HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 75

Offered by Representative Lilly:

WHEREAS, Tobacco smoke is a major contributor to indoor air pollution, and breathing secondhand smoke is a cause of disease and death, including heart disease, stroke, respiratory disease, lung cancer, low birth-weight babies, sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS), increased respiratory infections in children, asthma in children and adults, sinus cancer, and breast cancer in younger, premenopausal women; and

WHEREAS, The 2006 U.S. Surgeon General report, The Health Consequences of Involuntary Exposure to Tobacco Smoke, estimated that exposure to secondhand smoke kills approximately 50,000 people in the United States annually, including approximately 2,000 in Illinois; there is no risk-free level of exposure to secondhand smoke; ventilation and other air cleaning technologies cannot completely control for exposure of nonsmokers to secondhand smoke; smoke-free workplace policies are the only effective way to eliminate secondhand smoke exposure in the workplace, and evidence shows that smoke-free policies and laws do not have an adverse economic impact on the hospitality industry; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Department of Public Health reported a 28.4 percent decline in the smoking rate after the Smoke Free Illinois Act (the Act) was enacted in 2008 in addition to a 4.1 percent and 1.4 percent decline in the mortality rate for heart disease and lung cancer, respectively; the number of callers to the Illinois Tobacco Quitline increased dramatically after the Act became law from 7,255 in 2006 to 24,575 in 2012; in 2011, 91 percent of adults reported no exposure to secondhand smoke in indoor public places, and 89% of Illinois adults believed policies not allowing tobacco use in indoor or outdoor public places should be strictly enforced; and

WHEREAS, Twenty-eight states and the District of Columbia have passed comprehensive smoke-free laws to protect people against the harmful effects of secondhand smoke; and

WHEREAS, Aerosol from electronic cigarettes has a high concentration of heavy metals, volatile organic compounds, and ultrafine particles; the particle concentration is higher than in conventional tobacco cigarette smoke; exposure to fine and ultrafine particles may exacerbate respiratory ailments like asthma and constrict arteries, which could trigger a heart attack; and

WHEREAS, The World Health Organization (WHO) recommends that electronic cigarettes not be used indoors, especially in smoke-free environments, in order to minimize the risk to bystanders of breathing in the aerosol emitted by the devices and to avoid undermining the enforcement of smoke-free laws; and

WHEREAS, Secondhand smoke from combusted marijuana contains many of the same toxins, irritants, and carcinogens as tobacco smoke that can be breathed deeply into the lungs, which can cause lung irritation and asthma attacks and makes respiratory infections more likely; exposure to fine particulate matter can exacerbate health problems, especially for people with respiratory conditions like asthma, bronchitis, or chronic obstructive pulmonary disease; research has shown that secondhand marijuana smoke can do as much damage to the heart and blood vessels as secondhand tobacco smoke; and

WHEREAS, The American Society for Heating, Refrigeration, and Air-Conditioning Engineers (ASHRAE), the standard setting body for the HVAC industry, affirms that mechanical solutions like ventilation cannot control for the health hazards of secondhand smoke, and its standard (62.1) for acceptable indoor air quality is based on an environment that is free from tobacco and marijuana smoke and secondhand aerosol from electronic cigarettes; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that we strive to protect and strengthen the Smoke Free Illinois Act and urge the Illinois Department of Public Health to provide a data brief by 2023 on the impact of the Act since 2013 to commemorate the 15th anniversary of the Act's enactment; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be delivered to the Illinois Department of Public Health.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 715

Offered by Representative Hoffman:

WHEREAS, The members of the Illinois House of Representatives are saddened to learn of the death of Harold Byers of Highland, who passed away on December 9, 2021; and

WHEREAS, Harold Byers was born in Folsomville, Indiana to Ella Mae and Harold J. Byers on October 6, 1935; he married Nancy Reinke on December 3, 1955; and

WHEREAS, Harold Byers began his career as a teacher and basketball coach for five years; he spent the remainder of his career in the textbook business, first as a sales representative for McGraw-Hill and later as owner of B&B Book Supply; he devoted his entire life to promoting libraries and encouraging people to read and learn; and

WHEREAS, Harold Byers served as a state representative in the Illinois General Assembly and was a champion of civil rights and equal rights for all; his support for the Equal Rights Amendment to the U.S. Constitution as a downstate legislator earned him the wrath of Phyllis Schlafly and Anita Bryant, which he proudly wore as a badge of honor; and

WHEREAS, Harold Byers was a progressive on civil rights and social issues, though he was a fiscal conservative who believed in balanced budgets, and was a true watchdog of taxpayer dollars; and

WHEREAS, Harold Byers' first bill as a freshman legislator changed Illinois history by reforming the manner in which state legislators were paid; on his first day in office, he learned that a century old Illinois law required all legislators to be paid their entire annual salary on the day they were sworn in; he sponsored a bill, now law, that required legislators to be paid on a monthly basis only after they worked each month; his bill and law won the support of 635,138 grateful Illinois voters who signed petitions to help win passage of the long overdue legislative salary reform; and

WHEREAS, Harold Byers was a caring legislator who won passage of many important laws, including consumer protections, nursing home reform, political ethics reform, and help for working people who lived from paycheck to paycheck; and

WHEREAS, Harold Byers was fiercely and fearlessly independent as a legislator; he was awarded the Outstanding Legislator Award from the Independent Voters of Illinois for each of the two terms he served in the Illinois House of Representatives; he believed in opening government to the public and press; and

WHEREAS, Harold Byers was a member of the Madison County Board for 16 years, where he again served as a watchdog of taxpayer dollars; during his tenure, he became highly distressed that Madison County was without a county health department; he was disturbed that county residents were forced to travel to adjacent counties, Bond and Clinton, to obtain vaccinations for their young children; he therefore, as an advocate for good healthcare for all, was instrumental in the establishment of the Madison County Health Department; and

WHEREAS, Harold Byers served on the Metro East Park and Recreation District, helping to improve the district's park system for the betterment of the Metro-East area; and

WHEREAS, Harold Byers was appointed to the Illinois State Board of Elections by Governor Pat Quinn, where he served for a number of years and worked tirelessly to assure Illinois elections remained free and fair for all; and

WHEREAS, Every year on his birthday, Harold Byers and his wife Nancy organized a bean dinner at their home, where dozens of friends came to celebrate and raise funds for the local food pantry; and

WHEREAS, Harold Byers was a member of the Evangelical United Church of Christ in Highland; he had a generous spirit and lived his life to the fullest, enjoying his travels across America and his worldwide

excursions; he enjoyed attending sporting events and was an avid fan of both horse racing and the Chicago Cubs; he was thrilled to see his Cubs win the 2016 World Series and proudly attended one of the World Series games in Chicago to root for his team; and

WHEREAS, Harold Byers was preceded in death by his parents; his sister, Elaine Grundhoefer; his brother, Ronald Byers; and his daughter-in-law, Deborah Byers; and

WHEREAS, Harold Byers is survived by his loving wife of 66 years, Nancy; his children, Cheryl Byers, Sheila Byers (Rich Ullman), Keith (Patricia) Byers, Lana (Willard) Herman, Greg (Jane) Byers, Jeff Byers (Angela Schmidt), and Phil Byers; his grandchildren, Mandy Eyrich, Kim Fulton, Ashley Dickey, Margaret Byers, Eric Byers, Katelyn Kuk, Catherine Byers, Tara Byers, Maxwell Byers, Jennifer Ullman, Elaine Herman, Peter Byers, and Hannah Clifford; his great-grandchildren, Emmaline Eyrich, Spencer Eyrich, Emmalyn Dickey, Nora Dickey, Henry Dean Byers, Briella Byers, Miles Fulton, Grayson Davis, and Cameron Kuk, with two more on the way; and his brothers, Gary and Sam Byers; therefore, be it
