HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 326

Offered by Representative Representative Flowers:

WHEREAS, Even in times of economic stress, we, as citizens of this State, cannot afford to jeopardize the next generation's future by removing university instructors and professors from their students; and

WHEREAS, Putting instructors and professors on furlough is counterproductive as they provide services to the State that cannot be adequately measured; and

WHEREAS, Rationing time for instructors and professors to see their students is unfair both because it diminishes the value of the university's degree and because students pay tuition specifically for access to quality educators; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge Governor Pat Quinn, the Board of Higher Education, and all public universities in this State to do all that is in their power to prevent the furlough of instructors and professors; and be it further

RESOLVED, That public universities in this State should examine their financial ability to implement a tuition waiver program targeted at students coming from the middle-income brackets who are getting left behind in these times of economic hardship, similar to the one proposed for Eastern Illinois University in Senate Bill 1798; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to Governor Pat Quinn, the Board of Higher Education, and the board of trustees of each public university in this State.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 328

Offered by Representative Morthland:

WHEREAS, In the spring of 2011, the retail prices of motor fuels in Illinois have touched or hit record levels; and

WHEREAS, On May 4, 2011, the average sales price of gasoline-based motor fuel in Illinois was \$4.31 per gallon; and

WHEREAS, These retail prices include the substantial burden of motor fuel excise taxes, State sales taxes, local sales taxes, and environmental remediation taxes, which have been added to the underlying burden of worldwide crude oil prices; and

WHEREAS, The current price of crude oil is in excess of \$110 per 42-gallon barrel, driven upward by

political upheavals in the Middle East and adjacent regions of the Eastern Hemisphere; and

WHEREAS, The high price of motor fuels threatens prospects for Illinois employment and economic recovery by diverting consumer spending from discretionary purchases to motor fuel; demand for motor fuel is highly price-inelastic, as once people take up residence in a house, they are tied in to a pattern of driving to and from the places where they work, shop, and visit their relatives and friends, and cannot easily change their patterns; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge Governor Pat Quinn to take action immediately to comprehensively lower the price of motor fuel in all geographic regions of Illinois on a time frame adequate to prevent Illinois falling into renewed recessionary conditions; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge Governor Quinn and President Barack Obama to take immediate steps to reverse their current policies regarding the price of motor fuel and to cooperate on new policies to increase motor fuel supplies in Illinois, reduce pressure on Illinois motor fuel prices, and inform the Illinois public of the steps being taken to reduce price pressure on motor fuel; and be it further

RESOLVED, That, based upon the current political upheavals in the Middle East, consequent disruptions to the world supply of crude oil, and negative consequences of these disruptions to the fragile U.S. economic recovery, we urge President Obama and the United States Department of Energy to release part of the U.S. Strategic Petroleum Reserve for summer 2011 refinery throughput and consumer end-use; and be it further

RESOLVED, That, based upon the current record or near-record price of motor fuel in Illinois, we urge the President of the United States and the Administrator of the United States Environmental Protection Agency to suspend implementation of all federal Clean Air Act non-attainment rules that affect the chemical composition and market price of motor fuel sold in the Chicago, Illinois and St. Louis, Missouri metropolitan areas; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we commend our neighbor country, the nation of Canada, for its aggressive work in expanding crude oil production from one of the largest under-utilized sources of fossil fuels in the world, the oil sands deposits of the province of Alberta, which possess estimated reserves of 1.7 trillion barrels of bitumen, from which crude oil can be manufactured; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we call upon United States oil refiners to continue their work to rebuild their refineries to refine bitumen-based crude oil into consumer petroleum products and commend the example provided by Canada to those United States policymakers who have the power to decide upon policies that govern the drilling, exploitation, and enjoyment of crude oil resources here in the United States; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we direct the Illinois Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability to conduct an objective, non-political examination of our policy of charging "ad valorem" Illinois sales taxes on motor fuel, thereby raising these prices well above world spot market prices for gasoline, and to report its findings to the Speaker of the Illinois House of Representatives, the Illinois House Republican Leader, the President of the Illinois Senate, and the Illinois Senate Republican Leader, and for this study to be concluded and the report transferred no later than September 30, 2011; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to the President of the United States, the Secretary of the United States Department of Energy, the Administrator of the United States Environmental Protection Agency, the Governor of Illinois, and the executive director of the Illinois Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 330

Offered by Representative Cavaletto:

WHEREAS, The strains on the trust fund operated by the Illinois Unemployment Insurance System have been greatly increased in the past three years, causing the State of Illinois to fall into a \$3 billion debt to the federal government; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois has been forced to alter the Illinois Unemployment Insurance Act to pay the interest on this \$3 billion, which comes with an annual price tag of around \$80 million; and

WHEREAS, Illinois agencies and departments should be doing everything in their power to discourage those who fraudulently receive benefits from our unemployment insurance system; and

WHEREAS, There have been reports of fraud in the Illinois Unemployment Insurance System, with persons who are incarcerated continuing to illegally accept unemployment insurance benefits; and

WHEREAS, This fraudulent activity can be significantly reduced by cooperation, including database cooperation, between the Department of Corrections, the Illinois State Police, and the Illinois Department of Employment Security; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the Directors of the Illinois Department of Corrections, the Illinois State Police, and the Illinois Department of Employment Security to discuss the desirability of a formal intergovernmental information-sharing agreement; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to the Directors of the Illinois Department of Corrections, the Illinois State Police, and the Illinois Department of Employment Security.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 331

Offered by Representative William Davis:

WHEREAS, Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD) is a term used to describe airflow obstruction that is associated mainly with emphysema and chronic bronchitis; and

WHEREAS, COPD affects an estimated 24 million people and kills more than 120,000 Americans every year; on average, one person dies from COPD every 4 minutes, an alarming statistic for a disease many have not learned about; and

WHEREAS, In 2010, the National Center for Health Statistics released a report stating that in 2008 COPD became the third leading cause of death in the United States; and

WHEREAS, Pulmonary experts predict that, by the year 2020, COPD will become the 3rd leading cause of death worldwide; and

WHEREAS, COPD currently accounts for 1.5 million emergency room visits, 726,000 hospitalizations, and 8 million physician office and hospital outpatient visits, all of which are a detriment to the U.S. economy; COPD costs the nation an estimated \$42.6 billion in direct and indirect medical costs annually; and

WHEREAS, COPD affects over 550,000 citizens of the State of Illinois; the Illinois COPD Coalition, convened by the Respiratory Health Association, is implementing the State Plan for Addressing COPD in Illinois, a state-wide effort to increase early detection, improve care and treatment, and prevent and reduce the prevalence of the disease; and

WHEREAS, Research has identified a hereditary protein deficiency called Alpha-1 Antitrypsin; people with this deficiency tend to develop COPD, even without exposure to smoking or environmental triggers; and

WHEREAS, Recently, the death rate for women with COPD has surpassed the death rate of men with COPD; women over the age of 40 are the fastest-growing segment of the population developing this irreversible disease, due in large part to the equalization of opportunities for men and women to smoke over the past several generations; and

WHEREAS, There is currently no cure for COPD; spirometry testing and medical treatments exist to address symptom relief and possibly slow the progression of the disease; and

WHEREAS, Until there is a cure, the best approaches to preventing COPD and its considerable health, societal, and mortality impacts lie with education, awareness, and expanded delivery of detection and management protocols; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we designate the month of November as COPD Awareness Month in the State of Illinois in recognition of this deadly disease and its effects on the citizens of this State.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 332

WHEREAS, Rising healthcare costs continue to be the number one concern for small and medium-sized businesses in Illinois; and

WHEREAS, According to the Council for Affordable Health Insurance (CAHI), healthcare mandates cumulatively can raise the cost of basic health coverage by 20% to 50%; and

WHEREAS, According to CAHI, Illinois currently has 47 different insurance mandates in law today; and

WHEREAS, Healthcare mandates are paid for by only small and medium-sized businesses that buy health insurance on the open market; and

WHEREAS, Illinois policy makers need a better understanding of the costs these mandates add to health insurance in order to strike a balance between managing healthcare costs and providing access to quality health insurance; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we request the Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability to study the cost of each healthcare mandate that is a part of the Illinois Insurance Code on the date this resolution is adopted, as well as the cumulative effect of those mandates on the overall cost of health insurance in Illinois for businesses; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the findings of the Commission be reported to the General Assembly by February 6, 2012, to ensure that the members of the General Assembly are informed about the costs and overall impact these mandates have on the ability of small and medium-sized businesses to purchase health insurance; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be delivered to the Executive Director of the Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability.
