Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2875."

Fred Selcke: "2875. An Act to amend the Municipal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. 2876."

Fred Selcke: "2876. An Act to amend the Illinois Local Library Act.

Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. 2911."

Fred Selcke: "2911. 2911. An Act to amend the Illinois Pension Code.

Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. 2940."

Fred Selcke: "2940. An Act to amend the Criminal Code. Second Reading

Speaker Redmond: "Any from the floor? Third Reading. 2956."

Fred Selcke: "2956. A Bill for an Act to amend the Criminal Code.

Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor? Third Reading.

It is the intention of the Chair to recall House Bills' Second
Reading to the order to which they appear on the calendar. Appearing
on the calendar House Bills' Second Reading appears....Representative
Hanahan, for what purpose do you rise?"

Hanahan: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, House Bill 2559 was advanced from Second Reading to Third Reading and its an appropriation bill that was a companion to House Bill 2558. And Friday, there's a motion made by Representative Shea that this bill, 2558, would not be advanced until 2559 was out of Appropriation's Committee. And today on the calendar it appears in Second Reading having never gone to Appropriation's Committee and it is an appropriation for \$120,000 for the IDA project in Representative Meyer's district. I may have no objection to the bill or what it does, but I do object that this bill be moved out with reference to the Appropriation Committee. This bill should have properly been rereferred to..."

Speaker Redmond: "What?"

Hanahan: "House Bill 2559 should have properly been rereferred to the Appropriation's Committee. It is an appropriation bill and it was suggested Friday evening that the other bill, its companion bill, would be held on Second Reading until this bill came out of Appropriation's Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "We'll check on that and be back to you, Representative



Hanahan. In the meantime, House Bill 85 order of Second Reading."

Fred Selcke: "It was read a second time today. House Bill, let's see where am I, House Bill 85. An Act to amend Sections 9 and 10 of the State Public Defender Act. Second Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Duff."

Fred Selcke: "Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments.

Committee Amendment No. 1. An Act...a...amend House Bill 85, page 1,

line 1, by deleting and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Duff."

Duff: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House..."

Speaker Redmond: "Will you give the Gentleman order?"

Duff: "Because of a request from some of the members of the committee,

I am going to offer to table Amendment #1 so that Amendment #2 may

be offered by Representative Daniels and adopted, I hope."

Speaekr Redmond: "Any objection? Table #1 as amended."

Fred Selcke: "Amendment #2. Daniels. Amend House Bill 85, page 1, lines

1 and 5, by deleting Sections 9 and 10 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Daniels on Amendment #2."

Daniels: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this

Amendment #2, I met with the sponsor on, and he's agreed to the

addition there. It adds more counties to the requested provisions

regarding the Public Defenders Trial Services."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment #2 to House Bill 85. All in favor of the adoption say aye; opposed no. The ayes have it, the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? Third Reading. 148."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 148. A Bill for an Act in relation to the licensing and regulation of residential facilities and maintenance supervision care of mentally retarded persons. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Take that out of the record. Representative Porter doesn't appear to be in the chambers. House Bill 315."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 315. A Bill for an Act to revise into law in relation to mechanic's lein. Second Reading of the Bill. One

Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 315, page 1, line 1, and so



forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative Palmer in the House? Representative Palmer."

Palmer: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like permission of the House to table House Amendment...er...Committee Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objections? Committee Amendment #1 to House Bill 315 are tabled."

Fred Selcke: "Amendment #2. Palmer. Amend House Bill 315, page 1, line 1, by deleting Section 5 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Palmer."

Palmer: "Mr. Speaker, presently, under the law in this State, if a person performs..."

Speaker Redmond: "Give the Gentleman attention, this is a very important bill."

Palmer: "...materials to an owners home or for someone or for someone else, under the Mechanic's Lein Act, he is entitled, provided he takes the proper statutory steps to a lein against the real estate. Now this has been the law for many years. Many attempts to change that law over periods past has resulted in defeat. It does not make a great amount of difference insofar as industrial property, commercial property, or family residential property, or any other property which is to be improved where financing has to be obtained inasmuch as the banks or the attorneys or architects or engineers sees that the proper steps are taken before they lend money and move the money to the proper person. But over a period of time, the small home owner has been hit in situations where he pays off the contractor for repairs to the home. Work is done and the contractor hires somebody else to do the work. The contractor comes back to the owner for payment, he takes out his checkbook and he makes out a check for a \$1000 or so, however much money is involved. In those situations, if the contractor does not pay the subcontractor, the subcontractor, a lumber dealer is entitled to a lein against the real estate. And that's happend time and time again to the constitutents of every member of this House. Amendment #1, which was introduced to this Bill, took a very stringent approach to solving this problem. And



lengthy negotiations with the Lumber Dealers Association, the American Subcontractors Association and the Mechanical Specialty People, we did come to some agreement, which is the result which you see in Amendment #2. Briefly it is this; that in each contract by the contractor to the owner, the written contract has to include the words that the law requires that the contractor shall submit a sworn statement of persons furnishing materials and labor before any payments are required to be made to the contractor. Now these people are...most of the homeowners don't know the law and neither should be on things of this nature. They shouldn't be attorneys, they're not that sophisticated, the main thing he wants is the improvement for which he pays the money. So this is part of the consumerism or education aspect of the thing. If there's no written contract, then the subcontractor or the contractor has to give him a slip of paper which states escentially the same thing. He's put the owner on notice. Then, another Section is amended to provide that the subcontractor has to give notice within fourteen days to preserve his lend rights, that's not only the subcontractor, but the lumbermen and so forth and so on. Insofar as from the date of delivery of the material or the performance of the duty....now if he doesn't do this, he probably could lose his lend on the owners home. Notice after fourteen days, however, does preserve the lend to the extent the owner's not prejudice. That is, if the owner doesn't pay...hasn't paid the contractor, then the subcontractor has a lend to the better amount of his bill. This Section also provides the notice that is given to the owner, the...a...notice to not pay the contractor any money at all or anymore money until such time as that subcontractor or material man has been paid. Section 32 of this Act is amended to accommodate those two changes that have been talked about, so what briefly, we have is a notice provision to the owner to be given by the contractor, initially, in the contract and also, a notice provision to or notification by the subcontractor, lumber dealer, that they've been hired to do this work within fourteen days after furnishing the labor or furnishing the materials. Then again, this has been agreed upon, it maybe doesn't meet all of my objections to the present way of



doing things, but its better than nothing and its a step forward.

Again, to that class of people who need it the most, you're

constituents, the home owners, I ask for the adoption of Amendment

#2."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giorgi, for what purpose do you rise?"
Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, House Bill 315 in this amendment, the members
received a lot of mail on the dangers inherent in the original 315.

I see by the amendment, its a brand new bill and I'd like the
Chairman of Judiciary I, if he would tell us why this didn't become
a committee Bill inasmuch as the amendment is a brand new Bill. I
don't think this is fair to the Members of the General Assembly
because everyone of us was warned about the danger inherent in House
Bill 315 and I would like to hear from Judiciary I Chairman."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I, too, join with Representative Giorgi on the questioning of this Bill and the effect of this amendment. House Bill 315, as introduced, is different now as what this amendment has proposed. In fact, what I'm finding here is the old game of the 'P' underneath the '3' shelve, who's going to end up being, you know, lost on this Mechanic's Lein Rights. Right now, with this amendment that's before us, as I view it, the mechanics are going to be the ones short changed in the right of lein. Now I'm all for consumerism and all that, but I hate to see the poor tradesman, the subcontractor who might be putting on the siding or the...a...fixing the kitchen cabinets, or attempting to fix the plumbing, is all of a sudden going to be left out without any real mechanic's lein law. After all, the intents of those very name of the law was their protection. And all of a sudden we're giving in to arranging a protection for the lumber yard and for the mechanical contractor and suppliers and leaving the poor subcontractor open to some sort of regulation that mandates that he or she has to come in fourteen days ahead of time and notify the owner, whoever the owner is of the property, and in some cases you'll never get to know who the owner is of some residence under ten units with land trusts and the rest in effect, I don't understand why we are now going to penalize the subcontractor at the benefit of the supplier on his lein rights. And I'm against this amendment if this is



all its doing and I'd just as soon see the whole Bill go down to defeat."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "Will the Gentleman yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Leinenweber: "Representative Palmer, the first part of your amendment, as you explained it, at least as I understood it, merely provides that a notice must be contained in the written contract or in the event of an oral contract that a written notice of the statutory provision requiring the contractor to furnish a sworn statement, is that correct?"

Palmer: "Well if you read from line 24, that's what it says."

Leinenweber: "I can't find a copy of the amendment, but the second part, as I understand it, is that for a subcontractor to preserve his

lend rights, he must serve a fourteen day notice. Is that correct?"

Palmer: "By registered mail to the owner of the...and remember, that this only applies to an owner occupied residence."

Leinenweber: "Alright, now does that..."

Palmer: "He can send the letter by registered or certified mail that he's got, he is doing work there on the place."

Lenenweber: "Alright now does that supplant the sixty day notice, the subcontractor's notice?"

Palmer: "I beg your pardon?"

Leinwneber: "Does that supplant the sixty day notice?"

Palmer: "No it does not. The ninety day notice that you have referred to as a sixty day notice, is the...another step in the formulation of the lend itself, or the...the a...the..a...to keep the lend on the place, it does not do that. It notifies the owner that if the owner ...a...that this person is doing, furnishing material or furnishing labor on the premises, so that he does not go ahead and pay the contractor again, so that he does not have to pay twice. Now that's what we are trying to get at."

Leinenweber: "Why should the subcontractor, in effect, or why should the owner be notified twice that a particular subcontractor, one, when the contractor furnishes a sworn statement and second, by the subcontractor.



why do you require the second notice? There's additional paperwork."

Palmer: "Simply because the first notice is that there other people, the first notice is don't pay the money until such time, or that the first notice is simply that as a result of the transaction that there may be lends that will arise against the property, that's what it means. The second notice provision notifies the owner that a particular person is doing labor or furnishing materials to the home-owners premises."

Leinenweber: "Yes, but I think, I think you have to assume that the owner can read and when he gets the provision saying he must have a contractor's sworn statement, I think you can assume he will get one and that will be notice that a particular tradesman or subcontractor is going to be working on his house."

Palmer: "Mr. Leinenweber, let me tell you this, that had my Amendment #1, which you objected to simply made it mandatory upon the contractor as it is a law now, to give that statement, but also in the contractor's statement, there is a duty, a mandatory duty on the owners to demand this of the contractor. The owners of property are not the sophisticated that they know the law, neither should they have to go to a lawyer's office to find it out. This means a transaction that's free from these kind of things; it means simply that the subcontractor or material man, has to send a letter notifying the owner and its a single family residence again, nothing more, and the owner has to reside on the premises, this notice that he has been employed. And that's to keep hin from paying twice."

Leinenweber: "Mr. Speaker, if I might briefly address the amendment,
Representative Palmer's right, this amendment is considerably different
from the Bill and considerably different from the Committee Amendment
which changed the Bill and was voted out by, I think, and 8 to 6 vote
out of committee. I makes a very very bad Bill a little bit better.
However it still, in my opinion, does not make the Bill a good Bill;
however, the amendment is better than the Bill as it left the
committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Palmer."

Palmer: "This amendment has been on your desk for at least four or five



I've held off calling it. You've received notices from the Lumber Dealers Association, the American Subcontractors Association, and the Mechanical People, specialty people, that the Bill meets with their approval. Its the best thing that a bunch of us could work out with two of their lawyers, it is a step forward and its a heck of a lot better than the present law. Its not as stringent as Amendment #1, which was tabled me. And if you'd read the Bill, I think you'd find that."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the amendment. Shall Amendment #2 to House Bill 315 be adopted? All in favor say aye; opposed, no.

The Chair is unable to determine, I think all in favor vote aye and opposed vote no. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Representative Palmer."

Palmer: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, a great amount of time has been spent by the sponsor of this legislation with many others in trying to work out something so that the home owner, himself, can be given some protection regarding his payments to a contractor who comes around, suede shoes boys, if you want, if you please, that comes around to your house, to your constituent's house, gets the home owner to sign a contract for repairs, and then takes off for Florida or holds his money so that he doesn't have to do the work for some great period of time, or goes broke, whatever you might have. The amendment worked out gives protection to your constituents, and if you want to go back home and in reference to legislation of this type, have them ask you what did you do for me, you can certainly tell them that you did something on this bill. Its fair, this amendment. Its a fair amendment, it is worked out with all the trades that we knew anything about so that it could pass the floor of this House. If you're interested in protecting the rights of the single home owner, this is one way to do it. And I would hope on that basis that you would vote for this amendment, at least to give some protection to that home owner. Thank you very kindly."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished? On this question...take the record. On this question there are 69 ayes, 59 noes, Geo-Karis, aye; Campbell, aye, and the amendment is adopted. Chapman, aye. Any further



amendments? Any further amendments? Mann, 'aye'. Third Reading."

Fredric B. Selcke: "Representative Giorgi has assumed the Chair."

Giorgi: "House Bill 374."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 374. A Bill for an Act to provide a mandatory 30 day prison sentence for certain unlawful use of weapons. Second Reading of the Bill. Ah...."

Giorgi: "Is Representative Stearney on the floor?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "Wait just a minute."

Giorgi: "Representative Stearney? He's not on the floor? Take it out of the record. Here he is."

Fredric B. Selcke: "This Bill has been read a second time before. We'll go on to Committee Amendment #1 ah.... Amend House Bill 374 as amended on page 2 by deleting lines 28, 29, and 30 and so forth."

Giorgi: "Representative Stearney on Committee Amendment #1."

Stearney: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I believe

Committee Amendment #1 has been adopted. It was ah....Committee

Amendment #2 that was in dispute."

Giorgi: "Mr. Stearney, would you move to adopt Committee Amendment #1,
please?"

Stearney: "Yes. At this time I move to adopt Amendment #1."

Giorgi: "The motion is ah... on the adoption of Committee Amendment #1.

All in favor signify by saying 'aye' and the opposed 'nay' and the

Committee Amendment is adopted. On Amendment #2....."

Fredric B. Selcke: "Amendment #2, Rayson. Amend House Bill 374 on page 2 by deleing lines 18 and 19 and so forth."

Giorgi: "Representative Rayson on Amendment #2."

Rayson: "Mr. Speaker, Amendment #1 says ah... that if you're in violation of Section 10 of Article 24 of the Criminal Code, that's having a loaded vehicle in a municipality, the second offense is a thirty day mandatory prison sentence. That's o'kay, but Section 10 refers only to carrying a loaded gun in a car in a municipality. It accepts it in an unincoporated area. Amendment #2 strikes those lines ah.... where it says within the corporate limits of a city, village or incorporated town. So it removes the exceptions and says ah... and ah... a loaded gun in a car is a crime and is subject to ah... the



second offence mandatory thirty days ah.. as Amendment #1 sets forth and I would move the adoption."

Giorgi: "Is there any discussion to Amendment #2? Representative Stearney."

Stearney: "Mr. Speaker, as Sponsor of the ah.. particular Bill, I am in opposition to this amendment because it completly emaciates the Bill.

My Bill simply provided a penalty provision to existing law. Mr.

Rayson's Bill is is attempting to change the existing law and it boardens it and for that reason I would be in opposition. The existing law reads that whoever carries a loaded firearm or pistol within the municipality ah... are subject to a certain penalty and that's all my Bill is ah.... is looking at, ah.... attaching a particular penalty to that provision. Mr. Rayson is attempting to change the existing law and for that reason I am in opposition. I ask for the support of the Members of this House to yote 'no' on this amendment."

Giorgi: "Representative Duff on Amendment #2."

Duff: "Mr. Speaker, would the Sponsor of the amendment answer a question, please?"

Giorgi: "He indicates that he will."

Duff: "Representative Rayson, I ah.. I don't believe that everybody got a clear statement of how Amendment #2 ah... changes Representative Stearney's Bill, but you made a reference to the existence of a weapon in a car. Would you tell the Members how this expands the affect of the Bill and the limitations of the existence of a weapon in a car ah... as with respect to the existing law on the availability of a weapon to persons?"

Rayson: "Ah...."

Duff: "Then one other question after that."

Rayson: "O'kay. Yes, ah.. you see the Bill itself, as amended, it strickly a penalty Bill. Strickly a second offence, thirty day mandatory for violation of Section 10. Section 10 says that it is unlawful to carry ah... or possess, in a vehicle, or on or about his person, within the coporate limits of a city village or a corporated town any loaded pistol revolver or other firearm. In other words, in unlawful to carry a loaded gun in ah.... in a municiplaity, but under present law, it is not unlawful to carry a loaded gun in a unincorporated area.



In other words, ah... well, in McKinly Park, it's very close to ah... let's say Oak Forest, but there is a three or four block unincorporated area inbetween. Section 10 says if I carried a loaded pistol and I don't conceal it in that little four block area between the two towns, it's not a violation of Section 10. So if we are going to make mandatory penalities, I think we ought to make it applicable to all situations. You can't carry a loaded gun period ah... to ah... in order to make that penality provision stay up because it might have constitutional problems, otherwise."

Duff: "Well, what you're saying then is what Representative Stearney's

Bill applies to municipalities ah... you're amendment would apply to

the entire state, is that correct?"

Rayson: "That's right,"

Duff: "Thank you."

Giorgi: "Any further discussion? Representative Rayson to close."

Rayson: "Well, I do ah... do think it's explained. I think if we really mean to carry a loaded pistol, not concealed, on your person or in you car, if we really mean that to be ah... you know, unlawful; it should be applicable to wherever you are and ah.... I have no objection with the penalty. I am just having the offence fit into the penalty bacause when you deal in mandatory penalties, you deal in kind of a grave area and if this is to make ah.... it makes a decent Bill better.

Giorgi: "O'kay, the question is on the adoption of Amendment #2 to

House Bill 374. All in favor will signify by saying 'aye' and the
opposed 'no'. The 'noes' have it, Bob. Do you seek recognition?

Representative Mann on Amendment #2."

Mann: "Ya, Mr. Speaker ah.... before I ask for a Roll Call, I wanted to ask Mr. Stearney a question. I have been trying to get you attention." Giorgi: "Mr. Mann, Rayson is the Sponsor of the amendment so he would

have to close."

Mann: "With this Bill and he's objecting. Well, I ask for a Roll Call,
Mr. Speaker."

Giorgi: "You can ask Mr. Stearney a question."

I would move to adopt Amendment #2."

Mann: "Well, that's what I wanted to do."



Giorgi: "Mr. Stearney, will you answer a question for Mr. Mann?"

Mann: "Representative Stearney, you indicated to change the basic law,

but you didn't say why you oppose the Bill. It seems to me that

all Mr. Rayson's amendment does it to make it uniform throughout the

state. What's the basis for you objection?"

Rayson: "Mr. Mann, the basis for my objection is this. It'll make it

virtually impossible to pass this Bill through the House if you try to make it statewide. The purpose of this Bill is to address myself to the problems of the city where we have violent crimes and we're trying to put some stopper on the use of hand guns. If you try to make this statewide, you're just going to ingender a lot of opposition and the Bill will never pass. My thinking to be successful, is to ingender as little opposition as possible and I think the Bill is good in that respect. It addresses itself to the problem and where it's at and that's in the municipalities and I think that's where.... that's how the Bill is constructed and it's the best means of passing it in that form."

Mann: "Mr. Speaker, I withdraw my request for a Roll Call."

Giorgi: "O'kay, then I declared earilier that the amendment was lost.

The amendment is lost. Any further amendments? Third Reading.

House Bill 437."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 437...."

Meyer: "Mr. Speaker, I would like leave of the House to re-refer to

Appropriations Committee, House Bill 2559.. By accident, this Bill

Giorgi: "Excuse me, Mr. Clerk. Mr. Meyer, for what purpose do you rise?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 437. A Bill for an Act to amend Section 3.2 and 3.3 of an Act concerning fees and salaries classified in several counties of this state with reference thereto. Second Reading of the Bill. Ah.... Committee Amendment #1. Amends House Bill 437 and so forth."

Giorgi: "Representative Cunningham on Amendment #1 to House Bill 437."

Representative Roscoe, is that Bill out of the record?"

Cunningham: "This Bill is being held, isn't it? Isn't that the one that's ah... for a fiscal note?"

Giorgi: "Yes, yes it is."

Cunningham: "Well, we have to furnish that ah... unless we've had a change of mind from Representative Schlickman. We'd welcome any late conversion."

Giorgi: "No, there's still a request for a fiscal note."

Giorgi: "Take it out of the record."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 541."

Giorgi: "Representative Stearney, is he....."

Fredric B. Selcke: "A Bill for an Act to amend the Code of Criminal Procedure. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment.

Amend House Bill 541 as amended on page 1 by deleting lines 21, 22 and 23."

Giorgi: "Representative Stearney on Amendment #1 to House Bill 541."

Stearney: "Mr. Speaker, I move the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 541."

Giorgi: "We want the amendment explained, of course."

Stearney: "Mr. Speaker, the amendment simply deletes lines 21 and 22 and 23 of the Bill on page 1. It's a clean up Bill."

Giorgi: "Is there any discussion on Amendment #1 to House Bill 541?

The question is the adoption of the amendment. All those in favor say 'aye' and those opposed 'nay' and the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 559."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 559. A Bill for an Act to revise the provisions for state revenue sharing with local governmental entities by amending certain Act herein named. Second Reading of the Bill.

Ah... there were two Committee Amendments. Committee Amendment #2 was



tabled in Committee. Committee Amendment #1. Amend House Bill 559 on page 1, line 23 and so forth."

Giorgi: "Mr. Clerk, Mr. Clerk..... Representative McMaster on the floor?

He's not present. Take it out of the record. House Bill 563, Daniels."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 563...."

Giorgi: "Out of the record. Daniels isn't in the Chambers. House Bill 600,
Grotberg? Take it out of the record. House Bill 607, Sangmeister.

Representative Sangmeister?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 607. A Bill for an Act to amend Section 25 of the Housing Authority Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 607 on page 1 by deleing line 32 and so forth."

Giorgi: "Representative Sangmeister on Committee Amendment #1."

Sangmeister: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, ah... this Bill...

the purpose of the Bill was to establish a occupancy priority system for the Housing Authority so that when people were on a list that they couldn't get bumped off. The way the Bill was worded gave some problems to the people ah... who work in the Housing Authority area and through their Representatives, and this is really their amendment, we have changed the language so that it is now acceptable to the Housing Authority in the State of Illinois. It's really their amend-

Giorgi: "Is there any discussion to Amendment #1? The question is the adoption of the amendment. All those in favor will signify by saying 'aye' and those opposed 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Third Reading. Are there any further amendments? I'm sorry. Third Reading. House Bill 618."

ment and I accept it and move for the adoption."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 618. A Bill for an Act in relation to medical treatment administered soley for the purpose of prolonging human life. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment.

Amend House Bill 618 on page 2, line 27 and so forth."

Giorgi: "Representative Ewell on Amendment #1 to House Bill 618."

Ewell: "Amendment #1 is simply the Illinois State Medical Society Amendment to House Bill 618. What it does is it makes several changes ah... in terms of the documents that have to be reduced to writing,



dated and signed. It also eliminates responsibility to the doctor except for malice and it also gives the doctor the favorable presumption ah... except for willful and wanted conduct. These amendments and the final amendment strikes the ah... Class 'A' misdemeanor. These amendments were all put on at the suggestion of the Illinois State Medical Society."

Giorgi: "Is there any discussion to Amendment #1? Representative Totten on Amendment #1."

Totten: "Ya, just a question. My copy of the amendment..... Mr. Speaker and the Sponsor, my copy of the amendment shows the correction being made on page 2 of the Bill and I think that would be technically incorrect..... and that the amendment should be redrawn and referred to the right page."

Ewell: "Correct ah..... wait a minute."

Totten: "I have no objection to the amendment, but it's just technically incorrect the way it is now. I think."

Ewell: "Wait a minute. Where's that ah....."

Giorgi: "Take it out of the record, Mr. Ewell? Are you satisfied that the..... take it out of the record temporarily. We can come back to it. Hold it, Mr. Selcke."

Ewell: "Could we have ah... it's just a simple thing. What we really meant was page I and ah... we could have leave of the Committee to make the correction on its face. I think that would satisfy it."

Giorgi: "Repeat your inquiry."

Ewell: "Where it is page 2, it should be page 1.... the amendment. The page 1. It's in error."

Giorgi: "It's corrected. Is there any further discussion with Amendment #1? Representative Berman on Amendment #1."

Berman: "Will the Sponsor yield?"

Giorgi: "Yes."

Berman: "Do I understand the amendment to say that you are building in by this amendment ah.... that they'll be no liability except for willful and wanted by the doctor?"

Ewell: "It changes two of the ah..... one, it changes the presumption that the doctor has a right to presume that the person is of sound



mind if he signs the document. In other words, he does not have to make that independent determination. It also reduces it to the stage that the document have malice or you have to show the willful and wanton conduct on his particular part."

Berman: "Well, you see the.... I'm sure the State Medical Society would like this amendment because what you're doing is allowing a doctor here to do anything and never be responsible for his negligence of conduct. You can't ah... no doctor is malicious in making mistakes. They're negligent in making mistakes and now you're going to allow these people to come under a doctors care and ah... and you're not going to have any recourse available to this patient for anything that the doctor....."

Ewell: "No, no, no, Mr. Berman. It's only in the instance that the doctor is following the doctors suggestion. In other words, it limits itself only to this area. It does not limit itself to the general treatment of a patient. However, when a patient gets into this area and he makes the certain decision, you're saying the doctor has the right to rely upon his decision and they would not be responsible say ah.... in the cases you could show wither some willful or wanton conduct on the part of the doctor."

Berman: "You could never show willful or wanton. So what you're really doing is saying that is the doctor doesn't follow his advice, his own best advice, but follows the instructions of somebody else, you're letting him off the hook for any negligence and I think it's a very bad amendment. You're really allowing a patient to dictate his medical care. That doesn't make any sense. No doctor follows the patients orders, the doctor has to use his own best judgement."

Ewell: "Well, the doctor has got the right to remove the doctor anytime he gets ready. In other words, if I don't like you as a doctor, all I really have to do is to remove you. In other words, I can still dictate as far as I'm concerned. All you're doing in this relative instance is when the patient says, 'Look, I have examined a particular thing and I know what course I want for myself.' Now having made the decision, you're simply absolving the doctor of conduct except where it is either willful or wanton or malicious, that's all."



Ewell: "Well, that's another approach. I mean you can come at it from two different directions, but I have chosen this one."

Berman: "Well, I prefer the latter. If the patient is cognizant of what he wants to do, let him voluntarily sign a release, but what you're doing here is building a statutory out for any neligence by the doctor and I just don't think that that is the right approach."

Ewell: "That's not exactly true, Mr. Berman."

Giorgi: "Let the ah.... just a minute. Representative Matijevich has a point of order. Representative Matijevich, please."

Matijevich: "My point of order, Mr. Speaker, is that I don't think that they are debating the amendment. I think that they are debating the Bill because the amendment relates to sending a copy to the next of kin, as I understand it. Is that right, Representative Ewell. I think that they are debating the Bill."

Giorgi: "Your objection is well taken. Representative Downs, please."

Downs: "I would like to ask the Sponsor of the amendment a question?"

Giorgi: "He will."

Downs: "Does the amendment, ah.... which I can't locate on my desk here, does it go to the notice ah... to be given relatives in a period of time which must elapse before the treatment can be withdrawn?"

Ewell: "No, that part was covered in the original Bill."

Downs: "Then I would like permission to say a few comments about the amendment."

Giorgi: "Proceed."

Downs: "As a Members of the Committee that considers this question, ah....

the objections of the Committee, as I recall them, and my own objections
to the Bill, were in lack of concern for the Medical Society's concern
about the doctors liability as it was ah... a notice provision to
relatives and some safeguards that this was a procedure that would
not take place lightly and it was on those conditions that the Bill
was passed out of Committee and that there would be an amendment forthcoming that covered the questions of notice to relatives and the
elapse of a period of time."

Giorgi: "Pardon me just a moment, Gentleman. Representative Davis, for what purpose do you rise?"



Davis: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I'd like to present to you three charming ladies. I'm going to take this opportunity to invite them to remain over for the soul brothers dinner tomorrow night. There's Dorthy Bingly in the Speaker's Gallery and Ms. Wilhelmina Moore and Ms. Justine Cutimore. Ms. Dorthy Bingly is a well known radio and television personality ah.... Cosopolitan Chamber of Commerce ah.... Beauty School and Beauty Culture Commentator and one of Chicago's finest ladies. All three of them are. They are in the Speaker's Gallery."

Giorgi: "Representative Catania on Amendment #1 to House Bill 618."

Catania: "Would the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Giorgi: "He indicates that he will."

Catania: "Representative Ewell, I do recall that when this Bill was in human Resources, we were awaiting an amendment. Is there another amendment in addition to this Medical Society Amendment?"

Ewell: "Yes, there ah.... we have two amendments; Amendment #1 and
Amendment #2. Amendment #2 is ah.... the amendment that the Medical
Society basically supported in the situation, which we told the
Committee we would give some support to. I told the Committee I would
give some support to. Amendment #1, ah... which was my amendment,
simply had to do with the notice and ah... it provided that ah... that
the person sends a copy of the document to his next of kin."

Catania: "So this is Amendment #1 that we're discussing now? It provides for notice?"

Giorgi: "We are on Amendment #1."

Catania: "Is this the Medical Society Amendment or is this the Committee Amendment?"

Ewell: "#1, ah... 618 was the ah.... Amendment #1 was the one that provided that the person sends a copy of the document to the next of kin."

Catania: "This is the one that we're voting on right now?"

Ewell: "No."

Catania: "It says...."

Ewell: "Yes, yes, this is the Amendment #1."

Catania: "O'kay, and the next one, which we we'll discuss after we are



through with this one is the Medical Society Amendment, right?"

Ewell: "Right."

Catania: "O'kay, thank you."

Giorgi: "Representative Kosinski on Amendment #1."

Kosinski: "May I speak to the Amendment, Mr. Speaker?"

Giorgi: "Certainly."

Kosinski: "It would be perfectly logical, I think, for the Medical Society to support this Amendment. From the way I understand it from our good Sponsor, it takes them off the hook."

Giorgi: "Any further discussion? Representative Ewell to close on Amendment #1."

Ewell: "Amendment #1 is simply notification of the next of kin. I would just move the adoption. That's not the one that we had the argument on."

Giorgi: "The question is on the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 618. All in favor will signify by saying 'aye' and the opposed 'nay' and the Amendment is adopted."

Fredric B. Selcke: "Amendment #2, Ewell. Amend House Bill 618 on page 1, line 29 and so forth."

Giorgi: "Representative Ewell on Amendment #2."

Ewell: "It's Amendment #2 that causes a problem. Ah... Amendment #2 is the one that we've spoken about ah... that lets the doctor off the hook to the degree that he is not willful or wanton in his conduct as related to the particular patient. It was suggested by the Medical Society."

Giorgi: "Representative Berman on Amendment #2."

Berman: "All right, thank you, Mr. Speaker. It is Amendment #2 that creates, what I think, is a very serious problem. As I view this, you have a situation where a patient, based upon his doctor's diagnosis, considers himself to be terminally ill and he is authorized..... we are authorizing him, by this Bill, to execute certain documents that will allow his life to come to an end. Pull the plug, so to speak.

Now the problem with this Amendment is that it says that if the physician renders a prognosis and the patient executes this document to allow himself to ah..... for his life to come to an end, that the



Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 666 on page 1, line 1 and on page 1, line 5 by deleting and so forth."

Giorgi: "Representative VanDuyne."

VanDuyne: "Yes, Sir.... Yes, Mr. Chairman ah... I mean Mr. Speaker, I'm just trying to find the Bill. This is the Bill that allows the certified list to be given to the County Clerk by the County Chairman and those people to be so designated as Deputy Registrars. We have an Amendment to the Bill ah... that really doesn't do much except what I said. Giorgi: "Representative Schlickman on Amendment #1 to House Bill 666."

VanDuyne: "Mr. Madigan ah.... Representative Madigan was concerned about the ah... effect this would have on the registrars in Cook County and ah... it really has no effect. They can do ah... the same thing that they do now."

Schlickman: "It's the Bill that ah... provides that the Deputy Registrars may register people within their homes. The Amendment doesn't provide that, is that correct? So that some of us will be against the Bill, but will not oppose the Amendment."

VanDuyne: "Yes, ah... I don't know whether I am out of order speaking to the Bill, Mr. Speaker....."

Giorgi: "Representative Totten has a question. Representative Totten."

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Would the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Giorgi: "He will."

Totten: "In trying to follow the Amendment, I can't quite understand what it does to the Bill. Could you explain that?"

Giorgi: "Would you explain the Amendment, Mr. VanDuyne?"

VanDuyne: "To tell you the truth, I really can't explain this Amendment' too much, Representative Totten, but it was on the request of the people from Cook County that this was put in. They have a different



doctor will not be liable, either criminally or civilly for that prognosis, unless you can prove malice. Now Ladies and Gentlemen, you can never prove malice. No doctor acts out of malice, but what's happening here is ah... we're saying that the patient is relying upon a doctors prognosis and what I am saying is that if you're going to allow upon the doctors prognosis, the doctor must exercise a reasonable degree of care in giving that prognosis. Otherwise, you're going to give a blank check to any doctor, regardless of how well meaning he is, or how ill-meaning he is and how negligent he is to end a persons life. This is a terrible type of Amendment. You're saying that a doctor can say to a patient, 'You've only got two days to live and you're in great pain', and that patient is going to say, 'All right, doctor, I want you to put my life to an end.' If that doctor is wrong in that prognosis and we adopt this Amendment, that doctor is not going to have any liability for that wrong prognosis. I think it is a terrible Amendment. You're giving a blank check to a person's life to these doctors under this Amendment and I violently oppose this Amendment."

Giorgi: "Any further discussion? Representative Ewell to close then."

Ewell: "I would just like to point out that you're not talking about a single doctor; you're talking about at least two doctors under these circumstances. We trying to make the Bill as reasonable as possible to try and satisfy in a difficult area, the opposing forces. I am not saying that I am in love with Amendment #2, that I totally whole-heartedly believe in it, however, there were some Members that wanted me to try and make an agreement with the Medical Society and to try and get along with them and this I did. This is a good faith effort in this behalf, but I am willing to be bond by the wisdom of this Body however they choose to vote it up or down on its merits."

Giorgi: "All in favor of the adoption of Amendment #2 to House Bill 618 will signify by voting 'aye' and the opposed by voting 'nay'. Have all voted who wish? Take the record, Mr. Clerk. On this question there are 60 'nays' and 29 'ayes' and the Amendment is lost. Any further Amendments? No further Amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 666, Representative VanDuyne."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 666. An Act to amend the Election Code.



ah.... they don't have the Precinct Committeemen like we do in downstate and so they wanted to be assured that it wouldn't garble up the processes that they have in Cook County and ah... as I understand this Amendment ah... it does nothing to do that so they are happy with it."

Totten: "Well, I wonder if someone could explain the Amendment before we adopt it. I can't find that language in the Amendment, that's what I'm concerned about."

Giorgi: "Which Committee was this in?"

VanDuyne: "Elections. Now I...."

Giorgi: "Any further discussion? Representative Totten."

Totten: "Well, it was just my understanding that the Election Code was supposed to be uniform throughout and here we're ah... making an exception for Cook County people."

Giorgi: "Representative Fennessey on the same question."

Fennessey: "No, ah.. it just gives another option statewide. Cook County can use it if they see fit or they may not use it. It's up to the county to decide. Let the County Clerk decide whether he wants to use it or not. It's just another option."

Giorgi: "Representative Kempiners on Amendment #1."

Kempiners: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, if I understand the Amendment correctly, it really doesn't deal with the problem of whether it applies to Cook County or not; it just changes the Bill from the original position where the Precinct Committeemen would automatically be Registrars



to where the County Chairman can appoint anyone of his choosing. Ah... if that's my understanding of the Amendment as I remember it from the Elections Committee, I $_{\rm I}$ on't have any problems with that, but it's a bad Bill and I'll certainly have some comments on Third Reading."

Giorgi: "Representative VanDuyne to close."

Fredric B. Selcke: "Amendment #1, Tipsword. Amend House Bill 674 on

Shea: "Well, Mr. Speaker, at least according to the records I have, that on April 29...er on...er the 25th it was on Third Reading on the consent calendar and the 29th, an objection was filed and it was to be moved from the consent calendar, and on April 30th, it was placed on the calendar's Second Reading. It was read a second time on the 30th...er...it was placed on the consent calendar's Second Reading and that's why it is being called now."

Duff: "Well, Mr. Speaker, all I'm suggesting is if we're having these kind of error on the digest, they should be brought to somebody's attention, that's all."

Speaker Redmond: "Thank you very much. Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Has there been a fiscal note requested on this Bill?"

Speaker Redmond: "988."

Walsh: "Yes."

Speaker Redmond: "Has there, Mr. Clerk?"

Jack O'Brien: "None requested."

Speaker Redmond: "None requested."

Walsh: "I would like to request one."

Speaker Redmond: "The procedure, I believe, is to come down to the

Clerk's office and sign something and then you'll get it.

Doorkeeper?.....989. A fiscal note is in the process of being requested so we'll hold it on Second Reading and go to 989."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 989. Miller. A Bill for an Act relating to the mandatory training of law enforcement officers, officer recruits and auxiliary police. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 989 on page 4 by deleting line 30 and inserting in lieu there of the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Miller."

Miller: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, Amendment #1 does two things....put on a home rule Amendment and we also make it clear in the Bill that the Illinois Law Enforcement Officers Training Board is involved in setting three standards only. Inadvertently, I had put in the Bill 'hiring and promotional standards' and that is being



taken out by Amendment #1. I ask your favorable approval of Amendment #1 to House Bill 989."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "Will the Gentleman yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Shea: "As I understand the purport of this Bill, with the Amendment, it is to make mandatory the training of police officers, is that correct?"

Miller: "Representative Shea, in Amendment #2, we set up a standard whereby a municipality under 5000 people, a municipality can withdraw from mandatory police training requirements by a 3/5's vote of the government body of a local municipality. This was done at the request of the Illinois Municipal League who expressed a concern that there are a lot of small Illinois towns that don't have the ability to send their policement away to a training school. And we give them the opportunity to opt-out of mandatory training by a 3/5's vote of their governing body."

Shea: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 989. All in favor of the adoption, indicate by saying aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1013. Representative Miller."

Miller: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, there is Amendment #2 to House Bill 989."

Speaker Redmond: "Do we have Amendment #2, Mr. Clerk? House Bill 989 will return to the order of Second Reading if it ever got away from there."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment #2. Amends House Bill 989 on page 1, line 2,
by inserting 'optional training of' before the words 'auxiliary' and
so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Miller."

Miller: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, in Amendment #2 .

we do two things. Number one, we delete the mandatory requirement

for training auxiliary policemen and number two, as I pointed out



to Representative Shea, the municipalities under 5000 people would permit them to opt-out the mandatory training by a 3/5's vote of the governing body."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Rayson....Representative Holewinski."

Holewinski: "Will the sponsor yield to a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Holewinski: "A...Tom, you may know that my House Bill 8 for mandatory police training is presently in the Senate. How does this differ?"

Miller: "Well as I recall your Bill, Representative, and correct me if I'm wrong, on your House Bill, you required gun training for auxiliary

policemen, is that correct?"

Holewinski: "For what?"

Miller: "Gun training for auxiliary policemen? We are requiring not only the mechanical use of their weapon, but the moral and legal aspects of when to use deadly force. The Bill is intended to protect the police officer wearing a gun because he's the man who suffers indictments and his municipality is the one that's sued. Yes and I agreed with your Bill. In House Bill 989, Representative, we addressed ourselves to the over-all training of policemen. As you know today, both the State and municipalities, on a 50-50 basis derived a police training program on a voluntary basis to all Illinois local governments that have policemen on their staff. Today, 95% of all municipalities are participating in the program and this is an effort, 989, when we get to Third Reading, I will get into the fact that we do provide 100% reimbursement by the State for training our policemen by having the add-on fee on traffic and criminal fines."

Holewinski: "Is there a fiscal note on this?"

Miller: "None has been requested up to this point, Representative, however I would be glad to point out to you that if this Bill is enacted into law, the add-on fees on the traffic and criminal fines are expected to produce \$40,500,000...a....it will save our local municipalities \$2,500,000 and the State of Illinois about \$2,000,000."

Holewinski: "One more question and then I'm done. Will this increase the number of patterned traffic situations where people are polled on



to raise this fund, will it make more traffic offenses?"

Miller: "I see no reason for any local government law enforcement body to increase their amount of traffic ticketing soley because of this Act."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? The question is on the adoption of Amendment #2 to House Bill 989. All in favor say aye, opposed no, the ayes have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments? No further Amendments. Third Reading. 1013.

Representative Katz on the floor? Take it out of the record. 1030.

Representative Kempiners. 1030."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1030. A Bill for an Act to amend the Election Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 1030 on page 3, line 18, by striking 'County Clerk' and inserting in lieu thereof the following: 'State Board of Elections and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kempiners."

Kempiners: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this Amendment to House Bill 1030 makes two significant changes.

One, it changes from the County Clerk requiring additional information on these forms and makes it the State Board of Elections, and this change is made so that there is uniformity State-wide in the type of information required. And secondly, it requires the individual making application to sign an affidavit that they are not registered to vote any where else in the United States and intend to remain a citizen of Illinois and that they intend to return to the State of Illinois. I move the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1030."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the adoption of

Amendment #1 to House Bill 1030. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no.

The ayes have it; the Amendment is adopted. Are there any further

Amendments? No further Amendments? Third Reading. 1034.

Representative Caldwell."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1034. A Bill for an Act to amend the Public Aid Code. Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative Caldwell on the floor? Take it out of the record. 1037."



Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1037. Capparelli. A Bill for an Act to amend the Chicago Sanitary District Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Capparelli on the Amendment."

Jack O'Brien: "Amends House Bill 1037 on page 1, line 22, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Capparelli."

Capparelli: "I believe this Amendment extended it for five years. It was a Committee Amendment and I move for the adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1037. All in favor of the adoption say aye. Opposed, no, the ayes have it; the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments? No further Amendments. Third Reading. 1058. Representative Rayson."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1058. Rayson. A Bill for an Act to amend the Environmental Protection Act. Second Reading of the Bill.

One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 1053 on page 1, line 19, by deleting the period and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Rayson."

Rayson: "This is a Committee Amendment to this Bill to suggest a two-tier appellate procedure and Environmental Illinois Pollution Control Board administrative decisions on appeal."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Well Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, its a very controversial Bill. One that is opposed by the Attorney General and the Environmental Protection Agency and I'm wondering if the sponsor could be more specific with the effect of the Amendmentafter he's found it."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Rayson, can you be more specific?"
Schlickman: "Did you find it?"

Rayson: "Its been misplaced, but I'll work on it. The Illinois E.P.A.

Act is rather unique because it sets forth the views directly to the

Appellate Court..."

Schlickman: "...which is for the purpose of uniformity..."

Rayson: "....which is fine. However..."

Schlickman: "...why introduce the Bill then? I'm sorry...."



Rayson: "If you continue talking, I'll find my file."

Schlickman: "Why don't you hold it until you find it."

Rayson: "Alright."

Schlickman: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the record. 1061."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1061. Kelly. A Bill for an Act to amend the

Criminal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1. Kelly. Amends House Bill 1061 on page 2, by deleting lines 6 through 10 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kelly."

Kelly: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this Amendment, House Amendment, which I move for the adoption of, House Amendment #1, defines the word 'simulated'. It seems like the motion picture industry seems to be disturbed by not defining simulated and I've agreed and I don't think it takes away from the main intent of the Bill and I move for the adoption of House Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1061. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it. The Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments. No further Amendments. Third Reading. 1064.

Is Representative Choate on the floor? Hold it. 1065."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1065. Beaupre. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1083."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1083. Kempiners. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relation to the Airport Authority. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "No further Amendments. Third Reading, 1093.

Is Representative Brummet on the floor? Representative Kempiners."



Kempiners: "If an Amendment has not been filed, I believe Representative Polk does have an Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Do you want this returned to the order of Second Reading?"

Kempiners: "Yes, please."

Speaker Redmond: "Return 1083 to the order of Second Reading. 1093.

Representative Brummet."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1093. Brummet. A Bill for an Act in relation the registration of plumbing contractors. Second Reading of the Bill. On Committee Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Calvo."

Jack O'Brien: "Amends House Bill 1093 on page 2 by deleting lines 7 through 22 and so forth."



Speaker Redmond: "We'd better take that out of the Record. 1103, Representative Holewinski? 1103."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1103, Holewinski, a bill for an act concerning the reporting of investments and real estate mortgages by financial institutions. Second Reading of the bill. Two committee amendments.

Amendment Number 1 amends House Bill 1103 on page 1 by deleting line 19 and inserting in lieu, thereof, Section 3, 'Beginning on January 1, 1976, each institution shall file semiannually'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Holewinski."

Holewinski: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members of the House, . . . ah
. . . Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 1103 . . . ah . . . simply
makes the bill effective January 1st, 1976."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Question is on the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 1103. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; and the 'aye' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 2 amends House Bill 1103 on page 1 by deleting lines 22 and 23 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Holewinski."

Holewinski: "Amendment Number 2 . . . ah . . . House Bill 1103 is addressed to the problem of red lining, and it's primarily an urban problem.

House . . . ah . . . Amendment Number 2, rather, . . . ah . . . limits the applicability of the bill to counties having a population of 100,000 or more; and I move its . . . ah . . . acceptance."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hoffman."

Hoffman: "Question of the sponsor? Mr. Sponsor, would you explain how you can do that with a county of that size and up in as much as the accounts will be dispersed between neighboring counties?"

Holewinski: "Ah . . . I'm not sure I understand that question."

Hoffman: "Would you explain the amendment again then for my edification."

Holewinski: "Ah . . . Representative, this is the amendment that was adopted in . . . in committee. What the amendment does, it limits the requirements of the bill to counties having a population of 100,000 or more. The reason the amendment was . . . ah . . . was . . . ah . . . put in was that this . . . ah . . . bill seeks to



address a problem that is primarily an urban problem. Ah . . . counties of 100,000 or more, generally, will have some urban area. Ah . . . It just is seeing that the relevance to the procedure we're asking in this bill would not be as great in those totally rural communities."

Hoffman: "Thank you, Mr. Sponsor."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? The question is on the adoption of Amendment Number 2 to House Bill 1103. All in favor of the adoption say 'aye' and oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. On the order of Second Reading appears House Bill 1064."



- Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1064. Choate. A Bill for an Act to amend the Election Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment.

 Amends House Bill 1064 on page 14 by inserting between lines 12 and 13 the following and so forth."
- Speaker Redmond: "Before I recognized Representative Choate, I'd like to represent...recognize Representative Garmisa right up there."

 Why didn't you get asked? Representative Choate."
- Choate: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this is a re-registration Bill and on page...wait until I get my copy of the Bill....what the Committee Amendment does is that it extends the effective date through 1976 rather than just having a few short months to comply with the statute that would give something like a month and a half, so I would move for the adoption of the Committee Amendment."
- Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1064. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"
- Jack O'Brien: "Amendment #2. Schraeder. Amends House Bill 1064 on page 1, line 24, by changing 'four' to 'seven'."
- Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment #2 to House Bill 1064. All in favor say aye. Representative Choate."
- Choate: "What did the Amendment do?"
- Speaker Redmond: "Will you read the Amendment again? I take it, it wasn't your Amendment."
- Jack O'Brien: "Schraeder's Amendment. On page 1, line 24, by changing 'four' to 'seven'."
- Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schraeder."
- Schraeder: "Mr. Speaker, this changes the registration from four to seven years and it would save Peoria County something like \$100,000. We just re-registered our people and we do it every year with a post-card filing systems. And it seems to me that the expenditure of \$100,000, we can't afford it in our county and I would hope that this Amendment would be passed. This would save our county, and nobody else. If they want to re-register in their county, its certainly alright, but this is going to save us a bundle of money.



And I would certainly hope that we could change this by putting in seven years rather than four. Our records are up to date as of the last primary and general election and I would hope that the Members would accept this Amendment for the cost it will save us."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Choate."

Choate: "Well in the first place, Mr. Speaker, I want to clarify the record. I had the wrong Amendment in my hand and the Amendment we just adopted, which was the Committee Amendment, simply says that the State shall pay the cost of the re-registering rather than the local and individual counties and municipalities. Now as far as Representative Schraeder's Amendment is concerned, it would not work any hardship as far as financial cost on the municipality is concerned because if the Act is enacted into law, it will be...the cost of it will be born by State government. I realize that Representative Schraeder's county, town rather, Peoria, re-registered something like, I think it was three-four years ago, was it Fred? Something like three or four years ago, but inasmuch as ...inasmuch as this is not to be borne by the county, I would suggest that when we clean up the voters' rolls throughout the entire State of Illinois, that we should do it in every individual county, every precinct within the State. And as I said, there will not be any cost to the Election Board in Peoria and I talked to your people about it when they were in Committee and they did not oppose the Bill, so I would suggest that we should have complete and absolute and State-wide re-registering of all voters, so I would suggest that we do not adopt this Amendment."

Schraeder: "Mr. Speaker, if what I understand Representative Choate to say, that Amendment #1 was adopted, but it did not go to the material substance which he said, and I would suggest that the Members should reconsider the Bill by which #1 was taken. I happened to vote on it, but I didn't realize he was talking about the State picking up the cost of the registration throughout the State of Illinois. And I think on that basis, we should debate that a little bit before we get into my Amendment. I don't think the Members of this House realize that the State's gonna pick up the entire cost of re-regis-

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schraeder."



tration throughout the State of Illinois. And I think that should be discussed before we get into the merits to my Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kempiners."

Kempiners: "Well before I speak, Mr. Speaker, I'd like to know what we're going to do on Representative Schraeder's suggestion."

Speaker Redmond: "I don't believe that there's any procedure for a reconsideration of a vote when it hasn't been a roll call vote. I may be wrong on that, but I think that's the rule. Representative Duff."

Duff: "Mr. Speaker, I think Representative Choate's trying to get your attention."

Choate: "I would suggest, Mr. Speaker, that the Members who are in question of Amendment #1 would be certainly correct in wishing to debate the Amendment simply because I did misrepresent the Amendment, I had the wrong Amendment in front of me when I was talking about it and I did not adequately explain Amendment #1 until after it was adopted."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kempiners."

Kempiners: "Mr. Speaker, the reason I was seeking recognition was to ask the sponsor, after we were done with the Amendments, if he would leave this on Second Reading. We have some Amendments which are being prepared and I would like to discuss with him. If we are going to have a problem with Amendment...the adoption of Amendment #1 perhaps we could just pull this from the record and straighten it out and take it on Second Reading until a later time."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Choate."

Choate: "Mr. Speaker, you can look at the one when you look at the digest and see who is co-sponsoring this Bill with me will see that there's bi-partisan support on the Bill. I did say to some of my Republican and some of my Democratic collegues that I would certainly be happy to discuss any and all Amendments that they might wish to prepare and submit to me and then, if they desire, offer them on the floor. And I think if Representative Kempiner's Amendments are not ready for me to look at and to discuss, and certainly I would not want to advance this Bill passed the Second Reading stage or the



Amendment stage without giving him the opportunity to do what we talked about, so I suggest that we do take it out of the record, but I would also suggest to Representative Kempiners and others, that they have their Amendments prepared as soon as possible because we are getting into some deadline problems."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schraeder."

of the record. Is that correct?"

Amendment #1."

Schraeder: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, might I suggest, since
Clyde did not have the correct Amendment in front of him and was in
error, might I suggest that having voted on the prevailing side, we
reconsider the....he's going to take the Amendment out of the record?
Okay."

Speaker Redmond: "I would think that the correct procedure would be to take Amendment #2 out of the record and then in the posture of having had Amendment #1 approved, now I'll recognize Representative Choate on that issue."

Choate: "I've just been told by other people who do have Amendments that they do have all of their Amendments prepared, with the exception of one, so I would suggest that we do take the Bill out of the record.

If Representative Schraeder will take his Amendment voluntarily out of the record, then I think I can clear up the #1 Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schraeder takes his Amendment # 2 out

Choate: "Then, Mr. Speaker, as the chief sponsor of this legislation, I don't think there's any question in anyone's mind but what I did vote on the prevailing side as far as the adoption of the Amendment is concerned, so I would now move that we do reconsider the adoption of Amendment #1 simply because I gave an erroneous explanation by having another Amendment in front of me and I would suggest to my collegues that they now vote with me in reconsidering

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman having voted on the prevailing side now moves that the vote by which House Bill....Amendment #1 to House Bill 1064 be amended. All in favor say aye. All opposed, no." Choate: "Mr. Speaker, just again to clarify the record because we both left out one very important word. This wasn't a Committee Amendment



that we...Committee Amendment #1, that we did reconsider. Now if I understand correctly, we're in the position of having House Bill 1064 back in the House's possession and in the identical shape that it came from the Committee. Is that correct?"

Speaker Redmond: "No, I would think that the Amendment...we have adopted the Committee Amendment, but the vote by which it was adopted has been reconsidered. You could withdraw Amendment #1."

Choate: "Now, Mr. Speaker, I wish to hold Committee Amendment #1 and take
House Bill 1064 out of the record for the time being."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objections? Leave granted. Representative Walsh."
Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, its my pleasure to introduce a group from St. Bede's
School in Grant Township in Lake County, in the balconey on the
Democratic side. They're ably represented by Representatives Reed,

Speaker Redmond: "1093. Representative Brummet, do you want that called?

1093? Take it out of the record. Representative Keller here?

Cunningham: "Oh, I'm trying to get you to roll back, excuse me."

Speaker Redmond: "1136. Hanahan."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1136."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out. 37 out? 1137."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1137. Hanahan. A Bill for an Act in relation to employment benefits payable to State employees. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 11..."



Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1338. Hanahan. A Bill for an Act restricting lie detector tests and similar tests for public and private employees. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading, 1139."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1139. Hanahan. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relation to State Police. Second Reading of the Bill.

No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

JackJack O'Brien: Jack O'Brien: None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1140."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1140. Hanahan. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Municipal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "None. Third Reading. 1109."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mahar."

Mahar: "Thank you Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. Amendment #1 changes the salary of the Director to the salary that passed through the House, here, two weeks ago. And I move for its adoption."

Mahar: "Amendment #2 puts the language back in the Act that was in the previous Act. You have to restrict the Governor from spending money out of General Revenue without the consent of the legislature. And I



move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Totten, for what purpose do you rise?"

Totten: "Question of the sponsor on Amendment #2."

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he'll answer."

Totten: "Do you have any indication of what this will cost?"

Mahar: "Amendment #2?"

Totten: "Yeh, by the Bill and by Amendment #2. Has there been a fiscal note?"

....

Mahar: "Its not designed for any additional expenses whatsever. There are no new services and there are not new people added by the new Act."

Totten: "Well, who spends the money then?"

Mahar: "They are spending the same money that has been spent under the existing Act. Amendment #2 refers to the Section of the old Act which says that 'the amount of money that's appropriated in any of the transfers or if the total amount of money is spent, the Governor must come back to the General Assembly for additional revenues if there are additional bills to be paid'. Now Amendment #2 takes that responsibility away and places it back in the hands of the legislature which it says that when the annual appropriations are made for disasters or if a disaster occurs and the money is spent, the Governor has to come back to the General Assembly for the additional money he might need to pay the bills."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? The question is on the adoption of Amendment #2 to House Bill 1109. All in favor say aye.

Opposed, no. The ayes have it; the Amendment is adopted. Are there any further Amendments."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment #3. Amends House Bill 1109 on page 26 by deleting line 34 and 35 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mahar."

Mahar: "Amendment #3 deletes Section 27, which is in reference to health and life insurance benefits for Civil Defense workers. It takes it completely out of the Act. I move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain."

McClain: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. Will the sponsor explain what purpose in takin that Section out of this Act is?"



Mahar: "Well, it's difficult to insure civil defense workers, ah.. first of all, the revised life insurance benefits for them would be a very difficult thing to do and should be approached from a different ah... a different angle. At this particular point, you're talking about volunteer workers. You're talking about volunteer people and to accurately determine what this is going to cost would be rather difficult, so it's deleted from the Act."

McClain: "Ah... it's presently in the Act?"

Mahar: "It's being removed from the Act by this Amendment."

McClain: "And what is the purpose of ever being in the Act?"

Mahar: "Well, under the new Act... under the new Act, it was thought that civil defense workers probably ought to be treated like volunteer firemen or volunteer policemen who now ah... are eligible in many areas have ah... life insurance benefits and ah... other benefits, but this ah... is controlled by municipalities usually and this has to be a state fuction, which are additional funds of an undetermined amount so it's been removed from the Act in order to not cause a bottleneck as far as passing is concerned."

McClain: "Well, have you talked to like ah... Erie Jones on this ah... is he against this or for it or what....."

Mahar: "No, he's not. He's in favor of it."

McClain: "O'kay, thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? The question is on the adoption of Amendment #3 to House Bill 1109. All in favor say 'aye' and the opposed say 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted.

Are there any further Amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment #4. Amends House Bill 1109 on page 2, line 22 by striking the word 'or' and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mahar."

Mahar: "Amendment #4 is a home rule provision placed on the Act and I urge its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question is on the adoption of Amendment #4 to House Bill 1109. All in favor say 'aye' and the opposed say 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Are there any further Amendments?"



Jack O'Brien: "No further."

Speaker Redmond: "No further Amendments, Third Reading. On the order of House Bills, Third Reading appears House Bill 940. It appears that there are Amendments that have to be attached to House Bill 940 so we'll remove it from the order of Third Reading back to the order of Second Reading."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 940. A Bill for an Act to repeal the wage deduction for benefits of creditors. Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments. Amendment #1, amends House Bill 940 on page 1, line 1 by striking the word 'repeal' and insert in lieu thereof and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative ah... who's Amendment is this, Jack? Representative Shea. Amendment #1 on House Bill 940."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, I would move for the adoption of Amendment #1 to
House Bill 940. It's a Committee Amendment. What's happened here,
as I understand it, the Clerk explained it to me.... that this Bill
was amended on Second Reading when it was on the Consent Calendar and
then went to Third Reading. When a Bill was pulled off this Consent
Calendar, it goes back to Second Reading and you gotta go through the
Amendment process ah.... is that correct?"

Speaker Redmond: "That's correct."

Shea: "All right. I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1 to House Bill 940."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of Committee Amendment #1 to House Bill 940. All in favor of the adoption say 'aye' and those opposed say 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and Amendment is adopted.

Any further Amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment #2. Amend House Bill 940 as amended in the title and also the first sentence of Section 1 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment #2."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved for the adoption of Committee

Amendment #2 to House Bill 940. All in favor say 'aye' and the

opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Are
there any further Amendments? Third Reading. Representative Daniels,



for what purpose do you rise?"

Daniels: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I just talked to Representative Shea regarding House Bill 940. I would like to ask Representative Shea if he could hold that on Second Reading while we're studing the consequences of Public Law 93-647, which was signed into effect by the Congress on January 4, 1975. This applies to child support and alimony obligations ah... in relation to the public law that sets forth therein and I think that in a couple of days we will be able to resolve any problems with reagrd to the public law, ah....if he could hold it on Second Reading."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "Would you have any objections if I moved it to Third and if you want to amend it then I will bring it back."

Daniels: "No problem."

Speaker Redmond: "1141. Ah... Representative Duff."

Duff: "Well, Mr. Chairman, just to ask a question ah... on the rule ah....

this Bill is on Third Reading so I'm not concerned about this Bill,
but I do note that there are some Bills in the Digest where it says
that they are on the Consent Calendar, but there are Amendments. Now
it's my understanding that if an Amendment is put on a Bill in Committee
then it does not go on the Consent Calendar and if that's correct; I
think the people who prepare the Digest might ah... and the Clerk
might take some note to the fact that when a Bill comes out of
Committee amended, ah.. it doesn't go on the Consent Calendar."

Speaker Redmond: "I believe the rule is that if there is a Committee

Amendment, but it is reported out on the Consent Calendar and the

Amendment is assumed to be adopted by any further actions on the part
of the floor."

Duff: "Mr. Speaker, are we to understand that whenever we amend a Bill in Committee and then put it on the Consent Calendar, that we don't have to statiscally adopt the Amendment?"

Speaker Redmond: "That is correct."

Duff: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Rule 9c provides that any Amendment contained in Committee, reports on the Bill shall be deemed adopted and the Bill advanced to the order of the Consent Calendar, Third Reading.



1142, Representative Hanahan."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1142, Hanahan. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Municipal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. 1143."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1143, Hanahan. A Bill for an Act to amend the

Municipal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor? No Amendments from the floor. Third Reading. 1141."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1141, Hanahan. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act to revise the law in relation to counties. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1153."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1153. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois
Income Tax Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "No Floor Amendments. Third Reading. 1155."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1155, Flinn. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Income Tax Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Skinner. Amends House Bill 1155 on page 2
by deleting line 6 and inserting in lieu thereof the following and
so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative Flinn on the floor? Representative Skinner has Amendment #1 to House 1155. Representative Skinner on

the Amendment. Representative Flinn, do you seek recognition?"

Flinn: "Yes, Mr. Speaker ah.... I have not seen the Amendment. I would like to talk to the Sponsor of the Amendment. Would you take this out of the record at this time?"

Speaker Redmond: "All right, take that out of the record. 1167."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1167, Marovitz. A Bill for an Act in relation



to the Illinois Comsumer Product Safety Act. Second Reading of the
Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 1167 on page 3,
line 27 by inserting after the word 'agencies' the word 'municipalities'

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Marovitz."

Marovitz: "Mr. Speaker, there may be another Amendment that I've been infomed to ah.... and I'm not quite sure of the procedure ah.... of this. Is it to put this back and hold this on Second Reading, so that I may make sure that this Amendment may be added?"

Speaker Redmond: "O'kay, we'll take this out of the record."

Marovitz: "O'kay, fine. Thank you very much."

Speaker Redmond: "1174.... take that one out of the record."

Jack O'Brién: "House Bill 1174 ah... was this a fiscal note? Farley.
A Bill for an Act to amend the Civil Administrative Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "No Amendments from the floor. Third Reading. Representative Farley."

Farley: "Yes, Mr. Chairman, there is an Amendment to 1174. It deletes the word 'department' and puts in 'department's state park fund' and I move for the adoption of Amendment #1."

Jack O'Brien: "All right. Amendment #1, amends House Bill 1174 on page 1,
line 20 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schlickman. The question is on the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1174. All in favor say 'aye' and all opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Are there any further Amendments? No further Amendments. Third Reading. 1262... is Representative Hirschfeld on the floor? Take that one out. 1265, Representative Matijevich."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1265, Matijevich. A Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1274."



Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1274, Younge. A Bill for an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Department of Finance.

Second Reading of the Bill. Three Committee Amendments. Amendment #1,

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Younge isn't here. We'll have to take that out of the record. 1286."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1286, Pierce. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Insurance Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 1286 on page 1, line 13 by striking the word 'or' and inserting in lieu thereof the word 'and'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pierce on the Amendment."

Pierce: "Mr. Speaker, there may be another..... take that out of the record for a moment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Duff."

Duff: "Well, Mr. Speaker, just to understand the implications of your last ruling; ah... would it not also follow that if a Bill is on the Consent Calendar and then it is objected to, it would go on the regular Calendar at the same order of business upon which it reached in the Consent Calendar?"

Speaker Redmond: "If it had been removed from the Consent Calendar, it is my opinion that it should be taken off of the Consent Calendar and put on the order of Second Reading."

Duff: "Right, now the Calendar indicates that ah.. this Bill that we just handled went through Second Reading on the Consent Calendar, which would mean that ah... it was assumed that Amendment #1 was adopted. It was put on Third Reading on the Consent Calendar and it was then objected to. Now then ah.... does it then go back ah... stay on the Third Order of business, but it goes back to Second?"

Speaker Redmond: "Any Bill removed from the Consent Calendar shall stand on the order of Second Reading on the Daily Calendar. Any removed Bill to which Amendments have been proposed by a Committee or which is amended shall stand on the Daily Calendar in its original unamended form. All Amendments to the Bill shall be treated as if the Bill had never been on the Consent Calendar."

Duff: "Thank you."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pierce."

Pierce: "Mr. Speaker, I apologize. I couln't remember the Amendment to House Bill 1286, but there was a typographical error when it was prepared and all that the Amendment does ah.... is change the word, 'and' for the word 'or' which is a typographical error and ah... that was the reason that there wasn't a substantive Amendment, but there was a typo that we corrected by the Committee Amendment striking the word 'or' on page 1, line 13 and substituting the word 'and' which should have been there in the first place and I move the adoption of Committee Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1286. All in favor of the adoption say 'aye' and all opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments? No further Amendments.

Third Reading. 1292, Representative Schneider. 1317. Representative Jaffe. Would you turn him on?"

Jaffe: "Mr. Speaker, I just wanted to know if 1292 has any Amendments on it ah... or else I'd move it for Representative Schneider."

Speaker Redword: "I understand that it has already been moved."

Speaker Redmond: "I understand that it has already been moved."

Jaffe: "Oh."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1317, Laurino. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill. Three Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative Laurino on the floor? I guess not.

Take that one out of the record. 1324, Representative Calvo."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1324, Calvo. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Aeronautics Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor? No further Amendments.

Ah... or no Amendments. Third Reading. 1325."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1325, Satterthwaite. A Bill for an Act to create the Professional Geologist Examining Committee. Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments. Amendment #1, amends House Bill 1325 on page 2 by deleting line 5 and inserting in lieu thereof the following and so forth."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Satterthwaite."

Satterthwaite: "Mr. Speaker, I believe there are three Committee Amendments."

Jack O'Brien: "Two Committee and one Floor Amendment."

Satterthwaite: "Well, I have three Committee Amendments and one Floor Amendment. The Floor Amendment by Mr. O'Daniel. There is another Amendment then, so I guess we better hold this until that is straightened out."

Speaker Redmond: Take that out of the record. 1328, Representative Schoeberlein."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1328, Schoeberlein...."

Speaker Redmond: "Is he here? Take that out of the record. 1330, is Representative Meyer here?"

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1330, Meyer. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act relating to alcoholic liquors. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "No Amendments. Third Reading, 1339."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1339, Neff. A Bill for an Act to set standards for public owned motor vehicles. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Neff..... he doesn't appear to be on the floor. Take that out of the record. 1354, Representative Tipsword."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1354, Tipsword. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Savings and Loan Act. Second Reading of the Bill.

Four Committee Amendments. Amendment #1, amends House Bill 1354 on page 4, line 21 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tipsword."

Tipsword: "Mr. Chairman..... ah.... Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment #1 to House Bill 1354 ah... amends some minor language ah... some language changes in regard to the authorization of the Commissioner to issue regulations. I would move for the adoption.... this is the Commissioner of Savings and Loans. I would



move the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1354. All in favor say 'aye' and all those opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Are there any further Amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment #2, amends House Bill 1354 on page 14, lines 5 and 6 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tipsword."

Tipsword: "Mr. Speaker, this also is some correcting language in regard to the authority granted to the Commissioner of Savings and Loans in the State of Illinois. It just changes the words."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of Amendment #2 to

House Bill 1354. Those in favor of the adoption say 'aye' and those
opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and Amendment #2 is adopted. Are
there any further Amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment #3, amends House Bill 1354 on page 6, line 24
and line 25 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tipsword."

Tipsword: "This is the language that removes from the Bill as it was originally drawn, the authority of the Commissioner to set up a guarantee ah... fund, such as we have for the other federal laws for the banks. This has been withdrawn and there will be no insurance that can be set up or required by the Commissioner. It removes any such authorization."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of Amendment #3 to

House Bill 1354. All those in favor say 'aye' and all those opposed

'no' and the 'ayes' have it and Amendment #3 is adopted. Any further

Amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment #4, amends House Bill 1354 on page 3 by deleting line 32 through 35 and on page 4 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Mr. Speaker, this language removes any suggestions in the Bill that Savings and Loans would be authorized to branch. This would take any such authorization out of the Bill and insure that State Savings and Loans cannot branch in the State of Illinois."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #4



to House Bill 1354. All in.... Representative Deavers."

Deaver: "Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to accepting this Amendment.

I think this is one of the few opportunities that we should leave
this under the Act because the only chance that the State Savings and
Loans have to be on any kind of parity with the Federal Savings and
Loans is to leave this Section in the Bill. For that reason, I

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tipsword."

opposed the adoption of the Amendment."

Tipsword: "I might say that philosophically I am in agreement with

Representative Deavers, but I have learned to my sorrow that there
is no possibility of passing this Bill with the branch provision in
it and the Bill totally provides a lot of very needed changes and
authorizations to Savings and Loans in the State of Illinois and so
consequently, with the recommendation of the Savings and Loan League
and of the Commissioner, this Amendment has been made to the Bill and
so I must move for the adoption of it."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Friedrich."

Friedrich: "I was just going to....."

Speaker Redmond: "Would the gentlemen between the Chair and Representative Friedrich, please take your seats?"

Friedrich: "Mr. Speaker, I was just going to suggest to Representative

Deavers that I think there is another Bill which would put state and

federal associations in the same catagory with respect to branching."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of Amendment #4 to

House Bill 1354. All in favor of the adoption say 'aye' and all

opposed say 'no'. The Chair is unable to determine. All those in
favor vote 'aye' and the opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish?

Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, there's a little technical problem with this Amendment and I'm sure it could be done on it's face, but it's a little confusing and ah... Representative Tipsword on the Amendment ah.... I think he ought to underline ah... the new addition of the word ah... in other words, unless excused by resolution of the Board of Director shall'... should be amended and then ah.... where it says, 'constitute...."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tipsword."

Tipsword: "I think it's a new Section of the Statutes and does not require underlining."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? On this question there's
61 'ayes' and 14 'nays' and the Amendment is adopted. Are there any
further Amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1369, Representative McClain. Representative Miller, for what purpose do you rise?"

Miller: "I yield for the moment, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "All right. To whom?"

Miller: "To you, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "I'll yield to McClain. 1369."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1369, McClain. A Bill for an Act to amend the Unified Aeronautical"..... Anatomical Gift Act. Second Reading

of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. 1381,

Terzich. 1381."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1381, Terzich. A Bill for an Act to amend the Unified Disposition of Unclaimed Property Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1386, Hanahan. A Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. 1386."

the Revenue Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Hanahan. Amends House Bill 1386 on page 1, line 9 by deleting the first 'a' and inserting in lieu thereof the

Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative Giglio on the floor? He's not here so I think we better....."

Jack O'Brien: "Hanahan is the Sponsor."

following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "I know, but the Chief Sponsor of the Bill isn't here."

Jack O'Brien: "It's Hanahan's Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "It says Giglio's Bill. Oh, pardon me. Representative

Hanahan for 1386."



Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker, this is the Agreed Amendment to put it in mind with the Cook County Amendment, that was on Representative Capparelli's Bill, which was a Committee recommendation that this ah... problem of subsidy be equalized only for the one year instead of for the four years and I move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1386. All in favor of the adoption say 'aye' and all Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, would the Gentleman explain the reason for offering this Amendment ah....?"

Hanahan: "The Committee ah..... Representative Capparelli ah.. in Cook County and ah... covered Cook County with this Bill on a homestead exemption for \$15,000. In the Bill it is confusing whether or not a person could do this every year ah.... and you know, continue the \$15,000 exemption by adding to the property each year and all this Amendment does is certify that it will only be one that the \$15,000 would be granted. These are downstate counties."

Walsh: "This is for downstate counties only? The Amendment does not pertain to the fact that this is for downstate counties only."

Hanahan: "The other Bill...... no, this Bill is written only for downstate. Representative Capparelli had the one just for Cook County."

Walsh: "Well, then it would be fitting for me to object to the fact that it does not apply to Cook County at the time the Bill is on Third Reading?"

Hanahan: "No, because the Bill that does effect Cook County only is

Representative Capparelli's Bill. There was a constitutional question
as to whether we could have a homestead exemption both in Cook County
and the rest of the state ah.... there's a constitutional reason.

The lawyers advised two Bills."

Walsh: "That's in case the Cook County Bill got beat, I imagine."

Hanahan: "I have no idea."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1386. All in favor of the adoption say 'aye' and the opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Are there any further Amendments? No further Amendments. Third

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1407, Capparelli. A Bill for an Act to amend the Criminal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading, 1416."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1416, Ralph Dunn. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Security Law. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Spaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "No floor Amendments. Third Reading. 1443. Who's the Sponsor of that?"

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1443, Skinner. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 1443 on page 3 by inserting after the period on line 22 the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "This will make the Bill tighter and I move the adoption of the Amendment."

Skinner: "If I may read from our Staff Memo,.... if you could turn the volume down."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Skinner: "Apparently there are some Cook County School Districts that are using revolving funds and hiding expenditures of school personnel which the main Bill is intended to reveal. This will cover that problem."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further questions?"

Skinner: "I'll show you the memo, Gene."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1443. All in favor say 'aye' and the opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted.

Any further Amendments?"



Jack O'Brien: "No further."

Speaker Redmond: "No further Amendments. Third Reading. 1444, Representative Getty."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1444, Getty. A Bill for an Act to amend the Code of Criminal Procedure. Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative Getty on the floor? Proceed, Clerk."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment #1 was tabled in Committee. Amendment #2,

amends House Bill 1444 on page 2 by adding immediately below line 6

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Getty."

the following and so forth."

Getty: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment #2 ah... provides that ah.. in the event there's a preliminary hearing that that preliminary hearing will be sufficient for any causes arising out of the same set of facts and circumstances and I would move for the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment #2 to House Bill 1444. All in favor say 'aye' and the opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted.

Are there any further Amendments? Third Reading, 1445."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1445, Getty. A Bill for an Act to amend the Public Community College Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment #1, McGrew. Amends House Bill 1445 on page 1, line 26 by deleting 'no persons' and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McGrew on the Amendment. Representative Getty, do you have any reaction on the Amendment?"

McGrew: "Yes, ah... Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, in Representative McGrew's absence ah... this was discussed ah... with Representative McGrew ah... he brought it up in Committee and I told him that I would be happy to work with him on it. I'm happy to accept the Amendment. It deletes language that, I believe, is archaic from this Act and I would move for the adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #1



to House Bill 1445. All in favor of the adoption of the Amendment say 'aye' and all opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Are there any further Amendments? No further Amendments.

Third Reading. 1467. Is Representative Simms on the floor? 1467."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1467, Simms. A Bill for an Act to amend the Criminal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Leinenweber."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Simms...."

Speaker Redmond: "We'll have to take it out of the record. Representative Simms is not here. I'm sorry. 1478."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1478, Leinenweber. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Municipal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 1478 on page 1, line 15 by inserting after the word 'required' the following: 'for street or'."

Leinenweber: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Amendment #1 is a Committee Amendment and it deletes the parts of the Bill ah... which sought to increase the scope that a municipality could exercise the power of eminent domain and merely returns the Bill to what the original intent was, which would be directed to courts to expedite condemnation procedings on their trial dockets. I move the adoption of Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion?. The question is on the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1478. All in favor say 'aye' and all opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted.

Are there any further Amendments? No further Amendments. Third Reading. 1480."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1480, Yourell. A Bill for an Act to amend the Highway Code. Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments. Amendment #1, amends House Bill 1480 on page 6, lines 7 and 29 by deleting '5%' and inserting in lieu thereof '5%' and on page 7 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Yourell."

Yourell: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen, Amendment #1 and #2 were suggested by the township officials and ah... they were Committee Amendments and I move the adoption of Committee Amendment #1



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Would the Sponsor explain the Amendment? This has to do with increasing tax rates for county..... or I mean townships ah..

Road Commissioners and I think it is important?"

Yourell: "Yes, ah... really Amendment #1 simply had the bridges in the ah... Act and this took in all of the road district Amendment and placed in it a referendum. So before any tax levy can be increased, it has to be by referendum."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Is it by the Amendment or by the Bill itself that you're doubling the rate?"

Yourell: "The Bill took care of the rate and ah... Amendment #1 took care of the area concerned and the referendum."

Schlickman: "Ah... shouldn't that .05% in line 4 be underscored, by the way?"

Yourell: I didn't hear you. What page?"

Schlickman: "Amendment #1...."

Yourell: "Ya."

Schlickman: "Line 4. You're deleting and inserting and I'm just suggesting that the part you're inserting should be underscored."

Yourell: "You mean after the word, 'thereof'?"

Schlickman: "Yes, Sir."

Yourell: "Ya. Well, is that a technical Amendment that we can change, Representative Schlickman?"

Schlickman: "I assume so."

Speaker Redmond: "Rerpesentative Palmer."

Palmer: "Is the Sponsor will yield, ah.. what does Amendment #2 do?"

Yourell: "It puts in the entire road district and the referendum."

Palmer: "Is this for ah... township as well as Commission County Rural

Distrct?"

Yourell: "Yes."

Palmer: "Throughout the state?"

Yourell: "Yes."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of Amendment #1 to

House Bill 1480. All in favor of the adoption signify by saying 'aye'



and the opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and Amendment #1 is adopted.

Are there any further Amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment #2, amends House Bill 1480 on page 3, line 26 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Yourell."

Yourell: "Yes, that ah... Amendment #2 changes the ah... the rate from .125 to .25."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Would the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates that he will."

Schlickman: "As I look at the Amendment, what you're doing is restoring the rates to what they presently are?"

Yourell: "Well, I don't have a copy of the Amendment. Do you want to take it out of the record?"

Schlickman: "I have no objection to the Amendment, I just wanted to make sure that ah...."

Yourell: "I don't have a copy of it, I'm sorry."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Palmer."

Palmer: "Will that apply to urban townships or downstate townships?"

Yourell: "All townships."

Palmer: "Well, where is it needed? Who requested it? That's a big jump."

Yourell: "Well, I'll tell you what happened. The townships officials and the road district guys indicated by many letters and petitions received by the Members of the General Assembly that they ah... wanted to use a share of the state income tax ah.. for this purpose because when they ah... took away ah... some years ago, the ability to raise the levy in the downstate road districts, they had no way to go. So I ah... Tom McMasters and I decided that the state income tax was not the proper place to go and that a compromise Bill should be drawn up with the increase in the rate, but with a referendum. That's the genisis of the Bill."

Palmer: "Ya, but my question was, ah... where is it really needed?"

Yourell: "Pardon me?"

Palmer: "Where is it really needed? In what townships?"

Yourell: "All of the downstate road districts need this because they



don't have any money."

Palmer: "All right, fine."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of Amendment #2 moved by the Gentleman from Cook. All in favor indicated by saying 'aye' and the opposed 'no' and the Amendment is adopted. Are there any further Amendments? No further Amendments. Third Reading. 1521."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1521, Craig. A Bill for an Act to create the Auctioneers Licensing Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1528."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1528, VonBoeckman. A Bill for an Act to amend the Civil Administrative Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1554, Representative Geo-Karis."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1554, Geo-Karis. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act creating the Board of Higher Education. Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments. Amendment #1, amends House Bill 1554 on page 1 by striking lines 16 through 17 and inserting in lieu thereof the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Would you repeat that ah... Amendment #2 because I've filed four Amendments and ah....do you have the other four?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment #1, amends House Bill 1554 on page 1 by striking lines 16 through 17 and inserting in lieu thereof the following: 'of the Senate'."

Geo-Karis: "How many Amendments do you have in your book there?"

Jack O'Brien: "Two Committee Amendments and four Floor Amendments."

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker, I wonder if I can have leave? The four Amendments that I have already filed on the House floor ah... two of them I've taken in as those two and I just wonder if I could have leave to table those from the Committee because I have them again in here and



they can go in sequence?"

Speaker Redmond: "You want to ah.... be more specific. You want to table

Amendment # 1 and #2?"

Geo-Karis: "And then I can just bring them up ah... I have them here. I've already filed them again on the House floor. Perhaps I misunderstood and consequently they're already on file with the House floor."

Speaker Redmond: "Two Amendments.... four Amendments and two of them are ah...."

Geo-Karis: "The two that were #1 and #2 before....."

Speaker Redmond: "I see. Is there any objection to the lady tabling

Amendments #1 and #2? No objection. They're tabled. Now Amendment #1.

Jack O'Brien: "Amendments #1 and #2 are tabled. Floor Amendment #3,

Geo-Karis. Amends House Bill 1554 on page 1, line 14 by striking '19'

and inserting in lieu thereof '20'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "That's Amendment #3, is that correct?"

Speaker Redmond: "Yes."

Geo-Karis: "Amendment #3 ah... simply says that ah... none of the members representing public or non-public institutions may vote on the budget recommendations being made with respect to any institution and it reiterates the same fact that the student members will have no vote on either budget or policy. I move the adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of the Amendment.

Representative McClain."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ms. Geo-Karis, would you mind explaining that a little bit more in detail, please?"

Geo-Karis: "O'kay. Amendment #3 simply says ah... it amends House Bill 1554 on page 2 by striking line 9 and inserting in lieu thereof the following: 'none of the.....'... it's subject to ah... to subsequent Senate approval ah... 'none of the members representing public or non-public institutions may vote on the budget recommendations to be made with respect to any institution and the student members shall have no vote on either budget or policy matters.' I understand, at the present time, Mike, that the student does not have the right to



vote on either budget or policy matters. That's my understanding."

McClain: "So what you're saying is your giving them the right to vote."

Geo-Karis: "No, ah.. I said ah.... and the students members shall have no vote on either budget or policy matters."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further, Representative McClain."

McClain: "No, thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of Amendment #3 to
House Bill 1554. All in favor say 'aye' and the opposed 'no' and
the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Amendment #4."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment #4, Geo-Karis. Amends House Bill 1554 on page 1
by striking lines 16 through 17 and inserting in lieu thereof the
following."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "All right, Amendment #4 amends House Bill 1554 so that it will read as follows: 'the respective chairmen chairpersons of the Board of Trustees of' and by striking line 22 and inserting in lieu thereof the following, 'Board' and unfortunately, when the Bill was drafted, they had 'non-voting members and it should have been, 'and also three persons representing'. In other words, there still voting members. There was an error when the Bill was being drafted and they had 'non-voting' and they left them voting in the other matters in the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Deuster."

Deuster: "Mr. Speaker, I've been trying to follow this and I've had a little difficulty understanding what's going on and I don't have the Amendments here. Maybe ah.... I don't know whether they've been distributed or ah.... has it? O'kay."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Stone."

Stone: "Mr. Speaker, I can't seem to find these Amendments either. I am very interested in the Bill, I wonder ah... if we could take it out of the record until tomorrow?"

Speaker Redmond: "We better take it out of the record. We tabled #1 and #2 and we adopted #3 and then took it out of the record at that time.

Representative Washburn."

Washburn: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House,



you just mentioned ah.. private caucuses ah... and there's been a lot private caucuses around here. Most of the Members are concerned about when we're going to get out of here tonight. I know that the Methodists have a dinner and I guess Bishop Washburn has invited every Methodist but me and ah... this '19 Association.... Industrial Association that were in here this morning, I know have invited their legislators to have dinner with them. In fact, the group of the whole are having a reception right now from 5:00 to 7:00 and I don't know how many other things there are going on, but ah... might I suggest that we've made considerable progress here and I know the work load is heavy, but we've made considerable progress today, despite the time off for the bomb scare. I think it would be well if we could be excused in the ah... not too distant future so perhaps we could attend some of these functions and relax tonight."

Speaker Redmond: "It has been the intention of the Chair to adjourn at 8:00 and the reason for that is that we have approximately 1200 Bills in the ah... in the Chamber that we have to dispose of in about three weeks, which looks like 400 Bills a week and I hoped that we would be able to go until 8:00 today and ah... if we go along the way we have been going, I think we should be in pretty good posture."

Washburn: "Well, we've made good progress today, there's no doubt about that, but ah....I think ah.. because of that reason that we do ah... deserve a little reprieve tonight and ah.... the May 23rd deadline is quite uncertain, I would guess, in most of our minds at this point anyway."

Speaker Redmond: "I would think that ah... we should not disillusion ourselves into thinking that anything is going to happen to the May 23rd deadline, except that we're going to adhere to it. It takes 2/3 rd's vote in each Chamber and I don't see 2/3 rd's in either Chamber. Now it's perfectly all right with the Chair.... frankly, I don't have a Bill that I've sponsored here and aside from the pay of the compensation for the General Assembly, there isn't anything I really have a personal interest in. I think it's a better judgement that we go to at least 8:00 tonight."

Washburn: "Could I ask this then, Mr. Speaker, so that the Membership



would know; is it your intention to go until about 8:00 every night this week?"

Speaker Redmond: "Well, I don't say every night. If we make as much progress as we seem to have done today, ah... we may be able to do a little bit differently than that, but ah... Representative Miller."

Miller: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, from time to time there are various groups that come to Springfield and various events that carry people out of this Chamber and up to Chicago to attend political events or whatever the case might be and ah... all that we ask of you, Mr. Speaker and the Leadership on the other side of the aisle, is to give due consideration to the activities of this evening. Now we have other events that are going to be coming up between now and May 23rd and I think that if we collectively try to attend all that are important and then come back here and work hard in the off hours, we'll achieve our goal and not go through the detriment of this House."

Speaker Redmond: "I think I see some indication over there that we should continue, is that correct? House Bill 1554 is taken out of the record.

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1587. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act creating the Department of Children and Family Services. Second Reading of the Bill. Four Committee Amendments. Amendment #1, amends House Bill 1587 on page 7 by adding line 16 to include that this Amendatory Act takes effect on July 1, 1975."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Barnes."

House Bill 1587."

Barnes: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. Amendment #1 to House Bill 1587 is merely a clean-up Amendment. It's a Committee Amendment and it puts in the effective date and I would move for the adoption of Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1587. All in favor say 'aye' and all opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and Amendment #1 is adoption. Are there any further Amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment #2, amends House Bill 1587 on page 5, lines 12
and 13 by deleting 'appropriations made to this department' and so
forth."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Barnes."

Barnes: "Actually, Mr. Speaker, that's ah... Representative Grotberg's

Amendment, but ah.. it ah... again clears up some language in the

Section of the Bill as it relates to the revolving funds. I would move
for the adoption of that Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #2 to House Bill 1587. All in favor of the adoption say 'aye' and all opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and Amendment is adopted. Are there any further Amendments."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment #3, amends House Bill 1587 on page 6, line 6 by deleting 'shall' and inserting in lieu thereof 'may'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Barnes."

Barnes: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Amendment #3 does exactly what it says it does. It's makes this permissive. It changes ah... it deletes the word 'shall' and inserts the word 'may'. I would move for the adoption of Amendment #3."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #3 to House Bill 1587. The question is on the adoption of Amendment #3 to House Bill 1587. All in favor say 'aye' and all opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Are there any further Amendments?"

Advertising Control Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee
Amendment. Amends House Bill 1594 by adding the following thereto and
so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Barnes. Take that out of the record. Is

Representative Caldwell in the Chamber? Representative Berman? There's

Caldwell. 1618."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1618, Caldwell. A Bill for an Act to amend the Condominium Property Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 1618 on page 1 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Caldwell."

Caldwell: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this ah... is a Committee
Amendment and has to do with some definitions in connection with the
ah... Condominium Bills, which came out of ah... the Condominium
Study ah.. in a package of Bills and was introduced and ah... Mr.
Cook of the Real Estate Association ah... and it was agreed and ah...

As I recall, it was an Amendment to clean up some language that was agreed on by all of the Members of the Sub-Committee and was approved in Committee. Perhaps Representative Merlo recalls what it was. Is he on the floor? Do you want to read the Amendment, Jack?"

Jack O'Brien: "Ah... amends House Bill 1628 on page 1 in line 24 by inserting immediately after 'be' the phrase 'for any addition' and by deleting lines 27 and 28 and inserting in lieu thereof 'common surplus for each unit' and on page 2 on line 1 by deleting 'four' and inserting in lieu thereof 'five'."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion on the Amendment?"

Telcser: "This is a technical Amendment, Mr. Speaker. There's no substantive change ah... and the Bill itself deals with condominium associations and condominium properties who add extra land or space to their property and the Amendment is of no substantive nature whatsoever."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1628. All in favor say 'aye' and the opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Are there any further Amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further."

Speaker Redmond: "No further Amendments. Third Reading. 1633."
Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1633, Peters. A Bill for an Act to amend the Condominium Property Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 1633 on page 1 by deleting line 22 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Peters."



Peters: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, the Amendment offered to 1633 was an Amendment that was agreed to by all participants from the Sub-Committee and the Full Committee. It does make some technical changes ah... and certain discriptions are made in a part of the Act and not made in the other at ah... and it makes one Section to conform to the other. It sets up ah.. some procedures for ah... termination in terms of a disillusioned condominium ownership. Basically, Mr. Speaker, it's technical changes and clean-up changes in the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Do you move the adoption?"

Peters: "I move the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1633. All in favor indicate by saying 'aye' and the opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted.

Any further Amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further."

Speaker Redmond: "No further Amendments. 1635. Third Reading on 1633."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1635, Peters. A Bill for an Act to amend
the Condominium Property Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One
Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 1635 on page 1, line 21 and
so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Mr. Peters."

Peters: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, there was some question with regard to 1635 as to how a particular unit within evaluated.

a condominium was to be/ This Amendment provides that that evaluation should be made ah... or that determination made by the Board of Mangers of the condominium."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1635. All in favor indicate by saying 'aye' and all opposed by saying 'no' and the 'ayes' have it.... the Amendment is lost. The Amendment is adopted. Are there any further Amendments? No further Amendments. Third Reading. 1631."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1631, Lundy. A Bill for an Act to amend the Condominium Property Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee



Amendment. Amends House Bill 1631 on page 1 by deleting lines 8 through 11 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lundy."

Lundy: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House,
Amendment #1 to House Bill 1631 was an Amendment agreed to in
Subcommittee by the sponsor of the Bill, myself, and the Members
of the Subcommittee, was suggested by the real estate industry
to clarify the original intent of the Bill that escrow deposits
...that...that escrow accounts set up for initial pre-purchase
deposit would not prevent a purchaser from ordering extra work
and paying for it separately, the escrow requirement to satisfy
the Bill would not apply to that extra work and the money paid
for it. I move adoption of Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1631. All in favor of the adoption say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it; the Amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? No further Amendments. Third Reading. 1639.

Representative Merlo."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1639. Merlo. A Bill for an Act to amend the Condominium Property Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 1639 on page 1 by deleting lines 11 through 14 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Merlo."

Merlo: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, the Amendment reduces from 180 to 120 days the notice period to a tenant by the developer of the proposed building conversion. It also increases from 60 days to 90 days of an expiring lease as the period of time in which a developer can show a unit that is for sale. And I move the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1639. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it; the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments? No further Amendments. Third Reading. 1640."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1640. Williams. A Bill for an Act to amend



the Condominium Property Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 1640 on page 1 in line 20 by inserting and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Williams."

Williams: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this is another in a series of Condominium Bills. The Amendment...it was felt necessary to give the Board of Managers the power to approve the relocation of unit boundaries so that the relocation could not proceed in a haphazard manner detrimental to the best interest of the property. I move the adoption of Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1640. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments? No... Third Reading. Third Reading on 1640. 1641."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1641. Williams. A Bill for an Act to amend the Condominium Property Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 1641 on page 1, line 23, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Williams."

Williams: "This Amendment, it was felt necessary to give the Board of Managers the power to approve the subdivision of unit boundaries so that, again, each subdivision could not proceed in a haphazard manner detrimental to the best interests of the property. I move the adoption of Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1641. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it; the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments? No further Amendments. Third Reading. 1642."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1642. A Bill for an Act to amend the Condominium Property Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 1642 on page 2 and line 11 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Williams."

Williams: "This Amendment is a Committee Amendment. In lines 1 through 4, the...there's a word there 'disposition'. It was felt that it was



vague and we substituted the word 'conveyance' so that the time of occurrence can be definietly fixed in lines 5 through 14 because this election provided for 'actually can take place at a time before the developer has conveyed a majority of his units, he should be entitled to proportional representation on the Board in the portion thereof that is not the majority'. And in lines 15 through 19, it says 'the unit owners can take over at a time actually before the sale, a process would be finished, contracts of not more than three years ought to be allowed to continue without the cancellation by the unit owners'. I move the adoption of Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of Amendment #1 to
House Bill 1642. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have
it; the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments? No further
Amendments. 1645. Third Reading. 1645. Representative Flinn in
the chamber? 1656. Representative Williams."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1656. Williams. A Bill for an Act to create an Act to regulate certain practices of mortgage lenders in the administration of escrow accounts. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 1656 on page 1, line 12, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Williams."

Williams: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, this is the first I knew that this...this was off the consent calendar. I had it marked down that it passed and was sent down here on May 2nd. I know of no reason that it was taken off. It passed out of Committee on unanimous vote on the consent calendar, I've heard no opposition to it, but I just noticed that its back on Second Reading. I don't know why, but..."

Speaker Redmond: "Mr. Clerk, was it taken off the consent calendar."
Williams: "The Committee Amendment was worked out in a Subcommittee by
the Savings and Loan Association and I thought it was all agreed, in
fact, I thought it was on the consent calendar, this is the first I
new it was taken off the consent calendar."

Speaker Redmond: "Somebody objected, Representative Williams, so do you move the adoption of the Amendment?"



Williams: "Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "Amendment #1 to House Bill 1656. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments? Third Reading. 1658. Representative Geo-Karis."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1658. Geo-Karis. A Bill for an Act to amend the Animal Control Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "No Amendments from the floor. Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "I wonder if I can hold that on Second Reading because I'm
 expecting an Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the record. 1659. Representative..."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1659. Carroll. A Bill for an Act to amend

the Illinois Public Aid Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1665. Representative Macdonald, do you want to call that?"

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1665..."

Speaker Redmond: "Take that out of the record. 1669. Representative Mugalian."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1669. Mugalian. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Mugalian. Amends House Bill 1669 in line 14 by changing 'January' to 'July'."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Mugalian."

Mugalian: "That's exactly what the Amendment does, it extends the effective date by six months. Instead of January 1, it'll be July 1."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1669. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it; the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?



No further Amendments. Third Reading. 1680. Representative Giglio."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1680. Giglio. A Bill for an Act to amend
the Illinois Aeronautics Act. SEcond Reading of the Bill. One
Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 1680 by deleting Section
23(d) and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giglio."

Giglio: "I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of

Committee Amendment #1 to House Bill 1680. Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "What does it do?"

Speaker Redmond: "Will you explain the Amendment, Reprsentative Giglio?"

Giglio: "Actually what the Amendment is is to change the Aeronautics Act that we had last year and what it does is to put the emphasis on the student rather than those that have completed their training for parachute jumpers. Gene."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Well that apparently is contained in the Bill that was introduced and I'm wondering, specifically, what the Amendment does.

You say it changes the emphasis as to what?"

Giglio: "Well the original...the original Bill stated that all persons who came under the Act and the Department of Transportation found that it was unreasonable to implement this because of the expense and the manpower. So what they did, they made the liability and they put the emphasis on the student jumper and they made the airport have the liability and made the student have the insurance and they made it mandatory to have twenty-five hours before you completed your training as a parachute jumper. Now what they did then, they took the restrictions off those who completed their training and if these people wanted to jump on their own iniative, once you got your ticket, then it was your responsibility. What they found out that when they-put it together it was just too much, but in order to maintain the safety because of what happened and how this thing came aoubt last year, they made it so strict that it was just unbearable and unreasonable to enforce, so rather than do away with it completely. they put the emphasis on the student to protect the student. Once



you've got your ticket, then..a...you're on your own."

Schlickman: "Are you suggesting that this is a 'DOT' Amendment?"

Giglio: "A what Gene?"

Schlickman: "A Department of Transportation Amendment?"

Giglio: "I would...I would say yes with the support of the Paratroop
Association and all those that do jump. There was no opposition
in the Committee. We had the people from the Department of
Transportation and the people from the Parachute Association from
the State of Illinois and also affiliated with the country."

Schlickman: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any further discussion? The question is on the adoption of the Amendment #1 to House Bill 1680. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it; the Amendment is adopted.

Any further Amendments? No further Amendments. Third Reading. 1683."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1683. Yourell. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act regarding the fees for the Sheriff, Recorder of Deeds, and County Clerks. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Yourell. Amends House Bill 1683 on page 2, by inserting immediately after line 16, the following. 'Section 2.' This Amendatory Act of 1975 is not a limit on any county, which is a home rule unit, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Yourell."

Yourell: "A...yes...a...Thank you Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this Amendment #1, House Amendment #1, to 1683 is the limit on any county, which is a home rule unit. No limit on any county with a home rule unit. I move for the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of the Amendment.

Representative Palmer."

Palmer: "If the sponsor will yield for a question or two."

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Palmer: "Representative Yourell, what is the real need to exempt...

there's only one home rule county and that's Cook. Now what...

what's...what's the reason for exempting Cook County?"

Yourell: "Well I don't know. That's a standard Amendment, as I under-



stand it, if you've had any dealings with Al Green or Lou Schwartz, you know what happened. I don't know why they need it, but its there."

Palmer: "Well, that's to give them the control over it. Would that be so?"

Yourell: "Whatever you say, sir."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of Amendment #1 to
House Bill 1683. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes...
the ayes have it; the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?
No further Amendments. Third Reading. 1687."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1687. Getty. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relation to the regulation of persons engaged in the practice of funderal directing and embalming. Second Reading of the Bill.

One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 1687 on page 1, line 17, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Getty."

Getty: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Representative DiPrima, the Chairman of the Veterans Affairs, Registration and Regulation Committee has offered Amendment #2. I would, therefore, ask leave to table Committee Amendment #1 in favor of Representative DiPrima's Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objection? Leave is granted to table Amendment #1 ...any other Amendments? Mr. Clerk? There is no Amendment #2 on the desk. Representative DiPrima. Do we have it? Its not printed we'll have to take the Bill out of the record. 1693. Representative Chapman. 1693."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1693. Chapman. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 1693 on page 1, lines 1 and 5, by deleting 'Sections' and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Chapman."

Chapman: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, this Amendment provides for the recycling of loan dollars in the Illinois State Scholarship Commission Loan Guaranty Program. It will improve the accountability of the I.S.S.C. to the General Assembly by a more accurate describing of the real cost to the State for defaults in the Student



Loan Program. I move for the adoption of Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the adoption.....

Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "How?"

Chapman: "Ah.... Cal, I have a very good memo that I would be happy to share with you, but ah.. what happens now is, as you may know, 80% of the cost of default in the Loan Program are picked up by the federal government and go directly to the General Revenue Fund. Under this proposal, there will be a concept that provides for recycling so that the current appropriation of \$4,000,000 actually doesn't accurately discribe the amount that the defaults are costing us. The cost to the state is actually \$500,000 and the use of this fund will accurately describe just how much this is costing to us and make it possible for a lower appropriation to be made so that the Illinois State Scholorship Commission, instead of asking for \$4,000,000 will be in a position to only request \$500,000 for this particular matter."

Skinner: "I presume that this Amendment that you're talking about has

nothing to do with the Bill that's in the digest."

Chapman: "Cal, let me tell you how this came about. There were requests for two separate Bills and this is the only Bill that got lost in the shuffle of the last minute filing. The Legislative Reference Bureau had the request well in advance, but they're are doing a good job for us and this was just the only Bill where I had a problem and this was an important matter and so I introduced what was to be a separate Bill in the form of an Amendment to House Bill 1693. So it is germane. House Bill 1693 is an Amendment to the Illinois State Scholarship Commission and the Amendment also relates to the Illinois State Scholarship Commission and this was ah... my way of correcting a problem that had occured."

Skinner: "I think I would like to have a copy of the Amendment. Thank you, very much. Mr. Speaker, I wonder if we could have a record vote on one of these Amendments so we may find out if there are a majority of the Members in the General Assembly who have managed to stay through dinner."

Speaker Redmond: "I think that takes five people to join with you. O'kay.



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The question is then on the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1693.

All those in favor of the adoption vote 'aye' and all those opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Representitive Dunn, 'aye'.

Ralph Dunn. Have all voted who wish? On this question there are ah... Capuzi, 'aye'..... 98 'aye' and l'no' and Representative Catania, 'aye' and the motion ah... Leon, 'aye' and the Amendment is adopted.

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, I have tried to get a hold of the Sponsor of this Bill, Representative Garmisa, he's been ill, and ah... talk to him about this Amendment. I haven't been successful in doing that. I wonder if this Bill could be taken out of the record."

Speaker Redmond: "We'll take it out of the record 1827, Representative Sharp?"

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1827, Sharp. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Sharp."

Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative Sharp on the floor? We'll have to take it out of the record. 1832."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1832, Mann. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act relating to alcoholic liquors. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative Mann on the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amends House Bill 1832 on page 1, 2, 3 and 4 by striking everything after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mann. Was that your Amendment?"

Mann: "Yes, this was the ah... Bill, Mr. Speaker, which would permit the sale of ah.. wine and beer in the faculties on the campuses at



state institutions. The Amendment merely clarifies that because the Bill, in its original form, included faculty lounges and wasn't needed. I urge the adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1832. All in favor say 'aye' and the opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted.

Are there any further Amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further."

Speaker Redmond: "No further Amendments. Third Reading. 1843."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1843, Coffey."

Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative Coffey on the floor? Proceed, House Bill 1843."

Jack O'Brien: "A Bill for an Act to amend the Surface Mine Land Conservation and Reclamation Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Two

Committee Amendments. Amendment #1, amends House Bill 1843 on page 3,

line 24 by striking the word 'impact' and inserting in lieu thereof the word 'impact'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Coffey."

Coffey: "There's two Amendments here. One is just a correction of a misspelled word on this ah... first Amendment. On the second Amendment it is ah.... ah.. it was left out 'to be effected' was left out when the Amendment was put on.... when the first Amendment was put on. Just two technical errors that were corrected."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1843. All in favor say 'aye' and the opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted."

Fredric B. Selcke: "Committee Amendment #2, amend House Bill 1843 on page 1 by deleting lines 24, 25, and 26 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Coffey."

Coffey: "O'kay, on Amendment #2 is ah.. the Section that is marked as ah... effect ah... to change from a half a mile to one and a half miles of any muncipality."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Coffey, do you move the adoption?" Coffey: "I move the adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of Amendment #2 to



House Bill 1843. All in favor of the adoption say 'aye' and the opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted.

Are there any further Amendments?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "Amendment #3, Coffey. Amend House Bill 1843 on page 1 by deleting and so forth."

Coffey: "This Amendment ah... is just a technical error to change ah... to add to ah.. 'to be effected' that was left out."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hart."

Hart: "I was trying to get your attention on Amendment #2. I don't think it is technical..... technically incorrect form. I question whether or not that Amendment should be adopted in the condition in which it was drawn. I think all that language should be underlined."

Speaker Redmond: "I've been advised by the Clerk that it will be underlined."

Hart: "Well, then I wanted to ask some questions about it. I think there is more to it than just what Representative Coffey has stated about ah... the Amendment. It seems to me that it changes it from one half mile to one and a half miles and I wanted to ask him if that was correct. I had a question of the Sponsor."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Coffey, will you respond to the question?'
Coffey: "Mr. Speaker, we are on Amendment #3, but I did say that that

Coffey: "Mr. Speaker, we are on Amendment #3, but I did say that that was changed from one half mile to a mile an a half."

Hart: "Well, I didn't hear you say that and ah... I wanted to speak on that Amendment."

Coffey: "Mr. Speaker, I think that Amendment has already been adopted and I would be glad to talk to him further if he would like to on this Amendment. If he would like to come over."

Speaker Redmond: "Do you want to take it out of the record and discuss it with Representative Coffey?"

Hart: "Had Amendment #2 already been adopted."

Speaker Redmond: "Yes, it has."

Hart: "Well, I think I would have liked to have gotten the Speaker's attention when the Amendment was discussed on the floor and I would appreciate it when I put my light on if you would try and recognize



the Members. I know that not many of these are controversial, but some of them are."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, let's take it out of the record and you and
Representative Coffey discuss it and we'll see if we can work it out.
Representative Coffey."

Coffey: "Mr. Speaker, I would be glad to hold that on Third Reading and talk this over with him. That Amendment was accepted."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hart."

Hart: "Well, just for the record, I vote to move to reconsider the vote by which Amendment #2 was adopted. I did vote for it because I understood the Sponsor explained it that it was technical in nature. So I move that we reconsider the vote by which Amendment #2 was adopted."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved to.... Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Mr. Speaker, I would object to that. You stated earlier today that an oral Roll Call...."

Speaker Redmond: "You're correct."

Schlickman: "We could not tell who was on the prevailing side. Now

Mr. Chote, we knew was on the prevailing side because it was his

Amendment. I would further point out that the Sponsor of Amendment #2

did say and I did hear him say, ah.. that there was an extension from

one half mile to one and a half miles."

Speaker Redmond: "The Chair would appreciate it if the Sponsor would agree to hold this measure on the order of Second Reading and let Representative Hart and Representative Coffey discuss it and we'll call it on the order of Second Reading and see where we go with Amendment #3. I know it.... is that agreeable? Representative Coffey."

Coffey: "Mr. Speaker, could we go ahead and adopt Amendment #3 and then hold it on Second Reading?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hart."

Hart: "Well, I had moved to reconsider the vote by which Amendment #2 was adopted. I showed, for the record, that I had voted on the prevailing side, if anybody questions that.... well, let them question



it, but I ah... think my word is good on that."

Speaker Redmond: "The only problem is that I had previously ruled and I think rightly so, and the rules provide that you can't move to reconsider unless there's been a record Roll Call."

Hart: "Yes, but you haven't consistently held that way and ah... I guess if you're going to do it for one Bill and you should do it for all of them or not do it for one Bill and not do it for any of them. I know earlier in the day that we did reconsider a vote on a Bill ah... a voice vote on an Amendment and ah... so what's good for one Bill is

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Stone."

good for another."

Stone: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen, ah... I would hope that the Sponsor would leave the Bill where it is. I know that Representative Hart represents and area that is very very much concerned with this type of Bill. He is much concerned about this Amendment. I'm sure that he and the good Sponsor can get together and I would hope that ah... that it could be held here."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Washburn."

Washburn: "Mr. Speaker, if I understood the Sponsor when I was standing back there along side him, he said he would do exactly that; however he has ah... another Amendment and ah... we've adopted Amendment #1 and #2 and he has a third one that he's offered and certainly that should be acted upon and I'm sure that he'll keep his word that it will remain on Second Reading."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain."

McClain: "Mr. Speaker, I don't ah... we don't have a copy of Amendment #3 back here anyway so we would ask him to hold it anyway."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hart."

Hart: "Ah..now I have a copy of Amendment #3 and it appears to me that it is the same as Amendment #2 except that it's in technically correct form. I raised the question about Amendment #2 being in form because of the fact that it was not underlined. It was new language being inserted in the Statutes and it was not underlined and somebody said that it was corrected, but I don't believe it was corrected and apparently #3, which we're on now, was offered for the purpose of



correcting #2, so...a....it would seem to be in order that #2 be tabled by the Gentleman from...a...Coles and...a...or Vermillion and then #3 could be offered and if he would agree to hold the Bill, I'd like to talk to him about it."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Coffey."

Coffey: "Mr. Speaker, I would be glad to table Amendment #2 and add #3 and hold it on Second Reading."

Speaker Redmond: "I don't think we can do that. I think now Amendment
#3 is on reconsider....under consideration, I think you'd have to
ask for consideration on Amendment #3 be referred and then get after
#2."

Totten: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. I think what he can do is exactly what Representative Choate did. He's the sponsor of the Amendment, I'm sure...I'm certain your sure he voted on the prevailing side. The sponsor could move to reconsider the vote by which Amendment #2 was adopted and...a...once that is done, he can table Amendment #2 and we can proceed with Amendment #3."

Speaker Redmond: "I think that Representative Choate would pull Amendment #3 or what ever it was from consideration."

Totten: "Yeh, but he moved to reconsider the vote because he was the sponsor on an oral Roll Call..."

Speaker Redmond: "It had been adopted evidently. Amendment #3 still hasn't been voted on. So we are still on consideration of Amendment #3..."

Totten: "No, wait, the spon...the sponsor would like to, if he could, pull #3 out of the record because we have no Roll Call on that; move to reconsider the vote by which Amendment #2 was adopted. He would move that and then table Amendment #2 and proceed with Amendment #3."

Speaker Redword: "Now we're on the same ways length. Respectively.

Speaker Redmond: "Now we're on the same wave length. Representative Coffey."

Coffey: "Mr. Speaker, I would move to withdraw...a...take off the record the Third Amendment and ask to reconsider the Second."

Speaker Redmond: "Leave. That's kind of a short cut, but...now Representative Coffey. Representative Coffey."

Coffey: "Okay, I would like to move to table #2."



Speaker Redmond: "Leave? Amendment #2 is tabled. Now where is we?"

Coffey: "Now I'd like to move to adopt Amendment #3."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hart."

Hart: "I'd like, at this point, to ask the sponsor to take this Bill out of the record. In the first place, I don't think Amendment #3 has been circulated among the Membership, and secondly, I've got to talk to him about it before we vote on it."

Speaker Redmond: "I've been advised by the Assistant Clerk that the

Amendment has not been distributed, so I think that ends it for the

moment. Take 1843 out of the record. It is to be held on the order

of Second Reading. Amendment #2 has been adopted...Amendment #1 is

adopted, #2 is tabled, #3 is coming up. 1851. 1851. Representative

Kelly on the floor?"

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1851. An Act in relation to abortions to establish penalties for violation thereof and to repeal an Act herein named. Second Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative Kelly on the floor? Take that out of the record. The sponsor isn't here."

Fred Selcke: "Okay."

Speaker Redmond: "1886. Representative Washburn."

Fred Selcke: "1886. A Bill for an Act..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Washburn."

Washburn: "Thank you Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House,

I think you'll find that 1886 hasn't even been printed yet."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, we won't take any chances. 1890."

Fred Selcke: "1890. Just a minute, George. 1890. Give me 1890.

An Act to amend Section 1 of the Title of an Act creating to the Division of Special Supervision of the Department of Registration and Education. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Fred Selcke: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "None. Third Reading. 1912."

Fred Selcke: "1912. A Bill for an Act in relation to County Zoning.

Second Reading of the Bill. One Commit....er a wait a minute. Two

Committee Amendments. Committee Amendment #1. Amend House Bill 1912



on page 1 after line 33 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption...1912?....

Representative Tuerk."

Tuerk: "Mr. Speaker, Amendment #1 is the Home Rule Amendment, it does not apply to any county which is a home rule unit so I move for the adoption of that Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1912. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no.

The ayes have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Fred Selcke: "Committee Amendment #2. Amend House Bill 1912, page 1, line 33, by inserting immediately before the period the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tuerk."

Tuerk: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, This Bill, 1912, sets a little different situation on the number of votes required on protest of county regulations where a protest is filed. What this Amendment does is say that it goes from 3/4's of those of the entire Board to 3/4's of those voting on the question, but not less than the majority of all the members of the County Board. Speaker Redmond: "Representative Dan Houlihan."

Houlihan: "A quick question of the sponsor. Could you tell me what the rationale of the Amendment is? I mean what is the reason for diluting the 3/4's requirement?"

Tuerk: "You mean in the original Bill or in the Amendment?"

Houlihan: "Well perhaps, Fred, I'm not following you. Doesn't the

Amendment, as I understand what you've said, a...a...effect the Bill

to bringing about the change instead of having a 3/4's requirement

of all members of the County Board, you'll only have to have 3/4's

of the members of those voting on the question."

Houlihan: "Alright."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? The question is on the adoption of Amendment #2 to House Bill 1912. All in favor say aye.

Oposed, no. The ayes have it; the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments? No further Amendments. Third Reading. 1851."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1851. Kelly. A Bill for an Act in relation to abortions to describe penalties and violations and to repeal an Act therein named. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee

Amendment. Amend House Bill 1851, page 1, by deleting everything after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kelly."

Kelly: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1. The Amendment was drafted because the original Bill was passed the date for your drafting Bills and I had to go with an earlier draft. But this is the Bill and it amends everything after the enacting clause, but the Committee gave its approval and I would hope that the House would also. I move for the adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman...Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Considering the subject matter, Mr. Speaker, I think it would be wise to have an explanation of the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis, for what purpose do you rise?"
Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I would
