HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 337

Offered by Representative Turner:

WHEREAS, Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Incorporated, was founded on December 4, 1906 by seven college men, respectfully known as the "Seven Jewels," on the campus of Cornell University in Ithaca, New York and became the first intercollegiate Greek-letter fraternity established by and for African Americans; and

WHEREAS, The Seven Jewels of the Fraternity, Henry Arthur Callis, Charles Henry Chapman, Eugene Kinckle Jones, George Biddle Kelley, Nathaniel Allison Murray, Robert Harold Ogle, and Verner Woodson Tandy, recognized the need for a strong bond of brotherhood among African descendants in this country and the need to help correct the educational, economic, political, and social injustices faced by African Americans and other people of color; and

WHEREAS, Alpha Phi Alpha initially served as a study and support group for minority students who faced racial prejudice, both educationally and socially, at Cornell University; the Jewel Founders and early leaders of the Fraternity succeeded in laying a firm foundation for Alpha Phi Alpha's principles of scholarship, fellowship, good character, and the uplifting of humanity; and

WHEREAS, While stressing academic excellence among its members since its founding, Alpha Phi Alpha has consistently supplied its voice and vision to the struggle of African Americans and people of color and to issues of civil rights around the world; and

WHEREAS, The aims of Alpha Phi Alpha are manly deeds, scholarship, and love for all mankind; and

WHEREAS, The mission of Alpha Phi Alpha is to develop leaders, promote brotherhood and academic excellence, and provide service and advocacy for communities, as exemplified through its national programs which include "Go to High School, Go to College," which focuses on the educational achievement of students in elementary, secondary, and post-secondary schools and has given thousands of dollars in scholarship funds to deserving students, "Project Alpha," which teaches teenage pregnancy prevention and sexually transmitted disease prevention to young males, and its "A Voteless People is a Hopeless People" campaign, a voter registration and education program through which thousands of voters have been educated and registered; the Fraternity also focuses on providing service through its strategic partnerships with Big Brothers Big Sisters, the Boy Scouts of America, the March of Dimes, the American Heart/American Stroke Association, and the American Cancer Society; and

WHEREAS, For over 112 years, Alpha Phi Alpha has played a fundamental role in the positive development of the character and education of more than 200,000 men around the world; and

WHEREAS, Alpha Phi Alpha has over 700 college and alumni chapters in the United States of America, Africa, Asia, the Caribbean, and Europe; this total includes 141 chapters in the Midwestern Region, including 32 in Illinois; Alpha Phi Alpha's presence started in Illinois with the founding of the first college chapter in Illinois, the Theta Chapter in 1910, and the first alumni chapter, the Xi Lambda Chapter in 1924, both in Chicago; and

WHEREAS, Members of Alpha Phi Alpha include many noteworthy leaders in the areas of government, business, entertainment, science, and higher education, including Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., Thurgood Marshall, W.E.B. DuBois, John Hope Franklin, John H. Johnson, Adam Clayton Powell, Andrew Young, Robert Smith, and Cornel West; its membership also includes federal, State, and local elected officials, including U.S. Representative Danny K. Davis, former U.S. Senators Edward Brook and Roland Burris, former State Senator Donne E. Trotter, former State Representative Al Riley, former Cook County Board Presidents John and Todd Stroger, and former Mayor of Chicago Eugene Sawyer, among countless others who have long stood at the forefront of the fight for civil and human rights and social change for all Americans; and

WHEREAS, Several Alpha Phi Alpha members have served in the Illinois General Assembly, including the following members of the 101st General Assembly: Representatives Justin Slaughter, Arthur Turner Jr.,

Emanuel "Chris" Welch, and Senator Elgie R. Sims Jr, who also served as the 26th Vice President of the Midwestern Region; and

WHEREAS, Alpha Phi Alpha continues to enrich the lives of its members, who, in turn, provide service and advocacy for the communities they serve; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FIRST GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we recognize the 2019 Alpha Phi Alpha Day held at the Illinois State Capitol and welcome the members of Alpha Phi Alpha to the Capitol; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we declare the date of May 8, 2019 as Alpha Phi Alpha Day in the State of Illinois in honor of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Incorporated and its continued impact on the communities it serves.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 339

Offered by Representative Villanueva:

WHEREAS, Thousands of families across Illinois are affected by metastatic breast cancer; and

WHEREAS, Much of the talk around breast cancer focuses on early detection and routine diagnosis, where we have seen tremendous progress in the last 30 years; and

WHEREAS, The story for advanced disease is quite different; metastatic breast cancer patients continue to face many unique challenges, such as the emotional and physical demands of continual treatment; and

WHEREAS, Currently no cure exists for metastatic breast cancer and many of those with metastatic breast cancer will continue treatment with the goal of extending the best quality of life possible; and

WHEREAS, One in eight women in the U.S. could be diagnosed with breast cancer; specifically in Illinois, it is expected that 11,560 women will be diagnosed with breast cancer in 2019; and

WHEREAS, In the U.S., it is estimated that over 154,000 women have metastatic breast cancer; this devastating stage of breast cancer occurs when cancer spreads beyond the breast to other parts of the body, including the bones, lungs, liver, and brain; and

WHEREAS, In 2019, it is estimated that more than 1,720 women in Illinois will die of breast cancer, nearly all due to metastatic breast cancer; and

WHEREAS, Metastatic breast cancer affects all races and socioeconomic classes; while Caucasian women see slightly higher incidence rates of breast cancer, the mortality rate for African-American women with breast cancer is 39 percent higher than that of Caucasian women, and breast cancer is the leading cause of cancer-related death for Hispanic women; and

WHEREAS, The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention defines health equity as when every person has the opportunity to "attain his or her full health potential"; and

WHEREAS, Any discussions of breast cancer should include the spectrum from screening through the treatment of and support of those with metastatic breast cancer; and

WHEREAS, Metastatic breast cancer cuts short the lives of too many people in Illinois, leaving a lasting effect on their families; and

WHEREAS, While there have been treatment advances in metastatic breast cancer, many of those advances have benefitted a subset of patients with specific types of metastatic breast cancer; and

WHEREAS, While metastatic breast cancer remains incurable, there is reason to be hopeful; extensive research efforts are underway to address this high unmet need; and

WHEREAS, <https://ClinicalTrials.gov> is a searchable database which provides patients, family members and the public with information about current ongoing clinical research studies; and

WHEREAS, Additional focus is needed on the needs of the patient, promising research efforts in the development of more effective treatments, and the personal and social burdens of metastatic breast cancer for all women regardless of their race, ethnicity, or economic status; and

WHEREAS, More research is needed for metastatic breast cancer so that new and more effective treatments can be developed, as well as a push for critical research and advanced treatments for metastatic breast cancer; Metastatic Breast Cancer Awareness Day is an opportunity to shed light on the devastation metastatic breast cancer brings to communities throughout the State; and

WHEREAS, Individuals diagnosed with metastatic breast cancer can speak with their physician to learn more about the disease and find support groups and services in their community or online; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED FIRST GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare October 13, 2019 as "Metastatic Breast Cancer Awareness Day" in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the citizens of Illinois are urged to become informed and aware of metastatic breast cancer and to support funding for programs to reduce barriers to breast cancer screening, detection, and treatment for underserved women.
