135TH LEGISLATIVE DAY

Perfunctory Session

TUESDAY, MAY 22, 2018

At the hour of 1:07 o'clock p.m., the House reconvened perfunctory session.

INTRODUCTION AND FIRST READING OF BILLS

The following bill was introduced, read by title a first time, ordered reproduced and placed in the Committee on Rules:

HOUSE BILL 5884. Introduced by Representative Long, AN ACT concerning transportation.

HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 1111

Offered by Representative Moylan:

WHEREAS, Sen. John McCain is a true American hero who has dedicated his life to public service, serving in the United States Navy as an aviator from 1958 to 1981, as Congressman of Arizona's 1st District from 1983 to 1987, and in the U.S. Senate since 1987; and

WHEREAS, During the Vietnam War, Sen. McCain was seriously injured and captured and held as a prisoner of war for six years, where he was tortured and sustained injuries resulting in lifelong physical disabilities; and

WHEREAS, Sen. McCain was diagnosed with an aggressive form of brain cancer in 2017 and has been receiving treatment at home in Arizona; and

WHEREAS, On May 10, 2018, Special Assistant of the White House Communications Office, Kelly Riddell Sadler, mocked Sen. John McCain's diagnosis of brain cancer; and

WHEREAS, Kelly Riddell Sadler dismissed Sen. McCain's opinion on President Trump's nominee for CIA director, stating "[His opinion] doesn't matter. He's dying anyway"; and

WHEREAS, Common human decency calls for reverence and respect for members of the armed forces, seniors, and individuals with serious health concerns; and

WHEREAS, Several Senate Republicans have called for an apology from the Trump administration, including Sen. Lindsey Graham, Sen. John Cornyn, Sen. John Kennedy, and Sen. Dan Sullivan; and

WHEREAS, The Trump administration has refused to acknowledge or apologize for the degrading remarks made by its Special Assistant; and

WHEREAS, The members of the Illinois House of Representatives condemn recent disrespectful comments made by White House Communications Office Special Assistant, Kelly Riddell Sadler concerning Sen. John McCain; and

WHEREAS, It is in the poorest of taste for an employee of the highest office in the country to disrespect and disparage disabled veterans of the armed forces; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we strongly urge the President of the United States to issue a formal apology to Sen. John McCain and to remove Special Assistant Kelly Riddell Sadler from her position within the White House communications office and from any other government related duties; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to President Trump, his Chief of Staff, John F. Kelly, and Kelly Riddell Sadler as a symbol of our disapproval of any disrespect toward veterans or the armed forces, especially, the vile, shameful comments made by Kelly Riddell Sadler.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 1113

Offered by Representative Butler:

WHEREAS, Route 66 was designated in 1926 as America's Mother Road, linking the heartland with the Pacific Ocean and bringing millions of travelers to the many communities along its route, thereby creating a significant economic engine from Chicago to Los Angeles; and

WHEREAS, Upon the replacement of Route 66 by the interstate system, which led to its decommissioning in 1985, an economic hardship resulted for those local businesses that thrived on providing services to the Route 66 traveler; and

WHEREAS, Route 66 has become an iconic symbol of America's search for freedom, adventure, and prosperity which annually brings travelers from around the world to discover America; and

WHEREAS, The U.S. Congress has recognized the importance of the road by establishing the National Park Service's Rt. 66 Corridor Preservation Program in the National Trails Office in 1999 to foster preservation, economic development, and marketing through matching grants, which has leveraged more than \$4 million in historic preservation investment; and

WHEREAS, The NPS Rt. 66 Corridor Preservation Program will sunset in 2019, which would result in the lack of a federally designated organization to coordinate, fund, and support mutually beneficial activities on Route 66; and

WHEREAS, The Route 66 Road Ahead Partnership, a collaborative not-for-profit organization, was established to create a national coordinating structure and supports and promotes the idea of designating Rt. 66 as a National Historic Trail as the best means for ensuring a federal-level focus on Rt. 66; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the U.S. Congress to Pass H.R.801, introduced by U.S. Representative Darin LaHood, which would create the Route 66 Historic Trail; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to all members of the Illinois Congressional Delegation and President Donald J. Trump.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 1115

Offered by Representative Costello:

WHEREAS, Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) is a contagious neurological disease affecting members of the cervid family, including deer, elk, and moose; and

WHEREAS, Once contracted, the disease is always fatal; and

WHEREAS, CWD has continued to spread throughout the nation since its first detection, and cases of CWD have been confirmed in Illinois and its neighboring states of Iowa, Missouri, and Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, Today, the health of deer herds in Illinois is threatened by the spread of CWD, as is the State's storied hunting tradition and the economic and conservation benefits it provides; and

WHEREAS, Hunting is a vital economic force in Illinois, with hunters in Illinois accounting for over \$1.32 billion in annual spending and supporting 18,049 jobs; and

WHEREAS, In 2017 alone, the sale of hunting licenses brought in over \$32 million for conservation efforts in the State, while excise taxes paid on hunting equipment and associated goods, which were distributed to Illinois through the Wildlife Restoration Program that year, provided more than \$16 million in additional funds; and

WHEREAS, House Resolution 4454, the Chronic Wasting Disease Management Act, and Senate Bill 2252, The Chronic Wasting Disease Support for States Act, were recently introduced, respectively, in the United States House of Representatives and the United States Senate, as a means of providing states with additional resources to fight this disease and provide support for research; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we encourage all members of Illinois's Congressional Delegation to support and co-sponsor this essential legislation that will help protect the hunting heritage of Illinois and the immense conservation and economic benefits it provides; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to all members of Illinois's Congressional Delegation, Governor Bruce Rauner, and the Illinois Department of Natural Resources so that all may know the critical importance of House Resolution 4454 and Senate Bill 2252.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 1116

Offered by Representative Stuart:

WHEREAS, The Illinois Association of Regional Superintendents of Schools' (IARSS) educator shortage survey identified a widespread concern for both teacher shortages and substitute teacher shortages; and

WHEREAS, The report considers five key questions from the survey concerning a teacher shortage which include: difficulty with staffing, cancelled classes, frequency of candidate application, quality of applicants, and content shortage areas; and

WHEREAS, Teacher shortage concerns were more prominent in the rural districts of central Illinois, but substitute teacher shortage concerns were most evident for Southern Illinois districts; and

WHEREAS, edTPA takes away from the classroom experience, the most valid part of the student teaching process, and student teachers are already observed by no less than three educational professionals during classroom time; and

WHEREAS, Preparation for edTPA can take time away from the normal curriculum of a teacher, and can detract from the overall student-teaching experience, shifting focus from learning to teaching to pass a test; and

WHEREAS, The edTPA may favor student teachers in some teaching placements; some sources indicate that inner-city schools with low-income students or highly diverse student populations may present challenges that make passing the edTPA more difficult; also, the faculty responsible for overseeing and supporting student teachers may also affect test scores; and

WHEREAS, On top of the cost of tuition, the basic skills exam, and other certification requirements, this is a costly, unproven, and restrictive exam administered by Pearson Education, Inc.; the fee for taking the edTPA is \$300; and

WHEREAS, There is no research or evidence to support that edTPA is a reliable method for evaluating or choosing teacher candidates; and

WHEREAS, The exam is not scored by qualified teacher evaluators familiar with the teacher candidate; instead, Pearson Education, Inc. hires temporary workers at its own discretion to indirectly decide who receives teaching licenses; and

WHEREAS, Student teachers receive no compensation for hours they spend in the classroom and must also self-fund their participation in a teacher-certification program, which can present a significant burden; Pearson Education, Inc. is profiting from pre-service educators, many of whom will enter the profession in debt; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we encourage the State Board of Education to stop using edTPA as the teacher certification for licensure; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to the State Superintendent, the Illinois State Board of Education, and Pearson Education.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 134

Offered by Representative Riley:

WHEREAS, On May 16, 2017, Amtrak conductor and SMART-Transportation Division member Michael Case was shot by a passenger while performing his official duties at the Naperville Amtrak station; and

WHEREAS, While Michael Case is on a positive road to recovery, he spent 10 weeks in the hospital and endured numerous extensive surgeries; and

WHEREAS, This incident is one of 73 recorded assaults on Amtrak crewmembers since 2015; and

WHEREAS, While this most extreme example of violence is rare, we know passenger rail workers are increasingly facing other forms of violence and abuse; and

WHEREAS, There are no national standards for preventing assaults on passenger and commuter rail workers, despite the increase in assaults across the country; and

WHEREAS, Given the interstate nature of passenger rail and related concerns with transportation security, strong federal protections may be appropriate; and

WHEREAS, On the one-year anniversary of Michael Case's shooting, Illinois U.S. Senator Tammy Duckworth, along with U.S. Senator John Hoeven, have introduced in the U.S. Senate, the Passenger Rail Crew Protection Act; and

WHEREAS, This legislation would simply provide the same federal protections for passenger rail crewmembers that airline crewmembers currently have, so that any assault or intimidation of a rail crewmember would be handled under federal law; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that we support the introduction and passage of the Passenger Rail Crew Protection Act; and be it further
