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Nekritz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm delighted to join with Representative McAuliffe to welcome a whole group of folks who are up in the Speaker's Gallery today from the Adult Down Syndrome Center in... at Advocate Lutheran General Hospital in Park Ridge. This... we are celebrating in this Resolution the 25th anniversary of the Adult Down Syndrome Center. This is a very unique center from around the country. There's only one other center that does anything like this that provides primary care for adults with Down syndrome, but this is the first and really the best around the country. And I would like to give a special shout out to Dr. Chicoine, whose vision and leadership has create... has really made this center into what it is today from serving about a hundred adults when it started 25 years ago to now serving over... about 7 thousand adults annually. And the ... as the lifespan for folks with Down syndrome has doubled over the last number of years, the health care needs of adults with Down syndrome have come along with that. And so, this is... it's really very wonderful today to welcome them here to the Capitol and to recognize Dr. Chicoine and everyone at the Adult Down Syndrome Center. And especially the folks with Down syndrome that have joined us today and their family members, we give you a special welcome, many of whom have never been to the Capitol before. So, we're very excited to have them join us today."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. McAuliffe."

McAuliffe: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd like to also thank Representative Nekritz for bringing me on the Resolution and thank all... all the parents and all the adults that came down. Advocate Lutheran General is in my district and I'm very proud

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of that hospital and for all the people and all the… all the parents that took their time out to come down here to visit us here at the State Capitol. And a special shout out to Kerry Nicholson and her son, Patrick, who is also named after one of my constituents, his great aunt Pat Zeigenhorn. Welcome to all of you. And thank you for spending your day with us. We learned a lot today. Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Thank you for joining us today. And I thank the Sponsors for this Resolution. Those in favor of the Resolution will say 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 740, a Bill for an Act concerning regulation. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Bellock."

Bellock: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. And House Bill 740, I'm proud to do. This is one of the other Bills that we had in the agenda to make some changes in the CILAs to help protect the people in them. And what this Bill does... It's very simply... it just collects and securely stores identifying information and contact information for each individual resident, so the agencies have that information on hand for protection of the clients that they have in their facilities. I don't know of any opposition."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Lady's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish?

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Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Please record yourselves, Members. We have a lot of work today. Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 769, a Bill for an Act concerning government. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Cabello."

Cabello: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, House Bill 769 amends the State Commemorative Dates Act. Provides that on April 1 of each year is designated as Illinois State Trooper Day, a day to honor the dedicated men and women of the Illinois State Police. Provides that the Illinois State Trooper Day shall be observed throughout the state by the citizens of Illinois with civic remembrances of the sacrifices made on their behalf by Illinois's finest, the State Troopers. Especially, the ultimate sacrifice given by the State Police officers who lost their lives in the line of duty. I would respectfully ask for an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Gentleman's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Harper. Please take the record. There are 111 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 1772, Representative Parkhurst. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 1772, a Bill for an Act concerning regulation. Third Reading of this House Bill."

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Speaker Lang: "Representative Parkhurst."

Parkhurst: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. This Bill was requested by the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation. There's no fiscal impact. There's no known opponents. Simply, the Bill transfers the responsibility for certification of fingerprint machines from fingerprint venders, which are basically employees and nonowners, to fingerprint vendor agencies which are the owners of the machine. It's a sensible Bill. And I request an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Andersson."

Andersson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I just want... Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "I'm certain the Sponsor will yield."

Andersson: "I suspect she will. I just want to double-check,

Representative Parkhurst, is this your... Where are you? Hi. Is
this your first Bill?"

Parkhurst: "Yes, it is."

Andersson: "Congratulations. I'm sure..."

Parkhurst: "Thank you very much."

Andersson: "...it will go very well."

Parkhurst: "Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "She hasn't passed it yet. Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Speaker Lang: "Welcome to the House chamber. Thank you for being here. House Bill 1809, Mr. Davidsmeyer. Mr. Davidsmeyer. Out of the record. House Bill 2367, Mr. Ford. Please read the Bill. Excuse me, Mr. Clerk, is there an Amendment? Do you wish the Bill back on Second Reading for your Amendment? Mr. Ford, we'll take this out of the record and come back to it, Sir. Thank you. House Bill 2386, Mr. Breen. Mr. Breen. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 2386, a Bill for an Act concerning safety. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Breen."

Breen: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This is a Bill to legalize 360 lids on beer cans. So, this was a... it was a request from a brewery in my district. They asked me about midway last year, can we make this new can, which is sweeping the nation where all of the top of the can comes off. So, that for hoppy beers, IPAs, those sorts of beers, you can actually really smell them a lot better than... than you can with just a smaller opening on the can cover. And we looked into it, saw it was illegal, unfortunately, because of a law passed about 20 or

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30 years ago. This will clean that up and legalize this so that we can continue our wonderful tradition of great craft brewing in the State of Illinois. I'll stand for questions."

Bennett: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Basically, this... today as it is, the law requires the state to offer college entrance exams to students and it's a wonderful idea. What this does, this takes it one step further and codifies the state's practice to offer school entrance exams during the actual school day and that's the difference. It'll allow for safety and all those kinds of things as well. So, that's what this does. It's straightforward and says you need to have tests during the school day. So, with that, Mr. Speaker, I move for an 'aye' vote, please."

House Bill 2447, Mr. Pritchard. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 2447, a Bill for an Act concerning transportation. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Pritchard."

Pritchard: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen, this is a Bill that we passed out of this House before, but didn't move in the Senate. So, we've come back with some modifications and clarifications to the notion of amending the Illinois Vehicle Code that provides that if a person is in an accident and the proximate cause of that accident was failure to treat a known physical condition that that person can be held on the count of reckless driving. I would ask for your support."

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- Speaker Lang: "Chair recognizes Leader Currie. Leader Currie.

 Leader Currie, did you have an announcement?"
- Currie: "Thank you, Speaker. Please let the record show that Representative Ammons is excused for the remainder of the day."
- Speaker Lang: "Thank you, Representative. On Mr. Pritchard's Bill, those in favor vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting's open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? - Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 2485, a Bill for an Act concerning transportation. Third Reading of this House Bill."
- Speaker Lang: "Representative Hammond."
- Hammond: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 2485 amends the Vehicle Code to allow for the issuance of decals for the Prostate Cancer Foundation. And a portion of the funds will actually go to the Prostate Cancer Awareness Fund. Appreciate your support and take any questions."
- Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Please take the record. There are 108 voting 'yes', one voting 'present'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 2488, Representative Hammond. Two in a row. Please read the Bill."

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Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 2488, a Bill for an Act concerning conservation. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Hammond."

Hammond: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 2488 amends the State Forest Act and it allows for the Department of Natural Resources to charge for the actual cost of production as well as the materials in their forestry plan. And I would be happy to answer any questions and appreciate your support."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Lady's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Riley. Mr. Clerk, please take the record. There are 110 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 2506, Representative Fine. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 2506, a Bill for an Act concerning health. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Fine."

Fine: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This Bill is an initiative of the Department of Public Health. It eliminates a health maintenance advisory board that has nine members, but currently has no members and really has no responsibility."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Andersson, on a Bill with no responsibility." Andersson: "I'll be quick, I promise. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Sponsor yields."

Andersson: "So, we have no members, no responsibility, and we're getting rid of it. Is that correct?"

Fine: "I'm sorry. Say it again, I couldn't hear you."

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Andersson: "No members, no responsibilities. We're getting rid of it?"

Fine: "We are eliminating a government body."

Andersson: "I am 110 percent in favor of your Bill."

Fine: "Thank you."

'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Conroy. Please take the record. There are 110 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 2516, Mr. Andersson. Out of the record. House Bill 2531, Representative Hammond, again, a hat trick. Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 2531, a Bill for an Act concerning health. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Hammond."

Hammond: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 2531 is an initiative of the Illinois Department of Public Health. It's just technical in nature. It removes an outdated requirement for manufacturers to provide a drug formulary information to IDPH and the department no longer collects or maintains that information. Appreciate your support."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Lady's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Zalewski. Please take the record. There are 110 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 2537, Representative Moeller. Please read the Bill."

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Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 2537, a Bill for an Act concerning civil law. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Moeller."

Moeller: "Thank you, Speaker. House Bill 2537 makes two changes to the Code of Civil Procedure. The first change is that it reduces the publication requirements and costs involved in a name change for a minor. And the second change is that it streamlines and makes it easier for an individual to resume the use of their maiden name after a divorce. It essentially creates an opt-out versus opt-in process for making the name change. I would be happy to answer any questions. It's my understanding that this Bill has no opposition."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Andersson."

Andersson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Sponsor yields."

Andersson: "So, Representative Moeller, if I'm understanding this correctly... So, we've got a married couple that is sep... no longer married; they have some element of joint custody. One parent wants to change the name. There's a required notice to the other ex-spouse. Is that correct?"

Moeller: "Yes, that's correct."

Andersson: "And there's no opposition to the Bill?"

Moeller: "Not that I'm aware of."

Andersson: "Does it do anything else?"

Moeller: "That would be it."

Andersson: "Thank you."

Moeller: "Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Lady's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish?

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Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Please take the record. There are 110 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 2540, Representative Willis. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 2540, a Bill for an Act concerning education. Third reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Willis."

Willis: "Can you please move this Bill back to Second? There's an Amendment in the works."

Speaker Lang: "At the request of the Sponsor, Mr. Clerk, please move the Bill to the Order of Second Reading. House Bill 2543, Mr. Unes. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 2543, a Bill for an Act concerning transportation. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Unes."

Unes: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 2543 is an initiative of the Illinois Truckers Association. It is very technical just technical in nature. It's some clean-up language and removes the duplicity. I know of no opponents. And I ask for an 'aye' vote."

'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Ford, Mitchell. Christian Mitchell. Please take the record. There are 110 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 2584, Mr. DeLuca. Please read... Out of the record, Mr. Clerk. House Bill 2585, Mr. DeLuca. Please read that Bill."

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Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 2585, a Bill for an Act concerning notices. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. DeLuca."

DeLuca: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen, House Bill 285 (sic-2585), the same language last year passed with 112 'yes' votes last year, but it didn't move in the Senate. And what it does is if a notice is required to be published in a newspaper that is published in a particular unit of local government or a school district and there is no newspaper published in that unit of local government or school district, then a notice may be published in a secular newspaper having general circulation within the unit of local government or a school district. Be happy to answer any questions."

Speaker Lang: "Those is favor of the Gentleman's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Please take the record. There are 108 voting 'yes', 2 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 2606, Representative Bryant. Please proceed, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 2606, a Bill for an Act concerning transportation. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Bryant."

Bryant: "Sorry. We have a... Sorry, Sir. We have an Amendment pending. We'd like to move it back to Second Reading. Sorry about that."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Clerk, at the request of the Sponsor, place this Bill in the Order of Second Reading. House Bill 2611, Mr. D'Amico. Please read the Bill."

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- Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 2611, a Bill for an Act concerning transportation. Third Reading of this House Bill."
- Speaker Lang: "Mr. D'Amico."
- D'Amico: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This is an initiative of Secretary of State. Basically, when you're going to get your license reinstated after a DUI, they want to be able to access your information whether you received a DUI while operating a snowmobile or a watercraft."
- Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Gentleman's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Sims. Please take the record. There are 110 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 2623, Representative Fine. Please read the Bill."
- Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 2623, a Bill for an Act concerning transportation. Third Reading of this House Bill."
- Speaker Lang: "Representative Fine."
- Fine: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This Bill is an initiative of the Illinois Department of Natural Resources. It amends the Boat Registration and Safety Act. It does a number of things. It strengthens the governmental reporting requirements for certain watercrafts. It increases registration fees for certain watercraft. It modifies the requirements for personal floatation devices. And it repeals the water usage stamps."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Andersson."

- Andersson: "Thank you, Mr. Sponsor. Will the Speaker yield? Mr. Speaker, will the Sponsor yield?"
- Speaker Lang: "Say it anyway you like. The answer is yes."

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- Andersson: "Thank you, for both. Representative, is there a fee increase in this?"
- Fine: "There is a fee in one place and an elimination of a fee in another."
- Andersson: "So, where is the one and where is the other?"
- Fine: "So, it increases the registration fee for certain types of watercraft and it eliminates the water usage stamp fee."
- Andersson: "Do we anticipate that that will either increase or decrease revenues because one might be used more often, the other less or do we not know?"
- Fine: "Well, I really don't know how much of an impact it's going to have on overall revenues in general. It increases the fee for a Class 1 watercraft more than 16 feet from 18 to 28 dollars and for a cattle boat to 60 from 50 dollars."
- Andersson: "My understanding from our report, that this will also bring us into compliance that will generate 1.6 million in grants. Is that correct?"
- Fine: "So, part of this Bill that is so important is eliminating the water usage stamp because there's a lot of confusion about what that stamp does. And for many kayaks and canoes that have races in Illinois waterways, thousands of people come in from out of town to participate in these events. And the confusion in the past has been, you need a water usage stamp in order to participate and that really kept people from coming to Illinois to participate in these races. So, by eliminating the water usage stamp just for these races, they're hoping that this is going to bring in a lot of tourism dollars, people are going to come here to participate in the

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event, stay at our hotels, eat at our restaurants, and stay for the weekend and enjoy Illinois."

Andersson: "So, this is a tourism promotion sort of a thing?"

Fine: "In a way, yeah, I would say so."

Andersson: "So, I happen to have a kayak and I do pay that little thing. Am I going to not have to pay it or is it... or do I still have to pay?"

Fine: "Well, if... It's only if you're participating in that race..."

Andersson: "No, I would never participate in a race."

Fine: "...then you don't have to pay the water usage stamp. But if you're going to be using Illinois waterways in general, you're going to have to buy a stamp for your boat."

Andersson: "Thank you for your answers."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Members, please record yourselves. Cassidy, Sims, Yingling. Mr. Clerk, please take the record. On this question, there are 59 voting 'yes', 50 voting 'no'. And the Sponsor requests Postpone Consideration."

Fine: "Please."

Speaker Lang: "Thank you. Mr. Clerk, Committee Reports. Committee announcements. House Bill 2713, Mr. Welch. Mr. Welch. Out of the record. House Bill 2878, Mr. Hoffman. Mr. Hoffman. Out of the record. House Bill 2897, Mr. Severin. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 2897, a Bill for an Act concerning criminal law. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Severin."

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Severin: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, today I offer House Bill 2897 for your consideration. This Bill would make Illinois veterans suffering from posttraumatic stress disorder, better known as PTSD or depression eligible to receive a service dog from Helping Paws Service Dog Program. Currently, the Department of Corrections partners with the Helping Paws Program to provide service dogs to individuals suffering from physical or mental disabilities. This Bill will widen the pool of eligible individuals to include veterans suffering from PTSD or depression. The Helping Paws Program is working effectively. The committee of individuals that currently select service dog recipients would also be eligible for choosing which veteran receives a service dog. Service dogs have proven to be an effective companion animal for veterans coping with mental scars of war. Many veterans in Illinois could benefit from a service dog. This Bill would be a good way to ensure that more veterans would be eligible to receive them. I believe this Bill will further help us fulfill our great obligation to care for our veterans when they return home, while also not reinventing the wheel for the completely new program. Thank you. And I'm happy to answer any questions. And yes, this is my first Bill. And yes, I'm nervous."

Speaker Lang: "I have to tell you, Representative, I've been here almost 30 years and no one's ever admitted to that. Mr. Andersson."

Andersson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?" Speaker Lang: "I don't think so. Yeah, the Sponsor yields."

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- Andersson: "I'll... I'll give it a shot anyway. So, it is his first Bill. So, congratulations. And by the way, I'm still nervous, so I'll admit that. But thank you for standing today. I appreciate that."
- Severin: "Well, I was going to apologize to Mr. Turner, but don't get me talking 'cause I can talk a long time."
- Andersson: "Well, congratulations, presumptively, on the passage of your first Bill."
- Severin: "Thank you. I appreciate that."
- Speaker Lang: "That's it? Those in favor of the Gentleman's Bill will vote 'aye'; those opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Arroyo, Riley, Thapedi. Please take the record, Mr. Clerk. There are 110 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. Congratulations. Mr. Andersson is recognized."
- Andersson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Point of personal privilege." Speaker Lang: "Proceed."
- Andersson: "Just to answer your question of is that it, I know that there was a time back before I was here, where maybe we made a lot of fun of people, but I... Clerk Mapes tells me that never happened... but my pleasure is to welcome them and to be positive. And so, that will be this Floor Leader's protocol. Thank you."
- Speaker Lang: "Ah, the old days. Mr. Davis is recognized."
- Davis: "Well, thank you, Mr. Speaker. Kind of along that line.

 There used to be a time where the Members first Bills were something that we could poke fun at, but staff is doing things

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a little bit differently and actually giving Members real serious issues that we really can't poke fun at. So, if we could encourage staff to go back to the old way of doing it and giving issues that we can poke fun at, I think that would make the first Bill process a lot more fun for our newer Members. So, I make that request to our staffs on both sides of the aisle. Let's make the first Bill process a lot fun, again and lets do some real simple issues that we can have fun with."

Speaker Lang: "Like the budget. Mr. Wheeler is recognized."

Wheeler, K.: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Point of personal privilege."

Speaker Lang: "Proceed, Sir."

Wheeler, K.: "Ladies and Gentlemen, in a very sincere effort to honor the intent of Representative Tabares's Bill yesterday, regarding a Spanish language version of the Illinois General Assembly website, I want to let you know that we did a little coding last night in my office. And this morning on my actual State Rep webpage, there's a list... a link... a list of links to about a dozen different languages that are live right now. So, if you have constituents, like I do, that might want to read what we're doing in their own language, those abilities are available now. At the same time, I've e-mailed or attempted to every one of the Members of this Body a list of links and an outline of how to post these things. So, we are already making progress in our effort to reach out to members of our state who do not speak languages... English... in their native language to help them become part of our process. And

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I hope everyone participates and does what they can to promote this. Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "House Bill 2909, Representative Gabel. Please proceed, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 2909, a Bill for an Act concerning public aid. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Gabel."

Gabel: "Thank you... thank you, Mr. Speaker. This Bill amends the Illinois Public Aid Code. What it does is it allows for someone who has had surg... eye surgery and their prescription has changed, it allows them to get a new pair of eye glasses. Currently, in the program you can only get eye glasses every two years. This would allow them to get a pair of eye glasses sooner than that if they have had surgery."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Andersson."

Andersson: "You... thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?" Speaker Lang: "Sponsor yields."

Andersson: "Representative, so it's only after surgery? I thought
I heard you say if the prescription changes."

Gabel: "Only after surgery."

Andersson: "So, just because my eyes get a little worse over time that wouldn't qualify?"

Gabel: "It's not part of this Bill at this time. They would have to wait two years."

Andersson: "Thank you very much."

Speaker Lang: "Those is favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Zalewski. Mr. Clerk, please take the record. On this question, there are 107 voting

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'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 2957, Representative Fine. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 2957, a Bill for an Act concerning insurance. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Fine."

Fine: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This legislation requires the synchronization of prescription drug refills at least once per ensured year. It also allows patients to pick up all of their ongoing prescriptions at the same time every month. This will allow the patient and the pharmacist to stick to a medication regime. I know of no known opposition to this Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Andersson."

Andersson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Lady yields."

Andersson: "Representative, so what does synchronization of prescription drug refills mean?"

Fine: "Right now, you know, if you're on a number of different medications sometimes you pick up one at the beginning of the month, one in the middle of the month, one at the end of the month and this can be confusing for patients. And so, this allows the patient and the pharmacist to work together so that they're on a synchronized schedule."

Andersson: "Does that have any impact on the insurance coverage?

I just... I know from experience that sometimes insurers will deny you coverage in a... in a given cycle."

Fine: "So, it's to my understanding because you're not going to be getting any additional medication, but you're just going

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to be on the same schedule. So, you're going to get the same refills, but you're all... going to get them all at the same time."

Andersson: "So, presumably... so, presumably, there would be... maybe it'd be shorted, if you will, on some to even it out so that you're on one cycle?"

Fine: "Right."

Andersson: "Thank you. And it... are there any cost implications to this?"

Fine: "None that I know of."

Andersson: "Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Lady's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Crespo, Mayfield. Mr. Clerk, please take the record. On this question, there are 110 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 3014, Mr. DeLuca. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3014, a Bill for an Act concerning safety. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. DeLuca."

DeLuca: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen. This is more of an educational piece. And what it's about is clarifying and making it known what type of materials should not be mixed into recycling. So, not only your commercial and industrial recycling in the dumpsters, but also residential. So, items like household sharps, plastic bags, plastic sheets, plastic tarps, plastic wrap, polystyrene, Styrofoam,

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landscape waste, this should not, if you didn't know that already, it should not go in the recycling. It should go in the trash. Be happy to answer any questions."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Andersson."

Andersson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Sponsor yields."

Andersson: "So, it appears what we're really trying to do here, Anthony, is educate and discourage from putting things that don't belong in the recycling bins in the recycling bins. Is that correct?"

DeLuca: "Yes, it is."

Andersson: "And it appears from our analysis that there's no...
there's no penalty for this. So, again, it's to encourage... or
encourage and educate, but if somebody does it, they're not
going to be prosecuted for it, correct?"

DeLuca: "That's correct. There's no penalty in the Bill."

Andersson: "Thank you very much."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Ives."

Ives: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Sponsor yields."

Ives: "So, understanding there's no penalty, what... what's the enforcement mechanism then for the Bill?"

DeLuca: "Well, I did state it's more for educational purposes."

Ives: "But we're basically stating it's illegal. Do we have other Bills like this that are illegal, but unenforceable?"

DeLuca: "Can you restate your question?"

Ives: "I'm just wondering what's the use of a Bill that we qualify as illegal, when it's literally unenforceable. And even if somebody were to find out, there's no penalty."

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- DeLuca: "Well, at some point in the future if the state wanted to impose penalties or authorize units of local government to impose penalties, we could do that."
- Ives: "So, I mean, my brother runs a landfill out in the Quad Cities area. I mean, and he can tell you that there's a lot of recycling stuff that just ends up in the landfill. And I imagine that part of the reason is that it's contaminated recycling. It's not pure recycling. I just don't know how we correct for that and I don't... I don't understand how this Bill's going to really help. I mean, I agree with you. People should not be throwing the wrong things into recycling, but I just don't see how this Bill's going to help."
- DeLuca: "Well, that is the first… as I said, the first step is to educate folks and get the word out. So, if they didn't know previously, they will know going forward of what the do's and don'ts are with recycling material."
- Ives: "So, a stronger Bill, maybe that if the waste hauler actually recognizes that you have comingled in recycling items that should not be there. They just don't pick it up."
- DeLuca: "Well, to a certain extent the waste haulers police it now and they may not pick it up and they may put a tag on it."
- Ives: "Right. And I think that's very, very effective. 'Cause people want their garbage taken care of, so I don't see the need in making it illegal. I think that's... that that's the way to handle it. If the waste hauler doesn't pick up your recycling 'cause you've comingled, then you're going to have to pay for its disposal or in the case... my community actually went to where you're paying for both recycling and you're

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paying for regular garbage to be hauled away. Albeit, it's a little different in pricing. So, I think that's the better way to handle this."

DeLuca: "Well, I'll be more than willing to look at another piece that might tighten it up and strengthen it in the future."

Ives: "Thank you. To the Bill. I just think, honestly, we're going to be highlighted as the garbage police who made recycling provisions... or contaminated recycling illegal in the State of Illinois; and by the way, go ahead and keep doing it because there's no enforcement mechanism. I mean, that's what's going to come out of this Bill. And honestly, I think that that's just another thing to highlight the dysfunction in Illinois."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Davidsmeyer."

Davidsmeyer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Sponsor yields."

Davidsmeyer: "So, just looking at our analysis here, it says if you knowingly place into a container for collection. So, if I'm talkin... if I got a piece of Styrofoam and I put it in a recycling container, I obviously knowingly put it in the recycling container. What if I did not know that it was not recyclable?"

DeLuca: "Well, that's part of the process here too. Now today, you know that it's not recyclable."

Davidsmeyer: "I knew that before."

DeLuca: "So, you were just educated Mr. Davidsmeyer."

Davidsmeyer: "Yeah."

DeLuca: "Which is the point of the legislation."

Davidsmeyer: "I've been educating people on that for years, my friend. I understand what you're trying to do. I don't know

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that making comingling of garbage and recycling is necessarily something we should be making illegal. I think that we should encourage our waste collectors and recycling collectors to do their own educational campaigns. Thank you."

DeLuca: "Well, keep in mind it's not the first time that the State of Illinois has done something like this. The, you know, the Landscape Waste Act 1991, or whatever it was, made it illegal to mix landscape waste with trash. So, it's not that unusual."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Skillicorn."

Skillicorn: "Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Sponsor yields."

Skillicorn: "Representative, how is this communicated to the average homeowner that's trying to throw away their recycling? Is there... is this going to be published somewhere or is this going to be mandated and put on the recycling containers or something? That's just one thing I'm just not clear on."

DeLuca: "Most of the time that education process takes place by the hauler within a community. So, when a hauler would start a recycling program within a community, usually that information goes out at the time."

Skillicorn: "Okay. So, we're relying on the hauling company to do this."

DeLuca: "No, I didn't say that. I just answered the question that in most cases that how it... the education processes happens currently."

Skillicorn: "Okay. But the state isn't going to publish anything or send anything out about this, correct?"

DeLuca: "Well, the Bill doesn't require any of that."

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Skillicorn: "Thank you very much."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. DeLuca to close."

DeLuca: "Thank you for your questions. I ask for your 'yes' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Please record yourselves. Riley, Stratton. Mr. Riley. Please take the record. There are 102 voting 'yes', 8 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 3048, Mr. Fortner. Please read

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3048, a Bill for an Act concerning safety. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Fortner."

the Bill."

Fortner: "Thank you, Speaker. Members of the House, I am very pleased to present House Bill 3048. A Bill that will get rid of a part of the State Government that I actually helped to create back in my first term. I was the chief cosponsor of what became Public Act 95-777 and one of the things that did is create the Low-Level Radiation Task Force. And that task force has completed its mission. It's no longer needed as part of IEMA. And this Bill will dissolve it and remove it from our statutes. Happy to answer any questions."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Andrade. Mr. Clerk, please take the record. On this question, there are 109 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the

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Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 3058, Mr. Pritchard. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3058, a Bill for an Act concerning agriculture. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Pritchard."

Pritchard: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen, this Bill amends the Insect Pest and Plant Disease Act. And it makes permissive the inspection of plant samples requested by local units of government under the plant... Insect Pest and Plant Disease Act. It also is an initiative that codifies current practice not to duplicate services of the federal inspection of plant material that comes into the country. I would ask for your support."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Gentleman's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, please take the record. There are 110 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 3081, Mr. Reis. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3081, a Bill for an Act concerning regulation. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Reis."

Reis: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 3081, right now the Type I and Type II packing plants in Illinois have to register with the Department of Ag each year and pay a fee. And this is a redundant licensure. This Bill would allow them to become licensed once. And they're inspected every week. There's

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someone from the department there all the time to make sure that they pass their audits and are adhering to all the department regulations. It only generates \$8,900 a year and it takes more staff than that. So, I ask for your 'aye' vote and would be happy to ask any questions."

- Speaker Lang: "Mr. Davis. Mr. Davis withdraws his comment. Those in favor of the Gentleman's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Davis. Mr. Clerk, please take the record. On these... on this question, there are 106 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 3092, Representative Bourne. Please read the Bill."
- Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3092, a Bill for an Act concerning human rights. Third Reading of this House Bill."
- Speaker Lang: "Representative Bourne."
- Bourne: "I would ask that this Bill be moved back to Second, for an Amendment."
- Speaker Lang: "Mr. Clerk, please put this Bill on the Order of Second Reading. House Bill 3093, Representative Bourne.

 Please read the Bill."
- Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3093, a Bill for an Act concerning wildlife. Third Reading of this House Bill."
- Speaker Lang: "Representative Bourne."
- Bourne: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This Bill makes hunting licensees able to be carried electronically. It's an initiative of the Department of Natural Resources. I would ask for your 'aye' vote and would be happy to take any questions."

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- Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Lady's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, please take the record. On this question there are 110 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 3161, Representative Manley. Please read the Bill, Mr. Clerk. Your turn to show off, Representative."
- Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3161, a Bill for an Act concerning State Government. Third Reading of this House Bill."
- Speaker Lang: "Representative Manley, your guest isn't paying attention."
- Manley: "I know. I'm going to do my best here. Thank you. House Bill 3161 is a Bill that is kind of in response to the terrible Heroin epidemic that we're facing here in the state. What we... what we're doing with this Bill is attempting to educate the public by DHS adding information to their website that gives us information about the signs of Heroin and opioid use, helpful hints to parents. Basically, it is an educational one-stop shop for things that people might not be interested in or need to know. And I'll take any questions."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Andersson."

Andersson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Sponsor yields."

Andersson: "Representative, I think the Bill is a great idea, but there's one aspect that I've been learning... thank you... I've been learning about recently that is contributing to the Heroin crisis which is Fentanyl. That's actually becoming

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more threatening or more serious in that overall combination. I can't see you. So, my..."

Manley: Representative Hurley's in the way."

Andersson: "So, my question is, is there any ability to add to this that Fentanyl aspect? Because really that's a critical component of what's going on."

Manley: "I don't... this is not in the Bill, but I think DHS has given me the indication that they are very willing to do things. And I... that's a great point and I will talk to them about that as well, but yes, I've heard that as well."

Andersson: "So, I don't think it needs to delay your Bill in any way, but I would ask and encourage you, when you talk with them, that maybe they do that voluntarily."

Manley: "I sure will. Thank you."

Andersson: "Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Lady's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Leader Currie. Please take the record, Mr. Clerk. There are 110 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received a Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 3169, Mr. Sauer. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3169, a Bill for an Act concerning children. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Sauer."

Sauer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. It's an honor to stand before this Body and introduce House Bill 3169 as my first Bill.

This Bill was an initiative by the Department of Child and Family Services to amend various Acts by changing the term

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'ward of the state' to 'youth in care'. This is already referred to in our departments as youth in care, these special children that are in the care of the state. But I believe that we really need to change Code so that we refer to young people with the right terminology. In my opinion, one way to promote positive interaction and help inspire children is by doing away with these outdated legal terms that diminish their self-worth. This came out of committee with a unanimous vote. And I would ask for its passage. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Andersson."

Andersson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. And these freshmen are all outing themselves with their first Bills. So, congratulations on that."

'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Flowers, Severin. You know, it used to be more fun around here. Mr. Clerk, take the record. 110 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. Congratulations, Representative. House Bill 3272, Representative Jesiel. It is not her first Bill. Mr. Clerk, please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3272, a Bill for an Act concerning fish. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Jesiel."

Jesiel: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 3272 is an initiative by the Department of Natural Resources. It would amend the Fish and Aquatic Code. This is a very important Bill. The purposed changes of statute are intended to allow the

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- Department of Natural Resources to more effectively administer the Lake Michigan commercial fishing program. I ask for your 'aye' vote."
- Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Lady's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, please take the record. On this question, there are 109 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 3273, Representative Jesiel. Please proceed, Mr. Clerk."
- Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3273, a Bill for an Act concerning fish. Third Reading of this House Bill."
- Speaker Lang: "Representative Jesiel. More Bills about fish."
- Jesiel: "More Bills about fish. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This one would also amend the Fish and Aquatic Life Code. Currently, DNR is required to issue five commercial fishing licenses in Lake Michigan. This would allow them to issue up to five commercial fishing licenses. I ask for an 'aye' vote."
- Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Lady's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Rita. Please take the record. There are 110 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 3855, Leader Currie. Please read the Bill."
- Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3855, a Bill for an Act to revise the law by combining multiple enactments and making technical corrections. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Leader Currie."

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- Currie: "Thank you very much, Speaker. Members of the House, it's my favorite Bill of the year. It comes to us courtesy of the Legislative Reference Bureau. The effort is to make sure that technical differences from one statute to another, even as we amend and revise the law, are not permanent. So, it is technical corrections combining multiple enactments and making technical corrections, nothing substantive. And I hope you won't ask me any questions. I hope you'll just vote 'yes'."
- Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Lady's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Crespo, Hernandez, Manley, Stratton. Hernandez. Please take the record. There's 110 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 3874, Representative Mussman. Please read the Bill.'
- Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3874, a Bill for an Act concerning transportation. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Mussman."

Mussman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the committee. With this Bill, we are simply inserting the words 'anywhere in the state of Illinois', just to clarify that you are meant to have insurance anywhere you drive a vehicle in the State of Illinois. The original statute had the language split up a little bit. It was very confusing and we were seeing that police were applying it unequally across the state. I'm happy to answer any questions."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Ives."

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Ives: "Would this Bill, then require insurance when you're driving around on farm vehicles or your private property?"

Mussman: "Only if your farm vehicle was required to register with a regular plate and sticker if it was going to be driven on a regular road. There's a subclass of vehicles that don't have to do that. It does not apply to them."

Ives: "Okay. Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Lady's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Please take the record, Mr. Clerk. There are 106 voting 'yes', 4 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 3879, Representative Stratton. Please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3879, a Bill for an Act concerning State Government. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Stratton."

Stratton: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 3879 authorizes the Illinois Criminal Justice Information Authority to conduct a an inventory of sheriff's offices, clerks of the circuit court, and circuit clerks in the state to determine which ones utilize a primarily paper-based system."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Andersson for an announcement. Go ahead, Mr. Andersson."

Andersson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Sponsor yields."

Andersson: "So, Representative Stratton, I do understand this is your first Bill, correct?"

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Stratton: "That is correct and from what I understand, you indicated you would be welcoming and kind."

Andersson: "Welcoming and kind, I will be. Thank you for holding me to my word."

Stratton: "Absolutely."

Andersson: "But I do just have a few questions."

Stratton: "Certainly."

Andersson: "Because your Bill is real. You know, it's something real. So, you're taking a survey of those departments that use predominately paper. What is the underlying purpose of that? Why do we want to do that?"

Stratton: "So, I've worked with a number of agencies in criminal and juvenile justice reform and we've identified that there are a number of systems that use primarily paper-based systems. We know that we're in the age of technology, so this is not to encourage anyone at this stage to do anything, but we need to understand which systems can talk to one another and which ones cannot."

Andersson: "So, for example, we have 102 counties and I know this applies certainly more to just the counties. Is it literally going to be counting to determine, well, out of those 102 for example, 30 still are in the paper mode and the remainder are... I mean, is that kind of what it's going to do?"

Stratton: "It's simply to provide baseline information to understand which systems, whether technology-based or paper-based."

Andersson: "And that's for all the different agencies, correct?" Stratton: "Correct."

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Andersson: "Okay. But we're not digging into how they use the paper, how they use electronics. Right now, we're just trying to figure out who's kind of still operating a little bit in the dark ages."

Stratton: "That is correct."

Andersson: "Okay. Thank you very much. Was that positive and uplifting?"

Stratton: "It was positive and it was welcoming, as well."

Andersson: "Thank you."

Stratton: "Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Well, you had me and attention. Mr. Davis."

Davis: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Unlike the previous speaker, I offered no such characterization of what my questions might be. So, will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Yes."

Davis: "Thank you very much. Now, you are asking the Criminal Justice Information Authority to do a survey. Are they trying to find something wrong? Are they rooting out criminal issues with the survey?"

Stratton: "No. The criminal portion of this Bill relates to the fact that it is the Illinois Criminal Justice Information Authority. So, they are focused on the information and then they will utilize that information in the criminal justice system to understand how systems are talking to one another."

Davis: "So, they will determine, because they are the Criminal Justice Information Authority, whether or not any information that they are seeking whether or not some criminal activity has happened?"

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Stratton: "Absolutely not. As you know, the county sheriffs, the clerks and the clerks of court are a part of a system where they have to communicate one with another and this is really looking at whether the systems are using paper-based systems or technology-based systems. And it's really a question of..."

Davis: "To commit crime?"

Stratton: "I'm sorry, Representative."

Davis: "Whether or not they're using these systems to commit crime?"

Stratton: "If I may finish... If I may finish, it's to make sure that the systems are operating efficiently. Thank you."

- Davis: "But in order to see if they're committing crimes though?

 Because this is the Criminal Justice Information Authority,
 they're rooting out crime. So, they're checking paper and
 technology to see if crimes have been committed because
 they're the Criminal Justice Information Authority, right?"
- Stratton: "No. As you may know, the Criminal Justice Information Authority is primarily a research-based entity. And so, they are not a law enforcement entity, but they will be looking at other entities within the system to determine if they are utilizing paper or if they're using technology."
- Davis: "So, they are a research entity? So, they're researching paper and technology to determine if crimes are being committed?"
- Stratton: "No. They are doing research by way of the survey or inventory, as I mentioned in the Bill, to determine whether or not a system is using paper primarily or using technology."

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Davis: "But using paper or technology to determine if crimes are being committed? Because after all, they are the Criminal Information... Criminal Justice Information Authority, right?"

Stratton: "No. Because, again, some of these agencies, clerks of the circuit court, sheriffs, and county clerks offices are not necessarily doing that type of investigative work. But they do… are a part of the system and they do, of course, need to make sure that they share information one with another. So, this will look at how to make the entire system more efficient."

Davis: "But you said some... they don't do the investigatory work.

So, they're relying on their Criminal Justice Information

Authority to do the investigatory work, to look at paper and
technology to determine if crimes have been committed,
correct?"

Stratton: "No."

Davis: "Then what are they supposed to be doing?"

Stratton: "The Illinois Criminal Justice Information Authority?

Is that what you're asking? What are they supposed to be doing?"

Davis: "I quess."

Stratton: "The Illinois Criminal Justice Information Authority is a research entity that conducts research on a number of issues relating to criminal justice and they also provide that research information and it's available to you if needed on another Bill that you may want to talk about. And at this point, that's what they do."

Davis: "But they research information, sometimes investigate..."
Stratton: "No."

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Davis: "No, they don't investigate, but they research paper and technology to determine..."

Stratton: "They do what their name indicates. It's the Illinois, so they're here in this state."

Davis: "Okay."

Stratton: "Criminal Justice Information which is information that we're trying to gather here through this Bill."

Davis: "Right."

Stratton: "Authority, they've been given the authority to do that."

Davis: "The authority..."

Stratton: "And that's what they do."

Davis: "...to determine if crimes have been committed. That's what I've been saying all along."

Stratton: "But that's not what I said."

Davis: "No, it's what I've been saying."

Stratton: "That's what you've been saying?"

Davis: "Yes."

Stratton: "You are correct..."

Davis: "Okay."

Stratton: "...in that that's what you've been saying. Unfortunately, the premise is incorrect."

Davis: "All right."

Stratton: "But thank you for your inquiry."

Davis: "I'm sorry that my premise was wrong in suggesting that the Criminal Justice Authority look at criminal issues, but that's okay. But..."

Stratton: "They look at criminal issues; they don't investigate.

They're not a law enforcement agency."

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Davis: "Okay. I'll just leave it at that. Thank you very much,

Representative."

Stratton: "Thank you."

Davis: "Congratulations on your first Bill."

Stratton: "Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Davis, I think she won. Mr. Skillicorn."

Skillicorn: "Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Lady yields."

Skillicorn: "Representative Stratton, is this your first Bill?"

Stratton: "It is my first Bill."

Skillicorn: "Well, congratulations."

Stratton: "Thank you."

Skillicorn: "A very quick question. Does the Illinois Association of County Clerks, have they weighed in or have they been consulted?"

Stratton: "The Association has been consulted and someone from the Association appeared while I presented this before the committee. They gave some input and I believe at this point they are neutral and have not taken a position on this Bill."

Skillicorn: "So, I will probably urge an 'aye' vote, but I do have one more question. When I look at the text of the Bill, I don't see... actually, well, in my analysis it talks about after the information is recovered about formalizing rules. And then when I look in the text, I don't see that in the text of the Bill. Is that the intent?"

Stratton: "Can you repeat that question, please? You see what?"

Skillicorn: "Sure. In the analysis that I have, it mentions that it will formalize rules. Unfortunately, I'm trying to hit my

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monitor here and get to that analysis again and I can't, but that's okay. But then the text… the text here, I see doesn't include that. It's just authorizing the survey?"

Stratton: "Correct. And it was not meant to formalize any rules."

Skillicorn: "Okay. To the Bill. I recommend an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Stratton to close."

Stratton: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Again, this Bill, House Bill 3879 is to allow ICJIA to do a study on paper-based systems.

And I urge an 'aye' vote. Thank you."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Lady's Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Please record yourselves, Members. Mr. Clerk, please take the record. On this question, there are 109 voting 'yes', and 1 voting 'present'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. Chair recognizes Mr. Mitchell."

Mitchell, B.: "Thank... thank you, Mr. Speaker. Point of personal privilege."

Speaker Lang: "Please proceed."

Mitchell, B.: "Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, over in the… I believe in the… on the Democratic side in the gallery, I have the pleasure to introduce the grand champion junior and senior Clinton High School Dance Champions of the State of Illinois. So, could you stand up? I think some of you are standing up. Wave. Thank you. Thank you for coming."

Speaker Lang: "Congratulations. Happy you're here with us today.

And congratulations, Representative Stratton. House Bill

3910, Representative Willis. Please read the Bill."

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Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3910, a Bill for an Act concerning criminal law. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Lang: "Representative Willis."

Willis: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This Bill is an initiative of the state EMS commission. It basically codifies what emergency medical personnel can do out in the field and it allows them to administer controlled substance without having to wait for a written prescription in order to do so. And it's really important when you're out in the field every minute counts and I urge an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lang: "Mr. Andersson."

Andersson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lang: "Sponsor yields."

Andersson: "So, right now they can't... I mean, they have to wait for an order from a physician?"

Willis: "They are doing this right now, but there is some federal issues that they're actually doing it illegally. So, this codifies it to make sure that they are not doing that."

Andersson: "Thank you very much."

Speaker Lang: "Those in favor of the Bill will vote 'yes'; opposed 'no'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, please take the record. On this question, there are 110 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no'. And this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. Mr. Turner in the Chair."

Speaker Turner: "Representative Lilly, for what reason do you seek recognition?"

Lilly: "Point of personal privilege."

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Speaker Turner: "Proceed."

Lilly: "Thank you. General Assembly, it's that time of year where the women want to showcase our efforts to bring our Assembly together. May 10 is our COWL reception and Capitol Capers. I would like everyone to put that on their calendar. This is an event that is tradition to bringing all General Assembly Members together in support of women issues. I would also like you to put on your calendar for this evening, our creative meeting. If you're interested in participating in the General Assembly Capitol Capers this year, please meet with us, 4 p.m. in M1 in the Stratton. Again, that's 4 p.m., M1 in the Stratton. Your creative energies are needed. Thank you for your attention."

Speaker Turner: "Thank you, Representative. Representative Costello, for what reason do you seek recognition?"

Costello: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Point of personal privilege." Speaker Turner: "Please proceed, Sir."

Costello: "I'd like to remind everyone that the Illinois Sportsmen's Caucus Dinner and Auction is tonight at the Wyndham Hotel. Cocktails are at 5:30. Dinner is at 6:30. Love to see you all there and help support sportsmen in the State of Illinois."

Speaker Turner: "Thank you, Representative. Representative Flowers, for what reason do you seek recognition?"

Flowers: "Point of personal privilege. I would like to say happy birthday to my secretary, Deb Nance and wish her many, many more. Thank you."

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Speaker Turner: "Thank you, Representative. And happy birthday.

House Bill 736, Representative Flowers. Mr. Clerk, please
read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 736, a Bill for an Act concerning public aid. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Turner: "Representative Flowers."

Flowers: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 736 established a small business grant program that would provide money to low-income individuals who happen to be on public aid and who are interested in becoming entrepreneurs. And I would like to thank Representative Fortner for making a good Bill a better Bill. And I would like to turn the mic over to Representative Fortner, please. Thank you."

Speaker Turner: "Representative Andersson is recognized."

Andersson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Turner: "Sponsor indicates that he will... she will yield."

Andersson: "So, we're... we would be setting up a program for small business grants for public aid recipients who are trying to establish new businesses. Is that correct?"

Flowers: "Yes."

Andersson: "And it looks like from our notes that it's subject to appropriations. So, do we know how much we're talking about putting into this at that point?"

Flowers: "I don't know how much money it's going cost to start it up, but the fact of the matter is, we're trying to get people off of welfare to work and to help them create their own jobs and that's the purpose of the Department of Commerce and Community Affairs, as I once knew it. And so, this is what they do already and they will be identifying the people that

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are on public assistance who would like to be entrepreneurs and who would be able to create their own jobs and be self-sufficient."

Andersson: "And I assume that there'll be a variety of rules establishing, you know, who... who can qualify for the program..."

Flowers: "Absolutely."

Andersson: "...what amounts are appropriate to loan to a given individual or business?"

Flowers: "Absolutely."

Andersson: "Is there..."

Flowers: "This was a wonderful program that Tommy Thompson, back in the day, had it in Wisconsin and was very successful; and I always wanted to see a similar program here in Illinois. So, that Republican Governor did a very good job, back in the day."

Andersson: "There you go, and now you're doing a good job, Representative."

Flowers: "Well, thank you."

Andersson: "Thank you."

Speaker Turner: "Chair recognizes Representative Fortner."

Fortner: "Thank you, Speaker. To the Bill. I want to thank the Sponsor for bringing a good idea forward and then working with me and making it into a really good Bill. I think this is exactly the kind of program we like to see available at DCEO, so that they can look at giving grants to people who are currently on welfare but have ideas to become entrepreneurs and can help them get started and get to work. As the previous questioner noted, it is subject to appropriations so, we will set the funding levels through

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appropriation Acts. But this gives the statutory authority to begin this program. I'd ask for a 'yes' vote."

Speaker Turner: "Representative Ives is recognized."

Ives: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Turner: "Sponsor indicates that she will yield."

Ives: "Representative Flowers, did you guys specify in the Bill what would be the criteria or the qualifications for them to receive the grant or is that all up to DCEO?"

Flowers: "Representative, that would be up for... up to the department to sort that out, to make sure that they identify. The Bill does not identify. It will call for people who may want to qualify and then upon them submitting in their names and their ideas, that's where it would come from. Just like any other business."

Ives: "Okay. So, that was my question, I guess. Your Bill then, in no way, mandates that these grants go forward? They're subject to appropriation and they're subject to DCEO oversight and DCEO qualifications and DCEO vetting. Is that correct?"

Flowers: "That is correct."

Ives: "Okay. Thank you."

Speaker Turner: "Representative Flowers to close."

Flowers: "I would appreciate an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Turner: "The question is, 'Shall House Bill 736 pass?'
All in favor vote 'aye'; all opposed vote 'nay'. The voting
is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish?
Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, please take the record.
On a count of 104 voting 'yes', 4 voting 'no', 0 voting
'present', House Bill 736, having received the Constitutional

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Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 2713, Representative Welch. Mr. Clerk, please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 2713, a Bill for an Act concerning business. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Turner: "Representative Welch."

Welch: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 2713 is an initiative of our Honorable Secretary, Mr. Jesse White. This Bill does not have any opposition. It does not cost the state anything. What the proposal does is it adds to or amends the Uniform Partnership Act, the Limited Liability Company Act and the Business Corporation Act. It passed committee unanimously. And it does provide for expedited services in the Secretary of State's Office. I ask for approval."

Speaker Turner: "Seeing no debate, the question is, 'Shall House Bill 2713 pass?' All in favor vote 'aye'; all opposed vote 'nay'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, please take the record. On a count of 107 voting 'yes', 1 voting 'no', 0 voting 'present', House Bill 2713, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 3060, Representative Guzzardi. Mr. Clerk, please read the Bill."

Clerk Hollman: "House Bill 3060, a Bill for an Act concerning health. Third Reading of this House Bill."

Speaker Turner: "Representative Guzzardi."

Guzzardi: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the chamber.

This Bill would eliminate the fee for homeless people applying
to the Department of Public Health's vital records for a copy
of their birth certificate. Right now, people are charged a

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small fee when they apply for their birth certificate. We simply want to waive that fee for homeless people. The department has removed their opposition to this Bill. I know of no opposition to the Bill at the moment. It passed out of committee unanimously. And I urge an 'aye' vote. Thank you."

Speaker Turner: "Chair recognizes Representative Andersson."

Andersson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Turner: "Sponsor indicates that he will yield."

Andersson: "So, it looks like according to our analysis, that DPH is opposed. Is that correct?"

Guzzardi: "My under... in committee they had lifted their opposition. My understanding is that they are no longer opposed."

Andersson: "It... Okay. I accept your representation. What our report indicates is that they had requested an Amendment limiting the Bill exclusively to Cook County, but that you're opposed to that?"

Guzzardi: "So, here's the deal, Steve. Is that most people who apply for their birth certificates do it through their county Department of Public Health. The only reason you would need to come to the state is if you are applying for a record in a county where you no longer live. Like let's say you lived in Cook, but you were born in Madison County then you may apply through the state rather than... 'cause Cook County can't find it for you. So, we're actually working with the Cook County Board to do a pilot program for Cook County's Department of Public Health as well, but this would apply... the counties can't do it for the state. So, we're talking about just for those state records."

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Andersson: "So, this is only where you're applying through the state. Is that..."

Guzzardi: "Correct. Yes."

Andersson: "...what I'm understanding?"

Guzzardi: "That's correct."

Andersson: "What... Gentlemen, back off. I apologize. So, what's the current fee?"

Guzzardi: "At least \$15."

Andersson: "And so, we're waiving this for all persons who are defined as homeless?"

Guzzardi: "Correct. Yeah, we're relying on definitions for homelessness that are prescribed in federal statute. The McKinney-Vento Act, I believe is what it's called."

Andersson: "So, it's not really means tested. I mean, understand there are people who are homeless who are still the working poor who might have funds, have \$15 or no?"

Guzzardi: "So, that's a great question. I don't know the definition as it's laid out in McKinney-Vento, but I will say that to... it's a pretty stringent qualification to ensure that you are, in fact, homeless."

Andersson: "Okay. And again, you believe DPH is neutral on your Bill at this point?"

Guzzardi: "Yeah. DPH suggested some small technical language changes that may end up coming through the Senate, but yeah we've had conversations with them. They lifted their opposition in committee, so."

Andersson: "Thank you very much."

Guzzardi: "Thanks."

Speaker Turner: "Representative Guzzardi to close."

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Guzzardi: "Thank you, Members. I urge an 'aye' vote."
