HOUSE BILL 3623. Introduced by Representative Arroyo, AN ACT concerning appropriations.

### **HOUSE RESOLUTIONS**

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

#### **HOUSE RESOLUTION 165**

Offered by Representative Berrios:

WHEREAS, Section 1071 of the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act was enacted into federal law on July 21, 2010 and became effective on July 21, 2011, requiring financial institutions to collect and report information regarding credit applications from women-owned businesses, minority-owned businesses, and small businesses; and

WHEREAS, Section 1071 of the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act assigns the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau (CFPB) the responsibility to adopt and implement regulations, and the CFPB issued a letter on April 11, 2011 to the chief executive officers of financial institutions covered under Section 1071 of the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act advising them that obligations do not arise under Section 1071 until the CFPB adopts regulations and those regulations take effect; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois recognizes the importance of data collection and reporting under Section 1071 of the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act in improving fair lending oversight and an understanding of the extent to which the credit needs of women-owned businesses, minority-owned businesses, and small businesses are being met by our financial institutions; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-EIGHTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau to adopt regulations to implement Section 1071 of the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act as expeditiously as possible; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Illinois Attorney General, to the House Majority Leader and House Minority Leader of the United States Senate, to each member of the Illinois congressional delegation, and to the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau.

#### **HOUSE RESOLUTION 169**

Offered by Representative Hatcher:

WHEREAS, The Executive Board of the International Olympic Committee has proposed eliminating the sport of wrestling from the Summer Olympic Games beginning in 2020; the proposal remains to be approved or disapproved by the full Committee at its September 2013 general assembly; and

WHEREAS, Wrestling was one of the original sports of the ancient Greek Olympic Games and of the first modern Olympic Games; and

WHEREAS, Wrestling has been a traditional strength of the United States Olympic team; 124 medals have been awarded to the United States throughout the history of the Olympic Games; and

WHEREAS, The sport of wrestling builds great strength, not only of body, but also of character; wrestling also helps to instill the virtues of self-confidence, self-discipline, courage, and sportsmanship; and

WHEREAS, Wrestling has produced many outstanding national leaders, including Presidents, United States Supreme Court Justices, United States Senators, members of Congress, and business and military leaders, as well as many outstanding leaders in the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, There are thousands of student athletes in the State of Illinois that participate in wrestling at the high school and collegiate level; and

WHEREAS, Many of these young Illinoisans dream of representing the United States on the international stage at the Olympic Games and would be on the cusp of realizing their Olympic dreams in 2020, when the International Olympic Committee is set to remove one of the most time-honored, traditional sporting events not only on the Summer Olympics Program, but in the history of sport; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-EIGHTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the International Olympic Committee to reinstate wrestling as a core sport of the Summer Olympic Games; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we thank the United States Olympic Committee for its continued support of wrestling and urges it to work actively toward the reinstatement of Olympic wrestling; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to Richard Bender, Executive Director of USA Wrestling; James Considine, Illinois State Director of USA Wrestling; and the United States Olympic Committee.

#### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 30

Offered by Representative Kay:

WHEREAS, Childhood obesity has more than tripled in the past 30 years; and

WHEREAS, The percentage of children aged 6-11 in the United States who were obese increased from 7% in 1980, to 20% in 2008, and the percentage of adolescents aged 12-19 years who were obese increased from 5% to 18% over the same period; and

WHEREAS, In 2008, over 1/3 of children and adolescents were overweight or obese; and

WHEREAS, After the family, school is the primary institution responsible for the development of young people in the United States; and

WHEREAS, Schools have direct contact with more than 95% of our nations young people aged 5-17 years, for about 6 hours a day, and for up to 13 critical years of their social, psychological, physical, and intellectual development; and

WHEREAS, The health of young people is strongly linked to their academic success, helping students stay healthy is a fundamental mission of schools; and

WHEREAS, The fifth grade students at Columbus Elementary School in Edwardsville are building awareness and importance of physical fitness; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois has a blue ribbon panel that is reviewing ways to enhance physical fitness programs in our Illinois schools; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-EIGHTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that we further encourage educators and school administrators to suggest some topics, but not limited to the following for discussion during fitness awareness week: nutrition and dietary behavior, physical activity protocol, tobacco-use prevention, alcohol or drug use prevention, review of cardio protocols, review of eating disorders, and a review of physical activity facts; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge educators and school administrators to promote that one week of each school year be used to emphasize the importance of physical fitness in schools in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to Columbus Elementary School in Edwardsville.
