

Speaker Redmond: "Let the record show that Representative Geo-Karis is in her place, but there aren't really enough other Representatives so we'll have to stand at ease for ten or fifteen minutes. The House will come to order. Will the doorkeeper clear the floor of the chamber?"

Doorkeeper: "Will all those not entitled to the floor, please return to the gallery?"

Speaker Redmond: "Prayer will be by Reverend Krueger, the House Chaplain."

Krueger: "In the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, Amen. Bless this House, oh Lord, this day, Amen. Amos Parish wrote, 'The most precious thing anyone, any man or any business can have is the good will of others. It is something as fragile as an orchid, as beautiful, as precious as a gold nugget, and yet hard to find. As powerful as a great turbine and as hard to build. As wonderful as youth and as hard to keep.' Let us Pray. Grant, oh Lord, we beseech Thee Thy spirit, to think and do all we such things that is right that we cannot, that we who cannot do anything good without Thee may be enabled to live according to Thy will, thru Jesus Christ, Our Lord, Amen."

Speaker Redmond: "Clerk will take the roll call for attendance. Messages from the Senate? Committee reports?"

O'Brien: "Mr. Matijevich from Executive Committee to which was referred House Joint Resolution number 10. Offer by Mr. Brinkmeier on Feb. 19, reported the same back with the recommendation the Resolution be adopted. Mr. McLendon from the Committee on Personnel and Pensions, to which House Bill 192 was referred; reported the same back with the recommendation that the Bill do pass."

Speaker Redmond: "Will you take the record on the roll call? Representative Washburn."

Washburn: "Thank you...ah...Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House I'd like to ah...have the record show that Representative Waddell is still hospitalized in Loyola Hospital in Chicago. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Journal will so show. Any other excused absences? Representative Shea."

Shea: "Would the record show that Representative Getty is absent because of illness."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objections? The record will so show. Introduction and

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman from Madison, Representative Sharp. Do you desire recognition? Representative Sharp is recognized."

Sharp: "Am I on? Mr. Speaker, I'd like to have ah...leave of the House to table House Bills 296, House Bill 297, and House Bill 298."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objections? Leave granted. Representative Hirschfeld."

Hirschfeld: "Mr. Speaker, with leave of the House and as a principal sponsor I'd like to move to table House Bill 369."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objections? Leave granted."

O'Brien: "Table 296, 297, 298 and 369."

Speaker Redmond: "I would like to make two announcements. One is ah...today and tomorrow the Illinois Heart Association will be screening members of the General Assembly and others for high blood pressure and electrocardiographic heart defects. The screening station will be set up on the west side of the rotunda. Will be held both days and you are invited to participate. An effort will be made to screen legislators first and bring them ahead of others if a line is present. Would help if you identify yourself, thereby receiving preferential treatment. I believe everybody has received a notice to that effect. The other ah...announcement is again I would like to call your attention to the fact that it's very likely that in early April there will be a deadline for filing of Bills. We have discussed the matter with the Reference Bureau, have offered our full cooperation if, if they're in difficulty to get them out and I would strongly urge that everybody make arrangements to get their Bills prepared by the Reference Bureau. House

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Bill 97. It's on Second Reading. Will you read it, Mr. Clerk?"

O'Brien: "House Bill 97, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Court of Claims Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Are there any amendments from the floor? Hearing no amendments, advance to the Order of Third Reading. Senate Bill, Third Reading. Senate Bill 34. Will the Clerk read the Bill?"

O'Brien: "Senate Bill 34, a Bill for an Act to repeal a certain appropriation of the Capitol Development Board and to make like appropriation the Secretary of State for the same purpose. Third reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brandt, the gentleman from Cook. Representative Brandt."

Brandt: "Mr. Speaker and members of the House I would appreciate unanimous consent to refer Senate Bill 34 to Second Reading for the purpose of an amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there leave? Leave granted, be returned to ah...the Order of Second Reading."

O'Brien: "Amendment number 1, Brandt, amends Senate Bill 34 on page one, line nine by inserting after the word appropriated, the following: 'from the Capitol Development Bond Fund.'"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brandt."

Brandt: "I move the adoption of ah...Amendment number 1 to Senate Bill 34."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion. Representative Duff. Representative Duff."

Duff: "Mr. Speaker ah...could we have the Amendment explained, please."

Speaker Redmond: "Would you explain the Amendment, Representative Brandt."

Brandt: "er...The Amendment is the, originally the ah...the 4 million dollars in Senate Bill 34 was to be taken out of the General Revenue Fund, however the, however the ah...leaders of both parties and the Governors Office have decided to have that transferred over from, to the Capitol ah... Capitol Bond Fund. And then from the Capitol Bond Fund to the Secretary of State's Office."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? The question is on the adoption of the Amendment. All in favor indicate by saying 'aye'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment is adopted. Third Reading. Introduction of First Reading. Will the record show that Representative Hoffman has joined us, calling to the Chamber."

O'Brien: "House Bill 573, Giglio, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the

Illinois Municipal Code. First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 574, Harold Washington, et al, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Pension Code. First Reading of the Bill. O'Brien: "House Resolution 98, Lechowicz. House Resolution 101, Capparelli. House Resolution 103, Redmond. House Resolution 104, Hirschfeld. House Resolution 105, Miller."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giorgi."

O'Brien: "Senate Joint Resolution 16. Senate Joint Resolution 17 and Senate Joint Resolution 18."

Speaker Redmond: "Giorgi, Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, Senate Resolution 98 honors Mr. Marson as an outstanding City Clerk of Chicago. 101 we'll get to later. 103 honors Deborah Caldwell, Sam Bronkado, John Hofferkamp and Don Ed and Joseph Heckencamp and Secretary of State Mike Howlett for the outstanding job they did as temporary Speaker, Crew Miller. Number 105 honors Judd O'Connors for fifty years of service with Harvey. Hirschfeld honors Tom Kelly with many years of service with the Rantoul Knights of Columbus. And Senate Joint 16, 17 and 18 just extend to you reporting dates of three Commissions. But on House Resolution 101, I defer to Mrs. Adaleine Geo-Karis."

who will recognize the Resolution 101."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis has assumed her rightful position on the Democratic side."

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker of the House, thank you for the flattery, but it will get you nowhere. ah...Mr. Speaker, ladies and gentlemen of the House ah... the respectable assistant majority leader, Mr. Giorgi, asked me to have everybody sing 'Happy Birthday' for Roman Kosinski so everybody join in. Turn on the mikes. "Happy Birthday to you, happy birthday to you, happy birthday dear Roman, happy birthday to you. And many more."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, I move for the adoption of all the Agreed Resolutions."

Speaker Redmond: "Questions on the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions. All in favor signify by saying 'aye'; opposed 'nye'. The 'ayes' have it. The Resolutions are adopted. Any further Resolutions?"

O'Brien: "House Resolution 95, Deuster."

Speaker Redmond: "Committee on Assignment of Bills. The Order of Motions, Representative Schneider. Schneider."

Schneider: "Mr. Speaker, members of the House ah...last week, when we met on Friday two of the Bills, two of the Bills which were posted to my Committee were not heard. ah...They were posted ah...properly last week under the 6 ½ day notice. I'd like to have those Bills heard today. ah... Both sides of the aisles, Representatives Washburn and Shea, have agreed and ah...I'd like to waive the posting requirements so they can be heard. But they were properly posted, but with the contracted schedule and with my newness as Chairman ah...we failed to post them for this week. In fact, we didn't have the time to post them."

Speaker Redmond: "You have a list of the Bills, Representative Schneider?"

Schneider: "ah...They are Bills ah...House Bill 17 and House Bill 18, Representative Deusters' Bills."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved to suspend the appropriate Rule with respect to those Bills. The question is on the suspension of the Rules. Take the 107 votes and we'll take a record roll call. All in favor vote 'aye'; opposed vote 'no'. Record roll call. Bills 17 and 18, I understand that it's agreed by both sides of the aisle. All voted who wished? Take the record. Representative Maragos. Representative Maragos."

Maragos: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I have a similar request in the form Motions. Again by the same sponsor, Mr. Deuster.

There were three bills that were before the Revenue..."

Speaker Redmond: "May I announce the Roll Call first, Representative Maragos?"

Maragos: "Alright."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished? Take the record. On this question, the 'ayes' 117, no 'nayes'. The rule has been suspended; the motion adopted. Now, Representative Maragos."

Maragos: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to make a similar motion pertaining to House Bill 25 and 26 which were ah...Bills ah...no strike that. That's 24, 25 and 26. They are Bills dealing with the Lottery Laws and they were before the Committee last week and they were postponed until this week. However, again because of the 6½ Day Rule, we couldn't put them in the Formal Announcement and I'd like to move at this time to suspend the appropriate rules so they can be heard this afternoon in Revenue Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Then moved by Representative Maragos that the rule be suspended to permit Bills 24, 25 and 26 to be heard in Committee this afternoon. The record roll call. All in favor vote 'aye' all opposed vote 'nay'. It takes 107 votes. Have all voted who wished? Take the record. On this motion, the 'ayes' 118, 'nos' 0, er...I guess and ah...the motion is adopted. For what purpose does the gentleman from Champaign, Representative Hirschfeld, arise?"

Hirschfeld: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I'd like to make the same motion concerning House Bill 365, which was inadvertently left off by the Secretary of the Judiciary Committee. This is a Uniform Jury Selection Bill and I'd like to have it heard today in the Committee, please."

Speaker Redmond: "Have you checked with the Chariman, Representative Hirschfeld?"

Hirschfeld: "He's not here, but I checked with his staff people and they said it was inadvertently left off."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "Could I ask a question? Who is the Chairman of the Committee?"

Hirschfeld: "Representative Katz."

Shea: "He's here today, John."

Hirschfeld: "Well, I've been unable to find him."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Katz is in his place, Mr. Hirschfeld. Will a page re... escort Representative Hirschfeld over to Representative Katzs' seat. Representative Schraeder."

Schraeder: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like the same ah... request on House Bill 269 when the Deficiency Appropriation for Corrections, which was partially heard last week. And they said they would hear it this week if they, we get the consent of the House. The Chairman of the Committee is not here right at the moment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz, do you desire recognition?"

Lechowicz: "ah... Yes, Mr. Speaker. Representative Jane Barnes will make a motion to suspend the rules for the three Bills that were ah... in Appropriations Committee II for last weeks, so it will be... have a continuing hearing on those this week. So I'd like to yield the floor to Representative Barnes."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Barnes, Representative Barnes."

Barnes: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker, ah..."

Speaker Redmond: "Would the members please ah... get away from the front of the microphone."

Barnes: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker and members of the House, I would like to move to ah... waive the proper rules so that ah... the House Bills that were heard originally in Appropriation II, Friday the 28th, can be heard ah... on March 5th ah... tomorrow at 2:00 P.M. That was three Bills that was in Appropriation, they were set, set over for this week for further hearing. And I would so move at this time."

Speaker Redmond: "The numbers of the Bills. He's getting the numbers. Representative Peters."

Peters: "Just, just to ah... give Representative Barnes numbers 269."

Barnes: "Yea, here they are. House Bill 206 and House Bill 269. That's it. Two Bills, 206..."

Speaker Redmond: "Two Bills instead of three, is that correct?"

Barnes: "Yes, two Bills instead of three. The third one was voted out, 2 ah... 206 and 269."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "He wants ah... Representative Barnes, you want House Bills 206 and 269. Is that what I understand?"

Barnes: "Yes, those were the Bills that were scheduled to be heard as I understand would sit over for this week. The third Bill, 352 was voted out. That was one on the status of ah... women... 352."

Ryan: "Well the, the other Bill 206 was, was postponed at the request of the sponsor. I don't know if you've talked to him or not. I don't know whether he wants that back in or not... on 206."

Barnes: "Do you, you remember who the sponsor was?"

Ryan: "Polk, Ben Polk."

Barnes: "Ben..."

Ryan: "Can you hold on to that for just a minute? Maybe we'll get back to it, we'll check with Polk."

Barnes: "Okay, would you hold on to that motion for just a minute, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Redmond: "Take that motion out of the record and we'll go the Order of further Resolutions. Representative Choate."

Choate: "I, I, I think that ah... if the Chairman of Appropriations Committee II would clarify it, I don't find any problem with, with the hearing of the ah... two Bills this week. If the Chairman, is the Chairman here? Is Representative Boyle here, because he's the one that should post the Bills and ah..."

Speaker Redmond: "I don't see Representative Boyle in his seat so I assume that... Representative Barnes."

Barnes: "Thank, thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. Yes, we've cleared it up and I've spoke with the speaker Representative Polk concerning his Bill, House Bill 206 and he wanted it set aside until next week not this week so the only Bill included in that motion then, would be House Bill 269 which is the Bill, Supplementary Appropriations for the Department of Corrections.

269, which will be heard tomorrow and ah... Appropriations II at 2:00 P.M."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The motion of Representative Barnes to suspend the rules to permit the hearing of Bill 269 tomorrow without the posting. All in favor indicate by saying er... vote 'aye'; opposed vote 'no'. It's a record vote. Requires 107. Have all voted who wished? Take the record, take the record. This question the 'ayes' are 112, the 'nos' are 1, 3 voting present and the motion carries. Representative Yourell, do you desire recognition?"

Yourell: "ah... yea... ah... Point of Information, Mr. Speaker. I had a Bill in Counties and Townships this last week and it ah... the sponsor requested



a postponement on the, on the Bill because he wasn't ready and I was advised by ah... somebody who's handling that area that the Bill must be, be posted again. Now, is this a new rule or ah... the Bill was postponed in Committee, I really don't see the reason for posting the Bill again. Can't we just carry it over and let the 45 Day Rule apply?"

Speaker Redmond: "I've been advised by the Parliamentarian that this problem arises because normally you would have 7 days between Committee Meetings, and therefore, you could post it. But because of the accelerated Committee Schedule we had last week, why it didn't permit the full 6½ days posting."

Yourell: "Well I've got it on my schedule for hearing tomorrow because it was on ah... do I have to now ah... move to suspend the rules for ah... the posting of this Bill to be heard tomorrow in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Was it posted 6½ days ahead. It was posted?"

Yourell: "Well it was posted..."

Speaker Redmond: "Then you're alright."

Yourell: "It was posted 7 days prior to the, ah... my first Committee Hearing and then, the sponsor didn't want the Bill heard at that time. And, of course, the rule did not apply because our first Committee Meeting was on a Friday and ah... which would not leave 6½ days until Wednesday. So... but the Bill was posted the first time in the ah... in the prescribed ah... period of time. And it's carried on the notice for the Committee Hearing that will be tomorrow as a postponed Bill in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "And when was that posted?"

Yourell: "Well, I don't know. It's on my slip it was posted last ah... Friday, I believe."

Speaker Redmond: "Then, it would appear that you would have to move to suspend the rules in order to have it heard this week."

Yourell: "ah... Mr. Speaker, I now move to suspend the rules so House Bill 270 can be heard by Committee tomorrow."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Then moved by Representative Yourell..."

Yourell: "Mr. Speaker, may I make another inclusion, the sponsor of another Bill, House Bill one... 159 and include that in the motion."

Speaker Redmond: "Would you put the numbers up on the board, please."

Yourell: "270 and 159."

Speaker Redmond: "It's been moved that the Posting Rule be waived or suspended

for the purpose of hearing House Bills 270 and 259 in Committee tomorrow, 159 in Committee tomorrow. All in favor vote "aye"; those opposed vote 'no'. It's a record vote, takes 107 votes. Representative Davis, Representative Davis."

Davis: "Speaker, ah... my Bill was postponed. We were ready for a hearing last Wednesday, but ah... it was postponed and the Chairman of the Committee set it over until this Wednesday. He isn't here. I wanted to check with him to see whether or not ah... I would have to make the same motion. But he isn't here and for fear that ah... the 6½ Day Rule might apply to my Bill we haven't had our day in Court. I'd like to have my day in Court Wednesday. He said that he'd set it for Wednesday, but I ah... would like to move that ah..."

Speaker Redmond: "Would you hold that until we announce the roll call?"

Davis: "Alright."

Speaker Redmond: "On the ah... motion the 'ayes' have 117, no 'nays', one present. The motion is carried. Now Representative Davis."

Davis: "That House Bill 87 which did not have its day in Court was postponed and the Chairman said that he'd ah... set it over until Wednesday, but he isn't here, and for fear that ah... the same motion might apply, I'd better make it now that House Bill 87, which had, was regularly scheduled for hearing last Wednesday and which was postponed be heard tomorrow."

Speaker Redmond: "What Committee is this, Representative Davis?"

Davis: "Labor and Commerce. Representative Fary is the Chairman."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hill, the Vice-Chairman is here."

Davis: "Who?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hill are you familiar with this?"

Davis: "Representative Hill, the Vice-Chairman."

Hill: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I certainly am not familiar with the situation. I haven't attended a Committee Meeting yet because I was absent last week and while I'm on the floor, I'd like to just make a suggestion. We've spent here approximately a half an hour on these various Bills that are going to be heard in the various Committees. It seems to me that the Rules Committee, if this is going to go on week after week, we're going to be spinning our wheels many, many hours in the

next six months. And it seems to me that the Rules Committee should take this under advisement and come up with some sort of a plan where we don't sit here for hours upon hours asking for motions where someone had messed up a situation and should have taken care of it. I'm sorry I can't help you out on this particular situation because my knowledge doesn't allow me to."

Davis: "Mr. Chairman ah... Mr. Speaker, in answer to the distinguished gentleman, I agree with him that there should be some rule. But in the absence any rule, my Bill was scheduled to be heard and it was simply postponed. Now, heretofore, if a Bill is postponed ah... until the next week, it automatically comes up the next week. But I don't, I have witnesses down here for the Bill ah... because I've told 'em it was postponed until next week and I don't want any objections being lodged against the Bill and I think I'm entitled to at least one day in Court."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion. Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Well Mr. Speaker, the gentleman points out that he told the people that were in favor of the Bill about the meeting coming up Wednesday. I wonder who told the people who were opposed to the Bill that we were going to do this today. Now we're giving, we're giving the opponents to this Bill about 24 hours in which to marshal their forces. Your people had over a week. Now I suggest either we're early in the session, if you'll hold the meeting for this Bill a week from today, you can accomplish what you want to, you'll have your day in Court. There's no need to have it 24 hours from now, and I object to the gentleman's motion."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Mr. Speaker, I think if you'll take a look at the rules, they state that if a Committee Hearing is scheduled for the following week and a man asks for a continuance, it's granted to him automatically. The reason why Representative Barnes pointed out the fact that he had to suspend the rules because there was no Appropriation Committees scheduled for this week. But in reference to all the other Committees that are scheduled to be, have hearings this week, all it is, is a normal continuance and we don't have to have the leave of the, er... the ah... granting of the permission of the members to have a hearing. It's already scheduled and what we're

doing here now is out of order. The Bill can be heard in Committee and in turn, every member can have his fair day in Court."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Davis."

Davis: "I, I want the Minority Leader to know that I do not seek to take an advantage of anyone. This Bill was scheduled for a hearing and the Chairman postponed it until next week and heretofore, this has been all that is necessary. This is something new to me that when a Bill is postponed, it's scheduled ah... it's been scheduled ah... for about 3 weeks, now. And ah... they had too many Bills in there and they couldn't be heard. Now if, if he states that I should hold it over until some further notice is given and ah... the opponents, if there are any, has had plenty notice. And if they were down here, it was not my fault that it wasn't heard. But if he thinks that I should hold it over, what they gonna do about the other Bills in there if they gonna hold the other Bills over there that wasn't heard, then I agree to hold mine over. But I don't think you ought to take off on one Bill. I'll agree to hold it over and won't ask for a... But, the Chairman postponed, I didn't."

Speaker Redmond: "The motion has been withdrawn. Further Resolutions?"

O'Brien: "House Resolution 106, Ron Hoffman. House Resolution 107, Ron Hoffman. House Joint Resolution 14, McAuliffe."

Speaker Redmond: "Committee on Assignment of Bills. Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, ladies and gentlemen of the House, the Assignment on Bills Committee met and has made the following assignments: Senate Joint Resolution 7 was assigned to Revenue, House Bill 524 to Elementary and Secondary, and House Bills 13, 14 and 15 were reassigned from Veterans' Affairs Registration to Environment Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I believe that there is an error on the calendar in House Bill 139 which was heard in Counties and Townships and it's an Appropriation matter. It should be re-referred to the Appropriations Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman is correct. It's in error. It should not be on the calendar today, both 138 and 139."

Lechowicz: "Alright, thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Resolutions?"

O'Brien: "House Joint Resolution 13, Shea. Resolved by the House of Representatives of the 79th General Assembly, the State of Illinois, the Senate concurring herein, that the two Houses meet in Joint Session in the Hall of House of Representatives on Wednesday, March the 5th, 1975 at the hour of 12 o'clock, noon, for the purpose of hearing the Governor of the State of Illinois deliver his special message on the budget for the year beginning on July 1, 1975."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, ladies and gentlemen of the House, this is the Resolution to fulfill the Statutory requirement of the Governor delivering his budget message to this Legislature and I would move for its' adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is the adoption of the Resolution. All in favor indicate by saying 'aye'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Resolution is adopted. Announcements, announcements. Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and gentlemen of the House, the Democrats on the Appropriations Committee will have an orientation meeting with all Democrats in Appropriations I and II in Room 122B. That's in the State Capitol Building at 3:00 this afternoon. Now I've asked that all Appropriation members, both of I and II be in Room 122B this afternoon at 3:00 with our staff. Thank You."

Speaker Redmond: "Speaker has an announcement. The ah... Illinois Heart Association screening has been moved from the 3rd floor Rotunda to the 2nd floor in front of the Governors office. Representative Fennessey, Representative Fennessey."

Fennessey: "I'd like to announce to the members of the Election Committee that we'll meet in 122A, instead of 122B as last week."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schisler."

Schisler: "Mr. Speaker, ladies and gentlemen of the House, I'd like to ah... ask unanimous consent to waive the appropriate rule and have House Bill 527 heard in Ag. Committee Thursday, March the 6th."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, I don't think that Bills been assigned, yet so ah... I don't see how we can waive the rule."

Speaker Redmond: "I've been advised that, by the Chairman of the Committee

on Assignment of Bills that the Bill has not yet been assigned."

Schisler: "Well, Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, it's ah... to brand cattle so I hardly think it would fit in any other Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "It would seem inappropriate to the Chair to hear it before it's been assigned. I say it would seem inappropriate to hear it before it's been assigned. Representative Taylor, do you desire recognition? Representative Taylor."

Taylor: "Oh...Mr. Speaker, I'd like to have leave of this House to suspend the appropriate rule in order to have a continuing hearing on House Bill 291 in the Cities and Villages Committee this afternoon."

Speaker Redmond: "Put the number on the Board, Mr..."

Taylor: "291"

Speaker Redmond: "291, any discussion? The gentleman moved for the suspension of the appropriate rule. All those in favor vote 'aye', those opposed vote 'no'. It takes 107 votes. The motion takes 107 votes. Representative Houlihan, Houlihan."

Houlihan: "ah... Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I'm the sponsor of House Bill 291 and it was before Committee last, last week and ah... a Minority spokesman asked me if we could delay the vote on that and we had the presentation of all the testimony the witnesses were there, all the information was made available and I don't believe there's any opposition to, to taking the vote on this Bill ah... today."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished? Take the record. On this motion there are 108 'ayes', 6 'nays', 14 present. The motion is adopted. Kane no, Washington no, aye pardon me, Jones aye. Representative Davis."

Davis: "Mr. Speaker, I wanted, I rise to a point of information."

Speaker Redmond: "State your point."

Davis: "And my point is that if a Chairman of a Committee doesn't have the power to continue the hearing of a Bill, what power does he have? That's my question. I'd like to know because this thing will drive us all nuts in here."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Davis: "What power does he have? What power does the Chairman have?"

Speaker Redmond: "Well, it would to seem to me, Representative Davis, that the situation that we have here now is very unusual in that we accelerated

The hearing of the Committee and normally there would be the 7 days intervening. And normally this situation wouldn't arise and I hope that it doesn't arise in the future. Normally, the Chairman if you continued on the posting would be on the continued notices posted. Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, what happened last week, was as you know we had some new Committee Clerks. The Committee Clerks, when a Bill is continued should on the notice mark down that the Bill has been continued and that would be sufficient notice, but in some instances, although the Bills were con... continued on Committee and everybody was familiar, that was in the Committee that they were gonna be reheard. They weren't put on the Posting Notices. Now, all we're trying to do with some of these things is to get the mechanics cleared up so that these records are perfectly clear and somebody won't come back at a later date and say that we were in error and having the hearings."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hart."

Hart: "ah... Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I'm not sure that everybody exactly knows what we're doing here and I would like to have a verification of the affirmative roll call."

Speaker Redmond: "On which vote?"

Hart: "On the vote that we just took. It hadn't been announced yet and I don't know what happened to the Board, but ah... I want a verification of the affirmative roll call."

Speaker Redmond: "I thought that we had announced it and I thought I cleared the Board."

Hart: "You have not announced it."

Speaker Redmond: "I've been advised that it has been announced."

Hart: "Well, I'd like to have the tape played back because I don't believe it has. And I think it's very important issue and I request that we, we adjourn or recess for a moment so the tape can be played to determine that. I've had my light on here asking for recognition."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hart."

Hart: "I, I said I've had my light on waiting for the previous Speakers to conclude their remarks before ah... being recognized. And I, I do not believe that you've announced the roll call and I would request a verification."

On House Bill 291."

Speaker Redmond: "I've been advised that after I announced the roll call that other people had indicated that they desired to be on the roll call, so that the roll call now is 110 'ayes' and 7 'nays'. The gentleman still persist in asking for a verification."

Hart: "Yes."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker, I think you mentioned that you had announced the roll call already."

Speaker Redmond: "I have announced the roll call."

Houlihan: "...And we've moved on other business. I think the verification is out of Order."

Speaker Redmond: "I've been advised that we have not passed to another Order of business and that therefore, the gentleman is entitled to a verification. Members please be in their seats for a verification of the roll call. Proceed with the verification."

O'Brien: "E.M. Barnes..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker, is it appropriate to have a verification after you've announced the roll call?"

Speaker Redmond: "I've been advised that until I move to the next order of business, that it is in order and I so rule."

O'Brien: "J.M. Barnes..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Houlihan, Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker, in that case, I would request a poll of the absentees."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hart."

Hart: "ah... During the time that you're deciding that, could I have a copy of the seating chart and a copy of roll call. I'm not completely familiar with all of the new members and I don't know where they sit, and I'd like to have some way that I could see where they are and help to identify them."

Speaker Redmond: "I've been advised that we only have the one copy up here, Mr. Hart. The Clerk needs it to call the roll."

Hart: "Well then, I'm going to ask the Clerk to read very slowly so that ah... I can have time to see, when people raise their hand when their name is called."



Speaker Redmond: "The Clerk read and proceed very slowly. Representative Houlihan. Representative Houlihan, Representative Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker, I've requested a poll of the absentees, please."

Speaker Redmond: "I see Representative Yourell has returned to the chamber.

Put him back on the roll call. Representative Dan Houlihan returned to

the chamber. Put him back on the roll call. Representative Cunningham."

Cunningham: "Mr. Speaker, how am I recorded?"

Speaker Redmond: "How is the gentleman recorded? Roscoe Cunningham."

O'Brien: "Mr. Cunningham is recorded as not voting."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ebbesen."



Ebbesen: "ah... Yes, Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I am ah... Minority Spokesman on Cities and Villages and I just want to confirm what the sponsor of this Bill ah... has said previously that ah... our staff felt that when we heard the er... Bill last week, that we did not have sufficient ah... information and ah... proper input and so we agreed to take all the testimony at that time and to postpone the vote on the Bill until Cities and Villages would meet the next time, which, of course, is today at, scheduled for 2 o'clock and ah... I would appreciate it ah... it was unanimously agreed and with an understanding by both sides, Republicans and Democrats, in that Committee that we would do exactly that so those people who are not voting, or who moved off of an 'eye' to a present vote, I would appreciate it ah... if you would give this the necessary vote, so that this ah... can be completed in today's Committee Hearing."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hart."

Hart: "That's all the challenges I have, Mr. Speaker and thank you very much."

Speaker Redmond: "No further questions. Representative Houlihan."

Houlihan: "ah... Mr. Speaker, I have ah... Point of Parliamentary Inquiry. ah... While the Clerk is totalling up Dick Harts' ah... objections to the affirmative roll call, I had asked the Chairman of that Committee to ask to waive the Appropriate Rule because I had not seen the Bill posted on the Calendar which we have received today. I had thought it was only a procedural matter. A matter which the Minority Spokesman and the Chairman of the Committee had both talked about in the Committee about hearing the testimony and having the Bill brought up before the Committee for a vote this week. We, obviously had gotten into some snag and some people felt very strongly about voting on this Bill. Yet, one of the Committee members of concern that ah... there had been discussion about this Bill and about it being voted on this week notified me and gave me a copy of his notice that it had been posted. And it had been posted in the official notice going out to the Clerk, and it was not on the Calendar in error. And I would request the ruling of the Speaker as to whether that would comply with the House Rules and whether this verification and the ah... roll call that we've gone through might not have been ah... unnecessary."

Speaker Redmond: "Was, was the Bill posted?"

Houlihan: "Representative Merlo will ah... show you a copy of the posting notice which then, inadvertently, I suspect was not put on the Calendar. And I suspect that this verification, which Representative Hart has asked us to go through on this procedural question, might be unnecessary, and I really would apologize for having put all the members to this inconvenience by those who wanted to verify this procedural question."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Taylor, for what purpose do you rise?"

Taylor: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to ah... add my voice to the discussion that we did have in the Committee on last week. I did discuss with the Committee, and the Spokesman on the Republican side about that Bill. We were prepared to go with the Bill at that particular time. As the Minority Spokesman said, we have not had a chance to really dig into the Bill and find what was all in there. I agree with him and the other members of the Committee that we were here to testimony and then vote on the Bill in this weeks session. We did send out the notices that the Bill would be heard again, the continuation when this meets today. And, Mr. Speaker, I would hope that the Republican members, who pulled off the Bill, would reconsider and give us the vote in order to go on with the business of this House today."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijevec, Representative Matijevec."

Matijevec: "Mr. Speaker and members of the House, I wonder if you would look at the Official Posting Notice in the Clerk's office if, if the House Bill 291 is on that. It's a legal notice and I think that all we've done is really in vain. If, if that is officially posted, ah... in the Clerk's office as a legal notice, then it's got to be heard. In other words, I'd like an answer to that, Mr. Speaker. If that Bill is posted legally through the House or if somebody would run right outside at the, at the ah... Bulletin Board outside, we ah... could finish this thing in a hurry."

Speaker Redmond: "We've sent for the, for the original ah... copy of the notice. In the mean time, Representative Lemke, Lemke. I think the purpose is to indicate his return to the chamber and he desires to be recorded as voting 'aye'. Is that correct? Lemke 'aye'. Representative Rayson has returned to the chamber. Representative Rayson."

Rayson: "ah... Mr. Speaker, I wish to be recorded as voting 'aye' on this matter."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Telcser, do you desire recognition."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker, I think the verification has been completed. Would... Have you announced the roll call yet?"

Speaker Redmond: "No, I have not."

Telcser: "Well, ah... why don't we get the roll call? Well, I can simply say that ah... Mr. Speaker, that if we're gonna continue the procedure of extended and prolonged roll calls and verifications, ah... we'll never get the business of this House done. The roll call's been taken, the verification's been requested, I happen to be voting 'aye' for the question. I'm not voting 'no', but I think the business of this House ought to move along. What's that roll call."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz, what's your point."

Lechowicz: "The point, Mr. Speaker, is that Representative Houlihan asked for a direction from the Chair and we're awaiting that Ruling."

Speaker Redmond: "We've sent for the original posting, Mr. Lechowicz. Representative Beaupre."

Beaupre: "Mr. Speaker, how am I recorded?"

Speaker Redmond: "How is the gentleman recorded?"

O'Brien: "The gentleman is recorded as not voting."

Beaupre: "I'd like to be recorded as voting 'aye'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Choate."

Choate: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I disagree with Representative Lechowicz's statement. I agree totally with Representative Telcser because the question that has been put is not germane to the roll call at all, other than the fact that if the posting was not made, then the, then the roll call is in total order. If the, if the posting was not made, then ah... then there's no reason to, to go ahead and delay the roll call as Representative Telcser suggested. Because, after all, the roll call has been taken, been verified, and evidently it's been totalled because the Clerk is turned around ah... evidently completed his total, so consequently, I would suggest that the, that the ah... announcement of the roll call be made and then you can decide the question of the posting, whether it was or whether it was not."

Speaker Redmond: "On this, on this question there's 91 'ayes', 11 'nayes'.

Is that correct? Maybe you'll announce it, Mr. Clerk."

O'Brien: "91 'ayes', 8 'nayes', 20 'present'."

Speaker Redmond: "This motion having failed to receive the required majority, is thereby, lost but the question as to whether or not the posting was proper, still remains and we're having a little difficulty in finding that. We're taking it off the board, so we'll find out. Representative Hill."

Hill: "Can't we go to another order of business, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Redmond: "What order do you suggest?"

Hill: "Well, I have talked to Representative ah... Davis on his House Bill 87 and I now understand what the situation is and I'd like to make a motion."

Speaker Redmond: "On the order of Motion, state your motion."

Hill: "Mr. Speaker and members of the House, I move that Rule 18 be suspended to permit the hearing of House Bill 87 this week by the Committee on Labor."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I understood the sponsor to say that he had withdrawn that motion. He was going to accept hearing that Bill next week. This is a very important Bill, one on which there is a great amount of controversy. Those people who are in opposition to it have no idea that it's going to be heard tomorrow and if they find out they'd have no time to prepare their testimony. Now, I suggest to you that this is a bad practice, you know this session, we were going to have ah... we were going to be very careful to, to ah... observe all the rules. I'm afraid we've suspended more rules today than we did in the past two years. Now, it seems to me, Mr. Speaker, that the sponsor of the Bill was correct when he withdrew his motion the last time and agreed to permit everyone who is interested in testifying on this Bill do so. And that can only be done by postponing this for a week. May I suggest that he have it posted today and hear the Bill next week."

Speaker Redmond: "I would feel that ah... the motion of Representative Hill is out of order because Representative Davis did table his motion. And I have been advised that we've examined the posting and we find that it did not comply with the rules and there was not 6½ days. So, therefore, the ah... motion has been lost. Representative Shea, did you desire

recognition."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, at this time I'd move that the House stand at recess until 6 o'clock this evening. Now, that is going to be a session, perfunctory type session, where we can read in First Reading Bills. I, at that time, the House will then be adjourned until 9:30 tomorrow morning. So I move, Mr. Speaker, that we now recess until 6 o'clock and then adjourn and I'll hold that for a minute, I think Mr. Matijevich has got something that he wants to discuss with the House."

Speaker Redmond: "In the mean time, Representative Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker, prior to our ah... recess would I be able to get a ruling from the Chair on that Committee Posting on House Bill 291."

Speaker Redmond: "I gave the ruling that the time was inadequate and therefore was...."

Houlihan: "Oh, I'm sorry, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Washburn, do you desire recognition?"

Washburn: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House. Yes, and for the purpose of an introduction, in fact ah... a reintroduction for most of the people in this body of a man who has served five terms in this House, distinguished himself for 10 years in the House of Representatives, 6 years in the Senate our new Republican State Representative from the 4th District, John, Representative John Bill Carroll. Bill, would you stand."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Duff."

Duff: "A Parliamentary Inquiry, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "State your question."

Duff: "ah... Mr. Speaker, just a ah... to try to make a point ah... on the rule. ah... The motion previously made on recess ah... as distinct from a motion made to adjourn to a time certain ah... would keep this House in session and I believe the House Rules say that we can't have Committee Meetings while the House is in Session. Would it not be more appropriate for a motion to adjourn to a time certain."

Speaker Redmond: "I've been advised that in the motion to recess we would not be in session during the Committee Hearings."

Duff: "Just a technical point, Mr. Speaker. I believe a recess keeps us in session."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "During the recess, we're not in session and the reason I made it 6 o'clock was so that we wouldn't not have a session while the Committees are hearing. Now, what we're trying to do here, Representative Duff, is make it more convenient for the members so that they can get their Bills introduced."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea, Duff, Duff, pardon me."

Duff: "ah... Mr. Speaker ah... and ah... I would point out to the, the respected Majority Leader that I am not in any way objecting to his course of action, but a point, a Parliamentary Point on the rules. That's all."

Speaker Redmond: "Thank you. Representative Hirschfeld, Representative Hirschfeld."

Hirschfeld: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I cleared this with Minority Leader before I made this introduction, but I do rise to make, I think, a very important introduction. I had the fortune today of having a companion in the automobile as I came from Champaign. He's sitting in the Gallery behind the Republican members. He's the former Quarterback of the Fighting Illini Football team, who set the all-time rushing record at the University of Illinois and he's now the Quarterback for the Minnesota Vikings and I'd like to introduce Mike Wells, is in the Gallery behind us."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Choate."

Choate: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I'd like to ah... advise Mike that he has some bipartisan support in here, in as much as he's sitting on the Republican side. Mike, you ought to get right up here in the middle where we can, you know, go along with you. We like you too."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Garmisa."

Garmisa: "ah... Mr. Speaker and members of the House ah... I ask leave of the House to hear in Transportation Committee today House Bills 41, 110, 281, 282, 283 and 410. They were ah... they are ah... they were postponed in Committee last Friday. And we will meet in D-1 at 4:00."

Speaker Redmond: "Were they posted?"

Garmisa: "We didn't have time to post them, Mr. Speaker, between Friday and today."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea. It would seem to me that the request

is out of order because of the ruling in the previous... Representative Matijevidch, Representative Matijevidch."

Matijevidch: "Mr. Speaker, members of the House. Mr. Speaker, I wonder, there's a message that's supposed to come over from the Senate if we can get to that, I've been asked to try to move something along as quickly as possible."

Speaker Redmond: "We're now on the order of Messages from the Senate for which purpose, I recognize Representative Matijevidch. Will you read the message, first?"

O'Brien: "A message from the Senate by Mr. Wright's secretary. Mr. Speaker, I'm directed to inform the House of Representatives that the Senate adopted the following preamble and Joint Resolution in the adoption which I'm instructed to ask concurrence of the House of Representatives, to wit. Senate Joint Resolution 19, adopted by the Senate March 4, 1975 by 2/3's vote. Kenneth Wright, Secretary."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijevidch."

Matijevidch: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House. ah... Senate Joint Resolution number 19 is the resolution, an extension of a resolution which calls for a four member House, Senate Committee on investigating the allegations of bugging the Capitol Complex. I've been asked and I've checked with the Leadership on both sides of the aisles and ask that unanimous consent to ah... waive the appropriate rule ah... so that ah... we can consider and adopt the Senate Joint Resolution number 19. What Senate Joint Resolution number 19 does, it extends the authority to hold Executive Sessions of the Special Committee. It extends its scope. We've been told by some members that they ah... have ah... reports of some type of surveillance activity on individual members of the Legislature, so that the Committee could go into matters relating to security, privacy, and possible existence of surveillance of the members of the General Assembly. And also, that the Committee extend it's reporting dates no later than June 1, 1975, so that we can have a meeting of this special Committee, this week. I would ask unanimous consent for the waiver of the appropriate rule, rule, immediate consideration and adoption of Senate Joint number 19."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion. Representative Washburn."

Washburn: "Yes, thank you Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House.

Really, this is a continuation of a Resolution passed a few days ago.

It was considered at that time as an emergency, a serious matter and I would ask this ah... this ah... Representative ah... his request be approved."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? We have unanimous consent to suspend the rules. Any objections? The rules are suspended. Representative Rayson."

Rayson: "Mr. Speaker, last week in Judiciary I, I had a Bill, House Bill..."

Speaker Redmond: "Out of Order, at this moment. Representative Matijevich.

No, will you hold your comments until Representative Matijevich..."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, members of the House I now move that ah... we adopt Senate Joint Resolution 19."

Speaker Redmond: "It's been moved that we adopt Senate Bill er... Senate Joint Resolution 19. All those in favor vote 'aye', those opposed vote 'no'. This requires 107 votes. This requires 118 votes. 118 the computers tell me. Have all voted who wished? Take the record. On this question the 'ayes' are 123, the 'nos' are 1, 3 voting 'present'." Representative Hart. Declare that it's passed. Now, Representative Hart."

Hart: "ah... I have an announcement at the appropriate time. An announcement."

Speaker Redmond: "I think that this is about appropriate as any."

Hart: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and gentlemen of the House, the Special Joint Committee on the Environment will meet tomorrow morning in Room G-3 at 9 o'clock A.M."

Speaker Redmond: "Any other announcements? Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, I'd move that the House do now stand in recess until 6:00 this evening, at which time after the Bills are read a first time, that the House will then adjourn until 9:30 A.M. tomorrow morning."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion. You've heard the motion. All in favor indicate by saying 'aye'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The House is now recessed."



Speaker Shea: "The hour having reached 6 o'clock, the House will now come to order. Committee reports."

O'Brien: "Mr. Garmisa, from the Committee on Transportation to which House Bill 158 was referred; reported the same back with the recommendation that the Bill do pass."
