April 21, 1977

Doorkeeper: "Will all persons not entitled to the House floor, please retire to the gallery? All persons not entitled to the House floor, please retire to the gallery."

Speaker Redmond: "The House will come to order. Members please be in their seats. We'll be led in prayer today by the Reverend Krueger, the House Chaplain."

Reverend Krueger: "In the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost. Amen. O Lord, Bless this House to Thy service this day. Amen. It is written in the Talmud: 'Man is born with his hands clenched, but his hands are open in death, because on entering this world he desires to grasp everything, but on leaving he takes nothing away. Let us pray. Almighty God, our Heavenly Father, giver of all life and giver of all things, we thank Thee for the precious heritage and dignity to which we have been privileged to have been called. Keep us ever mindful, O Lord, that we are but stewards of all Thy Mysteries, custodians that are to show forth to those to who we have been called to lead and to serve, the equity of Thy Law and the favor of Thy promise. May we ever be faithful and diligent in our duty so that when we shall have finished our course in life, . . . it may be said that we have well labored and our fellow man is richer because of our having been . . . and in that being, having been with Thee; through Jesus Christ, Our Lord. Amen."

Speaker Redmond: "Roll Call for attendance."

Clerk O'Brien: "Committee Reports. Representative Hart, Chairman of the Committee on Financial Institutions, to which the following Bills were referred, action taken April 20, 1977, reported the same back with the following recommendation. Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Would the record show that Representative Kornowicz is excused because of illness?"

Speaker Redmond: "Any objections? Hearing none, the record will so show. Any excused absences on the Republican side? Representative Epton?"

Epton: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Would the record show that Representative Huskey is excused because of illness?"

Speaker Redmond: "Any objections? Hearing none...."

Epton: "...and Representative McAvoy, also."

Speaker Redmond: "McAvoy and Huskey....Representative Deavers."

Deavers: "Also excused is Representative Schoeberlein, he went home. His wife is ill."

Speaker Redmond: "The record will so show. Consent Calendar, Second Reading. Representative Mulcahey...Oh! Representative Van Duyne....Hello!....Representative Dunn. Hello!... Representative Mulcahey's bride....Hello!.... Where are the five children?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Consent Calendar. Second Reading. Second day. House Bill 419, a Bill for an Act to provide for retrocession of jurisdiction by the United States, to the State of Illinois, Second Reading of the Bill. House Bill 708, a Bill for an Act in relation to fire protection districts, Second Reading of the Bill. House Bill 710, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Municipal Code, Second Reading of the Bill. House Bill 785, a Bill for



an Act to amend the Game Code, Second Reading of the Bill. House Bill 1019, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Wage Payment and Collection Act, Second Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading.....House Bills, Second Reading. Representative Madigan. House Bills, Third Reading. House Bills, Third Reading appears House Bill 471. Out of the record, request of the Sponsor. 472.... 472, Representative Stuffle. Out of the record. 473... Out of the record. 485, 485....Representative Porter. Out of the record. 490; Skinner-Rigney. Representative Skinner here? 490....Representative Schlickman, are you waving, Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Would you like to read the Bill, Mr. Speaker?"

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 490...."

Schlickman: "590....509...."

Speaker Redmond: "I was wondering if you had replaced Representative Skinner....in the hearts of the affections of the people in Crystal Lake? "

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 490, a Bill for an Act to add Sections to the School Code, and amend Sections of the Election Code, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Mr. Speaker, I'm not sure I want to use this Bill to wake everybody else up today. Why don't we use somebody else's?"

Speaker Redmond: "Are you requesting that this be taken out of the record or postponed consideration? Out of the record. 509.....509.."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 509, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Public Library District Act, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, House Bill 509 amends the Illinois Library District Act by providing for



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a means by which a district can annex territory which is not being effectively served by the township in which it is located. Specifically there is no library in the territory to be annexed, but there is a library in that part of the municipality included within the district. By its terms it is restricted to territory which is a part of a municipality presently served, in part, by the district, thus, homogeneous interests would be consolidated. There are some instances, in Illinois, where part of the municipality is served by a library district and the other part is served by a township library. The district has its library in the municipality, the township library is located outside the municipality. This Bill would have the entire municipality served by the library located within the municipality. Annexation can take place only by referendum initiated by residents in the territory to be annexed, and voted on by all the citizens of the territory to be annexed as well as those of the annexing territory. By an Amendment, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, we provided that those who would disconnect from the township, would still be liable for the township share of bonded indebtedness. I sincerely solicit your support."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 99 'aye' and 3 'no', and the Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. 536....Representative Dunn. I can't see Representative Dunn."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 536, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Municipal Code, Third Reading of the Bill.

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Dunn."

Dunn: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the



House. Actually House Bill 536, 537 and 538 are all related and are a package and I would ask leave at this time to consider all three Bills on one Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing no objections, read 536 and 537 Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 537, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Drainage Code, Third Reading of the Bill. House Bill 538, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act to revise the law in relation to recorders, Third Reading of the Bill."

Dunn, J.: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, these Bills are a package amending the Illinois Municipal Code and the Illinois Drainage Code and the Recorder's Act. The purpose of these Bills is to facilitate the recording and searching of local assessment levies for sewer purposes and for drainage purposes. At the present time if a drainage district in your county spreads a levy for assessment purposes, the assessment rule is kept in the drainage district headquarters or office, wherever that might be. Those who search legal titles to determine whether or not they have.....property has liens against it, must search out and find the headquarters of all these various governmental bodies in your county. The purpose of this package of Bills is to consolidate all of this and to provide for recording in the County Recorder's Office. These Bills were considered in the 79th General Assembly and there was some concern at that time on the part of the County Recorders Association, however, the Bills have now been amended in accordance with their requests and requirements and I have been assured by their representative here in Springfield that these Bills are now in form approved by them so I know of no opposition at this time and I request a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative D. L. Houlihan."

Houlihan, D. L.: "I have a question of the Sponsor, Mr. Speaker."



Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Houlihan, D. L.: "John, do these Bills change the special assessment procedure in counties of over 500,000?"

Dunn, J. : "These Bills do not change the special assessment procedure anywhere. What they do is provide for a recording of the special assessment rule and the purpose of these Bills is to conform the rest of the state to counties over 500,000 which now provide for centralized recording of special assessment levies. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further questions? The question is, shall these Bills pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there is 116 'aye' and no 'nay' and the Bills having received the Constitutional Majority are hereby declared passed. Representative Mann, Representative Mann requests consent to be recorded as voting 'aye' on that series of Bills. Does ...are there objections? Hearing no objections, he is so recorded. There is similar request by Representative Sandquist. 544...."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 544...."

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the record, Representative Murphy? 557...."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 557, a Bill for an Act to amend the Criminal Code of 1961...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative J. Davis.... I can't see the Representative...."

Davis, J.: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schuneman....Third Reading..."

Davis, J.: "...House Bill 557 we've commonly termed as the 'Unlawful Entry Bill' seeks to bridge a gap in the Criminal Trespass Law that will provide for a Class A misdemeanor in criminal trespass within.....within buildings and house trailers, commercial buildings and is well defined, as the Bill is amended,.....where... no such criminal misdemeanor



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provision now exists under either the Land Criminal Trespass Law or the Motor Vehicle Aircraft and Watercraft Law. It's really very simple. It graciously passed out of Mr. Katz's Committee with a unanimous vote. And other than stand here and answer questions for the House I would respectfully request its passage."

Speaker Redmond: "Any questions? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor voteRepresentative D. L. Houlihan. Pardon me."

Houlihan, D. L.: "I've got a question of the Sponsor, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Houlihan, D. L.: "Representative Davis, presently you have a Section of the Criminal Code, which is defined....er.... entitled as, 'Criminal Trespass to a Vehicle'. Wouldn'twhat you are amending here into the Bill, by way of house trailers, aircraft, watercraft and use the word 'motor'.....Isn't that already covered by the existing definition of criminal trespass to vehicle?"

Davis, J.: "Well, no, it is indeed not. If you will notice, as the Bill is amended, it goes down into ...well, it would be Amendment #1, which actually struck everything after the Enacting Clause and rewrote it, we chose the Motor Vehicle, Aircraft and Watercraft Section which dealt...ah... primarily with things.....of vehicle or....structural type things rather than the land trust...passed Section of the Code. Criminal trespass to buildings and house trailers and we define buildings as ...'any building, commercial building, agricultural building or any other building which has not been deemed abandoned', which was one of the objections which was raised in committee by Representative Getty and was satisfied by this Amendment. We also, indeed, satisfied Representative Greiman's objections to it by providing a strong notification clause so that the person would be aware that he was indeed committing criminal



trespass. Does that answer your question, Sir?"

Houlihan, D. L.: "Well, not completely. Is there presently an existing section of the Criminal Code which is entitled Criminal Trespass to Land?"

Davis, J.: "Yes, there is."

Houlihan, D. L.: "And...hasn't it been judicially declared that criminal trespass to land can include a prosecution for criminal trespass to a building?"

Davis, J.: "The answer to that on the authority, and I quote only, my State's Attorney and other prosecutors that I've talked to. The answer to that is 'no', Sir. That's the purpose of the Bill and it seeks to bridge that gap."

Houlihan, D. L.: "The reason I raised that question, Representative Davis, is that our staff analysis indicates just the opposite from what information is that you are getting from your State's Attorney. Should the staff analysis be correct, then, in my opinion in the substantial part, this Bill is unnecessary....and will be severely limiting and I really don't think that's what you intend with the Bill."

Davis, J.: "Well, I haven't seen your staff analysis, Representative Houlihan, but I can assure you that the same analysis was in the Judiciary II Committee and there.... no objections were raised along those particular lines at that point. I can only assure you that after research from the people who suggested this Bill to me and after my research we found no such duplication."

Houlihan, D. L.: "Well, based upon, you know, the staff analysis, as we have the Bill before us, I'm wondering if you would be willing to take the Bill out of the record so we can resolve the question?"

Davis, J.: "Absolutely. I'd be delighted, Representative Houlihan and confer with you. Mr. Speaker, I would respectfully request that House Bill 557 be taken out of the record."



Houlihan, D. L.: "Thank you very much."

Speaker Redmond: "Five-nine-zero....Representative Terzich.

I can't see Representative Terzich."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 590, a Bill for an Act in relation to insurance coverage of dependents following death of subscribers to medical and hospital insurance plans, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Terzich."

Terzich: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, a few years ago we passed a Bill which would allow an extension of health benefits upon death of an employee. Most companies in the State of Illinois had that under their group insurance plan and after an experience I checked into it and I found out that Blue Cross and Blue Shield was not included in the program and House Bill 590 will include them and I urge support from the Membership."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Representative Houlihan. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there is 142 'ayes' and no 'nays' and the Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. 600...."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 600, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act relating to wage deductions for the benefit of creditors and regulating the issuance of deduction orders, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McLendon.... House Bill 600."

McLendon: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, House Bill 600 merely makes the Illinois Law conform to the Federal minimum hourly wage. The passage of this Bill does nothing to change the wages and subject the deduction because of the wage earner. We'll always get the exemption provided by the Fair



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Labor Standards Act. Whether or not Illinois Legislature acts or not. This merely makes the Act conform with the Fair Standards Law. I ask the favorable vote of the...."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any questions? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 135 'aye', and no 'nay' and the Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. 602...Representative Yourell, 602...Out of the record. 603...Representative Yourell, 603...Out of the record. 604, out of the record. 618..."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 618, a Bill for an Act in relation to public water districts, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Flinn."

Flinn: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, House Bill 618 removes from ambiguity in the present Statutes, which indicates that the clerk of a township could not serve on a water district board. There was no intention in the original law to say that they could not. The original law should have said 'Voting members of the town board could not appoint themselves to the water district'. What this proposes to do is to remove that ambiguity and permit a clerk of a town board to serve on such districts. So....I would ask for your support."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Representative Conti. Pardon me."

Conti: "Can I ask the Sponsor a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Conti: "It says, 'Amends an Act relating to public water districts'. Specifies that only voting township officers may not be appointed to serve as a trustee of a water district only within the township. We're very unique in Leyden Township, we have our own water district. Does that



mean that...that this disqualifies all the town board of trustees?"

Flinn: "No. The present Statutes say that the town board of trustees cannot serve now on a public water district. I don't think it applies to a township water district, since they are organized under a different statute altogether. All this is trying to do is to say that the clerk, who is not a voting member, can serve on a public water district, which is organized under this Statute. I'm sure that you're not covered under this Statute. "

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 151 'aye' and no 'nay', and the Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. 619. Representative Flinn."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 619, a Bill for an Act to repeal Sections of the Illinois Public Aid Code, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Monroe Flinn."

Flinn: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, House Bill 619 is the aftermath of a Bill that I had sponsored for about six years here in the House of Representatives. Last year we were partially successful in removing the requirement of the aged, the blind and disabled from having to sign a lien on their property in order to qualify for public aid. What I'm trying to do in this Bill is to wipe out all of those other liens retroactively and to provide that the Department of Public Aid would have to no longer set up such a department. Right now they are collecting in the neighborhood of slightly over \$700,000 a year in those....deaths of the survivors...who have been on Public Aid. This figure will drop dramatically each year



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and probably within the next few years it will cost more money to collect this money than they actually will collect. So I would ask for your support on this Bill also."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? Representative Wolf."

Wolf: "Would the Sponsor yield for a question? Mr. Flinn, I'm having a little difficulty here...understanding this just from the Digest. Am I to understand, if this Bill passes, that persons on Public Aid who had liens on their property because they were receiving Public Aid right now...do I understand that the State or the Department of Public Aid can recover?"

Flinn: "They will no longer recover these. They do now, under the present law. All those who sign liens prior to October 1, 1976, as of 1976, October 1, the Public Aid Department requires no one to sign liens except those with value of property of \$25,000 or above. What I'm saying here, those prior to that time, that signed a lien, would be absolved from having their lien foreclosed on them....At the death of the surviving spouse."

Wolf: "So then, this would not....what I was afraid of.... if you could just clarify this for me. If a person receives Public Aid benefits, and does not have to give up a lien or....on their estate, and they would pass away, that it is possible or conceivable that their heirs, their children, could then sell the property and leave the taxpayers holding the bag? Is that correct or am I misinformed?"

Flinn: "I don't like your choice of words, but in effect, what you are saying is true. It is not a matter of the taxpayers holding the bag. If you would just back up a moment. Those people who do not own property, who are in this category; and those people who are not blind, disabled or aged, above 65, who....even though they



own property, do not sign liens on their property. It is only this particular category of people that are forced to sign liens on their property. What I'm trying to do is make it fair for everyone."

Wolf: "All right, in this case then, if my mother, who happens to own a house, goes on Public Aid and receives assistance from the taxpayers, and she would pass away next month, she has received benefits for 'X' number of months or years and upon her death, myself, my brothers and sisters would then be able to sell the house?"

Flinn: "That's correct. And if your mother's neighbor happens not to own any property, or happens not to be 65 years old and did own some property, wouldn't have to sign a lien in the first place."

Wolf: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further questions? Representative Pullen."

Pullen: "Will the Sponsor yield, please? ...Mr. Sponsor, does this lien that now can be...is placed on the homes of Public Aid recipients that you are seeking to wipe out by this Bill, does this apply to all categories of Public Aid?"

Flinn: "The only category of Public Aid, to my knowledge, that requires any liens are the old aged, the blind and the disabled. There are no other categories of Public Aid recipients who are required to sign a lien on their property."

Pullen: "So, recipients of ADC and AFDC do not have a lien against their property but the elderly and the disabled and blind do?"

Flinn: "That's correct, Representative Pullen."

Pullen: "And, that is the only group that would be helped by this Bill, is that correct?"

Flinn: "That is correct. That is right. That is exactly right."



Pullen: "Thank you very much. I will continue to vote 'yes' as I did in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? Representative Flinn to close."

Flinn: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I think it's pretty well understood what the Bill does. I would just ask for your support."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there is 106 'aye' and 32 'no'....and the Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. 629...."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 629, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act to establish a military and Naval Code, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mahar."

Mahar: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 629 increases the per diem for the National Guard. In cases of when they are called out for an emergency. This Bill was heard in Committee and passed out 16 to nothing. A word or two about the background. You know the National Guard is called out in case of a disaster or tornado or flood or something like that. The present compensation allows them \$25 per day. This Bill would raise that compensation to \$40. This applies only to the enlisted men up to E-7. E-7 presently makes more than \$40. It does not apply to the officers. The Act was last amended in 1971. As a need, in order to maintain the enlisted strength of the National Guard, to have them available in case of an emergency, to pay them a per diem that will allow them to pay their expenses for their families and when they are taken away from their job. Now, a survey was made recently of 1800 National Guardsmen and it was found that



77 percent of them received no pay when they were called to active duty in the case of an emergency. Twenty-three percent . . .er. . .18 percent got the difference between their normal pay and something like four or five percent got the full pay. There is a need for this. I'd be happy to answer any questions. I urge your support."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Griesheimer."

Griesheimer: "Will the Sponsor yield for a couple of questions?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Griesheimer: "On this particular Bill, is it my understanding that this only applies in the situation where guardsmen are called to active duty such as . . .placing sandbags on levees, on manning the fire department here in Springfield and that type of work?"

Mahar: "That is correct. This only applies when they are called out for an emergency at the call of the Governor of the State of Illinois."

Griesheimer: "Is it also true that the majority of cases, when they've been called out in the past, these particular guardsmen are not receiving any pay whatsoever, even from their employer?"

Mahar: "That is correct. As a matter of fact the total outlay in 1976 was \$13,000. . . .to 36 men, and that was for manning the fire stations while a particular job action was going on here in Springfield."

Griesheimer: "Is it also correct that this only places our guardsmen in a comparable position with other states in the United States?"

Mahar: "That is correct."

Griesheimer: "...And at the present time we are considerably beyond the other states in the United States?"

Mahar: "That is correct."

Griesheimer: "Okay. Thank you Mr. Speaker. I would urge the affirmative vote on this Bill. All it's doing is bringing our guardsmen into the same comparative position as other guardsmen. And it only applies to emergency services."



Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 136 'aye' and one 'no'. The Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. 632."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 632, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Pension Code, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Collins."

Collins: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 632 merely changes the child's annuity provision of the Chicago Firemen's ... Article of the Pension Code. The Code currently says that an adopted child must have been adopted for at least one year before receiving a child's annuity in the event of the death of a fireman. This would merely change that, to strike that provision, in the event the death is the result of an accident. It received no opposition in Committee and I would ask for your favorable support."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative D. L. Houlihan. Any discussion? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this Question there are 120...139 'aye' and no 'nay' and the Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. 647. Representative Kempiners for two purposes. Representative Kempiners."

Kempiners: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. The first purpose that I would like to be recognized for is that ...to remind the Republican Members that the Illinois College Republican Federation is having a roast tonight. The subject of the roast will be our dear colleague, Adeline Geo-Karis. I just want them to know that Tom 'Maddious', who is the President, is available for anyone who wishes to purchase tickets. I'm sure that Mrs. Geo-Karis also has tickets, should anybody be desirous of purchasing them. The



second reason I would rise, Mr. Speaker, is to request that House Bill 647 be returned to Second Reading for purposes of an Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has asked leave to return it to the order of Second Reading for the purpose of an Amendment. Does he have leave? Hearing no objections, it will be returned to the order of Second Reading."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2, Kempiners, amends House Bill 647 on page 2, line 18 and so forth."

Kempiners: "Amendment #2, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, was given to me by the Urban County Council. House Bill 647 is a Sheriff's Merit Commission Act. It provides for appointment of the merit commissioners, by the sheriff, with the consent of the county board. This Amendment, that I am offering, and which I support, would say that if the sheriff fails to make the appointment within a 60 day period then the chairman of the county board may make the appointment. And I would move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kempiners, did you move for the adoption, to the Amendment? The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor say 'aye', Representative Lechowicz. Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield to a question? Does this Bill effect Cook County?"

Kempiners: "No, it does not. Cook County has its own law in this Sheriff's Merit Act..."

Lechowicz: "Well, the only thing I want to point out to you ...it says, 'provides for a merit system for deputy sheriffs. Mandatory in counties of 95,000 to 1,000,000. Optional in counties under 95,000.' Is that correct."

Kempiners: "Right. So it does not, in any way, effect Cook County."

Lechowicz: "Okay. Good. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Rigney."



Rigney: "A question for the Sponsor."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Rigney: "Are you changing the provisions here as to the chief deputy, as to whether or not he is to be included under the merit commission?"

Kempiners: "I'll respond to that question. Some others might be asked. This is not on Third Reading. I brought it back to Second Reading for an Amendment."

Rigney: "Okay."

Kempiners: "So, it will be on Third Reading, if you want to pursue that."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the adoption . . . the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 675. E. G. Steele."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 675, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act in relation to fire protection districts, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Steele. Out of the record. 679."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 679, a Bill for an Act to clarify the powers and duties of non-voting student members of various boards of institutions of higher education. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Dyer."

Dyer: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, House Bill 679 is identical to House Bill 3964, which passed the House by a vote of 119 to 28, last Session. It got caught in the final crunch in the Rules Committee in the Senate, therefore, it is being reintroduced this year as House Bill 679. It is simply a clarifying Bill. It spells out what the non-voting rights of the students who are trustees on the various boards in higher



education are. It is in line with an Attorney General's opinion and a court opinion. It will save a lot of confusion and litigation. I urge your favorable vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Lucco."

Lucco: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I just wanted to rise in support of House Bill 679. I'd appreciate your support to this Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 118 'aye' and 9 'no' and the Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Will all Members please be..... Representative Dunn."

Dunn: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise for the purpose of requesting leave at this time to be removed as Chief Sponsor of House Bill 2015 and request that Representative D. L. Houlihan be substituted for me, as Chief Sponsor of that Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Are there any objections? Hearing none...."

Unknown: "Pardon me....Oh!...D. L. O'Brien...er Dan O'Brien, pardon me. I got the Irishmen mixed up."

Speaker Redmond: "What's your name?..."

Unknown: "It should be Redmond, but it's not."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Will the Members please be seated. We have a very important ceremony here. Please take your seats. All the Members sit down. Have you ever heard that....'What's Your Line' Will, the newly admitted member of the Illinois Supreme Court Bar please stand-up? Representative McClain.

Unknown: "When did this happen?"

Unknown: "Today."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, a Resolution under your Sponsorship



has been introduced regarding Mr. McClain's recent success. If the Clerk has it available possibly he could read it at this time?"

Speaker Redmond: "Mr. Clerk, Order of Resolutions. Do you have the Resolution?"

Madigan: "Speaker Redmond is the Sponsor....Resolution 178."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Resolution 178, Redmond et al., Whereas, it comes to the attention of the House that Representative Michael F. McClain, the distinguished Legislator from Quincy, has successfully passed the State of Illinois Bar Examination; and Whereas, it will undoubtedly be with great satisfaction and pride that Representative McClain will accept admission to practice before the Supreme Court of the great State of Illinois; and Whereas, the successful completion of the requirements of the State Board of Law Examiners triumphantly climaxes an arduous, challenging and exciting journey of academic effort of distinctive caliber, for Representative McClain; and Whereas, Representative McClain's family, and especially his devoted wife, Cathleen Marie, while certainly able to be most proud of the strength and encouragement contributed, are even more proud of the Representative's true individual endeavor; therefore, be it Resolved, by the House of Representatives of the Eightieth General Assembly of the State of Illinois, that we congratulate and commend the Honorable Michael F. McClain, Representative from the 48th District, for having successfully reached the goal of his legal ambition, by having passed the bar examination for admission to practice in the State of Illinois; and be it further Resolved, that a suitable copy of this Preamble and Resolution be presented to Representative Michael F. McClain."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, I'm sure that I speak for all of the Members of the House when I offer my own personal con-



gratulations to Mike on his recent success. Prior to moving for the adoption of this Resolution, I would like to suggest to Mike that there is a Bill pending before the House, House Bill 1329, Sponsored by Dan Houlihan, that he may wish to become a Cosponsor of. That would provide a salary increase for the judges, Mike. I move for the adoption of the Resolution."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Resolution. Is there any reason why we didn't have the lawyer-loving Giorgi...make this motion? The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it andRepresentative Upton.....Are you going to caution him about the 12 man law firm?"

Upton: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen of the House,no, I'm not going to caution him about that. I obviously arise because of the conflict of interest. So I hope that the record will show that I was not entirely in favor of admitting another Member to the legal profession. The fact remains that Mike McClain and I have been friends for many...many years. I've seen him work hard. I've seen his attempts to do a great job Legislature and his becoming a lawyer and Mike, I want you to know that despite the fact that you are now a lawyer and have passed the Bar, I still hope that our friendship will continue."

Speaker Redmond: "682....Representative McClain, Esquire.... Do you desire to respond?"

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker,..Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. If I could indulge your patience for a minute. You know, a lot of what I did here, it is kinda interesting, you know I was a law student when my Dad died in 1972. As you recall, he was a Member of the House. He died here voting 'aye' on ERA and it was his commitment to 'Gene' Chapman and Giddy Dyer and a few others that kept him on the floor. Then we were asked to take his



place so that's why we're here. Actually, I continued with law and traveled at night down to St. Louis, to get my degree. In fact, Kathy and I were talking today, we got sworn in and I had traveled 102,000 miles at night . . . to get the law degree. I couldn't have done it without Kathy and my family and friends and with a lot of encouragement from a lot of you and I don't know you can't really put your names on the certificate with me but if you could a lot of your names would be alongside. I wish Kathy's could too. I'd like to thank the Membership and the Speaker for the kindness of the Resolution."

Speaker Redmond: ".....682....."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 682....."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kempiners..."

Clerk O'Brien: "...a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Coin-operated Amusement Device Tax Act, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kempiners."

Kempiners: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, this is a cleanup to an authority that the county governments already have to tax and license and regulate coin-operated amusement devices in the county. This same authority is given to municipalities, both in the Municipal Code and the Revenue Code. What we're doing is adding this authority for the counties, which they already have, into the Revenue Code...according to the dictates of the Legislative Reference Bureau. I would ask your support."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question... Representative D. L. Houlihan."

Houlihan: "I have a question of the Sponsor, Mr. Speaker. Did I understand you correctly to say, that this authority for counties is already contained in Chapter 32 and now you are putting this into the Revenue Act to make it consistent?"



Kempiners: "It is in Chapter 34, Paragraph 429.4.....and the Legislative Reference Bureau indicated, to make this consistent with authority granted to the Municipal Code, we'd have to add it. Yes."

Houlihan, D.: "Does this apply to all counties?"

Kempiners: "You asked me, when this was on Second Reading, whether the Cook County Home Rule would already have this authority...and it would....as far as I'm concerned."

Houlihan, D.: "All right. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Any other questions? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 145 'aye' and no 'nay' and the Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. 697."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 687, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the School Code, Third Reading of the 'Bill.'"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, House Bill 687 authorizes the State Board of Education to make reimbursements to school districts for the education of the exceptional children that they have who reside in orphanages and other such public institutions. Currently these payments are made on a prior year basis. This Bill makes the payments current. This is a Bill that was recommended by the State Board of Education. I urge your support."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question....142 'aye' and no 'nay' and the Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. 691."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 691, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the School Code, Third Reading of the Bill."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative McGrew. Out of the record. 692..."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 692, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Adult Education Act, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Chapman. ...Will the new lawyer please sit down?."

Chapman: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I'd like to ask you to look at Amendment #1 and to disregard the Synopsis, because the Synopsis has been amended out of the Bill. What this Bill, to amend the Adult Education Act, does now is only to deal with a cash flow problem. It provides that school districts have the alternative of receiving payments three times a year. You will see that this measure was approved by the Education Committee, by a vote of20 to 1. I hope you will vote 'yes' on this measure."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there is 142 'aye' and no 'nay' and the Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. 694."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 694, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the School Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Schneider-Brady-Hoffman."

Schneider: "Thank you Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. House Bill 694 extends for another year the quarterly payment procedure that we use for education....for special ed and transportation. Last year, you remember, we adopted this procedure for payments because it helps to level out the flow of cash in the State of Illinois at a time when we were faced with a serious financial crisis. That crisis has not been relieved. I therefore indicate to you that this procedure is good, it penalizes no one. The state and the school districts are all



satisfied. I would ask that we adopt it once again."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Telcser, do you seek recognition? Any further discussion?"

The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 152 'aye' and no 'nay'. The Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. 696."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 696, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Birchler.....Representative Lucco?...."

Lucco: ".....Want five....Do you want to put it on five...?"

Speaker Redmond: "....695....I thought I had called that one."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 695, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code, Third Reading of the Bill."

Lucco: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 695 changes the School Code to permit school trustees to use a realtor to sell any vacated school property, but only after they have had the publicizing and a public auction which the law now calls for. This will permit school districts to possibly get a little bit more money out of their vacated school building than they are able to get at public auction. If they do not get the prices they set, at a public auction, then they may give it to a realtor. I solicit your vote. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'."

Lucco: "....Before they couldn't use realtors..."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 136 'aye', and 2 'no', and the Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. 696, Represent-



tative Geo-Karis. Representative Geo-Karis is recognized for the purpose of making a motion."

Geo-Karis: "I'm sorry they called me. I'd like to be recorded as 'yes', if I could have leave of the House?"

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Lady have unanimous consent to be recorded as 'yes'? Will it change the result of the.... It will not change the result. Hearing no objection, Representative Adams...Representative Adams makes the same motion. Same result. Representative Bluthardt is recognized for the purpose of making a motion on House Bill 428."

Bluthardt: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I'm asking leave to bring House Bill 428 back from Third Reading to Second Reading for the purpose of an Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing no objection. Leave is granted. 428, Mr. Clerk."

Bluthardt: "I move to adopt Amendment #1 to House Bill 428. It's a clarifying Amendment. It provides for the effective date of laws and it clarifies it to read that by adding one Clause....it says, 'if January 1 of the following year proceeds the date a Bill becomes law, then the Bill shall become effective on the date it becomes a law'. It's merely to clarify. I know it doesn't clarify too much to you but that's what it does. I move for the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? Representative D. L. Houlihan."

Houlihan, D. L.: "Has this Amendment been printed, Mr. Speaker, or distributed?"

Bluthardt: "I've got a copy...."

Houlihan, D. L.: "We don't seem to have a copy over here..."

Bluthardt: "All right. Well, then do you want to leave it on Second, for the time being, until we get ...all right, thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "....48....428 is returned to the order of



Second Reading and there it reposes. 696.....Did we call that one? 696..."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 696, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Birchler."

Birchler: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, Bill 696 provides funds to help 18 Educational Superintendents of ...Educational Service Regions. Right now we have 78 elected Educational Service Region people. There are 18 of those regions that have multi-counties. The law provided that each county receive one thousand dollars expense funds prior to this consolidation. Now, this money is used by the Regional Superintendent to pay for his supervisory services to the districts within his system and since the counties have increased in number it means more districts and more costs. This Bill provides that there will be \$1000 provided for each county. I ask for a favorable vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Gene Hoffman."

Hoffman: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, in all due respect to the Sponsor, I would like to bring your attention ...the attention of the House to what, in effect,this Bill does. A number of years ago we moved into the process of consolidating the County Superintendent of Schools into what we call Educational Service Regions. We did this on a step by step basis. We did it on a basis of population. When we had separate superintendents they each received one thousand dollars above their salary for supervisory expenses. What we have herea situation, we have County Superintendents, 18 of whom will share in this \$78,000 using the figure of Representative Birchler, I have a figure of 102,000; I'll accept his figure. This means, in some of the smaller populated counties, in one Educational Service Region, instead of receiving one thousand dollars, the Education-



al Service Region Superintendent will receive in one of these Educational Service Regions that I know of, five thousand dollars. Now, that is a significant increase. We will go back to a previous pattern if we approve this Bill because we are still in the process of consolidating. We are going to be consolidating again in '79, where we'll be down to 58 Educational Service Regions. Let me remind you that these Educational Service Regions are related to ...are related to population. It has nothing to do with anything other than population. Also let me remind you, those of us who live in the northwest er...the northeastern area of the state, know the confines...or the limits I should say, of Cook County. Cook County goes all the way from the Indiana State line all the way out to Elgin. It's a gigantic county with half of the state's population. Here we are asking for additional support for areas which have very very small enrollment. Therefore, I must reluctantly rise and oppose this Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Further discussion? Representative Lucco."

Lucco: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I rise in support of House Bill 696. This is a consolidation thing brought about by the state. These various Regional Superintendents have combined, we have three and four counties combined together. It doesn't cost any more money than it now costs at the present time. Regional Superintendents are getting one thousand dollars in each of the counties in which they are serving and by combining three or more counties they merely will be getting the same amount of money that those three or four County Superintendents are now presently getting. So I think it's more than fair that by forcing these people to have, we'll say 'sub-offices' in other counties throughout their Region, that we allow them to maintain and keep the office expenses that they have, which is only one



thousand dollars per Superintendent. So I solicit your 'aye' vote to 696."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brady."

Brady: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and fellow Members, I too rise in support of this Bill. What was brought up before is that someone who has an Educational Region such as Cook County only receives a thousand, doesn't make sense because they don't get enough money to do the service. We don't give them money to do the service in the downstate counties that need it. By consolidating, the services that were rendered to one county at the price of a thousand, are now rendered to somewhat up to five as Representative Hoffman stated. That means that an Educational Service Region has to do the mailings and the transportation costs of getting around to much greater distance with one fifth the amount of money. I think this is unreasonable for us to expect them to do that. The total expenditure of this is only \$24,000 and I urge your favorable support."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 98 'aye' and 45 'no'. The Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. 702...."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 702, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act to revise the law in relation to counties, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Flinn."

Flinn: "Mr. Speaker, I would ask leave of the House to move House Bill 702 back to Second Reading for purpose of an Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing no objections, Mr. Clerk, would you read 702..."



Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Flinn, amends House Bill 702, by deleting line one and inserting in lieu thereof the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "...702, we have returned it to Second Reading? Is that correct, Mr. Clerk? Have we returned it to the Order of Second Reading?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Yeah!"

Speaker Redmond: "Okay."

Flinn: "Mr. Speaker, Amendment #1 removes a problem that we had with the Bill. It was caught by Mr. Maurice Scott, of the Taxpayers Association. There was some court rulings having to do with the corporate levy limits. What we do here in the Amendment is to simply call this additional tax something over and above the corporate levy limits. That's all the Amendment does. I move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on Representative Dan Houlihan. Dan Houlihan.."

Houlihan, Dan: "We don't have a copy of the Amendment, Mr. Speaker and I'm wondering if it has been distributed?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative D. L. Houlihan."

Houlihan, Dan: "...We do not have a copy of the Amendment, Mr. Speaker...Have they been distributed?"

Flinn: "Well, the copies are back here. I'm sure they've been distributed."

Speaker Redmond: "Page....The Amendments to 702..."

Houlihan, Dan: "I have a copy of it now, thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor say 'aye'....'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 744....744..."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 744, a Bill for an Act in relation to taxes on sales of used motor vehicles, Third Reading



of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Simms."

Simms: "Well, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, House Bill 744 is a very simple Bill. It requires that all persons engaged in the rental or leasing car industry, which sell their automobiles at retail, be required to collect sales tax on the automobile at the time of sale. This Bill is supported by the Department of Revenue, passed the Revenue Committee on a 15 to 0 vote. I would urge the passage of House Bill 744 ...for the House of Representatives."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question is... Representative D. L. Houlihan."

Houlihan, D. L.: "Would you describe... Representative Simms, what is the change that this affects in the existing law?"

Simms: "The existing law...what this does is, it tightens up a loophole in the law, whereby, two or three of the large national car leasing agencies have been selling their used automobiles at, ...on the open market, for individuals without collecting sales tax on the sale of the car. They are opening up car lots and they are selling cars at retail and not collecting sales tax. In contrast, to a leasing car company that is also licensed as a car dealership who must collect sales tax. So it has been estimated that perhaps as high as \$1,000,000 of uncollected sales tax is being lost to the State of Illinois."

Houlihan, D. L.: "I'm a little confused as to how they were able to avoid it in the first instance?"

Simms: "Because they were...three of the large agencies were not licensed any place in the United States as car dealerships, therefore, they were allowed to the exemption of disposing of assets without collecting sales tax."

Houlihan, D. L.: "I see. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "I would certainly stand in support of this Bill."



This is one of the loopholes that the lease car industry certainly deserves to have closed. I'm certain that they are not spending all of their money in an appropriate manner anyway and this will give them less of that money to worry about."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schuneman, do you seek recognition?"

Schuneman: "Yes, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, a question of the Sponsor.Tim, I noticed that this would effect the rental agencies and leasing agencies."

Simms: "Right."

Schuneman: "What about large fleets of automobiles owned by private concerns?"

Simms: "It's not coveredThat is not part of the Legislation."

Schuneman: "Okay. So....."

Simms: "It only pertains really to the three large national leasing car companies that are operating in Illinois, that are circumventing the loophole by selling these cars without collecting sales tax."

Schuneman: "Isn't it true that they are doing that legally now, in that they own those automobiles? Similar to automobiles owned by Illinois Bell or Caterpillar, or any other large corporations in the State."

Simms: "It's different. Those people don't sell theirs to the general public. They trade them in on other vehicles or sell them to their employees. Three of these large agencies have opened up around the state, car lots selling the used automobiles, and they say 'no sales tax collected'. They are allowed to escape the collection of the sales tax through the loophole in the law. It only pertains to the car leasing industry."

Schuneman: "Any idea how many cars are sold each year in Illinois this way?"

Simms: "The Department of Revenue has estimated that perhaps



as high as anywhere from a thousand to two thousand cars and we could be losing as much as one million dollars in sales tax."

Schuneman: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Friedrich."

Friedrich: "Would the Sponsor yield?.....Wouldn't this be a double tax, if the leasing company paid a full sales tax on it when they bought it and then turned around and paid a sales tax when they sold it?"

Simms: "No, because what they are doing is, they're paying at the time that they purchase the automobile they are paying a use tax rather than a sales tax. For example your....car dealer in your town may also be a leasing agency. He has to collect sales tax on the used car because he is licensed as a used car dealer. So, in essence he is paying double tax, you are right. But, the three large national leasing corporations are circumventing that and not collecting the sales tax on these automobiles, where the small independent dealer has to collect em.....as well as..."

Friedrich: "How about when it's sold to them in the beginning though? Before they can get the license in the beginning, wouldn't they have to pay Illinois sales tax?"

Simms: "They pay a use tax.."

Friedrich: "Right..."

Simms: "Right."

Friedrich: "Which is the same rate."

Simms: "Right.."

Friedrich: "So it is a double tax.."

Simms: "Well, it is a double...it's a use tax on the company to begin with so when they sell it at retail it is a sales tax to the individual that purchases the automobile. So it's not a double tax, it's a tax that is collected from two different individuals. It's a good Bill, actually because it protects the small car leasing company



that is also a dealership. At the same time it really pertains to the three large agencies in the state that have operated, that bring cars into Illinois that can sell them and dispose of them without having to charge sales tax. So it's a great incentive for them."

Friedrich: "But, wouldn't it be true...if you, in your business bought a car for use in your business....you pay sales tax when you buy that car and when you sell it you don't have to pay it. Now, do you want to extend that to all business too."

Simms: "No, this pertains only to the automobile leasing...."

Friedrich: "I know. But, would you like to project that and just say...any business that buys a vehicle pays sales tax when they buy it and the buyer has to pay when they sell it?"

Simms: "The buyer does not have to the buyer is the one who pays it when he purchases it. This only pertains to that aspect of the industry, Representative Friedrich, who are losing about a million dollars a year on this..."

Friedrich: "Well, we're losing sales tax when you sell your used....hearse, too."

Simms: "I trade that in....Ha...Ha...Ha..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Byers."

Byers: "Will the Sponsor yield?"

Simms: "Yes."

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Byers: "Mr. Simms, you said this was going to be a thousand to two thousand cars. Why can't these people just take their car to some other state then and sell it rather than Illinois?"

Simms: "Well, at the present time, ...at the present time, Representative Byers, they are selling the ...some of thesethree of the largest agencies are selling the cars on the open market, on lots, and not collecting sales tax. The other states have closed the loophole! I think



Illinois is only one of the two states left that have not closed the loophole that would prevent them if they are going to be in the retail car sales business."

Byers: "Isn't it true that the person that will pay the tax will be the person that buys the car?"

Simms: "Right."

Byers: "So the consumer will be the one that is actually paying this tax?"

Simms: "That's correct."

Byers: "It's the same....it's the same as if he would go to a car dealer and purchase an automobile?"

Simms: "You're right."

Byers: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? The question is, shall this Bill pass? All those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Representative Epton.Have all voted who wish?...."

Epton: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I, once again, have a conflict of interest. I will vote my conscience."

Speaker Redmond: "The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 134 'aye' and 4 'no'. The Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Any idea of what we intend to do with the rest of the day? There are four Committees that are meeting tonight, starting at 6 o'clock. The Exec,...I guess, has about three or four hours to go so we won't gowe won't proceed on the floor much later than a quarter to or ten minutes until six. So let's..... people get a sandwich and proceed. We will not come back tonight. We hope that Exec....will have finished everything that's been assigned to them. Representative Mann.Oh! I understand that one of the Judiciaries ...either one or two are staying. So that is five Committees. Is anything.....after 780...that has to be called today? 780...."



Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 780, a Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pierce, the Sponsor of 780."

Pierce: "Mr. Speaker, I'll trade you 780 for 112."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has offered to trade 780 for 112. Does he have leave? Okay. 112."

Pierce: "We'll hold 780. House Bill 112, which has been on Third Reading for quite a while, was approved in the higher Education Committee by a vote of 11 to 2. What it does is prohibit community college districts from imposing residency requirements on teachers and other staff for employment, promotion or retention. You recall, on Second Reading, Representative Walsh placed an Amendment on the Bill which I didn't like but he was successful; and that ishe placed an Amendment on . . . that would protect only teachers that are already working for community college districts from a residency requirement. Those to be hired in the future could be subject to such a residency requirement. That Amendment was adopted and I am now asking that we pass this Bill on Third Reading with that Amendment even though I did oppose the Amendment. What the Bill says now is that a community college district cannot impose a residency requirement on those teachers that already worked for the district. But, possibly could, on teachers hired in the future. The Chicago City colleges have imposed such a residency requirement, both retroactively and prospectively. I feel strongly that a teacher or any other professional person has the right to live where they choose. That this is the right of a free person, in a free nation, to choose his place of residency, as long as it does not interfere with his performance of his duties at work. Now I'm not talking about firemen or policemen; they are not included in this Bill. I'm not talking about city or county employees, they are not included in this Bill. Only college teachers. In my opinion a college teacher who



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is doing his job and who is a good teacher, should be allowed to reside wherever he chooses to reside. It is a basic freedom of an American citizen. The Amendment was placed on the Bill and the Bill is still a good Bill. The Bill would prevent community colleges from requiring teachers already hired to move into the district in order to be retained or promoted. Therefore, I urge that we support the Committee on higher education and pass House Bill 112, as amended."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Madigan. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 112, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Public Junior College Act, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, I rise to support House Bill 112, which would provide that the professors employed by the junior colleges would not be subject to a retroactive requirement of residency within the district which employs them. I support the concept that local governmental bodies can require that their employees must live within the physical boundaries of their district. I feel that municipalities, counties, special districts such as junior college districts, education districts, sanitary districts, should be allowed to require that employees live within the physical boundaries of the district. However, I feel that in certain instances, individuals were hired and took employment without the condition that they reside in the district. And to require now that these people be retroactively required to change residency and in some instances suffer a severe economic hardship is an undue burden to place upon people who took a job feeling that they had the ability to live wherever they wish. Therefore, I am going to support this Bill because I feel that it does uphold the ability of



local governmental bodies to require that people who are hired under the conditions they live in the district, be required to live in that district."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Gene Hoffman."

Hoffman, Gene: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. A similar Bill....to this Bill....113, was before the House Education Committee and I opposed it. However, House Bill 112 has been amended.....in such a way that it has removed my objections. I feel that it is in violation of an individual's rights to have the terms of his contract change after the fact. It's an ex post facto type of a relationship. The Amendment, which has been placed on this Bill has eliminated that, and I rise to support House Bill 112."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lauer. Can't see Representative Lauer....."

Lauer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Would the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Lauer: "Dan, where are you?"

Speaker Redmond: ".....do you want to ask, Representative Pierce?"

Lauer: "Yes."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pierce."

Lauer: "Representative Pierce, is the Walsh Amendment still on this Bill?"

Pierce: "Yes, the Walsh Amendment was adopted by the House and is Amendment #1 and is still on the Bill and I'm moving adoption and the passage of the Bill as amended ...by the Walsh Amendment."

Lauer: "Thank you, Representative Pierce. I too, Mr. Speaker, can strongly support this Bill as it is presently constituted. I think that it is a basic principle that local governments, whatever local governmental unit it might be, should be able to mandate that its employees



also be taxpayers. Philosophically, at least, it would anticipate that they might be concerned about how the tax monies are spent, if they are also taxpayers of the district. As the Bill came originally to the Higher Education Committee, Mr. Speaker, it seemed improper that people who were already established as ...members of a given profession and employees of a given local unit of government should be required to tear up their roots, but by the addition of Amendment #1 these people are grandfathered in so that now people that are required to live in a district, as a condition of employment, know what they are getting into. This being the case, I think it is probably the most fair compromise that can be accomplished and I strongly recommend an 'aye' vote for House Bill 112."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Representativewe haven't shut it yet. You still got time with your long arm of the law. Have all.voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 164 'aye' and 5 'no' and the Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. 804. Representative Epton."

Epton: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker....."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 804, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code,"

Epton: "....if I may make ..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Epton..."

Epton: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker,as all of my colleagues know, Representative Huskey suffered a heart attack recently as a result of which, of course, he was hospitalized in the intensive care unit. Just recently the doctors informed him that he could be with us on the floor of the



House for a short period of time. Through an inadvertence I asked the record to indicate that Representative Huskey be excused from the Attendance Roll Call yesterday as well as today. However, the fact remains that Representative Huskey was present yesterday and is also present today....and I hope that the Clerk will correct the record to show that he was in attendance on both days. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any objection? Hearing none, the record will be corrected to reflect that Representative Huskey was present both yesterday and today. 428...I understand that Amendment has been distributed. Is that correct?"

Clerk O'Brien: "The Amendment has been distributed now."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Bluthardt, if I could see him,....I assume....Representative Meyer and Representative Ryan, we can't see Representative Bluthardt..."

Bluthardt: "Mr. Speaker, thank you. I now move to adopt Amendment #1 to House Bill 428."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor say 'aye', 'aye'; opposed 'no', the 'ayes' have it. The Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 804..."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 804, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code, Third Reading of the Bill. Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, House Bill 804 provides for the right of wards of the state, to the use of state paid for special education facilities. By way of background, north of Des Plaines is a residential care facility for state wards operated by Maryville Academy, an agency of the Catholic Chicago Archdiocese.



Sometime previously Maryville operated a grade school and a high school. It closed the high school, thereby, mildly impacting the local high school district. It then closed its grade school, severely impacting the local grade school district. As a consequence, the state passed a Bill for the construction of a special ed facility, at state cost, to accomodate these grade school students from Maryville Academy. Subsequently, because of a change in state policy, the population of Maryville Academy has shifted from grade school students to high school students, thereby severely impacting the high school district. Unfortunately the local grade school district, which has the ownership now of the school, the special ed facility at no extra cost to us, has refused to cooperate with the high school district, with respect to the accomodations, with respect to the education of these wards of the state. What House Bill 804 does is simply to provide that before a grade school district can bus in, under a cooperative agreement, from outside the district, nonstate wards that the state wards are to be accomodated and fully taken care of. The Bill was reported out of the Elementary and Secondary Education Committee by a vote of 16 to one, it represents the legislative intent of the original Bill and I solicit your support."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question 159 'aye' and one 'no'. The Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Consent Calendar, Third Reading. We're getting ready to wind down."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 811, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Municipal Code, Third Reading of the Bill. House



Bill 816, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is, shall these Bills pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 141145 'aye' and one 'no', and the Bills having received the Constitutional Majority ...hereby declared passed. Representative Madigan. Representative Lechowicz...."

Lechowicz: "Just a point of clarification, Mr. Speaker..... 811, is up.....on the Consent Calendar. It should be corrected."

Speaker Redmond: "It is not, you say?"

Lechowicz: "No. The board....Jack."

Speaker Redmond: "Oh!"

Lechowicz: "You got House Bill 811 up there. We're working on the Consent Calendar. It's not on there. Oh, is it? I didn't notice it."

Clerk O'Brien: "On page 11..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ebbesen, will you give Representative Lechowicz some time.....a little bit later on?"

Lechowicz: "Okay, 811 and 816, I'm sorry. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan. Representative Sumner."

Sumner: "Mr. Speaker..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Sumner...for what reason do you rise?"

Sumner: "Mr. Speaker.....I'm not on. There, I am. Mr. Speaker, I rise to ask leave to withdraw as Chief Sponsor of House Bill 1544.....and also as Cosponsor and add Representative McMaster as the Chief Sponsor."

Speaker Redmond: "Are there any objections? Representative Mahar. Are you objecting?"

Mahar: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker..."



Speaker Redmond: "Hearing no objections, leave is granted.
Representative Mahar."

Mahar: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, as Chief Sponsor of House
Bill 2028, I request permission to table House Bill 2028."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing no
objections. Leave is granted. Representative Mudd."

Mudd: "Yes. Mr. Speaker, I would like leave to table House
Bill 28."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? 28....Was
that, Representative Mudd?"

Mudd: "Yes, Sir."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mudd, 28. Does he have leave?
Hearing no objections, leave is granted. Representative
James Houlihan."

Houlihan, James: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the
House, I would like leave to add Representative Vince
Molloy as Chief Cosponsor of House Bill 707. He had
similar legislation and asked to be added to the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Does he have leave? Representative
Hearing no objections, leave is granted. Representative
Winchester."

Winchester: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd like to have leave
for unanimous consent to suspend the appropriate rule
in order that House Bill 993 and 994 might be heard in
the Executive Committee next Tuesday. I've checked with
Representative Capparelli and he approved."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any objections? Representative
Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, I'm unaware of the Bill that Mr.
Winchester is speaking of."

Winchester: "I'm sorry, Mr. Madigan, I did check with Represen-
tative Capparelli. I did not clear it with the Majority
Leader."

Madigan: "Can you just hold it for a minute until I see what
the Bill is?"



Winchester: "Certainly."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative J. David Jones."

Jones, J. David: "Mr. Speaker, I ask leave to table House Bill 1757, of which I am the Chief Sponsor?"

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave to table 1757? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. Representative Kelly, ..you have a motion with respect to tabling a motion? Is that correct? Representative Kelly. Closing fast."

Kelly: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, thank you very much. I did make a motion to discharge a Committee on a House Bill 1450 and I'd like to table that motion."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave to table the motion? Hearing no objection, leave is granted. Representative Ewing. I'm waiting for you and Representative Madigan to come to terms. Representative Ewing."

Ewing: "Yes. Mr. Speaker, I'm the Chief Sponsor of House Bill 1730 and I'd like leave of the House to withdraw as Chief Sponsor and in substitution thereof.....Representative Pullen."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Wait a minute. Wait a minute. The Clerk advises me that we have forms to be filled out in those cases and I think it would be very.....You don't have to stand up and get.... you just come down and fill out the form."

Ewing: "We'll take care of it then. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Sandquist."

Sandquist: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, as the Sponsor of House Bill 617, I'd like leave to table that Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. Representative Satterthwaite."

Satterthwaite: "Mr. Speaker, I would like leave to be added to the Affirmative Roll Call on 679."

Speaker Redmond: "Does she have leave? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. Representative Winchester, with re...



Representative Winchester."

Winchester: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I renew my request for leave for unanimous consent to suspend the appropriate rule so that House Bill 993 and 994 might be heard in Executive Committee next Tuesday. I think Representative Madigan has worked this out now and I think he has no objection."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing no objection, leave is granted. Representative Chapman."

Chapman: "Mr. Speaker, I ask leave to be recorded as voting 'aye' on House Bill 629."

Speaker Redmond: "Are there any objections? Hearing none, leave is granted.....she'll be recorded..." Representative Tipsword, 629."

Tipsword: "Mr. Speaker, being Chief Sponsor of House Bill 336, I ask leave to table House Bill 336."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. Representative Jacobs."

Jacobs: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I would like to ask leave of the House to suspend the appropriate rules relating to posting of Bills so that the House Labor and Commerce Committee can meet tonight at 7 p.m. in room 122-B to hear testimony only on the Workmen's Compensation Bills and Unemployment Insurance Bills.....which are sitting in our Committees that have not been acted upon. This means that we will hear testimony only on such Bills.....and will not vote on them until properly posted for next week's meeting, however, we will be able to vote on those Bills which are remaining from today's postings."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mann."

Mann: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. The Judiciary I Committee I'm sorry. Excuse me. I thought this matter had been resolved. I'm sorry."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijeovich."



Matijevich: ".....I'm sorry, Chairman Mann. Mr. Speaker, on the unanimous consent as asked for by Representative Jacobs, I rise with some trepidation because he is a long time friend of mine and former office mate. However, I am very adamant and do object for this reason. First of all, we all know the importance of Workmen's Comp legislation. We all know that we've been unjustly maligned on past legislation. I would hate to see a Committee hurriedly go into Workmen's Comp legislation especially when I've been told by some opposition that they haven't had adequate notice of this meeting tonight. I think the public ought to have adequate notice and further than that I think that we're only going to get good Workmen's Comp legislation if we sit down calmly, coolly and not quickly....going into the matter. So I earnestly object and I know my former office understands that objection."

Speaker Redmond: "Under the circumstances, it cannot be considered. Representative Harris."

Harris: "Mr. Chairman, I'd like to announce a cancellation of a Subcommittee hearing on branch banking which was to be held in Chicago April 25."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Waddell."

Waddell: "Mr. Speaker, as Chief Sponsor of House Bill 828, I wish that it be tabled."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Are there any other announcements by any Committee Chairmen? Representative Yourell?"

Yourell: "The House Committee on Counties and Townships will meet at 8 o'clock in Room 118."

Speaker Redmond: "Any other Committee Chairmen? Representative Capparelli."

Capparelli: "The Executive Committee will meet immediately after adjournment, 6 o'clock."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tipsword, do you still seek



recognition? Is Bradley sitting on your switch?"

Tipsword: "No, he is not sitting on the switch. I was just wondering if you are going to go to motions tonight or not."

Speaker Redmond: "No. No, I'm not."

Tipsword: "What if we run out of time, Sir?"

Speaker Redmond: "Well, we have towe've got so many Committee meetings and everything that we just have to wind this one down. I told you we'd go to your question tomorrow."

Tipsword: "We have some very important matters and time is very important on them."

Speaker Redmond: "I will go to that early enough tomorrow so that it is taken care of."

Tipsword: "You had indicated to me you were going to go to it yet tonight."

Speaker Redmond: "Any other Committee Chairmen? Representative Lucco, are you seeking recognition?"

Lucco: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I rise to recognize the people up in the rear balcony, to the rear of the chamber. There are 27 members of Stephenson County Republican Central Committee Bob Wessel, their Chairman and they are represented by Mulcahey, Rigney and Adams. To the rear of the chamber, please."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker,"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Any further announcements?"

Speaker Redmond: "Any further announcements? Mr. Clerk. Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I have a very charming young man next to me who is celebrating his 28th birthday. I think it would be nice if everybody knows that Mike Abramson, Representative



Abramson...."

Speaker Redmond: "I thought you were talking about Representative Conti."

Geo-Karis: "Well, he is nice, but he is not very eligible. Neither is Mike for that matter but....anyway Mike has got his 28th birthday. I think we ought to wish him a happy birthday."

Speaker Redmond: "...Elmer is 28... Representative Jacobs."

Jacobs: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like to announce and ask that the House and Labor Commerce CommitteeBeings we have.... only four or five Bills, if we could meet immediately after adjournment and then we would be through for today's meeting."
