Having been reproduced, the following bill was taken up, read by title a first time and placed in the Committee on Rules: SENATE BILL 1225 (Demmer).

### **HOUSE RESOLUTIONS**

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

#### **HOUSE RESOLUTION 395**

Offered by Representative Fine:

WHEREAS, Food allergies affect nearly 15 million people in the United States, including one in 13 children; and

WHEREAS, Research shows that food allergies are increasing in the United States, particularly among children; and

WHEREAS, Shellfish, fish, milk, eggs, tree nuts, peanuts, soy, and wheat are the eight foods that cause the majority of food allergies; and

WHEREAS, Common symptoms of food allergies include hives, vomiting, diarrhea, respiratory distress, and swelling of the throat; and

WHEREAS, More than 200,000 emergency room visits are caused by food allergies each year; and

WHEREAS, Scientists are still looking for a cure for food allergies; and

WHEREAS, Every person with a food allergy must strictly avoid the food they are allergic to, which can best be done with the support and awareness of people around them; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare May 14 through May 20, 2017 as Food Allergy Awareness Week in the State of Illinois to help raise awareness and understanding of food allergies.

#### **HOUSE RESOLUTION 401**

Offered by Representative Scherer:

WHEREAS, Poverty knows no geographical, ethnic, religious, or political boundaries; of the total population in Macon County, 15.7% live in poverty as documented in the 2010 Census; each person should have the opportunity to live comfortable lives, and all residents of Macon County should work toward that goal; and

WHEREAS, The Decatur Macon County Opportunities Corporation (DMCOC) has been providing valuable services to the elderly and disadvantaged in Decatur and Macon County for over 53 years; and

WHEREAS, The purpose of the DMCOC is to prepare people to enter the economic mainstream of society by providing the skills, opportunities, advocacy, and services needed to become self-sufficient; and

WHEREAS, The DMCOC has provided programs and services to the low-income and elderly populations of Decatur and Macon County since its inception in 1964 as a community-based organization to address the "war on poverty"; it was formed as a combined effort of interested political officials, social service agencies, the Decatur City Council, the Macon County Board, low-income individuals, and community residents under the jurisdiction of the Economic Opportunity Act, which was signed into law on August 20, 1964 by President Lyndon B. Johnson; and

WHEREAS, In 2016, the DMCOC served a total of 6,403 individuals with 444 being children in the Head Start program, and 1,988 seniors being served meals through the Senior Nutrition program; and

WHEREAS, The fight against poverty should be a priority of all Americans so that all may enjoy liberty and freedom; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare May of 2017 to be Community Action Awareness Month in the State of Illinois to commemorate the 53rd Anniversary of the Decatur Macon County Opportunities Corporation; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to the DMCOOC as an expression of our esteem and respect.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 402

Offered by Representative Gordon-Booth:

WHEREAS, Each year, the Lupus Society of Illinois designates May as Lupus Awareness Month to show support for the estimated 65,000 Illinois residents who have lupus; and

WHEREAS, Lupus is an acute, chronic, and lifelong autoimmune disease in which the immune system is unbalanced, causing inflammation and tissue damage to virtually every organ system in the body; and

WHEREAS, Lupus can affect any part of the body, including the skin, lungs, heart, kidneys, and brain; no organ is spared; the disease can cause seizures, strokes, heart attacks, miscarriages, and organ failure; and

WHEREAS, While lupus strikes mostly women of childbearing age, no one is safe; African Americans, Hispanics/Latinos, Asians, and Native Americans are two to three times more likely to develop lupus - a disparity that remains unexplained; and

WHEREAS, Lupus can be particularly difficult to diagnose because its symptoms are similar to those of many other illnesses, and major gaps exist in understanding the causes and consequences of lupus; more than half of all people with lupus take four or more years and visit three or more doctors before obtaining a correct diagnosis; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare May of 2017 as Lupus Awareness Month in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge citizens to observe this month by educating themselves on the symptoms and impact of lupus, and to join with the Lupus Society of Illinois in supporting programs of research, education, and community service; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to the Lupus Society of Illinois.
