HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 134

Offered by Representative Molaro:

WHEREAS, The federal Social Security Act includes two provisions, the Government Pension Offset and the Windfall Elimination Provision, that reduce the Social Security benefits payable to persons who are entitled to benefits under the public retirement systems of the State under certain conditions; and

WHEREAS, These provisions penalize individuals who dedicate the majority of their productive years to public service to the State of Illinois, including educators, police officers, and firefighters; and

WHEREAS, These provisions take away benefits that public employees or their spouses have earned by paying into the Social Security system; and

WHEREAS, These provisions often leave public employees facing poverty in their retirement; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois is benefited by the recruitment of the best and most able individuals for public employment, but is hindered from doing so because of the offset penalties; and

WHEREAS, These provisions discourage individuals from moving from private sector employment into positions of public employment; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FIFTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we encourage and support action by the Congress of the United States to enact legislation to repeal the Government Pension Offset and the Windfall Elimination Provision from the Social Security Act, or reduce the effects thereof; and be it further

RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be sent to President George W. Bush and to each member of the Illinois congressional delegation.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 139

Offered by Representative Eddy:

WHEREAS, The House of Representatives recognizes that methamphetamine is fundamentally different from other drugs regulated by the Illinois Controlled Substances Act because the harms relating to methamphetamine stem not only from the distribution and use of the drug, but also from the manufacture of the drug in this State; and

WHEREAS, Methamphetamine is not only distributed and used but also manufactured in Illinois; the manufacture of methamphetamine is extremely and uniquely harmful, and the exposure to the manufacturing of methamphetamine has resulted in deaths or serious disabilities to many persons exposed to the manufacturing process; and

WHEREAS, The manufacture and use of methamphetamine is a problem that effects the entire State, especially in rural areas and in small towns; and

WHEREAS, A statewide awareness campaign alerting the public to the dangers of methamphetamine may help to reduce the illegal manufacture, distribution, and use of this substance and result in increased arrests and prosecutions of methamphetamine violators; and

WHEREAS, The summer months are increasingly susceptible to the illegal manufacture and use of methamphetamine since many children are on summer vacation from school and are highly susceptible to being exposed to this illicit substance; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FIFTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that August 1st of each year is hereby proclaimed as Methamphetamine Awareness Day in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Department of State Police, the Department of Public Health, local law enforcement agencies, the State Board of Education, and local school districts promote an educational campaign on that day warning the population of this State of the dangers of methamphetamine manufacture and use.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 30

Offered by Representative Smith:

WHEREAS, All of us as Americans are called to remember the extraordinary price paid for our nation's freedom by the selfless men and women who have sacrificed their lives to preserve and protect our nation; and

WHEREAS, We owe a special debt, not only to those brave Americans who have given their lives in service to our country, but also to those family members who loved those fallen warriors and who feel their loss every day; and

WHEREAS, From the time of World War I, the Gold Star has been the traditional symbol of both pride and mourning for the grieving families of those men and women in the Armed Forces who have made the ultimate sacrifice for this country; and

WHEREAS, Our Gold Star families have shown courage and compassion in the face of great personal sadness and continue to demonstrate their constant love of our country; and

WHEREAS, The United States Congress has designated the last Sunday in September as "Gold Star Mother's Day" and authorized and requested the President to issue a proclamation in observance of this day; and

WHEREAS, It is proper for the people of Illinois to set aside a week of each year to honor the pride, perseverance, dignity, and devotion of those who have loved and lost America's fallen heroes; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FIFTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that the last Sunday in September and the six days following in 2007 and each succeeding year shall be known as Gold Star Families Week, and that everyone in the State of Illinois shall be encouraged to display the flag of the United States and find other appropriate means to publicly express love, sorrow, and reverence for our Gold Star families.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 31

WHEREAS, The men and women who serve in the military of the United States have responded swiftly and selflessly whenever called upon to defend our nation, placing the national interests above their own; and

WHEREAS, Through service in the Armed Forces, our veterans have demonstrated their drive, determination, and character; and

WHEREAS, The U.S. Department of Defense operates the world's largest system of specialized professional and technical training schools, offering America's veterans unmatched opportunities to develop valuable knowledge and skills; and

WHEREAS, Today's high-tech military is staffed by superbly trained men and women who combine state-of-the-art technical skills with tested leadership abilities; and

WHEREAS, Veterans of active duty military service constitute one of our nation's most important sources of mature, responsible, and highly motivated employees; and

WHEREAS, By hiring veterans, employers honor their debt to our nation's military men and women while availing themselves of proven talents and honed teamwork skills that offer immense benefits to individual employers and to the larger economy of the State of Illinois; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FIFTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that that the month of November in 2007 and each subsequent year shall be known as Hire a Veteran month to recognize those brave, talented and patriotic men and women who have proudly worn their country's uniform and to encourage employers throughout the State of Illinois to recognize the special talents of those veterans and give special consideration and preference to those job applicants who have served in the Armed Forces of the United States.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 32

Offered by Representative Miller:

WHEREAS, The Monetary Award Program, also known as "MAP", which is administered by the Illinois Student Assistance Commission, is among the premiere state-funded, need-based, postsecondary grant programs in the United States; and

WHEREAS, MAP grants are intended to provide funding for all Illinois students seeking postsecondary degrees who demonstrate financial need, providing \$347 million in grants to 146,853 students in 2006; and

WHEREAS, The profile of students attending Illinois colleges and universities has undergone dramatic changes in the past decade, as increasing numbers of students are older, married, parents, or working; and

WHEREAS, Those students defined as independent, meaning those who are 24 years of age or older, those who are married, those with dependents, and those who have been in the military, are often the most financially challenged in their endeavors to pursue a postsecondary education; and

WHEREAS, As more working adults seek to return to school, they face a federal financial aid system designed primarily for traditional students; and

WHEREAS, Low-income working adults are often expected to contribute an unrealistic proportion of their income to college costs; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FIFTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that the Illinois Student Assistance Commission, in cooperation with the Board of Higher Education, Women Employed, the Federation of Independent Illinois Colleges & Universities, and other concerned parties, document the overall financial need of independent students in Illinois and the degree to which they are served by the Monetary Award Program in a report to be delivered to the General Assembly no later than December 31, 2007; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be delivered to the Illinois Student Assistance Commission.

Perfunctory Session

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 28, 2007

At the hour of 4:21 o'clock p.m., the House convened perfunctory session.

SENATE BILLS ON FIRST READING

Having been reproduced, the following bills were taken up, read by title a first time and placed in the Committee on Rules: SENATE BILLS 154 (Washington) and 186 (Chapa LaVia).

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTIONS CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS FIRST READING

Representative Watson introduced the following:

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT 20

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FIFTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least 6 months after the adoption of this resolution a proposition to amend Article IX of the Illinois Constitution by adding Section 9.1 as follows:

ARTICLE IX REVENUE

SECTION 1.5. LIMITATION OF ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS

(a) Except as provided in subsection (b), no bonds or other evidences of indebtedness that are secured by the full faith and credit of the State may be issued if, after the issuance, in the next State fiscal year after the issuance of the bonds, the amount of debt service (including principal, whether payable at maturity or pursuant to mandatory sinking fund installments, and interest) on all then-outstanding bonds would exceed 7% of the aggregate appropriations of (1) the general funds of the State and (2) moneys derived from fees, excises, or license taxes relating to registration, titles, operation, or use of vehicles on public highways or relating to fuels used for propelling those vehicles, including bond proceeds for the fiscal year immediately prior to the fiscal year of the issuance.

(b) If the Comptroller and Treasurer each consent in writing, bonds may be issued even if the issuance does not comply with subsection (a).

SCHEDULE

This Constitutional Amendment takes effect upon being declared adopted in accordance with Section 7 of the Illinois Constitutional Amendment Act.

The foregoing HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT 20 was taken up, read in full a first time, ordered reproduced and placed in the Committee on Rules.

Representative Mulligan introduced the following:

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT 21

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FIFTH GENERAL

ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least 6 months after the adoption of this resolution a proposition to amend Section 3 of Article IV of the Illinois Constitution as follows:

ARTICLE IV THE LEGISLATURE

SECTION 3. LEGISLATIVE REDISTRICTING

- (a) Legislative Districts shall be compact, contiguous and substantially equal in population. Representative Districts shall be compact, contiguous, and substantially equal in population.
- (b) By April 15 of the year following each Federal decennial census year, the State Board of Elections, by a record vote of a majority of the total number of members authorized by law as provided in Section 5 of Article III, shall designate a computer program for redistricting the Legislative Districts and Representative Districts that meets the requirements of this Section. The designation shall include detailed specifications of the computer program.

Any computer program designated by the State Board of Elections under this Section shall embody the following standards and criteria, as defined by Common Law, in this order of priority:

- (1) contiguity;
- (2) substantial equality of population;
- (3) compactness;
- (4) minimization of the number of districts that cross county or municipal boundaries; and
- (5) a fair reflection of minority voting strength.

Any computer program designated by the State Board of Elections under this Section shall not consider the following data:

- (1) residency of incumbent legislators;
- (2) political affiliations of registered voters;
- (3) previous election results; and
- (4) demographic information not required to be used by this Section or by the United States Constitution or federal law.

Except as specified in this Section, the computer program shall produce districts in a random manner.

- (c) (b) In the year following each Federal decennial census year, the <u>State Board of Elections General Assembly by law</u> shall redistrict the Legislative Districts and the Representative Districts <u>using the computer program designated under subsection</u> (b). The <u>State Board of Elections shall approve a redistricting plan by a record vote of a majority of the total number of members authorized by law as provided in Section 5 of Article III, and the Board shall file that plan with the Secretary of State no later than June 1 of the year following the Federal decennial census year.</u>
- (d) The State Board of Elections shall designate a computer program under subsection (b) and shall approve a plan under subsection (c) at public meetings. The Board shall give reasonable and adequate advance notice of those meetings.

If no redistricting plan becomes effective by June 30 of that year, a Legislative Redistricting Commission shall be constituted not later than July 10. The Commission shall consist of eight members, no more than four of whom shall be members of the same political party.

The Speaker and Minority Leader of the House of Representatives shall each appoint to the Commission one Representative and one person who is not a member of the General Assembly. The President and Minority Leader of the Senate shall each appoint to the Commission one Senator and one person who is not a member of the General Assembly.

The members shall be certified to the Secretary of State by the appointing authorities. A vacancy on the Commission shall be filled within five days by the authority that made the original appointment. A Chairman and Vice Chairman shall be chosen by a majority of all members of the Commission.

Not later than August 10, the Commission shall file with the Secretary of State a redistricting plan approved by at least five members.

If the Commission fails to file an approved redistricting plan, the Supreme Court shall submit the names of two persons, not of the same political party, to the Secretary of State not later than September 1.

Not later than September 5, the Secretary of State publicly shall draw by random selection the name of one of the two persons to serve as the ninth member of the Commission.

Not later than October 5, the Commission shall file with the Secretary of State a redistricting plan approved by at least five members.

(e) An approved redistricting plan filed with the Secretary of State shall be presumed valid, shall have

the force and effect of law and shall be published promptly by the Secretary of State.

(f) The Supreme Court shall have original and exclusive jurisdiction over actions concerning redistricting the House and Senate, which shall be initiated in the name of the People of the State by the Attorney General

SCHEDULE

This Constitutional Amendment takes effect beginning with redistricting in 2011 and applies to the election of members of the General Assembly in 2012 and thereafter.

The foregoing HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT 21 was taken up, read in full a first time, ordered reproduced and placed in the Committee on Rules.

Representative Mulligan introduced the following:

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT 22

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FIFTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least 6 months after the adoption of this resolution a proposition to amend Sections 2 and 5 of Article IV of the Illinois Constitution:

ARTICLE IV THE LEGISLATURE

SECTION 2. LEGISLATIVE COMPOSITION

- (a) One Senator shall be elected from each Legislative District. <u>Senators elected in 2008 shall serve four-year terms</u>. <u>Immediately following each decennial redistricting</u>, the General Assembly by law shall divide the Legislative Districts as equally as possible into two three groups. <u>During each ten-year period</u>, <u>beginning with the general election in 2012</u>, Senators from one group shall <u>first</u> be elected for terms of <u>six years and then for terms of four years four years</u>, four years, and <u>senators from the second group</u>, for terms of four years, two years and then for terms of <u>six four years</u>, four years and then for terms of <u>six four years</u>. The Legislative Districts in each group shall be distributed substantially equally over the State.
- (b) Each Legislative District shall be divided into two Representative Districts. In 1982 and every two years thereafter One Representative shall be elected from each Representative District for a term of two years. Representatives elected in 2008 shall serve terms of four years. During each ten-year period, beginning with the general election in 2012, Representatives shall first be elected for terms of four years, then for terms of two years, and then for terms of four years.
- (c) To be eligible to serve as a member of the General Assembly, a person must be a United States citizen, at least 21 years old, and for the two years preceding his election or appointment a resident of the district which he is to represent. In the general election following a redistricting, a candidate for the General Assembly may be elected from any district which contains a part of the district in which he resided at the time of the redistricting and reelected if a resident of the new district he represents for 18 months prior to reelection.
- (d) Within thirty days after a vacancy occurs, it shall be filled by appointment as provided by law. If the vacancy is in a Senatorial or Representative office with more than twenty-eight months remaining in the term, the appointed Senator or Representative shall serve until the next general election, at which time a Senator or Representative shall be elected to serve for the remainder of the term. If the vacancy is in any other Senatorial or a Representative office or in any other Senatorial office, the appointment shall be for the remainder of the term. An appointee to fill a vacancy shall be a member of the same political party as the person he succeeds.
- (e) No member of the General Assembly shall receive compensation as a public officer or employee from any other governmental entity for time during which he is in attendance as a member of the General Assembly.

No member of the General Assembly during the term for which he was elected or appointed shall be appointed to a public office which shall have been created or the compensation for which shall have been increased by the General Assembly during that term.

(Source: Amendment adopted at general election November 4, 1980.) SECTION 5. SESSIONS

- (a) The General Assembly shall convene each year on the second Wednesday of January. The General Assembly shall be a continuous body <u>for a period beginning and ending at noon on the second Wednesday of January of consecutive odd-numbered years.</u> during the term for which members of the House of Representatives are elected.
- (b) The Governor may convene the General Assembly or the Senate alone in special session by a proclamation stating the purpose of the session; and only business encompassed by such purpose, together with any impeachments or confirmation of appointments shall be transacted. Special sessions of the General Assembly may also be convened by joint proclamation of the presiding officers of both houses, issued as provided by law.
- (c) Sessions of each house of the General Assembly and meetings of committees, joint committees and legislative commissions shall be open to the public. Sessions and committee meetings of a house may be closed to the public if two-thirds of the members elected to that house determine that the public interest so requires; and meetings of joint committees and legislative commissions may be so closed if two-thirds of the members elected to each house so determine.
