Speaker Blair: "The House will be in order. The invocation will be Dr. Johnson."

Johnson: "Shall we pray. We do not approach You, our heavenly Father as a taskmaster, but rather as One Who is undisputed master of our lives. We ask Your divine direction which we have begun this day in this week. Keep us mindful that other depend upon our faithful efforts, even as we are dependent upon theirs. Guide us whenever we are confronted with difficult decisions, especially those which involve Your will for us and which will effect our relationship with others. Let all that we do in this hall of government be an expression of the concern which You have for us and which, through us, You have for whom we represent. Implant in us now the power of Your spirit without whom we can do nothing displeasing in Your sight. In that spirit we are moved to pray for this day. Amen."

Speaker Blair: "Announcements from the Clerk."

Clerk Selcke: "Could I have your attention please? I have an announcement to make. The House softball practice will be next Tuesday, May 21; at Lincoln Park, Diamond #5, from 5:00 P.M. to 7:00 P.M. Please bring your own equipment. The House softball practice, yeh, the 21st I said. Tuesday, the 21st, tomorrow night. Lincoln Park, Diamond #5, 5:00 to 7:00."

Speaker Blair: "Introductions First Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 2810. Grotberg. Appropriates \$38,000 to the Department of Transportation. First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 2811. McCourt. Creates the Cable Television Study Commission. First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 2812. Appropriates \$80,000 to the Cable Television Study Commission. First Reading of the Bill. No other..."

Speaker Blair: "Senate Bills' First Reading."



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Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 1227. Amends the Township Act. First Reading of the Bill. Senate Bill 1269. Appropriations to the Expense Commission of Economic Development. First Reading of the Bill. Senate Bill 1421. Appropriations for certain distributive ventures of the Department of Public Aid. First Reading of the Bill. Senate Bill 1422. An Act to amend an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Department of Public Aid. First Reading of the Bill. 1423, an Act to amend an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Department of Public Aid. First Reading of the Bill. 1477, an Act exempting from Use Tax and tangible personal property. First Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Union, Mr. Choate."

Choate: "Mr. Speaker, would you have the Clerk ah... to please indicate in the record ah... that Representatives Redmond and Boyle ah... both have an official absence today?"

Speaker Blair: "The record will so indicate. All right, we're going to Second Reading now ah.... House Bills. And in accordance with the rules, I want to inform the House as to how the Chair intends to proceed. We're going to proceed down the order by which they would expire ah.... and ah... within each date by ah.. their ah... chronological number. All right, and.... ah.... there are about a dozen R.T.A. Bills and they will all be in one group together and they come in ah they're grouped right together too. So we'll be calling all of those ah.... as we get down to them. O'kay, now ah... first then is House Bill 2277 ah.. and that's Mr. Shea. Ah.... the Secretary of State's Appropriation. We will take that out of the record for now. 2346 ah.... is Mr. Lundy. Do you want that called, Mr. Lundy? 2346, on Second Reading?"



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Lundy: "Mr. Speaker, there was an Amendment offered ah... a Committee Amendment offered in the ah.. Appropriations Committee, which I don't believe has been distributed. Ah at least if it has, I don't have it yet. So can we take that out of the record until Mr. Lechowicz arrives on the floor? It's his Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "Well, all right."

Speaker Murphy: "It's been distributed, yes. Proceed."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 2346, Lundy. A Bill for an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Illinois Arts Council. Second Reading of the Bill. Ah... one Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 2346 on page 1, line 1 and so forth."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Lundy."

Lundy: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, ah... Mr. Speaker, ah... Representative Lechowicz, ah... who is the Sponsor of this Amendment ah.. in the Committee is not on the floor. So I thought that we had agreed earlier to take it out of the record until he is present ah... to explain the Amendment. Unless ah...."

Speaker Murphy: "Mr. Lundy, the Amendment is printed and the Amendment is on the floor. Just as a courtesy to Representative Lechowicz, you mean?"

Lundy: "That... that was my impression. Representative Hanahan was also ah... on the Committee and he's urging me to go forward. If that's agreeable with you, I will do so."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from McHenry, ah.... turn on the light for Representative Lechowicz's seat, will you please? The light for Representative Lechowicz. Representative Hanahan. Lechowicz...."

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker, this is a Committee Amendment ah... Amendment #1 and it redistributes the total of the request to provide \$40,000 for personal services, retire-



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ment and social security. \$30,000 for evaluation and review of grant programs. \$25,000 for a challenge fund for which the agency can draw \$1.00 for every \$3.00 in matching contributions. \$50,000 in grants for locally sponsored community art councils. And a specific identification of grant programs by discipline \$100,000 in matching funds to the Chicago Symphony to tour Europe. \$50,000 of this amount is a transfer from the business and economic development budget. And I move for its adoption."

Speaker Murphy: "Ah... any discussion from the floor? Ah... Representative Collins."

Collins: "Ah... will the Gentlemen yield for a question? I ah.. I came in a little late. Is this Amendment raising the ah... total or lowering it?"

Hanahan: "Yes, this increases the ah.... the expenditure ah.. it's a \$50,000 increase."

Collins: "A \$50,000 increase? To what total?"

Hanahan: "One of the main reasons is \$100,000 in matching funds for the Chicago Symphony Orchestra to tour Europe, which is very important to the Arts Council ah.. for that to ah.... that expenditure to be made so that they could have a matching grant of \$100,000 for the Chicago Symphony to make this tour."

Collins: "Wouldn't it be cheaper to buy a one way ticket to the Free Street Theater? Well, if this is an increase, I would urge a 'no' vote on any Amendment for the Arts Council. This is obviously just more money that's going to be poured down the rat hole. What is the total?"

Hanahan: "The total is \$1, ah.... with this Amendment, it would be \$1,055,000. The original Bill was for \$1,005,000 but it did not include the \$100,000 change. We're reducing, by the way ah.. Representative, it might be of some interest, what we're changing by the ah... well,..."

Speaker Murphy: "Representative, ah... will you hold that mike down just a little bit? That's it."

Hanahan: "The input that the Appropriations Committee both ah... the Republican and Democratic Members had is to remove \$145,000 from the grant ah... that I think you would personally have more of an objection to. We're reducing that down by \$145,000. What we're doing is really redistributing the amount of money that we came up with because of this other \$100,000 for the Chicago Symphony ah.. an actual increase, but in the area that you have shown ah.. in the past Sessions, of most concern ah.. we are reducing that amount by \$145,000."

Collins: "Well, I have to say in seriousness that I applaud you for your reductions that you made in this lateful program and I ah.. in all seriousness ah.. I think that we should support something as worthy as the Chicago Symphony. However, ah.. on Third Reading, I think I'll have some comments as to the simpleness of spending \$1,000,000 plus on such a horrible program. Thank you."

Hanahan: "What I would suggest, Representative, is that possibly in ah... your own position; it would be better to vote 'no' on Third Reading rather than to destroy this Amendment that would be better than the Bill as introduced."

Speaker Murphy: "Does anybody wish to speak to the Amendment? Representative Grotberg."

Grotberg: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I rise in support of this Amendment, Mr. Hanahan and I would just like to do that on the display of party unity ah... and probably the most conservative dollar we can spend is to appropriate small amounts of money for the Arts Council to make sure that civilization does not wither up entirely while we are down here doing out best to undo several other things. Thank you."



Speaker Murphy: "Any further discussion? The Gentleman from Macon, Representative Borchers."

Borchers: "Mr. Speaker and fellow Members of the House, I hate to oppose this ah... Amendment, but I feel that I must.. It doesn't matter whether we spend money for important or unimportant things it seems around here. This is one of the things that I consider ah... rather unimportant. You start with about a \$200,000 Bill and now it's well over \$1,000,000 and still going up. I'd like to point out that civilization has continued and will continue as long as we don't blow ourselves up.... without spending some of the taxpayers hard earned money. And I've seen some of the activities in Chicago and downstate that ah... are done with these people and I just feel that we could save on money and put it to better uses than in this kind of activity. Thank you."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Lundy may close the dabate."

Lundy: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Let me just say ah.. with respect to this Amendment that although it appears to add \$50,000 to the Arts Council Appropriation ah... in effect, it does not do that because what the Appropriations Committee and its staff has determined is that ah... that \$100,000 which the Governor has committed the state to spend in support of the Chicago Symphony's Overseas Tour ah.... \$50,000 was supposed to come from the Arts Council's budget and \$50,000 from the budget of the Department of Business and Economic Development. The Committee felt, and I think properly so, that the entire amount should come out of the Arts Council's budget and therefore ah... \$50,000 was added to the Arts Council's budget and will be cut from the budget of the Department of Business and Economic Development. There is no net increase in cost to the state from this Amendment. So if you will ah....



if you want to oppose the Art Council because of the expenditures on the Art, that's fine, but this Amendment in effect, does not add any money to the Arts Council's budget."

Speaker Murphy: "All right, the question is on the Amendment to House Bill 2346. All in favor of the Amendment signify by voting 'aye' and the contrary 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Third Reading. Ah... the ah.. Representative from Cook, Representative Shea, ah.. is he on the floor? 2277... we want to go back to 2277 for a minute. Representative Grotberg, for what reason do you rise?"

Grotberg: "A point of personal privilege."

Speaker Murphy: "State your point."

Grotberg: "Ah... I do apologize, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House and thank you, Mr. Speaker ah... that National Pickle Week was last week and by some secretarial and stenographic error, we've failed to bring the reminder to the House of Representatives that St. Charles is the the Pickle Capital of the World. We hope that it does not interrupt the proceedings, but due to the fact that Miss U.S.A. as of last night is from St. Charles, I thought it would be nice if we all gave her a little squeek and be glad we're Repre..... thank you very much."

Speaker Murphy: "Those were the pickles last week anyhow."

Clerk Muprhy: "House Bill 2277. A Bill for an Act making an appropriation to the Secretary of State. Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments. Committee Amendment #1. Amend House Bill 2277 on page 3, line 9 and so forth."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, the first Committee Amendment reduces the appropriation



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by ah.. in excess of \$1,000,000 and I would move for the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Murphy: "Is there any discussion? The question is ah... the Gentleman from C ook, Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Would he yield for a question?"

Shea: "I will."

Speaker Murphy: "He indicates he will."

Schlickman: "In what area does this reduction of \$1,000,000 taking place?"

Shea: "You have the Bill in front of you, Representative. And I'll go over my notes and ah.. I think they're fairly complete. On page three, for personal services in the Department of Physical Services ah... that amount is reduced by \$25,000. For contractual services in the same department, that's decreased by \$100,000. State Retirement Fund is \$16,000. \$13,000 for Social Security contributions ah.. for a reduction of \$127,900 in the Physical Services Department. In the Department of Motor Vehicles there's a reduction in physicians of \$205,000 and \$35,000 in the extra help catagory. \$120,000 in contractual. \$50,000 in printing and \$20,000 for commodities ah... I'm sorry.... \$120,000 in contractual and \$50,000 in travel and \$20,000 in printing and \$15,000 in commodities and \$21,200 in automobile operations for a total of \$466,200."

Schlickman: "Is that it?"

Shea: "On page 5 in the Commercial Department; contractual services is reduced by \$40,000 and commodities by \$5,500 and equipment by \$5,800 for a total reduction of \$51,300. In the Department of Communications the printing is reduced..... that's on page 6, line 12.... it's reduced by \$26,000."

Schlickman: "Before you go any further with detail, are there any program changes?"



Shea: "Pardon me?"

Schlickman: "Are there any changes in program?"

Shea: "Not to my knowledge. There's a reduction ah... the Secretary tells me that there is a reduction from 3961 down to 3600."

Schlickman: "Thank you very much."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Representative Hudson is recognized."

Hudson: "Mr. Speaker, point of order. It seems to me ah... that the speaking system today is of the poorest quality maybe ah.. that we've experienced to date. I'm having difficulty hearing ah... particularly from up there. I'm sure you're aware of it. I just wondered if anything is being done about this."

Speaker Murphy: "Representative Hudson, you're point is well taken, but ah... we did have the sound engineers in here last week and they worked them all over and the consequence is that they don't work as good as they did before. So we are aware of it and ah..... we've called SONY and we're going to try and do something about it. The question is ah..... the question is on Amendment #1 to House Bill 2277. All in favor signify by voting 'aye' and the opposed by voting 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Third Reading. No, no.... oops."

Clerk Selcke: "Committee Amendment #2. Amend House Bill 2277 as follows on page 1, line 16 and so forth."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this Amendment puts in a 5% cost of living increase for the Secretary of State employees and I would move for it's adoption."

Speaker Murphy: "Is there any discussion? If not, the question is on Amendment #2. All those in favor signify by voting 'aye' and the contrary 'nay' and the 'ayes' have



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the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk Selcke: "Amendment #3. Shea. Amends House Bill 2277, page 11 and so forth."

Speaker Murphy: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, I withdraw that Amendment at this time and ask that the Bill be put on the Order of Third Reading."

Speaker Murphy: "Okay. He withdraws Amendment #3 and asks that the Bill be moved to Third Reading. Are there any further Amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 2353."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 20 what?"

Speaker Murphy: "2353."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 2353. A Bill for an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expenses of certain agencies of state government. Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments. Amend House Bill 23... Committee Amendment #1, Amend House Bill 2353, page 1, line 11 and so forth."

Speaker Murphy: "Maragos. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Maragos."

Maragos: "Representative Washburn on Amendment, I'll accept Amendment #1 and...ah...table Amendment #1, or #2, which one you saving me?"

Speaker Murphy: "Representative Washburn."

Washburn: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Table 1... #1, was bound to be an error, had a flaw in it and I would move that Amendment #1 be tabled."

Maragos: "I have no objections."

Speaker Murphy: "Ah... Is there leave to table Amendment #1? No objections? Amendment #1 is tabled."



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Clerk Selcke: "Committee Amendment #2. Amends House Bill 2353 on page 3, line 17 and so forth."

Speaker Murphy: "Representative Maragos."

Maragos: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. I have brought forth some objections to the Amendment #2...ah... of this Bill, because I have been negotiating with the staff of both the Appropriations Committee on both sides of the aisle to try to impress upon them that there was some mistaken notion at the time that the staff recommended that these Amendments be reduced. And for those of us who...ah...would...ah... I have learned now that there's no further drafts in the United States, as far as the Military Establishment. The only area, where we can become involved, where we can have a source of a military personnel, is through the National Guard and the Reserves and part of the cuts that will be instituted by this Amendment #2 is in the area of the National Guard Armory and for those of us who may not be aware, the National Guard Armory will be turned over fully in 1981 to the State of Illinois and unless we keep them in a, and maintain them until that time, we'll find that these buildings will be unusable and it will cost us ten times as much as it would today to maintain them or repair them and put them in proper condition. Therefore, at this time, I respectfully object to the placing of Amendment #2 on this Bill that reduces those Armory Bills, plus other areas which have been given to me to understand that they are necessary by the Department, the Naval Department and the Military Department. I would also like to state that in the area, that that there was a mistake



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notion given to the staff and I blame the Military and Naval Department for not conveying that information properly to the Staff and that is that a lot of these guards... a lot of these guards that are need, additional guards to safeguard the equipment that is operated by the National Guard and it's really equipment of the Federal Government, they have almost mandatory orders now to keep additional guards on those sights and...and in view of that, I would like at this time, if I can Mr. Speaker, Members of the House to... Not to table Amendment #2 until we go...and I'll put this Bill to Third Reading and come back if we have it... We can work out some solution with the Military Government...with the Military and Naval Department before it goes over to the Senate."

Speaker Murphy: "Is there any further discussion? The Gentleman from Grundy, Representative Washburn."

Washburn: "Thank you Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Amendment #2...ah...does reduce Armory operations, as the good Representative pointed out, by four hundred and fifty seven thousand. But it also increases the improvement fund by a hundred and sixty thousand. This Amendment was adopted, Amendment #2 was adopted in Committee by a vote of 23 to 0 and I move for the adoption of Amendment #2 to House Bill 2353."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea."

Shea: "I'm wondering if Mr. Maragos, would yield to a question."

Speaker Murphy: "He indicates he will."

Shea: "Ah...Sam, I've taken a look at some of the National Guard Armories throughout the State and particularly the



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one on Chicago Avenue and Michigan Boulevard and I just want to tell you I think they're in disgraceful condition. Now, is there anything in these appropriations to clean up the Armorys?"

Maragos: "Mr. Speaker, there is and to maintain the Armorys there's a three hundred thousand dollars, or so, I don't have my Bill in front of me right now, is to maintain these Armorys and in...according to the Military Naval Department, the Armorys in six counties downstate, plus the Armory northwest will be completely eliminated as well as the Chicago Armory will be reduced, as far as the maintenance goes, was the information I received."

Shea: "Well, Sam, what I'd like you to do is, will you tell me by the time this Bill gets to Third Reading if there's money in here to clean up the Armorys?"

Maragos: "They...they already have some budgeting to clean it up, but the thing is in addition to cleaning up they also need maintenance. Mr. Speaker, can we pass this for about fifteen minutes till I get my materials? Because I just got into the Floor. Take it out of the record for a few minutes?"

Speaker Murphy: "Do you want to take it out of the record...ah... Who's in charge of the Bill? Representative Washburn, are you willing to take it out of the record for a little bit? There's only a couple more Bills though."

Maragos: "Give me... Mr. Speaker, if I could have ten minutes to get my materials out and...ah...explain..."

Speaker Murphy: "Representative Washburn, he's asking for ten minutes to take it out of the record."

Washburn: "Okay."

Speaker Murphy: "Okay. Leave. Take it out of the record."



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For what reason does the Gentleman from McHenry... Yes, we are coming back to that. For what reason does the Gentleman from McHenry arise? The Gentleman from Lake, Representative Matijevich, my old colleague."

Matijevich: "No comment, being both of us are from Lake. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I rise on a Point of Personal Privilege and I know that many have done that many, many times and they always say, 'I've never risen before', and frankly, I don't think I have, but if I have, I'm sorry. Ah...today, I have introduced a Resolution, House Resolution 925. I'm not sure it's even been read into the record yet. But I introduced that with full fence of knowing what my Legislative responsibility is and I'll build up on why I now talk to you on a Point of Personal Privilege. Ah... this morning, Jim Houlihan, Representative Jim Houlihan and I had a press conference, which led to the introduction of House Resolution 925. It re...it refers to the hiring, to the hiring of former Attorney...former U.S. Attorney General Richard Klinedene...ah...all right, he has a Point of Order. Go ahead."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Juckett."

Juckett: "Well thank you Mr. Speaker, but I think a Point of Order would be in order here, that we were not on this Point of business, and I don't see where this is a Point of Personal Privilege. At the time of the introduction of the Resolution you would like to make a speech, then I think it would be appropriate, but not in this Order of Business."

Matijevich: "Mr...Mr. Speaker."



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Speaker Murphy: "Your point on the Resolution is correct, but he does have the right to be up on the point of personal privilege and on the point of personal privilege, I rule him in order."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, thank you very much and I think everybody in this House will agree with you when I'm through with my personal privilege because I was called something and I think..I have...I have the right to respond. Now this Resolution has to do with the hiring of former U.S. Attorney Richard G. Klinbring on a contractual basis, I believe, by our Attorney General, Bill Scott. Now Jim Houlihan and I have objected to this and we feel that the Attorney General, Bill Scott, who parades as the champion of the people's right to know ought to tell all of us why he hired Richard Klinbring in the first place. In my mind we have enough of a cast of characters in the Watergate cover-up in the administration in Washington that we in Illinois through the Attorney General's office should not be an employment agency for those...those who have now been found guilty of the federal crime so we introduce this Resolution in good conscience. Coming down here...I know you can't hear me, I guess some would rather have it that way, especially our Attorney General, Bill Scott. But coming down here to Springfield I heard on the radio where the Attorney General has called me and Jim Houlihan a stooge of the Governor and this was my objection and this is why I rise on a point of personal privilege..."

Speaker Murphy: "...the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "The Gentleman is not coming through too well over here, but I understood him to be up on a point of personal privilege and he's talking about something



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having to do with the former Attorney General of the United States. Now I would suggest to you, Mr. Speaker, that you have him state his point and sit down."

Speaker Murphy: "Your point is well taken as far as the Resolution is concerned and the former Attorney General of the United States is concerned, so John, Representative Matijevich, I do suggest that you speak on personal privilege and not on the Resolution and not on the former Attorney General, speak on your point of personal privilege."

Matijevich: "Alright, Mr. Speaker, and Members of the House, I just got to that point. The point is that I'm not anybody's stooge and the Attorney General ought to know it. He ought to know it by some action that's been here on the floor of the House. I think he's probably got more stooges than anybody, not that he's got any stooges on the floor of this House, but I've never been a stooge of anybody, I haven't been a stooge of the Democratic leadership. I haven't been a stooge of the Governor...when it was reported that I, as a State Central Committeemen, might vote for voting the State party chairman to a two year term, that obviously was the Governor's feeling, I didn't vote that way. I'm not his stooge, and if you'll check the record, I have voted against the Governor on his vetoes as much as anybody else on the floor of this House. I'm not anybody's stooge. Now...I guess I'm coming loud and clear now. Now Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I remember in my day, I use to like to watch the Three Stooges, there's only two of us, Jim Houlihan and I, and I would request now that anybody who believes as I do as...that they could join me as a co-sponsor of... in House Resolution 925 and show the Attorney General that I'm not acting as a stooge and he's got a lot of answers to give to this Body and the people of the State



of Illinois. Thank you Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Murphy: "Okay, John, we all know that you're not ...you and my very good friend, Representative Houlihan, are not stooges, we know that. House Bill 2353, on Second Reading. House Bill 2382 on Second Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 2382. A Bill for an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense to the Bureau of the Budget. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2382, page 1, line 12, and so forth."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Kankakee, Representative George Ryan."

Ryan: "Thank you Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment #1 to House Bill 2382 was recommended by the Committee. It's a reduction of \$52,800, it was an attempt to keep the Bureau of the Budget from becoming a political dumping ground for the political rejects of the Senate. I have been assured through the mails, a letter from Director Hovey, that that certainly isn't going to take place and he guarantees me that he'll have this cleared up shortly and since I have this assurance of this matter, I would move to table Amendment #1 to House Bill 2382."

Speaker Murphy: "Any further discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea."

Shea: "Could the sponsor of the Amendment tell me what it did before he was going to table it?"

Ryan: "It decreased it by \$52,800."

Shea: "In other words, you are now going to leave that at the original amount?"

Ryan: "I can't hear you, Jerry."

Shea: "Are you going to leave...Amendment #1 would have reduced it by \$52,000?"

Ryan: "Right."

Shea: "You do now want to table that Amendment, you feel that



is not necessary."

Ryan: "Right."

Shea: "Thank you."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Kankakee moves to table Amendment #1 to House Bill 2382. Are there any objections? If not, the Amendment is tabled. Any further Amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 2267. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Epton."

Epton: "Mr. Speaker, if I may interrupt the proceedings for just a moment, last week, in error, my vote was erroneously recorded on House Bill 2640, Amendment #4, I was not on the floor at the time and I came out in response to my name being called and whether the Speaker or the Clerk made an error, I don't know, but I'd like to ask leave of the House to have my vote properly recorded as it should have been. I am as no on Amendment #4 and I should have been recorded as yes and I'd like leave of the House to have the record changed."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook is asking leave of the House to show his vote as aye on Amendment #4 to what?"

Epton: "House Bill 2640."

Speaker Murphy: "...House Bill 2640, last week, is leave granted? Leave is granted and the Clerk will change the change in the vote."

Epton: "Thank you."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Randolph."

Randolph: "Mr. Speaker, I was absent when Amendment #4 was before the House, I was..I went to a wake of a relative in Lincoln and I'd like to be recorded and given unanimous consent to be recorded as voting aye on Amendment #4 of the same Bill."



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Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Randolph, has asked for the same privilege to be recorded as aye. Any objections? Leave is granted. House Bill 2267."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 2267. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections 194 and 195 of the Revenue Act of '39. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Murphy: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk Selcke: "Amendment #1. Skinner. Amend House Bill 2267 on page 4 by deleting lines 28 and 29 and so forth."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "I would ask leave to have Amendment #1 tabled."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman asks leave to have Amendment #1 tabled. Any objections? Leave is granted. Amendment #1 is tabled."

Clerk Selcke: "Amendment #2. Skinner. Amend House Bill 2267, page 4, by deleting lines 28 through 29 and so forth."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Amendment #2 rectifies an oversight in the ability of the county collector to contribute taxes paid under protest. At the present time, the collector has two alternatives. Number one, he may retain in escrow 100 per cent of the taxes paid under protest or he may retain 1 per cent of the total taxes collected. If this Amendment passes, he would be able to legally distribute all of the taxes that are paid under protest. Now this is a feasible alternative and a workable alternative because the State law now allows for successful tax protestors to get their money back from the next year's collection."

Speaker Murphy: "Is there any further discussion? The



Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea."

Shea: "I don't seem to have a copy of this Amendment on my desk."

Speaker Murphy: "Have these Amendments been distributed, Mr. Clerk?"

Clerk Selcke: "Yes."

Speaker Murphy: "The Amendments have been distributed. Correction, they have not been distributed. Take it from the record."

Clerk Selcke: "Out of the record?"

Speaker Murphy: "Out of the record. 2258. Oh, Amendment #1 is tabled, but take 2267 from the record. 2258 is the next one."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 2358. Adeline wants you."

Speaker Murphy: "The lovely Lady from Lake."

Geo-Karis: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, your beauty is only exceeded by your great ability. Mr. Speaker, I'd like to ask leave of the House and of the sponsor on House Bill 2258, I believe you just called that earlier, Mr. Clerk?"

Speaker Murphy: "2358."

Geo-Karis: "I take it back, but may I ask the House at this time to be approached...to be...a...co-sponsor on House Bill 2258, with the sponsor's permission?"

Speaker Murphy: "Is there any objection? Could Representative Geo-Karis be a House sponsor of House Bill 2258? Hearing none, I..."

Geo-Karis: "...thank you very much."

Speaker Murphy: "You tell it to the Clerk up there, will you?"

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 2358. A Bill for an Act to provide for the original and contingent expense of the Department of Insurance. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2358 on page 1 and so forth."



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Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Mugalian, is recognized."

Mugalian: "Would you take that from the record, please?"

Speaker Murphy: "He'd like that taken from the record.

You may have run out of time on this Representative Mugalian, but as you wish, we'll take it from the record."

Mugalian: "Thank you."

Speaker Murphy: "Take...take it from the record. 2403."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 2403. A Bill for an Act making supplemental appropriation to the Department of Personnel. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Murphy: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

The question is...Third Reading. House Bill 2417."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 2417. A Bill for an Act making supplemental appropriations to the Department of General Services. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 2417 on page 1, line 18, and so forth."

Speaker Murphy: "Representative Krause is recognized."

Krause: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. House Bill 2417 is a supplemental appropriation to the Department of General Services and what the Amendment does is reduce the appropriation by \$47,047 and I move for the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Murphy: "Is there any discussion? The question is does this Amendment pass. All in favor signify by voting aye, those opposed by voting nay. The Amendment is adopted. Are there any further Amendments? Third Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "Did you move that to Third?"

Speaker Murphy: "Um-hum, I did, Third Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "Alright, give me the next one."

Speaker Murphy: "2418."



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Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 2418. A Bill for an Act to make supplemental appropriation to the Department of General Services. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Murphy: "Are there any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. 2453."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 2453. Katz. A Bill for an Act to amend Section 1 of an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense of the State Civil Service Commission. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Murphy: "Any Amendment from the floor? Third Reading. 2454."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 2454. Taylor. Is he here?"

Speaker Murphy: "Representative Taylor here?"

Clerk Selcke: "Oh, a Bill for an Act to amend Section 1 of an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense to the office of the Commissioner of Savings and Loan. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Murphy: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. 2455."

Clerk Selcke: "2455. A Bill for an Act making Amendments to Section 1 of an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense to the office of Commissioner of Banks and Trusts. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Murphy: "Are there any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "2456. McClain. A Bill for an Act amending Sections 1 and 2 of an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense to the Department of Registration and Education. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."



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Speaker Murphy: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 2457. Matijevich. Is he here?"

Speaker Murphy: "Yes, he's here."

Clerk Selcke: "A Bill for an Act making additional appropriation to the Department of Mental Health. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Murphy: "Are there any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 2460. Hill. A Bill for an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense to the Illinois Commission on Intergovernmental Cooperation. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Murphy: "Are there any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "2489. Berman. A Bill for an Act making additional appropriation to the Superintendent of Public Instruction. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Murphy: "Are there any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. 2543."

Clerk Selcke: "2543. A Bill for an Act making appropriations to the State Board of Elections. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Shea and Collins. Amend House Bill 2543, page 1, line 9 and so forth."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Collins. A...Committee Amendment."

Collins: "Committee Amendment #1?"

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea. Any discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, I thought we were on 2543."

Clerk Selcke: "My mistake...a...my mistake."



Lechowicz: "Is it 2543? Thank you, I'll defer it to Representative Shea."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Committee Amendment #1 reduces personal services by \$200,900, retirement by \$11,900, social security by \$9200, and then provides a new line item of \$90,000 for data processing, a total reduction of \$132,000, I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Dundee, Representative Washburn. Alright, the Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 2543. All in favor of the Amendment signify by voting aye, contrary no, the ayes have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments? Third Reading. 2609."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 2609. A Bill for an Act to amend Section 4 of an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense of the Department of Labor. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Murphy: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 2714. Shea. A Bill for an Act appropriating certain unexpended monies appropriated by the Public Act 78-195 to the Department of Transportation. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Murphy: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "2754. A Bill for an Act to amend Section 2 of an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense of the Office of Superintendent Instruction. Berman...out of the record."



Speaker Murphy: "Out of the record. Okay. Ah...What's the next one? Are you ready on 2358, Representative Maragos? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Maragos."

Maragos: "Mr. Speaker, the Committee...ah...Mr...Representative Washburn and I have decided to pull it out of the record until tomorrow till we can discuss this Amendment, before we proceed. Thank you."

Speaker Murphy: "I just want to interrupt a minute and introduce an old colleague of ours from the House and the former...ah...one of the former leaders of the Senate and my colleague from Lake County, Representative and Senator Bob Coulson. Standing at the rear of the Chamber. House Bill 1277."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 1277. McMaster. Is he here? McMaster."

Speaker Murphy: "Is Representative McMaster here? There he is."

Clerk Selcke: "A Bill for an Act to amend Sections 3, 5 and 6 of the surface, mine land conservation, reclamation Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 1277, page 1 and so forth."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Knox, Representative McMaster."

McMaster: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. The Committee Amendment to House Bill 1277 is a complete rewriting of the original Bill. To fit the various things that the subcommittee, that was chaired by Representative Ken Boyle and myself, found out in the course of three hearings in the State of Illinois. It is rather a long Amendment. I would be glad to explain it if anybody would so desire. It came out of Committee 20 to 0,



with the Committee Amendment. Ah...we did not have any opposing testimony. The mining industry did not oppose the Legislation and I would...ah...urge the adoption of the Amendment and move the Bill to Third Reading."

Speaker Murphy: "Any further discussion? If not, the question is...ah... The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Would the Sponsor...would the Sponsor yield for a question?"

McMaster: "Yeah."

Schlickman: "How does the Amendment differ from the description of the Bill, as contained in the Digest?"

McMaster: "Can you hear me now? I would have to look at the description in the Digest. Actually it is in regard to replacing surface soil on the reclaimed land after the land has been graded. This would only be done on land that is being returned to row crops. We set up an advisory board for the Department of Mines and Minerals that will not go to the Department of Conservation as was in the original...ah...ah...synopsis of the Bill. It will stay in the Department of Mines and Minerals. We...ah...provide an advisory Board for the Department in regard to reclamation plans. We provide in a separate Bill the necessary appropriation for this Department to fund the advisory commission and beyond that if there's anything else I'd go ahead and be happy to answer then, Gene."

Schlickman: "Is this a Committee Amendment?"

McMaster: "Yes, it is a Committee Amendment, recommended by the subcommittee that...ah...Boyle and I chaired



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and adopted by the Committee some two weeks ago, I believe."

Schlickman: "What is the principal thrust of the Amendment?"

McMaster: "Well, the original Bill called for replacement of four feet of top soil. We...ah...defined what we mean by top soil, we, as to the darkened surface horizon, we are recommending eighteen inches where such is available and where it is not available...ah...a minimum of eight inches. We...ah... also provide for the soil beneath the surface soil we're replacing to get a water holding capacity to the total depth of four feet when you consider the eighteen inches and the prescribed soil underneath that."

Schlickman: "Thank you."

Speaker Murphy: "Any further discussion? If not, the question is, on the adoption of the Amendment. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', those opposed by 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments? Third Reading. 2128."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 21...ah...28. Skinner. A Bill for an Act to amend Section 4-.101 of the Regional Transportations..."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Representative Skinner."

Clerk Selcke: "Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee ... No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Murphy: "No Committee Amendments. Are there any Amendments from the Floor?"

Clerk Selcke: "Amendment #1. Skinner, amend House Bill 2128 on page 2, line 27 and so forth."



Skinner: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House."

Speaker Murphy: "Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "This is the first R.T.A. Bill to be considered today and what it does is make, this is an earmarking Bill. What it does is take the present Bill and turn it into a hundred percent earmarking Bill for the money which is raised through R.T.A. taxes within each transportation region. At the present time it reads two thirds, we're changing it to a hundred and dropping out the other earmarking of the fares strengthened from the State Federal subsidy. I move for it's adoption."

Speaker Murphy: "Any discussion? Is there any discussion? If not, the question is on the adoption of the Amendment. All in favor... All in favor of the adoption of this Amendment signify by saying 'aye', those contrary by saying 'nay'. The Amendment's adopted. I hope you know what you're adopting. Third Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 2129. Katz. Out of the record. 2132. Deuster. A Bill for an Act to amend Section 4.01 of the Regional Transportation Authority Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Murphy: "Any Amendments from the Floor? Third Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "2133. Totten. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections 1.03 and 4.03 of the Regional Transportation Authority Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments. We'd like leave of the House to go out of order a few minutes and read some Agreed Resolutions, just to save the time of the House. Do I have leave? Leave. These are Death Resolutions. The House will be in order for the reading of some Death Resolutions."



Clerk Selcke: "Ah...House Resolution 896. Leinenweber et al.

In respect of the memory of Professor Francis J.

'Frank' O'Mally. House Resolution...ah...926.

Merlo et al. In respect of the memory of Mr. Louis

Suelganic. House Resolution 972. Davis et al.

Whereas, the Members of this House have learned with great sadness of the death of Mrs. Nellie B. Dawson, widow of the late and great Congressman, William L. Dawson, of Illinois. And whereas, Mrs. Dawson passed away, Saturday, May 18, 1974, at her home in Chicago. Is a native of Louisville, Kentucky, where she was born seventy eight years ago. And whereas, Mrs. Dawson, the daughter of Minister, was a schoolteacher in Washington D.C. at the time of her marriage in 1921 to the future Congressman, from Chicago. And whereas, Mrs. Dawson, was an inspiration to her late husband and a noble partner in the great work he undertook for the people of his Chicago Congressional District. And whereas, Mrs. Dawson shared in the Congressmans distinguished carrer which was highlighted by his service as the only black member of the United States Congress, when he was elected in 1942 and later as the first black man to share a major Congressional Committee, the House Committee on Government Operations and whereas, Mrs. Dawson was an active and devoted participant..."

Speaker Murphy: "Ah...Ladies and Gentlemen, we're reading a Death Resolution and I would ask you to please be quiet while Death Resolutions are being read. Proceed Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Selcke: "Whereas Mrs. Dawson was an active and devoted participant in the Christian Science Movement, a Member of the Aged Church of Christ Science in Chicago.



And, whereas this outstanding woman will be sorely missed by a multitude of friends especially by the members of her family, including her son, William L. Dawson, Jr. Be it therefore resolved by the House of Representatives of the seventy-eighth General Assembly of the State of Illinois, that Members of this House join in expressing a great sadness at the Death of Mrs. William L. Dawson and extending our sincere, heartfelt sympathy to the members of her family. And be it further resolved that a suitable copy of this preamble and Resolution be forwarded to Mrs. Dawsons family as a token of our respect for this wonderful woman. Ah...Corneal wants to talk."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Corneal Davis."

Davis: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This is a Death Resolution for the widow of Congressman, William L. Dawson, who passed not long ago. Congressman Dawson, was both a distinguished Republican at one time and a distinguished Democrat. He served as Chairman of the Committee on Government Operations. He enjoyed the love and affection of men of both parties. He was a confident of presidents of the Nation and I'm asking that those of you on both sides of the aisle who would like to join in this Death Resolution for his widow, to please indicate. Or if we can not include all of you, if there are any objections then you may object to your name being put on there. His widow was a distinguished Christian Science Reader, who had many clients. Some...ah...that are known to us here, who came to her. They were great leaders and I can recall some of the



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statements that will live with me and live with those who knew the Congressman from many, many years. I can imagine hearing him say now, that if any many hates me because of the color God gave me, let him take it up with the Lord. Don't take it up with me, This was his philosophy. Not to hate people because of the color that God gave them. Not only was Chicago and Illinois better off but this nation was better off because of a man by the name of William L. Dawson, who had the respect and admiration of the leaders of this nation on, in both parties, lived and exercised influence in this great nation. They were also better, men and women, because of his distinguished wife, who was an advisor and a spiritual leader to many, many clients who came before her. Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House; I'd like to have you join me and I move the adoption of this Death Resolution."

Speaker Murphy: "Do I have leave of the House for the entire Membership to go on this Resolution? Leave. Representative Davis moves the adoption of the Resolution. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Resolution is adopted. Resolution 896."

Clerk Selcke: "House Resolution 896. Leinenweber et al. Whereas, the House of Representatives is deeply grieved to learn of the Death of Professor Francis J. 'Frank' O'Malley of Notre Dame University and whereas his distinguished ten years as the Professor on English at Notre Dame included the tutelage of such illustrious persons as Edward O'Connor, author of 'The Edge of Sadness', and Governor John F. Gilligan, of Ohio; and whereas, he will be sorely missed by



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his colleagues, associates and the former students of forty-one years of devoted teaching service. Therefore, be it resolved the House of Representatives of the Seventy-eighth General Assembly of the State of Illinois, that we express our profound sorrow at the loss of a distinguished Professor and a fine man, Dr. Francis J. O'Malley, of the University of Notre Dame; and be it further resolved, that a copy of this preamble and Resolution be foreaded to the President of the University of Notre Dame."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Will County, Representative Leinenweber is recognized."

Leinenweber: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, I'll yield my time to Representative Duff."

Duff: "Well Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I asked Representative Leinenweber if I couldn't say a few words on this Resolution of which he is the principal Sponsor. Mr. Frank O'Malley, Professor O'Malley, Frank, was an endearing and loved man for many, many years on the campus of the University of Notre Dame. There are many Members of this body who were graduates of that school and not a single one of them remembers him in any way except with the utmost of affection, admiration and respect. Mr. O'Malley was a teacher without compare, a teacher of the old school, a man who cared about his students, who cared about the English Language, who cared about the written word in a most complete and total way. There are really no words that we can say in adequate recollection of his memory. But, because he has been so loved and because he loved the language so well, I think perhaps, it might be fitting to refer to the words of a poet whom, whose work he held dear, from Julius



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Caesar, over the...over the body of Brutus, when the words were said and I think they're appropriate for Mr. O'Malley. His life was gentle and the element so missed in him that nature might stand up and say to all the world, this was a man. I now move the adoption of the Resolution.

Speaker Murphy: "The question is on the adoption of the Resolution. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', those opposed by saying 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Resolution is adopted. Representative Merlo now moves the adoption of Resolution 926. The question is on the adoption of Resolution 926. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', those opposed by saying 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Resolution is adopted."

Clerk Selcke: "I'll just read them by number. Agreed Resolutions. Agreed Resolutions."

Speaker Murphy: "Agreed Resolutions."

Clerk Selcke: "House Resolution 928. Skinner. House Resolution 929. Molloy et al. House Resolution 930. Molloy et al. House Resolution 931. Tuerk. House Resolution 933. Huskey et al. House Resolution 934. Blair et al."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative William Walsh, moves the adoption of the Agreed Resolution. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', those opposed by saying 'nay'. The 'ayes' have it, the Resolutions are adopted. Further Resolutions."

Clerk Selcke: "House Resolution 924. Greiman et al. House Resolution 925. Matijevich et al. House Resolution 932. Martin...who's that? House Joint Resolution 62. Springer...ah...Senate Joint Resolution 62. Springer."



Clerk Selcke: "Well we're on Amendment's...What's it doing here? We didn't have one on Second?

Well, we can call it back, can't we?"

Speaker Murphy: "House Bill 2277. Back on Second Reading.

The Gentleman from...ah..."

Clerk Selcke: "Amendment 3. Shea. Amends House Bill 2277, page 11, by inserting between lines 34 and 35, the following."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, this Bill was on Third Reading. I assume I've got leave of the House to bring it back to Second Reading for the purpose of an Amendment."

Speaker Murphy: "Leave of the House, to bring it back to Third Reading? Second...I mean Second Reading? Leave."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Amendment #3 is an Amendment that adds two hundred and twenty five thousand, fifty dollars or so much therefore as necessary to the Secretary of State for the establishment of a photographic Drivers License program. It's been cleared with the Appropriations Staff on both sides of the aisle and I would move for the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Juckett."

Juckett: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I was wondering how this Bill was called out of order from Third Reading."

Speaker Murphy: "We asked Leave of the House to bring it back from Third Reading to Second Reading. We got Leave of the House."

Juckett: "But Mr. Speaker, that was for leave to bring it back to Second but how was it called in the first



place?"

Speaker Murphy: "Back to Second Reading."

Juckett: "It was called out of order, against the Rules of the House."

Speaker Murphy: "We just had leave of the House to do it, Mr. Juckett."

Juckett: "The leave was to call it back to Second. Not to have it heard out of order."

Speaker Murphy: "We're trying to move the business of the House. We have nothing to do at the moment, we were trying to clean up some housekeeping details."

Juckett: "Well, Mr. Speaker, normally, the Speaker would ask for leave to hear it out of order."

Speaker Murphy: "We did ask for leave to bring it back to Second Reading."

Juckett: "But not to hear it out of order, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Murphy: "Is leave granted?"

Juckett: "Objection."

Speaker Murphy: "All right, Representative from Cook.

Are you objecting, Representative Juckett?

Objections have been heard. Representative Shea, Cook County. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea."

Shea: "Perhaps I can clear up something for my distinguished colleague. This Bill went from Second to Third Reading because there was a question about an Amendment and whether it was printed or not. It has now been approved by both Appropriations Staffs and is now printed. We thought that perhaps it would speed up the action of the House while we had nothing to do for a minute. The Speaker and I discussed the possibility of bringing it back and putting on the Amendment and moving it to Third Reading."



Speaker Murphy: "Does that answer any objection, Representative Juckett? Or do you still object? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative William Walsh."

Walsh: "Well Mr. Speaker, the Gentleman...Mr. Juckett's objection intrigues me. How many, may I ask the Speaker, how many votes it takes to take a Bill out of order?"

Speaker Murphy: "I am told it takes 89 votes. The Parliamentarian says it takes 107 to take it out of order."

Walsh: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I object very strongly to the substance of the Amendment that the Gentleman is attempting to put on the Bill and it seems to me that I have a better chance objecting where he needs 107 votes and I would...ah...if he needed a simple majority of those voting and so I join Mr. Juckett in...ah...objecting to the procedure and would hope that maybe the Gentleman would wait to another day to ..."

Speaker Murphy: "All right, objections have been heard. Representative from Cook, Representative Shea."

Shea: "Well Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I thought this was a noncontroversial ...ah... piece of business. But if there's objections and Mr. Walsh and Mr. Juckett want to object, I'll just leave the Bill on Third Reading and Mr. Speaker, I thought that we had leave of the House to bring it back but...ah...certainly I wouldn't want to do anything to upset the Majority Leader at this time. So, If you'll just leave it on Third, I'll leave the Amendment on Third."

Speaker Murphy: "All right, we'll take it out of the record. We'll leave it on Third Reading. The House will be at ease for a few minutes."



Speake Murphy: "The House will be in order. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Randolph for an announcement."

Randolph: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. I would like to announce that the Revenue Committee will meet promptly at 9:00 a.m. in D-1, tomorrow morning. We have a full calendar. 27 Bills and when we recess to go into Session, then we will meet immediately following the Session, tomorrow afternoon to finish our...our order of business. D-1, at 9:00 a.m., tomorrow morning."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative William Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, there will be a Rules Committee meeting tomorrow afternoon immediately after adjournment in Room M-3 and now Mr. Speaker, it's our intention to adjourn and so. I move that the House adjourn until the hour of 1:30 p.m., tomorrow."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Walsh, the Clerk has just a few Senate Bills on First Reading he'd like to read, before we put that motion. Proceed. The Gentleman from...ah... Representative Porter."

Porter: "Mr. Speaker, the Calendar for today shows House Bill 2199 on Second Reading, First Legislative Day. That is in error, the Bill should have been assigned...excuse me 2200, should have been assigned to the Appropriations Committee. Do we need a vote to take it off the Calendar and assign it to the Appropriations Committee, where it should have gone."

Speaker Murphy: "House Bill 2189...2189. He says it's on First Legislative Day today, it should have been assigned to Appropriations Committee, is that right?"



Porter: "House Bill 2200."

Speaker Murphy: "2200? House Bill 2200. You're saying it's an error on the Calendar, it should be on the Appropriations Committee, is that right? Are you saying it's an error on the Calendar? It should have gone to the Appropriations Committee?"

Porter: "Yes, it has not been heard by Appropriations yet and it should have gone to that Committee rather than directly to the Floor."

Speaker Murphy: "While we're waiting, I'll recognize the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Totten, for an announcement."

Totten: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. The House Appropriations Committee will meet tomorrow morning at 9:00 a.m. in room 212 and again one half hour after adjournment in room 212. At 9:00."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Peoria, Representative Schraeder."

Schraeder: "The previous Gentleman spoke of House Bill 2000, does that include all..."

Speaker Murphy: "2200."

Schraeder: "2200?"

Speaker Murphy: "Ah...The Gentleman, Representative Porter, they both should have been referred to Appropriations Committee, they came out of Transportation, they should have been re-referred. So, Senate Bills, First Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 1293. A Bill for an Act to amend Section 1 of an Act to authorize the Department of Revenue to make certain refunds. First Reading of the Bill. Senate Bill 1399. Amends the Public Community Colleges Act. First Reading of the Bill."



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Speaker Murphy: "Introductions and First Reading of House Bills."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 2813. Martin. Appropriates seven hundred and fifty thousand to the Department of Local Government Affairs. First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 2814. Skinner. Appropriates five hundred thousand dollars to the State Treasurer. First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 2815. Fleck. Amends the General Assembly Pay Act. First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 2816. McGrew. Appropriates one million, twenty five thousand dollars to the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction. First Reading of the Bill. That's it."

Speaker Murphy: "Representative Ryan, asks leave to table House Joint Resolution 74. Is leave granted? Leave. Representative Rayson, asks leave to table House Bill 2057, House Bill 2059, House Bill 2696 and House Resolution 566. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker...Mr. Speaker, I had two Bills, that were assigned to Appropriations. House Bills 2798 and House Bill 2799, that were inadvertently left off the Posting List. I've cleared it with both sides, I know of no objection. With leave of the House, I'd like to leave the Posting Rule and have those heard tomorrow."

Speaker Murphy: "Is leave granted to hear those Bills tomorrow? Leave is granted. I hear no objections. All right, the question now is on the adjournment. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the House is adjourned until 1:30 p.m. tomorrow afternoon."
