It can be a thankless job. Many, many of the good things we do will only be criticized, misunderstood or even misrepresented. Let that not discourage us, Lord, but fill us with joy and the desire to serve. Help us to love those we serve by putting their interests above our own and above all other things and goals. May the needs of those who depend on us be what guide our every decision. Make us Your good servants, Lord, and servants of every one of our brothers and sisters. Lord, we ask that You always bless this great Assembly. And we ask it with confidence, in Your name, Amen."

Speaker Turner: "With 113 Members present, a quorum is established. Representative Manley, for what reason do you seek recognition?"

Manley: "Point of personal privilege, please."

Speaker Turner: "Please proceed, Representative."

Manley: "I was so excited walking through the Capitol yesterday and I turned around and you know how you see someone that you know who they are, but you're not sure? Well, there was my constituent and somebody I adore, Lou Schiller. She is up in the gallery with Bob Schiller her husband and grandsons from New Mexico, Lucas and Jonas Chan. Welcome to Springfield. Speaker Turner: "Thank you, Representative. Representative Butler, for what reason do you seek recognition?"

Butler: "A point of personal privilege, please."

Speaker Turner: "Please proceed, Sir."

Butler: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. As a proud Member of the House Tourism Committee, I'd like to announce to the Body that this is National Travel and Tourism Week. The theme for Travel and Tourism Week across the nation is the faces of tourism, which highlights those who work in the travel and tourism industry. Here in Springfield we have over 3300 people who work in the travel and tourism industry, the folks that greet you at hotels, that manage you through the wonderful exhibits we have here in town, that serve you at our... our restaurants and everything. I would just like to remind the Body to say hello to those people and thank them for the job that they do. Tonight in Springfield we'll be having the Legends in Tourism Awards hosted by the Springfield and Convention and Visitors Bureau. And I invite anyone out to the Presidential Museum at 6 p.m. who would like to thank the folks locally who do that.

So, happy National Travel and Tourism Week."

Speaker Turner: "Thank you, Representative. Representative Gabel, for what reason do you seek recognition?"

Gabel: "Point of personal privilege."

Speaker Turner: "Please proceed."

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Gabel: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I just want to remind every... or let everybody know that we are having a Green Caucus meeting today at 4 p.m. in Room 100 in the Capitol. So, please come and attend. We're going to be talking about implementation of the future Clean Jobs Bill. Thanks."

Speaker Turner: "Thank you, Representative. Representative Lilly, for what reason do you seek recognition?"

Lilly: "Personal privilege, please."

Speaker Turner: "Please proceed."

Lilly: "Thank you. Ladies and Gentlemen, it is the day before the Capitol Capers COWL major event. We have rehearsal this evening at 5:30 at the Crowne Plaza. All of the cast please, 5:30, right after Session or committee meeting at the Crown Plaza. We need you; tomorrow is the show. Thank you."

Speaker Turner: "Thank you, Representative. House Joint Resolution 30, Representative Walsh. Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Joint Resolution 30 is an initiative in my area, the 86th District, and it deals with Interstate 80 through Joliet from New Lennox at the Route 30 interchange all the way to I-55 interchange. And basically, what has been brought forth is there's been a high number of accidents on this stretch of roadway due to congestion and the influx of new industry that's come in. And basically, what we're asking IDOT to do is to erect signage along that corridor to... to warn motorists of the high congested area and to kind of maybe give them a little initiative to be more aware of their surroundings as they move through there. That's the gist of this Joint

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Resolution and I'd ask for its adoption. I'd be happy to answer any questions."

- Speaker Turner: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of House Joint Resolution 30. All in favor vote 'aye'; all opposed vote 'nay'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, please take the record. On a count of 112 voting 'yes, 0 voting 'no', 0 voting 'present', this Bill, having received the requisite amount of votes, is passed. This adoption... this Resolution is adopted, excuse me. Representative Keith Wheeler, for what reason do you seek recognition?"
- Wheeler, K.: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Point of personal privilege."
- Speaker Turner: "Shhh. Thank you, Members. Can we please bring the noise level down? Representative Wheeler is recognized."
- Wheeler, K.: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. On the Tuesday before we left for our break I filed three different revenue estimates and invited everyone in this chamber to join me in supporting the... the first step in the actual House budgeting process. Other than the clerical error regarding sponsorship to House Joint Resolution 51, I'm yet to hear from anyone of my friends on the other side of the aisle supporting any of these revenue estimates. We're putting ourselves in a very difficult position to finish this Session through the normal appropriation process which we have in place. In order for us to prepare a real and thoughtful, balanced budget we have to work together. When are we willing to actually start that process? For the record, Illinois families and taxpayers understand that it's only common sense to first determine how

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much you have to spend before you actually start spending it. I mean, until two years ago this Body and this State did, too. Thank you."

Speaker Turner: "Representative Ives, for what reason do you seek recognition?"

Ives: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise for a point of personal
 privilege."

Speaker Turner: "Please proceed, Representative."

Ives: "I think it's interesting to note... to follow up on what Representative Wheeler just said is that constitutionally this Body has the requirement to actually set forth the amount that we anticipate will be our estimated receipts. This is part of the Constitution, it's under the State Finance Section. You can read it yourself. We have failed to do this for 2 years and 11 days. Now, Representative Wheeler doesn't recall where at 4 and 3 years ago we actually sat down as a Body and did such a thing. We came together, we unanimously, in a bipartisan fashion, adopted a revenue number. We haven't done that. And fortunately, Representative Wheeler has given you three different options. So, pick which number you like. Let's get behind one of these Resolutions. And let's start the first process in the budget of getting a budget done and that's just to identify how much revenue we have. Let's then... to do as we've done in the past and segregate that out to the Appropriations Committee and take testimony and decide what can we prioritize for our spending this year. The failure of this Body, the House, to adopt a revenue number is a complete failure upon all of us. All of us. We're all responsible for pushing our Leadership to bring forth a Bill and a Resolution

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to do such that... do such as that. Our House side... our Republican House side, we've done that. We've given you three options to get behind. If you're new to this part... to this Body, if you haven't seen a real budget process work go through, I invite you to talk to your older colleagues. Where this was our first thing that we did in the month of February so we could get to work on a budget. We have failed the people of Illinois. We have failed to devote... to produce even a revenue estimate as required by our State Constitution. Let's get to work. We don't have enough... much time. And we need to do this for the rest... for everybody in this entire state. Thank you."

Speaker Turner: "House Joint Resolution 22, Leader Durkin. Leader Bellock is recognized. Leader..."

Bellock: "Thank you..."

Speaker Turner: "...Leader Bellock, I'm being told there's a Floor Amendment on this Resolution that needs to be adopted?"

Bellock: "Yes. Thank you very much."

Speaker Turner: "Mr. Clerk."

Bellock: "Floor Amendment #1 adds the Lieutenant Governor or his or her designee and a representative of the statewide association representing high school districts to the membership of the task force."

Speaker Turner: "The Lady moves for the adoption of Floor Amendment #1 to House Joint Resolution 22. All in favor say 'aye'; all opposed say 'nay'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it. And the Amendment is adopted. House Joint Resolution 22, Leader Bellock."

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- Bellock: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. House Joint Resolution 22 creates the Task Force on Modes of School Transportation for Elementary and Secondary Education, sets forth the membership of the task force. Each Legislative Leader gets one appointment. It's going to review the modes of transportation moving forward and it will report back to the... their recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly no later than December 15, 2017."

- Clerk Hollman: "House Resolution 369, offered by Representative Lang.
 - RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we hereby extend our best wishes to Richard "Dick" Lockhart on the occasion of his retirement and commend him for his years of dedication to the people of the State of Illinois."

Speaker Turner: "Leader Lang."

Lang: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen. It is a bittersweet moment for me and for many who have served here for many terms to provide to the House a retirement Resolution upon the retirement of Dick Lockhart. Dick has been a stalwart

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in the Capitol for many years. The ... reading from parts of the Resolution, it's important for you to hear this gentleman's background. Dick enlisted in the United States Army in 1943. During his time in the service, he was held as a prisoner of war in 1945, and as a result of his efforts was awarded the Bronze Star and Combat Infantryman Badge and was honorably discharged from the service in December of 1945. During this period of time, Dick also witnessed the liberation of concentration camps in Europe. When he returned, after going to school, he formed his own lobbying and consulting firm, which still exists today, Social Engineering Associates in 1958, Ladies and Gentlemen. And he published a nonpartisan newsletter called The Illinois Political Reporter for almost 30 years. Some years ago, he was named one of the '10 Best Lobbyists in Illinois' by the Chicago Sun-Times, served as a special consultant to the Constitutional Convention of 1970, served as Speaker of the Illinois Third House in 1981, and in 2004 was the recipient of the Illinois Third House Lifetime Award. Dick has Achievement authored numerous works, including, The Legislative Process and the Pursuit of Virtue, Words Wise and Otherwise, and Lockhart Logic, one of my personal favorites. Upon retirement, Dick plans to write a civics guide on lobbying and the legislative process, which is a must read for all of us. Dick wants us to know he continues... plans to continue to keep working throughout the rest of the Session and maybe throughout the rest of this calendar year. He's been a teacher for other lobbyists, a mentor for other lobbyists and a teacher to Legislators as well. Some of you newer Members may not know Dick that well,

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but you're missing a treat that you haven't had a chance to spend a significant amount of time with Dick. Dick has had a profound impact on the State of Illinois and a profound impact on the General Assembly, as well as myself personally. And while we're sorry to see him go, we certainly wish him well in his retirement. He will be missed. And Mr. Speaker, I move that all Members of the House be added as cosponsors to the Resolution. And Ladies and Gentlemen, Dick Lockhart is in the Speaker's Gallery."

Speaker Turner: "Representative David Harris on the Resolution." "Thank you... thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. It's ... it's hard to offer more word... more words of accolade to what has already been said. The Assistant Majority Leader and I have been around State Government for a long period of time, probably too long, but Dick... Dick Lockhart has been around even longer than both of us. And I have to tell you, there are institutions in this great capital city, not just the ... not just the buildings but also the people. And Dick Lockhart really has been an institution around State Government for so, so many years. He is a wonderful fount of knowledge. His... obviously his military service going back to World War II is exemplary. He has been a wonderful... I say colleague to work with because those folks ... the third... the third rail folks really are almost colleagues of ours. We rely on them greatly. And Dick has been a wonderful source of information, a wonderful source of ... of ... of just good, good solid work that we rely on. And Dick, I got to tell you, we're going to miss you. All the best to you. I'm sure you'll be around seeing us, not in the official

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capacity as a lobbyist, but for many years to come. And we all wish you well. Congratulations to you for everything you've done."

Speaker Turner: "Leader Bellock on the Resolution."

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. And today is a Bellock: bittersweet day, Dick, because you are what everybody has just said you are. Probably one of the most amazing people I've ever met, not just in Springfield, but in my entire life. For all that we have said of your history, what Representative Lang said, what Representative Harris said, but especially I just have to tell the group that this morning when I was pulling up at about 6:45 this morning I saw this man quickly running across the parking lot, almost, in his suit and his briefcase and I thought, I wonder if that's Dick Lockhart. And as I turned around and parked my car there was Dick going up the stairs into the Stratton Building. And the first thing he said to me is, what can I do for you today? And that's just exactly what type of quy Dick Lockhart is. He did more mental health Bills with me, but your legislation spanned everything in the time you've been here. But just to wish you well, Dick, on behalf of all of us and that we can learn from you as an inspiration to us. Thank you."

Speaker Turner: "Leader Lang has moved that all Members be added as cosponsors on the Resolution. Seeing no debate, all Members will be added. The question is... Leader Lang moves that the House adopt House Resolution 369. All in favor vote 'aye'; all opposed vote 'nay'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Dease take the record. On a count of 112 voting

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- 'yes', 0 voting 'no', 0 voting 'present', House Resolution 369, having received the requisite amount of votes, is adopted. Congratulations, Dick. House Joint Resolution 5, Representative Ammons. Representative Ammons is recognized."
- Ammons: "Sorry, Mr. Speaker, if you could give me one second because I wear glasses and I can't see that. Let me grab my glasses."
- Speaker Turner: "Take your time, Representative."
- Ammons: "Thank you. This Resolution is in support of the University of Illinois Day and the 150-year celebration of the University of Illinois and the dedication to the State of Illinois from our flagship university. And we ask for support on this Resolution."
- Speaker Turner: "Lady moves that the House adopt House Joint Resolution 5. All in favor say 'aye'; all opposed say 'nay'.

 In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it. And the Resolution is adopted. House Joint Resolution 37, offered by Representative Thapedi. Representative Thapedi."
- Thapedi: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Joint Resolution..."
- Speaker Turner: "Excuse me... excuse me, Representative. I'm being told that there's a Floor Amendment on this Resolution that needs to be adopted?"
- Thapedi: "Yes. I would move for its adoption. Essentially Floor Amendment #2, to the best of my recollection, revamps the seats and how they're allocated to ensure that there is a more equal and balanced format or structure of the task force. And I move for its adoption."
- Speaker Turner: "Gentleman moves for the adoption of Floor Amendment #2 to House Joint Resolution 37. All in favor say

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'aye'; all opposed say 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it. And the Resolution is adopted... I mean, the Amendment is adopted. Representative Thapedi on House Joint Resolution 37."

Thapedi: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. U.S. Trade Policy has taken a prominent role in our country in the last few weeks, threats of increased tariffs, retaliatory duties, countervailing measures and other protections issues have arisen on a constant basis. The U.K. is leaving the E.U., France just elected a new President, the United States may or may not renegotiate NAFTA. TTIP negotiations are at hold. TPP negotiations are on a hold. It's important that Illinois's voice is heard in Washington and U.S. Trade Policy is reworked accordingly. House Joint Resolution 37 provides that voice and I urge its adoption. I'm available to answer any and all questions."

Speaker Turner: "Gentleman moves for the adoption of House Joint Resolution 37. All in favor vote 'aye'; all opposed vote 'nay'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, please take the record. On a count of 112 Members voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no', 0 voting 'present', House Joint Resolution 37, having received the requisite amount of votes, is adopted. Representative Williams, for what reason do you seek recognition?"

Williams: "Point of personal privilege, please."

Speaker Turner: "Please proceed, Representative."

Williams: "I just wanted to take a moment to welcome students from my district from DePaul University who are here in the

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- gallery. They're here to advocate for funding. Let's help our higher education students out. Thank you for coming down."
- Speaker Turner: "Thank you. And welcome to your Capitol.

 Representative Chapa LaVia, for what reason do you seek recognition?"
- Chapa LaVia: "Thank you, Speaker. For a point of personal privilege. I'd like everybody to acknowledge somebody up... well, it's a couple up in the gallery visiting from London, England, Chris and Clive Chap. So, if we could say hello to them."
- Speaker Turner: "Thank you. And welcome to the Capitol. House Joint Resolution 42, Representative Lily. Representative Lilly is recognized."
- Lilly: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen. I present House Joint Resolution 42, which is to designate Andre Iguodala Drive here in Springfield. Andre is currently performing and doing his job at the NBA Finals level in California with the Golden State Warriors. We are looking to celebrate his success as a student resident of here in Springfield. I ask for your 'aye' vote."
- Speaker Turner: "Lady moves for the adoption of House Joint Resolution 42. All in favor vote 'aye'; all opposed vote 'nay'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, please take the record. On a count of 112 voting 'yes', 0 voting 'no', 0 voting 'present', House Joint Resolution 42, having received the requisite amount of votes, is adopted. House Joint Resolution 43, Representative Unes. Representative Unes is recognized. Out of the record. House Resolution 21,

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- Representative Zalewski. Representative Zalewski is recognized."
- Zalewski: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Resolution 21 recognizes the victims and patients suffering from chronic fatigue syndrome, otherwise known as ME. We had substantive testimony in Representative Davis's committee earlier this year from a mother of a child with ME. This just simply asks us to do more to invest in research and funding of the disease. And I'd ask for an 'aye' vote."
- Speaker Turner: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of House Resolution 21. All in favor say 'aye'; all opposed say 'nay'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it. And the Resolution is adopted. House Resolution 55, Representative Brady. Representative Brady is recognized."
- Brady: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill... I'm sorry. House Resolution 55 simply seeks to acknowledge Grain Safety Bin Week here in the State of Illinois. And I ask for a 'yes' vote."
- Speaker Turner: "Gentleman moves for the adoption of House Resolution 55. All in favor say 'aye'; all opposed say 'nay'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it. And the Resolution is adopted. House Resolution 62, offered by Representative Davidsmeyer. Out of the record. House Resolution 87, offered by Representative Beiser. Representative Beiser is recognized."
- Beiser: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This came from our local building contractors. And they would ask that we just recognize a Construction Craft Day."

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Speaker Turner: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of House Resolution 87. All in favor say 'aye'; all opposed say 'nay'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it. And the Resolution is adopted. House Resolution 94, offered by Representative Winger."

Winger: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Resolution 94 calls for IDPH and ISBE to work together to provide guidance for developing and implementing a comprehensive water quality management plan. They shall report back on their work by 12/31/2017. This is in response to a large school district... suburban school district that had to close school for three days because there weren't really clear guidelines on how to react to Legionella in the water cooling tanks. And this should fix that going forward. So, this Bill is bipartisan supported and it is agreed upon."

Speaker Turner: "For further discussion, Representative Thapedi is recognized."

Thapedi: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Turner: "The Sponsor indicates that she will yield."

Thapedi: "Representative, just out of curiosity we had an issue come up in JCAR today that there were some discussions about where testing actually takes place; that apparently the State of Illinois has three or four of its own labs. Where would this testing take place?"

Winger: "Well, over the past year there has... there has been good work done in the school systems and with ISBE in planning for water quality plans to then encourage the school districts to create their own. So, this is not necessarily defining exactly where testing takes place. And in this particular issue with

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Legionella, it was detected within the water cooling system. And there wasn't a clear guideline on that as well. So, this is basically learning from... from lessons of the past and encouraging the schools to be more proactive in how they react to certain circumstances."

Thapedi: "And I certainly understand that. And I support your Resolution and I'm going to support it. I was just trying to get some clarification 'cause obviously if you're bringing something like this you know a lot more about the topic than... than we did on JCAR this morning. And apparently that issue arose that there were questions about where this testing could actually take place. That the State of Illinois is claiming that is doesn't have the facilities or at least the manpower, if you will, to test for Legionella. Just as you're talking about here in your Resolution, that they potentially want to outsource it. So, I don't know if you haven't even added that or that has absolutely nothing to do with what you're... what you're proposing today?"

Winger: "It... in this particular instance the school district I believe worked with heating and cooling professionals. So, it wasn't the state coming in and doing the water testing."

Thapedi: "Got it. Thank you."

Winger: "Thank you."

Speaker Turner: "Lady moves for the adoption of House Resolution 94. All in favor say 'aye'; all opposed say 'nay'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it. And the Resolution is adopted. House Resolution 77, offered by Representative Flowers. Representative Flowers is recognized."

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Flowers: "Excuse me, Mr. Speaker. Can you come back to my Resolution, please?"

Speaker Turner: "Yes, Ma'am."

Flowers: "Thank you."

Speaker Turner: "Out of the record. House Resolution 95,
Representative McDermed. Representative McDermed is recognized."

McDermed: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. This is a Resolution to ask the Federal Aviation Administration to approve a control tower for the Lewis Lockport Airport. I had some very interesting questions in committee. What are the planes there doing to be controlled at this time? And when I reported that what's happening right now is the planes talk to each other, everyone at the committee agreed that it was well past time to have a control tower. So, I'd like everyone's agreement to vote 'aye' on this Resolution to get a control tower at the very busy Lewis Lockport Airport. Thank you."

Speaker Turner: "Lady moves for the adoption of House Resolution 95. All in favor say 'aye'; all opposed say 'nay'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it. And the Resolution is adopted. Leader Durkin, for what reason do you seek recognition?"

Durkin: "Point of personal privilege."

Speaker Turner: "Please proceed, Sir."

Durkin: "I would like to recognize a former Member who has joined us today, who happens also to be a Member of the United States House of Representatives. One, Michael Bost who is to my right. If we could extend him a warm House of Representatives welcome, I would appreciate. But I also want to just say a

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few things about Mike. He's a busy guy. He also has a hobby. One of them is to impersonate Charlton Heston from the Ten Commandments, which we all witnessed a couple years ago. And some people suggested that may have been the gateway to the U.S. House. But Mike, thank you for joining us and good luck in Washington."

Speaker Turner: "Welcome back, Congressman Bost. Representative Bryant for what reason do you seek recognition?"

Bryant: "Point of personal privilege."

Speaker Turner: "Please proceed, Representative."

Bryant: "I would also like to welcome my predecessor, now Congressman Bost. I've been stacking up papers; I intended to throw them or to slam my microphone down, but I'm afraid I'll get charged for fixing the microphone. And I, too, appreciate, once again, that before I got here it was fixed."

Speaker Turner: "Thank you, Representative. House Resolution 77, Representative Flowers."

Flowers: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I move for the adoption of House Resolution 77, calling on the President to come to the City of Chicago to have a conference on gun violence. And when he come for gun violence, I would like for him to include job education training, housing. So, we could have a discussion as to what is going on on the south and west side of the City of Chicago and other parts of this state. And I move for its adoption."

Speaker Turner: "Lady moves for the adoption of House Resolution 77. All in favor say 'aye'; all opposed say 'nay'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it. And the Resolution is adopted. Mr. Clerk, committee announcements."

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Clerk Hollman: "The following committee was canceled for this afternoon: Government Consolidation & Modernization was canceled for this afternoon. Meeting at 1 p.m. is Public Utilities in Room 114, Transportation: Regulation, Roads & Bridges in C-1, Tourism, Hospitality & Craft Industries in D-1, Economic Opportunity in 118. Meeting at 2:30 is Environment in 413, Financial Institutions in Room 114, Judiciary-Criminal in Room 122."

Speaker Turner: "Mr. Clerk, Agreed Resolutions."

Clerk Hollman: "Agreed Resolutions. House Resolution 362, offered by Representative Moeller. House Resolution 363, offered by Representative Winger. House Resolution 365, offered by Representative Meier. House Resolution 368, offered by Representative Halpin. House Resolution 370, offered by Leader Durkin. House Resolution 371, offered by Representative Evans. House Resolution 373, offered by Representative Cavaletto. House Resolution 374, offered by Representative Cavaletto. House Resolution 375, offered by Representative Wallace."

Speaker Turner: "Leader Currie moves for the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions. All in favor say 'aye'; all opposed say 'nay'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it. And the Resolutions are adopted. And now, allowing perfunctory time for the Clerk, Leader Currie moves that the House adjourn until Wednesday, May 10 at 11 a.m., Wednesday, May 10, 11 a.m. All in favor say 'aye'; all opposed say 'nay'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it. And the House is adjourned."

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Clerk Hollman: "House Perfunctory Session will come to order. Introduction and First Reading of Senate Bills.
