Clerk Selcke:

"Message from the Senate by Mr. Fernandes, Secretary, Second Special Session. 'Mr. Speaker, I am directed to inform the House of Representatives the Senate has passed a Bill with the following title and passage which instructs concurrence of the House, to which Senate Bill #1 passed the Senate October 29th, 1973, Edward E. Fernandes, Secretary. Mr. Speaker, I am directed to inform the House of Representatives the Senate has passed a Bill'. What in the Hell? Wonder why they give us two messages, the same message? "#2. The Second Special Senate, Senate Bill #1 passed the Senate."

Clerk Selcke:

"Ah...Jerry, these are two copies, they're...they're both of the same message. So, I read the first message and started on the second and it's



the same as the first."

Shea: "All right, so . . ."

Clerk Selcke: "They are both on Senate Bill #1."

Shea: "So the record will reflect that only Senate Bill #1 passed the Senate."

Clerk Selcke: "Right."

Shea: "Thank you."

Clerk Selcke: "Throw one of these away. We ought to watch that. Hell, there ain't no point in giving them two of the same."

Speaker Telcser: "We ought to read just this one."

Clerk Selcke: "Yea. Only need one."

Speaker Telcser: "O.K. ah...the Gentleman from Cook, Representative William Walsh, with respect to Special Session #2."

Walsh: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, I move that Special Session #2 stand in recess until the hour of one thirty p.m. today."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman moves that Special Session #2 stand in recess until the hour of one thirty this afternoon. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', the opposed 'no'. Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, I move that the Third Special Session stand in recess until the hour of one forty-five p.m. today."

Speaker Telcser: "Is there any discussion? All in favor of the Gentleman's motion signify by saying 'aye', the opposed 'no'. Special Session #3 stands in recess until the hour of one forty-five this afternoon. O.K. the Regular Session will now come to order. Will the Members please be in their seats and the Gentleman from Cook, Representative William Walsh, asks leave to have the Attendance Roll Call from Special Session #1 serve as the Attendance



Roll Call for the Regular Session. All in favor are there any objections? Hearing none, the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea."

Speaker Telcser: "Introduction of First Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "Ah.... House Bill 2072, Polk et al, Amends School Code. First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 2073, Polk et al, Amends Hospital District Law. First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 2074, Polk, Amends the Dram Shop Act. First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 2075, Polk, An Act to prescribe the exhibits exhibition of films or pictures in outdoor theaters. First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 2076, Polk, Appropriates one thousand eight hundred and fifty dollars and eighty-six cents to Mrs. Sally A. Cerny First Reading of the Bill. Are these Agreed Resolutions?"

Speaker Telcser: "Agreed Resolutions."

Clerk Selcke: "House Resolution 580; Mahar et al, House Resolution 5.....ah...Kelly and Mahar et al. House Resolution 581, Kelly and Mahar et al. House Resolution 582, Choate et al. Ah... House Resolution 583, Campbell. House Resolution 586, Choate et al. House Resolution 588, ah... Pierce et al. No, Kelly and Mahar. House Resolution 590, Timothy Simms. What's that, another bill?"

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative William Walsh."



Walsh:

"Mr. Speaker, these are the Agreed Resolutions. House Resolution 580, commends the Hazel Crest J.C.'s upon their excellent service to the community. And House Resolution 581, commends the Homewood and Flossmoor J.C.'s for the same thing and House Resolution 582, congratulates our colleague Bob Terzich on the... on his 38th Birthday. Bob mustn't count them all. House Resolution 583, by Representative Campbell, congratulates Mr. & Mrs. Osgood Harter, of Danville, upon the joyous occasion of their 64th Anniversary of their marriage. House Resolution 586, congratulates the Lechowicz' on the birth of their new baby, Laura Ann, congratulations, Ted. House Resolution 588, by Representative Pierce, it extends the reporting date of the Energy Crisis Investigation Committee from November 1st, 1973 to May 1st, 1974 and the assistant or the Minority Whip, Representative Pierce may want to have a word to say about this. House Resolution 590, congratulates all of the personnel of Radio Station WRCK of Rockford upon the celebration of their fiftieth anniversary of operation as a licensed station and Mr. Speaker, I move the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions, in spite of that objection."

Speaker Telcser:

"The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Agreed Resolutions. Is there any discussion. The Gentleman from Perry, Representative Ralph Dunn."

Dunn:

"Thank you Mr. Speaker, I want to rise on a matter of personal privilege, and just take one minute to thank the Members of the General Assembly and the Leadership of both sides of the aisle for the work they did in trying to help DuQuoin keep the Hambletonian. I think yesterday it was mentioned on the Floor, that we had lost the Hambletonian, which is a three year old trotting race, that had been in DuQuoin and in Illinois for the last seventeen years. We lost a bid for it at the ah....the.... last Sunday, the Hambletonian is deciding that.....decided that.....to hold the next three years at least, at the Libertyville track in Philadelphia, and ah.... I want to express my personal appreciation to the Members of the General Assembly and to the Governor and for his staff and to the Racing Board for the work that they did in trying to keep the Hambletonian in Illinois. I understand that the Governor went all out, I understand the Racing Board and the members of the tracks and the different tracks around the state went all out. We think that we offered as good as battle as we could, but there's members of society that saw fit to move the Hambletonian and of course we're sorrowed about it in DuQuoin and I'm sure



it's a loss for Illinois, but I just wanted to thank the Members of the General Assembly and the administration for the work they did. Thank you."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman adoption of Agreed Resolutions. All in favor signify by saying 'aye' the opposed 'no'. The Resolutions are adopted. Further introduction."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 2077, J.J. Wolf et al, Amends the Unified Code of Corrections. First Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Telcser: "Anything else, Fred?"

Clerk Selcke: "Yea."

Speaker Telcser: "Anything else you have? O.K. on the order of.... ah Amendatory Veto Motions appears Senate Bill 894, for which purpose the Gentleman Will, Representative Kempiners, is recognized. Now, if the Members will come up to the....ah...ah...podium we will try to get your Senate Bills called today. You gotta watch these calendar dates. That's fifteen days. Representative Kempiners."

Kempiners: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I have filed a motion to concur in the Governor's Amendatory Veto of Senate Bill 894, which was sponsored by Senator Partee in the Senate. The Governor changed the jurisdiction of supervising safety requirements for the construction of mobile homes from the Department of Local Government to the Department of Public Health, and I concur in this Amendatory Veto and urge your support for it."

Speaker Telcser: "Is there any discussion? All right, now Ladies and Gentlemen apparently there is no problem with this motion. If all of you would get on the Roll Call, we might be able to establish a unanimous Roll Call...ah.... on this question for the rest of the day. The question is, shall the House adopt the Amendatory Veto with respect to Senate Bill 894. All in favor of the Gentleman's motion signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. The Clerk will take another Roll Call and this will be, unless there are objections, a unanimous Roll Call for the day."

"Aye. Merlo, 'aye'."

Clerk Selcke:

"I got ya."

Speaker Blair:

"What's easier, Fred? To have them come up or for me to...."

Clerk Selcke:

"Yea, better to come up."

Speaker Blair:

"The Clerk says that if you come up, it will be easier for him."

Clerk Selcke:

"Rayson, J. Houlihan....ahRon....ah....R.L.....Mugalian, Beaupre, O.K. Grothberg...O.K.....McLendon...O.K."

Speaker Blair:

"On this question there are 125 'ayes', no 'nays', none answering present, and the House adopts the Amendatory Veto Senate Bill 894. This will be our unanimous Roll Call for the day. On the order of Amendatory Veto Motions appears Senate Bill 550, for which purpose the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Arnell, is recognized."

Arnell:

"Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, Senate Bill 550 enlarged the corporate



limits of the Metropolitan Sanitary District of Chicago. By Amendment in the House, there were eight acres in Inverness added to this Bill. Apparently, the village officials of Inverness objected to the Amendment and consequently the Governor, specifically vetoed the legal description relating to the Amendment that was placed in the House. At this time, I would like to move to concur with the Governor's Amendatory Veto by deleting on page one lines 24 through 28 inclusive, and ask leave for the Last Unanimous Roll Call."

Speaker Blair: "Is there any discussion? Gentleman moves the House adopt the Governor's Amendatory Veto with respect to Senate Bill 550. Are there any objections to the Last Unanimous Roll Call? Hearing none, on this question there are 125 'ayes', no 'nays', and the House adopts the Governor's Amendatory Veto relative to Senate Bill 550."

Arnell: "Thank you."

Speaker Blair: "On the order of Amendatory Veto Motions appears Senate Bill 447, for which purpose the Gentleman from Winnebago, Representative Simms, is recognized."

Simms: "Ah....Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I move that the House do accept the specific recommendations of the Governor and accept the Amendatory Veto for Senate Bill 447, and I'd ask leave that the Last Roll Call be recorded as the Roll Call for 447."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea. The Motion is to accept the Governor's Amendatory Veto."

Shea: "Would you explain to us, Representative Simms, what the Amendatory Veto did? This is the, this is the Bill that came out of the Crime Commission covering....."

Simms: "Right."

Shea: "County hospital"

Simms: "This Amendatory Veto, on line 16 through 22, it starts in lieu thereof the following: 'services furnished by such hospital or facility'. It's a small Amendment that has the agreement of Senator Dougherty and ah.... I believe it has the agreement of the Cook County Board."

Speaker Blair: "O.K., Jerry? O.K. The Gentleman's moved that the House adopt the Governor's Amendatory Veto relative to Senate Bill 447. Are there any objections to the Last Unanimous Roll Call? Hearing none, this question 125 'ayes',



no 'nays' and the House adopts the Governor's Amendatory Veto relative to Senate Bill 447. Representative Bluthardt on the Floor? Ed, are you around here? Representative Schoeberlein, do you wish to call your Bill? Representative Garmisa, Representative Collins, Phil? Where are you at? You want to call 1179? Phil? We did, the Last Unanimous Roll Call. Representative Collins, do you want to call Senate Bill 1179? O.K. on the order of Amendatory Veto Motions appears Senate Bill 1179, for which purpose the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Collins, is recognized."

Collins:

"Ah...yes.....Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Senate Bill 1179 as introduced would have authorized the Capitol Bond Development ah... ah... additional sums of five million dollars for the purpose of the containerized cargo handling facilities for the port of Chicago. The Governor by Amendatory Veto cut the five million dollars to three point five million ah..... and I would move to accept the specific recommendation of the Governor."

Speaker Blair:

"Is there any discussion? The Gentleman moves the House adopt the Governor's Amendatory Veto relative to Senate Bill 1179. Are there any objections to the Last Unanimous Roll Call? One this question, 125 'ayes', no 'nays' and the House adopts the Governor's Amendatory Veto relative to Senate Bill 1179. The last call for now, Representative Garmisa, Schoeberlein or Bluthardt. O.K. Yes, we did Mr. Clerk, with our Last Unanimous Roll Call. Add Clarence Neff to the Roll Call and Molloy. O.K. On the order of Total Veto Motions.....on the order of Total Veto Motions appears Senate Bill 501, is Representative J.J. Wolf on the Floor? Representative J.J. Wolf. Representative Merlo, do you want your Bill called? Jake. O.K. on the order of Total Veto Motions appears Senate Bill 501. No, out of the record. On the order of Total Veto Motions appears Senate Bill 577, for which purpose the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Merlo is recognized."

Merlo:

"Mr. Speaker, and Members of the House, Senate Bill 577 merely clarifies a provision of legislation that was passed in the General Assembly in 1971. Granting the employees of C.T.A. the right to purchase prior credit of a non-private nature. The Governor's Veto contradicts the position of the Illinois Pension Laws Commission. In his Veto Message he alleges that the Bill.....yea.....sure....Mr. Speaker, would you take this out of the record for a moment, please?"

- Speaker Blair: "O.K. Representative Day, do you wish to have your motion called? Are you on the Floor? Representative Day. Representative Bradley, do you wish, to ah.... are you on the Floor, sir? Do you want yours called? No. Ginny, do you want yours called? O.K., on the order of Total Veto Motions appears Senate Bill 800, for which the Lady from Cook, Representative Macdonald, is recognized."
- Macdonald: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Senate.....I'd like to hold it for just a minute, please."
- Speaker Blair: "Take it out of the record. Phil, Representative Collins, do you wish to call Senate Bill 914? You don't think so, Phil? Well, we've gone through everything. (Whistle.....Singing) Are there any Members that wish to have their motions called this morning? With regard to Senate Bills. Both Total Veto Motions and Amendatory Veto Motions. Are there any Members who are prepared toah....from Cook, Representative William Walsh."
- Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, last night as the hours went on and on, we had some unpleasant words from the Minority Whip, because he had an Amendatory Veto or a override of a veto, dealing with children. So, he was complaining very bitterly that it was called very late in the day and there was very little opportunity for it to pass. He neglected to say that the reason we were considering it at all was that his Governor didn't seem to be terribly interested in children. Now, I urge him, if he has got anything dealing with children, that is in the form of a Senate Override, to call it and anyone else who has anything dealing with anything to call it now, because this is going to be your best opportunity. If you think you are going to work on the Governor...ah... and change his position or change anyone else's position, it simply isn't going to work. If you don't call it now, you are going to find yourself at eleven o'clock some night next week, or the week after, or who knows when, calling that thing and it will have no chance at all. So, I urge everyone to call their motions and do it right away. Let's get it over with now."
- Speaker Blair: "O.K. Representative B.B. Wolfe, for what purpose do you rise, sir?"
- Wolfe: "A point of Parliamentary"
- Speaker Blair: "State your point, sir."
- Wolfe: "I think what the Majority Leader said was well stated, but I also feel that the Membership of this House, at the beginning of the week should be



advised of the agenda and the program of the House, at least to the extent that the Leadership has decided that that is going to be the program, so that Members will not be trapped by thinking one: that we are going on for four or five days and that they have plenty of opportunity to present their motions and I think that if we are given the courtesy of knowing the agenda ah.....that we'll then be responsible for acting within that agenda program. I would suggest that the Speaker and the Leadership, both on our side and on the other side of the aisle, at least give the Members that courtesy."

Speaker Blair:

"Your point is well taken, sir. All right now, while we are waiting on Members with respect to Total Veto Motions and Amendatory Veto Motions.... Representative Walsh, Bill, and Representative Choate, is it O.K. if we go ahead and call these three non-concurrence motions? Are they Agreed? No. O.K. No. All right. Well, I'm trying to find something to do. Representative Pierce, for what purpose do you rise, sir?"

Pierce:

"Ah...Mr. Speaker, I thought during this blank period now we might hear from Representative Schneider, Mugalian on the merits of accumulative voting. I think we could use an inspirational speech right now telling how accumulative voting has given this House of Representatives such superior MembershipState Senate and how it should be retained so that men like the Speaker sitting on the up there on the platform, can come back with us despite the misfortunes that his Party is about to suffer and so that some wonderful suburban Democrats and Representative Houlihan, in Chicago, who has a very small minority behind him can all be reelected with the help of accumulative voting. So, I think if there is someone here maybe Representative Schneider or Mugalian will want to give you the history and all the merits of accumulative voting, it might be an appropriate time."

Speaker Blair:

"O.K., on the order of Amendatory Veto Motions appears Senate Bill 793, for which purpose, the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Garmisa, is recognized. Where are you at, Sparky? Who's going to handle that? Oh, there he is, Sparky."

Garmisa:

"Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I move now that the House do concur with the Senate in accepting this specific recommendation of the Governor, as to Senate Bill 793. 793....Senate Bill 793, Amends the Trust Companies Act to establish minimum requirements for capital reserve and operating expenses for trust companies. In its present form



this legislation would adversely affect the operation of certain financially sound trust companies already established, whose accounting methods differ from those required in this Bill. I would ask a Unanimous Consent of the House, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Blair:

"Is there any discussion? The Gentleman has moved that the House adopt the Governor's Amendatory Veto with respect to Senate Bill 793. Are there any objections to the Unanimous Roll Call? On this question, 125 'ayes', no 'nays' and the House adopts the Governor's Amendatory Veto with respect to Senate Bill 793. Representative Bluthardt come on the Floor? Or Schoeberlein? You want yours called, Representative Schoeberlein? On the order of Amendatory Veto Motions appears Senate Bill 580, for which purpose the Gentleman from Kane, Representative Schoeberlein."

Schoeberlein:

"Ah...Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Senate Bill 580 ah...has been....has an Amendatory Veto by the Governor, the Senate concurred in his Amendatory Veto. It applies only to the City of Aurora, and I would like Unanimous Consent that the House do likewise."

Speaker Blair:

"Is there any discussion? The Gentleman has moved the House adopt the Governor's Amendatory Veto with respect to Senate Bill 580. Are there any objections to the Last Unanimous Roll Call? This question, 125 'ayes' no 'nays', and the House adopts the Governor's Amendatory Veto with respect to Senate Bill 580. Do you have some Resolutions, Fred? Do you have a Resolution, or anything? Ah...the Unanimous Roll Call is now 135. O.K. General Resolutions, Representative Davis, are you on the Floor, sir? O.K. Just so you know that when we call General Resolutions, now, so you be on deck. General Resolutions. Corneal, not now. I just wanted you to know I'm going to call it. Sit in your seat and we'll get you in a second. General Resolutions."

Clerk Selcke:

"House Resolution 585, B.B. Wolfe et al. House Resolution 587, Katz et al. House Joint Resolution 79, Cunningham et al. Ah...House Resolution 591, Davis et al."

Speaker Blair:

"Did you read his yet? O.K. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Davis, with respect to the General Resolution, O.K., what is it, Speaker's Table. Resolutions are now on the Speaker's Table. Now, with respect to the Resolution just read, the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Corneal Davis."



Davis: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, the Resolution that was just read a copy is in your files in the room in there, we tried to get them to pass them out but they said the only thing they could do was to put them in your box. This is the Resolution that is offered by a legislative ad hoc action team. A little order please. This legislative action ad hoc team was formed in July of 1973. In response to several articles indicating that Illinois' children who have been placed out of state by the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services. Many people in the several legislative districts all over the state was concerned about this. When we formed this ad hoc committee. These children have been subject to abuse, mistreatment and neglect. Someabuse and mistreatment was Now, Representative Emil Jones and Representative Eugene Barnes did the investigating. In fact, Representative Barnes at his own expense went down to Texas. Invited members of the Texas Welfare Committee to come to Chicago, and they did come to Chicago and they testified before this ad hoc commission. Now, the thing we did on the committee, we, I spoke casually to the Speaker about and he raised no objections at that time. I spoke to the Leadership on the Democratic side, all sides. But, the thing we want to do now, since the ad hoc committee had no legislative standing, no mandate from this Body, we're offering this Resolution with the hope that you will agree that there ought to be a mandate from this legislative Body to look at these actions on the part of the children and family services, where are children are concerned. And for that reason, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I believe the proper rule is 41-A. I would move the suspension of rule 41-A for the immediate consideration of this Resolution and I would say that I'm sure107 votes to carry this motion, and I would appreciate the fact if you would give me that number of votes so that we can immediately take up this Resolution for consideration, because we have been working on it at our own expense, at the expense of everyone of the members of that ad hoc committee since July. I also motion that immediate consideration and that we suspend the proper rule which I believe is 41-A."

Speaker Blair: "Representative Davis, for what purpose do you rise, sir?"

Davis: "Mr. Speaker, after brief consultation with the Speaker and the Minority Leader, I would ask that the Resolution be not considered at this time."



We'll wait until the Special Session is called and we consider it. Will you hold it, please?"

Speaker Blair: "All right, Mr. Clerk, would you strike that resolution, out of the record? Treat it as though it was still lying on the Clerk's desk, waiting to be introduced. Representative Davis, what pur.....Representative Davis...."

Davis: "Mr. Speaker, there are lots of Members that have indicated that they wanted to be on this resolution. It is O.K. with me, please give their names to the Clerk...."

Speaker Blair: "All right."

Davis: "And they will be included in the Resolution."

Speaker Blair: "Will the Members who wish to Co-sponsor the Resolution come to the Clerk's desk, with it.....it is now reposing. O.K. Are there any Members who wish to have their ah...Total Veto Motions called, or an Amendatory Veto Motion called? Anyone else wish to have their motions called? Do you want yours read now? Fred, do you want to take Cal's and read it? O.K.

Introduction of First Reading of Bills."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 2078, Grotberg, Amends an Act concerning fees and salaries.

First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 2079, Skinner et al, Amends the Revenue Act. First Reading of the Bill. Is there a Member who wishes to call a Motion on Total Vetoes? Representative Macdonald, did you wish to have yours called? Someone told me.....ah.....nope, she's conferring. O.K., on the order of Total Veto Motions appears Senate Bill 800 for which purpose the Lady from Cook, Representative Macdonald, is recognized."

Macdonald: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Senate Bill 800 went out of this House and passed the Senate, also, by an overwhelming majority. I think, unanimously out of the House of Representatives. Ah... the Bill is a Bill that requires the repeal of requiring city and village incorporated town clerks to print, or cause to be printed a list of registered voters and to post these lists at least five days before a municipal election. This is a thirty-four year old Bill, applies only to Cook County and the motion to override came into the Senate, it passed the Senate by 48 to 2. The cost of this particular requirement is estimated to be, and was, in my particular district for most elections the average was three thousand dollars. Now, the county clerk has these lists for any person who wants to run for office and it seems an archiac Bill and one that



could save the taxpayers a great deal of money, so that I would ask for your vote to override this particular Bill. Thank you."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Union, Representative Choate."

Choate: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, maybe this Bill did pass by an overwhelming majority, but I'm sure that many of us did not know the full impact of the Bill. Now, it doesn't quite make sense to me that the village clerks in this instance would be wanting to get rid of this election duty, when at the same time the Municipal League is encouraging us to pass legislation to make the village clerks and the village official more of an overseer and a large, and a large part, the administrator of those elections. Now, as far as the cost is concerned, the village clerk lists are made only from triplicate forms provided by the county clerk. Basically, what you are doing, if we override the Governor's Veto of this Bill, you're taking away a service of the people. Let's say that I live away in one of the outlying villages of Cook County, and let's say for an example that there is administration in the....in the municipality that is opposed to me knowing about the voters list. So, I can't, if this is passed, make myself knowledgeable, as far as the voters list, except only one way and that's to get in my car, get on one of the public transportation vehicles, go all the way down to the heart of the City of Chicago, go the County Office Building, go to the County Clerk's Office, and get a copy of the registered voters list. Now, that if in the first instance I don't believe, is segregated by municipalities. So, basically then it doesn't really do me a whole lot of good to go to all of this effort. This is a law that lets the people of a municipality be as far as the registered voters of that municipality is concerned. We're taking away, if we override, a service directly beneficial to people who are interested in good government, honest elections. I urge the Membership to defeat the motion to override."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Juckett."

Juckett: "Mr. Speaker, would the Minority Leader yield for a question?"

Blair: "Well, it's unusual, but I think he will."

Choate: "I said no."

Speaker Blair: "He said no, go ahead."

Choate: "I was kidding."

Juckett: "He's always accomodating anyway. Now, you indicated that you wanted this



service available at the city and village levels. Is that correct?"

Choate: "I said that is where it is at the present time, to the best of my knowledge."

Juckett: "Does your city print a voters list?"

Choate: "Bob, now you and I know there's a lot of difference in going from Anna to Jonesboro, which is a little less than a mile, and incidentally not congested with traffic. There's a lot of difference in going to the County Seat of Union County, than there is going from one of the townships in the outlying portion of Cook County down to the County Building where this list would only be available."

Juckett: "In other words I....I take it that your city and village does not print a voters list, and that would be in violation of the elections laws of the State of Illinois."

Choate: "No, it wouldn't, I think that this Bill that we are talking about refers to the County of Cook. It says registration of electors in counties over 500,000'."

Juckett: "O.K., in other words your county is not quite 500,000."

Choate: "Not quite, but....but we're trying."

Juckett: "O.K., now would you prefer the city to print the list or would you prefer the county to print the list?"

Choate: "I don't care as long as in my county....as long....it wouldn't make that much difference in my county like it does in your county, Bob."

Juckett: "O.K., well, Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, ah...the law now requires the city and village and incorporated town clerks to print the same list that the county clerk now prints and an election held in one villages in our district, a candidate for elections said, I want the city clerk to print the list. Now, this is an identical list, I don't care if the county clerk prints it or city clerk prints it. There should be one person who is printing that list, and the city clerk is not going to have any more information than the county clerk, and vice versa. So, what we're trying to do is avoid a duplication. Now, if the distinguished Minority Leader would prefer not to have the county clerk print the list, that's O.K. with us too, but he is the general supervisor of elections, it is his primary duty, and the city clerk at this time is a deputized clerk. So, I think it would be far better to have the chief to print the list than to



have a deputy print the list, and that's all that Representative Macdonald is asking. Let's avoid the duplication, let's avoid the mistakes of duplication, and let's get on with it and let's support this override."

Speaker Blair:

"Is there further discussion? The Lady from Cook, Representative Macdonald, to close."

Macdonald:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Just briefly again I reiterate that this is a costly archaic duplicate effort and I do hope that you will support the Senate in their 48-2 vote to override this particular Bill. Thank you."

Speaker Blair:

"Senate Bill 800 passed. The Constitutional three-fifths majority, the Governor's Veto notwithstanding. All in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. The Clerk will take an oral Roll Call and this will require 107 votes."

Clerk Selcke:

Speaker Blair: "On this question there are 63 'ayes', 50 'nays', and the Ladies motion with respect to Senate Bill 800, fails. We are going to do something now. O.K. Resolutions."

Clerk Selcke: "House Joint Resolution #80, W.D. Walsh, Resolved, By the House of Representatives of the Seventy-eighth General Assembly of the State of Illinois, the Senate concurring herein, that when the House of Representatives adjourns on Tuesday, October 30, 1973, it stand adjourned until Monday, November 5, 1973, at 12:00 o'clock noon, and when the Senate adjourns on Wednesday, October 31, 1973, it stand adjourned until Tuesday, November 6, 1973 at 2:00 o'clock p.m."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative William Walsh, moves the adoption of the General Resolution. Any discussion? All in favor signify by saying 'aye', the opposed 'no'. The Resolution is adopted. Now, on the Speaker's Table appears Senate Joint Resolution #50. Senate Joint Resolution #50 appears on the Calendar on the order of the Speaker's Table, and the Gentleman from Kankakee, Representative Ryan, is recognized with respect to that matter."

Ryan: "Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I would like to move for the immediate suspension of Rule 41(a) for the consideration of SJR 50."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman has moved for the suspension of Rule 41(a) for the immediate consideration and adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 50. The Gentleman from St. Clair, Representative Krause."

Krause: "Well, Mr. Speaker I object to leave to hear this....is there any reason why this Bill.....this mo....this Resolution can't go to Committee?"

Speaker Blair: "Well, Representative Krause, the Gentleman has not asked for leave, he has made a motion, he has moved the suspension of the rules. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative B.B. Wolfe."

Wolfe: "Ah...what.....what does the Resolution do? What's the....."

Speaker Blair: "Would you explain the Resolution,....ah....Representative Ryan? I mean you want to....."

Wolfe: "What does the Resolution do? What's its purpose."

Ryan: "Well, the resolution is to rescind the the Constitutional Amendments that we passed last week, or last session, the Spring Session concerning



judges."

Speaker Blair:

"O.K., the Gentleman has moved for the suspension of rule 41(a) for the immediate consideration for the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 50. Now, Representative Krause has objected, ah....it will take a Roll Call Vote, require 107 votes. Do you wish to speak to the motion, sir? The Gentleman from St. Clair, Representative Krause."

Krause:

"Well, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this is a Bill....this is a resolution that we passed in the last session. I can't see any reason why this shouldn't go back to the....to the Committee. Now, we are rescinding the action that we had already taken. It appears to me that this Bill....this Resolution ought to be in Committee and get a fair hearing."

Speaker Blair:

"The Gentleman from Union, Representative Choate."

Choate:

"Well, if I understand the Resolution correctly, it repeals or suggests the repeal of the action that this Body took in the last Session, as far as a Resolution is concerned, and if I am incorrect I wish the Sponsor would correct me on it, because the Resolution that is asking to be repealed says that the judges of the State of Illinois shall run for election at a partisan election. Is that correct?"

Ryan:

"Basically that's right. All I want to do is withdraw that ah....."

Choate:

"I understand. Ah....I used the word repeal."

Ryan:

"All right."

Choate:

"I would like to say that I think that the majority of the Membership of this House acted wisely and in the interest of the voting public when they passed the Resolution, that we did in the last Session of the General Assembly. We talk about honesty in government today, and we talk about restoration of faith in the political system, as far as public leaders are concerned today, and I dare say that if you read the media, if you listen to the radio, if you watch television, read the newspapers, you find that the judicial system is no different than other political bodies in the confines of the State of Illinois, of the other forty-nine states. They don't have,.....they don't have, if you can believe the media, a strangle-hold on attempting restore faith as far as people in government today. I think that the general public did have a say, who resides in that judges chambers. I think that they should have a more emphatic voice



in saying and deciding who resides in that judges' chambers. I don't know why, to the best of my being able to decide what is the best course for body politics to follow, I don't know why any judge is afraid to put his record on the line, and run for election the same as other public officials do. I would suggest that the Resolution go to Committee, that we defeat the motion to suspend the rules and hear the merits of this Resolution in Committee and then decide what we want to do with it after we get a Committee Report."

Speaker Blair: "O.K., the Gentleman from Lawrence, Representative Cunningham. One minute, Representative Shea, for what purpose do you rise, sir?"

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, as I heard the Gentleman from Kankakee's motion, it was to suspend the rules for immediate consideration, is that correct? That's what we are voting on now? I think he said suspend the rule in adoption and I just wanted clear...."

Speaker Blair: "We are voting on the suspension of the rule.....he may move to adopt it if he wishes."

Shea: "That's.....just wanted to clarify that."

Speaker Blair: "You've got it right. Ah...what....I've got Representative Cunn..... Representative Epton, for what purpose do you rise, sir?"

Epton: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I think that Representative Shea has raised a point that should be clarified. I am one of the Gentlemen who voted in favor of this previous Resolution. Certainly, I felt very... I feel very strong on the issue, but I think that we should recognize we are sitting here idly with little activity going on of any consequence.... Representative Ryan is simply asking that you allow it to come to the Floor of this House at the present time, this House which is sitting here doing relatively little, asking you then to determine the fate of this Resolution, up or down. Anybody who votes for Representative Ryan's request is simply allowing it to come to the Floor of this House at this time, and it seems to me that we might be in good conscience moving in that fashion at the moment."

Speaker Blair: "O.K. are there any more points? Because Representative Cunningham has the Floor. Representative Matijevich, do you have a point of order, sir?"

Matijevich: ".....Mr. Speaker..."

Speaker Blair: "Make your point, sir."



Matijevich:

"I don't think the motion is debatable. I think he will allow the courtesy to let the Membership know what the issue is, we know what the issue is, I think we ought to vote on the motion."

Speaker Blair:

"I think your point is well taken. Representative Cunningham do you also have a point of order, sir?"

Cunningham:

"Yes, Mr. Speaker,one more place, namely mine. I'm apprehensive to find myself in complete agreement with the Minority Leader. For the first time this week that he has risen, I'm politics makes good bedfellows. It is absolutely unthinkable, that the news media could ramrod through this House without any discussion whatever, a matter of so vital concern to the constituents of all of us. We must have this go to Committee and we must show the nerve to tell the judges of the State of Illinois that they are subject to the will of the people, just as we are. After this thing is all over...after this thing is all over, if justice is trampled under...under foot, it seems threatened, I shall have a Resolution for legislative reform and we will have a retention ballot for Legislators. It makes....it makes just as much sense. I invite each of you, who feel as I, that the Democratic process of letting the electorate speak at the polls, is not quite outmoded to recruit our strength, build up our muscle. Let's turn back this sorry attempt to reduce the Legislature to a rubber stamp for the news media and the judges. Last June was the finest hour for the Sponsors of this Bill and if that be true, the opposite must be....must follow if they persist in their efforts to turn back progress. Let's send it to Committee."

Speaker Blair:

"O.K., are there any other points of order, so we can Representative Rayson, do you have a point, sir?"

Rayson:

"I want to direct myself to the parliamentary motion. Yesterday,...ah.... we had a maneuver to suspend rules regarding House Bill 763. The Majority Leader made a point that we should sort of accede to the Sponsor's wish, even though I didn't agree with it because it concerned an Amendatory Veto, but...but we acceded to that point. It....it seems to me this is a different point, but....related to his plea. Ah....the merit of his plea might be considered today and that is ah....a Sponsor, who in his own diligence, did put a through a Resolution which he in later reflection feels it has merit in rescinding, I say that his request ought to be acceded to, and



that's why I am supporting this motion as a parliamentary motion."

Speaker Blair: "Representative Ryan to close the debate."

Ryan: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I would just like to say to my good friend from Lawrenceville, that I'm not to crazy about the insinuation that the press was moved for this action here today...ah...that's not the case at all. Certainly, they've editorialized that that has not been an influencing factor. I would ask not to take the year vote away from you, Roscoe, or anybody else in this House, all I ask is for the chance for this Bill be aired here today and we'll see what happens. With that I would suggest you all give me a vote to suspend the rules. I need a 107 votes and I would appreciate your support."

Speaker Blair: "The question is shall the provision of Rule 41 (a) be suspended for the purposes for the immediate consideration and adoption of Senate Joint Resolution #50. All in favor of the Gentleman's motion signify by voting 'aye', and the opposed by voting 'no'. This will require 107 votes. The motion to suspend the provisions of Rule 41 (a) for the purpose of immediate consideration and adoption of Senate Joint Resolution #50."

Clerk Selcke: "Alsup, Anderson, Arnell, Barnes, Barry,...."

Speaker Blair: "Representative Shea, for what purpose do you rise, sir?"

Shea: "I still got this parliamentary point. This is just to suspend the rules, if it is suspended then the rules...."

Speaker Blair: "Going to have to move for the adoption of the Resolution."

Shea: "All right."

Speaker Blair: "It will take eighty nine votes. This is simply for the suspension of Rule 41 (a) so that he may then hear if he wishes the resolution and have it adopted. Proceed, Mr...."

Speaker Blair: "Record Representative Jimmy Holloway as voting 'no'."



Clerk Selcke:

"R. Holloway, D. Houlihan, J. Speaker Blair:

"Representative Bill Walsh, for what purpose do you rise

Walsh:

"I'd like to explain my vote, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Blair:

"Proceed, Sir."

Walsh:

"I'd like to just point out what's happening here. This motion to rescind passed the Senate last week and in the metropolitan newspapers the one person given credit for passing the motion to rescind was Senator Partee and of course by extention and not very much extention Mayor Daley was given the credit. Now, here we have a situation where Mayor Daley's people lead by the Assistant Minority Leader are sitting on their hands. Everybody questioned that they don't know what's happening here, or what the issue is, it is very simple. Everyone in this Body knows exactly what this motion does. They also know that we're playing against time, we're running out of it. If we are going to have to have a Committee meeting....."

Speaker Blair:

"Representative Choate, for what purpose do you rise, Sir?"

Choate:

"Well, I think we've listened to this tirade just about long enough and the point of order is simply one thing. That the Gentleman is not speaking to the motion, that exists on the floor of this House and you know it and I know it."

Speaker Blair:

"The Gentleman will confine his remarks to the motion. Representative Shea, for what purpose do you rise, Sir?"

Shea:

"My name is mentioned in debate and I'd like to ask the Clerk of the House



how I'm recorded on this."

Speaker Blair: "How's the Gentleman recorded?"

Clerk Selcke: "I got you voting 'aye'."

Shea: "All right, Mr. Majority Leader, if that's sitting on my hands, you know, why don't you look instead of talking."

Speaker Blair: "Representative Walsh, do you wish to respond, sir?"

Walsh: "Well, ah...he's sitting on his hands, Mr. Speaker, I'd just like to make this point, as a leader, because....."

Speaker Blair: "One minute....Representative Choate, for what purpose do you rise, sir?"

Choate: "Now, if the Majority Leader wishes to discuss the motion, it is all right with me he is not going to, Mr. Speaker, under these rules, continue the tirade that he set forth in his remarks."

Speaker Blair: "OK, now, Representative Murphy do you have a point, sir? The Gentleman from Lake, Representative Murphy has a point he wishes to make."

Murphy: "I'd like for you to do simply this, as much as I hate to, ah... I don't like what the ah....our Leader is doing under the guidance of Leadership. I don't want him to say what he is saying, I don't care what he says."

Speaker Blair: "OK, now, Representative Katz has a point he would like to make, sir."

Katz: "Mr. Speaker, am I correct that we are voting only on the question of suspending the rule as to whether this goes to Committee, is that correct?"

Speaker Blair: "That's correct, sir."

Katz: "Now, I would like to say that I have voted 'no' on the question of the suspension of the rules because I believe that the matter should go to Committee. I think it is a very important matter. I believe that it ought to be heard in Committee. I think that when it comes to the floor there are people who are not here today who want to be recorded 'yes' on this matter. I think that it would be a great mistake to interpret a desire for this to go to Committee with any feeling that it shouldn't be passed. I think it will pass when it comes out of Committee."

Speaker Blair: "Are there any more points? Then let's get....Representative Juckett, I'll get back to you, I'll take the Republicans and the Democrats."

Juckett: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I think all of their points of order are out of order. The Majority Leader was in the explanation of his vote and all their points have nothing to do and he should be able to express his reason for voting and I would like the Chair to rule against their points."



- Speaker Blair: "All right, now are there any more inquiries? Representative William Walsh, for what purpose.... "
- Walsh: "If I may continue to explain my vote, Mr. Speaker."
- Speaker Blair: "Proceed sir."
- Walsh: "It's been called to my attention that the Assistant Majority Leader didn't sing out 'aye', he slunk....if that is the correct word....or slinked if it is not..... down to the Clerk and has himself put on. Now, Mr. Speaker....."
- Speaker Blair: "Representative Matijevich for what purpose do you rise, sir?"
- Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, I don't mind listening to somebody explain their vote but the Majority Leader is not explaining his vote, he is explaining somebody else's vote....."
- Speaker Blair: "Representative Shea, for what purpose do you rise, sir?"
- Shea: "I was delighted to have the Majority Leader refer to me as the Assistant Majority Leader, because I think he's finally found out who's got the majority in the House."
- Speaker Blair: "Representative Walsh, you..do you wish to cast your vote, sir?"
- Walsh: "I thought I'd continue my explanation. They keep giving me more food for thought. First, I'd like to apologize for ... to Representative Katz ah.. in his 'no' vote, I think he was casting a 'no' vote and hoping 'yes', that's exactly the opposite of the Assistant Majority Leader's vote. Minority, I beg your pardon. Now, Mr. Speaker, I think we've had enough of that and I vote 'aye', happily."
- Speaker Blair: "Proceed with....Representative Choate for what purpose do you rise, sir?"
- Choate: "Inasmuch as the Majority Leader did take a wee bit of the time of this House, I just want to make one short observation. Maybe it will help him in the future. Bill, this is the reason you don't win very many battles. The kind of remarks you just made."
- Speaker Blair: "Proceed with the Roll Call."
- Clerk Selcke: "Walters, Washburn, Washington...."
- Speaker Blair: "Representative Washington to explain his vote."
- Washington: "Very briefly, Mr. Speaker, I think Representative Katz's remarks should be repeated so that there's no confusion as to why I'm voting 'no'. This Resolution originally passed this House with a big vote. Since that time there's evidently some mild storm that's arisen to return back to the



original way of retaining judges. I think that the people who are pushing this Resolution should be made to be brought before our Committee and state their reasons categorically why we should change our vote. They might convince me. I vote 'no'.

Speaker Blair: "Record the Gentleman as voting 'no'."

Clerk Selcke: "Williams, J.J. Wolf,"

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative J.J. Wolf, to explain his vote."

Wolf: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, I really don't care which way the Members want to vote but I would like to make the remark, it was mentioned that some Members might like to be here to record themselves on this measure. All I have to say to that is, we all get paid the same amount of money and if a Member wants to make a vote he ought to damn well be here when this General Assembly is in Session. I vote 'aye'."

Speaker Blair: "Record the Gentleman as voting 'aye'."

Clerk Selcke: "B.B. Wolfe."

Speaker Blair: "'Aye' for Mr. Wolfe."

Clerk Selcke: "Yourell, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Blair: "'Aye'. Mr. Speaker votes 'aye'. Representative Lechowicz, record Representative J.J. Hill as voting 'no'. Representative Lechowicz for what purpose...."

Lechowicz: "Mr. Speaker I was....I was off the floor temporarily on the phone, how am I recorded? When my name was called."

Clerk Selcke: "The Gentleman is recorded as voting 'no'."

Lechowicz: "That's correct, thank you."

Speaker Blair: "Representative Houlihan for what purpose do you ah....no, I'm sorry, Representative Beatty for what purpose do you rise, sir?"

Beatty: "Would you change my vote to 'yes' please?"

Speaker Blair: "Record Representative Beatty as voting 'yes'. Record Representative Leon as voting 'no'. Any Members ah....Representative Molloy wishes to be recorded as voting 'aye', Molloy, 'aye'. OK, now, Mr. Clerk, Merle Anderson 'aye', Merle Anderson 'aye'. All right now, wait a second now. Representative Brandt wishes to be recorded as voting 'no'. Clerk Selcke:

"I got Schoeberlein 'aye'."

Speaker Blair:

"Representative Thompson wishes to be recorded...for what purpose does Representative Thompson arise?"

Thompson:

"How am I recorded?"

Speaker Blair:

"How is the Gentleman recorded?"

Clerk Selcke:

"The Gentleman is recorded as not voting."

Speaker Blair:

"'No'. Record the Gentleman as voting 'no'. On this question there are 82 'ayes', 51 'nays', 3 answering 'present', and the Gentleman's motion to suspend the provisions of Rule 41 (a) fails. And that matter will remain on the Speaker's Table. Now are there any Members who wish to ah... have their Total Veto Motions called? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative William Walsh."

Walsh:

"Ah...Mr. Speaker, ah...pursuant to the Adjournment Resolution I move that the House stand adjourned until Monday, November 5th, at 12, noon. This is a Regular Session, may I hold that? Representative Grotberg has ah... an announcement."

Grotberg:

"Thank you. Ah...anyone involved in the hearings this afternoon and tomorrow afternoon of the Interim Study Committee's for the Human Resources, Counties and Townships, I'm talking to Catania, Chapman, McClain, Polk, for this afternoon, I'm talking to those who got the notice on Counties and Townships and the sponsors who have also received notice. So, while we are adjourning the Regular Session now, until next week, while we are adjourning the Regular Session until next Monday at noon, we have the Special Sessions starting at one o'clock this afternoon. I've been getting all kinds of calls and I can't get any answers, and I wondered if we could ah....Resolution 530. - Speaker Blair: "Where is that Bill, Jake?"
- Wolf: "That's in reference to the transfer of mental health patients, long term patient care from, away from Cook County to Kankakee and Manteno."
- Speaker Blair: "That's a Regular Session Bill."
- Wolf: "Then just get to me sometime today, Mr. Speaker. So, I know before we leave."
- Speaker Blair: "Jake, if you come up here with Jim Edgar, I think I'll have an answer for you. OK, Representative Walsh ah....pursuant to the Adjournment Resolution move that the Regular Session do stand...oh, wait a second, OK, the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Duff with respect to an announcement ah...."
- Duff: "Senate Joint Resolution 50 ah.. will be heard in Judiciary Committee at the regular time next Tuesday. Ah...we will try to post it in 212 if its open."
- Speaker Blair: "Representative Collins for what purpose do you rise, sir?"
- Collins: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, and especially Members of the Executive Committee, ah... we have had assigned to Committee House Resolution 530, which we will post today for hearing ah... in the Executive Committee next Tuesday morning at nine a.m. I just cleared that with the Minority Leader and I hope the Members of the Executive Committee will take notice that we will meet in our usual meeting place next Tuesday morning at nine a.m. to consider House Resolution 530."
- Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative William Walsh has moved pursuant to Adjournment Resolution of the Regular Session, do stand adjourned until the hour of twelve, noon, next Monday. All in favor of the Gentleman's motion signify by saying 'aye', the opposed 'no', and the Regular Session stands adjourned until the hour of twelve, noon, next Monday. Now as a reminder the Special Sessions will reconvene at one o'clock this afternoon."



Wolf:

"Mr. Blair, I am against the adjournment, ah... a little over two weeks ago I introduced a Resolution and I've been trying to find out if it is going to be a Committee hearing ah... or the Committee of the Whole is going to happen. I've been getting all kinds of calls and I want to see the names, and I wondered if we could ah.... Resolution 530. Speaker Blair:

"There is no objection to the adjournment of medical health patients, long term patients who have been from Clark County to Kankakee and Mantero."

Wolf:

"There is a motion for the Bill."

Speaker Blair:

"There is no objection, Mr. Speaker. So, I know before we leave."

Wolf:

"Take, if you wish to be with the House, I think I'll have an answer for you. We have a motion to adjourn to the adjournment."

Speaker Blair:

"Resolution 530 is a regular session of the House... oh, wait a second, OK, the adjournment of the House with respect to an adjournment of the House."

Duff:

"Speaker Blair, Resolution 530 will be heard in Judiciary Committee at the regular session of the House. All other bills to be post it in 212 if its open."

Speaker Blair:

"The adjournment of the House for what purpose, sir?"

Collins:

"The adjournment of the House for what purpose, sir, and especially Members of the Executive Committee... no objection to Committee House adjournment... hearing ah... in the Executive Committee... I just cleared that with the Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Executive Committee... usual meeting place next Monday... Resolution 530."

Speaker Blair:

"The adjournment of the House... Talsh has moved pursuant to the adjournment of the House... to stand adjourned until the next adjournment of the House... of the Gentleman's motion... and the Regular Session starts... next Monday. Now as a adjournment of the House... 6 o'clock this afternoon."

Clerk Selcke:

"Proclamation. Whereas the General Assembly needs adequate time to review and evaluate legislation required to implement the Governor's recommended budget, and Whereas an individual's total administrative and supervisory experience does not presently receive equitable consideration the issuance of general administrative certificates for the public schools, and Whereas the consolidation of the nomination of election of county boards in the March primary and November general elections would save millions of dollars and increase voter participation in these local elections, and Whereas pursuant to the Comptroller's Act of 1973 certain preordered functions heretofore performed by the Department of Finance are transferred to the Office of the Comptroller, and Whereas these four additional emergency matters require legislative action this fall, therefore pursuant to Article 4, Section 5 via the Constitution of the State of Illinois and Chapter 63, Section 191 of the Illinois Revised Statutes, we W. Robert Blair, Speaker of the House of Representatives and William C. Harris, President of the Senate do hereby call and convene a Special Session of the 78th General Assembly, State of Illinois to commence on Tuesday, October 30th, 1973 at one o'clock p.m. central standard time for the following purposes: 1. The enactment of legislation requiring committal of the Governor's budget Bills by a date certain. 2. Enactment of legislation providing for equitable consideration of administrative and supervisory experience as criteria for the issuance of general administrative certificates under Section 21-7.1 of the School Code. 3. Enactment of legislation to permit the consolidation of nomination and election of county boards into the March primary and the November general elections. 4. Enactment of legislation to transfer preaudited voucher control functions now controlled by Central Accounting in the Department of Finance to the Office of the Comptroller, October 25th, 1973, Springfield, Illinois, W. Robert Blair, Speaker of the House of Representatives, William C. Harris, President of the Senate."

Speaker Blair:

"Is there leave for the same Roll Call that we had with respect to the First Special Session today. All right, leave has been granted. Now, you've



got some....President Harris and I were going to address a Joint Session but Senate...with regard to this Proclamation, but the Senate is still in Session and we couldn't arrange it. Resolution, Mr. Pierce, Gentleman from Lake."

Pierce: "Mr. Speaker, I just want to thank you and the President for calling this Special Session, it was very thoughtful of you and I think we want to get to work on consolidation of elections ah...for Lake County and that was a very good purpose if you recall."

Clerk Selcke: "House Resolution #1, Pappas, Resolved that the Clerk informed the Senate that the majority of Members of the House has assembled pursuant to the Proclamation of the Speaker of the House and the President of the Senate convening a Fourth Special Session of the General Assembly and now ready for the transaction of business."

Speaker Blair: "Discussion. All right, the Gentleman moves for adoption. All those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no', the 'ayes' have it."

Clerk Selcke: "House Resolution #2...."

Speaker Blair: "Wait a minute, the Gentleman from Macon, Mr. Borchers, for what purpose do you rise?"

Borchers: "Mr. Speaker, this is of deep importance, I just wondered what special favors I might get from the Speaker for not asking for ah...the quorum to be taken and all that sort of thing....anything I can be offered?"

Speaker Blair: "For a quorum?"

Borchers: "I mean to keep me from asking for a count of the heads. What do I get?"

Speaker Blair: "Oh, I like that....the Gentleman did not....he withdrew his request."

Clerk Selcke: "House Resolution #2, Pappas, Resolved that the rules of the House of Representatives, 78th General Assembly as amended, be adopted the rules of the Fourth Special Session so far the same may be applicable and that the Standing Committees of the House of the 78th General Assembly and their Membership shall constitute the Standing Committees of the House during the Fourth Special Session."

Speaker Blair: "All those in favor of the adoption of the Resolution say 'aye', the opposed 'no', the 'ayes' have it. The Resolution is adopted."

Clerk Selcke: "House Resolution #3, Pappas, Resolved that a Committee of five members no more than three from the majority party be appointed by the Speaker to approve the last days Journal and all the Journals of the Fourth Special



Session of the 78th General Assembly."

Speaker Blair: "Allright, the Gentleman from Rock Island, Mr. Pappas moves for the adoption of the mendment...or the Resolution. All those in favor say 'aye', those opposed 'no', the 'ayes' have it. The Resolution is adopted. Are there further Resolu....Adjournment Resolution."

Clerk Selcke: "House Joint Resolution #1, Fourth Special Session. Ah...Pappas. Resolved by the House of Representatives, 78th General Assembly, State of Illinois, of the Fourth Special Session thereof, the Senate concurring herein, that when the House of Representatives adjourns on Tuesday, October 30th, 1973, it stand adjourned until Tuesday, November 6th, 1973, at one o'clock p.m. and when the Senate adjourns Wednesday, October 31st, 1973, it stand adjourned until Tuesday, November 6, 1973, at one forty-five o'clock p.m."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the Gentleman from Rock Island, Mr. Pappas moves for the adoption of the Adjournment Resolution. All those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no', the 'ayes' have it. The Adjournment resolution is adopted.

Blair: "Introduction."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill #1, Giorgi, Fourth Special Session, (have we got a stamp for this, Jack?) A Bill for an Act to amend the Election Code. First Reading of the Bill.

Blair: Further Introductions? Allright, the Gentleman from Rock Island, moves that the House, that the Fourth Special Session stand adjourned pursuant to the Adjournment Resolution until the hour of one p.m. Tuesday, November 6th. All those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no', the 'ayes' have it, and the Fourth Special Session is adjourned. Allright, First Special Session.. ah...we recessed earlier this morning until one fifteen and that is the Ethics Special...and...ah...we've got the Adjournment Resolution."

Clerk Selcke: "House Joint Resolution (what's the number?) House Joint Resolution #3...ah...Pappas. Resolved by the House of Representatives, 78th General Assembly, State of Illinois, that the First Special Session, thereof, the Senate concurring herein, that when the House of Representatives adjourns on Tuesday, October 30th, 1973, it stand adjourned until Monday, November 5th, 1973, at twelve thirty o'clock p.m., and when the Senate adjourns on Wednesday, October 31st, 1973, it stand adjourned until Tuesday, November 6th, 1973, at one o'clock p.m."

Speaker Blair: "Is there any discussion about that? The Gentleman from Will, Mr. Kempiners."



- Kempiners: "Ah...Mr. Speaker, just a question on this...ah...the procedure for next week."
- Speaker Blair: "All right."
- Kempiners: "I noticed that...ah...that information was disseminated that those of us who have Bills will be heard by the Committee of the Whole...ah...Monday afternoon and Tuesday morning. Do you anticipate we'll be hearing all those Bills during that two day period?"
- Speaker Blair: "Yes, it was the feeling of the Joint Leadership that using the Committee of the Whole and laying all of the Bills that have been introduced in the First Special Session before the Committee of the Whole...ah...that they could be heard through Monday afternoon and Tuesday morning and if we need additional time, we can arrange that next week."
- Kempiners: "Will there be any time allotment so that those of us with Bills will know when, practically when they will be heard?"
- Speaker Blair: "Well, ah...that's pretty hard, like any Committee hearing...ah...we'll move along, sure, I've designated Mr. Bluthardt, from Cook, as the...ah...to Chair of the Committee of the Whole and I'm sure he'll move as expeditiously as possible, if you have some particular time commitments that you would like him to facilitate for you, I'm sure he would be amenable to any reasonable suggestion you would put forth."
- Kempiners: "OK, thank you."
- Speaker Blair: "You're welcome. B.B. Wolfe, the Gentleman from Cook."
- Wolfe: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This is on the Resolution, or on the motion, yes, on the discussion that we just had concerning the Committee of the Whole for next Monday and Tuesday. As I understand ... this is a Committee of the Whole and not a Committee as though a Committee of the Whole. There is a distinction, there. The Committee of the Whole, no Amendments can be introduced to any of the Bills that are before the Committee, is that right?"
- Speaker Blair: "Right."

- Speaker Blair: "All right, no, no, it's the ordinary and usual Committee of the Whole that the House has been used to from time-to-time, going into when the Speaker's laid measures before it. Actually it was the thought of the Joint Leadership that inasmuch as we're going to be down here and it's a limited number of Bill session, that all the Members might like to participate in the hearing on these various measures rather than just a limited number in a single committee and that would justify using that procedure."
- Wolfe: "What happens after the Committee of the Whole, nothing is voted out of the Committee, pass, or do pass..."
- Speaker Blair: "Somebody moves that the Committee of the Whole do now arise..."
- Wolfe: "And that's what ordinarily happens."
- Speaker Blair: "All right, the question is on the adjournment of the First Special Session to the hour of twelve thirty on Monday pursuant to the Adjournment Resolution, all those in favor of the Gentleman's motion say 'aye', the opposed 'no', the 'ayes' have it and the First Special Session is adjourned. - Speaker Blair: "Is there any discussion? All right, the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Walsh... wait we might indicate here the Bills introduced in the Second Special Session are by agreement of the Joint Leadership ah...being laid before a Committee of the Whole House ah... that will convene on Tuesday, at what time, Fred? Tuesday, at two p.m. All right, that...B.B., turn B.B. on..."



- Wolfe: "Ah...we're on the Second Special Session of business, is that correct, Mr. Speaker?"
- Speaker Blair: "Right."
- Wolfe: "And the motion was...the Majority Leader's motion to adjourn to two o'clock on that day?"
