Speaker Redmond: "Good morning, never make a date with Adeline Geo-Karis, she'll stand you up."

John Paintor: "All those not entitled to the floor, will you, please, go to the Gallery."

Speaker Redmond: "The House will be in order and the members, please, be in their seats. We'll be led in prayer by the House Chaplain, Father Krueger."

Father Krueger: "In the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost. Amen. Oh, Lord, bless this House with thy service this day. I've been asked to say a prayer of thanksgiving for the recovery of Representative Garmisa. Blessed Saviour, we thank you for the illness of thy servant, Representative Garmisa, is safely past and he is able to rest in your abiding presence, relaxing every tension, releasing every care and anxiety, receiving more and more of your healing life into every part of his being. In moments of pain, he turned to you for strength, in times of loneliness, he felt your loving nearness; and, now, Oh, Blessed Lord, grant that your life and love and joy may flow through him the healing of others. In your name, Amen. Edward Gibbon's gave in 1776 the following reasons for the fall of the ancient Roman Empire: 1) the rapid increase of divorce; 2) the craze for pleasure; 3) higher and higher taxes; 4) building of gigantic arms, when the people . . . when the real enemy was the decadence of the people; and 5) the decay of religion, faith becoming a mere form. Speaker Redmond: "Roll Call for attendance. Agreed Resolutions."

Jack O'Brien: "House Resolution 251, Madigan. House Resolution 254,



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Grotberg. House Resolution 255, Polk. House Resolution 256, Fary.  
House Resolution 257, DiPrima. House Resolution 258, Kempiners.  
House Resolution 259, McPartlin. House Resolution 260, Meyer."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker and members of the House, House Resolution 251 commends Mr. Harold L. Pearlman, a Chicago attorney and philanthropist. House Resolution 254 commends Mr. Frank Virgis, a civic leader in Mr. Grotberg's district. House Resolution 255 commends the Illinois Association of Retarded Citizens. House Resolution 256 commends Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Gill upon their celebration of their 60th Wedding Anniversary. House Resolution 257 congratulates Michael Hilton upon his selection as the recipient of the . . . ah . . . Court of Honor of the National Council Boy Scouts of America. House Resolution 258 decreases that Saturday, June 21, shall be known as Professional Committee Staff Day of the Illinois House of Representatives. House Resolution 259 appears to be identical to a previous resolution on behalf of a Michael Hilton; and House Resolution 260 commends Mrs. Dorothy Shavors of Chicago. Mr. Speaker, I move the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions."

Speaker Redmond: "Rep . . . Representative Simms."

Simms: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, on a point of order, I look up at the board that there's 111 people here; and I know there's not 111 this morning. I might suggest we take a new Roll Call and nobody be placed on the Roll Call that's not here. Ah . . . I'm going to ask for a verification."

Speaker Redmond: "The motion is on the Agreed Resolutions. All in favor indicate by saying 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The Agreed Resolutions . . . Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like the Record to indicate that Representative Kozubowski, Leverenz, Laurino, Bluthardt, Collins, McPartlin, DiPrima, Huff, Miller and Mahar are to be put on the Roll Call and are present for the purposes of a quorum this morning."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Washburn. He's at . . . ah . . . Van-Duyne's desk."

Washburn: "Ah . . . Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I'd like to . . . ah . . . for



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the Record to show that Representative Kucharski and Porter are absent due to illness/accidents."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Simms."

Simms: "Well, on the Majority Leader's . . . ah . . . that was . . . there were . . . they can be present for purposes of per diem, but not for the purposes of establishing a quorum, that was not the agreement . . . ah . . . as of last Thursday. So I would object to that."

Speaker Redmond: "The objection will be noted in the Journal."

Simms: "Well, I mean . . . ah . . . you have to be here to be part of a quorum. We can't, at a later time if there is a call for a quorum, these people cannot be considered as being here if they're not."

Speaker Redmond: "Further resolutions."

Jack O'Brien: "House Resolution 250, Leon. House Resolution 252, DiPrima."

Speaker Redmond: "Committee on Assignments. Representative Leon."

Leon: "Mr. Speaker, on that House resolution that . . . ah . . . I introduced, I would ask leave to have the appropriate rule suspended and move for immediate adoption of the resolution. I have cleared it with the other side, and as long as we can . . . ah . . . have it adopted, I would appreciate it. Would the Clerk, please, read the resolution?"

Jack O'Brien: "House Resolution 250, whereas, there have been allegations by certain news media that a mass of funds has been perpetrated by an automobile dealer of this state; and, whereas, over a period of time federal and state agencies have investigated the alleged fraud; and, whereas, no satisfactory action has resulted from their effort; therefore, be it resolved that the House of Representatives of the 79th General Assembly of the State of Illinois that we urge the Commission of Banks and the Commission of Savings and Loans to cause an investigation to ascertain the procedure for possible legislation to prevent such actions from recurring and report to the General Assembly as soon as possible."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Leon."

Leon: "I . . . Mr. Speaker, I would ask that the appropriate rule be suspended for the immediate consideration and adoption of this House resolution."

Speaker Redmond: "Does he have leave? Hearing no objections . . ."



Leon: "I move for the immediate adoption, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved for the immediate adoption. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'. The 'ayes' have it; the . . . adopted. Consent Calendar, Second Reading, Second Day."

Jack O'Brien: "House . . . House Bill 948, a bill for an act to amend the Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the bill. House Bill 1107, a bill for an act to amend an act creating the Commissions of Survey and Problems Pertaining to Public Schools in the state. Second Reading of the bill. House Bill 1542, a bill for an act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the bill. House Bill 1758, a bill for an act to amend the Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the bill. House Bill 2152, a bill for an act to amend the Adult Education Act. Second Reading of the bill. House Bill . . . what I reported as House Bill 1542 should be House Bill 1543, a bill for an act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. House Bills, Second Reading. House Bill 70. Representative Duff."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 70, Duff."

Speaker Redmond: "Evidently, he's not here. 176, Representative Kosinski. 176."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 176, Kosinski, a bill for an act making appropriation to the Comptroller. Second Reading of the bill. One committee amendment amends House Bill 176 on page 1, line 24, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kosinski."

Kosinski: "Mr. Speaker, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, . . . ah . . . the committee amendment brings 176 in the line with the Substantive Bill 176 and changing effective date of this legislation. I ask for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman's moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 176. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'. The 'ayes' have it; the amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further."

Speaker Redmond: "No further amendments. Third Reading. 555."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 555, LaFleur, a bill for . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "555, LaFleur? Take it out of the Record. 680, Representative Skinner? I understand that a fiscal note has been requested



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on that and it has not been furnished. 732."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 732, Dave Jones, a bill for an act in relation to the Illinois State Fair. Second Reading of the bill."

Unknown: "Out of the Record."

Speaker Redmond: "What was that?"

Unknown: "Out of the Record."

Speaker Redmond: "Take that out of the Record. Kozubowski's on that Election Subcommittee, I believe. 895, is Representative G. L. Hoffman here? 954, Representative Farley here? 955, Representative Choate? 955."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 955, Choate, a bill for an act in relation to state payments to counties in which substantial areas of state and federal lands are located."

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the Record. How about 956. Out . . . take that out of the Record. 957, this time. Oh . . . 988, Representative Mudd here? 997, Representative Getty."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 997, Getty, a bill for an act to amend an act codifying the powers and duties of the Department of Mental Health."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Getty."

Jack O'Brien: "Second Reading of the bill. One committee amendment amends House Bill 997 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Getty."

Getty: "Mr. Speaker, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I would move for the adopti . . . adoption of the committee amendment. It clarifies a word which was misspelled . . . ah . . . or misstated in the original . . . ah . . . act."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 997. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Representative Houlihan."

Unknown: "Would Representative Houlihan tell us what that word was?"

Speaker Redmond: "J. Houlihan."

Houlihan: "'psychopharmacology'."

Unknown: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1013, Representative Katz. Fiscal note requested, hold that one. 1041."



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Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1041, Lechowicz, . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz."

Jack O'Brien: ". . . a bill for an act to amend an act in relation to state finance. Second Reading of the bill. One committee amendment . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz."

Jack O'Brien: ". . . amends House Bill 1041 on page 1 by deleting line 1 and 2 and inserting in lieu, thereof, the following: 'an act to amend certain acts to revise certain state financial procedures', and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, . . . ah . . . the Clerk's amendment, I move the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 1."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 1041. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'. The 'ayes' have it; the amendment's adopted. Any further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. 1047, Representative E. M. Barnes."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1047, E. M. Barnes, a bill for an act making appropriation of the Metropolitan Fair and Exhibition Authority. Second Reading of the bill. Committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. How about 1064, Representative Choate."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1064, Choate, a bill for an act to amend . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Take that out of the Record. Kosinski, 1079."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1079, Kosinski, a bill for an act making appropriations for the ordinary and contingent expense of the Dangerous Drugs Commission. Second Reading of the bill. Two committee amendments. Amendment Number 1 amends House Bill 1079 on page 1, line 12, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kosinski."

Kosinski: "Ah . . . Mr. Clerk, will you please read Amendment Number 1; I don't have a copy."

Jack O'Brien: "Amends House Bill 1079 on page 1, line 12, by deleting,



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'610,000', and inserting in lieu, thereof, '544,145'; and on page 1, line 14, by deleting, '40,900', and inserting in lieu, thereof, '38,446'."

Kosinski: "Ah . . . Mr. Chairman, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, this committee amendment prepared by staff is in order. I ask for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill . . . Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Will Representative Kosinski explain the amendment?"

Kosinski: "Its a reduction of \$32,000 from General Revenue Fund . . . ah . . . and make the appropriate changes for matching federal funds; and now, Mr. Chairman, I move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 1079. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Committee Amendment Number 2 amends House Bill 1079 on page 2 by inserting in between lines 20 and 21 the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kosinski."

Kosinski: "Is that, Mr. Clerk, the one that itemizes \$10,000 per organization? Ah . . . Mr. Chairman, there's been a reconsideration on that amendment . . . ah . . . to bulk some of the \$300,000 without definizing . . . definitizing \$10,000 per individual unit. I should like for this amendment tabled and the floor amendment, which will substitute it, adopted it. May we table Amendment Number 2?"

Speaker Redmond: "Does the gentleman have leave to table Amendment Number 2? Hearing no objections, leave granted."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 3, Ryan, amends House Bill 1079 on page 2 by inserting between lines 20 and 21 the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kosinski."

Kosinski: "Ah . . . Mr. Chairman, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, this is a substitute amendment. This Number 3 is a substitute amendment for Number 2, which, essentially, does the same things without the legal binding. I ask for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment Number 3 to House Bill 1079. All in favor say 'aye', and oppose 'no'. The



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'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1089, Representative Grotberg."

Grotberg: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, . . . ah . . . a point of personal inquiry."

Speaker Redmond: "State your point."

Grotberg: "Ah . . . Its that time of the year when at last night it erupted again regarding the nighttime food service; and I presume that we're going into food . . . ah . . . night sessions for some time to come. Ah . . . For the benefit of the members of the House and you, Mr. Speaker, I . . . ah . . . talked to this morning to Jim Taylor, who runs the food service downstairs and urged him and he agreed that he would, if necessary, may I if I can have your attention, folks, he would bring a cart up here into the back hallway where the Pages set up there or for wherever you want it, out in the rotunda; and . . . and have coffee, tea, makings of sandwiches, anything you want as long as we're in session, bring it closer to this body. Last night he had one customer up until 8 . . . from 6 until 8:00 o'clock, one customer . . . ah . . . downstairs; and I think that on behalf of the food service industry, the least we can do is meet him halfway; and I would make a suggestion, Mr. Speaker, that you or one of your staff members proceed and arrange for him to do exactly that, then the Pages don't have to worry about the elevator or anything, and it'll be right out in the hall."

Speaker Redmond: "Thank you very much."

Grotberg: "Yeah."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mann."

Mann: "Ah . . . Thank you, Mr. Speaker. John, Oh John, Representative Grotberg. John, . . ."

Grotberg: "What?"

Mann: ". . . when you meet 'em halfway ask him to get a new cook. Will you, John, please?"

Grotberg: "Ah . . . ah . . . the man is down there listening, Representative Mann, and I hope that he heard what you said. Jim, that's Representative Mann on the horn, in case you wanted to know. Don't forget him



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when you burn his next piece of toast. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "1089."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1089, a bill for an act making appropriation of Department of Local Government Affairs. Second Reading of the bill. Four committee amendments. Amendment Number 1 amends House Bill 1089 on page 1, line 21, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 1."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman's moved the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 1089. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The Amendment Number 1 is adopted. Amendment Number 2."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 2 amends House Bill 1089 as amended on page 1, line 27, and so forth."

Shea: "I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 2."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 2 to House Bill 1089. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Amendment Number 3."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 3, evidently, was tabled in committee. Amendment Number 4 amends House Bill 1089 on page 2, line 8, by inserting after the word, 'total', the following and so forth."

Shea: "This amendment changes . . . ah . . . the total and takes it . . . ah . . . inserts after the word 'total', 'from the Local Governmental Affairs Trust Fund for intergovernmental personnel for 50,000.' I move for the adoption of the amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment Number 4 to House Bill 1089. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. 1092."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1092, Hart, a bill for an act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Department of Registration and Education. Second Reading of the bill. No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor? No amendments from the floor. Third Reading. 1093."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1093, Brummet, a bill for an act in relation to



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plumbing contractors."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brummet."

Jack O'Brien: "Second Reading of the bill. This bill was read a second time previously. Amend . . ."

Brummet: "Ah . . . Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and ladies and gentlemen of the House. All this bill needed was a fiscal note; and it has been duly taken care of."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading."

Brummet: "And . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Its on Third Reading now."

Brummet: "O.K., I know, but on . . . I was just going to say on 1095, the next bill, its the same story on it."

Speaker Redmond: "1095."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1095, a bill for an act to create the Structural Test Control Advisory Council. Second Reading of the bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Fiscal note has been furnished."

Jack O'Brien: "This bill has been read a second time, previously. Fiscal note is now filed."

Brummet: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, that's all there was on that one also."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1128."

Jack O'Brien: "House . . . fiscal note request on that one."

Speaker Redmond: "Take that out of the Record. 1133. Representative Rayson here?"

Jack O'Brien: "Fiscal note request on this one."

Speaker Redmond: "Fiscal note request is not in the Record, yet. 1134. Representative Rayson here?"

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Downs, can you handle this?"

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1134 . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Take that out of the Record. 1135, out of the Record. 1167. Representative Marovitz. Take it out of the . . . has it been furnished, Chalkie?"

Charles Aikman: "No."

Jack O'Brien: "No, not yet."

Speaker Redmond: "1303."



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Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1303, Kane, a bill for an act making appropriation of the Department of Personnel. Second Reading of the bill.

Two committee amendments. Amendment Number 1 amends House Bill 1303 on page 1, line 13, by striking, '248,600', and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kane."

Kane: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, this is the . . . ah . . . committee amendment. It cuts about 420 . . . \$440,000 out of the Department of Personnel. I move the adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 1303. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted."

Jack O'Brien: "Committee Amendment Number 2 amends House Bill 1303 on page 5 by inserting immediately after line 25 the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kane."

Kane: "Mr. Speaker, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, this is a second committee amendment. It adds \$18,700 . . . ah . . . 500 to the Department of Personnel . . . ah . . . for an Employee Incentive Program. I move the adoption of the bill . . . of the amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 2 to House Bill 1303. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. 1317, Representative Laurino. 1426, Representative Schisler. 1426 . . . on what . . . on 1426? Representative Schisler, I've been advised that two amendments have . . . have been filed with the Clerk this morning, so we'll have to take this one out of the Record. Representative Schisler."

Schisler: "I can't . . . Mr. Speaker, I can't hear you."

Speaker Redmond: "I say I have been advised that . . . ah . . . two amendments have been deposited with the Clerk this morning and they're not yet printed and on the members desk yet, so we'll have to pass this one."

Schisler: "Is there . . . ah . . . objection?"

Speaker Redmond: "Well."

Schisler: "There were two amendments filed this morning, we already have some printed, they should be."



Speaker Redmond: "You want to move the adoption of the . . . how many amendments are there on this?"

Schisler: "About five, I think."

Speaker Redmond: "Why don't we adopt the ones we can."

Schisler: "Very good."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1426, a bill for an act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Department of Agriculture. Second Reading of the bill. Three committee amendments. Amendment Number 1 amends House Bill 1426 on page 1, line 21, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schisler."

Schisler: "I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 1."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Keller."

Keller: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, could we . . . ah . . . hear what the amendment does? I'm pretty interested in all these bills, and I'd like . . . these amendments, and I'd like to hear what they do."

Speaker Redmond: "Will you give the gentleman order, please. Representative Lechowicz, for what purpose do you arise?"

Lechowicz: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, that was my amendment in committee. Its the reduction of \$257,650 within a department within five different categories of the Department of Agriculture and I move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 1426. All in favor say 'aye', and oppose 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Amendment Number 2."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 2, Committee Amendment Number 2 amends House Bill 1426 on page 8, line 2, and so forth."

Schisler: "I move for the adoption of . . . ah . . . Amendment Number 2."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman's moved the adoption of Amendment Number 2 to House Bill 1426. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted."

Jack O'Brien: "Committee Amendment Number 3 amends House Bill 1426 on page 8, line 3, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Is this Representative Lechowicz's, also? Amendment Number 3, is this your amendment?"

Lechowicz: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Amendment Number 3 increases the County Fair Incentive Grant, and we move for its adoption."



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Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment Number 3 to House Bill 1426. All in favor say 'aye, and oppose 'no'. The 'ayes' have it; the amendment's adopted."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 4, Schisler, amends House Bill 1426 on page 9 by inserting between lines 3 and 4 the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Is this Representative Lechowicz's amendment, too? Representative Schisler."

Schisler: "I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 4."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Keller."

Keller: "I wished he'd explain what this amendment does . . . ah . . . and all the amendments . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Explain the amendment, Mr. Schisler."

Schisler: "This amendment . . . ah . . . adds the sum of \$112,500 for equipment that the . . . ah . . . Department of Agriculture is going to need . . . ah . . . later on. There's three large-scale trucks, and the reason for this the bodies have to . . . ah . . . be hand fabricated and the company cannot guarantee delivery before the end of the lapse period, which is September 30th. I move for the adoption of the amendment."

Keller: "Gale, it adds . . . ah . . . money for where?"

Schisler: "Its a re-appropriation."

Keller: "O.K."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 4 to House Bill 1426. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. Representative Walsh, for what purpose do you rise? Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 5, Craig, amends House Bill 1426 on page 6, line 32, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Craig. Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, we don't have that amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "This went up to be printed. We'll return to this one. Just hold it on Second, yes. 1487, Representative Hirschfeld. Take that one out of the Record. Representative Hirschfeld is not on the floor. 1470, Representative Kosinski."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1470, a bill for an act to require mandatory



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life sentences for persons convicted, Commission of Forcible Felony, for three or more times. Second Reading of the bill. One committee amendment amends House Bill 1470 on page 1, line 10, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kosinski. Representative Mann."

Kosinski: "Mr. Speaker, ladies and gentlemen of the House, . . . ah . . . Committee Amendment Number 1 . . . ah . . . proved defective . . . ah . . . in terms of . . . ah . . . wording. We have since put together Committee Amendment Number . . . or Amendment Number 2 is a floor amendment; I move for the tabling of Committee Amendment Number 1, and the acceptance of Committee Amendment Number 2."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objections to tabling of Amendment Number 1? Hearing no . . . leave granted and table Number 1 . . . or Amendment Number 1 is tabled. Amendment Number 2."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 2, Sangmeister, a bill . . . ah . . . amends House Bill 1470 by deleting everything after the enacting clause and so forth."

Kosinski: "This does, essentially, what Number 1 done . . . did with verification of language; I move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment Number 2 to House Bill 1470. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. Representative Berman. 1506."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1506 . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Will the members be in their seats, please."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1506, Berman, a bill for an act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the bill. Two committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kane. Representative Berman."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 1 . . . no, was 1 tabled in committee? Amendment Number 2 amends House Bill 6 . . . 1506 on page 1 by deleting line 1 and 2 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Berman."

Berman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, this is the amendment that we had discussed yesterday was re . . . it represents the recommendation of the Formula Subcommittee of the Committee on Elementary and Secondary Education. A question was raised as to



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. . . ah . . . the provisions in lines 24 through 30 on the first page of Amendment Number 2 and that has been corrected to limit it to the high school district by Amendment Number 3, which is on the Clerk's desk; and which I would move . . . ah . . . immediately after this. Ah . . . Therefore, I move adoption of Committee Amendment Number 2 to House Bill 1506."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 2 to House Bill 1506. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Amendment 3."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 3, Berman, amends House Bill 1506 as amended in the last sentence of the first paragraph and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Berman."

Berman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, ladies and gentlemen of the House, Amendment Number 3 is the amendment that we have discussed yesterday to limit the application of . . . ah . . . of the lines set forth in Committee Amendment Number 2 in accord with the intent of the . . . ah . . . committee amendment. So I move the adoption of Committee Amendment . . . of Floor Amendment Number 3 to House Bill 1506."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman's moved the adoption of Amendment Number 3 to House Bill 1506. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. 1512."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1512, Pierce, a bill for an act to require the labelling of energy consuming appliances. Second Reading of the bill. One committee amendment amends House Bill 1512 by deleting page 1, 2, 3 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pierce."

Pierce: "Ah . . . Amendment, excuse me, Mr. Speaker, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, Committee . . . Committee Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 1512 revises the bill substantially, but what it does is bring our energy labelling requirements in Illinois into conformity with the national standards of the U.S. Department of Commerce, so that all energy consumptive appliances in our state will be labelled. When you go to buy an air conditioner, you'll know its energy consumption and . . . ah . . . see that one air conditioner of a half ton



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uses a lot more electricity than another one. You can buy the most efficient. The same with . . . ah . . . washers, dryers, T.V. sets and so on. Amendment Number 1 . . . ah . . . puts the bill into conformity with the national standards; its a committee amendment; and I, therefore, move the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 1512."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman's moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House . . . to House Bill 1512. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; and the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 2, Pierce, amends House Bill 1512 as amended on page 2 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pierce."

Pierce: "Yeah, may I inquire of the Clerk, is there an Amendment Number 3? Mr. Clerk, is there an Amendment Number 3?"

Jack O'Brien: "Yes, there is."

Pierce: "All right, I withdraw Amendment Number 2, because Amendment Number 3 corrects an error in Amendment Number 2, which was never adopted. Amendment Number 2 is not a committee amendment, its my own amendment. I'll withdraw, if that's the procedure, Amendment Number 2, which has never been adopted; and then go with Amendment Number 3."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman have leave to table Amendment Number 2? Hearing no objections, leave granted. Amendment Number 2 is tabled."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 3, Pierce, amends House Bill 1512 as amended on page 2 by deleting line 1, 2, 4 and so forth."

Pierce: "Amendment Number 3 . . . ah . . . does what we were attempting to do with Amendment Number 2. Its a floor amendment. Ah . . . It brings us further to performing as a national standards. It was requested by the . . . ah . . . large appliance manufacturers that . . . that operate in all fifty states; and they felt we need this one minor amendment, Amendment Number 2. Ah . . . So we'd be conforming completely with the national standards of appliance labelling; and with this amendment, they, Amendment Number 3, they've withdrawn their opposition to the bill; and we should be ready to go ahead now on our Illinois . . . ah . . . Appliance Energy Efficiency Labelling



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Act; and I, therefore, move the adoption of Amendment Number 3."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 3 to House Bill 1512. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further."

Speaker Redmond: "No further amendments. Third Reading. 1515."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1515, Pierce, a bill for an act to amend an act concerning public utilities. Second Reading of the bill. The bill has been read a second time previously."

Pierce: "Yes, Mr. . . . yes, and now, . . ."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 1 . . ."

Pierce: "Was Amendment Number 1 adopted the previous time or did we take it out of the Record?"

Jack O'Brien: "It was adopted. Bill Amendment Number 2, Griesheimer, . . ."

Pierce: "All right, Mr. Speaker, . . ."

Jack O'Brien: ". . . amends House Bill 1515 by deleting everything after the enacting clause and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Griesheimer."

Griesheimer: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, I have spoken with . . . ah . . . Mr. Pierce on this. I . . . I think we have agreement now, but I want to check it before I make the comment. If you would like to . . . ah . . . respond to that. All the bill does is provide that all of the regulations he's establishing for installation . . . ah . . . standards . . . ah . . . will be enforced by the Local Department of Building and Zoning in the municipalities which have to abide by these. It does nothing else to the bill, but I . . . I do wish to check it with the Sponsor."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pierce."

Pierce: "I prefer the bill as it originally was, but the . . . the public utilities apparently don't want the responsibility of enforcing the installation of standards of new construction that will conserve energy. The Commerce Commission has agreed to promulgate them, which they do to Amendment Number 1 in the original bill; and if Mr. Griesheimer feels as some of the members of committee did feel, that the cities and villages would be better able to enforce the installation



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standards on new construction, because they inspect new construction anyway as part of their regular work, I will abide with Amendment Number 2 and . . . ah . . . go along with my colleague, Mr. Griesheimer on that . . . it doesn't really do anything to hurt the bill. In fact, it may . . . it made in operation and practice . . . ah . . . actually be more efficient so I'll go along with it."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 2 to House Bill 1515. All in favor indicate by saying 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "No further amendments. Third Reading. 1546. Representative Brinkmeier."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1546, Brinkmeier, . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Read the bill. Has the fiscal note been furnished? Take it out of the Record temporarily. 1584."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1584, Telcser, a bill for an act to grant law enforcement personnel the rights to organize and bargain collectively. Second Reading of the bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Telcser. Representative Telcser."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker, I . . . I think Representative Lechowicz is working on an amendment for this bill. I don't know if its filed yet. Do you have it, Mr. Clerk?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz, is your amendment ready?"

Telcser: "No? All right, well, could you leave it on Second Reading? I promised Representative Lechowicz . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Leave it on Second Reading. 1596."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1596, Lauer, a bill for an act relating to probation in court related services."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman doesn't seem to be here. Take that one out of the Record. 1609."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1609, Farley, a bill for an act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the bill. No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the Record. How about 1610? 1610. Take 1609 out of the Record."



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Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1610, a bill for an act making appropriation to the Auditor General. Second Reading of the bill. One committee amendment amends House Bill 1610 on page 1, line 9, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Farley on the amendment. Representative Berman. Representative Farley, on the amendment, 1610."

Farley: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I move for the adop . . . adoption of House . . . or Committee Amendment Number 1 to 1610."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 1610. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. 1636, Representative Farley."

Farley: "Mr. Speaker, could we just adopt the amendment and hold this on Second Reading also?"

Speaker Redmond: "Bring it back to the order of Second Reading. 1636."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1636, Totten, . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative Totten on the floor? Evidently, not, take it out of the Record. 1720, Representative Choate. 1720."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1720, Choate, a bill for an act making appropriation to the Department of Transportation. Second Reading of the bill. No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1721."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1721, Choate, a bill for an act making an appropriation to the Department of Transportation. Second Reading of the bill. No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1727. Take that out of the Record. 1766. Representative Washington, take that one out. 1785."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1785, a bill for an act to license and regulate landscape architects. Second Reading of the bill. No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 1 . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative Garmisa here? Take that out of the



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Record. Evidently, Representative Garmisais not here. 1546."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1546, Brinkmeier, a bill for an act to amend an act in relation to relocation payments to persons displaced by acquisition of real property by the state agency. This bill has been read a second time previously and held for a fiscal note. There's a fiscal note filed now."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1790."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1790, Berman, a bill for an act to prohibit distribution . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "I've been advised by the Sponsor, he desires to hold that one. 1795."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1795, Madigan, a bill for an act to create the Water Resources Commission. Second Reading of the bill. No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "No floor amendments. Third Reading. 1798."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1798, Ebbesen, a bill for an act to amend the Illinois . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Take that out of the Record. House Bills, Third Reading. On the order of House Bills, Third Reading, appears House Bill 779. The Chair recognizes Representative Willer. 779. I understand you desire to have that returned to the order of Second Reading for the purpose of an amendment. Is that correct?"

Willer: "Yes, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Does she have leave?"

Willer: "Ah . . . I would . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Hearing no objections, return it to the order of Second Reading."

Willer: ". . . and I would like to move to table Amendment Number 1 to . . . ah . . . House Bill 779. It's a typographical error and it's not clear."

Speaker Redmond: "Does she have leave to table Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 779? Hearing no objections, Amendment Number 1 is tabled."

Willer: "And then I would like to adopt Amendment Number 2 . . ."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 2 amends House Bill 779 on page 1 by de-



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leting lines 23 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Willer."

Willer: "This simply clarifies the bill and restricts the bill . . . ah . . . rather exempts Cook County, a home-rule county. I move this adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "The lady has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 2 to House Bill 779. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Third Reading. On the order of business House Bills, Second Reading, in the order in which they appear on the Calendar, 1820. Representative Rayson is not here. Take that out of the Record. 1828."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1828, a bill for an act creating the Park District Problem Study Commission. Second Reading of the bill. No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "No floor amendments. Third Reading. 1843."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1843, Coffey, a bill for an act to amend the Surface Mine Land Conservation Reclamation Act. Second Reading of the bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative Coffey here? Take it out of the Record. Representative . . . 1880."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1880, Marovitz, a bill for an act in relation to consumer protection creating the Office of Consumer Advocates. Second Reading of the bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Marovitz."

Jack O'Brien: "Marovitz."

Speaker Redmond: "1880."

Jack O'Brien: "This bill has been read a second time previously . . ."

Marovitz: "I believe we heard this . . . ah . . . yesterday on Second Reading."

Jack O'Brien: ". . . and held for a fiscal note."

Marovitz: "O.K."

Speaker Redmond: "Fiscal note been furnished yet?"

Marovitz: "The fiscal note has not been furnished yet."



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Speaker Redmond: "O.K., 1 . . . ah . . . 1167, same Sponsor, Representative Marovitz, 1167."

Marovitz: "Hold this on Second Reading."

Speaker Redmond: "Hold it on Second, the request of the Sponsor. 1891."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1891, Ralph Dunn, a bill for an act in relation to the state animal."

Speaker Redmond: "Take that out of the Record. 1907, Representative Stubblefield here? Take that out of the Record. 1945. 1945."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1945, Brinkmeier, a bill for an act making appropriation to the Administrative Office of Illinois Courts. Second Reading of the bill. One committee amendment amends House Bill 1945 on page 1, line 5, by deleting, '300,000', and inserting in lieu, thereof, '165,000'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brinkmeier."

Brinkmeier: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and members of the House, . . . ah . . . as the Clerk has said this reduces the appropriation from 300,000 to 165,000. Because of the money that is still left over from . . . ah . . . the Illinois Law Enforcement Commission we didn't need the 300,000; and I would urge the adoption of Amendment Number 1."

Speaker Redmond: "Question is on the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 1945. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further."

Speaker Redmond: "No further amendments. Third Reading. 1949."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1949, McClain, a bill for an act to amend the . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "I guess he's getting his law agreed on, we'll have to take that one out. 1955, out of the Record. 1956, out of the Record? 19 . . ."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill . . ."

Speaker Redmond: ". . . Oh, he wants 1956."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1956, a bill for an act to amend the Housing Authority Act. Second Reading of the bill. No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 1, Keller, amends House Bill 1956 on page



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1 by the/under number line immediately above line 7 by changing  
'5,000' to '10,000'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Keller."

Keller: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, all  
this amendment does is just raise the population from 5,000 to 10,000.  
I move for the adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1  
to House Bill 1956. All in favor say 'aye', . . . Representative  
Kane. Give the gentleman order, I can't even hear my gavel. Nobody  
else is supposed to hear this. Question is on the adoption of the  
amendment. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no' and Representative  
Skinner."

Skinner: "Could the Sponsor repeat what this amendment does, again? Is the  
Sponsor alive?"

Keller: "Yes, the Sponsor is alive; I couldn't get my mic' turned on."

Skinner: "Oh."

Keller: "O.K., what . . . what this does is . . . ah . . . Representative  
Hart . . . ah . . . wanted me to put an amendment on to . . . what I  
did is the Housing Authority Boards in towns over 25,000 . . . ah . . .  
can . . . ah . . . have your Housing Authority Boards now and we re-  
duced it and my bill did to 5,000. Now, we're just upping it back  
to 10,000 for agreement. That takes care of Representative Hart and  
Representative Friedrich. They were concerned about it."

Skinner: "Well, it didn't take care of the counties . . . the cities in  
my district."

Keller: "Why, do you want it back to 5,000?"

Skinner: "Yeah."

Keller: "Vote against the amendment then."

Speaker Redmond: "All in favor of the adoption of the amendment say 'aye',  
oppose 'no'; I can't distinguish the . . . ah . . . difference here.  
All in favor of the amendment vote 'aye', those oppose vote 'no'.  
Have all voted who wished? Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "What we're doing here is discriminating against towns whose  
population are between 5,000 and 10,000 people. Now, if . . . if  
you live in Chicago, you got no sweat; but if you got a district that



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has any other city, any other part of the state in it, you probably ought to vote 'no' on this."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Take the Record. On this question there's 52 'ayes', 60 'no'; the 'ayes' prevail, and the amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1596. Representative Lauer. 1956."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1956, . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "No, wait a minute, 1596."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1596, . . ."

Lauer: "Mr. Speaker, I would appreciate it if you'd take this out of the Record, because I've agreed to hold this bill on Second Reading . . . ah . . . depending upon the progress of some other bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the Record. 1965, Representative Katz on the floor? Take that out of the Record. 1975 out of the Record. 1977."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1977, Mulcahey, a bill for an act making appropriation to the Illinois State Scholarship Commission. Second Reading of the bill. One committee amendment . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mulcahey on the amendment. Will you read the amendment, please."

Jack O'Brien: ". . . amends House Bill 1977 . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the Record. Take that one out of the Record. 2000, Representative Hart. Take that out of the Record. 2010 out of the Record. Representative Hudson."

Hudson: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, and ladies and . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Will you give the gentleman order."

Hudson: "Mr. Speaker, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I'm requesting leave of the House to have my vote recorded from 'present' to 'no' on House Bill 396. Could I have leave to have . . . it will not effect the result in any way."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objection? 2026. Representative Mann."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2026, a bill for an act to amend the Vehicle Code."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mann, 2026. Why don't you use Schneider's



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microphone."

Jack O'Brien: "Second Reading of the bill. One committee amendment amends House Bill 2026 on page 1, line 12, by deleting, '\$200', and inserting in lieu, thereof, '\$100', and so forth."

Mann: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, this bill was taken out of the Record yesterday at the request of Representative Schlickman. I discussed the amendment with him, which reduces . . . ah . . . the fee from \$200 to \$100. He wanted to be assured that this merely covered the cost of administration and would not accrue a profit of the department. I satisfied him on that point. I now move for the adoption of . . . of Committee Amendment Number 1."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1 on House Bill 2026. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. 2071."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2071, McPartlin, a bill for an act to amend the Environmental Protection Act. Second Reading of the bill. No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2097."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2097, a bill for an act to amend an act relating to Chicago Park Districts. Second Reading of the bill. No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan. Take that out of the Record. How about 2098? Out of the Record. 2109, Emil Jones, out of the Record. 2119, Representative Totten."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill' . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Take that one out of the Record. How about 1636, Representative Totten? Out of the Record on that one. 2140, J. D. Jones."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2140, Dave Jones, . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative Jones on the floor? Representative McMasters, can you handle 2140?"

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2140, a bill for an act in relation to townships."

Speaker Redmond: "Take that out of the Record. 2142."



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Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2142, Keller, a bill for an act to amend the Horse Racing Act. Second Reading of the bill. One committee . . . no committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 1, Keller, amends House Bill 2142 on page 2 by deleting lines 6 and 7 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Keller."

Keller: "Yeah, . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Somebody turned a canary lose in this Chamber's. Representative Keller."

Keller: "Mr. Speaker, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, what this amendment does, there was some objection in the . . . ah . . . Revenue Committee to the . . . ah . . . Illinois Thoroughbreders, Breeders and Owners Foundation . . . ah . . . running the fund themselves; and this gives the . . . ah . . . Department of Agriculture the . . . the right to administer the fund. I move for the adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 2142. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Keller: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2147."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2147, McCourt, a bill for an act to amend the Illinois Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the bill. One committee amendment amends House Bill 2147 on page 1 by underscoring line 21 through 25."

Speaker Redmond: "Take that one out of the Record. 2148."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2148, Marovitz, a bill for an act in relation to the regulation of business and vocation schools. Second Reading of the bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 1, Marovitz, . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative Marovitz here? Take that out of the Record. 2150. Take it out of the Record. 2151."



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Jack O'Brien: "House Bill . . . there's a fiscal note request."

Speaker Redmond: "Fiscal note required on this one. Has it been filed?"

Unknown: "It's been filed, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Is it in the file, Mr. Clerk."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill . . . House Bill 2151, a bill for an act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the bill. No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "No amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Fiscal note's been filed. Third Reading. 2161."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2161, Caldwell, a bill for an act creating the Department of Vocational Rehabilitation. Second Reading of the bill. One committee amendment . . . two committee amendments. Amendment Number 1 amends House Bill 2161 on page 4 by striking line 11 and inserting in lieu, thereof, the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Caldwell."

Caldwell: "Ah . . . House . . . ah . . . this committee amendment, Mr. Speaker, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, adds four members to the Advisory Council and specifies that the Chairman must be . . . must have the recognized handicap. Ah . . . I move the adoption of this amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 2161. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Committee Amendment Number 2 amends House Bill 2161 on page 7 by deleting lines 23 through 25 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Caldwell."

Caldwell: "Ah . . . This amendment apparently was placed on by . . . ah . . . Representative White, but it's a duplication of . . . ah . . . Amendment Number 1. So I move . . . ah . . . to table that amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the gentleman have leave to table Amendment Number 2? Amendment Number 2 is tabled."

Jack O'Brien: "Floor Amendment Number 3, White, amends House Bill 2161 on page 7 by inserting the following between lines 16 and 17, 'The Govern- or shall from time to time appoint the Chairman of the Advisory



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Council. Said Chairman to be one of the members of the council having a recognized handicap."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Caldwell."

Caldwell: "I guess I'll have to look at that, Mr. Chairman, that amendment that Mr. White put on is the . . . the duplicate of an amendment previously read, so I talked to Mr. White, and I know that . . . ah . . . that's the one that needs to be tabled. I'll have to take a look and see who put the second amendment on. Take it out of the Record a minute."

Speaker Redmond: "Take . . . hold this on the order of Second Reading and will you take a look at the amendment, Representative Caldwell? 2165."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2165, Choate, a bill for an act to establish a program of financial assistance to facilities to facilitate local bridge improvements. Second Reading of the bill. Two committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Choate."

Choate: "Well, Mr. Speaker, ladies and gentlemen of the House, the Committee Amendment Number 1 is purely a technical amendment. It merely assigns a section number to the new fund created by the act so that it is compatible with the current format of the State Finance Act; and I would move that the House . . . ah . . . adopt Committee Amendment Number 1."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'. The 'ayes' have it; the amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 2 amends House Bill 2165 on page 1 . . ."

Choate: "Mr. Speaker, Committee Amendment Number 2 incorporates clarifying language requested by the Illinois Association of . . . ah . . . County Superintendent of Highways. The amendment's . . . ah . . . merely designed to insure that local officials cannot close the bridge merely to qualify for a grant under the act by requiring that the . . . ah . . . to be eligible for the grant. The bridges must be inspected and ri . . . and rated by a registered structural engineer and found to be unsafe for at least . . . ah . . . some types of traffic; and, as I said, it's recommended by the Association of



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County Superintendent of Highways. I would move, Mr. Speaker, that the House adopt Committee Amendment Number 2."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 2 to House Bill 2165. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "No further amendments. Third Reading. 2172."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2172, McGrew, a bill for an act to amend the Illinois Architectural Act. Second Reading of the bill. No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "No amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2193."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2193, Simms, 2193, there's a request for a fiscal note on this bill."

Speaker Redmond: "A request for a fiscal note on 2193. Has the fiscal note been furnished?"

Jack O'Brien: "No, we don't have it yet."

Speaker Redmond: "Hold that. 2196."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2196, Daniels, a bill for an act in relation to residential care facilities for the developed mentally disabled. Second Reading of the bill. One committee amendment amends House Bill 2196 on page 1, line 30, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Daniels."

Daniels: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Committee Amendment Number 1 is a technical amendments which corrects some of the language in the bill; and I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 1."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 1 . . . 2196. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 2, Daniels, amends House Bill 2196 on page 2 by deleting line 21 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Daniels."

Daniels: "Amendment Number 2 . . . ah . . . Mr. Speaker, ladies and gentlemen of the House, provides that the department may guarantee loans of



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money not exceeding \$20,000,000; and it . . . ah . . . deletes some of the technical language in there and inserts others so that loans can be guaranteed up to 100 percent; and I move for the adoption of Amendment Number 2."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "Will the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates that he will."

Shea: "When you say that it guarantees up to 20 . . . 20,000,000 in loans?"

Daniels: "That's correct, Mr. Shea."

Shea: "All right, now, it's the full faith and credit of the state behind the guarantee?"

Daniels: "That is correct."

Shea: "All right, now, can . . . what is . . . is there any loan limitation to any single residential care facility?"

Daniels: "No, there is not. Our estimate is that this would provide possibly up to ten facilities throughout the State of Illinois."

Shea: "No, but I . . . what I say is, could one facility for \$20,000,000 be built?"

Daniels: "If that was approved by the Department of Mental Health, yes."

Shea: "Don't you think we ought to put some limitation in there that there shouldn't be more than say \$2,000,000 to any one institution or one group?"

Daniels: "I . . . I don't think that's necessary because I think the department is the one that's . . . ah . . . going to have to provide the rules; and that they would be able to do that within their rule-making power in accordance with the bill . . ."

Shea: "What if they decided to give it to one group?"

Daniels: "Well, if they decide to do that, that could possibly be done."

Shea: "Well, could you . . . would you have any objection to doing it so that you could limit what you could give any one group? Would you have any objection . . ."

Daniels: "Why don't I talk to you . . . ah . . . Representative Shea, and why don't we hold this on Second Reading?"

Shea: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Hold it on Second Reading. 2228."



Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2228, a bill for an act to provide for the selection of delegates to National Nominating Conventions."

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the Record at the request of the sponsor. 2240."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2240, Boyle, a bill for an act making appropriations to the Abandoned Mine Land Reclamation Act. Second Reading of the bill. One committee amendment . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Doesn't appear that the sponsor is here, so we'll have to take that out of the Record. 2245."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2245, a bill for an act to amend the Illinois Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act. Second Reading of the bill. No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "An . . . any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "I understand that a fiscal note has been furnished, is that correct?"

Jack O'Brien: "Fiscal . . . fiscal note is filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Fiscal note's filed. Third Reading. What's the status of 2246?"

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2246, . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "We . . . did you leave out the amendments previously?"

Jack O'Brien: "No, no, this bill's never read . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Take that one out of the Record. 2253."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2253, Farley, a bill for an act to amend the Workmans' Compensation Act. Second Reading of the bill. One committee amendment amends House Bill 2253 on page 4 by deleting lines 10 through 15 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Farley."

Farley: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, . . . ah . . . this bill was called yesterday and . . . ah . . . Representative McClain has a question about the amendment. Ah . . . We . . . we met and we did talk and he agrees that the amendment is in the correct form; and . . . ah . . . I would move for the adoption of Amendment Number 1."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 2253. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"



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Jack O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2254."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2254, Getty, a bill for an act to amend an act in relation to the establishment, operation and maintenance of public community colleges. Second Reading of the bill. No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Getty."

Getty: "Mr. Speaker, . . . ah . . . I think the Journal is incorrect. That is Representative Farley's bill; it's been carried as my bill incorrectly for some time, but it . . . it's Representative Farley's, I believe."

Speaker Redmond: "Will the Record so show? Any objection to Third Reading, Representative Farley? Third Reading."

Jack O'Brien: "Did you move that to Third Reading?"

Speaker Redmond: "Yeah. 2263."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2263, Choate, a bill for an act to amend an act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expenses for the State Highway Safety Program. Second Reading of the bill. One committee amendment amends House Bill 2263 on page 2 by deleting lines 29 and 30 and inserting in lieu, thereof, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Choate."

Choate: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, if it's agreeable with the House, we can move the bill to Third Reading with the understanding that . . . ah . . . when we . . . ah . . . finish our dialogue with the Federal government, we might want to call it back and . . . and amend it."

Speaker Redmond: "Leave? Third Reading. 2265, huh, oh, pardon me, gentleman's moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 2263. All in favor of the adoption say 'aye', oppose 'no'; and the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "No further amendments. Third Reading. 2265, Representative Ewell. Take that one out of the Record. 2267, Representative



Shea."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2267, a bill for an act to amend the Charitable Solicitation's Act. Second Reading of the bill. No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2276."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2276, Willer, a bill for an act to amend an act in relation to licensing and regulation of homes."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the Record. 2277."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2277, White, a bill for an act to prohibit the sale of hearing aids except upon the prescription of a physician. Second Reading of the bill. Two committee amendments. Amendment Number 1 amends House Bill 227 . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative White."

White: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, I'd like to . . . ah . . . keep that on Second Reading, another amendment is being drafted."

Speaker Redmond: "O.K., Second Reading. Hold it on the order of Second Reading."

White: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "2347."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2347, Pierce, a bill for an act in relation to the regulation of repair work on the home or its contents. Fiscal note hasn't been filed."

Speaker Redmond: "A fiscal note requested and hasn't been filed yet? Out of the Record. 2348."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2348, McPartlin, a bill for an act in relation to the regulation of repair work on the home or its contents. Second Reading of the bill. No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2376, Representative McAuliffe, are you ready on that one? Hold that one. 2387."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2387, Emil Jones, a bill for an act to amend the Medical Practice Act. Second Reading of the bill."



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No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Out . . . out of the Record. On the order of House Bills, Second Reading, appears House Bill 2161. Representative Caldwell."

Caldwell: "Ah . . . The . . . that amendment, Mr. Speaker, was put on by Representative McClain. Ah . . . It takes out a section and adds another section, which is a duplication. So it's in order; and I move it adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Number 3, isn't it?"

Caldwell: "I think that would be Number 3, because numbers 2 and 4 were duplications."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Caldwell, will you come up and consult with the Clerk? 2161."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2161 was read a second time previously. We adopted Amendment Number 1 and tabled Amendment Number 2."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Caldwell."

Caldwell: "Ah . . . I think I got it straight this time, Mr. Speaker, . . . ah . . . Committee Amendment Number 2, sponsored by Representative McClain, I want to reconsider . . . ah . . . that amendment; and . . . ah . . . because it was tabled previously. I want to . . . on it adopted."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved that the vote by which amendment Number 2 . . . Representative Macdonald."

Macdonald: "I wonder would the sponsor . . . ah . . . yield for a question on the amendment?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Macdonald: "May . . . may I ask what . . . what the amendment that's being replaced did?"

Caldwell: "Ah . . . There's a later section, Miss Macdonald, and what I guess happened . . . ah . . . Mr. McClain . . . ah . . . put an amendment on which . . . ah . . . does the same thing as an early . . . when the statute was adopted, I think, in 1919, it was a duplication, and it merely replaced it. It doesn't . . . ah . . . take out anything. Ah . . . I . . . I wasn't aware of it, but as I talked with the Clerk there, I find that . . . ah . . . if we leave both in, they're



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just duplications."

Macdonald: "Now, the new amendment that you've replaced then, how . . . how does that change the original bill?"

Caldwell: "Ah . . . It doesn't change the original bill. They both . . . they both have to do with . . . ah . . . handicapped people in the Vocational . . . ah . . . Rehabilitation Program."

Macdonald: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved to reconsider the vote by which Amendment Number 2 was tabled. All those in favor of reconsidering the vote, vote 'aye', oppose say 'no'."

Caldwell: "Now, Mr. Speaker, I want to move the adoption of Amendment Number 3, which specifies that the four additional members of the Advisory Council, the chairman has to be a handicap person."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved the adopted Amendment Number 2 to House Bill . . . Representative Skinner."

Skinner: ". . . er, I wonder if the Sponsor would yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Skinner: "Ah . . . Would a member of the Republican Party be considered a handicapped person?"

Caldwell: "I consider them handicapped anyway."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Caldwell, I believe your moving to adopt Amendment Number 2, isn't that correct?"

Caldwell: "Yes, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "All in favor of the adoption of Amendment Number 2 indicate by saying 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment is adopted. Representative Caldwell."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 3, White, amends House Bill 2161 on page 7 by inserting the following between lines 16 and 17, 'The Governor shall from time to time appoint the Chairman of the Advisory Council, said Chairman to be be one of the members of the council having a recognized handicap'."

Caldwell: "I move its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 3 to House Bill 2161. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; and the 'aye' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"



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Gentleman desire to withdraw Amendment Number 4, is that correct? Now, are there any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third . . . Third Reading. Representative Bradley, for what purpose do you arise?"

Bradley: "For the purpose of an announcement, Mr. Speaker; and Mr. Speaker, in the rear Gallery on the Republican side, we have the eighth grade class of Arthur Grade School from Arthur, Illinois with us accompanied by William Ess, the principal, and Miss Keaney; and I wish that they would stand and be recognized, and I think that if we could make special recognition that they chose to come down here on Saturday instead of during the week . . . ah . . . to see the General Assembly in their working and not taking a day out of their school week to come down; and we in the General Assembly take special note; and I wish they would rise and be recognized."

Speaker Redmond: "Maybe the students will also take special note that the members of the General Assembly are working on Saturday. Representative Bradley."

Bardley: "I would like to call their attention also, Mr. Speaker, to the fact that the . . . that they're represented here today by Representative Stone, who is up there with them, and Helen Satterthwaite and John Hirschfeld. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "On House Bills, Third Reading, appears House Bill 1147 for which . . . ah . . . Representative Berman is recognized. Representative Berman."

Berman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I want to ask for leave to return House Bill 1147 from the order of Third Reading back to Second Reading for purposes of an amendment?"

Speaker Redmond: "Any objection? It's returned to the order of Second Reading for the purposes of an amendment."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 1, Berman, amends House Bill 1147 on page 1, line 10, by deleting, 'nay', and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Berman."

Barman: "Ah . . . Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 1147 is in response to a



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request that had been made when this bill was heard in the . . . ah . . . Insurance Committee. Ah . . . The bill, as originally introduced, does . . . ah . . . for stock insurance companies the same thing that . . . ah . . . we have done for other corporations . . . ah . . . and I feel that . . . and a bill that Representative Porter has previously passed out of this Legislature. It was . . . ah . . . the question was raised as to why . . . ah . . . this corporate indem . . . corporate indemnification of directors and officers . . . ah . . . in House Bill 1147 only applied to stock companies and not to the other types of insurance companies . . . ah . . . that we have in Illinois. Ah . . . Amendment Number 1 is in response to that and changed the limitation in this bill from just stock companies to any insurance company organized under the laws of the state . . . of this state. I move the adoption of Amendment Number 1."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Palmer."

Palmer: "Mr. Berman, does this . . . ah . . . this only applies to civil matters, not criminal matters?"

Berman: "No, sir, it . . . ah . . . it might apply to criminal matters, also. Ah . . . But that's not . . . that's not the amendment. The amendment just . . . ah . . . you know, your question really rides to, I think, to Third Reading, but the bill would cover criminal matters except where, and there's qualifying language on it . . . ah . . ."

Palmer: "Yeah, it does apply to criminal matters . . ."

Berman: "On page . . . I'm trying to find it for you, Romie, but it could . . . if there's a fine for a criminal action which involves . . . ah . . . no . . . ah . . . 'mens rea' . . . ah . . . you know, unlawful intention by the . . . ah . . . defendant, this bill might apply; but, again, . . . ah . . . that's not relevant to Amendment Number 1."

Palmer: "Well, it . . . ah . . . on the amendment then it's any insurance company organized under the laws of the state?"

Berman: "That's right."

Palmer: "What about foreign insurance companies?"

Berman: "I'm sorry, I didn't hear you."

Palmer: "What about foreign insurance companies that are not organized under



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Berman: "This . . . this bill wouldn't affect them."

Palmer: "O.K., thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 1147. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. On the order of House Bills, Third Reading, appears House Bill 1528. The chair recognizes Representative VonBoeckman. Representative VonBoeckman, do you desire to have House Bill 1528 returned from the order of Third Reading to Second Reading for the purpose of an amendment?"

VonBoeckman: "Yes, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objection? Hearing none, it's returned to the order of Second Reading. House Bill . . ."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment 1 amends House Bill 1528 and so forth."

VonBoeckman: "What this amendment does is bring it in conformity with the . . . ah . . . regulations of the Highway Department in . . . ah . . . making public intentions of the Department of Conservation to . . . ah . . . for future land requisition. I ask your support in this amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman's moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 1528. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; and the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. On the order of House Bills, Third Reading, appears House Bill 1103. Representative Holewinski is recognized. Holewinski? Holewinski. Representative Houlihan, will you stop interfering with Representative Holewinski's business. 1103."

Holewinski: "Mr. Chairman, . . . ah . . . Mr. Speaker and members of the House, Amendment Number 3 is really technical in nature. I ask that the bill be brought for this. As originally drafted, the bill would have required . . . ah . . . insurance companies to require disclosure of all their premiums; and this was really not my intent, therefore, Amendment Number 3 excludes all weal . . . health, life and accident insurance



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from disclosure requirements of the bill. Ah . . . I bounced it off the Chairman of the Committee on Banks and Savings and Loans and he saw no objections with it; and I move its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman's moved the adoption of Amendment Number . . . oh, pardon me, return it to the order of Second Reading for the purpose of an amendment."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 3 amends House Bill 1103 on page 1 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "You've heard the explanation of the amendment. All those in favor of the adoption . . . Representative Shea."

Shea: "Now, what . . . if . . . you're leaving 1 and 2 on this bill and putting 3 on?"

Holiwinski: "That . . . that's correct."

Shea: "Now, what . . . when you say it's technical, what does 3 do?"

Holiwinski: "As . . . as I explained, Representative Shea, originally the bill required . . . ah . . . disclosure of all insurance premiums, that was not my intention, . . . therefore, Amendment Number 3 excludes the requirements of disclosure for life, health and accident insurance, which are really irrelevant to the purpose of the bill. This, as you may recall, this bill was the . . . is the financial disclosure . . . ah . . . bill for financial institutions; . . . ah . . . and I really thought it was a mistake and bounced it off a few people, who agreed that it just wasn't specific enough."

Shea: "Well, could . . . could you explain to me, and I'm looking at the amendments, you know, what . . . what do they consider a neighborhood?"

Holiwinski: "Ah . . . A neighborhood is defined in the bill as a zip code area. The bill includes definitions of each one of the . . . ah . . . technical terms."

Shea: "All right."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hill."

Hill: "I wonder if the Representative will yield to a question?"

Holiwinski: "Yes, I will."

Speaker Redmond: "Says he will."

Hill: "What are you doing by this amendment? You're taking out a section that . . ."



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Holiwinski: "I'm not . . ."

Hill: ". . . that would eliminate disclosure on . . . in . . . from insurance companies on . . ."

Holiwinski: "Health, accident and life insurance., because those are . . . what we're looking through this bill is the investment policies of people who are involved in home financing and really insurance red lining type thing; and those factors are . . . are not relevant to the . . . to our objective."

Hill: "Well, it seems to me they would be very relevant. I would . . . ah . . . it seems that as far as, at least I'm concerned, that if you would get these particular figures you would know more what's going on, wouldn't you?"

Holiwinski: "Well, . . ."

Hill: "And you're weakening your bill instead of strengthening it."

Holiwinski: "No, Representative, we are . . . ah . . . we're still going to get the important insurance figures, the homeowners insurance, fire, theft casualty. Those are the ones that are relevant for investment and . . . and urban communities. Life and health are . . . ah . . . nobody could see any merit in asking for that . . . ah . . ."

Hill: "This just covers life and health and . . ."

Holiwinski: "Life and health and accident."

Hill: "O.K."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? Question is on the adoption of Amendment Number 3 to House Bill 1103. All in favor indicate by saying 'aye', 'no'; the amendment's . . . the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Third . . . any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. On the order of House Bills, Third Reading, appears House Bill 2153. Representative Kent is recognized."

Kent: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I'd like to bring 2153 back to Second Reading for a housekeeping amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objection? House Bill 2153 is returned to the order of Second Reading for the purpose of an amendment."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 1, Kent, amends House Bill 2153 on page 1, line 1, and so forth."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kent."

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Kent: "Amendment Number 1 is just to bring the . . . ah . . . bill in the proper form. I urge your . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "The lady has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 2153. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; and the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted."

Kent: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Representative Neff, did you desire to have 2167 brought back? 2167? On the order of House Bills, Third Reading, appears House Bill 2167. Representative Neff is recognized."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2167, Neff."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Neff . . ."

Jack O'Brien: "Representative Neff."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Neff, did you want this returned to the order of Second Reading, Representative Neff? 2167? I have it jotted down on a pad up here, I . . . don't have an amendment so we'll have to . . . did you want this returned? Take it out of the Record temporarily. We'll go to House Bill 2189. Representative Peters."

Peters: "Mr. Speaker, I ask leave to bring 2189 from Third to Second Reading for purpose of an amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objection? Hearing none, it will be returned from the order of Sec . . . Third Reading to the order of Second Reading."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 1, Peters, amends House Bill 2189 on page 1, line 1, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Peters."

Peters: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, ladies and gentlemen of the House, what this does is to take care of a problem in regards to the awarding of . . . ah . . . lotteries; and the amendment provides . . . ah . . . that in the drawing for a lottery, the lottery drawing must continue until a winning ticket is selected."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 2189 to House . . . oh, Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 2189. All in favor say . . ."

Peters: "No, Number 2, I'm sorry, I meant Number 1."

Speaker Redmond: "Amendment Number . . ."



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Peters: "I'm sorry, you're right."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 2189. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading."

Peters: "Thank you, sir."

Speaker Redmond: "On the order of House Bills, Third Reading, appears House Bill 1155. We recognize Representative Flinn."

Flinn: "Ah . . . Thank you, Mr. Speaker, . . . ah . . . I would like to have House Bill 1155 called back to Second Reading for the purpose of . . . ah . . . putting on an amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objection? House Bill 1155 returned to the order of Second Reading. Representative Flinn, . . ."

Flinn: "Would the . . ."

Speaker Redmond: ". . . do you have the amendment?"

Jack O'Brien: "Ah . . . Amendment Number 1 amends House Bill 1155 on page 2, line 11, and so forth."

Flinn: "I'd like to yield to Representative Kane, I didn't know he was on the floor. I was going to handle this amendment for him."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kane."

Kane: "There should be another number to that amendment. I think Amendment Number 1 was defeated."

Speaker Redmond: "We'll have to take it out of the Record, now. It's in Enrolling and Engrossing. I guess we returned it from the order of Enrolling and Engrossing to the . . . 2387, Emil Jones? On the order of House Bills, Second Reading. Take that one out of the Record. 2404, Representative Tipsword, do you want that called? Representative Bradley, does Representative Tipsword want 2404 called? I guess he's temporarily off the floor."

Bradley: "Take it out of the Record for a minute, he'll be right back."

Speaker Redmond: "2406? Take that one out of the Record. 2414? Is Representative D'Arco, do you want that one called? Take that out of the Record. 2415, Representative Fary?"

Jack O'Brien: "Out of the Record."



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Speaker Redmond: "Take that out of the Record. 2422. Representative Huff?  
2439, E. M. Barnes."

Jack O'Brien: "Mr. J. M. Barnes wanted that out of the Record."

Speaker Redmond: "Was E. M. Barnes. J. M. Barnes, she wants it out . . .  
out of the Record. 2440, 2440."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2440, a bill for an act to amend the Revenue Act.  
Second Reading of the bill. One committee amendment amends House Bill  
2440 on page 1, line 1, by striking, 'Number 162', and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Farley."

Farley: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I would  
move for the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 1 to House Bill  
2440."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman's moved for the adoption of Amendment Number 1  
to House Bill 2440. All in favor say 'aye' . . . Representative  
Walsh."

Walsh: "Would the gentleman yield to a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Walsh: "Ah . . . This . . . ah . . . is a bill that Representative Schlick-  
man was interested in yesterday. I wonder if the amendments answers  
the objections that he had to it?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "I had talked to Gene, and he said go ahead with it today."

Walsh: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1  
to House Bill 2440. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes'  
have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2478."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2478, Daniels, a bill for an act to amend an  
act to provide for the creation of management of forest preserve dis-  
tricts. Second Reading of the bill. No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 1, Daniels, amends House Bill 2478 on page  
2, line 1, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Daniels."



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Daniels: "Mr. Speaker, ladies and gentlemen of the House, Amendment Number 1 is merely a change in a spelling error in the bill. From, 'siltaculture', to 'silvercultural'. I move the adoption of Amendment Number 1."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 2478. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2593."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2593, a bill for an act to amend the Illinois Harness Racing Act. Second Reading of the bill. One committee amendment amends . . . House Bill 2593 on page 1, line 2, by deleting, '28.1', and inserting in lieu, thereof, the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Farley."

Farley: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, this is a committee amendment; and I would move for the adoption of . . . ah . . . Committee Amendment Number 1."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 2593. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2607."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2607, McPartlin, a bill for an act to amend the Illinois Health Facilities Act. Second Reading of the bill. One committee amendment amends House Bill 2607 on page 1 after line 7 by adding the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McPartlin, I mean, Shea."

Shea: "I move for the adoption of the committee amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 2607. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2686."

Jack O'Brien: "There's a fiscal note requested and not filed."

Speaker Redmond: "A fiscal note has been requested and not filed. 2692."

Jack O'Brien: "Mrs. Stiehl doesn't want her bill called."



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Speaker Redmond: "O.K. 2695, Representative Duff on the floor? Take it out of the Record. 2697, huh?"

Jack O'Brien: "Mr. Duff is in here."

Speaker Redmond: "Where is he? Oh, he isn't in his seat."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2695, Duff, a bill for an act to amend an act in relation to the performance of medical and dental or surgical procedures on the counselling for minors. Second Reading of the bill. One committee amendment . . ."

Duff: "Well, Mr. Chairman, ladies and gentleman of the House, the . . . ah . . . the amendment from the committee was a product of some objections that were made . . . ah . . . relative to a case law in the general area. I have changed my amendment to . . . changed the Medical Practice Act so that the consent of parents is required for surgery on minors . . . ah . . . on the premise that the minor is not knowledgeable in the area of informed consent in all cases. Ah . . . I move the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 1."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 2695. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. Representative Duff, do you desire to have 70 and 74 called? House Bill 70?"

Duff: "Ah . . . Mr. Chairman, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I . . . ah . . . are there one or two on that, Jack?"

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 70, Duff, a bill for an act concerning fees . . . ah . . . wait a minute . . . fees and allowances paid to jurors. Second Reading of the bill. No committee amendments."

Duff: "No, that's . . . that's not accurate, it should be . . . oh, yes, there are two amendments, no committee amendments. Ah . . . The first one . . . ah . . ."

Jack O'Brien: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Duff: "Yes, Mr. Chairman, I have two."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 1, Duff, amends House Bill 70 on page 2 by adding after line 25 the following, 'Section 2 of this act shall be effective July 1, 1976'."

Duff: "Well, Mr. Chairman, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I promised



the committee I'd change the effective date and then . . . ah . . . and then . . . ah . . . table the appropriations bill; and so I move the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 1, which changes the effective date."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman's moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 70. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 2, Duff, amends House Bill 70 on page 2 as follows and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Duff."

Duff: "Ah . . . I don't have it in front of me, Mr. Chairman, I believe that that is the technical amendment of words related to months. Ah . . . It is not a substantively important change in the bill."

Jack O'Brien: "On line 2 deleting, 'in', on line 3 deleting, 'full 4', and in lieu, thereof, inserting . . ."

Duff: "Oh, I'm sorry, it is important. It does make it a full payment of the, instead of one half payment, of the . . . ah . . . jurors fees on criminal cases only. I move the adoption of Amendment Number 2."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 2 to House Bill 70. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 74."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 74, Duff, a bill for an act to amend an act concerning fees and salaries. Second Reading of the bill. No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "Floor Amendment Number 1, Duff, amends House Bill 74 on page 4 by adding after line 32 the following: 'Section 2 of this act shall be effective July 1, 1976'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Duff."

Duff: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, ladies and gentlemen of the House, this is part of the same agreement with the Appropriation's Committee; and after this bill is moved to Third, I would like permission to . . . ah . . . table the two other bills, if I may. Ah . . . This will



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change the effective date. I move the . . . ah . . . adoption of Amendment Number 1."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 74. All in favor say 'aye' and oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 2 amends House Bill 74 on page 3, line 18, by deleting, 'January', and inserting, 'July', and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Duff."

Duff: "These are words to the same effect . . . ah . . . in reference to the change of the time it would be applicable. I move the adoption of Amendment Number 2."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 2 to House Bill 74. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading."

Duff: "Mr. Chairman, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Duff."

Duff: "At this time I would like to . . . ah . . . move to table . . . ah . . . House Bill 69 and House Bill 75, which are the appropriation bills that would have accompanied those two bills."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the gentleman have leave? House Bill 69 and House Bill 75 are tabled. On the order of House Bills, Second Reading, appears House Bill 1426. Representative Schisler. Representative . . . Schisler on 1426."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1426 was read a second time previously and we were on Amendment Number 5, Craig, amends House Bill 1426 on page 6, line 32, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Craig. Craig."

Craig: "Mr. Speaker and members of the House, Amendment Number 5 is an amendment for \$150,000 that goes back to the Soil and Water Conservation District. They was wanting . . . they thought they was going to need \$250,000, but they compromised on \$150,000. Now, this means about \$1,500 more per Soil and Water Conservation District for the nontechnical and clerical help in these districts."



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Speaker Redmond: "Move the adoption of the amendment?"

Craig: "I move for the adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the Amendment Number 5 be adopted.

All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendment?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 6, Craig, amends House Bill 1426 on page 9 by inserting between lines 3 and 4 the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Craig."

Craig: "Mr. Speaker and members of the House, Amendment Number 6 is an appropriation for \$51,800, which comes from the Ag. Premium Fund for the restoring of the horse barns that were due to cause of the fire at the Martinville County Fair."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of . . ."

Craig: "I move for the adoption."

Speaker Redmond: ". . . the gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 6 to House Bill 1426. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 7, Lechowicz, amends House Bill 1426 as amended on page 4, line 33, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, Amendment Number 7 restores approximately \$48,000 . . . ah . . . within a department's budget. This is a . . . ah . . . an item that was put up in committee and internally discussed it with the both staffs in conjunction with the department; and I move for the restoration of \$48,000 on Amendment Number 7."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment Number 7 to House Bill 1426. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment is adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "No further amendments. Third Reading. Representative McAuliffe on the floor? 2697."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2697, Grotberg, Representative Grotberg."

Speaker Redmond: "He's on the floor."

Jack O'Brien: "A bill for an act to amend an act creating the Department of



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Children and Family Services. Second Reading of the bill. No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor? Take it out of the Record. 2715, Representative Dunn, do you desire to have the bill to be called, Ralph Dunn? Take that out of the Record. 2762? Representative Hart is not . . . 2769."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2769, a bill for an act to amend the Civil Practice Act. Second Reading of the bill. Committee Amendment Number 1 amends House Bill 2769 on page 1 by deleting lines 1 and 2 and insert in lieu, thereof, the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, ladies and gentlemen of the House, Amendment Number 1 is really the whole bill. This is a medical malpractice panel, provides for a method of disposing of medical malpractice insurance. This is . . . Amendment Number 1 is an agreed subcommittee report that was approved by the whole committee; and I move for the adoption of the amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 2769. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Committee Amendment Number 2 amends House Bill 2769 as amended by adding on page 6, line 27, the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "I move for the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 2."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the . . . Representative Daniels."

Daniels: "Gerry, could you tell us what . . . ah . . . Number 2 does?"

Shea: "Yeah, that . . . would you read the amendment. It's a very short one-paragraph amendment?"

Jack O'Brien: "5, 'If a party shall reject unanimous determination of the Medical Review Panel, as filing of such written rejection shall be deemed and constitute a refiling of his complaint, if plaintiff or his answer, if defendant for the purpose of any motions as hereinafter provided pursuant to Section 41 of this act'."

Shea: "What that does is state that after the finding of the panel, if one of the parties proceed against the unanimous decision, that starts the



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Section 41 time running."

Daniels: "Yeah, this . . . this is a good amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giorgi, for what purpose do you arise?"

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, in these . . . ah . . . malpractice suits, where did the theory of all that a . . . a judge, a lawyer and a doctor should be the . . . do the first reviewing, what about the consumers that . . . ah . . . that's involved in the malpractice suit? Where'd this theory evolve? I thought the . . . ah . . . we had to get experience from the Industrial Arbitrating Commission."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. . . . Mr. Giorgi, we're passed that amendment. We adopted 1, we're on Number 2, you're . . ."

Giorgi: "Yeah, but I think that the members would like to be enlightened today . . ."

Shea: "Well, I'm . . . I'm sure they will at the time we get to Third Reading."

Giorgi: "Well, I think you should have explained the first amendment then, you didn't explain it."

Speaker Redmond: "Question is on the adoption of Amendment Number 2 to House Bill 2769; and all in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; and the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Committee Amendment Number 3 was tabled in committee. Committee Amendment Number 4 amends House Bill 2769 as amended by adding on page 7 . . . 7 between lines 19 and 20 the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "This amendment . . . this amendment provides that the Medical Society shall keep a roster of doctors available to testify on behalf of parties; and I'd move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved . . . Representative Shea, would you take a look at the amendments up here at the desk."

Shea: "This is Amendment Number 4, is it not?"

Speaker Redmond: "Appears to be identical with 2."

Jack O'Brien: "Looks identical to Amendment 2."

Speaker Redmond: "Take that out of the Record temporarily. On the order of House Bills, Third Reading, appears House Bill 1928. The chair recog-



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nizes Representative Lundy."

Lundy: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members of the House."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Ah . . . Could I inquire, Mr. Speaker, as to the order in which we are . . . 1928 is considerably higher than where we left off yesterday; and I . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "If you'll wait just minute for the motion, I think you'll understand what we're doing?"

Walsh: "All right, we were on the order of Third Reading, though, we weren't on the order of tabling bills, which is what I hope the gentleman is doing."

Lundy: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members of the House, . . . ah . . . House Bill 1928 is a bill which amends the House Maintenance Organizations Act. It really is quite a narrow bill on the form that it came out of the committee; and I was . . . ah . . . approached by the Department of Public Health and the Department of Insurance and asked to add to the bill an amendment which contains some technical corrections in the act as originally . . . ah . . . passed by this House, which the two departments in administering the act have found to be necessary; and I said that I would attempt to do that, and so I would ask for leave at this time to bring House Bill 1928 back from the order of Third Reading to the order of Second Reading to add an amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Well, I object to that procedure, Mr. Speaker, that bill should be called in the order it appears on Third Reading and then if the gentleman wishes to make that motion, he may do so; but we cannot go out of order for the purpose of bringing a bill back to the order of Second Reading. That's just simply not contemplated in the rules; and I object to the . . . ah . . . procedure."

Speaker Redmond: "In as much as I have done that repeatedly this morning with no objection, it would seem to me that I must treat everybody the same, . . ."

Walsh: "Well, . . ."

Speaker Redmond: ". . . unless you are supported by . . ."



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Walsh: ". . . if there is no objection, then you may do it, I suppose. I don't think you ought to do it at any time, objection or not."

Speaker Redmond: "Are you . . . are you supported by 89 members in your objection?"

Walsh: "This is the first time I've been conscious of you doing it. I . . . I'm sure that 89 members will support me in this, because it's eminently right."

Speaker Redmond: "O.K., we'll take a Roll Call vote. Representative Lundy."

Lundy: "Mr. Speaker, if I may, there is a good reason for this procedure, Mr. Walsh, and it is that if a bill is reached on the order of Third Reading and then taken back for an amendment, and the amendment is adopted, the bill may not be considered that same day since it has to be . . . engrossed again with a new amendment in it; and it results in a delay for the sponsor of the bill, which will not occur if the . . . the procedure that's followed . . . ah . . . that is attempted now is followed and many members have done it on the floor this morning and on previous days and there was no objection . . . ah . . . and I think it's a perfectly proper procedure. Nobody is prejudiced by it."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Well, first of all, I want to assure the gentleman who is a distinguished member of the Rules Committee and has probably offered more suggestions as to ways to operate this House through the rules than any other member on this floor that I am not picking on him. I assure you that I was not aware that we had been doing this this morning. Now, secondly, this is an extraordinary procedure to take a bill from Third to Second Reading. It's something that we really ought to discourage where possible, . . . ah . . . because it's time-consuming and . . . ah . . . is, indeed, extraordinary and . . . ah . . . I would suggest that the sponsor . . . ah . . . is not really aware of what his bill is doing and is . . . ah . . . open to suggestions . . . ah . . . at a time when he shouldn't be with respect to it. So I suggest that the procedure is wrong; I am shocked that he of all the members on this floor would do something that is so obviously in violation of the rules."



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Speaker Redmond: "Will you state your motion, Representative Walsh?"

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, I suggest that it is you that should state a motion. You are the one that is in violation of the rules, you should ask for 89 members to support your motion to go out of order."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "Well, Mr. Speaker, ladies and gentlemen of the House, the Speaker has repeatedly been doing this with leave of the House this morning. Now, all of a sudden the Assistant Minority Leader chooses to make an issue of it. Is it some bill in particular? Is it some person in particular? It always happens to be with a Democrat, why no Republicans? When Mr. McMaster wanted to change a bill, when other people wanted to change bills. Is there some reason that it's just with a Democratic sponsor, Mr. Assistant Minority Leader?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hill, for what purpose do you arise?"

Hill: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker and . . . ah . . . members of the House, . . . ah . . . I'd like to ask Representative Katz what his opinion is of this, . . . ah . . . because we haven't adopted the new laws or new rules yet; and I'd like to have his opinion on this. I wonder if he'd get up and say a few words."

Speaker Redmond: "He'd be glad to do it, but I don't think he's here."

Hill: "Oh, he's not here? Oh, pardon me."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Calvo."

Calvo: "Well, Mr. Speaker, . . . ah . . . somebody turned me off."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Calvo."

Calvo: "Yeah, Mr. Speaker, the only thing I would suggest about that out of order, is maybe the Assistant Minority Leader is out of order."

Speaker Redmond: "Tut tut, as I understand your motion, Representative Walsh, is that you desire to have Representative Peters', Representative McMaster's, Representative Daniel's, Representative Kent's bills returned from the order of Third Reading to the order of Second Reading so that we can unamend them and then put them back the way they were before this morning. Is that what your motion is?"

Walsh: "Now, if I may respond to that, Mr. Speaker, I don't even want Representative Willer's bill moved back to Second Reading so that we can unamend it. I'm objecting to this bill; and as I pointed out



before, and I don't know what the Majority Leader was doing at the time, I was unaware that you were doing this. I further suggest that it is not up to me to make a motion. It is you who ought to violate the rules, you can do it with 107 votes, I find, and I suggest that Mr. Lundy or you, Mr. Speaker, if you want to come down here and take a microphone, address the Chair and ask to suspend the appropriate rule."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "Could I ask the Assistant Minority Leader a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Shea: "When the other Assistant Minority Leader, moved two of his bills, how come you didn't object at that time?"

Walsh: "Everybody knows that Mr. Duff is special."

Shea: "Would you like to withdraw your objection to all this now, or could Mr. Duff withdraw it for you?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Duff."

Duff: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I had no idea that those bills of mine were being called out of order; and I think Representative Walsh is sweet, too."

Speaker Redmond: "The ruling of the Chair is that House Bill 1928 is returned to the order of Second Reading for the purpose of an amendment. Now, if you desire . . ."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, you can't possibly make a ruling like that . . ."

Speaker Redmond: ". . . there's a way . . . there's a way for you . . . there's a way for you to appeal the motion and that's to be supported by 89 members. Now, the question is or a motion of Mr. Walsh is that the . . . the . . . ah . . . Chair be overruled. He's appealing the ruling of the Chair and on that he'll take 89 votes; and all that want to overrule the rulings of the Chair vote 'aye', oppose vote 'no'. Roll Call. Mr. Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, I suggest to you that if Speaker Blair had conducted himself in that fashion, Speaker Blair would be hanging by his thumbs from the rafters. You, Mr. Speaker, have done something that is absolutely out of order. The rules clearly say that we shall take bills and call them in order. You can't rule from the Chair that you can do this."



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Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? On this quest . . . take the Record . . . on this question there are 14 'yes' and 73 'no'; the . . . Representative Kempiners votes 'aye'; and the Chair has been sustained. Representative Lundy. Representative Walsh, do you want to talk again?"

Walsh: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I want to question the presence of a quorum."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pierce."

Pierce: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, I pushed the wrong button, I'd like to be voting 'no' on this."

Speaker Redmond: "Record the gentleman as 'no'. Representative . . . 'no' for Stubblefield. Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Question the presence of a quorum, reuquest a call of the House."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea, and a quorum has been questioned. Representative . . . Representative Berman."

Berman: Mr. Speaker, I rise on a point of personal privilege."

Speaker Redmond: "State your point."

Berman: "Now, we've been moving along this morning on matters of noncontrover. . . noncontroversy, because we all recognize, and all of us who are down here today recognize, that it's an imposition on us and our families to be here on a Saturday, but we are here because we felt that noncontroversial matters could be moved along so that when we come back Monday we could try to move the bills in a very deliberative way. Now, we find because of some one person's peak that a quorum is being called and the efforts of all of us that are here today to try to clean up some of the noncontroversial matters may be put to no useful purpose; and I think that that's an insult to every person on this floor that is here today. We're here to try to clean up some things that really don't impose upon anybody, but must be done; and I, as one, think it's a great insult to me and to every other member, Republican and Democrat, who stay here on a Saturday, to clean up noncontroversial matters when the Assistant Minority Leader calls for a quorum because of something that really doesn't hurt anybody. We're trying to move along and we need some cooperation; and I think it's an insult to all of us here for that kind of a quorum call to be made; and I'm going to ask the Min . . . the



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Assistant Minority Leader to reconsider that . . . that call."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "Well, Mr. Speaker, if we take a quorum call and there aren't 89 members present, I'm sure you know how to get the other bodies here."

Speaker Redmond: "Call out the National Guard if need be. Representative Telcser, and it may need be."

Unknown: "What?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Telcser, did you ask for recognition? Representative Hill."

Hill: "Mr. Speaker and members of the House, I'm upset that I'm here this Saturday. It seems to me that a weekend like this that all of us should be home, but I'm here and I'm glad that the Minority Leader asked for a quorum call. I'm going to vote against the Minority Leader and I just want to say this to the membership, that I want to congratulate each and every one of you people that are here this Saturday, but I want it on Record, I want it on Record that whoever isn't here someone had not be pushing that button. I'm getting a little fed up to sit on this floor day in and day out when some people don't even show up and aren't being made a damn fool by some of the individuals that aren't here. It seems to me that we're elected to serve the people of our districts, and that's why I'm here and don't be pushing buttons if that person isn't here; and I want a record, I want a Record of this kept, and I want a record given to me of this Roll Call. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mann."

Mann: "Well, Mr. Speaker and members of the House, no one has greater respect for the Minority Leader, the Assistant Minority Leader, than I do having served with them for seven terms, but really, I think, . . . ah . . . Mr. Assistant Minority Leader, that you have been among the most vocal exponents and critics of the . . . ah . . . of the deadlines we have been trying to reach, you've repeatedly voiced concern about the time we're taking and here you are eating up an hour of our precious time on a Saturday. Now, on the time that I've served here, there has not been a man who has been more just or fair, in my opinion, in the matter in which he has run this House; and I



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think it's unfair to . . . to engage in this nit picking against the Speaker. I think it's extremely unfair, and I think we ought to move along with the business at hand; and won't you please withdraw that motion for a quorum, Mr. Assistant Minority Leader?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Yes, well, I'm . . . I'm happy to see that the gentleman from Chicago does not deal in absolutes. Now, I am also interested to learn that the Chairman of the Democratic Conference knows that we are only going to consider noncontroversial items today. Now, if the Speaker and the Majority Leader would ratify that decision, perhaps second that decision, we'd all feel a lot more comfortable and perhaps we could get back to work, if . . . ah . . . if Representative Hill does get his accurate Roll Call, on which I would join him."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Boyle."

Boyle: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I believe the distinguished gentleman has asked for a quorum call; and I'd like to have that quorum call before half the members on his side get out of the . . . off the floor of the House, or either that or I'd direct the Speaker to have the Sergeant at Arm lock the door they're . . . they're going like rats off a sinking ship here."

Speaker Redmond: "The Doorkeeper will bar the doors. We'll . . . we'll have quorum call, will all those that are present let's press the 'present' button. Go ahead. Roll Call. Representative Shea."

Shea: "Again, on the quorum call, I would like to show members present that have been and will be carried as 'present' but are excused to be at a subcommittee in Chicago on election. I want them on the Record. Representative Kozubowski, Representative Leverenz, Laurino, Bluthardt, Collins, McPartlin, DiPrima, Huff, Miller and Mahar."

Speaker Redmond: "Take the Record, Mr. Clerk, we don't need those, there's 98 on here, so that's a quorum, 99, take the Record."

Shea: "I still want it on the Record and they should be carried on this Roll Call, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "It shows . . . they will be shown as being 'present'. Representative Lauer."

Lauer: "Record me 'present', please, Mr. Speaker."



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Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lauer is 'present'. Representative Skinner, Representative Schoeberlein, . . ."

Skinner: "I am here."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner wants to talk."

Skinner: "Yes, no, Mr. Redmond, I wish to have entered on the Record my objection to having them counted as 'present' for the purpose of a quorum."

Speaker Redmond: "Let the Record show . . . show the objection. Representative Beaupre."

Beaupre: "Mr. Speaker, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, here we are on a Saturday as we have been in the past as we're obviously going to be in the future. I can tell you that I called my law office, for instance, yesterday, talked to a receptionist who has worked for my firm for a year and a half. I asked for one of my partners; and she said, 'may I tell him who's calling?'. You know that's the kind of situation that all of us face here, and as a result of the dilatory tactics that have constantly taken place from the other side of the aisle. We're going to be faced with it until July 1st and maybe thereafter; and I, for one, resent it. It makes it very difficult to raise a family, to do the kind of things we need to do in order to sustain ourselves and our family and to come down here and represent the people that we've been elected to represent; and if we're going to continue to have that kind of dilatory action on the . . . on the part of the other side of this aisle. If we don't make it out of here by July 1st, there's absolutely no question of who's responsible for it. It's been . . . been indicated a number of times . . . ah . . . in the last two weeks, and . . . and let the Record show . . . ah . . . what has been happening here and why we aren't getting our business done."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, the Chair has ruled that there is a quorum present. There's no . . . there's no business before the House, there's no reason for any debate or explaining of . . . of . . . ah . . . votes or anything else that I know anything about, so Representative Lundy, I'll recognize you. Wait a minute, now, hear what he's going to say. Representative Lundy."



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Lundy: "Yes, thank you, Mr. Speaker. As I understand it now, House Bill 1920 has been returned to the order of Second Reading for . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "That is correct."

Lundy: "All right, would you hold the bill on Second Reading for . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "It will be held. The bill will be held. Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Well, I think I'm . . . let me re . . . respond to what the last gentleman said and to what other gentleman on the other side have said."

Speaker Redmond: "I think you're out of order. He's just having it held, there's no reason to respond to anything. House Bills, Second Reading, appears . . . Representative Washburn."

Washburn: "Mr. Speaker, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I think, Mr. Speaker, we are here on Saturday and we're here to be heard, and I think that you should extend that courtesy to Mr. Walsh, now."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Now, if I may respond to the . . . ah . . . gentleman on the other side that have spoken about dilatory tactics. I submit to you that we have not been guilty of dilatory tactics at all. We just feel, Mr. Speaker, that we ought to have some input in how this House is run. If the Chair intends to operate in violation of the rules, we think we ought to be in on it. We ought to be told. The Leadership of the Republican Party should be in consultation with the Speaker and told about what he intends to do and how he intends to call bills. Now, you know very well, Mr. Speaker, many of the bills that were called this morning had no particular political significance, but if we permit you, sir, to operate in the way that you have been operating, in absolute violation of the rules, then you can do whatever you want with respect to political and other bills. Now, I, Mr. Speaker, you have some people on your side there that are not gentlemen."

Speaker Redmond: "Give the gentleman order."

Walsh: "Now, we will not have what they term as dilatory tactics if, sir, you will only bring Mr. Washburn in on what you are doing. If you will do that, I'm sure that we can go along very, very smoothly; and where the situation warrants, we can perhaps operate in violation of



the rules, but that does not include <sup>any</sup> riding rough shot and making a ruling such as the one you made. Anyone here who has a conscience and voted to sustain you on that ruling, sir, should go to confession. I would recommend that especially for Representatives Beaupre and Mann."

Speaker Redmond: "To whom?"

Walsh: "I'm . . . very seriously . . . very seriously."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative, do you have faculties in the Springfield Diocese? Representative Shea."

Walsh: "We'll leave that to you. I haven't finished and I'm very serious, Mr. Speaker, that if you will . . . if you will consult with the Minority, then you will not have what they term to be, but are not, dilatory practices. We are, simply, trying to do what we were elected to do by the people in our district. We are Republicans, we are entitled to consideration and you, sir, ought to start giving them."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "Could we just get on with the business of the House, now?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Washburn."

Washburn: "Thank you, Mr. . . . thank you, Mr. Speaker, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, on a very pleasant note, it's my privilege to introduce Mrs. John Kriegsman, the wife of one of our former colleagues, the former Representative John Kriegsman. She's in the Gallery to our left."

Speaker Redmond: "House Bills, Second Reading. On House Bills, Second Reading, appears House Bill 2786, Representative Cunningham? Is he in the Chamber? Representative Young?"

Yonge: "On 2801, Mr. Speaker? On 280 . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Young. Will the gentleman standing up between the member in the Chair, please, take their seat. 2801."

Yonge: "2801."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2801, a bill for an act to amend the Southwest Regional Port District Act. Second Reading of the bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Young."

Jack O'Brien: "One committee amendment amends House Bill 2801 on page 4, line 33, and so forth."



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Younger: "Committee Amendment Number 1, Mr. Speaker and members of the House, changes the word, 'park', to, 'parks'; and changes and includes subsidation of the interest rate; and I move the adoption of this amendment . . . amendment. It . . . ah . . . calls for the . . . ah . . . power of the Southwest Port Authority to subsidize the interest rate on revenue bonds."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Is the lady inferring that the interest rate is . . . this amendment is going to raise the interest rate on the bonds sold? To what level?"

Younger: "This amendment does not raise the interest rate on bonds sold, but a . . . a subsequent part of the bill . . . ah . . . general bill calls for the . . . ah . . . increase of the interest rate."

Hanahan: "To what . . . to what amount?"

Younger: "From 5 . . . from between 5 and 9½ percent."

Hanahan: "From 5 to what percent?"

Younger: "9½ percent."

Hanahan: "To 9½ percent?"

Younger: "Right, that is not a part of the amendment that we're talking about."

Hanahan: "That is not part of this amendment?"

Younger: "No. I move the adoption of the amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Ralph Dunn."

Dunn: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I wonder if the Sponsor would yield for a question, or really a more of a point of inquiry, I'd like to hear it explained again. I . . . I was unable to . . . she has such a nice soft, sweet voice that I was afraid that I wasn't going to catch the impact to the amendment. I'd like for it to be explained again, if I could."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed, Mrs. Younger."

Younger: "The . . . ah . . . bill as originally written calls for the . . . ah . . . establishment of an industrial park by the Southwest Port Authority. The amendment changes the word, 'park', to 'parks'. So the Port Authority would have the capacity to build more than one industrial park. The . . . ah . . . bill as originally amended . . .



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ah . . . written calls for the subsidation by the Southwest Port Authority of firms; and that was an error and the amendment changes that error to call for the subsidizing of the interest rate on revenue bonds . . . ah . . . by the Southwest Port Authority."

Speaker Redmond: "The lady moves the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 2801. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it, and the amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Floor Amendment Number 2, Younge, amends House Bill 2801 on page 5 by deleting lines 6 through 9 inclusive."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Younge."

Younge: "Ah . . . The committee recommended that the . . . ah . . . wording of the bill, which calls for an experimental and practical use of solar energy be deleted; and . . . ah . . . Floor Amendment Number 2 deletes that language; and I move for the adoption of Floor Amendment Number 2."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The lady has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 2 to House Bill 2801. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "No further amendments. Third Reading. 2804. Third Reading. Representative Younge."

Younge: "Speaker, there was one other committee amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Bring it back to the order of Second Reading."

Jack O'Brien: "You got Floor Amendment 2801?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Younge, I understand there's been a mistake in the numbering system here, so . . . ah . . . will you change the amendment to Number 3, is that what we have to do, Mr. Clerk? The amendment we just adopted should have been Amendment Number 3. There were two committee amendments . . ."

Younge: "That's correct."

Speaker Redmond: ". . . and the one we adopted should have been Number 3. Is there another amendment another . . .?"

Jack O'Brien: "Committee Amendment Number 2 amends House Bill 2801 on page 5 by deleting lines 18 through 33 inclusive and inserting in lieu,



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thereof, the following."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Younge."

Younge: "Ah . . . This committee amendment would change the wording which asks for general revenue bonds to be passed by the Authority without referendum. Ah . . . The amendment would take out the . . . ah . . . ability or power to pass general revenue bonds . . . ah . . . general obligation bonds without referendum; and I move the adoption of that amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The lady has moved the adoption of the amendment. All in favor say 'aye' . . . Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Will the lady yield to a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "She indicates she will."

Geo-Karis: "Was that a . . . does your amendment now say that they have to have a referendum for the bonds?"

Younge: "That's . . . that's correct."

Geo-Karis: "Then I'm for the amendment."

Younge: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Question is on the adoption of the amendment. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further."

Speaker Redmond: "Then for the Record there were two committee amendments and Floor Amendment Number 3, is that correct, and they've all been adopted? Third Reading. 2804."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2804, Fennessey, a bill for an act to amend sections of an act to revise the law in relation to the assessment of property. Second Reading of the bill. No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2809."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2809, Younge, a bill for an act to amend the Metropolitan Civil Center Act. Second Reading of the bill. One committee amendment amends House Bill 2809 on page 1 by deleting lines 1 and 2 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Younge."



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Young: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker and members of the House, Committee Amendment Number 1 . . . ah . . . changes the words from , 'Metropolitan Civic Center Act', to the, 'Metro-East Exposition and Performing Arts Authority Act'; and also . . . ah . . . gives the Authority the power to conduct feasibility studies. I move the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 1"

Speaker Redmond: "The lady has moved the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 2809. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; and the 'ayes' have it, the amendment's adopted. Anymore amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "No further amendments. Third Reading. 2820, Representative Huff. Take that out of the Record. 2832, Representative Berman."

Jack O'Brien: "There's a fiscal note requested."

Speaker Redmond: "Fiscal note has been requested, hold that one. 2851."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2851, a bill for an act to amend the Civil Administrative Code. Second Reading of the bill. No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2852."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2852 . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative Madison on the floor? Take that out of the Record. 2866."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2866, a bill for an act authorizing municipalities and counties to provide the violation of ordinances or civil offenses. Second Reading of the bill. No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2885."

Jack O'Brien: "House bill 2885, a bill for an act creating the Illinois Solar Energy Enabling Act. Second Reading of the bill. One committee amendment amends House Bill 2885 on page 2 by deleting lines 20, 21 and 22 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pierce."



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Pierce: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, yeah, Pierce, Mr. Speaker, Committee Amendment Number 1 . . . ah . . . was suggested by 'the Department of Business of Economic Development. They have to . . . they have to administer this act, and they thought it was a little cumbersome the way we introduced it. Ah . . . Committee Amendment Number 1 simplifies . . . ah . . . the administration sets up a division of . . . ah . . . of a Solar Energy Program within the department, rather than a separate division; and I, therefore, move the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 1."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Committee Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 2885. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; and the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "Floor Amendment Number 2, Pierce, amends House Bill 2885 on page 4, line 19, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, would the . . . ah . . . Sponsor yield to a question?"

Pierce: "Ah . . . Questions on what? Committee Amendment Number 1 or Amendment Number 2?"

Geo-Karis: "Yeah, well, I've been trying to get a question on your fir . . . is this Committee Amendment Number 2, Dan, that you're talking about?"

Pierce: "A minute ago, you mean, or right now? We . . . we just adopted, I understand, Amendment Number 1, which is a committee amendment, but I'll be glad to answer questions on it."

Geo-Karis: "No, Dan, that's right, I just had my hand up and he didn't see me. Ah . . . I merely . . . may I just ask you this . . . your . . . Committee Amendment Number 1, would you just explain it briefly for me?"

Pierce: "Yes, Committee . . . the bill as originally introduced set up a separate division of solar energy with a solar energy coordinator within the . . . ah . . . energy office of the Department of Business and Economic Development (D.D.), they didn't want an entire separate division. So now we set up what . . . what is called a . . . ah . . . Illinois Solar Energy Program, not a separate administrative division, within that department to . . . ah . . . to administer this act."



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Ah . . . It came forth in committee with that, and the committee amendment was drafted and approved unanimously in the Committee on Environment, Energy and Natural Resources. That Committee Number . . . that's Amendment Number 1."

Geo-Karis: "O.K., now, would you explain Number 2?"

Pierce: "Ah . . . Have we adopted Number 1? I want to do . . ."

Geo-Karis: "Yeah, it was already adopted anyway, so go ahead."

Pierce: "O.K., now, Amendment Number 2 is . . . is an amendment that I promised to put on in committee that provides for public hearings before we draft solar energy standards. Some members in committee, I think it might have been Mr. Griesheimer or . . . or . . . ah . . . Mrs. Reed or someone who was on the ball in the committee, said that we shouldn't promulgate solar energy procedures and standards without the right to public hearings; and Amendment Number 2 was the amendment I promised to place on on the floor that provided for public hearings before they adopted standards."

Geo-Karis: "Ah . . . Are you moving the adoption of that amendment?"

Pierce: "Yes, and I move the adoption of Amendment Number 2 to House Bill 2885."

Geo-Karis: "O.K., I have no objections. O.K., I have no . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 2 to House Bill 2885. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "No further amendments. Third Reading. 2892."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2892, a bill for an act to amend an act to establish Northeastern Illinois University. Second Reading of the bill. One committee amendment amends House Bill 2892 on page 1 by deleting lines 31 and 32 and . . . out of the Record."

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the Record. 2909. Is Representative Leverenz on the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2909, a bill for an act to amend the Illinois Fire Protection Training Act. Second Reading of the bill. One committee amendment . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "You'll have to take it out of the Record, he doesn't



appear to be here. 2925."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2925, a bill for an act to amend the Fair Employment Practices Act. Second Reading of the bill. One committee amendment amends House Bill . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the Record at the request of the Sponsor. 2957."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2957, a bill for an act to amend the Criminal Code. Second Reading of the bill. One committee amendment amends House Bill 2957 on page 1 by deleting lines 25 through 28 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Flinn."

Flinn: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, . . . ah . . . Committee . . . this is a committee amendment to House Bill 2957, and there was some technical things wrong with the bill as I originally presented it and Representative Getty drew up this amendment and presented in the committee; and I move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 2957. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2982. Representative Totten."

Jack O'Brien: "Out of the Record."

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the Record. 3000."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 3000, a bill for an act in relation to certain federally chartered financial institutions. Second Reading of the bill. No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2196. Representative Daniels."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 2196 was read a second time previously. We adopted Amendment Number 1. Floor Amendment Number 2, Daniels, amends House Bill 2196 on page 2 by deleting line 21 and inserting in lieu, thereof, the following, 'Section 3.07', and so forth."

Daniels: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, . . ."



ah . . . Amendment Number 2 at this time I would withdraw."

Speaker Redmond: "Withdraw Amendment 2, is that correct? Does he have leave?"

Daniels: "Yes, yes, withdraw Amendment Number 2, and I have Amendment Number 3, which has been distributed, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Will you repeat that, please?"

Daniels: "Withdraw Number 2 and I have Amendment Number 3, which has been distributed."

Speaker Redmond: "Amendment 2 has been . . . ah . . ."

Daniels: "Withdrawn."

Speaker Redmond: ". . . I think we'll have to move to table it . . . ah . . . gentleman moves to table Amendment Number 2. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. Amendment Number 2 is tabled. Now, Representative Daniels."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 3 amends House Bill 2196 on page 2 by deleting line 21 and so forth."

Daniels: "Mr. Speaker, ladies and gentlemen of the House, Amendment Number 3 is identical to Amendment Number 2 with the exception that it adds a portion that the department shall not guarantee loans in excess of \$5,000,000 for any one sponsoring authority; and I move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 3 to House 2196. All in favor say 'aye', oppose 'no'; the 'ayes' have it. Any further amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor? No amendments . . ."

All in favor vote 'aye', those oppose . . . who . . . those oppose vote 'no'. If anybody wants to vote 'no' on a specific bill, they can come up to the Clerk's desk and indicate the bills in which they desire to have a 'no' vote. Have all voted who wish? Representative Deavers, 'aye'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the Record. On these bills there's 107 'yes' . . . Representative Hill?"

Hill: ". . . where the people did not answer the quorum call and they are not present now; and I would suggest to the Speaker that you have another Roll Call and get those people off of this Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "Dump the Roll Call. The question is, shall these bills pass? All in favor vote 'aye', oppose vote 'no'; and only vote your own switch. Representative Hudson, did you raise . . . Have all voted who wish? Take the Record. On the question there's 95 'aye', 1 'no'; the bills having received the constitutional majority are, hereby, declared passed. Representative Telcser?"

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker, can I be recorded as voting 'present' on 2606? Do I just tell the Clerk or . . . oh, O.K."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, on House Bill 2769, which is the Medical Malpractice Series, I'd like to hold that on Second Reading until Representative Washington and I get out . . . straighten out the committee reports."



CLAY I:

Evidently, I've fouled up some place and got a wrong amendment, so I'd like to just hold it there."

Speaker Redmond: "Amendment Number 2 were adopted."

Shea: "Amendments 1 and 2 were adopted?"

Speaker Redmond: "Right."

Shea: "All right, now, if we could just leave it in that shape on Second Reading, and then we can get it straightened out."

Speaker Redmond: "It will be held on the order of House Bills, Second Reading. The order of business now is House Bills, Third Reading, on priority of call. We'll return . . . Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, just for a purpose of an announcement. The Appropriation's Committee that was scheduled for Monday morning at 10:00 o'clock, will meet at 12:30. That's for the Appropriations' I and II; I will meet in Room 114, and I believe, Kenny Boyle, you're scheduled for 118 and that's at 12:30, Monday. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "We'll return to the priority call where we left off yesterday . . . it appears House Bill 628."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 628 . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Mr. Walsh wants that out of the Record. I don't . . . I don't see in the rules anyplace where you have the right to take it out of the Roll Call."

Walsh: ". . . there some place."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lundy."

Lundy: "Well, Mr. Speaker, taking a bill out of the Record is an accommodation which the Speaker has always made to the members, but I don't think it's actually provided for in the rules; and I think maybe the proper thing to do would be to go forward with the bill."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is, does Representative Walsh have the right to take 628 out of the Record? All in favor vote 'aye' . . . all in favor vote 'aye' and oppose vote 'no'. Representative Lundy."

Lundy: "I . . . I would withdraw any objection."

Speaker Redmond: "He withdraws the objection. 643."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 643, give me that, a bill for an act to amend the Illinois Pension Code. Third Reading of the bill . . . ah . . . Tipsword."



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Tipsword: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker and members of the House, this is a bill which takes care of a . . . a problem that one state employee ran into who had been misinformed or misunderstood the manner into which he should . . . could pay into the Pension System . . . the State Employees Pension System; and I'd like to correct this for him. This effects only one person in the State of Illinois and was passed out unanimously by the Pension Laws Commission."

Speaker Redmond: "Question is, shall this bill pass? All in favor vote 'aye', oppose vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the Record. On this question there's 96 'aye' and no 'nay'. The bill having received the constitutional majority is, hereby, declared passed. 644."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 644, Griesheimer, is he here? Not here."

Speaker Redmond: "648."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 648, Yourell, not here."

Speaker Redmond: "650."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 650, Stubblefield, . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the Record. 651."

Fredric Selcke: "Caldwell, House Bill 651, a bill for an act to amend the Illinois Municipal Code. Third Reading of the bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Caldwell."

Caldwell: "Ah . . . House Bill 651, . . . ah . . . Mr. Speaker, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, . . . ah . . . is a bill that . . . ah . . . permits the . . . ah . . . superin . . . the directors, I guess, superintendents of police to . . . ah . . . give the officers an opportunity to file within five days when . . . ah . . . they have been suspended instead of three days. Ah . . . This . . . ah . . . this bill now directs itself to . . . ah . . . to a law that has been mandated by the Supreme Court earlier this year; and . . . ah . . . my understanding is that the . . . ah . . . necessary procedures are being taken by the City of Chicago, which this particular bill fav . . . ah . . . addresses itself to; and . . . ah . . . they will be doing it. However, I see no reason for us not to pass this bill since the time has come, I had an understanding with the Corporation Council of the city that it would be called, that they are in the process, I



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understand, of coming in compliance with the law. I move . . . ah . . . this bill's adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Will the Sponsor yield to a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Madigan: "Representative Caldwell, does this bill apply to the City of Chicago?"

Caldwell: "Yes, it does."

Madigan: "Did you state previously that . . . ah . . . there really is no need for this bill, that the city is complying with the court's decision now?"

Caldwell: "Well, it's not what I . . . no, what I said is that I understand that the city is taking the necessary steps to come into compliance with what the Supreme Court of the state has already mandated. The fact remains, however, that . . . ah . . . it's not done as yet."

Madigan: "Well, if the city is coming into compliance, apparently, they have the legal authority to take the steps necessary to come into compliance, why do we need the bill, if the city already has the authorization?"

Caldwell: "Well, well, I indicated in my presentation that . . . ah . . . there's nothing wrong with . . . ah . . . this bill being codified or come into the statute and maybe by the time it is signed by the Governor maybe the city will have set up the necessary machinery to be in compliance with what the Supreme Court has already made it . . . ready mandated; but in the . . . what . . . I see nothing wrong with passing this bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? Question is, shall this bill pass? Those in favor . . ."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, if this bill were taken from the Record, would it be affected by the deadlines?"

Speaker Redmond: "According to . . . no, it's 5/16 . . ."

Unknown: "You have until the 16th of May."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the Record, Representative Caldwell?"



Take it out of the Record. On the order of House Bills, Third Reading, appears . . . Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, on the Calendar on Third Reading appear two or three Bills that would expire on Sunday, May the 11th. I've discussed with Minority Leader and he has no objections that if we will extend to Monday, May the 12th all the Bills on the Calendar that would die on Sunday, May the 11th; and that would be my motion."

Speaker Redmond: "As a point of information, the Chair has researched that subject and according to Chapter 131, Section 1.11, when you compute time, you exclude the first and include the last day; so by operation of law, I think that would be what would happen; and I think that, in effect, I know that's what the rule . . . the rule would have been from the Chair, but just to buttress the motion, I doubt it is in conformance with the statutes of the State of Illinois; and the motion is that any Bill which would expire on Sunday, the date will be extended . . ."

Shea: "May the 11th."

Speaker Redmond: ". . . until May the 12th . . . 12th. Question is on the motion. All in favor indicate by saying 'aye', oppose 'no'. Oh, I guess we need 107. I don't think we need any, because the statute says it, but all those in favor vote 'aye', those oppose vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Take the Record. On this question there's 111 'aye', 1 'no'. The motion carries. On House . . . House Bills, Third Reading, appears House Bill 663."

Unknown: "Take it out of the Record."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 663--whose is that--. . . ah . . . McLendon, a Bill for an Act to amend Acts in relation to liability of cosigners in certain retail installment contracts. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McLendon."

McLendon: "Ah . . . Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this Bill amends the Retail Installment Sales Act and the Motor Vehicle Retail Installment Sale Act. It limits the liability of all persons other than the seller or holder who cosigns a retail installment contract to the extent that such person has received the goods, services or motor vehicle furnished under such contract. However, a parent or



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spouse who cosigns such retail installment contracts may be held liable to the full extent of the deferred payment price, notwithstanding, such parent or spouse has not actually received the goods, services or motor vehicle furnished under such retail installment transaction. The Bill passed out of Judiciary I by a considerable vote; and the intent of the Bill is only to protect the ignorant cosigner who does not know the full extent of legal effect of cosigning. Second, to make the cosigner liable only if the purchaser is not able to pay after the seller or holder has taken appropriate court action. This Bill would put the cosigner in a similar position of a surety, who is liable only if the principal defaults. I ask for a favorable vote, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is, shall this bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', oppose vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the Record. On this question there's 97 'ayes' and no 'nays'; the Bill having received the constitutional majority is, hereby, declared passed. House Bill 668."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 668, Deavers, a Bill for an act to amend the Municipal Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Deavers. Did you take the Record on that last . . .?"

Deavers: "Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, House Bill 668 is an amendment to the Insurance Code, and allows the little county and township municipal fire companies to assess up . . . to invest up to 40,000 of their assets in the local Savings and Loans. For some reason under the statute they have always been excluded and this is an agreed bill with the Department of Insurance. They have no opposition. They testified in behalf of the Bill; and I ask for a favorable Roll Call."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah . . . I made a mistake reading House Bill 665, I'm now reading 668, a Bill for an Act to amend Section of an Act relating to local and mutual district, county and township insurance companies. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Question is, shall this Bill pass? All in favor vote 'aye', oppose vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will



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take the Record. On this question, 104 'ayes', no 'nays'. The bill having received the constitutional majority is, hereby, declared passed. Representative Ewell. 689."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 689, a bill for an act to amend the Illinois Pension Code. Third Reading of the bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Leon."

Leon: "Mr. Speaker, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, this is an upgrading of the park . . . Chicago Park District Pension Bill, all sections of it have been approved by the Pension Laws Commission. It will cost no additional money. The employees who receive additional benefits under this act are to pay an additional amount from their pay into the fund. I'd appreciate a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "Question is, shall this bill pass? All those in favor vote 'aye', oppose 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the Record. On this question there's 102 'ayes', no 'nays'; and the bill having received the constitutional majority is, hereby, declared passed. 692."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 692, Beatty, a bill for an act to amend an act authorizing Public Health Districts. Third Reading of the bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Beatty."

Beatty: "Mr. Speaker, ladies and gentlemen of the House, this bill will allow a Public Health administrator or a doctor to serve as the executive officer of a County Health Board. Now, only a doctor can so serve in such a capacity. Ah . . . If this change is allowed, the normal medical supervision, of course, will continue. This would allow certain County Health Boards to collect fees where patients are insured and receiving medical services. At the present, they are providing this service, but due to this . . . ah . . . the lack of change in the statute they are not able to collect the fees. It effects only four districts, one of them is mine, part of my district in Burbank, Stickney, another is in East St. Louis and in Champaign, Urbana; and it makes . . . ah . . . maybe some other minor changes in the bill, but . . . ah . . . it was passed through committee without a dissenting vote."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is, shall this bill pass? All those in



favor . . . Representative Borchers." MAY 10 1975

Borchers: "Will the Sponsor yield?"

Beatty: "Yes."

Borchers: "Ah . . . I was curious to the fees collected. Do they go into the general fund of the county?"

Beatty: "These fees will probably go into the Local Health District to help them with the services that they are providing."

Borchers: "But there will be some sort of accounting of them, I presume?"

Beatty: "Oh, certainly, yes, sir."

Borchers: "Yeah."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? Question is, shall this bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', oppose vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Representative Geo-Karis. The Clerk will take the Record. On this question, there's 106 'aye', 1 'no'; the bill having received the constitutional majority is, hereby, declared passed. Representative Duff."

Duff: "Well, Mr. Speaker, just a parliamentary inquiry."

Speaker Redmond: "State your inquiry."

Duff: "Ah . . . there . . . there are . . . there was motion and agreement made yesterday that the members who are . . . ah . . . in Chicago on subcommittee could be added to Roll Calls on bills that passed; but I really don't think those members should be voted with their lights if there's any question at all to whether the bill is going to pass; and some of them are being voted."

Speaker Redmond: "This isn't real close, but . . ."

Duff: "Well, I'm just making the point. It's not the only . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "I think your point is well taken."

Duff: ". . . this is not the only Roll Call that I am referring."

Speaker Redmond: "I think your point is well taken. 696."

Fredric Selcke: "House . . . House Bill 696, Dyer, an . . . an act in relation to certain public assistance to the elderly amending certain acts, herein, named. Third Reading of the bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Dyer."

Dyer: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, House Bill 696 was voted out of the County and Township Affairs Committee 18 to 0; I think it would have gone



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clarifying the language. It does just what the synopsis says. Simply clarifies . . . ah . . . the privilege of the non-vote of auditors and the township supervisor in downstate counties, Cook County is exempted from this at their request, to purchase care for elderly people in private nursing homes as well as the county convalescent home where they choose to do this. I would hope for a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Lundy."

Lundy: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members of the House. Would the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "Indicates . . ."

Dyer: "Yes."

Speaker Redmond: ". . . she will."

Lundy: "Is there a requirement that the private nursing home in which . . . from which the services are purchased has to be a licensed nursing home?"

Dyer: "Ah . . . Yes, this must be a licensed home; and, of course, the state has the power of inspection."

Lundy: "Ah . . . Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Palmer."

Palmer: "If the Sponsor would yield for a question? At whose request was Cook County exempted?"

Dyer: "Ah . . . By . . . ah . . . the Cook County . . . ah . . . members on the . . . ah . . . County and Township Committee."

Palmer: "Officials?"

Dyer: "Ah . . . offici . . . repre . . . representatives of the Cook County Board."

Palmer: "Yeah, do they now put them in private nursing homes that you know?"

Dyer: "In Cook County?"

Palmer: "Yeah."

Dyer: "I . . . I can't speake for Cook County, Representative Palmer, I just know that the downstate counties wanted this clarified."

Palmer: "All right, thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Boyle."

Boyle: "Ah . . . I was wondering what . . . ah . . . requirements, if any,



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are in your bill to determine which private nursing homes the Board of Auditors can pick and . . . ah . . . select in the placing of these patients?"

Dyer: "I think in the language . . . ah . . . Representative Boyle, and particularly in the . . . ah . . . amended language, it makes it clear that these . . . that these have to be, you know, qualified licensed nursing homes."

Boyle: "Well, I know, but I . . . I . . . the thing that concerns me . . . ah . . . is I wonder what criteria and what selection process. Suppose there are three or more licensed nursing homes available to the Board of Townships Auditors . . . ah . . . what criteria is there in the act to determine which of the three qualified nursing homes the patients would be placed in? Is this just left simply to the discretion of the township auditors, or do they have to follow some standards . . . ah . . . with respect to the placement of these patients?"

Dyer: "Well, I think there are two . . . ah . . . statements I'd like to make on that, Representative Boyle. Ah . . . One, you'd find standards that, you know, in our Department of Registration and Regulations. Ah . . . Secondly, what we're doing here is . . . is placing the responsibility on the township supervisor and the Board of Auditors, who are locally elected officials. This is part of their responsibility . . . ah . . . to do this."

Boyle: "Well, the . . . the point is that . . . ah . . . now, we are having, I am a member of the Mental Health Visitation's Commission, and we're having a lot of difficulty with respect to the placement . . . ah . . . in nursing homes for patients by the Department of Mental Health; and the process of establishing some criteria to determine which nursing homes the patients . . . ah . . . to be placed in, and . . . and I submit . . . ah . . . I mean I'm gonna' vote for the bill, but I submit that you . . . you might think of this as a problem if you . . . all the nursing homes are licensed by the state, but I think that we have to address ourselves to some criteria or standards to determine which licensed nursing homes these patients can be placed in."

Dyer: "Ah . . . I think I agree with you completely, Representative Boyle, and I'll certainly make it a personal responsibility to follow through



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and check with the Department of Registration and Regulation and see that these are filled out very, very carefully."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Grotberg."

Grotberg: "Yes, one quick question of the Sponsor, if she'll yield?"

Dyer: "Yes."

Grotberg: "Representative Dyer, the synopsis leads out with care in private homes, not private nursing homes. Is it possible then that the townships can contract . . . ah . . . you know, my wife and I want to take in . . . ah . . . a senior person on the township role?"

Dyer: "I think if you read the bill, itself, you'll see that the contractual agreement with the operators of nursing homes, retirement homes or other facilities for the care of the elderly, I think you'd have to find that perhaps you have to become a licensed home in order to do this."

Grotberg: "Very good, then, Mr. Speaker, very briefly on the bill.

I think this is a crucial bill. In the township in which I live, they have out of their general assistance funds been able to only go a little way toward helping many of the people, for instance, that are eligible to live in the sheltered . . . ah . . . homes that I operate in my spare time when I'm back in St. Charles and we've been financing them jointly, but this would free them up to . . . to proceed in the legal manner on a thing that some of them are already doing I think . . . in . . . just to help people; and I would certainly recommend that we send this thing roaring out of here."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mautino."

Mautino: "Will the Speaker yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "Indicates she will."

Mautino: "I mean, will the Sponsor yield for a question, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Redmond: "Indicates she will."

Mautino: "Ah . . . Representative Dyer, one question. If . . . The synopsis also says pays the cost of care. Is that the per diem cost of care of the point system that is enacted now by the department?"

Dyer: "Ah . . . This is to use a . . . a part of the bill, one of the amendments makes it clear that any kinds of funds that . . . that the supervisor handles, may be used to supplement . . . ah . . . in any way that is needed . . . ah . . . basic funds for the . . . for the



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care . . . ah . . . of the elderly in these homes. Ah . . . In other words, in many cases, . . . ah . . . public . . . the State Department of Public Aid, the payment that we . . . ah . . . that the supervisors receive for the state are not sufficient to cover the actual cost of care. This makes it clear that the supervisor can use . . . ah . . . either his general assistance funds or his general funds or his revenue sharing funds to . . . to cover the actual per diem cost of the care."

Mautino: "O.K., if the actual per diem cost, let's say, is \$30 a day for thirty days . . . ah . . . which would be \$900 a month, would it then be fair to say the difference between the aid that's now received, which may be \$300 a month, will be picked up by that township supervisor, that additional \$600?"

Dyer: "That's right, this gives him the privilege to do that if that is the decision on his part."

Mautino: "If he has the funds?"

Dyer: "Correct."

Mautino: "O.K., thank you very much."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hill."

Hill: "I wonder . . . I wonder if the Sponsor would yield to a question?"

Dyer: "Yes."

Hill: "Ah . . . Up in one of the northern counties . . . ah . . . apparently, there's a conflict . . . ah . . . of interest in regards to investing monies in banks up there. Ah . . . In your piece of legislation, would this also be covered, where some local authority could have a nursing home or something like that and it could be found out by the people? I'm afraid that you're getting into an area where a lot of these local officials have interests in nursing homes or a private home, for that matter, is it protected in there, that is, is the taxpayer protected that it's possible to find out whether or not these local authorities do have an interest in these homes that you're trying to place these elderly people in? I think your bill is a very good bill, but I'd like to know if that protection is there."

Dyer: "Ah . . . Representative Hill, I think, in the first place, . . . ah . . . our ethics statements and our campaign, not campaign disclosure,



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but our financial disclosure statements . . . ah . . . perhaps would take care of this. This is an area of . . . that I would be glad to look into. I think any . . . ah . . . anything of this nature there can always be a conflict of interest between a public official, that's just something the public has to find out about. I will be delighted . . . ah . . . if this passes to follow through with this and see if an amendment is needed in the Senate to clarify just the point you brought out."

Hill: "Thank you very much."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Palmer."

Palmer: "In answer to the last question, I think in Chapter 102, which has to do with conflict of interests, directly or indirectly, probably would cover something like this, Jack."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Borchers."

Borchers: "Will the . . . will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Redmond: "Indicates she will."

Borchers: "There is just one point that I want to make certain . . . ah . . . in relation to . . . ah . . . Representative Grotberg's statement that this is a crucial bill, I agree with him. The thing that's important to me here in listening to the debate is, is this mandatory that there must be a licensed nursing home. You see as I . . . as I recollect the rules, if you have one or two people in a . . . ah . . . home, they do not have to be licensed; and I've run into some of those homes and found incredible conditions there, improper handling, they were bedridden, they weren't clean and so on. I think it should be mandatory in the bill, if it is not now, I think you should make certain it's mandatory that it be a licensed home, that . . . ah . . . they have a certain degree of safety involved. Is . . . is it or not?"

Dyer: "Ah . . . Yes, I feel that the language is . . . assures that, . . . ah . . . Representative Borchers. I share your concern."

Speaker Redmond: "Are you ready . . . are you ready for the question? Representative Kane."

Kane: "Would the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "Indicates she will."



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Kane: "What's included in, 'or in their facilities'? It seems like awful broad language when you have nursing homes, retirement homes or in their facilities for the care of the elderly."

Dyer: "Ah . . . Well, I . . ."

Kane: "What do you intend to include?"

Dyer: ". . . Well, I wonder if you would suggest to me what . . . what you think that does include. As the . . . as the committee received this and as it was drafted, . . . ah . . . it was intended and was intended to mean and is in the Amendment Number 1, . . . ah . . . you know, licensed, sheltered care homes for the elderly . . . elderly."

Kane: "License . . . well, licensing isn't mentioned anywhere in the bill or the amendment."

Dyer: "Well, I think you'll find that it is within the total statute that we're amending."

Kane: "You mean when you say, 'or in their facilities for the care of the elderly', . . . ah . . . you know, it's not very specific."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Reed."

Reed: "Mr. Speaker, as a former county board member, I think this bill addresses itself to a problem that exists. There, simply, are not enough county nursing homes. This, merely, allows county boards or township supervisors of general assistance to put their people in licensed nursing homes. There are inadequate facilities in many of our counties. It's up to the township supervisor. This bill does nothing more than allow those people to make use of private licensed facilities."

Speaker Redmond: "Are you ready for the question? The question is, shall this bill pass? All in favor vote 'aye', oppose vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? It takes 89 votes. Representative Borchers."

Borchers: "In explanation of my vote, for the last years I've been trying to go and check on sheltered care homes, nursing homes, etcetera; and since this is designated that it is a licensed home, I think it's most important that this bill passes. I know for a fact people being put in to homes in some areas that are not licensed because it falls under this one or two rule, and I must look this up to refresh my memory on it,



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but there . . . but the fact that a board member could not put an individual into a . . . to a friend's home . . . ah . . . where inadequate care is likely to occur is most important that this be stopped, and this bill will prevent that, as I understand it. Therefore, it should be passed."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the Record. On this question 89 'aye', 5 'nay'; the bill having received the constitutional majority is, hereby, declared passed. 705."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 705, Reed, a bill for an act to amend the Illinois Public Library District Act. Third Reading of the bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Reed."

Reed: "Mr. Speaker, ladies and gentlemen of the House, House Bill 705 adds two sections to the Public Library District Act. It allows a levy by referendum of up to 8.33 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation of the property within a district. The levy would cover the difference paid for by insurance and the actual reconstruction cost should a district library facility be destroyed. I ask for your favorable vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Question is . . . any discussion? The question is, shall this bill pass? All in favor vote 'aye', oppose vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the Record. On this question there are 95 . . . 94 'aye', no 'nay'; the bill having received the constitutional majority is, hereby, declared passed. Was that your first bill, Representative Reed?"

Reed: "My second, I'm happy to say."

Speaker Redmond: "709."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 709, Giorgi, a bill for an act to amend the Criminal Code of 1961. Third Reading of the bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, I think . . . is there . . . ah . . . the amendment I had intended to bring in this bill back from Third to Second, if the amendment is up there. Is it up there?"

Unknown: "Did you have 89 votes?"

Giorgi: "For what?"

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman have leave to return House Bill 709 to the order of Second Reading for the purpose of an amendment? Hearing no



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objections, return it to the order of Second Reading for the purpose of an amendment."

Fredric Selcke: "Ah . . . Amendment Number 1, Giorgi, amends House Bill 709, Page 3 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker and members of the House, this bill, when it was originally drawn, allowed card games in the homes among equals without any outside interference or outside cut. When the bill come out of the Reference Bureau, it included not-for-profit clubs. I'm not as much interested in . . . ah . . . seeing this . . . ah . . . go to the not-for-profit clubs or fraternal groups as I'm like . . . as I'd like to see it so people can play in their homes without fear of a criminal action. In any event, if an elected public official plays in his home and is arrested, his office could be declared vacant. Now, what the amendment does is strike the club part out and allows just the home playing among equals without outside interference, and if it's the wish of this Assembly to allow to go to clubs, vote down the amendment; but I move for the adoption of the amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Peters."

Giorgi: "And would the . . . would the people playing cards, please, leave the card game."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Peters. Peters?"

Peters: "Ah . . . Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Redmond: "Indicates he will."

Peters: "Representative Giorgi, this is the bill that was heard in the Executive Committee?"

Giorgi: "Yes, sir."

Peters: "Ah . . . By the amendment you are deleting clubs or non-profit organizations?"

Giorgi: "Yes, sir, the . . ."

Peters: "O.K."

Giorgi: "O.K."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative . . ."

Ebbessen: "Ah . . . Yes, Mr. Speaker, will the . . . ah . . . Sponsor yield?"



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Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Ebbessen: "Ah . . . Representative Giorgi, would you . . . would you . . . ah . . . run that one by me again relative to an elected official?"

Giorgi: "Yes, sir, in any event that the . . . the way the statute reads now, if you're arrested for playing pitch at home or hearts or black jack or whatever, and you're an elected official, I think it says it can file suit to declare your elected office vacant. This is a . . . a criminal offense. So what I'm trying to do is . . . ah . . . allow, I'm thinking of people that have . . . belong to pitch clubs, heart clubs, . . . ah . . . poker clubs and so on that play among themselves: and I happen to been a witness to a lot of political gatherings in Winnebago County, and Dupage and Cook County where a lot of the elected officials . . . ah . . . play cards, play poker . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Duff."

Duff: "Well, Mr. . . . will the Sponsor answer a question? Ah . . . Representative Giorgi, are we then to believe that the law right now says that for example if the Governor was to play poker . . . ah . . . somebody could . . ."

Giorgi: "No man is above the law, Nixon found that out."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ebbessen, for what purpose do you arise?"

Ebbessen: "Yes, . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ebbessen."

Ebbessen: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I'd like to get the end of the answer of my question without being interrupted by Mr. Duff."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed, he's sorry."

Giorgi: "The law provides . . . ah . . . cards when played at a person's . . . person's residence when no one receives any payment or other thing of value directly or indirectly for providing the place for the card game. Now, someone put in the . . . ah . . . when they drew the bill, they put in there also, 'played on the premises of an . . . any bonified and non-profit labor, veterans, fraternal or other organization having membership dues, when neither such organization or any person receives any payment or any other thing of value directly or indirectly for providing the place for the card game'. That means that if we belong to a country club, I . . . I don't belong to a



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country club, I belong to a labor club . . ."

Ebbessen: "Easy, easy."

Giorgi: ". . . if we play cards with each other without any outside interference, this bill allows it, but I amended that part out because I didn't want to think that I was providing a, you know, a vehicle for gambling in the clubs. I'm more concerned about the home . . . home games that are . . . ah . . . are . . . I remember an incident in Rockford where . . . ah . . . about eight people that were playing cards in their home, all of them were over 70 years old, were arrested for gambling. Really . . . ah . . . well, that's the . . . mentality of Rockford, but . . . ah . . ."

Ebbessen: "Fine, thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Houlihan."

Unknown: "Mr. Speaker . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Dan Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. By way of clarification and to . . . ah . . . attempt to answer the question that was raised by Representative Ebbessen, I believe the section of the Criminal Code that Representative Giorgi is referring to is the fact that upon a conviction of keeper of a gambling house, the statute presently provides for . . . ah . . . the voiding of all licenses issued by a municipality of a county. I, myself, wasn't aware that that included vacating an office of an elected official, but I do think that's the section that Representative Giorgi is referring to. A present penalty upon a conviction for keeper of the gambling place."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker, may I address my query to Representative Houlihan?"

Speaker Redmond: "If he is willing."

Geo-Karis: "Ah . . . Danny, the section that Zeke' quotes in his bill, you know, is 28-1, which simply says, 'a person commits gambling when 1) he plays a game of chance or skill for money or other thing of value unless except in subsection B of the section', etc. Now, the section you were just saying, would you tell me what it is?"

Houlihan: "I believe and I don't, . . . ah . . . Adeline, have the . . . ah . . . Criminal Code. in front of me, but I believe it's Chapter 38,

Section 28-3."



Geo-Karis: "Is that the one that, 'operates, keeps, owns, uses, purchases, exhibits, rents, . . . sales, bargains for the sale or lease of manufacturers, distributes any gambling device', right?"

Houlihan: "That is correct. It is 28-3."

Geo-Karis: "O.K., now, I'd like to direct my question to Mr. Giorgi, please?"

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Geo-Karis: "Ah . . . Zeke', you . . . your amendment, now that you wish to put on this bill, would exclude any card playing in labor clubs, county clubs and etcetera?"

Giorgi: "Yes, but my intention is if it's the will of the Assembly to allow this to defeat my amendment then I'll leave the bill like it is with that in it."

Geo-Karis: "Well, I would suggest your amendment is impractical, because I don't know one labor club, one country club that doesn't have this type of . . . ah . . . activity going on in some place or another."

Giorgi: "Yeah, but I'm not here to . . . ah . . . you know, fight . . . for the right of the country clubs and the . . . ah . . ."

Geo-Karis: "No, talk about the labor clubs, too, they both, you know, . . ."

Giorgi: "I'd like my amendment defeated so we can get on with the full bill."

Geo-Karis: "I agree, I agree, let's go."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Berman."

Berman: "I just wanted . . . I just want to have my voice in opposition to the amendment."

Giorgi: "I'd like to wear a white hat once in a while."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Borchers."

Borchers: "Will the Speaker yield? I was curious on two points. One, now, you have, I know, in my community some gentlemen who have a little card game about twice a week . . ."

Giorgi: "They're . . . they're criminals."

Borchers: ". . . and this goes on year after year . . ."

Giorgi: "And they're criminals, but go ahead."



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Borchers: ". . . ah . . . theoretically, I suppose they are, now, does this relieve them of that responsibility, although they are . . . ah . . . having this card game? Now, the other question is . . ."

Giorgi: "Ah . . . Well, this is very important. Psychologically, those people are going through life committing a crime week after week. With this bill, they don't feel as hypocrits, they feel clean again when you adopt this bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Boyle."

Borchers: "Now, the second question, the second question, I didn't . . ."

Boyle: "Will . . . will the gentleman yield? Representative Giorgi, I understand that this legalizes it if we play with equals. Will you tell us what an equal is?"

Giorgi: "I use the term equal so that a guy like you won't bring a show to my house and play poker with me."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Borchers."

Borchers: ". . . off on my second question . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Borchers."

Borchers: ". . . so I'll present that now. I have read in the papers where a very good friend of mine, Representative Choate, has refused . . . refused to play poker in the mansion with Governor Walker, now, is this because he is well aware of the present law and didn't want to take the chance of the mansion being raided?"

Giorgi: "Well, and I think that some of those two people mentioned, they were playing poker up above the clouds. Now, . . . ah . . . this is a very serious bill, you know, I know there's a little levity involved, but this is a very serious bill, I think, because . . . ah . . . many of our friends play a little cards, and . . . ah . . . I think we'd like to . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Stone."

Stone: "Mr. Speaker, this amendment isn't on my desk."

Speaker Redmond: "Are you ready for the question? The question is . . . Representative Grotberg."

Grotberg: "Yes, I just wanted to know if homes for the aged are considered a home, because we could've scrubbed the township bill is . . . ah . . . if we could legalize the . . . the friendly games in the homes



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for the aged and senior citizen residents, or as a private domicile."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "The key thing, Grotberg, is that no one derives any benefits, skims the game, cuts or charges for the . . . ah . . . and this is very important so that the homes for the aged would be an appropriate place for these people to play penny ante here, for example, . . ."

Grotberg: "Yeah."

Giorgi: ". . . and I don't think this kind of a show would bother them."

Speaker Redmond: "Ready for the question? The question is on the adoption of the amendment. Shall . . . the gentleman has moved that Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 709 be adopted. All in favor of the adoption say 'aye', oppose 'no'. Unable to determine. The amendment . . . the amendment's lost."

Giorgi: "All right, all right, thanks fellas'."

Speaker Redmond: "Back to the order of Third Reading. 717."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 717, Lundy, a bill for an act to create an advisory commission to the Director of the Department of Children and Family Services. Third Reading of the bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lundy."

Lundy: "Take it out of the Record."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the Record. 718."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 718, Giorgi, a bill for an act to amend the Illinois Horse Racing Act. Third Reading of the bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, . . . ah . . . I don't want the members to feel that everything I introduce is jocular, but what happens is . . . ah . . . now, that we've got cam . . . campaign disclosure, and I understand there's a bill coming over from the Senate with campaign limitations, and we're all filing ethics forms and . . . ah . . . we're reading daily the plight of a lot of people, it's a criminal act for people in the horse racing industry to contribute to our campaigns or anyones campaigns, and it's . . . it's a criminal act for people in the insurance industry, and that bill will be following, to contribute to our campaign; so what I've done is with this bill I will repeal the law where it's a criminal act for people in the horse racing industry to



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contribute to anybody's campaign. I think that . . . ah . . . I think that's bad that it should be a criminal act. I think that I, personally, want to go on Record as telling everyone in this Assembly that I don't know of a single . . . I don't know an owner of a horse, I don't know the owner of a race track, all I probably know is a couple of members of the Racing Board, and I understand they're objecting to this bill; but I don't feel it should be a criminal act for people in the horse racing business . . . ah . . . to contribute to any political campaign or political effort, and because of campaign limitations, campaign disclosures, campaign ethics, I don't feel we should be jeopardizing ourselves by receiving campaign contributions from those type of people. So I . . . I ask you to help me . . . ah . . . pass this bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Would the gentleman yield to a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "Indicates he will."

Skinner: "I wonder if these are companion bills to the bills we considered this morning that Representative Keller sponsored?"

Giorgi: "No, sir."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Holewinski."

Holewinski: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like to address myself to the bill?"

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Holewinski: "I . . . I really think that this is a bad bill. The . . . the horse racing industry has been such a sensitive one . . . ah . . . the area of contributions has been such a controversial one that I really don't think it's proper at this time to remove this restriction, and I would . . . ah . . . speak and I will vote in opposition to the bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Dan Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, ladies and gentlemen of the House, I rise to speak in support of the bill. I think it's illogical to have this kind of a prohibition on our statutes when we have the . . . ah . . . disclosure provisions of . . . ah . . . of the laws that we recently enacted in the last session. I would also point out to the membership that we have passed a bill out of here in the last week or two weeks,



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which deleted a similar prohibition on . . . ah . . . liquor license holders, and I urge the support of the bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Duff."

Duff: "Mr. Speaker, like Representative Giorgi, I don't think I actually know anybody that owns a horse and I wish Tommy Hanahan was here for me to tell him that. Ah . . . But I kind of agree with the Representative . . . ah . . . I think this is a serious constitutional question anyway when we try to inhibit people from participating in Democracy. We're all aware of how sensitive the race track thing has been in the past, but maybe it takes a little guts to do the right thing on this one."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Grotberg."

Grotberg: "Just one question, Zeke', this is a technical question. Maybe Charley Keller or Ralph Dunn or somebody can answer it. To . . . to run a horse, do you have to have a license. You know, I have friends that own a piece of a horse, is that horse? So anybody that owns a piece of a horse is involved in this . . . ah . . ."

Giorgi: "Yes, sir, everybody . . . it's anybody connected with the racing industry can't contribute any political campaigns or political effort or political referendum or whatever; and it's a criminal act for them to contribute, and in as much as we have what we have on the books, I don't . . . I don't see why we should be . . . ah . . ."

Grotberg: "I'm already . . ."

Giorgi: ". . . jeopardizing ourselves in criminal action. This bill is at no ones request but my own."

Speaker Redmond: "Ready for the question? Question is, shall this bill pass? All in favor vote 'aye', oppose vote 'no'. Representative Calvo."

Calvo: "Well, Mr. . . . Mr. Speaker, just to explain my vote briefly, I guess it's useless, because with 17 'no' votes, this isn't going to pass. But it's ridiculous to me that we stand here on this floor and say that these people regardless of some like Zeke', I don't own a horse or never owned any part of a horse, head or foot or nothing, but . . . but . . . ah . . . yeah, I've known a few, but let me point out . . . but let me point out, we've got a Disclosure Act,



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we have to file on anybody that gives us money, and it's ridiculous to exclude some industry and say, 'Well, they can't give you anything, they can't contribute, they can't have a dinner, they can't do anything', it's a ridiculous thing; and I think the people are voting red or, you know, they should have voted red when we . . . ah . . . I wonder how they voted on a campaign disclosure. I stood here and voted for that bill, and I've caught hell about it ever since from my district; and I tell you that if you're gonna' disclose who contributes to you, what difference does it make what industry it is and they all ought to be treated alike; and I urge you to vote green, you're not going to anyways, so get on with the business."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Can I put it on Postponed Consideration, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Redmond: "You may put it on Postponed Consideration. On the order of House Bills, Third Reading, appears House Bill 719. Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, . . ."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 719, Giorgi, a bill for an act to amend the Illinois Insurance Code. Third Reading of the bill."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, in perusing over the statutes I've found the same thing applied to insurance companies; and I repeat again, I want it said for the Record, I don't know any president of any insurance company or any . . . ah . . . anybody that's affiliated with the insurance of America; and I'm not ashamed to put whatever I put into my ethics form or my disclosure or my limitations or whatever; and . . . ah . . . I feel that they should . . . it shouldn't be a criminal act on their part to contribute to any campaign or any parties, I'm sure that they do . . . ah . . . and I think we ought to remove that from the books. I don't think it ought to be a criminal action for insurance people to be contributing . . . ah . . . and I want a Roll Call, sir."

Speaker Redmond: "Ready for the question? Representative Simms."

Simms: "Ah . . . A question of the Sponsor, if I might, Zeke', does this just . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."



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Simms: ". . . does this just pertain to corporate checks or to individuals that . . . ah . . . own stock in an insurance company."

Georgi: "It re . . . repeals that section entirely on contributions, so means that everybody's included."

Simms: "O.K."

Speaker Redmond: "Question is, shall this bill pass? All those in favor vote 'aye', oppose vote 'no'. Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, on both this bill and the last bill, you know, not too long ago the courts ruled it's discriminatory as to liquor licensees. So really what we're doing is removing . . . removing the discrimination. Also, let's face it, individuals who own stock in insurance companies, subvert the law anyway and I can see some lights there that are re . . . red, who I'm sure have received contributions from people who own stock in insurance companies. Let's legitimize what they're really doing anyhow. I think we ought to vote green. You know, I . . . we can name names of some of the big contributors in both political parties, who own, well, O.K. somebody said W. Clemon Stone, go ahead and say it. I didn't say it, I heard it though. So let's legitimize what he's doing anyway. He's the biggest contributor there is in the whole country, and let's vote green to legit . . . legitimize what he's doing."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, I fully agree and concur with remarks of the prior speaker. I think you'd better be alerted to the fact that the contributions will be made. If they're not made by the company direct, they . . . a lot of them instruct some of their key employers to make them anyway, so the contributions are there; so we might as well make it legal instead of just going around the bush on it."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Duff."

Duff: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I agree with Representative Geo-Karis there. If we . . . this is a good bill in a sense it brings things out in the open. Ah . . . Insurance industry in this state is like General Motors in Detroit and oil in Texas; it's the biggest industry to have outside of farming; and we all know darn well that . . . ah . . .



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there are subterfuges that go on wi . . . with the Disclosre Act, why not bring everything right out in the open and make it clean?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, ladies and gentlemen of the House, we talk about honesty and disclosure, we're required to file where we get every penny of money, and every elected or appointed public official has to show that. Now, what do we do with people that are with the insurance business? We say they can't contribute, so they give bonuses to their executives and then they turn around and make personal contributions. Who's is kiddin' who? Get it out in the open. If you're going to take a contribution from an insurance company, let him give it to you directly and show where you got your money. What's wrong with that? Everybody says when we passed the Financial Disclosure Act here, people just in groves got on to vote green and said let's bear our souls. Well, let's do it honestly. Well, let's people show where the money is coming from, not from John Jones but from the insurance companies."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Representative Simms."

Simms: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I'm casting a vote for this. I think this is good sunshine legislation. Let the sun shine in; and I think people have the right to know . . . ah . . . who's making contributions; and as Representative Giorgi and Representative Shea has said, people . . . ah . . . they can circumvent the law at the present time. Ah . . . There's nothing wrong with insurance companies, they're a legitimate business in Illinois and every other state. In fact, everybody has insurance today. So I think as long as the general public knows where the money is coming from, I think it is only prudent for the Legislature to . . . ah . . . perhaps more of the sunshine in as far as people are concerned of knowing who's supporting candidates and political parties for office; and let's make some honest people out of some of these individuals."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Representative Pierce."

Pierce: "Ah . . . Mr. Speaker, this is contributions from insurance companies. I'll tell you, I've got . . . ah . . . policies with some insurance companies and I hope they're backed by reserves; and



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I don't want those insurance company big shots using my reserve to contribute to some political campaign of some politician or my own. I don't need their money, let them keep the money on reserve for my widow and my children if something happens to me. We have enough insurance going under without having them donate to political campaigns, let's keep them solvent. C.N.A. was on the verge of insolvency recently. We have all seen insolvent insurance companies in this state; and I think . . . I think for us to authorize . . . ah . . . politicians to shake down insurance companies for contributions is it threatens all our reserves or our life insurance, and for the sake of a few contributions, a possibility of a few, you're putting in jeopardy the policy that's supposed to protect your family and those of your constituents; and I vote 'no', because there was a good reason for this prohibition, being the Insurance Code to start with, and it should stay there."

Speaker Redmond: "All . . . Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, just to briefly explain my vote, I think this prohibition was put into law prior to campaign disclosures, campaign limitations and ethics bills; and . . . ah . . . everyone knows how close I am to Representative Pierce, but . . . ah . . . it seems to me that . . . ah . . . some of these . . . ah . . . areas that I'm in today . . . ah . . . are a little sensitive for the people that represent insurance companies, and . . . ah . . . contributions keep them of their manners, but I would really . . . ah . . . I think we're proud of the fact that now we have campaign disclosure, campaign limitations, we file ethics forms; and I think we ought . . . we shouldn't be ashamed of the fact that we accept money from insurance companies or race track interests or other interests, because we're telling the world now that we're . . . we're . . . we're clean and we're pure and we want everyone to know our business; and I think this bill ought to be passed for that reason alone."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "We better put it on Postponed Consideration, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Postponed Consideration. He's moved to have it put on Postponed Consideration. 733."



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Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 733, Mahar."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mahar. Representative Stubblefield, on 736."

Fredric Selcke: "736, Stubblefield, a bill for an act to amend Section 3 of the Nursing Homes, Sheltered Care Homes, and Homes for the Aged Act. Third Reading of the bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Stubblefield."

Stubblefield: "Mr. Speaker, ladies and gentlemen of the House, this is a bill which would . . . ah . . . amend the Nursing Homes, Sheltered Care and Homes for the Aged Act. Would require that there be a licensing that would identify the shareholders of any corporation that applies for a license under the act, and with the amendment, would then require the same provision for those who had become successor corporations. It's a very simple bill that would allow us to . . . ah . . . know who owns the home, . . . ah . . . unscrupulous characters are there!"

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Mr. Jack O'Brien: "Amendment Number 1, McLendon, amends House Bill 1605 on page 1 by deleting line 2 and inserting in lieu, thereof, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McLendon on the amendment."

McLendon: "Mr. Speaker, I move the adoption of Amendment Number 1, which is, merely, a correction of a grammatical error."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment Number 1 to House Bill 1605. All in favor say "aye", oppose "no". The "ayes" have it; the amendment's adopted. Any further amendments? Further amendments? No further amendments. Third Reading. I understand that 1617 is not in the Bill Book. 1649, Representative Shea."

Mr. Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1649, Shea, a bill for an act in relation to the creation and operation of a public treasurers investment pool. Second Reading of the bill. No committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor? Third Reading. 1707, take it out of the Record. 1713, Representative Ebbessen, out of the Record. 1729, Representative Hill."

Mr. Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1729, Hill, a bill for an act relating to



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the person who owns any part of that stock."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Borchers."

Borchers: "Will the Sponsor yield?"

Stubblefield: "Yes."

Borchers: "Ah . . . I was curious how you would handle the publication.

Now, for banks, all stockholders have to . . . ah . . . at least once a year, their names are in the paper. Now, what procedure are you going to have to handle this? I think this is an excellent bill, frankly. How are you going to handle a disclosure of the ownership?"

Stubblefield: "The . . . ah . . . department would . . . ah . . . furnish blanks and applications; and they would have the responsibility then of . . . ah . . . making public those who are shareholders, and there would be a license fee of \$50, which would . . . ah . . . sustain the cost of doing so."

Borchers: "Would I be able to send in and get then the copy of the X,Y,Z nursing home, the ownership, the stockholders?"

Stubblefield: "That's correct, and they would have the responsibility of . . . ah . . . determining the rules and regulations and administration of the act."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further questions? The question is . . . Representative Hill."

Hill: ". . . er, I wonder if the Sponsor would yield to a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "Indicates he will."

Hill: "Is the same act that . . . ah . . . Representative Dyer was . . . ah . . . amending before? Do you know that?"

Stubblefield: "I'm not sure of that . . . ah . . . Representative Hill."

Hill: "It wouldn't take care of the townships then and the expenditures of money for nursing homes?"

Stubblefield: "No, I believe that would be . . ."

Hill: "Well, I . . . I think Representative Dyer . . . ah . . . should take note of this piece of legislation and apply it also to that group. I think this is a very good piece of legislation and, certainly, should be passed."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Simms."

Simms: "Mr. Speaker, . . . ah . . . this is an excellent bill. Perhaps



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this is one of the most important bills that's going through this session of the Legislature as far as some of the problems that we've had state-wide in the nursing home industry. There have been some problems. The news media in the state has pointed some of these deficiencies where the people have . . . ah . . . owned these homes in . . . ah . . . particular locations of the state, some places where they have forced individual patients to serve involuntary servitude as peonage to some of these places. So I think it's important that we know who owns these homes. If there's any political identity of any individuals in the past or in the future, and also of who's involved in the corporate structure of these homes; and some of these homes are the same series of homes that have repeated violations with the state; and I think this is an excellent bill and deserves to be supported."

Speaker Redmond: "Question is, shall this bill . . . Representative Boyle. Will the gentleman between the chair and Representative Boyle, please, be seated?"

Boyle: "I . . . I wonder, Representative Stubblefield, what provision you have made in the bill to . . . ah . . . in other words, does it apply to nursing homes that are in existence at the present time, or does this only apply prospectively?"

Stubblefield: "No, this applies to all those in existence and those that would start in . . ."

Boyle: "In other words, the nursing homes that are presently in existence would have to disclose the . . . ah . . . stockholders of the corporation as well as those built after the effective date of your act, is that correct?"

Stubblefield: "That's correct."

Boyle: "I think it's an excellent bill and should be supported."

Speaker Redmond: "Question is, shall this bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', oppose vote 'no'. Representative Geo-Karis from right field votes 'aye'. Representative Jaffe from left field votes 'aye'. Representative Greiman playing the same position votes 'aye'. Have all voted who wish? Take the Record. On this question there are 93 'aye', 1 'nay'; the bill having received the constitutional majority is,



hereby, declared passed. House Bill 742."

Fredric Selcke: "House Bill 742, Flinn, a bill for an act to amend the Civil Administrative Code. Third Reading of the bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Flinn."

Flinn: "Ah . . . Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, and ladies and gentlemen of the House, all this bill does is . . . is eliminate an unnecessary biannual report of the Telecommunications Division of the Department of General Services; and I would ask for your support."

Speaker Redmond: "Any questions? The question is, shall this bill pass? Representative Kane."

Kane: "Does this . . . are you explaining the amendment? Doesn't the amendment do more than that?"

Flinn: "No, all the amendment done was straighten out some language in the . . . in the bill that was . . . that was not clear. It . . . the intent of the bill has not been changed by the amendment."

Kane: "Well, it talks . . . the amendment talks about a comprehensive plan to coordinate and centralize all communication among all state offices?"

Flinn: "Well, what's going on right now, the Telecommunications Division of the Department of General Services has a continual . . . ah . . . report all the time; and all this bill does here is eliminate a bi-annual report that was created by some study commission a few years ago, and it's no longer necessary."

Kane: "Well, it also makes some . . . ah . . . development of a comprehensive plan, doesn't it? It doesn't just eliminate a report."

Flinn: "What are you . . . where are you taking that, Doug?"

Kane: "Amendment Number 1."

Flinn: "Well, Mr. Speaker, if there's going to be any question raised about this thing, I'd like to take it out of the Record, because I . . . I got plenty of time on the bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lundy."

Lundy: "Yes, thank you, Mr. Speaker and members of the House. Having had a chance to look at Amendment Number 1, perhaps I can clarify the situation a little bit. Apparently, what the amendment does is to leave with the department a responsibility to develop a plan for com-



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munications . . . telecommunications within state government, but eliminate the . . . ah . . . prior requirement that that plan be the subject of an annual report to the General Assembly."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hill, for what purpose do you rise?"

Hill: "I heard the Sponsor . . . ah . . . ask you to take it out of the call."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Flinn."

Flinn: "I, right now, cannot answer Representative Kane's question, because I . . . I mis . . . misplaced the amendment; and I had no question at all about the fact. Did Lundy explain it clearly enough? O.K., Mr. Speaker, I ask for your support of this bill."

Fredric Selcke: "Question is . . . question is, shall this bill pass?"

Speaker Redmond: "The question is, shall this bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', oppose vote 'no'. Representative Downs."

Downs: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I was hoping to have an opportunity to hear Mr. Lundy complete his explanation of what the amendment did, because there's a big difference between the synopsis and the amendment as described; and I've read the amendment; and I'd like to know more about it."

Speaker Redmond: "I think Mr. Lundy is just in the process of explaining his vote."

Lundy: "Yes, thank you, Mr. Speaker, briefly to explain my vote. The . . . the Department of General Services presently has a statutory responsibility to formulate a plan for centralizing and making more efficient telecommunication services throughout State government. What the bill would do is it also has . . . currently has the responsibility to make an annual report on that plan as it develops to the General Assembly. What the . . . what the bill would do with the amendment is to leave the department with the responsibility to develop the plan and update it, but to delete the requirement that they make an annual report to the Legislature on that plan."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the Record. On this question there are 93 'ayes', 2 'nays'; and the bill having received the constitutional majority is, hereby, declared passed. Representative Shea."



Shea: "Mr. Speaker, I move that the House now recess until 2:00; and then let the Clerk read in some First Readings and messages from the Senate; and then that it adjourn until 10:00 a.m. Monday morning for a perfunctory session and that the House return to regular session at 4:00 p.m. Monday afternoon."

Fredric Seleck: "You want me to read . . ."

Speaker Redmond: "This so the members will know what we've done? We have called every bill, House Bills on Second Reading. We've gone through the entire list. Today we have handled about 110 bills in one form or another. The question is on the motion . . . Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Would the Majority Leader mind asking Representative Beaupre or mind conferring with Representative Beaupre in allowing a perfunctory session introducing . . . introduction of five House Committee bills as well as Senate Bills?"

Shea: "I'm sorry I didn't hear the gentleman's question."

Skinner: "Well, you said you would allow . . . the motion was to allow the introduction and First Reading of Senate Bills, how about five committee bills that Representative Beaupre and I have been waiting on the last three days to get . . ."

Shea: "I didn't say Senate Bills, I said First Reading bills and Senate Committee Reports or Senate messages."

Skinner: "O.K., I misunderstood you, thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Grotberg."

Grotberg: "Mr. Speaker, is it true that the . . . ah . . . the House is going to be taken over by . . . ah . . . some youngsters coming in, and that the desks should be locked and things put away or has that disappeared from the agenda?"

Speaker Redmond: "It never was on the agenda. Originally, we were going to let the League and Academy use the Chambers, but because of the session, we convinced them that they should go in the Senate."

Grotberg: "We . . . we don't have to clear our desks then?"

Speaker Redmond: "Well, I'm not saying that you shouldn't lock them, but I'm just saying that the Chamber has not been given over to anybody for that matter. Representative Ryan."



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Ryan: "I would like to ask Representative Boyle or Representative Barnes to verify the fact that Appropriation's II will meet Monday at 12:30. Is that true?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Boyle."

Boyle: "Yes, that . . . that's right, Representative Ryan, we . . . ah . . . I believe that Representative Lechowicz announced that both I and II will meet Monday at 12:30."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the motion of Representative Shea. All in favor of the motion say 'aye', oppose 'no'; and the 'ayes' have it, and we now stand adjourned. We said you'd be out of here by 2:00."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 3003, Washington, a bill for an act making appropriation to the State Comptroller. First Reading of the bill. House Bill 3304, Committee on Revenue, a bill for an act to amend the Revenue Act. First Reading of the bill. House Bill 3005, Boyle, a bill for an act making appropriations for certain claims against the State of Illinois. First Reading of the bill. House Bill 3006, Younge, a bill for an act making appropriations to the Metro East Exhibition Performing Arts Authority. First Reading of the bill.
