RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FIRST GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we condemn words of Anti-Semitism wherever they are written or spoken, especially when they are written or spoken by the holder of an office of trust under the laws of the United States; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we name Congresswoman Ilhan Omar as the speaker of these words; and be it further

RESOLVED, That any condemnation of these words should specifically enumerate their Anti-Semitic content and condemn the continued existence of Anti-Semitism; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge all of the communities represented by all American lawmakers to unite in their opposition to Anti-Semitism; and be it further

RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be delivered to the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives Nancy Pelosi and to each member of the Illinois Congressional Delegation.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 178

WHEREAS, The Internet "Momo Challenge" phenomenon has taken social media by storm as parents, school districts, and police authorities express deep concern that adolescents might be seeing a video on children's websites that encourages young people to commit acts of self-harm and suicide; and

WHEREAS, Over the past decade, videos and stories originating on the Internet have been linked to self-harm, suicide, and violence toward others; and

WHEREAS, Instances of depression and suicide among adolescents are on the rise, with some studies reporting that hospitalizations of suicidal teenagers have doubled in the past decade; and

WHEREAS, The developing brains of children and teenagers are sensitive to disturbing content and more susceptible to making quick, risky decisions than adults; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FIRST GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge YouTube, Google, and all websites that cater to children to maintain stringent policies regarding the content that is posted by the public; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the aforementioned websites to do everything in their power to remove media that could be life-threatening to children and to help law enforcement officials locate the creators of this content if necessary; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge parents to always exercise caution when allowing children to access the Internet, as there is no guarantee that all the material they will be exposed to is safe, regardless of whether they are using a website intended for children; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the Illinois General Assembly to increase awareness about Internet safety and to advance policies to keep children safe on the web.

HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 174

Offered by Representative McSweeney:

WHEREAS, The worst events of the Twentieth Century were inextricably connected with the crimes of Anti-Semitism; and

WHEREAS, It is the duty of American citizens, inhabitants of a land of the free, to totally oppose Anti-Semitism wherever it is seen, heard, or found; and

WHEREAS, Words of Anti-Semitism were recently spoken by an elected member of the United States Congress, Congresswoman Ilhan Omar of Minnesota; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FIRST GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we condemn words of Anti-Semitism wherever they are written or spoken, especially when they are written or spoken by the holder of an office of trust under the laws of the United States; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we name Congresswoman Ilhan Omar as the speaker of these words; and be it further

RESOLVED, That any condemnation of these words should specifically enumerate their Anti-Semitic content and condemn the continued existence of Anti-Semitism; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge all of the communities represented by all American lawmakers to unite in their opposition to Anti-Semitism; and be it further

RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be delivered to the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives Nancy Pelosi and to each member of the Illinois Congressional Delegation.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 178

Offered by Representative Conyears-Ervin:

WHEREAS, The Internet "Momo Challenge" phenomenon has taken social media by storm as parents, school districts, and police authorities express deep concern that adolescents might be seeing a video on children's websites that encourages young people to commit acts of self-harm and suicide; and

WHEREAS, Over the past decade, videos and stories originating on the Internet have been linked to self-harm, suicide, and violence toward others; and

WHEREAS, Instances of depression and suicide among adolescents are on the rise, with some studies reporting that hospitalizations of suicidal teenagers have doubled in the past decade; and

WHEREAS, The developing brains of children and teenagers are sensitive to disturbing content and more susceptible to making quick, risky decisions than adults; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FIRST GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge YouTube, Google, and all websites that cater to children to maintain stringent policies regarding the content that is posted by the public; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the aforementioned websites to do everything in their power to remove media that could be life-threatening to children and to help law enforcement officials locate the creators of this content if necessary; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge parents to always exercise caution when allowing children to access the Internet, as there is no guarantee that all the material they will be exposed to is safe, regardless of whether they are using a website intended for children; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the Illinois General Assembly to increase awareness about Internet safety and to advance policies to keep children safe on the web.
