#### **MESSAGES FROM THE SENATE**

A message from the Senate by

Ms. Rock, Secretary:

Mr. Speaker -- I am directed to inform the House of Representatives that the Senate has adopted the following Senate Joint Resolution, in the adoption of which I am instructed to ask the concurrence of the House of Representatives, to-wit:

#### **SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 56**

WHEREAS, Dogs are not a commercial crop and should not be indiscriminately or irresponsibly mass produced; and

WHEREAS, Illinois citizens have the right to purchase quality purebred dogs, produced in loving homes by responsible breeders; and

WHEREAS, Poorly or improperly run breeding facilities increase the likelihood that the dogs contained therein will be denied their most basic needs, including, but not limited to, sanitary living conditions, proper and timely medical care, the ability to move freely at least once per day, and adequate shelter from

the elements; and

WHEREAS, Illinois is committed to preventing dogs from being housed in breeding facilities or pet stores that are overcrowded, unsanitary, and lacking proper shelter and care; and

WHEREAS, Current Illinois laws are insufficient regarding the care and husbandry of dogs in breeding facilities; and

WHEREAS, Without proper oversight, breeding facilities can easily fall below even the most basic standards of humane housing and husbandry; and

WHEREAS, Breeding facilities with unsanitary conditions create the potential for soil and groundwater contamination, the spread of zoonotic parasites and infectious diseases, and the sale of sick and dying animals to the public; and

WHEREAS, An unfair fiscal burden is placed on city, county, and state taxpayers, as well as government agencies, animal shelters, and rescue groups, by having to care for discarded or abused and neglected dogs from these breeding facilities; and

WHEREAS, Animal shelters and rescue groups are dedicated to caring for and finding homes for stray and unwanted animals and irresponsible breeders and pet stores are adding to the burden placed on these non-profit rescue groups; and

WHEREAS, Consumers must be provided with adequate information about the background of puppies prior to purchase in order to make an informed decision and current Illinois law is ineffective in providing this information to consumers who purchase puppies from pet stores and breeding facilities; and

WHEREAS, There is public support for addressing the breeding industry and pet store industry in this State; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING HEREIN, that there is established a Joint Task Force on Breeders and Pet Stores to investigate and make recommendations on ways to strengthen Illinois law regarding these 2 industries; issues that shall be examined include, but are not limited to the following: (1) humane care and treatment for dogs at pet stores and breeding facilities, (2) creating more specific requirements for indoor and outdoor kennel facilities to ensure the health and welfare of dogs used for commercial purposes, (3) establishing more detailed specifications so that indoor and outdoor facilities provide dogs with proper shelter, temperature control, ventilation, air movement, lighting, bedding, sanitation, slope of ground and run, and flooring materials, (4) creating more detailed record keeping requirements for breeders and pet stores, (5) ensuring that consumers are provided adequate information prior to the time of sale of dogs, (6) ensuring that dogs being sold are healthy, and (7) amending animal welfare laws to address these specific issues as well as related yet broader issues that could be addressed through such laws; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the members of the Joint Task Force shall include: one member appointed by the President of the Senate; one member appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate; one member appointed by the Speaker of the House; one member appointed by the Minority Leader of the House; the Director of Agriculture or his or her designee, who shall serve as the Chairperson; the Director of Agriculture shall appoint 5 members to represent the animal welfare community, including 2 members from national organizations and 3 members representing the shelter community and animal rescue community; the Director of Agriculture shall also appoint one member representing the small scale breeding community, one member representing the sporting dog community, one member representing the large scale breeding community, one member representing the pet store industry, and one member representing the Illinois Veterinarians; and be it further

RESOLVED, That that the Department of Agriculture shall provide administrative and other support to the Joint Task Force and meet at the call of the chairperson; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Director of Agriculture or his or her designee shall serve as the Chairperson; the Joint Task Force shall have a minimum of 3 meetings; and the members shall serve without compensation; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Joint Task Force shall report its findings and legislative recommendations to the Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the House by October 1, 2009; and that upon filing its report the Joint Task Force is dissolved; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be delivered to the Director of the Department of Agriculture.

Mr. Speaker -- I am directed to inform the House of Representatives that the Senate has adopted the following Senate Joint Resolution, in the adoption of which I am instructed to ask the concurrence of the House of Representatives, to-wit:

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 55

WHEREAS, School leadership is second only to classroom instruction among school-related factors influencing student learning; and

WHEREAS, The 95th General Assembly adopted House Joint Resolution 66, which directed the State Board of Education, the Board of Higher Education, and the Office of the Governor to jointly appoint a task force to recommend a sequence of strategic steps to implement improvements in school leadership preparation in this State; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois School Leader Task Force submitted a report to the General Assembly in February of 2008 outlining specific strategic steps to reform Illinois school leader preparation programs with the goal of increasing school improvement through instructional leadership; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING HEREIN, that based upon the recommendations set forth by the Illinois School Leader Task Force report, the State Board of Education, in collaboration with the Board of Higher Education, shall prepare legislative recommendations to restructure school leader preparation and certification programs in this State; and be it further

RESOLVED, That that these recommendations may include, but not be limited to, the following:

(1) reviewing the educator certification structure to more accurately include a professional educator license to reflect essential skills required of school leaders, specifically those of pre-kindergarten through secondary school principals (PK-12);

(2) aligning redesigned programs with national principal preparation standards;

(3) increasing certification and licensure requirements to include 4 years of teaching or school service personnel experience on a valid and appropriate certificate;

(4) ensuring appropriate faculty resources;

(5) establishing quality partnerships with PK-12 school districts;

(6) strengthening candidates' internships and residencies;

(7) revising formative and summative assessments;

(8) designating principal candidates graduating from redesigned school leader preparation programs and successfully passing the State performance-based assessment to receive an endorsement specific to PK-12 principalship;

(9) enabling educators currently holding a general administrative endorsement to retain the endorsement and continue to serve as a principal;

(10) directing all institutions of higher education that prepare principals to submit their redesigned programs for State Teacher Certification Board approval no later than July of 2011; and

(11) stipulating that all principal candidates must complete a redesigned and approved principal preparation program and pass the State performance-based assessment beginning in 2013 to receive a State principal endorsement; and be it further

RESOLVED, That work will already be underway to begin the redesign; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the State Board of Education shall present its legislative recommendations to the General Assembly by February of 2010; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Chairperson of the State Board of Education and the Chairperson of the Board of Higher Education.

Mr. Speaker -- I am directed to inform the House of Representatives that the Senate has adopted the following Senate Joint Resolution, in the adoption of which I am instructed to ask the concurrence of the House of Representatives, to-wit:

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 54

WHEREAS, The overall health and welfare of people with developmental disabilities is of utmost importance; and

WHEREAS, Like the general population, many individuals with developmental disabilities struggle with obesity, diabetes, and hypertension; and

WHEREAS, Certain developmental disabilities have been found to predispose individuals to health conditions such as obesity; and

WHEREAS, A recent randomized study of residents of community-based residential programs in Illinois found that 57% of the residents met the classification of overweight or obese; and

WHEREAS, The United States Department of Health and Human Services' Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has cited the Body Mass Index as a reliable indicator of obesity, calculated from a person's height and weight, and revealed the prevalence of obesity in approximately 34.3% of adults in 2005-2006; and

WHEREAS, The 2002 report of the Surgeon General's conference on health disparities and mental retardation, "Closing the Gap: A National Blueprint to Improve the Health of Persons with Mental Retardation", found that the health of approximately one-third of individuals with mental retardation is reported to be fair or poor; and

WHEREAS, The lack of access to preventative health care and good nutrition can lead to poor quality of life and increases in illness, medication usage, instances of social isolation, and other healthcare issues; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois funds services to persons with developmental disabilities in various residential settings; and

WHEREAS, Such residential programs strive to provide quality services that promote individuals' general health and well-being; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING HEREIN, that we affirm our commitment to the importance of supporting and improving health outcomes for people with developmental disabilities; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge all providers to adopt preventative health practices and work with those they serve to ultimately improve health outcomes; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we encourage the Department of Human Services Division of Developmental Disabilities to develop health related outcomes and standards as part of its quality management and monitoring efforts.

Mr. Speaker -- I am directed to inform the House of Representatives that the Senate has adopted the following Senate Joint Resolution, in the adoption of which I am instructed to ask the concurrence of the House of Representatives, to-wit:

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 51

WHEREAS, Women Construction Owners and Executives (WCOE) is a national organization with a chapter in Illinois; and

WHEREAS, WCOE promotes opportunities and business for women-owned firms in the construction industry; and

WHEREAS, WCOE monitors and provides input on legislation affecting women construction owners and executives; and

WHEREAS, WCOE is celebrating its 25th anniversary on March 23, 2009 in Washington, D.C.; and

WHEREAS, WCOE has at the top of its national legislative agenda improvements to the United States Department of Transportation's Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) program; and

WHEREAS, These changes will enable recipients of federal stimulus moneys to be prepared with a strong pool of qualified DBE firms to perform the work that is being funded; and

WHEREAS, The present DBE program imposes a \$750,000 personal net worth limitation on any qualifying owners seeking DBE certification and this limit has never been increased; and

WHEREAS, The present DBE program in 49 C.F.R. § 26.65 imposes the U.S. Small Business Administration's (SBA) size standards on the gross revenues of any firm seeking DBE certification, but also imposes an absolute limit, currently \$20.1 million, even if the SBA standard is higher; and

WHEREAS, Bonding capacity and ability to secure lines of credit are directly tied to both a DBE owner's personal net worth as well as the DBE firm's gross revenues; and

WHEREAS, These artificially low limits on personal net worth and gross revenues are particularly challenging for DBE firms in Illinois due to a higher cost of living and higher construction costs; and

WHEREAS, The City of Chicago and Cook County have established personal net worth limitations of \$2 million for their Minority and Women Business Enterprise (M/WBE) programs; and

WHEREAS, The current SBA gross revenue size standard for construction firms is \$33.5 million; and

WHEREAS, Governmental agencies that provide DBE construction opportunities must develop statistical and anecdotal evidence to show the extent of discrimination against women and minorities in the construction industry; and

WHEREAS, The DBE program presently provides no guidelines for the methodology that should be used for these disparity studies; and

WHEREAS, The Transportation Research Board of the National Academy of Sciences is in the process of developing a model disparity study methodology; and

WHEREAS, Such a model disparity study methodology would greatly benefit the DBE program; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING HEREIN, that we urge President Obama, the Illinois congressional delegation, and the Secretary of the United States Department of Transportation to take immediate action to increase the personal net worth limitation in the DBE program to \$2 million; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge President Obama, the Illinois congressional delegation, and the Secretary of the United States Department of Transportation to take immediate action to remove the cap on DBE gross receipts to reflect the applicable SBA size standards; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge President Obama, the Illinois congressional delegation, and the Secretary of the United States Department of Transportation to take immediate action to adopt the Transportation Research Board of the National Academy of Sciences' model disparity study methodology; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be delivered to President Obama, the Illinois congressional delegation, and the Secretary of the United States Department of Transportation.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 34

WHEREAS, Because former United States Senator Peter Fitzgerald was a Republican, a member of the same political party as President George W. Bush, the duty of choosing a candidate for the job of United

Sates Attorney for the Northern District of Illinois was his responsibility; and

WHEREAS, Illinois has a well-earned and long-standing national reputation of politicians of both political parties who engage in flagrant public corruption, abuse of the people's trust, and cronyism; and

WHEREAS, This unfortunate legacy of bipartisan, personal dishonesty, and public corruption is epitomized by George Ryan and Rod Blagojevich, two individuals whose words and actions leave a stench in the nostrils of honorable men and women; and

WHEREAS, It was necessary that former United States Senator Peter Fitzgerald act boldly and courageously to shake up the political establishment and its endemic culture of corruption by choosing an independent person of impeccable integrity and honor; and

WHEREAS, Senator Fitzgerald came under intense criticism by many, with some of the most fierce criticism coming from within his own political party, for breaking the age-old tradition of naming a prominent Chicago-area attorney to this position; and

WHEREAS, Patrick Fitzgerald came from humble, working class roots, with both of his parents having emigrated from Ireland; Patrick won a scholarship to attend a prestigious Jesuit high school in New York and worked his way through Amherst College where he made Phi Beta Kappa and later graduated from Harvard with a degree in law; when he worked in the office of the U.S. Attorney for the Southern District of New York, he prosecuted a major heroin smuggling ring and helped convict four members of the Gambino crime family on racketeering and murder charges; he also helped prosecute the terrorists involved in the World Trade Center bombing as well as those responsible for the bombing of U.S. embassies in Africa; and

WHEREAS, Patrick Fitzgerald was once described by a friend as, "Elliot Ness with a Harvard Law Degree and a sense of humor. He just cares passionately about chasing down bad guys"; and

WHEREAS, FBI Director Louis Freeh recommended Patrick Fitzgerald when Senator Fitzgerald asked for names of the best federal prosecutors in the country; and

WHEREAS, U.S. Attorney Patrick Fitzgerald has proven to be an exceptional choice for U.S. Attorney, has displayed a high standard of independence, hard work and integrity, set clear priorities for and re-energized the office, and most importantly has fearlessly sought to root out public corruption; therefore, be it
