HOUSE RESOLUTION 477

Offered by Representative Chapa LaVia:

WHEREAS, The Postsecondary and Workforce Readiness Committee of the Illinois P-20 Council engaged with numerous and varied stakeholders during a year-long process to identify strategies and key success factors for supporting postsecondary education and career readiness; and

WHEREAS, These strategies and key success factors included a systemic approach to personalized learning plans, ensuring high school graduation signifies readiness for college and careers, ensuring opportunities for students to earn early college credit, allowing for the development of innovative approaches for students to earn and transfer high school and postsecondary credit, and providing all students with career exploration supports and work-based learning opportunities; and

WHEREAS, Student readiness for postsecondary education and careers cannot be reduced to a single metric, but must instead be understood as a multi-faceted set of knowledge, skills, and abilities that allow students to successfully meet the challenges of college and career and live healthy, productive lives; and

WHEREAS, Raising academic expectations through implementation of the revised Illinois Learning Standards and expanding career education and opportunities through the Illinois Pathways initiative are not divergent strategies, but rather mutually reinforcing ones that, when used together, provide all students with a wider range of individualized, contextualized, realistic, and enriching learning opportunities; and

WHEREAS, By transitioning away from seat time and enabling students to master skills at their own pace, competency-based learning systems allow students to progress as they demonstrate mastery of academic content and also create multiple pathways to graduation, take advantage of learning opportunities outside of school hours and walls, and help identify opportunities to target interventions to meet the specific learning needs of students; and

WHEREAS, Various Illinois community colleges and their feeder school districts have demonstrated that co-designed and co-developed programs that provide developmental education to 12th grade students who are not prepared for college-level instruction can dramatically reduce remediation rates and thereby provide significant savings to families and taxpayers; and

WHEREAS, While dual credit is an important strategy for promoting college and career readiness and Illinois student participation in dual credit courses continues to increase, the ability of Illinois high school students to access dual credit courses in core academic courses is frequently limited by a high school's lack of teachers with a master's degree in the appropriate content area; and

WHEREAS, Career pathway programs that include attainment of core academic competencies, attainment of career-oriented competencies, professional learning via internships or other similar opportunities, and attainment of industry-relevant credentials enable students to accelerate advancement toward individualized career goals and enable students to make informed postsecondary education and career decisions; and

WHEREAS, Increased communication and collaboration across governmental, educational, and business entities must be leveraged to provide students with clear, consistent expectations, more navigable college and career preparation, and better targeted supports to meet individual student needs; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we encourage the State Superintendent of Education and the executive directors of the Illinois Community College Board, the Board of Higher Education, and the Illinois Student Assistance Commission to establish an advisory committee to provide recommendations that address:

- (1) proposed new, competency-based high school graduation requirements based on student proficiency of identified competencies aligned to the Illinois Learning Standards;
- (2) multiple methods, including, but not limited to, standardized assessments, for determining student proficiency levels on the identified competencies;
 - (3) mapping of student proficiency levels to achievement of identified competencies;
- (4) the required role of licensed teachers in determining student proficiency levels on identified competencies, and the permissive role of non-licensed professionals; and
- (5) acceptance of competency-based high school diplomas by postsecondary and financial aid institutions; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the State Board of Education, the Illinois Community College Board, the Board of Higher Education, and the Illinois Student Assistance Commission are encouraged to deliver recommendations to the General Assembly on or before February 1, 2016 for pilot implementation of competency-based graduation requirements, including proposed legislation for the implementation of said recommendations; and be it further

RESOLVED, That that the State Superintendent and the executive directors of the Illinois Community College Board, Board of Higher Education, and Illinois Student Assistance Commission are encouraged to establish an advisory committee to provide recommendations for the statewide scaling of programs codeveloped by community colleges and their feeder high schools that provide developmental education to 12th grade students who are not prepared for college-level instruction in order to significantly reduce statewide remedial education rates; the recommendations are encouraged to address:

- (1) the use of multiple measures in high school to determine student preparation for college-level instruction;
- (2) the appropriate timing of determinations of college readiness during the 11th grade year to support placement into appropriate course work during 12th grade;
- (3) the use of curriculum and assessments co-developed by high school and postsecondary education faculty; and
 - (4) the development of statewide model instructional supports, including contextualized,

career pathway-related, instructional supports addressing English Language Arts and mathematics competencies; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the State Board of Education, the Illinois Community College Board, the Board of Higher Education, and the Illinois Student Assistance Commission are encouraged to deliver recommendations to the General Assembly on or before February 1, 2016 for the implementation of said policies and programs and proposed legislation for implementation of said recommendations; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the State Board of Education, the Illinois Community College Board, the Board of Higher Education, and the Illinois Student Assistance Commission, in consultation with appropriate stakeholders, are encouraged to enter into an intergovernmental agreement by June 30, 2016 for the joint establishment of a program that will incentivize and accelerate the delivery of professional development and continuing education for high school teachers that will allow them to qualify as instructors for dual credit courses in high-need subject areas and locations within the State; and be it further

RESOLVED, That this program be encouraged to include at least a common statewide application for high school teachers, commitments from teacher preparation providers to develop cohort models appropriate for high school teachers, and other supports for accelerated higher education delivery models; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the agencies participating in the Illinois Pathways Interagency Committee ("IPIC"), which was formed by intergovernmental agreement among the State Board of Education, the Illinois Community College Board, the Board of Higher Education, the Illinois Student Assistance Commission, the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity, and the Department of Employment Security (the "IPIC Agencies"), are encouraged to establish one or more advisory committees that address:

- (1) the requirements for awarding career pathway endorsements in industry sectors prioritized by IPIC on a high school diploma;
- (2) opportunities for expanded access to career pathway endorsements, including programs available outside a student's resident school district;
- (3) increased recognition of career pathway endorsements by Illinois public community colleges and universities for course placement, advising, and college credit; and
- (4) appropriate supports from State agencies, employers, and the public-private partnerships supported by IPIC known as STEM Learning Exchanges for student attainment of career pathway endorsements; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the IPIC Agencies are encouraged to deliver recommendations to the General Assembly on or before February 1, 2016 for the implementation of a system for awarding career pathway endorsements and related policies and supports, including proposed legislation for implementation of said recommendations; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the IPIC Agencies are encouraged to establish one or more advisory committees that address:

- (1) grade-level expectations for education and career development and planning;
- (2) methods for ensuring all public middle and high school students have access to web-based, individualized tools to plan for postsecondary education, careers, and financial aid, including the alignment of such processes with high school consumer education instruction;
- (3) the development of a financial literacy program for students and families that aligns postsecondary education and career choices with likely financial outcomes to support economically sound decision-making;
- (4) the incorporation of individualized planning for postsecondary education, careers, and financial aid into high school consumer education instruction; and
 - (5) methods for increasing FAFSA completion rates; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the IPIC Agencies are encouraged to deliver recommendations to the General Assembly on or before February 1, 2016 for the implementation of said policies and programs, including proposed legislation for implementation of said recommendations; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the IPIC Agencies.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 478

Offered by Representative Lilly:

WHEREAS, Mental health is a state of well-being in which the individual realizes his or her own abilities, can cope with the normal stresses of life, can work productively and fruitfully, and is able to make a contribution to his or her community; and

WHEREAS, There is a stigma around mental health issues that can often prevent informed conversations on mental health issues as well as proper treatment from taking place; removing the stigma surrounding mental health issues will allow those suffering with mental health issues to more easily seek treatment and gain an understanding of their condition; and

WHEREAS, Mental illnesses are health conditions that are characterized by alterations in thinking, mood, or behavior, or some combination thereof, associated with distress or impaired functioning; behavioral health is defined as the behaviors and biology relating to a person's mental well-being, ability to function in everyday life, and concept of self; and

WHEREAS, Mental illnesses take on a wide variety of forms, including, but not limited to, mood disorders such as depression, anxiety disorders, schizophrenia, dementias, and eating disorders, which can be associated with learning disabilities; and

WHEREAS, Learning disabilities are neurologically based mental processing disabilities that can give rise to difficulties in acquiring knowledge and skills; learning disabilities include, but are not limited to, autism, dyslexia, visual processing disorders, auditory processing disorders, ADHD, dyscalculia, dysgraphia, and dyspraxia; and

WHEREAS, Children with learning disabilities are disproportionately affected by mental health issues; 36% of children with a learning disability will also develop mental health issues; and

WHEREAS, Mental health is essential to one's overall health and well-being, and mental health issues can strike a person regardless of his or her age, gender, race, ethnicity, religion, or economic status; and

WHEREAS, There is a lack of awareness of how to treat mental health issues and of resources available for that purpose; there is also a crisis of unaddressed mental health issues in the United States and the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, Those suffering from a mental illness and their loved ones often do not understand how to identify the symptoms and warning signs; and

WHEREAS, Untreated mental health issues lead to lost potential and numerous societal problems, such as increased incarceration rates, substance abuse rates, and emergency room visits; and

WHEREAS, According to the National Institute of Mental Health, there are an estimated 43.7 million adults with a mental disorder, or 18.6% of the total adult population in the United States; just over 20% of American children, either currently or at some point during their life, have or will have a seriously debilitating mental disorder; and

WHEREAS, The National Survey on Drug Use and Health found that only 58.7% of adults in the United States with a serious mental illness received treatment for a mental health problem; and

WHEREAS, The National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey found that only 50.6% of children with mental disorders had received treatment for their disorder within the past year; and

WHEREAS, With proper treatment, many mental health problems can dissipate or be reduced to a level where the person can fully function; and

WHEREAS, According to the National Alliance on Mental Illness, successful treatment rates for mental illness are extremely high and range from between 60% to 80%; the successful treatment rate for schizophrenia is roughly 60%, while depression is 70% and bipolar disorder is 80%; and

WHEREAS, People with mental illness who are in treatment can lead full, productive lives in their communities; and

WHEREAS, The Bureau of Labor Statistics estimates that 89.3 million Americans live in federally designated Mental Health Professional Shortage areas, where there is little to no access to mental health professionals; and

WHEREAS, A Journal of Psychiatric Services survey found that 47% of people untreated for mental health issues reported cost as a reason not to seek treatment; the same survey also found that 66% of untreated mental health patients did not go to a doctor because they thought the problem would get better on its own; and

WHEREAS, Six of 12 City of Chicago public mental health clinics were closed in 2012; and

WHEREAS, A total of 64.2% of inmates in local jails satisfied the criteria for a mental health problem currently or in the previous year; and

WHEREAS, The United States Department of Justice's Survey of Inmates in State and Federal Correctional Facilities found that fewer than half of inmates with a mental health problem have ever received treatment and only one-third received mental health treatment after admission; and

WHEREAS, The National Alliance on Mental Illness found that states collectively cut \$1.8 billion from their mental health budgets during the recession; the organization also found that, from 2009 to 2012, Illinois cut mental health funding by \$187 million, a 31.7% reduction; Illinois cut the fourth most of any state during this time period; and

WHEREAS, The Affordable Care Act makes behavioral and mental health treatment available to people throughout the country, especially those who could not previously afford treatment; and

WHEREAS, Mental health issues influence all branches of State government, including public health, children and family services, criminal justice, housing, employment, and other services; and

WHEREAS, It should be a fundamental goal of the State of Illinois to ensure proper awareness, identification, and treatment for mental health issues; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we acknowledge the seriousness of mental health issues in Illinois and strive to improve awareness and treatment of these issues; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the members of the General Assembly to have discussions and forums with their communities to promote awareness of mental health issues and access to mental health resources; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we encourage the members of the General Assembly and all school districts in Illinois to post information on mental health issues and local treatment resources on their public websites; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we encourage all school districts in Illinois to implement mental health screenings to properly identify students with mental health problems; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we encourage the federal government to improve mental health awareness, treatment, and funding to improve the lives of citizens struggling with mental health issues; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to President Barack Obama, the United States House of Representatives, and the United States Senate to review and discuss at the national level.
