### HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 54

Offered by Representative Skillicorn:

WHEREAS, The Founders of our country empowered state legislators to be guardians of liberty against future abuses of power by the federal government; and

WHEREAS, The federal government has created a crushing national debt through improper and imprudent spending; and

WHEREAS, The federal government has invaded the legitimate roles of the states through the manipulative process of federal mandates, most of which are unfunded to a great extent; and

WHEREAS, The federal government has ceased to live under a proper interpretation of the Constitution of the United States; and

WHEREAS, It is the solemn duty of the states to protect the liberty of our people - particularly for the generations to come - by proposing Amendments to the Constitution of the United States through a Convention of the States under Article V for the purpose of restraining these and related abuses of power; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that the State of Illinois hereby makes application to Congress under the provisions of Article V of the Constitution of the United States for the calling of a convention of the states limited to proposing amendments to the Constitution of the United States that impose fiscal restraints on the federal government, limit the power and jurisdiction of the federal government, and limit the terms of office for its officials and for members of Congress; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Secretary of State is hereby directed to transmit copies of this application to the President and the Secretary of the United States Senate, the Speaker and the Clerk of the United States House of Representatives, and the members of the Senate and House of Representatives from this State; copies shall also be transmitted to the presiding officers of each of the legislative houses in the several states, requesting their cooperation; and be it further

RESOLVED, That this application constitutes a continuing application in accordance with Article V of the Constitution of the United States until the legislatures of at least two-thirds of the several states have made applications on the same subject; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be delivered to the Secretary of State.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 55

Offered by Representative Brady:

WHEREAS, Grain bin accidents are serious incidents that affect farmers across the country; and

WHEREAS, More than 900 cases of grain bin entrapments have been reported with a fatality rate of 62% in the past 50 years; and

WHEREAS, In 2015, over 22 grain bin entrapments occurred with at least 11 fatalities, and in 2014, 38 reported grain bin entrapments resulted in 17 fatalities which are the highest numbers since 2010 when 59 entrapments claimed 26 lives; and

WHEREAS, The actual number of grain bin related accidents may be higher than the documented numbers; and

WHEREAS, Grain bin accidents can tragically affect individuals, families, and communities; and

WHEREAS, Through education and awareness of hazards and safe-work practices and procedures, the number of preventable injuries and deaths associated with grain handling and storage may be reduced; and

WHEREAS, Routine inspections of grain bins, dryers, wagons, augers, and other grain related equipment, should be conducted to reduce the risk of grain-related hazards; and

WHEREAS, Designing and implementing emergency action plans for farms and commercial businesses can decrease grain-related fatalities and should be a high priority; and

WHEREAS, First organized by Nationwide Agribusiness in 2014, Grain Bin Safety Week is an annual observance that occurs the third full week of February to promote grain bin safety on farms and commercial grain-handling facilities; and

WHEREAS, Grain Bin Safety Week is a collaborative effort by industry leaders and agricultural professionals working together; therefore, be it

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 56

Offered by Representative Chapa LaVia:

WHEREAS, All citizens of the United States possess the basic human right to the preservation of personal dignity; and

WHEREAS, All citizens of the United States deserve the investment of every possible resource to ensure their lasting physical, mental, and emotional well-being; and

WHEREAS, The brave men and women of the United States Armed Forces who proudly serve, risk their lives to protect our freedoms; and

WHEREAS, Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) was first defined by the American Psychiatric Association in 1980 to commonly and more accurately understand and treat veterans who had endured severe traumatic combat stress; and

WHEREAS, Combat stress has historically been viewed as a mental illness caused by a pre-existing flaw of character or ability; the word "disorder" carries a stigma that perpetuates this misconception; and

WHEREAS, Post-traumatic stress injury (PTSI) can occur after experiencing a severely traumatic event to include, but not be exclusive to, sexual assault, child abuse, high-impact collisions and crashes, natural disasters, acts of terrorism, and military combat; and

WHEREAS, PTSI is a very common injury to the brain that is treatable and repairable; and

WHEREAS, Referring to the complications from post-traumatic stress as a disorder perpetuates the stigma and bias against mental illness; this stigma can discourage the injured from seeking proper and timely medical treatment; and

WHEREAS, Making PTSI less stigmatizing and more honorable can favorably influence those affected and encourage them to seek help without fear of retribution or shame; and

WHEREAS, Proper and timely treatment can diminish suicide rates; and

WHEREAS, All citizens suffering from PTSI deserve our compassion and consideration: those who have received these wounds in action against an enemy of the United States further deserve our tribute and acknowledgement; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare June 27, 2017 as "Illinois Post-Traumatic Stress Injury Awareness Day"; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we declare June of 2017 as "Illinois Post-Traumatic Stress Injury Awareness Month"; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the Department of Public Health and the Department of Veterans' Affairs to continue working to educate victims of abuse, crime, and natural disasters, and service members, veterans

and their families, and the general public, about the causes, symptoms, and treatment of post-traumatic stress injury; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Governor, the Director of the Department of Public Health, and the Director of the Department of Veterans' Affairs.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 59

Offered by Representative Cassidy:

WHEREAS, Self-care is a lifelong daily habit of healthy lifestyle choices, good hygiene practices, prevention of infection and illness, monitoring for signs and symptoms of changes in health, knowing when to consult a health care practitioner, and knowing when it is appropriate to self-treat conditions; and

WHEREAS, The United States Food and Drug Administration deems over-the-counter (OTC) medicines as safe and effective for the self-care treatment of minor acute and chronic health conditions and symptoms such as pain, the common cold, allergies, and other conditions that impact large segments of the population; and

WHEREAS, Over-the-counter medicines are either developed as new nonprescription medicines or switched from existing prescription medicines; and

WHEREAS, Over-the-counter nonprescription medicines are self-care products that consumers purchase in pharmacies, supermarkets, retail stores, and online; and

WHEREAS, Every dollar spent on over-the-counter medicines saves the United States health care system six to seven dollars each year, totaling \$102 billion in annual savings; and

WHEREAS, Nonprescription medicines help to ease the burden on health care practitioners, eliminating unnecessary medical examinations that could be avoided with appropriate self-care; and

WHEREAS, Illinois benefits when its citizens practice appropriate self-care, do not unnecessarily visit health care practitioners, and are empowered by higher self-esteem, improved health, and the reduced use of health care services; and

WHEREAS, Illinois encourages its citizens to take advantage of the availability of self-care to improve personal and public health, save personal and public treasury, and strengthen the sustainability of the Illinois health care system; and

WHEREAS, Achieving the potential of self-care is a shared opportunity for consumers, health care practitioners, policymakers, and regulators; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we recognize the importance of improving awareness of self-care and the value it represents to the citizens of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we support increased consumer empowerment through the development of new nonprescription medicines and the appropriate switch of certain prescription medicines to nonprescription; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we acknowledge that over-the-counter medicines can greatly improve and reduce costs to the public health system; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we encourage consumers, health care practitioners, policymakers, and regulators to communicate the benefits of self-care; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we recognizes February of 2017 as Self-Care Month in Illinois.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 60

Offered by Representative Jones:

WHEREAS, February 7, 2017 is the 16th annual commemoration and observance of National African-American HIV/AIDS Awareness Day; and

WHEREAS, This observance is a nationwide effort to mobilize African-American communities to get educated, tested, involved, and treated for HIV/AIDS, as it continues to devastate African-American communities; and

WHEREAS, National African-American HIV/AIDS Awareness Day is directed, planned, and strategically implemented by HIV/AIDS organizations to mobilize community-based organizations and stakeholders involved in HIV/AIDS prevention, care, and treatment; and

WHEREAS, African-Americans account for 44% of people living with HIV, although they represent just 12% of the United States population; and

WHEREAS, Nearly 43,000 residents of Illinois are living with HIV (including the undiagnosed) and 51% of people newly diagnosed with HIV are African-American; and

WHEREAS, Young African-American gay men under the age of 30 in Chicago have an infection rate three times greater than their white counterparts; and

WHEREAS, At the current rate of infection, nationally 1 in 4 gay African-American men will become HIV-positive by the time they are 25, and 1 in 2 will have HIV by the time they are 35; and

WHEREAS, Of those African-Americans that are HIV-positive, fewer than half are prescribed antiretroviral therapy (HIV medication), and just 37% reach viral suppression; and

WHEREAS, Over two-thirds of women diagnosed with HIV in the United States are African-American; Center for Disease Control data reports that by race/ethnicity, African-American transgender women have the highest percentage of new HIV positive test results; and

WHEREAS, HIV medications taken daily (Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis or PrEP) have a greater than 90% chance of preventing HIV infection in people who are HIV-negative, but awareness of PrEP and access to PrEP is low in the most vulnerable communities; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois General Assembly and administration failed to transfer money to the African-American American HIV/AIDS Response Fund resulting in an inability to make grants to organizations focused on fighting the epidemic in the African-American community; and

WHEREAS, Numerous organizations, faith-based institutions, public health entities, and impacted citizens are hosting community events to recognize this day and its importance to African-Americans and all concerned citizens; and

WHEREAS, It is fitting that we join with these local, national, and international groups to express our strong support for National African-American HIV/AIDS Awareness Day and the initiatives to prevent HIV/AIDS in African-American communities and provide access to and utilization of HIV/AIDS prevention, treatment, and support services to those affected by HIV/AIDS; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we designate February 7, 2017 as National African-American HIV/AIDS Awareness Day in Illinois, and encourage local residents to strongly support this day and participate in events planned to commemorate the occasion.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 61

Offered by Representative Meier:

WHEREAS, Several organizations operating in Illinois advocate on behalf of individuals with developmental disabilities to ensure that they receive the highest quality of care; and

WHEREAS, Many of these advocacy groups receive funding from the federal government to advance their missions; and

WHEREAS, Sources of funding include Federal Protection and Advocacy Grants, and funding from the U.S. Department of Labor, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, and the U.S. Department of Education; and

WHEREAS, Some advocacy groups work to facilitate the transition of developmentally disabled residents from state- operated developmental centers (SODCs) to community integrated living arrangements (CILAs); and

WHEREAS, In light of recent findings that residents of CILAs were subject to egregious acts of abuse and neglect, the U.S. Government should ensure the funding they provide to advocacy groups is being properly used and distributed to the highest quality organizations; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge Congress to conduct a federal hearing on the developmental disability advocacy groups that receive federal funding; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the hearing should evaluate the effectiveness toward protecting all developmentally disabled individuals as well as the proper use of federal funds at each organization; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the results of the hearing should be acted upon by the Illinois General Assembly by enacting legislation as needed to guarantee that the developmentally disabled residents of Illinois are being supported by the highest quality advocacy groups.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 62

Offered by Representative Davidsmeyer:

WHEREAS, Lymphedema is swelling that occurs in the arms and legs of an individual, often caused by the removal of, or damage to, lymph nodes as part of a cancer treatment or other infection; and

WHEREAS, The factors that increase the risk of lymphedema include cancer treatment, age, excess weight or obesity, or rheumatoid or psoriatic arthritis; and

WHEREAS, Undiagnosed lymphedema can lead to serious complications, such as bacterial infections of the skin and lymph vessels or lymphangiosarcoma, which is a rare form of soft tissue cancer that results from severe cases of the disease; and

WHEREAS, Lymphedema cannot be cured, but the symptoms can be managed through a variety of treatment options, such as exercise, massage, therapy, and compression garments; and

WHEREAS, The necessary compression garments and therapy treatment options can cost between \$200-\$3,000 for a patient and are often not covered by insurance plans; and

WHEREAS, Lymphedema is not well-known and is often undiagnosed; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we encourage increased public awareness of lymphedema; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Governor, the Director of the Department of Public Health, all constitutional officers, and all members of the General Assembly in order to raise awareness of lymphedema.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 68

Offered by Representative Gordon-Booth:

WHEREAS, On September 17, 2008, the Electronic Products Recycling and Reuse Act, Public Act 95-0959, was enacted, setting forth procedures for the recycling and reuse of covered electronic devices in Illinois; and

WHEREAS, The Electronic Products Recycling and Reuse Act banned the disposal of covered electronic devices in landfills and incinerators beginning January 1, 2012; and

WHEREAS, To provide adequate collection of discarded electronic devices and comply with the disposal ban, more than 500 collection sites statewide are currently registered with the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) to accept electronic wastes; and

WHEREAS, Local governments statewide have contracted with electronic waste processors and recyclers for collection, reuse, and recycling of discarded electronics, providing a vital service to their residents; and

WHEREAS, A significant component of the discarded electronic waste stream collected to date has been, and continues to be, cathode ray tube (CRT) devices, including televisions and computer monitors; and

WHEREAS, CRT glass contains lead at a sufficiently high concentration to meet the definition of hazardous waste, necessitating handling the glass in a manner that protects human health and the environment; and

WHEREAS, The principal recycling market for CRT glass was historically the production of new CRTs; and

WHEREAS, Demand for new CRTs historically provided an economic incentive to recycle CRT glass for use in the manufacturing of new CRTs, and recyclers received revenue for the CRT glass provided to CRT manufacturers; and

WHEREAS, New CRTs have essentially ceased to be purchased in the United States, and there are no CRT manufacturing facilities located in the United States; and

WHEREAS, All CRT glass used in the manufacturing of new CRTs is now exported to India to the single remaining CRT manufacturing facility in the world; and

WHEREAS, There exist limited additional available outlets for the legitimate recycling of CRT glass in the United States; and

WHEREAS, The quantity of CRT glass collected far exceeds current demand and available markets for the glass; and

WHEREAS, CRT glass processing and recycling now carries a substantial cost, a significant change since the Electronic Products Recycling and Reuse Act was enacted in 2008; and

WHEREAS, The increased cost to process CRT glass has caused a number of electronic waste collection programs operated by local governments in Illinois to bear the cost increases or to be discontinued to avoid accumulation of CRTs; and

WHEREAS, Stockpiles of abandoned CRT glass have been discovered at several former electronic waste processing facilities across the United States, due to the lack of markets for CRT glass and the high cost associated with existing markets; and

WHEREAS, Kuusakoski Recycling and Peoria Disposal Company (PDC), both Illinois-based businesses, developed and permitted a CRT glass solution, the KleanKover Recycling Solution, whereby CRT glass is treated to reduce the leachable lead levels in the glass (the principal environmental concern associated with CRTs) below stringent federal thresholds and placed as Alternative Daily Cover (ADC) in a permitted landfill; and

WHEREAS, Kuusakoski Recycling and PDC have successfully operated the KleanKover Recycling Solution since November of 2013; and

WHEREAS, Given the lack of viable recycling markets, the IEPA has determined that treated CRT glass used as ADC can be counted towards manufacturer recycling goals under the Electronic Products Recycling and Reuse Act, as documented in IEPA correspondence to Kuusakoski Recycling on November 26, 2013; and

WHEREAS, Sustainable Electronics Recycling International (SERI), administrators of the R2 Standard (a voluntary certification standard for electronic waste recyclers) has prohibited its certified recyclers from using the KleanKover Recycling Solution or any other use of CRT glass as ADC; and

WHEREAS, At least 11 government jurisdictions in Illinois, representing over 4.3 million people and with some of the most effective e-waste recycling programs in the U.S., have petitioned SERI to reconsider its position on CRT glass management, citing the need for additional CRT glass management options in the U.S.; and

WHEREAS, Basel Action Network (BAN), administrators of the eStewards Standard (a separate voluntary certification standard for electronic waste recyclers) has defined any use of treated CRT glass within a disposal facility, including use as ADC, as a "last resort" option, effectively prohibiting use of the KleanKover Recycling Solution; and

WHEREAS, BAN has expressed interest in considering retrievable storage of CRT glass in permitted, monitored, and contained designated disposal sites as a preferred CRT glass management method; and

WHEREAS, In response to BAN's interest, PDC has proposed to develop a designated storage cell at its Indian Creek Landfill to provide storage and future retrieval of CRT glass, should markets develop to utilize the leaded glass; and

WHEREAS, The Indian Creek Landfill is fully permitted to develop the retrievable storage cell and accept treated CRT glass for placement in the cell, as confirmed by IEPA in a letter to PDC dated January 26, 2015; and

WHEREAS, PDC has established a perpetual care fund for the Indian Creek Landfill, consisting of a trust fund held by a third-party and available to Tazewell County (the host jurisdiction for the landfill), which provides funding to monitor and maintain the landfill into perpetuity, an even greater level of financial and environmental protection than is required under state and federal regulations; and

WHEREAS, PDC hosted a tour at the Indian Creek Landfill on October 23, 2014 for approximately 35 attendees of the annual conference of the Illinois Counties Solid Waste Management Association (ILCSWMA) to show attendees how CRT glass is currently managed, present the plan for retrievable storage, and answer questions; and

WHEREAS, ILCSWMA conference attendees were subsequently polled to determine their support for allowing treated CRT glass to be placed in a landfill regardless of whether it is used as ADC or placed in a dedicated cell for retrievable storage, and attendees voiced nearly unanimous support of this option with only 2 of the approximately 60 participants dissenting; and

WHEREAS, Kuusakoski Recycling and PDC formally petitioned BAN on November 18, 2014 to modify its standard and allow, as an additional preferred CRT glass management option, the placement of treated CRT glass in a retrievable storage cell within a permitted disposal site which has a perpetual care fund established; and

WHEREAS, At least 10 government jurisdictions in Illinois representing nearly 4 million people have sent letters to BAN in support of Kuusakoski Recycling and PDC's petition and urging BAN'S approval in order to maintain their vital electronic waste collection and recycling programs for their residents; and

WHEREAS, The option of retrievable storage of treated CRT glass in a dedicated cell at a permitted disposal site will provide needed environmentally protective, cost effective, and immediately available capacity for CRT glass, resulting in relief for residents, local governments, and recyclers across Illinois and the United States to manage this problematic material and reduce the potential for future discoveries of stockpiled material that would pose a significant environmental threat; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the Basel Action Network and the e-Stewards Leadership Council to approve the pending petition submitted by Kuusakoski Recycling and Peoria Disposal Company to allow the placement of treated CRT glass into a dedicated retrievable storage cell in a permitted disposal facility; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Executive Director of the Basel Action Network and the policy director of the Basel Action Network.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 69

Offered by Representative Beiser:

WHEREAS, Heroin addiction continues to be a serious and deadly problem in the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, Heroin accounts for one-quarter of substance related treatment admissions in Illinois; and

WHEREAS, Nearly 4% of youths reported using heroin in 2013; and

WHEREAS, 681 deaths were caused by heroin overdoses in 2014; and

WHEREAS, Illinois still heavily relies on the 12-step program to address heroin and over 300 other types of addictions; and

WHEREAS, Study after study has proven that 12-step programs have a poor success rate of only between 5% and 10%; and

WHEREAS, Twelve-step programs have a dropout rate of 95% after one year in the program; and

WHEREAS, Treatment models using behavioral science have shown a great deal of promise in many medical and mental health circles; and

WHEREAS, Countless loved ones have had to endure the pain and heartache associated with heroin addiction; and

WHEREAS, With 12-step programs having such low success rates action must be taken to save lives from heroin and other addictions; and

WHEREAS, A new treatment method that meets the needs of the addicted and that uses a behavioral methodology to better foster heroin addiction recovery is urgently needed; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we encourage the Illinois Department of Human Services to address heroin addiction and implement evidence-based practices for medication-assisted treatment services that meet the needs of the addicted in Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we designate November 4, 2017 as Heroin Addiction Awareness Day in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to Governor Rauner, Secretary of the Illinois Department of Human Services James T. Dimas, and Kari Karidis.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 75

Offered by Representative Flowers:

WHEREAS, On November 20, 1989, the United Nations General Assembly adopted the Convention on the Rights of the Child (Convention) to promote basic human rights for all children; and

WHEREAS, The Convention aims to protect children from discrimination, neglect, and abuse by establishing a full range of civil, political, economic, social, and cultural rights; and

WHEREAS, With the exception of the United States, South Sudan, and Somalia, every other member state of the United Nations - 193 countries - have ratified and accepted the Convention; and

WHEREAS, Although the United States had considerable influence in the drafting of the Convention and subsequently signed it on February 16, 1995, the Convention has never been presented to the U.S. Senate for advise and consent - the necessary and final step to U.S. ratification; and

WHEREAS, Without U.S. Senate approval, the Convention has no effect on children living in the United States, thereby leaving them without the protections contained within this important treaty; and

WHEREAS, Former President Obama has called the United States' failure to ratify the Convention "embarrassing"; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge President Donald Trump to submit the U.N. Convention on the Rights of the Child to the U.S. Senate for its advice and consent without delay, and further call on the U.S. Senate to move swiftly to approve the Convention; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to President Trump, U.S. Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, and U.S. Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 76

Offered by Representative Flowers:

WHEREAS, The Social Security Fairness Act of 2013 was introduced into the U.S. House of Representatives on April 26, 2013 as H.R. 1795 and into the U.S. Senate on May 8, 2013 as S. 896; and

WHEREAS, The Social Security Fairness Act of 2013 was to amend Title II of the Social Security Act to repeal the Government Pension Offset and the Windfall Elimination Provision; and

WHEREAS, The Government Pension Offset was enacted in 1977 and the Windfall Elimination Provision was enacted in 1983; and

WHEREAS, The majority of public employees affected by the Government Pension Offset lost their entire spousal benefit despite the fact that their spouses paid Social Security contributions for many years; and

WHEREAS, An affected public employee loses an average of \$3,000 per year because of the Government Pension Offset; and

WHEREAS, The Windfall Elimination Provision causes public employees to lose up to 60% of the benefits that they earned; and

WHEREAS, According to the Social Security Administration's actuaries, the long-term cost of eliminating both of these provisions is negligible while the loss of income to affected employees caused by these provisions forces some civil servants into poverty; and

WHEREAS, These provisions discriminate against teachers, police, firefighters, social workers, and other civil servants; and

WHEREAS, The State and national shortage of teachers, police officers, and firefighters is exacerbated by these provisions because they discourage people from entering and staying in these professions; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the U.S. Congress to introduce and pass legislation that eliminates both the Government Pension Offset and the Windfall Elimination Provision; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to President Donald Trump, U.S. Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, U.S. Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer, U.S. Speaker of the House Paul Ryan, U.S. House of Representatives Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi, and all members of the Illinois Congressional Delegation.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 77



Offered by Representative Flowers:

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois and the nation at large has seen a horrid outbreak of gun violence, seen daily on the streets of Chicago and other major cities and tragically spotlight in Tucson, Arizona, Denver, Colorado, Sandy Hook, Connecticut, Roanoke, Virginia, and Roseburg, Oregon; and

WHEREAS, The citizens of the major cities of our State and our nation see killings on the order of these highly publicized mass murders on a regular basis; and

WHEREAS, Today, there are enough privately owned guns in the United States of America to arm every man, woman, and child; and

WHEREAS, The fallout of the Great Recession of 2008 is still being felt in many parts of this country, where there are foreclosed homes and businesses, abandoned properties and vacant lots, and a desperate need for economic development; and

WHEREAS, In Illinois, we see high levels of unemployment and broad declines in healthcare, deteriorating infrastructure, and shrinking pensions and retirement savings as workers in all fields of education, healthcare, and public safety are laid off as a result of a financial crisis they did not create; and

WHEREAS, In 1967, the report of the Kerner Commission stated that "To pursue our present course will involve the continuing polarization of the American community and, ultimately, the destruction of basic democratic values. The alternative is not blind repression or capitulation to lawlessness. It is the realization of common opportunities for all within a single society"; and

WHEREAS, Since 1980, cities, states, and the nation have asked our citizens to Just Say No, recognize A Thousand Points of Light, and pass Three Strike laws and have preached Zero Tolerance, but the violence continues unabated; and

WHEREAS, School District U-46 (Elgin) conducted routine water sampling and found abnormally high levels of Legionella; and

WHEREAS, The school district closed its facilities in an effort to protect school children; and

WHEREAS, Legionella is a bacteria that is found naturally in the environment, usually in warm water; and

WHEREAS, In situations where environmental factors are favorable to the growth of Legionella in large numbers and the bacteria is aerosolized, human illness can occur; and

WHEREAS, Legionnaires' disease is transmitted by the inhalation of a mist or vapor that has been contaminated with Legionella bacteria; and

WHEREAS, The most vulnerable population for contracting Legionnaires' disease is individuals 49 or older, smokers, and people with chronic lung disease or weakened immune systems; and

WHEREAS, Legionnaires' disease is not transmitted person to person; and

WHEREAS, The United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends, when Legionella is identified, to treat the water; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Department of Public Health has encouraged school districts, prior to testing for Legionella, to implement and develop plans for the testing if a positive result were to occur; and

WHEREAS, School districts are following the testing recommendations as outlined by the American Society of Heating, Refrigerating and Air-Conditioning Engineers Standards; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we encourage the Illinois State Board of Education and the Illinois Department of Public Health to work in collaboration with school districts to develop and implement plans for the testing of Legionella; and be it further

RESOLVED, The Illinois State Board of Education and the Illinois Department of Public Health update the General Assembly with a report on their progress by December 31, 2016; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be provided to the State Superintendent of Education and Director of Public Health.

WHEREAS, A permanent control tower would make for safer landings at the airport, which has two intersecting runways; it would attract more commercial jets and increase the economic growth in the area; therefore, be it

HOUSE RESOLUTION 100

WHEREAS, The Medicaid program in Illinois has an immense, and growing, impact, both in terms of taxpayer dollars and the effect it has on citizens across the State; and

WHEREAS, State resources for healthcare services are currently so scarce that many healthcare providers are discontinuing services, leading to a profoundly detrimental impact on our communities; and

WHEREAS, Enrollment under the Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services' Medical Assistance Programs (Medicaid) exceeds three million; and

WHEREAS, A sizable portion of the Medicaid population is currently enrolled, often mandatorily, in Managed Care Organizations (MCOs), making outlays to MCOS, measured in billions of dollars, one of the largest resource uses in the State; and

WHEREAS, There has been little information disseminated to the General Assembly in terms of how State resources are being spent on MCOs and on the overall healthcare outcomes for individuals enrolled in these MCOs; and

WHEREAS, In this quickly evolving environment, the General Assembly must stay engaged in Medicaid funding and corresponding healthcare outcome issues and must be prepared to make legislative and administrative recommendations; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that the Auditor General is directed to conduct an audit of Medicaid MCOs, which includes a comparison of State expenditures between MCOs and fee-for-service entities; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the audit shall examine capitation rate setting and reimbursement issues for Medicaid MCOs for fiscal year 2015 with respect to the following issues:

- (1) Compare the total dollar amount of all reported encounter data submitted to the

Illinois Department of Family Services (DHFS) during SFY 2015 to the total dollar amount of reported claims payments made on behalf of Illinois Medicaid individuals by MCOs as reported to DHFS during SPY 2015;

(2) Whether encounter data is used by the Department of Healthcare and Family Services (DHFS) to set capitation rates;

(3) Calculate the aggregate amount of MCO capitation payments made by DHFS during SFY2015 (exclude Hospital Assessment pass-through payments from this calculation);

(4) The amount of payments made by DHFS to reimburse for-profit MCOs for the ACA Health Insurance Fee (HIP); determine if this HIP payment is mandated by federal CMS;

(5) The amount of payments made by DHFS to reimburse for-profit MCOs for "gross-sup" related to the HIP payment; determine the purpose of the "gross-up" payments;

(6) The incidence to which the MCO capitation rates contain supplemental, ORF-based payments to providers; for these payments, determine the amount of the supplemental, which providers received these payments, and whether these monies were directly tied to services actually provided (do not include payments associated with the Hospital Assessment Program);

(7) What administrative costs are paid to MCOs in terms of total dollars and percent of overall MCO medical based-payments;

(8) What is the overall average medical loss ratio (MLR) for all MCOs in aggregate and for each MCO individually; for the purposes of this audit, MLR is defined as all paid claims made by MCOs as reported to HFS for state fiscal year 2015 divided by aggregate MCO capitation payments made by DHFS during the fiscal year;

(9) What the denial rates are for MCOs and for fee-for-service providers billing the DHFS; determine whether there is a higher denial rate for services paid by MCOs; and

(10) To the extent information is available, determine how Illinois' rate setting methodology compares to other comparable states; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services and any other State agency having information relevant to this audit cooperate fully and promptly with the Auditor General's Office in its conduct; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Auditor General commence this audit as soon as possible and report his findings and recommendations upon completion in accordance with the provisions of Section 3-14 of the Illinois State Auditing Act.

## HOUSE RESOLUTION 101

Offered by Representative Kifowit:

WHEREAS, According to the Women in Military Service for America Memorial, 2.5 million American women have served or are serving in the United States Armed Forces since the American Revolution; and

WHEREAS, According to the United States Department of Veterans Affairs, 55,000 women veterans reside in Illinois; and

WHEREAS, During the American Revolution, Margaret Corbin, dubbed "Captain Molly", became the first woman to receive a military pension; she was wounded during the defense of Ft. Washington when her husband, John Corbin, was killed and she assumed his cannon post; and

WHEREAS, During the Civil War, women served in many roles supporting military forces; they organized public relief and sanitary commissions that gathered and distributed supplies to the troops; nurses and matrons staffed government and regimental hospitals; women disguised themselves as male soldiers to fight on the front, and also served as laundresses, cooks, and spies; and

WHEREAS, During the Spanish-American War, over 1,500 women served as nurses with the Army in Hawaii, Cuba, the Philippines, Puerto Rico, on the hospital ship USS Relief, and in stateside hospitals; and

WHEREAS, During World War I, 12,000 women served stateside, freeing men to fight in Europe; overseas, Army and Navy nurses, volunteers with the American Red Cross, the YMCA, the YWCA, the Salvation Army, and the American Women's Hospital Service all worked together caring for the "doughboys"; over 400 women died as a result of their service; and

WHEREAS, During World War II, approximately 40,000 American military women served stateside and overseas; women served in the Army, Navy, Marines, Coast Guard, and as members of the Women Airforce

Service Pilots; women served in every theater of the war and in many non-traditional roles; 88 women military nurses were held prisoners of war and more than 460 women lost their lives; and

WHEREAS, The Women's Armed Services Integration Act of 1958, signed by President Truman on June 12, 1948, granted women permanent status in the regular and reserve forces of the Army, Navy, Marines, and the newly created Air Force; and

WHEREAS, During the Korean War era, over 50,000 women again served both stateside and overseas; in Korea, Army nurses served in Mobile Army Surgical Hospitals (MASH) and general hospitals, while Air Force nurses supported air evacuation missions, and Navy nurses served on nearby hospital ships; and

WHEREAS, During the Vietnam War, 7,000 women served in Southeast Asia; the majority were nurses assigned to military hospitals, air evacuation, hospital ships, and field units, many of them were wounded; eight women who died are memorialized on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C.; and

WHEREAS, In 1970, the first woman was promoted to General after an amendment to the United States Code removed restrictions on the careers of female officers which had previously kept women from the general and flag ranks; and

WHEREAS, The Department of Defense Appropriation Authorization Act of 1976, signed by President Gerald Ford, established the admission of women into United States military academies; 119 women entered West Point, 81 entered the Naval Academy, and 157 enrolled at the Air Force Academy; women also enrolled in the Coast Guard Academy and the Merchant Marine Academy; and

WHEREAS, Approximately 410,000 American women deployed for Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm, making it the single largest deployment of military women in U.S. military history; women served in all areas of the operations, with the exception of direct combat; two women became prisoners of war, and five were killed in action; and

WHEREAS, Women have participated in U.S. military operations in Grenada, Panama, Honduras, Bosnia, Croatia, Somalia, Rwanda, and Haiti; laws banning women from flying in combat were repealed in 1991, and those banning women from duty on combat ships were revoked in 1993; and

WHEREAS, In March of 1996, Sergeant Heather Lynn Johnsen became the first woman to be awarded the Guard, Unknown Soldier Identification Badge, the second-least awarded badge in the Army; that same year, the first women were promoted to military three-star ranks when Navy Rear Admiral Patricia Tracey was promoted to Vice Admiral, and Marine Major General Carol Mutter was promoted to Lieutenant General; and

Whereas, Women serving in the military are deployed around the world and have supported major missions including Operation Able Sentry on the Serbian/Macedonia border, Operations Joint Endeavor and Decisive Edge, NATO missions in Bosnia, and Operations Southern Watch, Pacific Wave, and Provide Comfort, which supported the no-fly zone established against Iraq and offered humanitarian relief to Kurdish evacuees; and

WHEREAS, In 1998, for the first time, a woman fighter pilot delivered a payload of missiles and laser-guided bombs in combat; a year later, Air Force Lieutenant Colonel Eileen Collins became the first woman to command the space shuttle; also in 1999, Navy Rear Admiral Evelyn Fields became the first woman and first African American to command the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration Corps. (NOAA); in 2000, the Coast Guard promoted its first women to flag officer ranks; in 2000, Navy Lieutenant Commander Darlene Iskra became the first woman to command a Navy warship at sea; and

WHEREAS, Women were among the first troops deployed in response to the September 11, 2001 terrorist attacks; when Operation Enduring Freedom was launched a month later, women were again among the first deployed; on March 23, 2003, Army PFC Lori Piestewa became the first servicewoman to be killed in Operation Iraqi Freedom and the first Native American servicewoman ever to die in battle; PFC Piestewa, PFC Jessica Lynch, and SPC Shoshana Johnson became prisoners of war during the early days of the operation; by the end of 2004, 19 servicewomen had been killed in Iraq as a result of hostile action since the beginning of the war; and

WHEREAS, In 2005, Sergeant Leigh Ann Hester of the Kentucky Air National Guard, became the first woman to be awarded the Silver Star for combat action; she is one of 13 women to ever be awarded the Silver Star and the only woman to receive the award for combat action; the other 12 were nurses awarded for valor in World War I and World War II; and

WHEREAS, Today, an estimated 344,500 women serve in the U.S. Armed Forces on active duty, in the National Guard and Reserves, at every enlisted rank, and within the officer corps; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare November 9, 2017 as "Illinois Women

Veterans Day" to commemorate the sacrifices endured and the valor displayed by American Women veterans; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to the Director of the Illinois Department of Veterans' Affairs, Erica Jeffries.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 108

Offered by Representative Gordon-Booth:

WHEREAS, On September 17, 2008, the Electronic Products Recycling and Reuse Act, Public Act 95-0959, was enacted, setting forth procedures for the recycling and reuse of covered electronic devices in Illinois; and

WHEREAS, The Electronic Products Recycling and Reuse Act banned the disposal of covered electronic devices in landfills and incinerators beginning January 1, 2012; and

WHEREAS, To provide adequate collection of discarded electronic devices and comply with the disposal ban, more than 500 collection sites statewide are currently registered with the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) to accept electronic wastes; and

WHEREAS, Local governments statewide have contracted with electronic waste processors and recyclers for collection, reuse, and recycling of discarded electronics, providing a vital service to their residents; and

WHEREAS, A significant component of the discarded electronic waste stream collected to date has been, and continues to be, cathode ray tube (CRT) devices, including televisions and computer monitors; and

WHEREAS, CRT glass contains lead at a sufficiently high concentration to meet the definition of hazardous waste, necessitating handling the glass in a manner that protects human health and the environment; and

WHEREAS, The principal recycling market for CRT glass was historically the production of new CRTs; and

WHEREAS, Demand for new CRTs historically provided an economic incentive to recycle CRT glass for use in the manufacturing of new CRTs, and recyclers received revenue for the CRT glass provided to CRT manufacturers; and

WHEREAS, New CRTs have essentially ceased to be purchased in the United States, and there are no CRT manufacturing facilities located in the United States; and

WHEREAS, All CRT glass used in the manufacturing of new CRTs is now exported to India to the single remaining CRT manufacturing facility in the world; and

WHEREAS, There exist limited additional available outlets for the legitimate recycling of CRT glass in the United States; and

WHEREAS, The quantity of CRT glass collected far exceeds current demand and available markets for the glass; and

WHEREAS, CRT glass processing and recycling now carries a substantial cost, a significant change since the Electronic Products Recycling and Reuse Act was enacted in 2008; and

WHEREAS, The increased cost to process CRT glass has caused a number of electronic waste collection programs operated by local governments in Illinois to bear the cost increases or to be discontinued to avoid accumulation of CRTs; and

WHEREAS, Stockpiles of abandoned CRT glass have been discovered at several former electronic waste processing facilities across the United States, due to the lack of markets for CRT glass and the high cost associated with existing markets; and

WHEREAS, Kuusakoski Recycling and Peoria Disposal Company (PDC), both Illinois-based businesses, developed and permitted a CRT glass solution, the KleanKover Recycling Solution, whereby CRT glass is



treated to reduce the leachable lead levels in the glass (the principal environmental concern associated with CRTs) below stringent federal thresholds and placed as Alternative Daily Cover (ADC) in a permitted landfill; and

WHEREAS, Kuusakoski Recycling and PDC have successfully operated the KleanKover Recycling Solution since November of 2013; and

WHEREAS, Given the lack of viable recycling markets, the IEPA has determined that treated CRT glass used as ADC can be counted towards manufacturer recycling goals under the Electronic Products Recycling and Reuse Act, as documented in IEPA correspondence to Kuusakoski Recycling on November 26, 2013; and

WHEREAS, Sustainable Electronics Recycling International (SERI), administrators of the R2 Standard (a voluntary certification standard for electronic waste recyclers) has prohibited its certified recyclers from using the KleanKover Recycling Solution or any other use of CRT glass as ADC; and

WHEREAS, At least 11 government jurisdictions in Illinois, representing over 4.3 million people and with some of the most effective e-waste recycling programs in the U.S., have petitioned SERI to reconsider its position on CRT glass management, citing the need for additional CRT glass management options in the U.S.; and

WHEREAS, Basel Action Network (BAN), administrators of the eStewards Standard (a separate voluntary certification standard for electronic waste recyclers) has defined any use of treated CRT glass within a disposal facility, including use as ADC, as a "last resort" option, effectively prohibiting use of the KleanKover Recycling Solution; and

WHEREAS, BAN has expressed interest in considering retrievable storage of CRT glass in permitted, monitored, and contained designated disposal sites as a preferred CRT glass management method; and

WHEREAS, In response to BAN's interest, PDC has proposed to develop a designated storage cell at its Indian Creek Landfill to provide storage and future retrieval of CRT glass, should markets develop to utilize the leaded glass; and

WHEREAS, The Indian Creek Landfill is fully permitted to develop the retrievable storage cell and accept treated CRT glass for placement in the cell, as confirmed by IEPA in a letter to PDC dated January 26, 2015; and

WHEREAS, PDC has established a perpetual care fund for the Indian Creek Landfill, consisting of a trust fund held by a third-party and available to Tazewell County (the host jurisdiction for the landfill), which provides funding to monitor and maintain the landfill into perpetuity, an even greater level of financial and environmental protection than is required under state and federal regulations; and

WHEREAS, PDC hosted a tour at the Indian Creek Landfill on October 23, 2014 for approximately 35 attendees of the annual conference of the Illinois Counties Solid Waste Management Association (ILCSWMA) to show attendees how CRT glass is currently managed, present the plan for retrievable storage, and answer questions; and

WHEREAS, ILCSWMA conference attendees were subsequently polled to determine their support for allowing treated CRT glass to be placed in a landfill regardless of whether it is used as ADC or placed in a dedicated cell for retrievable storage, and attendees voiced nearly unanimous support of this option with only 2 of the approximately 60 participants dissenting; and

WHEREAS, Kuusakoski Recycling and PDC formally petitioned BAN on November 18, 2014 to modify its standard and allow, as an additional preferred CRT glass management option, the placement of treated CRT glass in a retrievable storage cell within a permitted disposal site which has a perpetual care fund established; and

WHEREAS, At least 10 government jurisdictions in Illinois representing nearly 4 million people have sent letters to BAN in support of Kuusakoski Recycling and PDC's petition and urging BAN'S approval in order to maintain their vital electronic waste collection and recycling programs for their residents; and

WHEREAS, The option of retrievable storage of treated CRT glass in a dedicated cell at a permitted disposal site will provide needed environmentally protective, cost effective, and immediately available capacity for CRT glass, resulting in relief for residents, local governments, and recyclers across Illinois and the United States to manage this problematic material and reduce the potential for future discoveries of stockpiled material that would pose a significant environmental threat; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the Basel Action Network and the e-Stewards Leadership Council to approve the pending petition submitted by Kuusakoski Recycling and Peoria Disposal Company to allow the placement of treated CRT glass into a dedicated retrievable storage cell in a permitted disposal facility; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Executive Director of the Basel Action Network and the policy director of the Basel Action Network.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 109

Offered by Representative Guzzardi:

WHEREAS, The Illinois Parents of Adults with Developmental Disabilities believe that every person with a developmental disability, supported appropriately, can live safe, meaningful, and connected lives in their home community; and

WHEREAS, Persons with disabilities have been historically isolated and segregated from their home communities, often in institutional settings, and Illinois currently institutionalizes more people with developmental disabilities than 47 other states; and

WHEREAS, The United States Supreme Court decreed in *Olmstead v. L.C.*, on June 22, 1999, that the unjustified institutionalization of people with disabilities is illegal discrimination, and the decision was affirmed in Illinois by the U.S. District Court in *Ligas v. Harnos* on June 15, 2011; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare June 22, 2017 and 2018 as "Illinois Community Living Day" in the State of Illinois, and we urge the citizens of Illinois to celebrate with both service and awareness; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to Illinois Parents of Adults with Developmental Disabilities Board Members Laurie Jerue, Ellen Garber Bronfeld, and Deb Hamilton.

#### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 15

Offered by Representative Evans:

WHEREAS, The Secretary of State is responsible for licensing and oversight of automobile dealers in the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, Illinois is experiencing an increase in non-traditional automobile sales by individuals or entities that do not meet the definition of a traditional dealer; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there is created the Automobile Dealers' License Task Force, consisting of the following members:

(1) the Secretary of State or his or her designee, who is to serve as Chair of the Task Force;

(2) one member of the General Assembly, appointed by the President of the Senate;

(3) one member of the General Assembly, appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate;

(4) one member of the General Assembly, appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives;

(5) one member of the General Assembly, appointed by the Minority Leader of the House of Representatives;

(6) the Director of the Department of Revenue or his or her designee;

(7) the Director of the Illinois State Police, or his or her designee;

(8) a representative of the Illinois Automobile Dealers Association; and

(9) the Illinois Attorney General or his or her designee; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Secretary of State shall provide staff and administrative support to the Task Force; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Task Force shall conduct a study related to the licensing and oversight of the nontraditional dealers doing business in Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Task Force shall meet at least three times and shall report its findings to the General Assembly on or before December 31, 2018; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Task Force shall be dissolved after submitting its finding to the General Assembly.

## HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 16

Offered by Representative Willis:

WHEREAS, During the 99th General Assembly, House Joint Resolution 77 created the Mobile Integrated Healthcare Task Force to identify and recommend ways that the State of Illinois can incorporate changes in its health care delivery system in order to increase the collaboration and utilization of current health care workers while decreasing the associated costs; and

WHEREAS, The Mobile Integrated Healthcare Task Force was to report its findings and recommendations to the General Assembly on or before January 1, 2017; and

WHEREAS, The Mobile Integrated Healthcare Task Force needs additional time to complete its work; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that the Mobile Integrated Healthcare Task Force shall report its findings and recommendations to the General Assembly as required by House Joint Resolution 77 of the 99th General Assembly on or before September 1, 2017; and be it further

RESOLVED, That with this extension the Mobile Integrated Healthcare Task Force shall continue to operate as provided under House Joint Resolution 77 of the 99th General Assembly.

## HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 17

Offered by Representative Martwick:

WHEREAS, It is appropriate and right to honor those great American figures who have served our nation in public office; and

WHEREAS, President Barack Hussein Obama is the pride of Chicago and Illinois; he began his professional life in Chicago as a community organizer; he attended Harvard Law School, where he was the first African American president of the Harvard Law Review; he taught constitutional law at the University of Chicago Law School for 12 years; and

WHEREAS, President Obama represented the 13th Senate District in the Illinois Senate from 1997 to 2004; he garnered respect and passed multiple progressive bipartisan legislation; and

WHEREAS, President Obama was elected United States Senator from Illinois with a strong mandate of 70% of the vote; his bid for the presidency was a similar success, creating an impressive coalition and making history as the first African American president; and

Eisenhower System of Interstate and Defense Highways as the "President Barack Obama Tollway" in recognition of President Barack Obama's dedication to public service as an Illinois State Senator, U.S. Senator from Illinois, and President of the United States of America; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Illinois Department of Transportation is requested to erect at suitable locations, consistent with State and federal regulations, appropriate plaques or signs giving notice of the name "President Barack Obama Tollway"; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution will be distributed to the Director of the Illinois State Toll Highway Authority and President Barack Obama.

RESOLVED, That the Secretary of State is hereby directed to transmit copies of this application to the President and the Secretary of the United States Senate, the Speaker and the Clerk of the United States House of Representatives, and the members of the Senate and House of Representatives from this State; copies shall also be transmitted to the presiding officers of each of the legislative houses in the several states, requesting their cooperation; and be it further

RESOLVED, That this application constitutes a continuing application in accordance with Article V of the Constitution of the United States until the legislatures of at least two-thirds of the several states have made applications on the same subject; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be delivered to the Secretary of State.

#### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 20

Offered by Representative Winger:

WHEREAS, The neighbors of O'Hare International Airport understand the importance of this airport to Illinois' economy and its supply of good jobs; and

WHEREAS, The neighbors of O'Hare want to take an active and friendly role in helping the airport deal actively with its many noise problems; and

WHEREAS, Among the sponsors of this resolution are individuals who have talked with representatives of the City of Chicago and who appreciate the work that the Chicago Department of Aviation is doing to improve the technology that it is investing on gathering noise pollution data and improving data communications and database technology to consolidate and store this data; and

WHEREAS, This is not the first time that Chicago has reached out to its "noise neighbors"; as part of its long-term expansion plans, Chicago and many of O'Hare International Airport's principal airlines have

maintained multi-year voluntary noise abatement flight procedures, instituted in 1997 and continuously revised since then as the "O'Hare International Airport Fly Quiet Program"; and

WHEREAS, Compliance with the Fly Quiet Program is overseen by the O'Hare Noise Compatibility Commission, an intergovernmental agency that includes Cook County, 41 municipalities, and 16 school districts adjacent to and around O'Hare International Airport; and

WHEREAS, The voluntary flight procedures included in the Fly Quiet Program include approved, voluntary, recommended aircraft pathways for safe commercial jet takeoffs from O'Hare International Airport, effective from 10 P.M. to 7 A.M.; and

WHEREAS, The O'Hare Fly Quiet Program releases quarterly reports to measure compliance with the elements of the Program, including compliance by airlines and their pilots with approved runway departure flight paths; these reports show that, as of 2015, many aircraft departures currently deviate significantly from the approved "Fly Quiet" flight paths, thereby imposing noise pollution upon substantial areas of residences, schools, commercial and industrial structures, as well as property owners, whose properties are not sufficiently monitored for noise pollution and are not sufficiently mapped as impacted by aircraft noise; and

WHEREAS, The Fly Quiet report published by the Chicago Department of Aviation and covering the fourth quarter of calendar year 2014 showed massive partial compliance and noncompliance with Fly Quiet runway departure guidelines, with one runway departure point (22L) showing only 40% of aircraft departure flight paths being implemented so as to keep the aircraft within 0.5 nautical miles of the approved takeoff pathway, so that 60% of the planes during this time period, taking off from this runway location, applied engine power and climbed into the sky while the plane was located at least 0.5 nautical miles or more away from the approved pathway; and

WHEREAS, Above and beyond runway departure point 22L, other O'Hare International Airport runway departure points also showed significant patterns of partial compliance and non-compliance with Fly Quiet takeoff flight path guidelines in the fourth quarter of 2014; and

WHEREAS, Overall monitoring by the O'Hare Noise Compatibility Commission and others indicated that, in 2015, Fly Quiet voluntary guidelines were being adhered to in only 30% of total flights during nighttime hours; and

WHEREAS, These examples of partial compliance and noncompliance impose substantial financial and quality-of-life burdens upon the neighbors of O'Hare International Airport, including individuals and businesses that understand the importance of the airport and want to be good neighbors; and

WHEREAS, The airlines that operate at Chicago O'Hare International Airport also have many other interrelationships with the City of Chicago, the Federal Aviation Administration within the United States Department of Transportation, and many other entities; and

WHEREAS, These airlines include the use of a specified number of departure gates and related support facilities; access to these departure gates and these support facilities are essential assets for doing passenger and cargo business at O'Hare International Airport; access to support facilities is an essential asset for doing non-passenger cargo business at the same airport; and

WHEREAS, Whenever an airline changes hands, and under a wide variety of other circumstances, access to major airport departure gates and support facilities is closely looked at by the owner of the airport, the United States Department of Transportation, and many other stakeholders in the United States airline industry; and

WHEREAS, The O'Hare International Airport Fly Quiet Program should be elevated to the rank of an independent, autonomous stakeholder in any future decisions made by O'Hare International Airport and its partners that will affect future allocations of airport departure gates and support facilities; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that we state the belief that O'Hare International Airport's noise monitoring technology should be coupled with artificial-intelligence software, including, but not limited to, software that gauges Community Noise Equivalent Level noise levels, to the maximum extent allowed by current technology in order to match the noises perceived by each station at each time to specific individual flight operations and the operations of individual airline firms and to gauge the compliance of each individual airline firm with the noise, time-of-day, and flight path guidelines set down in the Fly Quiet Program; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we call for a measurable improvement in Fly Quiet compliance no later than January 1, 2017, with further improvements to follow; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the Aviation Department of the City of Chicago to select a trusted third party that represents the interests of O'Hare International Airport's noise neighbors and to share the information enumerated in this resolution with this third party; such information-sharing should be carried out in a manner

that does not violate the intellectual properties and executive status of secure information controlled by any significant stakeholders at the airport; and be it further

RESOLVED, That, as a part of this information sharing, we urge the Aviation Department and the trusted third party to collaborate to develop a rank-ordered chart of each airline firm's compliance with the guidelines contained in the O'Hare International Airport Fly Quiet Program; the chart should be public information and should be revised and republished not less than every 3 months on the same basis as the reports currently submitted by the Fly Quiet Program to the public; and be it further

RESOLVED, That these charts and the data from which these charts are generated should be given explicit and formal consideration as elements in any decisions made, subsequent to the start of the generation of this data and these charts, on the reallocation of departure gates and support facilities at O'Hare International Airport; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to Chicago Mayor Rahm Emanuel, Secretary of the United States Department of Transportation Anthony Foxx, and the members of the Illinois congressional delegation.

#### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 21

Offered by Representative Bennett:

WHEREAS, It is appropriate for us to remember the many sacrifices and contributions made by members of the law enforcement community while protecting the safety of the public; and

WHEREAS, It is also appropriate for us to honor civilians who have given their lives in protecting the public; and

WHEREAS, Illinois State Police Trooper Michael McCarter, Paxton Police Department Patrolman William Caisse, and civilian, Donald Vice, were shot and killed following a traffic stop on I-57 south of Paxton; Larry C. Hale of the Paxton Police Department was wounded; and

WHEREAS, On April 7, 1979, at about 9:00 pm, Patrolman Caisse was dispatched to assist Trooper McCarter who was attempting to stop four speeding vehicles traveling southbound; once at the scene, one subject fled to an overpass area and began firing at both officers, fatally wounding Trooper McCarter and Donald Vice, Trooper McCarter's brother-in-law, who was riding with him; and

WHEREAS, Upon the arrival of another Paxton officer, Larry Hale, gunfire continued from the overpass area as another suspect retrieved a rifle from the rear of his pickup truck, shooting Patrolman Caisse in the back, killing him instantly; and

WHEREAS, The suspect then began firing at Officer Hale, wounding him in the right leg and chest, before he was able to return fire; as the suspect fell to the ground and reached for his weapon, the officer fired his revolver and killed him; and

WHEREAS, Trooper McCarter had served with the Illinois State Police for nine years and was assigned to District 6A; he was survived by his wife and son; and WHEREAS, Patrolman Caisse had served with the Paxton Police Department for three years; he was a United States Army veteran, and served in the Vietnam War; he was survived by his wife, son, two daughters, his parents, four brothers, and a sister; and

WHEREAS, Donald Vice worked at Caterpillar Tractor Company in Pontiac; he was survived by his wife, his mother, his stepfather, six sons, two brothers, three sisters, and four grandchildren; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that we designate the overpass at 200 North Road crossing I-57 South of Paxton as the "McCarter-Caisse-Vice-Hale Memorial Overpass"; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Illinois Department of Transportation is requested to erect at suitable locations, consistent with State and federal regulations, appropriate plaques or signs giving notice of the name of the "McCarter-Caisse-Vice-Hale Memorial Overpass"; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to the families of Trooper Michael McCarter, Paxton Patrolman William Caisse, and Donald Vice, and to Paxton Patrolman Larry C. Hale, the Illinois State Police, the Paxton Police Department, and the Secretary of the Illinois Department of Transportation.
