Governor Walker: "Thank you very much. Thank you. Thank you. Mr. Speaker, Mr. President, Members of the General Assembly, Ladies and Gentlemen. Illinois is now experiencing an economic recovery. Certainly it is slower than many had predicted. Indeed, it is slower than I had hoped for, but we are now moving in the right direction. I am today presenting a sound budget for these economic conditions. A budget that provides increased support for education, for Mental Health and other vital services within existing resources. And for the fourth consecutive year of this administration, there will be no increase in taxes. Other Thank you. Other States, and particularly the larger industrial States, are not so fortunate. They face the unacceptable alternative of putting vital services or increasing taxes or both. In the past two years. 27 states have increased taxes and the Governors of several states, including New York, Pennsylvania, and Connecticut are now urging new taxes, but we have not gone down that road in Illinois and we will not. To do so, would, I believe, be wrong, both morally and economically. It would hurt people who are trying to make ends meet and it would to some extent undercut economic recovery in Illinois. At a time when the Federal government is



reducing taxes to stimulate the economy, it makes absolutely no sense for State government to be increasing taxes. Now like the national economy, the Illinois economy has been buffeted by economic sources, world-wide and origin impact; inflation, recession; persistent high unemployment; energy sources. Unemployment in Illinois has reached unprecedented levels because manufacturing and construction have been hard hit, and those segments of the economy are the slowest to recover. The business climate, however, in Illinois is good. Our economy is diversified, strong in agriculture, manufacturing, service business and industry. Illinois is fiscally strong. Our general obligation bonds continue to receive the highest triple A rating. In January, we sold 150,000,000 dollars worth of bonds at an interest rate of 5.43%. During that week, the average rate on high grade government bonds were almost one percentage point higher. The favorable rates obtained by Illinois is a real measure of the high confidence which the financial community has in our State's Fiscal condition. As of March 1, our available cash balance in the General Revenue fund was 70,000,000 dollars. Our end of the year balance after accounting for necessary supplemental appropriations, is estimated at \$133,000,000. I am proposing that General Revenue Fund appropriations be increased next year by \$307,000,000. That increase, I believe, should be spent on vital services, primarily education and health, but I also propose that the increased spending be limited by available resources. We must not plan to spend more than we have. Last year was, I believe, a watershed year for the taxpayers of Illinois. We decided that we would continue to increase aid to education, but we also decided that we were not going to spend money that we do not have. That we were not going to force a tax increase. That we are not going to accept the notion that government will inevitably grow like topsy and that new taxes are inevitable. We will hold the line on overspending. This year, this same philosophy, the same fiscally responsible approach must be continued. The special interests that want more, more than the State has available but can't have their way. We can and will provide services to the people who need them



most, but we should not and we will not respond by over-spending. This Budget recommends appropriations of \$9.9 billion. That is \$224,000,000 less than the current fiscal year appropriation. It is \$842,000,000 less than the budget I submitted at this time last year. This budget recommends \$5.9 billion dollars for grants that includes aid to schools; \$2.2 billion for operations that includes traditionally higher education in our State institutions, and \$1.5 billion for capital. Compared to last year, the dollars recommended for grants and operations are up and capital is down. This is a balanced budget. As the constitution requires, expenditures will not exceed available resources. Over one-half of the budget, \$5.6 billion, consists of the general revenue and common school fund, the funds which support education, health and public aid. I am proposing that we spend \$2.4 billion dollars on education. That is 43% of the total general fund dollars available. It is an increase of \$184,000,000. That \$184,000,000 accounts for sixty percent, sixty percent of the additional general revenue fund appropriation, and again this year, I am proposing to you that all, all of the Federal revenue sharing dollars received by the State go to education. I am recommending \$1.7 billion for elementary and secondary education and that is an increase of \$148,000,000 or 9.5 percent over last year's. Because enrollments are declining, per-pupil support would be up more dramatically, from \$695 per pupil last year to \$773 this year, an increase of over 10 percent. That would provide over \$23,000 for a classroom of 30 students and these numbers, by the way do not include the over \$200,000,000 in capital funds to finance school construction and pay for this service. With this level of support, the State will be paid the largest share of the costs of elementary and secondary education, 48 percent. The highest in the history of the State. The balance, of course, is local and federal. Our commitment to funding education is further evidenced by comparison with other States. The recommended 9.5 percent increase for educational funding is the largest amongst comparable states. Look at the proposed increases for these other States. California, 7.4 percent against our 9.5 percent. Ohio, 7.3 percent.



Michigan, 4.6 percent. Texas, 7/10 of one percent. Pennsylvania, 6/10 of one percent increase and New York State, 4/10 of one percent increase compared to our 9.5 percent. On the basis of per pupil support, Illinois ranks second behind only New York. We rank ahead of California, ahead of Pennsylvania, ahead of Michigan, ahead of Texas and ahead of Ohio. Now I'm asking the Office of Education to recommend allocations of the increased dollar. That is what they are there for. They have the expertise to do it. It has been suggested that the period for implementation of the General distributive aid formula, be extended from the current four years to five years. If this is done, there will be enough to fully fund the formula, increase catagorical grants substantially and fund retirement that we have in prior years. At the same time I would like to suggest to you today that we really need to reexamine that formula. With many districts losing enrollment faster than anticipated, the formula is simply not operating fairly throughout our State. We must remember, too, and this is the final word on the subject of education, that the goal of all these dollars is not just spending money, but providing quality education for all. With these increased funds, school boards have the opportunity and the obligation to insure that money is not wasted on bureaucracy. The dollars must be spent as much as possible in the front line of education, the classroom, and they must be translated into quality education for our kids. I propose \$720,000,000 for higher education. That's an increase of \$36,000,000 over this year. Again, I have asked the Board of Higher Education to recommend allocation of the dollars. There should, I believe, be no tuition increase. Tuition increases would raise economic barriers for middle and low income families. Almost \$380,000.000 goes for institutional care in the Departments of State Government which operates our hospitals for the mentally ill, the developmentally disabled, our homes for children and veterans and our correctional institutions. These are dollars for direct care, staff, food, fuel and so forth. Another \$305,000,000 goes for tax refunds, tax relief, and other fixed costs. Approximately \$1.9 billion will go for Public Aid. With



improvements in the economy and with continuing effort to weed out eligibility, we will be able to help those in need of help. The Department has cut ineligibility in half in the last year according to the Federal Audit Study, and is intensifying its efforts to prevent fraud by providers. This year case loads should level off and the increasing costs of medical care will account for most of the increased budget. Another \$148,000,000 will be spent by the legislature, the judicial branch and the other elected officials. Well, I started out with \$5.6 billion and I've accounted for most of that. The remainder of the General fund, approximately \$560,000,000 or 10% goes for all of the other functions of State government, other services for Senior citizens. abused and neglected children, for the handicapped, environmental protection, consumer protection, public health, agriculture, enforcement of laws protecting working people. Economic and community development, conservation of our natural resources. This is a tight budget. It reflects the continuing effort of this administration to reallocate resources. Grant's and those of the direct payments to local governments, including school districts, community groups and individuals are up by 50% since 1973, but costs, costs for the operations of State government have actually increased once you turned it into real dollars and take out the impact of inflation. Education and human services account of 97% of the increased general fund appropriation. Dollars for operations account for a very, very small portion of this budget. To those who say, and there are some, to those who say that we can find another \$250,000,000 for education, I ask, where are you going to get the money. If they say more taxes, I say 'no'. If they say by cutting other programs, I ask, which ones? Are you going to close mental hospitals? Are you going to cut public aid grants? Are you going to cut down on law enforcement, consumer protection, economic development? Where, where can you find that \$250,000,000? The answer is, you cannot, without increasing taxes, and that I will not do. Now the overall budget is down in great part, because of the reduced level of recommended capital appropriation. Last



year, you'll recall that an effort to stimulate the lagging construction industry in our overall Illinois economy expedited efforts were made to get needed projects under contract. This year's budget level reflects the return to a more normal capital program. In the area of transportation we are continuing to make the investment necessary to improve and maintain highways, airports and railroads and yes, to support public transportation throughout the State. The recommended highway construction program, financed by road funds and bonds is \$1.2 billion. Over \$500,000,000 is for new projects. The balance is to continue projects now under contract. This program will enable us to mostly complete the interstate system. It will provide for the widening and resurfacing of 500 miles of roads. It also includes \$59,000,000 for improvements in the Chicago Metropolitan area. We are continuing to work on the supplemental freeway system. \$92,000,000 of freeway construction will be placed under contract next year. Support for public transportation will be \$242,000,000. Public transportation systems, as you know, all over this State, now receive State support, and there are the special programs for students, for senior citizens and for the handicapped. Details of other programs are spelled out in the accountability budget narrative which gives detail and historical comparison for each and every Department. Overall, this budget provides more services, services that people need and expect. Education accounts of 33 percent of the total and 43 percent of general funds alone. Human services account of 27 percent. Transportation for 19 percent. Protection of the environment and natural resources 5 percent. I repeat, this is a sound budget. A moderate budget. 'It balances the needs of all the people, the need for services and the need to hold the line on taxes. This budget calls upon government, to meet the needs of people with both quality and discipline. There is no room for frills. There is no room for political increases Only hard work and service to people. In short, this budget requires the State to live within its means, just as millions of men and women throughout Illinois are doing today. Thank you very much."



Speaker Redmond: "Will the Committee of Escorts come forward to the rostrum to escort the Governor from the Chambers? Will the

Committee come forward? The President of the Senate is recognized."

- President Partee: 'Mr. Speaker, I move that the Joint Session do now arise."
- Speaker Redmond: "The President moves that the Joint Session do now arise. All in favor, indicate by saying 'aye'. Opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Joint Session will arise."
- President Partee: "The Senate will be in immediate Session in the Senate

 Chambers. Thank you."
- Shea: "The House will come to Order. On the Motions, Representative

 Lechowicz, on Senate Bill 1520."
- Lechowicz: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Senate
 Bill 1520, I'm asking that this Bill be advanced to Second Reading
 with reference to Committee. This Bill is the Bill that provides
 land, which is presently located approximately at Oak Park and
 Irving Park Road for the purposes of the new Horizon School for
 the mentally retarded. There have been a number of meetings on this
 specific piece of property and in turn, between the Department of
 Mental Health and the Assistant Director, Mr. Blantant. He has
 proved....."
- Shea: "Mr. Lechowicz, have you cleared this with both sides of the aisle?"
- Lechowicz: "Yes, Sir, I have."
- Shea: "All right, the Gentleman's motion is to advance this Bill to
 the Order of Second Reading without reference to committee. On that
 Motion, the Gentleman from Winnebago, Mr. Simms."
- Simms: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I'd like to ask Mr. Lechowicz a question if I might."
- Shea: "He'll yield."
- Simms: "Representative Lechowicz, what is the value of this property that you want to transfer?"
- Lechowicz: "Mr. Simms, if you'll hold on for one minute. First of all, this is a parcel that is physically owned within the State. It's for..... and if you'll read the original grant to the State by the



Dunning Family, it can only be used for Mental Health purposes. If you recall, the appropriation for the capital development board, they are to put five facilities in there. This in turn, the exact dollar amount has not been figured, Tim, but in turn the purpose of the property is for the mentally disabled and in turn, it is suppose to receive the support of the department."

Simms: "Well, Representative Lechowicz, do you have any idea what the value of the property is. ... Is it worth ten million or two million or three million? I.... my point is, Ted, while this is State property at the present time....."

Shea: "Mr. Lechowicz, do you want to take this out and go over and talk to the Leadership again. They agreed, I thought."

Lechowicz: "More than happy to."

Shea: "Mr. Hoffman, do you have a question? He took the Bill out of the Record. Turn on Gene Hoffman."

Hoffman: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I realize
he's taken the Bill out of the Record, but for the Record, I would
just like to point out, it is my understanding that Commonwealth
Edison bought two acres of similar property about two years ago
from the Department for \$267,000. It seems to me like it's reasonable
that this Bill would go to Committee. I think that's all we're
asking, that there be a fair hearing on it."

Shea: "I don't think anybody is objecting. I thought he had talked to the people on your side. He's talking to them again. On the Order of House Bills.... on the Order of Motions appears House Bill 2347. The Gentleman from Peoria, Mr. Schraeder, on the Floor? Turn Mr. Giorgi on, on that Bill."

Giorgi: "No, no, no. I've got a Motion of my own I'm waiting for."

Shea: "Is Mr. Schraeder on the Floor. All right, take that Bill out of the Record. Turn Mr. Schraeder on please. There he is."

Schraeder: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, this Motion would be to bypass the Committee. We had a situation existing in the county of Peoria, the vacancy for the position of sheriff. The position was filled by mandate, the statute, with the Republican

Party picking their candidate and then subsequently he took office.



They also now demanded by the Statute to have a special election in August unless this piece of Legislation goes into effect. All I'm asking is that we allow a Motion to bypass committee so that this Bill may be placed on the Order of Second Reading so that we can pass it out as quickly as possible and thereby saving the County of Peoria \$50,000."

Shea: "Mr. Schraeder, let me ask you, as I understand the Rules, in order to get this Bill heard, you have to go to the Rules Committee and they would have to determine by a Majority vote that this Bill was a Bill necessary for the orderly operation of State government, so would you please, rather than make the Motion now, withdraw your Motion and discuss with Mr. Katz when he can arrange a meeting of the Rules Committee so we can do that for you?"

Schareder: "Yes, Sir, thank you very kindly."

Shea: "Thank you. On the Order of Motions is Mr. Giorgi,"

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, Senate Joint Resolution 54 is by Senator Palmer that's been in the House since November, and all it does is extend

Shea: "All right, the Gentleman from Winnebago, Mr. Giorgi, on the Agreed Resolutions."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, House Resolution 667 by Representative Polk congratulates the Morris Fire Department on 100 years of outstanding service. House Resolution 658 by Pepresentative Polk honors Mr. Charles Viele of Clinton, Iowa on his Golden Wedding Anniversary. House Resolution 669 by Madigan honors Margaret Punda on her Golden Wedding Anniversary. House Resolution 670 by Representative Geo-Karis honors the Diamond Exchange Club which selected William John Bickett for their outstanding award. House Resolution 671 by Fleck honors George Guttman of Illinois Glass Company. Shea: "Gentleman moves for the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions. All in favor say 'aye'. Opposed 'nay'. The 'ayes' have it. Now, back to Mr. Hoffman."

Hoffman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would at this time move for the suspension of Rules 41a for the immediate consideration of HR 651."

Shea: "The Gentleman moves for the suspension of the appropriate Rule for the immediate consideration of Resolution 651. Is there any discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Would the Sponsor explain the Resolution?"



Shea: "Will the Clerk read the Resolution? Evidently, it isn't on
the Clerk's desk. Will you go ahead and explain it, Mr. Hoffman?"

Hoffman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Resolution 651 addresses
itself to the process of testing of real estate facilities. This
has become a problem in many of the areas and we find that there
is a great question as to the constitutionality of these testers
and whether there are any violations of the Citizen's rights under
the State Constitution. This House Resolutions directs the Illinois
Investigating Commission to conduct public hearings on this matter
and report back to the General Assembly."

Shea: "All right, the Gentleman asks leave to use the attendance roll call to suspend the appropriate rules for the immediate consideration of the Resolution. Is there objection? Mr. Schlickman objects.

Now the gentleman moves to suspend the appropriate rule for the immediate consideration of the Resolution. Ladies and Gentlemen, will you please be in your seats? The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Hoffman, has moved the immediate consideration of House Joint Resolution 41. All those in favor will vote 'aye' to suspend the Rule. Those opposed will vote 'nay'. Takes 107 votes. Shea 'aye' please. House Resolution 651. It's not a Joint Resolution. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Hoffman, to explain his vote. This takes 107 votes."

Hoffman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I realize at this time that some of the interest has possibly dwindled, but I think to more appropriately put this we're dealing with the rights of the citizens of the State of Illinois and whether their constitutional prerogatives are being violated, and I would ask that the Members that do remain on the House Floor take a few minutes on this and act in accordance to suspend the Rules so we can give this vehicle, this House Resolution, to the Illinois Investigating Commission, so they can conduct hearings on this most sensitive area. This is something that for those who are not familiar with the process of testing I would take the prerogative of extending the explanation of vote until we do have 107, but this is the process where citizens engaged



in the process of selling real estate are approached by people pretending to buy or be interested in real estate, but they are there with the expressed intention to try to see if these salesmen or brokers, representatives of the firm can be inticed, coerced or trapped into saying or portraying something that is not within their prerogative to do. Now we have unindated with complaints in many of the areas of the State and it's a very

serious matter, and I would ask for a few more 'aye' votes."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Mann, to explain his vote." Mann: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I have a different understanding of the process, which my good friend, Ron Hoffman, described, and I think that ah this is a process which is not detrimental to local communities, but one which can be very helpful to local communities. I think that we ought to take a look at the process. I'm not opposed to the matters going to Executive Committee, but I don't think we know enough about what he's speaking about to go around the Committee. He's ased a lot of negative words to describe the process, but he hasn't said what the process is. He hasn't said who's for it and who's against it. We have plenty of time to take a look at this process and let the Executive Committee study it and approve of it and if it is worthwhile, then no time will be lost, but it's not the kind of a matter that needs attention today, and therefore I would urge either a 'no' or a 'yellow' vote."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Houlihan, J., to explain his vote."

Houlihan: "Will the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Shea: "We're on explanation of vote, but he indicates he will, Mr. Houlihan."

Houlihan: "In previous times we've had investigations by the Illinois

Investigating Commission that have cost a tremendous amount of
dollars that we haven't reviewed by the Committee procedure.

Don't you think it would be more efficient to have the Committee
System look into this first and then see if there is a necessity
for pursuing this Legislation and not having the investigation
undertaken instead of a preliminary hearing on this issue?"



"Under ordinary circumstances, Representative, that is Hoffman: exactly what I would do. However, in the areas that are experiencing this, we are having many, many charges that individual: Constitutional rights are being abridged, and for the cost of the litigation involved that is being permissively put upon some of the individuals involved, I feel that this is one area and many of the Representatives that I have discussed this with agree that we cannot tolerate one day, one minute, the abridgement or the violation of any citizen's constitutional rights. Some of the material that has been passed around, I have one here that if you care to see, the type of practices that we are referring to. Until such time as it hits your individual district, I don't think you can truly appreciate the impact, but It's something that I feel that we cannot in this case wait one minute more to do."

Houlihan: "Can you explain what some of those practices are?"

Hoffman: "The practices are multiple by description; however, they revolve around the testing of real estate offices, by people posing not as legitimate buyers, but people posing to test the realtor on what he says and how he handles his practice. Now for most Representatives in this area, in this General Assembly, who have served in the Armed Force of the United States, we were there with the intent of protecting our Constitutional rights, without the thought process of having to test anyone testing the legality or legal actions of someone without warrant charges, strikes me as something that we experienced in Europe in 1930. This is something where Big Brother
