Perfunctory Session

TUESDAY, MAY 3, 2005

At the hour of 11:40 o'clock a.m., the House convened perfunctory session.

RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 368

Offered by Representative Daniels:

WHEREAS, Media reports have revealed that Illinois nursing homes, long-term care facilities, community integrated living arrangements, and supportive living centers are housing 161 criminal parolees and sex offenders without adequate disclosure and supervision; and

WHEREAS, The Department of Corrections is not required by law to disclose the identities of parolees and ailing prisoners residing in nursing homes, long-term care facilities, Community Integrated Living Arrangements, and supportive living centers; and

WHEREAS, Criminal incidents against vulnerable residents have been increasingly reported to law enforcement officials: and

WHEREAS, Other states, such as Alabama, Arkansas, California, Florida, Georgia, Minnesota, and Oklahoma, are considering legislation to protect residents; and

WHEREAS, It is imperative the General Assembly take immediate action to ensure the safety of the residents residing in these nursing homes, long-term care facilities, Community Integrated Living Arrangements, and supportive living centers; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that a comprehensive investigation should be conducted to protect vulnerable residents of nursing homes, long-term care facilities, community integrated living arrangements, and supportive living centers and ease the concerns of family members; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Developmental Disabilities and Mental Illness Committee is urged to convene hearings to examine the issue, gather expert testimony from qualified representatives of the long-term care industry, the Department of Corrections, the Department on Aging, the Department of Public Health, Department of Public Aid, and advocates of long-term care residents, and propose solutions that will safeguard and protect the residents of Illinois' long-term care facilities.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 380

Offered by Representative Madigan:

WHEREAS, The work of Catholic Charities of Illinois to serve those most in need began in the mid-1800s when Catholic orphanages began to appear in many areas of the State, which later became part of the Catholic Charities of Illinois network; and

WHEREAS, Today, Catholic Charities of Illinois are present throughout the State in each diocese of Illinois (Belleville, Chicago, Joliet, Peoria, Rockford, and Springfield), continuing the tradition of serving the most vulnerable in need through a broad range of services; and

WHEREAS, The six Catholic Charities of Illinois are Catholic organizations that provide services to the most vulnerable in need of all faiths, through the work of over 4,500 employees, in accordance with the mission to serve the poor, a mission that originates from and is rooted in the Gospel values and Catholic Social Teaching, thus fulfilling the role of the Catholic Church to provide care to all those in need; and

WHEREAS, Catholic Charities of Illinois administer over 230 programs at over 200 sites across the State, providing direct services to over one million people; and

WHEREAS, Catholic Charities of Illinois are supported by one of the largest volunteer networks in the State, with nearly 10,000 volunteers; and

WHEREAS, Catholic Charities of Illinois have long been partners with the State of Illinois in providing services to children, families, seniors, immigrants, the homeless, and the sick; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we recognize May 5, 2005, as Catholic Charities of Illinois Day in the State of Illinois.
