Testimony by

Cynthia Canary, Director of the Illinois Campaign for Political Reform Illinois House Special Investigative Committee December 22, 2008

I am Cindi Canary, Director of the Illinois Campaign for Political Reform, a non-profit, non-partisan public interest group that conducts research and advocates reforms to promote public participation, address the role of money in politics and encourage integrity, accountability and transparency in government.

Ten years ago, ICPR was founded by the late Sen. Paul Simon, who throughout his government career – including his service in the Illinois House and the Senate – was dedicated to cleaning up politics and government in Illinois.

I am here today at the invitation of this Committee to address the pay-to-play scandal that has enveloped the Blagojevich Administration.

I want this Committee to be aware, that ICPR has publicly called for the governor's resignation. After reading the complaint lodged by the U.S. Attorney for the Northern District of Illinois, it was clear to ICPR that the allegations have created, at the very least, a serious appearance of corruption, which has impeded the governor's ability to govern. The governor intention to fight these charges without leaving office has made impeachment proceedings unavoidable.

We believe that the federal government's complaint provides ample basis for removing Gov. Blagojevich from office, particularly when viewed in conjunction with the fundraising and contracting patterns, which I will outline in my testimony. I do not personally know if the Governor has committed acts of corruption, but the appearance of corruption—a standard our courts have acknowledged in upholding campaign contribution limits—is indisputable. Over the past six years it has eaten away at the trust of Illinois citizens in their Governor and eviscerated his ability to govern.

ICPR fully recognizes and supports the governor's right to present a spirited and full defense in federal court. However, we do not confuse the anticipated federal indictment with the Illinois Constitutional proceeding, which this Committee is undertaking.

We believe that this Committee should consider whether the governor has through his actions, undermined public faith and confidence in government and the office of the governor.

My testimony is about "pay-to-play," which in the broadest terms is offering or asking for an inducement in exchange for an administrative action taken by a public official. The object of pay-to-play is to obtain a government contract, job or

other favor. Pay-to-play is a two-way street. It can be initiated by a corrupt official seeking private benefit from their public position or by a private citizen seeking to corrupt a public official. Pay-to-play is not unique to the Blagojevich Administration or to Illinois. Pay-to-play is partly the reason that former Governor George Ryan is housed today at a federal prison camp in Terre Haute, Indiana.

As long as both parties to a quid pro quo agreement keep the scheme to themselves, pay-to-play is extremely difficult to prove. However, this special investigative committee has the ability to dig much deeper than our researchers and the newspaper reporters who have examined the contributions and contracts.

ICPR has given Committee staff copies of numerous newspaper articles, as well as our research, showing the significant numbers of state contracts that have been awarded by the Blagojevich Administration to corporations and individuals who also have made large contributions to "Friends of Blagojevich," the governor's campaign committee.

ROD BLAGOJEVICH'S AGGRESSIVE FUNDRAISING PRACTICES

While it is unnecessary to explain Illinois' campaign finance law to this Committee, we should note for the record that Illinois places no limits on the size of campaign contributions and no restrictions on the transfer of money between committees, and (in contrast to federal law) allows corporations and unions to make direct contributions. Instead of limits and restrictions, Illinois requires only disclosure. If a public official wants to leverage governmental authority to generate campaign contributions or if a private party wants to use campaign contributions to influence a public official, Illinois' campaign finance law does nothing to prevent attempts at corruption.

When then-Congressman Rod Blagojevich created the "Prairie State Committee," a state political action committee and raised an inordinate amount of money for a committee not explicitly formed to support any cause or candidate, ICPR began to keep a close eye on the receipts.

By the time the committee formally changed its name to "Blagojevich for Governor" in August 2001, it had already amassed over \$2.25 million in receipts. Over the next six years the Governor raised an additional \$56 million. We believe that the patterns of fundraising that I will outline, when viewed in total, create an appearance of corruption, which has been a significant factor in the deterioration of our citizens' belief in the legitimacy of the Governor's continuation in office.

DISTURBING PATTERNS OF FUNDRAISING FROM 2002

As Rod Blagojevich ramped up his fundraising for the 2002 Primary Election, he reported significant, 5- and 6-figure donations from three different construction

companies, all of which shared the same address in Markham, Illinois. Research determined that these three companies were affiliated with Chris Kelly, and that a fourth company, CGK Consulting in Frankfort, was also connected. Together, these four firms accounted for over \$650,000 in donations and loans to the Blagojevich campaign. Kelly, of course, played a key role within his campaign as finance chairman, and later was named a Special Government Agent representing the governor with the Illinois Gaming Board. He is currently charged with tax fraud relating to gambling debts.

The pattern of making multiple, large, and apparently coordinated campaign contributions from affiliated entities to the governor's campaign fund was established early, and it became a pattern we looked for, and found, regularly.

From the day the gubernatorial campaign committee was formed, Rod Blagojevich's campaign fund has raised more than \$58 million in eight years -- an astonishing achievement. We came to see the fund as one of the most aggressive and effective fundraising machines in state history.

I outline this to illustrate that questionable, even alarming, fundraising practices were in evidence from the time that Mr. Blagojevich first set his eye on the governor's office. During Blagojevich's tenure, we have witnessed a sea change in how money and politics intersect.

I call your attention to a Chicago Tribune article from earlier this year. ("The governor's \$25,000 club; Big campaign donors to Blagojevich benefit from state," Chicago Tribune, April 27, 2008)

The Tribune's investigation found 235 checks written for exactly \$25,000 and payable to the governor's campaign. The Tribune discovered that three-fourths of them came from people or organizations that had gotten something favorable from the administration, such as contracts, board appointments, favorable policy positions and regulatory actions.

An examination of records at the State Board of Elections found that Rod Blagojevich's gubernatorial campaign fund has reported over 440 donations of \$25,000 or more, and that these donations account for more than \$21 million in receipts (including direct contributions, transfers, in-kind donations, and loans, but excluding other receipts).

Rod Blagojevich has raised more money than any other politician in this state's rich history and he has raised more, in large amounts of \$25,000 or more than any other candidate in the history of Illinois.

These donations raise red flags to outside observers such as ourselves. The disclosure reports say how much donors gave to whom and when, but they do not tell why the donation was made. In many instances, there is a troubling,

apparent correlation between donations and state actions. Media reports have noted that on many, many occasions, large donations to the governor's campaign fund came within weeks or days of the donor benefited from a positive action by an agency under the governor's control shortly after making a donation.

The Chicago Tribune highlighted several of these apparent correlations in a story published last April on what the Tribune called the governor's "\$25,000 Club."

The Tribune noted:

Attorney and political fundraiser Myron "Mike" Cherry made a \$25,000 donation on September 9, 2002; his law firm, Myron M Cherry and Associates made another \$25,000 donation on June 18, 2004. According to the Tribune, the Department of Financial and Professional Regulation hired Cherry's law firm, and the firm billed the state over \$900,000 for legal services.

Cordogan, Clark & Associates gave the Blagojevich fund \$25,000 on July 25, 2003. John Clark, a named partner with Cordogan, Clark & Associates, told the Tribune that Wilton Partners, the lead contractor on the Tollway Oasis project had urged him to make this contribution. John Clark's firm, Cordogan Clark, had a subcontract with Wilton Partners.

Patrick Engineering made a \$150 donation on July 19, 2002; in September of that year the company gave \$1,000; by 2007, it had given over \$56,000. The company has held state contracts worth an average of \$4 million in each of the last six fiscal years, principally with IDOT and the Tollway Authority.

ACS State and Local Solutions gave its first donation to the Blagojevich fund, of \$25,000, on July 25, 2003. It has since given about another \$25,000, over three donations. Its contracts with state agencies, mainly the Department of Healthcare and Family Services, have averaged \$17 million in each of the last six fiscal years. The Tribune noted that the contract, while initiated under the George Ryan administration, was finalized in 2003 in the same month as the \$25,000 donation was made to the Blagojevich fund.

Wight & Company gave the Blagojevich campaign fund \$500 on March 6, 2002, \$6,000 on May 22, 2002, and other donations through June of this year, bringing its total giving to the fund to over \$125,000. The company has three no-bid contracts with the Tollway, where most of its state contracts are; total state contracts have averaged over \$2.5 million over the last six years.

System Development Integration gave \$2,000 to the Blagojevich fund on June 23, 2000. The company made additional donations of \$10,000 on June 8, 2004 and \$5,000 on March 31, 2006; CEO David Gupta wrote a personal check for \$25,000 on July 14, 2003. The Tribune reported that System Development Integration was a subcontractor on a new emergency response headquarters; the firm has a contract with the Tollway worth over \$2 million for FY2009.

Environmental Design International gave over \$57,000 to the Blagojevich campaign fund, including donations of \$25,000 each on July 25, 2003 and June 21, 2004. The company had contracts worth \$560,000 in FY 2004.

These, sadly, are only a handful of examples of the troubling nexus between campaign contributions and the operation of state government.

In the last two decades, the size of campaign contributions made by state contractors to governors has grown tremendously.

Ten years ago, a contribution in excess of \$2,500 would raise eyebrows. Those are the ones that ICPR and journalists would look at more closely to see whether there was a connection to a state contractor. Some were from old friends and wealthy relatives, while others were from executives, corporations and labor unions that had received some benefit from state government.

When there is a nexus between a campaign contribution and a state contract or government job, the questions that we ask are: Were they just supporting officeholders who shared their political views? Or were they using campaign contributions to insure favorable treatment? Or were they responding to shakedowns by making campaign contributions to insure that the officeholder would not shut them out from consideration?

In recent years – the Blagojevich years -- the size of such contributions has exploded.

No longer does a \$2,500 contribution make anyone blink.

ICPR with assistance from Kent Redfield and the Sunshine Project examined contributions at the level of \$25,000 and above to the campaigns of Gov. Blagojevich, former Gov. George Ryan and former Governor Edgar.

Here are the numbers we found:

• Jim Edgar – We examined his last six years as governor and found he raised nearly \$11.8 million total. That included just eight contributions of \$25,000 or more, a total of \$422,000. The eight really big contributions to

Edgar constituted about 3.6 percent of the total Edgar raised.

- George Ryan We examined a six-year period that included his four years as Governor and as he geared up for his 2000 campaign. George Ryan raised almost \$20 million, and that included 35 contributions of \$25,000 or more, a total of \$1.6 million in those big contributions. Those 35 really big contributors to Ryan constituted 8.2 percent of the total Ryan raised.
- Rod Blagojevich We examined eight years that included his time as governor and the ramp up to the 2002 election. Rod Blagojevich raised \$58.3 million, and that included 435 contributions of \$25,000 or more, a total of \$20.6 million in those big contributions. Those 435 really big contributions constituted 35.3 percent of the total Blagojevich has raised.

Those large contributions are the ones that have been raising questions since Gov. Blagojevich took office.

THE ROLE OF STATE CONTRACTORS IN CAMPAIGN FUNDRAISING

In the last two decades, the size of campaign contributions made by state contractors to governors has grown tremendously.

In 2005, the Chicago Sun-Times analyzed contributions and state contracts. ("Donations and deals raise eyebrows," Chicago Sun-Times, January 30, 2005) The Sun-Times looked at 20 companies that had given a combined \$925,500 to Friends of Blagojevich and discovered the firms had been paid or were under contract to be paid a total of \$365 million by state government.

The criminal prosecutions of Tony Rezko, Chris Kelly, Stuart Levine and others have dramatically increased the public perception that state contracts, jobs and other benefits in the Blagojevich Administration are handed out to the largest campaign contributors and not to the firms or persons most qualified to receive them.

More recently, the Chicago Tribune found that state contractors had given \$250,000 of the \$650,000 in contributions that Blagojevich raised in June of this year, which happened to be the first 30 days after the House unanimously passed House Bill 824, the pay-to-play reform legislation. ("Governor steps up fundraising; Contractors' donations flow as reform bill sits," Chicago Tribune, July 29, 2008)

According to the Tribune analysis, more than 125 state contractors or their employees contributed at least \$399,000 to the governor's campaign in the first six months of this year. Those contractors have been awarded more than \$1.1 billion in state business since he was elected governor.

Utilizing public databases available from the State Board of Elections and Comptroller's Office, ICPR's own research has independently confirmed many of these news accounts.

Those contributions and the headlines led to the ultimate passage – over Gov. Blagojevich's veto – of House Bill 824. Beginning January 1, 2009, holders of state contracts valued at \$50,000 or more will be banned from contributing to the officeholder who awarded the contract.

Strangely and sadly, the enactment of that law is alleged to have caused the governor to go into overdrive to squeeze more campaign funds from state contractors. The complaint from the federal government explains that the governor recently attempted to raise as much money as possible from state contractors in advance of the ban.

Because the ban did not take effect immediately, it was a little like handing an arsonist the keys to a gas station and a box of matches and telling him you would be back to check on him in three months.

The people of Illinois and, indeed, the world are now viewing the five-alarm fire that has resulted.

As I noted above, at the beginning of my remarks, ICPR is a non-partisan research and advocacy organization. Our work has been broadly recognized as effective in bringing necessary and important reform to Illinois, including in the pay-to-play area, but clearly we have much, much more to do.

I am personally saddened and angered by the devastating impact that the alleged pay-to-play practices of the Blagojevich Administration have had on our state and on the public's confidence in government.

I would like to close by again applauding this Committee for its work in helping the Illinois General Assembly fulfill its responsibility under the Illinois Constitution.

The governor's \$25,000 club Big campaign donors to Blagojevich benefit from state

Gov. Rod Blagojevich's aggressive fundraising machine collected hundreds of \$25,000 checks in a campaign effort that dwarfed his predecessors', and most of these big givers ended up benefiting from his administration. A Tribune examination of all 235 of those donations shows that three of every four came from individuals, companies or interest groups who gotsomething – from lucrative state contracts to coveted state boardappointments to favorable policy and regulatory actions.

Donors interviewed said they gave to show their support for the firstDemocratic governor in a quarter-century or to get the attention of the newregime. But the Tribune found a pattern that raises new questions aboutpossible links between campaign donations and government actions.

Blagojevich insiders have been accused in a wide-ranging federal corruption investigation of exchanging favors for contributions. Last week, a formeragency director admitted in a plea agreement that he bought his job in partwith two \$25,000 donations.

While campaigning as a reformer who would end Illinois' "pay-to-play" reputation, Blagojevich relied heavily on donors with a stake in hisadministration. He proposed a cap on campaign contributions but has donelittle to pass the proposal.

Illinois is one of just five states with no limits on campaigncontributions. Most states prohibit individuals or companies from giving asmuch as \$25,000 to political candidates, according to the National Conference of State Legislatures.

A spokeswoman for the governor flatly denied any suggestion that Blagojevich traded favors for donations, as did an official with the governor's campaign fund, Friends of Blagojevich.

"Absolutely not," Doug Scofield, a top campaign adviser, wrote in an e-mailresponse to written questions. "There is no connection between campaign contributions and the awarding of contracts or jobs," he said. "The amount of the contribution is a decisionmade by the contributor alone."

Although there are some contributors who gave even larger amounts, for mostthe \$25,000 – about the price of a new Toyota Camry – was their largestpolitical donation ever. Political insiders and fundraisers interviewedacknowledge it was an amount pursued by the campaign from the early stages of Blagojevich's first run for governor.

A Chicago engineering firm and its affiliate wrote two \$25,000 checks in2006, and within months won \$25.4 million in new state business. A statelawmaker got a six-figure state job, one of more than four dozen donorsawarded jobs or appointments by Blagojevich. One Chicago pharmacist previouslytold the Tribune – and law enforcement – that his \$25,000 check to thegovernor's campaign was the price tag for fixing a critical state audit of hisdrugstore, an allegation the fundraiser who solicited the check adamantlydenies.

Breaking down donations

All told, Blagojevich's campaign has raised more than \$58 million since 2000, with nearly \$6 million coming in donations of exactly \$25,000. Those contributions – 235 in all – came from 166 different donors. Those donors are additional \$8.6 million in amounts larger and smaller than \$25,000.

For this report, the Tribune examined all donors who gave Blagojevich atleast one \$25,000 check, a snapshot of the governor's massive andunprecedented campaign effort.

While Blagojevich has received 235 checks for exactly \$25,000, hisimmediate predecessor, George Ryan – now in federal prison on corruptioncharges – received only 14 since beginning his run for governor. Aides toformer Republican Govs. Jim Edgar and James Thompson, who benefited from theirown powerful fundraising machines, agreed that \$25,000 checks were unusual.

Blagojevich has raised more than any other governor in Illinois history, according to state campaign finance records. It took his GOP predecessor, Ryan, 30 years of campaigning for state offices to raise \$40 million.

Of the 235 donations to Blagojevich, the Tribune found 175 came from companies, unions, trade groups or individuals who somehow benefited under hisadministration. More than three dozen are repeat contributors to political campaigns.

\The attorney's case

Chicago attorney Myron Cherry, a longtime supporter of Democraticpoliticians, sat on Blagojevich's finance committee from the early stages. Hesaid he thought \$25,000 was a target sought by the campaign at somefundraising events. Cherry made two \$25,000 donations to Blagojevich.

"I remember going to one fundraiser – there may have been others – where\$25,000 was published as a figure to be a co-host or something," Cherry said."It was on the invitation."

He said \$25,000 is "not an unusual figure in politics," and other amountswere also sought at Blagojevich fundraisers.

"Those of us who had enough money, those of us who wanted to see a changein leadership in this state, \$1,000 wasn't going to be enough," he said.

Six months after Cherry's second \$25,000 contribution, in June 2004, the state's insurance agency hired his law firm as part of a team to negotiate amultistate legal dispute over alleged fraud by insurance companies.

As part of the \$240 million settlement he helped negotiate between theinsurance companies and Illinois, Cherry said his firm billed \$900,000 infees. He said he submitted "thousands" of hours and reduced his hourly rate by40 percent.

Cherry said it is unfair even to suggest his contributions may have beenconnected to his state business.

"I solicited them for that business," he said. "I solicited several states. I was already involved in pursuing this litigation. It would have been bizarrefor the state to choose someone else to pursue litigation that I originated and pitched to them."

'An exclamation point'

Among the many first-time \$25,000 donors was a Chicago architectural firmthat designed the newly revamped oases on the Illinois Tollway.

John Clark, a principal with Cordogan, Clark & Associates, said that thelead agency on the project, the California firm Wilton Partners, suggestedCordogan, Clark also donate to Blagojevich. Wilton itself donated \$50,000 tothe governor's campaign fund on the same day. He said Wilton's leaders askedthe firm to make the donation as a way to call attention to the oases project, which at the time was moving slowly.

"Giving puts an exclamation point next to your name," Clark said.

After the donation was made, Clark said, the project started to go moresmoothly. But he said he wasn't sure that was a direct result of the donationor whether "people were finally getting up to speed."

He said he didn't see the donation as a favor and believes the state wasmerely living up to the terms of its original agreement signed under the Ryanadministration, in which Wilton has spent more than \$80 million to renovatethe oases and is paid by vendors renting space there.

"Maybe the contribution helped, but I can't say that for sure because itdidn't immediately happen," Clark said. "If that's a favor, it isn't much ofone."

"If we got anything it was not having to redraw our drawings and[specifications], which were being constrained at a low level [at the Tollway]," he added.

Officials from Wilton Partners did not return phone calls seeking comment.But Clark said Wilton's good work at the Tollway has been overshadowed byunfair allegations of political influence.

Clark's architecture firm was one of 15 donors who gave \$25,000 as part of July 2003 fundraiser at Navy Pier that raised more than \$1 million. All butone of the 15 received some benefit from Blagojevich's administration. \Fundraiser's admissions

Among the \$25,000 donors at that same fundraiser was Ali Ata, whoBlagojevich later picked to become director of the Illinois Finance Authority. Ata pleaded guilty last week to lying to federal agents when he denied histwo \$25,000 contributions helped get him his \$127,000-a-year job. Ata's pleacame amid the federal corruption trial of top Blagojevich insider Antoin" Tony" Rezko, who is accused of extorting bribes and campaign contributions from people seeking state business.

According to Ata's plea agreement, Blagojevich spoke with him at thatfundraiser. Ata said the governor called him a good supporter, acknowledgedthat Ata had made his second substantial donation and talked about Ata joininghis administration. Ata, now cooperating with federal prosecutors, faces up to 18 months in prison on charges that include lying to investigators about the conversation.

When Ata left his post at the finance authority in 2005 he was replaced bythe former executive of a Downstate bank whose parent company also contributed\$25,000 to Blagojevich. Jill Rendleman took over as director of the financeauthority after two years on its advisory board, a 2003 appointment shereceived the same month as her parent company's \$25,000 donation.

"I don't think the contribution we gave had anything to do with theappointment," said J. Hunt Bonan, vice chairman of the Peoples National Bankboard.

Bonan is now the chairman of the board of review for the state Department Employment Security, a post he also says had nothing to do with hiscompany's 10 donations to Blagojevich totaling \$119,000. Still, heacknowledges that donating doesn't hurt in doing business in Illinois, recalling a quote from the late U.S. Sen. Paul Simon, who once said that if hehad 20 phone calls waiting for him and he could only call one back, he wouldpick up the phone for the contributor.

"It does get attention," Bonan said.

\Board appointments

In addition to state jobs, the Tribune review revealed that Blagojevichappointed more than 40 of the \$25,000 donors or their close relatives or associates to typically unpaid but influential state regulatory boards and commissions.

Blagojevich spokeswoman Rebecca Rausch issued an e-mailed response toappointment questions, saying such decisions are vetted through the governor'soffice and based on the nominee's qualifications. In response to questionsabout state contracts, Rausch said: "Strong procurement rules are in placethat guide the process of awarding contracts, and it is independent of ouroffice."

Allegations of influence peddling have dogged at least one \$25,000contributor, who also helped raised hundreds of thousands more forBlagojevich.

Harish M. Bhatt, owner of the Basinger's Pharmacy chain based in Joliet, submitted the names of at least two Blagojevich appointees to the state's toppharmacy board and helped the state's top pharmacy regulator win his job. The Tribune reported last year that state pharmacy auditors probing allegations of Medicaid fraud at Basinger's complained their bosses were thwarting their vestigation.

Bhatt adamantly denied he exerted any improper influence and said theinvestigation against him stalled for lack of evidence. State police and federal corruption investigators reopened the Bhatt investigation after Tribune reports.

Bhatt also solicited a \$25,000 check from a Chicago pharmacist who was also in trouble with state regulators. The Chicago pharmacist told the Tribune and criminal investigators he made the donation as a form of protection butthought better of it and stopped payment on the check.

State police dismissed the allegations but reopened the case after Tribuneinquiries in late 2007. Federal agents are also looking at the allegations.

In the face of such allegations, the governor and his aides have repeatedly emphasized that they don't do business that way.

"We believe the thousands of contributors to Gov. Blagojevich's campaignbelieve in the things he is fighting

for, like making health care moreaffordable for working families and working to stimulate the economy bypassing a jobs bill," Scofield said.

\$25,000 donors, their state business

Donor: Patrick Engineering and Albin Carlson

- * Dates of \$25,000 donations: 5/25/2006 and 6/28/2006
- * \$25 million in state business

Awarded more than \$25.4 million in bid and no-bid contracts with the statetollway and transportation departments within months of the two contributions. All told, the two affiliated companies have earned \$52 million in businessdeals under the Blagojevich administration, but some of those contracts were initiated under Gov. George Ryan.

The companies have contributed more than \$345,000 to political candidates, including \$86,000 to Blagojevich. They donated a total of \$10,000 to formerGov. George Ryan and \$2,500 to former Gov. Jim Edgar. In a written response, company President Daniel Dietzler said his firmsnever expected anything in return for their donations.

He said his company often donates to candidates "who demonstrate strongleadership and who share values important to Patrick Engineering. We havealways supported leaders and we support Gov. Blagojevich because of hiscommitment to improving infrastructure and, in particular, rebuilding and expanding the tollway system."

Donor: ACS State & Local Solutions

- * Date of \$25,000 donation: 7/25/2003
- * \$79 million in contracts

Won a competitively bid state contract worth roughly \$15 million per yearto oversee the disbursement of child-support checks. The contract, signed with the Gov. George Ryan administration, was finalized under Blagojevich thesame month the national consulting firm made the donation. The firm hasdonated more than \$106,000 to political candidates, including \$49,087 toBlagojevich. Before Blagojevich took office, ACS received \$1.4 million instate business.

An ACS spokesman did not answer specific questions about why the firm madethe donations but e-mailed a statement that read, in part: "We contribute tocandidates and elected officials (of both parties) who we believe have or willhave a positive effect on federal, state and local government."

State officials say ACS turned around the disorganized and ineffective disbursement unit.

Donor: Wight & Co.

- * Dates of \$25,000 donations: 5/28/2004 and 5/2/2006
- * \$10 million in contracts

Awarded three no-bid contracts for inspection services and design work withthe state Toll Highway Authority after the first of two \$25,000 contributions.Mark T. Wight, owner of the company, was also part of a personal real estatedeal in 2005 that paid a broker's commission to Blagojevich's wife, Patricia,who owns her own real estate business. Wight sold his condominium for \$600,000 to his state lobbyist John Wyma, a longtime Blagojevich insider.

Wight and his companies have contributed more than \$600,000 to political candidates since 1994, including \$114,000 to Blagojevich. Wight declined to answer specific questions about his donations but has said he is proud of thework his company has done for the state.

Donor: Arthur J. Smith

- * Date of \$25,000 donation: 6/26/2006
- * More than \$700,000 in contracts

Won a bid for the largest of several contracts, to do background checks forthe Illinois Department of Children and Family Services beginning in 2004. Smith, a leading black entrepreneur in Chicago and owner of Art's Investigations, is also a business partner of longtime Blagojevich fundraiser Antoin "Tony" Rezko. Rezko is on trial on charges he corrupted state boards and improperly wielded influence with the governor. Smith has given \$95,465 to candidates since 1994, including \$35,000 to Blagojevich. He declined to comment for this report.

Donor: David Gupta

- * Date of \$25,000 donation: 7/14/2003
- * \$106,000 contract

Selected as a subcontractor on a new \$18 million, 50,000-square-foot stateemergency response headquarters. Gupta's company, System DevelopmentIntegration, was chosen by the lead contractor on the project after the contract was awarded in 2004.

Gupta has long been a Blagojevich supporter and was quoted in a statereport on hiring minority firms that being a "certified company has reallyhelped me get my foot in the door with government contracts that wereotherwise inaccessible to us."

A company spokeswoman said Gupta's donation had nothing to do with gettingthe state work. She said Gupta supported the governor because the governor favors stricter gun control laws.

Gupta and his company have donated a total of \$162,395 to political candidates, including \$102,425 to Blagojevich.

Donor: Environmental Design International

- * Date of \$25,000 donation: 6/21/2004
- * Contracts worth more than \$5 million

Won bid and no-bid contracts for survey, design and inspection work at the tollway and the state Transportation Department after the donation. DeborahSawyer, owner of the Chicago-based company, was recommended for a Blagojevichappointment to a state board by Rezko, but she did not get the post.

The company has donated more than \$129,000 to political candidates since 2001, including \$57,500 to Blagojevich. The company declined to discuss thereasons for its donations.

Donor: Former Illinois Rep. Phil Novak (D-Bradley)

- * Date of \$25,000 donation: 7/9/2002
- * \$102,800 state appointment

Appointed by the governor to head the Illinois Pollution Control Board onDec. 1, 2003.

Novak has contributed \$61,500 to candidates, including \$26,000 toBlagojevich. He raised about \$19,000 at a fundraiser he threw for Blagojevichin July 2002 to help his party retake the governor's mansion. Novak denied any connection between his contribution and the board position, a move that boosted his legislative salary and his pension. He retired in 2005.
