WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 22, 2017

At the hour of 9:48 o'clock a.m., the House convened perfunctory session.

HOUSE RESOLUTION

The following resolution was offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 33

Offered by Representative Feigenholtz:

WHEREAS, The members of the Illinois House of Representatives wish to congratulate the World Champion Chicago Cubs on winning an epic World Series on November 3, 2016; and

WHEREAS, The Chicago Cubs last won the World Series in 1907 and 1908; they last appeared in the World Series in 1945; and

WHEREAS, The Chicago Cubs compiled a record of 103 wins and 58 losses during the 2016 season; and

WHEREAS, The Chicago Cubs fielded the entire starting infield for the 2016 MLB All-Star Game; this marked the first time a National League team had done so since 1963; they had seven players selected, Jake Arrieta, Kris Bryant, Dexter Fowler, Jon Lester, Anthony Rizzo, Addison Russell, and Ben Zobrist; and

WHEREAS, The Chicago Cubs won the division championship with a 17.5 game lead; and

WHEREAS, The Chicago Cubs eliminated the San Francisco Giants and the Los Angeles Dodgers in the playoffs to advance to the World Series; and

WHEREAS, The Chicago Cubs defeated the Cleveland Indians in a historic and dramatic World Series Game 7 that went into extra innings, ending with a score of 8 to 7 in the 10th; and

WHEREAS, The Chicago Cubs rallied from a deficit of three games to one, a feat only accomplished by five other teams in World Series history; and

WHEREAS, A victory parade and rally was held for the Chicago Cubs on November 4, 2016, drawing five million fans, making it the seventh largest known gathering in the history of the world; and

WHEREAS, The Chicago Cubs have the greatest and most loyal fans in the world; with its historic scoreboard and green ivy, Wrigley Field is one of the greatest places to watch a ball game; Manager Joe Maddon has said that "playing in Wrigley Field is magical"; and

WHEREAS, The Ricketts family, Crane Kenney and the entire Cubs front office, and Theo Epstein should be praised for bringing together such an amazing team and for setting the Chicago Cubs on a course for continued success for many years to come; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that we congratulate the Chicago Cubs on winning the 2016 World Series; and be it further

JUDICIARY – CIVIL
STANDARD OPERATING PROCEDURES
As Amended

1. Sponsors of legislation (*i.e.* Bills and Resolutions) pending before the committee **should** check in with the committee clerk upon arrival in the committee room as the committee has adopted a “first come – first served” policy for conducting hearings on legislation pending and posted for hearing before committee. Preference shall be given to members in House leadership, and the discretion of the Chairperson.
2. All persons or organizations desirous of offering oral testimony before the committee must check in with the committee clerk and file a witness slip/appearance **before** offering in committee oral testimony.
3. All persons or organizations desirous of offering oral testimony before the committee are strongly encouraged to consult the Chief Sponsor of the legislation as soon as possible **before the hearing** on the legislation to:
 - (A) Advise the Chief Sponsor of the nature and scope of the opposition; and
 - (B) If possible, offer alternative language to address the opposition.
4. Written testimony, exhibits, and other tangible things **must** be filed with the committee clerk **before** being distributed to committee members – while the committee members are seated and the committee is doing business.
5. The Chairperson reserves the right to waive any of the aforementioned operating procedures in cases of unforeseen and exigent circumstances.

Dear Mr. Bolin:

On Wednesday, February 8, 2017, NIU's Information Security Officer(CISO) was notified of a possible breach of confidentiality and disclosure of personally identifiable information (PII) incident. Investigation determined that Rose Esary, an NIU Operation Services employee (Service Desk Analyst II) inadvertently provided access (username and password) of a graduate student's MyNIU account to a prospective student during a password reset on one occasion.

After concluding the investigation, it was determined that a breach did in fact occur. The following summarizes the facts:

- On February 7, 2017, Rose Esary inadvertently provided access of a graduate student's MyNIU account to a prospective student during a password reset process containing authentication for password resets including address, username, password, and last four digits of social security number.
- On February 14, 2017, the prospective student signed an attestation to the fact that no PII was retained or forwarded.

Based upon this incident Ms. Esary was provided supplementary training. NIU is in the process of implementing self-service password resets. Further, the current business process is being reviewed to mitigate this risk and assure the safeguarding of PII for the future.

At the hour of 1:13 o'clock p.m., the House convened perfunctory session.

HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 156

Offered by Representative Bennett:

WHEREAS, Fibromuscular dysplasia (FMD) is a disease that causes abnormal cell growth of the arterial wall; it can lead to areas of narrowing, beading, aneurysms, and dissections of the arterial wall; and

WHEREAS, Until recently, there has been very little progress in understanding the disease since it was first diagnosed in 1938; there is no known cause or cure for the disease and there are no set protocols to treat the disease; and

WHEREAS, FMD has always been considered and is still classified as a rare disease; many researchers now believe FMD is an under-diagnosed disease; some of the data suggest that 4-5% of the population may be affected by the disease; and

WHEREAS, Ninety percent of the patients affected by FMD are women, but men and children are also afflicted; there are different classifications of FMD; the two most common types are medial fibroplasia and intimal fibroplasia; unlike the adult population, children tend to be diagnosed with intimal fibroplasia, which can be more aggressive; some patients present with both types of the disease; there is no understanding of why there are differences; and

WHEREAS, Individuals and families affected by fibromuscular dysplasia often experience problems such as a sense of isolation, difficulty in obtaining accurate and timely diagnosis, and optimal treatment options; and

WHEREAS, The Fibromuscular Dysplasia Society of America (FMDSA) was founded in March of 2003; over the past 14 years, this association has been active and successful with many programs, including public and physician awareness, patient support, and engaging with researchers from around the world; and

WHEREAS, The FMDSA is funding the United States Registry for Fibromuscular Dysplasia; previously it was thought that 75% of FMD cases affected the renal arteries, but recent data has proven that to be inaccurate; it is also very common to have a 5-year delay from onset of symptoms to diagnosis; and

WHEREAS, There is still much needed awareness and research of the disease; FMD patients present with many of the same complaints as other patients with more common conditions, such as hypertension, headaches, and dizziness; others present with TIA or stroke, dissection of an artery, aneurysm, swooshing noise in the ear, and renal infarction; children can present with basic symptoms such as high blood pressure, headaches, insomnia, fatigue, and abdominal pain; misdiagnoses of FMD can lead to severe consequences and disability; and

WHEREAS, During the month of May each year, the FMDSA organizes a global observance of the issues associated with fibromuscular dysplasia; patients, medical professionals, and researchers join together to focus attention on fibromuscular dysplasia as a public health issue; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we designate May of 2017 as "Fibromuscular Dysplasia Awareness Month" in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to the Fibromuscular Dysplasia Society of America as an expression of our esteem and respect.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 161

Offered by Representative Gordon-Booth:

WHEREAS, On September 17, 2008, the Electronic Products Recycling and Reuse Act, Public Act 95-0959, was enacted, setting forth procedures for the recycling and reuse of covered electronic devices in Illinois; and

WHEREAS, The Electronic Products Recycling and Reuse Act banned the disposal of covered electronic devices in landfills and incinerators beginning January 1, 2012; and

WHEREAS, To provide adequate collection of discarded electronic devices and comply with the disposal ban, more than 300 collection sites statewide are currently registered with the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) to accept electronic wastes; and

WHEREAS, Local governments statewide have contracted with electronic waste processors and recyclers for collection, reuse, and recycling of discarded electronics, providing a vital service to their residents; and

WHEREAS, A significant component of the discarded electronic waste stream collected to date has been, and continues to be, cathode ray tube (CRT) devices, including televisions and computer monitors; and

WHEREAS, CRT glass contains lead at a sufficiently high concentration to meet the definition of hazardous waste, necessitating handling of the glass in a manner that protects human health and the environment; and

WHEREAS, The principal recycling market for CRT glass was historically the production of new CRTs; and

WHEREAS, Demand for new CRTs historically provided an economic incentive to recycle CRT glass for use in the manufacturing of new CRTs, and recyclers received revenue for the CRT glass provided to CRT manufacturers; and

WHEREAS, New CRTs have essentially ceased to be purchased in the United States, and there are no CRT manufacturing facilities located in the United States; and

WHEREAS, All CRT glass used in the manufacturing of new CRTs is now exported to India, to the sole remaining CRT manufacturing facility in the world; and

WHEREAS, There exist limited additional available outlets for the legitimate recycling of CRT glass in the United States; and

WHEREAS, The quantity of CRT glass collected far exceeds current demand and available markets for the glass; and

WHEREAS, CRT glass processing and recycling now carries a substantial cost, which constitutes a significant change since the Electronic Products Recycling and Reuse Act was enacted in 2008; and

WHEREAS, The increased cost to process CRT glass has caused electronic waste collection programs operated by local governments in Illinois to either bear the cost increases or be discontinued to avoid accumulation of CRTs; and

WHEREAS, Stockpiles of abandoned CRT glass have been discovered at several former electronic waste processing facilities across the United States, primarily due to the lack of markets for CRT glass and the high cost associated with existing markets; and

WHEREAS, Kuusakoski Glass Recycling LLC (Kuusakoski Recycling) and Peoria Disposal Company (PDC) , both Illinois-based businesses, developed and permitted a CRT glass solution, the KleanKover Recycling Solution, whereby CRT glass is treated to reduce the leachable lead levels in the glass (the principal environmental concern associated with CRTs) below stringent federal thresholds, and is then placed as Alternative Daily Cover (ADC) in a permitted landfill; and

WHEREAS, Kuusakoski Recycling and PDC have successfully operated the KleanKover Recycling Solution since November, 2013; and

WHEREAS, Given the lack of viable recycling markets, the IEPA has determined that treated CRT glass used as ADC can be counted towards manufacturer recycling goals under the Electronic Products Recycling and Reuse Act, as documented in IEPA correspondence to Kuusakoski Recycling on November 26, 2013; and

WHEREAS, Basel Action Network (BAN), administrators of the e-Stewards Standard (a voluntary certification standard for electronic waste recyclers) had previously defined any use of treated CRT glass within a disposal facility, including use as ADC, as a "last resort" option, effectively prohibiting use of the KleanKover Recycling Solution; and

WHEREAS, BAN had expressed interest in considering retrievable storage of CRT glass in permitted, monitored, and contained designated disposal sites as a preferred CRT glass management method; and

WHEREAS, In response to BAN's interest, PDC developed a designated retrievable storage cell at its permitted Indian Creek Landfill No. 2 to provide storage and future retrieval of CRT glass, should markets develop to utilize the leaded glass; and

WHEREAS, PDC has established a perpetual care fund for Indian Creek Landfill No. 2, consisting of a trust fund held by a third-party and available to Tazewell County (the host jurisdiction for the landfill), which provides funding to monitor and maintain the landfill in perpetuity, imparting a greater level of financial and environmental protection than is required under State or federal laws or regulations; and

WHEREAS, Kuusakoski Recycling and PDC formally petitioned BAN on November 18, 2014, to modify the e-Stewards Standard and allow, as an additional preferred CRT glass management option, the placement of treated CRT glass in a retrievable storage cell within a permitted disposal site which has a perpetual care fund established; and

WHEREAS, At least 10 units of local government in Illinois, representing nearly four million people, sent letters to BAN in support of the petition submitted by Kuusakoski Recycling and PDC, and urging BAN's approval in order to maintain the governmental units' vital electronic waste collection and recycling programs for their residents; and

WHEREAS, On May 6, 2015, the House of Representatives of the 99th General Assembly of the State of Illinois adopted House Resolution 328 urging BAN to approve the petition submitted by Kuusakoski Recycling and PDC and revise the e-Stewards Standard to allow placement of treated CRT glass into a dedicated retrievable storage cell at a permitted disposal facility; and

WHEREAS, On July 10, 2015, Public Act 99-13 amended the Electronics Products Recycling and Reuse Act to allow CRT glass placed in retrievable storage cells at permitted landfills to be counted towards manufacturer recycling goals; and

WHEREAS, BAN published Sanctioned Interpretation #5 to the e-Stewards Standard V2.0 on April 1, 2016, recognizing placement of treated CRT glass in lined, leachate-controlled, and monitored solid waste landfills as a conditionally allowable option for the management of CRT glass if all preferred options have been ruled out based on established criteria without requirement for further BAN approval; and

WHEREAS, Sustainable Electronics Recycling International (SERI), administrators of the R2 Standard (a separate voluntary certification standard for electronic waste recyclers) has prohibited its certified recyclers from managing CRT glass in any form within a landfill, including as ADC or in retrievable storage; and

WHEREAS, At least 15 units of local government in Illinois, representing over five million people, some of which governmental units maintain among the most effective e-waste recycling programs in the United States, petitioned SERI in 2014, to reconsider its options on CRT glass management, citing the need for additional CRT glass management options in the United States; and

WHEREAS, In June, 2016, representatives of SERI and the R2 Technical Advisory Committee (TAC, a multi-stakeholder group appointed by SERI to review and recommend revisions to the R2 Standard) toured the Kuusakoski Recycling and PDC facilities and received additional information about their CRT glass management process; and

WHEREAS, In September, 2016, Kuusakoski Recycling and PDC announced a further enhancement to their CRT glass management process which will segregate panel glass (which does not include concentrations of hazardous materials in regulated quantities) from leaded funnel glass; this enhancement will permit Kuusakoski Recycling and PDC to utilize crushed panel glass as construction aggregate at permitted landfills as a replacement for washed gravel in the construction of leachate recirculation wells and potentially landfill gas wells, while continuing to treat leaded funnel glass and place it in retrievable storage or utilize it as ADC at permitted landfills; and

WHEREAS, The option of beneficial use of CRT panel glass as construction aggregate, beneficial use of treated CRT glass as ADC, and placement of treated CRT glass in retrievable storage in a dedicated cell at a permitted disposal site provides needed environmentally protective, cost effective, and immediately available capacity for CRT glass, resulting in relief for residents, local governments, and recyclers across Illinois and the United States to manage this problematic material and reduce the potential for future discoveries of stockpiled material that would pose a significant environmental threat; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge SERI (Sustainable Electronics Recycling International) and the TAC (the R2 Technical Advisory Committee) to amend the R2 Standard to create an option for management of CRT glass through beneficial use, including in uses such as landfill construction aggregate and ADC, and placement of treated CRT glass into a dedicated retrievable storage cell in a permitted disposal facility; and be it further
