With the consent of the affected members, Representative Cassidy was removed as principal sponsor, and Representative Yingling became the new principal sponsor of HOUSE BILL 3930.

With the consent of the affected members, Representative Durkin was removed as principal sponsor, and Representative Sosnowski became the new principal sponsor of HOUSE BILL 1646.

With the consent of the affected members, Representative Durkin was removed as principal sponsor, and Representative Cabello became the new principal sponsor of HOUSE BILL 1604.

## **HOUSE RESOLUTIONS**

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

### **HOUSE RESOLUTION 326**

Offered by Representative Lang:

WHEREAS, Preeclampsia is a dangerous condition of pregnancy that can, in its most severe form, lead to maternal and infant mortality or premature birth with significant health risks for the mother and baby; and

WHEREAS, More than 350,000 cases of preeclampsia are diagnosed in America every year; 25% of the cases are classified as severe; and

WHEREAS, In America, a pregnant woman and her baby face life-threatening consequences due to preeclampsia every 6 minutes; and

WHEREAS, Globally, preeclampsia and other hypertensive disorders of pregnancy are leading causes of maternal and infant illness and death; conservative estimates claim that these disorders are responsible for 76,000 maternal and 500,000 infant deaths each year; and

WHEREAS, Public awareness of the symptoms of preeclampsia, which include spikes in maternal blood pressure, sudden swelling of the face, feet, and hands, severe upper abdominal pain, and blurred vision, can help women recognize the condition and seek appropriate medical care; and

WHEREAS, Many citizens of Illinois have joined with the Preeclampsia Foundation to raise public awareness in order to minimize maternal and infant illness and death due to preeclampsia; and

WHEREAS, The members of this body join the Preeclampsia Foundation in envisioning a world where preeclampsia no longer threatens the lives of mothers and babies; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we designate May 17, 2015 as Preeclampsia Awareness Day in the State of Illinois and applaud the Preeclampsia Foundation's mission to reduce maternal and infant illness and death due to preeclampsia and other hypertensive disorders of pregnancy; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to the Preeclampsia Foundation as a symbol of our respect and esteem for its work.

### **HOUSE RESOLUTION 328**

Offered by Representative McAsey:

WHEREAS, On September 17, 2008, the Electronic Products Recycling and Reuse Act, Public Act 95-0959, was enacted, setting forth procedures for the recycling and reuse of covered electronic devices in Illinois; and

WHEREAS, The Electronic Products Recycling and Reuse Act banned the disposal of covered electronic devices in landfills and incinerators beginning January 1, 2012; and

WHEREAS, To provide adequate collection of discarded electronic devices and comply with the disposal ban, more than 500 collection sites statewide are currently registered with the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) to accept electronic wastes; and

WHEREAS, Local governments statewide have contracted with electronic waste processors and recyclers for collection, reuse, and recycling of discarded electronics, providing a vital service to their residents; and

WHEREAS, A significant component of the discarded electronic waste stream collected to date has been, and continues to be, cathode ray tube (CRT) devices, including televisions and computer monitors; and

WHEREAS, CRT glass contains lead at a sufficiently high concentration to meet the definition of hazardous waste, necessitating handling the glass in a manner that protects human health and the environment; and

WHEREAS, The principal recycling market for CRT glass was historically the production of new CRTs; and

WHEREAS, Demand for new CRTs historically provided an economic incentive to recycle CRT glass for use in the manufacturing of new CRTs, and recyclers received revenue for the CRT glass provided to CRT manufacturers; and

WHEREAS, New CRTs have essentially ceased to be purchased in the United States, and there are no CRT manufacturing facilities located in the United States; and

WHEREAS, All CRT glass used in the manufacturing of new CRTs is now exported to India to the single remaining CRT manufacturing facility in the world; and

WHEREAS, There exist limited additional available outlets for the legitimate recycling of CRT glass in the United States; and

WHEREAS, The quantity of CRT glass collected far exceeds current demand and available markets for the glass; and

WHEREAS, CRT glass processing and recycling now carries a substantial cost, a significant change since the Electronic Products Recycling and Reuse Act was enacted in 2008; and

WHEREAS, The increased cost to process CRT glass has caused a number of electronic waste collection programs operated by local governments in Illinois to bear the cost increases or to be discontinued to avoid accumulation of CRTs; and

WHEREAS, Stockpiles of abandoned CRT glass have been discovered at several former electronic waste processing facilities across the United States, due to the lack of markets for CRT glass and the high cost associated with existing markets; and

WHEREAS, Kuusakoski Recycling and Peoria Disposal Company (PDC), both Illinois-based businesses, developed and permitted a CRT glass solution, the KleanKover Recycling Solution, whereby CRT glass is treated to reduce the leachable lead levels in the glass (the principal environmental concern associated with CRTs) below stringent federal thresholds and placed as Alternative Daily Cover (ADC) in a permitted landfill; and

WHEREAS, Kuusakoski Recycling and PDC have successfully operated the KleanKover Recycling Solution since November of 2013; and

WHEREAS, Given the lack of viable recycling markets, the IEPA has determined that treated CRT glass used as ADC can be counted towards manufacturer recycling goals under the Electronic Products Recycling and Reuse Act, as documented in IEPA correspondence to Kuusakoski Recycling on November 26, 2013; and

WHEREAS, Sustainable Electronics Recycling International (SERI), administrators of the R2 Standard (a voluntary certification standard for electronic waste recyclers) has prohibited its certified recyclers from using the KleanKover Recycling Solution or any other use of CRT glass as ADC; and

WHEREAS, At least 11 government jurisdictions in Illinois, representing over 4.3 million people and with some of the most effective e-waste recycling programs in the U.S., have petitioned SERI to reconsider its position on CRT glass management, citing the need for additional CRT glass management options in the U.S.; and

WHEREAS, Basel Action Network (BAN), administrators of the eStewards Standard (a separate voluntary certification standard for electronic waste recyclers) has defined any use of treated CRT glass within a disposal facility, including use as ADC, as a "last resort" option, effectively prohibiting use of the KleanKover Recycling Solution; and

WHEREAS, BAN has expressed interest in considering retrievable storage of CRT glass in permitted, monitored, and contained designated disposal sites as a preferred CRT glass management method; and

WHEREAS, In response to BAN's interest, PDC has proposed to develop a designated storage cell at its Indian Creek Landfill to provide storage and future retrieval of CRT glass, should markets develop to utilize the leaded glass; and

WHEREAS, The Indian Creek Landfill is fully permitted to develop the retrievable storage cell and accept treated CRT glass for placement in the cell, as confirmed by IEPA in a letter to PDC dated January 26, 2015; and



WHEREAS, PDC has established a perpetual care fund for the Indian Creek Landfill, consisting of a trust fund held by a third-party and available to Tazewell County (the host jurisdiction for the landfill), which provides funding to monitor and maintain the landfill into perpetuity, an even greater level of financial and environmental protection than is required under state and federal regulations; and

WHEREAS, PDC hosted a tour at the Indian Creek Landfill on October 23, 2014 for approximately 35 attendees of the annual conference of the Illinois Counties Solid Waste Management Association (ILCSWMA) to show attendees how CRT glass is currently managed, present the plan for retrievable storage, and answer questions; and

WHEREAS, ILCSWMA conference attendees were subsequently polled to determine their support for allowing treated CRT glass to be placed in a landfill regardless of whether it is used as ADC or placed in a dedicated cell for retrievable storage, and attendees voiced nearly unanimous support of this option with only 2 of the approximately 60 participants dissenting; and

WHEREAS, Kuusakoski Recycling and PDC formally petitioned BAN on November 18, 2014 to modify its standard and allow, as an additional preferred CRT glass management option, the placement of treated CRT glass in a retrievable storage cell within a permitted disposal site which has a perpetual care fund established; and

WHEREAS, At least 10 government jurisdictions in Illinois representing nearly 4 million people have sent letters to BAN in support of Kuusakoski Recycling and PDC's petition and urging BAN'S approval in order to maintain their vital electronic waste collection and recycling programs for their residents; and

WHEREAS, The option of retrievable storage of treated CRT glass in a dedicated cell at a permitted disposal site will provide needed environmentally protective, cost effective, and immediately available capacity for CRT glass, resulting in relief for residents, local governments, and recyclers across Illinois and the United States to manage this problematic material and reduce the potential for future discoveries of stockpiled material that would pose a significant environmental threat; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the Basel Action Network and the e-Stewards Leadership Council to approve the pending petition submitted by Kuusakoski Recycling and Peoria Disposal Company to allow the placement of treated CRT glass into a dedicated retrievable storage cell in a permitted disposal facility; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Executive Director of the Basel Action Network and the policy director of the Basel Action Network.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 329

Offered by Representative Lilly:

WHEREAS, Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. is a public service organization founded on January 13, 1913 by 22 young women with a vision on the campus of the prestigious Howard University in Washington, D.C.; and

WHEREAS, Only weeks after its founding, Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc.'s first public act of service was participation in the women's suffrage movement demanding rights for women, particularly the right to vote; and

WHEREAS, More than 250,000 women have joined this illustrious organization, with 1,000 collegiate and alumnae chapters located in the United States and around the world, including chapters in England, Japan (Tokyo and Okinawa), Germany, the Virgin Islands, Bermuda, the Bahamas, Jamaica, and the Republic of Korea; and

WHEREAS, Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., is composed of college-educated women committed to a lifetime of implementing the sorority's mission through its 5-point program thrust of educational development, economic development, political awareness and involvement, physical and mental health, and international awareness and involvement; and

WHEREAS, Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. is celebrating 102 years of exemplary service and dedication toward impacting communities, leading dialogues on national and global public policy, supporting quality education and removing barriers, stimulating current and future economic growth, and promoting quality of life overall; and

WHEREAS, In 1989, the National Social Action Commission instituted Delta Days in the nation's capital, an annual legislative conference to increase member involvement in the public policy-making process; Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. became a Non-Governmental Organization at the United Nations in 2003; and

WHEREAS, Legislative briefings, issue forums, and advocacy skills development and meeting with key policy makers, members of the United States Congress staff members, and experts are all part of the sorority's established platform; and

WHEREAS, Delta Days at the Illinois State Capitol occur on an annual basis, with members from across the entire State of Illinois and, in 2015, will embrace the theme of "Advocacy in Action - A Stronger Voice - A Stronger Presence"; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we commend the efforts of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., for its continued commitment to public service, recognize its collective contributions in helping to make the State of Illinois a better place to live, work, and play, and designate April 29, 2015 as Delta Day at the Illinois State Capitol; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. as a symbol of our respect and esteem.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 333

Offered by Representative Dunkin:

WHEREAS, America's first public community college was established in Joliet in 1901; today, there are 48 public community colleges in Illinois; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Community College System is the third largest in the nation, serving 853,524 students in credit and non-credit courses during the 2014 Illinois Community College System Fiscal Year; credit-generating students accounted for 77.3% or 659,712 students during the same year; and

WHEREAS, The Baccalaureate/Transfer program remained the largest credit instructional program area, enrolling 43.5% of students; 34.3% of all students enrolled in Fiscal Year 2014 indicated the intent to transfer to another school; and

WHEREAS, A total of 69,812 collegiate-level degrees and certificates were awarded to Illinois community college students in Fiscal Year 2014; Baccalaureate/Transfer degrees accounted for the second largest group of completers with a total of 19,524; and

WHEREAS, The number of community college completions in Fiscal Year 2014 is the highest count ever reported for the sixth straight year; and

WHEREAS, Nearly 3 out of every 10 graduates earned Baccalaureate/Transfer degrees; 7 out of 10 Transfer degree completers in Fiscal Year 2014 indicated the intent to transfer to a 4-year institution; and

WHEREAS, The transfer rate for Illinois Public Community Colleges students into 4-year colleges and universities is about 37%; and

WHEREAS, The process of transferring into a 4-year college or university is difficult for community college students because the Illinois Articulation Initiative lacks uniformity; almost every college and university participating in the Illinois Articulation Initiative has their own set of transferable credits; many credits earned at a community college may not be applied towards a 4-year degree and community college students spend more time and incur unnecessary expenses in pursuit of a 4-year degree; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we respectfully urge all public and private colleges and universities in the State to work together to strengthen the Illinois Articulation Initiative to allow greater uniformity in community college transferable credit allowances; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we call upon the Illinois Board of Higher Education, the Illinois Community College Board, and the Illinois State Board of Education to work together to make changes to the Illinois Articulation Initiative to create a more uniform set of transfer credit allowances between community colleges and public and private 4-year colleges and universities; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Illinois Board of Higher Education, the Illinois Community College Board, and the Illinois State Board of Education.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 335

Offered by Representative Hoffman:

WHEREAS, The Granite City Works steel mill has operated since 1878; it was originally founded by brothers William and Frederick Niedringhaus as the Granite Iron Rolling Mills, and most recently, owned by United States Steel Corporation; and

WHEREAS, The Granite City Works has been an industry leader in sheet steel products for customers in the construction, container, piping and tubing, service center, and automotive industries; and

WHEREAS, Granite City Works has an annual raw steelmaking capability of 2.8 million net tons; and

WHEREAS, Global influences in the market such as reduced steel prices, unfair trade practices, imports, and fluctuating oil prices, continue to have a dramatic negative impact on the steel production industry; and

WHEREAS, Domestic steelmakers continue to lose substantial sales to foreign countries, particularly China and South Korea, which have "dumped" their steel products into the United States market at prices below fair market value; and

WHEREAS, Due to these disruptions in the steel market, on March 25, 2015, United States Steel Corporation announced that it will temporarily idle the Granite City mill and lay off 2,080 steel workers by or after May 28, 2015; and

WHEREAS, Granite City Works is a vital part of the Metro-East economy, and the loss of this mill would be devastating to thousands of families and the financial well-being of the entire region; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the President of the United States and Congress to review the national tariff policy on steel goods and take action similar to the 2002 actions of President George W. Bush and Congress; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the President of the United States and Congress to consider all possible trade and economic policies to protect this vital American industry and minimize the financial impact on these hardworking men and women; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to the President and Vice-President of the United States, the Majority and Minority Leaders of the United States Senate, and the Speaker and Minority Leader of the United States House of Representatives.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 344

Offered by Representative Gabel:

WHEREAS, On February 18, 2015, Governor Bruce Rauner's administration released its proposal for the Fiscal Year 2016 State budget; and

WHEREAS, On that day, the Illinois Department of Human Services announced that it intended to save money by making it more difficult to enter the Division of Rehabilitative Services Home Services Program by changing the minimum threshold for eligibility; the Illinois Department on Aging also announced that it intended to save money by making it more difficult to enter the Community Care Program by changing the minimum threshold for eligibility; and

WHEREAS, The prior threshold for service was a score of 29 on the Determination of Need Assessment; the new proposed threshold for service would be a score of 37 on the Determination of Need Assessment; and

WHEREAS, The current Determination of Need minimum of 29 covers people with disabilities and seniors who are in need of help in critical areas of daily living; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services would carry the administrative responsibility for creating the change by seeking federal approval to amend the Medicaid State Plan to change the Determination of Need Assessment score requirement; and

WHEREAS, Changing the score from 29 to 37 would immediately eliminate 10,000 people with disabilities from the Home Services Program; changing the score would also prevent 16,000 seniors from becoming eligible for service in the next year, and 21,000 more would be eliminated in reassessment in the next year; and

WHEREAS, The members of this body find it unconscionable to deny 47,000 people with disabilities and seniors the opportunity to live independently in their communities; and

WHEREAS, The proposed change to the Determination of Need score was made without any input from disability and senior advocates; and

WHEREAS, Each person with a disability in the Home Services Program saves Illinois Medicaid at least \$17,000 a year by living in the community instead of a nursing home; and

WHEREAS, Each senior living independently with support from the Community Care Program saves Illinois Medicaid at least \$24,000 a year by living in the community instead of a nursing home; and

WHEREAS, Thousands of workers in the Home Services Program and the Community Care Program would be left without employment when consumers are made ineligible; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we state our opposition to the proposed change of the Determination of Need Score minimum threshold from 29 to 37, which would result in thousands of people with disabilities and seniors being left without critical support for activities of daily living in their own homes; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the Governor and the Illinois Department of Human Services to withdraw any and all plans to amend the Medicaid State plan to change the Determination of Need score requirements; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Governor and the Secretary of Human Services.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 351

Offered by Representative Chapa LaVia:

WHEREAS, The Indiana General Assembly recently signed Senate Bill 101, known as the "Religious Freedom Restoration Act", into law; and

WHEREAS, The bill enshrines legal discrimination against others, such as homosexuals, based on the pretext of religious freedom; and

WHEREAS, Passing a bill of this type could in fact perpetuate further discrimination of other groups on the pretext of religious freedom; and

WHEREAS, The bill poses a threat to Illinoisans who visit Indiana, who could be discriminated against by the newly adopted law; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that Indiana's "Religious Freedom Restoration Act" is publicly condemned by this body as an unnecessary and discriminatory measure that harms United States society; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we discourage travel to Indiana for the purposes of guaranteeing the right to be attended to in any business despite the religious beliefs of a business owner; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we hope that, upon passage of this resolution, the Indiana government will overturn the "Religious Freedom Restoration Act" for all the reasons highlighted; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution will be sent to Governor Bruce Rauner, Speaker of the Illinois House of Representatives Michael Madigan, President of the Illinois Senate John Cullerton, and their respective counterparts in Indiana.

#### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 60

Offered by Representative Sims:

WHEREAS, Sarcoidosis is a non-contagious systemic disease of unknown origin; it is commonly diagnosed with the detection of inflamed, microscopic growths called granulomas that grow and often affect the lungs, skin, eyes, and nervous system; and

WHEREAS, Sarcoidosis can affect any organ of the body and more than one organ at any given time; and

WHEREAS, The inflammation of such vital organs may cause seizures, blindness, disfiguring lesions, and heart failure; and

WHEREAS, Some famous suffers of sarcoidosis include NBC sportscaster Darrian Chapman, Hall of Fame athletes Bill Russell and Reggie White, gospel singer Mahalia Jackson, and comedian Bernie Mac, who passed away as a result of sarcoidosis; many other celebrities have or have had sarcoidosis; and

WHEREAS, Many individuals stricken with sarcoidosis eventually develop a serious disability or a potentially fatal condition; and

WHEREAS, Sarcoidosis was once thought to be an uncommon condition, but is now known to affect tens of thousands of people throughout the United States; and

WHEREAS, Sarcoidosis afflicts African Americans up to 8 times more frequently than other races; and

WHEREAS, As many people with Sarcoidosis have no symptoms, it is difficult to measure how many people have the condition; and

WHEREAS, Sarcoidosis is a disease that affects Americans nationwide and people around the world, yet its causes and potential treatments remain a mystery; and

WHEREAS, Skin-related symptoms of this chronic, multi-systemic disease were first recognized more than 100 years ago, but the effects of the disease on other organs were not observed until recently; and

WHEREAS, Sarcoidosis was the chief diagnosis of the death of fluorescent light bulb workers in Salem, Massachusetts in the 1940s; and

WHEREAS, Sarcoidosis was the first diagnosis for an overwhelming majority of rescue workers present at the World Trade Center on September 11, 2001; and

WHEREAS, Sarcoidosis has been documented to be disproportionately found among factory workers, Navy deck grinders, and members of other military branches; and

WHEREAS, Today, researchers are still trying to learn more about the causes, cures, and overall nature of sarcoidosis; and

WHEREAS, The American Lung Association, the National Sarcoidosis Society, and the National Sarcoidosis Foundation have actively advocated for more research to better understand how environmental and occupational exposures may increase the risk of sarcoidosis; and

WHEREAS, The National Sarcoidosis Society's Chicago Headquarters and the National Sarcoidosis Foundation strive to serve those afflicted by the disease by focusing efforts on public policy, research, funding, patient services, support group meet, public awareness, education, and finding a cure; and

WHEREAS, It would be fitting to designate the month of April 2015 as Illinois Sarcoidosis Awareness Month, a month with worldwide events to increase public awareness of the need to support individuals with sarcoidosis, educate others on the environmental and occupational issues associated with sarcoidosis, and educate medical and professionals who care for individuals with sarcoidosis; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that we designate the month of April 2015 as Illinois Sarcoidosis Awareness Month in the State of Illinois and show our support for the goals and ideals of National Sarcoidosis Awareness Month; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we encourage the federal government and the other 49 states to show their support of the goals and ideals of National Sarcoidosis Awareness Month; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Secretary of State is hereby directed to transmit copies of this application to the President and the Secretary of the United States Senate, the Speaker and the Clerk of the United States House of Representatives, and the members of the Senate and House of Representatives from this State; copies shall also be transmitted to the presiding officers of each of the legislative houses in the several states, requesting their cooperation; and be it further

RESOLVED, That this application constitutes a continuing application in accordance with Article V of the Constitution of the United States until the legislatures of at least two-thirds of the several states have made applications on the same subject; and be it further

WHEREAS, Because fines are a component of the sentences imposed by criminal courts, the imposition of fines is often the subject of appeals, which commonly result in cases being remanded to the circuit courts to correct the improper application of statutory provisions imposing fines, fees, or costs; and

WHEREAS, In *People v. Warren*, 2014 IL App (4th) 120721, the Appellate Court for the Fourth District wrote, "A vast amount of judicial resources are expended in the appellate court to resolve issues concerning the ever-expanding morass of fines and fees enacted by the legislature"; and

WHEREAS, In *People v. Folks*, 406 Ill. App. 3d 300 (2010), the Appellate Court for the Fourth District called for a "comprehensive legislative revision in the assessment of fines, fees, costs, and the \$5-per-day credit for time spent in custody prior to sentencing; and

WHEREAS, In *People v. Warren*, the court wrote that, "[t]he legislature continues to enact new fines, fees, and costs-in this case, leading to the imposition of 33 separate assessments; this adds more complexity to many cases where the monetary assessments may not even be collected; perhaps the legislature will answer our call"; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there is created the Criminal Fines, Fees, and Assessments Study Committee, consisting of 10 members appointed as follows: (1) one legislative member appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives; (2) one legislative member appointed by the Minority Leader of the House of Representatives; (3) one legislative member appointed by the President of the Senate; (4) one legislative member appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate; (5) 2 members of a Statewide association representing State's Attorneys; (6) 2 members of a Statewide association representing Circuit Court Clerks; (7) one member representing the Administrative Office of the Illinois Courts; and (8) one member representing the Office of the Attorney General; and be it further

RESOLVED, That 2 chairpersons, representing different political parties, shall be selected by the members of the Study Committee; and be it further

RESOLVED, That members of the Study Committee shall serve without compensation; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Study Committee shall undertake a comprehensive and thorough review of the provisions of the Illinois Compiled Statutes that create or impose fines, fees, or other financial assessments upon persons found guilty of criminal violations; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Study Committee shall undertake a comprehensive and thorough review of the relevant case law in which a State or federal appellate court has found error by an Illinois court, or by an Illinois circuit court clerk, in their application of the provisions of the Illinois Compiled Statutes that create or impose fines, fees, or other financial assessments upon persons found guilty of criminal violations; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Study Committee shall develop specific written recommendations for legislation to clarify and bring consistency and organization to the various provisions of the Illinois Compiled Statutes that create or impose fines, fees, or other financial assessments upon persons found guilty of criminal violations; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Study Committee shall draft one or more proposed bills to effectuate its recommendations; and be it further

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION  
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT 35**

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, That there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least 6 months after the adoption of this resolution a proposition to add Section 13 to Article VII of the Illinois Constitution as follows:

**ARTICLE VII**

## LOCAL GOVERNMENT

SECTION 13. UNFUNDED MANDATES

(a) If the General Assembly or any State executive action requires a unit of local government to establish, expand, or modify its activities in such a way as to necessitate additional expenditures of revenue by the unit of local government, then the State must provide funds to reimburse the unit of local government for the costs necessary to carry out the mandated requirement, except that the General Assembly may, but need not, provide funds for the following mandates:

(1) legislatively mandated requirements requested by the unit of local government affected; and

(2) legislatively mandated requirements that became effective before the effective date of this Section or State executive actions initially implementing legislation that became effective before the effective date of this Section.

(b) A mandated requirement that is not funded is not enforceable while not funded unless the bill implementing the mandated requirement passed with the concurrence of at least three-fifths of the members elected to each house of the General Assembly and specifically states that it is a non-reimbursable mandate under this subsection.

## SCHEDULE

This Constitutional Amendment takes effect upon being declared adopted in accordance with Section 7 of the Illinois Constitutional Amendment Act.

The foregoing HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT 35 was taken up, read in full a first time, ordered reproduced and placed in the Committee on Rules.
