## HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

### HOUSE RESOLUTION 810

Offered by Representative Welch:

WHEREAS, Tornadoes, floods, and other natural disasters are real and all Illinois citizens should be aware of the potential danger; while prevention of natural disasters is not viable, citizens can be prepared with emergency supplies and plans; and

WHEREAS, If the citizens of Illinois are prepared for zombies, than they are prepared for any natural disaster; while a Zombie Apocalypse may never happen, the preparation for such an event is the same as for any natural disaster; and

WHEREAS, Disasters disrupt hundreds of thousands of lives every year and can have lasting effects, both to people and property; and

WHEREAS, Over 60% of Americans are not practicing or preparing for natural disasters, and only 39% have developed an emergency plan; and

WHEREAS, Practicing for preparedness makes perfect, and staying safe is important for the citizens of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, Citizens should have supplies on hand, which may include, water, food, medications, tools, electronics, sanitation and hygiene products, clothing and bedding, important documents, and first aid; and

WHEREAS, Having an emergency plan and supplies can reduce the negative impacts of natural disasters or help avoid them completely; and

WHEREAS, Being prepared can reduce fear, anxiety, and losses that accompany disasters; and

WHEREAS, Emergencies can happen anywhere, anytime; citizens of Illinois should prepare for the Zombie Apocalypse; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that all Illinois residents are encouraged to participate in preparing for a Zombie Apocalypse, and have a plan that includes, signing up for local texts and weather alerts, developing emergency communications for the household, collecting significant documents and storing them in a safe place, and gathering emergency supplies; and be it further

RESOLVED, That all Illinois citizens are urged to follow and act on the disaster preparedness guidelines of the Illinois Emergency Management Agency and Federal Emergency Management Agency; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we designate October 2018 as "Zombie Preparedness Month" in the State of Illinois, and urge all Illinoisans to educate themselves about natural disasters and take steps to create a stockpile of food, water, and other emergency supplies that can last up to 72 hours.

### HOUSE RESOLUTION 812

Offered by Representative Greg Harris:

WHEREAS, Over 1.2 million people living in the United States are infected with HIV, and one in eight is unaware of the infection; and

WHEREAS, Significant advances in antiretroviral therapy (ART) for HIV have made it possible to reduce transmission rates, avoid over 862,000 premature deaths, gain over 27 million life-years, and gain \$615 billion in economic value over the cost of HIV treatment in the United States alone; and

WHEREAS, A 2011 clinical study from the National Institutes of Health found that treating HIV-positive people with ART reduces the risk of transmitting the virus to HIV-negative sexual partners by 96% from the start of treatment; and

WHEREAS, Medicaid expansion under the Affordable Care Act has played a critical role in decreasing the number of uninsured, particularly for people living with HIV; and

WHEREAS, Viral load suppression saves state Medicaid programs an estimated \$1 million per treated patient by preventing transmissions; and

WHEREAS, Viral load suppression not only improves individual health, but it all also reduces HIV transmission on a population level; and

WHEREAS, The HIV Health Improvement Affinity Group (HHIAG), a joint initiative between the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and the Health Resources and Services Administration, offers federal support for state-level efforts to improve rates of sustained viral load suppression among Medicaid and Children's Health Insurance Program enrollees who are living with HIV; and

WHEREAS, States that participate in the HHIAG benefit from direct technical assistance to develop and implement a viral load suppression improvement plan and leverage best practices to improve state viral load suppression rates; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we recognize the critical importance that viral load suppression plays in improving health outcomes and reducing HIV transmission.

#### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 104

Offered by Representative Halbrook:

WHEREAS, It is appropriate to honor those who have bettered the State of Illinois through public service; and

WHEREAS, Congressman Johnson was born in Champaign to Robert and Margaret Evans Johnson on July 23, 1946; he spent his childhood in Urbana and graduated from Urbana High School; he attended the University of Illinois, where he graduated Phi Beta Kappa and was honored with the Bronze Tablet, the University's highest undergraduate honor; he was accepted to the University of Illinois College of Law and graduated with high honors and was elected to the Order of Coif, the national legal honor society, in 1972; and

WHEREAS, In 1971, while still in college, Congressman Johnson began his long career in public service by winning a seat on the Urbana City Council, representing the same Ward that his father did; in his four years on the city council, he demonstrated to people throughout Central Illinois that he had a gift for crafting sound policies and taking care of the day-to-day needs of the people he represented; and

WHEREAS, Upon urging by community leaders, Congressman Johnson decided to run for a seat in the Illinois State Legislature; in 1976, he won a seat in the Illinois House by besting five other Republicans in a tough, but civil, primary; he held that seat in the Statehouse for more than two decades; he resigned as State Representative from the 104th District on November 13, 2000, one week after being elected to the United States House of Representatives to serve the 15th District of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, Congressman Johnson established a strong record of constituent service and was known for walking the Capitol hallways with a cell phone pressed to his ear as he talked to constituents, asking their opinions and addressing their problems; and

WHEREAS, While responding to the needs of his District residents was a top priority, Congressman Johnson was also a strong and independent voice on Capitol Hill and pushed for lower taxes, fought to bring federal dollars home to Illinois universities, was a strong advocate for civil liberties, voted consistently to protect our First, Second, and Fourth Amendment Rights, and voted to protect our environment; and

WHEREAS, Congressman Johnson was a leading advocate for the expansion of the use of bio fuels and paid special attention to the needs of veterans; he continued his tradition of opposing tax increases, promoting fiscal responsibility, and upholding conservative, common sense values in the United States Congress; most of all, he wanted to rekindle the spark in the nation's agricultural economy that is vital to the health of the region, nation, and world; and

WHEREAS, Congressman Johnson retired from Congress at the end of his term in 2013; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that we designate the section of Interstate 57 from I-74 South to Exit 232 as the "Congressman Tim Johnson Highway"; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Illinois Department of Transportation is requested to erect at suitable locations, consistent with State and federal regulations, appropriate plaques or signs giving notice of the name "Congressman Tim Johnson Highway"; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be sent to Congressman Tim Johnson, the Mayor of Champaign, and the Secretary of Transportation.

#### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 105

Offered by Representative Long:

WHEREAS, It is highly fitting that we remember those who contributed to the betterment of the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, Michael W. Ragusa was born in Streator to Joseph and Priscilla (Fulks) Ragusa on September 2, 1948; he graduated from Streator High School in 1967 and attended Illinois Valley Community College; he married Roseann Liss on May 24, 1975; and

WHEREAS, Michael Ragusa served with the United States Marine Corps in Vietnam; and

WHEREAS, During the Vietnam War, millions of gallons of Agent Orange were used as a weapon against the Viet Cong; Michael Ragusa was one of the thousands of soldiers exposed to Agent Orange during the war; and

WHEREAS, For 35 years, Michael Ragusa worked for the Disabled American Veterans and AMVETS of Illinois, where he dedicated his life to helping veterans; unfortunately, he brought back part of Vietnam with him, which would impact his health, but never his spirit; and

WHEREAS, Michael Ragusa was a life member of the Illinois AMVETS and Streator VFW Post 1492; he was also a member of the AMVETS Riders, the Pekin Marine Corps League, Streator American Legion Post 217, and the Streator Elks Lodge 591; and

WHEREAS, Michael Ragusa, 68, passed away on September 27, 2016 with his family by his side; he fought a courageous battle for a long time and left this world with grace and dignity; and

WHEREAS, Michael Ragusa was preceded in death by his parents and his brother, Joseph Alan Ragusa; and

WHEREAS, Surviving Michael Ragusa are his daughters, Renee (John) Ainsley and Kim (Brad Washkowiak) Ragusa; his grandchildren, Scott Hays, Anthony Cunningham, and Alayna Washkowiak; his brother, Chris (Cheri Michel) Ragusa; his sister-in-law, Debra Ragusa; his brother-in-law, Ray (Anita) Liss; and several nieces and nephews; and

WHEREAS, Michael Ragusa enjoyed watching the Chicago Cubs, savoring a fine glass of wine, and most of all, he loved to be with his family; and

WHEREAS, Michael Ragusa was a humble man who did not truly see how special he was; he always had a kind word to say, was a great giver of advice, and was an inspiration for all who knew him; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that we designate the Route 23 bridge in Streator over the Vermilion River as the "Vietnam Veteran Michael W. Ragusa Memorial Bridge"; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Illinois Department of Transportation is requested to erect at suitable locations, consistent with State and federal regulations, appropriate plaques or signs giving notice of the name "Vietnam Veteran Michael W. Ragusa Memorial Bridge"; and be it further
