HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 718

Offered by Representative Davidsmeyer:

WHEREAS, Oil and natural gas are vital components of our nation's economy and provide more than 11 million jobs nationwide, including 356,000 total jobs and \$53.5 billion in gross domestic income in Illinois alone; and

WHEREAS, U.S. energy abundance has provided security that has historically led to reliable, affordable energy for American consumers and our allies; and

WHEREAS, The world is looking to America for energy leadership and stability as current geopolitical events pose potential economic disruptions in addition to the inflation already affecting households, both in the U.S. and across Europe; and

WHEREAS, Russia is the third leading oil producer in the world but is risking economic and global security along with the loss of lives by invading the democratic nation of Ukraine; and

WHEREAS, Russian exports of oil and gas provide 36 percent of Russia's national budget that is used to finance the war in Ukraine; and

WHEREAS, The European Union (EU) is Russia's primary market for oil and natural gas, with the EU obtaining 35 percent of its natural gas and 25 percent of its oil from Russia; and

WHEREAS, The United States can increase its production of oil and gas to help provide economic and global security in light of the Russian invasion of Ukraine; and

WHEREAS, Operation and expansion of our oil and natural gas pipelines, key components of America's energy success that provide the most efficient means of transporting those commodities, are being blocked by the federal government and many state governments; and

WHEREAS, The Biden Administration continues to increase costs and delay efforts to develop oil and natural gas leasing on federal lands and waters, despite the fact that the program provides billions in revenues to federal, state, and local governments and supports conservation programs throughout the country; and

WHEREAS, U.S. offshore production is one of the lowest carbon intensive energy-producing regions in the world, and halting offshore leasing and development will shift production and capital investment overseas and undermine decades of environmental progress; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we strongly urge the President of the United States to take measures and support policies that ensure long-term American energy leadership, security, and progress, including those that result in the continued operation of existing oil and natural gas pipelines, the construction of new oil and gas pipelines, the resumption of consistent, credible federal lease sales, and the immediate preparation of a new five-year program to guide future offshore leasing; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Clerk of the House send duly authenticated copies of this resolution to the President of the United States, the United States Secretary of the Interior, the United States Secretary of Transportation, the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, and the Illinois Congressional delegation.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 719

Offered by Representative Swanson:

WHEREAS, The price of motor fuel, at the pumps where Americans buy it, is approaching the record-high price set in 2008; and

WHEREAS, Motor fuel is a commodity for which demand is inelastic, because its consumption is closely tied to promises made by ordinary American families; parents have promised their employers they will drive to work, and they have promised their children they will drive them to soccer practice; and

WHEREAS, United States home production of oil and natural gas is closely tied to federal policies; much of the U.S. oil and gas that is yet to be pumped comes from federal lands and waters in the Rocky Mountains, the Great Plains, the Gulf of Mexico, coastal California, and Alaska; and

WHEREAS, In this time of grave national uncertainty and economic and military threats, it is urgent that we achieve true energy independence in the United States of America; and

WHEREAS, To achieve true U.S. energy independence, we need to maximize the production of American energy, including energy from U.S. federal lands, as well as reducing barriers to the construction of infrastructure to pump, deliver, and refine energy; and

WHEREAS, Some voices continue to call for limiting or shutting down particular oil fields, energy production regions, and energy production technologies that are under our control and that we can use to achieve true energy independence and maintain our national security; and

WHEREAS, Whenever we listen to these voices, Americans pay more at the pump; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare U.S. oil and natural gas energy independence to be an urgent national priority; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we call upon the federal government and President Joe Biden to reverse current anti-production policies and to take all possible steps to maximize immediate U.S. oil and gas production, including from U.S. federal lands and waters; and be it further

RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be delivered to President Joe Biden, U.S. Secretary of Energy Jennifer Granholm, and all members of the Illinois Congressional Delegation.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 76

Offered by Representative Bennett:

WHEREAS, It is highly fitting that the Illinois General Assembly pays honor and respect to individuals who have given their lives in service to their communities; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois State Police has proudly served the citizens of Illinois since 1922, and its dedication to public safety has saved countless lives and has enriched the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, It is important to remember those officers who lost their lives while upholding their oath to serve and protect; and

WHEREAS, Trooper Albert Hasson was the first Illinois State Police officer to be killed in the line of duty; and

WHEREAS, Trooper Hasson was struck by a car while patrolling approximately three miles north of Chenoa on September 7, 1924; he pulled off the road to stop an oncoming car and was struck by a car from behind just as he stepped onto the roadway, throwing him 10 feet; and

WHEREAS, Trooper Hasson was taken by fellow officers to the hospital in Pontiac, where he succumbed to his injuries several hours later; and

WHEREAS, Trooper Hasson was a four-month veteran of the Illinois State Police, assigned to District 6 in Pontiac; and

WHEREAS, Trooper Hasson was a veteran of World War I, and at the time of his passing, he was survived by his wife; and

WHEREAS, To honor Trooper Hasson, a training room in the District 6 Headquarters was named after him in 2004; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that we designate U.S. Route 24 in the City of Chenoa as the "Trooper Albert Hasson Memorial Highway"; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Illinois Department of Transportation is requested to erect at suitable locations, consistent with State and federal regulations, appropriate plaques or signs giving notice of the name of the "Trooper Albert Hasson Memorial Highway"; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to the Illinois State Police, the Mayor of the City of Chenoa, and the Secretary of Transportation.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 77

Offered by Representative Swanson:

WHEREAS, It is highly fitting that the Illinois General Assembly pays honor and respect to individuals who have given their lives in service to their communities; and

WHEREAS, Staff Sergeant Lincoln Hollinsaid was raised in Lake Wildwood and later moved to Malden; he graduated from Princeton High School; and

WHEREAS, Staff Sergeant Hollinsaid enlisted in the United States Army in 1995; before the invasion of Iraq in 2003, he transferred to a different military unit to have a better opportunity of serving in combat; and

WHEREAS, On April 7, 2003, Staff Sergeant Hollinsaid was the platoon SGT when they had been assigned a mission to remove a wall that aligned with Highway 8 near the Baghdad airport; after a section had been removed, he walked forward to examine the area; at that time, enemy combatants fired upon him, and he was hit by small arms fire and an RPG; he died instantly; and

WHEREAS, Staff Sergeant Hollinsaid was an avid outdoorsman and loved to hunt and drive his pickup, which he had adapted to use for four wheeling in the rough terrain and mountains of Southern California; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that we designate the Main Street bridge over I-80 in Princeton as the "Staff Sergeant Lincoln Hollinsaid Memorial Bridge"; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Illinois Department of Transportation is requested to erect at suitable locations, consistent with State and federal regulations, appropriate plaques or signs giving notice of the name "Staff Sergeant Lincoln Hollinsaid Memorial Bridge"; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to the family of Staff Sergeant Hollinsaid and the Secretary of Transportation.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 697

Offered by Representative Gabel:

WHEREAS, The members of the Illinois House of Representatives wish to congratulate President Morton Schapiro on the occasion of his retirement from Northwestern University; and

WHEREAS, President Schapiro began his term as the 16th president of Northwestern University on September 1, 2009; and

WHEREAS, President Schapiro has served as a professor of economics in Northwestern's Judd A. and Marjorie Weinberg College of Arts and Sciences and as a fellow of the Northwestern Institute for Policy Research; he holds appointments in the J.L. Kellogg School of Management and the School of Education and Social Policy; and

WHEREAS, President Schapiro is among the nation's leading authorities on the economics of higher education, particularly in the area of college financing affordability, college costs, and student aid; and

WHEREAS, President Schapiro served as president of Williams College from 2000 to 2009; he previously served as a professor of economics and as assistant provost at Williams College from 1980 to 1991; and

WHEREAS, President Schapiro chaired the Department of Economics at the University of Southern California from 1991 to 1994 and served as dean of the College of Letters from 1994 to 2000; during his last two years as dean, he also served as vice president for Planning; and

WHEREAS, President Schapiro has written more than 100 articles and written or edited ten books; he has authored dozens of commentaries and essays for the New York Times, the Wall Street Journal, the

Washington Post, the Los Angeles Times, the Chronicle of Higher Education, and numerous other publications; and

WHEREAS, President Schapiro has received research grants and contracts from the National Science Foundation, the U.S. Department of Education, the World Bank, the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, the Spencer Foundation, the College Board, the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, and other groups to study the economics of higher education and related topics; and

WHEREAS, President Schapiro was elected a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 2010; he was elected to the National Academy of Education in 2017; and

WHEREAS, President Schapiro chaired the Big Ten Conference from 2018 through 2021; and

WHEREAS, President Schapiro has led Northwestern University through a period of record transformative academic growth; and

WHEREAS, During President Schapiro's tenure, undergraduate applications to Northwestern University and representation of underrepresented student populations have doubled; and

WHEREAS, President Schapiro has led Northwestern to a new era of active civic engagement by committing scholarly and financial resources to the Chicago and Evanston communities, creating programs such as the Northwestern Academy and the Good Neighbor Fund; and

WHEREAS, Over the course of President Schapiro's term, annual funding for sponsored research activity at Northwestern has risen 86 percent from nearly \$477 million in 2009 to \$893 million in 2021; and

WHEREAS, Under President Schapiro's leadership, Northwestern University has added 502 new endowed scholarships and fellowships, 84 endowed professorships, more than 30 new research centers and institutes, and hundreds of additional grants; and

WHEREAS, Through President Schapiro's supervision, the number of Northwestern University faculty with major academy memberships has increased by roughly 73 percent; and

WHEREAS, Thanks to President Schapiro's guidance, Northwestern University has risen to rank among the top ten American universities; and

WHEREAS, President Schapiro has been a transformational leader and tireless advocate for Northwestern University as well as a dedicated scholar and educator who has advanced Northwestern and its surrounding community; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we congratulate President Morton Schapiro on his exemplary tenure at Northwestern University and his contributions to higher education and wish him the best in his retirement; and be it further
