WHEREAS, Chief Arnold has over 3,000 hours of continued law enforcement training, including Northwestern University's School of Police Staff and Command and the Executive Management Program; he is a graduate of Thornton Township High School and received his Bachelor of Science degree with highest honors in Law Enforcement Management from Calumet College of St. Joseph; he and his wife, Angie, are lifelong residents of the south suburbs; therefore, be it

especially proud that the Alternative/SAVE school, an option for completion of education when traditional methods are not successful, has grown to include four sites serving more than 300 students; he has cultivated a "user-friendly" service environment in the region, providing easier access to the Regional Office of Education for students, teachers, administrators, parents, citizens, and taxpayers; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Jontry attended ISU and was a starting guard on the basketball team from 1956 until 1958; he was known as "Gunner" because he regularly hit clutch shots and was willing to attempt almost any basket; he still holds the season free throw record at ISU which stands at a 94% rate overall and a record 35 free throws in a row; he was inducted into the Redbird Hall of Fame in 1991 and continues to be very active in alumni and Varsity I Club activities; therefore, be it
