Speaker Blair: "The House will be in Session, the Invocation will be by Doctor Johnson."

Doctor Johnson: "Lord, God our Father, we confess that we can so often become too busy to do the most important things that demand top priority in our actions. Forgive us when we grow indifferent to those that are concerned about us. Forgive us when we do not care sufficiently about those who put us in positions of responsibility. Forgive us when we forget to recall or repay the kindness we experience from colleagues and friends. Hear the cries of all who call upon you this day and bless each one according to his needs. We especially ask you to look mercifully upon Representative J. J. Wolf, guide those who minister to his physical needs and according to your will, restore him to his duties in this House. Look upon us with . . . Lord, with your grace and give us a compassionate spirit that your blessing bountifully placed upon us might enable us to do those things which will be blessings to our people. Assure us now of your benediction as we go about the task that's before us. We ask this in your name, Amen."

Speaker Blair: "Roll Call for attendance. Messages from the Senate."

Fredric Selcke: "A message from the Senate by Mr. Fernandes, Secretary. Mr. Speaker, I'm directed to inform the House of Representatives that the Senate has passed Bills of the following titles in the passage of which I'm instructed to ask concurrence of the House, Senate Bill 82, 120, 476, 477, 479, 486, 491, 498, 499, 514, passed the Senate May 22, 1973. Edward E. Fernandes, Secretary. Mr. Speaker, I'm directed to inform the House of Representatives the Senate has passed Bills of the following title in the passage of which I'm instructed to ask concurrence of the House, Senate Bill 450, 458, 463, 464, 465, 466, 468, 471, 475, 570, passed the Senate May 22, 1973. Edward E. Fernandes, Secretary."

Speaker Blair: "Introduction."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1953, Tipsword, a Bill for an Act to amend the pres . . . Professional Service Corporation Act. First Reading of the Bill. We got any Agreed Resolution?"

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Davis."



Davis: "Mr. Speaker, I wanted to remind you let the Record show that our colleague, Representative B. B. Wolf, is excused because of illness."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the Journal will so indicate. Ah . . . The Gentleman from . . . ah . . . from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "Will the Journal so show that Representative Granata is absent because of illness."

Speaker Blair: "And . . . ah . . . the Gentleman from Johnson, Mr. C. L. McCormick is ill today because . . ."

Fredric Selcke: "His wife's ill."

Speaker Blair: "His wi . . . he has family illness and that's why he's not here."

Fredric Selcke: "His wife . . . Jack . . . all right."

Speaker Blair: "House Bills, Second Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bills, Second Reading. House Bill 684, Boyle, not here . . . not here. House Bill 892, Hanahan, not here. House Bill 699, Katz, not here. House Bill 701, Katz, not here. House Bill 142, Rayson, eeh, God, is anybody here? House Bill 626, Katz, not here. House Bill 873, Getty, is he here? House Bill 915, Madigan. House Bill 916, Deuster. Give me 916, we've got somebody here. House Bill 916, . . . ah . . . a Bill for an Act to provide certain appointed powers by county boards. Second Reading of the Bill. Where the hell is the Amendment? Ah . . . This Bill was read a second time on . . . ah . . . a previous day. Amendment #1 was adopted. Amendment #2 was adopted. Amendment 3 adopted. Amendment #4 was tabled, and the Bill was held on the order of Second Reading for Amendment #5 by Borchers. Where is he, are you going to handle it? We . . . Webber isn't here. Will you handle Webber's Amendment? Oh . . . we'll just take it out of the Record. Go through all this balony. Where in the hell is Webber? Is he back in my office, George? Well, we'll take it out of the Record. Out of the Record. A big waste of time, what was that number? 9 . . . ah . . . 1298, Mann, you want this, Mr. Mann? Out of the Record. Out of the Record. Ah . . . Gerry Shea, wants you."

Speaker Blair: "Ah . . . For what purpose does the Gentleman from Cook,





Mr. Shea, arise?"

Shea: "Ah . . . We were on House Bill 916, what happened to that?"

Fredric Selcke: "The . . . ah . . . Sponsor of Amendment #5 was not on the floor, so it was taken out of the Record."

Shea: "So i . . . we're . . . we're at what posture with the Bill now then?"

Fredric Selcke: "It's out of the Record."

Shea: "With no Amendments added?"

Fredric Selcke: "Well, Amendments 1, 2 and 3 were adopted previously, and Amendment #4 was tabled previously . . ."

Shea: "All right, that's where we're at."

Fredric Selcke: ". . . and now we're waiting, now we've read the Bill, the Sponsor of Amendment #5 wasn't on the floor, so we took it out of the Record."

Shea: "Okay, thank you."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill . . ."

Speaker Blair: "All right, now wait a minute now . . . ah . . ."

Fredric Selcke: "What's that Mr. Mann?"

Speaker Blair: "For what purpose does the Gentleman from . . . Mr. Mann, arise?"

Mann: "Mr. Speaker, I would . . . I would like to advance 1298."

Speaker Blair: "Oh, all right, . . . ah . . . are there any Amendments for 1298? Oh, all right."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1298, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Public Aid Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments. Any from the floor?"

Speaker Blair: "Any from the floor?"

Fredric Selcke: "1299."

Speaker Blair: "Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1299, Mann, a Bill for an Act to amend the Public Aid Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments. Any from . . ."

Speaker Blair: "Any from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah . . . House Bill . . . what was your number . . . well, we haven't . . . we haven't got . . . oh, oh, okay, 892. House



Bill 892, Hanahan, a Bill for an Act to provide for law in relation to counties. Ah . . . Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Fredric Selcke: ". . . there was . . . Amendment #1, Hanahan, amends House Bill 892."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Hanahan."

Hanahan: "All this Amendment does is change one word from 'more' to 'two' . . . er . . . 'two' to 'more' which puts the Bill in the form that the Sponsor originally intended. I moves its adoption."

Speaker Blair: "All right, any discussion? The question is on the adoption of the Amendment . . . Mrs. Dyer? All right, then, all those in favor of the adoption say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it, and the Amendment's adopted. Further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 842, Calvo, give me that Bill, Chockey. . . . ah . . . a Bill for an Act to amend the Cannabis Control Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments. Got one. Ah . . . Amendment #1, Calvo, . . . ah . . . Washington, amends House Bill 842 on page 1, line 1, by striking the word and . . . and to add Section on page 1, line 2, and so forth. Washington."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Harold Washington."

Washington: "Yes, I'm trying to get . . . I'm trying to get my hands on the Amendment, Mr. Chair . . . Mr. Speaker. Yes, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, Amendment # . . . this is #2, Mr. Clerk, to House . . ."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah . . . What . . ."

Washington: ". . . is this Amendment #2?"

Fredric Selcke: "No, this is Amendment #1, Harold."

Washington: "Amendment #1 to House Bill 842 strikes the lines 10 through 14 on page 1 of the Bill. The purpose of this Amendment is that it is felt that from the crime delineated here in this paragraph the penalty is too harsh. It is a form entrapment. Actually, it is . . . it isn't itself and it's not needed. I was under the impression that the Sponsor of the Bill was in agreement, but I under-



stand now that he isn't; and I move adoption of the Amendment notwithstanding his position."

Speaker Blair: "Any discussion? The . . . ah . . . Gentleman from Madison, Mr. Calvo."

Calvo: "Well, Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment #1 for intents and purposes . . . ah . . . killed the Bill. The . . . ah . . . language stricken on Amendment #1 is exactly the language that was put in the Bill and what it does is provide that there is a penalty for selling a . . . a product and passing it off as cannibus, even though it may not in fact be cannibus, if it is sold as such, there is a penalty of a misdemeanor the same as if it were cannibus. I would just tell you that this is a product of the Legislative Investigating Commission and the reason the Bill was drawn was at the request of the Chicago Police Department and many other law enforcement authorities throughout this state; and . . . ah . . . if we want the Bill, fine; if we don't want it, . . . ah . . . this is really a test of the Bill passage, not just an Amendment, because if the Amendment is adopted, the language that is put in to do this, of course, is stricken. So it's . . . can amount to strike the enacting clause. I, therefore, would ask you to pay strict attention when voting on the adoption of this Amendment because you are effectively killing the Bill. Ah . . . As I mentioned, it is requested by the various law enforcing . . . ah . . . Chicago Police Department and other law enforcing officials of this state, so . . . ah . . . I only would ask that you vote accordingly on whether or not you adopt this Amendment and I would ask that this Amendment be defeated if we wish to . . . ah . . . enact this type of legislation. Thank you."

Speaker Blair: "Is there further discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Douglas."

Douglas: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, I'm sorry that I just came on the floor, and I wonder if . . . ah . . . if I could find out what this Amendment is once again. I'm sorry to take the time of the House. Who is the Sponsor of the Amendment, and what does it say?"

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Washington."



Washington: "That the Amendments have been on the desks for several days and it's Amendment to House Bill 842 and aside for a few technical aspects of the Amendment, what it does is strike lines 10 through 14 on page 1. Now, lines 10 through 14 provide as follows: 'Section 5.1, it is unlawful for any person knowingly to deliver or possess with intent to deliver any substance which he represents to be cannabis'. My reason for submitting this Amendment is twofold, the penalty invoked here as a Class 4 felony, which is an extremely harsh penalty before that when this representation of something to be cannabis which in effect is not cannabis, secondly, it lends itself to entrapment on the part of some people who might . . . ah . . . be operating relatively unscrupulous. There is no necessity for this Bill, in effect, it does strike the enacting clause and notwithstanding the fact that the Legislative Investigating Committee supports, as I maintain, we don't need it. Simply because it comes from that Committee, doesn't mean it comes from on high. Ah . . . It has no inherent logic to it. I see no reason why one should be silent with such a . . . such extreme penalty from this type of offense. I might agree that such . . . such conduct should be punished, but to punish it in this fashion it seems to me to be extremely harsh."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Douglas."

Douglas: "Ah . . . Mr. Washington, . . . ah . . . do I understand correctly that the way the Bill was originally drafted, part of the reason for your Amendment is that the penalty for . . . for . . . ah . . . marijuana would be as strict as the penalty for . . . for heroin . . . for drugs that's far more dangerous? Do you think it's . . ."

Washington: "No, this . . . this has nothing to do about the traffic in drugs, nothing whatsoever. It doesn't touch that aspect of it. If one attempts to sell cannabis, period, that is a crime. This Bill doesn't touch it. What this Bill addresses itself to is the question of selling something which purports to be cannabis, which, in effect, is not cannabis and the seller knows, in effect, it is not cannabis. That's what the Bill does. It's unnecessary law, it's a harsh pen-



alty, and I see no reason to put it on the books."

Speaker Blair: "Further . . . the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Juckett."

Juckett: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, will the distinguished Sponsor . . . ah . . . yield for a question?"

Speaker Blair: "He indicates he will."

Juckett: "In your statement you indicated that . . . ah . . . you spelled out what the offense was and then you indicated that it would be a Class 4 penalty. Now, isn' it true that the first offense would be a Class A misdemeanor and any subsequent . . . ah . . . charge and conviction would, in fact, be a Class 4 felony?"

Washington: "That's correct. The Bill as originally drafted and submitted by Representative Calvo provides as you stated that the first offense will be a Class A misdemeanor and subsequent is a Class 4 felony."

Juckett: "All right, a misdemeanor on the first offense . . . ah . . . a felony and the second offense . . ."

Washington: "That's correct."

Juckett: ". . . is similar to what is in the cannibus Act now for the sale and possession of canni . . ."

Washington: "Act for cannibus, that's right."

Juckett: ". . . cannibus."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Madison, . . . ah . . . Mr. Calvo, for what purpose do you a . . ."

Calvo: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I would ask that as soon as we're through with the discussion I would just ask for a Roll Call motion on . . . I mean, a Roll Call vote on whether or not this motion is adopted."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the Gentleman joined by some helpers there? Mr. Berman. Mr. Krause. Mr. Craig. Mr. Fennessey and Mr. Douglas, all right. The question then is on the adoption of the Amendment #4. All those in favor will vote 'aye', and the opposed 'no'. Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take . . . the Clerk will take the Record . . . . . 60 'nos' and 29 'ayes', and the Gentleman's Amendment fails. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 843, Calvo, a Bill for an Act to amend Section



408 a controlled substance Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 843, page 1, line 20 and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The...ah...Gentleman from Madison, Mr. Calvo."

Calvo: "No Amendments...ah...Mr. Speaker that I know of. All right I move the adoption of Committee Amendment #1. I'm sorry I forgot about that."

Speaker Blair: "The question's on the adoption..... All those in favor say 'aye'. The opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it.

Further Amendments Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah...House Bill 915, Madigan, a Bill for an Act to amend the Election Code. Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments. Amendment #1 amends House Bill 915, page 1, but deleting lines 13 and so forth. Ah...Madigan."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee and provides certain protections for institutions effected by the Bill. I move adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "Any discussion? All right...ah...the question is on the adoption of the Amendment. All those in favor say 'aye'.

Opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendments adopted.

Further Amendments?"

Fredric Selcke: "Committee Amendment #2 amends House Bill 915, page 1, line 8 by inserting the word private after the word any and so forth. Madigan."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, Amendment #2 is similar Amendment #1 again providing protection for the institutions effected by the Bill.

I move adoption of Amendment #2."

Speaker Blair: "Any discussion? This is Amendment #2. Is there any discussion? All right. Okay...ah...Mr. Mugalian."

Mugalian: "I wonder if the Sponsor would explain what Amendment #2 does?"

Madigan: "Amendment #2 provides that if the officers or directors of a institution effected by the Bills will certify that there would be a violation of the religious tenants of that particular organization



then that they will be removed from the operation of the Bill."

Madigan: "Thank you."

Speaker Blair: "Any further discussion? The question is on the adoption of Amendment #2. All those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. Further Amendments."

Fredric Selcke: "Amendment #3, Kozubowski, amends House Bill 915, page 1, by deleting lines 1 and 2, and so forth."

Kozubowski: "Well Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment #3 merely calls for the...ah...State Board of for the creation of the State Board of Election and I would ask for the favorable adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh, William: "Mr. Speaker, this is a Bill which...ah...provides that ah...institutions receiving public funds are having tax exempt status...ah...be required to be used as...ah...ah...polling places. Amendment #3 that is being offered now attaches a provision for a State Election Board and as I understand it, it's the one that was defeated in the Elections Committee and I raise the question, Mr. Speaker, that Amendment #3 is not germane to the substance of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Let me have a quick look at the Amendment. All right the. After careful consideration the Parliamentarian advises me that the Amendment is not germane...ah...for what purpose does the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Shea rise?"

Shea: "Well Mr. Speaker I don't know under what ruling that the Bill is or the Amendment to the Bill is not germane."

Speaker Blair: "Under the chair's ruling sir."

Shea: "Well can I question that? Ah...what I'd like to do is get a definitive ruling for the chair one time."

Speaker Blair: "No more definitive ruling need be made than the fact that on the Gentleman's question from Cook Mr. William Walsh on germaneness of the motion of the Amendment that the Amendment is not germane."

Shea: "Well the Amendment certainly amends the Election Code. It puts a new Board of Elections in there and...ah...Mr. Speaker I don't understand it. I'd like a definitive ruling from the chair for a



change...ah...why Democratic Amendments are not germane and anything that...ah...the Majority Leader wants is germane."

Speaker Blair: "Well I don't know what you're talking about...ah...I'd I'm not going to argue with you about it, the chair's ruled...ah... are there further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 877, Mann."

Speaker Blair: "For what purpose does the Gentlemen from Cook, Mr. Shea rise?"

Shea: "Would the clerk please read the Bill in full and any Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "There's no requirement under the rules to do that. Proceed, Mr. Clerk."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah...House Bill 877, a Bill for an Act to amend the Code of Criminal procedure 9063, Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments. Out of the record. Take it out of the record. House Bill 1206, Choate, he's not here. Not here. House Bill 1207, Choate. Not here. House Bill 1658, where in the hell is that? Ah...House Bill 1658, Barry, Toby, out of the record. Where'd we quit? 16..ah...59, out of the record Toby. Ah...House Bill 890...ah...Duff, give me 890. House Bill 890, a Bill for an Act to amend the Code of Criminal procedure. Second Reading of the Bill. 890."

Speaker Blair: "Take it out of the record. Mr. Shea what are you up for again?"

Shea: "Well I would just like to hence forth ask that the clerk would read the full titles of the Bills and any Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "The clerk is doing his job according to the rules. Proceed."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 895, Hanahan, a Bill for an Act to amend Section 13 an Act in relation to State Police. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Fredric Selcke: "Ah...Amendment #1, Hanahan, amend to House Bill 89..."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Yes Mr. Speaker this is the same Amendment dealing with the lie detectors .....the corrective Amendment...ah...correcting one word in the Bill and I move for it's adoption."





Speaker Blair: "Is there discussion? The question is on the adoption of the Amendment. All those in favor say 'aye'... 'aye'. The opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 899, Mann. 899...ah...House Bill 899, a Bill for an Act concerning toilets in public places of accommodation or amusement...ah...Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment...ah...amend House Bill 899 by adding below line 16 the following: Section 2. Whoever violates this Act is guilty of a petty offense and shall be fined fifty dollars."

Speaker Blair: "The gentleman from...ah...Cook, Mr. Mann."

Mann: "Mr. Speaker if you could take this out of the Record temporarily, I have another Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "Take it out of the Record."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1535...ah...Giglio...ah...not here."

Speaker Blair: "Wait a minute...ah...Mr. Maragos said that he could handle it. Okay go ahead."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1535, a Bill for an Act to amend Section 67.15...ah...an Act in relation to Civil Administration of State Government."

Speaker Blair: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Maragos."

Fredric Selcke: "Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Maragos: "Mr. Speaker there's Amendment #1."

Fredric Selcke: "Yea...ah...Amendment #1, Giglio. Amends House Bill 1535 page 1, line 35 and so forth."

Maragos: "The purpose of this Amendment is to...ah...make it more corrective...ah...university should you have to work or by the Secretary of State...ah...it is a technical Amendment and...ah...I recommend do pass."

Speaker Blair: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

William Walsh: "Well Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This is a biannual attempt by me and by others to make the Department of General Services do the job for which they were created for a few years ago, and that is namely to



be the custodian among other things of State property. Now what this Bill does is to provide that the department shall be responsible for the maintenance of State vehicles, and the only exclusion in this instance are vehicles belonging to State universities. Now the Department of General Services would under this Bill be responsible for vehicles assigned to the Comptroller's Office...ah...the State Treasure's Office...ah...to all of the offices of the State except the universities. By this Amendment the Secretary of State wants to be different wants to keep the prerogatives he has just as previous Secretaries of State have...ah...the Amendment does this for him...ah...there's no justification for it. There are other elected state officials who...ah...are required to...ah...go through the Department of General Services just as the Department of Transportation and the other Code Departments are. So I suggest to you that the Secretary of State should not be going to private gasoline stations for gasoline and automobile maintenance. It should be required to do just as all of the other state offices are doing. All of the other state agencies except universities...ah...and go through the Department of General Services...ah...so I would respectfully suggest that in the interest of good government you oppose this Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "Is there further discussion? Mr. Giglio."

Giglio: "Ah...thank you Mr. Speaker...ah...Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I stand to disagree with the Majority Leader, and I urge that the Department of...ah...Secretary of State is so huge and he has so many vehicles that he knows what he is doing and that's where it should stay, and...ah...therefore, I would urge...ah...yes vote on this Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "Alright. The question is shall this Amendment be adopted? All those in favor will vote 'aye', and the opposed 'no'. The gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

William Walsh: "Well to further elaborate Mr. Speaker...ah...the Department of General Services was created four years ago by this General Assembly, and the job it was intended to do is exactly what is incorporated in this Bill unamended. The gentleman talks



about the Secretary of State of being born fast and other state agencies, and I submit to him that the Department of Transportation certainly has a great deal more of vehicles than the Secretary of State does and it is not inconvenient for them anymore than it is inconvenient for the state police to go to the Department of General Services for vehicle maintenance, and I suggest to you again...ah...this is the right thing to do and that we should give this department the control because that's where the General Assembly four years ago intended it to be, and I ask again that you vote 'no' on this Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "Have all voted who wish? The...ah...Clerk will take the Record. On this question there are 86 'ayes', 56 'nays' and the gentleman's Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah...House Bill 447, Shea. A Bill for an Act making an appropriation for the Ordinary and Contingent Expense for the Legislative Reference Bureau. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 447 on page 1, line 10 by deleting four hundred and thirty two thousand and inserting in lieu thereof four hundred and ten thousand on page 1, line 12, by deleting twenty six thousand and inserting in lieu thereof twenty four thousand and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Shea still... The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Shea."

Shea: "This is a Committee Amendment, and I don't think it was read completely. I would just like to make sure that we all understood what the Amendment said."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah...Amendment...ah...Amendment to House Bill 447 ...ah...Amendment #1. Amends House Bill 447 on page 1, line 10 by deleting four hundred and thirty two thousand six hundred and inserting in lieu thereof four hundred and ten thousand; and on page 1, line 12 by deleting twenty six thousand and inserting in lieu thereof twenty four thousand six hundred; and on page 1, line 14, by deleting seventeen thousand two hundred and inserting in lieu thereof sixteen thousand three hundred; and on page 1, line 15, by deleting thirty seven thousand and inserting in lieu



thereof thirty two thousand; and on page 1, line 17, by deleting five thousand and inserting in lieu thereof three thousand; and on page 1, line 19, by deleting two thousand and inserting in lieu thereof one thousand; and by deleting line 25."

Speaker Blair: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Shea."

Shea: "Ah...I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1."

Speaker Blair: "Any discussion? Ah...the question is on the adoption of the Amendment. All those in favor say 'aye'...'aye'. The opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 614, Calvo. Is Mr. Calvo here? Out of the Record. House Bill 878, Kozubowski. Out of the Record. House Bill 954, Shea. A Bill for an Act making certain appropriations for the Secretary of State. Second Reading of the Bill. Ah...three Committee Amendments. Amendment #1, amends House Bill 954 page 8 by deleting line 25 and inserting in lieu thereof from the General Revenue Fund the sum of one hundred and eighty thousand dollars; and on page 8, immediately after line 25 by inserting the following: and from the Road Fund, the sum of four hundred and twenty thousand."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Shea."

Shea: "I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1."

Speaker Blair: "Any discussion? Alright, the question is on the adoption of Amendment #1. All those in favor say 'aye'...'aye'. The opposed 'no'...'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Further Amendments?"

Fredric Selcke: "Ah...Committee Amendment #2. Amends House Bill 954 on page 11, by inserting between lines 12 and 13 the following: Section 13. The sum of twenty thousand dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is appropriated to the Secretary of State for completing the installation of a new Roll Call, speech reinforcement and communication system for the House of Representatives as provided in Public Act 77-702. Section 14. The sum of one hundred and fifty thousand or so much thereof as may be necessary is appropriated to the Secretary of State for



expenses necessarily incurred in completing the rehabilitation of the chambers of the House of Representatives in the Capitol Building as proved in Public Act 77-2044. Section 15. The sum of two million dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is appropriated to the Secretary of State for in connection with duties imposed on him by any no fault or compulsory motor vehicle insurance law enacted by the Seventy-Eighth General Assembly, and on page 11, line 13, by deleting 13 and inserting in lieu thereof 16."

Speaker Blair: "In regard to Amendment #2, Mr. Shea."

Shea: "Ah...Mr. Speaker perhaps you'd be interested in this Amendment. Mr. Speaker...Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Blair: "Yea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker perhaps you'd be interested in this Amendment. It's got seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars to rehabilitate the House. So...ah...I...I like to move for the adoption of it if you'd help me."

Speaker Blair: "Alright...ah...all those in favor of rehabilitating the House vote 'aye'...'aye', the opposed 'no'.... The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Further Amendments?"

Fredric Selcke: "Ah...Committee Amendment #3, amends House Bill 954 on page 2, line 6, by deleting one million fifty six thousand six hundred and fifty six and inserting in lieu thereof one million six thousand six hundred and fifty six; and on page 2, line 8, by deleting one million one hundred and ninety seven thousand four hundred and ninety six and inserting in lieu thereof one million one one hundred and forty seven thousand four hundred ninety six; and on page 2, line 18, by deleting one million four hundred and seven thousand four hundred and seventy and inserting in lieu thereof one million three hundred fifty seven thousand four hundred and seventy; and on page 4, line 6, by deleting nineteen million one hundred and forty one thousand eighty three and inserting in lieu thereof nineteen million forty one thousand eighty three; and on page 4, line 8 by deleting nineteen million eight hundred and eighty nine thousand eighty six and inserting in lieu thereof nineteen million seven hundred



and eighty nine thousand eighty six; and on page 4, line 18, by deleting thirty two million five hundred and thirty three thousand one hundred and sixty eight and inserting in lieu thereof thirty two million four hundred and thirty three thousand one hundred and sixty eight; and on page 7, line 15, by deleting five million four hundred and twenty thousand seven hundred and forty and inserting in lieu thereof five million three hundred and seventy thousand seven hundred and forty; and on page 7, line 19, by deleting seven million five hundred and eighty thousand fifty seven and inserting in lieu thereof seven million five hundred and thirty thousand and fifty seven."

Speaker Blair: "The gentleman from Cook, on #3 Mr. Shea."

Shea: "Ah...Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. Committee #3 reduces the Secretary of State's Budget by two hundred thousand dollars...ah...this...ah...reduction was worked out with the appropriation staffs of both sides of the aisle and was agreeable with the Secretary of State. Therefore, I would move for the adoption of Committee Amendment #3."

Speaker Blair: "Discussion? All those in favor of the adoption say 'aye'. Let's say the 'ayes' have it...ah...then we can stop there. Are there further Amendments?"

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1442, Craig. 1442...ah...a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Take it out of the Record. No...you want it out of the Record? You want to take it out of the Record? Okay."

Fredric Selcke: "1477, J. M. Houlihan. Is he here? Yea...no I guess he's not here."

Speaker Blair: "Take it out of the Record."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1017, Lundy...ah...a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Insurance Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 1017 page 1, line 1 and 5 deleting Sections 357.9 and inserting in lieu thereof Section 364 and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Lundy."

Lundy: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. The...before



the Insurance Committee I assured the members that I would attempt to accommodate some of the Representatives with suggested...ah...Amendments and they have not yet contacted me on that, and so I would...ah...like to have the Bill taken out of the Record once again."

Speaker Blair: "Take it out of the Record."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah...House Bill 1270, Katz. Is he here? Not here. House Bill 1242, Springer. Is he here? Out of the Record."

Speaker Blair: "Out of the Record."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1270, Katz. Not here. House Bill 1332, Thompson. Give me that one...ah...House Bill 1332, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Insurance Code. Second Reading of the Bill. You got one there? One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 1332 by....."

Speaker Blair: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Thompson."

Thompson: "Ah...Mr. Speaker, I've been informed that the Amendments are being cut and have not been placed on the desk yet. Would you remove it from the Rec...ah...temporarily?"

Speaker Blair: "Sure. Take it out of the Record."

Thompson: "Thank you."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1351. What is 1351? House Bill 1357, Catania. 1357, a Bill for an Act to amend the Income Tax Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 1357 page 1 in each of lines 1 and 5 by deleting 204 and inserting in lieu thereof 203 and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The lady...ah...from Cook...ah...Mr. Shea."

Shea: "Would you please ask the Clerk to read the Amendments in full?"

Speaker Blair: "Does the gentleman have a point of reference...ah...to that...ah...?"

Shea: "Well Mr. Speaker, I think that...."

Speaker Blair: "It's not what you think. Do you have a...?"

Shea: "I've asked for the Amendments to be read in full. We're amending the Bills. I think that we are entitled to hear the Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "The Constitution requires that they be reproduced and on the desk and they are...ah...so..."



Shea: "The Constitution doesn't say...ah...require that our rules require it."

Speaker Blair: "Well the Constitution...."

Shea: "It says that on Third Reading that the Amendments will be on the desks."

Speaker Blair: "Bill on each Amendment there...ah...to shall be reproduced and placed on the desk of each Member before final passage."

Shea: "That's right, but I would think that we ought to know what we're voting on and I requested that the Clerk to read the Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "Well now Mr. Speaker I think the gentleman realizes as is every Member here that there is no requirement that the Amendments be read. The requirement is that the Amendments be on the desk as was pointed out by the Speaker. Now our plan today was to meet until 12:30 to break for lunch for one hour and return then and work until about seven o'clock. Now is the gentleman is going to persist in these dilatory tactics obviously we can't do that. If the Clerk is going to be reading Amendments, and he is going to be jumping up every so often delaying the proceedings then we're going to have to work through lunch, and we're going to have to work far into the night. We're not going to have to do that just tonight, but in the days to following until June 30th. So I would respectfully suggest to the Assistant Minority Leader that he get off this tact, and get along with the business."

Speaker Blair: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Shea."

Shea: "Well, Mr. Walsh...ah...I certainly appreciate the fact that we are going to break for lunch today, but I don't think that we should be so expeditious that we don't do the peoples business and worry about our lunch. So I would like to have the Amendment read if I might."

Speaker Blair: "Alright...ah...and...ah...what the gentleman said...ah...just to underline it...ah...the Chair fully concurs with and we can plan on not stopping this week on Friday. So





I would suggest that all of you make . . . ah . . . indication. Now, proceed, Mr. Clerk, to read the Amendment."

Fredric Selcke: "Amendment #1 amends House Bill 1357, page 1, and on each of the lines 1, 5 and deleting '204', and inserting in lieu thereof '203', and by deleting lines 8 to 32 on page 1, lines 1 and 2, and on page 2 inserting in lieu thereof the following: 'Chapter 120, paragraph 2-203, Section 203, Base Income defined, A) individuals, 1 in general, case of an individual base income need . . . taxpayers suggested gross income for taxable use as modified by paragraph 2; 2 modifications, the adjusted gross income referred in paragraph 1 shall be modified by adding thereto the sum of the following amounts, A) an amount equal to all amounts paid or accrued to the taxpayers interest or dividends during the taxable year to extent excluded from gross income and the computation of an adjusted gross income . . ."

Speaker Blair: "Now, wait a minute, would the . . . I'm sure the Gentleman wants to . . . to concentrate on . . . on what is in the Amendment, and so let's accommodate him by reading it slowly, distinctly . . . ah . . . so he can concentrate."

Fredric Selcke: "B) an amount equal to 50 percent of the excess of the net long term capital gain for the taxable year over the net short term capital loss for such year to the extent deducted from gross income in the computation of adjusted gross income and B) an amount equal to the amount of the tax imposed by this Act to the extent deducted from gross income in the computation of the adjusted gross income for the taxable year, and by deducting from the total so obtained the sum of the following amounts, D) any amount included in such total in respect to any compensation paid to a resident in 1970 or thereafter by reason of being on active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States and in respect of any . . . ation . . ."

Speaker Blair: "Ah . . . Just one moment please, Mr. Clerk, rest your voice. The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Ron Hoffman, for what purpose do you arise?"

Hoffman: "Mr. Speaker, if it's the wish of the Democratic Party to sit



and listen to these Amendments and I would ask that the House be extremely quiet so we could hear every doltitone emulated from the Clerk's mouth."

Speaker Blair: "Oh, that's right, would the Members please be in their seat now because . . . and let's quiet down because the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Shea, wants to hear this. Wait a minute, for what purpose does the Gentlemen from Cook, Mr. Juckett, arise?"

Juckett: "Mr. Speaker, a point of parliamentary inquiry."

Speaker Blair: "Yes."

Juckett: "It's my understanding that under the new rules of the House, and this is a departure from the previous rules from the previous General Assembly, don't . . . isn't it a fact that we require these Amendments to be placed on the desks prior to the adoption of Amendment, and it's my understanding that the placement of these Amen . . . Amendments on the desks was so that every Member would know exactly what was in the Amendment and so that we could vote intelligently on the Amendment and I really don't see any reason for the reading of the Amendments in full."

Speaker Blair: "Yes, they're . . . they're not read . . . ah . . . and cannot be considered until they're placed on the desks before the Members."

Juckett: "But now what would be the purpose of reading it in full when it's already placed on our desk as for the constitutional requirement and our rule requirement?"

Speaker Blair: "Well, I suggest you direct your question to . . . ah . . . Mr. Shea. He wants it to be read too. The Gentleman from Franklin, Mr. Hart."

Hart: "Well, I would like to make a motion, I move that we . . ."

Speaker Blair: "Well, wait, you're not recognized for that purpose; now proceed with the, Clerk, would you read the Amendment?"

Fredric Selcke: "'D) Any amount included in such total in respect of any compensation paid to a resident in 1970 or thereafter by reason of being on active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States and in respect to any compensation to a resident in 1971 or thereafter for annual training performed pursuant to Sections 502



and 503, Title 32, United States Code, as a Member of the Illinois National Guard; E) An amount equal to all amounts included in such a total pursuant to the provisions of Sections 402A, 402C, 402D, 403A, 403B, 405D, 406A and 407A of the Internal Revenue Code or included in such total as distributions under the provisions of any retirement or disability plans for employees of any governmental agency or unit; F) The valuation limitation amount; G) An amount equal to the amount of any tax imposed by such Acts or by this Act which was refunded to the taxpayer and included in such total for the taxable year; H) An amount equal to the amount allowable as a deduction for the expenses for the care of certain dependents under Section 214 of the Internal Revenue Code, and I) An amount equal to all amounts included in such total which are exempt from taxation by the state either by reason of its constitution or by reason of the Constitution, Treaties or Statutes of the United States; B) Corporations, 1, in general, in the case of a corporation base income means an amount equal to the taxpayers taxable income for the taxable year as modified by paragraph 2; 2, modifications, the taxable income referred to in paragraph 1 shall be modified by adding it to the sum of the following amount; A, what? . . . okay, an amount equal to all amounts paid or accrued to the taxpayer as interest during the taxable year to the extent excluded from gross income in the computation of tax . . ."

Speaker Blair: "For what purpose does the Gentleman from Lawrence, Mr. Cunningham, arise?"

Cunningham: "Mr. Speaker, I arise to object to this degradation against the interest of every Member of this Body for the Speaker to give preferential treatment by . . . to the Minority Leader by humoring him by reading those . . . reading that Amendment. He has not cited any authority whatever to read it. We have each our own time schedules to keep. In the name of God, let's go on and not read anything further."

Speaker Blair: "Well, I certainly agree with you and . . . ah . . . I just wanted us to . . . ah . . . not be put into a position where



the . . . the Assisnat Minority Leader would accuse us of offend-  
ing . . . ah . . . him if we didn't pass the Amendment read . . .  
ah . . . so that he could understand what was in them and I  
didn't want the Chair to be accused acting in a arbitrary fashion  
on the matter and I hope that by letting the thing move on a  
little bit why it would render them harmless and I state that  
your point is well taken and if the . . . ah . . . the Lady will  
not explain her Amendment."

Fredric Selcke: "Yeah, Catania has a Committee Amendment."

Catania: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, Amendment #1 to House  
Bill 1357 is a Committee Amendment, it was ade . . . adopted  
unanimously in Committee and I move its adoption on the board."

Speaker Blair: "All right, is there discussion on the Amendment? All  
right, then, all those in favor of the adoption of the Amerdment  
say 'aye', opposed 'no'; the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment's  
adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1360, Bluthardt, is he here? Not here.  
House Bill . . ."

Speaker Blair: "Take . . . take it out of the Record."

Fredric Selcke: ". . . 1365, Lemke, not here."

Speaker Blair: "Take it out of the Record."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1366, Lemke, not here."

Speaker Blair: "Take it out of the Record."

Fredric Selcke: "1410 . . . ah . . . Emil Jones, House Bill 1410, a  
Bill for an Act to amend the Athletic Exposition Registration  
Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Are there any Amendments from the floor?"

Fredric Selcke: "Is he here, D. L.? House Bill 1411, what . . . no . . .  
no . . ."

Speaker Blair: "Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1411, D. L. Houlihan, a Bill for an Act  
to amend the Blood . . . Blood Lab . . . Labelling Act. Second  
Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Fredric Selcke: "Amendment #1, D. L. Houlihan, amends House Bill 1411



..."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, Amendment #1 to House Bill 1411 is an Amendment that was suggested in Committee . . . ah . . . it is an Amendment with . . . that I indicated to the Members of the Committee that I concurred in as a Sponsor of the Bill. The Amendment simply reduces the extension period provided for in the Bill from three years to two years, and I move the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "All right, discussion? Mr. Douglas."

Unknown: "Well, we're going into order . . ."

Douglas: "Ah . . . Would the Sponsor of this Amendment yield to a question?"

Speaker Blair: "He indicates that he will."

Douglas: "Mr. Houlihan, . . . ah . . . yes, there were those who may have agreed when you suggested yourself that you could limit the number of years but would you explain to us what the . . . what the purpose is? What . . . what difference will it make when every authority in the state was dealing with the blood problem, the Department of Public Health especially, which has gone overboard to assure you that they would make administrative changes what's the purpose in cutting down from three years even to two days something which everyone has said is just simply not necessary in the first place? What is your authority . . . ah . . . besides your own concern for this matter that justifies changing the Bill at all? It's bad to begin with and putting it down one year, I'm just curious what it is that prompted you to do that."

Houlihan: "If I may reply? Ah . . . First of all, . . . ah . . . we are dealing here simply with an Amendment emancipating the entire Bill . . . ah . . . that will be done in Third Reading. I'm quite aware Representative Douglas has opposition to this Bill, however, the Bill as . . . ah . . . initially . . . ah . . . framed called for an extension period of three years. Based on the . . . the suggestions of the Members of the Committee, I agreed to reduce the extension period provided in this Bill for two years. Now,



that's what the Amendment does, and . . . ah . . . it . . . ah . . . is actually in line with your opposition to this Bill, it limits the extension period that we are seeking under the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Douglas."

Douglas: "Well, . . . well, I'd like to speak against the Amendment, Mr. Speaker, now . . ."

Speaker Blair: "All right."

Douglas: ". . . the . . . the production is that by adding an Amendment on that presumably makes the Bill more palatable by lowering the number of years which is not true at all that there is an assumption that this Bill . . . and therefore that because the Amendment . . . ah . . . makes it only a one year extension to what is by far the finest piece of blood labelling legislation that we have in the United States will give people the erroneous idea that this becomes a better Bill; and I would speak against the Amendment on those grounds and . . . and hope that there would be other objections to it."

Speaker Blair: "All right, now, the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Capuzi, wants to be heard."

Capuzi: "Will the Sponsor yield to a question?"

Speaker Blair: "He indicates that he will."

Capuzi: "Ah . . . Mr. Houlihan, I believe that this is the Amendment that we spoke about in our Committee of Human Resources, is that correct, and the Membership agreed to a two year extension?"

Houlihan: "That is correct, Mr. Capuzi."

Capuzi: "Thank you."

Speaker Blair: "Other . . . the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Juckett."

Juckett: "Mr. Speaker, will the Gentleman from Cook, . . . ah . . . Doctor Douglas, yield to a question?"

Speaker Blair: "He . . . yes, will, it's a bit unusual, but he indicates that he will . . ."

Juckett: "Well, Mr. Speaker, he has spoken against the Amendment and I thought I'd ask him if that was okay."

Speaker Blair: "He an expert in the area."

Juckett: "Ah . . . Did you offer a Bill this Session which extended the



. . . extended the deadline for the . . . ah . . . liability of hospitals and doctors for hepatitis."

Douglas: "Yes, . . . ah . . . Representative . . . Senator Hall and I both had similar Bills that are being considered on that subject, but that has nothing to do with this subject at all."

Juckett: "Well, I think it does because there has not been a cure found for hepatitis and that was my original Bill two years ago, which . . . ah . . . which set up a deadline and you've extended that deadline and I think Representative Houlihan is doing the same thing on the . . . ah . . . blood labelling fact because not all of the cooperative blood . . . blood donor systems have been set up in the . . . the state and it's just absolutely impossible to meet this deadline of July 1 of 1973; and I don't see how anybody could oppose that when there is an impossibility to perform if they also support a Bill to extend a deadline on another item where there's an impossibility to perform; so, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I would urge you for the support of this Amendment to House Bill 1411."

Douglas: "Well, Representative Juckett, you use the word 'impossibility', that happens to be the opinion of two Members of this House. Every person, the Department of Public Health, which no one has mentioned, in all good faith in dealing with this . . . this Amendment and in asking that no Amendment be put on has by adminis . . . administrative edict which we granted to them under the Blood Labelling Act and through the . . . the recommendations of their task force said that they will and they have already met all the concerns that were expressed about having enough blood available for hemophiliacs and were even working to amend the Public Health Department appropriations; and I still submit in response to your question and the statements that this Amendment serves no purpose whatsoever, all the needs . . . all the needs have been met by the Department and, Representative Capuzi, I . . . I hope that you're aware of the fact that the Department of Public Health in response to the questions we raised in Committee have gone as far as we can



possibly expected . . . in telling us that they would and they showed us in writing they would amend their administrative rules to meet all these needs, and I ask you to recognize that even with this Amendment in addition to passing the Bill, which we'll discuss later, that we will be diluting and unnecessarily changing what is the finest blood Act in the United States."

Speaker Blair: "Further discussion? Does the Gentleman care to close?"

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, . . . ah . . . for the opponent of this Bill or the opponents of this Bill . . . ah . . . to oppose this Amendment is literally inconsistent for the failure to adopt this Amendment would be to leave the Bill in the . . . original form which calls for a three year extension. Ah . . . Based on the suggestions from the Members of the Committee we have agreed to reduce that extension to a period of two years. In consequence, we ask for your favorable consideration of the Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the question is on the adoption of the Amendment. All those in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment's adopted. Further . . ."

Fredric Selcke: "Amendment #2, D. L. Houlihan, amends House Bill 1411 on line 1 by striking Section and inserting in lieu thereof Section 2 and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, Amendment #2 . . . ah . . . to put it in perspective, subsequent to the Committee hearing of May the 16th in a meeting with the Representative of the Department of Public Health we were given a new guideline which . . . ah . . . became effective May the 17th state-wide. Ah . . . That guideline pursuant to the Blood Labelling Act reads and it's very brief and I'll read it as follows: It's Guideline A5 and it provides that 'blood donations on behalf of a hemophiliac for credit towards persons of pharmaceutical preparations commercially obtained in to be considered a donation'. What Amendment #2 to House Bill 1411 does is incorporate this language in the definition of donations and also excluding it from the definition





of purchase and I . . . ah . . . move the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Douglas."

Douglas: "Again, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this Amendment . . . ah . . . while . . . while appearing to simply go along with what the Department of Public Health has conceded to do . . . has agreed to do simply is adding something to the . . . to the statutory law which is unnecessary. There are many other facets of this problem which . . . which we have granted to the Department of Public Health to which we have granted to them the authority to . . . to pass down by administrative change through the task force that's been set up on this subject. I think also here we're putting something in and I'm beginning to get the feeling with some of the things that are being said that we have here the influence, I'm sure it's not intentional, from the profitmaking blood . . . blood banking industry which is . . . has been asking for these exact changes to be made. The profit-making blood banking industry which is some . . . is an organization and a group of people we have had to fight in getting the blood labelling law passed and . . . and to which we have . . . we have constantly got . . . which we have constantly got to deal on this problem are the ones who have been pushing these things. I'm sure the Sponsor of these Amendments and the Bill is not doing it without . . . without feeling in my . . . but I think that we're making a mistake if we go along with this Amendment 2 on what is essentially a very good piece of law to begin with; and I ask for your . . . ah . . . vote against this Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Juckett."

Juckett: "Well, Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I don't know where the distinguished Representative from Chicago has this inside information. This amendatory language did not come from the . . . ah . . . blood banks for profit, it came from people that were concerned with hemophilia and it came from people who . . . who are using hundreds and hundreds of pints of blood a year, and isn't it strange that the day after this Bill



passed Committee that our Department of Public Health changed their rules. Now, they've been in discussion with these groups for many months and nothing happened, but all of a sudden the Department when faced with a Bill passage which would further clarify this situation the Department of Public Health all of a sudden comes up with a brand new regulation which they hope would call off the heat on this Bill. But this Amendment is carefully drawn, it pertains to a situation which I hope none of us are ever in because if you are a hemophiliac, you live a restricted life and you live within the fear that any kind of an injury will cause the loss of your life because of loss of blood. This Amendment clearly puts into the field of donated blood that blood which is drawn for hemophiliacs and in many cases this is hundreds and hundreds of pints in any given year for a single hemophiliac. Now, I talked with the President of the Hemophilia Association this morning. I read him the proposed Amendment and I . . . as I did on the extension of time and he said it sounded good to him and he would put it before his Association but he would like to have it passed because it would help many people who are in a very serious position. So I would urge adoption of Amendment #2 to House Bill 1411."

Speaker Blair: "The Lady from Lake, Mrs. Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I was one of the Members of the Human Resources Committee which heard all of the evidence propounded to it on this Bill. I must say I'll have to disagree with our prior . . . with the . . . Mr. Douglas because I am in favor of this Amendment. In my county it is not easy to get voluntary blood and I urge all the Members here to support this Amendment based on what we heard and I'm . . . afford it to you in . . . heresay matter in the Committee because it is a necessary thing for the extension."

Speaker Blair: "Further discussion? The Gentleman care to close?"

Houlihan: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, in closing I would like to emphasize that the language of this Amendment was not drafted by me. It comes from the Department of Public Health. It is their guideline.



Now as Representative Juckett very...ah...pointly...ah... stated. This guideline has been attempted to be secured from the Department of Public Health since last August. The first time we got any response from the Department of Public Health in relation to this very significant problem was following the Committee Hearing on May the 16th. Now having given us a guideline...ah...they can also take the guideline away. What this does is incorporate that guideline into the statutory definition of purchase and donation. I urge your favorable consideration of the Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "Alright...ah...the question is on the adoption of the Amendment. All those in favor say 'aye'...'aye'. The opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1415, DiPrima. A Bill for an Act to amend Section 19.23 of an Act provides for the assessments of...ah...property. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Ah...Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1438, Pappas. Give me 1438...ah... a Bill for an Act to promote the Public Health, Welfare and Safety for the people of the State of Illinois by insuring the efficient administration of government to the promotion of free collective bargaining and so forth. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment...ah...amend House Bill 1438 page 2, line 32, by striking the wilful absence from one's position and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The gentleman from...ah...Rock Island, Mr. Pappas."

Pappas: "Ah...Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Committee Amendment #1...ah...strikes some language that...ah... might be unconstitutional...ah...so I therefore, move for the adoption of Amendment #1."

Speaker Blair: "Discussion? The question is on the adoption of the Amendment. All those in favor say 'aye'...'aye'. The opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Further Amendments? Third Reading."

Stone: "Ah...Mr. Speaker this...this series of Bills starts with House Bill 1451, 2, 3 and 4 and 51 was inadvertently omitted in the priority call...ah...it is on the Calendar and...ah..."

Speaker Blair: "Alright...ah...the Clerk says that the mistake was made and we will read 1451 now."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1451...ah...Stone. A Bill for an Act to amend the Community Mental Health Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments. Committee Amendment #1, amends House Bill 1451 on page 11, line 13 and so forth."

Stone: "This is a technical Amendment and it only corrects a typographical error and I move the adoption of Amendment...ah... Committee Amendment #1."

Speaker Blair: "Any discussion? Alright, the question is on the adoption of Amendment #1. All those in favor say 'aye'...'aye'. Okay, the 'ayes' have it. Further Amendments?"

Fredric Selcke: "Amendment #2...ah...Committee Amendment #2...ah... amends House Bill 1451 on page 2, line 24, by inserting before the period the following and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The gentleman from Moultrie, Mr. Stone."

Stone: "This...this Committee Amendment is an Amendment suggested by the Association of the Mentally Retarded. It is completely acceptable to me and to...ah...this Bill, and I move it's adoption."

Speaker Blair: "Alright, is there discussion? The question is on the adoption of the Amendment. All those in favor say 'aye'...'aye'. The opposed 'no'...'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1453, Stone. A Bill for an Act to amend the Municipal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee



Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Any Amendments from the Floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1454, Stone. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act relating to Counties. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Any Amendments from the Floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1464, Juckett. A Bill for an Act to amend the Mental Health Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments. Any from the Floor?"

Speaker Blair: "Any Amendments from the Floor? Third...Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1495...House Bill 1507, Keller. 1507. A Bill for an Act in relation to the applicability of local occupation taxes to catalogue sales. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Any Amendments from the Floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1517, Epton. Is Bernie here? Ah... a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Insurance Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 1517 page 5, by inserting immediately below line 11 the following and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Epton."

Epton: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This Committee Amendment helps expedite the liquidators in the disbursement of funds in the event of a liquidation, and I move for the adoption of Amendment #1."

Speaker Blair: "Alright, is there discussion? The question is on the adoption of the Amendment. All those in favor say 'aye'... 'aye'. The opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. Further Amendments? Third...Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1533, Garmisa. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act relating to Coroners. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Any from the Floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1541, Palmer. A Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Com-



mittee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Any from the Floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1555, a Bill for an Act to amend the Public Aid Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments. House Bill 1556, Lundy. A Bill for an Act to amend Section 304 of the Senior Citizens Disabled Persons Property Tax Relief Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Any Amendments from the Floor?"

Fredric Selcke: "I'm trying to find out...ah...yeh."

Speaker Blair: "Okay."

Fredric Selcke: "Wait a minute. No...1541. House Bill 1588, Murphy. Wait a minute. I don't know what do you have here? Well, he's not here. Do you want to move that? Murphy is not here. He's not here Mr. Speaker. No he's not on the Floor...ah...I can't. Okay, give me the Bill. House Bill 1588, Murphy. A Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act of 1939. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 1588 page 1 and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The gentleman from Lake, Mr. Murphy."

Murphy: "Mr. Speaker this is an Amendment that we put on in Committee to reduce the amount of land...ah...ten acres to be classified as farm land...ah...I move the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "Ah...is there discussion? All those in favor of the adoption of the Amendment say 'aye'...'aye'. The opposed 'no'...'no'. The 'ayes' have it...ah...the Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1618, Borchers. Ah...a Bill for an Act to amend the Juvenile Court Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments. Any from the Floor? Any from the Floor, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Blair: "Any from the Floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1650...ah...Tipsword. Is he here?"

Speaker Blair: "Yeh...he's here."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1650, Tipsword. A Bill for an Act to



amend Section 3 of the Real Estate Transfer Tax Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments. Amend House Bill 1650 page 2, line 29, by inserting a comma behind the word transferred."

Speaker Blair: "The gentleman from Christian, Mr. Tipsword."

Tipsword: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen. This Amendment is merely a technical Amendment correcting a grammatical error in this Bill. I would move for it's adoption."

Speaker Blair: "Alright, is there discussion? The question is on the adoption of the Amendment. All those in favor say 'aye' ...'aye'. The opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Further Amendments?"

Fredric Selcke: "Amendment #2, amend House Bill 1650 page 2, line 31, by inserting after the word information the following: pertinent to property tax assessment or equalization."

Speaker Blair: "The gentleman from Christian, Mr. Tipsword."

Tipsword: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This Amendment merely makes it absolutely certain that any information required upon a recoding statement for a date... ah...by the Department of Local Government should be information that would pertain to...ah...assessment or...ah...the valuation of property, and I would move for the adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "Discussion? The question is on the adoption of the Amendment. All those in favor say 'aye'...'aye'. The opposed 'no'...'no'. Zero...zero. All those in favor say 'aye'...'aye'. The opposed 'no'...'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1652, Hill. A Bill for an Act to amend the State Education Employment Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No...no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Any Amendments from the Floor?"

Fredric Selcke: "Ah...Amendment #1, Rigney. Is he here? Amend House Bill 1652 page 19 and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The gentleman from Stevenson, Mr. Rigney."



Rigney: "Well Mr. Speaker the intention of this Amendment is very simple. We've added only one word...ah...the word welfare to make it clear that when a judge is reviewing a strange situation...ah...he can consider the health, safety and the welfare of the children involved. It is a very simple one word Amendment. It's only intended to clarify the situation for an injunction."

Speaker Blair: "Discussion? The gentleman from Kane, Mr. Hill."

Hill: "Ah...Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I rise to oppose this Amendment in the Bill as it is drawn now...ah...we do have health and safety, and as the Sponsor has said the only word that would be added would be welfare. It seems to me that as far as adding this particular word to the Bill itself would only cause confusion. The word welfare is a very vague concept, and consequently it seems to me that it would cause more trouble than it would do good. In the...ah...National Labor Relation Act the word welfare doesn't appear, but...ah...the word national, health or safety appears and they have been functioning under this for many years, and I'd appreciate very much the defeat of this Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "Discussion? Further Discussion? Care to close Mr. Rigney?"

Rigney: "Well it seems to me that...ah...the welfare of children is really what education is all about, and I suggest to you that when we consider the rights of school boards and the rights of teachers...ah...the we also at the same time could consider the rights of the students that are involved. I wanted to make it clear that for instance that if a strike was dragging on for perhaps three or four weeks and if...ah...perhaps the health or safety of the children was not effected...ah...I think it is certainly effecting the welfare of these children. I wanted to make it clear that the...ah...judge would have injunction powers in this area...ah...for this reason I...ah...solicit your affirmative vote, and Mr. Speaker I ask for a Roll Call vote on this."

Speaker Blair: "Ah...for what purpose does the gentleman from





McHenry, Mr. Skinner arise? Alright, the gentleman is joining Mr. Hirschfeld, Mr. Skinner, Mr. Wolfe, Mr. Simms, Mr. Juckett and...ah...so...ah...the question will be on the Roll Call on the Amendment. All those in favor will vote 'aye', the opposed 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the Record. Oh...I'm sorry...ah...the gentleman from Kane, Mr. Hill. Go ahead Jack."

Hill: "Could I explain my vote Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Blair: "Sure, go ahead."

Hill: "I'd certainly appreciate very much a 'no' vote on this Amendment. What we have here is the addition of the word welfare, and I'm sure that you people know and realize that this particular...ah...word is...has a very vague concept and if this Bill were to become law, I believe that it would cause a lot of trouble...ah...in this particular sector, and I'd appreciate very much if you would vote 'no' on this Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "Alright, on this question...ah...there are 58 'ayes, and 30 'nay's' and the gentleman's Amendment adopted. The gentleman from...ah...Cook, Mr. Shea for what purpose do you arise?"

Shea: "How was I recorded?"

Fredric Selcke: "The...ah...gentleman is recorded as not voting."

Shea: "Would you record me as voting 'no', please?"

Speaker Blair: "I've already announced the Roll Call."

Shea: "Well I tried to get recognition...ah...Mr. Speaker, and I'd like to be recorded 'no'."

Speaker Blair: "It's no use...no use. Not before the Roll Call was announced."

Shea: "I tried, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Blair: "If you would stay in your seat, Mr. Assistant Minority Leader you'd know how you voted and...ah...you would be able to keep up with us."

Shea: "Well I was talking..."

Speaker Blair: "Are there further Amendments?"

Fredric Selcke: "Ah...Amendment #2, Griesheimer. Amend House Bill 1652 on page 5, by striking lines 23 through 28 and inserting



in lieu thereof the following and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The gentleman from Lake, Mr. Griesheimer."

Griesheimer: "Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House.

My Amendment is a very simple Amendment...ah...for once it should be rallied around by all of the Members of the House. As the Bill is presently constituted it provides that the school board and a teachers union or association may enter into an agreement whereby it would exclude any other teachers association. I believe that this would certainly interfere with the rights of the teacher to either participate in the professional...in a professional association or a union. In the schools in the Waukegan area of the State of Illinois we still have a great many of our teachers who think of themselves as professional rather than just union employees, and I would like to see the opportunity of these teachers who feel that they are truly professionals the opportunity to stay in their professional association. All my Amendment would do would be to allow those teachers who wish to be in the union the right to be in the union, and those who wish to be in the professional association the right to remain in the professional association... ah...would merely open up the Bill very slightly and would create an open feeling in the school systems, and I would urge your support for this Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "Discussion? Mr. Hill."

Hill: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I oppose this Amendment. This Amendment again would cause a lot of trouble in regards to this piece of legislation. The Amendment will strike a provision in our Bill which permits the labor organization and the public employer to negotiate and include in that agreement a requirement of maintenance of membership in a labor organization. It seems to me after a vote is taken whether they want to join a union or an organization that they certainly should have maintenance of membership, and I'd appreciate very much if the Amendment would not be adopted.

Speaker Blair: "The gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Schneider."

Schneider: "Would the Sponsor of the Amendment yield please?"



Speaker Blair: "He indicates he will."

Schneider: "Ah...Ron could you indicate to me what you mean by professional?"

Griesheimer: "Professional association, you mean?"

Schneider: "Yeah."

Griesheimer: "Well the I.E.A., I believe that they.."

Schneider: "Now I shared the last few months with you in the Education Committee, Ron. It seems to me that...ah...on many occasions when you talked about...ah...unions you have incorporated the I.E.A. as one of those unions. Now for the purposes of this Bill you're...ah...contending that that's not a union and it's a professional organization. Now either you're unclear maybe in your own mind as to the nature of what a professional organization is or you're just...ah...trying to undermine the Bill which is, of course, all right with me if that's your intention you ought to indicate that but I think really for a matter of consistency you ought to define what you have in your own mind. Now is you mean by professional organization maybe a principles organization or a statewide superintendent's organization I think that would be a consistent position and I think that might be ah...applicable to the Bill but I think off of...ah...some of our conversations in Committee you're offering at this point ah...different kind of criteria for the convenience of offending this to the Bill and then, of course, weakening the Bill but I think you ought state really what your purposes are or else make a redefinition at this point. I also...ah...submit that the Amendment is a bad Amendment and I think it ought to be beaten."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Will, Mr. Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "Will the Gentleman yield for a...ah...the Sponsor of the Amendment yield for a couple of other questions?"

Speaker Blair: "He indicates he will."

Leinenweber: "Ah...Representative Griesheimer if your Amendment is adopted then would, if your Amendment is not adopted under this Bill does the teacher have the right to refrain from joining any organization?"



Griesheimer: "I would...ah...answer that by only saying that that might be a possible...ah...off shoot of this Amendment...ah... ah...we are not directing our efforts to avoid a closed shop we just want to have the individual employee namely the teacher given the opportunity to...ah...take part in any organization they choose which might necessarily include the opportunity of not belonging to any association or otherwise organization."

Leinenweber: "But if, if you're Amendment was not adopted then it's conceivable that the employee organization and the school board might negotiate a way the right of an individual teacher not to belong to that organization. Is that right?"

Griesheimer: "Ah...that would be my understanding, yes."

Leinenweber: "I would certainly support this Amendment, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Champaign, Mr. Clabaugh."

Clabaugh: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I rise to speak in favor of this Amendment. Now if there's anyone who deserves to have this Amendment adopted it is that group and I assure you that there's thousands of members of teachers in the State of Illinois that have been and maybe still are members of the various organizations that are highly dissatisfied with the way those organizations are being run. Many many running into the thousands have gotten out of that organization because they don't like the things that have been standing for in the past five or six years. Now for this legislature to say that those people should be required to pay dues even though they don't belong and don't like whats going on to the extent that they gone out, is very unfair to thousands of teachers in this State and I submit to you further that one of the main reasons why this Bill with the provision which is really a union shop provision is here is because the organizations management knows that people won't pay their dues because they don't approve of what's going on and I think that any fair organization and this is the only one that this...ah...Amendment points itself against is the organization that realize that they are not delivering to the teachers of this State what the teachers want and that's the reason they've dropped out and don't want to pay



dues. I say that I'm in this case my sympathies are with the teachers who don't want it rather the organization who want to get their dues and continue to misuse their names either on or off the rolls as they please. I think this is a good Amendment and I think most of your teachers approve of."

Speaker Blair: "All right the Gentleman from...ah...Lake, Mr. Griesheimer to close."

Griesheimer: "Well Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I believe everything has been said on this. It's very clear we're just trying to...ah...leave our school system in a situation where it's open to the teachers, it's free for each teacher to make his or her own decision, who and what he's going to belong to, and...ah...the system has worked very well with...ah...competing associations in our own Waukegan district. I would urge you to support this Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "All right the question is on the adoption of the Amendment...ah...all those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. Pretty close. All those in favor vote 'aye', the opposed 'no'. Any explanation to vote? Mr. Hill do you want to explain your vote? I want to make sure we're not cutting you off now. All right. Have all voted who wish. The clerk will take the record. On this question there are 85 'no's' and 53 'ayes' and the...ah... Amendment fails."

Fredric Selcke: "Amendment #3, Hirschfeld, amend to House Bill 6052, page 1, line 4, and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Hirschfeld."

Hirschfeld: "Thank you Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. It's always a pleasure to follow Representative Griesheimer after that stellar...ah...performance...ah...I would like to say in beginning that this is not an attempt to undermine the Bill. I have great respect for the Sponsor of this Bill and I think that the Bill is an outstanding Bill. It has one slight fault. This is a mandatory Bill. Now several weeks ago on the floor of this House, House Bill 448 was introduced by Representative Hanahan and we attempted to put this Amendment on there...ah...this Amendment eliminates tenure if the Bill is signed into law and it



required the teachers to negotiate for their tenure. In other words they can still have tenure but they must negotiate for it just like they negotiate for wages, hours and working conditions and at that time Representative Hanahan said to me and said to this body as did other members that if a mandatory Bill came before this House and was signed into law they would have no objections to an Amendment that would eliminate tenure provided it could be negotiated for. I will assure you that the Illinois Education Association is opposed to this Bill...ah...pardon me supports the Bill but is opposed to this Amendment. Now I was in my district last night because of an emergency in my family and I took the opportunity afterwards to speak with the members of the C. E. A. which belonged to the I. E. A. with regard to this Amendment and Ladies and Gentlemen of this House the rank and file members of the Illinois Education Association supports this Amendment. They feel that they have no objection if they have to negotiate for tenure providing they have the right to strike, the right to unionize, the right not to be replaced by strike breakers and so forth, all of which would be provided by this Bill. When Senate Bill..pardon me..House Bill 448 was voted on that the Amendment was voted down many of you that supported my Amendment at that stage had mail sent to the teachers in your district by the I. E. A., mail that was misleading, deprecating, dishonest and inflammatory. Now most of this comes out of the mouths of one man who happens to be the lobbyist for the I. E. A. and I hope he's in the gallery today, Mr. Kent Bruce and I would tell Mr. Bruce that we have as much right to put Amendments on the Bill as the I. E. A. does. I frankly find Mr. Bruce's tactic and the tactic's of the Illinois Education Association personally obnoxious and Mr. Bruce called me to tell me that if I did not get in line with the I. E. A. that he could see to it that his big brother Senator Terry Bruce in the Senate saw to it that my Bills did not fly when they reached the Senate side of the rotunda. Now frankly I doubt if Mr. Bruce checked with his brother who's a State Senator who happens to be a close personal friend and with



whom I have handled a number of mental health Bills but even if he did that doesn't bother me. I think the Amendment is a necessary Amendment. I think that the teachers may not have both. They may not have the right to organize and the right to strike and still have tenure guaranteed unless they negotiate for it and I would encourage the Members of this House to vote with the rank and file members of the I. E. A. and not with the organizational leaders who intend to bleed it white with money and I would encourage a favorable vote on this Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Hill."

Hill: "Ah...Mr. Speaker I'd like to...ah...request an opinion from you whether or not this Amendment is germane to the Bill?"

Speaker Blair: "All right...ah...do you want to talk on it Mr.

Schneider? All right. Well we can probably while we're ascertaining whether it's germane...ah...listen to Mr. Schneider. The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Schneider."

Schneider: "Well thank you Mr. Speaker. Now on the Bruce Amendment ah...I'm speaking to the merits of it rather than to the characterization of Representative Hirschfeld as seen through the eyes of one teacher organization. I think what...ah...membership ought to concern itself with is again...ah...teaching in the classroom and tenure is allegedly granted for a two year or a three year period of time when the administration has evaluated and reviewed the abilities and the credentials of the person who's in the classroom over that two or three year period. Now assuming that the school board and the administrators find that his his performance to be acceptable he is then granted tenure. Now what this Amendment would...ah...purportedly do is to say now we're not going to deal with educational talent all we're going to say is you can negotiate your tenure. So we can move 200, 300, 400, 1,000 teachers into a tenure situation without any evaluation, without any criticism of that teacher's ability before the classroom. Now if the Membership and Representative Hirschfeld really want to do that then that's up to them. I personally think we have to be a little bit more



responsible and say that the system ought to be allowed to review the abilities of the teacher and move him on to tenure for purpose. So I think the Bill does quite the opposite of what the Sponsor rather the Amendment does quite the opposite of what the Sponsor intends and I think that you ought to defeat the Amendment if you're serious about education talent in the classroom rather than making it a kind of a charade of an issue to ..... for an organization or really to attach to the Bill again. So I would say...ah...the Bill the Amendment should be defeated. That the...ah...the intent perhaps from the Sponsor's point of view is legitimate but it's incorrect as to what's it's going to accomplish. Again I ask for a defeat of the Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "All right. The...ah...chair would rule that the Amendment as drawn is germane. The Bill's a very broad...ah... Bill in application and tenure there is a certainly one of the subjects...ah...and can properly be of collective bargaining. So in response to the Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Hill's request as the germaneness, the chair rules that that the Amendment is germane. Now Mr. Hill do you want to proceed?"

Hill: "Well Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I certainly oppose this Amendment. It seems to me that if the Sponsor of the Amendment does want something like this it should be a separate Bill. I'd like to say this that tenure as far as the teachers is concerned is something that is highly beneficial to all involved including the children in the classroom. I'd like to point out to you that as far as my view is concerned if it is ever enacted into law that is the time that the Sponsor should be act or reacting because this has a long way to go. I still believe that this particular Amendment should not be attached to this piece of legislation. It seems to me that there would be a lot of teachers lose tenure...ah...whether they belong to an organization or a union or not and it seems that this is a punishment. Now in regards to...ah...the Gentleman talking about the I. E. A. I'd like to explain to you that this is a O. S. P. I. Bill and as far as I. E. A. is concerned they are in back of this Bill even though they're reluctant in this



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respect. I also have the backing of the Chicago Federation and also the downstate teachers organization. So I'd appreciate very much if this did not become embroiled merely because of one or two individuals in the I. E. A. and I'd appreciate very much if you would defeat this Amendment. Thank you."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker would the Sponsor of the Amendment answer a question or two?"

Hirschfeld: "Yes."

Hanahan: "Representative Hirschfeld if your Amendment were adopted in school teachers in specific school districts around the State did not want to participate under the provisions of this Bill would they by your Amendment be removed from the tenure Act."

Hirschfeld: "That's not my understanding Representative because the Bill's a mandatory Bill and unlike your Bill it's not a permissive Bill."

Hanahan: "Well then I'd like to speak to the answer of that question.

The answer is an error. The Sponsor of the Amendment should realize that to abolish tenure under a mandatory Collective Bargaining Act as he called it, is not true. It's mandatory that the teachers have the right to be to come under the purview of House Bill 1652 to seek recognition and collective bargaining but I can foresee similar to the private sector there are three million in Illinois, working people. Two million of which do not belong to any collective bargaining units. I can foresee in the teaching industry the public...ah... employment sector of teaching that there be many school districts and many teachers that would not want to come under the provisions of House Bill 1652 and if this Amendment is adopted they would lose the right of tenure. I oppose it on that ground number one. Number two the other opposition to this Amendment would come on the basis that until you have true collective bargaining in the public employment field including the teaching profession to abolish tenure going into the collective bargaining would be folly because immediately the teachers would be fired upon



the expiration of...ah...their existing tenure contract and all bargaining would then take place with no tenure before a contract..ah..ah..allowed to become...ah...the agreement. I'd just suggest that the movement to abolish tenure which I do support at the proper time when there is true collective bargaining in the teaching profession when there is no injunctions allowed, when there is a provision in there for strike authorized and no strike breakers allowed to come in. When all these conditions meet then those teachers the Amendment should read those teachers who have taken advantage of that law should then have tenure removed. Now I don't know if that's constitutional or not under equal protection but I can't see taking away tenure rights from teachers who will not want to come under the purview of some form of collective bargaining and I oppose the Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Madison, Mr. Sharp."

Sharp: "Would the Sponsor of the Amendment yield for a question?"

Speaker Blair: "He indicates he will."

Sharp: "Yeah Representative...ah...Hirschfeld. I have one question here. We're talking about...ah...negotiating for tenure. I'm really uncertain what you mean by this. Could you give us an explanation of the manner in which you would negotiate for tenure?"

Hirschfeld: "Well I. Representative my answer to that would be it would negotiate for tenure just like you'd negotiate for wages, hours and working conditions...ah...that a...ah...tenure ah...ah...agreement would be drawn between a particular school board of the teachers in that district or if it's a broader negotiating group between several districts which would set down the guidelines for tenure for that particular area. So for example in Cook County they may have a seven year tenure..ah.. Bill. In..ah..county it may be a two year tenure Bill. In Stark it may be a five year tenure Bill depending on the particular negotiation. Then with regard to...ah...individual teachers and the problems that were raised by Representative Schneider, what would an individual teacher do. This'll be very similar



to grievance procedure that exists in labor negotiations today. If four or five teachers had to be passed on there would be a procedure setup under the Negotiation Act between the school board and the teachers and if there was a problem raised it would be...ah...decided by the grievance procedure under the particular labor agreement ..... Ah..I'm opposed to this Amendment...ah...basically because I feel tenure is designed for the teacher who goes into a school district, performs satisfactory for a designed period time set by period of time then is protected by the tenure law and I feel that there are provisions in the law to...ah...get rid of teachers who do not perform satisfactory...ah.. in the classroom after this day. So the only real question I have here is I don't think it's a practical thing to try to negotiate for tenure. I don't think it can be done...ah...under any practical set of circumstances and therefore I oppose this Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Peoria, Mr. Tuerk."

Tuerk: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. I just want to make one point in support of this Amendment. Those teachers and those groups representing teachers and those Members of this body who would ..... the merits of House Bill 1652 which is a collective bargaining process if within the spirit of the intend of collective bargaining it would seem to me that those people who want to be represented by collective bargaining would understand the realities of life and those realities are that whenever you have collective bargaining you give and take and this is one of the areas in which you can give and take. Now if you want all the better of all worlds, fine but on the other hand in a collective bargaining process you give up some things when you accept other things and therefore I think this is one of those areas the teachers have the possibility of losing in the long run if they engage in the collective bargaining process and I would urge your support of this Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Peoria or from Will, Mr. Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "Mr. Speaker I move to previous question."



Speaker Blair: "All those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. Previous question move. The Gentleman from Champaign, Mr. Hirschfeld to close."

Hirschfeld: "Thank you Mr. Speaker and I'd like to make it very clear that I don't get misquoted again. That I favor tenure. I have no objection to tenure but I think it's absolutely ridiculous to pass a Bill that is going to give the teachers every possible right and no liabilities. Now when tenure originally came into existence it came in basically for two reasons. To protect the teachers from school boards that were acting in a rather cavalier fashion and I would agree that the teachers needed the protection and to encourage teachers to stay on if they were qualified and I think that was a.....ah....reason for the Bill. We have gone from ten years which is what the word originally meant down to two or three years. Now despite the point raised by Representative Hanahan whether their a member of a union or their own voluntary organization these people can negotiate for tenure under this Bill and we are not taking away anything that should not be taken away in order to protect the school board, the school district, the schools, the children and the members of these organizations. We can still provide for personal review of the individual cases and I think the question on this Amendment is a very simple one. Are you willing to accept the age old concept that the tail goes with the hide. That's what we're asking you to do. If you get all the benefits you've got to at least accept the responsibility. I can assure the Members of this House that this Bill will pass with or without this Amendment. There is no way to stop a labor Bill on this House floor but if we pass this Bill out of here without this Amendment we are going to have a ..... and there is no way and I repeat no way that we will ever get rid of tenure and require it to be negotiated for just as the teachers negotiate for other aspects of wages, hours and working conditions and I would appreciate a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Blair: "All right. The question is shall this Amendment be adopted? All those in favor will vote 'aye', the opposed 'no'."



Have all voted who wish? The clerk will take the record. On this question there are 83 'yeas' and 37 'nays' and the Gentleman's Amendment fails."

Fredrick Selcke: "Amendment #4, Ron Hoffman, amend House Bill 1652, on page 10 by inserting after line 20 the following, and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Ron Hoffman."

Hoffman, Ron: "Would you take that out of the record, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Blair: "This is an Amendment. You want to withdraw it?"

Hoffman, Ron: "Mr. Speaker, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Blair: "Oh it's it's Gene Hoffman. All right. The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Gene Hoffman."

Hoffman, Gene: "I'm on occasion...ah...confused for the other Hoffman ah...Amendment...ah...#4 provides that...ah...it is very clear

in the Bill that there is nothing which...ah...prohibits employees ah...from presenting or making known their individual position to

the school board, just a regular meeting or to the district superintendent or other members of the administrative or super-

visory staff. The purpose of the Amendment is to just make clear on in everyone's mind that...ah...the individual...ah...staff

members has the prerogative...ah...to present his own...ah... position to the board or to the administration without going

through whoever happens to be...ah...the representative in this particular school district...ah...this seem to me a reasonable

in a modest way to ...ah...protect...ah...the individuals rights and I solicit your support for the Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "Discussion. The Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Hill."

Hill: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I certainly endorse this Amendment and request an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Would the Sponsor of the Amendment yield for a question? Representative Hoffman under no circumstance would this Amendment

allow an individual member of an organization to negotiate in behalf of himself or herself in deference to the agreement that

or the...ah...the arbitration or the...ah...city elective bargaining Committee that would be comprised of the school board

and the...ah...bargaining agents represented?"

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Hoffman, Gene: "No. It merely provides that they can present or make their positions."

Hanahan: "The only thing they could do is provide that they could present but they can't but they can not bargain separately from because they're disenchanted with some leadership of their bargaining Committee. They can not bargain separately or arbitrate separately from their duly authorized represented?"

Hoffman, Gene: "No."

Hanahan: "O'kay. Thank you."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Schneider."

Schneider: "Well Gene what is the purpose of the Amendment? Is there some kind of a prohibition that teachers can't express their opinion of school boards?"

Hoffman, Gene: "Ah...the purpose of the Amendment is that just make crystal clear in in all situations that you don't have some over zealous...ah...leader in an organization...ah...who says no one talks to the school board except through me and I think we've got that going on in some places and I think that's absolutely ridiculous and the purpose of this Amendment is to prevent that."

Schneider: "Because of your reputation I think it's probably a good Amendment and it's really perfectly crystal."

Speaker Blair: "Any further discussion? All right. The question's on the adoption of the Amendment. All those in favor say 'aye'. The opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. Further Further Amendments? For what purpose does the Gentleman from Fayette, Mr. Brummet rise?"

Brummet: "Mr. Speaker having voted on the prevailing side of which Amendment #1 to House Bill 1652 was adopted. I now move to reconsider both by which Amendment #1 was adopted."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Winnebago, Mr. Simms."

Simms: "Mr. Speaker I move that motion lie on the table."

Speaker Blair: "All right the Gentleman...ah...sought recognition for the purpose of moving to reconsider and that is not a proper order of business at this time. It will have to remain on the order of motions. Further Amendments...ah...state your



point."

Simms: "Mr. Speaker under Rule 54A as I read it, a Member who voted on the prevailing side of a record vote on a matter still within the control of the House may on the same day move to reconsider the vote...ah...or may give written notice that he will move to reconsider not later than the next legislative day. I would think it more prudent under this rule that such a motion is ordered while the matter is still pending. I think that that is written right into the rules."

Speaker Blair: "No it's not."

Simms: "Mr. Speaker, as long as you're giving a ruling I would like to you to tell me why not."

Speaker Blair: "I did when I explained it before you got up. Go ahead."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1698, Skinner."

Speaker Blair: "No wait a minute. I'm sorry. Are we past Third Reading? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh, William: "Ah...Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Blair: "Wait a minute, wait a minute now. We're back on the Gentleman from Union, Mr. Choate."

Choate: "Mr. Speaker I'm going to draw the attention of the House of something I believe is correct. You've ruled the Gentleman's motion out of order because it wasn't put on the order of... order of business where motions take effect. Is that correct?"

Speaker Blair: "Well we left the Bill on Second Reading."

Choate: "No, I mean this is the way that you ruled that it was out of order because we weren't on the order of motions."

Speaker Blair: "I I asked the Gentleman when he stood for what purpose he did and...ah...he told me that he stood for purposes of making motion to reconsider and I said that he would not be recognized for that purpose because we were on the amendatory stage."

Choate: "In other words he was out of order of the business of the House. We weren't on the order of motions. I think that's what you said."

Speaker Blair: "I said I did not recognize him to the purpose to making



that particular motion."

Choate: "Well we can go back to the tapes and I think that we'll find that I'm right but the point."

Speaker Blair: "The point is that I'm going to let him make that motion...ah...today...ah...he's not going to be precluded from making that motion."

Choate: "I understand that but the point that I want to bring out. That if the ruling that you have just made is correct then every Bill that has been passed by one or two votes and some Member rises up and says I wish to reconsider the vote by which that Bill was passed and you've recognized them for the purpose on both sides of the aisle for the purpose of locking up that Bill. All of those motions then were out of order."

Speaker Blair: "Well the point of it is I said I did not recognize him for the purpose for which he stood."

Choate: "Like I said I I."

Speaker Blair: "I think we understand each other. The Bill will remain on Second Reading...ah...and...ah...we will arrive at the point of order of motion sometime."

Choate: "I'm we understand each other and the fact is you just didn't want him to make the motion now...ah...because I don't why. Because the votes are not, they'll not change appreciably I dare say...ah...between now and later on in the day...ah...and I'm sure that...ah...ah...Representative Brummet was as much in order in that motion as any other Member has been when he locks up a Bill so to speak as we have done on numerous times in the past and probably will do on numerous times in the future."

Speaker Blair: "Certainly if he had..ah..stood and asked for recognition immediately after Amendment #1...ah...was considered and the vote was taken at that particular time on Amendment #1 I undoubtedly would have recognized him for the purpose of locking it up as you say. Except he really wants to unlock it. He doesn't want to lock it. So...ah...now we'll...ah...the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh, William: "Ah...Mr. Speaker I move that the House stand in recess for...ah...a half hour for the purpose of a Republican





Conference in Room 212. Following the recess we will break for lunch...ah...so that we will return here at 1:30...ah...for Regular Session."

Speaker Blair: "Ah...motion to adjourn not debatable for what...I mean to...ah...recess. The gentleman from...ah...Cook, Mr. Rayson for what purpose do you arise?"

Rayson: "Well I rise for a purpose of a point of parliamentary inquiry Mr. Speaker. What rule might I have to suspend to introduce these magnificent people who represent ten community colleges for the Springfield...ah...the Chicago who are sitting right behind you in the gallery?"

Speaker Blair: "Well I don't think any...any...ah...suspension is necessary on that now...ah...the proper procedure is to inquire of the Minority Leader or the Majority Leader...ah...concerning...ah...introductions and...ah...if that's what we provided in the rules...ah...ah...last week and...ah...that's...the reason for that is so that we can expedite the business of the House. Alright, there will be a Republican Conference in...ah...Room 212...ah...we will then go to lunch...ah...be back here at 1:30...ah...does that...ah...all those in favor of the gentleman's motion say 'aye'...'aye'. The opposed 'no'...'no'. The 'aves' have it. We'll recess now until 1:30."

Miller: "The House will be in Order. House Bills Second Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1698, Skinner. How are we going to go through the order Mr. Deuster? Okay...ah...out of the Record. House Bill 1725, Juckett. There he is. House Bill 1725, a Bill for an Act to amend Section 16 of the Nursing Homes, Sheltered Care Homes, and Homes for the Aged Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 1725 page 2, by striking line 25 and so forth."

Miller: "The gentleman from Cook, Representative Juckett."

Juckett: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. Committee Amendment #1 gives the council the Advisory Council the power to study and evaluate the adequacy of laws and it is an agreed Amendment, and I would urge the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1725."

Miller: "Any discussion? If not, the question is on the gentleman's



. . . ah . . . motion to adopt Amendment #1. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'; the 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 13 . . ."

Miller: "1332."

Fredric Selcke: ". . . House Bill 1332, Thompson, a Bill for an Act to amend the Insurance Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment amends House Bill 1332 by striking line . . ."

Miller: "For what reason does the Gentleman from Union arise, Representative Choate?"

Choate: "Mr. Speaker, would you have that Amendment read in full?"

Miller: "Ah . . . Did I recognize . . . who did I recognize, I didn't hear you. Ah . . . Proceed, Mr. Clerk, anything to oblige . . ."

Thompson: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I would like to table Amendment # . . . I would like leave to table Amendment #1 to House Bill 1332."

Miller: "Ah . . . The Gentleman moves to table Amendment . . . ah . . . #1 was it, Representative . . . Thompson . . ."

Thompson: "Yes."

Miller: "Ah . . . Any discussion? All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'; the 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is tabled."

Fredric Selcke: "Amendment . . . Amendment #2, Thompson, amends House Bill 1332 on page 1 by deleting line 1 and inserting in lieu, thereof, the following and so forth."

Thompson: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this . . . ah . . . Amendment #2 . . . ah . . . the only changes in it, it changed from 35 percent . . . from 50 percent to 35 percent of the number of individuals taking . . . ah . . . have . . . taking examination for temporary license for insurance. This Bill was agreed upon by the Department of Insurance and the insurance companies themselves. I would offer a motion that this Amendment be adopted to House Bill 1332."

Miller: "Any discussion? If not, the question is on the Gentleman's motion. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"



Third Reading. House Bill 916."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 916, been read a second time, Amendments 1, 2 and 3 were adopted, Amendment 4 tabled; Amendment 5, Borchers, amends House Bill 916, page 25, line 20, and so forth."

Miller: "Representative Choate, did you want me to call House Bill 349 now, did you think?"

Borchers: "Mr. Speaker . . ."

Miller: "The Gentleman from Vermilion, Representative Borchers."

Borchers: ". . . and fellow Members of the House, I might as well tell the truth about this because truth is the best defense. Ah . . . This Amendment is at the request of the County Board of Supervisors, the leadership in my county. It happens in my county and the board is controlled by the Republican Party. The sheriff is a Democrat and under the . . . ah . . . rules and regulations in relation to civil service, the sheriff appoints a . . . ah . . . a committee that okays the deputies and the civil service, etcetera. Now, it just happens that by one of those peculiar things that happens now and . . . began being human, the sheriff appointed three gentleman to the County Board of Supervisors, the President will not okay. So there we are in dilemma. Now, I am a Republican, we have . . . ah . . . no Civil Service Commission because the Board will not . . . will not accept the nominations and the sheriff will not back down. Right now, now, let me talk as an in . . . you might say, an independent Republican a minute. Actually, and I'll leave it completely up to the House, of course, there is a slight de . . . frugality here that we . . . we should cure this time or at another time, the frugality is that I believe there should be only one authority for anything, that this should be one authority, and so we should cure this some time that either the sheriff or the . . . the Board of Supervisors has the final decision because in some other county this kind of an argument is going to occur and, as a result, somebody is going to have to be waiting to be okayed for it, a deputy job or whatever it may be. We should cure it, however, I don't want to betray . . . since I have two Democratic fans on the other side, I'm not sure



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they're there, but I'm sure they know about it. They may object, but they have a right to; but those are the . . . those are the facts, we should cure it. If you pass this Amendment, which I will ask you to do and put on this Bill, . . . ah . . . you, of course, will be helping me as a Republican, Board of Supervisors; if you do not do it, that's you're going to be helping the Democratic sheriff and it is an interesting situation, but none . . . nevertheless, if we do the amount this time, we should do it one day because there's bound to be a similar situation happen in the other counties and they're . . . they'll be sitting, each of them trying to win against the other. So that's the fact, Gentlemen, I . . . I'd appreciate your putting this Amendment on . . . ah . . . the . . . ah . . . the House Bill 6 . . . 916, and so move."

Miller: "Ah . . . The Gentleman from Lake, Representative Deuster."

Deuster: "Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I deeply appreciate the total frankness, total candor, total honesty of the Gentleman in explaining his Amendment. It is my feeling that the Amendment, although it does purport to solve a political problem in Macon County, is really not germane to the Bill . . . ah . . . it . . . ah . . . has to do with appointments that are made by persons other than the County Board and . . . this Bill 916 simply clarifies the practice with respect to appointments that are already now made by the County Board, and I would hope that the Amendment was not adopted."

Miller: "Any further discussion? If not, the Gentleman from Macon, Representative Borchers may close the debate."

Borchers: "Well, Gentlemen, you had to perceive I've given you in complete candor of the situation here. I proudly disagree with my Republican compatriot, who is going against a Republican Member of the House. I think he'd be court-martialed or something similar to that nature. As far as the Democratic side of this House is concerned, if they'll come over and support this Republican Amendment, it should settle this Republican fight and . . . ah . . . and between the Democratic Staff and Republican County



Board, who might remind you in this matter and I will perhaps one day remember it, and come over and give you that extra vote. So let your conscience be your guide."

Miller: "All right, the question is Amendment #5 to House Bill 916 be adopted? All in favor signify by voting 'aye', contrary 'no'; the 'nos' have it, and the Amendment . . . are there five Members demanding a Roll Call, or 1, 2, 3 . . . all right, five Members demand a Roll Call. All in favor signify by voting 'aye', those opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the Record. On this question there are 98 'nays', and . . . what was that, 16 'ayes', Fred? 15, I can't see that far."

Fredric Selcke: "16 'ayes', 58 'nays' . . ."

Miller: "16 . . . 58 'nays' and 16 'ayes' and the motion to adopt the Amendment is, hereby, declared lost. Oh, 98 not voting, fine, the motion is lost. Any further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "All right, 1755. House Bill 1755, Choate, a Bill for an Act to create the Youth Service Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill . . . Telcser here, Telcser here? Mr. Telcser here?"

Miller: "Representative Telcser is not on the floor."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah . . . House Bill 1766, Maragos . . . ah . . ."

Miller: "Representative Maragos is not on the floor?"

Fredric Selcke: "Mr. McLendon . . ."

Miller: "Is there any Amendments?"

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1780, McLendon, is he here?"

Miller: "Is Representative McLendon, is he here?"

Fredric Selcke: "Okay."

Miller: "Yes, he's on the floor."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1780, McLendon, a Bill for an Act regarding leased residents . . ."

Miller: ". . . 899 on Second Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. Any . . . ah



further Amendments? Ah . . . Representative McLendon."

McLendon: "Ah . . . I notice Representative Chapman is not on the floor. She's brought an Amendment to me, will you hold that for a little while or take it out of the Record?"

Miller: "Take it out of the Record . . . why is it crossed off? . . ."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1818, Skinner, a Bill for an Act to amend the Public Aid Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1910, Arrigo, Victor here?"

Miller: "Representative Arrigo is not on the floor."

Fredric Selcke: "Oh she did, okay. House Bill 845, Lundy, . . . huh . . . it's got . . . the Amendment isn't printed yet, Mr. Lundy, we'll have to take that out of the Record. Ah . . . 868, Ewell."

Miller: "Yeah, he's here. Representative Arrigo is here."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 868, a Bill for an Act to amend the Airport Zoning Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "Collins. Representative Collins here?"

Miller: "Representative Collins is not on the floor."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah . . . R. L. Dunne here? Yeah, there he is. House Bill 930, a Bill for an Act to amend the Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment amends House Bill 930 on page 1, line 1 and 5, and so forth. R. L. Dunne."

Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Dunne."

Dunne: "Well, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, the . . . ah . . . Committee Amendment #1 really changes the Bill entirely and it merely calls for . . . ah . . . divides the Bill so that the Bill calls for a uniform speed limit on . . . ah . . . unposted residential streets in urban areas throughout the state; and I move for its adoption."

Miller: "Any further discussion? If not, the question is, shall the Amendment be adopted? All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'; the 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments? Third Reading."



Fredric Selcke: "Mr. Katz, not here. 997. Collins is not here. 101, Fleck."

Miller: "Is Representative Fleck on the floor?"

Fredric Selcke: "No. Kent, 34? Hudson . . ."

Miller: "Is Representative Hudson on the floor? He's not."

Fredric Selcke: "No, he's not here. 1037. Leinenweber? 1043. Brinkmeier."

Miller: "Is Representative Brinkmeier on the floor? He's not on the floor."

Fredric Selcke: "1060. Duff?"

Miller: "He . . . he does . . . I guess, he wants that held out of the Record."

Fredric Selcke: "Neff. Well, we're way passed you, Mr. Neff. Oh, hell, we're way by that. 1060, 1101. Neff here?"

Miller: "Rep . . . Representative Neff is on the floor. Representative Neff, do you want your Bill called? Clarence Neff, do you want your Bill called? Clarence Neff, do you want your Bill called?"

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1101, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill."

Miller: "For what reason does the Gentleman from Winnebago, Representative North, arise? Representative Pat North."

North: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, inadvertently left off the Priority List is House Bill 1069 and I checked with the . . . ah . . . Clerk several hours ago and he said he would put that in the call."

Fredric Selcke: "Yeah, yeah."

Miller: "1069, all right, Representative North . . . ah . . ."

Fredric Selcke: "Recognize Neff."

Miller: "Representative Neff is recognized."

Fredric Selcke: "Go ahead. Amendment #1 amends House Bill 1101 by deleting line 9 and so forth."

Miller: ". . . Henderson County, Representative Neff."

Neff: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, Amendment #1 is a Committee Amendment and is just a technical Amendment and I would move for its adoption."

Miller: "Will the Members please be in their seats?"

Neff: "I move the adoption of Amendment #1 . . . ah . . ."



Miller: "All right, the Gentleman's moved for adoption of Amendment #1, any discussion? All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'; the 'ayes' have it, the Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "On House Bill 1069, we have an Amendment, Pat, that hasn't been distributed. So we got to pass it by. Okay? Where is he? House Bill 899, Mann, a Bill for an Act concerning pay toilets. Second Reading in . . . of the Bill. One Committee Amendment, amends House Bill 899 by adding below line 16 the following and so forth."

Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative . . ."

Fredric Selcke: "What are you . . . Jack?"

Mann: "Ah . . . I move the adoption of Amendment #1 and I have an additional Amendment to offer."

Miller: "Is there any discussion? All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'; the 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted."

Fredric Selcke: "Amendment #2, Mann, amends House Bill 899 on page 1 by deleting lines 10 and 11 and so forth."

Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook . . ."

Mann: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, . . . ah . . . this reduces the prohibition on the bar of pay toilets to not more than 50 percent. I promised the Members of the Executive Committee I would put this Amendment on floor of the House; and I move its adoption."

Miller: "Is there any discussion? If not, the question is, shall the Amendment be adopted? All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'; the 'ayes' have it, the Amendment's adopted. Are there any further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1105, Gene Hoffman, is he here?"

Miller: "Ah . . . She's not here."

Fredric Selcke: "1127. House Bill 1127, Deavers, a Bill for an Act to amend the Municipal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1128, Deavers, a Bill for an Act to amend





the Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments. House Bill . . ."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: ". . . House Bill 1129, Lundy, an Act . . . in relation to mass transit fare increases. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Fredric Selcke: "Amendment #1, Lundy, amends House Bill 1129 on page 2, line 7, and . . ."

Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Lundy."

Lundy: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, when I appeared before the Executive Committee with this Bill, some question was raised as to the open-endedness of the sheer public hearings requirement, the fact that there was no maximum limit, and I agreed with the Committee that there should be such a limit in this Amendment imposes the limitation of not more than three public hearings, . . . ah . . . and this is in accord with . . . ah . . . this meets the approval of the Committee Members who expressed their concern on this issue and I . . . I ask for adoption of the Amendment."

Miller: "Is there any further discussion? Now, the question is on the Amendment. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'; the 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1141, Schlickman, . . . yeah, wait for my Bill, we're going down the order now, Chockey . . . a Bill for an Act authorizing State and Local Government bodies to cooperate and perform certain responsibilities by contractual agreement. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment amends House Bill 1141, page 1, line 9, by deleting 'permit' and inserting in lieu, thereof, 'encourage' and so forth. Schlickman."

Miller: "Repre . . . ah . . . the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Gene Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 1141, as it was introduced, would have required that inter-governmental cooperation



agreements and contracts be approved by a State's Attorney or Attorney General. This Amendment eliminates that approval requirement. I move for it's adoption, Mr. Chairman, Mr. Speaker."

Miller: "Any discussion? If not the question is shall the Amendment be adopted? All in favor signify by voting 'aye', contrary 'no'. The Amendment is hereby adopted. Any further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1766, Maragos, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Income Tax Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1144, Barry,.....here?"

Miller: "Representative Barry is not in his seat."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah...45's Barry not here. House Bill 1149, Schlickman, a Bill for an Act to amend the Northeastern Planning Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah...House Bill 1153, Harold Washington, a Bill for an Act to amend the County Police Department Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1154, Washington, a Bill for an Act to amend the Municipal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1155, a Bill for an Act to amend Section 11 of and to add to Section 11.1 to an Act in relation to County Police Departments. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "Yeah...House Bill 1160, Schlickman, a Bill for an Act to amend the Sanitary District Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Fredric Selcke: "Amendment #1, Schlickman, to amend House Bill 1160, page 1 by deleting line 19, and so forth."



Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, House Bill 1160 gives to certain sanitary districts expressed statutory authority to issue permits as a condition for the installation of sanitary and drainage sewers. By the Amendment...ah...we prescribe that the inspection incident to the permit shall be limited to a reasonable time following the initial sewage or drainage connection. I move for it's adoption."

Miller: "Any discussion? Now the question is on the adoption of the Amendment. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1162, Craig. Is Representative Craig on the floor? Ah...House Bill 1162, a Bill for an Act to amend to add Section 10 to an Act in relation to County Zoning. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1105, Gene Hoffman, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah...House Bill 1179, Dave Jones, a Bill for an Act authorizing Townships of less than 100,000 population to purchase or acquire fire, rescue and emergency vehicles equipment. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Fredric Selcke: "Amendment #1, Jones, amend to House Bill 1179, page 1, by deleting lines 25 and 26 and inserting in lieu thereof the following, and so forth."

Miller: "Ah...the Gentleman from Sangamon, Representative David Jones."

Jones: "Ah...Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House...ah... House Bill 1179 provides for a township to have a referendum for purchasing fire equipment but the this agreed Amendment in the House that...ah...clarifies the date for election. I move for it's adoption."

Miller: "Is there any further discussion? If not the question is to



adopt the Amendment. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1185, Kosinski, a Bill for an Act authorizing the sales certain real property in Cook County. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment, amend to House Bill 1185 page 1 by striking line 10, and so forth."

Miller: "Representative...ah...from Cook, Representative Kosinski."

Kosinski: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this Committee Amendments...ah...permits in the sale of property between the Department of Mental Health and Commonwealth Edison Company certain latitude to update the...ah...bid for the purchase of such property and I recommend it's adoption."

Miller: "Yes, any further discussion? The question is on the Gentleman's motion to adopt Amendment #1. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1190, Rayson, a Bill for an Act to amend the horse racing Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Ah...any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1201, Duff."

Miller: "Is Representative Duff on the floor? Take it from the record."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1202, McCourt."

Miller: "Representative McCourt on the floor?"

Fredric Selcke: "A Bill for an Act to amend an Act ..... a township organization. Second. Take 1202 out of the record. You want that one Toby? O'kay. House Bill 1159, Barry, a Bill for an Act to provide for certain reports by executive agencies to the Illinois Economic and Fiscal Commission. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1217...ah...Tipsword."

Miller: "Representative Tipsword, yes, he's on the floor."

Fredric Selcke: "A Bill for an Act to amend the Criminal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."



Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1220, Douglas, a Bill for an Act to amend  
 ..... Act in relation to Compensation  
 ..... to Members of the General Assembly. Second Reading  
 of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1221, Kosinski, a Bill for an Act to amend  
 the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee  
 Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1224, Hyde, a Bill for an Act providing  
 submission to electors of the State with question of public policy.  
 Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 883, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois  
 Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1034, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois  
 Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment,  
 amends to House Bill 1034 page 1, line 15, and so forth."

Miller: "Representative...ah...from Cook, Representative Hudson."

Hudson: "Well Mr. Speaker this Amendment was approved by the Committee  
 and it simply changes line 15 to read, prior to becoming a judge  
 rather than, prior to January 1, 1964 and I would urge the adoption  
 of this Amendment."

Miller: "The Gentleman from DuPage moves the adoption of the Amendment.  
 Any discussion? Representative from Cook, Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Thank you Mr, Speaker. I tried to listen to the explanation  
 of the Amendment. I couldn't hear him."

Miller: "Ah...Representative Hudson would you like to repeat your  
 statement please?"

Hudson: "How about a little order? Mr. Speaker order."

Miller: "Please let's have some order in the House so that the...ah...  
 men can hear the Amendment...ah...Representative Lechowicz said  
 that he failed to...ah...hear the explanation."

Hudson: "Ah...yes...ah Ted line 15 of House Bill 1034 this was is an



Amendment approved by the Committee and it changes the reading of that line in which says, shall have rendered service prior to January 1, 1964, it changes it to read, shall have rendered service prior to becoming a judge."

Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Lechowicz. No discussion? Any further discussion? If not the question is shall the Amendment be adopted? All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah...House Bill 1228 has an Amendment that hasn't been printed yet. Mr. Caldwell we can't call that. The Amendment's not back yet. Your Bill. House Bill 1236, Emil Jones, a Bill for an Act to amend the Municipal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1252, Tom Miller, a Bill for an Act to amend the Park District Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1263, Catania, a Bill for an Act concerning hours employment of females and certain occupations. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment amend House Bill 1263 page 1 and so forth."

Miller: "Representative Catania. Representative from Cook, Representative Catania."

Catania: "Thank you Mr. Speaker and Members of the House..ah..this is Amendment #1 to House Bill 1263. It was unanimously adopted in Committee and I move it's adoption on the floor."

Miller: "Any further discussion? If not the question is on the adoption of the Amendment. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 873, a Bill for an Act provides the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Illinois Law Enforcement Commission. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment amends House Bill 873, page 1 by deleting lines 10 through 20, and so forth."



Miller: "The Gentleman from Kankakee, Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "Yeah Mr. Speaker I'd like to have leave to table that Amendment."

Miller: "Ah...the Gentleman asks leave to table that Amendment. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's tabled."

Fredric Selcke: "Amendment #2, Getty, amend House Bill 873, page 1 by deleting lines 15 through 19, and so forth."

Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Getty."

Getty: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House...ah... Amendment #2 is a technical Amendment which corrects certain language so that the entire funding by the L.E.A.A. can be utilized through our matching funds and I move adoption of the Amendment."

Miller: "The question is on this Amendment. All in favor signify by saying 'aye'...ah...Representative from Cook, Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Mr. Speaker I was seeking recognition on Amendment #1 which was tabled to the Committee Amendment. I would hope that the Bill would be taken out of the record because the chairman of the Committee is not here and he voted supporting that Amendment and many other Members on this floor voted for, I opposed the Amendment at that time but in all fairness I think that the chairman of the Committee when an Amendment is adopted in Committee should be on the floor when a Bill is called and the Amendment is tabled by the Sponsor of that Amendment. Hope that the chair would make that reflection and I think it's unfair when this happens and I would hope that the Bill would be taken out of the record at this time."

Miller: "Ah...Representative Ryan is not on the floor at this time now and the Bill is and the Amendment is tabled. Representative from Cook, Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Mr. Speaker I think that the chairman of the Appropriations Committee Bud Washburn should be on the floor when the...ah.. Committee of Appropriations Committee Amendment is...tabled."

Miller: "Well we are in session and it certainly isn't the Sponsor's fault if the chairman isn't here..ah..and the Amendment has already been tabled. I don't...ah...believe we can recall it without a



proper motion...ah...Representative Telcser who's in...ah...Representative Simms seat wishes recognition."

Simms: "Ah...Mr. Speaker, Members of the House...ah...I understand that Representative Washburn is aware of the...ah...the sponsor's intent to table the Amendment. So it's not a situation where we are doing something he's unaware of."

Miller: "Ah...Representative Getty are you looking for recognition?"

Getty: "Yes...ah...Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen I had a conversation with Representative Washburn concerning this today and also with Representative Ryan and he is fully aware of the fact that Representative Ryan was going to move to table it and that...ah... I would offer Amendment #2."

Miller: "All right the question is on the adoption of Amendment #2. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "1251."

Miller: "Sitting...ah...excuse me Mr. Clerk. Sitting above us in the gallery is the National Council of Jewish Women. Sitting directly behind us in the Speaker's Gallery and they're here for a dinner and reception tonight. Give them a hand."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1271, Katz, a Bill for an Act in relation to the Evidentiary Weight of Toxicology Laboratory Report. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Katz."

Katz: "Ah...Mr. Speaker I'm pleased to report that the Department of Public Health desires that Bill to be tabled. So that will be one less discussion. I would move to table the Bill."

Miller: "The Gentleman moves to table House Bill, what is that Fred? 1271. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Bill is tabled."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1275, McMaster, a Bill for an Act to create a Township Government Laws Commission. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."





Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1282, McPartlin, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Purchasing Act. Is McPartlin here?"

Miller: "Representative McPartlin do you want on the record? Take it out of the record. I recognize the Gentleman from Cook, Larry DiPrima. Representative DiPrima did you want recognition?"

DiPrima: "Ah...Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House for the benefit of the new Members in the House I'd like to make an announcement pertaining to the...ah...Poppy Day sale that we're about to...ah..."

Miller: "Let's have some quiet for our favorite legionnaire, will you please?"

DiPrima: "Go into. Now for those of you that don't know. You know the poppies is a rehabilitation program that they have in the Veterans Hospitals and the veterans work on making up these poppies and they're compensated for their work. Now when...ah...Billy Sunday back in the 20's use to make a collection, he'd go around with a tin plate and he'd say I don't want to hear a sound. So now when our fellows go around I wish you'd give that consideration. This money goes toward the hospitalized veterans. Some of the poppies we have today are from the Amvets. Some from the...ah...VFW. In the past we've handled them for the Legion. So we spread it out you know. Commander Chief of the program are Robert Blair and...sh... one of the Congressional Medal of Honor, Clyde Choate. Chief.....  
.....are Bill Walsh and Jerry Shea. Regional Commanders are Jake Wolfe who brought the poppies down and myself. Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1285, Lemke, a Bill for an Act to amend the Interstate Judicial Compact Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."



Miller: "Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1304."

Miller: "Representative Lemke we just put your Bill on Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "Thompson, a Bill for an Act relating to the compulsory retirement of judges. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Fredric Selcke: "Amendment #1, Hart, amend House Bill 1304."

Miller: "For what reason does the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Thompson arise?"

Thompson: "Representative Mr. Speaker, Representative Hart has an Amendment to ..... House Bill 1304."

Fredric Selcke: "Amendment #1 amend to House Bill 1304 page 1 and so forth."

Miller: "Representative Hart is recognized to explain the Amendment."

Hart: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this Amendment just assures that it will only apply to those judges who are now ..... in office. I move for the adoption of the Amendment."

Miller: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of the Amendment. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1307, Madigan, a Bill for an Act to amend the Chicago Sanitary District Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Miller: "Any from the floor? Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1380, Matijevich, a Bill for an Act in relation to Consumer Protection creating the office of Consumer Advocate, and so forth. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee



Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Sélcke: "House Bill 1387, Beaupre, an Act to limit waiver of defense in certain retail installment transactions. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Representative Beaupre is recognized."

Beaupre: "Mr. Speaker, I have an Amendment Bill offer on this and it hasn't been printed up yet. I would like to defer to call on it... and..."

Miller: "Will you take... Mr. Clerk, will you take that Bill from the record please?"

Fredric Selcke: "Take it out of the record?"

Miller: "Take it out of the record."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill... 1388's having Amendments printed and they're not back yet. House Bill 1389, Barnes, a Bill for an Act to amend the Civil Practice Act. Second Reading of the Bill."

Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Holloway."

Fredric Selcke: "Two Committee Amendments. Amendment #1 amends House Bill 1389, page 1 and so forth."

Miller: "Representative Holloway is recognized."

Holloway: "Amendment #1... provides... that deleting lines 21 and 22 and insert therein that the officer, in his certificate or any record filed and maintained in the Sheriff's office, or other person making service... in his affidavit or in a record filed and maintained in his employer's office, shall, etc.... and on page 1 by deleting line 30 and 32 and inserting in lieu thereof... the following, a false statement, shall be liable in civil contempt. Where the court holds a person in civil contempt under this Section, it shall award such damages as it determines to be just where the contempt is prosecuted by a private attorney, and may award reasonable attorney's fees. Mr. Speaker, I move the adoption of Amendment #1."

Miller: "Is there any discussion? If not, the question is on the adoption of the Gentleman's Amendment. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's



adopted."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah...House Bill...ah...Amendment #2 amend to House Bill...oops hold the phone. Just a minute."

Miller: "Yeah Representative Barnes there's...ah...some confusion on this Bill. We have to check it. There's already a second Amendment on it and so we're going take it from the record for this moment."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1395...ah...Hart, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections 1, 4, 7, 12, and so forth of an Act to provide foreign relation Replevin. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends to House Bill 1395 on page 1, by deleting lines 18 and 19, and so forth."

Miller: "Representative from Franklin...ah...the Gentleman from Franklin, Representative Hart."

Hart: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this is an Amendment worked out by a Subcommittee of the Judiciary I on the Replevin Act...ah...it solves the problems and sets forth the guidelines suggested in the Supreme Court ..... I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1."

Miller: "Is there any further discussion? The question is on the Amendment. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1398...ah...Griesheimer, a Bill for an Act to amend the Unified Code of Corrections. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1400, Fleck, a Bill for an Act to amend the Principal Income Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 1400 page 3, line 7, and so forth."

Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook and Lake, Representative Fleck."

Fleck: "Ladies and Gentlemen, Mr. Speaker, Committee Amendments #1 is an Amendment which was...ah...suggested by the Joint Committee of the Illinois Chicago Fire Association which merely is technical. It cleans up the language of the Bill and I move the adoption of



Amendment #1."

Miller: "Any further discussion? If not the question is on the Gentleman's motion to adopt Amendment #1. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments. Third Reading. Representative Barnes we'll go back to your Bill now and Representative Holloway."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah...House Bill 1389, Committee Amendment #2 amend to House Bill 1389, page 1 by deleting 16, and so forth."

Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Holloway."

Holloway: "Ah...Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this is a simple Amendment. It...ah...merely...ah...increases the legal age for serving a summons on a member of a family from 10 years of age to 13 years of age and I move the adoption of Amendment #2."

Fredric Selcke: "Somebody changed it in pencil."

Skinner: "I changed it in the pencil. May I ask? What I did was changed the original Bill on the face of the Bill. Can I do that?"

Fredric Selcke: "No. In fact you can go to jail for that."

Skinner: "May I ask that it be taken from the record so I may get Amendment drafted to take it to where it originally was intended to be?"

Miller: "All right, take it from the record."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1428, Stiehl, a Bill for an Act to amend the Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment, amend to House Bill 1428 on page 1, line 16, and so forth."



Miller: "The Lady from St. Clair, Representative Stiehl."

Stiehl: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. Committee Amendment #1 will simply change the amount of \$3.00 to \$4.00. I move it's approval."

Miller: "Is there any discussion? If not the question is on the Lady's motion to adopt the Amendment. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'. The 'aye's' have it. Any further Amendments?"

Fredric Selcke: "Amendment #2, Stiehl, amend to House Bill 1428 on page 1, line 15 by deleting 69 and inserting in lieu thereof 65."

Stiehl: "Mr. Speaker I move for approval of Amendment #2."

Miller: "The Lady moves adoption of Amendment #2. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1433, Huskey."

Miller: "I just want to remind you Members if you're not paying attention. We just passed an Amendment that takes your salary away from you. So I hope you don't mind. Let's have a little attention, please." Huskey not here. Out of the record."

Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Yourell."

Yourell: "Well I just put in another Amendment doubling our salary."

Miller: "I adopted that before I called their attention to it."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1436, Giorgi, a Bill for an Act provides for funding and community action agency. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment amend to House Bill 1436, page 2 by striking line 6 and 7 by inserting in lieu thereof, and so forth."

Miller: "The Gentleman from Winnebago, Representative Giorgi. Is Representative Giorgi in his seat? Anybody handling this for Representative Giorgi? The Gentleman from Union."

Fredric Selcke: "Amendment #1."

Miller: "The Gentleman from Union, Representative Choate."

Choate: "Yes Mr. Speaker...ah...this Amendment was agreed to in the Committee and for Representative Giorgi I would move that Committee Amendment #1 be adopted."

Miller: "What does the Amendment do Mr. Choate?"

Choate: "Would you like for me to read it in full?"



Miller: "Any further discussion? The question is shall the Amendment be adopted? All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'. Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1437, Capparelli, a Bill for an Act to amend the Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1441, Giorgi. Does anybody want to handle that?"

Miller: "Is anybody handling this, Representative Giorgi's Bill?"

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1441 amends the Park District Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend to House Bill 1441, page 1, line 25, and so forth."

Miller: "Ah...the Gentleman from Union do you wish to handle this Amendment for Representative Giorgi? All right. Take it out of the record."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1470, Gene Hoffman, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code...ah...Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. Oh, pardon me. Representative from DuPage, Representative Schneider."

Schneider: "I think there is an Amendment Fred."

Fredric Selcke: "Oh..Amendment on 1470 is not printed, so we'll take it out of the record."

Miller: "Change it, Representative Schneider."

Fredric Selcke: "Amendment #1, Schneider, amend to House Bill 1470, page 1, line 1 by inserting after 29-5 the following, and so forth."

Miller: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Representative Schneider."

Schneider: "Thank you Mr. Speaker and Members of the House the...ah... Committee as a result of a conversation between the Members of the Committee, the Sponsor and myself...ah...clarifies some of the language and makes it applicable...ah...uniformly. It's agreed to with the Sponsor and myself. I move for it's adoption."

Miller: "The Gentleman moves for adoption of Amendment #1. Any discussion? All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. Third Reading."





Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1478, Skinner, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act relating to counties. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1484, Gene Hoffman, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1540, Palmer, a Bill for an Act to amend the Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1547, Matijevich, a Bill for an Act to amend the Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? The Gentleman from Lake, Representative Matijevich is recognized."

Telcser: "Ah...Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, Amendments #1...ah... was a Committee Amendment recommended by...ah...Representative B. B. Wolfe...ah...which...ah...stated that the contracts should be made available to the...ah...purchasers in both the language in which the newspaper advertisements were ..... in English and I move that Amendment #1 be adopted."



Miller: "Is there any further discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #1. All in favor signify by voting 'aye' saying 'aye' and the contrary 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah...Committee Amendment #2, amend to House Bill 1548, on page 2, line 11, and so forth."

Miller: "Ah...the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Telcser."

Telcser: "I move for the adoption of Amendment #2."

Miller: "Is there any further discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #2...ah...the Gentleman from McHenry is recognized, Representative Skinner, no. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendments adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Fredric Selcke: "Amendment Committee Amendment #3 amend to House Bill 1548 on page 7, by adding immediately after line 10 the following, the upon commencement of any action brought under this Section the plaintiff may mail a copy of the complaint, and so forth."

Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Telcser."

Telcser: "It's a Committee Amendment again Mr. Speaker...ah...recommended by the...ah...I believe it was Representative Wolfe again. I move for it's adoption."

Miller: "Any further discussion? The Gentleman moves for adoption of Amendment #3. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. I guess. I didn't hear anybody say 'aye' but...ah..thank you. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah...Committee Amendment #4 amend to House Bill 1548 on page 6 by striking lines 10 through 17, and so forth."

Miller: "Representative Telcser."

Telcser: "Well Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, this was the...ah... four and I believe the last Committee Amendment...ah...recommended again by...ah...Representative Wolfe and I move for it's adoption."

Miller: "Any further discussion. If not, the question is on the adoption of Amendment #4. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', contrary 'no'. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1550, North, a Bill for an Act to amend the



Consumer Fraud Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1562, Yourell, a Bill for an Act to amend Section 67.05. An Act in relations to Civil Administration of State Government, and so forth. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Fredric Selcke: "15..House Bill 1598, Philip, a Bill for an Act implementing the Constitution Provision of Comptroller of the Executive Branch. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Murphy: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, Amendment #1 simply makes the effective date of this Amendatory Act July 1, 1974 and it was suggested by the Office of the Secretary of State who will need until that date the time within which to implement the Act. I move for the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "Is there any discussion. The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1845. All in favor signify by saying 'aye'. The opposed 'no'. The Amendment's adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "Amendment on 1846 not printed. We won't take that. House Bill 1849, a Bill for an Act to amend Section 1 of an Act .....the Illinois Arts Council. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Are there Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1859, Maragos, a Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act of 1939. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend to House Bill 1859 on page 1, line 14, by deleting the word, what including."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Maragos."

Maragos; "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, I wish to move the adoption



of the Amendment #1 which is a corrective Amendment...ah...in this spelling."

Speaker Blair: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman asks for the move of the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1859. All in favor signify by saying 'aye'. The opposed 'no'. The Amendment's adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1860, a Bill for an Act to amend Section 3 of the Real Estate Transfer Tax Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1866, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Are there Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1869, a Bill for an Act to amend the Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Are there Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1870, a Bill for an Act to amend the Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Are there Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Speaker Blair: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Speaker Blair: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1880, a Bill for an Act authorizing Forest Preserve District Kane County to Aurora East Incorporated. Second



Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1886, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1889, a Bill for an Act to amend the Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1899, a Bill for an Act to amend Section 9 of the Impounding and Disposition of Stray Animal Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Are there Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1901, a Bill for an Act to amend Section 14 of an Act providing for Assistant Probation, and so forth. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1903, a Bill for an Act to amend the Juvenile Court Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Amendments from the floor. Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1904, a Bill for an Act to amend Section 6 of an Act in relation to jury commissioners, and so forth. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1908, a Bill for an Act to amend Section 14 of an Act providing for Assistant Probation, and so forth. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill. Oh he's not here. Mr. Arrigo's not here. House Bill 1912, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah...House Bill 1915, a Bill for an Act to amend the Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Are there Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1920, a Bill for an Act to amend the Criminal



Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Are there Amendments from the floor?"

Fredric Selcke: "Ah...Amendment #1, Ewell, amend to House Bill 1920 on page 2."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Ewell."

Ewell: "Mr. Speaker I move the adoption of the Amendment. In all sincerity I've I think I'd better read this Amendment to the...ah... body."

Speaker Blair: "That wouldn't be a bad idea."

Ewell: "Amendment #1 to House Bill 1920 is a very simple Amendment. It's simply says that nothing in this Amendatory Act of 1973 shall prohibit police officers from stopping and frisking any electronic communication when the police officers reasonably infers from the circumstances that the persons involved in the communication are committing are are about to commit or have committed an offense as .....in this code...ah...this is simply a stop and frisk Amendment...ah...we think it's entirely worthwhile because we have great faith in the police authorities of this State. We feel it will be a worthwhile tool and we can think in no other way how it's possible to trap and actually secure convictions against those people who are engaged in crime that amount to...ah...more than just a little ordinary crime...ah...I personally have faith in the police authorities. I do not believe that would be any abuse of this and I'd say that we're not even asking that you're not really inconvenienced by this type of stop and frisk. They don't even have to pat down the person or search them in any form or fashion. It's just a simple listen in and if nothing is going on that's criminal and if they don't have reasonable grounds and probable cause to believe a crime is being committed then it would not be in order but I think this is a simple Amendment. Worthwhile I think it would improve the Bill greatly and I urge the adoption."

Speaker Blair: "Is there any discussion? The Lady from Lake, Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Ah...Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I'm sure that the...ah...Speaker has good intentions, however, it's rather difficult for me to comprehend how a communication could mean



stop and frisk and, therefore, I would like to ask the prior speaker..... and I wonder if he would withdraw his Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Ewell."

Ewell: "I couldn't possibly do that. You see we're talking about the same type of stop and frisk...ah...when you catch a person on the street a stop and frisk it simply meant that we will have a routine patting down or routine search of the person. At no great inconvenience to the individual and clearly when they are not in violation of the law they would be allowed to go on. Now we're simply saying in this case you wouldn't even feel it. You wouldn't even suffer the indignity of knowing that it's been done. It's like that electronic...ah...surveillance when you walk into the airport. If nothing registers you have no problem and you keep going. All we're simply allowing them to do is when they have reasonable when they reasonably infer from the circumstances and remember that these police officers aren't just to be busybodies, and nosy people to listen in on your every conversation. All they simply want to do is when they reasonably infer from the circumstances and this is the language of our present law that the persons involved in the communications are committing or about to commit in a sense as defining the code. Now surely you don't want the bookies to walk around free from ..... You don't want organized crimes to succeed unmolested and all we're saying is this is a simple police tool. It offers no inconvenience whatsoever to the individual and I assure you that the people in my community would support this type of Amendment because after all we are stopped and frisked with regularity and...ah...as many of you have said it's no great inconvenience to us and I'm sure that this would be of no great inconvenience to you."

Geo-Karis: "Ah...again Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I ..... that I have the utmost respect for the ..... of the prior speaker, however, much as I may be in agreement with much that he says I do not feel that this Amendment would be ..... to this Bill. I cannot for the life of me figure out how a police officer is going to be able to



stop and frisk a electronic eavesdropping device and, therefore I respectfully ask that either the prior speaker and the Sponsor of the Amendment 1 either withdraw it or else I shall and I am objecting to that Amendment at this time."

Ewell: "I think there's just a slight misunderstanding. We don't want them to...ah...frisk the electronic device. What we want them to do is frisk the communication. In other words all we're doing is make this simple exception to keep the law consistent and...ah... we are concerned about the rights of individuals but we'll say that you wouldn't even feel it. You wouldn't even know it's there and surely it would offer nothing to the average citizen but after all we are concerned the art criminals, organized crime and we do want to keep our police department with adequate tools in order that they can perform their duty and I think this hysteria about phone conversations and bugging cannot be allowed to take away those...ah... necessary tools that the police need. So if you can understand simply the communication that we're stopping and frisking...ah... and not the device itself."

Geo-Karis: "Ah...again...ah...Mr. Speaker, if I may respectfully reply. The Amendment that the prior speaker and the Sponsor of the Amendment has is one that relates to electronic communication. Stopping and frisking any electronic communication. My Bill of 1920 relates to the registration of eavesdropping, electronic eavesdropping devices and the purpose of my Bill is to discourage unauthorized snooping. I respectfully request the Sponsor of this Amendment 1 to withdraw it. Again I repeat it has nothing to do with my Bill and if he does not withdraw it I respectfully ask this Assembly to honor my objection to Amendment 1."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Ron Hoffman."

Hoffman, Ron: "Thank you Mr, Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This Bill always seeks ..... and register the units we were discussing at this time. I think Representative Ewell has an excellent point, however, I don't think it goes far enough. I would like to see ..... in this Amendment the fact that eavesdropping devices can only be used if they are by court order, or authorized by the local authorities. If we have that provision



then certain the law enforcement agencies would have control and would know whether it is an applicable...ah...usage of this device or not and I see nothing wrong with the intent that Representative Ewell is purporting to put on but I really think...ah...Representative Ewell'll be well taken to take us a bit further, so that these devices can't only be authorized by the local authority. So they would have full knowledge of who was using it and for what purpose and if there was not for a legitimate purpose they would not authorize it."

Speaker Blair: "Okay the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Rayson."

Rayson: "Ah...Mr. Speaker I didn't want to engage in this...ah...matter but having listened to debate and I'm a Co-Sponsor of the Representative's Bill and I think it's a good one and I think we should subscribe to our purposes but I also feel that this Amendment is interesting and it's really consistent with his overall objective and I frankly see no harm in it and I really don't and I would like to see it included, and...ah...it certainly do anything to torpedo the Bill and I think, you know, it enhances the Bill and I rather hope that can get this good Bill passed with Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Washington."

Washington: "Ah...Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, I think Representative Ewell has done a service to this House by illustrating a very good point and I think what he's saying is simply this, that people when they're minding they're own business have a right to be free and secure and safe from snooping and prying into their personal affairs and what he is illustrating here quite vividly is that bugging is an unwarranted snooping upon people affairs and the Bill you voted down about a month ago the repeal of stop frisk is also an unwarranted intrusion upon people's private affairs. I think he's logical and consistent in bringing that point to us but I think that the Sponsor of the Bill is right. It's not really germane. I don't think it should encumber this very fine Bill and I join her in asking him...ah...to withdraw his Amendment after making that point. I hopes he makes it again, and again, and again before we leave here because I think that the facts develop on a national scene we're going to go on a crusade to repeal a whole lot of these repressive laws."





Stop frisk, excessive bugging, .....if we ever. All that sort of stuff is unwarranted intrusion upon people's rights and privacy and if we learn anything from what's happening on the national scene it's simply this, that we'd better get up off of our ..... and look at what some of these public officials in high places are doing and be very careful about giving to any agency of governmental, local, national or otherwise any unwarranted excessive discretion in prying into our personal private affairs. I want to congratulate Representative Ewell for focusing upon this very extremely important in such a way but I would suggest to him that he and I join bring this matter to the attention to the Assembly time after time but concede to...ah...Miss Geo-Karis wishes and withdraw your Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Peters."

Peters: "Mr. Speaker I was going to move to previous question but evidently there's some discussion on this and I'm just going to sit down."

Speaker Blair: "Is there further discussion? If not the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Ewell to close."

Ewell: "Ah...Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen...ah...it's seems that there are, well I have discovered a great deal of support for this type of an Amendment. Perhaps that the language just isn't specifically clear. We need to work on the language a little. I would be glad to but if this is not acceptable...ah...to the...ah.. Sponsor, then I would ask that we either vote on the Bill up or down and I ask for the Amendment up or down and I would ask that the Sponsor respond whether she wants to hold her Bill and see if we can't work this out."

Speaker Blair: "Do you wish to respond Representative Geo-Karis?"

Geo-Karis: "Ah...to save time if that is the request of the Gentleman who just spoke I will be glad to sit and work something out with him but I would respectfully again request to save time that you withdraw your objection at this time, Ray."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah...House Bill 1941, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Security Law. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."



Speaker Blair: "Are there Amendments from the floor? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea."

Shea: "I wonder if I might make a parliamentary inquiry at this time?"

Speaker Blair: "State your point sir."

Shea: "This is the last Bill on Second Reading priority of call. The next order of business is Third Reading. Is that where the Speaker intends to go after this?"

Speaker Blair: "No I'd like to go back on Second and pick up those Sponsors who were off the floor sir."

Shea: "Well could you tell me, does the chair intend to go to Third Reading today?"

Speaker Blair: "I I don't if I can speculate. We'll try. We'll try."

Shea: "Well I'm wondering if we might try right after this, cause we went through this hassle yesterday where we kind of asked the Speaker to go to Second and then it got all tangled up in votes and that and I don't think we'd like that today."

Speaker Blair: "Are there Amendments on the, on 1941 from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1228, Caldwell...ah...Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Law Business Purchasing Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend to House Bill 1228 page 1, striking all of Section 4A. and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Caldwell."

Caldwell: "Thank you Mr. Speaker...ah...Amendment #2...ah...I want to table Amendment #1, and I want to ..."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman moves that Amendment #1 be tabled. Is there objection? The Amendment is tabled."

Fredric Selcke: "Amendment #2, Caldwell, amend to House Bill 1228, on page 1, by striking all of Section 4A, and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Caldwell."

Caldwell: "Ah...Amendment #2 simply is the concession to the associated contractors of the State. We put in the...ah...in the Amendment in the Act, says this Section shall not apply to construction contracts. I move it's adoption."

Speaker Blair: "Is there discussion? The question is shall Amendment #2 be adopted. All those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'nay'. The 'ayes'



have it and the Amendment's adopted. Are there further Amendments?  
Bills advanced to the order of Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 684, Boyle. Is he here? House Bill 699, Katz, a Bill for an Act to amend the Environmental Protection Agency Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Are there any Amendments from the floor?"

Fredric Selcke: "Amendment #1, Katz, amend to House Bill 699 on page 1, line 1, and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Katz."

Katz: "Ah...this Bill that...ah...provides that in the event of a...ah...vacancies on the Environmental Pollution Control Board which prevents the agency from having a quorum...ah...is simply...ah...broaden to make sure that the failure of the agency to act due to the absence of a quorum will not result in the automatic granting of any permit. This does not make any significant change but it was pointed to me that the Amendment as explained in the Committee was not broad enough to cover the situation, it makes no significant ..... to changes however. I would move the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "Is there discussion? The question is shall Amendment #1 be adopted. All those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'nay'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. Are there further Amendments? Bill advanced to the order of Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 701, Katz, a Bill for an Act to amend the Environmental Protection Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Are there any Amendments from the floor? Bill's advanced to the order of Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 142, Rayson, a Bill for an Act making appropriation to the Department of Transportation. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend to House Bill 142 by striking line 12 and inserting in lieu thereof the following and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Rayson."

Rayson: "Ah...Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this Bill was put on in the Transportation Committee...ah...to a Bill to appropriate



\$5,000,000,000 to a much needed project in Park Forest...ah...this is a \$2,000,000,000 Amendment to enhance railroad crossings in Alton and...ah...being a Committee Amendment I move the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 142."

Speaker Blair: "Is there discussion? The question is shall Committee Amendment #1 be adopted. All those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'nay'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. Are there further Amendments? Bill is advanced to the order of Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 626, a Bill for an Act to amend the Toll Highway Authority Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Are there any Amendments from the floor? Bill is advanced to the order of Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 877, a Bill for an Act to amend the Code of Criminal Procedure. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Are there any Amendments from the floor?"

Fredric Selcke: "One Amendment from the floor. Mr. Mann here? Well take it out of the record."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Mann does not appear to be on the floor. Take it out of the record Mr. Clerk."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill. Barry's not here. He's on 1658. 1659. House Bill 890. Who's is that? House Bill 890, Duff. House Bill 890, a Bill for an Act to amend the Code of Criminal Procedure. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Three Committee Amendments. Apparently Committee Amendments 1 and 2 are tabled. Is that right? Committee Amendment #3, amend to House Bill 890 as follows on page 1, line 1, and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Duff."

Duff: "Ah...Ladies and Gentlemen of the House...ah...ah...Mr. Speaker do I need to move Amendments 1 and 2?"

Speaker Blair: "If they were tabled in Committee you do not."

Duff: "Right...ah...Amendment #3 is the result of a great deal of compromise...ah...with parties who are interested in this Bill which is essentially...ah...a Bill to modify...ah...the Grand Jury System in Illinois and...ah...we have held with the State's Attorneys



of Illinois and many other interested parties...ah...prolonged meetings to change some of the steps that we were trying to take in the Bill and retrench slightly. This Amendment is the result of those compromises and it constitutes the Bill...ah...I will...ah.. then offer Amendment #4 which is further compromise. Move the adoption of Amendment #3 to House Bill 890."

Speaker Blair: "All right is there discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Palmer with respect to Amendment #3."

Palmer: "Well Mr. Chairman I don't find Amendment 3 or 4 in my book. I may be having some difficulty on it but...ah...so that...ah...so that we're certain on this I'll ask the Gentleman if he'll explain Amendment #3."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Duff."

Duff: "Ah...I Amendment #3 I think Representative Palmer you're pretty familiar with because we have discussed it at some length before. It is the modifications that we made as a result of conversations with you and others relative to taking out the problem of evidence .....adversary grand jury and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "Is there further discussion? All right the question is shall Amendment #3 be adopted. All those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'nay'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment's adopted. Are there further Amendments?"

Fredric Selcke: "Amendments #4, Duff, amend to House Bill 890 by deleting all the title and inserting in lieu thereof."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Duff."

Duff: "Ah...Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment #4 to House Bill 890 is a further result of negotiation and compromise of some of the people who have...ah...interest in this Bill...ah...what it does essentially is after a meeting last week with the State's Attorneys Association and with the Representative of a Cook County State's Attorney they had suggested some additional modification..ah.. essentially this accomplishes all those...ah...substantively the .....most significant thing in it is that it defines more carefully and at a more limited way the affidavit which is mentioned in the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Is there discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Palmer."



Palmer: "The affidavit that is referred to is a . . . is the affidavit by the State's Attorney to the judge . . . or Chief Judge . . ."

Duff: ". . . ah . . . right . . ."

Palmer: ". . . and this one they wanted . . . some of them didn't want an affidavit and some of them wanted the affidavit more carefully defined. Ah . . . This is an effort to define the affidavit."

Speaker Blair: "Is there further discussion? All right, the Gentleman has moved that . . . ah . . . Amendment #4 be adopted. All those in favor say 'aye', oppose 'nay'; the 'ayes' have it, and Amendment #4 is adopted. Are there further Amendments? The Bill is advanced to the order of Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 614, Calvo, a Bill for an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Institute for Environmental Quality. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment amends House Bill 614, page 1, Section 1, line 11, and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Madison, Mr. Calvo."

Calvo: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, . . . ah . . . Amendment 614 is a Committee Amendment reducing the appropriation in this Bill and . . . ah . . . at this stage of the game . . . ah . . . until we determine what additional work load might be placed on this agency, the Amendment is certainly acceptable and I would move the House to adopt Committee Amendment #1."

Speaker Blair: "Is there discussion? The question is, shall Committee Amendment #1 be adopted? All those in favor say 'aye', oppose 'nay'; the 'ayes' have it, Committee Amendment #1 is adopted. Are there further Amendments? The Bill is advanced to the order of Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah . . . House Bill 1442, where's it at? Ah . . . He don't want it. Ah . . . Craig, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Are there any Amendments from the floor?"

Fredric Selcke: "Yeah, we got one, is he here?"

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Craig on the floor?"

Fredric Selcke: "Who's going to handle it for him? Will you handle it,



Jack?"

Speaker Blair: "I don't see Mr. Craig on the floor, Mr. Clerk."

Fredric Selcke: "Okay, out of the Record."

Speaker Blair: "Take it out of the Record."

Fredric Selcke: "14 . . . who's 1477? Huh? Is he here? Jim Houlihan on the floor? Yes, he is, yeah, 1017, who's that? Lundy? 1017, do you want to take that . . . do you want to call that, Mr. Lundy? Yeah, I think it is. House Bill 1017, Lundy, a Bill for an Act to amend the Insurance Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment amends House Bill 1017, page 1, lines 1 and 5, and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Lundy."

Lundy: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Ah . . . I would like to . . . ah . . . move the adoption of this Committee Amendment, and then move to table it because Amendment #3, which has just been distributed, includes the Committee Amendment which was Amendment #1. So I move the adoption . . . move to table."

Speaker Blair: "Oh, the Gentleman has moved . . . the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Maragos."

Maragos: "Would the Sponsor of the Bill and the Amendment please explain what those Amendments do and what the . . . for those of us who were not on the Committee, we may not know the significance."

Lundy: "I would be glad to respond to the Gentleman, however, I was just informed that . . . ah . . . Amendment #3 has not yet been distributed, and . . . and in that case, it seems to be more appropriate at this point to take the Bill out of the Record until Amendment #3 has been distributed."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Macon, Representative Borchers."

Borchers: "Mr. Speaker and fellow Members of the House, a point of personal privilege, and for us all, particularly why in relation also to Representative Brummet. I've just received a telephone call from the Giglio's and I think that's the way to pronounce their names, callin' Phil in relation to the raids by the narcotic agents without . . . ah . . . without warrants, you know, and the destruction of their property, etcetera, and they asked me to please convey to this



House their thanks for the Resolution; so that is what I've now done.  
Thank you."

Speaker Blair: "Okay, we'll take Representative Lundy's Bill out of the Record. Representative Shea, for what purpose do you arise, Sir?"

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, . . . ah . . . I've got an inquiry, I got a little confused yesterday. When we go on Third Reading, do we start with the priority of call, the first Bill, is that where we're at on Third?"

Fredric Selcke: "Yeah, yeah."

Speaker Blair: "That . . . that's correct, Sir."

Shea: "In other words, the first Bill on priority of call is where we'll start if we go to Third Reading?"

Speaker Blair: "That's my understanding."

Shea: "Thank you."

Fredric Selcke: "House . . . ah . . . Lundy's Bill is out of the Record."

Speaker Blair: "Representative Lundy's . . . ah . . . Bill is out of the Record, is that correct, Representative . . ."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1270, what about Katz, 1270. Is Katz here? Is Katz here? Not here. Mr. Katz on the floor? I don't know, I'm trying to find his . . . 1242 . . . if we'd go in order it would sure be a hell of a lot easier. Springer."

Speaker Blair: "Representative Springer, he's on the floor?"

Fredric Selcke: "Do you want 1242, Doc'? Give me it. House Bill 1242, a Bill for an Act to amend the Motor Fuel Tax Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment amends House Bill 1242, page 2, line 2, and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Randolph, Representative Springer."

Springer: "Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I move the adoption of Committee Amendment #1 to House Bill 1242."

Speaker Blair: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman has offered to move the adoption of Committee Amendment 1 to House Bill 1242. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', the opposed . . . the Committee Amendment is adopted. Further Amendments?"

Fredric Selcke: "Amendment #2, Deuster, amends House Bill . . ."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Lake, Representative Deuster."





Fredric Selcke: "We're on 1242, Springer moves the adoption of Committee Amendment #1; now we're on Deuster, Amendment #2. We're on Amendment #2, Mr. Deuster, amends House Bill 1242 on page 1 by deleting lines 1 through 4 and inserting in lieu, thereof, the following and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Lake, Representative Deuster."

Deuster: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, it was my hope that the Sponsor . . . ah . . . of this Bill would . . . ah . . . agree to keep it on Second Reading as I thought was the nature of a discussion we had in the House Transportation Committee . . . ah . . . inasmuch as this Amendment has something to do with the . . . ah . . . ultimate long-range solution of the Regional Mass Transit needs of northeastern Illinois and I would prefer . . . ah . . . if the Sponsor of the Bill would be kind enough to take it out of the Record that we would handle it that way."

Speaker Blair: "Do you wish . . . okay, the Sponsor indicates that he will take it out of the Record, and now this Bill will be on the order of Second Reading. Amendment #1 has been adopted, and now we'll take . . . do you want me to say . . . okay, now, Representative Springer, the Clerk informs me that we . . . it would be easier for him if we take it out of the Record, leave it on Second and you will move to adopt #1 all over again. So we'll take all of that action out of the Record."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1365, Lemke."

Speaker Blair: "Representative Lemke on the floor?"

Fredric Selcke: "No Amendments, I'll read it anyways."

Speaker Blair: "Okay."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1365, a Bill for an Act to amend the Workman's Compensation Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Are there Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "66, Jimmy. House Bill 1366, Lemke, a Bill for an Act to amend the Workman's Occupational Disease Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."



Fredric Selcke: "Skinner you ready? House Bill 1698, a Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1760, a Bill for an Act to create the Legal Board in the Department of Public Health. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill. Anybody want to handle Victor's Bill? House Bill 1910."

Speaker Blair: "Representative Shea for what purpose do you rise sir?"

Shea: "I'd like to handle Representative Arrigo's Bill that deals with the Chicago or I mean with the suburban TB Sanitarium and I'm familiar with the Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "All right."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah...an Act to provide for the creation and management of tuberculosis sanitarium districts. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend to House Bill 1910 change one, and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representativ Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1."

Speaker Blair: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman's ..... to move the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1910. All in favor of the adoption signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 845, Lundy, a Bill for an Act to amend the Aeronautics Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend to House Bill 845, page 1 line 21."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Lundy."

Lundy: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House...ah... once again...ah...this Committee Amendment has been superceded by Amendment #2 which...ah...does everything that the Committee Amendment did plus one other thing...ah...which is still consistent with the Committee Amendment and therefore I move the adoption of this Amendment and move that it be tabled and we move on to Amendment #2 which has been distributed."



Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman has moved to table Amendment number. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea."

Shea: "Could you, Joe could you tell us what Committee Amendment #. Could you explain what the Amendment your tabling does and what Committee Amendment or your Amendment #2 does?"

Lundy: "I'd be glad to. The...ah...Committee adopted Amendment...ah... permits the Department of Aeronautics to delegate to...ah...responsible sport parachuting organizations the...ah...authority to really to regulate their own members...ah...to issue permits and to...ah... to do all most everything with respect to approving drop zones for sport parachuting."

Shea: "All... this does with sport parachuting?"

Lundy: "Correct."

Shea: "Thank you."

Lundy: "The second Amendment which will be adopted includes everything that the Committee Amendment does and it also allows the Department to delegate one further authority to...ah...private skydiving clubs which is the authority to initially approve the location of...ah... drop zones."

Speaker Blair: "Is there further discussion? The Gentleman's move to table Amendment #1 to House Bill 845. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', the opposed 'no'. The Amendment is tabled."

Fredric Selcke: "Amendment #2, Lundy, amend to House Bill 845."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Lundy."

Lundy: "Amendment #2, Mr. Speaker, as I indicated does everything which Amendment #1 did and in addition allows the Department of Aeronautics to delegate two responsible sport parachuting organizations the authority to approve the location of drop zones for skydiving. I move the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "O'kay the Gentleman's moved. Is there any discussion? The Gentleman's moved the adoption of Amendment #2 to House Bill 845. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', the opposed 'no'. The Amendment's adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading. I'd like to take a moment now to introduce a former colleague of ours who's sitting...ah...in back of the chamber who's now a judge the Honorable Judge Rink."



Fredric Selcke: "House Bill, Katz's here?"

Speaker Blair: "Is Representative Katz on the floor? Take it out of the record."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 997, Collins. Collins here?"

Speaker Blair: "Is Representative Collins on the floor? All right go ahead with it."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 997, a Bill for an Act to amend the Unified Code of Corrections. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Are there Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 101, Fleck, a Bill for an Act to amend the Civil Administrative Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Are there Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "1043. House Bill 1043, Brinkmeier, a Bill for an Act conveying land to the City of Freeport. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Are there Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "1060. House Bill 1060, Duff. 1060."

Speaker Blair: "Take that out of the record. By the request of the Sponsor."

Fredric Selcke: "1144. Barry. Barry's not here. 1145. 1190, read, 1201. 1201, Mr. Duff. Do you want that one? A Bill for an Act creating the Illinois Council on Criminal.... Justice, and so forth. Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments. Committee Amendment #1. Amend to House Bill 1201."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Duff."

Duff: "Ah...Ladies and Gentlemen of the...ah...House, Committee Amendment #1...ah...do two relatively simple things. The first...ah...simply adds the Illinois...ah...Appellate Public Defender to the list of members and second...ah...the housekeeping chores, secretarial duties ah...which were put under the Department of Corrections are taken out. I move the adoption of Committee Amendments #1 and if I may 2 at the same time."

Speaker Blair: "Well we'll take separate Roll Calls. Is there any discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea."



Shea: "Who's going to perform the housekeeping and secretarial functions if you don't get it from the Department of Corrections?"

Duff: "Ah...we...ah...the feeling is that the...ah...giving the present fiscal situation in the State we're asking for a very small budget and we have functioned with a great deal of volunteer work...ah.. and quite satisfactorily I think and if the Governor does not want staff...ah...we would have it done within the Commission itself."

Shea: "Well how much are you going to ask for in appropriation to staff this with?"

Duff: "\$10,000."

Shea: "And how much did you get last year?"

Duff: "I believe it was \$25,000."

Shea: "So that you're really reducing what you're getting?"

Duff: "We are...ah...have had conversations with the Governor's staff on what kind of support should be here and we're trying to be responsive to his fiscal attitudes on it. We went for the last four or five months without any...ah...full-time staff at all. We had a little difficult time to be perfectly frank with you but...ah...ah...it has managed to function because of the fine efforts of people like Bob Scott."

Shea: "All right. Thank you."

Speaker Blair: "Is there further discussion? The Gentleman's asked to move the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1201. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', the opposed 'no'. The Amendment's adopted. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Duff has offered and moved the adoption of Amendment #2 to House Bill 1201. All in favor of the adoption signify by saying 'aye', the opposed 'no'. The Amendment's adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1202, McCourt. You got a floor Amendment there. A Bill for an Act to amend Section 6 of Article 11, an Act provides in relation to township organization. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Are there Amendments from the floor?"

Fredric Selcke: "Amendment #1, McCourt, amend to House Bill 1202."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative McCourt."

McCourt: "Ah...Mr. Speaker in the Committee there was a suggestion that



we clarify the Bill slightly by changing the word, coexistent to ..... although they both have the same meaning, so that has been on Amendment #1 and we've added two words, duties and functions to clarify it and I move adoption."

Speaker Blair: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman's offered to move the adoption of Amendment #1. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea."

Shea: "Will the Gentleman yield for a question?"

Speaker Blair: "He indicates he will."

Shea: "Ah...I understand how this would work say in Evanston or Oak Park or River Forest, Berwyn...ah...or Cicero but could you explain to me what would happen in a township...ah...like Riverside ah...where they're not ..... with any municipality?"

McCourt: "It would have no affect. It would have to be a township in a municipality that has .....boundary."

Shea: "Well I...ah...is the purpose of the Bill if the township government is abandoned then the municipal municipality would take it over?"

McCourt: "That is correct."

Shea: "All right. Now what happens to those townships such as the one I live in Riverside if they were to abandon the township form of government, do you cover in your Bill what would happen to those?"

McCourt: "Ah...no I do not. There would have to be additional legislation to cover that. This only takes one step and that's just those townships that have ..... boundary."

Shea: "Would you have any objection...ah...if when this got to Third Reading if we could come up with the language to take care of those others if we piggybacked it on your Bill?"

McCourt: "Well in a sense I would. I would prefer that this be done one step at a time...ah...I would prefer that each Bill be treated on it's own merit. I'd rather have this Bill just treated as taking care of both situations that 19 townships and municipalities have ..... boundaries and what you're suggesting could be done at some other time."

Shea: "Thank you."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1387, Beaupre, a Bill for an Act to limit the waiver defenses in certain retail installment transactions. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Are there Amendments from the floor?"



Fredric Selcke: "Is he out there? Bill Beaupre. Amendment #1, Beaupre, amends House Bill 1387, page 1, line 14, by deleting . . ."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Kankakee, Representative Beaupre."

Fredric Selcke: "I don't know where he sits."

Speaker Blair: "Is that Representative Beaupre, let's see, 1, 2 . . ."

Fredric Selcke: "4th one over, but I can't . . ."

Speaker Blair: "All right, take it out of the Record. He's not here."

Fredric Selcke: "What about 1388, what were we holding that one for?  
House Bill 1388, Stone, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act relating to awards of attorney's fees. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Are there Amendments from the floor?"

Fredric Selcke: "Amendment #1, . . . ah . . . B. B. . . . are you going to handle this Amendment? Amendment #1, Stone, amends House Bill 1388, page 1, line 2 . . ."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Moultrie, Representative Stone."

Stone: "Mr. Speaker, this Amendment just puts a date on it for the Bill to become effective and it's suggested by Representative B. B. Wolf and he is not here, I move the Amendment of . . . ah . . . the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman has offered to move the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1388. All in favor of the adoption signify by saying 'aye', oppose . . . the Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 14 . . . 1433, Huskey, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment amends House Bill 1433 . . ."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Huskey."

Fredric Selcke: "Mr. Huskey."

Speaker Blair: "He's right there, Fred."

Fredric Selcke: "Yeah, but he's not on his desk . . . oh, pardon me, I'm thinking of Lemke . . ."

Speaker Blair: "Representative Huskey, is this your Amendment? Who . . . is this a Committee Amendment?"





Fredric Selcke: ". . . it's a Committee Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "What . . . what Committee was it in, Fred? The Gentleman from Cook, Repre . . . the Gentleman from Sangamon, Representative Londrigan."

Londrigan: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I move to suspend Rule 10 to go to the order of Third Reading."

Speaker Blair: "Representative Londrigan, your inquiry is out of order. You were not recognized for that purpose, Sir, we're in the middle of a Gentleman's Bill. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Huskey."

Huskey: "Mr. Speaker, I move to table the Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman from Union, Representative Choate."

Choate: "Mr. Speaker, I would move that the provisions of Rule 10 be suspended so that the House might change in order of business and proceed to the order of Third Reading."

Speaker Blair: "Representative Huskey, for what purpose do you arise, Sir?"

Huskey: "I don't think I was . . . was given the courtesy of finishing . . . ah . . ."

Speaker Blair: "Representative Choate, for what purpose do you arise, Sir?"

Choate: "In . . . for the information of anyone that might be concerned, Rule 10 says and under B 'any order of business may be changed at any time upon the motion of any Member supported by five additional Members if the motion is adopted by an affirmative vote of 89 Members', in other words, Mr. Speaker, I'm certainly with Representative Londrigan was certainly within the pervue of the rules of this House."

Speaker Blair: "Well, Representative Choate, under the provisions Robert's Rules there is a motion pending on the floor and, therefore, the motion which you just put would be out of order. Representative Choate."

Choate: "Mr. . . . Mr. Speaker, now, you and I are not . . . ah . . . naive and we're not infants in this legislative business and we



realize that our rules in this instance supercede the Robert's Rules of Orders, and I am quite sure that the tapes will not . . . will show that there was not a motion on the floor at the time that Representative Londrigan made his motion."

Speaker Blair: "Well, now, Representative Choate, when you sought recognition, the Chair was under the impression you wished to discuss Representative Huskey's motion. It is the intention of the Chair to go to the order of Third Reading. Ah . . . We're in the middle of another motion and another Bill. It would be my ruling that your motion still, Sir, is not . . . ah . . . in proper order at this time."

Choate: "Mr. Speaker, I have no objection to Representative Huskey's motion, whatsoever; and I did not rise for the intention of making a motion until you had ignored Representative Londrigan's motion. I would withhold any motion that I was a part of until after the motion that Representative Huskey had made, which I'll be quite frank with you did not hear, and if he did make a motion to table that Amendment, I would say to you that that motion is in order and that we should act on that motion."

Speaker Blair: "Thank you very much. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Huskey."

Huskey: "Mr. Speaker, I renew my motion to table the Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Yourell."

Yourell: "Yeah, this is a . . . this is a Committee Amendment, Mr. Speaker, and I'd like to have the Gentleman explain what the Committee Amendment does."

Speaker Blair: "Okay, does the Gentleman wish to explain the Amendment?"

Yourell: "I haven't seen the . . . I haven't seen the Amendment . . . ah . . ."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Yourell."

Yourell: "I . . . I didn't hear the Gentleman respond."

Huskey: "Mr. Speaker . . . Mr. Speaker, I move that . . . ah . . . Amendment #1 be adopted."

Speaker Blair: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman . . . is there



any discussion? The Gentleman has offered to move the adoption of Amendment # . . . the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Yourell."

Speaker Blair: "Let's take it out of the Record."

Fredric Selcke: "No, we don't have many. House Bill 1484, Gene Hoffman, not there. Oh, man, 1512, can't somebody read those off the damn Calendar, I can't see and look every place. J. M. Houlihan here? House Bill 1512, a Bill for an Act in relation to protect the consumer of dissemination of inaccurate credit card information. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Are there Amendments from the floor?"

Fredric Selcke: "Yeah, we got one here. Amendment #1, Houlihan, amends House Bill 1512 . . ."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative J. M. Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Mr. Chairman, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Committee or Amendment #1 to House Bill 1512 merely cleans up one word and inserts in . . . inserts it in the Bill, and also changes the . . . the penalty to conform to the Uniform Code of Collections; and I would move its adoption."

Speaker Blair: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman has offered to move . . . the Clerk informs me the Amendments have been distributed."

Fredric Selcke: "I think, I can't remember everything."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman has offered to move the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1512. All in favor of the adoption signify by saying 'aye', the opposed 'no'; the Amendment's adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1526, Calvo, where the hell is it at, a Bill for an Act to amend the Horse Racing Act. Second Reading of the Bill. There's a floor Amendment on this someplace. Well, there's gotta' . . . you got Amendment . . . next Amendment, it must be #2, you gotta' have . . . no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Are there Amendments from the floor?"

Fredric Selcke: "Ah . . . Yeah . . . Amendment #1, Ewell, amends House Bill 1526, page 1, striking line 1 and inserting in lieu, thereof, the following and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Ewell, who is in McLendon's seat."



Ewell: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen . . . ah . . . this Amendment is the product of my personal hearing in the Executive Committee. We had there the Members, the attorneys for the Race Board, some other Sponsors for the Racing Board, and they told us in Committee that they needed extra days for horse racing in order to raise more money for the State of Illinois and I ask them pointedly, how much money would this give to the General Revenue Fund? They were uncertain, but they told me it would contribute quite a bit. Well, I have knowledge that by being on the Agriculture Committee that it all went to the Ag' Premium Fund. So they told us that no uncertain language myself and all the Members of the Committee that they would have no objections to this additional money going into the General Revenue Fund, which is sadly depleted. In order to do that, we had to strike some language of the present Act which prohibits any transfer of funds from racing to anything other than the Ag' Premium Fund, and so the jest of this Bill, and I wish all the Members would give me a little attention at this point, the jest of this Bill . . ."

Speaker Blair: "Representative Calvo, for what purpose do you arise, Sir?"

Calvo: "Well, Mr. Speaker, . . . ah . . . I hate to interrupt my good friend, Representative Ewell, Yourell . . . ah . . . sorry, Ray, Ewell, but I . . . I just want to make a point of order. Ah . . . I would ask the Speaker for a ruling about whether or not the Amendment is germane. Now, by the explanation he has made, he is amending a statute that is in existence different sections of the Racing Act and a statute that was passed by this House. Now, I submit that that Amendment does not amend this Bill in any shape or manner; and if I'm wrong, of course, . . . ah . . . I have no, you know, but I . . . I think we need a ruling. I don't believe it amends this Bill, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Blair: "The Chair would rule, Sir, that the Amendment is germane."

Ewell: "Mr. Speaker, . . . ah . . . I'm very gratified for that recommendation. I want to say to all the Members of this Body that what we're talking about here is revenue, revenue to the State of



Illinois, revenue to the General Revenue Fund, the pocket into which we dip to pay all of our bills. Now, what we're saying by this simple Amendment is to allow money from the race tracks to come into the General Revenue Fund. Now, we're not greedy, we don't want to reach back and take away from the Ag' Premium Fund and all of its fine purposes for exposition halls and fairs and all of the other laudatory purposes, but this additional revenue is needed by the State of Illinois, it's needed in the General Revenue Fund, and that's exactly what this Amendment would allow, the additional, only the additional racing days shall be deposited in the General Revenue Fund, the fund that benefits all of the people of the state, the fund out of which we pay all of our bills and the fund which is most in need; and I would ask for the support of the entire Body on this Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Vermilion, Representative Craig."

Craig: "You're damn right he is . . . Mr. Speaker, I'd like to ask the Gentleman from Cook a question."

Speaker Blair: "He indicates he'll yield. Who . . . ah . . . made this . . . suggested this recommendation? Who suggested this?"

Ewell: "Ah . . . The people of the State of Illinois, they said that the General Revenue Fund is quite low and they want every possible means to get additional revenue and . . . ah . . . we looked upon this and particularly when I heard from the attorney of the Racing Commission state that he did not care where the money went and that they had no objections whatsoever to it going to the General Revenue Fund. He stated that to myself and all the Members of the Executive Committee."

Speaker Blair: "Representative Craig."

Craig: "Mr. . . . Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I would like to . . . I . . . would you pay attention, particularly you people with . . . are interested in county fairs and things of that nature, the Ag' Premium Fund . . . this . . . this money was set up to go into the Ag' Premium Fund and we at time and time again raided the Agricultural Premium Fund for various means that we needed such as help pay the World War II pension, the Korean bonus and things of



that nature when we had to have the money. Now, here we come in again wanting to offer more racing dates, and here today there's a lot of county fairs in downs . . . in the State of Illinois that want more funds to rehabilitate for improvement of their fair-grounds, for prize money, also the people who have the Illinois coal stakes, they're wanting more money for the Illinois coal prize money and all of these people, they're costs have been going up the same as anybody else that's in State Government; and I think they should have some more money in order to provide for better racing in Illinois and to promote racing in Illinois which is a great factor in giving revenue to the State of Illinois. Now, this money was drawn to the Agricultural Premium Fund and to me I think the Racing Board has made this suggestion maybe to do this; and if I understand the fact of the matter, I feel that the Racing Board, as I know it today, has felt for many years in the past to do away with the Agricultural Premium Fund, and I say that this is one step in so doing; and I urge you to vote 'no' on this Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "Is there further discussion? The Gentleman from Kane, Representative Waddell."

Waddell: "Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I, too, arise in opposition to this. This is merely the first in a series of . . . of subterfuges that if we allow this to happen, the first thing you know, the entire fund will be gone, and I urge the defeat of this."

Speaker Blair: "Is there further discussion? The Gentleman from Peoria, Representative Schraeder."

Schraeder: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I, too, arise in opposition to this Amendment. It's the old story of chipping away and they get their foot in the door and pretty soon the whole body in and then the Agricultural Fund has gone out the window; and my downstate districts absolutely oppose these types of encroachments, and I would urge a 'no' vote."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative J. J. Wolf."

Wolf: "Would the Sponsor . . . would the Sponsor of the Amendment yield to a question?"



Speaker Blair: "He indicates he will."

Wolf: "Representative Ewell . . ."

Ewell: "Yes?"

Wolf: ". . . did I understand you correctly that at present none of the money from the racing goes into the General Revenue Fund at all?"

Ewell: "No."

Wolf: "No, it doesn't or . . ."

Ewell: "It goes into Ag' Premium Fund, all of it, all of it."

Wolf: "So then if we do increase racing dates . . . ah . . . we actually don't bring in revenue for the state except in the Agricultural Premium Fund."

Ewell: "That's correct, in other words, if we give them additional racing dates, we are getting no money whatsoever for the General Revenue Fund. In other words, the State of Illinois is not getting a dime. What happens is we're putting it into a special fund, and incidently this fund has about the . . . has, when we talk about funds, it has surpluses and funds which do not . . . the Ag' Premium Fund is consistently had a much greater surplus and the fund most in need is General Revenue because when we want to pay for mass transit, we dig into General Revenue, and when we want to pay anything else, in fact, if we want to pay welfare, if we want to pay costs or any type of thing for the . . . we dig into the . . . ah . . . General . . . General Revenue Fund. Now, all I want to do is take the increase, not their present fund, and I think there's adequate funding and no one will deny that, but I'm saying that the increase ought to go in the General Revenue because we need the money."

Wolf: "Well . . . well, just one final question . . . ah . . . you're not taking anything from the Premium Fund now? You're not taking anything away from the Agricultural Premium Fund?"

Ewell: "Nothing whatsoever. This is just an additional . . ."

Wolf: "Now, all right, the additional money coming in, will they also get an increase, part of it go in the Agricultural Premium Fund in part of . . . ah . . . and the . . . General Revenue?"

Ewell: "No, the General Revenue will only get the benefit of the increased days, that's all. In other words, the Ag' Premium Fund remains intact





but we're allowing these additional days and that's what they're asking for in this Bill; and I was assured by the Attorney for the Racing Commission and also the Representatives of the Racing Board who were there present that they didn't care where the money went, they would have no objections to this Amendment; and I have the other Members of the Executive Committee who heard it who will support me."

Wolf: "I was just going to suggest then, Mr. Speaker, . . . ah . . . or to the Sponsor of the Amendment that possibly if you allow some increase in the Ag' Premium Fund on the additional days with a portion going into the General Revenue we might eliminate some of the . . ."

Well: "Well, if we are willing to give the General Revenue any of it, I'm sure we could work out an Amendment; but if the intention of the Body is that under no circumstances no money will come in, then I would rather go with the Amendment. However, I'm willing to . . . if the Sponsor will hold the Bill, I'm willing to hold the Amendment and we could work out some portion to go to General Revenue. I have no problems. Would that be agreeable to the . . ."

Speaker Blair: "Representative Calvo, what is your wish, Sir?"

Calvo: "Well, my problem is that, you know, I . . . I think if Ray wants to amend the Act which provides for the fiscal portion of this matter that the Legislature passed which says how . . . where the money goes and how much, I don't have any objection to that, but that really isn't in my Bill, Ray; and . . . ah . . . I hate to hold it, you know, the day . . . going nigh to a close . . . and if we took it all the way through the Senate or . . ."

Speaker Blair: "Representative Lechowicz, one . . . one moment, please, Representative Lechowicz, for what purpose do you arise, Sir?"

Lechowicz: "Mr. Speaker, I was wondering if you ruled on the germaneness of this Amendment because this same matter was brought up in the Executive Committee what Representative Calvo is pointing out to the floor as far as a possibility of this Amendment or the . . . would not be germane to this Bill."

Speaker Blair: "We've made that ruling already, Sir."

Lechowicz: "Well, I appeal the ruling."



Speaker Blair: "Okay, the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Washington."

Washington: "Ah . . . I was under the impression that the Sponsor of the Bill was going to accede to the request which I consider very legitimate from Representative Ewell and if he does, then I won't have anything to say; but if he doesn't want to do that, then I support this Amendment wholeheartedly. What we have here is a windfall of millions of dollars and the question is, who gets that windfall? Now, I, for one, think that the people of the State of Illinois should share equally in that windfall. I'm not against the Agricultural Premium Fund. I don't recall a single vote I've ever made down here that direct even remotely, even threaten that Agricultural Premium Fund in the way its dispersed. I approve of it. What Mr. Ewell is simply saying is, why should they get this windfall? If we impose upon the people of the State of Illinois to the extent of additional date, then it appears to me that the schools and the mental health programs and all these other variegative programs throughout the state should get the benefit of that money; but the extent of Representative Wales . . . Raymond Ewell's reason in this is that he's suggesting to Representative Calvo that if he pulls the Bill out, he can work out some combination. Are you prepared to do that?"

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Madison, Representative Calvo."

Calvo: "Mr. Speaker, let's take this Bill out of the Record and I'll try to work with Representative Ewell and . . . ah . . . maybe later today or tomorrow we could call it."

Speaker Blair: "Okay, take it out of the Record."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill . . . I've got to get this 1526 . . . I'm giving it . . . yeah . . ."

Speaker Blair: "Okay, the Consent Calendar, Second Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "Take that out of the Record, George. Boy, what page is that on? House Bill 811, a Bill . . . to amend the School Code . . . the Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill. House Bill 870 amends the Illinois Highway Code. Second Reading of the Bill. House Bill 887 an Act to amend Section 2 of an Act authorizing . . ."

Speaker Blair: "Are there any questions on any of the Bills on the Consent Calendar, Third Reading?"

Fredric Selcke: "Not that I know . . ."

Speaker Blair: "All right . . . ah . . . if not, the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh, moves that the . . . the House Bills, Third Reading, Third Day, be passed. All those in favor vote 'aye', the opposed 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the Record."

Fredric Selcke: "Not destroying it, just . . . making it easier for him to get away . . ."

Speaker Blair: "On this question there are 146 'ayes', no 'nays'; and these Bills having . . . each of these Bills having received a constitutional majority is, hereby, declared passed."

Fredric Selcke: "Let me see it here, what is today?"

Speaker Blair: "House Bills, Third Reading, proceed on the order of call."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah . . . George, find out that Bill in here that has to do with . . . ah . . . with . . . ah . . . with . . . ah . . . House Bill 349, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Income Tax Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Sangamon, Mr. . . . ah . . . Londrigan."



Londrigan: "Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I appreciate the fine salute. This Bill provides individuals a sales tax credit for their food, drugs and medicine equal to \$10 for each exemption. This is the same Bill that received over 100 votes to get it out of Committee onto this House floor. It has not been changed. When the Constitutional Convention provided that we could have this sales tax released, I introduced a Bill similar to Speaker Blair's Bill that he has now."

Speaker Blair: "You're not supposed to mention the name of any Members in debate, proceed."

Londrigan: "Ah . . . A little . . . free advertising . . . in this Bill . . ."

Speaker Blair: "I wanted to get a disclaimer in there, you know."

Londrigan: ". . . provided direct relief on the sales tax. As you know, this Bill failed in a previous Session and was criticized by retailers and others. So I looked over to what other states are doing and found that the best approach and the one most used by other states is the sales tax credit approach. This also received encouragement of the Governor. This Bill has been approved in Committee by the Taxpayer's Federation, by the retailers who believe it is the simplest to administer, by the Department of Revenue who believe it is the simplest to administer so that there was no organization or organized opposition to this Bill. As I said, it is the simplest of all to administer and what I like about it, it is equitable to all; every citizen of the State of Illinois, and we all eat, will receive \$10 credit or refund on this sales tax. There can be no question or constitutionality. It will provide 110,000,000 tax reliefs. Now, I invite everyone on both sides of the aisle to Cosponsor this Bill, Republicans and Democrats alike, many are already sponsoring this Bill and I invite all of you to go up and get on this Bill. We have consistently promised the people sales tax relief for four years since we passed the income tax, we have not produced. This is our opportunity to produce. The people don't care how we do it, they want it done. We voted for the other sales tax Bill that left here, we believe that you and everyone in the



House should now support this and give the promised relief that we all gave them. Next time we'll be able to run and say I Cosponsored a sales tax relief and kept my promise to you, the people. I ask for your support."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from . . . ah . . . Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "Well, Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, . . . ah . . . the Gentleman represents that this . . . ah . . . is sales tax relief, nothing to be further from the to . . . the truth. What this Bill does is . . . ah . . . provide an extra exemption on the income tax and purely and simply reduce the revenue from the income tax. Now, I submit to you that this is the wrong approach, just as Representative Maragos has the wrong approach by doing substantially the same thing, because there's not necessarily a relationship between the amount of a credit that a taxpayer gets and the amount of sales tax that he pays. As we discussed earlier, exemptions claimed for people who live outside of the state or who may have never been in the State of Illinois are rewarded with \$10 as the Gentleman said. They don't have to expend any money at all for sales tax. Now, I suggest to you that the Republican Party has passed a tax relief Bill that has passed this House overwhelmingly and, incidently, with the . . . with the support of both . . . ah . . . voting and verbally of the Sponsor of this Bill. Ah . . . I suggest to you that it was directed at the sales tax. The sales . . . it was a credit for people who paid the sales tax, because it was a credit given them at the time of purchase at the counter, and that's where it counts, that's where they got the relief. It was related to what they paid in sales tax. Now, I suggest to you, Mr. Speaker, that if we pass this Bill, this is additional tax relief, we can say, this is tax relief at the income tax level, we passed this House tax relief at the sales tax level, the less regressive, but if we pass both of them, then we're not going to have a Regional Transportation Authority. In effect, what we're doing here is voting on a Regional Transportation Authority because the amount of money involved comes very close to



what the Regional Transportation Authority would cost. So what we're doing here is we're throwing away the Regional Transportation Authority and I believe the Governor whose ideas closely resemble this Bill, I believe the Governor is pretty well on record as not being very enthusiastic about a Regional Transportation Authority. May I . . . may I say further that the Sponsor of this Bill, the Representative from Sangamon and Montgomery Counties has a record of voting for tax relief, he has the taxpayers in mind certainly, he voted against the State Income Tax, and that's certainly laudable. Yesterday, however, he had a Bill before us that happily was defeated that would've cost the taxpayers of the State of Illinois approximately \$84,000,000 and that . . . ah . . . if you'll recall would have given sick pay to state employees upon their retirement, and I'll . . . he's gone further and Sponsored such things as . . . ah . . . Sangamon State University for Sangamon . . . for this area and that has met at the President of Sangamon State, if you'll recall, a mansion, but it also costs a lot of money, and I kind of wonder where the Gentleman figures some of this money is coming from. Now, finally, finally, Mr. Speaker, finally, Gentlemen . . . Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, the Gentleman has introduced House Bill 931 which would require the state to pay for health insurance coverage for all state employees' dependents, and not just the state employees, this would have cost some \$18,000,000. Now, I expect that the Gentleman is trying to make everybody happy, the state employees, for which there are many here in his district, and he's also helping out the poor beleaguered taxpayers in his district. Now, the Gentleman has got the best of both worlds, he's got no taxes and all kinds of services. Now, I suggest to you, Mr. Speaker, that maybe the motives of Sangamon and Montgomery County ought to smarten up a little bit and look to what they're sending to Springfield and kind of . . . what I'm saying really is they ought to send them to Washington . . . she's too much for us . . . seriously though I think they ought to . . . ah . . . they ought to consider and they . . . and all of us ought to consider what we're doing when





we're voting for so-called tax relief and when we do it at the level of the income tax, Mr. Speaker, I submit to you that we are . . . we are reducing, we are chipping away at the most equitable tax that we have in the State of Illinois and we ought to be directing our attention elsewhere, mainly in this instance toward providing tax relief so that we can have something . . . some of the things that we vitally need such as a Regional Transportation Authority and I urge that you vote 'no' on this Bill."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the Gentleman care to close?"

Londrigan: "Mr. . . ."

Speaker Blair: "Wait a minute . . ."

Londrigan: ". . . Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, . . ."

Speaker Blair: ". . . wait . . . wait, the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Maragos."

Maragos: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I was not going to speak on this . . . on the merits of this Bill at this time because it would not need much support from me. But since my name was mentioned in debate in spite of the ruling of the Speaker just a few seconds before the . . . distinguished Majority Leader admonished us not to use names, the Majority Leader did use my name in debate. First of all, I wanted to distinguish that so this will not have the Maragos-onus on it, this is not the same Bill that Maragos' Bill was, which was handedly defeated about three weeks ago. This has a different approach, in all seriousness, this has a different approach to the problem of giving relief. Call it what you may, it is still relief from the area of giving the taxpayer some amenities from paying sales tax and I was very much interested in what the Majority Leader had to say, that he went all around the ball park but still could not throw a good pitch to the batter upon which he could strike back, in other words, he was bringing in his other Bills and each of those Bills that he liked but does not like, he should vote on those Bills that are sponsored by Mr. Londrigan as they come up. But he should be cloud the issue that this is vital legislation and it is economically



feasible legislation. It will not cost the Department of Revenue or the taxpayers additional monies to administer for auditors and it will be simple relief and check . . . and . . . ah . . . and motivation for each taxpayer to show that this state of ours does consider his plight when he has to go to the grocery bill; so for doing that they'll tell him here's \$10 a year per person that you are supporting, take this in lieu of having you go through the long rigamarole of having to take it off at the counter where you're going to have to make expert auditors of the checking girls, where you'd have to have the Department of Revenue hire additional accountants and where you're going to have much more auditing procedures set up. I think it's a very laudable Bill. We should think of this Bill on its merits, and it's a program that the people of the State of Illinois should . . . ah . . . who . . . they really want, especially the elderly people and the people of the lower income groups. I wish you would support this Bill handily. Thank you."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Petrovich."

Petrovich: "Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, in relation to this Bill, I would just like to make one or two points. One of which is this that it is a misnomer and declouding the public mind when we reported this Bill as a sales tax relief Bill. For a married couple this will provide a rebate of \$20 which amounts . . . the amount of sales tax they would end up paying on \$100. Breaking that down to 365 days per year, what we're saying is we are giving you a \$.13½ per day on which you don't have to pay tax. Now, I think we'd be more proper if we'd just end up saying to the people of the state what we're doing here is giving it \$20 back without trying to puff this and to make it any bigger than it is. We are not providing sales tax relief, we are not taking the tax off of food or medicine, we are giving the people back \$20 which amounts to a food allowance of \$.13½ per day per person."

Speaker Blair: "The . . . ah . . . Gentleman from Macoupin, Mr. Boyle."

Boyle: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, . . . ah . . . since the . . . my seatmate, the distinguished Gentleman from Sangamon's name was



mentioned in debate by the distinguished Majority Leader. I only wanted to say, Mr. Majority Leader, that I didn't know what a great Legislator I was sittin' next to until you made all those fine remarks about Jim, we want to thank you."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Juckett."

Juckett: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, will the Sponsor yield for a question or two?"

Speaker Blair: "Ah-ha, Mr. Londrigan?"

Juckett: "Now, my understanding is that this is supposed to be sales tax relief, and I was wondering how did you arrive at the figure of \$10 per tax exemption?"

Londrigan: "First of all, I thought what others was doing . . . were doing in this regard and I talked to the Governor to see what tax range we might have the money to give this relief with, and we're talking around \$100,000 . . . \$100,000,000 area and the previous Bills that we been introduced have been in this same \$100,000,000 and it's been generally agreed that we have this much money to give for tax relief. I would like to make it more and, hopefully, in the future we will. I have had some ranges . . . ah . . . estimates by the retailers who seem to think maybe \$12 would be closer to the actual cost, but what we're primarily doing is giving the tax relief that we can afford at this time . . . ah . . . beginning, I hope."

Juckett: "In other words, you relate \$10 as far as this Bill is concerned to the average which is paid by each citizen in sales tax?"

Londrigan: "I . . . I've seen some figures with retailers that said \$12. Ah . . . I find that a little hard myself to . . . ah . . . agree with, however, as I said, that wasn't the approach. The approach is . . . is to have a beginning. We're here four years and we haven't started. This is an approach, and I hope . . . hopefully in the years to come we can raise this \$10."

Juckett: "Well, now, I see that you're amending the Income Tax Act and you have through your Bill you would provide a tax credit against the income tax. Now, would this credit apply and would there be a refund even if there was no tax due on the income tax?"



Londrigan: "That is true. Some talked about this tax refund and I had one suggestion that I amend this out of the Bill; but I think this is the most essential part of the Bill because while there will be welfare people that will get a refund, we can adjust what they're going to receive if we care to do so; but look at the large, large number of people that make from \$2 to \$8,000 depending upon their children and deductions. They pay no income tax. This is the group that primarily needs this tax relief and if we're not to give refunds to all people who were trying to make ends meet by taking a job would be penalized and I believe this Bill would be unconstitutional; but as a matter of principle, I have felt that we must give this refund."

Juckett: "Now, would it be possible for somebody who is say on relief who was not paying an income tax to have money refunded to them?"

Londrigan: "That's right, I just stated that previously, yes."

Juckett: "Well, Mr. Speaker, may I address myself to the question?"

Speaker Blair: "Yes, proceed."

Juckett: "Well, Ladies, and Gentlemen of the House and Mr. Speaker, I think is again another Bill where we're trying to restructure the economy and the income statures of everyone in the State of Illinois. This really has nothing to do with the sales tax. It's unfortunate that the Sponsor of the Bill does not have enough guts to stand up and say that he wants to redistribute income, because that's really what he's doing; and to try to pry it on to a very popular issue of sales tax reform is in my opinion a fraud upon the people of the State of Illinois; and anybody who would be connected with it, I think, is practicing a fraudulent practice. I think that if he really wants to do some reform of taxation, let him lower the income tax, let him lower the tax rates; but then, of course, that wouldn't provide additional money for those people who are not paying for the services of the State of Illinois; and so rather than helping the people who many times are struggling with two and yes even three jobs to get their kids through school, to give them maybe a college education that their mothers and fathers didn't have the privilege of enjoying, we are, in turn, saying we don't believe



in your effort, we don't think that your contributions to the economy are good enough; and so we want to take the money that you're earning and return it to those who don't pay their way; and I think this is a bad Bill, it's as bad as the one we defeated earlier this year, and I can see no reason why anybody who voted against that Bill could vote for this because they're two peas in a pod and I think the pod is mighty rotten and we shouldn't fall for this kind of a give away scheme to those who don't contribute; and I urge a 'no' vote on this bad Bill."

Speaker Blair: "The . . . ah . . . Gentleman from . . . ah . . . Henry, Mr. McGrew."

McGrew: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker, in the belief, as usual, that the Gentleman from Cook has said more than is necessary on this Bill, I'd like to move the previous question."

Speaker Blair: "All those in favor of the previous question say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it, the previous question has been moved. The Gentleman from Sangamon, Mr. Londrigan, to close."

Londrigan: "Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I want, first of all, to thank the Majority Leader for his very fine words of endorsement, I couldn't have said it better myself. I fortunately have had the endorsement consistently where it counts most with the voters. They understand what I am attempting to do for them. There's been an attempt here to make this part of . . . as Representative Catania said before, we are not here as Democratic Representatives, Republican Representatives, we are here as Representatives of all the people, and they told us they want tax relief. Now, I sponsored the first sales tax. The concept to give it directly. It was defeated, what am I to do, come back with the same again? No, I looked around for something better and I think we have found something better. Now, we can argue all day and all night for four more years about concepts and vote down every Bill. The people don't give a darn about concepts, they want tax relief. Now, here's a chance to give it to them. We voted for the last Bill on the Republican Leadership because we are voting on what the people want. Now, here's our opportunity to



again vote for tax relief. When we go back and run again, if this Bill should win or be defeated, they will say, 'how did you vote on these Bills?'. Suppose it wins and you're caught short. I don't think we want that to happen to any of us. Let's give the promised tax reform to the people now. Let's be sure we send through every worthwhile Bill and in some way the Governor will sign one of them. I ask for your support."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the question is, shall this Bill pass? All those in favor will vote 'aye', and the opposed 'no'. The Gentleman from Whiteside, Mr. Miller."

Miller: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I'd like to explain my 'no' vote, if I might. Last year, as I said previously on this House floor, the present Governor of this state told the people of Illinois that there was \$500,000,000 in the state budget which was not necessary. May I inform you right now, Ladies and Gentlemen, that passed out of this House or now pending on the Calendar of this House is Bills totally \$450,000,000 reduction in the General Revenue Fund, \$450,000,000. If this Bill passes, we're very close to the maximum which the Governor suggested to us. I'd like to say this, one of the main reasons that I'm not about to vote 'yes' on this Bill is that I think the Governor was wrong on his \$500,000,000 suggestion. I'm not one of those that wants to put this burden on his back. Now, I would suggest to the Sponsor of this Bill that if he is sincere in what he is trying to do for the people of Illinois, he is going to be back here next year and I hope and I hope sincerely that he will introduce an increase . . . an increase in the State Income Tax because that, Ladies and Gentlemen, is the only way the State of Illinois can continue to pay its bills; and I call upon him right now to say whether or not he is prepared to introduce an increase in the State Income Tax. Mr. Speaker, that is my reason for voting 'no' because I'm not ready to raise taxes on any person in the State of Illinois."

Speaker Blair: "Have all voted who wished? Mr. Ewell."

Ewell: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen . . ."

Speaker Blair: "The Clerk will take the Record. On this question there



are 11 'ayes', 31 'nays'; and this Bill having received the constitutional majority is, hereby, declared passed. The next Bill, Mr. Speaker."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill . . . what is the next one? . . . 576, a Bill for an Act to amend Section 1 of an Act in relation to Jury Commissioners and so forth. Third Reading of the Bill. Pierce."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Pierce."

Pierce: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, all this Bill does is put in the statute what's been practiced now in many counties and that is having bi-partisan membership on the Jury Commissioners. In counties over 40,000, the judges chose three Jury Commissioners. It's quite customary in many counties to have two commissioners of the Majority Party and one of the other party, but there's no statutory requirement. All that this Bill says is that the Minority Party will at least have one of the three Jury Commissioners in each county over 40,000. The . . . the Jury Commissioners Act is such that it only applies to counties over 40,000. We have a bi-partisan Boards of Review at the county level, Civil Service Commissions at both the municipal and county level, Sheriff's Merit Selection, Merit Boards are bi-partisan, and all this Bill does is assure that the . . . ah . . . Jury Commissioner shall be bi-partisan. The Bill was approved in the House Judiciary Committee. I ask for your support."

Speaker Blair: "Any discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Mr. Speaker, a point of information. I sat here quite intently to hear House Bill 349 pass and by the vote by which it passed; and I'm sorry I didn't hear the Speaker make that announcement."

Speaker Blair: "I did."

Lechowicz: "All right, thank you, Sir."

Speaker Blair: "Any further discussion? All right, the question is, shall House Bill 576 pass? All those in favor will vote 'aye', and the opposed 'no'; the Gentleman from Will, Mr. Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "Mr. . . . Mr. Speaker, in explaining my 'no' vote, the present Jury Commission Act . . . ah . . . does not specify



political affiliation. I think . . . ah . . . in this day and age . . . ah . . . when the turns of things of the ways of partisan politics that we ought not to mandate that . . . ah . . . politics get involved in such a thing as a Jury Commission. So I would certainly suggest . . . ah . . . there be more red lights up there and preserve our Jury Commissions from the inroads of partisan politics. I suggest more red votes."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Fleck."

Fleck: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, especially the Members on my side of the aisle, I wish you'd look at your Digest and see that this got 10 dissenting votes in the Committee, it only passed by 2 votes; and this was probably the first political issue that came up before the Judiciary Committee. It was strictly a party line vote, and I wish a lot of the Republicans who are voting green would switch around and . . . ah . . . take cognizance as to how our party posture should be on this; what it actually does is permits the downstate counties to have an additional most likely Democratic Jury Commissioner, and if your downstate County Chairman would want that, I suggest you vote green, otherwise I vote 'no'."

Fredric Selcke: "On 349."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Griesheimer."

Griesheimer: "Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, . . . ah . . . understanding the Sponsor's good intentions here and since we're both from the same county, I believe he is taking one giant step to play politics right into the middle of our Jury Commission where it just shouldn't be. We have a Gentleman on that Jury Commission, who as I understand it has been rather non-partisan in his politics for years, and what he is forcing is the distribution of two Republicans and one Democrat on every Jury Commission. Now, this is really base politics for no good reason whatsoever. We can choose up and take our sides when we're in the legislative process but we should try to keep it out of the judicial process if possible; and I can see no earthly good reason for this either in Lake County or any other downstate county; and I think we should vote 'no' on this issue."





Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Pierce."

Pierce: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, I'd like to . . . ah . . . explain my vote. The reason the Bill is needed and the previous Speaker didn't realize there's nothing more partisan than the present Jury Commission in Lake County or in many other counties where there are three Members of one political party. The Jury Commission is partisan, it should be bi-partisan the way the Sheriff's Merit Board is, the way the Board of Review is, the way Civil Service Commissions are; they all . . . ah . . . call for Minority Party representation as does the State Pollution Control Board, the Illinois Commerce Commission, most of our boards require bi-partisan membership. Right now the Jury Commission in Lake County has three Republican Members, no Democratic. They're very partisan, they lead to discredit . . . to discredit of the Jury system, they're unfair, they're partisan; and I think all we're doing here is assuring that there shall be bi-partisan membership on the Jury Commissions. If you want it all one way, vote that way. Some day, you know, the shoe may be on the other foot. In Cook County it's on the other foot. In other counties, St. Clair and so on, it's on the other foot. Let's assure that all our citizens of our county are represented on the Jury Commission. That's all the Bill attempts to do. You still have the Majority on there, you still have it two to one. Why not allow the Minority Party to have one Member on the Jury Commission. The Gentleman from Cook is very unfair on Judiciary Committee for saying this was a partisan Bill. It's not a Democratic Leadership Bill, it has bi-partisan sponsorship. Our Minority Leader didn't even know I had this Bill, he just asked me about the Bill. It's my individual Bill. It's not a Democratic Party Bill. I ask for your support. It's not partisan, it's bi-partisan Bill. The Majority Party will still control the Jury Commission. Let the Minority Party also have a Member on the Commission as we do on the Boards of Review. I ask for your support on this Bill."

Speaker Blair: "All right, have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the Record. Ah . . . On this question, the Gentleman from Cook,



Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, I think that's close enough to verify."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the Members will be in their seats and the Clerk will proceed to verify the affirmative Roll Call."

Fredric Selcke: "Alsup. Arrigo."

Speaker Blair: "Wait a minute, the Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Pierce."

Pierce: "I ask for a poll of the absentees."

Speaker Blair: "All right, poll the absentees."

Fredric Selcke: "Bluthardt. Brinkmeier. Catania. Collins. Deuster. Brinkmeier."

Speaker Blair: "Brinkmeier 'aye'."

Fredric Selcke: "Deuster. Duff. R. L. Dunne. Gibbs. Granada. Gene Hoffman. Dave Jones. Kucharski. McAvoy. Palmer. Rose. Schlickman. Schoeberlein. Totter. VonBreckman. Wall. Walters. B. B. Wolf. Now . . ."

Speaker Blair: "Now, proceed to verify the affirmative."

Fredric Selcke: "Alsup. Arrigo. Barnes. Barry. Beatty. Beaupre. Berman. Boyle. Bradley. Brandt. Brinkmeier. Brummet. Caldwell. Calvo. Capparelli. Carter. Chapman. Choate. Craig. Davis. DiPrima. Douglas. Ewell. Farley. Fary. Fennessey. Flinn. Garmisa. Getty. Giglio."

Speaker Blair: "Ah . . . The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, would you request the Members to raise their hands as their names are called?"

Speaker Blair: "I will request the Members to sit down so that the people that are verifying on the other side . . . ah . . . can see through them. Ah . . . Now, the Clerk will proceed."

Fredric Selcke: "Giorgi. Hanahan. Hart. Hill. Jimmy Holloway. D. L. Houlihan. J. M. Houlihan. Jacobs. Jaffe. Emil Jones. Katz. Keller. Kelly. Kennedy. Kosinski. Kozubowski. Krause. Laurino. Lechowicz. Lemke. Leon. Londrigan. Lundy. Madigan. Mann. Maragos. Martin. Matijevich. McClain. McCourt. McGah. McGrew. McLendon. McPartlin. Merlo. Mugalian. Nardulli. Patrick. Pierce. Polk. Porter. Speaker Blair: "Dunn 'no'. VonBoeckman, how's the Gentleman recorded?

Fredric Selcke: "The Gentleman is recorded as not voting."

Speaker Blair: "Record him as 'aye'. All right . . . ah . . . Mr.

Speaker Blair: "He's there."

Walsh: "Rayson?"

Speaker Blair: "He's there."

Walsh: "Mann?"

Speaker Blair: "Mann's there."

Walsh: "Laurino?"

Speaker Blair: "He's there."

Walsh: "Barry?"

Speaker Blair: "He's there."

Walsh: "I have no further . . . ah . . . questions?"

Unknown: "Keller."

Walsh: "One more."

Speaker Blair: "He's there. Are there any further questions of the  
affirmative? Mr. McCourt."

McCourt: "Mr. Speaker, how am I recorded?"

Speaker Blair: "How's the Gentleman recorded? McCourt."

Fredric Selcke: "The Gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."



McCourt: "Would you please vote me 'no'."

Speaker Blair: "Change the Gentleman's 'aye' to 'no'. The Gentleman from Perry, Mr. Dunn. How's the Gentleman recorded? How's the Gentleman recorded?"

Fredric Selcke: "The Gentleman is recorded as voting 'no'."

Speaker Blair: "Leave it that way. Mr. Duff, you're recorded as voting 'no'. All right, is there . . . are there any further questions now? All right, where are we, Mr. Clerk? 88 'aye', and 67 'nays'. The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Pierce."

Pierce: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, I move to Postponed Consideration."

Speaker Blair: "All right, . . . the Gentleman . . . the Gentleman has leave . . . now wait a minute, there's a motion before the House . . . ah . . . to Postponed Consideration. I have to . . . ah . . . have, you know, somebody has to do something before I can . . . ah . . . get to you, Mr. Arrigo, there's a motion before the floor by the Sponsor of the Bill to Postponed Consideration. Now, does the Gentleman have leave. Now, wait a minute, now, wait a minute. Mr. Pierce."

Pierce: "Mr. Speaker, was Mr. Arrigo taken off the Roll Call?"

Speaker Blair: "Well, I . . ."

Pierce: "I think . . . to take him off the Roll Call if he's here. I don't know whether he's been taken off . . ."

Speaker Blair: ". . . yeah, all right, what happened down here?"

Fredric Selcke: "The Gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Pierce: "That's what I thought. I'll move to Postpone."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the Gentleman moves to Postponed Consideration. Does he have leave? All . . . all right, . . . ah . . . place it on the order of Postponed Consideration."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah . . . Murph', you going to take yours now? Huh?"

Speaker Blair: "Senate Bills, Second Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "What page is that Bill? Senate Bills, Second Reading . . . ah . . . wait a minute, we got to go according to priority of call. 164. Senate Bill 164, a Bill for an Act to amend Section 1 and so forth of an Act in relation to control and maintenance of purchase of land, construction necessary of buildings



for public graveyards. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments. Any from the floor?"

Speaker Blair: "Any from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "Senate Bill 106, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act relating to marriages. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments. Do you got one on the floor? Amendment #1, Hirschfeld, amends Senate Bill 106 on page 1 by deleting all of lines 21 through 28 and inserting in lieu, thereof, the following: 'of venereal disease if on the basis of negative'."

Speaker Blair: "Ah . . . The Gentleman from Champaign, Mr. Hirschfeld."

Hirschfeld: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, . . . ah . . . Senate Bill 106, which is sponsored by Representative Day in the House and Senator Sours' Bill from the Senate, is a Bill that deals with the premarital exam for couples with venereal disease and . . . ah . . . at the time the Bill came through the Judiciary Committee it had a clause contained in the Bill that waived the medical examination of blood test requirements. It's contrary to the so-called sincerely held religious beliefs of the people that were inquiring into the possibility of marriage. The Amendment that I would propose . . . ah . . . would delete that particular phrase so that every couple that applies for a marriage license regardless of religious beliefs . . . ah . . . would be required to submit to these tests. At the present time, . . . ah . . . we are seeing a rise in venereal disease in this country and the State of Illinois of phenomenal proportion and I hard . . . I recognize that probably the best place to try and test this would be at the high school level; but parents take great umbrage if you want to test their children in high school. The only chance we have of checking . . . ah . . . a fair chance of catching venereal disease is in the premarital exam; and I do not believe that anyone should be removed from the obligation to take the venereal disease test simply because they might state that they have a sincere religious belief opposed to that test. To me it's very similar to the . . . ah . . . law we have now where if a child would be dying and needed transfusion, we can transfuse that child



even if the parents object and I would move the adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from . . . ah . . . Union, Mr. Choate."

Choate: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, I want the Sponsor of the Bill to know that . . . ah . . . the Amendments have not been distributed, however, I did listen to his very adequate explanation of the Amendment. I'd want him to know that I'm not disagreeing with it at all, however, because of the re . . . way that you describe the Amendment that they haven't been dis . . . I have no objections to the Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "The Clerk advises the Amendment's been out for three or four weeks on the desks."

Fredric Selcke: "It's been out a long time."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from . . . ah . . . Cook, Mr. Maragos."

Maragos: "Ah . . . Would the Sponsor of the Amendment and . . . respond to an inquiry please? Ah . . . Representative Hirschfeld, did we also amend this in Committee regarding the other portions as to the type of test the doctors wanted to be in . . . wasn't there another Amendment supposed to be put on . . . when we heard this in Judiciary Committee? If you don't want to answer it, maybe . . . ah . . . the Bill Sponsor will answer it, maybe Representative Day could answer that."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Peoria, Mr. Day."

Day: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, . . . ah . . . I would like to request that the Sponsor of this Amendment hold it so that . . . ah . . . I might have a chance to examine it. I wasn't aware that this Amendment was going to be offered, and I would like to have an opportunity to look it over before . . . ah . . . passing on it."

Maragos: "Well, Mr. Speaker, in the meantime, I have a question for the Bill Sponsor, Mr. Day, wasn't there another Amendment recommended by the Committee besides this Amendment at which time I thought you were going to place it on regarding the . . . the type of testing that was supposed to be involved?"

Day: "No, there was no . . . there was no agreement that that Amendment was to be put on. The agreement was that we would discuss this with



the Department of Public Health and get their opinion on that subject."

Maragos: "All right, what . . . what . . ."

Day: "I have not heard from them."

Maragos: ". . . well, I . . . that's why I'm just wondering . . . ah . . . if we should be very careful before we move this Bill further and I would like you to hold this Bill . . . ah . . . unless there's a deadline today; but I think this is the point in issue and out of courtesy you should have asked the . . . ah . . . the Department of Health. You had a couple of weeks to do this at least and you should have asked that they give us an opinion as to re . . . because the way . . . the way that the Amendment reads . . . the reads now is making it very difficult to run any test and because these doctors want to relieve any responsibility from what the testimony we had in Committee as I recall; and I think . . . ah . . . Representative Hirschfeld's Amendment is a step in the right direction that we also have to have an additional Amendment regarding what type of testing we're going to do."

Day: "Well, the whole . . . the whole question is here is whether or not this Bill . . . ah . . . spells out the type of test that the Legislature wants the doctor to perform. Ah . . . if we are going to spell out a complete test here and require a complete test and expect the doctor to sign the certificate that he has given a thorough and complete test for venereal disease, then we should do so; and we should take the responsibility for the additional cost . . . ah . . . of . . . ah . . . such a program. But the purpose of the Bill . . . ah . . . originally was to . . . ah . . . keep the doctors honest and to make it possible for them to sign a certificate for only that type of test which presumably was intended by this Act when it was first passed."

Maragos: "Mr. Speaker, because of this ambiguity of misstanding . . . ah . . . misunderstanding as to what the Department is supposed to do, I would respectfully ask Representative Hirschfeld and Representative Day to hold this over until tomorrow so we could . . . because I'm in favor of the Amendment that Hirschfeld has as a step, but I





want to get further clarification as we agreed in Committee when we let this Bill come out with that understanding."

Choate: "That's agreeable with me."

Maragos: "Is that all right with you, Representative Hirschfeld?"

Speaker Blair: "All right, now, there's a little confusion . . . ah . . . Mr. Day asked a question of the . . . the . . . Mr. Hirschfeld about holding . . . yeah, Mr. Hirschfeld."

Hirschfeld: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I'll be very glad to hold the Amendment until tomorrow. I would like to . . . I'll apologize to Representative Day, but I would like to remind the distinguished Representative that in the Committee, I opposed the Bill in the form it was in and I do believe I told him after that time that I was going to prepare an Amendment . . . ah . . . that I would introduce to Second Reading to try and make the change."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Douglas."

Douglas: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, . . . ah . . . I realize Representative Hirschfeld has apparently agreed to take it out of the Record, however, I think the question is on his . . . that I have is . . . is relevant . . . ah . . . on the floor and I wonder if I could ask you this and then . . . ah . . . hopefully you might consider this in . . . in your dealing with the . . . with your Amendment. What religious belief are you referring to that would prevent the physicians assuming a thorough examination is not now required from doing a blood test which is all the physician needs to my knowledge in order to determine whether someone has . . . ah . . . venereal disease?"

Unknown: "Okay."

Hirschfeld: "Well, Representative, I agree with you, but as the Bill is drafted without this Amendment that I'm trying to put on and I'll try and put on tomorrow, it says that if any couple comes in and says we have a sincere religious belief that forbids our having a blood test, all they got to do is say that and if the judge approves that, they don't have to take a blood test, and my objection is to that language."

Douglas: "What . . . what religion, excuse my ignorance, but what



religion precludes the taking of . . ."

Hirschfeld: "The Jehova's Witnesses, for example."

Douglas: "I see, all right, thank you."

Speaker Blair: "Take it out of the Record."

Fredric Selcke: "133. Senate Bill 133, Juckett, an Act to amend Sections 1, 2 and 5 in the title of an Act to create a Commission to visit and examine state institutions. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments. You got any from the floor on this one?"

Speaker Blair: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "Senate Bill 261, . . . ah . . . Maragos, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act relating to recorders. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments. Any from the floor?"

Speaker Blair: "Any from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah . . . Senate Bill 105, Day, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act relating to jurors. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment amends Senate Bill 105 in the House, page 2, by striking line 2 and inserting in lieu, thereof, and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Peoria, Mr. Day."

Day: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, . . . ah . . . this Amendment simply takes care of an objection that the Sheriff's Association had to the Bill as it was . . . ah . . . originally worded and it does not . . . ah . . . make any substantial change in the . . . ah . . . thrust of the Bill itself; and I would move for the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "Discussion? Question is on the adoption of the Amendment. All those in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it, and the Amendment's adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "Senate Bill 110, Lauer, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act relating to human blood. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Ah . . . Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "Senate Bill 111, Collins, a bill for an Act to amend an Act relating to state finance. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."



Speaker Blair: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "Senate Bill 119, Campbell, amends Public Aid Code.

Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading.

356."

Fredric Selcke: "Senate Bill 356, Holloway, an Act to vacate, expend, ban

and release an easement for highway purposes in Jackson County,

Illinois. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "Senate Bill 70, Day, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act

in relation to county zoning. Second Reading of the Bill. One

Committee Amendment amends Senate Bill 70 in the House on page 1

by deleting lines 8 and 9 and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "Any Amendments from the floor? Oh, the Gentleman . . .

Committee Amendment . . ."

Day: "Mr. Speaker, I move for the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Blair: "All right, all those in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no';

the 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Further Amendments?

Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "Senate Bill 136, Hanahan, a Bill for an Act to amend

the Revenue Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amend-

ments."

Speaker Blair: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Madison, Mr. Calvo."

Calvo: "Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, the Amendment is a mere . . . ah . . . technical Amendment to clean up a couple of errors in drafting and I would move the adoption of Committee Amendment #1."

Speaker Blair: "Is there discussion? The question is on the adoption of the Amendment. All those in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it, the Amendment's adopted. Further Amendments? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "Senate Bill 1139, an Act making appropriation to the Superintendent of Public Instruction. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments. Any from the floor? Any from the . . ."

Speaker Blair: "Any from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "Senate Bill 1140, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments. Any from the floor?"

Speaker Blair: "Any from the floor?"

Fredric Selcke: "Third Reading."

Speaker Blair: "Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "Senate Bill 1141, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Department of Public Aid. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments. Any from the floor?"

Speaker Blair: "Any from the floor? Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah . . . Senate Bill 172, you got that one? . . . well, Chockey's lost . . . Senate Bill 172, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment amends Senate Bill 172 on page 2 by deleting lines 15 through 32 and so forth. Ah . . . That's Gene Hoffman . . ."

Speaker Blair: "Oh, is . . . ah . . . Mr. Hoffman back there? Better take it out of the Record."

Fredric Selcke: "Out of the Record. Senate Bill 271, a Bill for an Act to amend the Public Senior College Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. Is that



it, now, oh . . . ah . . . let's see, now, we've had some motions that . . . ah . . . some of the Members wanted to have heard. All right, wait I've just got some motions I . . . all right, . . . ah . . . Mr. Barry had . . . is Mr. Barry still here? Yeah, here he is. We're on the order of Motions now."

Fredric Selcke: "Well, where's Sid . . ."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Bureau, Mr. Barry."

Barry: "Mr. Speaker, Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I would move to suspend Rule 37A for the purpose of calling two Bills out of order, 947 and 948, that are . . . ah . . . an emergency to keep the school district operating."

Speaker Blair: "Ah . . . Can we . . . those on Third Reading?"

Barry: "They are."

Speaker Blair: "947 and 948?"

Barry: "Yes, Sir."

Speaker Blair: "All right, . . . ah . . . the Gentleman is moving to suspend the rules so those Bills may be called out of order on . . . ah . . . the order of Third Reading. All those in favor vote 'aye', the opposed 'no'. Have all voted who wished? It needs 107. The Clerk will take the Record. On this question there are 117 'ayes', no 'nays'; and the Gentleman's motion prevails. Now, we'll go to House Bills, Third Reading, and we'll call House Bill 947."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 947, an Act to appropriate the sum of \$125,174.20 to the Illinois Student Public Instruction. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Ah . . . read 9 . . . the Gentleman have leave to have 948 heard at the same time? Hearing no objections, read 948."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 948, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Barry: "Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, these two Bills will keep the school district operating by virtue of an appropriation of \$125,000 after deleting or rather reducing it by the amount of additional state aid that we anticipate pursuant to the normal formula. This school district lost better than



50 percent of its assessed valuation by the loss of the only industry in town. I would appreciate your support."

Speaker Blair: "Ah . . . Is there discussion? All right, the question is, shall these two Bills pass? All those in favor will vote 'aye', and the opposed 'no'. The Clerk will take two Roll Calls. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the Record. Oh, this requires 10 . . . all right, on each of these questions, there are 135 'ayes', no 'nays'; and each of these Bills having received the votes required under the Constitution I, hereby, declare pass. The Gentleman from Bureau, Mr. Barry."

Barry: "Mr. Speaker, now, I have another similar request please suspending 37A for the purpose of hearing House Bill 1924 . . . ah . . . it was merely a lateral transfer of monies within Northern Illinois' . . . Northern Illinois University's current budget for the purpose of accepting bids on an exten . . . on an incinerator. Now, in two weeks the bids will run out . . . ah . . . of the opportunity to comply with E.P.A., we'll be down the drain. I would appreciate 107 votes to suspend 37A and then proceed with this Bill please."

Speaker Blair: "What number is that again?"

Barry: "1924."

Speaker Blair: "All right, . . . ah . . . 19 . . . all right, the Gentleman asks to suspend the rules. All those in favor vote 'aye', the opposed 'no'. It requires 107. Have all voted who wish? Take the Record. On this question 143 'ayes', no . . . no 'nays'; and this Bill having received the constitutional majority is, hereby, . . . no . . . oh, all right, yes, the President told me I was suspending the rules, so . . . ah . . . this . . . this motion having received 107 votes . . . ah . . . the motion prevails. Now, read the Bill . . . Third Reading, read the Bill."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1924, a Bill for an Act to amend Section 6 of an Act making certain appropriations and reappropriations. Third Reading of the Bill."

Barry: "Now, Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, pardon me, Mr. Speaker . . ."

Speaker Blair: "Go ahead."

Barry: "I may proceed? Ah . . . Clearly a lateral transfer of \$147,000 in the current funds available to the Northern Illinois University to accept bids that are outdated in two weeks. I would appreciate your . . . ah . . . vote on your . . . ah . . . affirmative vote on this Bill."

Speaker Blair: "On the . . . ah . . . the Gentleman from Macon, Mr. Borchers, on this question. Okay."

Borchers: "Mr. Speaker, and fellow Members of this House, I would just like to ask a question, what will happen to the university . . . ah . . . in relation to the E.P.A. and the requirements if we don't give the money? What is the penalty?"

Barry: "If we . . . if we don't . . . ah . . . give them the money to complete this transaction, it's my understanding they will spend about five times this amount of money to comply within the next three years."

Borchers: "I see, okay."

Telcser: "Is there further discussion? The Gentleman from Champaign, Representative Hirschfeld."

Hirschfeld: "Will the Sponsor yield?"

Telcser: "He indicates he will."

Barry: "Yes, Sir."

Hirschfeld: "Ah . . . Representative, can you tell me what happened with the appropriation for the construction of the Library Building then?"

Barry: "The appropriation for the Library Building is . . . ah . . . as it was except for some half million dollars, I please . . . I believe, and that's where this money is coming from. It's not . . . ah . . . disturbing the library construction at all."

Telcser: "Is there further discussion? The question is, shall House Bill 1924 pass? All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Take the Record. On this question 147 'ayes', no 'nays'; and this Bill having received the constitutional majority is, hereby, declared passed. Representative Matijevich, for what purpose do you arise, Sir?"

Matijevich: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, I have a similar motion as Representa-



tive Barry. Ah . . . I now move to suspend the provisions of House Bill 37A . . . ah . . . so that House Bill 1928 . . . ah . . . may be called out of its numerical order on Third Reading. Ah . . . I explained the need for this Bill yesterday. Ah . . . The Department of Mental Health needs this transfer of funds, otherwise, it will not be able to meet its May 31st payroll at six Department of Mental Health facilities and also it's a . . . may build for interim care for the mentally retarded. Ah . . . I will move to . . . ah . . . suspend Rule 37A, and I need 107 votes."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman has moved to suspend the provisions of Rule 37A for the purpose of having House Bill 1928 called out of the order of business. All in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed 'no', 107 votes. Have all voted who wish? Take the Record. On this question there are 139 'ayes', 6 'nays'; and the Gentleman's motion prevails. On the order of Third Reading appears House Bill 1928."

Fredric Selcke: "Ring the bell again, Arthur."

Telcser: "Third Reading."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 1928, an Act to amend Sections 1, 2, 3 and so forth of an Act making appropriation for the ordinary and contingent expense of the Department of Mental Health. Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Lake, Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I think I explained the need for this Bill. This Bill must be signed by the Governor by June 1st at the latest. I would ask for a favorable Roll Call on House Bill 1928. Is there any discussion? The question is, shall House Bill . . . the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Juckett."

Juckett: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, would the . . . ah . . . Gentleman from Lake . . . ah . . . explain what the transfers actually are?"

Matijevich: "Ah . . . yes, Representative Juckett, this is the transfer of funds adjustment between purchase care and personal services appropriations . . . ah . . . from last years appropriations. During the appropriation hearings last year, the subject of transferability





was discussed and the . . . Appropriation's Committee advised the Director of the Department of Mental Health it would not provide the additional transferability above the 2 percent provided by the Finance Act. Because they could not go beyond that 2 percent, . . . ah . . . the Department was advised to come back this Session of the Legislature and ask for the appropriate transfer needed. Ah . . . There are significant changes in the program and workloads of these various Department of Mental Health facilities . . . ah . . . and it's created a requirement for alterations in the personal services funding requirement. It is because of these changes that the Department has here come and requested this transfer of funds."

Juckett: "Now, are we transferring from personal care to purchase of care or are we transferring from purchase of care to personal services?"

Matijevich: "Well, I, we're transferring from . . . ah . . . from care and community living facilities into care and private institutions because the proposed community living centers haven't been . . . ah . . . come about as anticipated in the last year and so that change must . . . ah . . . be made . . . ah . . . and also we've made an adjustment between . . . ah . . . purchase care and personal services."

Juckett: "Well, are we . . . are we increasing personal services or decreasing?"

Matijevich: "I would say that we are increasing personal services."

Juckett: "Well, it's my understanding . . . ah . . . correct me if I'm wrong, but . . . ah . . . it's my understanding that there have been quite a few layoffs within the Department of Mental Health and personal services and if that is so, I mean if it's true that they're laying anywhere from, you know, 200 or 300 personal service people off at each of the institutions, why would there be a need for transferring to personal services?"

Matijevich: "The . . . the . . . I . . . I'm mistaken, the alterations in Personal services as I read it is . . . is the increase in purchase care, Representative Juckett."



Juckett: "So it's not adding money for more employees . . . ah . . ."

Matijevich: "Right."

Juckett: ". . . within the Department that are purchasing care or patients of the Department?"

Matijevich: "Right."

Juckett: "Thank you."

Telcser: "Is there further discussion? The question is, shall House Bill 1928 pass? All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Take the Record. On this question there are 140 'ayes', 2 'nays'; and this Bill having received the constitutional majority is, hereby, declared passed. Now are there any further motions from the floor? Okay, now, let's be sure Representative Rigney is here, okay? Now, you're on the Calendar, Rev. Look, I'll get . . . I want to get to the motions on the Calendar, but first let's get some that are coming from the floor. Okay, the Gentleman from . . . ah . . . Fayette, Representative Brummet, seek recognition."

Brummet: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, having voted on the prevailing side by which Amendment #1 to House Bill 1652 was adopted, I now move to reconsider the vote by which Amendment #1 was adopted."

Telcser: "Having voted on the prevailing side, the Gentleman from Fayette moves to reconsider the vote by which Amendment #1 to House Bill 1652 was adopted. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye' . . . Roll Call? Roll Call? Okay, are there five . . . the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "A point of order, Mr. Speaker, I heard something about lay it on the table. Now, is there a motion that we lay the Gentleman from Kane? There is not."

Telcser: "So the only motion before the House now is for the Gentleman's motion to reconsider . . . to reconsider the vote by which Amendment #1 was adopted."

Walsh: "I see, so that if we're opposed to the Gentleman's motion we vote 'no'?"

Telcser: "Correct . . ."



Walsh: "Thank you."

Telcser: "And there are . . . ah . . . five Members who have requested a Roll Call; and now, I'll restate the motion. Ah . . . Okay, having voted on the prevailing side, the Gentleman moves to reconsider the vote by which Amendment #1 to House Bill 1652 was adopted. All in favor of the Gentleman's motion signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Now, the Gentleman from Stephenson, Representative Rigney, to explain his vote."

Rigney: "Mr. Speaker, I have to reject this attempt to reconsider what I think was a very fine Amendment to this original Bill. We're talking here about the addition of one word when we're talking about the injunctive powers of the court. The word that seems to have some people disturbed is that word 'welfare'. There was only one purpose in adding that one word . . . ah . . . to this original Bill. I wanted to make it clear that if in the event a prolonged strike was underway, that the court in reviewing this situation could consider the welfare of the children that would be involved that they could act in their best interest; and this is why I felt that it was necessary to broaden the powers as far as the court was concerned in this case. So this is what has led to this Amendment. I think it's a good Amendment. I think it's justified, as I said this morning, I feel that the whole purpose of education is for the welfare children, and I hope that we don't lose sight of that fact; and so I do earnestly solicit a 'no' vote on this motion to reconsider."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative William Walsh."

Walsh: "Well, Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, there is little that I can add to what the Gentleman said about the value of this Amendment and why we should vote 'no' on it. I think there may be some misunderstanding, however, in the minds of some of the Members. In order for us to defeat the Gentleman's motion to reconsider this vote to take the Amendment off of the Bill, we have got to have more 'nos' than there are 'ayes' up there because all the Gentleman needs is a simple majority of those voting. So I urge every Member to vote 'no' on this Gentleman's motion. I don't



know how . . . I don't know how the hell they all vote, do you . . .  
Rudy . . ."

Telcser: "Does anyone else wish to explain their vote? Okay, have . . .  
have all voted who wish? Take the Record. On this question  
there are 86 'ayes', 87 'nays'; and this . . . no, it's relaxed,  
the Gentleman from McHenry, Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker, right before that Roll Call is locked, I ask  
Representative McAvoyn's vote to be taken off. He isn't here right  
now, and I know he would never vote 'no' on this type of issue, and  
I just suggest that there is an awful lot of lights up there and  
there are Members of this House that aren't present. This is an  
important labor issue, I suggest that either we redo the Roll Call  
and everyone take care of their own switches or we'll have a verifi-  
cation of both the 'ayes' and 'nays' and spend instead of supper  
time in our favorite places, we're going to spend it here."

Telcser: "The Members wish a new Roll Call?"

Hanahan: "Do you want a verification, I don't . . ."

Telcser: "Do you wish to verify this Roll Call?"

Hanahan: "Sure, all right, we'll verify."

Telcser: "Okay, Representative . . . ah . . . Hill, for what purpose  
do you arise?"

Hill: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, I'd like you to poll the absentees, and then  
I request a verification."

Telcser: "That's fine. Is that all right? Rep . . . Representative  
Mugalian, for what purpose do you arise, Sir?"

Mugalian: "Mr. . . . Mr. Speaker, . . . ah . . . personal confusion the  
first time. Why can't we just save time, everyone sit down, and  
I know we're all honorable Men and Women, and just vote once more and  
not run around pulling switches?"

Telcser: "Well, okay, the Gentleman has requested a poll of the absen-  
tees. So the Members please be in their seats and will the Clerk  
please read the absentees and then we'll go to a verification.  
Representative Hirschfeld, for what purpose do you arise, Sir?"

Hirschfeld: "Mr. Speaker, can you tell me which side of the issue Repre-  
sentative Shea spoke on this time?"



Telcser: "Representative Shea, do you wish . . . okay, will the Clerk please read the absentees?"

Fredric Selcke: "Beaupre."

Telcser: "Representative Beaupre, for what purpose do you arise, Sir?"

Beaupre: "I'd like to be asked to be recorded as 'yes'."

Telcser: "Record the Gentleman as voting 'aye'."

Fredric Selcke: "Granada. B. B. Wolf. Everybody voted."

Telcser: "Oh, boy, everybody voted."

Fredric Selcke: "The only one who didn't vote was . . ."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Union, Representative Choate."

Choate: "Mr. Speaker, inasmuch as there was only three absentees, I want you all to know, two were from this side, and one from there."

Telcser: "Representative Murphy, for what purpose do you arise, Sir?"

Murphy: "We've got a better attendance, Mr. Choate, we take our jobs more seriously."

Telcser: "Representative Richard Walsh, for what purpose do you arise, Sir?"

Walsh: "In view of the polling of the absentees, I wonder if it might appropriate the presence of a quorum?"

Telcser: "Representative Ewell, for what purpose do you arise?"

Ewell: "Mr. Speaker, a point of inquiry. I feel shades of Watergate, there's a cover-up here."

Telcser: "All right, a verification has been requested . . . ah . . . do you . . . the affirmative Roll Call would be verified first. Rep . . . Representative Shea, for what purpose do you arise, Sir?"

Shea: "Which side is the prevailing side, Mr. Speaker?"

Telcser: "Well, the affirmative happens to be the prevailing side, although, I don't really think it makes a difference. Oh, now, the Clerk tells me right now it's tied."

Shea: "Well, that would mean that negative is the prevailing side or what . . ."

Telcser: "Well, if it's tied, nothing is prevailing really."
