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Doorkeeper: "All persons not entitled to the House floor, please retire to the gallery. Attention all Members of the House, the House will convene in five minutes. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "The House will come to order and the Members please be in their seats. We will be led in prayer by Reverend Krueger, the House Chaplain."

Reverend Krueger: "O Lord, bless this House to thy service this day. Amen. Thomas A. Bailey said: Many Americans, through sheer indifference or incapacity, have abdicated their kinship. We have set up a representative government, and then all too often have failed to indicate in what way we wish to be represented. Let us pray. O Lord God, we come before Thee this day with hearts and minds that are sincere and humble; we acknowledge Thee to be the creator and author of all things; and we are grateful for the trust that Thou hast extended to us. In Thy divine wisdom we have been blessed with a form of government in which all men are equal in the right of participation. May our efforts, as Members of this Illinois House of Representatives, never diminish the desire of the governed to share in this process. May all that we do be in harmony with their needs and comprehension. And, finally O Lord, may the laws which are here enacted be attuned to the symphony of love with Thou has ordained for all mankind. We ask this in the name of Thy Son. Amen."

Speaker Redmond: "Roll Call for attendance. Message from the Senate."

Clerk O'Brien: "A message from the Senate by Mr. Wright, Secretary. Mr. Speaker, I am directed to inform the House of Representatives that the Senate passed Bills of the following title, the passage of which I am instructed to ask concurrence of the House of Representatives to-wit Senate Bills 492, 493 and 639, passed by the Senate April 28, 1977. Kenneth Wright, Secretary."



Speaker Redmond: "Committee Reports."

Clerk O'Brien: "Representative Schisler, Chairman from the Committee on Agriculture to which the following Bills were referred. Speaker Redmond: "The Executive Committee meets in about 15 minutes so I think probably we'd better stand at ease for 15 minutes. We don't want to bring them back tomorrow so, unless you all want to come back with them. I hear objections. Stand at ease until 4:30."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, as long as we have a little lull...I said I always like to have a little humor when something is dull around here. I was thinking today, you know we've had such a big rush of Bills that came out and it looks like all of the Committees are all through and it reminded me of the airplane that was flying in the fog and the weather was real bad and the air captain came over the intercom and he said, I've got some bad news and some good news. He said, first the bad news... we're lost



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he said, now the good news, we're making good time."

Speaker Redmond: "The Parliamentarian within in ear shot? Representative McCourt, do you seek recognition?"

McCourt: "Mr. Speaker, may I be recognized to make a motion to table some items that I'm the principle sponsor of?"

Speaker Redmond: "We're not back in Session yet."

McCourt: "All right."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tuerk.... Representative Luft."

Luft: "Thank.... Mr. Speaker, while we're not doing anything could I table a couple of Bills?"

Speaker Redmond: "I can't hear you."

Luft: "May I table two Bills while we're...."

Speaker Redmond: "We're not back in Session yet. Be at ease for another ten minutes. Representative Bradley on the floor? Representative Garmisa."

Garmisa: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Just to make sure that there is no misunderstanding, there will not be a meeting of the Transportation Committee tomorrow. That has been called off."

Totten: "This is Representative Joe Lucco's birthday and I think in this little interim when we're not in Session so the rules can't be broken that we ought to have Representative Tipword lead us in Happy Birthday to Representative Lucco. Representative Tipword, can you sing Happy Birthday to Joe Lucco?"

Tipword: "I haven't.... is it in the rules?"

Totten: "Well, we're not in Session so we can't break the rules."

Tipword: "I will if everybody else will. Happy Birthday to you. Happy Birthday to you. Happy Birthday dear Joe, Happy Birthday to you."

Speaker Redmond: "The House is back in order. Order of business is motions. Representative Luft, for what purpose do you rise?"



Luft: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. As principal Sponsor of House Bill 1937 and House Bill 188, I would like to have those Bills tabled, please."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing no objections leave is granted. Representative Lechowicz. Somebody over here wanted to table something, was it McCourt? Was that Representative McCourt? Representative McCourt has asked leave to table House Joint Resolution Constitutional Amendment 34, does he have leave? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. Representative Bowman."

Bowman: "Mr. Speaker, as Chief Sponsor of House Bill 1463, I also ask leave to table."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave to table House Bill 43, was it? What number was it?"

Bowman: "1463."

Speaker Redmond: "1463. Representative Kane."

Kane: "With the Co-chairman of the State Government Reorganization Committee, I would ask leave of the House to put the following Bills into interim study, House Bill 55, 1120, 1121, 1122, 1123."

Speaker Redmond: "I wonder if you would put them in writing so it can be Journalized, Mr. Kane."

Kane: "Thank you. Do I have leave?"

Speaker Redmond: "Put it in motion.... is the motion in writing? Mr. Clerk...."

Clerk O'Brien: "Motion to put House Bills 55, 1120, 1121, 1122, 1123, 1124, 1125, 1245, 1476 and 1761, in interim study."

Kane: "It's the select Committee on State Government Reorganization."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Representative Totten."

Totten: "Yeah, I believe, Mr. Speaker we have to suspend the rules in order to do that, don't we.... do we not? Doesn't the rules provide that the only way we can put into interim is...."

Speaker Redmond: "We ask for the unanimous consent was what he



asked for and I asked if there were objections... now, are there objections"

Totten: "Well, doesn't he have to just move to suspend the rules to put it into interim."

Speaker Redmond: "If there is no objection then we assume he has unanimous consent and that the rule was suspended. If there are objections then he would have to move to suspend it and try and get the votes. If you don't object to it why.... there are no objections. Representative Laurino."

Laurino: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I would like leave of the House to have the appropriate rule suspended.... posting rule, so that we can have a Committee hearing on the Brinkmeier vs. Adams Subcommittee Tuesday afternoon and evening for the Subcommittee recount and then to report to the Full Committee on Wednesday."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has asked leave to suspend the appropriate posting rule, is there any objection? Hearing no objection leave is granted. Representative Friedrich."

Friedrich: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. For the first time in my life I'm going to ask to have leave to discharge a Committee so a Bill can be moved to Second Reading without reference. This is an unusual situation, I feel that.... I have checked with the Chairman on Elections, Representative Laurino. What happened.... my House Bill 2188, was assigned to Cities and Villages without my knowledge it was sent to.... was assigned to Elections. When I got to the Elections Committee they said that it had not been posted and they needed copies of the Bill. Yesterday I asked for leave for it to be heard today and the Committee did not meet today and I think it is an unusual set of circumstances so, I would ask for unanimous consent to have this Bill put on Second Reading without reference to Committee."



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Speaker Redmond: "Representative Katz. Does Representative Friedrich have unanimous consent? Representative Byers.... objection has been raised. Representative Byers.... Representative Friedrich."

Friedrich: "Then I would like a Roll Call on my motion. I think this is an unusual situation. As I say, in all my years I have never asked to do this. I would not do it now without consent of the Chairman and I haven't and I think the Members that was there are familiar with the situation, so I would ask for a Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Could we hold that for just five seconds?"

Speaker Redmond: "Yes. Representative Waddell."

Waddell: "Mr. Speaker, in reference to the previous matter. Those individuals who are not here, how are you going to notify them about the meeting on Tuesday morning... on Elections Committee?"

Speaker Redmond: "The Chairman will take care of that. Representative Laurino."

Laurino: "Well, Mr. Speaker, maybe the Gentleman misunderstood me, I didn't say it was going to be Tuesday morning. We come into Session at twelve noon, the appropriate people have been notified, I just needed leave of the House for a posting situation and it is a recount on three precincts up in Joe Daviess County. That's all it is."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Waddell."

Waddell: "To set the records straight, what had been said was Tuesday morning or Tuesday night and I didn't know which."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Laurino. Representative Laurino is the Chairman of Elections and he will run the Election Committee."

Laurino: "Mr. Speaker, I thought he was talking about the Election contest.... that's all I've got leave for that."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tipword."



Tipsword: "Mr. Speaker, may I table two motions on your motion Calendar relating to House Bill 869."

Speaker Redmond: "Which ones are they Representative Tipsword? Representative Tipsword, desires to table the motion with respect to House Bill 869... both motions, that's right. Does he have leave? Hearing no objections leave is granted and the motions are tabled. Representative Laurino, where do you stand now? Leave was granted as my understanding and.... Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, you just stated that leave was granted on what, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Laurino, what was your request?"

Laurino: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Leave was granted for the Election contest of Brinkmeier vs. Adams for the recount of three precincts from Joe Daviess County to be recorded, after the recount Tuesday after we come into Session to be reported to the regular Committee meeting on Wednesday. That is all leave was granted for."

Speaker Redmond: "Leave was granted. Hearing no objections... Representative Hart."

Hart: "There will be a Democratic Conference in room 114, immediately."

Speaker Redmond: "How long, Representative Hart?"

Hart: "Thirty minutes."

Speaker Redmond: "Democratic Conference for thirty minutes, we'll be back on the floor at 6:00. Representative Telcser."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker, Representative Ryan asked that we have a Republican Conference also, I don't know what room is available but...."

Speaker Redmond: "Maybe you will have a conference room without walls."

Telcser: "118... 118 is available?"

Speaker Redmond: "I don't know, I'll find out."



Telcser: "Would you find out now?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijeovich."

Matijeovich: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House.

Could I have leave of the House. There are three Appropriation Bills which are contrary to the rules. They passed out of a substantive Committee with a companion Bill but contrary to the rules were not rereferred to Appropriations Committee. So, could I have leave to have House Bill 1047, 1099 and 2001, referred to the Appropriation I Committee. I just didn't have time to talk to the Leadership on it but I know that nobody would object to that."

Speaker Redmond: "Are they substantive Bills?"

Matijeovich: "No, these are Appropriation Bills that must be..."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay."

Matijeovich: "...referred to Appropriations Committee by our rules."

Speaker Redmond: "Hearing no objections, leave is granted. 118 Mr. Telcser for the Republican Conference."

Doorkeeper: "All persons not entitled to the House floor, please retire to the gallery. Thank you."

Doorkeeper: "Could I have your attention please. All persons not entitled to the House floor, please retire to the gallery."

Speaker Redmond: "Introductions, First Reading."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2379, McBroom. A Bill for an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense to the Department of Transportation. First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 2380, Mugalian. A Bill for an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense to the Commission on Mental Health and Developmental Disability. First Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Senate Bills, First Reading."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 492, a Bill for an Act to amend



Sections of the Vietnam Veterans Compensation Act. First Reading of the Bill. Senate Bill 493, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Revenue Act. First Reading of the Bill. Senate Bill 343, a Bill for an Act making appropriation to the ordinary and contingent expense of the Medical Center Commission. First Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Reading of the Journal."

Clerk O'Brien: "Journals for 42nd Legislative Day, Saturday April 23rd, 1977..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan, in approval of the Journal."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, I move to dispense with the reading of the Journal #41, April 22, 1977. Journal #42, April 23, 1977. Journal #43, April 25, 1977, and I move that they be approved."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Is there any discussion? Hearing none, all those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Journal is approved. Representative Kosinski."

Kosinski: "Mr. Speaker, I request suspension of the posting rule to permit the meeting of a Subcommittee of Appropriations II and Human Resources to accept a report on the addition and corrections. Set Subcommittee meeting to be May 5, at 8 A.M. in room C-1 of the State Office Building."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any objections? Any discussion? Hearing none leave is granted. Representative Katz."

Katz: "Mr. Speaker, there are five Bills that Sponsors in Judiciary II, the Sponsors have asked me to put on the Interim Study Calendar. Could I have leave to suspend the provisions of Rule 25 (b), so that House Bills 262, 1276, 1979, 1350 and 1367, be placed on the Interim Study Calendar."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. The Order of Motions, is the five minutes expired, Representative Ryan? The Order



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of Motions, House Bill, motion with respect to House Bill 17. Representative Richard Kelly. Somebody asked me earlier in the day, how long we would work today and I said five o'clock. So, if you asked me now.... five o'clock. House Bill 17."

Kelly: "Mr. Speaker...."

Speaker Redmond: "Where is this Bill, Mr. Kelly?"

Kelly: "Pardon me?"

Speaker Redmond: "Where is this Bill.... is it in...."

Kelly: "The Bill is in Committee, I have requested a discharge and accordingly to that, I would like to raise a question. Since we are at the end of the line on Bills that are in Committee, does this mean that every Bill that is filed under motions will be dead at this point rather than let's say, continuing them possibly next week? Are they dead?"

Speaker Redmond: "If it is in Committee and is not on Interim Study Calendar, it will automatically be tabled tomorrow."

Kelly: "Well, then I certainly want to advance with my motion."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay, proceed. Mr. Clerk.... Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "In the past there has been some ground rules with respect to the calling of these motions to cut down the time. They have as I recall, been that the Sponsor of the motion has an opportunity to present his case, the Chairman of the Committee present his, the Sponsor close and take a vote. Is that the procedure you intend to follow?"

Speaker Redmond: "If you make the motion, I'll abide by whatever the judgement of the Membership... Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Well, I object to that kind of motion, if he wants to bring a new rule into the play of this House of Representatives I think he should go before the Rules Committee. Now, there is something in the rules that say this kind of procedure should take place and lets keep to the orderly process of the rules that are adopted by



this House for handling any motion and at this stage of the game, is not a time to change rules."

Walsh: "I was just attempting to be helpful, Mr. Speaker, and I renew my motion."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman... Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, we all know why we're here and we all know why we're going to stay here awhile longer. And, let me tell you that reason will never come about because we've got a rule book here that I know is going to take 107 votes no matter how deeply you look into it over there and therefore, I'm going now move that the House stand adjourned.... and that takes precedence over all of you."

Speaker Redmond: "Matijevich moves to adjourn. That takes precedence.... that takes precedence..... and that takes precedence and there is no debate. The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Representative Matijevich has moved that we adjourn. Representative Simms."

Simms: "Mr. Speaker, I move that motion lie upon the table."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "I'll make a motion that we adjourn until Tuesday at noon and I don't think that is amendable, is it Dave? Nor debatable."

Speaker Redmond: "According to Rule 61, a motion to adjourn takes precedence over a motion to lay it on the table so, the question is on the Gentleman's motion... Representative Simms."

Simms: "Mr. Speaker, I'm going to withdraw my motion to table Representative Matijevich's. At the same time, I think, I would like to speak on the motion if I might. What a disgrace to the people of the State of Illinois that they want to cause an issue on the debate that the people have the right to debate the issues before the people of the State of Illinois. And if the Democratic Party is showing continued irresponsibility in Illinois by turning their backs on the people and trying to ramrod....."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijevich. Representative Matijevich is recognized."

Matijevich: "I have been requested by some of my hierarchy to withdraw that motion. I'll withdraw it but believe me you better have 107 votes because you're going to need them."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I would certainly hope that you could keep this House under better control than you have in the last two or three minutes and if you don't, Mr. Speaker, I would say that we are in for a long evening and...."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay, Representative Walsh, I want you to take care of Representative Simms to make sure he stays in order. The question is on the motion to House Bill 17, Representative Kelly."

Kelly: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. House Bill 17, which I'm requesting to be discharged from the Judiciary II Committee is a Bill which I sent each Member a letter on relating to the subject of obscenity. At the Judiciary II Committee meeting I received a vote of 10 votes for and 3 votes against and 5 votes present which would indicate that there was not strong opposition, in fact strong support for this proposal. Now, I would like to apologize to Representative Mann because in my letter I indicated his obscenity Bill may not be constitutional. Representative Mann's Bill in my opinion would meet the constitutional guidelines but it is very much a different obscenity Bill than the one I am presenting which is in fact, duplicates the exact language of in the Miller vs. California U.S. Supreme Court decision which was made in 1973. Therefore, I would ask for your favorable support on House Bill 17, to discharge Judiciary II Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Johnson."

Johnson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. With all due respect to Representative Kelly,



I along with the other twenty-three Members of Judiciary II Committee approved the Bill that is now on the floor of the House, Representative Mann's Bill by unanimous vote. I might also point out that the report of the Subcommittee of the Judiciary II Committee on obscenity and I think that to have two Bills on the floor of this House particularly in light of the overwhelming approval that the Members of the Committee gave to Representative Mann's Bill is probably improper and confuses the Members of this House to what direction we want to go. And I would strongly oppose Representative Kelly's motion to discharge on that basis."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Friedrich, do you desire to speak on this Resolution..... motion."

Friedrich: "No, I was just wondering what happened to my motion which Representative Madigan wanted five seconds on a while ago."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, it's got kinda caught in the switches but we'll be back.... The question, Representative Kelly to close."

Kelly: "Well, I indicated earlier that this subject under my obscenity Bill was much different than that under Representative Mann's obscenity Bill. Mine strictly included the Miller vs. California language, it also kept in some other areas that I think are important. I don't like to go into detail on Representative Mann's Bill but it's got a different approach on obscenity than mine does and this Bill is 100% constitutional. It would give the State of Illinois once again a statute on obscenity which meets all complete guidelines and I really think the Committee should have given a fair opportunity to both obscenity Bills when this Bill was heard. And I do think it should be kept alive and should be followed through the legislative process because this might be the Bill that eventually that the General Assembly thinks is the best obscenity



some type of open primary, I think that we owe it to them, I think that it is important that we bring this Bill to the floor of the House for debate. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative C. M. Stiehl."

Steele, E.G.: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I rise, too, in support of this motion. This vote here is really a test of whether we can make our legislative process really work in behalf of the people. Here is an issue in which the Committee couldn't reach a decision, it was tied. Now, if it was just a normal issue, I would say, forget it but this is not a normal issue. It is an issue of great public interest, it is an issue in which the Committee has been unable to decide. It's an issue in which polls have been taken, it's an issue in which volumes have been written in the newspapers in which elections have been won and lost. It is an issue in which the people expect us to debate this issue on the floor of the House and make that decision. At the very least we owe the people of this state an open discussion on the merits of this issue and I urge that we discharge the Committee and bring it out of the floor. To bottle up this Bill in the Committee process is to really cast a shadow on our Legislative process here and I say, regardless of how you feel on the merits of this issue you should recognize and realize that this is an issue in which the public expects us to take a vote, discuss it on the floor of the House and I urge you to support this motion to discharge Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mulcahey."

Mulcahey: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. This particular Bill has been going around the General Assembly for a number of years and this particular Bill has been researched and developed on a bipartisan basis. It has support from Democrats and Republicans alike and with this I hope we can get it off... out of Committee and on the House



Bill and I therefore, ask for your support."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor say 'aye'.... vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 105 'ayes', 13 'no' and the Gentleman's motion prevails. House Bill 25. Representative Robinson."

Robinson: "Mr. Speaker, there are five of us who are sponsoring this motion to discharge House Bill 25. House Bill 25, is the optional primary. I'm disappointed that we haven't had an opportunity to bring this up until late on Friday. However, I would like to point out that this is really the first time in over twenty years that the open primary issue has ever made it to the floor of the House. This will be the first recorded Roll Call on the open primary issue. Mr. Speaker, I know that you know this very well because this originally... the proposal originally was backed by Representative Horsley, when he represented Sangamon County in the House and you, Mr. Speaker, one of his Cosponsors on this Bill a few years back. Mr. Speaker, the five of us who are on this would like an opportunity to speak. I would like to cut short my time if I could cede it to Representative C.M. Stiehl. I would like her to have an opportunity on this issue that is backed by all the polls, by 80% of the people in the State of Illinois."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Stiehl."

Stiehl: "Thank you, Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I rise in support of this motion because I feel that the polls have clearly shown the intensity of voters' feelings on this subject. During the past twenty to twenty-five years numerous Bills have been filed and yet none of them have been debated on the House floor. I think that in view of the desire of the people to have



floor. This is a Bill that is going to allow the 90% of the people of this state who want to vote in open primary elections on a secret basis and it is going to provide the opportunity for that very thing. This is their right and it is our responsibility to give it to them."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Edgar."

Edgar: "I would like to join the other four Cosponsors of this to say that I think the time has come for the full House to debate this issue on the floor. I think it is the type of issue that the time has come and the Committee was unable to reach a decision, they were split on it. I think that we can resolve this issue once and for all and we could bring it to the floor of the House and I urge a 'no'.... 'yes' vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Davis.... heard you the first time."

Davis: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. I rise in support of this measure as a Cosponsor, And any House Member who has had a primary fight and I had five in my primary fight last time and has gone through the agony... the agony of trying to find people to come out and vote in our current primary system must realize the efficacy of voting for the discharge motion so that this Bill can have a full hearing on the House floor."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Laurino."

Laurino: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. As Chairman of the Elections Committee I rise in opposition to this discharge motion, specifically because the open primary Bill delutes the two-party system in which I am in great favor of. Secondly, when you allow a situation to start with a secret situation in our ballot box that allows the voter to hid behind a cloak rather than becoming proud of his party, you can actually, if you are a strong one party and a weak one party in a vicinity in a municipality,



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you can control that entire municipality. The two-party system was founded on the ability to have people declare themselves and I don't see any reason why we should dispose of that situation at this time. And, I think that if you discharge the Committee, you are destroying the reason to have a Committee. We might as well have a meeting of the whole and five thousand Bills heard on this floor of the House instead of having Committee Reports. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pullen."

Pullen: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. It was my good fortune to be setting in the Elections Committee the other morning when this Bill was heard and I can testify that this Bill received a fair hearing. If one believes in the two-party system in Illinois, one would not accept this kind of Bill. I believe that the comments that have been made, that the people want this Bill discussed and debated on the floor. I think that comes from the fact that the people do not understand what a primary is or the two-party system and I urge a 'no' vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I rise to speak in support of this motion because, let's not fool ourselves the time has come where the electors are more sophisticated, are not going to be told what they are going to do when they don't want to declare themselves. I think it is high time that we debate this issue on the floor and I can tell you that from my area people are sick and tired of being called second class citizens because they don't vote in the primary for fear of reprisal and this is too often in Chicago and DuPage County to. I might also add that I think this will strengthen the two-party system and I think it is a motion that should be debated and should be passed affirmative and let the



issue come to the floor for discussion."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House.

I think I'm going to surprise the maker of this motion because I believe in open primaries. However, I believe in something stronger than that and that is the Committee structure. I believe very strongly in the Committee structure and I really think rules of the House provide that if somebody did you dirt in Committee then you use the discharge motion. Now, Penny Pullen just got up and said that she sat in that hearing and she thought the maker of the motion was treated fairly. Now, just because it was a close vote means nothing. I lost a Bill the other day that didn't get the required majority of the Members of the Committee, I happen to make that... have that rule adopted you've got to live by the rules. So, I, in spite of the fact that I'm strongly for an open primary, am going to vote 'no' against this motion."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Campbell."

Campbell: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House.

Although I have great respect for the Sponsor of this legislation, I think it is the most idiotic piece of legislation I've seen come in this House in the last ten years. And if you want to destroy the two-party system, this is a damn good way to do it and we live in America where people should have the guts to go to the polls and declare themselves whether they are Republican or Democrat. And I'm going to tell you that you're not going to get anymore people to the polls because of the fact that they don't have to declare themselves. So, let's call a spade a spade and defeat this motion and kill this Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Byers."

Byers: "Mr. Speaker, I move the previous question."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the previous question. The question is, shall the main question be put? Those



in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. Representative Robinson to close."

Robinson: "Mr. Speaker, let me make it clear what the Bill does. It says that any individual can declare or not declare, it says in order to vote for party officials, like precinct Committeemen or Ward Committeemen or delegates you have to declare. This is a compromise...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain, for what purpose do you rise?"

McClain: "Mr. Speaker, I suggest the Gentleman not speak on the motion but speak on the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Speak on the motion."

Robinson: "The rules, Mr. Matijevich, provide that when you get a nine to nine vote and they don't kill your Bill you can bring a motion to discharge and you need 89 votes to get it out and that is the rule we're abiding by."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Representative Houlihan, to explain his vote. 89 votes."

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, and Representative Matijevich in particular. I agree with you that we ought to support the Committee system, we ought to encourage the Committees to deliberate to make their decisions and report to the floor. But in this particular case the Committee could not make a determination one way or another. It was not a close vote, it was a tied vote. The Committee after a full and thorough hearing couldn't make a decision. And in that case it is very appropriate for us to appeal to the entire Membership of the House for a favorable vote on this particular motion. What we want in this motion is the ability of the House to give direction to that Committee and I think that the merits of this Bill have been thoroughly presented and I would urge everyone to vote 'aye' on this particular issue."



Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 63... 64 'aye' and 61 'no', the Gentleman's motion fails. 165, Representative Kosinski."

Kosinski: "Mr. Speaker, inasmuch as they are companion Bills, may we hear 165 and 166 together?"

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Read 166, Mr. Clerk."

Kosinski: "This is an unusual motion to discharge in that the Bills were never heard in Committee through evidently lack of communication between my Chairman, Mr. Harold Katz and myself the Vice Chairman. The Bills were not called and all of a sudden the Committee dissipated. These are law and order Bills, essentially they're directed in those situations where armed robbery... felonies are committed, people go out on bail, commit other felonies, go out on bail, commit other felonies and I'm attempting to put a cap on this and I ask that we have the opportunity of hearing these Bills on the floor inasmuch as they were not heard in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Katz."

Katz: "I rise reluctantly in opposition to motion to discharge. I would only state that I was not aware during the time that we were meeting that the Gentleman desired the Bills to be called, subsequently there will be a motion, there is one filed by Mr. Cunningham. In his case I was aware that he wanted the Bill being called; inadvertently it was not called and I believe that, in my opinion does justify being discharged. In the case of the distinguished Gentleman from Chicago, I was not aware that he wanted the Bills called so I believe that bringing it out on the floor in this way subverts the Committee system. I believe for that reason it should not be discharged and therefore, I will vote 'no'."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? The question is on



the Gentleman's... Representative Kosinski to close, 'pardon me.'"

Kosinski: "I can say, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House in all honesty, I did ask Mr. Katz to call the Bills. Unfortunately there was a lot of turmoil in Judiciary II and I'm sure without any malice Mr. Katz forgot my request. It is on that basis that I ask to hear these Bills."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On these two motions there is 103 'aye' and 15 'no' and the Gentleman's motion prevails. 219, Representative Ralph Dunn. Representative Ralph Dunn."

Dunn: "Thank you, Sir. House Bill 219, is a revenue matter and it was not assigned to Revenue Committee and I filed a motion to ask that it be recommitted to Revenue Committee and that is the extent of my motion. I would ask for a favorable vote on.... Well, this would not.... it's been heard and... hold on just a minute. It's been heard in Committee, it is not a matter of dying it just ought to be rereferred to Revenue Committee next... I need to hold that until weekend. The Bill has been heard in Committee, Mr. Chairman, I would like to ask...."

Speaker Redmond: "It's a motion to rerefer to House Revenue Committee, is that what you want to do?"

Dunn: "That's right.... that's right."

Speaker Redmond: "They tell me it is on Second Reading. Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "A point of parliamentary inquiry, Mr. Speaker. If this motion prevails and this Bill is sent back to the Revenue Committee, will the deadline for Committee consideration apply to the Bill?"

Speaker Redmond: "Yes."

Madigan: "So that there will be no opportunity for the Revenue



Committee to consider this Bill, is that correct?"

Speaker Redmond: "Just a minute now, I have been advised that the Bill is on Second Reading is that correct? It's on Second Reading. Do you want to take it off of Second Reading and put it back in Committee, Mr. Dunn?"

Dunn: "Mr. Chairman, this is a Bill that authorizes some twenty-five million dollars and it was not sent to Revenue Committee, this is an extended motion. The motion has been filed a long time ago, it had nothing to do with the deadline."

Speaker Redmond: "Oh, I see. Whose Bill is this?"

Dunn: "It is Pouncey's Bill. It had twenty-five million dollars in Capital Development Bond money."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to have a ruling if the motion is in order. The Bill was assigned to Committee and it was reported do pass on the Order of Second Reading."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, this is really not a Revenue Bill as you said and it contained an Appropriation Bill. I believe it passed out of Appropriations Committee... oh, no, was recommended that it do not pass, I guess.... tabled I believe. Think about that one for a while, 218, is a companion Bill and it has been recommended do not pass and 219, is a authorization Bill but, it surely doesn't go to Revenue. I think he ought to just withdraw the motion."

Speaker Redmond: "Who voted in the motion, Representative Dunn?"

Dunn: "I made the motion but, I'm the Minority Spokesman on Revenue Committee and it occurred to me that Bills like this that authorized twenty-five million dollars would be assigned to Revenue Committee and so I asked that it be reassigned to the Revenue Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz."



Lechowicz: "Mr. Speaker, I renew my point of order. I believe the motion is out of order."

Speaker Redmond: "What is your motion specifically? Do you have a motion? Mr. Clerk, will you read the motion?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Pursuant to Rule 31 (e), I move that House Bill 219, be rereferred to Revenue Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "The Parliamentarian says that is the effect of transferring from one Committee to another and that the motion is out of order. Now...."

Dunn: "Is what?"

Speaker Redmond: "That the motion is out of order at this time. The Bill was on the Order of Second Reading. 239, Representative Tuerk."

Tuerk: "Mr. Speaker, before you leave that business, try to clarify... it seems to me that Second Reading Bill 219 is Sponsored by Representative Pouncey and the motion for 219 was filed by Representative Dunn. There seems to be a little confusion as to which Bill we're talking about here."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, that has been straightened out in my mind and I was the one that interjected that misunderstanding about the original Sponsorship and Mr. Dunn but the Parliamentarian advises me that this time that motion is out of order. 239. Representative Deuster... Representative Deuster, is he here? Representative Deuster, on 239... out of the record. 240, Representative Griesheimer.... Representative Porter, do you seek recognition?"

Porter: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Representative Griesheimer is not here at the moment and he hasn't asked me to handle this motion and I know nothing about the Bill except what I read in the Digest. but I think he would probably at least like a vote on it and maybe some Member of the Committee that was there at the time the Bill was heard could....."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijeovich, for what purpose do



you arise?"

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, that motion belongs to Representative Griesheimer and he's not here and any discussion of it is out of order."

Speaker Redmond: "I think we ought to put it to a vote. I don't see anything in the rules specifically that provides that nobody else can handle it. We have had occasion where a Member would be ill and somebody would represent... Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Well, Mr. Speaker, if you were asked to handle a Bill would be one thing but I don't believe he.... I think he stated on the floor that he didn't know anything about it and he's just willing to handle the Bill and I believe that is out of order."

Speaker Redmond: "You desire to put the motion, Representative Porter?"

Porter: "Well, I would like to get the chance at least to take a vote on it, I am the principal Co-sponsor of it."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz, I'm going to let him have a vote on it."

Lechowicz: "Why do you get back to it "

Speaker Redmond: "240, the question is the Gentleman's motion that the Judiciary II be put on Second Reading, First Legislative Day... I mean the Judiciary II, will be discharged on House Bill 240 be put on the order of Second Reading. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 54 'aye' and 29 'no', the Gentleman's motion fails. 344, Representative Telcser."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker, can I have leave to be recorded as voting 'no' on Representative Kelly's motion relative to House Bill 17? It will not affect the outcome."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing no



objections, leave is granted. 344, Representative Huff."

Huff: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In deference to Representative Jacobs, who I have the highest regard and unflagging faith with regards to 344, I at this time will ask leave to table that Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "House Bill 380, Representative Bluthardt... out of the record. 559.... 496.... Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, I move to table the first two motions with respect to House Bill 496, but I would like to be heard on the third."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing no objection the motion is tabled on 496.... first two motions on 496 is tabled."

Walsh: "Now, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. The third motion is to discharge the Committee on Labor and Commerce from further consideration of House Bill 496, which is a meet-after-six Bill. I submit to you Mr. Speaker, that this Bill has some difference from the other two Bills that have passed Labor and Commerce...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain, for what purpose do you rise?"

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I don't believe that the Gentleman is speaking to the motion, he's speaking to the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Speak to the motion, Mr. Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I'll repeat what I said and get up to the point where I spoke on something other than the motion. Seriously, Mr. Speaker it has been permitted for Sponsors to discuss a little bit about the Bill in these discussions...."

Speaker Redmond: "And that's all you were doing. Proceed."

Walsh: "That's all I was doing. Now, Mr. Speaker, let me tell what happened in Labor and Commerce. I'm proud to be a Member of that Committee, of the Labor and Commerce Committee and I must say, Mr. Speaker, that no finer group of Members



of people serves on any Committee in this House than those on Labor and Commerce and I know that they all, slightly more than half of them disagreed with this Bill when it was heard. Even though... even though, Mr. Speaker, a very similar Bill was heard by the Committee, a perfect stranger came in there, Mr. Speaker, one that does not serve on the Labor and Commerce Committee... had his Bill heard and it passed out very nearly unanimously. Now, I know that the Members of the Committee who did not support my Bill at the time because of partisan peek, have gotten over that.... they've gotten over that, Mr. Speaker and I know that they would like to support their fellow Committee Member; Walsh and give him a vote on his motion to discharge the Committee so that we may consider this matter and as I point out, there are differences in this Bill from the two Bills that have passed out of the Committee previously and I urge your support."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pierce, do you seek recognition? The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Representative Pierce, do you seek recognition now?"

Pierce: "After you announce the vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished? Representative Walsh, to explain his vote."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, I wished that I would see you milk this one a little bit like I've seen you milk others. Let's see if we can't get this up to 89 for good old Walsh."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis, for good old Walsh."

Geo-Karis: "Yes, for good old Walsh and you know, Willie, I hope you remember.... do give him 89 votes. Just give him 89, so he will never forget us."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? I think the cow has gone dry. The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 79 'aye'



and 41 'no' and the Gentleman's motion fails. 559, Representative McCourt. McCourt... out of the records. Tipword... oh, those two have been tabled. Representative Pierce."

Pierce: "Mr. Speaker, I want leave to be recorded as voting 'aye' on House Bill 25. The Clerk's office has tied the Committee Chairman up all day today with the false information that Bills in Committee are dead unless they are reported back to the Clerk's office tomorrow. Now, the rules say they have to be acted on by tomorrow. Nothing in the rules say the Committee Reports have to be received by tomorrow. Yet, that information is being given to the Committee Clerks... it's driving us crazy here signing these reports and we can't even pay attention to the business on the floor of the House and I resent the rules being interpreted incorrectly by the Clerk's office to the Committee Clerks."

Speaker Redmond: "Parliamentarian... 915, Representative Totten... does the Gentleman have leave to be recorded on 25? Hearing no objections it is so recorded. 915, Representative Totten."

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I filed a motion to discharge on House Bill 915 and although I respect the Committee system as well as anyone, the crunch we had with many Bills there's a lot of us who didn't get the opportunity to have a full Committee hearing. I think the hearing that I did have on the Bill was fair, the vote was 11 'aye', 5 'no' and 2 'present' because there just wasn't enough Members to get it out. The Bill is a Bill dealing with the Public Aid Code that has to do with recoupment procedures..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I think... I suggest that the Gentleman speak to the Bill and not the motion."

Speaker Redmond: "Shame on him, Representative Totten, speak to



the motion."

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. The motion has to do with the Bill that has to do with recoumpment procedures in the Public Aid Code and the Bill is similar to one that we passed out of this House on an Agreed Bill list last year and got caught in the end. And I think that the Bill... at least deserves the full attention of the House again so that we can act on it in the same manner that we did last time and I solicit your favorable vote on this motion to discharge."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question is on the.... Representative Chapman."

Chapman: "Mr. Speaker, I'm just so suprised that Mr. Totten would pursue this motion, I would think that the friendship that the Human Resources Committee showed to him earlier in the week on a Bill which he was the particularly interested in would have been a good enough result to last a long, long time. It was good enough, by the way that we drew condemnation from the Chicago Tribune in this morning's paper where the Human Resources Committee was accused of taxing a laetrile Bill that had dubious value and I've asked the House to vote 'no' on Mr. Totten's motion. There were eighteen people present when they had the vote on his Bill so, I think there was plenty in attendance to provide a good vote for Mr. Totten's Bill if it had sufficient merit."

Speaker Redmond: "Ready for the motion. The question... do you want to speak on this one? Representative Skinner... he wants to help good old Totten."

Skinner: "I think we ought let good old Totten get another condemning editorial from the Chicago Tribune... why not?"

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Explain your vote if you want to, Mr. Keats. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will



take the record. On this question there are 59... 61 'ayes', 35 'no'. The Gentleman's motion fails. Representative Skinner. The motion to suspend Rule 25 (d), until 5-13-77."

Skinner: "This is a historic moment, I was wrong. The Speaker..."

Speaker Redmond: "Would you repeat that, please?"

Skinner: "I was wrong..."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay."

Skinner: "Exclamation point. The Speaker and the Members have moved very expediently this week and I see no reason to suspend 25 (d), until 5-13-77 at 4 P.M., because obviously we're going to finish by midnight tonight. So, I would ask that that motion lie upon the table."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave to have the motion lie on the table... leave granted. 1000, Porter, Representative Porter."

Porter: "Mr. Speaker, I would ask for a ruling from the Chair as to how many votes it would take to discharge the Committee on Energy Environment and Natural Resources. I think this might be important on other measures tonight because I believe that the report of that Committee on this Bill has not been read."

Speaker Redmond: "What is the posture of the Bill now?"

Porter: Apparently remains in Committee unless the report has been read, is that correct, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Redmond: "What happened in Committee?"

Porter: "In Committee today there was a do not pass motion that carried 8 to 7."

Speaker Redmond: "Has that...."

Porter: "But, that report has not been read."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McMaster."

McMaster: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. We did hold a Subcommittee hearing upon this Bill, we did report back the Subcommittee to the Full Committee on a do not pass motion. The Full Committee did vote do not pass and I think that the Committee Report will be in

at the proper time and so, I would ask for a ruling also. I would assume it takes 107 votes to get the Committee changed."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "A point of inquiry, Mr. Speaker. Was the Committee Report adopted?"

Speaker Redmond: "No. Wait a minute... Committee Report has not been read into the records here."

Lechowicz: "And, what does the man's motion call for?"

Speaker Redmond: "His motion calls to discharge the Committee and place on the Order of Second Reading, First Legislative Day."

Lechowicz: "Has the... how long has the discharged motion been filed with the Clerk?"

Clerk O'Brien: "The motion was filed April 25th."

Lechowicz: "Timely, thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Parliamentarian advises me that the motion is out of order inasmuch as the Committee has acted on it."

Porter: "I'm sorry, Mr. Speaker, I didn't hear you."

Speaker Redmond: "I said that the Parliamentarian says that it has been the practice not to permit a motion of this kind at this posture of the Bill, there has been the hearing in the Committee and the Committee evidently has... the vote has been taken and the Committee has evidently reported. Representative Matijeich."

Matijeich: "Point of order. The Committee has not come back with an unfavorable vote and I think the motion to discharge is in order, he filed it a couple of days ago... timely, he only needs 89, somebody else will need 107...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative...."

Matijeich: "...but 89 is all he needs."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Flinn, for what purpose do you rise?"

Flinn: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I'm Chairman of the Environmental,



Energy and Natural Resources Committee and this Bill came up last week and we put it in a Subcommittee and it had a fair hearing. There were witnesses heard today, we had posted likewise for the Full Committee and the Full Committee did indeed vote this thing down by voting favorably on a do not pass motion. Now, the fact that the Committee Report hasn't been read into the record I think is really immaterial, the Committee did indeed act and they rejected this Bill as being a Bill that should be put on Second Reading and I think that should be taken into consideration when we vote on it."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "I agree with Monroe and I move to... that the motion lie on the table because the Committee has really acted except that the report has not been filed. Since it has not, the Bill has not been reported back unfavorably and that is all he needs is 89 to discharge. I agree that the Committee really did its work and I would move that the motion lie on the table even though I'm for John's Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Porter."

Porter: "Well, is your ruling that the motion is out of order, is that...."

Speaker Redmond: "That is correct."

Porter: "What would it take to overrule the Chair?"

Speaker Redmond: "107."

Porter: "Well all right, if it takes a 107 to overrule the Chair and that's your ruling, let's do this with it. I have also filed a motion to take from the table that was filed today. If you will assure me that that will be heard within a week or so, then the Bill won't die... won't otherwise die since it will take 107 now and 107 then I am willing to wait."

Speaker Redmond: "You did file that... it hasn't been on the... it will be on the Calendar Monday, Representative Porter."



Porter: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "1011, Representative Telcser."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker, I move to table that motion."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Telcser...."

Telcser: "I move to table that motion."

Speaker Redmond: "1051, Representative Meyer."

Meyer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 1051, is the... is an Amendment... it amends the Textbook Bill, it permits the inclusion to supply...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Would the Gentleman just explain the Committee action and not the part of the Bill please?"

Meyer: "Why, I would be happy to, Representative. The Committee action on this Bill.... we went to the Elementary and Secondary Education Committee, the same Bill passed out... the same Act passed out last year with Representative Barnes sponsoring one version and I sponsored the other version. It received 107 votes. Quite frankly taking a Bill that aids nonpublic school children or parents of nonpublic school children to Elementary and Secondary Education is like Representative Kosinski's taking Capital Punishment Bill to Judiciary II. It is not a favorable Committee to this type of legislation, as I said before, the same Bill got a 107 votes last year in the floor of the House and I urge your favorable consideration. It did receive a fair hearing from hostile parties though."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schneider."

Schneider: "You got me on... thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. It's old hostility himself. Let me see, I would say that first of all, it is not the same Bill. It is a Bill that does not relate only to textbooks but to supplies. The Committee was I think very curious. They reversed a do not pass motion at the request of the Sponsor. They also listened to the most extended and fine,



I must add, elaborate testimony from an outstanding witness. However, apart the very dubious thing about constitutionality, the cost I think would be rather expensive and I would recommend that we do not support the motion."

Meyer: "Could I close, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Meyer: "Mr. Speaker, there weren't any witnesses on this Bill. He is confusing it with the other Bill, this amends and expands the Textbook Act. There is not an Appropriation Bill with this Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brady."

Brady: "Mr. Speaker, I don't mean to supersede the Sponsor of the Motion who is attempting to close there but, I did want an opportunity to speak in support of his motion because as a very active Member of the Elementary and Secondary Education Committee with the conflicts that we were having I was unable to be in Committee that day and unable to address myself to this piece of Legislation. I think we have to bring it to the floor to discuss it and I'm in support of this motion."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schneider.... Representative Meyers to close."

Meyer: "I urge your favorable support."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished?"

Meyer: "Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Meyers."

Meyer: "As I mentioned before, the Textbook Bill came out of this General Assembly last year, it did receive 107 votes. This expands it from textbooks and supplies and as I said before, I think if you're in favor of educational support to nonpublic schools you would vote for this Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take



the record. On this question there are 81 'aye' and 30 'no' and the Gentleman's motion fails. 1059... Representative Meyer."

Meyer: "Do you think I could have a poll of the absentees on this before you officially announce it."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has requested a poll of the absentees. Poll the absentees, Mr. Clerk. All right, whatever the rules says. Representative Mudd."

Mudd: "Mr. Speaker, how am I recorded?"

Speaker Redmond: "How is the Gentleman recorded?"

Clerk O'Brien: "The Gentleman is recorded as not voting."

Mudd: "Record the vote 'aye'."

Speaker Redmond: "Record the Gentleman as 'aye'. Representative Farley"

Farley: "Mr. Speaker, how am I recorded?"

Speaker Redmond: "How is the Gentleman recorded?"

Clerk O'Brien: "The Gentleman is recorded as not voting."

Farley: "Would you vote me 'aye', please?"

McMaster: "Mr. Speaker, may I ask that my vote be changed from 'aye' to 'no'?"

Speaker Redmond: "Change the Gentleman from 'aye' to 'no'. Proceed with the call.... Representative Caldwell, 'aye'. Representative Mulcahey, 'aye'. Representative J. Davis 'aye'. Representative Antonovych, you have been so quiet I haven't had a chance to pronounce your name often 'Aye'. Antonovych, 'aye'. Representative Tuerk, 'aye'."

Meyer: "Mr. Speaker, what's the count now?"

Speaker Redmond: "What's the count, Mr. Clerk?"

Clerk O'Brien: "88 'ayes'... 87, excuse me 87 'ayes', 31 'nays'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Telcser, 'aye'. Representative Adams, 'aye'. What's the score?"

Clerk O'Brien: "89 'ayes', 31 'nays'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Jacobs, 'aye'. Proceed with



the poll of the absentees."

Clerk O'Brien: "Bartulis, Bennett...."

Speaker Redmond: "Bartulis, 'aye'. Who is the next one....
Bennett?"

Representative Walsh, Hanahan's rules apply to you too. Representative Johnson... Representative Meyer... Representative Peters. Kempiners, we'll sic Hanahan after you. Proceed with the verification of the Affirmative Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Meyer, sit down where you belong."

Speaker Redmond: "He did change. Now I don't know whether he was called."

Clerk O'Brien: "If I called him I was in error. He changed from 'aye' to 'no'."

Satterthwaite: "He is recorded as 'no'. Thank you. The other inquiry, Mr. Speaker, would you clarify for us the status of the Bill and the vote that will be required to pass this Bill?"

Speaker Redmond: "89 votes with the motion of Mr. Meyer."

Satterthwaite: "How does this vote differ from the vote on Mr. Porter's Bill?"



Speaker Redmond: "Mr. Porter's.... the Parliamentarian advised me that his motion was out of order."

Satterthwaite: "Well, the reason I'm asking, Mr. Speaker, is that I'm not clear on status of this particular Bill. I thought that at the last meeting of the Elementary and Secondary Education Committee that we took the Bill that was still in Committee and voted do not pass on those Bills an order to clear the Calendar."

Speaker Redmond: "This Bill is still in Committee... Glenn, will you explain it."

Schneider: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. The courtesy of the Committee on a Bill that got two or three or four or five votes was that we would withhold a do not pass motion and leave the Bill in Committee at a do pass motion, I think that is the status of this Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Breslin."

Breslin: "Mr. Speaker, how am I recorded?"

Speaker Redmond: "How is the Lady recorded?"

Clerk O'Brien: "The Lady is recorded as not voting."

Speaker Redmond: "Richmond... Representative Richmond in the chamber? How is he recorded?"

Clerk O'Brien: "The Gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Speaker Redmond: "Remove him."

Schneider: "Representative McGrew."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McGrew... how is he recorded?"

Clerk O'Brien: "The Gentleman is recorded as not voting."

Speaker Redmond: "Leave him on then."

Schneider: "Wait a second, Mr. Chairman... you read his name..."

Speaker Redmond: "Who?"

Schneider: "Representative McGrew, you are not voting?"

Speaker Redmond: "He's not voting."

Schneider: "All right, Representative Schisler."

Speaker Redmond: "Schisler, is here someplace, I think. Representative Schisler."

Schneider: "No he is not, Mr. Speaker. Thank you. How is he recorded?"

Speaker Redmond: "The Doorkeeper back there advises me that Representative Schisler is here in the chamber." *alright*

Schneider: "Well, until I see him. Don't even materialize him."

Speaker Redmond: "He is in the chamber."

Schneider: "He is not visible... the mystery continues. Can we take him off the Roll then? Where is he?"

Speaker Redmond: "He's in the men's room."

Schneider: "Stay in the Men's room, Schisler. Representative Stanley, we'll check on Representative Schisler...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Stanley..."



Schneider: "We'll give Schisler the courtesy..."

Speaker Redmond: "Stanley is in his seat."

Schneider: "Representative Terzich."

Speaker Redmond: "Terzich, is he here? How is he recorded?"

Clerk O'Brien: "The Gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Schneider: "Is Terzich here? Where is Terzich? Oh, there he is..."

Speaker Redmond: "You are not in your seat according to Hanahan's rules you're supposed to be over there."

Schneider: "Representative Wall."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Wall, how is Representative Wall recorded?"

Clerk O'Brien: "The Gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative Wall here? Remove him."

Schneider: "Representative...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mautino, for what purpose do you rise?"

Mautino: "I would like to be recorded as 'aye'."

Speaker Redmond: "Record Representative Mautino as 'aye'."

Schneider: "Representative Wolf."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Wolf is in the back there."

Schneider: "Representative Younge."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Younge... is Representative Younge here? How is she recorded?"

Clerk O'Brien: "The Lady is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Speaker Redmond: "Is she in the chamber? Remove her."

Schneider: "Representative Farley."

Speaker Redmond: "Who?"

Schneider: "Farley."

Speaker Redmond: "Farley, is back there."

Schneider: "Representative Holewinski."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Holewinski is looking over Houlihan's shoulder."

Schneider: "Let's see... what is the count, I think we are below now."



Speaker Redmond: "88 'ayes'... Representative McMaster, for what purpose do you rise?"

McMaster: "My very persuasive seatmate has prevailed upon me to change my vote from 'no' to 'yes'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schneider."

Schneider: "We are still looking for Mr. Schisler and I would like to know how many times a person can change their vote, it seems to me a dilatory tactic..."

Speaker Redmond: "I don't know any rule that says he can't. Representative Schisler."

Schneider: "When he's gone, he's gone, Mr. Chairman."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schneider."

Schneider: "Schisler is off, right. We take him off the record?"

Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative...."

Schneider: "He has not been taken off."

Speaker Redmond: "It hasn't been taken off yet. Joe Carey, is Schisler in there? Okay. Take him off the Roll Call."

Schneider: "The potty patrol reports. Okay."

Speaker Redmond: "Finally found a job for Joe Carey."

Schneider: "All right."

Speaker Redmond: "On this question 88 'ayes' and how many 'no'?"

Clerk O'Brien: "29 'no'."

Speaker Redmond: "29 'no' and the Gentleman's motion fails."

Schneider: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "1190... Representative Deavers, for what purpose do you rise?"

Deavers: "Having voted, I guess on the prevailing side I would like to make a motion to reconsider."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman having voted on the prevailing side, moves that the vote by which the motion failed be reconsidered. Representative Schneider, for what purpose do you rise?"

Schneider: "Move that that motion lie on the table."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman moves the motion lie on the table. The question... you want to dump this... Representative



Deavers has moved the vote by which Representative Meyer's motion with respect to House Bill 1051, failed be reconsidered. Representative Schneider, moves that that motion lie on the table. The question is on Representative Schneider's motion. Those in favor vote 'aye' and opposed vote 'no'. Requires a simple majority. I will revise my estimate, we'll be here until 5:30. Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 28 'aye' and 80 'no', Representative Schneider's motion to table fails. Representative Schneider." We're back on Representative Deaver's motion to reconsider. The question is on Representative Deavers motion to reconsider the vote by which Representative Meyer's motion with respect to House Bill 1059 failed. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Representative Schneider."

Schneider: "Is it possible to verify.... I mean to reconsider a verified Roll Call? What rule is that David, would you do me the courtesy of checking that. "It is my understanding that you cannot Which rule?"

Speaker Redmond: "Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. We'll check the rules in the meantime. Have all voted who wished? Rule 62, said, 'a Member who voted on the prevailing side on a record vote on the matter still within control of the House may on the same day move to reconsider.' Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Well, Mr. Speaker as I understand this motion of Representative Deavers takes 89 votes."

Speaker Redmond: "That's right."

Walsh: "In order for us to reconsider this we need 89 votes, also as I understand it, we have the 89 votes for Representative Meyer's motion... well, darn near had it, one of the Members was just walking in, so I would urge everybody to get this up to the 89 votes so that we can reconsider it because I think are 89 people here who feel that Representative



Meyer's motion is a good one."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 92 'ayes', 28 'no' and the Gentleman has requested a verification of the Affirmative Roll Call. He's entitled to that. Representative Schneider."

Schneider: "In case the Members are curious, you know, I haven't seen Ralph Capparelli walk in the chamber yet, and I see his count up there, I see Representative Wall again, I see that leave for the same verification to get up to 88."

Speaker Redmond: "You're right."

Schneider: "All right, so if the people are going to continue to pushing green.... I'm going to verify the next one as well."

Speaker Redmond: "Please refrain from that practice. Representative Conti."

Conti: "There is a few others also pushed, I see Jaffe's is up there he wasn't on there before."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, that doesn't make any difference. Representative Yourell."

Yourell: "Mr. Speaker, I move that we adjourn."

Speaker Redmond: "I didn't hear you. The question is moved for a verification of the Affirmative Roll Call. Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "Abramson, Adams, Anderson, Antonovych..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Satterthwaite."

Satterthwaite: "Mr. Speaker, there has been other times when the Speaker in fairness to the Members of this chamber, has requested that we abide by the rule that says that only the Members of the House may push only their own switches. Now, it is obvious that many of the people who were knocked off the last Roll Call have suddenly had a green light appear in their behalf and I would ask you, Mr. Speaker, in fairness to the Members to dump this Roll Call and enforce that rule and perhaps we could take this Roll Call honestly without having a verification."



Speaker Redmond: "I think your point is well taken. I see some of the names here that are voted and they shouldn't be, so I do think in fairness to everybody that it should be dumped.... yes, dump the Roll Call and all those in favor vote 'aye' and opposed vote 'no' and please do not vote your seatmates switch or any other Members switch. It isn't fair. Representative Meyers... not fair to the Member and that means don't vote the negative either."

Meyer: "Mr. Speaker, in fairness and expediting time, I just wish that the Members would vote their own switches so that we can get a fair and actuate Roll Call and avoid the necessity of verification."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. Representative Lauer, for what purpose do you rise?"

Lauer: "Mr. Speaker, vote me 'aye' please."

Speaker Redmond: "Vote the Gentleman 'aye'. What's the score Mr. Clerk? On this question there is 84 'aye', 27 'no' and the Gentleman's motion fails. 1059.... Representative Meyer."

Meyer: "I feel like a trouble maker. Quite frankly, Mr. Speaker, I would feel remiss in...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Byers, for what purpose do you rise?"

Byers: "Mr. Speaker, on page 40, of the House Rules, point (b) it says, I'll verify Roll Call, the vote shall be final when the results is declared and no Member may change, add or remove his vote subsequently, and I think that was the end of that."

Speaker Redmond: "We're on the next motion."

Byers: "Pardon."

Speaker Redmond: "We're on the next motion."

Byers: "I think it's out of order this Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "That was 1051, wasn't it? We're now on 1059."



Mr. Byers, if you will look, you will see that the second motion in the and the third motion are both Representative Meyer's and he desires to be heard with respect to each of the motions. He apologizes. I think now that... before we get going on this one it would be a good idea if the new father would please stand up. Will the new father please stand up. Representative Kozubowski. 1059, Representative Meyers."

Meyer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This is a new Bill and a new Act. This creates a Parental Grant Act, again I would point out, by the way the companion appropriation Bill... because there was hostility in the Committee to the appropriation that this was creating, has been introduced and it is a thousand dollars, I don't intend to raise the amount. The only thing that I want to do is raise the Constitutional issue...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain, for what purpose do you rise?"

McClain: "Speak to the motion, Representative Meyer."

Meyer: "I'm speaking to the Committee question that were raised in the Committee that I would hope that I would be able to explain on the floor of the House. The total cost to the State of Illinois for this Act would be one thousand dollars. I think that this is important, the sole object of this Act the Parental Voucher Act would create a test Constitutional Act. I received a fair Committee hearing from a hostile Committee. I wished that there were certain Members that weren't.... that are absent and I urge your favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Porter."

Porter: "Could I ask a question of the movement?"

Speaker Redmond: "You may."

Porter: "Ted, does this grant apply to every family in the State of Illinois or just some certain ones."

Meyer: "No, Sir. Every family, each and every family."



Porter: "Each and every family in the State of Illinois, this is a voucher plan in other words."

Meyer: "Yes, Sir."

Porter: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schneider."

Schneider: "I just hope that we kinda stick to what Mike McClain is asking us to do and that is talk to the motion. Ted is suggesting that the voucher plan ought to be challenged. Possibly that is true but I don't believe this is the procedure. So, what I would suggest again, all the kind words I said about the witness are true. The testimony was elaborate and extended, the Committee gave it a fine hearing and I think the Bill should remain in the posture it is now and that is, to die tomorrow. So, I think it is a motion that should not be passed; that's your opposition for 1059."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Yourell."

Yourell: "A question of the motion."

Meyer: "Yes, Sir."

Yourell: "Is this thousand dollars in the Governor's budget?"

Meyer: "No, Sir. But, I'm sure that there is room for it."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. 89 votes. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 73 'aye' and 22 'no' and the Gentleman's motion fails. House Bill 1190, Representative Cunningham."

Cunningham: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I hope that you each heard the fearless Chairman of Judiciary II, Representative Harold Katz, when he acknowledged that this Bill was never called though the witness waited in the wings. Had it been called it would have received a fair hearing in Representative Katz's Committee. I ask you to support the Chairman and vote 'aye'."



on the motion to discharge."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 68 'aye' and 26 'no' and the Gentleman's motion fails. 1338, 1339 and they are traveling as an entry. Representative McClain, would you confine your remarks to the motion."

McClain: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I move that this motion lie on the table."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing no objections leave is granted and the motion lie on the table. At the request of the Sponsor of 1355, it will be taken out of the record. 1400.... Representative Porter."

Porter: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 1400 seeks to eliminate the sales tax on food and drugs and makes it up by raising the tax on other items subject to the sales tax by one percent. It would cost the state no money and I would urge a favorable vote."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 46 'aye' and 29 'no' and the Gentleman's motion fails. 1434... out of the record at the request of the Sponsor. I think that motion probably is not in order because the Bill has been tabled. 1527... 1527 is on the Interim Study Calendar, I see. Representative Barnes. Jane Barnes."

Barnes: "Mr. Speaker, I had filed a motion several days ago to discharge...."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, you may proceed on it."



Barnes: "Oh, thank you, Mr....."

Speaker Redmond: "107 votes is the problem."

Barnes: "107..."

Speaker Redmond: "On the Intern Study Calendar is where it is.
Do you care to proceed?"

Barnes: "May I ask a question of the Parliamentarian? Would
I be able to have these heard next week or must they
be heard this evening?"

Speaker Redmond: "Did you hear that? Anytime but it still takes
107 votes. You may have some work to do."

Barnes: "Well, thank you very much. Since everybody is so
tired I would be very happy to wait."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay. How about 1528, what's the story on
that one?"

Barnes: "That's the same story, Sir."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay. Take that out of the record also. 1542...
wait a minute... wait a minute, the Parliamentarian advises
me that that 1528 is not on the Intern Study, Representative
Barnes."

Barnes: "Well, 1528 is an extension of the Textbook Bill that I
passed in the last Session. And, we've had a pilot program
for a year. And as of this October, it has been implemented
throughout the state from kindergarden to third grade
because that was as much of the appropriation would tolerate.
The reason that we are expanding the definition of textbooks...
May I have a favorable Roll Call, Sir?"

Speaker Redmond: "That remains to be seen. Representative
Schneider."

Schneider: "Well, we have discussed a similar motion moments
ago with Representative Meyer. He, however, differs in the
sense that he showed up for Committee. I have spoken
to Representative Barnes about her interest in the Bills
and she said that she is too busy to appear in Committee.
So on the 26th, Tuesday, of this week she indicates.... she
filed motion, our Committee, the Education Committee met



Wednesday, 27th. Now a lot of us had busy schedules, a lot of us were tired, and a lot of us wanted to bite the bullet and face the votes in the Committee. I would have asked the same of Mrs. Barnes; however, she has felt perhaps that she would just as soon go to the floor with the motion. I think that it is unfair to do that... that she can just avoid the exposure and testimony and go directly to the floor at a time when you can't discuss it on a motion rather than talk to...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "Well, Mr. Speaker, Representative Barnes is within her rights and I think that Representative Schneider is out of order in his comments."

Speaker Redmond: "Bring your remarks to a close addressing the motion, Representative Schneider."

Schneider: "The Chair would suggest that if a person has good faith in terms of wanting to present the Bill, they would have appeared in Committee rather than filing motion the day before asking for discharge. I would ask an unfavorable Roll Call and defeat it."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Ladies motion. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Does Representative Schneider have leave to vote Representative Jaffe? Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 68 'aye' and 24 'no' and the motion fails. 1542. Representative Wikoff."

Wikoff: "Thank you, Mr. Chairman, Members of the House. I urge that House Bill 1542, be discharged from Labor and Commerce and put on Second Reading...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijevich, for what purpose do you rise?"

Matijevich: "A point of order. I believe... I'm not sure but I believe this Bill may be in the same stature as the ruling that you have already made on Representative Porter's



motion, and so I would like to have you rule."

Wikoff: "Mr. Chairman, I believe his motion was ruled out of order, and I believe I have a timely motion to file which was placed yesterday."

Speaker Redmond: "What's the.... Mr. Clerk, what is the posture of House Bill 1542? Representative Jacobs.... Be at ease for a few minutes here. Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to bring to your attention Rule 56 (a), and the important thing is, it says any Member may move that a Committee may be discharged from consideration of a Bill or a Resolution assigned to it and not report it back unfavorably. I believe this Bill was reported and it is filed with the Clerk's office that a do not pass motion was adopted by Committee and I want to put that into the record on House Bill 17.... on House Bill 1542 as with the other Bills that will be coming back on a later date. And I believe what the important thing is that it has been reported and in turn I would hope the... I think that it would require 107 votes now to suspend that rule."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Wikoff."

Wikoff: "I believe that Rule 24 (c), says that no Bill or Resolution shall be called for a vote in Committee without the approval of the Chief Sponsor where such Roll Call is the final vote permitted under this Section. I would ask a ruling on that."

Speaker Redmond: "I yield to the Parliamentarian."

Wikoff: "Mr. Speaker, while the Parliamentarian is looking at that I believe that this Bill has not been reported out of the House."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "That's my whole point, Mr. Speaker. I believe it is reported because it has been filed with the Clerk's office. Under Rule 66 (a), it doesn't say it is not received or read into the record. It says reported and reported means



that it has been filed with the Clerk."

Wikoff: "Mr. Speaker, I don't believe any ruling has been made on the floor."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, I don't believe that until the report has been put into the record here that you can say that it has been reported back. The Clerk's office says that they have not received the report on 1542. Representative Jacobs."

Jacobs: "Mr. Speaker, the copy that Representative Lechowicz has is the copy that came from the Clerk's office."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijevich. Now, I can solve this. The Clerk tells me that it is not recorded."

Matijevich: "Well, all I'm saying is that somebody is lying like hell because my secretary filled in for Jake's Clerk and I know that's filed and we'd better tear this thing apart. You know, I've found some problems before with the Clerk's office. If you want me to do it again, we're going to turn this place up side down."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Stuffle, for what purpose do you rise? Representative Stuffle."

Stuffle: "Mr. Speaker and Members, have you ruled that this motion takes 89 votes?"

Speaker Redmond: "I haven't ruled yet and we can't figure out whether it has been reported."

Stuffle: "At the proper time I would like to ask for your ruling on that and to be recognized."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. The only problem that I have with your indication is, that that would mean that the Committee Clerk would have to have the reports into the Clerk's office tomorrow, or they all would die. I think the issue, as I read the rules, is if the Committee took action on the Bill, not if the Clerk's office received that action."

Speaker Redmond: "We will be at ease till a quarter till nine..."



until we figure this one out. House Bill 1542, the question is on the Gentleman's motion to discharge Labor and Commerce and put it on Second Reading. Those in favor vote 'aye' and opposed vote 'no'. It takes 89 votes. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Representative Simms."

Simms: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I would like to urge that a green vote be placed on this Bill. This is a very serious topic in the State of Illinois and that's the topic of unemployment compensation..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain."

Simms: "... and this legislation does need the opportunity..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain, for what purpose do you rise?"

McClain: "Point of order, Mr. Speaker. I think the Gentleman ought to speak to the actions of the Committee and not to the structure matters."

Speaker Redmond: "Please confine your remarks to the actions of the Committee on this motion."

Simms: Well, Mr. Speaker, I was explaining my vote and I think that is the prerogative of any Member of the House despite Mr. McClain's insistence that individuals not be allowed to. But, I think this is an important topic..."

Speaker Redmond: "Bring your remarks to a close, the point is well taken."

Simms: "To every Member of the House and I would urge a green vote for individuals that realize this is a serious topic in Illinois and that the citizens of Illinois deserve relief from the repressive rates that the Democratic Legislature passed in the last Session."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Well, I didn't realize that I was on, Mr. Speaker, but while I am on I would like to urge as Representative Simms did that we do give this a green vote. It really doesn't matter very much what the Bill addresses itself



to. Everyone here knows that the problems in unemployment compensation are such that..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Walsh, confine your remarks to the motion."

Walsh: "...are such, Mr. Speaker, that that business is being driven out of this state in...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Walsh, please confine your remarks to the motion."

Walsh: "I'm confining my remarks to the motion, Mr. Speaker and unless we correct this problem, Mr. Speaker, whether it is a Democrat or Republican Bill... matters not but the more Bills that we have to work with as vehicles to address ourselves to this problem, the better off we will be and the better off the people of the State of Illinois will be. So, we all should vote 'yes' on this motion."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 64 'aye', 28 'no' and the Gentleman's motion fails. 1624, Representative Deavers. Representative Deavers. 1624... 1645, Representative Collins... I can't hear you... Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I appreciate your pseudo attempt to be fair here, but I'm not really very happy with the way things have gone. First of all you said that we would recess until a quarter till nine and about twenty minutes to you called a motion, gave nobody a chance to get in here that may have been off the floor. Secondly, the Sponsor of the motion... of the motion to discharge, Representative Wikoff, called for a poll of the absentees and was ignored. Now, if we're going to go through the motions let's go through all of them, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "1645, Representative Collins... out of the record. 1692, Representative Collins... out of the record. 1790, Representative Porter."

Porter: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 1790, deals with the subject of unemployment



compensation. The Bill was never heard in the Labor and Commerce Committee and ought to be heard. It is directed at correcting some of the worst excesses that were written under that law in 1975..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I suggest that the Gentleman ought to speak to the motion and not to the heart of the Bill."

Porter: "Mr. Speaker, in making a motion you have to tell what the Bill does. I'm just telling you what it does."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "Well, Mr. Speaker, will you quote the rule to me that says he can't speak to the Bill please?"

Speaker Redmond: "It's custom and practice."

Ryan: "Well, I would like the ruling, Mr. Speaker..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker, all you have to do is read the motion that is all it takes. The motion is to discharge it - It has nothing to do with anything else and you're confined to the subject before you on what is written the Clerk's desk."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? Representative Hart."

Hart: "Well, thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. I'm going to confine my remarks to the motion. The motion is to discharge the Committee.... I'm a Chief Co-sponsor of this Bill. If you will look in your Digest, you will find approximately sixty or seventy Members of this House that are Co-sponsors to this Bill. As it has been pointed out, the motion to discharge should not be used except in cases where you did not get a hearing in a Committee or the Committee monkeyed around with your Bill. And, in both cases in this instance, that applies to this Bill. This is in fact a good Bill and the Committee did not give it a hearing; and it monkeyed around with it and I think it ought to get out on the floor. I didn't appreciate the remarks of



Representative Hanahan in our caucus about only getting out Bills of Sponsors that he trusted and I'm going to urge the Members of this House to support this motion."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Porter to close."

Porter: "I urge a favorable vote."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion.

Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Representative Hart."

Hart: "Thank you very much. In order to give the Members of the Assembly an opportunity to get to their switches on this matter, I'm just going to talk a little bit so we don't get a quick Roll Call. But, this really is a good Bill. I think we ought to at least have an alternative on the floor of the House other than those that... some people agreed on to vote out of the Committee. This is no reflection at all on any of the Members of the Committee but I think there ought to be some alternatives. And I would urge Members of the House to support this motion and vote to at least get the Bill on the floor."

Speaker Redmond: "D.L. Houlihan. Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are... Representative Hart."

Hart: "I would like to put this matter on Postponed Consideration."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has requested leave to put on Postponed Consideration. Hearing no objections, leave is granted. Postponed Consideration. 1795...and 1796, Representative Tuerk."

Tuerk: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. I will attempt in all sincerity to address myself to the motion which is to discharge these two Bills. And, in so doing, I would say that these Bills of important subject matter such as they are, did not really get the fair hearing. And I want to relate to you the shambles of the Committee action last night relative to these two Bills when I was not present. There was a motion made relative to do not pass



when the Chairman and all the Democratic Members knew precisely what my wishes were earlier in the day because these two Bills, and particularly the whole subject matter, got about thirty to forty minutes of consideration in Committee which after two years of operating this state in a shambles relative to this subject matter of occupational disease and workmen's comp.... aw..just relax, I'm not going to get into the..."

Speaker Redmond: "Bring your remarks to a close, Representative Tuerk, confine them to the motion."

Tuerk: "Well, these two Bills...."

Speaker Redmond: "You are interfering with Representative Tuerk. When Representative Tuerk is through we'll recognize you. Representative Tuerk. Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker..."

Speaker Redmond: "Explain your bad manners."

Walsh: "In order that some of these animals over on the other side can be quieted...."

Speaker Redmond: "We'll sic Yourell, after you again."

Walsh: "May I suggest that the Parliamentarian... that the Parliamentarian look at Roberts Rules of Order, Section 35.... I mean not the substitute Parliamentarian, the real parliamentarian. And before we continue, Mr. Speaker, with this very serious matter this motion is debatable and the maker of the motion may address himself to the substance of the question and I urge you, Mr. Speaker, to ask to restore some decorum... restore some decorum and let this question be debated."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tuerk... everybody be quiet except Representative Tuerk."

Tuerk: "That's a real good idea, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Will the Gentleman standing between the Chair and Representative Tuerk, please sit down."

Tuerk: "Well...."

Speaker Redmond: "Simms."



Tuerk: "As I was relating to the House, these Bills didn't get the opportunity or as good a hearing as they should have had because it is an important subject matter. It's a subject matter that not only I and others on this side of the aisle have addressed themselves to, but others on the other side of the aisle to the untenable conditions of the present law. So, in that spirit of bipartisan corporation and certainly to save the time of the House, I would now move, Mr. Speaker, to consider House Bill 2202 on the same motion, discharge the Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "We're considering 1795 and 1796 Now, is there any further discussion on 1795...."

Tuerk: "Well, I did make a motion, Mr. Speaker, that the other Bill...."

Speaker Redmond: "Is asking leave, are there objections? Objections have been heard. Representative Tuerk will proceed with 1795 and 1796."

Tuerk: "Well, I think it was a proper motion and...."

Speaker Redmond: "Objections were raised. Go ahead."

Tuerk: "Well, I could put it to a vote but let's... let's go on with 1795 and 96, now. Actually as I said before, this is too important subject matter not to be out on the floor of the House. There are portions of these Bills that should be enacted into law to help this entire State of Illinois operate in a more favorable climate. I would ask for your favorable support to discharge Committee and put it out on the Second.... Second Reading, First Legislative Day."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this... these questions, 1795 and 1796 together, the Gentleman's motion fails. 1828. Representative Deavers."

Deaver: "Point of information...."



Speaker Redmond: "Pardon me, Representative Tuerk."

Tuerk: "Well, I would like to have leave of the House at this point to put those two Bills on Postponed Consideration."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. 1828, Representative Leinenweber. 1828, Representative Leinenweber... out of the record. 1830, Representative Collins. 1830, Representative Collins... out of the record. 1832, Representative Collins.... Representative Collins on 1832... Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, your Rules Committee made that rule that, you know, you need so many votes to put something on Postponed Consideration and he didn't get it. So, let's treat him accordingly." By the way I apologize to the Clerk's office, they do a hell of a job. Did he get 70 votes?"

Speaker Redmond: "1832, Representative Collins... out of the record. 2202, Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker, at this late stage of the evening I don't know if I could really explain the motion without the objections of some of the Members of the House. So I'll just leave that motion where it is, if you would please."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tuerk, would you like to join in.... take that one out of the record. 2245... Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Mr. Speaker, there was nothing really wrong with the Committee hearing on this Bill. The only problem was I forgot to bring two six packs of Cours beer so that the Committee Members could see me be arrested by the Illinois Liquor Control Commission for having brought too many into the state. I think this is an extremely important subject matter to a lot of your beer drinking constituents And for that reason I would like to have the opportunity to place the subject matter before the



full House."

Speaker Redmond: "This question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 53 'ayes', 23 'no', the Gentleman's motion fails. Representative Friedrich are you seeking recognition?"

Friedrich: "On a motion, Sir?"

Speaker Redmond: "You asked for the quorum call?"

Friedrich: "Mr. Speaker..."

Speaker Redmond: "Roll Call for a quorum.... never mind.... we can't do that... I won't tell you what it is, but if you come back to the office, I will tell you. Representative Barnes, for what purpose do you rise?"

Barnes: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. While something that I think is very noncontroversial, I hope. I would... Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I would like to waive the appropriate rule for the posting requirement so that Senate Bill 485 can be heard in the Appropriations II Committee on Wednesday at the regular hearing time. Senate Bill 485 is a supplemental appropriation for the Department of Labor. I have discussed this with the Leadership of both sides of the aisle and there is agreement that this Bill can be heard at that time. Ask leave of the House."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? I guess we have some more motions that appear on the Supplemental Calendar. 876, Representative Catania... out of the record. 2188, Representative Friedrich... do you have a motion with respect 2188?"

Friedrich: "Yes, and that's when we took off for five seconds back some time ago. Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I filed a motion on House Bill 2188, and I think the circumstances are are much different than those that have been discussed previously. This Bill was assigned apparently



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in error to Cities and Villages and was posted for a hearing. I left the Committee hearing and they said, 'Oh, I guess you didn't get a notice it was moved to the Elections Committee.' I went to the Elections Committee and they said, 'Well, we didn't post it but we will hear it if you get copies.' We didn't have copies, so I asked on the floor of the House last night to suspend the rules to have this heard in Elections Committee today, and I woke up this morning to find out that they had quit last night and scheduled no meeting for today. So, I really never had any opportunity for hearing, and I would like to have the rule suspended so at least this Bill could have some attention which it never got through no fault of mine and through no fault of Representative Laurino, who is Chairman of the Committee. He's aware of this motion and has no objection to it."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Representative Friedrich."

Friedrich: "I think somewhere along the line I ought to get a turn at bat, and if I can't get it any other way, I would like to suspend the rules to put this on Interim Study. I think I should have had a chance to be heard. It was not Representative Laurino's fault. It was not my fault, and yet for three days I was chasing this Bill around trying to find out where it was. So, if this motion fails, which it obviously has, I would like to have unanimous consent to let it be put on Interim Study Commission."

Speaker Redmond: "Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, Interim Study Commission. House Bill 1000, Representative Simms. Representative Deavers."

Deavers: "Mr. Speaker, I call to the Clerk's attention House Bill 1624 and the motion. 1624 is not my Bill and I think Representative Pouncey may want to take some action on it."



There is an error in the printing."

Speaker Redmond: "Which Bill is that?"

Deavers: "Representative Pouncey."

Speaker Redmond: "Taylor Pouncey, 1624.... select a Committee on state government. Representative Pouncey."

Pouncey: "Mr. Speaker...."

Speaker Redmond: "I'm afraid it is too late to call this one."

Pouncey: "Bill 1624 is on Second Reading of the Calendar and I'm pleased where it's at, Sir."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Deavers, do you want to help somebody else? House Bill 1000, Representative Simms."

Simms: "I don't have House Bill 1000, Representative Porter does."

Speaker Redmond: "Oh, we've already done that. 400... Skinner."

Skinner: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, House Bill 400 is the only opportunity that we will have... oh, excuse me, that will be explaining the Bill, though, and I shouldn't do that. Suffices to say that I was in the House Executive Committee this afternoon for approximately four hours and unfortunately didn't get called until the House was about to go into Session, and we didn't have time to consider the Bill. The Bill is a fairly interesting one; I at this point, I think, would be willing to have it put in Interim Study... on the Interim Study Calendar, if the Chairman of the Committee would not object and the House would not object and would ask leave to do so. Would that be possible?"

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? 1862, J. M. Houlihan."

Skinner: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "1862, J.M. Houlihan. J.M. Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker, I filed a motion but I would like the parliamentarian if it is in order. I think the rules require it having been on the Calendar for one day and..."

Speaker Redmond: "You are correct, was it?"

Houlihan: "No, I filed it today."



Speaker Redmond: "Okay, then you are out of order. You are out of order it hasn't been on... 1208, Representative Deavers. What are you going to do with this one and who's it?"

Deavers: "Mr. Speaker, I would like at this time have a Roll Call on that motion. No one agrees with the debate, everybody knows what's in it so... let me see the scoreboard please."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Just a point of order. I'm just trying to find his motion, where are they? I'm looking for them."

Speaker Redmond: "On Supplemental Calendar. They have just been written here.... they are not on a regular printed Calendar for the day..."

Matijevich: "Evidently I didn't get that. Is that a new supplemental just passed out? I sure can't find it..."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, why did somebody give it to me then. Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Well, Mr. Speaker, has that Calendar been distributed to the Members... been on the desk for a day?"

Speaker Redmond: "The motion has just been turned in, Representative Matijevich, so I assume it requires 107 votes according to the rules. Do you want to try and get 107? The question is on the Gentleman's motion to suspend the rules. That is the Calendar's requirement. All those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. It takes 107 votes. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there is 56 'ayes' and 21 'no', the Gentleman's motion fails. 1113, Representative Friedrich. You are going to talk yourself out of some per diem if you're not careful. Representative Friedrich on 1113...."

Friedrich: "No, I have withdrawn that motion there was...."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay, Representative Friedrich do you seek recognition for another matter?"



Friedrich: "Yes, I do. I would like to go to the order of House Bills on Third Reading for the purpose of calling House Bill 770, the deficiency appropriation for the Attorney General. We do have a time problem there and it needs to be called."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there leave? Hearing no objections, 770.. is that correct?"

Friedrich: "Right."

Speaker Redmond: "House Bill, Third Reading 770."

Friedrich: "Mr. Chariman or Mr. Speaker and Members of the House...."

Speaker Redmond: "Where is the objection? Representative Barnes. Is there an objection? Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Yes, I have an objection, Sir."

Friedrich: "I thought the Speaker had the prerogative of going to the order of business that we have operating under those rules, you know that Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker, I happen to have an appropriation Bill, too, supplemental for the office of Education. I know the treatment that I got two days ago."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay, we'll go to the order of Third Reading. On the order of appropriations.... the first one is 635, Representative Stiehl."

Clerk Hall: "House Bill 635, a Bill for an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense of the office of Auditor General. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Stiehl."

Stiehl: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 635 appropriates six million one hundred and forty-five thousand three hundred and fifty-six dollars for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the office of the Auditor General. This is a very conservative budget. In fact, it's less than the amount requested in the Governor's budget for this office. I would move for an affirmative vote."



Speaker Redmond: "The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 112 'ayes', 1 'no' and the Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. 718, Representative Mann, on the floor? Out of the record. 750, Representative Ryan."

Clerk Hall: "House Bill 750, a Bill for an Act making a certain appropriation to the Secretary of State. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "750... out of the record. 770, Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "I was wondering why a Democrat Bill concerning the Secretary of State is taken out of the records to get to a Republican Bill for the Attorney General. Now, if we want to stay here and vote tonight, I think that there should be some respect given to both sides of this aisle. You're going to need them on the verification of Roll Call when you get to your Bill, otherwise, and I think you should call and move this Bill along with your Republican Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Who wants to handle 77... 750? Do you want to handle it Representative Hanahan?"

Hanahan: "I am not aware of the Bill. It is your Bill and Representative Ryan's."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, I'm...."

Hanahan: "And Representative Barnes."

Speaker Redmond: "I'm Chairing the gathering right at the moment, so, 770. Representative Matijevich, will you move it?"

Matijevich: "Yeah."

Speaker Redmond: "750."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, House Bill 750, is the one that both you and Representative Ryan introduced to appropriate a hundred thousand to the Secretary of State for the expenses



of the White House Conference on Library. You know we had a couple of hearings on it, and it came out favorably, and I would appreciate a favorable vote from the Membership."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. May I speak in behalf of House Bill 750. Exactly what Representative Matijevich pointed out an appropriation of a hundred thousand dollars to the Secretary of State for expenses of state activities and proceedings and in preparation for the White House Conference on library and information services in 1978. The plans for the White House Conference on library and information services were initiated on a federal level under the previous administration. The federal appropriation for the project is pending congressional action. The target date for the conference is September 19, of '79 with a number of states specific projects should be implemented. This is primary a project of the Illinois Library Association, and since Alan Dixon is the State Librarian, we need this money so they can participate in the conference, and I strongly encourage an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished? Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, I was trying to accommodate you and Representative Ryan, but as long as I see him over there pulling everybody off, I really don't care... so, you know Charlie Clabaugh is the one that was pushing it in Committee, and for some reason or other you people don't want it... you know, it is alright with...."

Speaker Redmond: "We'll take this one out of the record. 770..."

Clerk Hall: "House Bill 770, a Bill for an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Auditor General. Third Reading of the Bill."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Friedrich."

Friedrich: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. This is a deficiency appropriation for the Attorney General. The timetable is such that if this Bill is not passed on May 15, the number of people are going to have to be layed off, and there will be no payday for the last half of June, but the timetable is such that we need to pass it now. The difference in... were worked out in the Appropriations Committee as Representative Matijevich is prepared to say and I'd be glad to answer any question. It has been reduced now seventy-five thousand dollars from the original request because they have gone over the items and find they are necessary."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative James Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Will the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Friedrich: "Yes, I will."

Houlihan: "Representative, you indicated that there is money in here for a pay raise for the Attorney General office.."

Friedrich: "There is not."

Houlihan: "There is not?"

Friedrich: "There is not. No. Part of this has been brought about by two or three things. One is that the contractual money that was spent is considerably above what was anticipated... the U.S. Steel case accounts for two hundred and twenty-five thousand which was a clean water case."

Houlihan: "Representative, I think you ought to review the material on this Bill more carefully."

Friedrich: "We have, Sir."

Houlihan: "As I recall, the Legislature appropriated approximately 2½% pay increase for the Attorney Generals office. We deliberated on this in the Committee and the House floor. After we approved that pay raise, then he appropriated or decided that he would give his employees a 5% pay increase



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and that is why we're in this situation. He thumbed his nose at the Legislature by saying that he didn't care what our deliberations were and he chose to have an appropriation increasing the pay raises in his office when he knew that we were in a tight financial condition. I think that's terribly irresponsible. I think it is out of place. I think that it is inappropriate for an elected state official to do that kind of action, and I think we ought to seriously review whether or not we ought to continue or approve his action."

Friedrich: "This has been review, Representative Houlihan, by the...."

Houlihan: "It's going to be reviewed again too."

Friedrich: "Well, you will have to take some responsibility for what happens to these attorneys who will have to be laid off and the services will have to be stopped then, and this includes some prosecution assistance cases in a number of counties where some serious crimes now are being assisted, and I can name you the counties and the kind of crime..."

Houlihan: "Is there any reason he has to lay off attorneys or could he lay off the press people in his office?"

Friedrich: "Well, as far as I know, he has one press person. I think he should be entitled to that."

Speaker Redmond: "Bring your remarks to a close, please."

Friedrich: "Well, I...."

Speaker Redmond: "Do you desire to have this taken out of the record, Mr. Friedrich?"

Friedrich: "Well, I yield to Representative Matijevich to confirm the fact that this has been gone over."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "I'm sorry, Dwight, I'm not in the mood now. I would have helped you a little bit, but when I saw them pulling off votes on the last Bill, I just got out of the mood."



Friedrich: "I suspected that might happen, and if that's going to be the mood, I would have to ask that it be taken out of the record. I have no other choice, but I can assure you that you're going to create some problems which you may not want."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the record. Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Are there any announcements, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Any announcements? Representative Porter."

Porter: "As a matter of fairness, Mr. Speaker, on the order of motions...."

Speaker Redmond: "The order of motions, 1000, Representative Porter." This is the last order."

Porter: "All right. Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. The motion to discharge the Committee on Environment, Energy and Natural Resources. House Bill 1000, assigned to the Committee and a hearing was undertaken on the House floor on this Bill. One witness was heard... at that point there was a motion to assign the Bill to a Sub-committee and seven other witnesses who were there and present, ready to testify, were not heard, in violation of the House rule that witnesses who are there should be heard at a public hearing. A Subcommittee was set up for today, but some of those witnesses who were from out of town and some of them from out of state could not return for that hearing and so, I think a fair hearing on the Bill was effectively denied and I would move to discharge the Committee from further consideration. I might say in respect to House Bill 1000 that there are one hundred Cosponsors, Members of this House, Co sponsors this legislation."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Flinn."

Flinn: "Well, Mr. Speaker... all due respect to the Sponsor of House Bill 1000, it's true that one proponent was allowed to testify until the motion was made to put the



Bill in a Subcommittee. I appointed a Subcommittee Chaired by Representative Dick Hart, and he held a fair meeting on this Bill, and all of those people who desired to testify today on that Bill in Subcommittee were permitted to testify. Now, this happens very often in Committees where we're trying to conserve time in the Full Committee, that we put a controversial Bill in a Subcommittee, and Bill 1000 was treated no differently than many other Bills been treated by putting them in a Subcommittee, and I would oppose the motion of the Sponsor of Bill 1000."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion. All those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. All those in favor vote 'aye', opposed 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Representative Porter."

Porter: "Well, I repeat that there was a chance for these witnesses to be heard. There is a hundred Cosponsors on the Bill. It should have been heard in fairness to them. They were here in present in the chamber. The Bill deals with the animal trap and unnecessary cruelty to animals, and I think that we did deserve a fair hearing in this chamber, and I would ask an 'aye' vote so that the Bill come on the Calendar."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 60 'aye' and 36 'no' and the Gentleman's motion fails. Any announcements? Representative Telcser."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker, I'm the principal Sponsor of House Bill 2010 and I wondered if I could table it, please."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave to table? Is that what you wanted?"

Telcser: "Yes."

Speaker Redmond: "Have leave to table, hearing no objections... Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, does Mr. Telcser wish to table any of these



other Bills in the series?"

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Telcser."

Telcser: "No, Representative Madigan, I had promised the Committee if any one of these funds did not wish to participate in this investment vehicle I would table the Bill. I've heard from this one particular firm, and I'm following through on my word."

Madigan: "Mr. Telcser, might I suggest that we keep the matter alive."

Telcser: "Okay, fine. I'll withdraw my motion and leave House Bill 2010 on the Calendar."

Speaker Redmond: "Have leave."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, are there any further announcements?"

Speaker Redmond: "Any further announcements? I guess not."

Madigan: "And, I'm informed that we will meet in Perfunctory Session tomorrow at nine o'clock in the morning and return Tuesday at twelve noon, and therefore, I move, Mr. Speaker, that with a Perfunctory Session tomorrow at nine o'clock in the morning that we adjourn 'til Tuesday at twelve noon."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Gentleman's motion carries. Perfunctory tomorrow and Regular Session Tuesday. Congratulations and thank you very much for the hard work."
