Having been reproduced, the following bills were taken up, read by title a first time and placed in the Committee on Rules: SENATE BILLS 2223(Fortner), 2254(Severin), 2260(Burke, D.), 2274(Hammond), 2291(Breen), 2304(Frese) and 2306(Drury).

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTIONS CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS FIRST READING

Representative Lang introduced the following:

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT 4

WHEREAS, The Ninety-second Congress of the United States of America, at its Second Session, in both houses, by a constitutional majority of two-thirds, adopted the following proposition to amend the Constitution of the United States of America:

"JOINT RESOLUTION

RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES AND SENATE OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED (TWO-THIRDS OF EACH HOUSE CONCURRING THEREIN), That the following article is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as a part of the Constitution when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission by the Congress:

Section 1. Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex.

Section 2. The Congress shall have the power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.

Section 3. This amendment shall take effect two years after the date of ratification.""; and

WHEREAS, A Joint Resolution is a resolution adopted by both houses of the General Assembly and does not require the signature of the Governor; a Joint Resolution is sufficient for Illinois' ratification of an amendment to the United States Constitution; and

WHEREAS, The United States Congress has recently adopted the 27th Amendment to the Constitution of the United States, the so-called Madison Amendment, relating to Compensation of Members of Congress; this amendment was proposed 203 years earlier by our First Congress and only recently ratified by three-fourths of the States; the United States Archivist certified the 27th Amendment on May 18, 1992; and

WHEREAS, The founders of our nation, James Madison included, did not favor further restrictions to Article V of the Constitution of the United States, the amending procedure; the United States Constitution is harder to amend than any other constitution in history; and

WHEREAS, The restricting time limit for the Equal Rights Amendment ratification is in the resolving clause and is not a part of the amendment proposed by Congress and already ratified by 35 states; and

WHEREAS, Having passed a time extension for the Equal Rights Amendment on October 20, 1978, Congress has demonstrated that a time limit in a resolving clause can be disregarded if it is not a part of the proposed amendment; and

WHEREAS, The United States Supreme Court in Coleman v. Miller, 307 U.S. 433, at 456 (1939), recognized that Congress is in a unique position to judge the tenor of the nation, to be aware of the political, social, and economic factors affecting the nation, and to be aware of the importance to the nation of the proposed amendment; and

WHEREAS, If an amendment to the Constitution of the United States has been proposed by two-thirds of both houses of Congress and ratified by three-fourths of the state legislatures, it is for Congress under the principles of Coleman v. Miller to determine the validity of the state ratifications occurring after a time limit in the resolving clause, but not in the amendment itself; and

WHEREAS, Constitutional equality for women and men continues to be timely in the United States and worldwide, and a number of other nations have achieved constitutional equality for their women and men; therefore, be it

HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 971

Offered by Representative Gabel:

WHEREAS, One in eight women will be diagnosed with breast cancer during their lifetime; and

WHEREAS, Women whose breast cancer is diagnosed early before it has spread have an almost 100% chance of being alive five years later; and

WHEREAS, Early detection of breast cancer and timely follow up, coupled with guideline concordant treatment is critical to survival from breast cancer; and

WHEREAS, A University of Illinois at Chicago study found that poor women, minority women, and women without any private health insurance were far more likely to have their breast cancers missed on a screening mammogram; and

WHEREAS, Both University of Illinois at Chicago and Metropolitan Chicago Breast Cancer Task Force studies have found significant variation in the quality of mammography, with minority women, poor women, and women with less education more likely to receive poorer quality mammography resulting in later stage diagnosis; and

WHEREAS, Both University of Illinois at Chicago and the Metropolitan Chicago Breast Cancer Task Force studies find significant fragmentation of care experienced by poor women entering the healthcare system at lower resourced facilities, with delays experienced in follow up and loss to follow up resulting in poorer breast cancer outcomes for poor women, minority women, and women with less education; and

WHEREAS, To address the challenges with mammography quality, two pieces of prior legislation (Public Act 95-1045 and Public Act 97-638) were signed into law and the Department of Healthcare and Family Services established a statewide mammography quality program with two rounds of data successfully collected; and

WHEREAS, The Department of Healthcare and Family Services has not administered this women's healthcare quality improvement program required by law for two years and has no internal capacity to administer such a program; and

WHEREAS, To address the challenges with respect to quality of breast cancer treatment and fragmentation of care and the barriers to receiving guideline concordant breast cancer treatment, Governor Rauner signed the Breast Cancer Excellence in Survival and Treatment act into law (Public Law 99-433) on August 21, 2015; and

WHEREAS, The Department of Healthcare and Family Services has failed to implement the BEST Act including implementation of a breast cancer treatment quality program as required by the BEST Act, provisions in the BEST Act that require that all networks of care have patient navigation for cancer patients and that the Medicaid breast cancer patient navigation programs be expanded; nor has the Department ensured that every women in Medicaid is being offered and encouraged to utilize the mammography coverage proscribed in the Public Aid code that requires baseline coverage of mammography at age 35-39 and annual mammography at age 40 onward; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the Governor and the Department of Healthcare and Family Services by July 1, 2018 to contract with an external expert entity that has prior experience collecting statewide mammography quality data to perform the Department's quality improvement program and to provide each participating facility with a mammography quality report annually; such entity should be reimbursed at an annual rate of \$230,000; and be it further

RESOLVED, That by July 1, 2018, the Department of Healthcare and Family Services is urged to contract with an external expert entity that has prior experience collecting breast cancer treatment data from safety net providers in Illinois and is a federally designated Patient Safety and Quality Improvement Organization as of January 1, 2018; this entity should be responsible for developing a breast cancer treatment quality program and will collaborate with the State's cancer registry in so doing; such entity should be reimbursed at an annual rate of \$350,000; and be it further

RESOLVED, That that the Department of Healthcare and Family Services is urged to immediately implement all other components of the BEST Act and to work with breast cancer advocates and breast cancer clinical experts to ensure that the Illinois Medicaid program provides the highest quality breast cancer screening and treatment to women served by Illinois Medicaid; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Governor and to the Director of Healthcare and Family Services.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 972

Offered by Representative Sauer:

WHEREAS, National Foster Care Month originated in 1988 under President Ronald Reagan to give foster parents the recognition they deserve for opening their homes to children in need; and

WHEREAS, Foster Care Month recognizes the foster parents who work to provide a bright future for the children in their care; and

WHEREAS, Illinois is strongly committed to ensuring that children grow up healthy and safe; and

WHEREAS, Over 16,000 children in Illinois are looking for permanent families to give them the love and care they need and deserve, and to help them reach their goals; and

WHEREAS, In order to give foster youth the support they need, people all over Illinois are stepping up to serve as mentors, teachers, faith leaders, caseworkers, advocates, and kinship caregivers; and

WHEREAS, Declaring Foster Care Month in Illinois provides an opportunity to recognize foster parents for their hard work and dedication to children; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we recognize May of 2018 as Foster Care Month in Illinois to give recognition to those who devote their lives to improving the lives of foster children, and to bring awareness to the hardships foster children face and the unique and rewarding opportunities to help and serve them; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to Beverly J. Walker, Director of the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 973

Offered by Representative Sauer:

WHEREAS, The members of the Illinois House of Representatives recognize that township government is the oldest existing unit of government in the United States; it was first established in Providence, Rhode Island in 1636 and in Illinois in 1850 with the creation of Ela Township; and

WHEREAS, Eighty-Five of the 102 counties in Illinois operate under the township form of government; townships serve more than eight million citizens; and

WHEREAS, Ela Township serves over 40,000 residents in Lake County; and

WHEREAS, Ela Township has provided vital programs and services to its residents; and

WHEREAS, Ela Township provides services for seniors, youth, and disabled individuals, general assistance, cemetery maintenance, park maintenance, bussing, property assessments, road maintenance, and counseling; and

WHEREAS, Ela Township has been recognized on several occasions, most recently by receiving the Association of Illinois Senior Centers highest honor, the "Mind, Body and Spirit" award, for its "55 Plus" program; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we thank Ela Township for its service to its residents and we recognize September 21, 2018 as Township Day in Ela Township; and be it further

HOUSE RESOLUTION 975

Offered by Representative Durkin:

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois is the 6th most populous state in the country; it is home to world-class cities, enriched communities, renowned tourist destinations, and is a leader in many areas including transportation, technology, finance, manufacturing, agriculture, and, most importantly, access to an unrivaled labor force; and

WHEREAS, There are many positive aspects of this State that should be applauded and highlighted, unfortunately, we find ourselves at a true crossroads; years of fiscal irresponsibility and political malfeasance have resulted in an undesirable state of affairs that has plagued and will continue to loom over the Land of Lincoln; and

WHEREAS, Based on 2015 American Community Survey (ACS) data collected by the U.S. Census Bureau, Illinois experienced a 3.7% increase when comparing the median household income reported in the 2014 ACS (\$57,478) and the 2015 ACS (\$59,588); the 3.7% increase was just under the U.S. average of 3.8%; moreover, the states of Missouri and Wisconsin witnessed more substantial increases; and

WHEREAS, Illinois has to move towards a future that seeks and expects to be competitive in all sectors; that is what every State across America is doing in order to embolden their residents and, furthermore, attract the best and brightest employees and employers; and

WHEREAS, It is with this reality in mind that Illinois lawmakers now more than ever must act in order to ensure that the best days for Illinoisans are ahead of us; the time of kicking the can down the road and blatant inaction and disregard is over; Illinois must unequivocally reinforce the notion, not only to every resident but to any person that may wish to come to the Prairie State, that Illinois is truly forward-looking; and

WHEREAS, There is no greater threat to Illinoisans currently than that of continuing down the trajectory that we are on today; through years of laxity, unchecked spending, and ever-growing means of overtaxation, Illinois residents are being subjected to incredible pressures to leave their homes and relocate elsewhere; and

WHEREAS, Illinois has among some of the highest tax burdens of any state not only in the Midwest, but in the country; Illinois has one of the highest average property tax burdens in the United States; Illinois residents are charged one of the highest average combined State and local sales taxes; if this were not enough, Illinois has estate, corporate franchise, and numerous other State and local taxes that make taxpayers reasonably question what Springfield is doing right; and

WHEREAS, The Tax Foundation's State Business Tax Climate Index for 2018 ranked Illinois 29th on its yearly report that compares the states' tax systems; comparatively, Indiana was ranked 9th, Michigan was ranked 12th, and Missouri came in at 16th most favorable; and

WHEREAS, Things must change for the better through fiscally responsible and sustainable initiatives that foster economic growth and cease to be an over-encumbrance on Illinois taxpayers; this is why proposals such as those calling for a graduated income tax to be adopted in this State must be denied outright; and

WHEREAS, The Federation of Tax Administrators found in data compiled for their 2015 state and local revenues comparison that, per capita, the average taxpayer paid a total of \$5,751 in state and local taxes, the 12th highest in the country; when comparing this amount to the percentage of an average taxpayer's income (11.7%), Illinois came in 8th highest in the country; comparatively, not one of our neighbor states (i.e., Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky, Michigan, or Missouri) landed in the top 15; and

WHEREAS, To continue on this senseless path of overburdening and debilitating propositions of increased taxation and reckless spending is simply unconscionable; proponents of a graduated income tax offer that this is a "fair" treatment of taxpayers, yet this is far from the truth; and

WHEREAS, Studies have shown that states with graduated income taxes impose an increased burden on the middle-class; this venture, instead of creating fairness, exasperates the tax base; and

WHEREAS, States that impose graduated income tax rates, which vary in application but number 33 in all, present a troublesome case for their residents, and would, undoubtedly, present an equally problematic case here in Illinois; looking at California, for example, which has one of the most so-called progressive income tax bracket systems, with a base rate of 1% and a top marginal rate of 13.3%, an Illinois taxpayer that is earning a median household income of approximately \$59,000 would be subject to a 9.3% income tax rate under the Golden State's model - nearly doubling the current Illinois tax; using the New York tax structure, the Illinois taxpayer would be subject to a 6.33% state tax rate; using the New Jersey model, that same Illinois taxpayer would be subjected to a 5.525% income tax rate; and

WHEREAS, Graduated income taxes only create added burdens and dissuade economic prosperity, two unintended consequences that proponents of enacting such a tax system fail to mention; organizations including the Civic Federation and Taxpayers' Federation of Illinois have provided detailed analyses of hypothetical scenarios where Illinois would impose such a tax; these figures might please proponents that only focus on increasing revenues, but it must be noted that there will be a cost to such a proposal that one group, Illinois families, will have to pay for; and

WHEREAS, National organizations, such as the Hoover Institution, have outlined the gross inadequacies of the graduated income tax system; while it may appear to provide equity, the so-called progressive income tax punishes hard-working, middle-class families, as they make up the majority of the tax base; there is nothing fair in making average Illinoisans pay for the shortcomings of a legislature that has created a tax and spend paradigm that is unsustainable; and

WHEREAS, Proposals calling for a graduated income tax introduced in recent years in the legislature have failed to even begin the discussion because legislators and proponents alike realize that such an initiative would lead to irreparable damage that would only serve to further impair the economic outlook of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, A move to amend the constitution to allow for such a repugnant affront to Illinois families would be an act of utter insult to Illinois taxpayers and a dereliction of the duty owed to taxpayers by members of the legislative branch of government, a body that is supposed to improve the general welfare and protect

the best interests of all Illinoisans; nothing about creating an unfair, unequal, and avaricious tax system helps the General Assembly accomplish these ends; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we stand united in opposition to any measure that would allow the creation of a graduated income tax on Illinois residents; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to each member of the Illinois General Assembly and the Office of the Governor as a testament to our unwavering commitment to improving the day-to-day lives of families across this great State.
