It passed the House and the Senate giving the Northshore Sanitary District limited quit take powers of condemnation so that it could uh..put its sewer pipes in the ground to comply with this court order. The quick take provisions were very limited to only (unintelligible) and ran out as of January 1, 1975. It is absolutely necessary to the Northshore Sanitary District to have this authority in order to comply with this court order and I would urge your support to override the veto and move to chair on this motion for favorable consideration."

Blair: "Is there discussion?" All right the uh Clerk will take the Roll Call and the question is, Shall House Bill 652 pass, the veto of the Governor to the contrary notwithstanding? All those in favor vote aye and the opposed no."

Blair: "On this question there are 113 ayes, 18 nays, and this Bill have received the Constitutional 3/5's majority is here by declared passed, the Governor's veto notwithstanding. On the order of Total Veto Motions



appears House Bill 41 for which purpose the Gentleman from Decatur, Representative Borchers is recognized.

Borchers: "Mr. Speaker, well could I have a little order?"

I'll make this short, this Bill simply to make it impossible to for the Environmental Protection Agency to make harsher tougher rules for the Federal Government now the Bill is vetoed on a proposition by the Governor that there were no rules covering by the Federal EPA of grain elevators which this Bill is all about. Now the Governor is incorrect, it happens that the OSHA which is a government agency on health and safety have rules far stricter than you can imagine. There isn't any farmer, or possibly a man, who is connected with any factory that don't know about the rules and regulations of OSHA, OSHA covers over and goes into the proposition of Environmental Control as if it were an environmental control agency of the federal government on grain elevators so all this does is make it impossible for any ...federal agency they..excuse me.. makes it impossible for the environmental agency of the State of Illinois. It could also then seriously effect the businesses that correlated and support the small towns as the grain elevators are some of the principal business in our Illinois towns downstate so I ask that you vote to override the Governor's veto."

Blair: "Is there any discussion? The question is shall House Bill 41 pass with the Consitutional 3/5's majority, the Governor's veto notwithstanding? All those in favor will signify by voting aye, the opposed by voting no, the clerk will take an oral Roll Call. One moment, Representative Mann for what purpose do you rise, Sir?"

Mann: "Well Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, as much as I admire and respect the Gentleman from Macon and he knows I do admire and respect him, I do find it somewhat amusing to hear him who has been a long time advocate of local



control and local government and a long time opponent of big brother in Washington, suggesting that we now look toward Washington to set guidelines for our environment. This certainly is a radical turn around for the Gentleman from Macon and perhaps we are witnessing a rebirth of his entire political philosophy which has always been to oppose Washington bureaucracy and control but I would suggest to you Mr. Speaker and to the Members of the House that we hardly need an EPA if we are going to permit the National EPA to decide what the regulations are for the State of Illinois and for the several states. I always thought that we had an Environmental Protection Agency which by the way gave birth during those Golden Ogilive year's for the purpose of setting environmental standards to meet the environmental problems of the State of Illinois, not those prescribed by the National government. And I can't with all..uh..due respect have that much faith in the standards promulgated by the National Government in view of the way that our environment nationally is going down hill. We look to the pipeline in Alaska, we look to the deterioration of our National Parks we look to the proliferation of the road builders, we look to the ... (unintelligible) for Lockheed but not for maintenance of our..uh..the quality of our natural life and I just can't uh say to you, Mr. Speaker, and the Members of the House, lets abandon the environmental protection agency because I want to say right now that uh while we think this is a good idea now, ten years from now, when you don't have an environment left in the State of Illinois, and you can't breath and you don't have any space and you don't have any clean rivers and clean lakes you may feel otherwise about it...so while I don't pose as an expert on grain elevators I do think that once we permit an invasion of the ...uh...jurisdiction and..uh..the means by which the EPA is after all a product of this General Assembly

to set standards to protect our environment then we might as well write EPA off and say that from now on we will incorporate by reference and all our environmental legislation the rules and regulations of the federal government. I don't think that Mr. Borchers really wants that done, I think it would be poor public policy, I think it would be a step backward and if he wants to do that he ought to file a Bill to abolish the entire Environmental Protection Act and I would urge a vote to sustain the Governor's veto here. A no vote on the Gentleman's motion."

Blair: "The Gentleman from Union, Representative Choate."

Choate: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I found it hard in my mind to resolve exactly what I was going to do far as this motion was concerned,...I supported the legislation in the last session of the General Assembly I don't think that there is a question in anyone's mind, but what something should be done ...about this all important question revolving around the grain elevator industry in the State of Illinois it can (unitelligible) the economic life blood of certain areas of the state but we can even muddy the water in attempting to bring about a better way of life as far as environment is concerned in the State of Illinois. There has been a joint EPA task force on grain elevators regulation created to study this problem. Housekeeping procedures and rules and regulations by which they will operate have already been instituted and as far as I know this task force is attempting to resolve this very important question at the present time. I would say to you that the task force would have more tools at hand because of being able to take into consideration the federal controls involved then probably we have at hand. So consequently, I at this time, am going to give the task force as far as I am personally concerned an opportunity to study this important



question, and I am not going to vote to override at this time. I am going to give them the time necessary to do what they must and can do in behalf of the grain elevators and the people affected by the grain elevators and also at the same time do what is most feasible so far as ecology is concerned for the great State of Illinois. Therefore, Mr, Speaker, I am not going to vote to override the Governor's Amendatory Veto."

Blair: "Is there further discussion? Does the Gentleman wish to close? The Gentleman from Macon, Mr. Borchers, to close the debate."

Borchers: "Mr. Speaker, I think you have heard pretty well the two sides of this..it is true this..uh.. Commission is looking into the grain elevators and the problems of the grain elevators but I feel that this is important enough that we should take action now and therefore I request that we override the Governor's Veto."

Blair: "The question is shall House Bill 41 pass with the constitutional 3/5's majority, the Governor's veto notwithstanding?" All in favor signify by voting aye, the opposed by voting no. The Clerk will take an Oral Roll Call.

Selcke: "Alsup, Anderson, Arnell, Barnes, Barry, Beatty, Beaupre, Berman, Bluthardt, Borchers, Boyle, Bradley, Brandt, Brickmeier, Brummet, Caldwell, Calvo, Campbell, Capparelli, Capuzi, Carter, Catania, Chapman, Choate, Clabaugh."

Claubaugh: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, briefly. I'd like to explain my vote just because I voted for the EPA regulation, because I voted for the board and approve of most of the things they do, I don't have to approve of all the foolish things they did and I think their regulation on grain elevators was a very foolish one."



Now I'd like for anyone to tell me what comes out of a grain elevator that doesn't fall on the ground within 200 or 300 feet and... (unintelligible)... within the next 24 hours. There is nothing harmful to it but this is just one of the excess to it and these excesses I think are one of the things we are going to have to eliminate if we don't eliminate a lot more of it later on. Let's clean it up rather than just (unintelligible) and I vote aye."

Selcke: "Collins, Cox, Craig.."

Blair: "Present for Representative Craig."

Blair: "Record the gentleman as voting present."

Selcke: "Yeah, but Mr. Schneider, if they would shut up and
 answer and open their gush when I ask them it would take
 three minutes...I don't care."

Blair: "On this question there are 47 ayes, 83 nays, 7
 answering present and this motion having failed to receive
 the constitutional 3/5's majority is hereby declared lost.
 On the order of Total Veto Motions appears House Bill 969.
 For which purpose does the Gentleman from Cook, Representa-
 tive Juckett, be recognized?"

Juckett: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House,
 yesterday when we called this Bill, the Minority Leader
 requested that I hold it in the hopes of compromise, we
 had a meeting and I was informed by the Minority Leader



that a Representative from the Governor's Office and the Minority Leader and I should sit down this morning and work towards that compromise. I want to extend my heart-felt thanks to the Minority Leader for all of his efforts to arrive at a compromise. When the Governor's man came, the Governor's position was that I drop completely and totally the override of House Bill 969 and that we would try to work out distributive formula for next year. This was the talk that I had had with our Republican education man Gene Hoffman, the Chairman of the School Problems Commission, earlier in the week, My suggestion was to the Governor's man was that we override on 969 and then we sit down and work out a distributive formula and that I would in the Spring when we worked out this formula introduce a Bill for the formula at the same time then kill off 969. The reason for that is very simple. This is a reimbursement program if we do not pass 969 now there will be no increase in Special Ed for this year because the school district can not work on promises and the school kids can not be helped on promises. They would know that if 969 passed the monies would be available. This position was totally unacceptable to the Governor's man. I then suggested that we try and work between now and next Monday which is the last day to hear overrides that we try and work out this distributive formula in the same art of compromise and the same sprit of compromise that our Majority Leader worked out with the Department of Mental Health in House Bill 724. Because there there was not only suggestions of compromise there was the actual fact of every detail and there now is, I understand, a Bill that is being proposed for the compromise. I could not go back to the small kids and say that I gave up 969 on a promise that you might be helped some time in the future. This position



this offer of compromise was unacceptable to the Governor to the Governor's Office. My last effort at compromise then was to request that the Governor call a Special Session on Special Education and during this Special Session we should then work out a compromise and a distributive formula that would help the kids of our state. This offer was also rejected. Now again I want to play compliments to the Minority Leader, I think he thoroughly believes that this last compromise was a good compromise and one that could solve the problem. However, we did not have the final say so and naturally it had to come from the Governor's Office. But I say to you, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, and I say to the people of the State of Illinois what is more important...is it more important to return \$10 to every person in this State unless there was a Special Session called for that purpose? Is it more important to have a Bill on campaign contributions when the people of the State of Illinois realize that their Governor is speaking out of both mouths, both sides when he has refused to declare his contributions and he accuses the Assembly of not asking. I say to you, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, that it is far more important to be able to have the kids educated. There are many kids who will be doomed to a life of frustration and a life of unaccomplishment because we have failed this year. The General Assembly did not fail, we passed the Bill overwhelmingly in June. We know what the results are. We know what the consequences are. So I urge you, I plead with you, I beg to help the little kids of this State who need the help and who with out our help will not receive anything at all. That is the issue it is not me, not the Minority Leader, it is not anyone of us. It is the little kids of the State, please vote to override on 969.



Blair: "The Gentleman from Union, Representative Choate."

Choate: "Mr. Speaker, uh..if you would get the attention of membership, I would like to make first a request. I know that there is reason for personal visits and what have you on the floor of the House today, but let me me advise the Membership that when the Roll Call is being taken that you are only going to delay our departure by having an awfully lot of noise because I know that in all instances I have not been able to ascertain whether a Member is voting and whether he is not. Therefore, if the noise to that degree continues and we get into a close vote we are going to have the additional time, the additional time of verification of Roll Calls simply because we were not able to hear whether that Member was here to vote and whether he truly voted and whether someone else voted for him. Now to the attention of the matter at hand. The Sponsor of this motion started off absolutely correct but he did bring one thing into it that I don't think should become involved in this piece of legislation. He is correct when he suggested that I suggested a postponement of the hearing of this motion until such time as we could attempt to work out a feasible agreement that would satisfy both parties involved. This we have attempted to do and whether it is wrong or whether it isn't I would like to feel and I know that I did have a wee bit of part in playing in the resolving of the other important question that he was talking about sponsored by the Majority Leader. Now, the motion that confronts us today is simply whether we go...we go forward on a program that is truthfully, yes dedicated to the assistance of certain people in the State of Illinois. But that isn't really the overpowering question that faces us today, why can't we...why can't we as reasonable people, as reasonable Members of the General Assembly, as reasonable people involved in State



government take a little bit more time and come forth with a program that we know is adamantly clear to each and every Member of this General Assembly to the extent that it really and truthfully and absolutely does the job which we intend for it to do. Just one little thing that I know is not completely satisfied in my mind as far as House Bill 969 is concerned and I haven't seen it mentioned in the Veto Message and I haven't brought it to the attention of the Chief Sponsor because it just comes to my mind at the present time. I'm not confident as far as the input of the local people are concerned under the structure of the program established in House Bill 969. I know it is not his intention, I know it is not the intention of well meaning people to eliminate the input by local people, but this is a question as I said that just crossed my mind this morning and I am not confident that they will have the input that they should rightfully have. I don't think that we want to be hasty in a matter that I said yesterday and I say again today, ...creates emotion, emotion because we do want to responsibly discharge our duties as a legislator in behalf of the people effected by House Bill 969. I still contend as I said yesterday, lay emotions aside temporarily and let ourselves confront the issues factually and head on. We are going to delay the enactment of House Bill 969 until we have such people as the Sponsor, such people that are members of the School Problems Commission who are well intentioned I know such people as Dr. Bakalis, such people as the Governor of this State, and such people that have talked to me on this side of the aisle, and some on the other that when and if we do enact legislation of this nature its explicitly going to be aimed in the right direction and do the things that we all want done. That is the reason that I suggest that we do not be hasty that we do not vote to override that we



bring together all of these people involved, all the learned educators involved all the people from the local areas involved, that want to get involved, and I am sure should be involved, let's bring them all together and bring about a permanent solution by the enacting of legislation in the next Session of the General Assembly so that we can put an end to this problem once and for all. I am not going to vote to override as I have indicated."

Blair: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Representative Gene Hoffman."

Hoffman: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen, I rise in opposition to the motion to override. As has been mentioned by both the Sponsor of the Bill and the Minority Leader, there is room for a reasonable and responsible solution to this problem. The legislature will be meeting again prior to uh the actual implementation of the cost of the program which we are considering today. This program was uh..to take effect fiscally in the 75th fiscal year or FY75. The discussion that I have had with the Members of both sides of the aisle in both Houses on the School Problems Commission leads me to believe that the Commission can come to reasonable and responsible solution to this situation in which we find ourselves. We are going to leave local school districts in the lurch if we can not override this veto today, because they either have the programs in operation now or they don't. In the area of Special Ed we pay after the fact rather than at the same time or before. Therefore if the programs were not in operation during this school year they would not qualify to be paid on the basis of this program until some later time anyway and we can deal with that in uh April. One of the other problems that I find with this program is that when it was discussed during the Legislative

Session we were using figures in the neighborhood of 18 to 19 million dollars. The hard data that we have at the present time indicates that that costs have just about doubled to 32½ million dollars. As far as being concerned about kids and their position they won't even know the difference because these programs are either in effect now or they're not and what this Bill does, in fact, is escalate the cost of state support to teacher's salaries. And therefore, I would believe that between now and when we meet in April we can come up with a reasonable and responsible solution to which all of us can stand, on, a one which will our present uh program. In fact this particular Bill 969 may be very significant that it has taken us to this position and acted as a catalyst so that the interested parties can get together and be responsible for the aforementioned reasons. I am not going to support the motion to override the veto and for the reasons that I indicated I hope that I have a number of people who will join me."

Blair: "The Gentleman from Lake, Representative Pierce."

Pierce: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, that was one of the uh, uh, softest, I wouldn't say weakest, but one of the least convincing talks I have ever heard the Gentleman from DuPage give on any subject because he is usually quite strong and has good reasoning behind his arguments. Let me tell you I believe in overriding a veto when the veto is a bad veto and the Governor is wrong. Many of you just voted to override a veto and the Governor is wrong. Many of you just voted to override a veto on the Northshore Sanitary District in my area giving them quit-take powers. Why you did it I don't know but you did it. I'll tell why I'm going to vote to override the Governor on this veto, because this administration has no special education

policy, they're just putting us off. They vetoed House Bill 805 which I sponsored, they vetoed this Bill, House Bill 859 and their reasons were frivolous. They were based on the fiscal 74 budget and these Bills didn't have any effect till fiscal 75. So the Governor says I'm vetoing because they effect 74 and when we show they don't effect 74, the School Problems Commission Spokesman comes back and tells us well we have time to work on it because they are not effective'till fiscal 75. So they hit you one way if they are effective this year and then they hit you the other way when you tell them they are effective next year, they say wait a year. They have no policy towards Special Education, they have no interest in Special Education, they have no interest in Special Education. No one from the Governor's Office talked to me when they vetoed House Bill 805. No one from the Governor's Office talked to Representative Juckett and myself when they vetoed House Bill 969. No one has come to me to work out 805. No one came to him until yesterday to work out 969. When the Governor is right I'll support him, when he's wrong I'll vote to override him and believe me this is a good Bill and we should vote to override because we have mandated special education on our local school districts and we've refused to fund it or give them the money. We can't expect them to do the job and mandate for them to do the job if we won't give them the where with all and I intend to vote to override the Governor when he is wrong as he is in this case."

Blair: "The Gentleman from LaSalle, Representative Soderstrom."

Soderstrom: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I am always amazed by what a battle we get into when it comes to providing money for the handicapped children in the field of Special Education. This is



just a typical example in the State of Illinois as you do know did mandate all the school districts to have a Special Education Program. Most of the districts are complying some are still not. But listen, when the state does mandate that they have Special Education Programs then the State must provide the money. Now, I am Chairman of the House Education Committee. I am standing right here to tell you that no one has told me about any kind of a compromise agreement personally. All I have heard is right here on the House floor. I can see nothing wrong with strengthening the position by overriding this veto and give them a little leverage so that they will have something to talk about if there is a compromise pending. So at this time and for those purposes, I respectfully solicit your vote."

Blair: "Is there further discussion? Well ah does the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Juckett wish to close? Ok, the question is shall House...the question is shall House Bill 969 pass on the constitutional 3/5's majority the Governor's veto notwithstanding, all those in favor signify by voting aye, those opposed by voting no, the Clerk will take an oral Roll Call. "

Blair: "The Gentleman from Kane, Representative Wadell,"

Waddell: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I think that all of us that have served down here for a while, have seen issues such as roads, CTA, RTA, all of the rest of it go through like gangbusters and everybody is on the bandwagon and I think that those of us who have been here for a while have listened to a lot of prayers by a lot of ministers trying to do the thing of compassion to their fellow men. And let me tell you they have a mighty hollow ring when it gets down to the place that you play politics with a bunch of kids that really need your help. I vote aye."

Blair: "Record the Gentleman as voting aye."

Selcke: " Wall, R. Walsh, W. Walsh, Walters, Washburn, Washington, Williams, J.J. Wolf , B.B. Wolfe, Yourell."

Blair: "Fred, will you record Representative Merlo no, Brandt no, Bradley present, Bradley present, Representative Holloway, Bob Holloway wishes to be recorded aye, Bob



Holloway aye... Now while the Clerk is tallying up his Roll Call are there any other Members who wish to have their Total Veto Motions called? Would you please come up to the Speaker's podium and let us know? Mr. Clerk, would you record the Speaker as voting aye. Representative Juckett, for what purpose do you rise?"

Juckett: "Mr. Speaker, we're very close will you please poll the absentees?"

Blair: "Lets see what the count is now before we...currently there are 89 ayes, 37 naves, 8 answering present. The Gentleman has... Representative Juckett, do you persist in the poll? The Gentleman has asked for a poll of the absentees. Will the members please be in their seats and the Clerk will read the names of the absentees. There are currently 89 aye votes."

Selcke: "Beatty, Caldwell, Capparelli, Capuzi, Carter, Clabaugh, Cox, DiPrima, Epton, D'Arco, Fleck, Flinn, Garmisa, Giglio, Hart, J.M. Blair: "On this question there are 90 ayes, 37 naves, 8 answering present. Representative Juckett, for what purpose do you rise Sir?"

Juckett: "Mr. Speaker, I would ask leave to postpone until Monday."

Blair: "Ok, put it on the Order of Postponed Consideration. On the Order of Total Veto Motions appears House Bill 445, for which purpose does the Gentleman from Cook, Representative William Walsh is recognized."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, we should divide on this Bill a little differently then we do normally. There is no political consideration here at



all and I think for the first time in a long time I am going to find myself in the same camp with many people on the other side of the aisle from the City of Chicago and uh County of Cook and many other counties surrounding Cook. What House Bill 445 does is provides that the money spent for motor fuel tax where is user uses the Illinois Toll Roads that money will be returned to the counties through which the toll roads traverse. These counties amount to some 11 counties and the rationale is the same rationale that is used for farmers who are given back the amount of money that they spend for fuel taxes on gasoline that is used in the fields. The same rationale applies to the Boating Act for the gasoline that is purchased for the use of boats. That money that the approximate motor fuel tax money is used to administer the Boating Act. So this might be considered to be an anti-diversion Bill it provides that the money that is spent is used by these counties and in these cities and municipalities for the users. As you know, the toll that the toll road users pays for the maintenance of the the operation, the retirement of bonds on the toll roads, therefore the money that he pays for motor fuel taxes when he buys his gasoline should not go into the State Road Fund. It should go for the use for the maintenance of highways and roads leading to the toll roads which he converses to get to the toll roads. So I suggest to you that this is a very reasonable Bill. The Governor didn't think so, but I don't think the Governor spent enough time analyzing it. I can forgive him for that he had a lot to do uh, ...I would then, Mr. Speaker ask you and all of the Membership to uh kindly sustain my motion to override the Governor's veto on House Bill 445.

Blair: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman from DeKalb. Representative Ebbesen."



Ebbesen: "Mr. Speaker, I uh too rise to support this override uh this motion. All we have to do is think of the concentration of the uh population of Illinois in the northern section there that involves the 11 counties and it only follows that we have got the concentration of the automobiles which means the uh lions share of the consumption of the motor fuel taxes. And uh you know through out the rest of the state, central and southern Illinois, people who pay their motor fuel taxes there have freeways or tollways are all up there. Just take one look at the Illinois map. And I too would encourage all people involved in these 11 counties specifically to vote in favor of this override."

Blair: "The Gentleman from Will, Representative Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, on this Bill, I think you ought to pay attention to this; we have a memorandum here that indicates that this of course is a reduced allocation to the state and all local governments outside of the counties that have these toll roads in there. So I would suggest when you decide whether or not to vote to override the rule of thumb if you have a toll road in your district vote the override if you don't vote to sustain the veto."

Blair: "Is there further discussion? Does the Gentleman wish to close debate? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Walsh to close the debate."

Walsh: "Well I'd just like to point out to the Membership from the City of Chicago that this would mean an additional \$4,000,000 for their city streets and as a user of Chicago Streets, I'll tell you this, they can use it. uh... It would mean for example to Oak Park about \$70,000, to Downers Grove \$56,000 and you can pretty well multiply the uh population by \$1.20 in any municipality through which the toll road runs to arrive at how much this



means for your municipality. And I suggest to you Mr. Speaker that even if those of you who do not directly benefit might vote for this just out of simple justice and I solicit your support. "

Blair: "The question is, shall House Bill 445 pass with the constitutional 3/5's majority. Representative Gentleman from uh..Christian, Representative Tipsword."

Tipsword: "Mr. Speaker, I wonder if I might ask a question about this Bill?"

Blair: "Indicates he will."

Tipsword: "Where does the funds, where are these funds presently placed now that are collected?"

Walsh: "They presently go to the Motor Fuel Fund and are distributed according to the formula 35% to the state, 11% to Cook County and 12% to the downstate counties, 32% to municipalities, uh based on population and 10% to townships based on the number of road miles."

Tipsword: "So they are then distributed all over the state on the same formula that the money is collected from motor fuels all over the state are distributed, they go into that same fund and are redistributed all over the state in the same proportion is right?"

Walsh: "That is correct."

Tipsword: "And if this Bill passed, the motor fuel taxes that are collected all over the state would still go into that fund distributed as they are now but the toll highway fund would no longer go into that fund to be distributed all over the state, but would be limited solely to those counties in which the toll highway exists or in which the tolls are collected is that right? "

Walsh: "That is correct."

Tipsword: "Well Mr. Speaker, consequently I fear I am going to have to oppose this bill because this is truly a raid upon the motor of the road funds of Illinois that as they



apply to the entire state and while all of the state will continue to be distributing their motor fuel tax funds into this road fund to be distributed on the present formula, we'll be taking out this portion of this road fund to be distributed no longer over the entire state as a whole, but a limit only within those counties in which those tolls are collected and I think that would be a very very dangerous ah diminution of the road funds in the State of Illinois without any replacement for it.

Blair: "The Gentleman from Bureau, Representative Barry."

Barry: "Would the Sponsor yield to a question?"

Blair: "He indicates he will."

Barry: "Bill, I run 6 counties one of which is DeKlab that will soon that a toll road over simplified what you are suggesting from my personal point of view would be that I take motor fuel tax monies from 5 of my counities to give it to one of my counties is that correct?"

Walsh: "No that is not correct."

Barry: "Well it seems to me that way because you are taking monies out of motor fuel tax funds that goes to all of the other counties, isn't that so? Those that do not have toll roads pay for those that have the toll road or will have the toll roads in my case."

Walsh: "Well let me uh I ah I suppose that you could say that Toby, however, Mr. Speaker, I did close the debate it seems to have opened up again."

Blair: "You will have the opportunity to close again sir, if you wish. The Gentleman from Union, Representative Choate."

Choate: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I uh..look at this Bill and I for the life of me don't understand how it passed in the last session of the General Assembly. Quite frankly what it does it takes out to the best of my estimate more than 4 million dollars out of the Road Fund that would be allocated to portions of the state under the formula that was just mentioned a moment ago. Now it would take under



the provisions of this Bill it would take more than 4 millions of dollars from some 95 counties and deposit it in five counties.. don't quite make equitable judgement in my mind a reality. I uh just can't see Union County, Alexander County, Sangamon County or any of these down-state counties relinquishing a portion of their road fund monies to go to seven counties in the northeast portion of the State of Illinois. I think that it is a bad precedent to set, I think that we should not raid 95 counties for the sake of 5 in this instance as far as to the tune of more than 11 pretty near 12 million dollars, but that is in all practicality what we are doing. I suggest that this motion be defeated."

Blair: "Is there further discussion? The Gentleman from Lawrence, Representative Cunningham."

Cunningham: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I wish to rise to support the proposition, the rule of thumb of Representative Leinenweber. We do not have any toll roads in the 54th District. We don't have any roads in the 54th District. In the last few days I have heard the very fine Department of Conservation Director, Anthony Dean, urging all of you from up north to come down to southern Illinois and see our autumn leaves. Well, I am here to tell you to stay at home because we don't have any roads that will make it possible for you to come back if you are going to come down then why don't you go in singles or doubles and not in great crowds because you will over exhaust our road supply. And I want to say to the people on the other side of the aisle, you should think very carefully before you thumb your nose at your Governor before voting to override his veto. Party solidarity is an important thing and you keep that very closely in mind including the independents on the other side of the line. There is another reason why you should



uphold your very fine Governor on this case, for once he is right and that is not very often in these vetoes. So I urge everyone of you here who has any compassion or any sence of obligation whatever to the citizens of Illinois, to give the Majority Leader's bad Bill the deep burial that it deserves. And we are going to have something to say later about restoring the inbalance and bringing roads to the 54th District. Thank you."

Blair: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of the motion."

My county, which is the third largest county in the State of Illinois, does have toll roads, such as they are and we do have some roads but we haven't had that consideration as of yet. Much as I would like to agree with our good Governor, I do feel that we should consider where most of the traffic goes and since we don't have much traffic going through our toll ways I think we should benefit there too and I therefore rise and speak in favor of the motion."

Blair: "Representative Calvo for what purpose do you rise?"

Calvo: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I would uh heard Representative Cunningham was very delighted with his remarks in one way but I just wondered if he's moved his district. I recall traveling in his district quite a lot on about 100 miles of new interstate highway. And I wondered if he doesn't have roads if he wants to give us the \$100,000,000 back that was spent in his district for interstate 70 and 57. "

Blair: "Is there further discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative William Walsh, to close the debate."

Walsh: "Well Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, just to clear up a few points. First of all Roscoe, I can't understand the attack made on me as the Sponsor and I want to tell you that I have supported 100% your proposal to build a four lane expressway from Lawrenceville



to Effingham and I conveyed that to the Department of Transportation. Their problem is that they haven't been able to find Lawrenceville. To the Minority Leader, let me say that it is not five counties that we are concerned with here it is 11 counties. And to my friend Representative Barry, let me say that it is not just DeKalb in your district that is involved in this but also Lee, Ogle and Whiteside. Now, I'd like to reiterate a point that I thought I made earlier and that is that toll road users are paying for the mileage they drive on the toll road with their tolls. It is already done and it is indeed double taxation to make them pay again. Now if there were a way that they could buy gasoline without paying motor fuel taxes then that would be a better way than this Bill. There is no such way at this time and I would certainly endorse such a proposition in the future. At this time in order to be just, in order to do for those people in the 11 counties effected that which we do for the farmer, that which we do for the boaters and to indeed avoid diversion then we should pay this money into funds in their communities and their counties and their incorporated areas to maintain the roads there--that my friend is simple justice. I don't see how any one can oppose it I don't know why this wasn't thought of before. I urge your support."

Blair: "The question is shall House Bill 445 pass with the constitutional 3/5 majority uh..the Governor's veto notwithstanding? All in favor of the Gentleman's motion signify by voting aye, the opposed by voting no, the Clerk will call the Roll.

Selcke: Alsup, Anderson, Anderson, Arnell, Barnes, Barry, Beatty, Beaupre, Berman, Bluthardt, Borchers, Boyle, Bradley, Brandt, Brinkmeier, Brummet, Caldwell, Calvo. Campbell, Capparelli, Capuzi, Carter, Catania, Chapman,

Blair: "The Gentleman from Lawrence, Representative Cunningham to explain his vote."

Cunningham: "Indulge me just a moment to explain my vote, I want to concur 100% with what the Majority Leader said about the Department of Transportation being unable to find Lawrenceville. They have been unable to find it for 150 years, but may God be our judge we are going to help them locate where Lawrenceville is, and in regard to Representative Calvo's statement that we had all these miles we have to drive more than 50 miles to reach a four lane road in Illinois that leads anywhere. There is no other spot in Illinois that is treated as badly as we and that doesn't exclude Quincy. I am proud to vote no."

Blair: "Sorry about that, On this question there are 57 ayes,



77 naves, how many answering present, Fred?"

Selcke: "None"

Blair: "None answering present and this motion having failed to receive the constitutional 3/5's majority is here by declared lost. O.k. will the Members please be in their seats? We are going to take the Adjournment Resolution in a couple of minutes and we want the Members to know that the Clerk's Office will be open until 5 o'clock today so that those of you who have motions to file or Bills that you wish to leave with us for introduction into the Perfunctory Session, uh you will know that the Clerk will be open until 5 o'clock today. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Walsh. William Walsh, anything else Fred...one second, Ok, the Clerk wants to write the Adjournment Resolution is all,..where is he, is Representative Bluthardt around? The Members will pay attention to the screen, there is a very important announcement on the screen. Representative Bluthardt, we were looking for you, for what purpose do you rise, Sir?"
