HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 145

Offered by Representative Jesiel:

WHEREAS, A legislative proposal would allow State Medicaid funds to be used to pay for abortions and would cover abortions for State employees for any reason through all nine months of pregnancy; and

WHEREAS, The legislation would allow the State of Illinois to fund organizations that pay for abortions; and

WHEREAS, There were 39,856 abortions performed in Illinois in 2015; and

WHEREAS, The number of abortions in Illinois represents 4.6% of the abortions performed across the country; and

WHEREAS, Medicaid currently does not provide funding for abortions and insurance benefits for abortions are only provided to State employees when the life or health of the mother is in danger and in cases of rape and incest; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois would be responsible for 100% of Medicaid costs tied to abortions because there would be no federal reimbursements as a result of the Hyde Amendment which prevents federal funds from covering abortions; and

WHEREAS, Illinois ended 2016 with nearly \$11 billion in unpaid bills, making the cost of abortion funding an undue burden on taxpayers;; and

WHEREAS, Taxpayers opposed to abortion on moral and religious grounds should not have to fund abortions with their tax dollars; and

WHEREAS, State or federal law does not prohibit private donors from paying for abortions; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we state our opposition to legislative efforts to use State taxpayer funds to pay for abortions and to use taxpayer funds to pay for insurance costs for State employees to have abortions for any reason through all nine months of pregnancy.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 148

Offered by Representative McSweeney:

WHEREAS, A proposed tax on sugar-sweetened beverages to generate revenue to balance the State's budget has been contemplated by some policymakers; and

WHEREAS, Adding an additional tax on sugar-sweetened beverages will raise grocery costs for Illinois hardworking families and kill Illinois jobs; and

WHEREAS, Studies have concluded that any obesity-related benefit of decreased sugar-sweetened beverage consumption that comes from a tax is negligible or offset by individual circumstances and environments; for instance, West Virginia has had a sugar-sweetened beverage tax since 1951 and has the second highest obesity rate in the United States at 35.6%; since 1990, the diabetes rate in West Virginia has more than doubled from 6.7% to 14.5%; Arkansas has had a sugar-sweetened beverage tax since 1992; during this time, obesity rates have doubled from 17% to 34.5%, ranking it the sixth-highest rate in the United States; additionally, the diabetes rate has doubled from 5.8% to 12.6%; and

WHEREAS, If the sugar-sweetened beverage tax will reduce consumption as the advocates claim, then it will in turn negatively impact bottlers, manufacturers, agricultural suppliers, distributors, retailers, and labor; with more than 100,000 Illinois residents directly and indirectly employed by the beverage industry, the vast beverage industry could face layoffs if the sugar-sweetened beverage tax is signed into law; and

WHEREAS, Beverage-related jobs create \$654 million in wages in Illinois, with an additional \$702 million in wages for occupations that rely on beverage sales; passing this soda beverage tax would decrease sales resulting in a decrease in local and State revenue at a time when governments across Illinois are facing declining revenue; and

WHEREAS, A soda tax will provide additional incentive to the two-thirds of Illinois residents who live within a 40-minute drive of a neighboring state to shop in that neighboring state and therefore further weaken tax receipts and cripple local businesses; specifically, Illinois retailers which border other states will be put at an even greater competitive disadvantage with out-of-state retailers; and

WHEREAS, A recent proposal would impose an unreasonable new State penny-per-ounce tax that would result in 68 cents in new taxes on a typical 99-cent, two-liter bottle of soda; and

WHEREAS, An additional tax on sugar-sweetened beverages goes against the pro-business, pro-jobs, pro-growth policies that should be under careful consideration as Illinois seeks to regain sound financial footing; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we fully support our hardworking citizens and oppose all efforts, on the State or local level, to impose new taxes on beverages and food; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we state our firm opposition to any additional taxes on sugar-sweetened beverages.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 28

Offered by Representative Flowers:

WHEREAS, The banking crisis in the United States is continuing as exemplified by the fraudulent practices of Wells Fargo Bank and others; the ongoing criminal actions of JP Morgan Chase, Citibank, HSBC, and other "too-big-to-fail" banks have resulted in billions of dollars in fines; and yet, the federally insured banks still have over \$250 trillion of derivative securities on their books, the same securities that blew up the economy in 2008; and

WHEREAS, The financial crisis is being driven by a collapse of our nation's industry and infrastructure, gross domestic product has been expanding at an anemic rate of 1-2% per year for nearly a decade, and productivity has been growing at an even lower .5%; and

WHEREAS, A return to a durable industrial recovery will require adoption of national banking policies as the first Secretary of the Treasury, Alexander Hamilton, and Presidents, John Quincy Adams, Abraham Lincoln, and Franklin D. Roosevelt adopted during their administrations; federal credit to industry, states, and cities built the nation's economy; a new national bank could invest trillions of dollars into our infrastructure, creating millions of new jobs and increasing productivity of the nation; and

WHEREAS, During the 114th Congress (2015-2016), the House of Representatives introduced the "Return to Prudent Banking Act of 2015" (HR 381), and the Senate introduced the "21st Century Glass Steagall Act of 2015" (S.B. 1709), both intended to restore the separation of investment and commercial banking; neither reached a vote; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that we urge the United States Congress to immediately adopt the "American Recovery Program" with the following objectives:

- (1) To pass legislation of a similar nature to those introduced in the 114th Congress restoring the provisions of the Glass-Steagall Act; Glass-Steagall was law for 66 years and prevented the kind of collapse that hit the U.S. in 2008; the Illinois General Assembly was one of 15 state legislatures to file Glass-Steagall resolutions in 2016, (HR1093); and Glass-Steagall was added to the platform of the 2016 Democratic and Republican national conventions; and
- (2) Return to a national banking and a federal credit system modeled on the principles of Alexander Hamilton's First Bank of the United States, which built all of the early infrastructure of the nation; President Abraham Lincoln was a leading advocate for a new national bank and used the Greenback policy to build the industrial might of the nation; the same credit policy was embodied in President Franklin D. Roosevelt's Reconstruction Finance Corporation (RFC), which financed the gigantic New Deal infrastructure program, the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC), which proved to be one of the best publicworks programs ever funded by the U.S. government; in Illinois, the CCC planted thousands of trees, installed telephone lines, and built recreational areas, picnic facilities, impoundments, roads, and trails; Illinois CCC projects include the Belle Smith Springs Recreation Area, Shawnee Pounds Hollow Recreation Area, and the New Salem Village; a new national bank can be capitalized at one to two trillion dollars with non-taxpayer money and can fund a new infrastructure program; and
- (3) Use the federal credit system to build a modern network of high-speed rail, power generating systems, and water projects, such as those urgently needed in the Southwest; high-speed passenger and freight lines could alter the entire Western United States; and
- (4) Rebuild our space program, beginning with industrial development of the moon, explore the solar system, and inspire future generations; and launch a crash program to develop fusion power as key to solving the energy problems for the long term; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Majority Leader of the Senate, and the members of the Illinois Congressional Delegation.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 30

Offered by Representative Walsh:

WHEREAS, According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, motor vehicle crashes are a leading cause of death in the United States; in 2014, more than 33,700 people died from motor vehicle crashes; for every death there are numerous devastating injuries and costly emergency room visits; and

WHEREAS, Drivers on the corridor of I-80 between the exit to I-55 in Joliet and the exit to Route 30 in New Lenox, suffer high rates of congestion; the corridor has witnessed a total of eight fatalities and 1,456 crashes since 2011; and

WHEREAS, These traffic accidents and the resulting injuries and deaths are tragedies for the families, the communities of the victims involved, and for the people of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Department of Transportation is administering a study of I-80 from Ridge Road to US Route 30 in preparation for the reconstruction of I-80 structures in that corridor; the reconstruction may not occur for several years; and

WHEREAS, Motorists would be safer and would take more precautions while driving if they had advanced knowledge of the congestion and dangers associated with the above-mentioned corridor along I-80; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that we urge the Illinois Department of Transportation to erect signage notifying motorists of congestion and possible dangers along Interstate 80 between the exit to I-55 in Joliet and Route 30 in New Lenox; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Secretary of the Department of Transportation and the Mayor of the City of Joliet.
