Doorkeeper: "All those not entitled to the floor, will you please go to the gallery? All those not entitled to the floor, will you please go to the gallery? All those not entitled to the floor, will you please go to the gallery?"

Speaker Redmond: "The House will come to order and the members will please be in their seats. We will be lead in prayer, this morning, by Reverend Krueger, the House chaplain."

Reverend Krueger: "In the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost. Amen. Bless O Lord, this House to Thy service this day. Amen. It is written in the ninth and tenth verses of the Book of Genesis 'and the Lord said unto Cain, where is Aba thy brother? And he said, I know not, am I my brother's keeper? And he said what has thou done, the voice of thy brother's blood cryeth unto Me from the ground'. Let us pray. Dear Lord, our Father, who is made of one blood in all nations upon the earth and called all mankind Thy children, bless, we beseech Thee, all immigrants and exiles. And especially those who have come to this land, may their coming be a blessing to the nation, this State, and to them. Help us in our legislation to labor together with them in the fellowship to build, here, a righteous society founded on brotherhood and justice. May we ever remember our heritage and the freedom it has bestowed upon those we dwell amongst. We ask all in the name of Him through whom Thy kingdom cometh. Amen."

Speaker Redmond: "Roll call for attendance. Messages from the Senate."

Jack O'Brien: "A message from the Senate by Mr. Wright, Secretary.

Mr. Speaker, I am directed to inform the House of Representatives that the Senate has concurred with the House of Representatives in passage of a bill with the following title to wit: House Bill 1090 together with an amendment passed by the Senate, as amended, May 8, 1975. Kenneth Wright, Secretary."

Speaker Redmond: "Let the journal show that Representative Walsh has arrived....at 9:04. House Bills' Second Reading. On the order of House Bills' Second Reading appears House Bill 70. Representative Duff is not on the floor. 148? He's here. Yes he is. House Bill 148, Representative Porter. Do you want to take that out of the



record? Out of the record. 156. Out of the record. 175."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 175. Kosinski. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act concerning fees and salaries. 175. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 1. Kosinski. Amends House Bill 175 on page 1, line 17, by inserting the following 'after misdemeanor either at trial or at any other stage of the'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kosinski."

Kosinski: "Mr. Chairman, members of the House, this is one of the bills that was moved to Second Reading bypassing Committee...a...at the last stage of Committee hearings, these would have been Committee amendments of mine...Amendment No. 1 is a technical one inserting provision that witness compensation shall be dated at any stage of a misdemeanor trial and I ask for its acceptance."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 175. All in favor say aye, opposed, no. The ayes have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 2. Kosinski. Amends House Bill 175 on page 2 by inserting the following after line 13 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kosinski."

Kosinski: "Amendment No. 2 will make the substantive bill, 175, consistent with the appropriation 176. In this amendment, rather than having a specific effective date, the effective date is indicated as that time in which federal funds will be available so as not to burden the State. I move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to House Bill 175. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it, the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. 555. Representative LaFleur. Do you want 555 moved? Take it out of the record. 559."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 559. McMaster. A Bill for an Act to revise the provisions of State revenue sharing of local governmental entities. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 559 on page 1, line 23, and so forth."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative McMaster."

McMaster: "A...Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Committee Amendment No. 1 on House Bill 559...a...was recommended by the Municipal League since this legislation effects both municipalities and counties, we recognized the need of this amendment and we are very happy to put it on. I recommend the adoption of the Committee Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 559. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "No further amendments. 563. Third Reading on 559. Did we move 175 to Third Reading? 563."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 563. Daniels. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relation to use of assumed names in the conduct of transactions of business with the State. Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments. Amendment No. 1 amends House Bill 563 on page 1 by deleting lines 29 through 32 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Daniels."

Daniels: "Yes, Mr. Speaker. On House Bill 563, after that came out of Committee, we had some discussions with the County Clerks' Association and also the Illinois Press Association. As a result of those, we've introduced, I believe it's Floor Amendment No. 4, so I would like to table Committee Amendment No. 1, and I believe Committee Amendment No. 2 and 3. And then move for the passage of Floor Amendment No. 4. I think that's the number, is that right, Mr. Clerk?"

Jack O'Brien: "There's Committee Amendments 1 and 2. Floor Amendments 3, 4, and 5."

Daniels: "5 is the last one, so I would move to table Committee Amendment No. 1 and 2."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved to table Committee Amendment No. 1 and 2 to House Bill 563. Any objections? Leave is granted. Amendments 1 and 2 are tabled."

Jack O'Brien: "Floor Amendment 3. Daniels. Amends House Bill 563 on page 1 by deleting line 1 and inserting in lieu thereof the following



and so forth."

Daniels: "As far as Floor Amendment, No. 3 and 4, I do not wish to proceed on those and I'd like to proceed on Floor Amendment No. 5, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Do you want to withdraw 3 and 4?"

Daniels: "3 and 4 I wish to withdraw."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objections? Amendments 3 and 4 are withdrawn."

Daniels: "Now Amendment No. 5..."

Jack O'Brien: "Floor Amendment No. 5. Daniels. Amends House Bill 563 on page 1, lines 1 and 7, and so forth."

Daniels: "Amendment No. 5, Floor Amendment No. 5, is the bill at the present time, Mr. Speaker. Basically what that does is as far as the Assumed Name Registration Act, it deletes the provisions which require a business to file in all counties in which it transacts business. Now it only has to file its Assumed Name Certificate in the county of its principle place of business and also it changes the penalty from a misdemeanor to a petty offense or a business offense. And I would move for the adoption of Floor Amendment No. 5."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Floor Amendment No. 5 to House Bill 563. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it. The amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. 680."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 680. Skinner. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relation to property tax relief. Second Reading of the Bill. This bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment No. 1 was withdrawn. Amendment No. 2...a...Amendment No. 2 was ordered to lie on the table. Amendment No. 3 was adopted, and the bill was held on Second Reading for a fiscal note."

Speaker Redmond: "Has the fiscal note been supplied? Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "A...how long does...do the Departments have to reply to requests for a fiscal note?"

Speaker Redmond: "I'm not certain. There's nothing in the rules. I don't recall exactly what the...the law says. Representative Lundy, do you have that...that statute on the fiscal note? Is there



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any time within which the Department's supposed to furnish the note? Representative Lundy?"

Lundy: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Section 2 of the Fiscal Note Act says that...a...'the note shall be prepared by the agency from which it was requested within five calendar days after it is requested'."

Speaker Redmond: "Five days, Representative Skinner. We'll hold that on Second Reading then. Is that satisfactory? House Bill 687. Thank you, Representative Lundy."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 687. Giorgi. A Bill for an Act to amend the Bingo License and Tax Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 687 on page 2, lines 10 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, the amendment changes the figure from gross to net and move for the adoption of the amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 687. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it. Any further amendments. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further."

Speaker Redmond: "No further amendments. Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 723. Representative Sangmeister."

Sangmeister: "Mr. Speaker, somewhere along the line when you're on Second Reading, House Bill 1560 was moved to Third Reading. There was a Committee Amendment that should have been with that bill and somehow, it never got with the bill. So I've now introduced it as a Floor Amendment, so I don't know when you want to do it, but I'd like to sometime, bring 1560 back to the order of Second Reading in order to put on the Committee Amendment, which is now a Floor Amendment. So any time that you can do that, I'd appreciate it."

Speaker Redmond: "Why don't we go to the order of Third Reading right now. 1560?"

Sangmeister: "That's correct."



Speaker Redmond: "Is it in today's calendar?"

Jack O'Brien: "It should be."

Speaker Redmond: "On the House Bills' Third Reading appears House Bill 1560. Representative Sangmeister has moved that be returned from the order of Third Reading to Second Reading for the purpose of amendment. Any objections? It is now on the order of Second Reading."

Jack O'Brien: "A...Amendment No. 1. Sangmeister. Amends House Bill 1560 on page 1 by deleting lines 8 through 31 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Sangmeister."

Sangmeister: "Mr. Speaker, this Amendment, which was adopted by the members of the committee...a...amends the Criminal Code and the substitution of judge section of the Criminal Code whereby the defendant was entitled to bump any two judges that he requested...and a...the original bill was to remove that and make it by way of affidavit only. The Committee suggested that we change it that they can only move one judge without an affidavit and that's simply what the Amendment does and I would move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 1560. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? Third Reading. On the order of House Bills' Third Reading appears House Bill 970. We're now on the order of House Bills' Third Reading. The Chair recognizes Representative Rigney."

Rigney: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I, too, would like to ask leave of the House to bring House Bill 970 back to Second Reading for a clarifying amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objections? It is returned to the order of Second Reading."

Rigney: "Well, Mr. Speaker, this is the a...970 is the bill that talks about removing the name from pick-up trucks when they have changed ownership. This bill was on the consent calendar; was taken off because there was need for some further clarification. What the bill says right now in this amendment form, is that any person acquiring a second division vehicle bearing the name, trademark, or



other identification of the previous owner shall obliterate such name, trademark, or other identification within fifteen days of acquisition of the vehicle."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 1 amends House Bill 970 on page 2 by deleting lines 3 through 6 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 970. All in favor vote aye. Opposed vote no. The ayes have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? Third Reading. On the order of House Bills' Third Reading appears House Bill 1339."

Jack O'Brien: "1339? I think it is."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Neff. Do you desire to return that to the order of Second Reading? Representative Neff. Will you turn him on?"

Neff: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to turn this back to Second Reading. I had made an error there and I put two amendments on as one of them is conflicting with the other. And I'd like to return it back to Second Reading."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objections? The order of Second Reading."

Neff: "Mr. Speaker, at this time I'd like to table Amendment No. 1, which does conflict with Amendment No. 2."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, would the sponsor explain both Amendments?"

Neff: "A...Representative Madigan...a....House Bill 1339 is a bill that ah.... would require ah... all ah... government agencies to purchase a per cent of their cars in the ah... in the rage that would do fifteen miles or better. And in Amendment No. 1, I have that law enforcement on emergency vehicles. To be exempt, this is requested by...in the Committee. I...a....changed that there to...a...a...a... authority...a...and emergency vehicles.and emergency vehicles, because that corresponds with the...a...present code. A...Amendment No. 2 just replaces...a...Amendment No. 1. Amendment No. 1 had law enforcement and emergency vehicles and then to confirm with the Code, I changed it to authorized emergency vehicles."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan."



Madigan: "Would the sponsor yield to a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Madigan: "Representative, would you be willing to hold this on Second Reading until we can check the Amendments? The second Amendment?"

Neff: "A...yes, I'll be glad to."

Madigan: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "I didn't get the...a...Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "I asked the sponsor if he would be willing to hold this bill on Second Reading, where its at now, until I have an opportunity to examine the second Amendment. And he indicated that he'd be willing to do that."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the record and remain on the order of Second Reading. Leave it on Second. And we're now on the order of House Bills' Third Reading and there appears House Bill 46. Representative Washington is recognized."

Washington: "Mr. Speaker, I ask leave to return House Bill 46 to order of Second Reading for an amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objection? Leave. Representative Madigan?"

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, if my memory serves me correctly, on this particular bill, yesterday, Mr. Washington moved to table an amendment, which had been put on the bill."

Speaker Redmond: "I think that was House Bill 45."

Madigan: "Thank you Mr. Speaker."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 3. Washington. Amends House Bill 46 on page 2 by deleting lines 10 through 31 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Washington."

Washington: "Mr. Speaker and members of the House, this was requested by the Insurance Department. It simply provides that where...a reports for judgements against various business entities which are regulated by existing agencies, that those agencies should proceed... would proceed to investigate pursuant to their own statutory authority. I know of no opposition; I move adoption of Amendment No. 3 to House Bill 46."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 3



to House Bill 46. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? No further amendments? Third Reading. And now the order of business House Bills' Third Reading appears House Bill 836...837. The Chair recognizes Representative Brinkmeier. Representative Brinkmeier."

Brinkmeier: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like leave of the House to move House Bill 837 back to Second Reading back to Second for the purpose of an amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Leave? Return to the order of Second Reading."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 1. Brinkmeier. Amends House Bill 837 on page 1, line 10 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brinkmeier."

Brinkmeier: "Mr. Speaker, members of the House, this is an Amendment requested by the Department of Conservation and it's not a very important Amendment, but it's something they thought should be in there and I would move for the adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 837. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. On the order of House Bills' Third Reading appears House Bill 236."

Brinkmeier: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like leave of the House to move this bill back to Second for the purpose of an Amendment, also."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objection? House Bill 236 will be returned to the order of Second Reading for the purposes of an Amendment. Representative Brinkmeier."

Brinkmeier: "Mr. Speaker, members of the House, this is an Amendment that was a mistake that was detected by the Reference Bureau and it's an inconsequential Amendment, but it's one that they requested and I would urge the adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 236. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further amendments?Reading on House Bill 236. On the order of House Bills' Third



Reading appears House Bill 892. The Chair recognizes Representative Williams."

Williams: "A..Mr. Speaker, I request leave to bring 892 to back to...to a...Second Reading for purposes of a small amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Leave? Does the Gentleman have leave? House Bill 892 will be returned to Second Reading."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 1. Williams. Amends House Bill 892 on page 1, line 21, and so forth."

Williams: "A..the reason for this it was...a...pointed out to me by some of our fine attorneys in the House that soliciting is sometimes used as a term that attorneys do, they are a solicitor, so I changed the language there, a...soliciting for a prostitute and inserting in lieu thereof...a...prostitution. It's a Class A misdemeanor and I move the adoption of Amendment No. 1."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 892. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. On the order of House Bills' Third Reading appears House Bill 1401 for which the Chair recognizes Representative Giglio."

Giglio: "A...Mr. Speaker, 1401, I like to...a...table number...a...table Amendment No. 1 and apply Amendment No. 2."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave to return House Bill 1401 to the order of Second Reading? On Third Reading?"

Giglio: "A...its on Second, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "It's on Second Reading?"

Giglio: "It's on Second."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay, then we don't have to return it. We are on the order of business House Bills' Second Reading on which appears House Bill 1401...."

Giglio: "I'd like to...a...leave of the House to table Amendment No. 1, which was put on in Committee and ask that we adopt Amendment No. 2. Its a clean-up Amendment. The wording that we had inserted in the Amendment was not put in the way we asked them to do it and that's why I'm asking leave of the House to table 1 and apply 2."



Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave to table Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 1401? Leave. Amendment No. 1 is tabled. The Gentleman has now moved the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to House Bill..."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 2. Amends House Bill 1401 on page 1, line 14."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giglio, do you desire that to be adopted?"

Giglio: "Move for the adoption of Amendment No. 2."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to House Bill 1401. All in favor say aye, opposed no, the ayes have it, the Amendment No. 2 is.....Representative Giglio, there's been a fiscal note requested on that measure."

Giglio: "Oh, yeh. Do we have to have it now?"

Speaker Redmond: "No, but we have to leave it on the order of Second Reading until we furnish it. You have five days."

Giglio: ""Okay."

Speaker Redmond: "It will remain on the order of Second Reading. On the order of House Bills' Third Reading appears House Bill 1996... recognized Representative Katz."

Katz: "Mr. Speaker, I would ask leave to return this to Second Reading for purposes of an amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objections? 1996 is returned to the order of Second Reading."

Katz: "Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 1966..."

Speaker Redmond: "Have you read the Amendment, Mr. Clerk?"

Katz: "Excuse me."

Speaker Redmond: "1996. 1996. Where is it? What is the correct number, Representative Katz? Is that 1966 your...On the order of House Bills' Third Reading appears House Bill 1966. The Gentleman has requested leave to return that to the order of Second Reading for the purpose of an Amendment. Any objections? It is returned to the order of Second Reading."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 1. Katz. Amends House Bill 1966 on page 1 by deleting lines 32 and 33 and so forth."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Katz."

Katz: "Yes, this Amendment changes the reporting date of the Commission on the organization of the General Assembly from April 15 to May 15, 1977, and permits the Commission to make available information to the public regarding opportunities in State government under action...under actions of the General Assembly. I would urge adoption of Amendment No. 1."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 1966. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendment? No further amendments. Third Reading. On the order of House Bills' Second Reading appears House Bill 723."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 723. Mugalian. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act in regard to forceful entry and detainer. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 724."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 724. McMaster. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act to create a Township Government Laws Commission. Second Reading of the Bill. We can't find the bill, would you take this one out of the record right now?"

Speaker Redmond: "Take this one out of the record, temporarily. We can't find the bill. Representative McMasters, will you turn him on?"

McMaster: "Mr. Speaker, I don't believe there were any Committee Amendments and I don't believe there are any Amendments from the floor."

Speaker Redmond: "The Clerk can't find the bill temporarily. As soon as we get it, we'll come back to it. House Bill 732. Is Representative Jones on the floor? 745. Representative Kozubowski? Take it out of the record. 752. Representative Grotberg."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 752. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act to provide for a privilege tax on mobile homes. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 752 on page 1 by deleting 1 through 3 and so forth."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Grotberg."

Grotberg: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 752 is the County Problems Commission Study Commission Amendment combined with several variations of original bills that were combined into one amendment with 752 as the vehicle to update the existing privilege tax on mobile homes. And it incorporates many of the problems, it doesn't incorporate the problems, it gets at many of the problems of the administration of the current privilege tax and I would move for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 752. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Floor Amendment No. 2. Katz. Amends House Bill 752 on page 1, line 1, by deleting 'and 6.1 and so forth'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Katz on Amendment No. 2 to House Bill 752."

Katz: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, a...a...this Amendment eliminates...a...in Cook County, a tax which exists and which really serves no useful purpose. It is the tax that is imposed by the county on mobile homes. Now it is a privilege tax and I have check with the representatives of the County of Cook and they actually favor this Amendment because it costs them more money to impose the tax than they collect. Its absolutely ridiculous. It is a losing proposition. They actually, in spite of collecting the tax, end up with the net loss. and I think that that absolutely makes no sense and, accordingly, this Amendment would correct that somewhat ridiculous situation in which a tax is imposed at a net loss to the county. I would move the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to House Bill 752."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Grotberg."

Grotberg: "Yes, thank you Mr. Speaker. I have some objections to the home rule amendment, county home rule amendment, that the Representative from Lake, er...from Cook, is offering. A...one of the corrective measures of this bill is that the cost of collection



of this tax. The cost of collection of this tax, among the many others...a...features of it may be...a...billed back to the taxing units...a...that are...a...in the schools and the parks, etc. The cost of collection is added to this so that they will get that back. A...I realize how the people from Cook feel about the privilege tax and the privilege tax, itself, is a matter of constant debate and will be heard from later. I have suggested to the Representative from Cook...a...that we should parallel these two Bills, Mr. McMaster's real estate bill and this bill through the House in tact, and...a...hear the debate on both issues and save the home rule amendment until the Senate, and if he would defer to that I would be pleased and otherwise we'll just call the roll, I don't intend to make an all day issue out of it at this point. I do resist and would encourage a no on the home rule amendment to this State-wide bill."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Katz, has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to House Bill 752. All in favor of the adoption of the Amendment say aye. Opposed, no. Representative Katz, the Chair is unable to determine. All those in favor vote aye. All those against, vote no. Have all voted who wished? Representative Katz."

Katz: "Explaining my vote, Mr. Speaker, this is a home rule amendment. It would enable the county to eliminate a tax that results in a net loss; thus it would benefit the county and would also benefit the citizens of the county and I really don't find any objection that I've heard to this amendment. The notion that we're supposed to leave to the Senate, this amendment, it seems to me we leave too much to the Senate, and its a good amendment, it ought to be adopted in the House."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, members of the House, I think that Representative Katz has a fine idea. We should not be leaving these things to the discussion of the Senate, we should put the amendments on here in the House and protect the integrity of our own body and I commend Representative Katz for his action in this regard. I vote aye."



Speaker Redmond: "McMaster."

McMaster: "I'm not on. Now I'm on."

Speaker Redmond: "Yes ya are."

McMaster: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, what we are actually discussing on this floor is the question of the mobile home privilege tax versus the question of mobile homes being assessed on real estate. We have the legislation for the mobile homes real estate under my sponsorship on Third Reading. It is Representative Grotberg's desire to get his privilege tax bill on Third Reading. In reality there have been, I believe, three circuit courts in the State that have ruled that the mobile home privilege tax is an unconstitutional tax. For that reason, I think that we are going to have to go with the bill that will support mobile homes being assessed as real estate. I think that in regard to the home rule amendment that we are getting a little bit dangerous on this because I think that taxation, as far as homes, something like this, should be uniform State-wide. I don't think that this is the normal...a...home rule amendment in that we exempt the home rule county of which we have only one. I really think that this is something that we should not be putting on a bill such as this, that is effecting taxation on a State-wide level. I know that the home rule county does have the right to levy its on taxes. I know they have been disappointed with the privilege tax, but believe me, I think that before we are through, the courts are going to uphold the fact that the privilege tax is unconstitutional and, therefore, whether the amendment is or is not on this legislation. The legislation will probably never become law."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Dunn. Give the Gentleman order, please? Representative Dunn."

Dunn: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. I'd like to explain my vote. I'm certainly not against home rule amendment on anything that...that Chicago or Cook County would like to have unless that its a danger of disturbing the rest of the State of Illinois. I think the only reason this wasn't put on and the reason that it...it wasn't on it is because...is because the over-lying tax, er...taxing bodies,



school district, the cross county lines in and around Cook and I think that this would disturb the constitutionality of it or at least it would make it so that part of the school district would have it and part of it wouldn't and I ah... I suggest that you look at it real close before you put a home rule amendment on this."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative J. Dunn."

Dunn: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Perhaps I ah... I don't understand the technicality of the amendment, but I don't see home rule language here. The amendment is couched in terms of ah... exempting from the Act ah... counties with population exceeding the two million inhabitation and ah... if we're going to put a home rule amendment on ah... fine; if not, ah... otherwise, I see no reason to ah... to tax ah... one county any different from another with regard to mobile homes. So I think that everyone should be treated alike throughout the entire state. So I have to oppose this amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Beatty."

Beatty: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, we do need this amendment. In Cook County the ah... county does not wish to tax mobile homes. It is determined that it is a more of ah... there is more cost in trying to collect the tax than there is to ah....and there is no profit in it for the county and I don't think that we should force a tax on a county that they don't wish. Therefore, I think that a green vote is a proper vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Grotberg."

Grotberg: "Thank you. In explaining my 'no' vote, Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House; two points come to mind. The Representative that just spoke ah... refers to the County of Cook as not needing the tax or not wanting it and several others have also. Home rule counties are already exempt from the rate portion of this Act and ah.. now that we have the cost of recovery of the cost of collection in the Bill, it's altered it considerably. I am more concerned with the statement of the Representative ah....



Ralph Dunn, who suggested the problems of overlapping tax districts may ah... present a real problem if the Home Rule Amendment goes on. This is not so much a problem with me of fighting a home rule amendment, as to leaving this basic statewide tax program in tact, as it proceeds through this Chamber and other Chambers parallel to the Real Estate Tax Bill, which would repeal the whole Act and therefore would take care of all of the amendments that we are offering. I would plead again with you ah.... with discretion for red lights ah.... do not foul up this difficult tax situation anymore than it is, with a Home Rule Amendment. If you have not yet voted, please vote 'no' and keep the Bill intact."

Speaker Redmond: "Are you ready for the question? Have all voted who wish? Representative Yourell."

Yourell: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ah... briefly I ah.... I think all this amendment does it take a home rule county out, which of course is Cook, under a tax that they ah.. find ah.... that it costs more to collect than they realized in revenue from. Now the ah... property that it's assessed in Cook County, relative to mobile homes, is assessed at 40%; whereas residential property is assessed at 22%. So with that in mind, I think that the revenue derived from the Real Estate Tax assessed at a 40% rate will provide those local governments with the revenue that would have been lost if we put the Mobile Home Tax on. So I can't see how and in good faith we can force a county to collect a tax that has been demonstrated to cost them more than they collect. It just doesn't make sense. We had testimony in the last Session of the General Assembly relative to this issue and it was indicated then by ah... representatives of the County Clerk's Office and the County Treasurers Office in Cook, with figures to substantiate that it cost more to collect a tax than the revenue received from it. So I think that this Home Rule Amendment is good and should be adopted."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Take the record. No, back up. Have all voted who wish? Well, on this..... we've taken

the record and on this question there are 75 'yes' and 74 'no' and the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. 771."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 771, VanDuyne. A Bill for an Act to amend the Snow Mobile and Registration and Safety Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments. Amendment 1, amends House Bill 771 on page 1, line 29 by deleting 'with the exception of registration information'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative VanDuyne."

VanDuyne: "Yes, Mr. Speaker ah.... we had originally postponed this ah.... to try and work out something with Mr. Mautino's Bill and also Mr. Griesheimer's Bill, but ah.... the Department of Conservation would like to pass this on to Third Reading today, if they could."

Speaker Redmond: "Has Amendment 1 been adopted? Are you moving the adoption of Amendment 1 to House Bill 771? All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. Representative Mautino."

Mautino: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, will the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Mautino: "Ah... Leroy, did you say that you're moving this one to Third without having consideration on the other two Bills? The Department of Conservation wanted to put in the one Bill?"

VanDuyne: "Yes, ah... Dick. The man from the Department of Conservation ah.. called me yesterday and said that ah...it was just becoming too confusing and so he asked me to ah.. pass it on. They would work with you individually."

Mautino: "Well, that means that ah... then are they going to ah... agree to all three Bills moving out of the House or just this one?"

VanDuyne: "As I understand it, ah.. he's not forgetting about yours, but he wants this pushed through so that he'll have each one going."

Mautino: "Even if the other two fail."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further amendments? All those in favor of the



adoption of Amendment 1, vote 'aye' and opposed 'no'. Amendment 1 is adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment 2. Amends House Bill 771 on page 2, line 21 by inserting after 'limits' the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative VanDuyne."

VanDuyne: "I would just ask for an affirmative vote on this also."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment 2 to House Bill 771. All in favor say 'aye'. opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it. Any further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. On House Bills, Second Reading, appears House Bill 724."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 724, McMaster. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act to create a Township Government Laws Commission. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor? No further amendments. Third Reading. House Bill 782."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 782, Totten. A Bill for an Act to amend the Election Commission. Second Reading of the Bill. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment 1, was adopted and the Bill was held on Second Reading. Amendment 2, Totta.. Amends House Bill 782 on page 1, line 1 by inserting '8-8' and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Totten."

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. Amendment 2 we discussed yesterday ah... and it was held on Second Reading. It amended another Section, which we forgot ah... originally and I think the objections have been worked out and I move the adoption of the amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment 2 to House Bill 782. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. 816."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 816, Mugalian. A Bill for an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense of the Department of Financial Institutions. Second Reading of the Bill. One



Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 816 on page 1, line 13 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mugalian:"

Mugalian: "The amendment reduces its appropriation, which is for the expenses of the Department of Financial Institutions by approximately \$15,000 or \$16,000 and I move its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment 1 to House Bill 816. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "No further amendments, Third Reading. 848."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 848, Collins. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relation to Judicial Review of decisions of Administrative Agencies. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor? No amendments from the floor. Third Reading. 855."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 859, Luft. A Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 859 on page 1, line 14 by deleting the number '65' and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Luft."

Luft: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen, ah... Committee Amendment 1 has some technical errors in it and I would like to move at this time to have that tabled and offer a Floor Amendments, which does nothing but correct the technical errors in the Committee Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the gentleman have leave to table Committee Amendment 1? Leave granted. Tabled."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment 2, Luft. Amends House Bill 859 on page 1, line 14 and so forth."



Luft: "Was that Committee Amendment 2? I'd like to have that tabled also, please."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved to table Amendment 2 to House Bill 859. Any objections? Amendment 2 is tabled."

Jack O'Brien: "Floor Amendment 3, Luft. Amends House Bill 859 on page 1, line 14 by deleting number '65' and so forth."

Luft: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen, I would like this time to offer a Floor Amendment which corrects the technical errors that were in Committee Amendment 1. Committee Amendment 1 made application for the Homestead Exemption at the age of 64, rather than 65. It set a \$10,000 ceiling to qualify for the property tax freeze and set forth administrative procedures by which the state reimburses local governments ah... for the loss of revenue. I move for the adoption of this amendment at this time, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment 3 to House Bill 859. Representative Barnes. Representative Deuster."

Deuster: "Mr. Speaker, I've been trying to follow the priority of call and I ah... this might not be the precise moment, but maybe you could indicate where you are going. We're down on 859, which expires June 6th and the Bill that was prior to that was 816, which is way up on the list and ah... just so I could follow it and other Members can, could you indicate ah... is there some rhyme or reason or ah... what are we doing?"

Speaker Redmond: "I wasn't following the priority of call this morning. I was taking them in the order on which they appear on the Calendar."

Deuster: "Oh, I see. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment 3 to House Bill 859. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further."

Speaker Redmond: "No further amendments. Third Reading. 876."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 876, Palmer. A Bill for an Act to amend The Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"



Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 895. Is G.L. Hoffman on the floor? 895? G.L. Hoffman? Take that one out of the record. 922."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 922. Dan Houlihan. A Bill for an Act to amend the Public Community College Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 931."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 931, Flinn. A Bill for an Act to relate parimutuel betting. Second Reading of the Bill. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment 1 was adopted and the Bill was held for a fiscal note. The fiscal note has been supplied."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further amendments on this?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further amendments on this."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 945. Is Representative Craig on the floor? Take that one out. We'll hold at the request of the Sponsor 954. 955."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 955, Choate. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections..... A Bill for an Act in relation to state payments to counties. Second Reading of the Bill. This is....."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Choate."

Choate: "Mr. Speaker, do you know the ah....."

Speaker Redmond: "955."

Choate: "Ya, I know the Bill is, but do you know the death mill date of the Bill?"

Speaker Redmond: "May 21st."

Choate: "The reason I say that is simply because Representative Hart has an amendment and he is not on the floor."

Speaker Redmond: "We'll hold it on the order. It has time."

Choate: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "How about 956?"

Choate: "Same situation."

Speaker Redmond: "957?"



Choate: "Are all of those Bills by ah... Choate, Hart and Winchester? Why don't you hold them all?"

Speaker Redmond: "Fine. 962."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 962, Brummet. A Bill for an Act to amend the Soil and Water Conservation District Law. Second Reading of the Bill. This Bill has been read a second time previously and held for a fiscal note. The fiscal note is filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brummet."

Brummet: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, ah... I have filed a fiscal note on this...."

Speaker Redmond: "And the amendment has been adopted? Is that correct?"

Brummet: "Right. All amendments have been adopted."

Speaker Redmond: "No further amendments, then. Third Reading. 977."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 977, Keller. A Bill for an Act in relation to the applicability of local occupation taxes to catalog sales. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 980."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 980, LaFleur. A Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments. Amendment 1, amends House Bill 980 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative LaFleur."

LaFleur: "Members of the House, I believe that there is only one amendment to this. Amendment 1 was tabled in Committee and was replaced by Amendment 2. So I would like to table Amendment 1 and move for the adoption of Amendment 2."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the gentleman have leave to table Amendment 1? Amendment 1 is tabled."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment 2, amends House Bill 980 on page 1 in each of line 1 and 5 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative LaFleur."

LaFleur: "I move for the adoption of Amendment 2. It has some technical changes. It changes ah... House Bill 980, but it also includes ah..."



House Bill 961 within the framework and by combining the two Bills, I think that we could move ahead much faster."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment 2 to House Bill 980. All in favor say 'aye' and opposed 'no', the 'ayes' have it and Amendment 2 is adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further."

Speaker Redmond: "No further amendments. Third Reading. 985."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 985, Katz. A Bill for an Act to amend the Facilities for the Handicapped and Opened to the Public Act. Second Reading of the Bill. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No, ah..... Committee Amendment 1, amends House Bill 985 on page 1, line 15 by deleting and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Katz."

Katz: "Yes, ah.. these were ah... I think it's Amendment 1 and Amendment 2 were added at the request of the Committee to ah...limit the effect of the Facilities for the Handicapped Act so that it would cover new construction where there is not a problem of retro-fitting anything and so the amendment was added at the request of the Committee to limit the breadth to the Bill and I felt they were right and I added the amendment. So I would move the adoption of Committee Amendment 1."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved the adoption of Committee Amendment 1 to House Bill 985. All in favor say 'aye', opposed, 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment 2, amends House Bill 985 on page 1 by deleting lines 29 and 30 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Katz."

Katz: "Yes, ah... if the Clerk will enlighten me ah... we have distributed a new amendment, Mr. Clerk, ah.. is that amendment ah...."

Jack O'Brien: "Floor Amendment 3?"

Katz: "Yes, that's right. So we were tabling Amendment 2 ah... to make way for Amendment 3, is that correct, Mr. Clerk? If you would look at that. I happen not to have a copy with me, but



my recollection is that ah... Amendment 3 would replace Amendment 2. it would be technically correct if....."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment 2 is on page 1, line 29 and 30 adding 'building to construct an addition'...."

Katz: "Yes, I believe that it's right. I believe it's to table ah.... I would maybe ah... Mr. Speaker, if so if you would just go on to the next one while I check with the Clerk. I want to make sure that the amendments are consistent with each other. So if you would take it out of the record, I will return to it in just a moment after I have checked with the Clerk."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the record. 988."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 988, Mudd. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Mr. Speaker, previously, House Bill 962 was advanced to the order of Third Reading. The Clerk reporting that a fiscal note had been filed. We have checked the Clerk's Office and was advised that a fiscal note was not filed, has not been filed and none is available. I'm wondering where it's at."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brummet."

Brummet: "I understand that there is some question about a fiscal note on 962, Mr. Schlickman? Ah.... Mr. Skinner has a copy of it over there if you would like to see it over there, but it was filed here yesterday. I'd be glad to get you a copy of it."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Well, all I know, Mr. Speaker, is that the law in the rules provides that the fiscal notes be filed with the Clerk."

Speaker Redmond: "There isn't any question about it and if it isn't here, we'll have to get a copy of it....."

Schlickman: "We've requested from the Clerk's Office and we were told just a few minutes ago that none has been filed, nor is available."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, take this one out of the record. If it's filed it should be in the Clerk's Office and with the file."



Schlickman: "May I suggest that until we are sure that one has been filed and is available through the Clerk's office that this bill be brought back from the order of Third Reading?"

Redmond: "It's on Second Reading now. We haven't moved it yet."

Schlickman: "It was moved earlier."

Speaker Redmond: "Oh, pardon me. I thought you were talking about 988."

Schlickman: "962."

Speaker Redmond: "We will return House Bill 962 from the order of Third Reading back to the order of Second Reading and ah...please secure the fiscal note, give it to the Clerk. The Lady from Madison, Representative Stiehl."

Stiehl: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise for the purpose of introduction. It's my pleasure to introduce some students today. Visitors in the gallery from Blessed Sacrament School in Belleville with their Pastor, Monsignor Kneebler. This is a particular honor for me because I'm a graduate of Blessed Sacrament School. They are represented by myself, Representative Flinn and Representative Younge. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "988."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 988. A Bill for an Act to amend the Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "One Committee Amendment...one Floor Amendment, Hart."

Speaker Redmond: "Is Hart here? Representative Mudd."

Mudd: "Mr. Chairman and ah...Members of the House, I discussed this amendment with Mr. Hart and what it does it clarifies some language in the ah...Act and it ah...which the Attorney General has ruled ah...in favor of and ah...I talked to Representative Hart and I would move for the adoption of Amendment 1 to House Bill 988."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 988. All in favor say aye; opposed, no; the ayes have it, the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further..."



Speaker Redmond: "No further amendments. Third Reading. On the order of House Bills' Second Reading appears House Bill 985."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 985. Gene Hoffman. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relation to regulation of business and vocational schools."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Katz."

Katz: "Excuse me. Mr. Clerk, did you read that correctly, sir, the 985...a....its the Facilities for the Handicapped Act."

Jack O'Brien: "Oh no, I read 895."

Katz: "Yes."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 985. Katz. A Bill for an Act to amend the Facilities for the Handicapped and Buildings Open to the Public Act. Second Reading of the Bill. We've adopted Amendment No. 1 and we are on Amendment No. 2."

Katz: "Alright now, Mr. Speaker, I have had a chance to check with the Clerk and straighten the order out. I would move to reconsider the vote by which Amendment No. 1 was adopted."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved to reconsider the vote by which the Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 985 was adopted. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it."

Katz: "Now, Mr. Speaker, I would ask leave to table Amendment No. 1. That will be embraced within Amendment No. 3, which is coming subsequently."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Table number... Amendment No. 1 is tabled. Is it two that you want tabled?"

Katz: "A..yes...a...no. One I wanted tabled. Now we go to two, Mr. Speaker, if the Clerk would read two."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 2. Amends House Bill 985 on page 1 by deleting lines 29 and 30 and so forth."

Katz: "Now, Mr. Speaker, Amendment No. 2 was adopted at the suggestion of the committee and it makes clear that any of the requirements for building that have to be made to make buildings usable by the handicapped apply only to new construction. It does not involve any retro-fitting and I would urge the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 2."



Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 2 to House Bill 985. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Floor Amendment No. 3. Katz. Amends House Bill 985 on page 1, line 1 and 6 and so forth."

Katz: "Now, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment No. 3 does what had been earlier intended by Number 1 that we tabled, it does make clear that the Facilities for the Handicapped Act applies to office buildings and factories so that physically handicapped people will be able to get jobs, which is very important. But it limits it to the smaller...to the larger size office building and factory so that it does not impose a burden on anyone and I would move the adoption of Amendment No. 3."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment No. 3 to House Bill 985. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it. Amendment No. 3 is adopted. Any further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. On the order of House Bills' Second Reading appears House Bill 962. Representative Brummet. House Bill 962. I understand that the fiscal note has been furnished. Am I correct? The fiscal note has been furnished? Representative Brinkmeier."

Brummet: "I have been made...I have been provided with a copy of a fiscal note. A...there's no stamp on it indicating that its been filed with the Clerk; however, I am going to rely upon the representation by the sponsor that this is the fiscal note which was filed with the Clerk, and I remove my objection."

Speaker Redmond: "Thank you. Third Reading. 962, Third Reading. 997."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 997. Getty. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act codifying the powers and duties of the Department of Mental Health. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 997 deleting the words and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Getty. Representative Getty on the floor? Take that out of the record. 1013."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1013. Katz. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act to regulate the practice of public accounting."



Speaker Redmond: "Out of the record. 1041."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1041..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz on the floor? Lechowicz? Take that out of the record. 1043."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1043. Farley. A Bill for an Act in relation to the regulation of certification of farm labor contractors. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Are there two Floor Amendments? Take that out of the record. 1044."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1044. Farley. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act relating to employment offices and agencies. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1045."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1045. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act to provide into law in relation of private employment agencies. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1064. Representative Choate?"

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1064. Choate."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the record. 1091. 1074, pardon me."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1074. Choate. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lucco is handling this bill, I understand."

Jack O'Brien: "Second Reading of the Bill. Five Committee Amendments. Amendment No. 1. Amends House Bill 1074 on page 1, line 1 and 2, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lucco."

Lucco: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, Mr. Choate has asked me to handle this bill, and its a privilege to do so. Amendment No. 1 merely deletes some verbage there and cleans up the amendment of this



bill and I would like for...to move the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 1074, please."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 1074. All in favor saying aye, aye. Opposed no. The ayes have it. The Amendment No. 1 is adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Committee Amendment 2 and 3 were evidently tabled and Committee Amendment No. 4 amends House Bill 1074 on page 1 in each of lines 1 and 6 and so forth."

Lucco: "Its Amendment No. 4 gives the Regional Superintendent the right to select one of the States' Attorneys from any of the counties in a multi-county unit to serve as a legal advisor. And I move the the Amendment No. 4 to Bill 1074 be adopted."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 4 to House Bill 1074. All in favor say aye. Opposed no. The ayes have it and Amendment No. 4 is adopted."

Jack O'Brien: "Committee Amendment No. 5. Amends House Bill 1074 on page 1 and in each of lines 1 and 5 by deleting Section 18-6 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lucco."

Lucco: "Amendment No. 5 permits the Regional Superintendent to select one of the County Treasurers out of a multi-county unit in a regional educational area to serve as the Regional Treasurer. I move Amendment No. 5 to House Bill 1074 be adopted."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 5 to House Bill 1074. All in favor say aye. Aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it, Amendment No. 5 is adopted."

Lucco: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further amendments? No further amendments.

Third Reading. 1091. Kozubowski? Take that one out of the record. 1092."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1092. Hart."

Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative Hart in the chamber? Take that one out of the record. 1093."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1093. Brummet. A Bill for an Act in relation



to the registration of plumbing contractors. Second Reading of the Bill. This Bill has been read a second time previously.

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brummet."

Brummet: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. A...I'm waiting for a fiscal note on 1093 and 1095 also."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay, we'll hold those then."

Brummet: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "House Bill 1128. Representative Keller on the floor? Are there any amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1128. A Bill for an Act to amend the Retailers...Retailers Occupational and Use Tax Act. Second Reading of the Bill. This Bill is being held for a fiscal note."

Speaker Redmond: "Has the note been furnished yet?"

Jack O'Brien: "It has not been furnished."

Speaker Redmond: "Hold that. House Bill 1129."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1129. Hudson. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relation to Criminal Identification and Investigation. Second Reading of the Bill. Committee Amendment No. 1 was tabled in Committee. Committee Amendment No. 2 amends House Bill 1129 on page 2 by deleting line 3, 4, and 5 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Take this out of the record at the request of the sponsor. 1133."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1133. Rayson. This bill is being held for a fiscal note."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the record. 1134. Representative Rayson on the floor? 1134 is being held for a fiscal note? 1135? Fiscal note. 1136."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1136. Hanahan. A Bill for an Act to amend sections of the Minimum Wage Law. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amndments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 1. Schraeder. Amends House Bill 1136 on page 4 by restoring the stricken material in line 5 through 17."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Schraeder...is the a..."



Speaker Redmond: "The death date on that is 5-26."

Hanahan: "A...the Assistant Majority Leader assured me that he will have the answer next Monday or Tuesday for any need to move...unless you want to move it to Third Reading...."

Speaker Redmond: "No...no, I just wanted to call your attention. That should be adequate time, but I just..."

Hanahan: "But I have...I have it...I have agreed to keep it on Second Reading until Monday or Tuesday in hopes that I'll certainly get a call on it then."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mudd."

Mudd: "Yes, Mr. Chairman, I was wondering if the...a...sponsor of that amendment would yield for one question."

Speaker Redmond: "The sponsor of the amendment is Representative Geo-Karis. Does Representative Geo-Karis yield?"

Mudd: "Well, well Mr. Hanahan could probably answer."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hanahan."

Mudd: "A..Tom, would this..a...then entitle both people who work in this occupation to receive their salary plus the gratuity with the gratuity not being included in their salary as compensation?"

Hanahan: "This amendment will allow the employer to cut in half the Minimum Wage Law on the benefit that every employee under the law would be entitled to 50 percent if, if the employee has received, and it can be established and proven that he or she has received, at least \$1.10 in that hour of occupation in the way of a gratuity or or a tip."

Mudd: "Okay, the other thing, Tom, is we've got some of these hotels that are taking a cut of the gratuity for themselves, which is actually supposed to be for the service rendered by the employee and they are taking a cut right off the top of that. Is there anything in the bill to prevent them from doing this?"

Hanahan: "Yes, it is a law right now, believe it or not, a lot of people aren't following it, but in the law right now, the Director, the way the present law reads, is that it says the Director may require each employer desiring an allowance for gratuity to provide substantial evidence that the amount claimed, which may not exceed 50 percent of the applicable minimum wage rate was received by the



Speaker Redmond: "Oh, Representative Schraeder. Pardon me."

Schraeder: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, this...a...Amendment is incorporated in Amendment No. 2. In view of that, I'd like to table Amendment No. 1 and seek that in Amendment No. 2."

Speaker Redmond: "Is leave granted to table Amendment No. 1? Hearing no objections, the Amendment is tabled."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 2. Geo-Karis. Amends House Bill 1136 on page 4 by deleting line 5 through 17 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this is the amendment that has been suggested to Representative Hanahan, the sponsor of the bill, in order to alleviate the situation for the waitresses and waiters involved in a bill like this. And the sponsor of the bill can explain it more fully."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, Amendment No. 2 will put back in the 50 per cent tip credit to relieve the employers that employ those employees that are customarily engaged in occupations that have tips...a...tips, we're talking about cab drivers, we're talking about waiters, waitresses and those types of employees, busboys, a...bellhops, those types of employees that generally have tips as part of their salaries. This amendment also clarifies that the Director shall require, instead of may requiring each employer desiring for this exemption to keep record. And it also further clarifies that this exemption will only be granted in the hours for which the claim of the exemption is made. And I support the amendment as adopted to House Bill 1136."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to House Bill 1136. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it. Amendment No. 2 is adopted."

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "A...due to a request by the Minority...or the Majority... Assistant Majority Leader, I would like House Bill 1136 remain on Second Reading until next week."



employee and no part thereof was returned to the employer. That is the present law. And I'm insisting now, the amendment will include that the Director shall, instead of may, which will clean up this area, and then also that the employees who work and...and... and perform services that are not necessarily a tip service, that they could not continue to be at a 50 percent exemption for the services that they're working at, getting 50 percent of the minimum wage. They would have to be paid the full minimum wage. If, for example, a restaurant tells a waitress to come in at 8 o'clock and they are not going to serve food until 12 o'clock, for those four hours they would be covered by the full minimum wage with no tip allowance."

Mudd: "Alright, then they have, they have to show the amount of gratuity that was received on that particular...a...a...banquet or something and the employer will not...a...get any part of that, right?"

Hanahan: "Right. The law...the law, right today, provides that the, believe it or not, a lot of people violate this law. A lot of employers, the law right today, specifically prohibits the employer from taking a piece of the gratuity."

Mudd: "Alright, thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "We'll hold that on the order of Second Reading. 1155. Still on Second. 1155."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1155. Flinn. A Bill for an Act to amend the Income Tax Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 1. Skinner. Amends House Bill 1155 on page 2 by deleting line 6 and inserting in lieu thereof the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "This is an administration bill and it is an amendment which is opposed by the administration, but it is imminently reasonable and I don't say that because I'm suggesting the amendment, I'm saying that because Doug Kane suggested the amendment in Committee, or at least the idea for the amendment. Right now, the Revenue Department is not required to send any notice that they are denying a taxpayer...a...a...rebate. A...if a certain period of months



just elapsed, the rebate is considered automatically denied. Now they want to extend the limit, the length of time for the rebate, but they don't want to send any notice to the taxpayer. And I don't think that's fair; I think that the Department ought to be able to figure out whether they are going to deny a requested rebate within twelve months and if they...a...decide to deny it, fine, but the taxpayer at least deserves a written notice and if the Revenue Department can't find it in that period of time, the taxpayer probably ought to have some recourse. I move the amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Flinn."

Flinn: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, this is my bill and Representative Skinner has offered an amendment and he uses the reasoning that he offers it that Representative Kane is for this. I've talked to Representative Doug Kane and he is opposed to the amendment; he doesn't intend to vote for it. He told me the other day. Now all this bill does is provide the Department of Revenue the opportunity to pay taxpayers a rebate for their income tax providing they have not got around within the six months period they are now permitted...a...limited to give them the rebate. It takes that six months limit off and it's through no fault of the taxpayer at all, he may not get a rebate because the six months has expired, and we want to take it out altogether. And what the amendment does, is put a twelve-month limit on it. Now this has nothing to do with the taxpayers being at fault at all. It's when the Department has not got around to processing or has mislaid or made some error and they owe the taxpayer a rebate on his State income tax and it permits them to pay him back regardless of when it is and I think it's a good bill and I don't think it should be amended."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? The question is on the adoption of the amendment...Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "You know we've got a real problem with blinkin' lights up on the podium. It must be very difficult to see them. A...let's try to put this bill into perspective. Right now, if you file a State income tax...a...rebate request, the Department has to do it within..."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Stone."

Stone: "A...point of order, Mr. Speaker. It seems to me that the Gentleman has spoken once on this amendment, he is not closing, he cannot speak twice."

Speaker Redmond: "I'll let him close right now."

Skinner: "I'm sorry, Representative Stone, I thought that applied to amendments too. I appreciate the courtesy of the Chair if it does not. Right now in the State law, you have, the Department has six months to answer a letter from a taxpayer, or a complaint from a taxpayer asking for a rebate. Now if they forget it, you lose. Now that's absurd, even the Department agrees that's absurd, and what this bill does in its unamended form, is say the Department will have forever to answer your letter, that is if they are incompetent and cannot find your rebate form and process it within whatever that length of time is. I mean if they find it four administrations from now, they'll be able to give you a rebate. What my amendment does is say that the Department of Revenue damn well better be efficient enough to send you a letter within twelve months of the time you file your income tax form telling you that they are denying your rebate request and that is all it does. Now if the department can't take affirmative action within twelve months, maybe we ought to get a new director. And personally, I think the present director is doing a pretty good job."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of Amendment No. 1. All those in favor of the adoption say aye. Opposed, no. In the opinion of the Chair, the noes have it. You may...all in favor of the adoption vote yes. Opposed vote no. Have all voted who wished? Representative Beatty."

Beatty: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I'd like to explain my vote. We have a bill, here, proposed by Representative Flinn, it's a very good bill, it is limited in a certain way to do a certain thing. He is the sponsor. If someone else wishes to change the law in some other way, they should propose their own bill. The sponsor should be entitled to have the bill in the form in which he wishes it to be and, therefore, I vote no on this amendment."

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Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished? Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, Representative Beatty has very distinctly stated what is at issue on this question. Representative Flinn has proposed a bill to the House, he wishes to present that bill to the House on Third Reading in the form that he desires. And I think that he is entitled to that and we should vote down this amendment. I vote no."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished? Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Well, you know, this is an interesting argument, it wasn't used very successfully on the part of Representative Rayson the other day. Apparently what the...what one of the leaders on the other side of the aisle thinks is whether the issue is the content of the bill or the amendment is whether or not the sponsor shall be allowed to have it in the form he wishes on Third Reading, whether that form is as good as the amended form or not? Now this...without this amendment, the Department of Revenue is going to be allowed to have unlimited incompetence. We can go for several administrations before the Department finds out they've made a mistake in giving a rebate to the taxpayer, and the poor taxpayer is going to be...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, I rise for purpose of an announcement, and I only interrupt Representative Skinner because the group is leaving and there is a distinguished visitor with this group."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Madigan: "It's the sixth grade class from the Wilson School in Pekin in the 45th Legislative District represented by Representatives Luft, VonBoeckman, and Anderson, and the teacher with the class is the mother of Representative Richard Luft."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed, Representative Skinner, your time is fast expiring."

Skinner: "Well, I'm sure it hasn't expired and I'm now talking to Mr. Johnson of the Reference Bureau, asking him to draft an amendment to the rules that will prohibit the introduction of...of a...people in the gallery during explanation of votes and during debate except when it's the mother of a State Representative, happens to have a..."



Speaker Redmond: "Your time is coming to a close."

Skinner: "What I'm trying to point out is at the present time, under this amendment, if it stays in its form, the Department will have unlimited amount of time and will never have to tell a taxpayer whether or not his request for a rebate is denied. Now if you think the Department, any Department, especially a tax department, ought to have that authority, you sure as hell ought to vote no on this amendment. But if you think the Department within twelve months of a rebate request ought to have the decent courtesy to tell a taxpayer whether or not he's going to get a rebate, you ought to vote yes on this amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished? Take the record. On this question, the ayes, 74, noes, 77, and the amendment is lost. Any further amendments?"

Fred Selcke: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1164."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1164. A Bill for an Act to amend the Civil Administrative Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments. Representative Shea in the Chair."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Will, Mr. VanDuyne. Oh, are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House Bill 1167. There's a fiscal note requested on this bill and it hasn't been filed. House Bill 1176. On House Bill 1176, there's been a request for a fiscal note. Has it been filed yet, Mr. Mautino? Turn on Mr. Mautino, please."

Fred Selcke: "He's on."

Mautino: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, it has been filed. It was filed yesterday with the Clerk. I have a copy of it here."

Shea: "Who requested that, do you know, Mr. Mautino?"

Mautino: "A...Mr. Duff."

Shea: "Requested it?"

Mautino: "And it was..."

Shea: "Is Mr. Duff on the floor? He chooses not to be with us. Read the bill."



Fred Selcke: "A...House Bill 1176. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, 10, and so forth of the Boiler Safety Act. Second Reading of the Bill. We've got a Floor Amendment? No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Fred Selcke: "Amendment No. 1. Mautino. Amend House Bill 1176, page 1, line 15, and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Bureau, Mr. Mautino."

Mautino: "Mr. Speaker, the Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 1176 is clarification language which includes pressure vessels to the Boiler Safety Act and makes other non-substantive changes and restriction to conform with the existing code for boiler safety and includes liquified as well as compressed...."

Shea: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment No. 1. Is there any discussion? hearing none, all those in favor will vote aye, those opposed, nay, the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments?"

Fred Selcke: "No further amendments."

Shea: "Third Reading. Call the next bill, Mr. Clerk."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1275. A Bill for an Act to regulate the employment of minors in sales service, distributive service of occupation. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 1275 page 2, line 13 and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, the Assistant Minority Leader, Mr. Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, I understood that there was a fiscal note requested on House Bill 1162 and you advanced the bill to Third Reading."

Shea: "It was filed."

Walsh: "Oh, okay."

Shea: "On 1176, it was filed."

Walsh: "That was the last bill that was up, is that correct?"

Shea: "But the man that requested the fiscal note, one of your leaders, chooses not to be with us on the floor, I just wanted to....he's out here now. Mr. Stub...are there any amendments from the floor? Committee Amendments? The Gentleman from Winnebago, Mr. Stubblefield, moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1; is there any



discussion? All those in favor will vote aye. Those opposed will say nay. The ayes have it, the amendment is adopted. Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Duff."

Duff: "Mr. Speaker, you may be able to be on the floor at all times, I'm not sure, but when that fiscal note was requested by our leadership and our Assistant Minority Leader got up and inquired of you of it, I think you should easily recognize that he would be speaking in my behalf and deserves an answer. Shea: "The Gentleman from Logan, Mr. Lauer, on Amendment No. 1."

Lauer: "Mr. Speaker, Committee Amendment No. 1 takes the...a...clarifies the bill because my intention in drafting the bill was that the money that would come from the distributive fund would be from the county share only. The purpose of the bill is to direct some funds directly to townships so that they can maintain roads downstate. The bill is limited to counties of less than a million population. Shea: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1. All those in favor will say aye. Those opposed nay. The ayes have it. The Amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 1317. There has been a fiscal note requested and it has not been furnished."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1322., Gene Hoffman. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments.."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. The gentleman from Winnebago, Mr. Giorgi, at Mr. Madigan's mic."



Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, for the purposes of an announcement, up in the back gallery, the Center Street School Eighth Grade from Fairfield, Illinois ably represented by Representative O'Daniels, Keller and Cunningham and we would like to have them stand to be recognized."

Shea: "The Assistant Majority Leader, Mr. Davis, for an announcement."

Davis: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I'd like to announce my colleagues birthday from the 22nd District, Jim McLendon, ah... and to tell you that there is a birthday cake right here in my office and he invites you to have a piece with him. Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 1323, Gene Hoffman. A Bill for an Act to validate to the organizations of certain community unit school districts. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House Bill 1325."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 1325, Satterthwaite. A Bill for an Act to create the Professional Geologist Examining Committee. Second Reading of the Bill. Ah... two Committee Amendments. Committee Amendment #1, amends House Bill 1325 on page 2 by deleting line 5 and so forth."

Shea: "The lady from Champaign, Mrs. Satterthwaite."

Satterthwaite: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, Amendment #1 which was approved in Committee makes some minor changes in the wording of the Bill and I move for its adoption."

Shea: "The lady moves for the.... is there discussion? The lady moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1. All those in favor will say 'aye', those opposed will say 'nay', the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "Committee Amendment #2. amend House Bill 1325 on page 1, line 22 and so forth."

Shea: "The lady from Champaign, Mrs. Satterthwaite."

Satterthwaite: "Amendment #2 was also approved in Committee. It was



a clerical thing to ah... break up one very clumsy sentence into two or three sentences to make it more readable. I move for the adoption of Amendment #2."

Shea: "Is there discussion? The lady moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment #2. All those in favor will say 'aye' and all those opposed will say 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "Floor Amendment #3, O'Daniel. Amend House Bill 1325 on page 3 by deleting all of lines 12 through 17 and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman from Wayne, Mr. O'Daniel on Amendment #3."

O'Daniel: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I spoke with the Sponsor of this Bill and she had no opposition to it. What this amendment is ah... it just merely removes the requirement that a majority of the directors of a company be registered geologists. I would appreciate a favorable vote."

Shea: "Is there any discussion? The gentleman moves for the Floor Amendment #3. All those in favor will say 'aye' and all those opposed will say 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "Amendment #4, Satterthwaite. Amend House Bill 1325 on page 5, line 33 and so forth."

Shea: "The lady from Champaign, Mrs. Satterthwaite on Amendment #4."

Satterthwaite: "Amendment #4 adds some qualifications for the Committee that is to review the ah... certification of geologists. I move for its adoption."

Shea: "Is there discussion? The lady moves for the adoption of the amendment. All those in favor say 'aye', those opposed say 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "That's it."

Shea: "Third Reading. House Bill 1327."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 1327. An Act to amend the Revenue Act of 1939. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"



Fredric B. Selcke: "Amendment #1, Beatty. Amend House Bill 1327 on page 1, line 1 by deleting and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Beatty."

Beatty: "This Bill ah.. basically allows the Supervisor of Assessments an additional salary of \$500 if they take certain courses of study which will lead them to become Certified Illinois Assessing Officers and receive a certificate from the Illinois Property Assessment Institute. This amendment broadens the provision of the Bill and we'll send it to all state and local Assessing Officials if they would take this course of study and ah... they would be allowed \$1,000 and it would really upgrade the assessment practices by making these officials more qualified. I move for the adoption of Amendment #1."

Shea: "Is there discussion? Hearing none..... the gentleman moved..... The gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Skinner."

Skinner: "Mr. Speaker, there is a real problem with blinking lights. Either the glass on that thing isn't working or we're going to have to ah... instead of utilizing the lights, stand up and scream and I would really rather use the lights. This is a Bill that....."

Shea: "You are being recognized."

Skinner: "Well, I appreciate that, but you almost adopted the amendment and went on to Third Reading and if I wouldn't have jumped up, you would have. This makes a rather major change in this Bill. At the present time, Certified Illinois Assessing Officers are paid a \$300 a year bonus. The original Bill increased it to \$500 and the amendment increases it to \$1000. Now that's an extra \$282,000 and I'm not saying that the assessors who... who become minimumly qualified, and let me assure you being a Certified Illinois Assessing Officer as being minimumly qualified, if someone isn't, you certainly wouldn't want them assessing your property. I'm not sure that they should be given this bonus before they give us something. I would sincerely suggest that it would be better to put the \$1,000 bonus, if that is what is desired by the majority of this House, in the Committee Bill that will be heard on Monday



night of ah.... Monday, May 19th at 7:00 pm in the Capitol ah..... you know, why don't they give us some performance for the extra money instead of giving them the money first and hoping that they'll give us the performance? Maybe the Sponsor could respond to those comments?"

Shea: "Turn Mr. Beatty on."

Beatty: "Mr. Skinner, the Bill provides that these gentlemen are supposed to take a course of study and complete and receive a certificate before they get any money. Now the purpose of the Bill is to really upgrade these people in their particular trade so that they do a fairer job and it's ah.... I would really say that it is something that would improve our government by having men more qualified and by taking this course in training and then after they complete the course and get their certificate they would then be paid this additional sum."

Skinner: "All right, then let me speak to what a Certified Illinois Assessing Officer is...."

Shea: "The gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Skinner, on the Bill."

Skinner: "Virtually any Member of the General Assembly could become a Certified Illinois Assessing Officer if they know how to cram and are willing to spend about three days."

Shea: "Could we have some order? Go ahead."

Skinner: "All right. I've done so and maybe other Members of this General Assembly. I really don't think that we ought to give them an extra \$700 a year in state salary before there are performance standards placed on local assessors. I mean just being qualified doesn't mean that you are a good assessor. There are two elements that are required for a good assessor. Number one, you have to know how to do the job and number two, you have to want to do the job as the law provides. Right now, the average assessor in the State of Illinois, is not doing the job as the law requires. He is not even doing the job as the law requires. The average assessment in the State of Illinois, if I may make a sales tax analogy; if three people were going into a grocery store and each buying \$100 worth of groceries and the first person in line would



be charged \$4.00 as sales tax and the second person in line would be charged \$5.00 as sales tax and the third person in line, \$6.00 as sales tax, there would be a bloody revolution right at the counter. Well, that's how bad assessments are right in the State of Illinois right now. You're just as likely to be charged 20% too high or 20% too low as just right. It seems to me that the time to raise bonuses for the ah... for half of the assessing job or half of the final job, which is prequalification, is after you get the other half, and that is performance standards after they do the job. I really think \$500 is plenty for now and that takes care of inflation. Taking them up to \$1000 is just out of sight."

Shea: "Is there further discussion? The gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #1. All those in favor will say 'aye' and those opposed will say 'nay'. The 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Is there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 1333."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 1333. A Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act of 1939. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House Bill 1336."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 1336. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Municipal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House Bill 1338."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 1338. A Bill for an Act to amend the Inheritance Tax Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 1338 on page two and so forth."

Shea: "Mr. Choate, are you going to handle this Bill for Mr. Hart and move the adoption of the Committee Amendment?"

Choate: "Let me see if he wants it."

Shea: "The gentleman moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1. Is there discussion? All those in favor say 'aye' and those



opposed say 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Third Reading. House Bill 1356."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 1356, Mudd. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Excuse me for a minute, Mr. Mudd. Mr. Schlickman, do you have a question?"

Schlickman: "Yes, Mr. Speaker. Going back to House Bill 1338 where there was an amendment ah... unfortunately not described or read ah....and in looking at the amendment I find that it is not in proper form ah... you're own ah... one of your own aides asked me yesterday ah... to beware of this and I'm calling to the Clerk's attention ah... I think that there is some underscoring that is missing."

Shea: "We will look at it and perhaps it can be corrected in Enrolling and Engrossing."

Schlickman: "Right, but I think that it should be called to the Clerk's attention."

Shea: "Mr. Clerk, will you make a note on House Bill 1338 to have the people in Enrolling and Engrossing check it? On House Bill 1356 ah...."

Fredric B. Selcke: "Amendment #1, Mudd. Amend House Bill 1356 on page 1 by deleting lines 25 and 26."

Shea: "The gentleman from Peoria, Mr. Mudd."

Mudd: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, during the Committee Hearing on this ah...Bill there was a problem with some of the language. We struck it out and cleaned it up and I would appreciate the adoption of Amendment #1."

Shea: "The gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #1. Is there ah..... Floor Amendment #1? Is there discussion? The gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #1. All those in favor will say 'aye' and those opposed 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 1129."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 1129, Hudson. An Act to amend an Act



in relation to criminal identification and investigation. Second Reading of the Bill."

Shea: "Mr. Walsh, do you have an objection to me calling this out of order?"

Fred Selcke: "Committee Amendment No. 1 was tabled in committee.

Committee Amendment No. 2 amend House Bill 1129 on page 2 by deleting lines 3, 4, and 5, and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Hudson. Well, Mr. Hudson, will you excuse me for a minute?"

Hudson: "Yes."

Shea: "The Assistant, or the Minority Leader, the Gentleman from Grundy."

Washburn: "A...thank you Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. We are privileged to have with us, this morning, the eighth grade class from Atlanta Grade School, and their teachers, Steve Dillon, Dennis McNeece, from the 44th District represented by Representatives Deavers, Lauer, and Bradley. Will the eighth grade class of Atlanta Grade School please stand and be recognized?"

Shea: "I'm informed that's in Logan County. The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Hudson."

Hudson: "Thank you very much Mr. Speaker. A question of the Clerk,...a... Fred,...a...a...there was an Amendment No. 1 that was tabled, that is so, and then Amendment No. 2 and Amendment No. 3 was offered, but 2 and 3 have been combined. Yesterday, I turned in what would be Amendment No. 4, which would have been a combination. Do you have any...are we...a..."

Fred Selcke: "Well, let's see, Amendment No. 2, Committee Amendment No. 2 amends House Bill 1129 on page 2, by deleting lines 3, 4, and 5, and by deleting lines 12 through 19, and Floor Amendment No. 3 amends House Bill 1129 on page 2 by deleting lines 20 and 21."

Hudson: "Yes, that is right. That is right, Mr...a...a...Clerk. But what I'm requesting leave of the House to do, I do have...a...what I'm seeking to do is to have Amendment No. 2 tabled and Amendment No. 3 and they are combined in Amendment No. 4."

Shea: "The Gentleman moves to table Amendment No. 3. Is there objections?"



Or Number 2 and 3."

Hudson: "Right."

Shea: "Hearing none, Amendment 2 and 3 are tabled. Now we're on Amendment No. 4 and the Gentleman from DuPage...."

Fred Selcke: "Amendment No. 4. Hudson. Amend House Bill 1129, page 2, and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman from DuPage."

Hudson: "Yes. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. Amendment No. 4 really is a Committee Amendment. It came out of Judiciary unanimously and what it does is to bring House Bill 1129 back very much in line with the law as it now stands on the books concerning the expungement of records, ...and I would...a...I would move for the adoption."

Shea: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment No. 4. Is there discussion? Hearing none, the Gentleman...all in favor will vote aye, or say aye, those opposed, nay. The ayes have it. The Amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 1385."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1385. Farley. A Bill...A Bill for an Act to amend Section 1 of an Act to regulate the employment of children repeal an Act herein named. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House Bill 1426."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1426. Schisler. A Bill for an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expenses to the Department of Agriculture. Out of the record. He wants it out of the record."

Shea: "Take it out of the record. House Bill 1438."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1438. Schneider. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Fred Selcke: "No amendments from the floor."

Shea: "Third Reading. House Bill 1439."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1439. Schraeder. A Bill for an Act to amend



the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Hold, alright, ...a...Mr. Schraeder, do you want that out of the record?"

Schraeder: "No, Mr. Speaker, I think the calendar is wrong, that's Representative Schneider's."

Shea: "We'll correct the calendar. Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1043. Farley. A Bill for an Act in relation to regulation and certification of farm labor contractors. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Fred Selcke: "Committee...a...Floor Amendment No. 1. Shea. Amends House Bill 1043, page 3, line 11, and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Farley."

Farley: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Amendment No. 1 is just a clarifying amendment. It corrects some technical language and I move for the adoption."

Shea: "Is there discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment No. 1. All in favor will say aye. Opposed, nay. The ayes have it, the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments?"

Fred Selcke: "Amendment No. 2. Shea. Amend House Bill 1043 on page 5 by inserting "immediately" and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Farley."

Farley: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Amendment No. 2 is more of a technical change and it allows a crew leader to keep payroll records subject to inspection by the Department of Labor, and I move for the adoption of Amendment No. 2."

Shea: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment No. 2. All those in favor will say aye. Opposed, nay. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 1470."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1470. Kosinski."

Shea: "Is Mr. Kosinski on the floor? Take it out of the record. Is he there?"

Fred Selcke: "No he's not."



Shea: "Oh, take it out of the record at the sponsor's request. House Bill 1483."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1483. Craig. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 1483 on page 4, lines 11, 25, and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Craig, er from Vermilion, Mr. Craig."

Craig: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, the amendment to House Bill 1483 on line 4, a...page 4, line 12 and 25, deleting 75 and inserting in lieu thereof, 30 miles for an increment, every 30 miles permit for \$2.50 and then on line 12 and 26, it makes the permit for operation within a 75 mile radius of the sight is the base of the vehicle for \$25 permit. I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1."

Shea: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment No. 1, all those in...is there discussion? The Gentleman from Cook,...er...the Gentleman from Will, at Mr. Sevcik's desk. Mr. Sangmeister, do you wish recognition? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment No. 1. All those in favor say aye. Those opposed say nay. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. Mr. Craig, do you wish to go back and pick up some of your earlier bills? 945?"

Fred Selcke: "Give me 945. House Bill 945. Craig. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 945 on page 1, by deleting lines 1 and 2 and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Vermilion, Mr. Craig."

Craig: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. This is a...makes it practically a brand new bill. This is the amendment that the Department of Transportation and the Department of Public Safety had agreed to on the speed...uniform speed...of 55 miles an hour. And they...so that is the whole amendment by the Department of Transportation and the Department of Public Safety, which they have agreed to, the uniform speed."

Shea: "Is there discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption



of Amendment No. 1. All those in favor will say aye. Those opposed say nay. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. On House Bill 1401, there was a request for a fiscal note, and it was being held on Second Reading. The fiscal note has been filed. The amendments have been adopted and the bill will now be ordered to Third Reading.

On the order of House Bills' Third Reading appears House Bill 1487." Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1487. Hirschfeld. A Bill for an Act relating to the inspection of elevators. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Is...is...the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Madigan."

Madigan: "Is the sponsor on the floor, Mr. Speaker?"

Shea: "I was just going to inquire. I don't see him. Is Mr.

Hirschfeld in the chambers? Take the bill out of the record.

On the order of House Bills' Second Reading appears House Bill 1489. The Gentleman..."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1489. Deavers. A Bill for an Act to exempt fuels use in diesel railroad locomotives, and so forth. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House Bill 1493. Take that out of the record at the sponsor's request. House Bill 1506. Is Mr. Berman here?"

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1506. Berman. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments. Committee Amendment No. 1...."

Shea: "Hold it for a minute, Mr. Clerk. The Gentleman from Grundy, the Minority Leader."

Washburn: "A...excuse me, thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. We are privileged to have with us, this morning, on the rear balcony, 150 students from the Momence Junior High School from the 43rd District, a...Ryan, Beaupre, and Washburn, the Representatives. Their Superintendent, Mr. Alexander Delb, is with them this morning. Students from Momence, please rise and be recognized."

Fred Selcke: "Apparently, Committee Amendment No. 1 was tabled in



Committee. Committee Amendment No. 2. Amend House Bill 1506 on page 1 and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Berman."

Berman: "Thank you Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Committee Amendment No. 2 on House Bill 1506 represents the recommendations from the subcommittee of the House Committee on elementary and secondary education regarding addressing itself to a number of areas of revision in the school-aid formula. A...it addresses itself to the transportation formula that was previously incorporated in Representative Bradley's bill. The acceleration for the reimbursement for school districts that have passed referenda after January 1 of 74, the a...addressing itself to the problem of loss of assessed valuation for...a...school districts that are limited by the 25 percent increase in the previous year, a...a...allowance for inclusion in the...or exclusion of the immunity in M.R.F.T. funds for computation of the reimbursement and a phase-in program to address itself to downstate unit districts. I move the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 2 to House Bill..."

Shea: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 2 and the Gentleman from Cook, the Assistant Minority Leader, Mr. Walsh."

Walsh: "Well Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the house. This is probably the most significant amendment that we'll be dealing with this year. It's an amendment that..."

Shea: "Proceed, sir."

Walsh: "It's an amendment that provides from the accounted school fund that there be an additional 50 or 60 million dollars spent. My purpose in objecting to the amendment is that, as I read it, the money is spent every place but where I live. The suburban schools get nothing, or virtually nothing out of this. It provides for about 16½ million dollars for Chicago because it permits Chicago to use assessed valuation of a few years ago and not the assessed valuation currently. Its a unique principle, it seems to me, because the formula is based on current assessed valuation, that portion I object to very strenuously. And for downstate, it provides that



there be transportation tax be included in arriving at the qualifying tax under the school formula. Now there are very few suburban, there are many suburban schools, that have no transportation tax. Where they do have a transportation tax, its in suburban high schools. So I suggest to you that this amendment discriminates very badly against suburban schools who have a desperate need for money, just as schools everywhere do. And for that reason I object to the amendment and would hope that all suburban members, anyway, if they're going to be representative of their district, vote no on this amendment."

Shea: "Is there any further discussion? The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Hoffman."

Hoffman: "Mr. Speaker, will the sponsor of Amendment No. 2 yield...for a question?"

Shea: "He indicates he will."

Hoffman: "Representative Berman, is it my understanding that the basic objection of Representative Walsh...a...a...is going to be addressed by amendment...a...another amendment to put the same clarification into the language of this bill as we put into 534 and passed out yesterday?"

Berman: "A...yes, there is an amendment being typed today that will bring the portion regarding the assessed valuation decrease in line with the bill that we passed out yesterday, House Bill 534, that limits it to high school districts. It was not the intent of the amendment as presented to the Committee, nor was it the intent of the Committee when they adopted this amendment to...a...address itself to the problems of assessed valuation in Chicago. If this part does address itself to the problem of assessed valuation, high school districts, in the suburbs."

Hoffman: "A..alright, then, your intention is to adopt Amendment No.2, leave it on Second Reading until we get the third amendment to clarify the concern that Representative Walsh has. Is that correct?"

Berman: "That's right. I thought that that would be a better way than to seek to table the Committee Amendment. I thought that a third amendment should be put in to merely clarify the Committee Amendment."



Hoffman: "Alright, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, on that basis of that assurance and the sponsor's recognition that the amendment to House Bill 1506 is, in fact, a Committee Amendment and for all practical purposes is a...a...Committee bill, and the fact that we are going to hold it on Second Reading for that one clarifying amendment, I, personally, see no problem with the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as long as it stays on Second Reading."

Shea: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Daniels."

Daniels: "Will the sponsor yield to a question?"

Berman: "Yes."

Shea: "He indicates he will."

Daniels: "A..Representative Berman, as I look as your Amendment No. 2, does this provide for a tax increase, or can there be a tax increase?"

Berman: "The only portion that relates to the...a...to a tax increase would be in the...a...last portion of a...starting on pages 3 and 4, that provide for an increase, subject to a back-door referendum for a phase-in in the downstate unit...a...primarily downstate unit district to bring up their...a...tax rates up to what the...a...a... dual districts combined are now allowed to levy."

Daniels: "Now if there's a request, or a tax increase, does it require a referendum?"

Berman: "No, a back-door referendum. In other words, if you look at lines 26 through 32, roughly, on that page 3, the Board would adopt a resolution increasing their tax, the tax rates of the school districts. And then, we have provided in there that within thirty days, which is, by the way, a longer period of time than presently exists in the statutes, a...a...petition can be filed by 10 percent or 1500 voters calling for a referendum on the question of the increase of those rates."

Daniels: "So, in other words, the instance of the question of referendum would be...have to be brought by the public, or 10 percent of the voters. Is that correct?"

Berman: "That's correct."

Daniels: "Thank you."

Shea: "Is there further discussion? Is it a point of order? The



Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Walsh, on a point of order."

Walsh: "Wouldn't it be more orderly, Mr. Speaker, if we held this amendment until the new amendment is brought up and consider them at about the same time, so that we could have some idea of what the significance of the new amendment was?"

Shea: "Well, that's up to the sponsor, but the Gentleman, the educational expert on your side just said it's alright, so I thought we could proceed."

Walsh: "Well, I would prefer, if the sponsor would agree, to hold this amendment...a....because...."

Shea: "Do you want to address yourself to him?"

Walsh: "Yeh, Mr. Sponsor, would you be good enough to hold this amendment until the...a...new amendment comes along? There can be no loss of time by doing that."

Berman: "Well the only loss of time, Bill, that I'll point out is that we've discussed and explained this amendment. If you don't think we'll have to do it again, that's fine with me. I'll be glad to hold it as is."

Walsh: "Fine, fine."

Shea: "Take the bill out of the record. House Bill 1512."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1512. Pierce. A Bill for an Act to require the labeling of energy consuming appliances. Second reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 1512 by deleting pages 1, 2, and 3, and so forth."

Shea: "You want that out of the record, Mr. Pierce? Take that out of the record. What about 1513? Do you want that out, Mr. Pierce?"

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1513. Pierce. An Act to provide for the recovery and sale of waste paper from certain State buildings and so forth. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House Bill 1515."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1515. Pierce. An Act to amend an Act concerning public utilities. Second Reading of the Bill. We got any amendments on that? A...give me the floor amendments? No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"



Fred Selcke: "Wait a minute, there must be one. Yeh, I'm in error.

One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 1515 by deleting everything after the enacting clause and so forth."

Shea: "Is this a Committee Amendment, Mr. Pierce?"

Pierce: "A...I don't know, I think it's a joke, myself. There's no Committee Amendment. Oh, wait a second, there is a Committee Amendment. Hold on. Did he strike everything after the enacting clause?"

Shea: "I think the joke's on you."

Pierce: "I'll have to talk to the Chairman of the Committee that handled that bill. Yeh, there is a Committee Amendment and I will move adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1. What it does...what it does, Mr. Speaker, I apologize for not having it out,...a...what it does is satisfy the Illinois Commerce Commission. Their objections to the original bill, the original bill...a....asks the Commerce Commission, directs them to set insulation standards for new...a...homes and buildings to conserve energy and the Commerce Commission said they could do that if we would clarify the bill, which Amendment No. 1 does to set out the method in the public hearings by which they do it. They are now satisfied with the bill. This is a Committee Amendment that satisfied the regulatory authority that will have to do this and, therefore, I ~~move~~ the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 1515."

Shea: "The Gentleman...is there discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 1515. All those in favor say aye. Those opposed, say nay. The ayes have it the amendment is adopted. Is there further..."

Fred Selcke: "Amendment No. 2. Griesheimer. Amend House Bill 1515 by deleting everything after the enacting clause and so forth."

Shea: "Mr. Griesheimer, do you wish to table Amendment No. 2?"

Griesheimer: "It's not my amendment."

Shea: "It's not your amendment?"

Griesheimer: "Mr. Speaker, what...what bill is that?"

Shea: "House Bill 1515."

Griesheimer: "Mr. Speaker, it is. That's correct. The amendment only



goes to a portion of an amendment from Committee, but its effect is to do the same. If I may explain the amendment, Mr. Speaker."

Shea: "Is it the same as Amendment No. 1, or is there a difference?"

Griesheimer: "There is a difference. It only entails three words in the amendment, but we had to strike the entire first amendment to do this."

Shea: "Now, Mr. Pierce just adopted Amendment No. 1. Now you want to... will your amendment strike everything after the enacting clause? Or where are we on your amendment?"

Griesheimer: "Well, on my amendment, the Reference Bureau put it together in this manner. They evidently felt this was the proper way to approach it. Actually, all my amendment does...a...to the existing amendment, is change the words on page 2, public utilities, and inserts in lieu thereof, local building and zoning departments as the enforcement agency for these a...requirements that are mandated by the bill."

Shea: "Perhaps you and Mr. Pierce and Mr. McPartlin, the Chairman of the Committee, can get together and decide the best way to handle that."

Griesheimer: "Fine."

Shea: "Would you take the bill...the Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Pierce."

Pierce: "Mr. Speaker, I want to say by Amendment No. 2, Mr.

Griesheimer has never spoken to me about it. I didn't even know it existed. Now perhaps it was distributed in the pile on my desk, here. He didn't raise it in Committee. And this went to the Environment Energy and Natural Resources Committee, nor did he ever discuss it with me, so I think we better get together and discuss it. In its present form, I will oppose Amendment No. 2."

Shea: "Well, that's why I suggested we take it out of the record and he discuss it with you, sir. Is that..."

Pierce: "That's satisfactory. Thank you."

Shea: "Take the bill out of the record. House Bill 1538. Mr. Stearney on the floor? Turn on Mr. Stearney for a minute. Do you wish this bill called?"

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1538. Stearney. A Bill for an Act to add Sections 109.1-1 to the Code of Criminal Procedure. Second Reading



of the Bill. Apparently, Committee Amendments 1, 2, and 3 were tabled in Committee. Committee Amendment No. 4. Amend House Bill 1538, page 1, by deleting lines 1 and 2, and so forth."

Stearney: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Committee Amendment No. 4 is now the bill. However, it is substantially in the same form as the original bill except that it added certain provisions to satisfy the interests of the States Attorney. And that would be on page 2, lines 7 through 15, which provide certain exceptions when the case may be delayed and not contributable to the State and I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 4."

Shea: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 4. All those in favor will say aye; those opposed, nay. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 1544."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1544. Maragos. An Act to amend the Revenue Act of 1939. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Fred Selcke: "None."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Maragos, you..."

Maragos: "Mr. Speaker, this bill was held for a fiscal note and that fiscal note is now attached to the bill and that's why it was held up at Second Reading."

Shea: "No amendments from the floor. Third Reading. House Bill 1546."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1546. Brinkmeier. A Bill for an Act to amend Section 3 of an Act and to add Section 3(a) of an Act in relation to uniform relocation payments and so forth. Second Reading of the Bill. Ah, let's see, did we get the fiscal note?"

Shea: "Mr. Brinkmeier, do you want this out of the record? Take it out of the record. Mr. Brinkmeier, could you tell, now have the amendments been adopted?"

Brinkmeier: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, the amendments have, but there has been a request for a fiscal note, which I do not have."



Shea: "Alright. On the order of House Bills' Third Reading appears House Bill 1555."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1555. Marovitz. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 1555, page 1, line 22, and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Marovitz."

Marovitz: "I'd like to move the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1."

Shea: "The Gentleman moves the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1.

Is there discussion? All those in favor will say aye. Those opposed, nay; the ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Are there any further amendments? Are there amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House Bill 1557."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill...here it is...House Bill 1557. Jaffe. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House Bill 1561."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1561. Satterthwaite. A Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act of 1939. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Is she here?"

Shea: "She's here, she..."

Fred Selcke: "Amends House Bill 1561 on page 1, lines 15 and 6 and so forth."

Shea: "The Lady from Champaign, Ms. Satterthwaite, on House Bill 1561."

Satterthwaite: "Would the Clerk remind me what that amendment did? I don't have that record with me."

Fred Selcke: "Amendment No. 1 amends House Bill 1561 on page 1, line 15 and 16, by deleting because of bankruptcy or death."

Satterthwaite: "Oh, yes. This was a Committee recommended amendment. It changes it to make a less restrictive kind of bill for it and I move its adoption."

Shea: "Is there discussion? The Lady moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1. All those in favor will say aye; those opposed, nay. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 1576."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1576. A Bill...Craig. A Bill for an Act to



amend the Illinois Library System Act. Second Reading of the Bill.
No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House
Bill 1562."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1562. Satterthwaite. A Bill for an Act to
amend Sections 2 and 3 of an Act in relation to the establishment
of maintenance of county and multiple counties, public health
departments. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House
Bill 1584."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1584. Telcser. A Bill for an Act to grant
law enforcement personnel the right to organize and bargain
collectively and so forth. Second Reading of the Bill. No
Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Do you want to hold that for the appropriation, Mr. Telcser?"

Telcser: "A...yes, Mr. Speaker, I also understand Representative
Lechowicz has an amendment he wanted to offer. So I'll..."

Shea: "Take that out of the record. House Bill 1585."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1585. Polk. A Bill for an Act making
appropriations to the Secretary of State. Second Reading of the
Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House
Bill 1586."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1586. Polk. An Act to amend the Illinois
Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee
Amendment: Amend House Bill 1586, page 3, by deleting line 13 and
so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Rock Island, Mr. Polk."

Polk: "Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen, House Bill 1586,
Amendment No. 1, a...deletes on page 3, line 23, the whole Section of
G. The Pension Commission was opposed to this Section of the
bill. We amended the Bill, struck it out, and they now approve of
it and it came out of committee and I would recommend passage of
the Amendment No. 1."

Shea: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption



of Amendment No. 1. All those in favor say aye. Opposed, nay; the ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 1596. Is Mr. Lauer on the floor? Take the bill out of the record. House Bill 1608."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1608. Marovitz. A Bill for an Act to add Section 2 to the Consumer Fraud Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 1608 by deleting lines 8 through 15 and inserting in lieu thereof the following and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Marovitz, on Amendment No. 1."

Marovitz: "I would move the adoption of Amendment No. 1."

Shea: "The Gentleman...is there discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Totten, wishes to have you explain the amendment. Mr. Totten would like to have you explain the amendment."

Marovitz: "A..Amendment No. 1 limits the bill to three areas. First of all, those who advertise in a language other than English; second, those who conduct any part of the transaction or negotiation in a language other than English; and thirdly, those who hold out or represent that language other than English is utilized in the transaction. In these three instances, where affirmatively, the business holds out or represents that they are going to do business or transact a business in other than the English language, then, in those limited cases, they have to give a written agreement in that foreign language. If they use a written agreement in conducting that business, it only applies to retail sales where a contract or written agreement is necessary to the sale. And it only applies where the business first takes the affirmative action of representing that the business is done in a foreign language. In other words, what we are trying to do by this amendment, we're trying to keep businesses who advertise or represent that we deal in a foreign language, we'll help you out in a foreign language, but make them follow through and give a copy of their, of the contract or agreement in that foreign language, instead of getting people into the store under false pretenses that they are going to be able to conduct their business in their common tongue and then find out that they've got a contract in a foreign language that they really don't



understand."

Shea: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment No. 1. Is there any further discussion? All those in favor say aye. Those opposed, say nay. The ayes have it, the amendment is adopted. Is there further discussion? Er, is there any further amendments? Third Reading. Is Representative Bluthardt? Leon? Calvo? Keller? Byers? or Kempiners? If they're on the floor, would they please come to the Clerk's desk? House Bill 1609."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1609. Farley. An Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Do you want that out of the record, Mr. Farley? The same with 1610? Is that negotiating time? House Bill 1616."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1616. McCourt. Is he here? Is he here? A Bill for an Act making appropriations to the Board of Vocational and Rehabilitation. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House Bill 1629."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1629. Lundy. An Act to amend the Condominium Property...give me the bill...1629. A Bill for an Act to amend the Condominium Property Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments. Committee Amendment No. 1. Amend House Bill 1629 on page 3 and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Lundy. Mr. Clerk?"

Lundy: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This, like all of the bills recommended by the Condominium Study Commission, was considered by a subcommittee of Executive. And this first subcommittee and Committee Amendment was agreed to between the sponsors and the real estate industry. I'd be glad to explain it if there are any questions, but it's an agreed amendment."

Shea: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1. Is there discussion? All those in favor say aye; those opposed say nay. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments?"

Fred Selcke: "Committee Amendment No. 2. Amend House Bill 1629 on page 1, line 29, and so forth."



Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Lundy, on Amendment #2."

Lundy: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, this amendment was offered in the Committee to clarify some further objections which the Real Estate Agency had expressed to the Bill. As I recall there was no debate on it in Committee and I ah... again move the adoption of the amendment."

Shea: "The gentleman moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment #2. All those in favor say 'aye' and those opposed 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it. Are there further amendments. Third Reading. House Bill 1636."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill....."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Washington."

Washington: "Just an inquiry, Mr. Speaker. Is it your intention to break for lunch or are we going to work right through?"

Shea: "The Speaker said that he had one errand to take care of and he will be back. When he gets back he will make that announcement. It will probably be within the next couple of minutes."

Washington: "Thank you."

Shea: "House Bill 1636."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 1636, Totten. A Bill for an Act to amend the Condominium Property Act. Out of the record?"

Shea: "Take the Bill out of the record. Mr. Washington, Mr. Houlihan has offered to share with you. House Bill 1654."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 1654, Giorgi. A Bill for an Act to amend the Unemployment Compensation Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House Bill 1662."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 1662, Miller. An Act to amend the Medical Practice Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Do you want that out of the record, Mr. Miller? Oh, ah... are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House Bill 1663."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 1663, Chapman. An Act.... A Bill for



an Act in regard to Medical Malpractice. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Committee Amendment #1, amend House Bill 1663 on page 1 and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Miller."

Miller: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I move to table Committee Amendment #1 to House Bill 1663 as it is technically defective by having underlining under the language and I have Floor Amendment #2 to correct the problem."

Shea: "Is that your Bill? Is the Calendar in error? It shows Mrs. Chapman."

Miller: "The Calendar is in error, Mr. Speaker."

Shea: "Mr. Clerk, will you make sure that the Bill shows Mr. Miller as the Chief Sponsor of that Bill?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "O'kay."

Shea: "The gentleman moves that Amendment #1 be tabled. Is there objection? Hearing none, Amendment #1 will be tabled. Are there further amendments?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "Floor Amendment #2, Miller. Amend House Bill 1663 on page 3 and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Miller on Amendment #2."

Miller: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, Amendment #2 now does in fact become ah... the language of House Bill 1663. It was unanimously adopted by the Judiciary I Committee and it has the support of the Illinois Medical Society and under the language of the Bill we state, 'in any case before a court of this state in which a medical practitioner is being sued, lack of informed consent shall not, in itself, be effective to establish negligence or willful or wanton misconduct if the plaintiff has failed to adduce expert medical testimony in support of the alleged lack of informed consent.' I move the adoption of Floor Amendment #2 to House Bill 1663."

Shea: "The gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #2 to House Bill 1663. Is there discussion? The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Getty."

Getty: "Will the gentleman yield?"



Shea: "He indicates that he will."

Getty: "Representative Miller, is that the same as the amendment was put on in Committee?"

Miller: "Yes, it is, Mr. Getty."

Getty: "O'kay, then I have no objection."

Shea: "Is there further discussion about Amendment #2? The gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #2. All those in favor say 'aye' and those opposed say 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading House Bill 1682."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 1682, Stone. An Act to amend an Act in relation to meetings. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 1682 and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman from Moultry, Mr. Stone."

Stone: "Mr. Speaker, this is a Committee Amendment that was put on my request because ah... it was put in by the Reference Bureau drafting the Bill and it was not intended that it be in. It merely takes out the provision that collective bargaining proposals may be held in close session. I move the adoption of the amendment."

Shea: "Is there discussion? The gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #1. All those in favor say 'aye' and those opposed say 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. It is the intention of the Chair that we will work until 12:30 and then break one hour for lunch at 12:30 and return at 1:30 to the Chambers. House Bill 1687."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 1687, Getty. An Act to amend Section of Article III of an Act in relation to regulation of persons engaged in private funeral directing and embalming and so forth. Second Reading of the Bill."

Shea: "Are there any amendments?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "Ah... just a minute. This Bill apparently was read a second time."

Shea: "Mr. Getty, on your House Bill 1687, Committee Amendment #1, is it tabled. Why is it still being held on Second Reading?"



Getty: "The Committee ah.... the Amendment #2, which was offered by Representative DiPrima, was not printed. It was moved and then we found that it had not been printed so it was held on Second Reading."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. DiPrima on Amendment #2."

Fredric B. Selcke: "Amendment #2 to House Bill 1687 amends ah.. and so forth."

DiPrima: "Mr. Speaker, Amendment #2 ah... all it does is add one person to the five persons already on the ah... General Directors Board. This amendment has met with the approval of the Chief Sponsor of the Bill, Mike Getty. I move for its adoption."

Shea: "Is there discussion? The gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #2. All those in favor say 'aye' and all those opposed say 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. Ladies and gentlemen, the television light is on and they will be shooting some film from the balcony. House Bill 1696, Miss Chapman."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 1696. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House Bill 1697."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 1697, Chapman. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House Bill 1698."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 1698, Chapman. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House Bill 1704."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 1704, Geo-Karis."

Shea: "Is Miss Geo-Karis on the floor? Take it out of the record. Is Mr. Choate on the floor? Take 1720 and 21 and 27 out of the record. House Bill 1732."



Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 1732, Meyer. A Bill for an Act to provide for financial assistance to parents for children in non-public schools in the state. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "Amendment #1, Meyer. Amend House Bill 1732 on page 1, line 14 and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #1. Is there any discussion? All those in favor will say 'aye' and those opposed.....The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Berman."

Berman: "Is this a Committee Amendment?"

Shea: "It's a Floor Amendment."

Berman: "Could he explain what it does?"

Meyer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. It corrects three spelling changes and it deletes one paragraph in the Bill that was a duplication."

Shea: "The gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #1. All in favor say 'aye' and those opposed, 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Third Reading. House Bill 1733."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 1733, Meyer. An Act making an appropriation to the Illinois Parental Education Assistance Authority. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House Bill 1765."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 1765, Taylor. An Act to amend the Administrative Review Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House Bill 1766."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 1766, Washington. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Small Business Purchasing Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 1766 on page 2, line 18 and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Washington, on Amendment #1."

Washington: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this was a Committee Amendment. No substantive changes ah... there were merely



technical changes and I move the adoption of the amendment."

Shea: "The gentleman moves for the adoption of the amendment. All those in favor of the adoption say 'aye' and those opposed say 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "Amendment #2, Washington. Amend ah... House Bill 1766 as amended on page 4 by deleting lines 11 through 29 and inserting in lieu thereof the following and so forth."

Washington: "Mr. Speaker, ah... would you take this Bill out of the record?"

Shea: "At the request of the Sponsor, the Bill is out of the record. House Bill 1783, Miss Chapman."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 1783, Chapman. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Food Drug and Cosmetic Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 1783 on page 1 by deleting line 1 and so forth."

Shea: "The lady from Cook, Miss Chapman."

Chapman: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this is a Committee Amendment and it puts the administration of this Act under the Department of Agriculture, rather than the Department of Public Health. I move for the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1783."

Shea: "The lady moves.... is there discussion? The lady moves for the adoption of Amendment #1. All in favor say 'aye' and those opposed 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 1785."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 1785. A Bill for an Act to license and regulate landscape architecture. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Walsh. Amends House Bill 1785 on page 8 by inserting between line 20 and 21 the following and so forth."

Shea: "Take that Bill out of the record. I thought the Sponsor was on the floor, but he is not. House Bill 1790."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1790, Berman. A Bill for an Act to prohibit



distribution of obscene materials. Second Reading of the Bill.
One Committee Amendment. Amends...."

Shea: "Take that Bill out of the record. House Bill 1795."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1795, Madigan. A Bill for an Act creating
the water....."

Shea: "Take it out of the record. House Bill 1798."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1798, Ebbesen. A Bill for an Act to amend
the Illinois Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One
Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 1798 on page 1 by deleting
line 1 and inserting in lieu thereof the following and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman from DeKalb, Mr. Ebbesen. Mr. Leverenz, do you
want to handle this? You're the other Co-Sponsor on House Bill
1798. All right, ah.... Mr. Leverenz, is this your Bill? 1798?
Well, Mr. Ebbesen is off of the floor. Do you want to handle the
amendment for him? Out of the record. Now that Miss Geo-Karis
has returned, we will call House Bill 1704."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1704, Geo-Karis. A Bill for an Act to amend
the Illinois Coal Development Bond Act. Second Reading of the
Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Geo-Karis. Amends House Bill 1704 on
page 1, lines 1 and 5 and so forth."

Shea: "The lady moves.... is there discussion? The lady moves for
the.....turn you on Geo?"

Geo-Karis: "Yes. Thank you Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of
the House. Amendment #1 amends the Illinois Coal Development Bond
Act in the title and clause of the Illinois Coal and Energy Devel-
opment Bond Act and Amendment #1 also amends this Bill in Section II
ah... House Bill 1704 ah.. in order to describe the ah.. other
forms of energy, which include solar energy, wind generation, solid
waste or any other energy system except that which is generated
by nuclear energy. The reason nuclear energy has been exempted
from the Bill is because nuclear is fully funded by the federal
government. I move the adoption of the amendment."

Shea: "The lady moves the adoption of Amendment #1. The gentleman



from Lake, Mr. Pierce."

Pierce: "Will the lady yield for a question? Was this a Committee Amendment?"

Geo-Karis: "If you recall, Dan, in Committee ah... we mentioned that we had to clean up the Bill? You know, make it more technically correct on other forms of energy. I said that I would supply the amendment in the House ah... on the House floor and that's what I've done."

Pierce: "Well, than it is not really a Committee Amendment. What this amendment does then is expand the Coal Bond Authority and the ah... and the Coal Board to all ah... to all energy sources, with the exception of nuclear energy. Is that right?"

Geo-Karis: "No, this amendment ah... the Bill, itself, expands the Coal Authority, if you recall, to where it has an additional 10,000,000 for alternative forms of energy. What this amendment does is specify ah... forms of energy a little more clearly and it also amends the title of the original Coal Development Bond."

Pierce: "So the original Coal Development Bond Act will now become our overall Energy Act and will cover natural gas and electricity and it would cover gasoline and hydroelectric. It would cover all forms of energy now....."

Geo-Karis: "Except nuclear energy."

Pierce: "Well, is this an administration Bill or ah...."

Geo-Karis: "This is a Bill ah.... Mr. Representative, that you and I both know, was fully urged by unanimous vote of the Illinois Energy Resources Commission, which has been holding hearings on different forms of energy. We've had about five or six hearings on the question. The federal experts have come in from Washington, from Cleveland and all over the country to help us get our long range form of ah.... formulation of energy policy, one of which duties ah...which we are invested in this Energy Resources Commission. It was heard in your Committee, as you recall."

Pierce: "This amendment wasn't heard in my Committee."

Geo-Karis: "The Bill was."

Pierce: "On the amendment ah... I have no objection to adoption of



the amendment as long as this House realizes that we are creating this Commission, which is originally to ah... approve projects under the Coal Development Bond Act and we're making this the overall Energy Commission in the State of Illinois and we're making its Chairman or Chairperson the Czar or perhaps the Czarina of Energy in our state and I think that may be good because I don't know who else is really doing it. The administration claims to be doing it ah... the Energy Coordinators's Office ah... now in the Department of Business and Economic Development. I'm not sure what they're doing, but at least they are trying to set something up and certainly if the amendment expands the Coal Act to all sources of energy and that is the feeling of the legislature, I have no particular objection to it as long as we know what we're doing. Thank you for answering the question."

Geo-Karis: "Honestly, I don't intend to be a Czar or Czarina or anything. I'm just trying to do a job with which I was invested under the powers granted to the Commission under the Bill that was passed as an Act ah... last year."

Shea: "Is there further discussion? The.... I've got a real problem, Gene. I've got you up asking to be recognized and Skinner. If I don't recognize Skinner, he's going to come up and look at the rights again. So the gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Skinner."

Skinner: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the lady yield for a question?"

Geo-Karis: "Yes, Sir."

Skinner: "I understand that there is also a Bill that would increase the allowed bonds for this Commission by \$10,000,000 for solar energy."

Geo-Karis: "No, no. There is... the Bill itself increases it by \$10,000,000 for other forms of energy, which includes solar energy, waste energy, ah... includes....."

Skinner: "O'kay, ah.. now I have another question. Ah... you already have \$70,000,000 authorization. Is that correct?"

Geo-Karis: "For coal. That's strictly for coal energy and development."

Skinner: "Well, since none of those bonds have been issued, why can't you just change the authorization for those \$70,000,000 worth of



bonds? Why do you need an extra \$10,000,000?"

Geo-Karis: "Because already some of the projects that will be forthcoming for review to this Energy Resources Commission from the Business Economic Development Department, which has to first approve of any of these projects, Mr. Skinner, ah... Mr. Skinner, are you listening?"

Skinner: "Yes."

Geo-Karis: "The Business and Economic Development Board has to approve these projects first and when we get them then we have to approve them or disapprove them. One project already before the Business and Economic Development Board on the coal problem wants \$80,000,000. We don't want to disturb the \$70,000,000 money for coal energy development because we are the fourth largest coal producing state in the union. We have the largest amount of coal reserve and we don't have an Energy Research and Development Center for our needs as yet, but Washington, which only has a few mines, does have an Energy Research and Development Center. Now the federal government wants positive action from our state. I might point out something to you from the State of Ohio, if I may? I think that will clarify what I am trying to tell you. The State of Ohio put out a newsletter, May, 1975 which read, 'Last year other states committed tens of millions of dollars for coal and energy development. For example, Kentucky committed \$57.7 million and Illinois committed \$70,000,000. Unless Ohio moves ahead fast, other states will win most of the billions to be spent by the federal government and industry for energy development.' So my amendment to the Bill that was passed out of Committee simply clarifies the Bill and includes other forms of energy. However, the \$10,000,000 that we're asking in the Bill, which was approved by the Committee, relates to other forms of energy including solar energy, waste energy, and alcohol made from corn, including all other forms of energy, except nuclear."

Shea: "Is there further discussion?"

Skinner: "I'm trying not to interrupt, Mr. Speaker. I have a feeling that the same question I asked of Representative Blair, two years



ago is still relevant and with the added ah... knowledge that this Body has gained....."

Shea: "Mr. Skinner,..... the gentleman from Cook, Mr. Bluthardt on a point of order."

Bluthardt: "Mr. Speaker, I'm sure that Representative Griesheimer has two or three amendments he wishes to offer on this Bill and ah.... I would appreciate it ah.... I am a Co-Sponsor of ah.. one of those amendments, ah... if we would take this out of the record until Mr. Greisheimer has a chance to be here to offer his amendments."

Shea: "Where is Mr. Griesheimer?"

Bluthardt: "Well, I'm not his keeper, Mr. Speaker. I don't know where he is, but ah....."

Shea: "Well, if one has amendments, then one should be on the floor when the Bills are read."

Bluthardt: "Who knows what is going to be called here anymore."

Shea: "We are going right down the order of the Calendar. Proceed, Miss Geo-Karis. Turn Mr. Skinner back on, please. Could we have some order? Mr. Skinner has the floor."

Skinner: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I don't require order on this particular amendment. The point that I want to make is that the same question that was asked Representative Blair when he was originally selling this Bill, probably still holds true; and that is that there is not we are asking for another \$10,000,000 of bonded indebtedness, which.... for which there are no concrete projects that have been approved and I really don't think that you need more than \$70,000, 000. Last year neither Representative Blair nor Governor Walker could come up with one project. The projects that I have seen quoted in the newspaper, mainly take money from ah... Northern Illinois pocketbooks and ah.... to subsidize Southern Illinois electric rates. I'm just not at all sure that we need that \$80,000,000 authorization. I think it can be accomplished by another amendment just to put in all of the things that Geo wants to do in the original \$70,000,000."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Schlickman."



Schlickman: "Well, Mr. Speaker, my questions were answered. Number 1, this is not an Appropriations Bill, but I think that it should be called to the attention of the Membership that the Bill provides for additional authority of \$10,000,000, while the synopsis indicates \$10,000."

Geo-Karis: "There was an error ah... and it's not ah... it is \$10,000,000, Gene."

Schlickman: "Well, I know. I'm just calling to the attention of the Membership the difference."

Shea: "Just a small one, Geo, \$9,990,000. The gentleman from Lake, Mr. Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I guess I want to reiterate some of what I guess Representative Pierce said and some of what Representative Skinner said. I was one who supported wholeheartedly the Coal Bond Development Act. I think you who live in Southern Illinois ought to be a little leary of this Bill and its amendments. We've got a long way to go yet on the development of coal resources and what we doing here, ah... we're doing it too early in the first place. None of the bonds have been ah... yet ah... left on the coal development resources and really what we are going to do it put ah... solar energy in competition with coal development much too early. So you who live in Southern Illinois and I'm one of those who supported the Coal Development Bond Act, so that we can spur our economy and so we can use our coal resources in Illinois, but I don't think that we need to authorize \$10,000,000 in bond indebtedness for the purpose of research of other forms of energy. This was meant to be a Coal Development Resource Act and that's what it ought to be so let's leave it at that. If we want other legislation in the future to ah... on the research of solar energy, let's do that separately, but let's not put it in competition with the coal development. I would urge, ah.. first of all the defeat of this amendment. I don't like the Bill either."

Shea: "Is there further discussion? The gentleman from Perry, Mr. Dunn."



Dunn: "Thank you Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. I am a Member of the Energy Resources Commission and I'd like to reiterate or ah... support what Representative Geo-Karis has said about the amendment and I would ah... certainly support her and urge that we adopt it."

Shea: "The gentleman from ah..... are you through, Mr. Dunn? The gentleman from Kane, Mr. Waddell."

Waddell: "Will the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Shea: "She indicates that she will."

Waddell: "If perchance we take this \$70,000,000 on one hand and we are now extending another \$10,000,000 ah... have you then caused a reduction of this \$70,000,000 to \$60,000,000?"

Geo-Karis: "No, Mr. Waddell. The \$10,000,000 is in addition to the \$70,000,000. We do not want to disturb the funding for the Coal Energy and Research Development Bonds of \$70,000,000. That's why we ah... have the original Bill, that I have here in my hand and my amendment is not on that, but I'll ask the question; the original Bill, that I have sponsored 1704, with the unison support of the Illinois Energy Resources Commission, provides an additional \$10,000,000 worth of bonds for research into other forms of energy and I might add that the universities are in complete agreement that other forms of energy are a link with coal. So you see, it's just ah... we're not going to hurt the Coal Development Bonds at all."

Shea: "Is there further discussion? The gentleman from Macoupin, Mr. Boyle."

Boyle: "Representative Geo-Karis, I wonder how you arrived at the magic figure of \$10,000,000 to research the other sources of energy?"

Geo-Karis: "Ah... Mr. Boyle, we arrived at that figure because we felt that the primary money, the \$70,000,000 should be dedicated to the coal and \$10,000,000 should be available for all other forms of energy, including energy from corn, which creates alcohol which can be mixed with gas for fuel including waste energy...."

Boyle: "Well, I certainly am in favor of ah.. energy from corn, but I



think that ah.. perhaps ah.. it would be better ah.. for us to worry and concern ourselves with the development of coal first, don't you? Isn't this the primary purpose of the ah... of the Commission?"

Geo-Karis: "I would like to ah... if I may respond... ah... I have a letter in my hand from Southern Illinois University in Carbondale from the Vice President, George Maze and may I quote the first paragraph in his letter? He says, 'There are two primary factors involved in the link between coal and alternative energy sources. The first involves the utilization of coal and other fuels and combinations and the second factor involves the greatest potential for energy savings and for extensive utilization of coal as an energy source. The problem of the past is that we have made few attempts in treating these problems in an integrated and systematic fashion.' And he closes his letter by saying that he is a proponent of 1704."

Boyle: "Well, I think that you have an excellent idea, Representative Geo-Karis and I think that someday ah... I could support legislation of this type, but I would certainly hope that at this time we would spend the money that has already been allocated in the development of coal. I think that we have a long way to go yet in the development of Illinois coal and before we go out and look for other sources of energy, I think that we should take care of our homebase first. I would oppose your Bill."

Geo-Karis: "Well, we are doing that, Representative Boyle, because there it's \$421,000,000 ah... contemplated by the federal government to be spent on alternatives in energy research and development for 1976 and we want our state to qualify for it."

Shea: "The gentleman from Fulton, Mr. Schisler."

Schisler: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I rise in support of this amendment. I happen to be a Member of the Commission. It's the hardest working Commission that I have ever served on in my ten years of political life. When you get into the field of energy and you discuss all of the possibilities of



coal, you also realize what we have to do in other areas such as energy from corn and from solar energy. There is no end to what we can do and we are discussing higher gasoline prices and higher fuel prices, I do not see how that we can stop with the original Bill. We have to go forward with this amendment and in the ah... immortal words of Representative Bob Mann the other day, we have to drag ourselves out of the 12th Century. So I think that it would behoove all of the Membership to support this amendment and to help keep prices down in the future as far as our energy is concerned. Thank you."

Shea: "The lady from Cook, Mrs. Macdonald."

Macdonald: "Thank you Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House.

As a Member of the Energy and Natural Resources Committee ah... I have had a great deal of interest in the energy problem in general and I think that it behooves this General Assembly to pay attention to what our Chairman, Representative Pierce has said that we indeed have to look to other energy sources other than coal and this Bill does not diminish in any way ah.. the development of coal in Illinois. I do think that solar energy and the other sources of energy that have been mentioned are extremely important ah... to the development of the problem that faces not only Illinois, but this nation. We have one of the largest research energy sources in my district and I have talked at length with them about this problem. They are in their infancy with solar resource ah.... development and I think that it behooves this General Assembly to recognize that it is an important aspect of a future source of energy and I urge the support of this amendment."

Shea: "Ladies and gentlemen, the hour having reached 12:30 I will recognize Mr. Madigan and we will break one hour for lunch. Mr. Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, I move that we recess until 1:30 and allow five minutes for the Clerk to perform some perfunctory business."

Shea: "Mr. Choate."

Choate: "Well, Mr. Speaker, it's not going to take too long to take a vote, I don't believe and we're breaking right in the instead



of breaking after the hearing on a Bill or the vote on a Bill, ah... we're breaking right into the middle of a discussion and the ah.... potential vote. I would think that maybe ah... if Mr. Madigan would hold his motion for just one second that we could dispense with this piece of legislation and then go on."

Shea: "Mr. Choate, I think that I would like to do that, but there are fifteen people that wish to talk on this very important piece of legislation. So if you want we can continue...."

Choate: "Well, if there is fifteen people wanting to discuss it then make it sixteen because I will discuss it to."

Shea: "So can we do it at 1:30? The gentleman's motion is that we recess for one hour for lunch and allow the Clerk five minutes to read in some messages. All in favor say 'aye'. The House stands in perfunct for five minutes and in recess until 1:30."

Jack O'Brien: "Messages from the Senate by Mr. Wright, Secretary.

Kenneth Wright, Secretary. The House is now in recess until 1:30 o'clock p.m."



Doorkeeper: "All those not entitled to the floor, will you please go to the gallery?"

Speaker Redmond: "The House will be in order and the Members will please be in their seats. House Bills, Third Reading."

Shea: "The House will be in order. Is Miss Geo-Karis here? The order of business is House Bill 1704. On the order of Second Reading, Miss Geo-Karis has offered Amendment #1. Is there any further discussion? The lady offers Amendment #1. All those in favor say 'aye' and opposed say 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? No further amendments. Second Reading. Ah..... Third Reading. House Bill 1705."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1705, Geo-Karis. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act creating the Illinois Resources Commission. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 1705 on page 1 by deleting lines 13 through 16 and inserting in lieu thereof and so forth."

Shea: "The lady from Lake, Miss Geo-Karis on Committee Amendment #1."

Geo-Karis: "I move the adoption of the Committee Amendment, Mr. Speaker."

Shea: "Is there any discussion? The lady moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1. All in favor say 'aye' and the opposed 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments?"

Geo-Karis: "Are there any further amendments?"

Shea: "There is, I understand."

Geo-Karis: "I don't know of any."

Jack O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, Griesheimer. Amends House Bill 1705 on page 1 by deleting lines 13 through 16 and inserting in lieu thereof and so forth."

Shea: "Is Mr. Griesheimer on the floor? Well, I suppose we have one of two choices. We could either take the Bill out of the record, take the amendment off or just sit and wait for Mr. Griesheimer."

Geo-Karis: "What is this amendment about? Could you read it, please?"

Shea: "The gentleman from McLean, Mr. Bradley."



Bradley: "Well, Mr. Speaker, we could move it to Third Reading and if he insist upon hearing it ah... if the Sponsor wishes ah... then we could move it back to Second and go on with the business of the House."

Shea: "Well, everybody, I think, knew that we were going to start at 1:30. I made that eminently clear, I hope. The gentleman from Lake, Mr. Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, it's obvious that it's going to have to go back to Second Reading anyway. Why not take it out of the record. The gentleman will be here, I'm sure and then we'll get to it today. I don't know why not."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. My question is ah... since this is an authorization of \$10,000,000 worth of bonds, I was wondering why this item wasn't referred to the Appropriation Committee?"

Geo-Karis: "This is on 1705, Ted."

Lechowicz: "Oh, I'm sorry."

Geo-Karis: "It's not the same thing."

Shea: "1704 went to Third Reading."

Lechowicz: "Well, maybe you could still answer my question, Mr. Speaker."

Geo-Karis: "Well, I'll be glad to meet with you, Ted. You tell me what to do and I'll do it."

Shea: "Are we having a wrestling contest again, or what?"

Lechowicz: "No, just a point of order, Mr. Speaker, that's all."

Shea: "Is Mr. Griesheimer on the floor? Miss Geo-Karis, would you want to look at the amendment? Perhaps you could just move for its adoption."

Geo-Karis: "Yes."

Shea: "The lady moves for the adoption of Mr. Griesheimer's amendment. Is there discussion? Mr. Matijevich, the gentleman from Lake."

Matijevich: "I just ah... on a point of order. Are the two amendments compatible?"

Shea: "We are on 1705."

Matijevich: "I know that. Are there two amendments or one?"



Shea: "Amendment #1 was the ah... Committee Amendment....."

Matijevich: "I see."

Geo-Karis: "Amendment #2 was Mr. Griesheimer's amendment and I have no objection to his second amendment."

Shea: "It strikes the same lines and inserts new language, although the Bill was amended by deleting lines 13 through 16 and inserting in lieu thereof new language, the amendment and ah... I will ask the Clerk to amend it on its face. Amend House Bill 1705 as amended."

Matijevich: "As amended. Yes, then it will be compatible."

Geo-Karis: "Yes, I move for the adoption of this amendment."

Shea: "Is there discussion? The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Mr. Speaker, I rise on a point of inquiry. On House Bill 1704 there were two amendments which the gentleman from Lake desired to offer. These amendments were ignored because of his absence. Now we have 1705 with an amendment by the gentleman from Lake and he is not here and it is acted upon."

Shea: "We did not ignore anybody's amendments on 1704, Sir. We adopted the one amendment that was on the Clerk's desk. There are no further amendments. I would not do that to any Member."

Schlickman: "Well, first of all, I think it is out of order to act upon anybody's amendment when that person is not here. I wonder two, where are the fifteen people that were going to speak on 1704 before we went to recess?"

Shea: "Mr. Schlickman, at 12:30 when we recessed the House, we recess it for one hour for the purpose of having lunch. At 1:30 we returned and at 1:35 we proceeded. Mr. Griesheimer is here now so I think he can well fend for himself. Mr. Griesheimer."

Schlickman: "Mr. Speaker, if I may make a point. I would simply suggest that I have a great deal of respect and admiration for the Chair in wanting to proceed in a timely fashion, but when you don't even have a quorum of the House ah... in existence when you are acting upon a Bill at Second Reading and when it was announced before we took the recess that there were fourteen or fifteen people that wanted to speak on the Bill, I don't think we are doing the Membership generally or the people of the state ah... any



favors by proceeding....."

Shea: "Are you requesting a quorum call, Sir?"

Schlickman: "I am not requesting a quorum call."

Shea: "All right. On Amendment #2 to House Bill 1705, Mr. Griesheimer has returned to the floor. Do you wish..... Amendment #1 to House Bill 1705 was adopted, Mr. Griesheimer. We're on Amendment #2. Do you wish to proceed, Sir?"

Griesheimer: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I am very pleased that all of the Members sought after my body to get up here for my amendment, but I have never filed any amendments on this Bill."

Shea: "On 1705?"

Griesheimer: "No, Sir, I have not."

Shea: "Do you wish then to table Amendment #2 that has your name, Sir? Or do you wish to withdraw it?"

Geo-Karis: "I have no objection to your Amendment #2."

Shea: "We're on House Bill 1705, Sir. Mr. Griesheimer, is that your amendment?"

Griesheimer: "Yes, it is, Mr. Speaker. We're on a different Bill."

Shea: "Do you wish to offer that?"

Griesheimer: "Yes, I will offer this."

Shea: "The gentleman moves to adopt Amendment #2 to House Bill 1705."

The lady from Lake, Miss Geo-Karis accepts the amendment. Is there discussion? Hearing none, all those in favor will say 'aye' and those opposed 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Is there further amendments? Third Reading. The lady from Cook, Miss Chapman is recognized."

Chapman: "Mr. Speaker, I ask leave to table House Bills 2926 and 1692."

Shea: "The lady asks leave to table House Bills 1692 and what was the other number?"

Chapman: "2926."

Shea: "2926. Is there objection? Hearing none, the Bills will be ordered tabled. House Bill 1820."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1820, Rayson. A Bill for an Act to assure all members of the public the right to inspect and copy public records. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment."



Amends House Bill 1820....."

Shea: "Is Mr. Rayson on the floor? Take that one out of the record. Mr. Mugalian, there has been objection that the Sponsor is not on the floor, so I'm taking the Bill out of the record. House Bill 1837."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1837, Collins. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Collins. Amends House Bill 1837 on page 1, line 30 by deleting 'profound' and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Collins."

Collins: "Yes, thank you Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House. The amendment merely strikes one word and then restores some statutory language which was stricken by the Bill. I would ask for the adoption of Amendment #1."

Shea: "Is there discussion? The gentleman moves for the adoption of Floor Amendment #1. All those in favor will say 'aye' and all those opposed will say 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 1843."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1843, Coffey. A Bill for an Act to amend the Surface Mine and Land Conservation and Reclamation Act. Second Reading of the Bill."

Shea: "Is the gentleman Mr. Coffey....."

Jack O'Brien: "This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 and #2 were adopted. Floor Amendment #3...."

Shea: "Is the gentleman from Coles, Mr. Coffey on the floor? Take the Bill out of the record. House Bill 1880. Is Mr. Marovitz on the floor? Take the Bill out of the record. House Bill 1883."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1883, Madigan. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House Bill 1886. Mr. Jaffe, is he on the floor? Take it out of



the record. House Bill 1891, Mr. Dunn. Mr. Dunn, are you ready on that? Take that out of the record. House Bill 1907. Mr. Stubblefield ah... is he on the floor? Take that out of the record. House Bill 1941, Mr. Duester."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1941. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Highway Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 1946 on page 1 and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman from Lake, Mr. Deuster."

Deuster: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, House Bill 1941 is a ah... the basic Bill would allow ah... the townships to extend an additional tax of \$.15 per \$100.00 of assessed valuation ah... for the purpose of drainage purposes. Amendment #1 requires that... be subject to a favorable referendum. This is a Committee Amendment and I urge the adoption of Committee Amendment #1."

Shea: "Is there discussion? Is there any discussion? The gentleman offers the adoption of Committee Amendment #1. All in favor will say 'aye' and those opposed 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Shea: "No further amendments. Third Reading. House Bill 1946."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1946, Brinkmeier."

Shea: "Is Mr. Brinkmeier on the floor? Mr. McClain, do you want to handle this Bill? You're the Co-Sponsor with him."

Jack O'Brien: "A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 1946 on page 1 by deleting line 1 and 2 and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman from Adams, Mr. McClain."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House. I believe that Representative Brinkmeier and myself have pulled ourselves off of this Bill ah... being the major Co-Sponsors and ah... in lieu of that ah... Representative Gene Hoffman is the ah... Chief Sponsor of this Bill."

Shea: "Mr. Clerk, will you amend the records of the House to indicate that Mr. McClain and Mr. Brinkmeier are no longer sponsoring this



Bill and that Mr. G.L. Hoffman is. Now the gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Hoffman."

Hoffman: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, we have ah... requested for the last two days that this be cleared up and I'm sure that it will be. House Bill 1946 was ah... originally a Bill that dealt with the nursing professions as related to schools. That has been entirely deleted from the Bill and now 1946 is a new Act which provides by this amendment for a survey of the school districts ah... by educational service regions across the state in which there will be a board member from each of the school districts within the E.S.R. Regions appointed to the survey committee and they will survey ah... the schools in their district against the existing standards and I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1."

Shea: "Is there discussion? The lady from Adams, Miss Kent."

Kent: "Ah.... will..."

Shea: "Mrs. Kent."

Kent: "Will the gentleman yield for a question?"

Shea: "He indicates that he will."

Kent: "Would you explain if this is the same Bill as 1505?"

Hoffman: "1505 has been tabled and this is not the same Bill as 1505. This asks for a survey only there is no mandatory reorganization or any of that type of thing."

Kent: "What will happen at the end of the survey?"

Hoffman: "The survey will be done ah... completed by July 1, 1976. A state committee then will ah... check the survey and the recommendations and will submit a report of the survey to the General Assembly School Problems Commission and one other group and ah... that's it."

Kent: "May I speak to the Bill, Mr. Chairman or ah.... the amendment."

Shea: "The lady from Adams, Mrs. Kent, on the Bill."

Kent: "The amendment is changing the Bill entirely?"

Hoffman: "That's correct."

Kent: "This is a forerunner in my estimation of the consolidation of schools. Any of you who have small counties...."



Shea: "Mrs. Kent, please. Could we have some order, please? Proceed, Mrs. Kent."

Kent: "As I said, this is the forerunner of the consolidation of schools because a survey can so often turn around to be actual and I think this is what the whole intent of this is. I will have one county that will not have a school. These schools are doing their job and sometimes better than the larger schools. So I urge those of you who are against the consolidation in the manner in which it has been proposed to ah... vote 'no' on this amendment."

Shea: "Is there further discussion? I see your flashing light, Mr. Schlickman, now are you going to be like Mr. Skinner and let the lights flash or do you want to yell? The gentleman from Lawrence, Mr. Cunningham."

Cunningham: "Mr. Speaker, will the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Shea: "She will."

Cunningham: "No, I meant the Sponsor of the amendment."

Shea: "Oh, he will."

Cunningham: "What.... Representative Hoffman, what is the cost of your survey?"

Hoffman: "The cost of the survey is provided in the Bill and is covered out of funds that are appropriated to ah... the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction. The survey provides for people to serve without cost and ah... the expenses of the survey will be handled through the current appropriation of the Office of Education. I might also say that...."

Shea: "Excuse me a minute. Mr. McGrew, have you recovered your child? You may proceed now."

Hoffman: "The ah....."

Shea: "Mr. Matijevich on a point of order."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to have a ruling from the Chair ah... under Rule 34 (c) ah.. an amendment is not in order unless it is confined to the subject of the Bill. I just wonder if this amendment, which really provides a new Bill is not ah... of the same subject matter of the original Bill. Let's face it, we can be real general...."



Shea: "You raising objections, Mr. Matijevich?"

Matijevich: "Yes."

Shea: "Mr. Clerk, may I see the Bill and the amendment? Mr. Hoffman, are you indicating that you want to take it out of the record?"

Hoffman: "Yes."

Shea: "The gentleman requests that it be taken out of the record and ah... do you want a ruling prior to the time he takes it out, Mr. Matijevich or do you want him to discuss it with you?"

Matijevich: "Well, I wouldn't mind a ruling. If we're going to get to it later, we might as well have it now."

Shea: "May I have the Bill and the amendment before it is taken out of the record? In the opinion of the Chair, the amendment is not germane. The gentleman's point is well taken. The gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Hoffman."

Hoffman: "Mr. Speaker, let me just say that ah... we deliberately looked for a Bill to ah... which amended Chapter 122 of the School Code and which House Bill 1496 did. This particular amendment pertains to ah... to schools and school districts. We did this at the suggestion of a number of people who felt that to merely amend House Bill 1505, which I have already tabled would only confuse the issue and therefore not to do that, we deliberately went to a Bill that amended Chapter 122 of the School Code. In the past ah... rulings have indicated when this came before the House, that if it dealt with the same Chapter ah... that it was in fact germane. If some people oppose the concept of people looking at their own schools against existing yardsticks, ah... that's one issue and that can be determined on Third Reading. I would be disappointed to say the least, ah... if on the basis of a ruling when we deliberately attempted to meet these types of concerns by choosing House Bill 1947 to have it ruled non-germane at this time."

Shea: "As I said, Mr. Hoffman, it was the ruling of the Chair that the amendment was not germane. Now if you want to appeal the ruling...."

Hoffman: "I would like to appeal the ruling, ah... I think the difficulty that I have now in appealing the ruling is the ah... the Membership



that is ah... present. I may think I have ah.... you know, I just don't think I have enough people here."

Shea: "Well, Mr. Hoffman, in the opinion of the Chair, you've struck everything after the enacting clause and seek to put a new title in the Bill so that it is so completely different I think it would run into constitutional problems. That is the ruling of the Chair. Are there further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. Mr. Schlickman on a point of order."

Schlickman: "Mr. Speaker, I just want to say that my mother taught me to criticize when I should and to compliment when I can. I support your ruling."

Shea: "Thank you, Sir. The gentleman from Lawrence, Mr. Cunningham."

Cunningham: "Well, the last comments made me extremely nervous because I got up here to say that I too think that you are doing a splendid job, but I did want to gently remonstrate with you about a pattern that has developed for the second time in a row when I've gotten up to speak something has happened to cut off discussion after about fifteen seconds. I hope, Mr. Speaker, in your excellence that you realize that it would be a gross injustice to the people of the 54th District that they not be heard on this floor. And again I compliment you on your skilled effort."

Shea: "The gentleman from Adams, Mr. McClain."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House. Mr. Speaker, I ah... although I have my own problems with the amendment, I ah... hope we haven't gone on pass 1946, but the question I would have it ah.... that Representative Hoffman indicated the desire to pull the Bill out of the record so that maybe he could ah.... work something out. Would that not be honored?"

Shea: "Well, then we will return the Bill to the order of Second Reading.... Is that what you desire, Representative Hoffman? It is on Third Reading."

McClain: Thank you."

Shea: "The gentleman from Stevenson, Mr. Rigney."

Rigney: "Well, Mr. Speaker, may I inquire of the Chair what is on Third Reading if the amendment is not ah... part of it?"



Shea: "The original bill, sir."

Rigney: "Well, I was under the impression that the bill...the sponsor of the bill was not going to pursue that. Am I correct? Could I have Mr. Brinkmeier's comments?"

Shea: "Mr. Brinkmeier and Mr. McClain have withdrawn as sponsors. Mr. Hoffman is a sponsor of the bill. The bill is on Third Reading. He can table it if he wishes. House Bill 1950."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1950. Porter. A Bill for an Act relating to the authorizing formation of close corporations. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Shea: "Third Reading. House Bill 1955."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1955."

Shea: "Is Mr. Keller on the floor? Take the bill out of the record. House Bill 1956, Mr. Keller, out of the record. House Bill 1964 Mr. Katz."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1964. A Bill for an Act to amend the Medical Practice Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 1964 on page 1, line 11."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Katz."

Katz: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. The amendment that appears as a Committee Amendment, but because I was before the Committee on a number of matters that day, I had looked over the original amendment and it embodies pages of different amendments. I think the simplest thing to do would just have leave to table Committee Amendment 1. And I have now filed Committee Amendment 2. I filed Amendment No. 2, which is in fact, the way the Committee approved the bill, but first I will simply table Amendment No. 1, ask leave to do so."

Shea: "The Gentleman asks leave to table Amendment No. 1. Has he leave? Hearing no objection, Amendment No. 1 is tabled. Are there further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 2. Katz. Amends House Bill 1964 on page 1 by deleting lines 8 through 15 and so forth."



Katz: "Amendment No. 2 is precisely the amendment, as presented to the Executive Committee and approved by that Committee. The general bill is one providing for continuing education for physicians. Amendment No. 2 was drafted with the cooperation of the Illinois Medical Society. It sets forth some reasonable requirements with regard to continuing education and I would move the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 2. A...correction, I would move the adoption of Amendment No. 2, which is precisely the amendment that was earlier tabled as Committee Amendment No. 1 because of a technical error in the collection of the papers."

Shea: "You're moving for the adoption of Amendment No. 2, Mr. Katz?"

Katz: "That is correct, Mr. Speaker."

Shea: "Is there discussion? The Gentleman from Macon, Mr. Dunn."

Dunn: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. I have a question of the sponsor. The sponsor explained in a general way that the amendment provides for continuing education of physicians. However, I see that the amendment has...a...a...number of provisions in it. I wonder if the sponsor would give a little more detailed explanation of what this is all about."

Katz: "Yes, I would be glad to do so, Mr. Dunn. When you talk about the problem of continuing education..."

Shea: "Mr. Katz, can I disturb you for a minute?"

Katz: "Certainly."

Shea: "The light is on and they're going to shoot some pictures on the floor of the gentlemen from A.P. I'm sorry, Mr. Katz, proceed."

Katz: "Yes, Mr. Dunn, with regard to the general idea of continuing education, the Illinois Medical Society shares the view that I felt in introducing the bill, that it is a good idea. There are vast numbers of changes that are going on in the medical field. All sorts of drugs and other things and it is very important that physicians keep up and keep abreast of what is going on. However, it is a complicated problem, and for example, the physician who is engaged in a specialty, such as radiology, couldn't reasonably be expected or even need to keep up with what's going on in internal medicine or general medical practice. All the amendment does is to try to set up



a sensible proposal for the medical examining committee to follow in arriving as to what would be reasonable with regard to requirements for continuing education. Now when the bill reaches Third Reading, I certainly will go into it further. At this stage, this is simply a frame-work upon which the medical examining committee of the Department of Education and Registration could set up some reasonable requirements."

Shea: "Is there further discussion? Mr. Dunn."

Dunn: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, does the amendment contain a provision or provisions...a...a...which...a...relate to penalties for the failure to...a...comply with the mandatory continuing education requirements prescribed in the amendment?"

Katz: "No it does not. It simply directs the medical examining committee to promulgate some reasonable standards of continuing education. It is possible that at some future date when that has been done, the subject might be back before us. But at this state, it is a direction to the medical examining committee that is already established for the purpose of administering the Medical Practice Act to set forth and make a study and make recommendations with regard to what would be reasonable in terms of requiring physicians to keep reasonably abreast of developments that are going on in the medical field."

Dunn: "One more quick question, if I may? Is the amendment now the bill, or is there other substance in the bill itself?"

Katz: "The only thing that is left, Representative Dunn, in the bill that is not in the amendment...I...I...put in the bill a provision that in the event a physician was located in an area where they did not have available opportunities for continuing education, recognizing that there are some communities in Illinois that...a...where the community is dependent upon the physician and to encourage the medical schools to go into those communities and to make available the educational opportunities there, locally, so the physicians wouldn't have to leave, I put in a provision that said that in the event that the application of the standard would prevent a community from having a physician that...that should not be so. In other words that the physician should not be...the community should not



deprived of a physician because there are no opportunities for continuing education in that community. Now that was in the original bill. It isn't in the Medical Society amendment, which is the amendment that you have before you...a...but it remains in the bill from the original bill. It was simply a provision to make clear that it was certainly neither my intention or desire to interfere with communities having physicians stay in those communities to take care of the people in those communities."

Shea: "There are a number of people that are on the floor of the House that are not authorized. I wish you'd please leave the floor of the House if you're not authorized to be on the floor. The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Totten."

Totten: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. Would the sponsor yield for a question?"

Shea: "He indicates he will."

Totten: "Thank you. Representative Katz, is it my understanding you've tabled Amendment No. 1?"

Katz: "Yes, I've tabled Amendment No. 1 because you would go down to the Clerk's desk, you will see that what happened inadvertently, was that the Committee Clerk, whoever did it, happened to staple together pages from another amendment that was totally unrelated to the subject along with Committee Amendment No. 1. Now what Committee Amendment...what Amendment No. 2 is, is exactly the same amendment as was presented as Committee Amendment No. 1, but inadvertently, the Clerk of the Committee gathered together the wrong, some of the wrong pages and so it doesn't make any sense anymore, and rather than to go back and send it back to Committee to straighten it out, I simply tabled what the Committee Clerk had sent in to the Clerk and simply added as Amendment No. 2 exactly the same amendment that was approved by the Executive Committee as Committee Amendment No. 1. Inadvertently, a clerical error was made and all that we have done is to straighten out that clerical error. I have not changed a word."

Totten: "Does, well, let me ask you this. Does Amendment No. 2 include accountants?"



Katz: "No, it has nothing at all to do with accountants. That was the mistake that appeared originally. That was why the original Amendment No. 1 was incomprehensible and I just decided the simplest thing to do was just to table it. It had no business there in the first place."

Totten: "Thank you."

Shea: "Is there any further discussion? The Gentleman offers the adoption of Amendment No. 2. All those in favor will say aye. Those opposed will say nay. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. On the order of House Bills' Third Reading appears House Bill 1975. The Gentleman wishes that out of the record. House Bill 1982. Is Mr. Berman on the floor? Second Reading. House Bill 1982 on Second Reading. If I said Third Reading, I made a mistake, Mr. Schneider, we're on Second Reading."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1982. Berman. A Bill for an Act to amend the Environmental Protection Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? What?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 1. Amends House Bill 1982 by deleting line 35 on page 2 and line 1 through 3 on page 3 and inserting in lieu thereof, the following."

Shea: "The Gentleman from...the Gentleman from Macon, Mr. Borchers, on the amendment. This is your amendment, Mr. Borchers, to House Bill 1982."

Borchers: "A...what this amendment does on House Bill 1982 is strike a...lines....a...lines...a...35 on page 2 and lines 1 through 3 on page 3 and insert therein the following. Now those lines that are struck are the agency, that's the E.P.A. Agency, may prescribe reasonable fees for...a...permits required pursuant to this Act. Such fees in the aggregate may not exceed the total cost to the agency of its inspection and permit system. What I want to do is point out to the membership here, that this is a clear indication that the Environmental Protection Agency is going to try and push off on the industry, sanitary districts, municipalities, farmer, what have you. The ah... cost



of the permit...the cost that require them to have permits and the cost of those permits. Now already, the cost of the E.P.A. in relation to factories lost to Illinois are approximately, the last I heard, are 195 factories have either left Illinois or refused to come here because of the E.P.A. The...a...a...this kind of a action will further increase the cost of a, through the permit system, which there's no set amount, no one knows what this permit will be. For example, using is one example the Staley Company, and this is not in relation in permit, but is a possible estimate of what a cost would be, it cost the Staley Company for filling out the forms, alone, of the air conditioners of that company, over \$20,000. Once, I showed the a...I showed a picture of it and spoke of this before. It took of some 20 people and..a...some two weeks to three weeks, as I recollect, to fill out these forms. Now if the permit system goes into effect, there's no curb whatsoever on what they can charge. It could be \$5000 to Staley's, for example, it could be \$10,000. No one knows what the permits will cost. I feel that industry, municipalities, sanitary district of your town...a...a...a...municipality in relation to this...the sewer systems, or to the streets, our ground water, whatever it may be and the E.P.A. is more and more trying to cover in every way, every facet of our life. Whether it's your own home being hooked up to a sanitary district, you're going to have to have an E.P.A. permit to do it. And you'll have to pay for it. I feel that we should put on this amendment for the protection of ourselves, our children, our homes, our municipalities, our industry, our farmers, our sanitary districts, I think it's a most important necessary amendment. I solicit your support."

Shea: "The Gentleman offers the adoption of Amendment No. 1. Is there discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Berman."

Berman: "Thank you Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 1982 is my bill that I introduced to do a relatively simple thing. And my good friend from Macon County is making a mountain out of a molehill. Number one, the purpose of the bill was to put in...a...a...judicial interpretation language that says that if the E.P.A...a...a...is going to charge fees, that the fees cannot



exceed the amount of the cost to the agency of its inspection and permit system. The bill puts a limit, a limit, a lawful limit upon the amount that can be charged. Number two, the E.P.A. doesn't charge any fees. This is a technical bill merely to set forth in statutory language the kind of language that has been set forth in judicial court decisions. Now...a...Mr. Borchers has talked about all of these thousands of dollars in fees. I submit to you that that's not the purpose of this bill. I suggested to him that if he wants to eliminate this language, he should introduce a bill and not use my bill as a vehicle to do exactly the contrary to what the bill was intended to do. So I stand up here and tell you that the bill is simple, the bill doesn't do anything to anybody except to put in some necessary technical language limiting the amount of fees and I would urge a no vote on Amendment No. 1 to 1982."

Shea: "Any further discussion? The Gentleman from Macon, Mr. Borchers, to close."

Borchers: "I'd just like to point out two points. If that's...if the... a...if this is not the purpose of this bill then this amendment won't hurt a thing. It guarantees the safety of the various industries, municipalities, etc. that I have just mentioned. As far as the fees are concerned, the very minute they begin to put in bills or a bill that speaks of fees by the E.P.A., you can be sure that it won't be long, they will be doing this. We might as well protect the industries, the sanitary districts, etc. that I have talked about right now while the talkin's good. Because when we first passed this environmental law...a...rule in the House...a... law in the House and gave them unlimited power, we opened up Pandora's box. And I'd like to have that Pandora's box closed and protected, protect us all from what could happen if this box is opened."

Shea: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment No. 1. All those in favor will say aye. Those opposed say nay. The nays have it. Is there a request for a roll call? There's been a request for a roll call vote. All in favor of the amendment will vote aye. Those opposed will vote nay. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Take the record, Mr.



Clerk. On this question there are 36 aye votes, 83 nay votes and the motion to adopt fails. Are there any further amendments?

Third Reading. House Bill 2000."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2000. Hart."

Shea: "Is Mr. Hart on the floor? Take the bill out of the record. House Bill 2010."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2010. Washington. A Bill for an Act in relation to State contracts with small construction business. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "There's a fiscal note requested. Have you satisfied that, Mr. Washington?"

Washington: "No, that's why I want it held. I was indicating I wanted.."

Shea: "Alright, take the bill out of the record, please. House Bill 2026. Mr. Mann."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2026. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2026 on page 1, line 12 by deleting \$200 and inserting in lieu thereof, \$100. And on page 2, line 14 by deleting \$200 and inserting in lieu thereof, \$100."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Mann."

Mann: "Mr. Speaker...a...this is a fee bill, it reduces...a...the amendment reduces the fee from \$200 to \$100 and I move the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1."

Shea: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Sangmeister, er, Mr. Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. Would the sponsor yield?"

Mann: "Yes sir."

Schlickman: "What is the basis for the \$100?"

Mann: "I don't know."

Schlickman: "Is it an arbitrary figure?"

Mann: "It was the recommendation of the Commerce Commission after consultation with the staff of the Motor Vehicles Committee."

Schlickman: "Well I'd like to be assured that the \$100 is related to the cost of administration. Now you go from \$200 to \$100 by the amendment that suggests to me that somebody made a mistake



at the outset and I'm wondering if a...a...mistake is being compounded by the amendment."

Mann: "Do you want me to get some information for you, Gene? Take it out of the record, Mr. Speaker."

Shea: "Take the bill out of the record. On the order of House Bills' Second Reading appears House Bill 1999. We inadvertently skipped over one of the Assistant Minority Leader's bills."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1999. Walsh. A Bill for an Act in relation to the giving of notices for the requirement for filing statements of economic interest. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 1. Walsh. Amends House Bill 1999 on page 1 by deleting 30th and so forth."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 1999 makes the bill conform with various elections requirements for various units of government. In addition to that, it provides that the statement of economic interest and the campaign disclosure forms may be mailed together to candidates and that, Mr. Speaker, is about all it...it also changes...a...provision in here from "has filed" in the statement of candidacy to "will file" and that's all it does, Mr. Speaker, and I move the adoption of Amendment No. 1."

Shea: "Is there discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment No. 1. All those in favor will say aye... Those opposed, nay. In the opinion of the Chair the ayes have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. Mr. Choate. On the order of House Bills' Second Reading appears House Bill 2028."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2028. Lechowicz. A Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One ...three Committee Amendments. Amends House Bill 2028 on page 18 by adding immediately after line 13, the following, 'Second 3. This amendatory Act of 1975 shall take effect January 1, 1976.'"

Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House,



the first Committee Amendment is to change the effective date to January 1, 1976, in order to have the Clerk have ample opportunity to institute this Act and I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1."

Shea: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1.

All those in favor...is there any discussion? All those in favor say aye. Those opposed, say nay. In the opinion of the Chair, the ayes have it and the amendment is adopted."

Lechowicz: "Committee Amendment No. 2, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, is to limit the properties of four units or less and, also, that it is the principle resident of the owner. It's also a Committee Amendment. Again, what it does is limit the property to four units or less and it has to be owner-occupied and I move for its adoption."

Shea: "Is there discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment No. 2. All in favor will say aye. The ...those opposed, nay. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 3 amends House Bill 2028 on page 1 and so forth."

Lechowicz: "This is a corrective amendment and it is initiating a schedule of fees for this Act. Again, it's a Committee Amendment, I move for its adoption."

Shea: "Is there discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 3. All in favor will say aye. Those opposed, nay. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 2041."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2041. It's being held for a fiscal note."

Shea: "This...is there a fiscal note been filed, Mr. Houlihan?"

Houlihan: "Yes, I filed the fiscal note with the Clerk."

Jack O'Brien: "A Bill for an Act relating to the demolition of court houses and other buildings. Second Reading of the Bill. Three Committee Amendments. Amendment No. 1. Amends House Bill 2041 on page 1 by deleting on line 25 and inserting in lieu thereof and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Houlihan, J.M."



Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen, Amendment No. 1, Committee Amendment No. 1 is merely a technical amendment which cleans up the language indicating that there should be notification to the Department of Conservation prior to plans being adopted rather than actual demolition of a court house, and I would move for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1."

Shea: "Is there discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1. All in favor will say aye. Those opposed, will say nay. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 2. Amends House Bill 2041 on page 1, Section 1-B and so forth."

Shea: "Mr. Totten, I'm sorry, I didn't see your light flashing, did you wish to discuss the last amendment?"

Totten: "No, I wondered when it would be in order to ask what the fiscal note says."

Shea: "I will finish getting the amendments called and then we will discuss the fiscal note."

Totten: "Thank you."

Shea: "Mr. Houlihan, J.M., on the Amendment No. 2."

Houlihan: "Committee Amendment No. 2 changes...a...language in the bill. The bill had talked about the need to notify the Department when there was reconstruction or demolition or substantially altering. This might of involved notification of the Department when there was some minor changes made; we made that to structurally. There was one other addition which just changed the language, made it a little clearer in terms of the notification procedure and I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 2."

Shea: "Is there discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 2. All those in favor will say aye. Those opposed, nay. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 3. Amends House Bill 2041 on page 1, Section 1-A and so forth."

Shea: "The Assistant Minority Leader, Mr. Walsh."



Walsh: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, it's my pleasure to introduce the eighth grade graduating class of St. Germane's Grade School, accompanied by Sister Paulette, Miss Trout, and Miss Rucco. And they're on the Democratic side and they're a nice looking group and shows good sense. Please stand up."

Shea: "I've asked the unauthorized people to please leave the floor. Mr. Doorkeeper, will you make sure that the unauthorized people are off the floor. On Amendment No. 3, Mr. Houlihan, J. M."

Houlihan: "Committee Amendment No. 3 rewords the definition of county courthouse. It had been pointed out that in some instances the county had used incidental buildings while they were repairing the courthouse. And the definition might include them, we tried to clear that up and we also tried to...we've...we've added a home rule amendment on that so that it would not have effect in Chicago. We weren't directing this bill towards the county courthouse in Chicago, so I move the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 3."

Shea: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 3. Is there discussion? All in favor of the amendment will say aye. Those opposed will say nay. The amendment, in the opinion of the Chair, the nays are more than the ayes and the amendment fails."

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker..."

Shea: "Would you like me to take a vote again, Mr. Houlihan?"

Houlihan: "Yeh, could you listen once more on that?"

Shea: "Well, I would if...you know, if you would have voted instead of talking, it might have helped."

Houlihan: "I'll try to do that, let's try again."

Shea: "Alright, all in favor of the adoption of the amendment will say aye. Those opposed will say no."

Houlihan: "Oh teacher, we've got a problem."

Shea: "You have a problem. The ayes have it, the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments?"

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker, in reference to Representative Totten's question, the Department of Conservation has filed a fiscal note indicating that there would be no increased cost in their handling this bill and the procedure, as it's outlined in the bill, I've worked closely



with them and they don't feel that there would be any additional cost in their Department."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, for purposes of an announcement, seated in the gallery on the Republican side is a group of students from the Forest School and their accompanied by their teachers, Mrs. Keplitz, Mrs. Cook, Mrs. Zorbork, and Mrs. Garsia. And that's in the 24th and 30th legislative districts represented by Representatives Caldwell, Mann, Giglio, Epton, Maragos, and Collins, on the Republican side."

Shea: "On House Bill 2041 are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 2048."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2048..."

Shea: "Hold it, Mr. Clerk. The minority spokesman on Appropriations, Mr. Totten."

Totten: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. The...in reference to 2041, the sponsor indicated that there...the Department indicated there would be no additional cost for them to have hearings and conduct the hearings and so on, I just can't quite understand that, on that fiscal note."

Shea: "Might I suggest that Mr. Houlihan walk over and see you and discuss it with you."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2048. Ron Hoffman. A Bill for an Act in relation to police protection districts. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House Bill 2071. Mr. McPartlin on the floor? Take the bill out of the record. House Bill 2092."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2092. Maher. A Bill for an Act to prohibit the State and any unit of Illinois local government from imposing fines on any unit of Illinois local government. Second Reading of the bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 1. Maher. Amends House Bill 2092 by deleting lines 1, 2, and 3 and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman has offered the adoption of Amendment No....Mr. Maher."



Maher: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment No. 1 was an amendment that was asked for in Committee and I agreed to put it on. However, it does not technically correct and I would like to ask to have tabled Amendment No. 1 tabled."

Shea: "The Gentleman asks leave to table Amendment No. 1. Is there objection? Hearing none, Amendment No. 1 is tabled. Are there further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 2. Maher. Amends House Bill 2092 by deleting lines 1, 2, and 3 and inserting in lieu thereof the following and so forth."

Maher: "Amendment No. 2 adds to the bill school district and special purpose district in addition to those mentioned. I move for its adoption."

Shea: "Is there discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment No. 2. All those in favor say aye. Those opposed say nay. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Are there further amendments, Mr. Clerk? Third Reading. Could we have a little order, please? And Mr. Doorkeeper, I've asked the people twice that are not authorized to leave the chamber and now I'm going to ask you take them off the floor? House Bill 2093."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2093. Downs. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Public Aid Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook...are there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 1. Amends House Bill 2093 on page 2, line 11, by deleting 1975 and inserting in lieu thereof, 1976 for changes in costs after October 1, 1975."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Downs."

Downs: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, please pardon my laryngitis. Amendment No. 1 responds to concerns expressed in the Committee. To the best of my knowledge, it complies with the concerns in making the effective date of the proposed change in the law to start October, 1975 and the first implementation of it would



be October, 1976, based on changes in the cost standard...a... commencing October 1st, 1975, and I move for the adoption of the amendment. Thank you."

Shea: "Is there discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment No. 1. All in favor will say aye. Those opposed, nay. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? No further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill ...the Gentleman from Cook, Houlihan, J. M."

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker, I...a...I have to apologize to the minority spokesman and to the members, here. I was inaccurate in my earlier conversations with the Department, they had indicated they probably would be able to handle the...a...procedure of having the hearings and that was in their current staff because they are reorganizing all their historic sites, buildings, that whole division. In the fiscal note which was filed, which I had inadvertently not looked at it, this morning...a...they said it might cost between \$5000 and \$20,000 to have a hearing officer and record that. I would like to correct the record so that there's no error on it and I've talked to Representative Totten and we'll get him a copy of the fiscal note."

Shea: "Mr. Totten, is that agreeable with you?"

Totten: "Excellent. Thank you."

Shea: "Mr. Totten agrees, your error will be overlooked."

Houlihan: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker, your generosity is heartwarming."

Shea: "House Bill 2096."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2096. Mudd. A Bill for an Act in relation to the hotel operators' occupation tax. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2096 on page 5 line 2 and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Peoria, Mr. Mudd."

Mudd: "Mr. Chairman, members of the House, when we introduced Amendment No. 1 in Committee, it had some errors in it so we redrafted it... and...a...as Amendment No. 2, which has been filed with the Clerk, so I would ask, this time, leave to table Amendment No. 1."



Shea: "The Gentleman asks leave to table Amendment No. 1. Is there objection? Hearing none, Amendment No. 1 is tabled. Are there further amendments, Mr. Clerk?"

Jack O'Brien: "Floor Amendment No. 2. Mudd. Amends House Bill 2096 on page 1, line 12, and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Peoria, Mr Mudd."

Mudd: "Yes sir, this...a...Amendment...a...takes care of...a...the problems we had with the...a...original amendment. It clarifies the language a little better and I would ask for the adoption of Amendment No. 2."

Shea: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment No. 2. Is there discussion? All those in favor will say aye. Those opposed, nay. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendment."

Jack O'Brien: "Floor Amendment No. 3. Mudd. Amends House Bill 2096 on page 4 by inserting between lines 13 and 14, the following and so forth."

Mudd: "Mr. Chairman..."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Peoria, Mr. Mudd. Mr. Kosinski? Go ahead, Mr. Mudd."

Mudd: "This amendment...a...just...a...states...a...very briefly that the funds derived...a...from the...a...imposition of the hotel-motel tax will not be used...a...to advertise or otherwise promote new competition in the hotel business. I would ask for its adoption."

Shea: "Is there discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment No. 3. All those in favor will say aye. Those opposed, nay. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. House Bill 2104."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2104. Beaupre. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Municipal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House Bill 2105."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2105. J. Dunn. A Bill for an Act to provide



for the Decatur Metropolitan Exhibition Auditorium and Office Building Authority. Second Reading of the bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Shea: "Did you wish to table this bill, Mr. Dunn, did you say?"

Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Shea: "Third Reading. House Bill 2109."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2109..."

Shea: "Take it out of the record. House Bill 2118."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2118. Schneider. A Bill for an Act to create the Educational Manpower Retaining Act. Second Reading of the bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2118 on page 2, line 12, and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman from DuPage, the Chairman of Elementary and Secondary, Mr. Schneider."

Schneider: "Thank you, Mr. Chairman...a....Speaker. The amendment is a very routine one that was adopted in Committee. It clarifies the word 'area' so that it is not construed to mean geographic area, but means subject or academic area and I move for its adoption."

Shea: "Do you move for the adoption of the amendment? The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of the Amendment No. 1. Is there discussion? Hearing none, all those in favor will say aye. Those opposed say nay. The ayes have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further."

Shea: "Third Reading. House Bill 21...House Bill 2123."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2123. Getty. A Bill for an Act to amend the Unified Code of Corrections. Second Reading of the bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2123 on page 19, line 5, by striking the words, and so forth."

Shea: "Mr. Ryan. Mr. Ryan? The reason I didn't call House Bill 2119, Mr. Totten's Bill, is he requested it out of the record. There is a request for a fiscal note on this bill, Mr. Getty, have you filed it?"

Getty: "Yes, I have one, I haven't filed it."



Shea: "You have not, or have. Have the amendments been adopted, Mr. Clerk?"

Jack O'Brien: "No."

Shea: "Do you want to move for the adoption of the amendment?"

Getty: "Yes, I would like to move for the adoption of the amendment."

Shea: "Do you wanta...."

Getty: "It clar...it clarifies the language to provide clearly that the employees are county employees."

Shea: "Would you explain the amendment, Mr. Getty, please?"

Getty: Yes. It clarifies certain language in the bill to provide that the employees are county employees and not State employees."

Shea: "Is there further discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 2123. All those in favor say aye. Those opposed will say nay. The ayes have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further."

Shea: "Alright. Now this bill...has there been a fiscal note filed, Mr. Getty?"

Getty: "Mr. Speaker, I have a copy of the fiscal note. I don't know whether or not it was filed."

Shea: "The Clerk's office indicates that it has not been filed with them."

Getty: "I will file it in standard, then."

Shea: "Take this bill, or leave this bill on Second Reading until the minority appropriation people have a chance to view it because Mr. Kesselman would have small fits if he didn't look at it. House Bill 2140."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2140. J. D. Jones. A Bill for an Act in relation to townships' shares of State income tax receipts. Second Reading of the bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2140 on page 1, line 16, and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Sangamon, Mr. Jones, on House Bill 2140. Do you want that out of the record, Mr. Jones? Take 2140 out of the record at the sponsor's request, House Bill 214....the Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Grotberg."

Grotberg: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. I rise on a point of personal



privilege. A...I am one of the several members of this House that, yesterday, voted red on the motion to strip the enacting clause from a very controversial bill in this House. As a sophomore member of this chamber, I had never run in to the experience of that motion before, and have learned something since. But my point, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of this House, is that I have before me this morning's issue of the Bloomington Pantagraph with a very intelligent article by the Associated Press regarding the parliamentary procedure. But added on by the local press of that very distinguished journal which I have never taken to task for anything until this moment is the roll call in black and white inferring that everyone who voted red, yesterday on that bill, was in favor of marijuana and...and its use; and those that voted green were opposed. And I would take to task and want the record to show that I object to such journalism and the interpretation of a parliamentary roll call as being on the issue and I would demand an apology from the Bloomington Pantagraph and its representative in this chamber, Mr. Scott Harold, and I want equal time in their paper and I want that to be part of the record for those very great people back in my district, 98 percent of whom are opposed to liberalizing the use of pot. Thank you."

Shea: "The Gentleman from McClain, Mr. Bradley."

Bradley: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. I read the same article and I could stand to be corrected by Representative Grotberg if I'm wrong, but I think the last sentence in the article prior to the...a...a... description as to how we voted explained by Mr. Harold that, actually, a yes vote was a vote for killing the bill. And I may, if I would like to be corrected on that but I read the same article, was interested in the explanation because my vote was there along with yours, but I was satisfied with the last sentence of the description as just exactly what the meaning of the roll call did show. Now if I'm in error, I stand to be corrected."

Shea: "Might I suggest that Mr. Grotberg and Mr. Bradley get together and discuss the Pantagraph. Do you want to get in the act, Mr. Mann?"

Mann: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I just wanted to say to Representative



Grotberg...Grotberg...a...ba...a...Grotberg...a...that your right, John, but don't hold your breath waiting for that apology."

Shea: "On the order of House Bills' Second Reading appears House Bill 2141."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2141. Ebbesen. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act concerning fees and salaries. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Huff, a point of order."

Huff: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. I rise on a point of personal privilege. A...I want to speak in behalf of...a...the Rathskeller, which everyone here knows is the restaurant located underneath the Capitol. The other day, that restaurant came under the scathing of attack by one of the Senators that I won't identify at this time, but...a...he was...a...taking the...a...Rathskeller for task for putting out some liver. He said it was unetable. I just want to point out to that Senator that on that day, there was around 3000 visitors here in the Capitol and I'm sure that about half as many partook of that liver and there were no complaints. But the point I want to bring out is that there were twenty-four senior citizens in line that day who came down here with just a dollar for lunch and they bought the liver dinner and...e...they didn't have enough money, but the Rathskeller, very graciously, gave them the liver dinner and added coffee and pie and salad for a monetary amount of \$1.85. And I think that the Rathskeller should be commended. Too often, we're too quick to find fault and blame. And compassions, like mercies, very seldom strain, so I want to take this opportunity to commend the employees and the staff of the Rathskeller for their very generous and compassionate treatment of those elderlies. I want to go on record to say that they are doing a fine job. Thank you."

Shea: "Your good remarks are duly noted. On the order of House Bills' Third...er...Second Reading is House Bill 2141. The Bill has been read, are there any amendments? No amendments? Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House Bill 2142. Mr. Keller isn't on the floor. Take it out of the record. House Bill 2144."



Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2144. Calvo."

Shea: "Is Mr. Calvo on the floor? Take it out of the record. Mr. Calvo is here. He was in the Speaker's office. House Bill 2144."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2144. Calvo. A Bill for an Act in relation to the sales of residences to require certain disclosures with respect to sale of residences and to create civil liabilities for the violation thereof. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2144 on page 7 by inserting after line 1, the following."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Madison, Mr. Calvo."

Calvo: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Committee Amendment No. 1 amends House Bill 2144 to include fire protection as one of the areas of disclosure. This was an amendment requested by the staff at the time that the bill was heard in Committee. I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1."

Shea: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 2111...2144. All those in favor say aye. Those opposed say nay. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. Returning to House Bill 2123. There is a fiscal note. Have you given that to the minority, Mr. Getty?"

Getty: "Yes...yes, I did, Mr. Shea...Mr. Speaker. It was given to...a...their ..a...staff person."

Shea: "Is that agreeable with you Mr. Totten? Third Reading. House Bill 2145."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2145. Downs. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relation to State monies. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2145 in each of lines 20 and 21 and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Downs."

Downs: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, the Committee Amendment No. 1...a...gives a definition of a primary service area, which is far more logical and reactional than that contained in the original bill and I believe, also, removes or should remove, objections which have been raised by some concerned groups to the bill and I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1. Thank you."



Shea: "Is there discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1. All those in favor will say aye. Those opposed nay. The ayes have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further."

Shea: "Third Reading. House Bill 2148."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2148. Marovitz. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relation to regulation of business and vocational schools. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "The Gentleman....are there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Shea: "Third Reading. A...Mr. Marovitz, you want to hold this bill on Second?"

Marovitz: "Yes, there is an amendment. I'd like it held on Second for the purposes of an amendment."

Shea: "Take the bill out of the record. House Bill 2149."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2149. Gene Hoffman. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2149 on page 2, lines 6 and 7 and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Hoffmar."

Hoffman: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, in Committee Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 2149 deletes some language that was added by the Office of Education. We had originally asked in this bill that local school districts provided with protected revenue and expenditures for the forthcoming school year. Amendment No. 1 deletes that language from the bill and I would move the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1."

Shea: "Is there discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 2149. All in favor will say aye. Those opposed, say nay. The amendment...the ayes have it; the amendment is....Mr. Brinkmeier, did you wish to discuss this amendment?"

Brinkmeier: "Well, no. No, its okay."

Shea: "The ayes have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further."



Shea: "Third Reading. On the order of House Bills' Second Reading appears House Bill 2142. Mr. Keller, do you want to proceed with this bill?"

Keller: "Mr. Chairman, I'd like to take it out of the record because I have an amendment for it."

Shea: "Take the bill out of the record. House Bill 2150. Mr. Pierce, do you want that held? Turn Mr. Pierce on, please. Mr. Pierce?"

Pierce: "Mr. Speaker, I understand that our friends on the other side of the aisle have filed a request for a fiscal note on 2150. Is that correct? And I'm waiting for the Office of Education to produce that so we might as well take that out of the record."

Shea: "Take it out of the record. House Bill 2151. Mr. Merlo, there's been a fiscal note requested on 2151. Have you filed such yet?"

Merlo: "No I have not, Mr. Speaker. I wasn't aware of the fact, but I certainly would."

Shea: "Might I ask the minority leadership if they're going to request a fiscal note, would they be kind enough to inform the sponsor that they've asked for it. Take the bill out of the record. House Bill 2154."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2154. McCourt. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Is there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Shea: "Third Reading. House Bill 2155."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2155. McCourt. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Shea: "Third Reading. House Bill 2156."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2156. Gene Hoffman. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2156 on page 1, line 19, and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Hoffman."

Hoffman: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Committee



Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 2156 clarifies the addition of the language for the tax fire prevention and safety...in the inclusion of environmental land, energy resource, energy conservation purposes. That the tax must first be used for the life safety code work and if that, in fact, is completed up to standards, then they consider the use of it for environmental and energy conservation purposes. That's the entire amendment and...a...I would move for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1."

Shea: "Mr. Madigan. The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment No. 1. Is there discussion? All in favor of the amendment will say aye. Those opposed say nay. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 2157."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2157. Kane. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. On Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2157 on page 1, line 1, and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Sangamon, Mr. Kane."

Kane: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this is a Committee Amendment that removes Chicago from the bill since the Chicago School District already has these powers that, if the bill is passed, will extend to all school districts in the State. I move the adoption of the amendment."

Shea: "Is...Mr. Kane, have you moved...have you explained the amendment? Have you moved for the adoption of it? Is there any discussion? All those in favor of the amendment will say aye. Those opposed will say nay. Well, since nobody wants to vote on the amendment, perhaps it will fail. All those in favor will say aye. Those opposed will say nay. The ayes have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. House Bill 2160."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2160. Caldwell. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relation to vocational educational rehabilitation of disabled persons. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading."



House Bill 2161."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2161. Caldwell. A Bill for an Act creating the Department of Vocational Rehabilitation. Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments. Amendment No. 1 amends House Bill 2161..."

Shea: "Is Mr. Caldwell on the floor? Take the bill out of the record. The Gentleman from Winnebago, Mr. Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, for the purpose of an announcement, we have visiting us, today, the eighth grade class of Hershaf Elementary School with their teachers, Carol Houdas, James Phipps, and Ron Williamson, and they are represented by Representatives Beaupre, Washburn, and Ryan. They are in the back of the chamber and I'd like to see them stand and be recognized."

Shea: "House Bill 21...or the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. White, did he want something? House Bill 2165. Mr. Choate. Is Mr. Choate on the floor? There's an amendment on it, Mr. Choate. It shows on the calendar as being an amendment. Is there an amendment on it? Take it out of the record. House Bill 2167."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2167. Neff. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One...no Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 1. Neff. Amends House Bill 2167 on page 1 and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Henderson, Mr. Neff, on Amendment No. 1."

Neff: "Thank you Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen, Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 2167 was prepared at the suggestion of several members of the Motor Vehicle Laws Commission. The original bill, and I agreed with them, was too broad and the amendment now provides that this is a place for land improvement contractors, can be used only for...a...within a radius of 75 miles, as the present law stands, and only to transport machinery and equipment for soil and water conservation work in the owner's community. Therefore, I would like to move the adoption of this amendment."

Shea: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman moves for the



adoption of Amendment No. 1. All in favor will say aye. Those opposed will say nay. The ayes have it. The amendment is adopted. Is there further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further."

Shea: "Third Reading. House Bill 2168."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2168. LaFleur. A Bill for an Act to amend the State Comptroller Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2168 by deleting lines 11 through 17 on page 2."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, er, DuPage, Mr. LaFleur."

LaFleur: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, Members, this Amendment takes out a section of the bill, and it was at the recommendation of the Committee, and I move for the adoption of Amendment No. 1."

Shea: "The Gentleman...is there discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment...Committee Amendment No. 1. All those in favor will say aye. Those opposed, nay. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 2169."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2169. LaFleur. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relation to State finance. Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments. Amendment No. 1 amends House Bill 2169 in the title on page 1, line 2, and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. LaFleur."

LaFleur: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, this also was a Committee Amendment and I move for the adoption. It merely cleans up the language of the bill and takes out one obsolete section."

Shea: "Is there discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1. All those in favor say aye. Those opposed say nay. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Committee Amendment No. 2. Amends House Bill 2169 on page 2 by striking line 16 and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman on Amendment No. 2."

LaFleur: "I move for the adoption. It substitutes the word 'substantially' for the word 'largest'."



Shea: "You move for the adoption of the amendment?"

LaFleur: "Yes."

Shea: "Is there discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 2. All those in favor will say aye. Those opposed, nay. The ayes have it the amended...amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 2170."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2170. Kucharski. A Bill for an Act to amend the Weights and Measurements Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House Bill 2172. Is Mr. McGrew on the floor? Take it out of the record. House Bill 2178. Is Ms. Catania on the floor? 2178."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2178. Catania. A Bill for an Act to repeal an Act concerning the hours of employment of females in certain occupations. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 1. Hill. Amends House Bill 2178 on page 1 by deleting lines 1 through 3 and so forth."

Shea: "The Lady from Cook, Ms. Catania."

Catania: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. I believe that Representative Hill wanted to propose an amendment to this bill."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Hill."

Hill: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this amendment provides for voluntary overtime. And I'd appreciate the adoption of Amendment No. 1."

Shea: "Is there discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment No. 1. All those in favor will say aye. Those opposed will say nay. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 2180."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2180. Catania. A Bill for an Act to provide increased employment opportunities by executive agencies, State of Illinois. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."



Shea: "Third Reading. House Bill 2190."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2190. Porter. A Bill for an Act to amend the Insurance Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2190 on page 1 by deleting lines 14 through 22 and so forth."

Shea: "Mr. Porter. Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Committee Amendment No. 1 merely expands on the idea of the bill and actually becomes the bill, and it adds a provision for escrowing of insurance funds that would otherwise be payable and paying interest on them and I would move the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1."

Shea: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1. All in favor will say aye. Those opposed, nay. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Further amendments? Third Reading. Could we have a little order and would the members please be in their seats? On the order of House Bills' Second Reading appears House Bill 2192."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2192. Reed. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Municipal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House Bill 2193."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2193. Reed. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Municipal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2193 on page 2, line 12, and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Winnebago, the Assistant Minority Leader, Mr. Simms."

Simms: "A..yes, 2193, I think, Mr. Clerk, is my bill rather than Mr. Reed's. I think you are looking at the wrong bill."

Jack O'Brien: "2193 is Simms'."

Shea: "Your bill Mr. Simms...."

Simms: "I move to table Committee Amendment No. 1 as there was some technical problems with the bill, and which will be connected with Amendment No. 2. So I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment



No. 1."

Shea: "Did you read...do you want to read the title again, Mr. Clerk?"

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2193, Simms. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act codifying the powers and duties of the Department of Mental Health. Second Reading of the Bill."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Winnebago, Mr. Simms, moves to table Committee Amendment No. 1. Does he have leave? Hearing no objections, Committee Amendment No. 1 is tabled. Are there further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 2. Simms. Amends House Bill 2193 on page 2, line 12, after the word 'no' insert the word 'appropriate' and so forth."

Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, I hereby request a fiscal note on this bill and its being filed with you at this very time."

Simms: "Alright, we'll be happy to hold it for the Assistant Majority Leader. We appreciate the same notification on the minority side as you've requested for the majority."

Shea: "Do you want to take it out of the record or do you want to adopt the amendment?"

Simms: "I move for the adoption of Amendment No. 2, Mr. Speaker, which is the Committee Amendment with the technical amendments...a.. technical flaws removed."

Shea: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment No. 2. All those in favor will say aye. Those opposed will say nay. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Hold the bill on the order of Second Reading. There's been a request for a fiscal note. On the order of House Bills' Second Reading, there appears House Bill 2195."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 2195. Who's is that? Cunningham. A Bill for an Act to amend Section 113-3 of the Code of Criminal Procedure Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Fred Selcke: "None."

Shea: "Third Reading. House Bill 2196."



Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2196, Daniels. A Bill for an Act in relation to....."

Shea: "Is the gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Daniels on the floor? Take the Bill out of the record. On the order of House Bills, Second Reading appears, House Bill 2198."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2198, Schoeberlein. A Bill for an Act to amend Section II of an Act for the fixing and providing for the payment of salaries of States Attorneys and Assistants confined to their powers and duties and so forth. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 2198 on page 1 after line 31 by adding the following and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman from Kane, Mr. Schoeberlein."

Schoeberlein: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, House Bill ah... Amendment #1 to the House Bill merely strikes home rule counties from the Bill. I move the adoption of the amendment."

Shea: "Is there any discussion? The gentleman moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1. All those in favor say 'aye' and all those opposed say 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 2200."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2200, Cunningham. A Bill for an Act to amend the Fish Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. On the order of Second Reading appears House Bill 2206, Mr. Clerk. I think that was advanced to the order of Third Reading yesterday because ah... Mr. Simms withdrew his request for a fiscal note. Third Reading of that Bill. On the order of House Bills, Second Reading appears House Bill 2213. There has been a fiscal note filed with that now, Mr. Clerk?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2213, Shea."

Shea: "I believe that the amendments were adopted, ah... were they not, Mr. Clerk?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "I'm looking. Amendments #1, #2, #3 were adopted."

Shea: "The amendments have been adopted and the fiscal note has been



adopted and the fiscal note has been filed. Mr. Totten, ah... is it all right.... ah... have you got the fiscal note on 2213? Third Reading. On the order of House Bills, Second Reading appears House Bill 2231. That was held for a fiscal note. I believe that it has been filed. Is that right, Mr. Totten? Third Reading. On the order of House Bills, Second Reading appears House Bill 2246. Is Mr. Marovitz on the floor? Do you want your pharmacy Bill called, Mr. Marovitz? Take it out of the record. House Bill 2252."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2252, Farley. A Bill for an Act to amend Section I of an Act to promote general welfare to the people of the state by providing remedies for injuries suffered or death resulting from occupational disease. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "Amendment #1, Farley. Amend House Bill 2252 on page 3 by deleting lines 15 through 18 and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Farley."

Farley: "Thank you Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House. Amendment #1 is a technical amendment. It puts back language and takes out one word and substitutes a different word. It takes out the word 'except' and puts in the word 'including'. I move for the adoption of the Amendment #1."

Shea: "Is there discussion? The gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #1. All in favor will say 'aye' and those opposed 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 2253. The gentleman from Cook, Mr. ah... Mr. Totten."

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I believe that there was a request for a fiscal note on that. We don't have that one."

Shea: "Back to the gentleman from Cook, Mr. Farley."

Farley: "Yes, Mr. Speaker. The Clerk does have a fiscal note up there on this and the following Bill also."

Shea: "The Clerk indicates that there have been fiscal notes filed.

Has Mr. Kesselman got them?"

Farley: "Not this one."



Shea: "Well, why don't we come up and look at them, Mr. Kesselman? On the order of House Bills, Third Reading... or ah... Second Reading appears House Bill 2253."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2253, Farley. A Bill for an Act to amend Section I of an Act to promote the general welfare of the people of the state by providing compensation and so forth. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 2253 on page 4 by deleting lines 10 through 14 and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook on the amendment."

Farley: "I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1."

Shea: "Is there any discussion? The gentleman moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1. The gentleman from Adams, Mr. McClain."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentleman of the House. Bruce, would you mind explaining your amendment, please?"
I've got it here and I guess ah... I don't quite understand the input of it."

Farley: "Yes, instead of removing a lot of language in the Bill we decided to put the language back in and just substitute a word. If you'll notice on page 3 of the Bill ah... we have x'd out language starting with the word 'except'. What the amendment does is replace that language. We still have the word 'except' crossed out and precede that with the word 'including'. In effect, it does the same thing as the ah... xing out of the language, but ah... it just does it in a different way."

Shea: "Is there any further discussion?"

McClain: "Mr. Speaker...."

Shea: "Do you wish to speak to the Bill?"

McClain: "I'd like to ask a couple of more questions, if you don't mind?"

Shea: "Proceed."

McClain: "Bruce, the Bill amends Workmen's Compensation Act, correct?"

Farley: "That's correct."

McClain: "In your amendment you have struck from the Act ah... 'other than the Members of the General Assembly, except any official of' and in other words, what you're doing ah.. is your striking from



the Workmen's Compensation Act ah... the possibility of the Members of the General Assembly, Deputy Sheriffs, Assistant States Attorney ah... from receiving Workmen's Compensation, is that correct?"

Farley: "What we're doing is ah... we're including all elected officials and ah... other except firemen and policemen under Workmen's Compensation."

McClain: "On Amendment #1, line 6....."

Shea: "Mr. McClain, might I suggest that you and Mr. Farley get together on this? I understand why he is concerned about this so would you just discuss it with him?"

Shea: "Take it out of the record, please. 2253 out of the record. On the order of House Bills, Second Reading appears House Bill 2254. Is Mr. Getty on the floor? Take it out of the record. House Bill 2256."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2256, Leverenz. A Bill for an Act making an appropriation for the Secretary of State. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amendment #1, amend House Bill 2256 on page 1, line 10 and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Lechowicz on Amendment #1. Or do you want to ah... Mr. Leverenz do you want to move Amendment #1?"

Leverenz: "I move that we adopt Committee Amendment #1, which reduces the appropriation, yes."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook moves the adoption of Committee Amendment #1. All in favor say 'aye' and those oppose 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 2259."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2259, Mautino. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "Amendment #1, Mautino. Amend House Bill 2259 on page 2, line 22 by deleting 50% and inserting in lieu thereof 25%."

Shea: "The gentleman from Bureau, Mr. Mautino to explain Amendment #1."

Mautino: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, Amend-



ment #1 brings the statute into conformity with the existing statute concerning the percentage of increase that can be added to a bad check. The law as it exist is 25%. The Bill was written ah.... which included 50%. So we are reducing it down from the original figure to 25%. I move for its adoption."

Shea: "Is there any discussion? The gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #1. All those in favor say 'aye' and those opposed, 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 2263."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2263, Choate. A Bill for an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the State Highway Safety Program. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 2263 on page 2....."

Shea: "Do you want that out of the record, Mr. Choate? Take it out of the record. House Bill 2265. Is Mr. Ewell on the floor? I see.... Yes, I notice the difference in the hair, Mr. Yourell. Is Mr. Ewell? Take it out of the record. House Bill 2268."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2268, McLendon. An Act to amend the Workmen's Compensation Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "Amendment #1, McLendon. Amend House Bill 2268 on page 1 by deleting line 10 and inserting in lieu thereof the following and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. McLendon."

McLendon: "Yes, ah... Mr. Speaker, this is ah... minor amendment. It merely changes 'employees' to 'employers' where they have political parities. I've talked to labor about it and they have agreed to it."

Shea: "The gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #1. All those in favor say 'aye' and those opposed 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 2269."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2269, Beatty. An Act to create the Court of Claims. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee



Amendment. Amend House Bill 2269 on page 1, line 1 by inserting after 'to' the following and so forth."

Shea: "Mr. Bradley in the Chair."

Fredric B. Selcke: "Representative Bradley in the Chair."

Bradley: "Representative Beatty for Committee Amendment #1."

Beatty: "Amendment #1 merely changes the title of the commissioners that now work for the Court of Claims to the title of Associate Judge in every instance where that title appears. I move for the adoption of Amendment #1."

Bradley: "The gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #1. All in favor say 'aye' and the opposed 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and it is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 2270."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2270, Beaupre. An Act to amend the Illinois Insurance Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Bradley: "No ah.... amendments from the floor?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "Amendment #1, Beaupre. Amend House Bill 2270 on page 1 line 8 and so forth."

Bradley: "The gentleman from Kankakee, Mr. Beaupre on Amendment #1."

Beaupre: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, Amendment #1 is a technical amendment. It substitutes Section ah.... 367.1 for Section 400.1. I move the adoption of the amendment."

Bradley: "The gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 2270. All in favor say 'aye' and all opposed 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 2276."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2276, Willer."

Bradley: "Is Miss Willer here? Out of the record. House Bill 2277."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2277, White. Is she here? Not here."

Bradley: "Out of the record. House Bill 2278."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2278, Nardulli. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Police Training Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Bradley: "Are there amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House



Bill 2283."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2283, Beaupre. A Bill for an Act relating to payments or expenses necessarily incurred by student members of boards governing state colleges, universities and public community colleges. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Bradley: "Amendments from the floor?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "Amendment #1, Beaupre. Amend House Bill 2283 on page 2 by striking lines 21 through 27 and so forth."

Bradley: "The gentleman from Kankakee, Mr. Beaupre."

Beaupre: "This Bill applies to all of the state wide higher education boards as originally drafted. It did not include the word 'elected', but it indicated that all of them were appointed. Of course the University of Illinois trustees are elected state wide. Ah... the amendment merely includes ah... in the Bill the word 'elected'. I move for its adoption."

Bradley: "The gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 2283. All in favor say 'aye' and those opposed 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it. Third Reading. For what purpose does the gentleman from Cook, Mr. Madigan arise?"

Madigan: "For purposes of an announcement, Mr. Speaker."

Bradley: "Proceed."

Madigan: "Seated in the gallery on the Republican side of the aisle are a group of students from the 8th grade of the Robert Morris School in Chicago. The school is located in the 44th Ward where Representative John Merlo is the Democratic Ward Committeeman. However, the district is located in the 13th Representative District and that is represented by Representatives Randolph, White and James Houlihan. They are accompanied by their teachers, Michael Flagatutee and Mrs. Lou Rocheal in the gallery to the right."

Bradley: "On the Calendar on Second Reading appears House Bill 2286."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2286, Catania. A Bill for an Act to amend Section 5 and Section 3 of an Act relating to the issuance and usage of credit cards. Second Reading of the Bill."

Bradley: "For what purpose does the gentleman from Cook, Mr. Totten



arise?"

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I've been trying to get your attention on House Bill 2283. I believe there was a request for a fiscal note filed and I wonder whether that has been filed."

Bradley: "I've been informed by the Clerk that the motion has been recorded and filed."

Totten: "Thank you."

Bradley: "Back to ah....for what purpose does the gentleman from Cook, Mr. Madigan arise?"

Catania: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. We don't move to table Committee Amendment #1 on the floor?"

Bradley: "We should ah... we should move to table Committee Amendment #1 on the floor. The lady so moves to table Committee Amendment #1. It is now tabled. Now Committee Amendment #2."

Catania: "Committee Amendment #2, which was suggested by several Members of the Committee ah.. provides that on credit card applications the rights of people with respect to ah... sex discrimination shall be spelled out on credit card applications and I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment #2."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2287, Skinner. A Bill for an Act to amend the Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 2287 on page 1 and so forth."



Bradley: "The gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Skinner."

Skinner: "I move the adoption of the Committee Amendment."

Bradley: "The gentleman moves ah... for what purpose does the gentleman from Cook, Mr. Totten arise?"

Totten: "What does it do?"

Bradley: "Are you asking a question? Do you wish to reply, Mr. Skinner?"

Skinner: "Certainly."

Bradley: "He indicates that he will."

Skinner: "I think I have the substance of the question, Mr. Speaker.

The amendment puts into the words that the Department of Transportation understands and agrees with; the definition of an emergency rescue squad."

Bradley: "Did he answer the question for you, Mr. Totten? Back to the question. The question is on the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 2287. All in favor say 'aye' and the opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it. Further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 2290."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2290, Porter."

Bradley: "Take it out of the record. House Bill 2292."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2292, Simms. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act concerning conveyances. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 2292 on page 1 by deleting lines 14, 15 and 16 and so forth."

Bradley: "The gentleman from Winnebago, Mr. Simms."

Simms: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1, which simply states no recorder shall record any instrument which is not prepared in accordance with the state statute. I move for its adoption."

Bradley: "The gentleman moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1 to House Bill 2292. All in favor say 'aye' and those opposed say 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and it's adopted. Third Reading. House Bill 2296."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2296, Nardulli. A Bill for an Act to amend the Adult Education Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One



Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 2296 on page 1, line 2 and so forth."

Bradley: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Nardulli."

Nardulli: "I wish the Membership to adopt Committee Amendment #1."

Bradley: "The gentleman moves the adoption of Committee Amendment #1 to House Bill 2296. For what purpose does the gentleman from Cook, Mr. Schlickman arise?"

Schlickman: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I think we're deserving of an explanation of the amendment."

Bradley: "I think you're correct. Mr. Nardulli, will you respond, please to the question by Mr. Schlickman on the explanation of Committee Amendment #1?"

Nardulli: "Ah... Representative Ben Polk will explain the amendment."

Bradley: "The gentleman from Rock Island, Mr. Polk on the explanation."

Polk: "Ya, Gene. I don't have the amendment here, but the ah... the amendment states that ah... well, the Bill presently states that the scholarships can be given ah... to Spanish speaking students. The amendment now states that it can be given to ah... any person that is bilingual, not necessarily just Spanish."

Bradley: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Schlickman."

Schlickman: "I didn't understand that this was a scholarship Bill."

Bradley: "Would you care to explain, Mr. Polk?"

Polk: "Well, we have a copy of the amendment here now and ah... scholar... scholar ah... there is language in here in relation to scholarships and what we struck was the portion that says, 'does not speak English as a primary language and just introduced bilingual instead.'"

Schlickman: "Well, does the amendment provide scholarships, ah... provide for scholarships?"

Polk: "No, it just defines ah... it just changes the definition of who can eligible."

Schlickman: "And now expands the program from Spanish speaking population, but to other populations where English is not the primary language?"

Polk: "That's correct. It doesn't add or detract any of the scholar-



ships. It just simply says that bilingual ah... rather than ah... does not speak English as a primary language."

Schlickman: "Do you have any idea what the fiscal impact is going to be by extending it....."

Polk: "It will have none. We're not changing the number of scholarships, we're simply saying that a person does not necessarily have to be Spanish speaking to be eligible. A person could be Polish or Russian or Irish or Italian or German."

Bardley: "Is there further discussion? Back to the amendment ah... the gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 2296 so all in favor say 'aye' and all opposed say 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it. Further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 2313."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2313, Yourell. A Bill for an Act relating to local government distributive funds. Second Reading of the Bill: One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 2313 on page 1 by striking all of lines 5 through 23 and so forth."

Bradley: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Yourell."

Yourell: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. The real Yourell is standing up now. What this does is ah... clarify the ah.... the ah.... statute as it relates to the population of counties, municipalities, and states so that in the reflection of movement from a municipality or the annexation the ah... municipalities will not be penalized and the counties will not and the state will not. I move the adoption of Committee Amendment #1."

Bradley: "The gentleman moves the adoption of Committee Amendment #1 to House Bill 2313. All in favor say 'aye' and those opposed say 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and are there further amendments?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "No further amendments."

Bradley: "Are there amendments from the floor? Third Reading. The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Totten."

Totten: "Has there been a fiscal note filed with this Bill? Has there been a request for one?"

Bradley: "We will check. Just a second. No request has been filed."

Totten: "All right. I've been trying to get your attention ah..... before you went to Third Reading. I've just been looking at this



and our indications are that its going to cost the state about \$10,000,000 a year and I would like to verify that and request a fiscal note if I could before you put it on Third Reading."

Bradley: "Well, I'm afraid that the Chair has already moved the Bill to Third Reading."

Totten: "Well, I was trying to get your attention while it was still on Second, but you overlooked my light."

Bradley: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Yourell."

Yourell: "Yes, this Bill has been on Second Reading on the calendar since April 29th and ah... I was advised that a fiscal note was not necessary, but if the gentleman wishes to have one, I see no reason to deny him that consideration."

Bradley: "Does the gentleman persist?"

Totten: "I really think that with the possible impact there ah... we should have one to verify the costs."

Bradley: "The Chair has been recognizing the requests for fiscal notes and if the Chief Sponsor does not object ah... we'll move that Bill back to Second Reading. The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Schlickman, for what purpose do you rise?"

Schlickman: "Mr. Speaker, I rise on a point of personal privilege, I guess."

Bradley: "State your point."

Schlickman: "With respect to House Bill 2296, I asked what the amendment did with respect to scholarships. I was told that the Bill, as it was originally introduced, considered the subject of scholarships and the only affect of the amendment was to expand the scholarships from Spanish speaking to bilingual. I call to the attention of the House, that the Bill as it was originally introduced, has nothing to do with scholarships. It talks about programs ah... with respect to Spanish speaking. It's by the amendment that a different section of the School Code is amended and for the first time, through the amendment we get into a scholarship program and I respectfully suggest that based on what I think was a misrepresentation of the Bill and the amendment, that it be brought back to the order of Second Reading so that I can have



the opportunity of filing a request for a fiscal note."

Bradley: "Mr. Schlickman, would you walk over to Mr. Totten and to Mr. Nardulli's ah... chair and discuss it with them and then get back and the Chair will consider your request at that time?"

Schlickman: "Well, that's a different Bill, isn't it?"

Bradley: "Pardon?"

Schlickman: "It's a different Bill. I'm talking about...."

Bradley: "Yes, I know. You're talking about one that has already been moved to Third Reading. I thought that you were satisfied by the explanation given by the two gentlemen."

Schlickman: "I find that the explanation isn't in accord with the amendment and the Bill as they are contained in my Bill Book."

Bradley: "The Bill is on Third Reading and that is where it is going to stay and I would suggest that you talk to the two gentlemen that gave the explanation and then get back to the Chair....."

Schlickman: "Well, you mentioned Representative Totten, you don't mean him."

Bradley: "Pardon?"

Schlickman: "You mean Representative Polk?"

Bradley: "Polk, I'm sorry. I think Mr. Nardulli was the Chief Sponsor of the Bill."

Schlickman: "O'kay."

Bradley: "The gentleman from Grundy, Mr. Washburn, for what purpose do you rise, Sir?"

Washburn: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I rise for the purpose of an introduction. We are pleased to have with us this afternoon in the Speaker's Gallery, ah... the fifth grade class of Coleman School in Elgin with their teacher Marcy Dollfores and with Mr. and Mrs. Wickersham. Now they are located in the 2nd Legislative District represented by Representatives Friedland, LaFleur and Mugalian. Fifth grade students from Coleman School, would you stand, please?"

Bradley: "House Bill 2347."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2347, Pierce. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Insurance Code. Second Reading of the Bill."



Ah.... one Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 2347 on page 4, line 20 by deleting 'may' and inserting in lieu thereof 'will' and so forth."

Bradley: "The gentleman from Lake, Mr. Pierce."

Pierce: "Isn't there a request for a fiscal note on that Bill?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "Yes, there is, but we don't have it yet."

Pierce: "I don't know ah... for some reason they have requested a fiscal note and the Department of Insurance is preparing it so we better take it out of the record. I don't want to upset my friends across the aisle."

Bradley: "2348."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2348, McPartlin. He's not here."

Bradley: "Take it out of the record. 2349."

Fredric B. Selcke: "2349, White. A Bill for an Act pertaining to the disclosure of prepared frozen foods. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 2349 on page 1 by striking lines 27 through 34 and so forth."

Bradley: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. White."

White: "Mr. Speaker, there are no floor amendments."

Bradley: "The gentleman moves the adoption of Committee Amendment #1 to House Bill 2349. All in favor say 'aye' and all those opposed say 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it. Further amendments?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "No further amendments."

Bradley: "Any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. 2355."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2355, Katz. A Bill for an Act to provide consumer representation in state licensing procedures by amending certain Acts therein name. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment: Amend House Bill 2355 on page 1 by deleting lines 1 and 2 and so forth."

Bradley: "Mr. Katz."

Katz: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, Committee Amendment #1 ah.. substantially limited the original Bill so that it provided only with regard to the Nursing Home Licensing Board that Illinois will comply with a new federal law. The new federal law says that no federal money may go unless the nursing homes in



the state ah... under a Regulatory Board in which a majority of the people are members of the public rather than of the particular group and so in order to ah..... that is Amendment #1 and I would move its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "Yes, will the Speaker yield?"

Speaker Redmond: "Yes, he indicates that he will."

Ryan: "Representative Katz, you say that this only affects nursing homes?"

Katz: "Yes, ah.. in the Committee I amended out all other licensing groups ah... not voluntarily, I will add, but the Committee did not seem to ah... see fit to go along with the other groups, but we had to take care of the immediate problem of nursing homes because the State of Illinois would stand to lose ah... I think ah... something like a huge amount of federal money if we didn't comply. So it eliminates everything but nursing homes ah.. in the ah... Amendment #1."

Ryan: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further questions? The question is on the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 2355. All in favor say 'aye' and opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments."

Fredric B. Selcke: "Amendment #2, Katz. Amend House Bill 2355 as amended by deleting the title and inserting in lieu thereof the following and so forth."

Katz: "There are several Bills, Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, that ah... are going through the change ah... somewhat of the name of the Department of Registration and Education. It will henceforth be known as the Department of Consumer Affairs and Licensing, which has been determined to be a more appropriate title. Amendment #2 simply conforms this particular statute to reflect the new name which will be the Department of Consumer Affairs and Licensing. I would move the adoption of Amendment #2."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment #2 to House Bill 2355. All in favor say 'aye'. All opposed say 'no'.



The 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. Temporarily, to accommodate the needs of the Members, we will go to the order of House Bills, Third Reading on priority of call. On House Bills, Third Reading on priority of call appears House Bill 119, for which purpose the Chair recognizes Representative Porter."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 119, Porter. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections 14-7.02 and so forth of the School Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Porter."

Porter: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, ah... this Bill expires on the Sunday Calendar and I ask the Speaker if he would call it at this time ah... on Third Reading. House Bill 119 is designed to end a discrimination which exists in the present law against handicapped children who attend the public school. Presently, if a handicapped child is enrolled in a private school his tuition is reimbursed for a summer school program up to \$500.00 but if that child is attending a public school that has no summer school program, no tuition would be available for him to attend a private school if a summer program were offered. He is discriminated against simply because he attends the public school during the regular school year. So House Bill 119 has two intents. First, to end that discrimination and provide the same tuition reimbursement for a handicapped child who attends a public school during the regular school year when his school does not offer a summer program and when he would be materially benefited by it. Second, to encourage public schools to undertake summer programs for their own handicapped children. We would do this by paying the actual costs of the summer school up to \$500.00 and by providing full state reimbursement up to the \$500.00 for those actual costs of a summer school program. Presently, the first \$100.00 has to be paid by the local school district and that would be eliminated. Now the costs of this Bill are necessarily in estimate because the Bill is permissive and not mandatory. It does not require summer school programs. The experts though, estimate the additional



cost at between \$3 and \$4 million dollars or about 3% or 5% of the Special Education Budget for Fiscal 76', which is about \$97 million dollars. I would urge the Members of the House to vote 'aye' on this very good Bill that would provide equitable treatment and an opportunity for all handicapped children in this state."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pierce."

Pierce: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I sponsored the original legislation which provided for \$500.00 maximum summer tuition reimbursement for handicapped children who because of the nature of the handicap must attend a non-public school during the winter months and we provided the summer school reimbursement with the local school district paying the first \$100 and the state paying the balance for tuition or \$500.00 whichever is less to a maximum of \$400.00 so these children would not fall behind in the summer months ah... so they could keep up because learning disabled or handicapped children ah... retarded children fall back very fast in the summer, ah.. some of them do, unless they keep up with their training. Now when we sponsored that into law and it became law, it obviously created a discrimination against handicapped children who attend public school special education courses because many many public schools don't have summer school for handicapped children. So they were staying home during the summer and falling behind while the students who attended handicapped ah.... students who attended private special education facilities were eligible for summer school. Now what Mr. Porter is attempting to do in House Bill 119 is to cure that inequity and to make it fair and to make it fair for the handicapped children in public schools to be on the par with those in non-public schools and be eligible for summer school reimbursement. It's a good Bill. It removes an inequity that was unintentionally created and I ask all of my colleagues to support House Bill 119."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the General Assembly, it's with a great deal of reluctance that I rise to raise some questions about this legislation, John. Obviously, the handicapped



children and people that are afflicted with a learning disability are a priority item. We have to deal with them and we have to try and provide quality education in the best way possible. Yet, way too often with these programs and with other programs, ah... we do not budget them in with the overall formula the overall costs that we have provided for education. In line of that, I would like to ask you a couple of questions. You say it may cost upwards to \$3 to \$5 ah... maybe \$6 million dollars. Now is this within the recommendations from the School Aid Formula and the Special Education System? In other words, are we going to add this on or ah... where are we going to get this money?"

Porter: "This Bill would have ah... as I understand it, Jim, no fiscal impact to the coming fiscal year."

Houlihan: "Well, I understand that, but just to prove that we're not just talking about immediate problems. Once we get these on the record the costs begin to escalate for future generations and it is done this way ah... no impact this year, but then the year after that there is a tremendous impact."

Porter: "Well, I can't answer the question where the money is going to come from and I don't think that question has been asked in reference to a number of other Bills that require some spending in the future. I think this state simply has to decide if it's going to make a commitment to treat all handicapped children equitably and fairly and it is going to cost a little bit of money to do that. I can't answer the question directly."

Houlihan: "Well, John, see what I'm trying to get at is ah... as you know, the Governor is approving the State Board of Education's Budget ah... a request of \$136 million dollars for special education programs. This was an increase of \$30.3 million dollars over the Fiscal Year of 75'. Now that a nearly 30% increase. The budget does not include this and it does not have any provision to include this from the State Board of Education and I wonder ah... you know, where is this going to stop. We have to be responsible in what we're appropriating. You're saying we oughta do \$500.00 here and \$500.00 there and it's not in the budget and I want to know



who is going to pay for it."

Porter: "Let him cut it out of his Public Works Program, Jim."

Houlihan: "Well, John, I think ah... Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, if you don't want to discuss the Bill, John, ah... if you just want to make snappy comments back, I think we just oughta vote 'no' on this Bill. I think this is a serious matter. I'm not trying to speak against the idea. I think though that it has to be ah... approached responsibly and we have to have the money to fund it or we're just going to be holding out promise to children who won't be able to receive these funds and that's, I think, the worst kind of ah...disaster which could be put on somebody; where they think they're going to get some benefits and then the money is not there. I would have to urge a 'no' vote on this Bill."

Speaker Redmond: Representa....."

Porter: "Well, in answer to your question again. Honestly, it has no fiscal impact for the coming year and the question, I don't think, is relevant."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mann."

Mann: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, without seeming to take issue with my friend, Representative Houlihan, I would like to speak in support of this Bill. I don't think these children can wait. Simply because if we do wait, we may lose many of them who need this kind of therapeutic help. I don't know why this sum of money or this program was not included within the Governor's Budget and I don't fault him for it, but I do think that the program is of such magnitude in terms of importance that we have to pay attention to it. Now you may or may not be aware of the fact that as a scientific ability increases we are finding more and more children with learning disabilities. I'm not talking about ah... kids from any particular background, but children that do require some kind of special attention. I recall back in 1965 when I sponsored with ah...the then Representative Sapperstein and Representative Pierce ah... I think it was 1967 a mandatory program for the training and teachers of the mentally handicapped. I don't



know whether that program as yet has been fully implemented, but we've been asking handicapped children and children with learning disabilities ah... to wait for too long. I just think that this is that kind of Bill that has such a compelling aspect to it that it deserves our support and I urge a 'yes' vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Duff, do you seek recognition?"

Duff: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I would like to speak in favor of the Bill.

I can certainly understand the concern that the Representatives of the Governor might have when they are talking about spending dollars, but I would remind them that the New Illinois Constitution says, unequivocally, the State of Illinois has the primary responsibility for the education of every child to the maximum of his or her capability. If there is an area in Illinois where we fall short of our responsibility in education, it is the area that is addressed by this Bill. I don't think that there is any question that if the Governor is concerned about not providing for these children, who amongst our citizenry are the least able to help themselves, that he should reorder his priority and this Bill should be put upon his desk so that he will have to go through the hard thinking of reordering those priorities. This is the kind of a subject that Representative Bob Juckett worked his heart out for years and years and I think to some extent even effected the contribution that he made with his life to this Body. I think what Representative Porter is proposing.....is a very sound way and we should all support it."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? Representative Ewell, do you desire recognition?"

Ewell: "Yes, just a question of the Sponsor. Mr. Porter, ah.. I've been having a little trouble over here. I had a couple of Bills here that sort of increased the income tax and ah.. I wondered ah.. along with the people who are willing to spend all of the states money, if we could get a few Sponsors on this Bill and if we can get at least 20, 30 or 50 ah.. we'll try and get it introduced. I wonder if you will sort of ah... you know, come over and join us on this?"



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Satterthwaite."

Satterthwaite: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I rise to speak in favor of this Bill. I think that it is an area that has been neglected. We have been discriminatory in giving the advantage of summer school education to some handicapped children and not to others. In speaking to the point of where is the money to come from; I would like to remind this Body that it has been the policy during the last few years, for us to encourage parents to keep handicapped children within the home setting, to keep them out of state institutions in so far as possible. I think that we should use whatever means we can to encourage parents to continue in that process. We have been developing local activities and local supportive services and this is one reason that we find now that more of our handicapped children are staying in the local community and I think that is a good thing. It is only fair that we give the families the supportive services that they deserve and I think over the long run we are able to provide them with better education in that home setting than we can by institutionalizing them. So anything we can do to encourage that process should in the end mean that we have to put fewer dollars into supporting state institutions, which have done a notoriously bad job of taking care of our children in the past. I urge your support for this Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is shall House Bill..... Representative Porter to close. Pardon me."

Porter: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I just want to say that this Bill is not proposed to cost an astounding amount of money. We estimated it at \$3 to \$4 million dollars. I've sat in this Chamber for this Session and watched us spend millions and millions of dollars without these questions being raised. I am extremely surprised that the Governor would take a Bill ah... to make equitable treatment between handicapped children and make that a Bill upon which he would make a stand to save some money. I think that this is an area in which the money is extremely well spent and I would urge an 'aye' vote for this very good Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is shall House Bill 119 pass. Those

in favor vote 'aye' and those opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question there are 114 'ayes' and 7 nos' and this Bill having received the constitutional majority is hereby declared passed.

In a similar emergency posture appears House Bill ah... on Third Reading, House Bill 1173, which is a supplemental appropriation for the Department of Mental Health. We recognize....."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 1173...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mulcahey."

Fredric B. Selcke: "Wait a minute. I haven't read it yet. A Bill for an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Department of Mental Health. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mulcahey."

Mulcahey: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, House Bill 1173 is a supplemental appropriation for the Department of Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities. It is divided up into three categories. Number one, a supplemental appropriation of \$1,300,000 and number two, a transfer of \$850,000 of federal funds and number three, a transfer of \$106,100 among the divisions and institutions. This is a much need Bill and it is my understanding as we sit here at this moment ah... these agencies are operating in a deficit and I would urge a 'aye' vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is shall House Bill 1173 pass..... Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, I would just ask why we are taking this Bill now, Mr. Speaker and if ah... you insisted on going to it, why you did not ask to suspend the rule applicable to the order of call?"

Speaker Redmond: "It was represented to me that it was an emergency situation for the supplemental appropriation of the Department of Mental Health and I announced that I was going to go with the same posture as House Bill 119. I heard no objection and that is the reason that I called it."

Walsh: "Well, I don't recall you asking that, but it would have been appropriate for you to ask to suspend the rules because it takes a definite number of votes to do that. It takes 107 votes."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "As I heard the Speaker ask leave of the House and there was no objection so there is no need for a Roll Call vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea is correct. On this question ah... the question is shall House Bill 1173 pass. All in favor vote 'aye' and all opposed vote 'no'. Representative Walsh, for what purpose do you rise?"

Walsh: "Well, just to say that I submit that he is not correct and that the House ah... there should be a suspension of the rules when the order of call is changed and I would request that for the future."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Simms."

Simms: "Mr. Speaker, a question of the Sponsor. Is this his first Bill?"

Speaker Redmond: "Yes."

Simms: "O'kay."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question there are 126 'aye' and no 'nay' and 1 'present' and this Bill having received the constitutional majority is hereby declared passed. We will now return to the order of House Bills, Second Reading. I have a few announcements to make. We will intend to break for supper tonight about 6:00 and return at 7:00 and work as late as Representative Walsh will work. Come in in the morning at 9:30 and adjourn not later than 2:00. We'll come in Monday at 4:00. Tonight, if we have sufficient attendance, we'll have the order of Third Reading. For the benefit of Representative Polk, as to whether or not the Senate is considering House Bills, I have a Senate Calendar and on it appears House Bills, Third Reading and House Bills, Second Reading and House Bills, First Reading. There have been House Bills passed and sent to the Governor for signature. On the order of House Bills, Second Reading appears House Bill 2366."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2366, D'Arco. An Act to provide for the creation and management of Forest Reserve Districts. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 2366



on page 2, line 15 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative D'Arco."

D'Arco: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen, Amendment #1 amends House Bill 2366 on page 2, line 15 by striking the number '.035' and inserting in lieu thereof '.06' and on page 2, line 25 by striking the number '.015' and inserting in lieu thereof '.021'. I would ask for the adoption of the amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 2366. All in favor say 'aye' and all opposed say 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 2372."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2372, Shea, Stone. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill. Ah... One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 2372 on page 1, line 12 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea on the amendment."

Shea: "I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1. Those in favor say 'aye' and those opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 2376."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2376, McAuliffe. Not here."

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the record. House Bill 2386."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2386, Keller. An Act to amend the Illinois Highway Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 2386 on page 1, line 1 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Keller."

Keller: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, all this does is ah... it is a correcting amendment that ah... puts it in the right ah... statute where it should be. I move for the adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The gentleman has moved for the adoption..... Representative Mann."

Mann: "Mr. Speaker, I believe that there are people taking pictures in the balcony."



Speaker Redmond: "To the guests in the balcony, taking pictures is not permitted without expressed permission of the Chair and none has been given. Please discontinue. The question is on the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 2386. All in favor say 'aye' and opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Third Reading. On the order of House Bills, Second Reading appears House Bill 2313. We recognize Representative Totten."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2313, Totten. A Bill.....2313?"

Speaker Redmond: "2313 ah.... wait a minute. Representative Marovitz, what ah... ya, he withdrew the request for the fiscal note. I wanted the world to know that Representative Totten had rechanted. Third Reading. 2387."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2387. A Bill for an Act to amend the Medical Practice Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "Amendment #1, Jones, Emil. Amend House Bill 2387 on page 1, line 1 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Jones."

Jones: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, Amendment #1 to House Bill 2387 is a technical amendment to clarify the language of the Bill. Also it puts in an effective date of January 1, 1976 and I move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Redmond: "Yes, he will."

Ryan: "Representative Jones, will you explain that amendment once more, please? I didn't hear you."

Jones: "I don't have it here in front of me. Do you have it?"

Ryan: "No, I haven't."

Jones: "I said it was a technical...."

Ryan: "Does this have something to do with acupuncture?"

Jones: "Yes, it does. I don't have ah... do you have the amendment?"

Ryan: "No, I don't have the amendment."



Jones: Take it out of the record."

Fredric B. Selcke: "I'll read it. Amendment #1. Amend House Bill 2387 on page 1, line 1 by inserting immediately after '5-a' the phrase 'and 5-b' and by inserting between line 16 and 17 the following: 'Section 2. Section 5-b is added to the Medical Practice Act approved June 30, 1923 as amended' and the added Section to read as follows: 'Section 5-b. The practice of acupuncture in this state is forbidden except where it is used for therapeutic or anesthetic purposes and is performed by a person who is a physican licensed under the Medical Practice Act. Approved June 30, 1923 as amended, or is a dentist licensed under a Act to regulate the practice of dental surgery and dentistry in the State of Illinois and to repeal certain Acts therein named. Approved June 11, 1909 as amended, and by deleting line 17 and inserting in lieu thereof the following: 'Section 3. This Act takes effect January 1, 1976.'

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? Representative Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "Will the gentleman yield for one more question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates that he will."

Leinenweber: "Representative Jones, is the Bill still in the shape it is in the digest? Is that gone now?"

Jones: "No, it is not the same as it is in the digest. I don't have the amendment. Let me have the amendment because I don't have the amendment with me."

Leinwenweber: "Mr. Speaker, I think maybe it oughta be taken out of the record."

Jones: "Take it out of the record."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the record. House Bill 2399."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2399, Brummet. An Act to amend the Illinois Insurance Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "Amendment #1, Brummet. Amend House Bill 2399 on page 1 by deleting lines 1 and 2 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brummet."



Brummet: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House. All this amendment does is to include the non-profit hospital service companies as well. I move for the adoption of this amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 2399. The question is shall the amendment be adopted. Those in favor say 'aye' and those opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Third Reading. 2404."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2404. A Bill for an Act to amend the Coal Mining Act ah... Tipword. Second Reading of the Bill. Seven Committee Amendments. Committee Amendment #1. Amend House Bill 2404 on page 1 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tipword."

Tipword: "Mr. Speaker, Amendment #1 is a rather lengthy amendment to House Bill 2404, but it takes out several of the provisions that were improperly drawn and takes out several of the provisions that were not acceptable to those who operate coal mines in the State of Illinois and I would move for the adoption of Amendment #1. It is a clean-up amendment. A general clean-up amendment on the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Any questions? The gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 2404. All in favor say 'aye' and the opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further amendments?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "Committee Amendment #2. Amend House Bill 2404 on page 1, line 9 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tipword."

Tipword: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen, Amendment #2 removes the provision that had originally been in the Bill eliminating shift rotation. This is a matter that has been taken care of by contract in the coal field and so it is recommended that this be removed from the Bill. I would recommend and move for the adoption of Amendment #2."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #2 to House Bill 2404. All in favor



say 'aye' and opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted."

Fredric B. Selcke: "Committee Amendment #3. Amends House Bill 2404 on page 1, line 9 and so forth."

Tipword: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen, Amendment #3 removes a long provision from the original Bill that would have provided an additional civil remedy to injured minors other than that which was provided in Workmen's Compensation. This removes all of those additional civil remedies and makes ah... places the miners back under the Illinois Workmen's Compensation Law. I would move for the adoption of Amendment #3."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #3 to House Bill 2404. All in favor say 'aye' and all opposed say 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. Any further amendments?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "Committee Amendment #4. Amend House Bill 2404 as amended in Section 38.2 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tipword."

Tipword: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen, Amendment #4 ah... simply sets up a time or date by which the Director and the ah... not the Director but the ah... Mining Board shall adopt safety regulation which are no less stringent than the federal regulations which would apply. This gives them some leeway. They can have different regulations, but they must be at least as good as the ones that the federal labor safety standards provide. This sets up the date of January 1, 1976 for the enactment of those regulations. I move for the adoption of Amendment #4."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #4 to House Bill 2404. All in favor say 'aye' and the opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further amendments?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "Committee Amendment #5. Amend House Bill 2404 on page 5, line 23 and so forth."

Tipword: "Mr. Chairman and ladies and gentlemen, Committee Amendment #5 ah.. provides an effective date of January 1, 1977 for the date upon which ah.. those who are supervising personnel shall ah... obtain



a certificate of competency for the positions of supervision in which they operate. I would move for the adoption of Amendment #5.

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #5 to House Bill 2404. Those in favor of the adoption say 'aye' and the opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted."

Fredric B. Selcke: "Committee Amendment #6. Amend House Bill 2404 as amended by deleting Sub-Section 'c' and so forth."

Tipsword: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen, Committee Amendment #6 ah... changes the provisions in regard to inspection of mines and ah... especially the inspection of escapeways from underground mines. It had provided that on each ship in the original Bill that there should be an inspection of the escapeway. This would remove that provision and simply provide that there shall be one examination of the escapeways by the inspector each day. I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment #6."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #6 to House Bill 2404. All in favor of the adoption say 'aye' and the opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted."

Fredric B. Selcke: "Committee Amendment #7. Amend House Bill 2404 on page 3 by deleting line 8 and so forth."

Tipsword: "Committee Amendment #7 corrects a deficiency in the Bill as originally drawn in regard to ah... the provision relating to civil penalties for violation of the safety standards that are to be provided under this Act. This sets up a hearing procedure under which ah... that ah... violation can be examined into and give ah... constitutional protection to those that are so accused. I move for the adoption of Amendment #7."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment #7 to House Bill 2404. All in favor say 'aye' and all opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "Floor Amendment #8, Hart. Amend House Bill...."

Tipsword: "Mr. Speaker...."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tipsword."

Tipsword: "Now there is Amendment #8 and Amendment #9 that have been offered by Representative Hart. He and I have discussed the amendments. He had presented them to me before they were ah... given to the Clerk for ah.. printing and for placement on the desk. I would like to be able to check with Representative Hart to be sure these are the ones we have agreed to ah..... three amendments of Representative Harts, but he is off the floor. I would like to move that this Bill be held on Second Reading so that we might proceed with these amendments when Representative Hart returns. I think that there is an additional amendment that the operators ah.. are going to be able to agree to with the miners and perhaps we may be able to work this out totally."

Speaker Redmond: "On the request of the Sponsor we will hold it on the order of Second Reading, but the Chair is going to advise the Membership that hereafter ah... that if any person, any Member has an amendment to someones else's Bill and he is not here to move the adoption of that amendment, I don't think it is fair to the Member to hold his Bill up indefinitely because somebody is not on the floor. If the Sponsor requests that it be moved, I will move it. Representative Tipsword."

Tipsword: "With regard to this particular Bill, may I tell you, Mr. Speaker and all of the people who are concerned about this very important safety Bill on the floor of this House, that the representatives of the coal operators have been trying to get all of them together and meet with the representatives of the miners in the state so that we might work out a totally agreeable Bill or at least a generally agreeable Bill ah... to be presented here and so for that reason it is important that it remain on Second Reading for another day or two and I appreciate your keeping it on Second Reading, Sir."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, we will keep it on the order of Second Reading, but I just wanted to say that from here on in though, that it would seem to me that in fairness to the Sponsors of Bills, they should not be ah... have their Bill held up because a Sponsor of



an amendment is not here and if he requests that it go forward, well, it will go forward to the order of Third Reading. House Bill 2409."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2409."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the record. House Bill 2414."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2414, D'Arco. A Bill for an Act to amend Section 2 of an Act in relation to the establishment of the Medical Center in the district of the City of Chicago and so forth. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 2414 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative D'Arco. Will you hold the Bill? House Bill 2415."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2415, Fary. A Bill for an Act to protect retailers against their unfair economic ah... against unfair economic practices ah.... out of the record."

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the record. 2422."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2422. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Highway Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Fredric B. Selcke: "Amendment #1, Kempiners. Amend House Bill 2422 as follows and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Huff."

Huff: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With regards to my Bill 2422, I ah.. would like to take it out of the record at the moment."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the record."

Huff: "Thank you, very much."

Speaker Redmond: "2439."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2439....."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the record... wait a minute ah....."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2439, Jane Barnes."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the record. House Bill 2440."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 2440, Farley. A Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 2440 on page 1, line 1 and so forth."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Farley."

Farley: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House. The amendment to House Bill 2440 completely alters the Bill from its original intent. The Bill, as amended, deals with the taxation of property for school purposes. Under the current law, property of schools, including real estate on which the schools are located, shall be exempt from taxation. The property should be exempt from taxation and must be used exclusively for school purposes. It cannot be used for profit including student resident dormitories and all lands. The amendment to this Bill would allow to these excluded properties the following: Property including interest in land and other facilities located on the real estate of the school or adjacent to the school grounds. The property could be used by the academic research or professional society instituted association or organizations which would serve to advance the learning in the field of study taught by the school. I would move for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "A question to the Sponsor, please?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates that he'll yield."

Leinenweber: "Does this apply only in Cook County or is it all over?"

Farley: "Applies to Cook County."

Leinenweber: "Just Cook County?"

Farley: "Yes, that is my understanding."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Duff."

Duff: "Would ah....."

Speaker Redmond: "Are you finished, Representative Leinenweber?"

Leinenweber: "I had just one or two other questions."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Leinenweber: "Does this apply to private schools and public schools or just public schools?"

Farley: "Yes, all schools that carry a tax exemption now."

Leinenweber: "Well, isn't that what the Bill does ah... provide the tax exempt status? What does the amendment do? I thought that's what you said it did?"



Farley: "Would you repeat that question?"

Leinenweber: "I thought your amendment provided tax exempt status for all schools...a....land used soley for school purposes."

Farley: "Right. What this does is ...the key word in the amendment is 'adjacent' to school property or on school property."

Leinenweber: "Well how does it change the existing law?"

Farley: "Well, it...it makes a little broader. It makes it more inclusive. If you had a school that owned a piece of property and a facility that was used, but not owned by the..by the university or the school, if that facility was used to promote..a...learning taught by that school or institution, that would come under an exempt status."

Leinenweber: "Could you give me an example of the type of building you are talking about and the type of owner?"

Farley: "Well if the American Cancer Society had a building or owned a building that was adjacent to the University of Illinois, or the Chicago University, and did research for that University, that building would come under a tax exemption status."

Leinenweber: "Well, the Cancer Society isn't necessarily such a good example. What about...a...Remington Arms doing research on guns or something like that with a grant from Northwestern, even though they might be doing something else on the property?"

Farley: "That...that...that would be an example. Yes. They would receive a tax exemption as long as...a...that research was in conjunction with the learning...a...generated by the University and that they would not use that research to a view of profit, or for a view of profit."

Leinenweber: "Is there a public grounds swell for this bill? And if so, what parts does this amendment seek to placate?"

Farley: "I don't know of any ground swell, but the bill was introduced to clean up and clarify the statute."

Leinenweber: "The bill...the amendment's an entirely new bill, isn't that correct?"

Farley: "That is correct."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Huff. Duff."



Duff: "A...would the sponsor answer a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Duff: "Would this be broad enough to include service activities around the university, like cafeterias, bookstores, and fraternities and sororities? Would it include bookstores?"

Farley: "No. No it would not."

Duff: "Would it include cafeterias?"

Farley: "No it would not."

Duff: "Or fraternities or sororities?"

Farley: "No sir."

Duff: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Well Mr. Speaker, I rise on a point of order."

Speaker Redmond: "State your point."

Schlickman: "House Bill 2440, as it was introduced, amended paragraphs 643 in Chapter 120, the revenue article, to provide for extention of 1974 taxes in Cook County on the same basis as permitted for 1973 taxes if the lower multiplier than that of 1972 is applied by the Department of Local Government Affairs. By the amendment, everything after the enacting clause is stricken, a new section or paragraph of the revenue article is being amended and an entirely new subject is being introduced into this bill. And I respectfully suggest, Mr. Speaker, that putting aside the merits of the amendment, that we have an ungermane amendment and one that should not be considered."

Farley: "Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Farley."

Farley: "I would be willing to take this out of the record and discuss the bill or the amendment, which is the bill, with any member..."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay. Take it out of the record."

Duff: "Mr. Speaker, I raise the issue of germaness. We're going from extention of taxes to the subject of exemption of taxes. Those are two entirely different subjects. And I raise the issue of germaness and do respectfully request a ruling from the Chair."

Speaker Redmond: "You may be right and that's the reason he wants to



take it out of the record so that he has a chance, to give the chair a chance to look at the amendment and the bill."

Duff: "He indicated he wanted to talk to me and I'd rather have him talk to you."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, I'll make a ruling on it when that time comes."

Duff: "Thank you Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the record. Representative Shea."

Shea: "Well, I was off the floor, I have a bill on Second Reading, House Bill 2406, did we pass that up?"

Speaker Redmond: "Yes, we did."

Shea: "I'd like to make a statement with regards to the bill because there's been a lot of comment about it. That's the bill that deals with the Hospital Governing Commission of Cook County. I just would like to say that I met yesterday with members of the Governing Commission and Doctor Haughton, and we are working on an agreed amendment so I will hold it until such time that we've worked something out."

Speaker Redmond: "Thank you very much, Representative Shea. 2473. 2473."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 2473. A...who's is that? A...Catania. A Bill for an Act to amend the Fair Employment Practice Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments. Committee Amendment No. 1. Amend House Bill 2473 on page 2, line 8, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Catania on the amendment."

Catania: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. Committee Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 2473 provides that religious organizations and institutions may discriminate on the basis of religion. I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1."

Speaker Redmond: "The Lady has moved for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 2473. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it and the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments?"

Fred Selcke: "Committee Amendment No. 2. Amend House Bill 2473 on page 2, line 3, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Catania."



Catania: "Committee Amendment No. 2 is a technical amendment, it changes the date from 1974 to 1976. I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 2."

Speaker Redmond: "The Lady has moved the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 2 to House Bill 2473. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? Third Reading. 2478."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 2478. Daniels. A Bill for an Act...is he here? A Bill for an Act to amend Section 5 of an Act to provide for the creation, management of forest reserve districts. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Fred Selcke: "Amendment No. 1. Daniels. Amend House Bill 2478 on page 2, line 1, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the record. 2484."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 2484. Tipword. A Bill for an Act to amend the Criminal Code of 1961. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 2484 on page 3, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tipword on the amendment."

Tipword: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen, a...this amendment...this amendment was added by the Judiciary Committee. It simply would provide that any person who is authorized under this bill to be equipped with a firearm should, first, be trained in the use and schooled in the use of a firearm and all legal aspects of using deadly force while an officer of the State of Illinois. I move for the adoption of the amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 2484. All in favor of the adoption, say aye. Opposed, no, and the ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? Third Reading. 2488."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 2488. Lundy. A Bill for an Act in relation to retaliatory act...retalitative action against certain persons. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 2488 in lieu...in line 6 by deleting the word 'relative' and inserting in lieu thereof 'retaliatory' and so forth."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lundy."

Lundy: "Thank you Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this amendment simply makes some spelling and grammatical corrections in the bill."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 2488. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Third Reading. 2534."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 2534. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections 4(d) and so forth of the Personnel Code. Second Reading of the Bill. Looks like four Committee Amendments. Committee Amendment No. 1. Amend House Bill 2534 on page 4 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker and members of the House, Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 2534 makes some, two technical, corrects two technical errors and eliminates some new language that was...a... originally thought to be helpful in the first drafting, we have eliminated that on page 4 of the bill and I move the adoption of Amendment No. 1."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 2534. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted."

Fred Selcke: "Committee...a...Committee Amendment No. 2. Amend House Bill 2534 on page 5 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment No. 2 we had in the jurisdiction, had been extended to all unskilled positions and, therefore, the section is now obsolete. I move the adoption of Amendment...a... Committee Amendment No. 2 to House Bill 2534."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion to adopt Amendment No. 2 to House Bill 2534. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted."

Fred Selcke: "Committee Amendment No. 3. Amend House Bill 2534 on page 10, by deleting lines 7 through 11 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment...a...Committee Amendment No. 3...a...makes a change on page 10. It updates certain Criminal Code citations to reflect the present...a..."



standards that we now have. It also makes a change on...a...a...page 9. It simply eliminates a duplicated paragraph in the original drafting, and I move the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 3 to House Bill 2534."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "One question to the sponsor."

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he'll yield."

Leinenweber: "Would you run that once more, quickly by me, on the criminal penalties?"

Bradley: "Yes...a...we're...we're updating it...a...a...so that the this...a...Personnel Code will reflect the standards, now, that we have in the Criminal Code. A...what the general criteria for disqualification from public employment for conviction of a misdemeanor centers on those serious misdemeanors which are largely called 'Class A' under the Illinois Revised Statutes. And within this Class, those which have historically associated with...a... criminal association...a...capacity to commit felony or damage to the process of law enforcement, and so there really getting this into the same shape that it will reflect what our Criminal Code says and putting it into the Personnel Code."

Leinenweber: "Is this merely a non-substantive amendment to update existing language?"

Bradley: "Yes sir."

Leinenweber: "Okay. What was the vote out of Committee on this bill? Do you remember? Its not in my book."

Bradley: "To tell you the truth, I don't remember what the final vote was on it."

Speaker Redmond: "13 to 7."

Leinenweber: "Thank you."

Bradley: "I move, then, the question is on the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 3 to House Bill 2534."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Peters."

Peters: "Representative Bradley, if you would yield for one question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Peters: "Representative Bradley, when we're talking about dismissal



for a Class A misdemeanor, does that mean that if someone was working for the Highway Department, a...should receive a ticket that is convicted for...a...drunk driving, as example, that he could, then, be dismissed from a civil service job?"

Bradley: "If...did you say if its listed, or if he did get a Class A misdemeanor?"

Peters: "Well, I'm not sure whether drunk driving is a Class A misdemeanor or not, I'm asking that question, if someone is employed by the State Highway Department, receives a ticket and is convicted for drunk driving, is that grounds, under this amendment, for dismissal from his job?"

Bradley: "Its only Class A misdemeanors that are listed that he would be, that he could be dismissed from his job if it was a Class A misdemeanor."

Peters: "You don't know whether it is or not?"

Bradley: "A...a...drunken driving charge....no its not."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? The question is on the Gentleman's motion to adopt Amendment No. 3 to House Bill 2534. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments?"

Fred Selcke: "Committee Amendment No. 4. Amend House Bill 2534 on page 1, by deleting line 3 and inserting in lieu thereof the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Thank you Mr. Speaker and Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Amendment No. 4 inserts into the Personnel Code, a.. what we refer to as an Expert Board of Examiners...a...so that when the State is in the process of hiring personnel of technical, scientific, legal, medical skills, that a Board of his peers would be there to examine him and I move the adoption of Amendment No. 4 to House Bill 2534."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 4 to House Bill 2534. The question is on the adoption of the amendment. Those in favor say aye. Aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments?"



Fred Selcke: "Floor Amendment 5. Bradley. Amends House Bill 2534 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker, I think there are two floor amendments. I'd like to table Amendment No. 5 to...a...Floor Amendment No. 5 to House Bill 2534."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Amendment No. 5 is tabled."

Fred Selcke: "Floor Amendment No. 6. Bradley. Amend House Bill 2534 on page 3, line 3, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, what we're doing now with number...a...6...is in we're including into it and making some technical changes. We're eliminating the Auditor and including the State Comptroller. We're eliminating the O.S.P.I., putting in the State Board of Education, in the proper places throughout the Personnel Code at the request of the Office of Comptroller and at the request of the...a...the State Board of Education...a...and I move the adoption of Floor Amendment No...or Amendment No. 6 to House Bill 2534."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 6 to House Bill 2534. All in favor, vote aye...a...say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Any further amendment? No further amendments. Third Reading. 2565."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 2565. Catania. A Bill for an Act to amend the Unemployment Compensation Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any from the floor?"

Fred Selcke: "Floor Amendment No. 1. Catania. Amend House Bill 2656 on page 5, line 22, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Catania."

Catania: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, Floor Amendment No. 1, which I'm proposing to House Bill 2565, was one requested during the Committee hearing. It makes it quite clear that only one parent can claim dependency, then, if it's for one child for children in the process of getting unemployment compensation."



I move for the adoption of Amendment No. 1."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The Lady has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 2565. All in favor say aye. Aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. 2573. Representative..."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 2573. Gene Hoffman."

Speaker Redmond: "Is G. L. Hoffman here?"

Fred Selcke: "Is he? Gene Hoffman?"

Speaker Redmond: "He doesn't appear to be here. Take that out of the record. 2576."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 2576. Dave Jones. A Bill for an Act to amend Section 3 of an Act to require the payment of interests by lessors of residential property on security deposit and so forth. Second Reading of the Bill. Give me the Floor Amendment. 2576. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Fred Selcke: "Amendment No. 1. Schlickman. Amend House Bill 2576 on page 1, line 1, by deleting Section 3 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative J. D. Jones. Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Mr. Speaker, I...thank you Mr. Speaker, before offering that I would request to be advised of the Clerk as to whether or not its been distributed. I wouldn't like to proceed without its being distributed."

Speaker Redmond: "Has the amendment been distributed, Mr. Page? 2576. I've been advised it has been distributed."

Schlickman: "It has, then? Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. Members of the House, this bill extends State-wide, an Act which now is applicable to the City of Chicago and provides that on a security deposit made by lessees that the landlord will pay 4% interest per year. This amendment amends the broadening bill, by providing that the payment of interest shall not be paid monthly...annually...but rather, shall accumulate with the security deposit and then be paid to the lessee at the time that the security deposit is refunded. I'm offering this amendment



on behalf of the Illinois Realtors Association, which feels that, by this amendment, bookkeeping, on the part of the landlord, would be kept to a minimum without any loss of interest to the lessee. And it's on that basis that I do offer it."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 2576. Representative Merlo."

Merlo: "Will the sponsor yield to a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Merlo: "Gene, this applies to twenty-five units or more, is that correct?"

Schlickman: "The Act, which you were the sponsor, provides that landlords of units of twenty-five apartments or more, shall pay 4% to be increased to 5%, hopefully, by your bill this session, on security deposits made by lessees. Now the sponsor...the...the bill, as it was originally introduced, extends that Act from the City of Chicago to State-wide. The amendment simply provides that interest will continue to be paid, either at the 4 or 5 percent level, but that the interest shall not have to be paid annually by the landlord to the lessee, but rather, accumulate, as would be the case in a savings account, and then payable to the lessee at the time of the security deposit is refunded. As I say, the Illinois Realtors Association has asked that this amendment be offered so as to keep to a minimum the bookkeeping, or mechanical operation. As you and I both know, the realtors are opposed to the original Act; they're opposed to the bill, and I am hopeful that by the offering and adoption of this amendment, that we can significantly reduce their opposition and maintain the effectiveness of this law and its extension State-wide."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Merlo."

Merlo: "Mr. Speaker, I wish to speak to the amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Merlo: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, the 77th General Assembly, in its wisdom, passed a law that requires the lessor of buildings that have twenty-five units or more. Now we're not speaking of the little landlord with a two-flat or a ten-flat or an eight-flat, we're talking about the big developers, the big-time operators with



twenty-five units or more. And at that time, we passed the bill which required them to pay interest at the rate of 4 percent at the conclusion of a twelve-month period. And now, Ladies and Gentlemen, in comes the Illinois Real Estate Board with another ploy, with another toy, if you want to call it, to again impair the tenant who is paying an exorbitant rent, particularly in the high-rise area that Representative Telcser, Marovitz, and I represent, and also Representative Peters. Let me tell you what this would do. First of all, this would take away the little revenue that was returned to the tenant on an annual basis. And you and I know that today's economy, a dollar means an awful lot. For instance, to the elderly person, to the young youths, the young boys and young girls who are renting apartments. These are the people that we should be concerned about, but not the real estate dealers, not the big developers. And in addition to that, this would give them a means of providing in a lease, an optional clause which could call for a rental of a unit for two years with an additional option of an additional two years with a total four years that they will keep this money without returning any interest at all until the conclusion of the lease. Ladies and Gentlemen, I abhor the methods that are being employed by the Illinois Real Estate, and I think that this amendment, above all, should be soundly defeated and I certainly would ask your cooperation in doing so."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like to speak on behalf of the amendment.

While I was on the subcommittee that heard the testimony Representative Jones' bill, I personally happen to oppose Representative Jones' bill because I don't think that the Act, itself, is a good Act. However, it was...the evidence brought forth to the Committee hearing in quite a bit of detail disclosed the immense amount of bookkeeping in detail for tax purposes and for other purposes that the large landlords are required to perform merely to comply with this law because 4 percent return on, in many instances, which is less than a \$200 amount, which is being held. The cost of the bookkeeping, as all costs in maintaining rental



apartments, must be borne in the last analysis, by the tenant. So it was pretty grafically brought forth by the witnesses, that the cost to them in the bookkeeping, in the hiring of the extra personnel to maintain the books, to handle this type of thing, exceeded the amount of interest paid. And of course these costs are passed on, as is the interest, to the tenants in the form of higher rent. So I think the original Act, although well intended probably is not a good Act. I particularly not interested in seeing it extended downstate, but if its going to be passed and its going to be extended downstate, I think the least we can do is try to hold the cost of abiding by this Act to an absolute minimum so that these costs, so that we can protect the tenants from the higher rentals, which they're going to receive because of this bill. So I think its a good amendment to, what is probably not a very good bill, so I would urge its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schlickman, do you...."

Schlickman: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan, pardon me."

Madigan: "Will Representative Schlickman yield to a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "State your point, Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, under Rule 34, I want the Speaker to rule whether the amendment is germane as to subject matter. The subject of the bill, now I realize that the subject of the law that's being amended, one could interpret it to be germane. But the rules state it must be germane as to the subject of the bill, and the subject of the bill is the matter of deleting the Act in municipalities having less than 500,000 doll...a...population. And under that interpretation, Mr. Speaker, I believe that the amendment is not germane under Rule 34, and I would like your ruling. It's in the rules. You gotta...you gotta agree again."

Speaker Redmond: "It would appear to the Chair that the objection of Representative Matijevich is well taken. The Act, as I understand it, extends the...a...it extends the protection of the Act to the downstate communities, as I understand it. And the amendment appears to concern itself with the question of the return of a



security deposit and I don't think that that is the same thing as extending the Act to the downstate communities. So Representative Schlickman?"

Schlickman: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, my mother taught me that those who live by the sword, die by the sword. I respect your judgment on the matter and anticipate consistency in your rulings in germaneness. Thank you very much."

Speaker Redmond: "I can assure you that to the best of my ability, my rulings will be consistent. Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, I would ask you to reconsider your ruling for the reason that previous speakers have tended to interpret somewhat loosely, germaneness. Now to change a substantive bill to a bill creating a commission, clearly, is not germane. But a bill dealing with security deposits and the interest paid thereon, whether downstate or in Cook County, it seems to me, Mr. Speaker, that this amendment is indeed germane since it deals with the subject of how those security deposits are to be paid. And I respectfully submit from my experience, I have not seen a speaker who would have ruled that this amendment was not germane."

Speaker Redmond: "And they all have been wiser than I. I'm just doing the best that I can and in my judgement, the amendment is not germane to the bill. Representative LaFleur. Representative Jones? Do you desire any comment?"

Jones: "Well, I can't fly in the face of your judgment, sir, so I have to accept it, I guess."

Speaker Redmond: "Are there any further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. 1577...2577, pardon me."

Fred Seicke: "House Bill 2577. Duester. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 2577 on page 1 by deleting lines 8 through 32 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Duester."

Duester: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, House Bill 2577 provides due process for school principals. It is a downstate version of another bill that is pending. Amendment No.

1 is the bill. It is a Committee Amendment. It was reported out

15 to 1. The reason for the amendment was to conform and to make identical the provisions for the downstate school principals as they are to be applied to the Chicago principals. What the amendment does is to provide that no principal may be de-classified or demoted or reduced in rank without a little bit of due process and that includes reasonable advance notice in writing, a private hearing if the principal so requests, and a public hearing. However the school board's decision would then be final. That is Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 2577 and I move its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 2577. All in favor say aye. The opposed, no. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? Third Reading. 2580."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 2580. Duester. A Bill for an Act making appropriation to the Department of Conservation...give me the amendments...Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any from the floor?"

Fred Selcke: "Amendment No. 1. Floor Amendment. Duester. Amend House Bill 2580 on page 1 by deleting lines 5 through 7 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Duester."

Duester: "A. yes, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, amend...a...House Bill 2580 is an appropriation and I might point out that, for some strange reason, it was reported out of the Substantive Committee directly to Second Reading and I inquired of staff whether that was a mistake or not, and it is possible, I suppose, although I don't know that it might be re-referred to the Committee or it might be left here. But at any rate, Amendment No. 1 has been filed to the bill. What the bill provides is actually an earmarking or a lateral transfer of funds and it reads: 'Amendment No. 1. The sum of \$225,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated from the State Boating Act Fund to the Department of Conservation for an Illinois water patrol.' And that refers to another bill establishing in the Department an Illinois water patrol which would be active in the field of boating safety and boating education and boating law



enforcement. I would move the adoption of Amendment No. 1. It is my amendment to my bill and it does put the bill in the form that I would like it to be considered."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 2580. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Third Reading. 2582. Representative..."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz, for what purpose do you rise?"

Lechowicz: "For the same purpose, Mr. Speaker, I tried to get recognition last night after...before we adjourned. On the calendar, the following bills are listed and they are appropriation matters that were never heard in the Appropriations Committee. I'd like to move that the following bills be reassigned to the Appropriations Committee: House Bills 1616, 2439, 2580, which you just adopted an amendment to, and 2820. These bills are all appropriation matters. They were incorrectly reported out directly to the floor and should be re-referred to the Appropriations Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of the Gentleman's motion. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it and the motion is adopted. 2582. Representative Hirschfeld on the floor?"

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 2582. Hirschfeld. Not here."

Speaker Redmond: "He doesn't appear to be on the floor. Take it out of the record. 2589."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 2589. Berman. A Bill for an Act to amend Section 3 of an Act to promote the public health and comfort of persons employed by providing for one day of rest in seven. (I second that.) Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 2589 on page 1 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Berman."

Berman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Committee Amendment #1 to House Bill 2589 clarifies the language that was originally in the Bill by providing as to the 4½ h... to the 20 minute lunch hour after 4½ and 6 hour



of work, did the...a...substantially the same...a...language as the original bill, but made it in a more proper section and changed the penalties. It was adopted in Committee; I move the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 2589. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Third Reading. 2607. Take that one..."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 2607..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Huff, for what purpose do you rise?"

Huff: "Point of inquiry, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "State your point."

Huff: "You will take note that House Bill 2422 I took out of the record because they had a fiscal note on it. Is that correct?"

Speaker Redmond: "It was 2422."

Huff: "Right."

Speaker Redmond: "We were advised to hold it and not call it."

Huff: "Right. Well I did that because there is a fiscal note on it.

I just want to go on record by stating that yesterday, on the eighth, I sought to get a statement from the Department of Transportation, around four o'clock, and I was told, at that time, everybody had gone to lunch. Now the reason I'm raising this point is that its my belief that that Department has five days to answer my request. Am I correct?"

Speaker Redmond: "You are correct."

Huff: "I'd just like for the Chair to take note that I made my initial request for that information on the eighth."

Speaker Redmond: "The journal will so reflect."

Huff: "Thank you, sir."

Speaker Redmond: "2607. Take that out of the record. 2611."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 2611. Bradley. A Bill for an Act to amend... to exercise the...to amend an Act to exercise the right of eminent domain. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee, whoops, wait a minute. Apparently, Committee Amendment No. 1 was tabled in Committee. Committee Amendment No. 2. Amend House Bill 2611 by



deleting lines 9 through 32 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment No. 2, we accepted in Committee to include municipalities and counties in the...a...in the bill and I move the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 2 to House Bill 2611."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "Is..ques...question for the sponsor."

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he'll answer."

Leinenweber: "Is the description accurate in the bill book?"

Bradley: "Would you mind reading what your bill book says?"

Leinenweber: "It says quick take powers to municipalities after filing of petition and ruling in court is so requested by the defendant that proceedings are legally sufficient. And perhaps I don't understand."

Bradley: "That's...that's correct...that's on...that's on the bill, not on the amendment."

Leinenweber: "Alright, but the amendment extends this particular bill to other than municipalities. Is that right?"

Bradley: "Municipalities and counties."

Leinenweber: "Could you, very briefly, describe what the bill does?"

Bradley: "The..the bill, the way..if...if we adopt the amendment, will allow the quick take powers to be given to counties and municipalities to...a...so that there will not be a delay. And as you well know, the only thing we are doing here, is extending the quick take powers that we already have for some other organization to counties and municipalities. So that, in particular, my purpose for introducing the bill was that we are trying to build a city hall in the City of Normal and they are going to condemn some property and take it eventually, but with the cost of construction going up as rapidly as it is, we would like to have a quick take powers to the municipality."

Leinenweber: "Mr. Speaker, very briefly on the amendment, I'm no great fan of quick take and...a...if this bill should pass, you're



not only giving cities, but apparently counties, too, quick take powers. I really don't think that we ought to put this bill into that shape for Third Reading. I would...."

Bradley: "Actually, Harry and I didn't have the amendment right before me, but I think we're also including sanitary districts, but that's to get the bill in the shape I want it. If you want to talk against the bill on Third Reading, I'm sure we're going to have quite a discussion on it, but I would like to adopt the amendment to get it in the shape we need it."

Leinenweber: "Well, I would just reiterate my request that we have a no vote. I don't think the Sanitary District makes it a better bill either."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Dunn, Ralph Dunn."

Dunn: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. I...I...a...would like to ask the sponsor a question about the amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Dunn: "Could you tell me, now, Representative Bradley, who has quick take powers in the State of Illinois? Just the Department of Highways, or...."

Bradley: "Well, Mr. Dunn, in all due respect, I would like to debate that question on Third Reading and I'd be glad to answer any question on the amendment, but that has nothing to do with the amendment. That discussion should be on Third Reading. The amendment simply puts in municipalities, counties, and sanitary districts into the quick take power of eminent domain. That's all that we're doing."

Dunn: "I...I...I... thank you. I know what...what he's saying is he doesn't want to debate who, all about the bill, but I think its germane as to who has quick take powers now and who we're extending to. If everyone in the State of Illinois has quick take powers except the two or three, why then, probably, we should extend it to them, but if its only now a State right, why I think maybe we're making a difference, so I certainly don't intend to support the amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Palmer."



Palmer: "If the sponsor will yield to a question or two?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he'll yield."

Palmer: "What...a...what is the need for a sanitary district having quick take powers? I realize that a few years ago, we did give that quick take powers to Metropolitan Sanitary District to obtain easements to...a...for...a...sewage systems extending out to some of the suburban townships. This was a good thing."

Bradley: "I think you are referring to the City of Chicago. I think they have the power already with their home rule unit and they seem to think so too. We have a sanitary district, the Bloomington-Normal Sanitary District, and in order to lay pipelines or anything there's been occasions where there would be a need for quick take. And as I said earlier, in order to...a...to make its construction quicker, we ran into this same situation running a pipeline in downstate Illinois, running a pipeline from some deep wells about four miles to the City of Normal for their water and by the time we got all the property...a...the cost of construction had gone up. It was over about a three year period and it had gone up considerably and you well know we are eventually going to get it anyway."

Palmer: "Let me ask you this question, then. How long does it take the attorneys after they file the petition condemnation or complaint condemnation in Bloomington or McLean County before an order is entered? And Cook County takes a long time."

Bradley: "It does...it's not very quick in Cook...in McClean County either."

Palmer: "Well, what's your time...a...time limits on that? Six months?"

Bradley: "I really can't say...a...what it is in McLean County. It's at least that long and maybe longer."

Palmer: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Peters."

Peters: "Mr. Speaker, just a request, a roll call vote on this particular amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Griesheimer."

Griesheimer: "Mr. Speaker, will the sponsor yield for a question?"



Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Griesheimer: "Two years ago when we provided for quick take for the North Shore Sanitary District, all of the members were willing to go along to give us quick take power based upon the same needs that you have. So I'm very sympathetic with your situation to get the property necessary to get the pipelines through. But the one restriction that both the Senate and the House mandated was that there be a limited period of time the quick take would be in effect. Does your bill have that provision? In other words, is there a cut-off date for the quick take powers?"

Bradley: "No sir."

Griesheimer: "Would you be willing to put on such a cut-off?"

Bradley: "I don't see any objection to it. If you want to get an amendment drafted, I would accept it. I would like to see if we're going to get this adopted. Move it to Third Reading and I'll move it back to Second Reading for that purpose, if we could get together on what kind of a limit you'd like to have."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further questions? The question is shall Amendment No. 2 to House Bill 2611 be adopted? All in favor vote aye. All opposed vote no. Have all voted who wished? Representative Hill, do you desire recognition?"

Hill: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this amendment makes a bad bill that much worse. I don't know if you people in the House realize what this does. But it covers all of the State of Illinois. And you can feel well assured that some where along the line, you're going to get stung. I got stung with a bill like this. Thank God, I hadn't voted for it, but when they reappropriated, I ended up with Will County. And believe me, it was certainly a mess over there when the legislature allowed quick take in an area that I had in the new district. And the people screamed to high heaven over there. And it wasn't just one or two people, it was hundreds of them. And I got so much mail I didn't know what to do with it, and if you allow something like this to be placed on that bad bill then you are going to suffer for it in the long run."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Meyers."



Meyer: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. When I am practicing law, I have...a... some experience in the condemnation field. For some time I represented the Department of Transportation when I was on my sabbatical leave. Recently I've been lucky enough to represent clients who have had their property condemned. Those of you who are opposed to...you're missing the point. Quick take provides cash to the landowner to defend a suit. If the condemning authority has made the decision to take somebody's property, its an almost irrevocable course. The governmental unit is going to acquire that property. It then becomes a question of the only litigated question will be how much will this...will the property owner get for his land? Under quick take provision, it gives the property owner a cash deposit, the last offer immediately thirty days after the entry of the order. Under normal circumstances, in Cook County, it takes you a year to get a trial. And what has happened is, that the land owner is going to lose his land, but he...and he's loss use of it, he can't get a building permit, he can't do anything else with it, he can't mortgage it. The only right he has is to continue to pay taxes on it and, ultimately, he loses the land whereas with quick take, he would have his cash in hand and money to fight this law suit."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished? Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Yes, I'd just like to make that clear, I'm voting no and my explanations are these is thatcash he's talking about to fight the suit don't go to the landowner. It goes to the lawyers."

Speaker Redmond: "What's wrong with that? Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, its quite regrettable that the structure of quick take has been raised in the manner that it has because those of you who are voting no, in all probability, you're not voting against quick take, you're voting against the concept of eminent domain. The truth of the matter is what Representative Meyers stated. Once a governmental agency having been granted the power of eminent domain under the Constitution, decides that the property is to be taken by vote of



its corporate board and generally these people are elected, then you're proceeding to court. The result is inevitable, the property is going to be taken. There, under a quick take, as distinguished from the normal procedures, there are no constitutional rights lost to the property owner. They still have the right to a determination by a jury as to what the price is going to be. They don't lose anything, what you do is it expedites the flow of governmental action to bring about the completion of the public project in a more expeditious manner. I vote aye."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished? On this question 55...56 aye...58 aye, 79 no. Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I didn't close the debate and Representative Meyer's certainly explained it eloquently. What we're attempting to do and I appreciate Representative Madigan's remarks because we, as explained, we're going to make it possible to...to...for municipalities who want to do some work in their area in the city, they're going to get the land anyway, it was going to be possible to save some dollars if we could give them some help and we've taken enough time on this bill on Second Reading so now, Mr. Speaker, to clean up the calendar, I'll table House Bill 2611."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman asks leave to table House Bill 2611. Any objections? House Bill 2611 is tabled. 2620."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2620. Capparelli. A Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "No amendments from the floor? Third Reading. 2625."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2625. D. L. Houlihan. A Bill for an Act increasing the number of circuit court judges. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2625 on page 1, line 9, by deleting 5 and inserting in lieu thereof, 3, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Houlihan."



Houlihan: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. Committee Amendment No. 1 limits the applicability of this bill to Cook County and I move the adoption of the amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 2625. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes....Representative Palmer. Representative Palmer."

Palmer: "Mr. Speaker, if the sponsor would yield for a question."

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Palmer: "What does the amendment provide?"

Houlihan: "The amendment limits the applicability of the Act to Cook County solely."

Palmer: "Does it provide anything else?"

Houlihan: "No it does not."

Palmer: "Would the...a...sponsor be willing to hold it on Second for a while?"

Houlihan: "Well, I...I've held it on Second for some time. I've already talked to you about this, Romie."

Palmer: "I know, I thought somebody else was going to talk to you about it."

Houlihan: "I talked to all of them."

Palmer: "Would you bring it back to Second Reading?"

Houlihan: "I'd like to take it out of the record for the moment, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the record. Representative Totten."

Totten: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. I believe there was request for a fiscal note filed for that bill."

Speaker Redmond: "It has been filed I understand."

Totten: "It has been, then? Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Well the note has been.....2686"

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2686. Leverenz. A Bill for an Act to provide for the licensing of temporary help, referral agencies and counselors. Second Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mautino. Has the fiscal note been filed? Representative Mautino."



Mautino: "Mr. Speaker, Representative Ted Leverenz has asked me to handle this and I ask you to take it out of the record for right now."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the record. On House Bills' Second Reading appears House Bill 1880. The Chair represents Representative Manowitz....Marovitz."

Marovitz: "Mr. Speaker and members of the House, there are three Committee Amendments to House Bill 1880. And I would ask the Clerk to read the amendments."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill....House Bill 1880. A Bill for an Act in relation to consumer protection creating the Office of Consumer Advocate. Second Reading of the Bill. Three Committee Amendments. Amendment No. 1. Amends House Bill 1880 on page 18, line 18, by deleting 1 in 1974 and inserting in lieu thereof 30 in 1976."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Marovitz."

Marovitz: "I move the adoption of Amendment No. 1."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No.Representative Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "Is that the effective date of the Act? That date?"

Marovitz: "No, that is the beginning of the term."

Leinenweber: "When is the beginning of the term?"

Marovitz: "The beginning of the term for the agency is...the agency is January 1 and for the advocate it is January 30."

Leinenweber: "And they serve for two years?"

Marovitz: "Are you speaking of the advocate?"

Leinenweber: "Yes."

Marovitz: "Six years."

Leinenweber: "Okay, thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Mr. Speaker, point of order, I guess. My copy of House Bill 1880 shows that this bill has six pages, but the amendment makes reference to page 18."

Marovitz: "A...that is a typographical error. That's correct and I would ask leave that on Amendment No. 1, we just scratch out the 8. It should read Amendment No. 1. Amend House Bill 1880 on page 1



instead of on page 18. That's just a typo. It should be on page 1 instead of page 18. Page 1, line 18, not page 18, line 18.

I would ask leave that we just delete that 8 on its face."

Speaker Redmond: Representative Schlickman, I've been advised the Clerk can make the correction on the face of the amendment."

Schlickman: "I have no objection, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 1880. All in favor say aye. Representative Kane."

Kane: "A...Representative Marovitz, is 1974 a typo also? I think that's been changed by amendment. The amendment deletes 1 in 1974 and inserts in lieu of that, 30 in 1976."

Marovitz: "That's been changed by amendment. It was originally a typo, but we changed it and corrected it by Amendment No. 1."

Kane: "But there's a substantive change from 1 to 30."

Marovitz: "There's a substantive change so that the agency begins on January 1 and the advocates' term on January 30 to give the agency time to consider and appoint the advocate."

Kane: "Is thirty days long enough?"

Marovitz: "I think 30 days is a long enough period to consider appointments."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? The question is on the adoption... Representative Satterthwaite."

Satterthwaite: "May I ask the sponsor a question, please?"

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Satterthwaite: "Did I understand you to say that the advocate's office was for a term of six years?"

Marovitz: "Correct. That's in the bill."

Satterthwaite: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of...Representative Totten."

Totten: "Would the sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Totten: "Is there a companion appropriation bill with this?"

Marovitz: "I'm sorry, I didn't hear the question."

Totten: "Is there a companion appropriation bill with this?"



Marovitz: "No there's not."

Totten: "Do you have any estimate of the cost of doing this?"

Marovitz: "We...we will be filing a fiscal note on this."

Totten: "You will be filing a fiscal note? Then you're going to ask that it be held in Second Reading after you get the amendment?"

Marovitz: "We could still...we could adopt the amendment at this stage, Mr. Speaker."

Totten: "Right. And then hold it until the fiscal note is filed."

Marovitz: "I will be glad to hold the bill after the adoption of the amendment."

Totten: "Okay. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 1880. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Committee Amendment No. 2. Amends House Bill 1880 on page 4 by deleting lines 12 through 21 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Marovitz."

Marovitz: "Committee Amend...Committee Amendment No. 2 changes the composition of the Consumer Protection Agency. It provides that the three members will be: one, a gubernatorial appointee; two, an Attorney General appointee; and the third member will be the Lieutenant Governor of the State of Illinois serving ex officio. I move the adoption of Amendment No. 2. The purpose of this amendment is to make the Consumer Protection Agency and the resulting advocate as bipartisan as possible and to represent the interests of all consumers in the State of Illinois."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "One question on the amendment. Does the amendment change the terms of the appointees?"

Marovitz: "The term...the...the...a...a...the terms of the members of the Consumer Protection Agency are all four years."

Leinenweber: "That's as opposed to six years in the Act."

Marovitz: "No, the six years are the advocate. Four years for the agency members and the advocate will be six years."

Leinenweber: "Alright. The amendment reduces the term of the agency



members from six to four. Is that right?"

Marovitz: "No, no. It was always four, Harry."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? Representative Schneider."

Schneider: "Will the sponsor yield to a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Schneider: "Is this a...the I.O.E.'s bill, Representative? Is this there..."

Marovitz: "The I.O.E."

Schneider: "Yeh, Office of Education."

Marovitz: "No."

Schneider: "Oh this isn't. Alright, thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Peters."

Marovitz: "Representative Leinenweber, you are correct. The term was originally six years. It's been reduced to four. We just didn't feel that every time there's a new appointee that there should be a new consumer advocate. We want this thing to be bipartisan to represent all consumers' interests and, therefore, we have an overlapping term of six years for the advocate."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Peters."

Peters: "Representative Marovitz. If the sponsor would yield, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Peters: "Representative Marovitz, you indicated that by this amendment, the consumer advocate will be appointed for a period of six years?"

Marovitz: "That's in the bill. That's in the bill."

Peters: "Not in the amendment?"

Marovitz: "No."

Peters: "Alright, I'll ask you about that later. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? The question is on the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to House Bill 1880. Those in favor of the adoption say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted."

Jack O'Brien: "Committee Amendment No. 3. Amends House Bill 1880 on page 6, line 1 by adding after the period, the following and so forth."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Marovitz."

Marovitz: "Committee Amendment No. 3 provides that the Attorney General may initiate proposals for rules and regulations for the agency. The agency is then required to schedule a hearing on the Attorney General's proposal and must take final action within ninety days. And if the agency does not take final action within that time, the Attorney General's regulations become effective."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Would the sponsor yield?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Schlickman: "By implication, would this amendment prevent the agency from drafting its own rules and regulations?"

Marovitz: "No it would not. It would give the Attorney General input as to rules and regulations to promulgate within the agency itself."

Schlickman: "It's permissive as far as the Attorney General is concerned."

Marovitz: "Certainly."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there further discussion? The question is on the adoption of Amendment No. 3 to House Bill 1880. All in favor of the adoption say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? We're going to hold the bill on the order of Second Reading. House Bill 2625."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2625. D. L. Houlihan. A Bill for an Act increasing the number of circuit court judges. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2625 on page 1 line 9 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. This is a bill that was previously called just a few minutes ago and I have spoken with Representative Palmer about it. Committee Amendment No. 1 merely restricts the applicability of this Act of Cook County solely and I move the adoption of the Committee Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 2625. All those in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? Third Reading. On the order of House Bills' Third Reading appears



House Bill 1717...717. Representative Lundy. Representative Lundy?"

Lundy: "Yes, thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 717 is a bill that a number of members have gotten a lot of mail about. Its to create an Advisory Commission for the Department of Children and Family Services on Services to the Blind. I have met with a number of the most vocal critics of the bill and have agreed to add some amendments to it, which have been distributed to your desks to bring the bill more into line with what they want and to make it a more constructive bill and so I asked the Speaker if he would allow me to bring the bill back from Third Reading to Second Reading to put that amendment on. And I ask leave to do that now."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objections? House Bill 717 to be returned to the order of Second Reading for the purpose of an amendment."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 1. Lundy. Amends House Bill 717 on page 1, line 25..27, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lundy. Thank you Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Amendment No. 1 makes a number of changes in House Bill 717. But I think I can characterize them generally as saying that...all of the changes require that the divisions within the Department of Children and Family Services would furnish services to the blind and there are three such divisions. Would be required to be consulted by the Advisory Commission and would be, under this amendment, entitled to be present at and participate in the deliberations of the Advisory Commission before the time that recommendations are made to the director. I think that would short...short cut a lot of problems. It might enable the problem to be worked out before they have to get to the stage of becoming a subject of recommendation under the director. The amendment, as I said, was drafted in response to suggestions by critics of the bill and I think it does go a long way toward meeting many of their criticisms. I move the adoption of the Amendment No. 1."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment



No. 1 to House Bill 717. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no.
The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments?
Third Reading. Representative Leon, for what purpose do you rise?"

Leon: "I have House Bill 689 on Third Reading, I'd like it taken back to Second for the purposes of an amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objections? House Bill 689 is returned to the order of Second Reading for the purpose of an amendment. 689."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 1. Leon. Amends House Bill 689 on page 1, line 1, and line 6 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Leon."

Leon: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this amendment was tentative for the approval of the Pension Laws Commission for a cost of living increase. The Pension Laws Commission at a meeting ratified and approved this type of an increase and I held the bill in order to put that amendment on, which was agreed by committee. I would appreciate...I move for the adoption of Amendment No. 1."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 689. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Third Reading. House Bill 15 appears on House Bills' Third Reading. Representative Duester is recognized."

Duester: "Mr. Speaker, I request that House Bill 15 be taken back to the order of Second Reading for the purposes of considering one amendment. Its sort of the technical amendment. This is a boating safety bill. It changes the word 'lake' to 'navigatable waterway' and I would request leave to return it to the order of Second Reading for that purpose."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 2. Duester. Amends House Bill 15, as amended, Section 1.2 by changing 'lake' to 'navigatable waterway'."

Duester: "This is an amendment that I discussed with Representative Yourell, who is quite familiar with boating and boating safety. And the bill, itself, prohibits traveling at a speed in excess of 'Slow-No Wake' within a hundred feet of, oh...docks and rafts, and

so forth on lakes. The amendment would change that to navigatable

waterways, and I move the adoption of Amendment No. 2."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain."

McClain: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. Would the sponsor yield to a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Duester: "I'd be delighted."

McClain: "Representative Duester, in our area we have some, and especially down in Grafton, going up the Mississippi River, we have some natural bay areas, which it'd be almost impossible to be further than a hundred feet from dock areas. Now would this amendment restrict those...a...those boatings?"

Duester: "Well...a...yes, it would. I think Representative Yourell had indicated that there was a sort of a ditch or...a...a...man-made canal in which there was an awful lot of unsafe boating going on and he thought that it would be wise to extend it beyond lakes. Originally, the bill, in my thought, was designed for lakes, but I would think a general safety rule applicable to lakes could be extended to bays as well. And the answer is yes."

McClain: "Of course, I supported your measure when we were just dealing with lakes, but I...it has further impact, when you're expanding this. Is this the bill that also requires that the Department of Conservation get involved in the policing?"

Duester: "This is the bill that incorporates actually five provisions of Wisconsin law that were adopted in 1974. Actually, oh, one of them is that you can't operate, you know, in a circuitous manner around boats or swimmers and some others. This is the fourth bill in the boating safety series. I...I would recognize your concern. Actually, I was happy with lake and...a...but I indicated to Representative Yourell that in view of his problem, I would return it and accommodate the consideration of an amendment. I don't want to jeopardize my bill and I understand that..."

McClain: "May I ask this question, sir? Could I contact, and hopefully with Mrs. Kent, back in our area with the understanding that if we can work out things with Representative Yourell, you'd be willing to go back to lakes. I think you have an awful lot of impact on



those of us that live on either the Illinois River or the Mississippi River, that you don't recognize."

Duester: "I'll tell you what I might do in view of your concern, Representative McClain, I think what I might do, I'm sorry Representative Yourell doesn't seem to be here, but I wouldn't want to jeopardize the bill by broadening it and I think that I would indicate to him that over in the Senate we would take up this amendment."

McClain: "That'd be great."

Duester: "Does that make good sense? Alright, thank you. Mr. Speaker, a...a...I'm sorry to have taken the time of the House for this matter, but in view of Representative McClain's concern, I would at this time, move to table Amendment No. 2 and allow the bill to be returned to the order of Second Read...Third Reading, I'm sorry."

Speaker Redmond: "Is it Amendment No. 1 or Amendment No. 2?"

Duester: "This was Amendment No. 2, I believe, as the Clerk..."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved to table Amendment No. 2 to House Bill 15. Does he have leave? Amendment No. 2 is tabled and returns to the order of Third Reading."

Duester: "Thank you Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "On House Bills' Second Reading appears House Bill 1886. Representative Jaffe."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1886. Jaffe. A Bill for an Act to create the Horse Racing Act of 1975. Second Reading of the Bill. Four Committee Amendments. Amendment No. 1..."

Jaffe: "Mr. Speaker, Amendment No. 1 restores the Agricultural Premium Fund to the bill. It was omitted from the bill and it is a Committee Amendment and I move its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 1886. All in favor say aye. All opposed, say no. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 2. Amends House Bill 1886 on page 18 and so forth."



Jaffe: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like to move to table Amendment No. 2 because Representative Hanahan has an Amendment Nos. 4 and 5 that takes the place of this."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objections to tabling of Amendment No. 2? Leave granted, Amendment No. 2 is tabled."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 3. Amends House Bill 1886 on page 31 by deleting Section A in line and so forth."

Jaffe: "Mr. Speaker, essentially what Amendment No. 3 does is it restores the language as it was before. Without this language, there would be a new tax and it was inadvertently left out of the bill and we just put this language in and I move its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 3 to House Bill 1886. All in favor say aye. All opposed, no. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 4. Amends House Bill 1886 on page 16 by eliminating each of the percentage signs appearing in Column C of the chart appearing below line 15."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Jaffe."

Jaffe: "Mr. Speaker, this was merely a typographical error. They put a percentage sign in there when they shouldn't have been in there..."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 4 to House Bill 1886. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The amendment is adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Floor Amendment No. 5. Hanahan. Amends House Bill 1886 on page 18, line 5, by deleting and so forth."

Hanahan: "It's an agreed upon amendment that it specifically removes any...a...questioning of licensing of the employees at the race track enclosures that would have not, have in any way, a chance of being around the horses or what the Horse Racing Act pertains to. I move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 5 to House Bill 1886. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 6. Waddell. Amends House Bill 1886 on page 24, by deleting lines 15, 16, 17, and 18."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Waddell. Representative Telcser."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker, Representative Waddell had to leave, today, to make a doctor's appointment. All of you know he had a...he was ill a couple of months ago. I don't know what the amendments do and I wonder if Representative Jaffe, if the bill goes to Third, would let him take a whack at it when he comes back. Maybe next week. I don't know what the amendments do, I have no idea."

Jaffe: "Well actually, we are opposing Amendments No. 6 and 7 that Representative Waddell did introduce. We talked to him extensively on this. I would like to get the bill to Third Reading; however, and ...a...alright, let's, you know, put it off, if we can move it to Third Reading, Mr. Speaker, and if he still wants to, you know, persists in..."

Speaker Redmond: "So what are we doing, withdrawing Amendment No. 6 temporarily? Are there any other amendments sponsored by Representative Jaffe? How many amendments does Representative Waddell..."

Jaffe: "He has two. 6 and 7, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Are there any 8th, is there an Amendment No. 8?"

Jaffe: "Yes, there are three more and they're all agreed to, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay. Amendment No....we'll hold Amendment No. 6 and 7. Wait a minute, now. Amendment No. 8."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 8. Ewell. Amends House Bill 1886 on page 10, line 3 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Jaffe."

Jaffe: "This is Representative Ewell's amendment and basically, it just has a good faith affirmative action plan and it's an agreed to amendment, Mr. Speaker, and I move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment No. 8 to House Bill 1886. All in favor say aye. Opposed, a no. The amendment is adopted. Amendment No. 9."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 9. Ewell. Amends House Bill 1886 on page 10, line 8 and so forth."

Jaffe: "This is the same type of amendment, Mr. Speaker, it has an affirmative action plan and we..."



Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 9 to House Bill 1886. All in favor say aye. Opposed, no.

The ayes have it and the amendment is adopted. Amendment No. 10."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment No. 10. Ewell. Amends House Bill 1886 on page 13, by inserting following lines 15 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Jaffe."

Jaffe: "The same explanation, Mr. Speaker. It's an affirmative action plan and we appreciate..."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 10 to House Bill 1886. All in favor of the adoption vote aye... say aye. Opposed, no. The ayes have it; the amendment is adopted. Are there any further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "Has there been a fiscal note filed on this bill?"

Speaker Redmond: "There has, yes."

Ryan: "Have you got it?"

Speaker Redmond: "It's in the Clerk's office. Third Reading. On the order of Resolutions, the House...the Chair will recognize Representative Polk. Resolution 253."

Polk: "Mr. Speaker, I would request that the Clerk read the resolution please?"

Jack O'Brien: "House Resolution 253. Polk, et al. Whereas the honorable Michael F. McClain of Quincy, State Representative from the 48th District will receive his law degree from the St. Louis University Law School on Saturday, May 10, 1975; and whereas Representative McClain attended law school full time during the 1971-1972 academic year. And thereafter, from June, 1972 to May, 1975, continued to night school classes in St. Louis, Missouri, from his home in Quincy, Illinois; and whereas the dedication and perseverance of the Gentleman from Adams is witnessed by this achievement as it is a two hour and twenty-five minute drive from Quincy to St. Louis, and Michael McClain made this trip at least two nights a week and as many as four nights a week, traveling a total of 102,000 miles during the four years in which he attended law school; and whereas doing his adamous struggle like Mike McClain has had the loving support and encouragement of his beloved wife,



Kathleen, mother of their five month old son, Patrick, and of Kathleen's parents, who reside in St. Louis, and with whom he stayed while in St. Louis; and whereas Michael F. McClain succeeded to this House following the death of his father, Elmo McClain, on June 15, 1972, who would indeed be proud of his son as are we all on this great event. Therefore, be it resolved that the House of Representatives of the 79th General Assembly of the State of Illinois that we extend our heartiest congratulations to our good friend and fellow State Representative, Michael F. McClain, and to his family on the occasion of his graduation from the St. Louis University Law School, that we wish him the very best in the future, that in exchange for his continued considered council in our deliberations, we promise to recognize his new status by never again mistaking him for a page on account of his tender years; and be it further resolved that suitable copy of the Preamble and Resolution be presented to the honorable Michael F. McClain."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain, do you care to respond Declines?"

McClain: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption of the Resolution... roll call...all in favor vote aye and opposed vote no Have all voted who wished? Take the record. Will you dump the roll call? Representative Beaupre."

Beaupre: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I not only have had the pleasure of being Mike's seat mate for the beginning of this term, but...as you know, my office is next to his and I know the kind of difficulty that he's gone through and so forth in trying to travel back and forth to law school. I just wanted to make a point. I recall reading back about 1950 of a Sheriff in the State of Colorado and the story appeared in the American Bar Journal of how some Sheriff in the State of Colorado travelled some 50,000 back and forth to go to law school. I was somewhat familiar with that sort of program, myself, and subsequently exceeded that, but I want to point out that travelling 100,000 miles going back



and forth to class ah... to go to law school ah.. it really showing a great deal of merit and stick-to-it-tiveness and I think it probably falls within the Genis Book of Records for ah.... travel to matriculate and I think ah.. in all seriousness, ah... Mike has achieved a great feat and we all should congratulate him."

Speaker Redmond: "Did we adopt the Roll Call? Representative Griesheimer."

Griesheimer: "Oh, thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm speechless. I forgot what I was going to say. I ah... I just wonder whether it would be appropriate, since we are vastly broadening the powers of the Energy Resources Commission, I think they oughta investigate Mike McClain. I think he might be the cause of a lot of our problems."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Barnes. We have to take another Roll Call and the question is on the ah.... shall the resolution be adopted? All those in favor vote 'yes' and opposed vote 'no'. Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I too, would like to add my commendation of Mike and also his great wife, who is able to put up with a child and Mike and his going to school wasn't easy, but I think they are a great couple. They have a great son and commend Mike and congratulate him. It is not easy to commute. I am an ex-commuter myself, but not 200 miles. Congratulations, Mike. I think you're great."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McGrew."

McGrew: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House. I have a couple of comments concerning the resolution we are now on. The first being, as I campaigned last time, I was told that I was too young to serve and Mike was my example to say, 'Well, but there is one younger than I am.'; and that was him, but the second point I have and perhaps much more to the purpose of this resolution is, I in no way can conceive that anyone can have a law degree where they make their profession on verbiage and then end a speech sum totally by saying, thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Keller."

Keller: "Mr. Speaker, I wonder if a motion to strike the enacting clause



would be in order?"

Speaker Redmond: "I doubt it."

Keller: "Could we verify the Roll Call then?"

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question there are 170 'yes' and no 'no' and the resolution is adopted. The Chair would like to make a request to have the lawyers friends, Representative Giorgi and Representative Hanahan present the resolution to Representative McLean. Do you want to make an announcement?"

Barnes: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise for the purpose of an announcement and I hope everyone that is here will listen to this announcement. Scheduled for Appropriations II, Monday at ah... formally scheduled at 10:00 am. Monday in Room 118 was House Bill 734 and House Bill 899 and I don't know who the Sponsor's are; I hope you know them. House Bill 966, House Bill 1358, House Bill 1366, House Bill 1522, House Bill 1717, House Bill 2013, House Bill 2476, House Bill 2495, Senate Bill 292, 346, 455 and 516; that meeting will be instead of 10:00 am. that meeting will be at 12:30 pm. in the same room. 12:30 pm. Room 118, Monday. Thank you."

Madigan: "Ladies and gentlemen of the House, on a special order of business, today in Chicago the Representative Committee for the 25th Legislative District met and selected an appointee to complete the unexpired term of Representative Lemke, who was appointed to the Senate within the last 30 days. The Committee selected Mr. Edward E. Kornowicz of the 25th District. He is with us on the podium now and also with us is Judge Craven and at this time Judge Craven will administer the Oath of Office to the new State Representative, Mr. Kornowicz. Judge Craven."

Judge Craven: "It having been certified to me that you have been appointed State Representative ah... pursuant to the Constitutional provision for appointment; it's my pleasure now to administer the Oath of Office. Will you raise your right hand and repeat after me? I do solemnly swear."

Kornowicz: "I do solemnly swear."

Craven: "That I will support the Constitution of the United States."



Kornowicz: "That I will support the Constitution of the United States."

Craven: "And the Constitution of the State of Illinois."

Kornowicz: "And the Constitution of the State of Illinois."

Craven: "And that I will faithfully discharge the duties."

Kornowicz: "And that I will faithfully discharge the duties."

Craven: "Of the Office of State Representative."

Kornowicz: "Of the Office of State Representative."

Craven: "To the best of my ability."

Kornowicz: "To the best of my knowledge.... to the best of my ability."

Thank you very much. It's a very inspiring day. In fact, this morning I was down in Chicago and then approved by the Committee as the State Representative of ah.... the 25th District and I hope to be working with you fellas for the next ah.... for the continuance of this Session. Thanks a lot, fellas."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, I move that the House do now stand in recess until 7:15."

Speaker Redmond: "All in favor indicate by saying 'aye'....."

Shea: "P.M. this evening."

Speaker Redmond: "Opposed 'no'. The motion is carried and we'll stand in recess until 7:15. I may say that 7:15 instead of 7:00 is in deference to Representative Walsh."

Doorkeeper: "All those not entitled to the floor, will you please go to the gallery?"

Speaker Redmond: "For what purpose does the lady from Lake County arise?"

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, at noon today, the Oakcrest Junior High from Beach Park, Waukegan and Zion area, Illinois, from the 31st District, which I represent along with Representative John Matijevich and Ronald Griesheimer. Beach Park Consolidated School District #3 Band played in the rotunda downstairs. Sixty-nine band students; sixth, seventh, and eighth graders directed by Ron Nicholson and accompanied by parents, Mr. and Mrs. Warrick, Mr. and Mrs. Ray Richardson, Mr. and Mrs. Clatch, Mrs. Robert Doddy, and Mrs. Frank Nables. I would like to tell this Assembly, Mr. Speaker, that this young band played the Battle



Hymn of the Republic like it has never been played ah.. more beautifully before in the rotunda. I would like to make this commendation of this band for the record. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "As I remember, that was the favorite song of Senator Robert Kennedy."

Geo-Karis: "Well, it happens to be my favorite song too, Mr. Speaker, and I don't hold it against any Democrat who likes it."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner. Representative Deuster. Representative Walsh. Representative Totten. Representative Ryan. Representative Schlickman. Representative Katz."

Shea: "Are we ready to proceed, Mr. Walsh? Is Representative Steele on the floor? Representative Grotberg. Representative Ralph Dunn. Miss Catania. Mr. Simms. Call House Bill 2728."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2728, Katz. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act to conform statutory references. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House Bill 2729."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2729, Katz. A Bill for an Act to amend various Acts to conform to the Constitution of 1970. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Shea: "Third Reading. House Bill 2730."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2730, Katz. A Bill for an Act to amend certain Acts and make changes to the ah.... to conform to the Constitution. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? House Bill 2731. Third Reading on that ah.... Third Reading on House Bill 2730. House Bill 2731."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2731. A Bill for an Act to amend Acts to conform to the Constitution. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."



Shea: "Third Reading. House Bill 2732."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2732. A Bill for an Act to amend various Acts. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Shea: "Third Reading. House Bill 2733."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2733. A Bill for an Act to amend certain Acts to conform to the Constitution. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. House Bill 2734."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2734. A Bill..... House Bill 2734. A Bill for an Act to amend various Acts to conform to the statutory provisions. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Shea: "Third Reading. The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Telcser."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker, I don't know just what your intention is. If it's to stay on Second Reading without amendments, fine; but if you're going to go to Third before there is a quorum, I just want you to know that I am going to ask for a quorum call."

Shea: "Well, Mr. Telcser, any time that you think that there is not a quorum of Members on the floor ah... you can call a quorum if you want it."

Telcser: "Well, I say ah... I only want to call a quorum if we go to Third Reading. If you want to call it now then I call a quorum now."

Shea: "You want to call a quorum?"

Telcser: "I hadn't intended to, but you so much as asked me to so ah... I will call a quorum."

Shea: "Well, you know and I know how many people are here. I'm taking Second Reading Bills...."

Telcser: "Without amendments, right?"

Shea: "Without amendments."

Telcser: "All right, o'kay."

Shea: "Do you withdraw your ah...."



Telcser: "Ya, but if you go to Third Reading, I'm going to call for a quorum."

Shea: "I wouldn't go to Third. House Bill 2735."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2735. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act provided to the law in regard to ah.... estrays and other lost property. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Shea: "Third Reading. House Bill 2736."

Jack O'Brien: "There is an amendment on this."

Shea: "House Bill 2737."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2737. A Bill for an Act to amend the Probate Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Shea: "Third Reading. House Bill 2738."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2738. A Bill for an Act to repeal parts of Acts to conform to statutory references. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Shea: "Third Reading. The Assistant Minority Leader, Mr. Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, it's my pleasure to introduce a class from Morton East High School in Cicero, Illinois in the West Balcony. They're very capably represented by Representatives Sevcik, Klosak and ah... gee, I can't seem to make out the other ah...."

Shea: "How many Bills do you have left on the Calendar, Mr. Walsh?"

Walsh: "Shea, Shea."

Shea: "I want you to know that they are all registered too, Mr. Walsh. House Bill 2738. House Bill 27 ah..... House Bill 2736. Mr. Telcser, you don't mind if we call Bills with Committee Amendments, do you?"

Telcser: "As long as the Minority spokesmen are present, I guess it's all right, but if they're controversial, Mr. Speaker, I think we are going to deny a lot of Members to participate in the important



ah..... are not going to be able to participate in an important part of the legislative process."

Shea: "2736."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2736. A Bill for an Act to amend the Election Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amendment #1, amends House Bill 2736 by deleting all of Section II."

Katz: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, there is nothing controversial with regard to 2736 or this amendment. This was a Committee Amendment offered by the Committee. These are series of revisory Bills and ah... there had been one change intervening in the law since the time they were drafted and the Committee simply took account of the change and made the technical change to conform to the present state of law. I would move for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1."

Shea: "Is there any discussion? The gentleman moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1. All those in favor say 'aye' and those opposed say 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 2738."

Jack O'Brien: "We've moved that already."

Shea: "House Bill 2741."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2741. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act to provide for licensing and regulating detective agencies. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amendment #1, amends House Bill 2741 on page 2, line 10 and so forth."

Katz: "House Bill 2740, the preceding Bill, is already on Third Reading. It increases the penalties for illegal wire tapping. I think all of us are aware of events in recent months in which this was said that their existiveness in the capitol complex and elsewhere. 2741 simply provides that in the event an individual is ah... accused and convicted of violating the eavesdropping law of Illinois by illegal eavesdropping, that if that person is a licensed detective, that he would automatically lose his license as a detective. The Committee Amendment does that and I would



move the adoption of Committee Amendment #1 to House Bill 2741."

Shea: "Is there any discussion? The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Peters. The gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Daniels."

Daniels: "Harold, the amendment, you said ah.... makes the violation an automatic loss of license? Is that what you said?"

Katz: "Well, what I ah.... what occurred was in the original language of the Bill, we said that the detectives automatically and permanently lost his license. There was some objection in the Committee to the use of 'and permanently' because they said nothing is permanent and so we're deleting the language 'and permanently' and so it leaves the situation that the detective simply automatically, if he is convicted, would lose his license, but it deletes 'and permanency'. It's just an automatic loss of license. After that it would be up to the licensing board as to whether or not at any future time they would reissue the license."

Daniels: "O'kay."

Shea: "Is there any further discussion? The gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #1. All those in favor say 'aye' and all of those opposed say 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. Mr. Calvo on the floor? Is Mr. Skinner on the floor? Mr. Roscoe Cunningham? Miss Younge. Mr. Fennessey? Miss Younge? Mr. Huff? Mr. Brinkmeier? House Bill 2786. 2826, I'm sorry."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2826, Brinkmeier. A Bill for an Act to amend an Election Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2826 by inserting immediately after the '.' in the following places and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman from Stephenson, Mr. Brinkmeier."

Brinkmeier: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this is a Committee Amendment and what it does ah... it states simply that the nominating petition shall be ah... the conduction of them shall be by the County Clerk and the Board of Elections Commission. It is a Committee Amendment and I would urge its adoption."

Shea: "Is there any discussion? The gentleman moves for the.... the gentleman from Will, Mr. Kempiners."



Kempiners: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Representative Brinkmeier, was this the Bill on the consolidation of elections?"

Brinkmeier: "Yes, permissive consolidation."

Kempiners: "To make it permissive?"

Brinkmeier: "Yes, that's right."

Kempiners: "O'kay, that's a good amendment. I second your call for adoption."

Brinkmeier: "Thank you."

Shea: "Is there any further discussion? The gentleman moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1. All those in favor will say 'aye' and those opposed 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 2830."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2830, Satterthwaite. A Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Shea: "Third Reading. Mr. Berman. Mr. Fary. Mr. Marovitz. Mr. Skinner again. Well, well, I'm happy that you're back, Mr. Skinner. House Bill 2872 is where we're at, Mr. Skinner."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2872. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Shea: "Third Reading. House Bill..... is Mr. Pierce on the floor? Mr. Berman? Mr. Downs? House Bill 2908."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2908. A Bill for an Act in relation to appearance of Housing Code Violations. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend House Bill 2908 on page 1 and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Downs."

Downs: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, this is a unanimously adopted Committee Amendment, which changes the original penalty called for in the Bill for failure to appear to



a petty offense only and ah... provides for due process in the service of notice and summons upon such persons and also it provides for a permissive standing in Housing Code cases under certain conditions, which the court first determines that a responsible organization or individual may present evidence that might not otherwise be brought before the court which is relevant. I move the adoption of Committee Amendment #1."

Shea: "The gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #1. Is there any discussion? All those in favor say 'aye' and all those opposed say 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 2907."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2907. A Bill for an Act to authorize imposition of Municipal Use Tax and County Use Tax. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments?"

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Shea: "Third Reading. House Bill 2916."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2916, Catania. A Bill for an Act regulating the hiring of persons by state agencies. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2916 on page 1, line 1 by deleting 'hiring' and inserting in lieu thereof 'housing'."

Shea: "The lady from Cook, Ms. Catania on Amendment #1."

Catania: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. Committee Amendment #1 is precisely what the Clerk just read. It corrects a technical error. It said 'hiring' instead of 'housing'. I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1."

Shea: "The lady moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1. Is there any discussion? All those in favor say 'aye' and those opposed 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further."

Shea: "Is the lady from Cook, Ms. Chapman on the floor? Third Reading on that last Bill. House Bill 2941, Mr. Giorgi."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2941, Giorgi. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act to establish a Joint Legislative Rule. Second Reading of

the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2941 on page 1, line 16 by deleting 'statutory' and inserting in lieu thereof 'statutory' and so forth."

Shea: "Is Mr. Tipsword handling your legislation now? Your lawyer. The gentleman from Christian, Mr. Tipsword for Giorgi."

Tipsword: "Mr. Speaker, this amendment is an amendment that was added to this proposed Bill that comes from the Legislative Reference Board, which gives authority to the new proposed divisions of the Legislative Reference Bureau to cooperate with law schools ah... bar associations, commissions, all agencies of government in the course of obtaining their information and ah... drafting Bills. I move for the adoption of the amendments."

Shea: "Is there any discussion? The gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #1. All those in favor say 'aye' and those opposed 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Third Reading. Is Mr. Flinn on the floor? Is Mr. Berman back? House Bill 2962."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2962. A Bill for an Act to amend the Code Criminal Procedure. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Shea: "House Bill 2961. Third Reading on 2962."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2961. A Bill for an Act concerning children born out of wedlock. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Shea: "Third Reading. House Bill 2892. Mr. Walsh. Would you turn on Mr. Walsh, please?"

Walsh: "Ya, ah.. thank you very much. Mr. Speaker, I object to going back to pick up this Bill, 2892. We're on 2982, I believe and I would insist that ah....."

Shea: "Well, I'm going through the Calendar one time and then going back where I started from after dinner."

Walsh: "No, no, no, no. The rule does not provide for that, Mr. Speaker. You go through the ah... no, you go through the Calendar and then if you want to stay on that order of business you run through to the finish and then start with the first Bill on the Calendar."

Shea: "Well, Mr. Walsh, I'm going back where I started because some Members were not all here."

Walsh: "Well, ah....."

Shea: "Call House Bill 2964 now. 2964."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2964. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act concerning land titles. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2964 on page 9 by inserting immediately after line 13 the following: 'This amendatory Act of 1975 is a limit of any county which has a home rule unit.'"

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Yourell."

Yourell: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. Committee Amendment #1 was explained by the Clerk. It is not a limit on any county which is a home rule unit and the reason for the amendment is that the recorders offered today is presently involved in litigation, which would determine that ah..... the recorders office is not a home rule unit and I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1."

Shea: "The gentleman moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1. Is there discussion? All in favor say 'aye' and those opposed say 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 2974."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2974. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Shea: "On 2974... on Amendment #1. Is there no amendments? Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Shea: "Third Reading. House Bill 2975."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2975, Catania. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Income Tax Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."



Shea: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Shea: "Third Reading. House Bill 2975 ah... we just called that? It's on Third Reading? House Bill 2982, Mr. Totten."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2982. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Public Aid Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2982 on page 1 by deleting line 9 and 10 and inserting in lieu thereof the following and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Totten."

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Amendment #1 permits the ah... Illinois Department of Public Aid the option of establishing a recoupment plan and it gives them the flexibility to modify it according to federal regulations. It was suggested by the department and I move its adoption."

Shea: "The gentleman from Winnebago ah.... you've explained the amendment, Mr. Totten? The gentleman from Winnebago, Mr. Giorgi, have a question?"

Giorgi: "Yes, Sir, of Mr. Totten. Ah... which hardship ah... situations are being removed with your amendment, Mr. Totten?"

Totten: "Ah... Mr. Giorgi, the amendment doesn't remove any. It ah... puts language into the Bill that the department requested to allow it to be more permissive and to allow it to be more flexible with the federal regulations."

Giorgi: "Ya, but what do you do with the hardship ah..... because you know, these are the people that are being forgotten in these public aid ah... F.E.C. recipients. It's the hardships and conditions."

Totten: "It does nothing to that. The amendment does nothing to that."

Giorgi: "You don't improve on it either, right?"

Totten: "Pardon?"

Giorgi: "You don't improve on the hardship conditions either, do you?"

Totten: "No, it doesn't change that at all."

Shea: "Is there any further discussion? The gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 2982. All those in favor will say 'aye' and those opposed 'nay'..... the gentleman from Cook, Mr. Mann. Did you have a question? I'm sorry, I didn't see your



light flashing."

Mann: "Yes, Sir, I did. I was trying to get your attention. I wonder if the gentleman ah... I didn't quite understand the gentleman's explanation. Would it press him to tell me again what the amendment does?"

Totten: "Sure, I'd be glad to. The amendment permits the Department of Public Aid the option of establishing a recoupment plan where it is economically feasible. It also allows the department the alternative to enter into or out of a recoupment plan. It also gives the department the flexibility to modify the plan as federal regulations permit because their being changed was suggested by the department ah... that we put that language into the Bill."

Mann: "So in other words, you are making it permissive."

Totten: "Right."

Mann: "Thank you."

Shea: "Is there any further discussion? All those in favor of the gentleman's amendment will say 'aye' and those opposed will say 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further questions? Further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 3000."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 3000. ..."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Randolph on a question."

Randolph: "Mr. Speaker, House Bill 3000 is not printed and the Bill position."

Shea: "They told me that it was printed, Mr. Randolph. I'll find out and ah... we'll take it out of the record. With leave of the House I will return to where we started after the dinner break. House Bill 2967. Is Mr. Groberg on the floor? House Bill 2711, Mr. Simms."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2711. A Bill for an Act to amend the Election Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2711 by deleting line 34 on page 1 and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman from Winnebago, Mr. Simms."

Simms: "Mr. Speaker, Committee Amendment #1 ah.. strikes the line"



which allows an individual to file a nominating petition with their earned academic degrees. I move for its adoption."

Shea: "Is there any question? The gentleman from Will, Mr. Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "The way the Bill ah... a question for the Sponsor. The way the Bill is in the book ah... the only exception to the use of the title is an earned academic degree. That is no longer in the Bill so no ah....."

Simms: "That is being removed from the Bill, correct."

Leinenweber: "That is the amendment."

Simms: "That is the amendment."

Leinenweber: "Thank you."

Shea: "Is there any further discussion? The gentleman from Macon, Mr. Borchers."

Borchers: "Mr. Simms, could I use my B.S. on that Bill?"

Simms: "Well, I think probably your B.S. degree is probably well known, Representative Borchers, but ah... it would be prohibited, correct."

Borchers: "Good answer. Thank you."

Shea: "Is there any further discussion? The gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 2711. All in favor say 'aye' and those opposed say 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 2716."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2716, Catania. A Bill for an Act in relation to state aid for probation services. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2716 on page 1 by deleting lines 16 and 17 and and so forth."

Shea: "The lady from Cook, Ms. Catania. Mr. Schoeberlein, would you punch Mr. Walsh's light there? He don't seem to be at his desk."

Catania: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. Committee Amendment #1 to House Bill 2716 makes a provision that in the event that a statewide probation system is in effect, the probation subsidy program proposed by the Bill would be administered by the administrative office of the Illinois courts. If such a system were not in effect, then the probation subsidy program would be administered by the counties. It also makes a provision for additional probation officers for very small counties. I move the adoption of Committee



Amendment #1."

Shea: "Is there any discussion with regards to ah.... Mr. Lechowicz, the gentleman from Cook."

Lechowicz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I think we need a little order, Mr. Speaker, because I tried to listen to the lady explanation of Amendment #1 to House Bill 2716 and unfortunately, I could not hear her. Could we have a little order, Speaker? Could I ask the lady to repeat the explanation of Amendment #1?"

Shea: "Back to Ms. Catania on Amendment #1."

Catania: "Committee Amendment #1, which was ah.. adopted with the Bill unanimously in the Judiciary II Committee, provides that if a statewide probation system is in effect in Illinois, then the probation subsidy program proposed by the Bill, would be administered by the administrative office of the Illinois courts. If a statewide probation system is not in effect in Illinois, then the probation subsidy program will be administered by the counties coming into line with the probation system as it now exists in Illinois. It makes further provisions for small counties, that they would have additional probation officers under the provisions of this Bill."

Lechowicz: "Thank you, Sue."

Shea: "Is there any further discussion? The gentleman ah.... the lady moves for the adoption of Amendment #1. All in favor say 'aye' and all opposed say 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 2718."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2718. A Bill for an Act to amend the Unified Code of Corrections. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2718 on page 2 by deleting line 29 and so forth."

Shea: "The lady from Cook, Ms. Catania."

Catania: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. Committee Amendment #1 to House Bill 2718 is permissive. It would allow the Director of the Department of Corrections for special reasons to decide that children born to women in prison ah... could remain with their mothers up to the age of one year and it also makes a



change which is ah... an implementation of the Illinois Constitution. It says that parents ah... or persons who have custody of children shall have access to the services of the Department of Children and Family Services ah...at the time of incarceration. I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1."

Shea: "The lady moves for the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 2718. Is there any discussion? The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Deuster."

Deuster: "Well, I thank you for the compliment, but I'm from Lake, but I do have a quick question and ah....."

Shea: "The gentleman from Lake, Mr. Deuster."

Deuster: "Ah... under the present law, ah... I wonder if the Sponsor would indicate what happens to the children ah....."

Catania: "Under the present laws ah... a woman who has sole custody of a child can ask this Department of Children and Family Services to place the child when she is placed in the Illinois prison system. This would say that either parent or any person having sole custody of a child could have access to the services of the Department of Children and Family Services."

Deuster: "So the other spouse could request the same thing that the individual spouse could, is that it?"

Catania: "That is correct."

Deuster: "Thank you."

Shea: "Is there any further discussion? The lady moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1 to House Bill 2718. All those in favor will say 'aye' and those opposed 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further amendments? House Bill..... Third Reading. House Bill 2724."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2724. A Bill for an Act to amend the Election Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2724 on page 1, line 7 and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman from Winnebago, Mr. Simms."

Simms: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, Committee Amendment #1 clarifies the language in the Bill to indicate that an individual that is seeking office to the General Assembly in



more than one county may on a legal description of petition say 'the voters of the (blank) legislative district' instead of having to have duplicate petitions for each county. I move for its adoption."

Shea: "Is there any discussion? The gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #1. All those in favor will say 'aye' and those opposed will say 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. On the order of House Bills, Third Reading appears House Bill 2 ah..... Third Reading on that last Bill. On the order of Second Reading, appears House Bill 2760."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2760. A Bill for an Act relating to money collected by the Attorney General. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2760 on page 2 by striking lines 14 and 15 and 16 and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman from Madison, Mr. Calvo."

Calvo: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I move the adoption of Committee Amendment #2. All the amendment does is make it a little clearer that in the event....."

Shea: "We're on #1, Mr. Calvo."

Calvo: "I mean Committee Amendment #1. All it does it make a little clearer as to the court designation of where funds go and it provides that that's what supposed to happen with them. I move the adoption of Committee Amendment #1."

Shea: "Is there any discussion? The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Peters."

Peters: "Will the gentleman yield for a question?"

Shea: "He indicates that he will."

Calvo: "Sure."

Peters: "Representative Calvo....."

Shea: "Could we have some order? This is a very important Bill.

Proceed, Mr. Peters."

Peters: "Representative Calvo, is the amendment that you are offering here along the lines that were discussed in the Committee and ah... suggested by Representative Berman?"

Calvo: "Yes, to a great extent. What I would like to do, Pete, ah... we haven't got any further amendments yet and I would like if we



can to move it along to Third and then I'll bring it back to Second if we get ah... you know, further ah... a further clarifying amendment. This is partly along those lines, yes."

Peters: "Has any attempt been made to discuss this with the people in the Attorney General's Office?"

Calvo: "Yes, they haven't contacted me. I've been here all week hoping they would, but you know, ah... the next day the gentleman had to be in Chicago and I said I'll see you Monday and I haven't heard anything."

Peters: "You have agreed, though that you will bring it back?"

Calvo: "I will bring it back, yes."

Shea: "The gentleman from Will, Mr. Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "I ah... I have one question for the Sponsor. I haven't got a copy of the amendment, which doesn't mean that it hasn't been passed out, but the Bill says that the only change in the existing law is that the funds go into the General Revenue Fund rather than to the State Treasury. What does the amendment do again?"

Calvo: "All right, ah... here's what the amendment adds to that, Harry."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Telcser."

Telcser: "Will the gentleman yield for a question?"

Shea: "Mr. Telcser, you have one of your Members now talking, ah... Mr. Leinenweber, did you want to interrupt him?"

Telcser: "No, I'll wait until he's finished."

Shea: "All right."

Calvo: "To answer the question ah.. what the amendment does is add the following ah... where it says: 'To pay into the State Treasury all monies received by him for use of the state, and to deposit into the General Revenue Fund, or in such other funds as may be required by court order. All monies recovered in law suits brought in behalf of the state, which shall then be expended pursuant to appropriations made by the General Assembly.' Now Harry, as you might recall, the reason for this is that when the court orders the state to expend the funds in a certain area, then we have to have it in the Revenue Fund and appropriated by the General Assembly for ah... to meet that provisions of that order and that's what the



amendment is directed to and I think that answers your question. In other words, it does change the present matter to that degree. In other words, so that we can comply with the court orders."

Leinenweber: "Thank you."

Shea: "Is there any further discussion? The Assistant Minority Leader, Mr. Telcser."

Telcser: "Will the gentleman yield, Mr. Speaker."

Calvo: "Surely."

Telcser: "Representative Calvo, I discussed this Bill with you the other day ah.... is this an amendment that's been worked out with the Attorney General's Office?"

Calvo: "No, ah.. in answer to Representative Peters' question, they have not...."

Shea: "Can we please have some order? Proceed."

Calvo: "The fiscal officers of the A.G.'s Office was to contact me this past Monday. He has not yet. I would like to go ahead and move the Bill to Third Reading with this amendment and then we will still be happy to work with him, and I'll bring it back to offer any amendment that we can get worked out."

Telcser: "All right, thank you."

Shea: "Is there any further discussion? The gentleman from Kankakee, Mr. Ryan."

Ryan: "Will the gentleman yield for a question?"

Calvo: "Yes, Sir."

Ryan: "Representative Calvo, how much money are we talking about? Do you know? Do you have any idea?"

Calvo: "I don't know. It's monies that are recovered in court suits and ah... you know, we don't know what it is going to be from one year to the next."

Ryan: "Well, do you have any idea what it has been in the years past?"

Calvo: "No, I don't because it varies quite a lot. I really don't know."

Ryan: "Could we have a Roll Call vote on this, Mr. Speaker?"

Shea: "Absolutely, if you are joined by five other Members and can see those hands popping up. Is there any further discussion? The



gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 2760. All those in favor will vote 'aye' and those opposed will vote 'nay'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record, Mr. Clerk. On this question there are 83 'aye' votes and 32 'nay' votes and no Members voting 'present' and Amendment #1 to House Bill 2760 is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. House Bill 2770."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2770. A Bill for an Act to amend the Civil Practice Act. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2770 on page 1, line 11 and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. McPartlin moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1. Is there any discussion? Those in favor will say 'aye' and those opposed 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further."

Shea: "Third Reading. House Bill 2781, Mr. Skinner."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2781. A Bill for an Act to prohibit the requirement that excess funds be kept in escrow accounts for the purpose of paying taxes. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 2781 by deleting lines 6, 7 and 8 and so forth."

Shea: "The gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Skinner."

Skinner: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I apologize for myself and Representative Darrow and Representative Deuster, all who were late coming back because the service at the Mansion View was inferior. I move the adoption of this amendment, which puts into legal ease what I had put into layman's language in the original Bill."

Shea: "Is there any discussion? The gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 2781. All those in favor will say 'aye' and those opposed 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments? Third Reading. Is Mr. Cunningham on the floor? House Bill 2800."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2800. A Bill for an Act making appropriations to the East St. Louis Industrial Development Commission. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill



2800 on page 1 by deleting lines 1 and 2 and inserting in lieu thereof and so forth."

Shea: "The lady from St. Clair, Ms. Younge."

Younge: Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I move the adoption of Amendment #1, which changes the word 'to East St. Louis Development Board' to 'the Southwest Regional Port District.'"

Shea: "Is there any discussion? Does your light work, Mr. Leinenweber? The gentleman from Will, Mr. Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "I have one question. You say that no longer is the appropriation to the East St. Louis Development Board, but the what?"

Younge: "To the Southwest Regional Port District."

Leinenweber: "What is the purpose of the appropriation?"

Younge: "The purpose of the appropriation is to promote the development of an industrial park in the East St. Louis area."

Leinenweber: "Is there any East St. Louis Development Board?"

Younge: "Ah... there is not."

Leinenweber: "Was this by error or ah....?"

Younge: "No, the original fault was to create one, but ah... there is a Port District there already in being that has the responsibility for industrial development and economic development so my second thought was to just use it."

Shea: "Is there any further discussion? The lady moves for the adoption of Amendment #1 to ah.... I'm sorry, Mr. Dunn. The gentleman from Perry, Mr. Dunn."

Dunn: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I wonder if the Sponsor would yield for a question?"

Shea: "She indicates that she will."

Dunn: "Representative Younge, does the amendment just call ah... change the name of the Development Commission to the Port District?"

Younge: "The amendment call for changing the name from the East St. Louis Development Board to the Southwest Regional Port District."

Dunn: "Is the amount \$100,000 still say the same?"

Younge: "Yes, that still stays the same."

Dunn: "Thank you. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Shea: "The gentleman from DeKalb, Mr. Ebbesen."



Ebbesen: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, may we have a little order? I can't hear what is being said."

Shea: "Is there any further discussion? The gentleman from Cook, the Assistant Minority Leader, Mr. Telcser. Oh ah... I thought ah... Mr. Walsh."

Walsh: "Thanks very much, Mr. ah... Associate Speaker. I ah... question the germaneness of this amendment and I would ask that the Chair rule on it. I would prefer to have the permanent Speaker rule on it. He is standing right there smiling down at us."

Shea: "It's a Committee Amendment, Mr. Walsh."

Walsh: "Well, that doesn't matter."

Shea: "Ms. Younge."

Younge: "Ah...it is just a change of name of a entity, Mr. Speaker. There is a present ah... I think, philosophy of not creating new boards or commissions and in line with that philosophy I simply attempted to use an already established state agency, which is in keeping with what I think is the will of the General Assembly. I'm just simply trying to ah... adopt a different name and it is clearly germane to the subject matter."

Shea: "Since this is an Appropriation Bill, I feel that the amendment is germane, Mr. Walsh. Proceed. Mr Walsh, the Chair has ruled. Certainly, he is entitled to that. Turn him on."

Walsh: "Ya, well, o'kay ah... now let me just explain what you ruled on because I'm sure you don't understand. The Bill..... the Bill provided for an appropriation for an agency that does not exist. The amendment changes the appropriation to an agency that does exist. Now Mr. Speaker, I don't know how on earth you can possibly rule that that is germane. It is an entirely different agency."

Shea: "Mr. Walsh."

Walsh: "Now I would add...."

Shea: "Mr. Walsh, Mr. Walsh. Turn Mr. Walsh on. Mr. Walsh, would you tell me wherein there is a requirement of germaneness with Appropriation Bills?"

Walsh: "Well, Mr. Speaker...."

Shea: "Would you tell me?"



Walsh: "Ya, if you can't see where there's germaneness with Appropriation Bill....."

Shea: "Where is the requirement of germaneness?"

Walsh: "The requirement of germaneness is in every Bill and every amendment to a Bill. Now I would ask, Mr. Speaker, especially in view of the ruling that the permanent Speaker made this afternoon with respect to a Republican amendment, that he rule on this....."

Shea: "Point of order, Mr. Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I wish he would quote the appropriate rule. I think he is out of order."

Shea: "Mr. Walsh, might I read to you from the Constitution of the State of Illinois on the title Section 8, Passage of Bills; where it says: 'Bills ah... except Bills for the for Appropriations and for the codification revision or amendment of laws shall be confined to one subject.' There is no requirement for Appropriation Bills to be confined to one subject and the Chair has so ruled. Proceed."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, ah.. did you want me to proceed?"

Shea: "No, I want Ms. Younge to proceed."

Younge: "I move for the adoption of the amendment."

Shea: "Ms. Younge, moves for the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 2800. All those in favor will say 'aye' and those opposed will say 'nay' and ah.... on a Roll Call vote; all those in favor will vote 'aye' and the opposed will vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? On this question..... take the record, Mr. Clerk. On this question there are 92 'aye' votes and 43 'no' votes and none voting 'present' and Amendment #1 is adopted to House Bill 2800. Are there any further amendments? Third Reading. House Bills, Third Reading."

Speaker Redmond: "The order of business is Third Reading. House Bills, Third Reading. On the priority of call appears House Bill 46."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 46. A Bill for an Act to amend the Detrimental Business Practice Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Washington."

Washington: "Mr. Speaker, ah... from the last Roll Call there ah..."



there are quite a few absentees today. Ah... this is a controversial Bill and I feel somewhat at a disadvantage with proceeding because I can look around and can see some people who have indicated that they would support it and they are not here. I have another Bill in the same category, which expires Sunday, the 11th. Now it's not my fault that they are not here, but it seems to me that in light of that, ah... perhaps the Speaker should consider or could consider the fact that those Bills that die by Sunday, perhaps should be extended at least till Monday to give us half a chance to have a full..... I told Shea that, didn't I? No, I don't want to move to do it..... I want the Speaker to do it."

Speaker Redmond: "Parliamentarian, will you..... Representative Washington."

Washington: "Is there an Amendment #3 on that Bill or just two amendments?"

Speaker Redmond: "On which Bill?"

Washington: "46."

Speaker Redmond: "The Bill is up in Enrolling and Engrossing, Representative Washington, so we can't tell from here. I suppose we could call up there and find out. I've been advised by the Parliamentarian that in order to extend the time, you can so move, but it would take 107 votes."

Washington: "Well, in getting back to this Bill, Mr. Speaker, I... I am not certain whether I have two amendments or three on this Bill. That's my problem."

Speaker Redmond: "We'll take that Bill out of the record for now and will you check with Enrolling and Engrossing and find out?"

Washington: "All right. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "House Bill 145."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 145....."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mc....."

Fredric B. Selcke: "A Bill for an Act to....."

Speaker Redmond: "The Sponsor wants to take that out of the record. 154. Three Amendments have been adopted on that, Representative Washington. On House Bill 46, ah... three amendments have been adopted."



Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 154. A Bill for an Act to amend the Park District Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "That one out of the record. 160."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 160. A Bill for an Act to prohibit the employment in this state of aliens who are in the United States illegally. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Borchers."

Borchers: "Mr. Speaker and fellow Members of the House, I want to give you a few facts in soliciting your support for actually as far as I can find out, the first Bill of this nature in any state of the union. I would like to point out to you what ah..... someone is giving me some alien interference."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed, Mr. Borchers."

Borchers: "Legal or illegal. Anyway, I want to point out to you some facts. One, that ah... Attorney General Saxby and our present Attorney General estimate that in this country at least one million jobs could be held by our own people, by Americans both black and white that need jobs, that are now being held by illegal aliens. Two, they're slave labor to a great degree because they're afraid to ah... say anything about the employer who employs them and also the man who employs them generally is employing them for less money than the minimum wage. In all senses, this was rather startling when I went into it, but it's an example on the cost of education. In Los Angeles and New York alone, putting one town and the other from the East Coast to the West Coast, in those two places it is estimated that \$100,000,000 is the cost in those combined school districts, if they should be combined, \$1,000,000 a year for the education of the children of the illegal aliens. If you read the paper today, New York is thoroughly broke. They are.... they were turned back at our border, according to immigration authorities this last year, 800,000 plus illegal aliens. How many then bounced in to another area of our border and go in? No one knows. Millions of dollars are being made by certain individuals by smuggling illegal aliens into this country. No one knows how much that amounts to. In Chicago alone, last year, 12,000 were returned to their native country.



wherever it might be. For this....."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kosinski."

Kosinski: "I have a question when he has stopped."

Borchers: "Ah... in relation to a Roll Call on this matter if it's going to be that easy ah... I'll tell you right now to get it out of the way that the A.F. of L. and C.I.O. and American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars are all for this Bill. The ah.. importance of this Bill could be financially of great importance. It is estimated 300,000 to 400,000 illegal aliens are in the State of Illinois. Now I gave out brochures concerning these matters, but as time has gone by maybe some of you have forgotten some of the facts that I put on your desks. This is approximately 3% of the population in the State of Illinois. Now the money that is sent out of this state, not counting the United States 'cause no one know, but the money that is sent out of this state by illegal aliens working in the State of Illinois and sending their money back to their native country, is anywhere ah... and no one knows, but is estimated from \$500,000,000 up. No one knows how much. All at a loss to our own economy. Some of it going to communist countries, such as Poland, where just about a month and a half ago they caught fifty illegal ah... Polish aliens on ah.. in one shift alone at a Sears building. I want to point out that these aliens come from all over the world. Illegal aliens come from all over the world. Hong Kong, the Phillipines, Europe, all countries in Europe, Mexico, the Islands and elsewhere. One man alone ah... they found \$15,000 on him that he was getting ready to send to his native country. One woman, who is holding two jobs, had \$5,000 on her getting ready to send to her native country. On welfare, ah... all they have to do is have a child and they are instant citizens and we get the pleasure of paying for the child's birth, which averages \$500. I think, from what I hear calls of Roll Call, I think you appreciate the gravity of the situation and I don't want to take your time. So I do solicit your support that you'll be able to say that we ah... this legislature is the first legislature in the history of the United States, as far as I can ascertain, to try and pass and will pass



an illegal alien Bill. So I solicit your support. I have plenty more facts, but I think this is enough to give you the idea of what is happening to us. Let's vote for our people, our blacks, our whites, who need jobs, not somebody else."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Marovitz."

Marovitz: "Will the Sponsor yield?"

Borchers: "I'll yield."

Marovitz: "Ah.... Representative Borchers, can you tell me why it is that ah.... farm workers are objecting to this Bill?"

Borchers: "Well, it really wasn't with my wish, but the Committee wanted it and I've looked into this and it seems to me that there is about 6,000 migrant workers and as a result of that ah.... a percentage of the illegal aliens is unknown in that group, but it's minute compared to the illegal aliens holding other jobs in other areas of our state."

Marovitz: "Well, it seems to me that we're talking about illegal aliens. Not a class of illegal aliens, but we're talking about illegal aliens in general and their specifying what group. Are you saying that you don't go along with the amendment?"

Borchers: "This House.... well, this House put ah.... this Committee and Members of this House put the amendment on and I'm not going to argue the point that ah.... when it only affects possibly a few thousand people at the best, but we have some 400,000. That's a very small percentage and I'd rather ah... because of the migrant nature of the ah.... the work of the migrant in the fields and the possible increase it costs to prove it, I'm not going to argue the point."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Calvo."

Calvo: "Will the gentleman yield for a question?"

Borchers: "Go ahead."

Calvo: "What every ah.... when you talk about farm ah.. you know, I'm an old farmer myself, but how many aliens do you think come into this state for that very reason and then after they're here, for the seasonal intercultural label migrate to the cities and spend more time and try to find jobs there. How many of that 400,000 do you



think got here as a result of being migrant farm laborers?"

Borchers: "I would say that that would be a question that nobody would answer. This is a very dark realm of ours statewide. It's time that we took some sort of action to try and do something about it. No one can answer that question."

Calvo: "Well, Mr. Speaker, if I could just briefly speak to the Bill.

I think this would probably be a good Bill if it was brought back to Second Reading and that amendment removed because if we're going to have a Bill as to illegal aliens' employment in the state, regardless of where you're from or what type of work you're in, I don't think they should be allowed to work if they're not going to be employed in the state in any industry in this state, whether it be agriculture or ah... steel plants or whatever and ah... if it's an illegal aliens Bill then I think it oughta apply to all types of employment and I wonder if the gentleman would consider holding the Bill, bring it back to Second and removing this bad amendment?"

Borchers: "I think that we should go ahead on the Bill, but I am not particularly adverse to what you say. I I feel that 95% of a loaf is better than no loaf."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hudson."

Borchers: "Let them take it off in the Senate."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hudson."

Hudson: "Would the ah... Mr. Speaker, would the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates that he will."

Hudson: "Webber, I am sympathetic to what you're trying to do in your Bill, but I raised the question the other day, I think on Second Reading, when the amendment went on, Amendment #4, and that's the one that bothers me and bothers many of us. My question is; if with that amendment on your Bill really isn't illegal. Maybe we have an illegal Bill here dealing with the illegal aliens. The reason I say this, ah... I'm wondering seriously about the constitutionality of a law which really doesn't seem to afford equal protection under the law. I don't believe that this one would. I think it's a serious flaw and if you would consider pulling it back and perhaps



removing that amendment ah... I certainly could support it wholeheartedly, but with the amendment on I don't think I can, in good conscience support it."

Borchers: "Mr. Speaker, may I ask a parliamentary question?"

Speaker Redmond: "I think that's reversing the process."

Borchers: "I can't ask then?"

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed, ask."

Borchers: "If I if we ah... take this to a vote and it doesn't get the 89 votes, I would be forced to put it on postponed consideration, can I then take it back or not?"

Speaker Redmond: "Yes, you can."

Borchers: "I'm just curious. I'm not backing up, but I am curious as a matter of parliamentary procedure. I've never been in this position quite before."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mann."

Mann: "Mr. Speaker, would the gentleman yield for a question or two?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates that he will."

Mann: "Webber, what is the position of the Chamber of Commerce on this?"

Borchers: "I have it here, but I want to point out to you that they say that ah... it's the federal government that reserves itself the right to a.... ah.... just a minute here, I'll read it to you. I have it."

Mann: "Webber, will you tell me...."

Borchers: "I'm telling you now."

Mann: "We all have the letters, but what is the position?"

Borchers: "It says that the federal government reserves ah... the Congress legislation with respect to nationality, but it doesn't say that the state hasn't got a right to make a decision as to employers. Those people live in our state and are subject to this legislature and not the Federal Congress."

Mann: "Webber, is the Chamber of Commerce for your Bill?"

Borchers: "They are not, but on the other hand the American Legion, The Veterans of Foreign Wars, A.F. of L. the C. I. O. ah.. they are. Take your choice. I'm surprised to see you on the other side."



Mann: "Weber, may I ask you one more question?"

Borchers: "Yes."

Mann: "What's the largest employer in your district, Weber?"

Borchers: "Staley Manufacturing Company."

Mann: "Staley? How many people do they employ?"

Borchers: "About 5,000."

Mann: "All right, now if they should employ ah... an illegal alien, do you favor fining them \$10,000?"

Borchers: "Absolutely."

Mann: "You do?"

Borchers: "Absolutely. I do. That is for more than one time."

Mann: "Well, that may be why the Chamber of Commerce is opposed to your Bill, Weber?"

Borchers: "I could care less. I know what is best for my country and my state and this is best for my country and my state and that's the only thing that I have ever been interested in. I don't care about the Association of Commerce or ah...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brummet."

Brummet: "Mr. Speaker, would he answer a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates that he will."

Brummet: "Mr. Borchers, in reading this House Amendment #4, ah... I don't think that they can hire ah... these aliens in agriculture.

The only thing that it does is exempt the employer from demanding and receiving proof of citizenship or legal residence. If this is right in the digest ah...."

Borchers: "That is correct."

Brummet: "So this doesn't give the the right to hire aliens. It's just the fact that these people come along and it's seasonal work and it would take too much time and trouble to decide whether or not they are aliens."

Borchers: "They move from field to field often. Within a few days they do this and they pass up and down the State of Illinois. It would be a very difficult proposition."

Brummet: "You can't get people to do that work so where in the world would we get them if we didn't get...."



Borchers: "It would be very difficult and besides the number of those that are illegal in this group are minute."

Brummet: "All right, thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kosinski."

Kosinski: "Will the Sponsor yield to twenty-eight questions?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates that he will."

Borchers: "Twenty-seven."

Kosinski: "Webber, obviously the intent of this is understandable and I'm certain it's being dealt with on the federal level. I do have some concerns. What is the enforcing agency on this?"

Borchers: "It would be the normal course of events. That is ah... the State's Attorneys and the police....."

Kosinski: "Is this in addition to Chapter 38? It doesn't indicate so, incidently, Webber?"

Borchers: "No, but since it would be a law in the State of Illinois, I would certainly think that it would follow the normal procedures ah... normal legal procedures"

Kosinski: "Well, in as much as there is a penalty of \$500 to \$1,000 it makes it part ah... I presume, of the Statutes concerned with criminal justice, doesn't it?"

Borchers: "Yes, it would."

Kosinski: "But it doesn't indicate so and I have another question. It indicates that this ah... as it is unlawful for any employer knowingly or intentionally in this state to employ an illegal alien ah... and we know that that is difficult to prove, ah... now would you say were an employer to accept a federal social security card as prove that a man was hireable, would that then permit him to plead he didn't knowingly hire the man?"

Borchers: "Well, certainly he would be free of any guilt. If the alien is....."

Kosinski: "I yield, Mr. Speaker."

Borchers: "If the alien had a forged social security or one that was improperly secured, why ah... the employer is not guilty of any crime."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Flinn."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ebbesen."

Ebbesen: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I move the previous question."

Speaker Redmond: "The previous question has been moved. All those in favor of putting the main question say 'aye', opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and Representative Borchers to close."

Borchers: "In closing, I'll close very simply. It's time to think of your country instead of perhaps the pea-pickers or the cannery presidents or whatever. It's time to think of your country and your state and the thousands and the tens of thousands and some ah... three-hundred people in this state that are out of work that might be able to get a job, black and white. It's time that we do something about it and this is the first step and I solicit your support."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is shall this Bill pass. Those in favor will vote 'aye' and the opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Representative Cunningham."

Cunningham: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I think it's an indicting commentary on the moral values of Americans and upon the Illinois House of Representatives, in particular; that any of you would seriously consider harrassing with criminal prosecution. Those foreigners who are industrious enough to perform the labor that Americans are too lazy to perform; I invite you to vote for the fifty fine Polish women who will continue to keep the floors swept ah... there in Chicago. Vote 'no'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I think the Sponsor of this Bill has really been sincere and serious about it. In explaining my vote, I have three things to tell you. One, we are penalizing the Mexicans, who are really Americans. They belong to this continent, but we're not going to do a thing about the Viet Nameese people coming in and therefore I think we will be discriminatory. Number two, it is a federal item on immigration and it's the federal government that should look into it and number three, the Bill as it is with the 4th Amendment is definitely, is unconstitutional."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Representative Borchers, for what purpose do you rise?"



Borchers: "I see that it's only fifty, but again I want to remind you that the argument that there are Mexicans from this continent, they're not Americans if they are here illegally. They're sneaking across our borders and they're taking our jobs, they're taking our money and they're doing things that we should be doing and having our own people do. It ah... to me, this is a matter of patriotism. As far as ah....."

Speaker Redmond: "Bring your remarks to a close, I think you've explained your vote before."

Borchers: "All right, let's have the Roll Call and then I will ask to have it put on postponed consideration to ah... and then bring it back later on to Third Reading ah... to Second Reading."

Speaker Redmond: "You better do it before I announce the Roll Call."

Borchers: "Very well, I will request now that we put it on postponed consideration."

Speaker Redmond: "Postponed consideration. Dump the Roll Call. Let's have another noncontroversial Bill. House Bill 165."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 165. Ah... he's not here."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Friedrich? He's not here. Out of the record. House Bill 174."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 174, Geo-Karis. An Act in relation to payment of costs for police protection, fire protection and the rescue services furnished in the state or county parks, conservation areas or forest preserves. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Ah.... o'kay, I'll take a Roll Call. Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, this Bill only provides for reimbursement by the Department of Conservation for fire or police services, ah... not by the county if they are in need in the Department of Conservation ah... state park. I respectfully ask for your consideration because the joining municipalities do not pay taxes on this park plan. We do not collect taxes, rather."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is shall House Bill 174 pass? All those in favor vote 'aye' and those opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. 121 'aye' and no 'nay'



and the Bill having received the constitutional majority is hereby declared passed. 177, Representative Merlo."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 177. An Act requiring automatic sprinkling systems in high rise apartments. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Merlo."

Merlo: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, fire protection is an immediate concern as high rise buildings soar behind the control capacity of existing fire equipment. The average citizen living in a modern society, such as ours, expects that a combination of designs, skills, and scrutiny of public officials will insure his safety particularly in the glistening high rise buildings. He expects to be protected from harm and tragedy. He expects to go about his daily activity with confidence and without fear. Representative Telcser, Representative Marovitz and I live and represent the 12th Representative District, a District in which there are perhaps more high rises or as many than any other area in the State of Illinois. A district where tragedy has struck. For example, tragedy struck killing four persons and injuring eighteen others when fire broke out on the 36th floor of the high rise building at 3450 Lake Shore Drive. In 1972 a woman and a man were killed, eight persons were injured and an estimated 300 persons fled into the bitter cold when a fire broke out at 720 West Gordon Terrace and just last night, ladies and gentlemen, just before midnight, at 3600 Lake Shore Drive, described as a start of a Towering Inferno. Elevators were put out of order. People had to descend from the 23rd story and in one instance that appeared in the Chicago newspapers indicated that an elderly woman had to be abandoned on the stairwell because she could go no further. Richard Bland, of the National Presidents Commission on Fire Protection and Control, said of a fire that occurred in New Orleans, just a few years back where five persons were killed and a number of other injured, 'the fire could have been stopped if water sprinklers had been installed.' He also said, 'there is no reliable way to fight high rise fires without having at least the aid of automatic sprinklers.' On February 13th of this year at



900 North Lake Shore Drive, a woman died in her 17th floor apartment, while residents of the Lake Front glass building had to evacuate it and of this fire..... I'll take a Roll Call, if you want it."

Speaker Redmond: "Are you ready for the question?"

Merlo: "I'll take a Roll Call, providing I get the necessary votes."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Keller."

Keller: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like to ask the gentleman a question."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Keller: "John, ah.. in this it requires buildings that are eight stories or more, that's correct is it not?"

Merlo: "Yes, Representative Keller, and it would only effect new construction starting in '76."

Keller: "Now, this two year period starting ah.. does that mean in two years, that all of the older buildings would have to go back and have the sprinkler system put in?"

Merlo: "This would not affect old buildings, just the new construction."

Keller: "Now, what about ah.. on any new construction ah.. on all the floors, I mean, it's just not the floors above the second floor, it's all the floors would have it have this, correct?"

Merlo: "Anything above eight floors?"

Keller: "I mean all of the floors ah... all the way down on it. I mean, some buildings, I know, don't have sprinkler systems on the first two floors, but they do there above. That's what I'm getting at."

Merlo: "No, it would only be above eight stories. The reason for that, Representative Keller, is this: That fire equipment, the modern standard fire equipment used today cannot go above eight stories."

Keller: "O'kay. In other words, your Bill ah.. what I'm getting back to saying, ah... the first seven stories would not have to have the sprinkler system in, just those above the seven stories."

Merlo: "Above eight stories."

Keller: "Well, I know above eight stories, but what I'm saying ah.. if there is a twenty-four story building, just the top sixteen stories would have to have it in. Is that correct? If it is a twenty-four story building....."



Merlo: "Those stories above the eighth level."

Keller: "O'kay, I just wanted to understand it correctly. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Meyer."

Meyer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the gentleman yield for a question?"

Merlo: "Yes."

Meyer: "Representative Merlo, does this Bill have the traditional home rule amendment on it?"

Merlo: "Representative Meyers, in my opinion and in the opinion in the many I have talked with, the Bill, as written, recognizes the home rule units. It recognizes it in the interest and concern that it is the interest and concern of Illinois in wanting to protect its people and it further provides that it leaves the installation and the type of installation up to the local unit of government. I might site, too, that providing for the health, safety and welfare of the people of the State of Illinois is called the police power and it is vested primarily in the General Assembly and this is mentioned in two places in the Constitution, the preamble and of course, the Section relative to the local government."

Meyer: "Then this does not apply to the City of Chicago?"

Merlo: "It applies to the entire State of Illinois."

Meyer: "Well, is there a home rule amendment in this Bill?"

Merlo: "As I mentioned, I think that it does... it does mention the fact that they have to comply with this rule, which of course says that ah... the all of the cities in Illinois have to comply."

Meyer: "Well, I'll ask the question again, ah.... I didn't get an answer, Mr. Speaker. Does this apply to the City of Chicago? Does it ah.... Representative Merlo, does this Bill apply to the City of Chicago?"

Merlo: "Yes, it does."

Meyer: "O'kay, thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Grotberg."

Grotberg: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the gentleman yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates that he will."

Grotberg: "Representative Merlo, I have the same concerns that you and I



talked about in Committee. What would be your estimation of the planning sequence in the architectural design of an average building of ah... let us say of twenty stories in the City of Chicago?

I know we're all guessing, but it's more than a matter of months or what?"

Merlo: "Representative, would you repeat your question?"

Grotberg: "My question is the same one that you and I ah.... I have no objection to what you're trying to get at here, but remember in Committee, I was concerned about the effective date of this Act for building already under design. Any building that is up and started ah... or started... or the building will be started, you did not define starting in the Bill and starting to me is the design portion. It takes two or three years to design them and these tremendous added costs, the financial planning of a high rise building ah... I have to quarrel with your enacting dates now as I did then and I thought Jack, that you had amended it to a later date because of some of that dialogue..."

Merlo: "No, it's still as it was originally... which starts any new construction that would be started as of January 1, 1976 and I would imagine that this would be determined by the date that the permit was taken out."

Grotberg: "All right, but what you're saying is that any building ah.... it is now... of May 1975 ah... we're talking about seven months on a long range finance plan for any high rise building; I'm concerned about the developer who has arranged and tried to come in within reason so that his rents are not way out of line and this rather costly installation to back and redesign for and refinance for and I would just plead that you would find a way to find a later enacting clause for this kind of ah... ah... legislation, which is going to escalate building costs."

Speaker Redmond: "Are you ready for the question? Representative LaFleur."

LaFleur: "An inquiry of the Chair, Mr. Speaker. If this effects the City of Chicago, how many votes will be needed to pass to make it effective in the City of Chicago?"

Speaker Redmond: "89. Are you ready for the question? The question is



shall House Bill 177 pass. All those in favor vote 'aye' and opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question there is 112 'aye' and 7 'no' and the Bill having received the constitutional majority is hereby declared passed. Mr. Skinner, for what purpose do you rise?"

Skinner: "To perhaps obliterate my total confusion. Does this ah... what does this apply to ah... does it apply to Crystal Lake and not Chicago?"

Speaker Redmond: "State of Illinois and the City of Chicago. Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "I put on my 'yes' button and I think it ended up 'present'. I meant to go 'aye' on that thing. I'm sorry."

Speaker Redmond: "Will you change Representative Geo-Karis from 'no' to 'aye'. Representative Walsh. Representative Walsh is 'present'. Representative Palmer is 'aye'. Representative Deavers, 'present'. Macdonald, 'aye'. Jones, 'aye'. Daniels, 'aye'. Merlo, 'aye'. Terzich, 'aye'. Representative Terzich."

Terzich: "Yes, ah... Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, since my firehouse covers the district of Representative Merlo, I would like to thank you all for the helping hand. I need all of the help I can get."

Speaker Redmond: "178."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 178, Merlo. A Bill for an Act to amend the Criminal Code of 1961."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Merlo."

Merlo: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, it has become very apparent that the hand gun is a devastating threat to the lives of all of our citizens and the current laws, which allows probation or fine for conviction of carrying such a concealed weapon seems completely out of step with reality of armed violence increasing throughout the state. Concealed weapons have proven to be one of the biggest threats not only to the lives of our citizens, but to the police officer arresting for minor traffic offenses. House Bill 178 would require the imposition of a mandatory jail sentence of at least one day, not counting the day of arrest for defendants convicted of carrying



concealed weapons on or about their person. Mr. Speaker...."

Speaker Redmond: "Give the gentleman order."

Merlo: "I as many of you, look dimly on mandatory impositions. However, there are presently provisions in the Criminal Code, which do provide the mandatory jail sentence when a person performs any of the variety of serious offenses. Appearing as a personal witness before this Bill was Circuit Court Judge Kenneth Winth and in his statement he said that there was approximately twenty-five provisions in our present statute that require minimum mandatory jail sentences with no probation. Chicago recently passed an ordinance, which provides a mandatory jail sentence at ten days to six months for an unauthorized person caught carrying an unregistered gun and on April 2nd of this year.... may we have a little order. This is gonna be a tuffy, Mr. Speaker, I know."

Speaker Redmond: "It's kind of unlikely, but we'll try. Give the gentleman some order."

Merlo: "On April 2nd of this year the Commonwealth of Massachusetts enacted a law requiring a minimum mandatory jail sentence of one year without suspension, probation or parole for the possession of a gun. Now ladies and gentlemen, the purpose of this Bill is not to fill our jails, but to discourage people from taking guns out on the street. I feel that the law will work because it is a practical enforceable way of changing peoples' habits in route to the goal of gun control. It does not conflict with other political and legislation in effect of banning hand guns or other weapons. It does not infringe upon the rights of those who have obtained a license to carry a weapon. It does not pass judgement on the wisdom of keeping a gun at home or in one's place of business. It does not purport to solve all of the problems connected with violence with guns. However, in the last several decades, we have created a climate of permissiveness unparalleled in human history. We are in the midst of an epidemic of gun lunacy on our streets. Citizens of all ages and from all walks of life are carrying guns. I would like to present facts. Presently, there are 30 to 35 million hand guns in the United States. During 1973 an estimated 19,510 murders were committed



in the United States and 53% through the use of hand guns. From 1964 to 1973, 850 law enforcement officers were killed. These are federal statistics, however, in Chicago in 1974, 970 murders, 50% were by the use of hand guns. I can go on and on and give you additional statistics, however, I feel that we are all aware of the importance of this. I just want to mention one other fact; that I did amend this Bill to keep it into effect for a period of two years just to make a study as to whether this would deter in the crimes that are committed with hand guns and I ask your favorable vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Palmer."

Palmer: "If the Sponsor will yield for a question?"

Merlo: "Yes."

Palmer: "John,....."

Merlo: "Yes, Romey."

Palmer: "The City of Chicago has an ordinance on this, do they not?"

Merlo: "There.... yes, they have an ordinance, but it's just....."

Palmer: "And that ordinance also provides that they can imprison them up to six months. I'm in favor of the concept, but I just wonder ah....I'm ah... you know why ah... there's been a lot of criticism with some of the gun court. Can't you already do this in the City of Chicago?"

Merlo: "The Chicago ordinance directs itself to those carry unregistered guns."

Palmer: "But not concealed weapons?"

Merlo: "Unregistered."

Palmer: "Ya, but what about....."

Merlo: "Concealed, yes... I would imagine it would be."

Palmer: "I think it does concern itself with concealed weapons, too.

What about the enforcement in the city?"

Merlo: "Well, we would hope....."

Palmer: "Carry concealed weapons under the city ordinance."

Merlo: "This is different than the city ordinance that exists in the City of Chicago, Romey. This would be whether it is unregistered or registered; if you carry a concealed weapon, you would be subjected to a mandatory jail sentence of at least one year."



Palmer: "I understand that, but I understand also and ah... I could be corrected on this, as to whether or not the city has an ordinance on this carrying the concealed weapon."

Merlo: "Well, there is a marked difference in that this would take away judicial discretion. It would be mandatory that a jail sentence be given."

Palmer: "Well, what we're doing is telling the judges that at least they've got to put them in jail for one night ah... or one day."

Merlo: "That's correct."

Palmer: "Which they haven't been doing."

Merlo: "That's correct."

Palmer: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Winchester."

Winchester: "Will the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates that he will."

Winchester: "Representative Merlo, what is your definition of a concealed weapon? Is a concealed weapon a shotgun or a rifle that's in a case or is a 22 pistol that's in a holster that's laying on the front seat of an automobile? Is that considered concealed?"

Merlo: "Yes, I would say that it would be. It was on the seat of an automobile, yes."

Winchester: "The present law doesn't consider a hand gun that's in a holster laying on a front seat of an automobile, ah... that's not now considered a concealed weapon, is it?"

Merlo: "Well, I've been advised by my legal staff that it has to be concealed on your person. I'm not a lawyer, but I do have some counsel from some expert lawyers."

Winchester: "Thank you, Representative."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McMaster."

McMaster: "Will the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Merlo: "Yes, go ahead."

McMaster: "Jack, I think I know what you're getting at. You're trying to get a mandatory sentence. Can you hear me, Jack?"

Merlo: "I think I can, yes."

McMaster: "It's been difficult to hear you. Mr. Speaker, will you give



us some order, please. Mr. Speaker. I'm trying to ask Jack a few questions and I think I would like to hear his answers and I would like to have him hear the questions in order that he might answer. If we could hear some quiet, please. Jack, you're seeking a mandatory sentence of one day for carrying a concealed weapon?"

Merlo: "That's right."

McMaster: "You're seeking mandatory sentence of one day for a concealed weapon, right?"

Merlo: "That's correct, yes."

McMaster: "What are you involving in the way of registration of guns or hand guns?"

Merlo: "Well, this would have to adhere to the law that exists, which mandates us to register all hand guns."

McMaster: "You register hand guns in the City of Chicago?"

Merlo: "Yes, we do."

McMaster: "We do not ah... statewide. Does this affect only home rule counties?"

Merlo: "Oh boy, here we go again. Well, Representative, this has nothing to do with registration."

McMaster: "Well, you just said that it did, Jack."

Merlo: "No, I didn't say it did. I said that Chicago has a Registration Act. I think that's what you asked me."

McMaster: "Yes, but you're saying that a person carrying a weapon that it is not registered is subject to a one day imprisonment."

Merlo: "Oh, no, no, no, no. I did not say that, Representative McMaster."

McMaster: "Well, that's what I understood you to say, Jack."

Merlo: "No, I'm saying that an imposition of a one day sentence would be for carrying a concealed weapon, regardless of whether it is registered or regardless of whether it's not registered."

McMaster: "Well Jack, I want to see a mandatory sentence for people who are convicted of a crime with any kind of a weapon whether it be a gun, whether it be a club, whether it be a knife, whether it's a pool cue ah... whatever it is. Really I think this is where our trouble lies, it's not with the hand gun. It is with the people who let them off after they have been caught with a hand gun. I would



like to support your legislation, Jack. I don't think a one day mandatory sentence is sufficient. I think this is just a tap on the wrist, believe me."

Merlo: "Well, Representative McMaster, I can tell you this. The discretion is made by the judge. It's a mandatory one day up to a year. Now he still has that discretion to go as high as a year, but he has to mandate a one day sentence."

McMaster: "I think we've given the judges too much discretion as far as this is concerned anyhow."

Merlo: "Well, Massachusetts, as I told you, just passed a law where it is one year."

McMaster: "And I would be more inclined to agree with that."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Barnes."

Barnes: "Would the Sponsor yield to a question, please?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates that he will."

Barnes: "Mr. Sponsor, I have one problem with this whole concept and I hope that some people would begin to listen to what's going on here. My question to this, is for this one day sentence that you're talking about and the Section of the Statute you are amending, would this be a felony?"

Merlo: "Well, ah..."

Barnes: "Now you're amending the Section of the Statute 24-1. Now part of that statute addresses itself to a Class A misdemeanor, but also part of that Statute addresses itself to a felony. So what I want to know is under this Bill would the person be charged or be charged with, upon a conviction, a felony."

Merlo: "Representative Barnes, it does not change the law. It effects the penalty. Now as I say, I'm not a lawyer. If the present law reads that the possession of a hand gun is a felony, then it would remain a felony."

Barnes: "The question that I'm addressing to you, so I am clear on the way I want to vote on this, is ah... is it or would it be a felony. That's all. That's all I'm asking. Everybody is saying that it doesn't change anything and all I want to know is whether or not the answer is yes or no."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker, I think I can answer the question....."

Merlo: "Representative Matijevich is looking at the Bill and he said it's a Class 'A' misdemeanor at the present time. It would remain that."

Speaker Redmond: "Are you ready for the question? The question is shall this Bill pass. All those in favor vote 'aye' and the opposed vote 'no'. Representative Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to explain my vote. This is a good Bill and particularly for those of you who oppose ah... hand gun registration of abolition of the hand gun because this is a anti-gun Bill that everybody can support because this punishes the offender rather than taking it out on the gun. Now it makes no changes at all in the substantive law concerning illegal use of the weapon. What was a crime before this Bill is still a crime ah... it doesn't increase the gravity of any offense. All it does is provide that in the event a person commits one of, I think, four or five violations with guns, such as concealing a gun on his person, that he shall see the inside of a jail. That the judge shall not have discretion to turn him out. I sat on a Sub-Committee that heard a Hand Gun Registration Bill in Chicago and we ah... the head policeman on the gun detail testified that not one single person that was arrested for violating the State of Illinois Gun Registration Law in the City of Chicago, to his knowledge, had ever been sentenced to jail. This is the Bill that attempts to deal with the gun offender, rather than the gun. So I would suggest that anybody who feels that something ought to be done about the problem with guns, particular hand guns, should get on this Bill and vote 'aye'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Barnes."

Barnes: "Thank you very much. Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I am one who considers that we have a great problem as it relates to hand guns and the gravity thereof, but I think that you better take a look at this Bill. I think everybody better listen. On the first conviction for this particular kind of charge, yes, there is a one day sentence for a Class 'A' misdemeanor, but on any convictions



thereafter, you're talking about a Class '4' felony. One of the reasons that many of the people in that gun court in Chicago is not being sentenced on these kind of charges is because by in large, they're not the kind of people that are committing crimes. You're talking about businessmen, small businessmen, salesmen, insurancemen that have to carry a lot of money on their person. Now these people get stopped for various reasons and therefore end up in gun court with a registered gun. Now the point is, is that under this, yes, the first time if a Class 'A' misdemeanor, but the second time it's a Class '4' felony. So I think you better think about what you're doing because this Bill will not get to the person you want to get to. There is no way. You simply will be giving records to hard working law abiding citizens and I don't think that we should do that. You're talking about one day to one year. You're penalizing the people that you're trying to protect. I think on an issue like this I would vote 'no' and I would suggest that you do the same."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Marovitz."

Marovitz: "I'd like to make one point clear to Representative Barnes and anybody else who may be not sure what this provides. The charge is a Class 'A' misdemeanor regardless of what the penalty is. It makes no difference; it's a Class 'A' misdemeanor whether you put them in jail or whether you don't put them in jail and a subsequent crime is gonna be the same penalty, irregardless of what you're charging them with the first time. We're just making sure, we're providing that for the first time, for a Class 'A' misdemeanor, which would be whether he went to jail or he didn't, he's going to spend at least one day in jail. For all of us who see the crime rate going up and people in our districts afraid to walk outside, it's about time that we get tough and here's a place where we're saying to the judges, 'It's about time we put these people who carry concealed weapons in jail.' We're taking away the judges' discretion and making sure that these people don't get back on the streets the very same day to commit these crimes over again. It's a misdemeanor, irregardless. We're not changing that and I don't think that anybody should be deceived. It's a good Bill and I would ask everybody to cast a 'green' vote."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, according to the Statute, and I think many people are wondering whether they would be prevented from carrying a gun in their home or in their place of business or their land. According to the Statute, this only refers to ah...carrying a concealed weapon in any vehicle or on or about his person. It says 'except when on his land or his his own home, or fixed place of business, any pistol, revolver or other firearm.' So you can still carry a gun in your home. You can still carry a gun on your land. You can still carry a gun in your fixed place of business even if this Bill is passed. I urge your consideration."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I would like to reiterate what Bill Marovitz said because I think many were confused over Gene Barnes's explanation of vote. This in no way changes the present law as to misdemeanors and felonies. That doesn't change at all. All we're talking about is our penalties. Now my first term in the legislature, I remember I went to the Judiciary Committee and I had a toy pistol in my pocket and I was trying to explain to the Members of the Judiciary Committee how dangerous it is when one might lose his temper and have a weapon on their person and in that Judiciary Committee and later on, by action in the House and the Senate, we passed it a Bill whereby it's a minimum \$250.00 fine ah... in carrying a concealed weapon. I know of no court that really enforces that fine and that is where the problem really lies. Very often you've heard that the courts are not assessing the proper penalties. This is one more instance when we can tell the court, 'We realize these are serious offenses'. We've got Bills here that are going to try and outlaw ammunition and outlaw guns. We know that they're not going to pass. At least we have here a Bill whereby we're going to penalize the wrong doer. The person who we shouldn't have any pity for. The person carrying that concealed weapon. I urge you to support this. If anything, the only amendment on after this is that if any judge didn't ah.. live up to this one day sentence, put the judge in for thirty days and then we'll find out that the law is going to work."



It's not going to work if the judges don't adhere to it. Let's show the judiciary that we want at least one day in jail for this very serious offense."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Meyer."

Meyer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd just like to point out ah.. looking at that board that there is several other Bills in this General Assembly dealing with abolition of hand guns and I suspect that most of the Sponsors of that legislation and the proponents of it, aren't voting for this legislation."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Representative Merlo."

Merlo: "Well, I ah... I would only like to close ah....you know, I'm against mandatory imposition, I really am. However, somewhere along the line ah.. we've got to make a judgement is we're going to maintain a sane society. I just want to tell you that in excess to 28 Bills that have already been introduced in the Congress of the United States, all of them directed towards registration, confiscation, prohibiting importation, manufacturing and banning sales and none of them have jelled, none of them at all because of the strong lobbyists. I think this is the only fair approach and I said before; ah.. we're asking for just two years to see if this in some way will deter the crimes in the street and I ask for your favorable support. I would like to see 89 votes on that board."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Representative Collins."

Collins: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, it was noted with regard to who might be voting for this and in explaining my vote, I am one of the Co-Chief Sponsors of 'ban the hand gun legislation' and I am voting 'green' on this matter for exactly that reason and I agree that we do not enforce the laws that are on the books now with regard to offenders using hand guns and I believe that there are a number of voting 'yes' on this Bill for the very reason that we agreed that those laws should be enforced and this is one way to make clear we wanta' see them enforced. We would like to see the hand guns eliminated entirely and because we're voting on 'green' on this, we hope we'll have your support on that one to."



Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Representative Borchers, 'aye'. Take the record. On this question there are 91 'aye' and 41 'no' and this Bill having received the constitutional majority is hereby declared passed. Representative Kornowicz, the replacement for Representative Lemke is voting the switch at that desk and although his name has Lemke's name up on the board, it really is Representative Kornowicz. Representative Peters."

Peters: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, a number of years ago, when I happened to be working for the Office of the Cook County Sheriff, Mr. Kornowicz, who is now a Member of this Body, ah... if I might say again ah... a number of years ago...."

Speaker Redmond: "Give the gentleman some order, please."

Peters: "A number of years ago when I worked for the Cook County Sheriff's Office, Ed Kornowicz might remember, he was my supervisor in a job that I had there and now that he is on that side of the aisle and I'm on this side of the aisle, I welcome him heartedly to our ranks. Good seeing you here, Ed."

Speaker Redmond: "187, Is Representative Friedrich here? Representative Leinenweber, I'm sorry."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 187, Leinenweber. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Municipal Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 187 is an amendment to the Municipal Code, which eliminates the requirement of notifying the fire protection district or a public library district of annexation proceedings when the annexing municipality does not provide fire protection or public libraries. The law now requires notice by certified or registered mail or by personal service or intent to annex property to any fire protection district or library district in which the property may lie. Now the intention of this is that the districts are to be notified in the event their tax base is going to be effected. The Bill requires the notification whether or not there is going to be any effect of the tax base because of in the event a municipality does not provide fire protection or library district services, then the fire protection district or the library



district will continue to serve it. There is no opposition to the Bill. It came out of the Sub-Committee ah... or Cities and Villages Committee unanimously. It will save municipalities money through postage and attorney's fees and time and effort in determining ah... overlapping districts ah... determining whether partial of a property is in a district. It's a kind of a clean-up measure. Nobody opposes it. The library districts support the Bill and to my knowledge the fire protection districts ah... do not oppose the Bill and I would urge its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Any questions? The question is shall House Bill 187 pass. Those in favor vote 'aye' and those opposed vote 'no'. Representative Kempiners."

Kempiners: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Am I recognized to ask questions of the Sponsor?"

Speaker Redmond: "Yes."

Kempiners: "Ah... if I understand the digest correctly, what all this applies to ah... is if the ah.. let's say that the City of Joliet did not provide fire service and they annexed part of the East Joliet Fire Protection District, they would not have to notify that district as long as they were not providing alike service?"

Leinenweber: "That's correct."

Kempiners: "O'kay, thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 107 'ayes' and no 'nays' and the Bill having received the constitutional majority is hereby declared passed. Representative Mann, 'aye'. McLendon, 'aye'. Calvo, 'aye'. Fennessey, 'aye'. McLendon... Schoeberlein, 'aye'. Garmisa, Downs, Representative Cunningham, 'aye'. House Bill 212."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 212....."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Griesheimer."

Fredric B. Selcke: "A Bill for an Act to amend the Criminal Code of 1961. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Griesheimer, for what purpose do you rise?"

Griesheimer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise on a point of personal



inquiry or privilege ah... as the case may be."

Speaker Redmond: "State your point."

Griesheimer: "To one of our freshman legislators who got up today and gave great laudatory remarks to the ah.... rather unusual restaurant we have in the basement, he wasn't privileged to hear my comments two years ago about it and I personally haven't changed my opinion too much, but I'm just inquiring at this time, since we are out to set all sets of records for late evening work, it would be nice to have a place where we can get a bad cup of coffee or some stale milk and I was wondering if there has been any provision made to have a few employees down there so that if we'd like a cup of coffee during the wee hours of the morning when we work, ah... we might be able to get them between now and the end of June."

Speaker Redmond: "I was under the impression that they would be open today, but we'll make sure that they will be open hereafter on any evening that we're going to be working."

Griesheimer: "I'd rather not have them open of the hereafter. I'd rather ah..... no, that's not very nice ah.... but I couldn't resist it."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Jaffe."

Jaffe: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, ah... House Bill 212 ah... if you take a look at House Bill 212 and you take a look at the digest, I'd like to point out that the amendment is now the Bill. So if you'll please keep that in mind; the amendment is now the Bill. Basically what House Bill 212 does is that it tightens up the eavesdrop and wire tap law in this particular state. At the present time, ah.. you know, it's the opinion of many that the law goes too far. Eavesdropping and wire tapping is permitted with the permission of the State's Attorney only ah.. and one party. You do not have to have, and I would like to stress this, you do not have to have, in the State of Illinois, any court order for wire tap today. All you have to have is the consent of one party and the State's Attorney. Basically what House Bill 212 does is change the wire tap laws considerably in that now you will have to have one party consent and a court order. In addition to that, you'll have to



have..... court review and the courts will be subjective to report to the court administrator. There're provisions in the Act for emergency situations, where you have an officer whose life might be in danger ah.... he can go in with a bug on him when he makes an arrest, but he to has to go into court a little bit later and he too has to tell the court the reasons for the wire tap. This Bill was actually a product of a Sub-Committee ah... made up of Representatives Getty, Palmer, Leinenweber, Holewinski and Chaired by Representative Mann and it came out of the Judiciary II Committee by an 18 to 1 vote. I really know of no opposition to this Bill and I would solicit your support."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "I would just echo that the Sub-Committee make-up ah... the fact that a unanimous Bill came out must mean that somebody didn't understand the Bill, but I think it is a good Bill and what it does is provide a tightening of the procedure of eavesdropping by adopting the federal rule. The federal government ah... seems to get along well with it and it was the feeling of the Sub-Committee that the particular procedures that are in use under the federal law would be good for Illinois so I would also urge an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kosinski."

Kosinski: "Mr. Speaker, will the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates that he will."

Kosinski: "Mr. Jaffe, I did understand that the provisions of the amendment properly cover the police officer who may be in jeopardy of his life go in on a buy, is that correct?"

Jaffe: "Yes, that's correct."

Kosinski: "Then I can vote for this Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Simms."

Simms: "Mr. Speaker, if the Sponsor would yield for a couple of questions?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates that he will."

Simms: "Representative Jaffe, let me ask you a hypothetical question.

In a case of an individual, where there has been threatening phone calls to that individual; at the present time through the permission of the State's Attorney and police department, they can attach ah.....



electronic devices. In the case of ah... obscene phone calls, threatening phone calls, etc; would this still allow this type of situation?"

Jaffe: "Yes, the only difference would be that you would have to have a court order on it."

Simms: "Well, would this to a great degree ah... handicap law enforcement people in the cases of these situations where ah.... let me rephrase the question. How long usually does it take to get a court order for such wire tapping permission?"

Jaffe: "Well, you know, you can get a court order in a matter of hours depending upon where you wire. You can have the court order for a certain length of time."

Simms: "Oh, o'kay. That answers my question."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Deuster."

Deuster: "I wonder if the Sponsor would yield to just two questions?"

In reading the synopsis, you would get the idea that this is a ridiculous Bill because all parties to a conversation would have to consent and I gather that the original Bill has been completely redone or sustantially redone. Is that correct?"

Jaffe: "Yes, I indicated to you that the amendment is now the Bill, Representative Deuster."

Deuster: "Now even though I share your concern about civil liberties, I'm wondering ah.... I'm not so sure that a court order is that easy to obtain. If you received an assassination threat or a threat of violence on a ah.... a late Saturday night, you're going to have a hard time finding a judge and getting a court order and I'm wondering if this isn't really a substantial interference with the ability of our police to protect citizens."

Jaffe: "Let me say to you that the I.B.I. testified before the Committee and they said that they could live with it very easily and no police official every ah.... every told us that it would be an interference. As a matter of fact, I think that most of them said that they could live with this and they can go along with it and ah... no problem."

Speaker Redmond: "Are you ready for the question? The question is shall this Bill pass. Those in favor vote 'aye' and those opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this



question there are 120 'ayes' and 5 'nays' and the Bill having received the constitutional majority is hereby declared passed. 214."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 214, Palmer."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madison, 'aye'. Representative Dunn, 'aye'."

Fredric B. Selcke: "Is Palmer here?"

Speaker Redmond: "Take that one out of the record. Is Representative Rayson here? Rayson, 245. 316, Representative Palmer. Not here. Representative Caldwell? Priority of Call. 334."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 334, Caldwell. A Bill for an Act to add Section 4 (a) to the Illinois Small Business Purchasing Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Caldwell."

Caldwell: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, ah... House Bill 334 amends the Illinois Small Business Purchasing Act. It adds a Section, similar to Section 8 (a) of the Federal Small Business Act, providing that the Department of General Services make contract with any state agency to provide procurement functions for that agency and may place contracts with small businesses for the goods and services to be procured. This Bill was heard in Committee and ah... there was one amendment added. We changed the word 'shall' to 'may' and that was the amendment that came out of Committee, I think without any opposition. I move its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is shall this Bill pass? All in favor vote 'aye' and opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 120 'aye' and 1 'nay' and the Bill having received the constitutional majority is hereby declared passed. 345, E.M. Barnes."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 345, Pierce ah.... or Barnes, excuse me. An Act to amend the Fair Employment Practice Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Barnes."

Barnes: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, House Bill 345 is a very simple Bill. The Bill does exactly what it says. It was amended and it only addresses itself to



discharges that are general ah... under honorable conditions or undesirable. What it says, ah... it makes it an unfair labor practice to discriminate a veteran with a discharge that falls within those categories in terms of him receiving employment. It's a very simple Bill. It's a Bill that addresses itself to a problem that we know exists and I would solicit the support of the House for this Bill. I ah... as far as I know there is no opposition to this Bill. I've spoken with Members of the various veterans groups and they do not have opposition. They support this concept."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tuerk."

Tuerk: "Mr. Speaker, would the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates that he will."

Tuerk: "Does this apply to dishonorable and bad conduct discharges?"

Barnes: "Absolutely not. It did not in the form that it was introduced and it did not ah... Representative Simms added an amendment, which further clarified it and it does not address itself to that at all. That is taken out of it completely."

Tuerk: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Winchester."

Winchester: "Mr. Speaker, will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Redmond: "He says he will."

Winchester: "What is the difference between an unfavorable discharge and a dishonorable discharge?"

Barnes: "Oh, quite a bit. The difference is that this Bill only addresses itself to discharges which fall into two categories other than honorable and one is general, under honorable conditions. Another one is undesirable. These are administrative discharges. The difference is the last two categories, which you may be thinking about, bad conduct or dishonorable, which is punitive. That's not in this Bill at all. It's taken out."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Deuster."

Deuster: "I have one question. As I remember, ah... we passed the same Bill ah... two years ago and I was wondering what happened to that Bill."

Barnes: "Well, Representative Deuster, that's a long story, but one



of the things that happened to that Bill is the reason that they amended the procedure in the Senate to eliminate proxy voting. The proxy voting killed it in Committee."

Deuster: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Are you ready for the question? The question is shall this Bill pass. All in favor say 'aye' ah... or vote 'aye' and all opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Representative Kosinski."

Kosinski: "Mr. Speaker, may I explain my vote?"

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Kosinski: "It's my feeling, ladies and gentlemen of this Assembly, that it's important that labor absorb these people. The alternative is of course to put them on the public dole. I would much rather have them work at some useful capacity in labor and it pleases me to vote 'yes'."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Representative Simms."

Simms: "Well, Mr. Speaker, to briefly explain my vote, I did put an amendment on this Bill which did take out part of the objection about the bad conduct provision and I think that the Bill is acceptable and I think that it does solve ah... a very needed purpose. Some of these people do need employment and I do feel that they do need a second chance and I do feel that this will go a long way towards solving that."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Representative Deuster."

Deuster: "Mr. Speaker, just briefly, in explaining my 'no' vote. It is my understanding that this discrimination includes asking a question and I don't know why we should take away the right of an employer to ask a question to a serviceman ah... 'How come? How come you got this special kind of a discharge?' I believe and ah... although the Sponsor may ah.. answer that, that is my concern. I under..... and that is discrimination, yes, but it's simply having someone satisfy himself ah... as to what the reasons might be."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 95 'aye' and 21 'nay' and the



Bill having received the constitutional majority is hereby declared passed. 354, Representative Pierce."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 354. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act in regard to judgements and degrees. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pierce."

Pierce: "Mr. Speaker, House Bill 354 ah... removes the ah... \$2.00 fee for filing, for filing a satisfaction of judgement. It's ah... believed and this is ah... sponsored by the Joint Bar Association Programs, ah.. it's believed that by removing ah... the fee we will encourage creditors to file these on behalf of the debtors and therefore clear up old judgements that hang around and ruin the credit rating and ah... foul up the titles of people that had judgements against them ah... once they pay off the judgements."

Speaker Redmond: "Are you ready for the question? The question is shall this Bill pass. Those in favor vote 'aye' and opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question there are 115 'aye' and 4 'nay' and the Bill having received the constitutional majority is hereby declared passed. 367."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 367."

Speaker Redmond: "Take that out of the record. I don't think that Representative Hirschfeld is here. 372, ah... that's Hirschfeld. 375, Stearney. Is he here? 376, Stearney. Out of the record. 378 ah... at the request of the Sponsor ah... it's out of the record. 382, Hirschfeld. Out of the record. 396, Representative Younge."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 396, Younge. An Act to create the Illinois depressed areas in land use and community development authority and so forth. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Younge."

Younge: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House of Representatives, the House Bill 396 would create the land use depressed areas redevelopment authority. This authority that is created under this Act would be a public developer that would in conjunction with private enterprise and local and state and federal agencies, come up with a comprehensive redevelopment plan for depressed areas. Those are areas



that suffer from outstanding and advanced stages of blight and decay and deterioration, unemployment and a dwindling tax base. The authority would be responsible for a long range comprehensive plan for the regrowth and the redevelopment of these areas. The plans would be the result of a cooperative effort of the local advisory group working together with the land use and redevelopment authority and with the various state agencies and if the local advisory group and if the authority then approves the redevelopment plan it would be presented to the General Assembly. The redevelopment plan would have as one of its components a financial plan that would include the bonding request. Should the General Assembly approve the plan then the redevelopment would occur. I look upon 396 as an outcry from the depressed areas of Illinois for help in redevelopment and ah... I move the passage of this Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Griesheimer."

Griesheimer: "Mr. Speaker, would the Sponsor yield for a couple of questions?"

Speaker Redmond: "She indicates that she will."

Griesheimer: "I'm questioning ah.. is the digest correct that this does not include the City of Chicago or any home rule units?"

Younge: "One of the amendments is an exemption of home rule ah....."

Griesheimer: "Mr. Speaker, I can't hear the answer."

Younge: "There has been an amendment filed exempting home rule units."

Griesheimer: "Then you're saying then that this does not apply to the City of Chicago or any other home rule unit?"

Younge: "It is not a limitation on home rule units."

Griesheimer: "Well, all of the depressed areas seem to be in the home rule units ah.... I don't see what the purpose of this Bill is."

Younge: "If a home rule unit shows to use the services of the authority then the home rule unit would have a right to do so. Comprehensive redevelopment cannot occur where it is not wanted and ah... the purpose of my accepting the home rule exemption was merely to say that should the City of Chicago or should any other depressed area or a part of a city wish to have the services of the authority and



its redevelopment process, it would be available, but if the local unit of government did not want it then it would not be forced on them."

Speaker Redmond: "Are you ready for the question? Representative Lundy."

Lundy: "Thank you Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House. I think that Representative Younger is to be commended for undertaking quite an ambitious project in ah... in putting this Bill together. It meets a very real need in her area and a very real need in many areas in the state. I think it could be an enormously useful vehicle for those communities that wish to use it. As Representative Younger pointed out; it is permissive. It provides a coordinating framework and a way to bring together resources in some of the terribly depressed areas in our state and I would urge an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McCourt."

McCourt: "Mr. Speaker, will the Sponsor please yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "She indicates that she will."

McCourt: "Ah.... what is the price tag on this Bill?"

Younger: "The price tag is \$450,000. \$150,000 for staff and 3 \$100,000 planning grants."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Telcser."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I rise to support Representative Younger's legislation. I agree with Representative Lundy. I think that it's legislation that's very sensitive to her part of the state. I frankly think that it's legislation which every Member of this House should support and I personally commend the Representative for being so concerned with her part of the state."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, there may be home rule units that need this type of legislation, but there are plenty of other areas that need it even worse and Mrs. Younger does know her area and there is a lot of depressed area in her area and I think that it is a very worthwhile piece of legislation. It's



permissive and I certainly urge an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ebbesen. The gentleman has moved the previous question. The question is shall the main question be put. All in favor say 'aye' and all opposed say 'no' and the 'ayes' have it. The question is shall House Bill 396 pass. All in favor vote 'aye' and those opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 134 'ayes' and 5 'nays' and the Bill having received the constitutional majority is hereby declared passed. 397."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 397, Getty."

Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative Getty in the Chamber? I understand that Representative Getty is ill. Take that one out of the record. Representative Bluthardt is on the ah.... election business.

Fennessey is also on the election contest, I believe. 470, Representative...oh, pardon me. Representative Fennessey. 416."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 416, Fennessey. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act relating to alcoholic liquors. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Fennessey."

Fennessey: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, 416 is a Bill that allows people to hold a liquor license to hold public office. At the present time our liquor laws are very discriminatory against people holding liquor licenses. This is the same Bill that I had last year and it's the same provision that ah.... no one in the law enforcement agency may hold a license and I ask for a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "Are you ready for the question? Representative Dunn."

Dunn: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates that he will."

Dunn: "My question is ah.... if this legislation passes will it be possible for ah.... ah... for example, a mayor to hold a liquor license?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Fennessey."

Fennessey: "Not within his jurisdiction, no."



Dunn: "Well, where else? ⁷ Anywhere else?"

Fennessey: "He could hold a license in some other area, yes."

Dunn: "O'kay. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tipsword."

Tipsword: "Would the gentleman yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates that he will."

Tipsword: "Mr. Fennessey, this would not abrogate, however, any local ordinances that would require that the liquor license holders be residents of the area ah... which governs the issuance of the license, does it?"

Fennessey: "No, it wouldn't have anything to do with that."

Tipsword: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Are you ready for the question? The question is shall this pass? All in favor vote 'aye' and opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Representative Geo-Karis, 'aye' from the Democratic side. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 91 'aye' and 5 'nay' and the Bill having received the constitutional majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 470, Representative Tuerk."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 470, Tuerk. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tuerk."

Tuerk: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, House Bill 470 applies to school districts organized under Chapter 33. It's a permissive Bill, which would allow school districts to hold the elections ah... school elections, at the same time with the city and the county. In my particular area ah.. it would save ah... the school district some \$32,000 to \$35,000 everytime we have an election. I would move for favorable support of the House."

Speaker Redmond: "Are you ready for the question? Representative Jaffe."

Jaffe: "Can I just ask one question, Fred? Now in my area ah... we elect school board members every year. So ah... would this mean that on one year we would have an election on one day and then on



the next ah....."

Tuerk: "This applies to school districts organized under Chapter 33 and I don't think your school district is, Aaron."

Jaffe: "Oh, is this only Peoria, is that it?"

Tuerk: "It's only Peoria with the possible exception of Springfield and Rockford, but that would have to have some legal interpretation."

Jaffe: "I see."

Tuerk: "To my knowledge, it's only Peoria."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is shall this Bill pass. Those in favor vote 'aye' and opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 128 'aye' and 1 'nay' and the Bill having received the constitutional majority is hereby declared passed. 484."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 484. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act to regulate campaign financing and amending certain Acts in connection therewith. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Williams."

Williams: "484 addresses itself to the problem that ah... making it necessary for the County Clerk and so forth to send out the packet that we're all familiar with ah... and it cost about \$4.00 a packet and postage of about \$2.50. There are about 1,041 school districts in the state, 330 park districts, and 69 library districts and if each of the districts has approximately four to six candidates ah... the cost of the materials to the taxpayer is more than the candidate even spends in his own election. These units of local government ah... as we know, ah... schools, park districts, libraries ah... neither receive \$1,000 nor spend \$1,000 in their campaigns. The average spent by a candidate is about \$30.00. The Bill here simply says that the Clerks in these units of local governments, instead just mail a notice of obligation to each candidate stating that if they should qualify, that they have an obligation to file and the necessary material and the forms may be picked up at the County Clerk's Office. Just a few days ago ah... you saw a letter here from the County Clerk of Cook County saying that he supports this. It's a good Bill and ask for the support of the House. I'll answer any



questions."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? Representative Simms."

Simms: "Well, ah... let me ask the Sponsor a couple of questions. Representative Williams, this is just now ah... for school boards?"

Williams: "Well, actually it would apply to anyone who would not ah... well, in other words, you're ah.. let's see, ah... you would be under the obligation as the Act is ah... you know, at the present time, if you receive \$1,000 or, but what this eliminates is the necessity that the Election Authority has to mail out this thing as soon as they get your name."

Simms: "Well, the problem I have with the Bill ah... speaking to the Bill is that this might be the case in many of your smaller communities, etc., but in some of your larger communities such as Rockford, Peoria, Waukegan, Springfield, etc. ah... candidates for some of these offices spend way over \$1,000 for the school board or for the park board, etc. In fact, I would assume in the districts such as Rockford or Peoria or Waukegan, it would very easy to say that the average could be maybe \$3,000 to ah... for these individuals to seek office and so I think the responsibility is the Secretary of State has to send these forms and I think they should to the Members of the General Assembly and State Officials, notifying us of our campaign obligations and we are aware of the statute. Many of these individuals in these other ah... seeking lesser offices are not going to be aware of the requirement. So I think that the provision should remain as the same and the requirement for sending these forms should be retained and I think there should be a great deal of thought and consideration before we enact this Bill."

Williams: "If I may respond to that, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Williams: "This does not eliminate that requirement. The only thing it does eliminate is the requirement that this be mailed immediately to the candidate. In other words, the candidate is under the obligation that he has to file ah.. if he is going to receive a \$1,000 or spend a \$1,000."

Simms: "Well, Members of the General Assembly receive that, correct?"



Also other State Officials. Well, on the same token I think many of these other positions are not quite as important as the State Legislature or a State Office, but to the people seeking those offices and also the responsibility to file those is just as important as an issue and I think they should be afforded every opportunity of the law that we enjoy. I think that it's only the responsibility of the election officials and I think the County Clerk should retain this responsibility and they should conform to what the campaign financing law is and that way we don't have anybody running down to the legislature saying, 'We did not know that you had to fall under this requirement or we did not have the forms available.' It takes out all of that area of suspense and I would urge a 'no' vote."

Williams: "I think you are missing the point."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Will the Sponsor yield for a couple of questions?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Geo-Karis: "Jack, ah... under your Bill are you eliminating the requirement that either the County Official or the Secretary of State, with whom nominating petitions are filed?"

Williams: "I'm glad you asked that question because that will answer ah... Representative Simms. I am not eliminating that obligation or requirement on the part of County Clerk or the Secretary of State's Office."

Geo-Karis: "Then what are you doing with this?"

Williams: "I am eliminating the necessity that as soon as he receives that statement of candidacy, that you have to be mailed out the packet. He will be mailed out a notice of obligation under the Act, that if you spend a \$1,000 or receive a \$1,000 that you must file a campaign ah... well, you know, that A-1 ah.. the first one would be the A-1 form and so on."

Geo-Karis: "Well, with all of the confusion that we've had about forms to file, don't you think Jack, that we'd be better off if we retained the original law honored because you recall two years ago, we had problems because people didn't file certain forms because they didn't realize that they had to file them again when they were running for



office. Don't you think that we might end up having more confusion if we eliminate the law that you're trying to eliminate?"

Williams: "We are not eliminating anything, Adeline, other than the fact that you don't have to spend the \$6.50 for people just to take this material and throw it down the drain. Here's a good way to save hundreds of thousands of dollars because a lot of this material just ends up in the waste basket. It does not remove in any way the obligations under the Campaign Disclosure Act."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I looked this Bill over and I think that it is very good. I ah...."

Speaker Redmond: "Are you ready for the question?"

Walsh: "Just killed your Bill, Jack. Let me just say this. In my legislative district, there are about 30 incorporated towns and in those towns, cities, and villages, I'll bet there aren't 1% of the candidates for election who are required to file disclosures of campaign contributions. These people are all, at great expense, sent forms for the purpose of doing this ah... and I think the Bill is reasonable. The Bill provides for notice in case they do spend the money and in case they are required to file and I can see nothing at all wrong with it. I think it is a very good idea... It's something that should have been thought of a couple of years ago when we passed the Campaign Disclosure Act and I urge your support."

Speaker Redmond: "Are you ready for the question? Representative Totten."

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I wonder if I could ask a question of the Sponsor."

Speaker Redmond: "You may."

Totten: "Jack, in your amendment to the present Election Code, can you tell me why you indicated that it may be obtained at the Office of the County Clerk and not the Election Authority that is responsible for issuing the forms, such as the municipality or the school board?"

Williams: "Yes, I can answer that. Section I-3, Chapter 46 ah... defines Election Authority to mean a County Clerk; a Board of Election Commissioners, or a Clerk of a unit of local government or school district



having election jurisdiction."

Totten: "Does that mean that ah.... a member running for the school board ah... in my school district would receive the notice from the school board and could obtain the forms there if they were going to spend over a \$1,000."

Williams: "Yes."

Totten: "It would not require them to go to the County Clerk's Office to ah...."

Williams: "No, that would be the Election Authority, then under the statute."

Totten: "O'kay. I think under those circumstances that this is a good Bill also."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is shall this Bill pass. All those in favor vote 'aye' and opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 115 'aye' and 10 'nay' and the Bill having received the constitutional majority is hereby declared passed. 489."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 489."

Speaker Redmond: "Take that out of the record."

Fredric B. Selcke: "Out of the record."

Speaker Redmond: "491."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 491, Kempiners. A Bill for an Act to revise the law in relation to counties. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kempiners."

Kempiners: "Thank you Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, this Bill is a very simple one and the digest is accurate. It basically will permit counties to require, where they so desire, to door to door peddlers to register with the County Clerk and that the County Board may establish reasonable hours. I had a similar Bill in the last Session, which the ah.... direct sellers opposed. I sat down with them and we came up with an agreement and now they no longer oppose it. In fact, they do support this Bill and I would urge your support."

Speaker Redmond: "Are you ready for the question? Representative McGrew."



McGrew: "Thank you very much. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates that he will."

McGrew: "Ah.... would you tell me if they are in support of this now or they no longer oppose it now?"

Kempiners: "They are in support."

McGrew: "O'kay, thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is shall this Bill pass. All those in favor will vote 'aye' and opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Representative Kent."

Kent: "Am I too late to ask a question."

Speaker Redmond: "No, proceed."

Kent: "Representative Kempiners, what about the ah.. statewide sellers that we had so much trouble with last year."

Kempiners: "If they are required to ah... the language defining these people are taken right out of the Municipal Code. Municipalities now have the right to require this type of registration and...."

Kent: "And you only have to register or do they have to pay a fee?"

Kempiners: "All they can require is that they register with the County Clerk and the only other thing that the County Board can do is to establish hours within the county so that they don't go around at you know, about 10:00 at night and this sort of thing."

Kent: "But there is no fee?"

Kempiners: "No fee."

Kent: "O'kay. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Representative McGrew."

McGrew: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. I'd like to explain my 'no' vote. I think that we are boardering hypocrisy and absurdity here because as you stop to think for a moment, you'll realize that we do not have nice neat lines drawn whereby a door to door salesman will know when he has left one county and is now in the jurisdiction of another County Board. So consequently, he will have to go and register for a whole area or ah... he may not know what area he is in. If he comes and the Clerk happens to have that day for a holiday, as they have many, he simply would not be able to get such a permit



and so I think that this is very unpractical and very unworkable and I would suggest a 'no' vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 124 'aye' and 10 'nay' and the Bill having received the constitutional majority is hereby declared passed. 495."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 495, Peters. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Peters."

Peters: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, this is the same Bill that passed last Session by 140 some odd votes when it was introduced by Representative Jaffe. What it ends up doing is it ah... brings some conformity to our election law by permitting an individual eighteen years of age to run for membership in the school board."

Speaker Redmond: "Are you ready for the question? Representative Tuerk."

Tuerk: "Would the Sponsor yield? What was the amendment that was adopted? I'm sorry, I don't have it in front of me."

Peters: "I'm sorry, Representative Tuerk. The amendment was added by Representative Skinner and it makes the same application for Junior College Districts."

Tuerk: "Oh."

Peters: "The question is shall this Bill pass? All in favor vote 'aye' and opposed vote 'nay'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take Representative Luft. Representative Brinkmeier."

Brinkmeier: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I ah.. I was one of those people that advocated lowering the voting age and I guess I'm being contradicting of what I was talking about then, but I'd like to call your attention to the fact that your authorizing youngsters in high school who are still there to maybe determine who their teachers are. In the small communities around the state they will have a vote in whether or not their going to retain teachers. I just don't believe that this is wise and I would like for you to think just a moment about this. I would urge a 'no' vote."



Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 105 'aye' and 25 'nay' and the Bill having received the constitutional majority is hereby declared passed. 518."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 518. A Bill for an Act to create the Illinois Impoundment Control Act and establish procedures and so forth. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lundy. Take it out of the record. 522, Representative Friedrich ah.. he's not here. Take it out of the record. 524..... 535, Representative Mugalian. Is he here? 537, Representative Kempiners."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 537, Kempiners. A Bill for an Act to amend the Grain Dealers Licensing Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kempiners."

Kempiners: "Thank you ladies and gentlemen of the House, again this is a simple Bill and if it hadn't been for an amendment, it would have been on the Consent Calendar. It has the agreement of the Illinois Agricultural Association of the Department of Agriculture and it doesn't change any requirement on the grain dealers except it does permit a small grain dealer, ah.. instead of filing a 6% surety bond to file the equivalent in a certificate of deposit made payable to the Department of Agriculture and I would ask for your support."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is shall this Bill pass. All those in favor vote 'aye' and opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 129 'ayes' and 1 'nay' and the Bill having received the constitutional majority is hereby declared passed. 546."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 546, Matijevich. A Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker and ladies and gentlemen of the House, House Bill 546 is a simple Bill. Under the present law ah... assessors and deputy assessors are eligible for \$300.00 if they attend and



complete ah... successfully a program and receive a Illinois Certified Assessing Officers Certificate. Bordering new members are allowed to participate, but they don't receive the additional \$300.00 per year compensation and it is felt that if this is allowed to them more border review members would participate and the end result would be better performance. I would appreciate your support of House Bill 546."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Will the gentlemen yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates that he will."

Skinner: "John, I wonder if you remember the debate this morning over the amendment which Representative Beatty put on his Bill, which would raise the bonus for the Certified Illinois Assessing Officer's designation from \$300.00 to \$1,000. Now do you intend for this increase if his Bill passes to be \$1,000 for border review members also?"

Matijevich: "I wasn't here when that debate went on. In other words, there was a debate whereby the \$300.00 would be increased to \$1,000?"

Skinner: "He has a Bill that originally took it to \$500.00 and he amended it this morning to take it to \$1,000. Now I'm just asking ah... well, since the border review members are part time officials, whether you intend them to get \$300.00 or \$1,000."

Matijevich: "Well, I would intend to carry on with my Bill as \$300.00 and I don't think that I would have supported the one for \$500.00 to \$1,000."

Skinner: "I don't think you would have either."

Speaker Redmond: "Are you ready for the question? The question is shall this Bill pass. All those in favor vote 'aye' and opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 117 'aye' and 2 'nay' and the Bill having received a constitutional majority is hereby declared passed. 580."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 580, Ron Hoffman. He's gone."

Speaker Redmond: "Take that out. Representative Grotberg."

Grotberg: "Thank you ladies and gentlemen of the House. With leave



of the House, Mr. Speaker, could we hear 600 and 601 together ah... even though they're out of ah..."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objections?"

Grotberg: "They're of the same subject matter and it will save the time of the House."

Speaker Redmond: "Leave granted."

Grotberg: "Ladies and gentlemen of the House, House Bill 600 amends...."

Speaker Redmond: "Wait a minute."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 601. An Act in relation to county zoning. Third Reading of the Bill."

Grotberg: "Yes, thank you, Mr. Speaker, Mr. Clerk and ladies and gentlemen of the House, House Bill 600 amends the Municipal Code in the Zoning Section in relation to notice. House Bill 601 does the same thing for the County Code in the Zoning Notice Act and both Bills simply narrow the playing field for publication so that newspapers of the ah... that publish in the area closest to the zoning matter shall be first considered ah... for zoning notice ah... legal notices by the Municipal Zoning Board or the County Zoning Board and the Board of Appeals and ah..... that's all there is to it and I would move the adoption of these two Bills and request a green vote for these wonderful people Bills that ah... settle an old quarrel that's been going on ah... when you serve notice in Calumet City for action that's in Evanston or ah... it could happen downstate. These are statewide Bills and I would appreciate your support."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Will the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates that he will."

Houlihan: "How many times does the notice have to be published under House Bill 600?"

Grotberg: "That's been amended back to once, Mr. Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Your original Bill was what, twice?"

Grotberg: "Yes, and we struck that and put it back to once. One publication."

Houlihan: "That's the existing law?"

Grotberg: "Right."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Would the Sponsor yield for just one question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates that he will."

McClain: "John, on page 1 of House Bill 600, you've struck lines 28 through almost 31, which deleted the requirement for ah...populations less than 500. Ah... could you explain that to me, please?"

Grotberg: "Yes, Mr. McClain, that was stricken because it technically ah.... it's not germane anymore to the fact of publication in every county and municipality in the State of Illinois. The language that was stricken says that municipalities with less than 500 population in which no newspaper was published, publication may instead be ah... posted in three prominent places within the municipality. We now go back to the county; there are actually a newspaper publication in all of our 102 counties in Illinois."

McClain: "O'okay, thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Are you ready for the question? The question is shall House Bills 600 and 601 pass. All those in favor vote 'aye' and opposed vote 'no'. We'll have two Roll Calls. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 98 'aye' and ah... Representative Daniels, 'aye' and 8 'nay'... Representative Mulcahey, 'aye', Representative Mautino, 'aye', Representative Mann, 'aye' ah... 'no'.... what's the score now? On this question there's 100 'aye' and 8 'nay' and the Bill having received the constitutional majority.... these two Bills having received the constitutional majority is hereby declared passed.... are hereby declared passed. We have to have two Roll Calls here. 624. Is Representative Hanahan on the floor? We'll have to hold that one. Oh, pardon me."

Fredric B. Selcke: "House Bill 624. An Act to amend an Act in relation to state police. Third Reading of the Bill."

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this Bill would allow the state police to have four Assistant Superintendents be designated under law and there's a House Amendment that reworted the language, which permitted the Superintendent designate these ah... Assistant



Superintendents that would receive \$100.00 a month more than the Lieutenant Colonels that are now designated. We have increased the amount of state troopers over a period of ten years from approximately 800 state troopers to 1600 yet we have never increased the amount of administrative personnel that are necessary to operate a good and efficient state police force. This Bill is supported by the state troopers and the state police administration. I ask for a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan, for what purpose do you rise?"

Madigan: "Will the Speaker yield to a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "The Speaker won't, but the Sponsor will."

Madigan: "The ah... Sponsor. We're working late, Mr. Speaker. Representative Hanahan, will these four appointees be subject to conformation by the State Senate?"

Hanahan: "No, they won't."

Madigan: "Was that considered in the drafting of the Bill?"

Hanahan: "It never was questioned. We're talking about four assistants. Not Assistant Superintendent in the administrative ah..... we're talking about assistants to assist a superintendent. It doesn't affect home rule either, by the way."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, will the Sponsor take this Bill out of the record?"

Speaker Redmond: "Will you take this out of the record, Mr. Hanahan?"

Hanahan: "What is my final date on this Bill, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Redmond: "I think it's the 16th."

Hanahan: "That means that I've only got a couple of more days. Yes, I'll take it off."

Lechowicz: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the record. I don't know if you're interested in this, but since Tuesday including the last action, it appears that we have considered about 750 Bills. Who says that this isn't a deliberative Body? Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, I move that the House do now adjourn until 9:30 am. tomorrow morning."
