Speaker Redmond: "Agreed Resolutions."

Selcke: "Ah... House Resolution 240, Mahar, et al. House Resolution 244, Hart, et al. House Resolution 245, Shea, et al. House Resolution 246, Madigan, et al. House Joint Resolution 45, Mugalian. House Joint Resolution 46, Mann, et al."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, and Members of the House. House Resolution 240, commends the Midlothian Fire Department which was founded in 1925, upon the celebration of its 50th Anniversary. House Resolution 244, commends Jchn Jankousky of Benton, who is a Senior at Benton Consolidated High School upon being selected as a National Merit Scholarship winner. House Resolution 245 ah... provides that ah... the name of State Representative Eugenia M. Chapman be changed to Chapperson. And House Resolution 246, commends the Reverend William J. Rogers upon the celebration of his 40th Anniversary in the Priesthood. House Joint Resolution 45, Memorializes the Armenian dead in the 1950... 1915 massacre which occurred in the Ottoman Empire. Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman from Cook has moved the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions. The question is on the adoption. Those in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Resolutions are adopted. Representative Washburn."



Washburn: "Yes, thank you ah.. Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. The purpose of ah... another introduction of the Government class of Washington Jr. High, from Peru. 200 strong taught by Mr. Clarence Dingerson, represented by Representative Anderson, Luft and VonBoeckman. Students would you... stand."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mudd."

Mudd: "Yes, Mr. Speaker ah... this morning when we ah... came into the Chambers the freshman were ah... will note that they received a... a gift from one of the ah... ah... Representatives, and I would like to, on behalf of all the freshmen, thank Representative Roscoe Cunningham for that token of friendship. Thank you, Rosco."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lundy."

Lundy: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I want... ah... Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I wonder if Representative Cunningham would now inform the freshmen and the other Members of the House which Bill it is, on his that's coming up today."

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates that it's a public service."

Lundy: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madison."

Madison: "Thank you, very much Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, as a freshman I too would like to thank Roscoe for the gift. I think he might have gotten a little mixed up in his symbolism through, because he gave me an elephant."

Speaker Redmond: "Introduction, First Reading."

O'Brien: "House Bill 3002, Shea, Collins. A Bill for an Act making ^{OPR} Appropriations for the State Board of Elections. First Reading of the



Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "General Resolutions."

O'Brien: "House Resolution 241, Porter and Neff."

Speaker Redmond: "Committee on Assignments."

Speaker Redmond: "Because of the press of business yesterday, we omitted Death Resolutions so we'll do them now. Death Resolutions."

O'Brien: "House Resolution 234. Respects the memory of Michael Nardulli.

House Resolution 242, Respects the memory of Mr. Joseph T. Plunkett.

House Resolution 243. With respect to memory of Richard "Two-Ton" Baker."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, I move for the adoption of the Death Resolutions."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of the Resolutions,

all in favor say 'aye', Opposed 'no'. The 'eyes' have it, the Resolutions are adopted."

Speaker Redmond: "Consent Calendar, Second Reading, Second Day."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Greiman... does Representative Katz desire recognition? Representative Washburn."

Washburn: "Ah... thank you, Mr. Speaker... Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Mr. Speaker, do you have any idea when the Calendar will be available for today... I hardly..."

Speaker Redmond: "We've had the delivery of 14."

Washburn: "I hardly see how we could proceed with anything that's on the Calendar until they have been placed on the Members' desks.

Ah... there's so much on there and ah... it's difficult to tell where Bills are and what order, or anything and I would suggest

that maybe we delay if they are going to be delivered in the near future, until they are on the Member's desk."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, I agree with you. There was no intention to proceed on anything that would..."

Washburn: "Fine."

Speaker Redmond: "Require the Calendar."

Washburn: "Fine."

Speaker Redmond: "The Calendar has been distributed to both sides..."

Anyone that doesn't have a Calendar would you let us know... you do not



have... No the full Calendar... the Pages, do you have sufficient Calendars... do you have it Jack?"

Speaker Redmond: "Agreed Resolutions, Representative Giorgi."

O'Brien: "House Resolution 247, Schoeberlein, et al."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, this is ah... by Representative Schoeberlein, Resolution 247. And it honors Mr. Howard A. Floyd, who is 'Man of the Year' for the Elgin Riverside Club and I move for the adoption of Agreed Resolution."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of the Agreed Resolution, all in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. Resolution is adopted."

Speaker Redmond: "The House will be in order, just as a matter of interest. We moved 298 Bills yesterday off Second Reading to the order of Third Reading."

Speaker Redmond: "The order of business, House Bills, Second Reading and House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 70."

O'Brien: "House Bill 70, Duff. A Bill for an Act concerning Fees, Allowances paid to Jurors. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor. No Amendments from the floor, Third Reading. House Bill 74."

O'Brien: "House Bill 74, Duff. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act concerning Fees and..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Duff."

Duff: "Mr. Speaker, ah... would you please take both of those Bills out of the record, I believe I made the Committee Chairman a promise on those and I want to check it out before I move them to Third."

Speaker Redmond: "House Bill 70, be returned to the order of Second Reading. House Bill 70 and 74 be taken out of the record."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Porter, on the floor?... Geo-Karis, House Bill 170."

O'Brien: "House Bill 170, Geo-Karis. A Bill for an Act creating Lake Michigan Shoreline Study Commission. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative LaFleur... Representative LaFleur."

LaFleur: "Do we have Calendars, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Redmond: "I... believe so."

LaFleur: "We have no Calendars here ah... in the back at all."

Speaker Redmond: "How many are without Calendars?"

LaFleur: "All this area in the back, is without Calendars... over here
Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "We've had ah... problem with the printer, he didn't
get the Calendars here on time ah... we have been running a shuttle
service back and forth. I thought we had enough now, evidently I
was in error. Would it be possible for the Members to consult
yesterday's Calendar, these are merely Second Reading Bills...
House Bill 170... I'll get it here someplace."

O'Brien: "House Bill 170. A Bill for an Act creating Lake Michigan
Shoreline Study Commission. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee
Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor."

O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "No Amendments from the floor, Third Reading. 236."

O'Brien: "House Bill 236. A Bill for...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brinkmeier, on the floor. Take it out
of the record.... Oh, you want..."

O'Brien: "House Bill 236. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act creating
an Advisory Commission on the Compensation of Appointed State Off-
icers, Elected Public Officials. Second Reading of the Bill. No
Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. 237."

O'Brien: "House Bill 237. A Bill for an Act creating an advisory Com-
mis... Committee on the Compensation of the General Assembly Memb-
ers. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. 338,
Representative Mugalian."

O'Brien: "House Bill 338. A Bill for an Act to create the Land Resources
Management Study Commission. Second Reading of the Bill. One Com-
mittee Amendment. Amend House Bill 338 on page 1, line 14, by



changing '2' to 'one', and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mugalian."

Mugalian: "This is an Amendment that ah... was approved by the... by the Committee and I urge its adoption. It makes some changes in the Bill, it tightens up the ah... the Study Commission Membership and it also calls for public hearings throughout the State. I move its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion. The gentleman has moved the adoption on Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 338. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

O'Brien: "Floor Amendments Number 2, Mugalian. Amend House Bill 338, as amended on page 1, Section 1, so forth."

Mugalian: "Mr. Speaker, floor Amendment Number 2, specifically designates as one of the Public Members of the Commission, a person appointed by the Southwestern Illinois Metropolitan and Regional Planning Commission. This is an Amendment that result... resulted from conversation at the Committee Hearing, in which Representative Calvo requested. I move its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the adoption of Amendment Number 2 to House Bill 338. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Third Reading. 414."

O'Brien: House Bill 414, Cunningham. A Bill for an Act creating the Illinois Medical School Admission Study Commission. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

O'Brien: "Amendment Number 1, Walsh, Cunningham. Amends House Bill 414 on page 1, line 1, in the title by deleting 'Illinois Medical' and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Cunningham."

Cunningham: "Well, this was an Amendment suggested by my esteemed friend, Bill Walsh that widens the scope of the ah... Commission Study. I think that it's worth while and urge its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Shea."



Shea: "This is the floor Amendment?"

Cunningham: "Well yes, in a matter of speaking, it is."

Shea: "Well, would you explain how it widens the scope in authority?"

Cunningham: "Well I would call on the... the father of the Amendment, Bill Walsh in that department. It's a ge... ah... very small addition ah... Representative Shea..."

Shea: "That's why I would like to find out about it."

Cunningham: "It merely suggests that the purpose of the Commission Study would be broadened to include the study of curriculum and along with the admission policy."

Shea: "Is Mr. Walsh..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Walsh, can you shed any light on the Amendment?"

Walsh: "Well... ah... Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. The sponsor of the Bill ah... accurately ah... defined it as far as he went, what we would hope to do is ah... with the Amendment, look into the admission policies ah... whether the curricular was such that ah... in the Medical School, was such that it was ah... too expensive to provide a sufficient number of Doctors to practice in this State ah... it extends it also to the practice of Dentistry the ah... scope of the Commission ah... and also extends it to ah... looking into Private as well as Public ah... Medical Schools."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? The question is on the adoption of the Amendment... all in favor of the adoption, say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

O'Brien: "Amendment Number 2, Cunningham. Amends House Bill 414, as amended in Section 4.02, by inserting Section 4.02 and so forth."

Cunningham: "Mr. Speaker, the second Amendment merely recites that the Commission shall work with and will receive assistance from the Illinois Board of Higher Education in its examination of the admissions policies of the concerned. And, this was put in at the request of ah... Director Lepper, and he felt that that should be there to recite the program that we would all be involved together in this effort. So, I urge the adoption of Amendment Number 2."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "Well... will the sponsor yield for question?"

Cunningham: "Surely."

Shea: "Mr. Walsh's Amendment broadens the scope to the Bill to include the Private Medical Colleges within the State. Your Amendment mandates cooperation with the Commission, what does it do to the Private Institutions in the terms of mandating?"

Cunningham: "Well, I don't see how that would be... there's any connection between those two positions, its just a pledge that we'll work with them."

Shea: "Well if it's a pledge or mandate, that's what I'm concerned about. The Private Institution receive substantial amount of State dollars and I would not want them to be put in jeopardy by failing to mandate or failing to cooperate with the Commission. Is there penalty for those Institutions?"

Cunningham: "None whatever."

Shea: "Thank you."

Cunningham: "Surely."

Cunningham: "Move the adoption of Amendment Number 2."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? The question is on the adoption of Amendment Number 2, to House Bill 414. All in favor say 'aye', all in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments? Third Reading. 437."

O'Brien: "House Bill 437, Cunningham. A Bill for an Act to amend the Fees and Salaries Act. Second Reading of the Bill. 1 Committee Amendments. Amends House Bill 347 on page 3, by deleting lines 22 and 23 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Cunningham."

Cunningham: "The Chair will recall that this ah... Bill was being held for a Fiscal Note and is now been furnished... give it to the ah... Clerk."

Speaker Redmond: "Has the Amendment previously been adopted?"

Cunningham: "Yes it was.... no, I move to adopt the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved the adoption of the Amendment, all in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'... Representative Giorgi, do



you seek recognition?"

Giorgi: "Yes, sir. To what extent... how much is the Fiscal Note, total?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Cunningham."

Cunningham: "A million, six-hundred and seventy-thousand."

Giorgi: "Is that ah... that has to do with the balance paid to Circuit is it your plan in your Bill to ah... to eliminate the ah... resident Circuit Judges in the Counties that don't ah... you might say, deserve one and replace them with associate judges when it comes time for their retention, is that your plan for this Bill?"

Cunningham: "No, we have no intent to downgrade the Judicial system in rural Illinois. Now, you would be interested to know, Representative Giorgi, that the whole purpose of this is to appropriate money for Cook and DuPage County, which is a long way from the 54th District, so where it is you that are being benefited and not we."

Giorgi: "But, I understand ah... Mr. Speaker, that ah... ah... with the impla... implementation of the new Constitution, we implemented ah... resident circuit judges for every down State County and some Judges, and then there are some Counties, I think there's a resident Circuit Judge for a County with a population of 3,000 people and we are going to be paying that Circuit Judge \$37,000 a year to administer our county with 3,000 people, which amounts to about ah... a hundred dollars..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Peters, for what purpose do you arise... Representative Peters."

Giorgi: "I'm sorry, 42...."

Peters: "Mr. Speaker, not to... to interrupt ah... Representative Giorgi, but I believe that we are on the Amendment now, which, all that has to do is change the effective date. I think those questions best be answered on Third Reading."

Speaker Redmond: "Point is well taken. The question is on the adoption of the Amendment. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The Amendment is adopted. Third Reading. 555."

O'Brien: "House Bill 555, LaFleur. A Bill for an Act to revise the Law in relation to divorce. Second Reading of the Bill. No, Committee Amendments."



Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "No floor Amendments, Third Reading. 559."

O'Brien: "House Bill 559, McMaster. A Bill for an Act to revise the provision of the State Revenue Sharing of local Governmental entity. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Is McMaster on the floor... take that out of the record. 563. I have been advised the sponsor of 555 desires to return it to the order of Second Reading, any objections... return to the order of Second Reading. 563... 600, Representative Grotberg."

O'Brien: "House Bill 600, Grotberg. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Municipal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. This Bill was read previously.... Amendment 1, was adopted... floor Amendment Number 2, Taylor. Amends House Bill 600 from page 1, line 1, by striking, so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Taylor."

Taylor: "Would you take it out of the record for a minute, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the record. 601."

O'Brien: "House Bill 601, Grotberg. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relation to County Zoning. Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments. Amendment Number 1, amend House Bill 601 on page 3, by inserting immediately after line 10 the following, so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Who's Amendment is that?"

O'Brien: "Grotberg."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Grotberg."

Grotberg: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 600 and 601 ah... are ah... the publication Bills and Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 601 was a home rule Amendment that we have negotiated intensively for a good ten days or two weeks. And, there is an agreement now and I so move to table Amendment Number 1."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved to table Amendment Number 1, any objections..."

Grotberg: "To House Bill 601."



Speaker Redmond: "Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 601 is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

O'Brien: "Ah... Committee... Committee Amendment Number 2, amends House Bill 601 on page 1, by striking line 1 and inserting in lieu thereof the following, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Grotberg."

Grotberg: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I... Amendment Number 2 ah... to House Bill 601 ah... merely includes the Zoning Board of Appeals in the Public Notice Act ah... to bring it into conformity and I would move for the adoption of Amendment Number 2, to House Bill 601."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 2, to House Bill 601. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment Number 2, is adopted. Any further Amendments. Representative Grotberg."

Grotberg: "Yes, Mr. Speaker. Ah... no further action on 601 but I think we could drop immediately back to also 600, if Representative Taylor or Mr. Shea is...."

Speaker Redmond: "House Bill 601 is moved to the order of Third Reading."

Grotberg: "You want to hold 600, Jerry? Okay, ah... take it out of the record, for a period. I would like to come back to and read it today, Mr. Speaker before he dies. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "687, Representative Giorgi.... I did on 601, Third Reading."

O'Brien: "House Bill 687, Giorgi. A Bill for an Act to amend the Bingo Licenses and Tax Act..."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the record... conference called. 697."

O'Brien: "House Bill 697, Pouncey. A Bill for an Act making Appropriation of the Department of Governmental Affairs. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 697 on page 1, line 9, by striking the word 'lindbloom' and inserting in lieu thereof, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pouncey."

Pouncey: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen. I move for the adoption of Amendment Number 1."



Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 697. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no', the 'ayes' have it. The Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments? Third Reading. 714, Representative Craig."

O'Brien: "House Bill 714, Craig. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments. Amendment Number 1, amends House Bill 714, on page 2, in line 25, by deleting '\$25.00 per day', and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Craig."

Craig: "I move for the adoption to Committee Amendment Number 1."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is, adoption of Committee Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 714. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. Representative McClain."

McClain: "Explain Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Craig."

Craig: "What the Amendment does on line.... page 2, line 25 by deleting '\$25.00 per day, or \$12.50', and inserting in lieu thereof, the following: '\$50.00 (\$25.00) per day, or \$25.00 (\$12.50)'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain, anything further? Against the adoption of the Amendment... say no. The 'ayes' have it. Any further Amendments."

O'Brien: "Amendment Number 2, amends House Bill 714 on page 1, by inserting between lines 14 and 15 the following, so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan, do you desire recognition?"

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, for purpose of an announcement."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Madigan: "Seated behind me in the gallery are a group of 5th grade students and parents, from the State Park School which is located in the 56th Legislative District is represented by Representatives Lucco, Calvo and Steele. Also with them is a County Board Member, Mr. Homer 'Boothen', would they please stand."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Craig, Amendment Number 2."

Craig: "I move the adoption of Amendment Number 2."

Speaker Redmond: "Any.... Representative McClain."

McClain: "Could he explain the Amendment."



Speaker Redmond: "Would you explain the Amendment, Representative Craig?"

Craig: "On page 1.... amend House Bill 714 on page 1 by inserting between lines 14 and 15 the following: 'No book, record, tax return, or other document examined under the provisions of this Section, or any report of the auditor for the Secretary of State may be used as evidence in any criminal proceeding or as a basis for a citation for an alleged violation of this Act.'"

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion. The question is on the adoption of Amendment Number 2, to House Bill 417. All in favor of the adoption say 'aye', opposed 'no', the 'ayes' have it. The Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments. Third Reading. 716."

Selcke: "House Bill 716..."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the record, momentarily. 729."

Selcke: "House Bill 729... have we got that one Chalkie... Ah... A Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Ah... two... two Committee Amendments. Committee Amendment Number 1, amends House Bill 729 on page 1, by inserting between lines 21 and 22 the following, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Daniels.... Daniels... who's ah... Representative Daniels is the ah... chief sponsor. Who's the sponsor of the Amendment?"

Daniels: "Mr. Speaker, I move the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 1 and 2. The ah... Committee Amendment that we are dealing with ah... 1 and 2..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain, would like an explanation to the Amendment."

Daniels: "Committee Amendment ah... Number 1, expands the definition of an open space area, which would include ground cover or planted perennial grasses as merely an extension of the explanation of an open space area. Committee Amendment Number 2, goes to the roll back in the event the land is sold to a three year, preceeding ah... period from the date of sale."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentlemen has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 729. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted."



Selcke: "Committee Amendment Number 2, amends House Bill 729 on page 2, by deleting lines 29 and 30 and inserting in lieu thereof, and so forth."

Daniels: "As I stated earlier ah... Committee Amendment Number 2, applies to roll back in the event of sales and would make ah... the roll back to extend to three years preceding the date of sale, and I would move for the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 2."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the adoption of Amendment Number 2, to House Bill 729. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no', the 'ayes' have it. The Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments..."

Selcke: "Ah... Committee Amendment 3 and 4, were tabled in Committee, we have floor Amendment Number 5, Kane. Amend ah... House Bill 729, on page 1, by inserting between lines 26 and 27 the following, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kane."

Kane: "Mr.... Mr. Speaker, I move to table Amendment Number 5."

Speaker Redmond: "Move to table Amendment Number 5, is that correct."

Kane: "Yes."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objections. Amendment Number 5, is tabled."

Selcke: "Amendment Number 6, Beaupre. Amend House Bill 729, on page 2, line 1, by inserting immediately after the period the following, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Beaupre."

Beaupre: "Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This is rather simple Amendment, basically ah... there was several of us in Committee who felt that there should be some cut-off date ah... so that if the application for the filing of an additional valuation as an open space ah... parcel ah... was not made within a... a given period of time ah... that ah... the valuation would revert back to its original form. Ah... this place is ah... the burden on the landowners to file that application by the 31st of January on any given year. I would move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion. Gentlemen has moved the adoption... Representative Maragos."



Maragos: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to ask the sponsor of the Amendment, Mr. Beaupre, is this the question we had in Committee, regarding from October ah... to January. Does this Amendment take care of that ah... period... time period."

Beaupre: "I'm not sure Sam, what your referring to in regards to the dates that you mentioned... what this Amendment refers to the question which arose in Committee as to what happen ah... if no application is filed, would the ah... parcel of land just continued to be carried ah... as an open space parcel by the local assessing ah... officials ah... what this Amendment does, is that it places the burden each year on the property owners to file an application by June 3... by January 31st, if that does not happen ah... then of course it reverts back to the old ah... ah... assessment level."

Maragos: "It's similar to what the exempt properties have to do every year now, and most of the...."

Beaupre: "Yes, that's correct."

Maragos: "All right, thank you. It's a good Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Daniels."

Daniels: "Yes, I have discussed this Amendment with Representative Beaupre and it's acceptable to ah... myself as a chief sponsor of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of Amendment Number 6 to House Bill 729. Any discussion. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no', the 'ayes' have it. The Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments, no further Amendments. Third Reading. Representative Kane, for purpose do you arise."

Kane: "Ah... I just had another Amendment ah... delivered to me, similar to Amendment Number 5, which I tabled. Would the sponsor of the Bill agree to move the Bill back to Second ah... later."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Daniels."

Daniels: "Well, Mr. Speaker ah... let me meet with Mr. Kane and see what it is and then I'll... we'll get back to that, okay... because I'm not aware..."

Speaker Redmond: "It's all right with me."

Daniels: "I'll meet with him right now, Mr. Speaker, if that's okay."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Epton, for what reason do you rise... Epton, Representative Epton."

Epton: "Mr. Speaker, there are two Bills on Third Reading which have been called to our attention and have to come back to Second Reading for the purpose of an Amendment. The ah... first is House Bill 2538 in which the sponsor is Representative Getty, we've cleared it with Representative Getty and would like to ah... bring that back to Second Reading for the purpose of an Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The order of Third Reading appears House Bill 1735, the gentleman has asked leave to return it to the order of Second Reading for the purpose of an Amendment. Any objections... Second Reading also appears House Bill 2538 on Third Reading, he has asked the same leave. Any objections. Hearing none, House Bill 2538 will return to the of... Second Reading... no just back on Second."

Epton: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "1735... 2538... Representative Washburn."

Washburn: "Thank you, ah... Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. We are honored to have in the Speaker's gallery this morning a group of students from Joliet Montessori School, included in the group are the ah... lovely wife of Representative Leinenweber, Mrs. Jerry Leinenweber and Thomas and Steven Leinenweber and the Director of the school Miss Pascrel Hoopernick, would you please rise."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hart."

Hart: "Ah... I have also two Bills that we wanted to take back to Second that are on Third, 955 and 956 which Representative Choate and I are the sponsors of, there's an Amendment that needs to be adopted."

Speaker Redmond: "Are there any objections. On the order of Third Reading appears House Bill 955 and 956."

Hart: "That's right."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved that they be returned to the order of Second Reading for the purpose of an Amendment. Any objections. Leave granted. House Bills 955 and 956 will return to the order of Second Reading. 9... 730."



Selcke: "Ah... House Bill 730 ah..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Griesheimer on the floor?"

Selcke: "A Bill for an Act relation to Public Water District. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment, amends House Bill 730 on page 1 by deleting line 24 and inserting in lieu...."

Speaker Redmond: "The sponsor doesn't appear to be here so we'll have to take that out of the record.... there he is."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Griesheimer."

Griesheimer: "Mr. Speaker, ah... this Committee Amendment ah... merely lowers the amount of the ah... available rates that can be used to sell Revenue Bonds for the Municipal Water District. The original Bill was set at 9% ah... this reduces it to 8% ah... at 8% it was unanimously passed by the Committee. I would urge the adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has move the adoption to the Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 730, all in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendmets. Third Reading. Will the Clerk advise us of the status of 792, is that on Third Reading?"

Selcke: "Yes."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay. 732, you do not desire to call that. 745."

Selcke: "745, House Bill 745... A Bill for an Act to provide for the Ordinary and Contingent Expenses of the Civil Service Commission Second Reasing of the Bill. One Committee Amendment...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kozubowski..."

Selcke: "House Bill 745 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the record. 766, is Representative McGrew on the floor?"

Selcke: "House Bill..."

Speaker Redmond: "I don't see Representative McGrew... we'll take that out of the record. 7... 768."

Selcke: "768, Hirschfeld..."

Speaker Redmond: "I don't see Representative Hirschfeld. 771, Representative VanDuyne..."

Selcke: "Not here."



Speaker Redmond: "Take that out of the record. 782, Representative Totten... 782."

Selcke: "House Bill 782, Totten. A Bill for an Act to amend the Election Code. Second Reading of the Bill. Ah... 1 Committee Amendment, amend House Bill 782 on page 2, line 35 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Totten."

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. Committee Amendment Number 1, was adopted at the suggestion of the Committee on... in regards to ah... providing a means for a person striking a signature on a ah... petition ah... to verify that he struck the signature or... and as a certification that ah... goes with the ah... petition, indicating that ah... those... those signatures struck on what line and what page were done so by either the candidate or the circulator. The Amendment also provides for... ah... a maximum or a ah... on the minimum maximum range on certain ah... candidates ah... where they ah... there's a percentage now, in the Election Code, this provides that the difference has to be at least 50 ah... more than the minimum and that's what Amendment Number 1 does, it was adopted at the suggestion of the Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion. The question is on the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 782. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. Representative McClain."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, would the sponsor yield before you announce the roll call... or the vote."

Speaker Redmond: "What was that, sir."

McClain: "Would the sponsor yield... sponsor Amendment yield to a question, please."

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates that he will."

McClain: "Representative Totten, what's the penalty for a ah... person circulating the petition or the candidate who's behalf the petition is circulated, striking the signature without ah... accompanying that with initialing... what's the penalty."

Totten: "Ah... Representative McClain, there is no penalty now, currently under the Law ah... the... the court can question those and we've had some cases like that, this just spells out a procedure



for the candidate ah... to strike signatures so that the law is clear as to what a candidate or circulator can do, there is no penalty provided."

McClain: "There is no penalty for a person that does strike though... okay. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of the Amendment, all in favor of the adoption of Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 782 say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments."

Selcke: "Ah... Amendment Number 2, Totten. Amend House Bill 782 on page 1, line 1 by inserting 8-8 immediately before and, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Totten."

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. Amendment Number 2 ah... just amends another section of the Code that the Reference Bureau forgot to include in the original Bill ah... to do exactly the same thing that Amendment Number 1 indicates..."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion?"

Totten: "And I would move its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "What's 8-8 amend, what... who does it effect..."

Totten: "Ah... that's the Section applying to ah... Representatives in General Assembly."

Shea: "And... how does it effect that."

Totten: "Ah... Representative Shea, it does the exactly same thing as Amendment Number 1 does, it provides for a means for striking signatures and certification that the candidate or circulator ah... has stricken the signatures... provides for exactly the same mechanism that's in Amendment Number 1, that's the Bill now."

Shea: "Well.... why would... why would a candidate want to strike a signature on a petition?"

Totten: "Well... the law requires, now... that the person be a qualified elector of the party, okay, a candidate may want to strike signatures that are not qualified electors or they could be challenged."



Shea: "Well, it seems to me, a circulator... there's at the bottom of that petition, there's a certification by the circulator that the name that he is circulated that to are qualified electors of the party and that they live within the district. Now, are you saying that the circulator can go out and circulate the petition... then make that certification and the candidate can later strike a name of the petition?"

Totten: "That has been practiced, that has been done, yes. And, there is no means to strike the signature now. I... if you... if you have someone ah... circulate a petition for you, they don't always check to make sure that they are ah... qualified electors of the party and then a candidate can check that, and this provides a means for striking those."

Shea: "Well, hasn't some court cases held... that the whole petition, the 25 or 10 signatures are invalid, if the circulator has under oath ah... said that they are qualified electors and live within the district."

Totten: "Yes, I believe there was a recent decision in Cook County that questioned this because the law was not clear as to how to strike signatures, it was suggested at that time that the law ah... be... cleared up as to how you could strike someone who is an unqualified elector, and that's what this Bill does."

Shea: "Well.... ah... I get a little confused, could you hold this on Second... let us look at it."

Totten: "Sure."

Speaker Redmond: "House Bill 782 is being held on Second Reading, Amendment Number 1 has been adopted. 771."

Selcke: "House Bill 771. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections 121.14 the Snowmo... Snowmobile Registration Safety Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Ah... two Committee Amendments, Committee Amendment Number 1, amends House Bill 771 on page 1, line 29 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative VanDuyne."

VanDuyne: "Mr. Speaker, on request of the Department of ah... Conservation ah... Representative ah... the other two Representative that have the same Bill as I do have ah... deferred to the Department



of Conservation, we're going to try to consolidate these three Bills ah... into one and ah... I asked yesterday to postpone this until next week. If that's possible."

Speaker Redmond: "You want 771 held."

VanDuyn: "Postponed until nex week."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay, we'll just take it out of the record. 789."

Selcke: "House Bill 789... you got it Chalkie..."

Speaker Redmond: "Fred's misfiled that one, we'll have to come back. 790."

Selcke: "790 ah... Merlo. A Bill for an Act relating to sell of Condominiums, providing for full and fair disclosure of the nature of interest in Condominiums and support. Second Reading of the Bill. Ah... 2 Committee Amendments. Committee Amend.... Committee Amendment Number 1, Amends House Bill 790 on page 11 in line 3 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Merlo... Representative Collins, for what purpose do you rise."

Collins: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, ah... Representative Macdonald and I were just sending out for lunch and our seatmate, Representative Leineweber is in the gallery and we wondered if we could get his order."

Speaker Redmond: "Will the Members... will the Members please be in their seats. Representative Merlo."

Merlo: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. Amendment Number 1, is a merely a non-substantive work change that was suggested by the Saving and Loan League and I move its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 790. Any discussion. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no', the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments."

Selcke: "Ah... Committee Amendment Number 2, Amend House Bill 790 on page 1 in line 29 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Merlo."

Merlo: "Ah... Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. This Amendment makes many non-substantive changes, but in addition to that, we



do have changes that I think need record explanation. Ah... page 4 of line 34, requires the Secretary of State to furnish certificate of registration with the County Recorder in which the project is located and this Amendment was added to meet the ah... objections from the Title Companies. Ah... we also have ah... on page 16, line 30 ah... which adds exception for non-residential Condominiums pursuant to the court order by governmental agency and this was at the request of the Saving and Loan League. Ah... we have another change which allows the developer to gain partial compliance by complying with the laws of another State or Municipality. Another Section, the Section ah... well, page 24, line 19, reduces the penalty for first violation to a class 'a' misdemeanor. On page 25, line 10, eliminates the right of re... recession after the closing. And, this was added by the recommendation of the Saving and Loan League, and Mr. Chairman... Mr. Speaker, I move the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion. The gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 2, to House Bill 790. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no', the 'ayes' have it. The Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments? No further Amendments, Third Reading.."

Speaker Redmond: "House Bill 789."

Selcke: "House Bill 789, Fennessey. An Act to amend Sections of an Act to authorize County Authorities to provide for the temporary care custody, dependant, delinquent and truant children to levy and collect a tax for that purpose. Second Reading of the Bill. 1, Committee Amendment, amend House Bill 789, page 1, by inserting immediately after line 32 the following, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Fennessey."

Fennessey: "Ah... I don't believe that's Committee Amendment, it's a Amendment offered by McClain..."

Speaker Redmond: "It's a Committee Amendment offered by Mr. Deuster."

Fennessey: "Oh, that's the Home Rule Amendment... what that's.... all that is. I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 1."

Speaker Redmond: "Move the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 781. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes'



have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments."

Selcke: "Ah... Amendment Number 2, McClain. Amends House Bill 789 on page 1, line 22, by adding after 'However,' the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, ah... could you check with the Clerk, I believe there is also Amendment Number 3 which clarifies.... there is Fred, ah... I'd ask for leave to table Amendment Number 2 ah... there's a cloud on Number 2 which Amendment Number 3 will ah... clear up."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman moves to table Amendment Number 2, to House Bill 781, any objections. Ah... Amendment Number 2, is tabled."

Selcke: "Ah... Amendment Number 3, McClain. Amend House Bill 789, page 1, line 20, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Amendment Number 3 ah... clears up a particular problem we have in our.... in our County, ah... and the Amendment reads; No County shall be required to discontinue the use of any detention home in existence or in use on the effective date of this amendatory Act of 1975 because of the fact that the proposition to establish and maintain the detention home has not been submitted to the voters. In our particular County we have a detention home now in existence and ah... the County Board wants to fund it and help maintain it, however the State's Attorney says because in the original Act ah... we did not construct the home with the referendum that ah... this... this matter has to be cleared up and this Amendment would be ah... ah... would remove that cloud and it's with the approval of the sponsor of this Bill, and I would move to adopt this Amendment. I wish Mrs. Kent was here, ah... she is in support of this Amendment and its co-sponsor."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion. The question is on the adoption of Amendment Number 3, to House Bill 789. All in favor say 'aye' opposed 'no', the 'ayes' have it. The Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments. Third Reading. 791."

Selcke: "House Bill 791. A Bill for an Act making appropriation to



Secretary of State for Administration of Condominiums Registration Act. Second Reading of the Bill. 1, Committee Amendment, amend House Bill 791 on page 1, by deleting line 6 through 11 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Merlo."

Merlo: "Ah, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. This is the ah... appropriation Bill for the Condominium Registration Act and the Appropriation was increased from, one-hundred, sixty-seven thousand, five-hundred to a hundred and eighty-one thousand. The reason for the increase was that the Secretary of State Office neglected to consider the pension fund contribution as well as the social security contribution. I ah... ask ah... and it is a line item, and I ask approval of the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 791, all in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments. Third Reading. 793."

Selcke: "House Bill 793. A Bill for an Act in relation to allocation of dates to Horse Racing and Harness Racing meetings, Amendment certain Acts are inhumane. Second Reading of.... Second Reading of the Bill. 1, Committee Amendment, amend House Bill 793, page 1, by deleting line 9 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Jones."

Jones: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 1, to 793."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Totten."

Totten: "I don't have a copy of the Amendment and I wonder if the sponsor would indicate what it does.... What does the Amendment do."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Jones."

Jones: "Yes, Amendment Number 1, clarifies the Bill and it clears up a technical error in the drafting of the legislation, what it does is this, in the event two or more applicants file for a date at a particular track... at a particular track, then a lottery between ah... those particular applicants. This is what the Amendment does."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion. The question is on the adoption of the Amendment. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The



'ayes' have it. The Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments.
Third Reading."

Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative Simms on the floor? 716."

Selcke: "House Bill 716. A Bill for an Act to add Section 3.12 and amend Sections 5, in Act relating to custody disposition of certain property processed by law enforcement agencies. Second Reading of the Bill. 1, Committee Amendment, amend House Bill 716, page 1, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Simms."

Simms: "Ah.... yes, I move the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 1, which is the Home Rule Amendment. I move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion. Representative Shea."

Shea: "Is this 716 or 816?"

Simms: "716."

Speaker Redmond: "716, we went back, Jerry, to pick it up."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved the adoption of the Amendment.

All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no', the Amendment is adopted.
Any further Amendments. Third Reading. 816."

Selcke: "House Bill 816. A Bill for an Act to provide the Ordinary Contingent Expense of the Department of Financial Institution.

Second Reading of the Bill. 1, Committee Amendment, amends House Bill 816, page 1, line 13, by deleting one-million, seventy-seven thousand three-hundred and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mugalian... out of the record. 825."

Selcke: "House Bill 825, D'Arco.... not here.... A Bill for an Act to amend the Motor Fuel Tax Law. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor. No Amendments from the floor, Third Reading. 843."

Selcke: "House Bill 843 ah... Keller. A Bill for an Act..."

Speaker Redmond: "Take that one of the record."

Selcke: "Here he is, here he is. House Bill 843. An Act to amend the Public Water Districts Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor."



Selcke: "Amendment Number 1, Cunningham, amend House Bill 843 on page 1, by deleting line 16 and inserting in lieu thereof the following, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Cunningham."

Cunningham: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. The present state of the law is... that when there is a Public Water District and it's organized and the next day a hundred disgruntled citizens say, we are not satisfied, we want to desolve it. They file a petition with the court, the court is required to hold an election. There is no ob... there is no rule for discretion. We all agree that that's not proper as it should be, the Amendment, the original Bill provides that, for four years from the date the... the Water District was established, you can not have the election and then if you have an election you can't... you have to wait at least 2 years before you have another. It was the thought of many thoughtful people who had looked into the matter, that the pendulum had swung just a little bit too far by the Bill itself, in undeleted form because it deprived the court of any discretion in the direction of dis... of forbidding the dissolution. So, this Amendment simply seeks to find the high common median ground between the two extremes and provides that if a hundred disgruntled citizens come in and say, we're not satisfied with the Water District and want it disolved, the court shall hold a public hearing and if it finds that that hearing, that the Water District shall be disolved or can be disolved without manifestly adversely effecting the public interest, then the election will be held. I respectfully urge that the Amendment is common sense, in that it echos the judiciary of the State of Illinois, which is the final guardian of all our liberties with the right to have a public hearing. And, that the public hearings should control whether or not there is an election. The public hearing viewed from that point of view would obviate an unnecessary election, it would safeguard everyones interests. I understand that the other sponsors original Bill, which I'm one, are not enthusiastic about the... about the Amendment, but I urge you to believe that the Amendment is in the right direction.



for the reasons stated and would appreciate your affirmative vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Keller."

Keller: "Ah... Mr. Chairman, I... I would like to ah... know first if the Amendment has been circulated, we on this side of the aisle do not have a copy of it. Ah... although I would like to oppose the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Has the Amendment been circulated on the Democratic side."

Cunningham: "About three weeks ago, Mr. Speaker and I would appreciate my distinguished colleague from the 54th to explain why he opposes, it's not sufficient to say that were against it, what's wrong with it."

Keller: "Well, its... first of all... has it been distributed yet?"

Speaker Redmond: "The Clerk tells me, its been distributed."

Keller: "Well, my... my reasons for posing... opposing is, is ah... in this particular district that we are trying to take care of happens to be in ah... Representative Choate and Representative Hart, Representative Winchester, Cunningham and O'Daniels and my district and we are all on this particular ah... piece of legislation as co-sponsors and I feel that ah... what we have in this particular district is that we have had an election and the people have said that they want to form this Water District so that we can have a rural water supply. There is a certain group of people ah... within the district who have opposed this, who are trying to take it to court and... and do away, abandon the district, but the majority of the people have spoken within the district and the majority of the people in the district have said that they want this here concept ah... ah... for rural water supply and... and I intend to stand with the majority of the people in the district in trying to do and trying to help them, what they want. And, under... right now they are getting... getting their hearing, but I can't see why we should let them come back in, this Amendment theoretically would just ah... practically kill the Bill, I mean it would make it superfluous."

Cunningham: "Mr. Speaker, was that a question, and may I respond?"



Cunningham: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would ask each of you to examine the wording of the Amendment. The Amendment does in no way kill the Bill, it merely strengthens it, it makes a good Bill better, it reaffirms your confidences in the right of everyone to be heard when they have a grievance, come to court and have a hearing. And, it does not, and I underscore not, in... in anyway lessen the ability of a majority to be heard and to dissolve a district that they find unacceptable. I ask for an 'aye' vote on Amendment Number 1."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hart, do you seek recognition?"

Hart: "Well, I... I was going to ask that we have a roll call vote on this Amendment, I think this Amendment is politically motivated and completely unnecessary."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of Amendment Number 1. All in favor say 'aye'... you want a roll call vote... all in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Cunningham."

Cunningham: "I didn't get a chance to close there a minute ago and I was terribly disturbed by Representative Hart's, mistake of the fact, there's no politics involved in the Amendment at all. The people you came and asked me that the Amendment be offered were all of the Democratic face and all we're doing by this Amendment is re-affirming the right of the people to come in and be... re-affirming the right of the people to come in and be heard before there is an election, and if you have the election there's expense involved and you have a little hearing that the court finds can be done without any manifest harm or adversely effecting the district in going ahead with the election. And I would ask Representative Hart to reconsider has ah... his snap judgement there as to the political motivation, because nothing could be farther from the truth."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished. Take the record on this question. There are 15 'yes', 57 'no'. The Amendment fails... Any further Amendments. No further Amendments, Third Reading. 844."

O'Brien: "House Bill 844, Luft. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. 1, Committee Amendment, amends



House Bill 844 on page 1, by deleting line 11 and 12 and so forth."
Speaker Redmond: "Representative Luft."

Luft: "Ah... thank you, Mr. Speaker. Committee Amendment Number 1, reduces the request for additional members of the State Board of Education from 4 to 2 and sets forth procedures for appointing the two new members and at this time Mr. Speaker, I'd move for the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment Number 1. Any discussion. The question is on the adoption of Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 844. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no', the 'ayes' have it. The Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments. No further Amendments, Third Reading. The Chair would like to made an announcement as to what our plans are today, we don't intend to break for lunch because we have ah... a ah... soul food dinner this evening and this would be a good way to encourage attendance. So, we'll go right through to about ah... 6 o'clock. Any questions on that... Representa... okay. So we won't break for lunch but we'll all have soul food. Representative Borchers."

Borchers: "Ah... Repres.... ah... Mr. Speaker and fellow Members of the House. I have a request that I want you all to listen to it. For reasons, that I'll tell later, I would like to have anyone here who is a French descent ah... from Colonial France, Illinois Colonial France... please give me their name on a piece of paper so that I will know who all of you are descended from a French ah... Illinois Colonial people, for example, Representative Choate and Representative Beaupre are of this group and I would like to have your names so please give me your names, on your mother's side or father's side or whatever and write it down and give it to me as soon as possible. Thank you."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hoffman, G. L. Hoffman, for what purpose do you arise?"

Hoffman: "Mr. Speaker, with leave of the House, I would like to . . . ah . . . take House Bill 534 from the Order of Third Reading back to Second Reading for the purpose of an amendment by Representative Berman."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objection? On the Order of Third Reading appears House Bill 534. Representative Hoffman has moved that it be returned to the Order of Second Reading for the purpose of amendment. Does he have leave? Hearing no objections, the bill is now on Second Reading. Representative Macdonald. Do you have the amendment, now?"

O'Brien: "Amendment Number 1, Berman, amends House Bill 534 on page 13 by inserting after line 24 the following: '. . . Beginning January 1, 1974, and, thereafter, when a school district has increased the educational or operations . . .', and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Berman."

Berman: "Ah . . . Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 534 does two things. Number one, it gives recognition to school districts that have passed referenda this year and accelerates the payment of their school aid formula entitlement, so that the referenda results gives . . . ah . . . gives them the necessary money . . . ah . . . as quickly as possible. The second part of this amendment allows the school districts that receive relatively little state aid and have a long period of time in order to be phased in over the period of the Resource Equalizer Formula to exceed the 25 per cent limitation, which is imposed upon them under the formula, where there has been a decrease in assessed valuation. Ah . . . Both of these are amendments that require immediate action in order to be effective for the current year; and I move the amend . . . the adoption of Amendment Number 1."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment Number 1. Representative Skinner. Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "I wonder . . . I wonder if the Sponsor of the amendment could inform us what relationship this might have in future years if the assessment base of any given school district is decreased. Would it have the same impact as what you explained for this year?"

Berman: "Yes, if it . . . what it does is this, as . . . as you know, there's a 25 per cent limit on . . . ah . . . over and above the previous years state's entitlement. That's the limitation that's been imposed. Now, a number of high school districts find that because of that limitation its gonna' take them 8, 9 or 10 years in order to get their full entitlement. One of the things that we did not, I think, truly, anticipate when the 1484 was passed two years ago was what would be the effect on these school districts when there's a drop in assessed valuation. All that this amendment does is to say that an exception to the 25 per cent limit would be where there has been a decrease in assessed valuation. All they're gonna' do is speed up the entitlement to make up for the decrease in . . . in assessment . . . they're not going to get any more money than they would eventually had been entitled to anyways."

Skinner: "All right, then in the case of Rockford, if the Supervisor of Assessments decides to take the assessment level down to something closer to 33 per cent of than 44 per cent, Rockford might end up with its fair share of state aid money earlier?"

Berman: "Are they limited, now, by the 25 per cent increase from the previous year?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hoffman, for what purpose do you arise?"

Hoffman: "I just wanted to respond to the question that this amendment only applies to those districts who are allowed to increase their state aid by 25 per cent of the previous year. This amendment . . . ah . . . will not effect unit districts . . . ah . . . because they aren't limited by the 25 per cent increase, they get a quarter, and that change in assessment is automatically reflected in their state aid. The problem we're addressing here are districts that have lost assessment, but have additional entitlement and this allows them only to get what they would be entitled to more quickly due to the loss of assessment. That's all it does."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? The question is on the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 534. Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Yes, I have a question of the Sponsor. I'm in favor of the first part of the amendment, but if I understand what you're doing with the second part of this amendment, you're saying that those people who have lost assessed valuation, you're going to allow them to get more money and, in other words, you're . . . ah . . . amending the formula that we passed; and its going to directly effect the amount of money given to those school districts. Now, how many school districts do you know of that have lost assessed valuation, and where might they be located?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Berman."

Berman: "The school districts, I believe, would be the . . . ah . . . high-expenditure districts. I think that they are primarily in the suburban areas around Cook mnd . . . ah . . . the metropolitan area around Chicago. Ah . . . These are districts that were receiving a substantially . . . ah . . . a very minor amount of state aid at the time of the passage of the Resource Equalizer. Ah . . . the total cost of this amendment . . . ah . . . would probably be around \$2,000,000. Ah . . . The . . . ah . . . they're not going to . . . they're not in the long run receiving more than they would have otherwise been entitled to. All we're doing is saying that . . . ah . . . they are winding up with less dollars to spend in their districts because of the unanticipated decrease in assessed valuation. So we're suggesting here that the 25 per cent over the previous year allotment limitation would be made an exception for those districts."

Bradley: "Well, . . . I would suggest to you that they are receiving and they are going to receive more money than they are entitled to. Ah . . . You can turn it around the other direction and say to us downstate, when we lose students, it directly effects the amount of money we're entitled to; and when our assessed valuation goes up behind every student, it directly effects the amount of money that we're entitled to; and when the assessed valuation of the districts that you talk about, because they're not assessing properly, it directly effects the amount of money that's going to those school districts; and I think that the people downstate had better take a look at what this amendment

does. Ah . . . I'm in favor of the first part of the amendment; I think the second part of the amendment is a . . . is a bad amendment. You're taking money and you're getting . . . you're getting a bigger slice of the pie, and you've gotten a big slice of the pie for the past three years with your 25 per cent increase for the last three years. Downstate where, you know, that we're having problems . . . ah . . . with the decrease and we're trying to do something for them; and we're having problems . . . ah . . . with decreasing numbers of students. You, evidently, are having problems with . . . ah . . . a decreased assessed valuation. I can't imagine where it might be where you get decreased assessed valuation today if the assessor is doing a proper job. So I'm going to have to oppose the . . . the whole amendment, reluctantly, because I'm in favor of the first part of the amendment. Anybody that . . . anybody that passes a referendum is certainly entitled to the money coming through . . . to them in state aid; but, Art, because of the second part of the amendment that you've got tacked together . . . ah . . . and you're going to get a bigger share of the pie . . . ah . . . I'm going to have to oppose the amendment."

Berman: "Well, let me respond. I think that what we're doing is addressing ourselves to both downstate and to the . . . ah . . . suburban area, and that's a . . . that these two items are also part of the recommendation from the House Elementary and Secondary Education Committee. Now, Gerry, you know that we have tried to respond to the needs of downstate through the endorsement and support of the Transportation Formula, which you have . . . ah . . . sponsored. The first part of this amendment addresses itself to downstate districts that have passed referenda. We think that in order to be fair throughout the State of Illinois, the second part of this amendment is also addressing itself, even on a much lesser dollar amount, to other areas that are also having problems. Now, this is, I think, a . . . a fair and equitable approach to adjust itself downstate and upstate; and that's why its being offered as it is."

Bradley: "Well, if I might respond to that. I said I was in favor of the first part of the amendment; I think its a worthy piece of Legislation,

and it should be . . . this . . . that part should be adopted. The second part of the amendment, as far as I'm concerned, Art , addresses itself similarly to the . . . to the amendment that I offered in Education Committee that would have helped the downstate people that you suggested we not put on, if you recall, that we would have . . . we were going to amend the School Formula that would have given a few more dollars downstate, which we desperately need. Evidently, you need the \$2,000,000 where you are. I think maybe if you could pull this out of the Record for a few minutes, we might be able to work something out."

Berman: "Well, let me point out, when you talked about the amendment that you offered, the price tag on that amendment was \$13,000,000. Your bill alone is \$18,000,000. Now, this amendment here is trying to adjust itself to helping . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hoffman, for what purpose do you arise?"

Hoffman: "Mr. Speaker, just to . . . ah . . . suggest that we are on the amendment stage and that this amendment is, for all practical purposes, the bill; and I would like to suggest that . . . ah . . . that we adopt the amendment and . . . ah . . . that we're going to have a chance to vote on the bill on . . . on Third Reading; and then we'll have a chance to talk about it. I think there's some confusion on this . . . ah . . . this is a part of a . . . of a total package and I think we can clarify it."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain."

Berman: "Well, I'd like to have it adopted."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, . . . ah . . . ladies and gentlemen of the House, I'd have to agree with Representative Bradley, and, Gene, I would suggest that maybe what we ought to do is . . . ah . . . pull the bill out of the Record and make two separate amendments, so we can address each part of the amendment, rather than as a package."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Well, I would agree that it should be taken out of the Record, too.

I don't find a copy of the amendment; and since the amendment is as

significant as it is, I think we all ought to have a chance to look at it."

Speaker Redmond: "Has the amendment been distributed?"

Unknown: "It should have been. We put it in on Friday. Go up and lean on 'em, Joe."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kane, do you seek recognition?"

Kane: "Has the amendment been distributed?"

Speaker Redmond: "We're trying to find out."

Kane: "O.K., . . . ah . . . can I address myself to the amendment?"

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Kane: "I'd like to . . . ah . . . disagree with the statement made by . . . ah . . . Representative Bradley from . . . from Bloomington. This . . . ah . . . amendment is not going to reduce the share of school . . . ah . . . state school money going downstate. Ah . . . it is going to . . . ah . . . redress a problem . . . ah . . . that . . . ah . . . effects the suburban part of Cook County. It also going to effect some of the problems that we have downstate. I think it is a good amendment . . . ah . . . and it should be adopted."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, . . . ah . . . I'd like to respond to Representative Kane, if I may. Ah . . . Doug, that's simply not true. There's only so much of the pie, and . . . ah . . . as you well know, when you take a little bit of the pie and you put it somewhere, that means its taken some . . . from someplace else, and I think the wisest part for your part of the amendment, Doug, is for you to also ask . . . ah . . . for Gene to take the bill out of the Record so that we can address ourselves to the two parts of the bill 'cause otherwise the amendment could fail and your Springfield School District will not be saved . . . ah . . . not be helped as you'd like to see it helped; and I'm in favor of that part, but, please, I would advise you don't get caught in the box between downstate and the City of Chicago in trying to support a suburban amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schneider, do you seek recognition? He indicates "no". Representative Kane."

Kane: "Ah . . . In response to Representative McClain, if I might, is that this isn't going to . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Kane: ". . . this isn't going to increase the . . . ah . . . the share of money going to the suburban school districts. Ah . . . What it will do, is just exempt from the 25% limit those school districts that . . . ah . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Stone, for what purpose do you arise?"

Stone: "A point of order, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "State your point."

Stone: "Now, we've been listening to a dialogue between various gentlemen here, who answer each other, and this is, quite obviously, . . . ah . . . not provided for in the Rules."

Speaker Redmond: "Point is well taken. Question is on the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 5; Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Did we find whether the amendment has been distributed, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "I . . . I . . ."

Walsh: "I was handed one, but I still don't have one in my book; and I wondered if . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "I sustain your point, Representative Stone."

Walsh: ". . . been distributed?"

Speaker Redmond: "I've been advised it has been distributed."

Walsh: "O.K."

Speaker Redmond: "Question is on the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 534. Those in favor of the adoption say "aye", oppose "no"; Chair is unable to determine. Those in favor vote "yes", those opposed vote "no". Representative Stone."

Stone: "Mr. Speaker, I'm advised that none of the members on this side have the amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hart has it, Representative Williams has it."

Stone: "Well, they got it "specially" then, and because I believe it has not been distributed."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, I've been advised that it has been distributed. Now, I don't know how I can make any determination. Representative McClain."

McClain: "I was going to address the Amendment, Mr. Speaker, so..."

Speaker Redmond: "Speak on the Amendment."

McClain: "Thank you very much. Ah... I'd like to point out to, especially, the people from the City of Chicago and downstate Illinois that, once again, we're amending the Resource Equalizer here. You're making a tremendous error, because once this Bill gets out, and we come with our own package to try to aid downstate schools and more money for the City of Chicago, we're going to be facing them; and they're going to have the votes to stop it. I think you're making a tremendous error. Downstaters are gettin' taken, again; and if I were you, I'd change your votes."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Take the Record. On this question 82 'aye', 34 'no'; and the amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments? Third Reading. Representative Hill do you... do you desire recognition? Representative Hill do you desire recognition?"

Hill: "Ah... Mr. Speaker I would like to have leave to bring House Bill 1729 back to Second Reading, off of Third for the purpose of an Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "On the order of Third Reading appears House Bill 1729, the gentleman has moved that it be returned to the Order of Second Reading for the purpose of an Amendment. Any objections? Return to the Order of Second Reading."

O'Brien: "Amendment Number 1, Hill. Amends House Bill 1729 on page 1, line 16 by inserting, immediately after the word 'seller' the following: From whom purchase was made and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hill."

Hill: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, this was merely a clarifying Amendment ah... the Bill had to do with warranties and the Amendment ah... assures that the product will not be sent back to the manufacturer if there is a local place that it can be repaired. I would appreciate the adoption of Amendment Number 1."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of the Amendment, all in favor of the adoption indicate by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments? Third Reading. Representative Washington."

Washington: "Mr. Speaker, I ask leave to return House Bill 45 from the Order of Third Reading back to Second Reading for the purpose of an Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "On the Order of Third Reading appears House Bill 45. The gentleman has moved that it be returned to the Order of Second Reading for the purpose of an Amendment. Does he have leave? Second Reading."

O'Brien: "Amendment Number 1, amends House Bill 45 on page 1 by deleting 'add' and inserting in lieu thereof; amends Section 2 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the adoption of Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 45. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. Any further Amendments? No further Amendments. Third Reading."

Speaker Redmond: "The Order of House Bill Second Reading, appears House Bill 847... 847."

O'Brien: "House Bill 847, Tipword. A Bill for an Act exempting farm chemicals from certain taxes. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. 848."

All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no', the 'ayes' have it and Amendment Number 1 is adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1063, Mr. Giglio. House Bill... take it out of the record. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1064, Mr. Choate... House Bill 1064."

O'Brien: "1064, Choate. A Bill for an Act to amend the Election Code. Second Reading of the Bill..."

Madigan: "Take that out of the Record. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1083."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1083, Kempiners. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relation to Airport Authorities. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Madigan: "Are there any Amendments from the floor?"

O'Brien: "Amendment Number 1, Grotberg. Amends House Bill 1083 on page 5 by deleting line 21 and inserting in lieu thereof, and so forth."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Will, Mr. Kempiners..."

O'Brien: "It's Grotberg's Amendment."

Madigan: "I'm sorry. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Kane, Mr. Grotberg."

Grotberg: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1083 ah... merely places the proposition of whether or not you can opt out of a County Airport Authority ah... into all future Airport Authorities but none of the existing ones."

Madigan: "Is there any discussion?"

Grotberg: "I would move for its adoption."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Cook, Mr. Shea."

Shea: "Wou.... would you explain the Amendment, again Jack."

Madigan: "Mr. Grotberg."

Grotberg: "Ah... thank you. Yes, Mr. Shea I will yield for a question."

Shea: "Would you explain..."



Grotberg: "We're back, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Ah... we're back on the subject of the old DuPage County Airport..."

Shea: "That's in Kane and DuPage..."

Grotberg: "And...ah... the new Fox Valley Community Airport Authority which was established ah... last May, a year ago, and ah... the gentleman from ah... Will, Mr. Kempiners House Bill 1083 is an opt out ah... Bill... or an Amendment to the County Airport Authority Act... of the early 1940's which in general, would effect every County Airport Authority of the 19 or 20 Counties in the State... or County Airports and my Amendment to his Bill ah... just takes out all the grandfather implications of the Bill and throws it into the future."

Shea: "In other words, your Amendment says what is, is and that if your going to opt out, only in the future."

Grotberg: "You better believe."

Shea: "All right."

Grotberg: "A good Amendment... I move for the adoption."

Madigan: "Representative Grotberg has moved for the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 1083. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Will, Mr. Kempiners."

Kempiners: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in opposition to this Amendment to my Bill. Ah... Representative Grotberg said an awful lot about a very short Amendment ah... following should be Amendment Number 2, offered by Representative Polk, which I will accept and will endorse and will support, which basically put the effective date or which basically says this Act would effect any Airport Authority created after January 1, 1974. What I would like to remind this Assembly of is this has nothing really to do with the DuPage County Airport, because the Fox Valley Airport Authority is an Authority with no Airport. And, his Bill basically or his Amendment basically will hamper the efforts of the good citizens of Batavia, who would like at least some procedure to withdraw from this Authority, before there is an Airport in the Authority. And, I think that the Bill is a very good one and with Representative Polk's Amendment, which I will support, will make this Bill, put



this Bill in such shape that it will effect no other Airport Authority in the State other than the one we are discussing. And, I would very strongly urge that you vote 'no' on this Amendment."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Kane, Mr. Hill."

Hill: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. Certainly I agree with Representative Kempiners, that this Amendment is a very bad... Amendment. And, those people from Batavia, and this is the only area that it would effect, it doesn't effect any other Authority in the State of Illinois. Those people from Batavia that want their rights preserved and want to get out of this before an Airport comes into the Authority, certainly should have that right, and the Amendment would stop them from having their rights and I would certainly would appreciate very much a 'no' vote on this Amendment. Thank you."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Peoria, Mr. Schraeder."

Schraeder: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. This is an extremely good measure, it's a good Amendment... it should be adopted. If we take the position that were going to let these districts of these small Communities out of these Airport Authorities, there going to receive all the benefits of the Airport services without paying any cost of operation. I think this Amendment is extremely crucial and it should be passed out without any opposition."

Madigan: "Is there any further discussion? Further-discussion... The question is, shall Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1083 be adopted. All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', all those opposed by voting 'no'. The Clerk will take the Record."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Winnebago, Mr. Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, I like to take a moment to make an announcement. There are thousands of people out in the ah.. Rotunda trying to gain admission to the Chambers and it seems that 3/4's of the Chambers are full, but the Chamber... the area behind the Speaker's Podium is not being used and was wondering if you could instruct



the Doorkeeper to tell the people that are milling around in the Rotunda, that they can come up to the Speaker's section."

Madigan: "Thank you, Mr. Giorgi. The Chair also like to announce that the Doorkeeper has requested that the Members of the House refrain from using the main door at the rear of the Chambers because of the congestion which has been caused out in the Rotunda, by the visitors to the Capital Building. And, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Winnebago, Mr. Stubblefield."

Stubblefield: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Along that same line, I think that we should recognize a number of visitors in the gallery... ah... members of Organized Labor who are here..."

Madigan: "Representative Stubblefield, that's a function of the Leadership, we do ask Representative Giorgi to make that announcement. Mr. Giorgi, do you know what the announcement is... Representative Giorgi... your colleague wishes to make an announcement."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, I think.... what Representative Stubblefield is referring to is the ah... entire Rockford Building Trades, is down here en mass. The ah... business agents of the various Locals are all out in the Rotunda, milling around, they can't gain admission to the Speaker's ah... gallerys and that's the reason for the previous announcement. But, they are too many to really single out for honor so that ah... just to mention to the House that they are all down here in quest of jobs and they feel that the Governors accelerated Program ought to get top priority. Thank you."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentleman from DeKalb, Mr. Ebbesen to explain his vote."

Ebbesen: "Ah... yes, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. In explaining my vote ah... I noticed that there is 90 some Members up there that hasn't casted a vote. It is an extremely important Amendment and ah... one that I think has a great deal of merit. I realize that this is ah... Representative Kempiners Bill but ah... the Amendment that he proposes to put on ah... would ah... go back about 4 months, I think, is it ah... Representative Kempiners, it's 4 months back to January, 1975 the ah... anything.... ah... 74."



year and four months.... sixteen months. But, this particular Amendment addresses itself ah... from this day forward ah... ah... assuming the adoption of the legislation in the future, is a very good Amendment and ah.. ah... it would ah... ah... serve everyone well to pay attention and 80 some people get on the... on the green up there and vote 'yes'."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Kane, Mr. Grotberg."

Grotberg: "Yes, thank you Mr. Speaker. In explaining my ah... green vote on this very meaningful Amendment, I think we must recall ah... the whole situation for all the Members of the House. The situation has been kicking around this House floor for a good 20 years and is now being resolved with the matter of the DuPage County Airport and the fledgling County Airport Authority, Fox Valley Community Airport, it's called. And, those of you who would wish for that situation be hanging around the House for the next 20 years would have the problem of dealing with it annually, based on every opt out Bill that comes down the pipe. I do see that... that ah... my good friend Representative Kempiners has a overwhelming ah... death nail on my Amendment and I will not go on explaining my vote, but we will not have heard the last of House Bill 1083. Thank you."

Madigan: "Is there further explanation of vote. Have all voted who wished, the Clerk will take the Record.... The Clerk will take the Record. On this question there are 31 'ayes', 78 'nos', 3 voting present and this question having failed to receive it sufficient votes, the Amendment is here-by declared losted. Are there further Amendments?"

O'Brien: "Floor Amendment Number 2, Polk. Amends House Bill 1083 on page 6, by inserting below line 25 the following; 'This Section 18a is applicable only to Airport Authorities established after January 1, 1974'."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Rock Island, Mr. Polk."

Polk: "Mr. Speaker, the Amendment Number 2 is very limited, it does as the Clerk indicated. It indicates that, this Section 18a is applicable only to Airport Authorities established after January 1, 1974. I discussed this with the sponsor, he agrees, we'd appreciate



your support."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Kane, Mr. Grotberg."

Grotberg: "Yes, Thank you Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. We have now come 180 degrees in 5 minutes and this is the nail in the coffin, that pins it right down to the Village of Batavia, opting out of this only County Airport Authority that has been established, Calendar 1974. And, ah... the principal remains the same... either we have County Airport Authorities by General Legislation or we have it by Special Legislation, we are now involved in the area of Special Legislation and the Amendment to the County Airport Act that allows a specific town it's... the Bill itself if you have not read it describes ah... a particular Village in Illinois, which is adjacent to mine and many of my good friends live there and work there. But, the fact remains, it is Special Legislation regarding a general topic, County Airport Authorities or any other authority or Park District or whatever you would have. And, this Bill is drafted and the Amendment that the gentleman from ah... Moline puts on ah... here, brings it right down to a single Village in the State of Illinois having an opportunity to opt out, and I would recommend a 'no' vote on this particular Amendment."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Peoria, Mr. Tuerk."

Tuerk: "Would the sponsor yield for a question."

Madigan: "The sponsor indicates he will yield."

Tuerk: "Mr. Polk... Mr. Polk."

Polk: "Yes."

Tuerk: "Why did you select the date of ah... January, 1974, for this Amendment."

Polk: "I discussed this with my Airport Authority in... in Rock Island and that was the date they suggested."

Tuerk: "Why wouldn't you in fact ah... select a date into the future like January 1, 1976, as opposed to 1974. Yo... your still going to allow somebody to opt out if they so disire, right."

Polk: "That's correct, I'll yield to Mr. Kempiners."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Will, Mr. Kempiners."

Kempiners: "If I could Mr. Speaker, I would like to respond to the



questioning from the gentleman from Peoria. Your right, there is only one Airport to my knowledge that was created after this date or Authority created after this date and it's the Fox Vallege Airport Authority. I made my point in the last discussion of Representative Grotberg's Bill, that this is an Authority without an Airport and the people of Batavia want to opt out of this, they voted 4 to 1 against it in the referendum. All their asking, there on the periphery, they want to get out because they don't feel that it's going to serve them. And, I'm... I'm urging a 'yes' vote on Representative Polk's Amendment because I feel it's a good way to protect Authorities where there is an operation going, whereas it will still provide an opportunity for a Community to leave the Authority before one gets going with the Fox Valley Airport Authority and I think that it is a just way of handling ah... ah... a very difficult situation. Ah... so this is why we picked that date and he said, he received a letter from the manager of his Airport Authority and this is acceptable to me and I think that it will provide this law to passed which will effect all future Airport Authorities ah... in the same way that it will protect the one that I'm concerned about."

Tuerk: "In other words ah... say 3, 4 years down the road, if there is an Airport Authority ah... organized, this law if it were to become... become law, then it would provide an opportunity for them to opt out of ah... that Airport Authority also, right."

Kempiners: "Within a specified period of time, there is a deadline of ah... I believe its 1 year. This gets into the particular Bill itself and ah... there is a deadline inwhich they can do it, because I'm... you know, I'm concerned too. Once an Authority is created you don't want to interrupt it, you don't want to take ah... Community out of the center of it, so the Bill's very tightly drawn so as not to ah... endanger any existing Authority... or any Authority once its created, after a one year period."

Madigan: "Is there further discussion? The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Kane, Mr. Grotberg."

Grotberg: "Yes. Will the sponsor of the Bill yield for another question?"



Madigan: "The sponsor indicates that he will yield... The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Polk, Mr. Polk from Rock Island."

Grotberg: "Ah... I was asking the sponsor of the Bill Representative Kempiners, either gentleman can answer this question. Once you get pass this Amendment on the Bill itself and I realize that I may be out of order, but I think that its germane. You'll still find that this particular Bill is drafted for a single town in Illinois, and that this enacting date ah... or the ratio active date of 1974... January 74, pertains only to this town. Now, the gentleman from Peoria, Mr. Tuerk asked the question, what about the future. Special Legislation will have to be drawn for everybody that opt, in or out of this, Representative Tuerk. Representative Tuerk, Special Legislation would have to be drafted for everybody that wanted out because this a mandatory of the 1942 Airport Act, only describes a single town. In its language there is no other town that qualifies, so if nobody else wants out we've got to go through another Specialized..."

Madigan: "Will Representative Taylor come to the podium please, Representative Taylor would you come up to the podium, Representative Taylor."

Grotberg: "That concludes my questions, Mr. Speaker."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentleman from DuPage, Mr. LaFleur."

LaFleur: "Would the.. would the sponsor of the Bill yield for a question."

Madigan: "The sponsor indicates that he will yield."

LaFleur: "Ah... I know this ah... Amendment address itself only to a ah... organization of an Airport authority after January of 1974. But the concept of this ah... allowing a area to opt out, would that effect things like the Metropolitan Sanitary District and other areas if someone would like to originate a Bill to allow an area to opt out Bill."

Madigan: "Mr. Kempiners."

LaFleur: "Or R.T.A."

Kempiners: "I've seen Red Herring before, but this is ridiculous... This amends the Airport Authority Act, it deals only with Airport Authorities, it's a responsible Bill a responsible Amendment that is



being addressed by this particular body and just as I can put in a Bill narrowly describes criteria for ah... a particular area to opt out of a Airport Authority, some other person can do it for some other Act in the statute book. I want to make something very clear to the Members of this Body, it does not address itself to one municipality, in fact the Bill if you read the Bill, addresses itself to territory and there are some criteria that the territory has to be. It so happens that one Community does meet this criteria, but there are many areas that could meet it, so this is not special interest and I would urge the adoption of Representative Polk's Amendment to my Bill."

Madigan: "There being no further discussion, the question is, shall Amendment Number 2, to House Bill 1083 be adopted. All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', opposed by voting 'no'. The Clerk will take the Record. The Clerk is taking the Record, all who vote... all who wish to vote, please vote. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Let's get on the Record. Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the Record. On this question there are 81 'ayes', 15 'nos', 1 voting present and Amendment Number 2 to House Bill 1083 is hereby adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading. On the Order of House Bill Second Reading appears House Bill 1063, Mr. Giglio."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1063. A Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Cook, Mr. Giglio. No Committee Amendment. Are there any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1084."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1084, Huff. A Bill for an Act to amend the Vietnam Veterans' Compensation Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Madigan: "Are there any Amendments from the floor?"

O'Brien: "None."

Madigan: "Third Reading. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1092."



O'Brien: "House Bill 1092, Hart. A Bill for an Act to provide for the Ordinary Contingent Expense for the Department of Registration and Education. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment, amends House Bill 1092, on page 2, line 9 by deleting six-hundred and six-thousand, seven-hundred and inserting in lieu thereof, three-hundred and sixteen-thousand, seven-hundred and by inserting between line 21 and 22 the following; 'For expenses for outside hearing officers to conduct Department hearings and render opinions of facts and findings to the Directors... a hundred and ninety-thousand dollars.' And, on page 2, line 28 by deleting five-million, six-hundred and sixty-five thousand, four-hundred and inserting in lieu thereof, five-million, five-hundred and sixty-five thousand, four-hundred."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Franklin, Mr. Hart."

Hart: "Ah... was that Amendment adopted in Committee or defeated in Committee?"

O'Brien: "It indicates here, offered in Appropriations I, Committee by Representative Lechowicz."

Hart: "Well, it was defeated and I ah... I'm not offering it on Second Reading, it shouldn't have come with the Bill."

Madigan: "Representative Hart, the Chairman of the Appropriations Committee, Mr. Lechowicz is absent at this time... so take the Bill out of the Record until he returns. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1093."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1093, Brummet. A Bill for an Act in relation to the Registration of Plumbing Contractors. Second Reading of the Bill. 1. Committee Amendment, amends House Bill 1093 on page 2, by deleting lines 7 through 22 and inserting in lieu thereof the following, so forth.... Brummet."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Fayette, Mr. Brummet."

Brummet: "This Amendment was adopted ah... unanimously by the Committee and ah... what it does is... is designate what Plumbing is and so forth and I move for the adoption of this Amendment."

Madigan: "Is there any discussion? There being no discussion the question is, shall Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 1093 be



adopted. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and Amendment Number 1 is adopted. Are there further Amendments?"

O'Brien: "Amendment Number 2, Brummet. Amends House Bill 1093 on page 5 by deleting..."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Fayette, Mr. Brummet."

Brummet: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. All this Amendment does is to clean-up some language in the Bill and that's the size of it. I move for the adoption of this Amendment."

Madigan: "Is there any discussion? There being no discussion, the question is, shall Amendment Number 2 to House Bill 1093 be adopted.... for what purpose does the gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Skinner... would you return to your seat Mr. Skinner... The House is being delayed while Mr. Skinner is returning to his seat... Does it concern your filing of a Fiscal Note, Mr. Skinner?"

Skinner: "Your warm."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes, Mr. Skinner."

Skinner: "Ah... you have the subject ah... I'm wondering if you're intending to hold this Bill on Second Reading, until..."

Madigan: "Let us complete..."

Skinner: "Until... file."

Madigan: "Complete the action on the Amendment."

Skinner: "Well, I'm just... fine."

Madigan: "We'll return to you at that time."

Madigan: "The question is, shall Amendment Number 2 to House Bill 1093 be adopted. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed 'no', the 'ayes' have it and Amendment Number 2 is adopted. The Clerk informs me that a Fiscal Note has been filed by Representative Skinner, relative to House Bill 1093 therefore the Bill will be heard will be held on the Order of Second Reading until the... response has been filed relative to Mr. Skinner's Fiscal Note. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Fayette, Mr. Brummet."

Brummet: "Mr. Speaker, this doesn't take a Fiscal Note ah... this is in the Budget for the Department of ah... Health and ah... there is no Fiscal Note required."



Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentlemen from McHenry, Mr. Skinner."

Skinner: "I'm not certain but I think what... yesterday, the Chair ruled
 z just the opposite of that, now I'm aware as other Members ah... House
 floor are aware that the Fiscal Note Law in this State is in the state
 of chaos, it doesn't mean too much and I'm hopeful that by requesting
 some Fiscal Notes on these things we may perhaps provide the impetu-
 ous to a meaningful Fiscal Note Act. So, I do believe the Speaker
 did rule the opposite of what Representative Brummet suggested you
 should rule today, yesterday. Hopethe typist got all those comma's."

Madigan: "Would you two gentleman approach the podium, Mr. Brummet and
 Mr. Skinner. And, on the Order of House Bill, Second Reading
 appears House Bill 1098."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1098, McPartlin. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act
 in relation to the transfer of Real Estate. Second Reading of the
 Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Madigan: "Are there any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. On the
 Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1110, Mr. Collins."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1110. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois pens-
 ion Code. Second Reading of Bill. 1. Committee Amendment, amends
 House Bill 1110, on page 2 by deleting line 28 and inserting in
 lieu thereof the following and so forth."

Madigan: "Take that out of the Record. On the the Order of House Bill,
 Second Reading appears House Bill 1094."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1094, Brummet. A Bill for an Act to amend the
 Private Sewage Disposal Licenses Act. Second Reading of the Bill.
 No Committee Amendments."

Madigan: "Are there any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. Let the
 record show that House Bill 1093, remain on the Order of Second
 Reading until there is a Fiscal Note filed. On the Order of House
 Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1095."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1095, Brummet. A Bill for an Act to create the
 Truc... The Pest Control Advisory Counsel. Second Reading of the
 Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Madigan: "Are there any Amendments from the floor?"

O'Brien: "Amendment Number 1, Brummet..."



Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Fayette, Mr. Brummet."

O'Brien: "Amends House Bill 1095 on page 4, line 10 and so forth."

Brummet: "This Amendment is also to take care of a technical error in the Bill and it has no substantive change."

Madigan: "Is there any discussion? There being no discussion, the question is, shall Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 1095 be adopted. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and Amendment Number 1 is adopted. Are there further Amendments? The Clerk informs me that Representative Skinner has filed a Fiscal Note relative to House Bill 1095 and therefore House Bill 1095 will be retained on the Order of Second Reading until the Fiscal Note is filed. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1110, Mr. Collins."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1110. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill. 1110."

Madigan: "Are there any Committee Amendments?"

O'Brien: "One Committee Amendment, amends House Bill 1110 on page 2, by deleting line 28 and so forth."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Cook, Mr. Collins."

Collins: "Ah... Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 1110 ah... was a Bill that would have permitted ah... retirement of a Chicago Policeman with twenty years service at the age of fifty. That provision is stricken by this Amendment and the Bill would now read that a policeman at the age of 50, who had 25 years of experience would be ah... allowed to retire at that time. This Amendment puts the Bill into conformity with Pension Laws Commission ah... ah... policies and I would ask for the adoption of the Amendment."

Madigan: "Would you approach the Podium, Mr. Collins...."

Madigan: "Representative Collins has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1110. The question is, shall Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 1110 be adopted. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no', the 'ayes' have and Amendment Number 1, is adopted. Are there further Amendments?"

O'Brien: "No further."



Madigan: "Third Reading. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1117."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1117, Taylor. A Bill for an Act relating to Probation Officers. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committees."

Madigan: "Are there any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1122."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1122, McAuliffe. A Bill for an Act to amend the Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment, amend House Bill 1122 on page 1, by deleting line 14 through 17..."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Cook, Mr. McAuliffe... to move the adoption of the Amendment."

McAuliffe: "Move the adoption of the Amendment."

Madigan: "Is there any discussion? There being no discussion, the question is, shall Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 1122 be adopted. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and Amendment Number 1 is adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1111."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1111, Choate. A Bill for an Act to amend the Election Code. Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments, Amendment Number 1, amends House Bill 1111 on page 3, line 1 by adding after 'member' the words 'County Commissioners' and so forth."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Union, Mr. Choate."

Choate: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Ah... Committee Amendment Number 1 was drafted by the Reference Bureau, simply to bring about corrective language that had been put in the original Bill. Committee Number 2, simply delays the effective date so that those who are applying by this Act will will have approximately 18 months, but rather than just a year to comply with the Act and I would move for the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 1, Mr. Speaker."

Madigan: "Is there any discussion? There being no discussion, the question is, shall Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1111 be adopted. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed by saying 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and Amendment Number 1 is adopted. Are there further Amendments?"



O'Brien: "Amendment Number 2, amends House Bill 1111..."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Union, Mr. Choate."

Choate: "Ah... I have already explained the Amendment, Mr. Speaker. I would now move that the House adopts Committee Amendment Number 2."

Madigan: "Is there any discussion? The question is, shall Amendment Number 2 to House Bill 1111 be adopted. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed by saying 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and Amendment Number 2 is adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1127."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1127, Beaupre. A Bill for an Act to amend the Public Community College Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment, amends House Bill 1127 on page 1, line 26..."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Kankakee, Mr. Beaupre."

Beaupre: "Mr. Speaker, I move for the adoption of the Amendment."

Madigan: "Is there any discussion? The question is, shall Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 1127 be adopted. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed by saying 'no'.... For what reason... for what purpose does the gentleman from Adams, Mr. McClain arise?"

McClain: "I ask him if he would explain the Amendment, I just think that it's a normal process, we ought to be doing that."

Madigan: "Would the gentleman from Kankakee, Mr. Beaupre explain Amendment Number 1, for Mr. McClain.... and Mr. Mulcahey.... and Mr. Berman... Mr. Beaupre."

Beaupre: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Ah... the Amendment ah... on House Bill 1127 deals with setting a... the original Bill ah... changes from the designation in the Community College Act ah... from... to the Capital Development Board, utilizing the current language in our ah... of our Agency for funding Capital Development Programs for Community Colleges. It changes it from the Illinois Bonding Authority to the Capital Development Board ah... in addition ah... there was some questions that arose in Committee as to whether or not ah... there should be a ah... limitation upon the time ah... ah... Community... Community Colleges District had ah... to ah... evaluate ah... and... and assess ah... the property that they were using for a contribution ah... to ah... ah... the Capital ah..."



Expenditures for the building of new buildings. This was an Amendment ah... that the Capital Development Board and the Community College Trustees worked out and ah... as a matter of compromise ah... it basically says that, if you hold land ah... at the present date or prior to the time this Act goes into effect and it was donated ah... by a charitable foundation or through public grants, that it qualified as a contribution ah... ah... to the Capital Building Program. It excludes ah... any contribution that was a result of a donation by the Federal.... of land by the Federal Government or by the State of Illinois, subsequent to the passage of this Act and I would ah... move the adoption of the Amendment."

Madigan: "Is there any discussion? There being no discussion the question is, shall Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 1127 be adopted. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed by saying 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and Amendment Number 1, is adopted. Are there further Amendments?"

O'Brien: "No further."

Madigan: "Third Reading. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1128."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1128, Keller. A Bill for an Act to amend the Real-estate Occupant Use Tax Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Madigan: "Are there any Amendments from the floor? No Amendments from the floor, however, the Clerk informs me that a Fiscal Note has been filed relative to House Bill 1128 and therefor the Bill will remain on the Order of Second Reading, until there is a response to the request for a Fiscal Note. On the Order of House Bill, Second reading appears House Bill 1129."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1129, Hudson. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relation to Criminal Identification and Investigation. Second Reading of the Bill. Ah... Madigan: "The Chair recognizes.... take it out of the Record? Take it out of the Record. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears

O'Brien: "House Bill 1133, Rayson. A Bill for an Act to amend the Public Community College Act. Second Reading of the Bill. 1. Committee Amendment, amends House Bill 1133 on page 1, line 11, and so forth."

Madigan: "Is Mr. Rayson on the floor? Take that out of the Records. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1136, Mr. Hanahan... Mr. Hanahan on the floor? Take that out of the Record. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1155."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1155, Flinn. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Income Tax. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Madigan: "Are there any Amendments from the floor?"

O'Brien: "Amendment Number 1, Skinner. Amends House Bill 1155 on page 2, by deleting line 6, and so forth."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Skinner....

Mr. Skinner, is your Amendment opposed by the sponsor of the Bill?"

Skinner: "I may be the sponsor of the Bill, let me take a look."

Madigan: "No your not, Mr. Flinn is the sponsor of the Bill."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1176, Mautino. A Bill for an Act to amend the Boiler Safety Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Madigan: "Are there any Amendments from the floor?"

O'Brien: "Amendment Number 1, Mautino. Amends House Bill 1176..."

Madigan: "Is Mr. Mautino on the floor?... For those who are off the floor but, they are listening to the squawk boxes, it's becoming difficult to move the Bills. Without the sponsors of the Bills and the sponsors of the Amendments, if Mr. Mautino is within ear shot would he return to the floor.... Take House Bill 1176 out of the Record. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1182."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1182, Chapman. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Horse Racing Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment, amends House Bill 1182 on page 5, line 18 by deleting

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the lady from Cook, Mrs. Chapman."

Chapman: "Ah... Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. I would like to make a statement that applies, not only to Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1182 but also would save my repeating this statement, perhaps for the next 33 Bills that follow after this one. Ah... these are 34 Bills out of the package that the Commission on the status of women has purposed to the lesigature. These Bills were referred to the Banks and Savings and Loan Committee which ah... gave them careful study, the Chairman, Representative Leon, appointed a Committee of 3, Representative Tipword was Chairman and Representative Hart and Representative McAvoy served on this Committee. We spent ah... a good part of 2 days, 2 weeks ago with the help staff, very carefully going over all 80 of these Bills. We ah... took the suggestion of the Study Committee for Amendments, which almost invariably ah... ah... minor, technical Amendments and changes, perhaps that go slightly beyond what we were proposing. The Ah... Amendments have all been approved by the Banks and Savings and Loans Committee and are here before you today ah... if the Committee wants a full, if the House wants a full description on these Amendments, I of course will be happy to provide as full explanation as I can. For example, on House Bill 1182, there is a broadening of the language to provide benefits, not only for widows under the ah... Illinois Horc^s Racing Act but, also for surviving spouses and this illustrates what we are doing with these Bills. When we find a benefit that approves to a number of one sex... then we extend this benefit to the other sex. Where we see a restrition, then we have repealed the... the Bill ah... I move the adoption of House Bill... of Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1182."

Madigan: "Is there any discussion? There being no discussion, the question is, shall Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1182 be adopted. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed by saying 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and Amendment Number 1, is adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 766."



O'Brien: "House Bill 766, McGrew. A Bill for an Act Authorizing Western Illinois University to construct and operate a non-commercial Educational Television Station. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Madigan: "Are there any Amendments from the floor?"

O'Brien: "None."

Madigan: "Third Reading. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 767."

O'Brien: House Bill 767, McGrew. A Bill for an Act making appropriations for the construction of Educational Television Station, Western Illinois University. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment."

Madigan: "Are there any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. On the order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1182.... House Bill 1184."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1184, Chapman...."

Madigan: "For what purpose does the gentleman from Franklin, Mr. Hart arise."

Hart: "Ah... thank you, Mr. Speaker. I was on the Sub-Committee on these Bills with ah... Mrs. Chapman and others... and they are all technical Amendments, making no subsidy changes and I wondered if it wouldn't be, alright with leave of the House, to move them all with one roll call, or with one vote ah..."

Madigan: "Is there leave.... Representative Hart, I believe that there are Amendments to every Bill which must be adopted, are you proposing that on one roll call we move to adopt all those Amendments."

Hart: "Yes, and have all the Bills read a second time and then adopt the Amendments... consider them all one time."

Madigan: "Are they always the same Amendment."

Hart: "Well they're not subsidy and they are all tended to the same thing. I don't care, except that if... I mean I've been here ah... most of the time with all the rest of you, if you want to stay here all night and work on stuff like this, it fine but I'm just trying to ah... ah... move up ah... the work of the House so we can get to Third Reading and some other things."



Madigan: "I appreciate your suggestion, Representative Hart but there has been objection raised and the.... therefore the Chair will recognize the lady from Cook, Mrs. Chapman."

Chapman: "Ah... Mr. ah... Speaker, I move the adoption of Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1184. It changes ah.. one word ah... 'parent' to 'parents'."

Madigan: "The Clerk will read the Bill a second time."

Madigan: "Ah... Mr. Clerk... Mr. Clerk, I thought we were on House Bill 1184."

Madigan: "The Bill has been read a second time and Representative Chapman has moved that Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 1184 be adopted. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and Amendment Number 1 is adopted. Are there further Amendments? On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears.... Third Reading, for House Bill 1184. O'Brien: "House Bill 768, Hirschfeld. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act concerning Jurors. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Madigan: "Are there any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1186."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1186. A Bill for an Act to amend the Public Aid Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment, amends House Bill 1186 on page 1...."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the lady from Cook, Mrs. Chapman."

Chapman: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, did we overlook House Bill 1185?"

Madigan: "It's not listed on my Calendar, Mrs. Chapman."

Chapman: "Okay."

Madigan: "So we're on House Bill 1186."

Chapman: "Ah... Mr.... Ah... I move the adoption of Amendment Number 1,



to House Bill 1186, it ah... makes it clear that a ah... that we ah... intend to pronoun he to also refer to she."

Madigan: "Mrs. Chapman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1186. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed by saying 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and Amendment Number 1, is adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1188."

Leinenweber: "In other words, the Bill is originally drafted, does not apply to any municipality under 100,000 population."

Chapman: "Ah... the law, as it is now, ah... does not apply to municipalities having a population of less than 100,000 ah... Mr... Mr. Hart, maybe could help me out on this one, because this was a suggestion which ah... he made."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Franklin, Mr. Hart."

Hart: "Ah... yes, ah... Mr. Speaker. The present law provides ah... that the Mayor can call out the militia or so forth... and Cities over a 100,000 to ah... quell disturbances and the Amendment makes it Statewide."

Madigan: "Is there any discussion? There being no discussion, the question is, shall Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1217 be adopted. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1217 is adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1220."

Selcke: "House Bill 1220. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Structural Engineering Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amendment Number 1, amends House Bill 1220, and so forth."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the lady from Cook, Mrs. Chapman."

Chapman: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, this changes a ah... 'he' to read 'the director'. Ah... I move for the adoption of Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1220."

Madigan: "Is there any discussion? There being no discussion, the question is, shall Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1220 be adopted? All those in favor signify by saying 'aye'... for what purpose does the gentleman from Macon, Mr. Borchers arise."

Borchers: "Oh... a matter of Parliamentary inquiry, Mr. Speaker. I just wanted to know what time our bomb scare was to be held today."

Chapman: "Ah... Mr. Speaker ah... a number of these Bills relate to a anti-discrimination clause that appears frequently in the statute. It reads something like this, there will be no discrimination on the basis of race, color or religion and sometimes sex is included, sometimes natural origin is included, so whenever we found ah... natural origin missing, we included this too and in House Bill 1224 we inadvertently ah... did not do this. So, what the Amendment does is, it adds phrase 'national origin' to this added discrimination clause. I move for the adoption of Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1224."

Madigan: "Is there any discussion? There being no discussion, the question is, shall Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1224 be adopted. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed by saying 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and Amendment Number 1, is adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1230."



Selcke: "House Bill 1230. An Act to amend an Act to prohibit discrimination or intimidation on account of race, creed, color, sex or national origin employment under contract. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Committee Amendment 1, and so forth."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the lady from Cook, Mrs. Chapman."

Chapman: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, Amendment Number 1, inserts ah... and or 'her' after a 'his'. I move the adoption of the Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1230."

Madigan: "Is there any discussion? There being no discussion, the question is, shall Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1230 be adopted. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed by saying 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and Amendment Number 1, is adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1232."

Selcke: "House Bill 1232. A Bill for an Act to amend Section 1, of a title of an Act to prohibit solicitation or inducement of sale or purchase of real estate on the basis of race, color, religion or national origin or ancestry. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Committee Amendment Number 1, amends House Bill 1232, and so forth."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the lady from Cook, Mrs. Chapman."

Chapman: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, Amendment Number 1, is another one that adds or 'her' ah... following ah... the word 'his' as it appears in the Bill. The Commission did not try to make these kind of changes but at the recommendation of the Study Committee we were happy too. I move the adoption of Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1232."

Madigan: "Would the Clerk read the Amendment."

Madigan: "Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1235."

Selcke: "Amendment Number 1, amends House Bill 1235 page 6, line 35, by deleting 'his'."

Chapman: "I move the adoption of Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1235."

Madigan: "Is there any discussion? The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Cook, Mr. Peters."

Peters: "Representative Chapman, were delat.... deleting 'his' are we adding anything."

Chapman: "Ah... I'm looking for...".

Madigan: "You wish to address a question to the sponsor?"

Peters: "That's all right, Representative Chapman."



Chapman: "Aha... I found it. Ah... I move for the adoption of Amendment Numer 1, to..."

Peters: "Did you find it, Representative?"

Chapman: "Ah... I have the Bill and somehow or other we didn't get the Amendment, in this one."

Madigan: "For what purpose does the gentleman from Franklin, Mr. Hart arise."

Hart: "Ah... thank you, Mr. Speaker. All this does is to take out the word 'his' which was inadvertently not taken out when the Bill was drafted."

Selcke: "1243, a Bill for an Act to amend the Code of Criminal.... the Criminal Code of 1961. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment, Committee Amendment Number 1, and so forth."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the lady from Cook, Mrs. Chapman."

Chapman: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, this adds 1, 2, 3, 4 or 'she's' and 2, 'her's' remove the adoption of Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1243."

Madigan: "Is there any discussion? There being no discussion, the question is, shall Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1243 be adopted? All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed by saying 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and Amendment Number 1, is adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading. Madigan: "Are there any discussion? There being no discussion, the question is, shall Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1248 be adopted? All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed by saying 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and Amendment Number 1, is adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1250."



Selcke: "House Bill 1250. A Bill for an Act to amend the Municipal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment, Committee Amendment Number 1, amends House Bill 1250, and so forth."

Chapman: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, Amendment Number 1 adds 'or hers' and 'or shes'. I move for the adoption of Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1250."

Madigan: "Is there any discussion? There being no discussion, the question is, shall Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1250 be adopted. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed by saying 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and Amendment Number 1, is adopted. I hope you appreciate what I'm doing up here, for you. Are there any further Amendments? Third Reading. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1252."

Selcke: "House Bill 1252. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act to revise the law in relation to Counties. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment, amends House Bill 1252, and so forth."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the lady from Cook, Mrs. Chapperson..."

Chapman: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, I want you to know that I appreciate you and I appreciate the Members of the House, also. Ah... this is the last Bill that ah... we will be considering, I believe, today ah... I hope that the cooperation of this House will be just as good when we have these Bills on Third Reading, when of course, I would be very happy for a one roll call for all the Bills ah... or would be happy to take, one at a time. I move the adoption of Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1252, which is a one-ah... 'or her' amendment."

Madigan: "Is there any discussion? There being no discussion, the question is, shall Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1252 be adopted. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed by saying 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and Amendment Number 1, is adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading. On the Order of House Bill Second Reading appears House Bill 1255."

Selcke: "House Bill 1255. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Municipal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Madigan: "Where is Mrs. Chapperson... Are there any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1262."



Selcke: "House Bill 1262. A Bill for an Act to regulate the practice of speech and language pathology and audiology. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment, Amendment Number 1, amends House Bill 1262, page 2, line 14, and so forth."

Madigan: "Are there any Committee Amendments?"

Selcke: "Yeah, I just read it.... Hirschfeld, is he here."

Madigan: "Is Mr. Hirschfeld on the floor? Does anyone know where Mr. Hirschfeld is... is there any Committee Amendments... which Committee... The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Cook, Mr. DiPrima... Mr. DiPrima, to move the adoption... Committee Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1262.... that motion having been made, all those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed by saying 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and Amendment Number 1, is adopted. Are there further Amendments?"

Selcke: "No."

Madigan: "Third Reading. On the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1274."

Selcke: "House Bill 1274. A Bill for an Act to provide for the Ordinary Contingent Expense of the Department of Finance. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment, Committee Amendment Number 1, amends House Bill 1274, page 2, line 5, and so forth."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the lady from St. Clair, Mrs. Younge. To move the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1274. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed by saying 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and Amendment Number 1, is adopted. Are there further Amendments?"

Selcke: "Apparently Committee Amendment Number 2, was tabled in Committee. Committee Amendment Number 3, amends House Bill 1274, page 4 by striking line 10, and so forth."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the lady from St. Clair, Mrs. Younge."

Younge: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Comm... Committee Amendment Number 3 ah... merely changes the name from 'the Automobile Liability Revolving Fund' to the 'Risk Management Revolving Fund'. And, I move the adoption of Commi.... Committee Amendment Number 3."

Madigan: "Is there any discussion? There being no discussion, the question is, shall Amendment Number 3, to House Bill 1274 be adopted. All



those in favor will signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed by saying 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and Amendment Number 3, is adopted. Are there further Amendments?"

Selcke: "Amendment Number 4, Friedrich. Amends House Bill 1274, page 1, line 24, and so forth."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Cook, Mr. Totten... Mr. Totten."

Totten: "Yeah, thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm going to handle Amendment Number 4 for Mr. Friedrich, who left. Ah... Amendment Number, puts the Bill back in the order that it was originally when the Governor introduced his budget ah... and I move the adoption of Amendment Number."

Madigan: "Is there discussion? The Chair recognizes the lady from St. Clair, Mrs. Younge."

Younge: "I have a substitute motion that this motion be tabled, it was very thoroughly con... ah... ah... debated by the Committee and it was very overwhelmingly overruled and I move for it to be tabled."

Madigan: "The motion is that the motion of Representative Totten, to adopt Committee Amendment Number 4, to House Bill 1274, be tabled. The... as I understand it, that is a non-debatable motion. The question is, shall the motion of Representative Younge to table Representative Totten's motion be adopted? All those in favor of Representative Younge's motion to table, will signify by voting 'aye', all those opposed by voting 'no'. The Clerk will take the Record."

Madigan: "Have all voted who wished? The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Cook, Mr. Totten."

Totten: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, may I explain my vote."

Madigan: "Why of course you can."

Totten: "Thank you. Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. Amendment Number 4 ah... puts the Bill in the order in which the Governor originally intended the Department of Finance and that was to remove, by agreement, the pre-audit function and give it to the Comptrollers office. Ah... I have a letter here indicating the agreement and apparently it has been reneged on, and what we are trying to do is to put the Bill ah... in the fashion that it was originally introduced in the budget book ah... and which is required ah... by the



ah... statute under the responsibility of the Comptroller. And, I would just like to cite that section of the statute, Chapter 15, paragraph 209 which specifically states, the Comptroller shall examine each voucher and all other documentation require by or pursuant by law to be filed with him. And, this Amendment ah... does exactly that and I would respectfully request that on the motion to table ah... that you vote 'no' so we can adopt the Amendment and put the Bill in the ah... fashion that it should be."

Madigan: "Have all voted who wished?.. have all voted who wished?. The Clerk will take the Record. Ah... for what purpose does the gentleman from Cook, Mr. Peters arise."

Peters: "Ah... if I may, Mr. Speaker to ah... explain my vote on this. as indicated by Representative Totten, this Amendment which was offered by Representative Friedrich and handled here in the Chamber by Representative Totten, does in fact end up putting in the Bill for the Department of Finance in the same manner in which it was pre... presented to us, in the budget summary as presented by the Governor. Ah... this is making no other change than was initially indicated in the Governor's Budget Message to the House. And, I would respectfully request ah... the Membership to ah... pay particular attention to this measure here and to add their 'no' votes on the... on the board ah... in opposition to the tabling Amendment of Mrs. Younge, so that we can get to a... a vote on the actual Amendment."

Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Skinner to explain his vote."

Skinner: "Mr... Mr. Speaker, I'm sorry that ah... the sponsor of the Bill to abolish the Department of Finance, is not here, Representative Friedrich because I think that he could speak fairly cogently to the... to this Bill and to this particular tabling Amendment. The Department of Finance is basically a... a pre-laundry, it's basically a laundry for the Executive Branch ah... to take out those vouchers that should have never been filed in the first place. Now, either we ought to defeat this tabling Amendment or tabling motion and approve the Amendment ah... as one option or as a second option abolish the Department altogether or the third option, change the Constitution and abolish



the State Comptroller."

Madigan: "Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the Record. On this question, at this time there are 79 'ayes', 71 'nos', no voting present.... For what purpose does the gentleman from Cook, Mr. Totten arise."

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker I would respectfully request a verification of the roll call."

Madigan: "Of the affirmative roll call, Mr. Totten."

Totten: "Of the... affirmative... yes, of the affirmative roll call, a poll of the absentees."

Madigan: "For what purpose does the gentleman from Cook, Mr. Lechowicz arise."

Lechowicz: "Based upon that request, I would like a poll of the absentees and then after we get through with the affirmative I want to verify the negative as well."

Madigan: "The Clerk will poll the absentees."

Selcke: "Brandt. Capparelli. Chapman. Collins. D'Arco. Downs. Friedrich. Gaines. Gene Hoffman. Kelly. Kucharski. Lemke. Leon. Madison. Mudd. Mugalian. Palmer. Rayson. Reed. Sangmeister. Schlickman. Sharp. Stubblefield. Terzich. VanDuynes. Willer. Mr. Speaker."

Madigan: "For what purpose does the lady from Cook, Mrs. Chapman arise."

Chapman: "How am I Recorded, Mr. Speaker."

Madigan: "How is Mrs. Chapman recorded."

Selcke: "The lady is recorded as being absent."

Madigan: "Record her as 'aye'."

Madigan: "Representative D'Arco, record him as 'aye'. Representative Sharp, 'aye'. Representative Kelly..."

Selcke: "Wait a minute... wait a minute."

Madigan: "Gentlemen, why don't we take another roll call. Is there leave? No, no leave... fine. Who else... Representative Mugalian wishes to be recorded as 'aye'. Is Representative Kelly recorded as 'aye'?"

Selcke: "Representative Kelly... Okay."

Madigan: "Representative Sharp, has he been recorded as 'aye'."

Selcke: "Yes."



Madigan: "Representative Mudd, 'aye'. Sangmeister, 'aye'. Collins 'no'."

Selcke: "Collins, 'no'."

Madigan: "Mr. Clerk, what is the affirmative roll call right now... Mr.

Totten there are now 86, 'ayes', 72 'nos', do you persist in your request for verification. The gentleman is persisting in his request for verification. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Cook, Mr. Totten."

Totten: "Yah, ah... on the verification if the Chair would help us by having the Members in their seats ah..."

Madigan: "The gentleman has requested that everyone return to their chairs. The Clerk will proceed with the verification."

Selcke: "E. M. Barnes. Beatty. Beaupre. Berman. Boyle. Bradley. Brinkmeier. Brummet. Byers. Caldwell. Calvo. Catania. Chapman. Craig. D'Arco. Darrow. Davis. DiPrima. John Dunn. Dyer. Ewell. Farley. Fary. Fennessey. Flinn. Garmisa. Getty. Giglio. Giorgi. Greiman. Hanahan...."

 and come back, it will allow the service in the first....and come
 back to a different Municipality, it will allow the time from the
 first Municipality to apply and the Amendment has the ah... cost
 paid by the second Municipality. I move the adoption of Committee
 Amendment Number 1."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion, the gentleman moves the adoption of
 Committee Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1533. All in favor say



'aye', opposed 'no'. The Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments? I have been advised by the Clerk that a Fis... a request for a Fiscal Note has been filed on 1544. Are there any further Amendments on 1533. Third Reading. 1545."

Selcke: "House Bill 1545. A... 1545... A Bill.... ah... House Bill 1545. A Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act of 39. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor? No Amendments. Third Reading. 1546. I've been advised that 1545 needs a Fiscal Note... Oh 1546, pardon me. Needs a Fiscal Note and until its furnished it will have to stay on the Order of Second Reading, in the meantime, Representative Brinkmeier do you want to move the adoption of the Amendment. 1546, we might as well adopt the Amendment."

Brinkmeier: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. I yield to Representative Rigney, these Amendments ah... were approved by the Agricultural Committee and I would allow.... ask that Harlan Rigney would explain them."

Selcke: "House Bill 1546. A Bill for an Act to amend Section 3 of an Act in relation to Uniform relocation payments and so forth. Second Reading of the Bill. Third Committee Amendments. Committee Amendment Number 1, amends House Bill 1546 page 1, line 23, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brinkmeier."

Brinkmeier: "Mr. Speaker, I would request that Representative Rigney explain these Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Rigney."

Rigney: "Well, Mr. Speaker Committee Amendment Number 1, merely takes out the \$10,000 limitation on the interest payment. I move for the adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved for the... Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, ah... your saying that Committee Amendment Number 1, removes the \$10,000 limit?"

Rigney: "That's correct."

Lechowicz: "And what would.... and was there a Fiscal Note requested on this Bill."



Rigney: "There was not."

Lechowicz: "I request one now, Mr. Speaker... well, not with the Amendment, I believe. I think with the amended version now would be ah... quite a bit more money."

Rigney: "If I might comment on that Mr. Speaker, I think it would be very difficult to draft a Fiscal Note until we knew what lands we're going to acquire and what interest payments we'd be obligated to assume. But, that is the effect of the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brinkmeier."

Brinkmeier: "I would ah... merely urge the adoption of Amendment Number 1."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has urged.... the gentleman has ah... moved Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1546 to be adopted. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Selcke: "Committee Amendment Number 2, amends House Bill 1546, page 1, by deleting lines 27 and 28, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brinkmeier. Is that Representative Rigney, also."

Rigney: "Well, Mr. Speaker Amendment Number 2, merely makes it clear that we can talk now only about reimbursement ah... for land that is being mortgaged, but also land that has been acquired under a land contract. In as much as most of land today does change hands on the basis of a land contract, so I move for the adoption of Amendment Number 2."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brinkmeier."

Brinkmeier: "Yes, Mr. Speaker I would request the adoption of Amendment Number 2."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 2, to House Bill 1546. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Selcke: "Committee Amendment Number 3, amends House Bill 1546 on page 2, Line 5, and so forth."

Rigney: "Well, Mr. Speaker, Amendment Number 3 makes it clear that when we adjust this payment it shall be done on the bases of the going rate for... ah... borrowing that the farmer would do ah... on the



land that he would be replacing ah... the original Bill said it should be done on the bases of... of what a person could receive for the money he placed on deposit, but these people will not be depositing money, they will be borrowing money to ah... buy additional land and it's on the bases of what will they have to pay to the bank ah... to borrow this money. I move for the adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Mr. Speaker, there is one thing, maybe the Clerk can inform me. Have these Amendments been distributed because I've looked all over for them, I don't have them."

Speaker Redmond: "Advised by the Clerk that they are Committee Amendments they should have been adopted... should have been distributed."

Lechowicz: "Well, I don't think so ah... will the Clerk let me know if they are or not... Our staff people don't even have them. Speaker..."

Speaker Redmond: "How many Amendments are there... Three Amendments. Representative Rigney."

Rigney: "They were distributed on the Republican side, that's all I know."

Speaker Redmond: "We have been advised, they have been distributed."

The question is on the Amendment... on the adoption of Amendment Number 3. All those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. 1547... Oh wait a minute, that's right it has to be held for a Fiscal Note. We'll have to hold it on the Order of Second Reading. 1547."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1547, Kozubowski. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. 1554."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1554, Geo-Karis. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act creating the Board of Higher Education. Second Reading of the Bill..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

O'Brien: "Ah... this Bill was read a second time previously, Committee Amendment Number 1, was tabled, Committee Amendment Number 2, was tabled ah... Committee Amendment Number 3..."



Geo-Karis: "Was adopted."

O'Brien: "Was adopted and the Bill was ordered held on Second Reading."

Geo-Karis: "Ah... I... there's three other Amendments coming up right now."

O'Brien: "Committee Amend... ah... floor Amendment Number 4, Geo-Karis, amends House Bill 1554, on page 1 by striking line 16 through 17, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Ah... this simply ah... does just what the ah... Clerk said and ah.. it also strikes line 22 and its unfortunate when the Bill was drafted they had put 'non-voting members' well, we struck out 'non-voting' so the members adds three persons representing, it goes on with the rest of the Bill. I move the adoption of Amendment Number 4."

Speaker Redmond: "The lady from Lake, has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 4, to House Bill 1554. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Representative Bradley, for what purpose do you arise."

Bradley: "Well, thank you, Mr. Speaker. I arise for the purpose of an introduction, Mr. Speaker in the gallery we have the young members of the Austin Community Organization from the 18th and the 21st Districts which are represented by Representative Bob Downs, Jesse Madison, Bob McPartlin, Langdon Patrick, Larry DiPrima and Vincent Molloy and I wished those members of that Organization would stood... would stand and be recognized."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis, Amendment Number 5."

O'Brien: "Amendment Number 5, amends House Bill 1554 on page 4, by striking lines 28 through...."

Geo-Karis: "Ah... Amendment Number 5, ah... corrects the title of the Superintendent of Public Instruction and changes it to the State Superintendent of Education because that's what he is known by now, Mr. Speaker and I move the adoption of Amendment Number 5."

Speaker Redmond: "The lady has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 5, to House Bill 1554. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"



Geo-Karis: "Yes."

O'Brien: "Amendment Number 6, Geo-Karis. Amends House Bill 1554 on page 2 by striking line 9, and so forth."

Geo-Karis: "Ah... Amendment Number 6, ah... refers to page 2 as the Clerk said and ah... states that none of the members, representing Public or non-Public Institutions may on the budget recommendations to be made with respect to any institution or system of institutions, and it goes on, interested shall have no vote on either budget or policy, matters which is already entered. And, I move for the adoption of Amendment Number 6."

Speaker Redmond: "The lady has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 6, to House Bill 1554. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments? Third Reading. I have been advised that there is a pair of lost glasses, on Representative Kosinski's desk. Will the owner of the lost glasses please claim them. 1555."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1555, Marovitz. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Maragos on the floor... or Marovitz rather. Take him out of the Record. 1563, Representative Satterthwaite ah... What's the status of 1562?..."

Satterthwaite: "Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "1562... I know.... that's not been distributed yet. 1563."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1563. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act relating to the care and treatment by counties, persons afflicted with tuberculosis. Second Reading of the Bill. No, Committee Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. 1564."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1564, C. M. Stiehl. A Bill for an Act to provide for free employment of vocational training by Public Community Colleges. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. 1565."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1565, C. M. Stiehl. A Bill for an Act making appropriation to the Illinois Community College Board. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."



Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "No Amendments from the floor, Third Reading. 1568."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1568, Brummet. A Bill for an Act to amend Agriculture Fair Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment, amends House Bill 1568 by deleting a part of page 1 below line 7, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brummet... Representative Brummet, take it out of the Record. 1569."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1569, Brinkmeier. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment, amends House Bill 1569 by deleting everything after line 8, on page 1, and inserting in lieu thereof the following, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brinkmeier."

Brinkmeier: "Well, Mr. Speaker as the Clerk has indicated this Amendment is really the Bill at the present time, it was approved by the Committee and I would urge ah... that we do adopt Amendment Number 1."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1569. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

O'Brien: "Amendment Number 2, Brinkmeier. Amends House Bill 1569 by deleting everything after line 8, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brinkmeier."

Brinkmeier: "Well, Mr. Speaker I'm must confess, I'm at a loss for that Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "It appears to be identical with Amendment Number 1, maybe..."

Brinkmeier: "That's the only Amendment that I'm aware of, is the one..."

Speaker Redmond: "It the same Amendment. Withdraw Amendment Number 2.

Any further Amendments? No further Amendments, Third Reading. 1583."

O'Brien; "House Bill 1583, Telcser. A Bill for an Act making Appropriations to the Illinois Law Enforcement Personnel Employment Board. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor? No Amendments from the floor, Third Reading. 1585."



O'Brien: "House Bill 1585, Polk. A Bill for an Act making appropriation for Secretary State. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor? Representative Hart."

Hart: "I... I wanted to ask the sponsor if... we discussed this Bill in appropriations Committee and I wasn't sure whether he agreed they was going to put an Amendment on it or not ah... there was some talk about amending it down to \$2,500.00 and I... I wasn't sure what he decided that he was going to do."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Polk on the floor? Representative Polk, you desire to have it held on Second Reading... Representative Hart. Take that one out of the Record. 1568."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1568, Brummet. A Bill for an Act to amend the Agriculture Fair Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment, amends House Bill 1568 by deleting that part of page 1, below line 7, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brummet."

Brummet: "Ah... I move the adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1568. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments? No further Amendments, Third Reading. 1586, Representative Polk. 1594."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1594, E. M. Barnes. A Bill for an Act to amend the Highway Advertising Council Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment, amends House Bill 1594 by adding the following thereto, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "1594, Representative Barnes."

Barnes: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. Hou.... Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1594 in essence of the Bill, it's a Committee Amendment and what it does is add ah... definition of the ah... signs that can be placed more than 660 feet to the nearest highway and it also defines Ervan.... Urban areas as to the above signs in the area having more than 5,000 population. I would move for the adoption of Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1594."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number



1, to House Bill 1594. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments? No further Amendments, Third Reading. 1597."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1597, Lucco. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment, amends House Bill 1597 on page 1, by deleting lines 26 through 29, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lucco... Representative Lucco... center aisle, down front... right under the teachers nose."

Lucco: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. Amendment Number 1, is a Committee Amendment, it makes no substantive change in the Bill. I move that Amendment Number 1, be adopted to House Bill 1597. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1597. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments? No further Amendments, Third Reading. 1602."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1602, Tuerk. A Bill for an Act making appropriations to Department of Transportation. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor. Third Reading. 1608, Marovitz... take that out of the Record. 1609, Representative Farley... take that out of the Record. 1610... out of the Record. 1636, Representative Totten... 1645, Representative Flinn.... 1658, Representative Geo-Karis."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1658. A Bill for an Act to amend the Animal Control Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. We will be at ease for about 2 minutes while I consult with the President of the Senate, who used to serve in this Chamber."

Speaker Redmond: "1665."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1665, Macdonald. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relation to Compensation of the Members of the General Assembly. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Macdonald."



Macdonald: "Go ahead."

Speaker Redmond: "Have you explained the Amendment?"

Macdonald: "There are no Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Are there any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. 1668."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1668, Mann. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. 1645."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1645, Flinn. A Bill for an Act in relation to the tenure of certain offices. Second Reading... First.... Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments, Amendment Number 1, amends House Bill 1645 on page 1, line 14, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Flinn."

Flinn: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker and Members of the House.

Ah... the original Bill called for the total compatibility for members of the County Board to hold the office of Township Supervisor simultaneously. Amendment Number 1, ah... permits them only to serve out the term they were elected for prior to the Attorney General's ruling that they could not hold both offices. I move for the adoption of Amendment Number 1."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1645.... Representative Hill... Representative Hill."

Hill: "I wonder if the sponsor would yield to a question."

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Hill: "Do I understand this right that this would allow those supervisors to hold their jobs on the County Board, even though ah... the Attorney General has given an opinion just the opposite."

Flinn: "Ah... Representative Hill, the original Bill said that but all the Amendment does now, is change the Bill to permit them to serve out the term that they were elected for prior to the Attorney General making the ruling. Now, there is considerable opinion... considerable opinion that the Attorney General could have just as well ruled that they participated in and making contracts between the Township and County Board would be illegal, the Act themselves, rather



than ruling them out as supervisors and all I'm doing now is to say that they were duly elected and at that time the Attorney General ruled that they could hold those offices and since that time he has ruled they could not. And, all we are doing in the Amendment is permit them to serve out the term that they were duly elected for."

Hill: "What about those people that were appointed, during this period of time."

Flinn: "I... don't know of any appointments to the ah... County Board or ah... or ah... Township Supervisor, but this says elected, it doesn't have anything to do with the appointments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further questions or discussion? The question is, on the adoption of Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1645. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. Any further Amendments?"

O'Brien: "Amendment Number 2, amends House Bill 1645 on page 1, by adding after Section 2 the following, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Flinn."

Flinn: "Ah... thank you, Mr. Speaker. Amendment Number 2, just makes all the Acts of the Township Supervisor during the interim period legal, so that we don't have any problems ah... tax protest and so forth, so I move for the adoption of Amendment Number 2."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the adoption of Amendment Number 2, to House Bill 1645. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments? No further Amendments, Third Reading. 1681, Representative Rayson... 1681."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1681. A Bill for an Act to amend the Cannabis Control Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment, amends House Bill 1681 on page 1, by deleting line 1 and inserting in lieu thereof, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Rayson."

Rayson: "Thank you, Mr. Chairman. This is the ah... Amendment that has hailed white and known as the Cass Amendment to this very important Bill, which the daily news says, makes it a very sensible marijuana Bill and I move the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 1,



to House Bill 1681."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Would the sponsor indicate what the Amendment does."

Speaker Redmond: "Explain the Amendment, please."

Rayson: "Yes, after weeks of work the Amendment puts in on the Cannabis Control Act, penalties for all avenues of marijuana use. As to a limited amount of private use, it would be a petty offense penalty and for public use, which would be defined in statute, it would be graded misdemeanor penalty with an open end to suggest in the definition of cannabis, if there are derivatives of cannabis found to be virilous and found to be extremely harmful that we wouldn't have to remend this Act to put them in control substance. It also covers vagary in the exsisting law now where there is no common conspiracy ah... statute applicable to marijuana possession over 500 grans, which was a vagary of the... of the old law, it was by an oversight admitted so we tighten that up. This is the thrust of the Amendment and Representative Katz could articulate further but I hope that's ah... explanatory."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Do you say what the penalties are in the Amendment. Ray, what are the penalties in the Arendment."

Rayson: "I could name them but I would rather ah.... ah... mind deferring this to Representative Katz, the architect of this Amendment. Representative Katz."

Lechowicz: "Fine."

Katz: "Ah... what the ah... Bill does is to ah... tighten up the penalties that would have been elimated under the original Bill. As regard... the use and possession of less than 30 grams of marijuana ah... the penalty is the fine not to exceed \$100.00. On the first offense the Judge ah... may, if he desires, require of the young person or whoever the offender is... to attend a drug education course if the court has one, that they want the person to do it. Ah... it characterizes the offense as a petty offense ah... that is what the crime is. For the use and possession of marijuana in excess of 30 grams ah... I think the penalties are less ah...undisturbed



for the public smoking of marijuana, I don't have my file with it but the penalties ah... are misdemeanors depending, it starts out with ah... Grade C, misdemeanor, the second offense, Grade B, the third offense Grade A. In other words the ah... the limited penalties of the petty offense applies only to the private possession and use of marijuana, it does not apply to the ah... to the public use. In addition to that, the Amendment ah... tighten up ah... another provision that I thought was, myself too loose and the Sub-Committee, incidentally that reported the Bill that consisted of Representative Palmer and Representative Getty and Representative Rayson, four Members of the Sub-Committee were the ones who came in with this. The original Bill restricted the language 'delivery' that appears in the original Bill to limit it to the use of the word 'sale', so that presumably anybody who delivered marijuana, but if you couldn't prove a sale would not be doing anything illegal, we restore the original word from the present Act of 'delivery' so that tighten up that provision. I believe that summarizes, Representative Lechowicz the general structure of the penalties that are provided in the Amendment."

Lechowicz: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion. The question is on the adoption... Representative Duff.... Representative Duff."

Duff: "Ah... one question of the ah... sponsor of the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Duff: "Ah... Representative Katz, in one section in the Amendment it says to the extent that ah... control should ever in the future be applied that... that... that this Amendment wouldn't apply."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Rayson... Representative Rayson do you care to..."

Rayson: "I refer you to line... on page 2, line 16 through 19."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Katz."

Katz: "Well... one of the things that we did, as I told you, we were trying to tighten up the Bill ah... there is some suggestion beginning to appear that ah... there may be ah... derivatives of marijuana that they may be more harmful than marijuana... we... the facts are



not yet established but at least there is a suggestion that this may be true and ah... all that we say there is, if there is a derivative of marijuana that the General Assembly in the future should bring under the control substances Act that those lesser penalties that are ah... mentioned in response to Representative Lechowicz's question would not be would not be applicable... that the penalties in the Control Substances Act with... would apply. That was simply an attempt to... to shore up the situation and the concerns that have been expressed by some... that ah... there are derivatives or possible derivatives of marijuana that might be quite different than marijuana, much more ah... harmful and a much greater stimulant and all that we say is that, if that does develop and the General Assembly does decide to bring that substances under the Control Substances Act, the penalties under the Control Substances Act rather than this Amendment would be the ones that would be applicable."

Duff: "My question on the... on those particular 4 lines is not because I misunderstand your intent but it's because I do consider it also to be an important ah... matter and I wonder if we can draft, in futures in the way that this is drafted. I wonder if it's ah... legal drafting ah... ah... if this General Assembly can pass a Bill which is drafted in... in futures."

Katz: "Well... I don't believe that... Representative Duff, that it is really in futures all that we're saying is, ah... that it ah... the consumption or use of a drug ah... is a drug that comes under the Control Substances Act that the penalties of the Control Substances Act will apply. I... I think that I would welcome your judgement I know that you have had lots of experience but it would seem to me that puts the way that I put it, namely that... that the jurisdiction under this law excludes ah... matters that ah... come within the scope of the Control Substances Act, I don't believe that that's invalid at all. I think that's a perfectly permissible way for a statute to apply. I am glad that you raised the point however, about the whole thing because I want to tell you that it is a provision that should be reassuring to ah... lots of Members of the General Assembly and ah... we really ah... are very hopeful that when it does reach



Third Reading that Members will understand that it has been carefully drafted in such a way as to ah... protect ah... young people and ah... it a sound kind of Amendment in our opinion."

Duff: "On more question if I may, Representative Katz. On page 2 ah... Section 4.1 ah... line 20 through ah... 28. Ah... it refers to public property on line 21 and public place or of accommodation on line 22 ah... and I wonder if that means that if somebody lived in the ah... public housing project that they would be ah... not included under the extentions of the Bill and I wonder in terms of publice place of accommodation, whether if that means that if somebody were in a hotel room or motel room or some similar enclosed facility, but public to whether that also would not be included."

Katz: "Ah... in my opinion ah... Representative Duff, if they were in the public housing project ah... in the game room or in the lobby ah... I would think that... that would be a public place and I believe that they would be subject to the misdemeanor penalties for..."

Duff: "I'm referring to the words, public property on line 22..."

Katz: "Yes, I don't ah... Representative Duff, I'm doing this from memory because Representative Rayson just sort of transfered this to me all of a sudden. But, I'm quite familiar with it and without regards to given you the particular line. I do believe I can answer the question. And, I believe the answer to the question is that if you are talking about a public part of a public housing project, the answer is that it would be a public place but, if your talking about the apartment that is normally occupied by a tenant I believe that would not be a public place and I think that would be the answer to your question."

Duff: "Representative Katz, I will direct your attention to line 21 of page 2, where it says public property, it doesn't say a game room, it says public property and that could include every single part of a public housing project..."

Katz: "Well..."

Duff: "No other way to read it."

Katz: "Yes, well Representative Duff ah... what I would suggest, if you would like to do so, ah... would be that I would be glad to ah... to



ah... to meet with you if Representative ah... Rayson is agreeable to hold it on Second Reading or to move it forward though but with a understanding that if after looking at it together we do concluded that another Amendment is in order. You and I together can draft it I believe we agree on what it ought to be, it's just a question of looking at and seeing what it does... so I would give you my assurance that as soon as the matter moves on, I will come over to see you..."

Duff: "Representative Katz, if I can save you some time, I don't think we agree on what it should be and I don't want to participate in drafting the Amendment, I only want to bring it to your attention."

Katz: "Thank you ah... very much, Representative Duff."

Speaker Redmond: "Any futher discussion? The question is on the Amend... the adoption of Amendment Number 1, to House Bill 1681. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it... the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. All in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Roll call vote. Have all voted who wished. Representative McGrew."

McGrew: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Could we go... run through this just briefly again, I'm not sure if I understand the ramification for this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Katz."

Katz: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, those people who are voting red there, are vot voting in favor of the Illinois Bar Association Bill which takes off any penalties at all... for the private use and consumption of any amount of marijuana, I don't understand it. Now, the Amendment is a very restrictive Amendment, it limits very much ah... the Illinois Bar Association rise some Bill ah... the Bill in its form in this Amendment ah... very much limits marijuana, it is... those people who believe in strict controls would be voting green on this Amendment for sure. I don't understand my good colleague Mr. Cunningham for example, voting red because he voted against the Bill in its original form and what he is voting for, if your voting red, is the Bill in its original form... exactly as the Bar Association introduced it."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Borchers."

Borchers: "Speaker, fellow Members of the House. Very simple by leav... by voting ah... red and putting this ah... getting this as it would be, what we're doing is putting in better posture to defeat when it comes to the floor of the House and get rid of the whole thing."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Cunningham.... Representative Daniels."

Daniels: "Well, Mr. Speaker ah... rising to explain my vote I'd like to inform you as one of the members of the Judiciary Committee that heard this Bill. The problem that we face here is the Illinois Bill, Illinois Bar Association that was presented to us was in such disastrous form that those of us in good mind could not support it. Now we have the Bill, the ah... Katz's Bill that's before us right now in the Amendment form. Now, the reason that I'm going to vote 'no' on this proposed Amendment is because that the Bill in its present form actually doesn't go to the overall problem that we're dealing with. The decision that we're being asked to abide by, by supporting this Amendment, is not whether or not the use of marijuana should be legal but whether or not we actually want to encourage the trafficking in the use of marijuana. Because, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House actually by voting for this Amendment and supporting this Bill you'll be supporting the use of private possession of marijuana. Now, what you are saying then on the other hand is, that you can use it in your home but don't dare grow it because you'll still be guilty of a criminal offense and don't try to buy it because your going to be guilty of a criminal offense. And Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House I submit to you, that this Amendment in its current form, does not deal with the problem that our young people would like us to deal with nor does it deal with the problem that our adults or the Criminal Justice System would like us to deal with. I find it insignificant and consequently I attend to oppose it at all fronts."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished. Representative Cunningham."

Cunningham: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. The Captain Quig who runs the Judiciary II, created the impression in minds of some of you that if you voted 'no' here.... if you've been



there you will agree with my analyses, but it may have created the impression that if you voted 'no' here, you were bound to vote green when the terrible original Bill comes on the floor. Nothing could be further from the truth, the gentleman from Decatur accurately put his finger on it, your constituents are not in favor of this wild irresponsible effort that coyses the... carries favor with the marijuana people. You can vote red everytime it gets up and you won't be too far from wrong and I want to say to you, there will be an Amendment here just very shortly that I shall offer that got extremely short striped in the.... the House, in the Committee but the thrust of the Amendment is that we give a release to those parents who have the misfortune of having children who are born with prenatal brain damage and are also users of cannabis, that chilling thought should give some of you a little pause here before you put all..."

Speaker Redmond: "Bring your remarks to a close, your time is expiring."

Cunningham: "I'm coming that way... Speaker, before you put all these irresponsible green lights on the board. Vote red."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished. Representative Schisler."

Schisler: "Mr. Speaker, at the proper time I would like to table this Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished? On this question... take the Record, on this question there is 64 'yes', 44 'no' and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments. Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "The gentleman to be recognized, I think this would be the proper time. A motion to table is in order at anytime."

Speaker Redmond: "Speak for yourself John Alden."

Walsh: "Well... he has... He asked to be recognized."

Speaker Redmond: "I didn't see that... that he had given you any proxy."

Walsh: "No...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schisler, do you desire to be recognized."

Schisler: "Mr... Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. To save a lot of time now and on Third Reading, I move to table this Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Rayson."

Schisler: "1681."

Rayson: "Well... has ah.... ah... Mr. Speaker have you ah.... declared the



results of the vote on the Amendment Number 1."

Speaker Redmond: "Yes, and I declared the Amendment was adopted."

Rayson: "Well... we're on Second Reading Mr. Speaker, I suggest that motion is out of order. It's not germane to the amending process."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ewell."

Ewell: "Mr. Speaker, I support Mr. Rayson's point. The gentleman could move to strike the enacting clause my amendment which would be proper but surely he can't move at this stage to table another Members Bill. I think the Bill belongs to the sponsor and only he can ah... move to table the Bill and I ask that you rule the gentleman's request out of order."

Speaker Redmond: "I'm not to sure of the status of this but I would request that ah... Representative Schisler hold this motion... to advance it to Third Order, I will then decide whether or not your motion is in order. Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Why don't you decide that before hand, we have a number of ah... Amendments to this Bill we could save a great deal of time if your decision will be that the motion is in order and I think that it is."

Speaker Redmond: "The motion is out of order... the motion is out of order."

Walsh: "Just because I think it's in order, or did you consult with anyone."

Speaker Redmond: "In the next Session if your Speaker, why then you can rule whatever you want. Any further Amendments?"

O'Brien: "Committee Amendment Number 2, was tabled in Committee. Floor Amendment Number 3, Cunningham. Amends House Bill 1681 as amended by inserting at the end of subsection (b) of Section 10 the following, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Cunningham."

Cunningham: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Amendment Number 3, merely releases the parent of a child who is born with brain damage and the parents use cannabis. Now, 64 of you went on record here a few moments ago as being in favor of a ...a system where by the users of cannabis were subjected to penalty that's



comparable to pl... to improper parking of your car in Chicago, 3 times. And, if you feel so strongly that there's no possible damage of brain damage you have a moral obligation of putting it on the record here by adding this Amendment to the Bill and giving the complete bill of health to these parents that are addicted with that particular habit. When I offered this Bill in the Judiciary Committee, I was told that it was irresponsible, that I was dealing very flippantly with a very serious subject but I'll leave it to my constituents as to which of us is dealing seriously or not seriously with this very vital concern to all the people throughout the State of Illinois. This is the time to face up to reality, you have come to a 'y' in the road where you must make a choice and if you are positive that there is no danger involved you must vote for the Amendment and if you think that there is any possibility of prenatal brain damage then you have a moral obligation to vote against the Bill itself. The ideal is not mine, it was suggested to me by a member of the Board of Governors of the Illinois State Bar Association and those of you who thought that sanity had left that ah... association entirely are in error. There is a small vocal minority and God Bless them, but the fact that the majority of the I.S.B.A. acts irresponsibly does not give you and I a licenses to do so. I urge and plead with you to give me a green light on Amendment Number 3."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lundy.... Lundy."

Lundy: "Ah... Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. To despite the eloquent explanations that sunk the Amendment, I don't find that on my desk and I make an effort to try to keep track of the Amendments and I don't find it distributed. Has it been distributed to the members desks?"

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion on Amendment Number 3? Representative Rayson."

Rayson: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, I... I admire the gentleman from ah... Lawrence County... he.... I have trouble distinguish whether he... he makes comments in just or whether he is serious, in short striped in sub-committee, he didn't. I seconded his motion for the purpose of having full discussion on the matter. I might say that there was



a... at that hearing a ah... representative of the Illinois Medical Society which... which reputed some ah... of this ah... dreadful ah... information that some people were saying with regard to this subject ah... no matter what the gentleman might in variousness suggest it... it's couched at least in a... the ambiguity of provocative and I of the courtesy of the gentleman have to resist and I think he knows that... and I trust that this Amendment would be defeated."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McGrew."

McGrew: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Would the sponsor of the Amendment yield for a question."

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates that he will."

Cunningham: "Delighted."

McGrew: "As you indicate, if a child has brain damage his parents would not be held responsible, were he using marijuana, is that correct."

Cunningham: "That is exactly what the Bill... Amendment does."

McGrew: "My only question..."

Cunningham: "Give the parents a bath we... we're going to excuse them from civil liability and we will also excuse them from parental neglect... because..."

McGrew: "My only question, Representative Cunningham, did your mother ask you to do this?"

Cunningham: "No, it was your mother."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion. Representative Yourell... Ewell rather."

Ewell: "Would the sponsor yield to a question."

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Ewell: "Ah... Mr. Sponsor, don't you think that we really ought to include 'drink' in this because I understand there is quite a bit more brain damage from drinking.... and don't you think that we might be better, perhaps we join forces and put this in an independent Bill and include both 'drink' and the 'use of marijuana' and we might even add a few other things in."

Cunningham: "But, if I understood the new rules, we could only have one subject... on topic and that will have to be a separate Bill but I'll



join with you in that, Raymond."

Ewell: "All right, understand again I think this is sort of a bad Amendment for this particular Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Houlihan, James."

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker, I move the previous question."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved the previous question. The question is, shall the main question be put. All in favor... no debate on this... all in favor of the main question vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Representative Cunningham, if the Chambers will be quiet enough, I'd like to have Representative Cunningham close."

Cunningham: "Take the roll.... take the roll."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "Are we on the motion to end debate or on the main question?"

Speaker Redmond: "We're on the motion to the previous ques.... to end debate... Have all voted who wished. Have all voted who wished. Representative Geo-Karis, a point of personal privilege."

Geo-Karis: "Ah... I have a very confusing gentleman behind me. I'm so confused I don't know whether... if I vote yes, what I'm voting for, if I vote no, what I'm voting for. Will someone explain something."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is, shall the main question be put. Have all voted who wished. Take the record. On this question there are 82 'yes', 62 'no', the previous question carried. Now, the question is, on the adoption...the motion... have been corrected, takes 2/3 of those voting to the previous question. The previous question was lost, it didn't have 2/3. Further discussion on Amendment Number 3. Representative Satterthwaite."

Satterthwaite: "Will the sponsor of the Amendment yield for a question."

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Satterthwaite: "Mr. Cunningham, I am a little concerned because as a mother of two brain damaged children and as a person who has never used marijuana in any form. I find that the Medical Profession finds it very difficult to determine what the cause of brain damage is. And, I wonder if you have some kind of a test now... that will indicate, not only what ah... what the cause of the brain damage was



but will specify that it was because of the use of marijuana."

Cunningham: "No, and I appreciate the the sincerity of the question. As was indicated by one of the other speakers, the testimony before the Judiciary Committee was very much in conflict. The Medical Association sent a very aerodite and ah... persuasive doctor on the subject and he said there was some risk. I think that was alluded to by the Chairman or by the sponsor on that. I have no information just the testimony that was offered in the... in the hearing and to me it was absolutely appalling that the Bill progress another inch. I would have thought that it would have perished on the spot."

Satterthwaite: "Well, I would like to suggest that if there is no way of enforcing this and there is no way of distinguishing whether brain damage has been caused by the use of marijuana or for some other cause, it's silly for us to have this kind of an Amendment on any Bill regardless of how damaging the use of this substance might be."

Cunningham: "Your given away your non legal background. The question of liability is always... always very serious. We're given a complete total release to the parents and that shouldn't be characterized as silly, it could be a ^Amonitory value."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mann."

Mann: "Mr. Speaker, the gentleman did not answer the question. He doesn't know and no one else knows, whether or not brain damage ah... is transmitted ah... genetically ah... or not or what the genetic causes are or string. No one knows medically or conclusively whether or not cannabis causes brain damage and surely he's toogodd of a lawyer ah... to say to Mrs. Satterthwaite that she displays her legal ignorance because she gave a very good question. How would a Judge ever determine it, now let me finish, Roscoe. This is not a serious Amendment and you know it, it's an offense to anybody that has a brain damage child as anyone who is brain damaged now, if your against the Bill you ought to oppose it on Third Reading and not come up with some kind of a varied speeches and insulting Amendment. And we ought to vote it down."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Walsh."



Walsh: "Well, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I suggest the last speaker was completely out of order and has no business at all criticizing another Members Amendment for whatever reason. I suggest to you that there is no reason why we can't support this Amendment, I'm supporting it because it makes a bad Bill infinitely worse. But, everybody else can support it to be- cause if you think that marijuana does not cause brain damage, and I'm convinced there is evidence that there is, that it does. There is an article in the Readers Digest by a very prominent Physician who turned a hundred and eighty degrees on this subject and is very much opposed to cannabis now. I suggest to you that everybody ought to be able to support this, the proponents and the opponents. So give Roscoe a break, this is an opportunity to get Roscoe in your pocket too, he'll help you sometime this is a good Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Luff... Representative Mann, a point of order. What is your point."

Mann: "Point... point of personel privilege, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Mann: "The last speaker is certainly the last man that should get up on this floor and tell anybody, that another Member should not be critical of another Member. The last speaker..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lundy."

Lundy: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I move to table this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Cunningham."

Cunningham: "Wait, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Cunningham."

Cunningham: "The Speaker has just ruled just a few minutes earlier, that a motion to table was out of order on Second Reading. It came from the liberal wing of the Party, in that regard and you can-not do a flip-flop in mid air at this point. And, while I've got the microphone, I want the record to be very clear on the point that my remarks to the distinguished Representative from Champaign were in no way critical. She is one of the finest people that I know, she voted for me the other night at... at the Pensions Bill and I... I think very highly of her... far more than many others who have



criticized ah... both of us in this matter. I want to..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ewell."

Ewell: "Point of.... point of order ah.. strike it... I withdraw...ah...
I'm ready to vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Duff."

Duff: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I would hardly venture to criticize my respected
colleague..."

Speaker Redmond: "I believe your out of order, Mr. Lundy has raised a
point of order. This motion to table is not debatable. So the
question is, shall Amendment Number 3.... Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Well....have you agreed to accept the gentleman's motion with
respect to a motion to table, and if you have, will you distinguish
between this ruling and the ruling you made on Representative
Schisler's motion to table the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "The motion to table the Amendment has been a proper
motion as long as I've been here. So, I rule as far as an Amendment
is concerned, that I think a motion to table is proper. If you want
the opinion of the Chair I would have preferred that rather than get
into this arraign, that's taken about an half an hour, if we had
concentrated on what we're going to do on Third Reading we probably
would have been a lot better off. Representative Schisler."

Schisler: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Under ah...
rule 63 'b-2 ah... I ah... still move to ah... strike the enacting
clause, on House Bill 1681."

Speaker Redmond: "An Amendment er.... a ah... a motion to that effect
has been filed in writing and it will be taken up at the proper
time. Right at the moment now....Representative Matijeich."

Matijeich: "Mr. Speaker, under that rule it has precedence over....
over over any Amendment, if you will check that rule... that I think
it's in order right now."

Speaker Redmond: "Which rule are you referring to."

Matijeich: "63 'b2'."

Speaker Redmond: "Have been advised by the Parliamentarian that Represent-
ative Matijeich is right and that the motion to strike the enacting
clause takes precedence, over all Amendments. I'm not sure that I



agree with the ah... Parliamentarian but we pay them... No this isn't your motion, it's Representative Schisler's motion. The motion is, shall... have you got the motion there... Representative Schisler has moved... has moved to Amendment House Bill 1681 by removing the enacting clause. 63 'b-2'. Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis; "Ah... Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Do I understand on the point of parliamentary inquiry that, if we vote 'yes' on Representative Schisler's motion we ar.... we are in effect ah... dropping the Bill on its head, where it belongs is that right."

Speaker Redmond: "Your killing the Bill, I don't know how you doing it..."

Geo-Karis: "Thank you. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Beaupre."

Beaupre: "A point of parliamentary inquiry, Mr. Chairman."

Speaker Redmond: "State your point."

Beaupre: "If we ah... strike the enacting clause on this Bill by voting 'yes' on this, is it not true that the Bill will continue to advance... ah... on the Calendar."

Speaker Redmond: "My understanding is if you strike the enacting clause, that the Bill is dead."

Beaupre: "Well, I understand that the Bill is dead but the Bill technically still would advance on the Calendar, would it not?"

Speaker Redmond: "No. Are you ready for the question? The question is, shall House Bill 1681 be amended by removing the enacting clause. Representative Rayson."

Rayson: "Al..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Rayson."

Rayson: "Mr. Speaker ah... I want to abide by the rules, if you... I... I want to explain my vote or I want to certainly resist this motion whatever the Chair thinks is appropriate at this time."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, you may debate the issue, you may do whatever you please."

Rayson: "All right. Ah... I've been here over 10 years and ah... very rarely has this kind of procedural device been used ah... we always seem to have a precedence of... of extending courtesy to sponsors, and I might say Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, that after we work



painstakingly on this Amendment for over 2 weeks and burning midnight oil, and having it shaped up to the extent that we feel the majority of this House would support, this Bill is amendment and after we have a little time to turn around some of the strip, some of the people might have because this thing was labeled as a decriminalization Bill, which it is not any Bill of that nature what so ever, add when we came up with a product with Representative Katz and Representative Romie Palmer, the distinguish Minority Spokesman for the Republicans in House Committee, Judiciary II Committee, asked to be chief co-sponsors I think as a courtesy now to 3 chief co-sponsors that you should join with me in opposing this motion, at this time. We can have our Third Reading up and down, but I think it's most ^{PERTINENT} impairment to the responsibility of the Members of this House that we ventilate this issue in the context of the social scene and in context to what this penalty Amendment really in fact might do in the Cannabis Control Act for the betterment of the State. And that's why..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Jaffe, for what purpose do you arise."

Jaffe: "A parliamentary inquiry, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "State your point."

Jaffe: "As I understand your ruling, you said that this is a motion to amend. Now, as I understand it, in order to amend we must have an Amendment, that we must have an Amendment placed on our desk and I don't have any Amendments on my desk, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, this is not a motion to amend, this is a motion to strike the enacting clauses, it's proper under the rules."

Speaker Redmond: "The paper that I have before me reads, I hereby move to amend House Bill 1681 by removing the enacting clause. Now if this was phrased a little bit differently, I might agree with you but this calls itself a motion to amend. Representative Barnes."

Barnes: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. Not only that, I raise the question upon the form of this Amendment. It is not in proper form it's just Xeroxed on a piece of paper, it does not amend anything, it does not elude to anything it's just a piece of paper that's been ran off, it is not worth the paper it's written on."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schraeder."

Schraeder: "Mr. Speaker, I move the previous question, everybody knows it's a bad Bill, we might as well get it over with. I move the previous question."

Speaker Redmond: "The problem is, as I see it, is what has been handed to me is not a simple motion to strike the enacting clause... which is... if it was in that form it would be in order but this is a motion to amend and I believe that under our rules we would have to have it xerox and distributed... Representative Marovitz."

Marovitz: "Mr. Speaker... Mr. Speaker, I would like to ah... for one moment, I would like to remind my colleagues on the other side of the aisle that this is a Bill of joint sponsorship, take it or leave it. And ah... it deserves to be heard on its merits and not destroyed so merrily, like some people want to do. It's a Bill that has gotten a lot of publicity, its been... its in effect in other States and it's about time that we hear this question, on its merits, vote it up or down but don't kill it so merrily. A lot of time was spend on this Bill, it does have joint sponsorship, let's hear the Bill and not... and kill this Amendment it is absurd.... you may disagree with the Bill but do it on the floor on Third Reading."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Meyer."

Meyer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ah... a point of parliamentary inquiry. Is this motion debatable?"

Speaker Redmond: "I think this one is."

Meyer: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "The final disposition of the Bill. If it isn't, it has been. Representative Mautino.... Representative Mautino."

Mautino: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. As I look at the Amendment I ah... I like to ask Representative Collins, how do you spell striking, is that striking or stricking, a good labor man would spell those differently, I think. I think it is improper, sir. It's not even spelled correctly."

Speaker Redmond: "The House will be in order, I'll recognize Representative Schisler, you have two documents that you have submitted to the Chair. One is a... a motion to amend and the other one is ah..."



a move to ah... to strike the enacting clause. Now, do you desire to... to ah... withdraw the motion to amend. He indicates that he does, now, the question is on the motion of Representative Schisler which I move under rule 63 'b-2' to strike the enacting clause to House Bill 1681. And, I don't believe that that has to be in writing... Representative Madison."

Madison: "Mr. Speaker, I have before me an Amendment to House Bill 1681, it is Amendment Number 6, and I suggest, Mr. Speaker that this Amendment is technically incorrect on its face. The word striking is misspelled, the word inactive is misspelled and I think this ah... Amendment is completely out of order, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "We're not... we're not on that, Representative Madison, we're under the motion, it's not a motion to amend. The motion of Representative Schisler under rule 63 'b-2', to strike the enacting clause of House Bill 1681."

Madison: "Mr. Speaker, is it a ruling of the Chair that that motion does not have to be in writing."

Speaker Redmond: "It is in writing here but it doesn't have to be xerox and be distributed on the desks of the Members. If it was an Amendment, it would have to be distributed. It's a simple motion, it has to be produced in writing but not necessary distributed."

Madison: "Mr. Speaker might I ask if what you have in writing is an exact replica of what I have in writing here."

Speaker Redmond: "Ah... I don't know, the one that I have, it says I move under rule 63 'b-2' to strike the enacting clause to House Bill 1681."

Madison: "Thank You, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Signed, Gale Schisler."

Madison: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the motion to strike the enacting clause to House Bill 1681. Those in favor vote 'aye', those opposed vote 'no'. Representative Barnes, for what purpose do you arise... Representative Barnes."

Barnes: "Thank you, very much Mr. Speaker. Parliamentary inquiry. How many votes does it take for this to be sub..."



Speaker Redmond: "Wait until I find out."

Barnes: "Sustained"

Speaker Redmond: "Simple majority."

Barnes: "Nope...ah... a... a point of order... point of order."

Speaker Redmond: "State your point."

Barnes: "Your striking a total Bill here, your not striking a section
your your striking everything after the amend... the enacting clause
which in effect strikes the total Bill. Now, we saying that we
going to vote a Bill up and down by Amendment form with only a
simple majority. No ah... ah... ah..."

Speaker Redmond: "I have been advised that it takes a simple majority
unless the rules specifies differently. The rule doesn't spec...
Representative Mann."

Mann: "Mr. Speaker, in explaining my vote I say to my colleagues, wel-
come to the 12th century. I vote 'no'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Katz."

Katz: "Ah... Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Ah...
I really do wonder why the ah... gentleman from ah... New Loundon
is so concerned about not letting this Bill go to Third Reading.
Is he afraid that a full debate on the merits of this Bill might
persuade the Members of this House that this Bill makes sense, that
it makes sense to 22,000 people in Illinois who were last year convicted
of this crime. We deal with the most serious kinds of problems here I
doubt, since the gentleman has been in this House, if a single Bill
has ever been killed by this process. Every Member, including that
gentleman has been entitled to have his Bill on Third Reading and
to have the merits debated. Why do they deny to other people the
rights that they themselves cherish, where are the defendents of
freedom and the opponents of tyranny here when they are trying to
steamroll us thought this House an Amendment that has its purpose
denying Members of this House an opportunity to have their Bill
fully debated and fairly heard. Let them stand back and if they
want to attack, let them attack at the proper place, on Third Read-
ing. This is a gross insult to the intelligence of this House and
to the people of Illinois who labor under the assumption that this

is a parliamentary deliberate body where people are prepared to listen to arguments and then vote on the merits after they have heard the argument. This is not a lynching society here, this is a place where Members are entitled to have their Bills fairly heard on Third Reading and I'm very much... and very whole heartedly ask the members to allow the sponsors of this Bill the same privilege that was accorded to thousands of Bill last Session, thousands of Bills the Session before and to vote 'no'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. At the time this Bill was called in Judiciary, I went down because I thought it was one of the most terrible Bills that I ever heard introduced in this House. And, I was ashamed almost to be a Member of the Illinois Bar Association that they would go on record as wanting to legalize marijuana. But I have read the Amendment and I wish some of you would just take the time to read the Amendment, I was co-chairman of the Illinois Crime Commission with Representative Hide and spent over a year going up and down this State and into other States to draft the law that this is seeking to amend. Now, I think that possibly one of the worse... worse things that we have facing us as a society is the drug abuse and the use of drugs of this nature but I ask you to look and to give this Bill a chance to get to Third Reading where we can debate it, where we can understand it... then if your opposed to it, let's kill it but this is enough of an important subject to take the time of this House to debate the merits of the Bill, not kill it by a parliamentary motion."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Palmer."

Palmer: "Well Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. The Amendment does not decriminalize marijuana... and if the motion to strike the enacting clause if sustained, we will then be foreclosed, that is the Members of this House... the legislature will be foreclosed from further inquiry and to this problem. The problem will not go away... it's still with us and it needs const... constant scrutiny by the Members of the Legislature. We did come out, I believe in Amendment Number 1, with a realistic approach to the problem, we have not

decriminalized anything but we did provide for a realism that is exercised by the courts now, and that is, not to send these young offenders to jail. We've provided for a petty offense... we also provided for some court jurisdiction for that person through the conditional discharge apparatus, we also provided that the court could say to this child, a person that they could get into a drug education course which is a most needed thing right now in this field of marijuana. It should not be killed now, the Members of this Legislature should not turn its... their backs on this approach. Kindly let it go to Third Reading... kindly deny the motion to kill the Bill, let it go to Third and let's have floor argument at that time as is due every Member of this Legislature and the Public."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madison."

Madison: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen. Ah...

Mr. Speaker I'm not an attorney, I ah... I ah... don't sit on the Judiciary Committee but I'm concerned about what is happening here. Ah... it seems to me that... well, first of all, the merits of the Bill at this point is be damned. It seems to be that what we're doing here is opening up ah.... it's setting a precedent that's going to open up pandora box in terms of Members having their Bills killed on Second Reading. I think its a bad precedent, as I look up and see those green lights it reminds me of an illicit love affair with ah... with the rules of this House that is going to bastardize the whole process and I would suggest very strongly that the Members reconsider their feeling as it relates to killing a Bill this way... and if a Bill needs to be killed it ought to be killed on Third Reading or else what we're going to have in the future is a flurry of motions to strike enacting clauses and a hell of a lot of Bills killed on Second Reading and not having a chance for those Bills to be heard fully. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Meyer."

Meyer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ah... for the edification for those who can't remember and in especially Representative Katz. The last time this motion was offered was by John Lewis when he was a Member of this House and that was on Representative Rayson's Bill in 1966



where he successfully struck the enacting clause on the abortion Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ewell."

Ewell: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to point out to the Body that this Bill is alive by virtue of a technicality. I support the Bill, I support the principal. However, the Bill is alive by virtue of some technicalities which occurred in the early morning hours ah... in Committee. I suggest, we may not the Bill but I think that what we all have to be big enough to do, that includes the sponsor and everybody else, when you got 84 votes going against you... almost 89, you know the Bill can't succeed. I think that in the interest of the House and the interest of time and in the interest of everything, if you've got this many votes against your Bill and only 57 for it, I think you either ought to take it to a Interm Study, table it or something else and although I support the principal I'm going to join and vote 'aye' to cut the enacting clause."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Fleck."

Fleck: "I was ah... going to concur exactly what Ray Ewell said, so I'm going to vote 'aye' and change my vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Barnes."

Barnes: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I'm not speaking in terms of merit that's involved in this deal. I may or may not support the Bill on Third Reading but I think that all of us here better stop and consider what we are doing. Each and everyone of us has Bills on this Calendar, we are not always in attendances and whenever we set the precedents that your Bill can be killed by 1, simple majority, in this case it happen to be 87 to 55 but lets consider the fact that it could be 56 to 55 and if you now join in setting this precedents, in this action that you are going to kill this particular Bill in this fashion, I think you better stop and consider your own legislation because it happens to be Representative Rayson, today but tomorrow it could be you. And, I think you should consider that, I'm not going to change to 'aye' because that's the easy way out. I think you should all be voting 'no' and I would suggest that if this motion prevails this will not



be the last time you see it this Session."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Duff."

Duff: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I don't think that it's an accident that it has been some 8 or 9 years since this motion was effectively used on... in this Chamber. I think the reason it hasn't been is the sense of fundamental fairness that has been found within this Body, now I did not vote to get this Bill out of Committee and I don't know ah... but what I feel that the subject does deserve debate on the floor, but most importantly, I think all of us... every single one of us could be subjected to this experience ah.. and I think that it is fundamentally unfair not... in a Democratic Body to give a roll call on the merit, with full debate to any Member of this House. I don't want my 'no' vote here to be recorded as my position on this issue. I would like to cast a vote on Third Reading on this issue so that my constituency can know percisely where I have decided to stand on the Bill and not to be misinterpreted by some roll call relative to a motion that I think is fundamental unfair."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Dunn."

Dunn: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Some good comes of everything, this House in its wisdom has not seen fit to adopt permanent rules yet... and in the purposed rules is this very motion and if we don't like this motion, let's get it out of the permanent rules or let's change it into a form that we do like. It is a rule of this House at the present time, to the best of my knowledge, its been properly brought forward and I think it is a proper motion and I think that we should vote the way we see fit on this motion and not be falling back to debate what's fair and what isn't fair. This rules were adopted a long time ago and they are properly invoked, if we stand by this rule we can stand by other rules, we've tried to adhere to other rules, we should adhere to this one. So, I'm voting green, I'm going to stay green and I hope when the permanent rules come up we'll have the wisdom to look into this rule and see if it's a



proper rule and should be continued. We're not all going to lose our Bills here, we've got permanent rules to adopt yet. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ebbeson... Ebbeson."

Ebbeson: "Ah... yes, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. It was implied by Representative Ewell that ah... there weren't sufficient ah... the indication by the number of green votes, up there, that the Bill on Third Reading if it was to ever achieve that posture, would never receive the sufficient number of votes to pass out of the House but he implied that a red vote is in favor of the concept of the Bill and for the record I just want it understood that my red vote is based on the fact that I think the Bill should have the opportunity to go the Third Reading where it can receive a proper burial."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Ah... Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. We really have had much debate on this Bill even though it is not on Third Reading but the prior speaker who said ah... questioned about going ahead with this invocation of the rules was one of the gentleman who wanted the new rules 2 years ago and helped draft them. And, in as much as this is one of the rules and as much as I hate to invoke them against my good friend the sponsor of the Bill. It is obvious that this Bill is not going to go anywhere later, we are going to engage in more debate later on it, I myself am committed not to support a Bill like this in view of the fact that there has been documentation by strong Medical Authority that has reversed itself... that marijuana is dangerous and I don't think that we should open it up any further at this time. I would like to see the sponsor put his Bill in an Interim Study Committee and really have some good research and good hearings on it. And, therefore I'm sorry, I have to vote 'yes' and I really don't want to deprive him of his right to have his Bill on Third Reading."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Borchers."

Borchers: "Mr. Speaker and Fellow Members of the House. I try to be a practical man, I know what this ah... what this Bill will do to me.



It will take.... I'll get at least oh.... in my area I'll get 500 to a 1,000 letters, 90% against it, I'll have to answer the time... the effort, the money involved. I will also be bedeviled by calls on the telephone, that I won't get proper sleep and no minutes peace because my area will be very much against it, which I'm sure, Representative Tipword, Representative Dunn will concur with me. So I'm going to practical, I want to kill it now so I don't have to answer at least 500 to a 1,000 letters."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Rayson."

Rayson: "Mr. Speaker, and Members of the House. I have said before that its been creditable experience each day ah... you come here, butthis is something more than that. You see, we just put on the Amendment ah... less that a hour ago and I defy... I defy each of.... in all of the Membership here, if there is more that 5 people here who have read through that Amendment. I think what we are really doing is reacting to a decrimination Bill which I feel that if it were properly ventilated in due course this would come, as all thing do come in the Illinois General Assembly, a bit late, but we are really just softening a certain area, a certain penalties, tighening up the Bill in others, Representative Getty, a distinguish criminal lawyer a distinguish Representative. I pointed out a vagary in the law... that's the biggest hand I ever got here, thanks Mike. That's one of points of the Amendment is to close a loophole in the exist-ing law with regard of common conspiracy, did you know that the Cannabis Control Act did not have this criminal sanction for anyone that engaged in criminal conspiracy beyond 500 grams. Ah... we have done other things in this Bill.... that isn't the point, the point is we have worked painstakingly on Amendments, we haven't really dicussed the Amendment, we are reacting to a regular Bill, reacting to our own incoated feelings on what is right and what is pure.... and what we think our constituents feel, now I can tell you... as Representative Houlihan can, in his district some 87% in his district favor this kind of legislation. But, beyond that I have the Chicago Daily News, that just the other night saying, sensible



marijuana Bill... and why... what I'm trying to say to each and everyone of you, we put the Amendment on that the chief co-sponsors Representative Katz, Representative Palmer and myself, want to see that you understand the Amendment. And vote it up or down in regard to the context to which we live with regard to this social shame. I'm against marijuana.... I think it stinks... but I don't think it's criminal genic... and I don't think that what we have on the book is a proper criminal law enforcement, to this problem. So, I'm... I would like to say, I would importune you.... but I don't want to say that because I feel that in your wisdom you should understand the right of a sponsor to have the Bill in shape, vote it up or down real fast, I don't care but let us ventilate at least the provisions of these Amendments and get on with the business of this House and let us not... go on record of voting down something which as we as ostriches want to remove from our scene by a motion to strike the enacting clause, I think that that's horrendous procedure to any Member of this House and I will fight for anyone's right to have his Bill heard on Third Reading, regardless of the merits of his Bill. That's the principal that I want to invoke now and I'm addressing myself procedurally the Bill. And, Mr. Chairman.... Mr. Speaker, at the appropriate time I would like to be recognized for a motion. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Now is the appropriate time."

Rayson: "I sincerely ah... request a verification of the roll... roll call, starting with the absentees."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished. Representative Deuster."

Dueter: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Ah... there are a few Members in the House who are lawyers, I don't practice much but I did handle a case involving some young people who were picked up smoking a little marijuana. And, I would like to address my remarks to those no-lawyers who have put the green button on and I think and ah... sort of a mischievous way partly to ah... take care of a problem vote against the Bill early ah... and I think their thinking that if you can kill a Bill in Committee why can't you kill it on Second Reading... but, let's do this thing in. And,



I think many of you ought to understand, that under present law... ah... for a first conviction for possession of a very small amount, this is considered under Illinois Law to be such a minor matter that you can actually go in and have the conviction record expunged, just wiped right off and so we already under Illinois, recognize that ah... at least for the first conviction it is a minor thing and you should not blacken the reputation of a young person for the rest of their life. Now there are some parts of this Bill that I don't approve and I'll probably vote 'no' on Third Reading but I certainly appeal to some of my colleagues to switch your green lights to yellow at least and to allow us to consider this subject and also to have a vehicle, because it may be, if it is defeated on Third Reading, Representative Rayson may have an opportunity to adjust it into something that will be helpful and recognized ah... the social fact of life that are already recognized in our Illinois statute and at least for the first offense is a very minor thing that can be expunged."

O'Brien: "Representative Shea, in the Chair."

Shea: "The gentleman from Sangamon, Mr. Jones."

Jones: "Ah... Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. I want to make a matter of record that my vote on this is not... for the substance of the Bill but as a protest against the action taken and I'm... I'm voting to see that the Bill... should have a hearing and we vote it up or down."

Shea: "Have all voted who wished. Take the record. On this question there are 91 'aye' votes, 61 'no' votes, 13 voting present and the gentleman from Cook, Mr. Rayson for the purpose of a request."

Rayson: "Well, I think the precedents establish the principal here as clearly as by Representative Jones suggest that we should verify the roll call so that some gentleman may kinda re-deliberate and hopefully that we can defeat this motion and I shall not yield my move for the verification of the roll."

Shea: "The gentleman has requested a verification of the roll call. Mr. Clerk, call the 'aye' votes."

O'Brien: "Anderson. Arnell. Beatty. Birchler...."



Shea: "Hold on, Mr. Clerk. Mr. Rayson."

Rayson: "I think precedents and that's what we are appealing here. I suggest the absentees."

Shea: "Are you requesting them."

Rayson: "Yes."

Shea: "We'll have them called."

Rayson: "Thank you."

Shea: "Mr. Clerk, call the absentees."

O'Brien: "Brandt. Deavers. Friedrich. Garmisa. Hudson. Kucharski.

Lauer. Leon. Lucco. Porter. Schlickman...."

Shea: "Mr. Clerk, proceed to verify the affirmative vote and change Jesse White from 'aye' to 'no'."

O'Brien: "Anderson. Arnell. Beatty. Birchler. Borchers. Boyle.

Bradley. Brinkmeier. Brummet. Calvo. Campbell. Capparelli...."

Shea: "Mr. Schneider, did you have something to say. Turn Mr. Schneider on at Mr. Mann's desk."

Schneider: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, just that the Clerk is reading a little to rapidly and I know we would like to get done but we can't follow the roll call. Thank you if... Jack if you slow down a little. Thank you."

O'Brien: "Carroll. Coffey. Collins. Craig...."

Shea: "Would the Members please be in their seats."

O'Brien; "Cunningham. Daniels. Darrow. DiPrima. John Downs... excuse

me that was John Dunn. Ralph Dunn. Ewell. Ewing. Fary. Fenn-

Shea: "Its... if you want to call it a motion to strike, a motion still requires a simple majority."

Mann: "Well, Mr. Speaker ah... you know, I don't want to challenge the wisdom of this Chair but Mr. Speaker, ah... in affect what we're doing is killing the affirmative action of a Committee vote and I... I would think ah... that it would require ah... a majority, Mr. Speaker."

Shea: "Mr. Mann, the rules are silent, a motion takes a majority of those voting on the question to carry, I might agree with you but I'm not in a position to rule otherwise."

Mann: "Well, Mr. Spekaer ah... what.... do the Roberts Rules of Order address themselves to this question in as much as our rules are silent, I do not have the Roberts Rules available."

Shea: "I can't find any place in our rules, Roberts Rules say that, unless the specifies otherwise require on a motion any simple majority carries."

Mann: "Well, Mr. Speaker without belaboring this may I just make one further remark. As I understand it, Constitutionally a Bill is defective if it does not have an enacting clause. What we are doing here, Mr. Speaker, I submit is removing the Constitutional ah... sanction of any Bill and I... I think when we get into the area of ah... of Constitutional requirement ah... more than a simple majority would be called for."

Shea: "Mr. Katz... er I mean Mr. Rayson, is there any question of the affirmative vote."

Rayson: "Yes, Mr. Speaker..."

Rayson: "Representative McAuliffe."

Shea: "Representative McAuliffe is in the center aisle. Record Representative Deavers 'aye'."

Rayson: "Ah... Representative Sharp."

Shea: "Representative Sharp... he's on the floor."

Rayson: "Representative Sevcik."

Shea: "Representative Sevcik... is Representative Sevcik in his seat? how is he recorded, Mr. Clerk?"

O'Brien: "The gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Shea: "Take him off the roll and return Representative Laurino to the roll call. Are there any further questions Mr. Rayson?"

Rayson: "Representative Stearney, Mr. Speaker."

Shea: "Representative Stearney, how is he recorded?"

O'Brien: "The gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Shea: "Is Representative Stearney on the floor... take him off the roll call."

Rayson: "Representative Brinkmeier."

Shea: "Representative Brinkmeier, how is he recorded?"



O'Brien: "The gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Shea: "Is Mr. Brinkmeier on the floor? Take him off the roll call."

Rayson: "Representative Wall."

Shea: "Representative Wall, how is he recorded?"

O'Brien: "The gentleman is recorded as voting present."

Shea: "How's he... Mr. Clerk."

O'Brien: "Mr.... voting present."

Shea: "He's voted present, Mr. Rayson."

Rayson: "All right. Representative Stubblefield."

Shea: "Representative Stubblefield is in his seat."

Rayson: "All right. Representative McAvoy."

Shea: "Representative McAvoy, how is he recorded?"

O'Brien: "The gentleman is recorded as voting present."

Shea: "Are there any other questions, Mr. Rayson."

Rayson: "Representative VonBoeckman."

Shea: "Representative VonBoeckman, how is he recorded?"

O'Brien: "The gentleman is voted ah... 'aye'."

Shea: "Is Representative VonBoeckman on the floor? Take him off the roll call."

Rayson: "Representative Ralph Dunn."

Shea: "Would you gentlemen... would the Members please be in their seats. Representative Ralph Dunn, is in his seat."

Rayson: "Ah... Representative Simms."

Shea: "Representative Simms, how is he recorded?"

O'Brien: "The gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Shea: "Is Representative Simms on the floor? Take him off the roll call."

Rayson: "That's all my ah... tired eyes can cover, Mr. Speaker."

Shea: "What's the roll call, Mr. Clerk?"

O'Brien: "81 'ayes', 62 'nays'."

Shea: "On this question there are 81 'ayes and 62 'nays'. The gentleman's motion to strike the enacting clause prevails and it shall be. On... on... the gentleman from Cook, Mr. Rayson."

Rayson: "Mr. Speaker, I arise to a point of personal privilege. My name was mentioned in debate earlier with the regards to another



ah... matter ah... dealing with the same subject matter and I wish to address myself to the House."

Shea: "The gentleman on a point of personal privilege."

Rayson: "Ah... Representative Meyer did mention my name and ah... that there was this ah... motion to strike the enacting clause by Representative John Lewis, it was in 1967 not 1966 and if I recall it was on a piece of toilet paper, that just gives it a little flavor, and I guess in my ten year tenure it was ah... ah... a stride once on my esteem colleague, Representative Scariano by his distinguish colleague from his district, Representative Jack Walker. But, be that as it may, I ah... really feel kinda touched by the action of the House at this time. Now... Representative Geo-Karis came to me and said, 'why don't you put it in Interim Study', I'll be glad to put it in Interim Study... I want more study on this subject ah... some people voted against me because of that, but I can't say in the middle of a roll call, when we are dealing with principal and precedents to that at that time. And, I feel that we made a tragic mistake in this House, I think Representative Dave Jones, hit it on the head, he's not voting for the Bill. He's revoking for the sacrosanct rules and the procedures and courtesy that have been extended to Members... and I consider myself a Member... to this House. And, I feel that at this time, you know, Representative Mann just said, do I want this in Interim Study... I... I suggest that the will of the House has spoken so I wouldn't even want to suggest that package at this point.... but I'm reminded of the words of Edmund Burke, who's name comes up from time to time in this House and it's kinda of a principal that I live with. But, first of all before I get to that, with regard to the abortion issue on a very mi... minor therapeutic abortion issue, which in one year later tha... the intellectual hierarchy of the Catholic Church were agreed to push but be that as it may, that issue went to the United States Supreme Court on 72 rule on 1963 they held that statute in Illinois and in other States Unconstitutional. Now, I have said before that I try to be a Constitutional Conservative and I'm obsessed with being a Constitutional Lawyer and I feel that whatever we do here



or anywhere, we must adhere to the Constitution even if we don't like it, and amend its process during the deliverance process that's involved in that kind of an Amendment. So, I'm saying to you, I'm against abortion now and have always been against it, but as a Constitutional Lawyer that I felt that its secular Lawyers or Lawmakers or whatever we are, we have to address ourselves to the facts as they are and not as we pretend them to be... and that's the reason that I feel touched on this floor, on this occasion. But, I feel that we can get on with the business at hand and redeem ourselves and regain our initiatives, temporary lost, to be responsible legislators in the... in the gush of business before us. So, my point of personal privilege is not personal, I carry no book in politics I am not recriminatory.... but I feel that we slipped by a principal and I hope that we can regain that little slippage, and I think we can. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Shea: "On the... on the Order of... on the Order of House Bill, Second Reading appears House Bill 1684... I'll get to you Mr. Porter..."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1684, Arnell. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act to revise the Law in relation to Township Organization. Second Reading of the Bill. No, Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Now, the gentleman from Cook, Mr. Porter."

Porter: "Well, Mr. Speaker before you went to that next Bill, I just want to... I wasn't recorded on that ah... roll call because..."

Shea: "How do you wish to be recorded."

Porter: "I was down in Senate Committee and not because I'm necessary for the Bill but simply for the principal involved. I would like to be recorded as 'no'."

Shea: "The gentleman ask leave of the House to be recorded as 'no'. Is there objections... let him be recorded as 'no'. The gentleman from Lake, Mr. Deuster."

Deuster: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, just a Parliamentary Inquiry ah... I may have not ah... heard this... so what is the status of that Bill we just considered at this time."

Shea: "It is on the Order of Second Reading with the enacting clause struck."



Duester: "Thank you."

Shea: "The lady from Lake, Miss Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Ah... Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I can well appreciate the comments of the sponsor of the prior Bill and I certainly pledge to him, that when the rules are coming forth on this House to be approved or disapproved, that particular rule which I think is horrendous although it is still in operation, 63 (d) ah... 2, I certainly will oppose its being inflecting upon the Membership in the future."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Arnell on House Bill 1684.... has this been read a Second... are there any Amend.... ah... no Committee Amendments, any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House Bill 1687."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1687, Getty. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relation.... regulation of persons engaged in practice of Funeral Directing and embalming. This Bill has been read a second time previously..."

Shea: "Are there any..."

O'Brien: Amendment Number 1 ah... was tabled and the Bill was held on Second Reading."

Shea: "Are there any other Amendments?"

O'Brien: "Amendment Number 2, DiPrima. Amends House Bill 1687 on page 1, by deleting line 17, and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. DiPrima on Amendment Number 2."

DiPrima: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentl... Gentlemen of the House. This was an agreed Amendment between the sponsor and people from the ah... Funeral Directors Assosication and that's all it does."

Shea: "While we're digesting that remark, I would like to take an opportunity to introduce the Treasurer of the State of Illinois and a former colleague of ours, the Honorable Alan Dixon."

Shea: "The gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment Number 2, is there any discussion? The gentleman from Franklin, Mr. Hart."

Hart: "I... I don't have a copy of this Amendment on my desk, has it been circulated?"

Shea: "Mr. Clerk, has this Amendment been distributed? I'm under... I understand that this Amendment has not been distributed, so we'll



take the Bill out of the record and hold it. On the Order of Senate Bill, Second Reading."

Shea: "On the Order of Second Reading appears Senate Bill 366. The gentleman... is Mr. Craig on the floor? Mr. Bradley, would you see if you could find Mr. Craig, this is an Appropriation Bill he wants to move. On the Order of Senate Bills, Third Reading... On the Order of Senate Bills appears Senate Bill 47."

O'Brien: "Senate Bill 47, Lucco. A Bill for an Act making additional Appropriations for the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University. Third Reading of the Bill."

Shea: "The gentleman from Madison, Mr. Lucco."

Lucco: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Senate Bill 47 is a deficiency appropriation, this Bill was passed out of the Senate 40 to 2, it makes appropriations from the Southern Illinois University Income Fund for increases in the cost of operating the Physical Plant of Southern Illinois University at Carbondale and at Edwardsville. This is due to inflation, the money will be used to pay for fuel and utility bills due to the increase thereof. I would appreciate a favorable vote on this deficiency appropriation Bill."

Shea: "The gentleman has moved for the passage of Senate Bill 47, is there any questions? The gentleman from Effingham, Mr. Keller."

Keller: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I would like to ask the sponsor if ah... is there any appropriation in this Bill for the ah... Lucco Memorial Gymnasium?"

Shea: "Is there any further discussion? The gentleman..."

Keller: "He hasn't answered my question yet."

Lucco: "No... sorry to say, not as yet."

Shea: "The gentleman from Will, Mr. Kempiners."

Kempiners: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker will the gentleman yield."

Shea: "He indicates he will."

Kempiners: "I noticed that the Bill was amended in the Senate and ah... it provides funds, among the funds provided is two-hundred and thirty-two thousands dollars for contractural services. Can you give us some idea what those contractural services entail."



Lucco: "As soon as I find them sir... ah... I don't find the Amendment that your referring to Sir."

Kempiners: "Well, if you've got a copy the Senate Bill as it was put in the House, it would already be incorporated into the main body of the Bill."

Lucco: "This merely appropriates three-hundred, ninty-six thousand dollars for Carbondale and a hundred and fifty-one thousand.... a hundred and forty-five thousand for the Edwardsville Campus."

Kempiners: "Right..."

Lucco: "It says nothing about ah... contractual services."

Kempiners: "I'm looking in the digest, apparently Amendment Number 1..."

Shea: "The gentle... the gentleman from Cook, Mr. Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. To answer the gentleman's question that the two-hundred and thirty-tw... the two-hundred and thirty-two thousand dollars on line 11 of the Bill is spent in the following manner: The S.I.... Southern Illinois University in Carbondale we have \$87,000 for utilities. At Southern Illinois University in Edwardsville we have \$75,000 for utilities and the O. and M. Physical Plant for \$70,000 which gives you a grand total of \$232,000."

Shea: "Are there any further question, Mr. Kempiners? The gentleman from Madison, Mr. Lucco to close."

Lucco: "Thank you, very much. Thank you, Representative Lechowicz, I did find what he had found before I did. I thank him very much, again this is a deficiency Bill to ah... cover the increase in the cost of Public Utilities, namely coal, electricity, power, etc., at the two Southern Illinois Campuses and for example, coal is has gone up in the past year from \$9.27 a ton to \$27.21 a ton, so this is a much needed increase in ah... deficiency appropriation. So, I would like your favorable support on this Bill."

Shea: "The question is, shall Senate Bill 47 pass. All those in favor will vote 'aye', those opposed will vote 'nay'. Have all those voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Take the record, Mr. Clerk."

Shea: "Palmer, 'aye'. On this question there are 124 'ayes', 4 'nays', 7 voting present and Senate 47 having received the Constitutional



Majority is hereby declared passed. Ewell, 'aye'."

Shea: "On the Order of Senate Bills, Third Reading appears Senate Bill 141."

O'Brien: "Senate Bill 141, Ebbesen. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act making certain appropriations and re-appropriations to the Capital Development Board. Third Reading of the Bill."

Shea: "The gentleman from DeKalb, Mr. Ebbesen."

Ebbesen: "Ah... yes, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Ah... Senate Bill 141 ah... amends.... Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Amends a line item in the Fiscal Year 75, appropriations to the Capital Development Board for Northern and it provides for the planning of a steam connection between the East and West of the Heating Plants as well as the construction of the initial phase of steam connection. The ah... steam connection is being proposed instead of ah... purchasing a new auxiliary steam boiler for the West Heating Plant and Senate Bill 141.... and I want to emphasize this, does not change the amount of the appropriation it just changes the purpose for which the appropriation may be used and the additional money that's necessary is in their ah... present ah... ah... fiscal year appropriation for 1976, it passed out of the Senate 52 to 9 and came out of the ah... Appropriation Committee unanimously and I ah... would appreciate a 'yes' vote on this."

Shea: "The gentleman... is there any discussion? The... the gentleman from Winnebago, Mr. Giorgi... do you recognize... do you want recognition?"

Giorgi: "Yes, I would like to ask Representative Ebbesen if the ah... Capital Development Bonding Board has ah... given an opinion on this Bill?"

Ebbesen: "Well ah... yes, it has the support ah... of the Capital Development ah... Board and also has the support of the ah... ah... Board of Regents.... Board of Higher Education."

Giorgi: "Fine... he said the magic word."

Shea: "The gentleman from DeKalb, Mr. Ebbesen, moves that or the question is, shall House... Senate Bill 141 pass. All those in favor vote 'aye', those opposed vote 'nay'. Have all voted who wished? Take



the record, Mr. Clerk. On this question there is 133 'aye' votes, no 'nay' votes and 12 Members voting present. Senate Bill 141 having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. On the Order of Senatat Bills, Third Reading appears Senate Bill 166. The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Greiman."

O'Brien: "Senate Bill 166. A Bill for an Act making additional appropriations to the Board of Governors State Colleges and Universities. Third Reading of the Bill."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Greiman."

Greiman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen of the House ah... this Bill is one for a supplementary appropriation for \$200,000 for Northeastern Illinois University. The University had originally anticipated an increase of enrollment of about 2½%, but we are a city ah... campus and ah... apparently not as many young me... young men and women were going away to school, last year and we ah... experienced over 9.1% increase. Which increased the operating expenses by some \$200,000, happily however we received \$300,000 in additional tuition and se... additional.... tuition and ah.. so that on the \$200,000 that we're asking for now we are making a \$100,000, and I ask that ah... it be passed."

Shea: "Th...the gentleman moves for the adoption of Senate Bill 166. Are there any questions? The question is, shall Senate Bill 166 pass. All those in favor will vote 'aye', those opposed vote 'nay'. Shea, 'aye'. Have all voted who wished? Leon, 'aye'. Have all voted who wished? Take the record. On this question there are 142 'aye' votes, no 'nay' votes, 3 voting present. Senate Bill 166 having received the Constitutuional Majority is hereby declared passed. Wadell, 'aye'. On the Order of Senaté Bills, Third Reading appears Senate Bill 225."

O'Brien: "Senate Bill 225. A Bill for an Act making supplemental appropriations to the Department of General Services. Third Reading of the Bill."

Shea: "The gentleman from Rock Island, Mr. Darrow."

Darrow: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Senate Bill 225 makes a supplementary appropriation of \$310,000 from the office supply revolving fund to the



Department of General Services. This office supply revolving fund supports the operation of the office supply store through which the State Agencies in Chicago and Springfield purchase the paper, folders, pens and other office supplies. I'd ask for a favorable vote on this Bill."

Shea: "The question is.... or is there any discussion? The question is, shall House Bill 225.... Senate Bill 225, pass? All those in favor will vote 'aye', those opposed vote 'nay'. Have all voted who wished? Take the record, Mr. Clerk. On this question there are 125 'aye' votes, 1 'nay', 10 voting present. Senate Bill 225 having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. On the Ord... Geo-Karis from her seat, 'aye'. On the Order of Senate Bills, Third Reading appears Senate Bill 224."

O'Brien: "Senate Bill 224. A Bill for an Act to amend the Capital Development Bond Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. Senate Bill 224 would amend the Capital Development Bond Act by increasing by four-million dollars the amount of bonds that may be used in connection with safe building. This is intended to provide for the refurbishing of the Senate Chambers, I move for the.... I move that Senate Bill 224, pass."

Shea: "Is there any discussion? The question is, shall Senate Bill 224, pass. All those in favor will vote 'aye', those opposed vote 'nay'. The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Mann.... have all voted who wished."

Mann: "Mr. Speaker, I would wish the Bill would include refurbishing some of the Members.... of the Senate."

Shea: "The gentleman has corrected his statement. Have all voted who wished? Take the record. On this question there are 135 'ayes', 3 'nays', 5 voting present. Senate Bill 224 having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. On the Order of Senate Bills, Third Reading appears Senate Bill 389."

O'Brien: "Senate Bill 389. A Bill for an Act making Appropriation of Sangamon County. Third Reading of the Bill."

Shea: "The gentleman from Sangamon, Mr. Londrigan."

Londrigan: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. By Amendment,



this Senate Bill appropriates \$23,000 to the Department of Correction for reimbursement to Sangamon County for the cost of Attorney fees by order of the Illinois Supreme Court for a criminal case transferred to Sangamon County from Randolph County. It received unanimous approval in the Senate, 50 to nothing and I ask for your support."

Shea: "Is there any debate. The gentleman has moved for the adoption.... or the question is, shall Senate Bill 389 pass? The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ah... will the gentleman just yield to a question."

Shea: "He indicates he will."

Lechowicz: "Ah... Jim, is this a similar situation like ah... we had on Representative VanDuyne's Bill where we were strapped by a court order."

Londrigan: "Yes, this is... the Supreme Court ordered the payment by Sangamon County because Randolph County didn't have any funds to do it."

Lechowicz: "Okay, thank you."

Shea: "The gentleman from Macon, Mr. Dunn."

Dunn: "Will... will the speaker yield to a question?... Er... the sponsor, pardon me."

Shea: "He indicates he will."

Dunn: "Does the amount ah... appropriated ah... represent the total amount of the ah... defense fees in this case or is this ah... balance due after ah... Sangamon County has ah... previously paid larger sum."

Londrigan: "As far as I know, this is the total amount. I think there were four defendants that.... it was a criminal case ah... riots down in Menard Penitentiary, they asked to change the venue, it was changed.... the venue was changed up to Sangamon County and the Supreme Court stuck Sangamon County with the bill."

Dunn: "Best to your knowledge, this is a total ah... claim for these services."

Londrigan: "Yes."

Dunn: "Thank you."

Londrigan: "\$23,000."

Shea: "Is there any further questions? The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Duff."

Duff: "Will the spon.... will the sponsor yield to a question?"



Shea: "He indicates he will."

Duff: "Ah... was this the ah... murder case of the four ah... defendants that were brought up here before Justice Douglas, about 4 or 5 years ago?"

Londrigan: "Yes."

Duff: "Well now.... hasn't that subject come before the Legislature before?"

Londrigan: "Ah... I think there might have been a re-trial on it, yes."

Duff: "And wasn't there a very serious ah... amount of ligation as to whether there was excessive fees charged."

Londrigan: "No."

Duff: "This was ah... Wiseman-Shakerwicz, et al from Alton."

Londrigan: "We are talking about 23,000, here your talking about, I think was a couple of hundred-thousand in the Will case."

Duff: "Does this fee go to the law firm of Wiseman-Shakerwicz etc, down in Alton, Illinois."

Londrigan: "Not that I ah... know of, no."

Duff: "Well, Mr.... I wonder if you would mind taking this out of the record because there are some serious questions about it and I like to look into them with you, if you don't mind."

Londrigan: "I don't know of any serious questions.... I don't know of any question at all except very nominal figure of \$23,000 which the Supreme Court...."

Duff: "Well, I could tell you that that Menard case came up here to this County and that there was serious ligations about excessive fees being granted by Justice Douglas to that Law Firm and it was ligated at great length for a long period of time and there are some questions involved in it and I would appreciate an opportunity to look into it."

Shea: "Is there any further discussion? The gentleman from Will, Mr. Sangmeister."

Sangmeister: "Well.... I would just to back the sponsors Bill, certainly this House is very gracious to Will County. We have excessive.... not excessive, we have extensive fees of \$200,000 which this House ah... question through the Appropriation Committee and on the floor, that saw fit to pay a certain sum of 23,000 is certainly well justified."



and I would urge an 'aye' vote."

Shea: "The question is, shall Senate Bill 389, pass. All those in favor will vote 'aye', those opposed vote 'nay'. Shea, 'aye'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Take the record, Mr. Clerk. On this question there are 99 'ayes', 11 'nays', 18 Members voting present. Senate Bill 389 having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. On the Order of Senate Bills, Second Reading appears Senate Bill 366. The gentleman from Vermilion, Mr. Craig."

O'Brien: "Senate Bill 366, Craig. A Bill for an Act making appropriation of the State Fair Agency. Second Reading of the Bill. Three Committee Amendments. Amendment Number 1, amends Senate Bill 366 on page 1, line 11, and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman from Vermilion, Mr. Craig."

Craig: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. I move for the adoption of Amendment Number 1, which increases the line items on page 2, from 'personal services' from '\$42,000' to '\$161,200'. From retirement '75...' from '2,800' to '7,500'. Social Security from '2,100' to '\$5,800'. For Contractual Services from '100,000' to '290,100'. For Commodities, from '50,000' to '126,200' making a total of '590,800' instead of '196,000'. I move for the adoption of Amendment Number 1."

Shea: "The gentleman moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 1, is there any discussion. All those in favor will vote 'aye', those opposed will say 'nay'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment Number 1, is adopted. Committee Amendment Number 2."

O'Brien: "Committee Amendment Number 2, evidently was tabled in Committee. Committee Amendment Number 3, amends Senate Bill 366 on page 1, by inserting between lines 15 and 16 the following, and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman from Vermilion, Mr. Craig on Senate Amend.... or on Amendment Number 3."

Craig: "Amendment Number 3, amends the.... on page 1, by inserting between lines 16.... 15 and 16 the following; The sum of \$60,000 is appropriated from the Agricultural Premium Fund to remodel, improve and adapt public facilities to the needs of the handicapped



persons; and on page 1, line 16 by deleting 'Section 2.' and inserting in lieu thereof 'Section 3.'. This is for the handicapped out at the Fairgrounds over the curbing and things like that."

Shea: "The gentleman moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 3, all those in favor say 'aye', those opposed will say 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments? No further Amendments, Third Reading. On the Order of House Bills, Second Reading appears House Bill 422.... or Senate Bill 422."

O'Brien: "Senate Bill 422. A Bill for an Act making appropriation of the Department of Public Aid. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any Amendments from the floor. Third Reading. On the Order of Senate Bills, Second Reading appears Senate Bill 480."

O'Brien: "Senate Bill 480. A Bill for an Act making appropriations for additional Federal Funds to the Bureau of the Budget. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. On the Order of Senate Bills, Third Reading appears Senate Bill 540."

O'Brien: "Senate Bill 540. A Bill for an Act to add Sections to an Act to provide for the.... for an exposition performing Arts Authority in Madison and St. Clair Counties. Third Reading of the Bill."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, the Assistant Minority Leader, Mr. Walsh."

Walsh: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I arise to object to considering Bills other than appropriations that must pass now in order for people to be paid, and Bills to be paid for services. I suggest to you that there is no reason, or urgency about Senate Bill 540 and therefore does not qualify and is not.... as I understood it, a part of the Bills were to be considered that were Senate Bills... So, I object very strongly, Mr. Speaker and I suggest to you that along the line I'm going to ask for a roll call as to whether we should be in this order of business. As the Chair knows, they've skipped from Third Reading to Second Reading which is the progression that it should but from there we ought to be adjourning. Now, there is a dinner that we are all expected to go to, in a few minutes... in a few minutes and we're going to have extensive debate on this Bill. I see Representative



Collins up on his feet and he's florid and ready to go..."

Shea: "Well, Mr. Walsh...."

Walsh: "Now, Mr. Speaker... Mr. Speaker, now if you just.... just let me continue. I though we had an agreement with respect to Senate Bills and the ah... the ah... agreement... there was an understanding that we could consider those few Bills that we considered now because they were urgent. This one is not urgent.... there is no reason for us to be considering it.... we're.... I understand, going to have to work on Saturday, this week. Saturday, I'm told to.... in order that we can get House Bills out of the way by May 23. I seriously question that we can get the House Bill out of the way by May 23 without messing around now considering Senate Bills. Now, if we're going to work all night tonight, let's work on House Bills.... not consider these Senate Bills. Do you know, in the Senate they haven't touched on a House Bill, they aren't aware we're over here, now.... I respectfully request, Mr. Speaker that you get off of this order of business and either go to an adjournment or get back to House Bills because that's where the urgency is."

Shea: "Well, now Mr. Wash.... just so that the record is clear, Mr. Tuerk from your side of the aisle... along with Mr. Calvo, Mr. Lucco and Mr. Mudd tell me that there is a great urgency in their Communities and asked me to call the Bills. I would have assumed that one of the gentlemen from your side of the aisle and one of the gentlemen from our side of the aisle came up and approached this bench that they had an emergency or whatever we've got here, I'm sorry.... with you.... so Mr. Walsh, I will recognize Mr. Tuerk and he can perhaps explain it to you."

Tuerk: "Your Honor, thank you very much. Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. There is an emergency to this Bill and we were on Senate Bills Third and ah... it would take about 3 minutes of this House time to pass this Bill, get it on to the Governor so that he can sign it. Now, the emergency involved in this Bill, is simple, and I say simple and yet its a big... big... piece of business, is that we in Peoria are ready to go on a Civic Center. Now, the bonding Council has said that it's necessary to make an earlier effective date for this Law so



that a friendly lawsuit and I don't mind telling the Members of this House that it's necessary for a friendly lawsuit to be filed so that it can really determine ah... this law in relation to the sale of bonds. Now, the plans are practically ready, we're ready to go and there is an emergency to the extent that this Bill should be passed out of here at this time. Now, we were on Senate Third, we took more that appropriation Bills and I think we should be addressing ourselves to this particular Bill."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. I wished to speak on behalf of Senate Bill 540. Representative Lucco has been attempting to have this Bill considered for approximately 2 months and for some reason the distinguished Assistant Minority Leader, for reasons be-known only to himself has decided to consistently oppose the consideration of this Bill. Today we have already considered Bills... Senate Bills other than Appropriation Bills, I think the people from Peoria all there Representative have agreed on this, are entitled to have this Bill considered today. We have considered emergency matters for other towns, we probably even considered emergency matters for the western suburbs of Chicago at different times, including LaGrange and LaGrange Park so, let's give the gentlemen an opportunity to have their Bill heard."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Collins."

Collins: "Well, ah... Mr. Speaker ah... someone tells me I should ask for a change of menu... ah... however, if this was such an emergency to Peoria, I would suggest to Mr. Tuerk that they shouldn't have taken a free ride on this rip-off ah... from ah... Southern Illinois. But, on a point of Parliamentary ah... Inquiry, Mr. Speaker, when this Bill was called on Second Reading, Representative Walsh rose, in my absence to state that I did have an Amendment for this Bill and attempted to have it held. I'm still waiting for that Amendment to come from the Reference Bureau, now, it's not my fault that ah... that ah... the Amendment has not yet been prepared, I've check on it as late as yesterday and it still isn't ready and I would ask the sponsor to hold this Bill until that Amendment could be considered on Second

Reading. I would suggest to you Mr. Speaker, that this crush caused by these rules of yours are the reason why my yet ah... "

Shea: "It's the rules of this House, Mr. Collins."

Collins: "However... however, I do think that I should be extended the opportunity to ah... ah... offer that Amendment on Second Reading which was not ready ah... in the Reference Bureau and in fact it is not ready yet."

Shea: "Will the gentleman from Madison, Mr. Lucco on House Bill 540... er... Senate Bill 540. The distinguish Minority Leader on a motion."

Walsh: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, we eluded earlier to a ah... function that begins 5 minutes from now and in view of that, and I'm sure I'll get a great deal of support on this motion, I move that the House do now stand at adjourned until...."

Shea: "Your not recognized for that motion. The gentleman from Madison, Mr. Lucco on Senate Bill 540."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker."

Shea: "Turn Mr. Walsh on."

Walsh: "I was recognized for a purpose of making a motion... I made one..."

Shea: "Mr. Walsh, you taught me so well last year..."

Walsh: "I made a perfectly legitimate motion..."

Shea: "The gentleman from Madison,... the gentleman from Madison on Senate Bill 540, Mr. Lucco. The Bill... has the Bill been read a third time? Mr. Lucco."

Lucco: "Mr. Speaker, thank you very... very much and the indulgences of the Ladies and Gentlemen of this House. Ah... I'm so glad that these fellows rally whenever I get up here. I will make this very brief, this Bill provides that the Exposition and Performing Arts Authority in Madison and St. Clair Counties is to become effective immediately. The Governor has already appointed the Members of the Authority, in fact they were supported... appointed some weeks ago and they need this Bill to meet and to begin the deliberation in order to select the site, which is already, the money and so forth... all the Bill and everything is in order. So, I ask a favorable vote."

Shea: "Is there any discussion? The gentleman from Mis... from Cook,



Mr. Walsh... on the question."

Walsh: "Ah... you refuse to consider my motion, Mr. Speaker. All right on the motion..."

Shea: "Your recognized on Senate Bill 540, Mr. Walsh."

Walsh: "All right, on the question. Let me say to you and in all seriousness, and the sponsor of this Bill... the House sponsor, I think is one of the most capable new Members that has come along. Also, one of the most likable... however, he's go a turkey... the... Mr. Speak... The..."

Shea: "Proceed, Mr. Walsh."

Walsh: "The Bill provides that this Authority and throughout the State, I believe there are 8 of them, may issue Bonds... Revenue Bonds indeed, but these Bonds are secured by the full fact and credit of the State of Illinois. Now, I suggest to you, for that reason... and others, this is not a good Bill. It is very possible that these Authorities are going to go bust, there in small towns, if they... they are in towns that may not be able to sustain an Exposition Hall. Now, if they do go bust, Mr. Speaker then the people of the State of Illinois are going to have to stand behind it, not the people of Peoria, not the people of other towns involved but the people of the State of Illinois. Now, what we're doing here, we had people down here today by the thousands who are interested in jobs... not jobs in Peoria, jobs in the State of Illinois. If were going to issue Bonds let's go with the Governors Program, let's ah... let's issue a bunch of them but let's get some people working. This isn't going to get anyone working, Mr. Speaker... this is a rip-off and I suggest to you that either in Peoria or in Rockford... one of those two places the..."

Shea: "Proceed, Mr. Walsh. I'll try to keep some order."

Walsh: "Yah... In one of these two places, Mr. Speaker there was a referendum to create... an Authority, such as this. A referendum that was defeated by a margin of 2 to 1, now who on earth... 3 to 1, I'm corrected, now who on earth are we, Mr. Speaker to come along and say, you've got the Authority and you can issue all the Bonds you want... do whatever you care to do. We passed this in the last

General Assembly, Mr. Speaker, it was a very close vote in the last General Assembly, now I submit to you that the Members here had had... had not had an opportunity to consider this question. The question of whether Bonds issued by local Authorities ought to be guaranteed by the people of the State of Illinois. It's a very serious question I'm very sincere in my opposition to this Bill. This Bill has flown through here, as you know, it was not referred to a Committee of the House, so I suggest to you new Members that you consider this very carefully, that you vote 'no' on it... there's no urgency to begin with, the Bill is bad and it should be defeated."

Shea: "The gentleman from Macon, Mr. Borchers."

Borchers: "Mr. Speaker, I was going to make a motion to adjourn, but I'm sure you won't recognize for that motion..."

Shea: "Your right, sir." The gentleman from Peoria, Mr. Tuerk."

Tuerk: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. Our distinguish Minority... Assistant Minority Leader sometimes is a little bit behind the times, the speech that he just made should have been made 6 or 8 months ago and I remember him making a speech similar to that, 6 or 8 months ago when we had Senate Bill 166. That was the time to make the point, now this is Public Law already, what this Bill does is just provide for an earlier effective date, as I explained before, so that there could be some friendly test cases made so they provide for the sale of these Bonds, now it's not the time to argue the relative merits of the substantive ah... type of the Bill, it th... all this Bill does is provide for an earlier effective date. And, therefore I think it should get an overwhelming support of the House, pass out Senate Bill 540."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Collins."

Collins: "Well, Mr. Spekaer, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I think the Assistant Minority Leader, Mr. Walsh made the point rather well and I think it was re-enforced by Representative Tuerk's remarks. Senate Bill... or ah... 166 was a bad Bill, it was a horrible Bill and there is no reason to move up the enactment of a bad Bill of this.... of this type, rather we should leave it at the original date so we'll have time to repeal this thing. This Bill was the..."



the brain child of the futile brain of President Reynolds Gene Grays, down at S.I.U. when we had ah... ah... legislative investigation down there and this hull grew out of the ashes of that Committee hearing ah... into this Exposition Hall which will be in ah... in Madison or St. Clair... Madison County. Now, maybe there is some argument for putting one in Peoria and Rockford, I don't know but I don't think that there is any argument to put one in an area so close to St. Louis as to be ah... almost a certain loser. And, I would suggest to you that perhaps it would make just as much sense to put one in Calument City where I... I reside and after all we were once the tourist capital of the country. You could make the same arguments to put one in Arlington Heights where the Bears hope to play or down in Clyde Choate's area, in Johnson City so we could have the World Series of Pool in there. Why not... why not put one in Nauvoo or Galatia, you can make the argument for most anywhere, Mr. Speaker and I would even suggest we could put one in Fox Lake where Representative Fleck has a summer home and boy could we sell tickets up there. I suggest we beat this Bill."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Palmer."

Palmer: "Parliamentary Inquiry, Mr. Speaker. Was the Bill Amended? Has this Bill been Amended?"

Shea: "No it was not."

Palmer: "Is there not an incapability of provisions ah... on line 28 and 29 when you state the effective date shall be April 15, 1975."

Shea: "With what."

Palmer: "Well, what the... with Section 2, that this Amendatory Act takes effect upon its becoming a law, now which one is effective."

Shea: "Its.... I think if that question was raised on Second Reading, I think in the Parliamentarian Rules that we have a statute on effective dates that covers it. The gentleman from..."

Palmer: "Ah... Mr. Speaker..."

Shea: "Yes, Mr. Palmer."

Palmer: "If April 15, 1975, is that substantive date or what ah... I'm sure that your interested in issuance of legal Bonds."

Shea: "Ah... the question arose at that time, the Parliamentarian, I



think, rightfully so and whoever was in the Chair ruled that the Bill will take effect immediately on becoming a law or April the 15th, 1975 which ever date is later."

Palmer: "Well, shouldn't April 15, 1975 be deleting from the Act to prevent any uncertainty..."

Shea: "No, sir."

Palmer: "As to legality."

Shea: "Not in the opinion of the Chair. The gentleman from Madison, Mr. Lucco to close."

Lucco: "Thank... thank you, very much again Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. I want to thank the Assistant Minority Leader for that turkey, I was expecting a goose really for Thanksgiving. But, I... I'm sure the Governor will be very glad to hear that Representative Walsh will be in support of the Accelerated Bonding Program, I would like to close now and ask for your favorable vote."

Shea: "The question is, shall Senate Bill 540 pass. All those in favor will vote 'aye', those opposed will vote 'nay'. Shea, 'aye'. Have all voted who wished? The gentleman from Winnebago, Mr. Simms to explain his vote."

Simms: "Well, Mr. Speaker in explaining my vote, I hate to ah... disagree with my ah... distinguish colleague, Assistant Minority Leader. The substantive issue has already been decided by the legislature, we're going to have ah... downstate Civic Center and I don't think that Bill is anymore ridiculous probably than building McCormick Place, but we have already made the issue of these Bonds, should be placed up... they have the legal question decided and these Communities still have the right to decide. So, I would urge that we vote 'yes'."

Shea: "Have all voted who wished? The distinguished Assistant Minority Leader, to explain his vote."

Walsh: "That's extinguished, Mr. Speaker. I would just like to ah... to point out that what the last speaker said, in my opinion is not true. The Bill was passed in such a condition that the Bonds could not be sold, so the effect of it is, that we are here voting for the Authority, they can appoint all the people that they want too... but



they did not have in the opinion of Bond council and others, they did not have the authority to issue Bonds... we are here giving them that authority and for that reason in substance we are approving the whole measure. So, I would suggest a 'no' vote."

Shea: "The gentleman from Lake, Mr. Deuster to explain his vote."

Deuster: "Well, Mr. Spekaer I arose earlier to ask the sponsor a question but ah... I guess you didn't see the flashing light and so I would like to ask the sponsor a question, maybe he can answer this and explain his vote. Is it true..."

Shea: "Your too late, Mr. Deuster."

Deuster: "Well, I... all right, in explaining my vote..."

Shea: "I apologize for not seeing your light."

Deuster: "All right... all right, I just want to say I've now casted a 'no' vote because if this does put the full fact credit of the State of Illinois behind this local project, I think everybody ought to know it and I'm sorry that the sponsor was not accorded... corded an opportunity to deny that that's the case and to deny that that's what's in this proposal."

Shea: "Have all voted who wished? On this question there are 1... take the record, Mr. Clerk. On this question there are 106 'aye' votes, There is some question whether you need 107 or 89... you need 89 votes to make a Bill effective immediately, before July 1. On this question there are 106 votes... 'aye' votes, 19 'nay' votes, 22 voting present. Senate Bill 540 having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Madison."

Madison: "Thank... thank you very much your honor... ah... Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, in behalf of the ah... the ah... people who are in charge of the affair tonight, I would like to move that we do now stand in adjournment."

Shea: "We will in just one minute, we have one more piece of business, Mr. Madison. The gentleman from... the gentleman from DuPage, Mr. G. L. Hoffman, on House ah... Senate Bill 534..."

Hoffman: "House Bill."

Shea: "House Bill 534."



Hoffman: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. There was some confusion today on ah... the language in the explanation of an Amendment to House Bill 534, with leave of the House I would like to take the ah... Bill back to ah... to Second Reading for the purpose of tabling Amendment Number 1, and putting on Amendment Number 2, to clarify that. So I would like to have leave, Mr. Speaker."

Shea: "Does the gentleman have leave? Hearing no objections the Bill is returned to the Order of Second Reading. The gentleman moves to reconsider the vote by which Amendment Number 2 ah... Amendment Number 1 was adopted, does he have leave... leave having been granted he moves that the Amendment be tabled. The Amendment is tabled and now Amendment Number 2. The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Berman."

Berman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ah... the Am... in response to some of the objections that were raised earlier, we checked the language and the Amendment does not fulfill the intent in which I explained the Amendment. Amendment Number 2, does fulfill the intent and that was explained as to ah... the needs to some of the downstate School Districts and the Suburban School Districts and I move the adoption of Amendment Number 2, to House Bill 534."

Shea: "Is there any discussion? The gentleman from Adams, Mr. McClain."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I'd like to say that the Amendment is in full agreement with ah... our qualms with Amendment Number ah... 1 and ah... we fully support Representative Berman's Amendment."

Shea: "Is there any further discussion? The gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment Number 2, All those in favor say 'aye', those opposed say 'nay'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading. The gentleman... er... the Lady from Cook, Miss Macdonald."

Macdonald: "Thank you... thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would like to know if we could waive the appropriate rules to extend the life of Senate Bill 167 which was to have been heard in Committee yesterday and was not... was posted and not able to be heard because of the change of Committee hearings."

Shea: "The lady moves that the 45 day rule be extended through and in-



cluding... what date, Miss Macdonald."

Macdonald: "Ah... extend it beyond ah... the 7th, May 7."

Shea: "That the 45 day rule be extended through and including..."

Macdonald: "The 15th."

Shea: "May 15th with regards to Senate Bill 167..."

Macdonald: "167,"

Shea: "It will take 107 votes, all those in favor will say 'aye', those opposed will say 'nay'... er.... vote 'aye'. Have all voted who wished? Skinner, 'aye'. Have all voted you wished? Take the record Mr. Clerk. On this question ther are 136 'aye' votes, 2 'nay' vots, 1 voting present and the ladies' motion to extend the 45 day rule is adopted. The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Spekaer, does the Clerk need additional time?"

Shea: "No."

Madigan: "I move that we adjourn until 9:00 A.M. tomorrow morning."

Shea: "The gentleman's motion is that the House stand adjourned until 9:00 A.M. All those in favor will say 'aye', those opposed say 'nay'. The motion carries, the House stands adjourned until 9:00 A.M. tomorrow morning."
