Secretary Howlett: "The Chair recognizes Representative Robert Brinkmeier."

Brinkmeier: "Mr. Secretary, members of the House, since adjourning last Tuesday, I have been the recipient of four phone calls:... from four of my county chairmen. Now, two of them have been contacted by one executive office of State government, the other two by another executive office; however, in both cases the message was very loud and clear...'Would you please use whatever persuasion you have to convince Representative Brinkmeier to cast his vote for Bill Redmond?' I responded to these county chairmen by replying as I stated on the floor here last week. I think Bill Redmond is one of the most capable, dedicated, honest men in this General Assembly. Now, very frankly... I want to make it absolutely clear... I was about to say perfectly clear, I want to say absolutely clear..."

Secretary Howlett: "Ah... Bob, make it crystal clear."

Brinkmeier: "All right, Mike, crystal clear it is. My arm was not twisted; there was not one threat of termination of a single patronage job. And I appreciate that very much, so I have no anger; I have no resentment... However, I am disappointed... that two great Democratic leaders, who I respect very, very much... apparently don't respect my judgment as I respect theirs. With the exception of three years... during World War II, I have lived in what is now the 35th Legislative District. I'm very... very pleased, and very... very flattered that last November, if my hypotheses are correct, I think maybe a Democrat led in that District. I know that there are extenuating circumstances, but I think that the fact that I lived with those people all my life, and I know what they want, and what they believe... had a large part to play in how they voted last November. I'm going to reply to you now... explain to you... what my response was to them... As I said a moment ago, I have no qualms with Bill Redmond;

he would probably be a great Speaker. But, I want to give you two little examples of what has happened since last Tuesday, and I think it will get my point across crystal clear; Number 1, immediately after... I expressed why... I was supporting Rolland Tipsword, one of my very good friends from the other side of the aisle came across, and he was trying to convince me that the problems of the metropolitan area, insofar as education was concerned, were very similar to those... of our District... of my District. And he made this statement to me; he said, 'You know, I have a school in my district that has only eighteen hundred students'... only eighteen hundred, I repeat. Ladies and gentlemen, I represent a hundred and eighty-nine thousand people... I have only one school district that has that many. Now, to me this exemplifies the difference in thinking. Point number two: last night I had the pleasure listening to a spokesman for one of our major farm organizations in the State of Illinois, and he was explaining to those farmers and agribusiness people there the difference of the... difficulty of communicating ah... with certain agencies of State government. And he told us about receiving a telephone call... from a young man in our... one of our State agencies, that was actually trying to be helpful... He wanted to help these farmers... Now this will fly over the heads of our metropolitan friends, but you rural people will know what I'm talking about. He said that there were two stipulations, though... if we are going to help you fight pollution, help the farmers fight pollution. The stipulation number one: the farmer must not employ more than ten people... Well, I looked around that auditorium last night and saw about four hundred people seated there, and there wasn't one... agribusiness or farmer, that I know of, employed as many as ten people. Stipulation number two: the maximum loan that could be made to this farmer was a hundred thousand dollars. This is to fight pollution... Well, it's absolutely ridiculous. Very obviously this young man is very capable; he knows how to fight pollution and what to do in metropolitan areas, but he has absolutely no conception of what is needed for our rural areas in the State. Now, ladies and



gentlemen, these two points, as best as I can explain to you, illustrate why I... feel that it's important to have at least one person in State government who lives farther than 30 miles from the Loop. I think that the four or five million of us who live beyond that 30 or 35 mile radius deserve to have one person... in State government that understands our problem. Now, I know that there are other problems, such as assessment, road construction, law enforcement, mental health, you name it; they exist in rural areas; they exist in metropolitan areas.. but the scope of those problems is entirely different, and the solutions have... to be different. I submit once more to you downstate Democrats, to do some serious soul searching right now, and see if you can't support a very capable downstater as our Speaker, and for those of you that live in the metropolitan area, let me say this again... you have many people representing your viewpoints in State government and in the U. S. Senate... Don't you really believe that we are entitled to one person, just one... who can speak for those of us that live outside that metropolitan area? I'm going to cast my vote for Rolland Tipword again... I hope others will do so... also. Thank you."

Secretary Howlett: "Representative Webber Borchers."

Borchers: "I would like to take just one other story... support that what has just been said by Representative ah... Brinkmeier. Two years ago I had the ah... farmers ah... Grain Growing Bill in. It was at the committee hearing, after the hearing. The bill was carried to committee. After the hearing a young man came up to me... introduced 'hissself,' said that he had been hired by the Pollution Control Board; he was one of those to go downstate and look into farms and farming problems. He said.. I asked him what his credentials were. He said, well, he was from Chicago and he was not graduated from agricultural school. Then he asked as a favor if I would bring him a cup of ah... soybeans, so he would know what a soybean looked like... Now, to me that was just slightly ridiculous, so this one of the... a very silly story of some of the problems that we may have out of people not having proper representation from downstate."

Secretary Howlett: "Representative Hill."

Hill: "Ah... Mr. Secretary and members of the House. I have served in this honorable body now for sixteen years. I have been very proud to serve here for those sixteen years, and certainly be proud to serve two more years if the good Lord is willing. Last Tuesday I heard a speech on this floor... and it was a speech that, as far as I am concerned was one of the most vicious I have ever experienced on this floor of the House of Representatives. By implication and statement the person that gave that speech... tried to imply... that Representative Choate, and those sixteen other Democrats that are voting with him... he tried to imply that there was something irregular... something wrong... in this particular group. He said that money and clout... is what prevailed as far as Representative Choate is concerned... and he says that my experience to prove this to you... was House Bill 1414. Now I remember that piece of legislation, and the reason that I remember it, is because on that piece of legislation I had quite a few doctors call me from my district, asking me to vote against it... and do everything within my power to defeat it because in the bill, it calls for a consumer advocate... in regards to these various ah... groupings in the medical profession. Several times during the debate on that particular bill..."



and after it was postponed the first time, I went to that gentleman from Lake County and I said, 'Pursue that bill... I'm for it... and I will continue to vote for it'. But that's the bill he used... I worried about that all day yesterday. None of the State offices were open, so when I got to Springfield today... I got the Digest... and I got the Journal... just to see who did vote for that piece of legislation. And out of the seventeen people that are voting for Clyde Choate today... I would like to tell you who voted for it. Mr. Brummet, Clyde Choate, Bob Craig, Mr. Fennessey, Jack Hill, Oral Jacobs, Mr. Jaffe, Von Boeckman, and Williams... the rest of them, in our group... did not vote on that piece of legislation. It received 97 votes to pass the House of Representative. There were 46 votes in opposition to this piece of legislation... and there were only 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, Democrats... that voted against... that piece of legislation, from the gentleman from Lake County, and one of those five is the present candidate that he is voting for, and anyone that would like to come over here... and read this Journal... to prove to himself or herself... the viciousness that occurred here last Tuesday certainly is free to do it. I have lost a lot of respect for this gentleman, because apparently he spoke... without his brain being in gear, because he can avail himself of this Journal... exactly the same way that I have... and I fault... the news media... for carrying that story... without even checking it. I think this is disgraceful... and hope that it never occurs on this floor again. And I vote for Clyde Choate. Thank you."

Fred Selcke: "Hill, Choate...."

Secretary Howlett: "Representative Matijeich."

Matijeich: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I just want to tell everybody here that very often there is something behind... what you see in the Journal. I lived with House Bill 1414, so I know what it was all about. Some of you may recall, and this may be in the Journal too, that Jack, right before that bill was a consumer bill, and some of you may remember it, on the other side of the aisle, that Pate Philip had that he was handling for the Attorney General, ah... I was going to vote for that bill, and



Clyde Choate came over to me, and I was the last vote... In fact, I was on the bill, there was a verification; and I have never taken a walk on a verification yet... but I did on that bill and ah... my bill was coming up next, 1414, and he was violently opposed to it, and he said that he would vote for that bill... but I knew what was happening, so often, as I said, much happens ah... that you can't find in the Journal, Everybody lives with their legislation and believe me, this isn't the reason, the only reason that I oppose ah... Clyde Choate. There are some reasons, but ah... when my bill came along, 1414, the very next bill, ah... the Medical Society was at that very moment... at that very moment, passing out literature... to tell the members on the other side of the rotunda that a bill was coming over... soon, very soon. How did they know that my bill was going to pass? The truth of the matter is, that the power brokers finally gave up and it was going to pass here, and they were notifying them that it was going to be stopped in committee, It was stopped in committee; it was stopped in Jack Walker's committee without me... without me, the House sponsor, ever being notified that that bill was being called in committee. That is some of the tactics that I'm referring too. You won't see it in any Journal, not in any Journal, but believe me, it's there, and I think that I can point out some other facts like that. Jack, I'm sorry you feel about those words... they weren't intended to be vicious; they were intended to tell the members of the House that there are tactics that are ah... used here that I think aren't open in passing legislation, in defeating it, and I stand for getting rid of those tactics. That's all there is to it... and ah... I hope that you respect me for what I believe in, too."

Secretary Howlett: "Ladies and gentlemen, I hope that we would address ourselves... to the election of a Speaker, and that the Democrats would settle their own differences in caucus. Representative Clyde Choate."

Choate: "I'm going to be very brief, Mr. Speaker. If the gentleman is implying that I... talked to Repres.... to Senator Jack Walker, or a single solitary member of the Senate regarding that bill, he is just putting words in somebody's mouth because it isn't true. If



he thinks that I... had the State Medical Society, or anyone else, circulate any... publications of any nature... to the Senate, as far as that bill is concerned, it is just not true. As far as asking him to take a walk... I don't recall it... It's possible, and it would be nothing different than any other leader on either side of the aisle has done on given occasions, on pieces of legislation... that has to do... with the parties' stand, in most instances, but as far as trading my vote... that is not true..."

Secretary Howlett: "The Chair recognizes Representative Stubblefield  
of Winnebago County."

Stubblefield: "Thank you, Mr. Secretary of State. Members of the Gen-  
eral Assembly, and Representatives all, I have with some restraint  
remained silent for more than 80 roll calls, and frankly that  
surprises even me... And now with tongue in cheek... I would like  
to explain our action, not for the benefit of the Representatives  
on this floor, because most of them are more experienced than  
I am, and I know that they all understand that what we're doing  
here is an act of statesmanship and in no way political in nature.  
And we freshmen are beginning to comprehend that a little bit, too.  
But I just fear that the citizens back home may well misunderstand  
what we're doing unless someone takes the time to explain to them  
that what we're about is not politics as usual, but we're really  
carrying out a strategy... which I think best serves their inter-  
est, that is, the interest of the people of the State of Illinois."



Now, I, along with many others of my party, campaigned on the... pledge that, if elected, we would hold the line on spending; we would hold the line on taxes, and I think very frankly several were skeptical that we did not have a plan for doing that, but I would like to remind you that for now, for almost two weeks, there has been no mention of a single program on this floor... that would cost the taxpayers money. There has not been any thought of new appropriation, and there has not been the slightest mention of a tax increase. We also pledged that if elected we would conduct an open legislature, with each member having a right to make an input into these proceedings, and once and for all we would end the discussions being made in the backroom or the smoked filled room. We have 80 roll calls to prove that we Democrats have not made a deal. Now, I think our constituents should also be reminded that we have done this as Representatives to some discomfort and harm to ourselves, because they will probably not realize that until we have elected a Speaker... we will not be paid per diem, and we will not be paid our travel expense and so we have done this at some discomfort to ourselves. And I think the citizenship of our State ought to also be reminded that they probably not seen anything yet. If we can be successful in maintaining this strategy past June 30 and until July 1st, then think of all the money that we can save the taxpayer, and we can probably reduce and maybe eliminate forever State bureaucracy. That's something we promised to do and no one thought that we could do it, but I think that we Democratic majority this time just might get it accomplished... now, if something should go wrong, and we accidently elect a Speaker, then I don't think the people back home ought to panic, because we'll have another program and another strategy that will serve their purpose just as well, but I really don't see any plan for alarm at the present time. In fact, I only panicked at one time... that was back when Representative Redmond had about 81 votes, and it looked like we might elect a Speaker for a couple of roll calls, but the compromises pulled back and we're no longer in trouble. So I want to compliment my colleagues I think the people back home are proud



of all of us... this has really been and continues to be a real display of statesmanship. Now, inasmuch as our strategy is not in jeopardy, and since the name of my colleague Zeke Giorgi is not in nomination, a man that I would like to vote for and who I think would make a good Speaker, I'm going to once again vote for Bill Redmond. Thank you."

Secretary Howlett: "I might suggest to my friend Representative Stubblefield that you could elect a Speaker and accomplish all your ends... and let this poor old Secretary of State go back and try accomplishing in my Office."

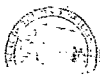

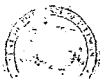

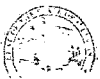

weeks, and consider him to be a man of integrity... a soft spoken man... a true leader of our party, and at all times a gentleman. But, Mr. Secretary, now is the time... for those of us in the House of Representatives to look beyond party lines.... Now is the time to look at the business at hand, and to consider the problems of this State. I have known William Redmond for a number of years. I have known William Redmond since the age of five... and perhaps it is appropriate that I am standing here at the present time... addressing you, and perhaps it's appropriate that I am going to speak to you of a friend and a colleague... and a long time family acquaintance. My friend, my acquaintance... William Redmond, has been a personal associate for a number of years. The wounds on the other side of the aisle, in my opinion, will last... for many years... and it has been my experience... through the happening that we have seen over the past week. I, too, have received communications from... both people in my District... I have received telegrams and phone calls. I have received, ladies and gentlemen... phone calls from not... only the members of the Democratic Party, but members of the Republican Party. I have talked to people in my District that are Republican leaders; I have talked to people that are concerned about what's happening in the Illinois House of Representatives. I know that members of my side of the aisle are concerned about this movement, and I can hear some of the talk that's going on at the present time. But, Mr. Secretary..."

Secretary Howlett: "Let the gentlemen finish, please... everybody has had their say...."

Daniels: "Mr. Secretary... I want you to know that it's with a deeply embedded feeling of... confidence in the legislative process... that I say to you, in full awareness of the problems that we're facing, that Mr. Secretary, I switch my vote... from James Washburn to that of William Redmond. Thank you."

Secretary Howlett: "Representative Washburn."

Washburn: "Mr. Secretary and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I move that we adjourn until Monday morn... Monday at 12 o'clock."

Secretary Howlett: "Representative Washburn, would you amend that till
