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Doorkeeper: "Attention to all Members to the House of Representatives the House will convene in five minutes. Thank you."

Doorkeeper: "All persons not entitled to the House floor, please retire to the gallery."

Speaker Redmond: "The House will come to order, Members please be in their seats. Let the records show that Representative Geo-Karis is in her seat. We will be lead in prayer this morning by Father Krueger, the House Chaplain."

Father Krueger: "In the name of the Father, Son and the Holy Ghost. Amen. O Lord, bless this House to Thy service this day. Amen. It is written in "The Talmud": There is a difference between him who does no misdeeds because of his own conscience and him who is kept from wrongdoing because of the presence of others. Let us pray. Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 196, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Are there any motions or any floor Amendments on 196?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motion filed, no further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Representative Houlihan, James."

Houlihan: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I wonder if I would have leave of the House... House Bill 707 is on Third Reading and passed out of Committee 13 to 0, I am Co-principle Sponsor



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with Representative Molloy, I can explain the Bill and I think we can move on that.... I don't think there is any controversy on that Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "What number?"

Houlihan: "707, that was before Representative Matijevich's...."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay, we'll take a chance if you're willing.

House Bill, Third Reading 707. Representative Lechowicz, will you come to the podium for a moment."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 707, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Pension Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative James Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 707, allows municipalities under five hundred thousand and it is permissive, I might add, to invest policemen's pension or firemen pension fund in the insured shares of a national credit union. Now, this merely allows them to do in the credit union which is insured federally what they can do in a savings institution or other financial institution. It passed out of Committee 13 to 0, I know of no opposition. The Illinois Municipal League was not opposed to this legislation, in fact it supported it. The national credit union was in support of it and I believe that there is no controversy on this particular item. I would ask for a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Molloy. The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 126 'aye' and no 'nay' and the Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Representative McMaster."

McMaster: "Mr. Speaker, I'm a little bit concerned. Would you as the Speaker, respond to a question if I...."

Speaker Redmond: "I'll try."



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McMaster: "Mr. Speaker, it seemed last night that we were here working on some Third Reading Bills along about eight o'clock when we adjourned to go home. Could you tell me in your explanation would there have been more people on the floor at that time than there are now, this morning."

Speaker Redmond: "My studied estimate is that there were more at eight o'clock last night than there are now. Thank you very much."

McMaster: "I regret, Mr. Speaker that we had to go home last night, I happened to be one of those who voted in support of you."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay. Agreed Resolutions."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Resolution 215, McClain, Hanahan. 217, Miller. 218, Wikoff. 219, Dawson. 220, Levin. 221, Stanley. 222, Lechowicz."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Clerk, do you have Resolution 216, also?"

Clerk O'Brien: "That was removed from the Consent Calendar, from the Agreed Resolution list I believe."

Giorgi: "House Resolution 215, by McClain, honors Donald Johnson who retired as Director of Labor. 217, Miller notes that the village of Chicago Heights celebrates its 70th birthday. 218 by Wikoff, denotes that the NCA Track and Field Championships will be held at Urbana, May 31st through June 4. House Resolution 219 by Dawson, signals its 95th anniversary of St Peter and Paul Roman Catholic Church of Chicago. House Resolution 220 by Levin honors the Lake View Citizens Council. House Resolution 221 by Stanley, marks the twenty years dedicated service of Beverly Lake School for the handicapped in Elgin. House Resolution 222 by Lechowicz, talks about the Polish National Alliance and freedom day. I move for the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions."

Clerk O'Brien: "I do have House Resolution 216 here on the Agreed list to, Geo-Karis."



Giorgi: "Yes, Resolution commends the testimony dinner for the Honorable LaVerne Wells, Clerk of the Village of Mundelein. I move for the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions."

Speaker Redmond: "Moves for the adoption, those in favor indicate by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Resolutions are adopted. General Resolutions."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Resolution 213, Giorgi. House Resolution 214, Flinn, Stiehl. House Joint Resolution 32, Ebbesen. House Joint Resolution 33, Lechowicz."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Committee on Assignments."

Clerk O'Brien: "Representative Lechowicz, in the Chair."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Ladies and Gentlemen, let me just announce that the intent of the Chair is go through House Bills, Second Reading with floor Amendments that have been offered then we'll go into the House Bills on Second Reading with Committee Amendments and then House Bills, Second Reading with no Amendment that have been offered either on the floor or in Committee. That's the intent of the Chair and we're waiting for the Clerk to come up with the Calendar as far as Amendments that have been offered on Bills, Second Reading from the floor. Representative Ryan, do you have anyone that should be excused today? Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, would the records show that Representative Kornowicz, is excused because of illness."

Speaker Lechowicz: "So indicated. Representative Wolf."

Wolf: "Mr. Speaker, I just wanted the privilege of addressing somebody from the 17th District as Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Thank you, very much. Representative Telcser."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker, could the records show that Representative Kucharski and Dyer are absent because of illness."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Hearing no objections, the record will be so indicated. House Bill, Second Reading, House Bill 17. Representative Kelly."



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Kelly: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. On House Bill 17, there are two House Amendments which I would like to be adopted. Amendment #1, would only add the word, 'serious' one word change on page 3, line 11, after the word 'without'. I move for the adoption of House Amendment #1."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 17, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Criminal Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1, Kelly."

Kelly: Yes, I move for the adoption of House Amendment #1, which would add one word which was left out by the Reference Bureau. The word 'serious' after the word 'without' on page 3, and line 11."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion on Amendment #1? If not, the question is, all in favor of the adoption of Amendment #1 will signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed. Amendment #1, is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, Kelly. Amends House Bill 17, on page 2 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Kelly."

Kelly: "Yes, Mr. Speaker. Amendment... House Amendment #2, redefines the definition of interest in violence. What I did is, I've taken out some of the words such as sadistic also masochistic, some of the words which would have been further... had difficulty in defining later on and I made it a much more smaller definition and more in line with the language which would be more acceptable by this body. I move for the adoption of House Amendment #2."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion on Amendment #2? Hearing no discussion... all in favor signify by saying 'aye' in adoption of Amendment #2, all opposed. Amendment #2, is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 36, Representative McMaster."



Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 36, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act authorizing the establishment of a Metropolitan Enforcement Groups. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was offered in Committee."

McMaster: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Amendment #1, that we adopted in Committee was incorrect in language, for that reason I would like to table Amendment #1 and offer Amendment #2, after we table Amendment #1."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman moves to table Committee Amendment #1, any discussion? Hearing none.... Representative Houlihan. Representative Dan Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Is Amendment #2, distributed?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mr. Clerk, is Amendment #2, distributed? We are on Amendment #1, once it is tabled Committee Amendment #1. Any discussion on that then? The question is on a motion to table. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', all that is opposed. Amendment #1, is tabled. Amendment #2."

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, McMaster. Amends House Bill 36, on page 2, line 27 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mr. Clerk has that Amendment been distributed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Yes, it has been distributed."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative McMaster on the Amendment."

McMaster: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Amendment #1, is merely corrective language to the Amendment that we did accept in Committee, it contains words such as the department shall and the director shall determine in place of department shall, operating budget of the Municipal Enforcement Groups and the director may assign the functions and duties created under this Act to be administered by the Department of Law Enforcement, Division of Investigation. It is similar to the one that we accepted in Committee but merely correcting the language to make it more clear. I offer it for adoption."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion on Amendment #2? All those in favor signify by saying 'aye' in the adoption of Amendment



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#2. All those opposed. Amendment #2, is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #3, Willer. Amends House Bill 36, as amended in Section 5 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Amendment #3, Representative Willer."

Willer: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I have Amendment #4, written here now the Clerk did it, but it is an Amendment to the Amendments that were offered by Representative McMaster. I do not have a copy of the second Amendment here. I know what his second Amendment did... all I do is change the word 'may' to 'shall' but I'm at a disadvantage not having a copy of his Amendment."

McMaster: "Mr. Speaker, I gave Representative Willer a copy of this Amendment at least two weeks ago, Ann."

Willer: "Yes, but you changed it then."

McMaster: "No, I gave you a copy of the new Amendment. I think you were over here to show me Amendment #3 and at that time I gave you Amendment #2, to make a copy it, which you did."

Willer: "Okay, I have Amendment #2, here and I'm changing the work 'may' as in the Amendment to 'shall' so that the Bill would read and I'm sorry, I'm at a disadvantage with only one eye. The Department.... I'm sorry, can you wait just a moment."

McMaster: "Mr. Speaker, I am willing to wait for Representative Willer, I would like to say though that I have taken a copy of her Amendment, shown it to the Department of Law Enforcement and they are in opposition to her Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mrs. Willer, I believe you want to table Amendment #3 and move the adoption of Amendment #4."

McMaster: "No, I don't think that is what she wants to do."

Willer: "No... no, I simply want to change... he had changed one word 'may' to 'shall'...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "We'll take the Bill out of the record for a

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minute until you and the Sponsor can get together."

Willer: "Yes, will you please."

Speaker Lechowicz: "House Bill 36, is out of the record. House Bill 37, Representative McMaster, you want to hold that for awhile."

McMaster: "37, I don't believe... I don't know whether Representative Willer has any Amendments to it or not."

Speaker Lechowicz: "House Bill 37, Representative McMaster."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 37, a Bill for an Act making appropriation to the Department of Law Enforcement. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "One moment, Representative Schlickman, for what reason do you arise?"

Schlickman: "Well, only to suggest, Mr. Speaker, if I may. That in as much as House Bill 37, is an appropriation to implement the Act created by House Bill 36, that it might be well if they proceeded in tandem and be treated as such rather than having one go to Third and the other staying at Second. Just a suggestion."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative McMaster."

McMaster: "Mr. Speaker, I think that all we're trying to do is expedite the operations of this House, I'm perfectly willing to move 37, on to Third Reading and hold it there while we're waiting for 36 to catch up and I do think we've got to move along in this game, Gene, we can't monkey around."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, I would like a question of Mr. McMaster. Who's going to get the bulk of the million dollar appropriation which group? It is upstate or downstate or where?"

McMaster: "Well, this time we're leaving it up to the Department Law Enforcement, Zeke, to make that decision. I would assume that probably the largest Metropolitan enforcement group would certainly have a bigger budget. For that reason I would assume that the largest amount would go to

the largest Metropolitan group and I don't think I need to tell you who that would be, Zeke."

Giorgi: "But you increased it by a hundred thousand dollars, what was the necessity for that."

McMaster: "We have not yet... well, we are increasing it yes, by the Committee Amendment and we are going to table Committee Amendment #1, to make again technical corrections in floor Amendment #2."

Giorgi: "At least tell us what...."

McMaster: "The extra hundred thousand dollars, Zeke, goes to the Department of Law Enforcement for their expenses and administrating this program when we turn it over to them instead of being with ILEC."

Giorgi: "You mean that you're going to charge 10%, you're going to increase personnel 10% just to administer that program, doesn't make sense."

McMaster: "Well, this again was the suggestion of DLE, Zeke, they needed this money to take care of the cost of the... operating the program and I'm willing to go along with it, Zeke."

Giorgi: "Well, what's the hundred thousand going to be used for in as much as you say that's what is going to be needed to administer, that's 10% of the total. What are you going to spend a hundred thousand on, you ought to know that."

McMaster: "Well, Zeke, we're not passing the Bill at this time again this...."

Giorgi: "Well, this is an Amendment you want me to vote on the Amendment don't you?"

McMaster: "I certainly do, Zeke and the wishes of the Department of Law Enforcement that they have this amount in there for their cost of operating MEG program out of their office rather than out of Illinois Law Enforcement Commission."

Giorgi: "Okay, but you ought to be able to tell us, you ought



to be able to breakdown the hundred thousand dollars because you use the term, law enforcement, I don't become paralyzed."

McMaster: "Well, Zeke, what should I say for Administrative Per..."

Giorgi: "Tell me what the hundred thousand dollars is for, if you can't tell me say you can't tell me."

McMaster: "For administrative Personnel, for mailing...."

Giorgi: "Two more Deputy Directors is that it? Two Deputy Directors of twenty-five or thirty grand a piece."

McMaster: "No, I do not believe that would be true, Zeke."

Giorgi: "Well, then you're unable to answer what the hundred thousand dollars is for, is that correct?"

McMaster: "I guess not to your complete satisfaction, Zeke."

Giorgi: "Thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Totten."

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I don't think we have tabled Amendment #1, to get to Amendment #2, yet have we."

Speaker Lechowicz: "No, we have not. Representative McMaster."

McMaster: "Mr. Speaker, I move to table Committee Amendment #1 and offer...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion on tabling Committee Amendment #1? All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all that are opposed. Committee Amendment #1, is tabled. Amendment #2."

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, McMaster. Amends House Bill 37, on page 1, by deleting line 5 through 9 and so forth."

McMaster: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I think we have discussed this floor Amendment #2, quite some length although it was not before us at the time and again it was making technical corrections in language and it does contain the extra one hundred thousand dollars for the operation of the MFC unit under DLE, Department of Law Enforcement. I would offer it for adoption."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion on Floor Amendment #2. Representative Dan Houlihan." Any discussion? All those



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in favor signify by saying 'aye' on Amendment #2. All that are opposed. Amendment #2, is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. Now, we will revert back to House Bill 36, Amendment #3, I believe was in consideration. Representative Willer."

Willer: "Yes, I think I've got this right now. On the Amendment that Representative McMaster has submitted in Section 51, the Director may assign the functions and duties created under this Act to be administered by the Department of Law Enforcement, Division of Investigation. I have changed by my Amendment, that 'may' to 'shall' so we will have the Director's shall assign the functions and duties. Now, Representative McMaster says that the Department opposes this, I don't know who is playing games with who. I talked to them and they said they did want control over MEG because of its bad track record. I think that this is... if we are going to create MEG and give a statutory underpinnings then by Lord let's see that it is run properly and let the Department of Law Enforcement supervise it. This is a simple change and I don't see why there should be opposition and I simply do not believe that the Department opposes it because they told me, they didn't."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative McMaster."

McMaster: "Well, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. DLE, does oppose this Amendment, the Bill itself does give DLE control of the MEG unit and certainly tightens up the control that I believe you feel they have not had in prior years and believe me, the Department of Law Enforcement has told me that they were in opposition to any Amendments other than the one that we've put on at this time. I urge the defeat of this Amendment, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I



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rise to support Mr. McMasters in his opposition to Mrs. Willer's Amendment #3, I'm convinced that the Department does not want the Amendment and it doesn't need it and so, based on their word, Mr. Chairman, I urge the Members on this side of the aisle to oppose the Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Members of the General Assembly, I just happened to be sitting in the Committee when this was heard and I know that the Director said that he wanted Representative McMaster's alledges, or says... states. I don't know where all this information is coming from. Perhaps the Director thinks that the operation is so bad that it couldn't get worse if he had control. I don't know, but certainly he said, if the money is going to come out of state government he wants his hand in it."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any further discussion? Representative Willer to close."

Willer: "Well, I would only repeat that considering its very bad track record in the past, I want this unit and I would hope that the General Assembly would want it. In the first place this is not even in the Governor's budget, there is plans for reorganization reorganizing law enforcement agencies but if we're going to have MEG with statutory underpinnings then for heaven sakes let's see that it is run properly. I don't know why everybody is afraid of changing this 'may' to 'shall' because this is exactly what it will do and I would urge your support."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Willer, moves the adoption of Amendment #3. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed. Roll Call has been requested. All those in favor of Amendment #3, will vote 'aye', all those opposed will be recorded as 'no'. Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 19 'aye', 73 'nays', none recorded as 'present'. The Amendment is defeated. Amendment #4."



Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #4, Willer. Amend ~~the~~ House Bill 36, as amended in the first sentence of Section 5, by deleting 'may' and inserting in lieu thereof, 'shall'."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Willer."

Willer: "Well, Mr. Speaker, table this Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Willer, ~~moves~~ to table Amendment #4. Any discussion? All in favor signify by saying 'aye', all that are opposed. Amendment #4, is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading on House Bill 36. House Bill 41, Representative Caldwell."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 41... Fiscal note requested on this."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Has the fiscal note been filed? Representative Caldwell."

Caldwell: "Mr. Speaker, the Revenue Department suggested that we introduce a Bill for a budget for ~~starter~~ purposes and that Bill is the Committee on Assignments currently. What I'm suggesting if there is an accompanying Bill for appropriations, fiscal note wouldn't be necessary. Am I correct?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "That is correct. Representative Totten."

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. What is the appropriation then, does... what is the Bill number?"

Caldwell: "The Department suggested one million, seven hundred and fifty thousand."

Totten: "Thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Dan Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker, what Amendment are we on?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "We're on House Bill 41, the question was whether a fiscal note was filed. The Sponsor indicated that there is an Appropriation Bill... he answered Representative Totten's question as far as the dollar amount of the Appropriation Bill. Now, we're on consideration of House Bill 41, if there is any Amendments.... Mr. Clerk."



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Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 41, a Bill for an Act authorizing the creation of business to operate policy number games. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, 2 and 3, were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Are there further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No.... Floor Amendment #4, Younge. Amends House Bill 41, on page 6, line 24 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Houlihan, for what purpose do you rise?"

Houlihan: "We don't have the Amendment, I wonder if it has been printed and distributed."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Caldwell, we have been informed that Amendment #4, has not been printed yet we'll have to take the Bill out of the record."

Caldwell: "It is alright with me."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Thank you. House Bill 44, Representative Skinner. Representative Skinner on House Bill 44."

Skinner: "This is a Committee Amendment, I assume it is adopted automatically."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Let him read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 44, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of Senior Citizens and Disabled Persons Property Tax Relief Act. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was tabled in Committee, Amendment #2, and 3, were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motion."

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading."

Clerk O'Brien: "There was a fiscal note requested on this."

Speaker Lechowicz: "House Bill 47, Representative Mautino. Cal, did you file a fiscal note on 44?"

Skinner: "I think I signed a fiscal note for everything that came out of the Revenue Committee and probably by inadvert



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I signed one for my own, it will be ready on Friday so, why don't you just leave it on Second."

Speaker Lechowicz: "We'll put the Bill back on Second and hold it till a fiscal note has been filed. Representative Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker, on that last Bill there were no floor Amendments. What will be the position of the Chair, are you going to take House Bill, Second Reading that have floor Amendments and then go back to the normal order of call as far as the sequential order?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "No, I called it in error. Next Bill, House Bill 83, Representative Marovitz."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 83..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Wait a minute Jack, he's not on the floor. Take it out of the record. House Bill 100, Representative Daniels."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 100, a Bill for an Act to regulate the business of automobile repairs. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was tabled in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Daniels, are you on the floor? Representative Telcser, do you want to handle this Bill, you're a Chief Cosponsor?"

Telcser: "I don't know anything about it."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Take it out of the record? House Bill 100 is out of the record. House Bill 113, Representative Pierce."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 113. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Walsh. Amends House Bill 113 by deleting that part of line 9 which follows the comma and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Walsh."



Walsh: "All right, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this Amendment is the same Amendment that was put on the Junior Colleges Residency Bill and simply provides that the....."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Ralph Dunn....."

Walsh: "Oh, I beg your pardon, Mr. Speaker... Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Lechowicz: "I'm sorry.... sorry."

Walsh: "Yeah, we've got.... I move to table Amendments #1, 2 oh, Amendments #1 and 2 I move to table."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Walsh moves to table Amendments #1 and 2. Is there any discussion? All those in favor signify by saying 'aye'. All those opposed... Amendments #1 and 2 are tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: Amendment #3, I believe... was inadvertently numbered #4.... and printed. Walsh, "

Walsh: "That's correct."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amends House Bill 113 by deleting that part of line 9 which follows the comma and all of lines 10 and 11 and line 12 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "I don't know whether it's necessary, Mr. Speaker... if it is I will move to amend Amendment number... numbered 4 to Amendment #3 on its face."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Leave granted? Leave granted. Amendment #4 will now be Amendment #3 amended on its face. Amendment #3."

Walsh: "Now, Mr. Speaker, this is the same Amendment that was attached to the Junior College Teacher or Employee Residency Bill. We had considerable discussion on that. The same principles apply here as applied on that and I would hope that this would be supported in the same way that the Amendment to the prior Bill was supported."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "I wonder if the Gentleman could tell us what would



happen if one of... one member of a family.. the husband works in one junior college district and another member of the family works in a second junior college district. Where would he suggests they live?"

Walsh: "The... yes, the.. this, Cal, this Amendment simply gives the board the prospective right to make residency a condition of employment. If they are currently.. if that situation existed currently, then if this Bill is enacted, than the boards could not make residency a requirement."

Skinner: "What if a biology professor from one junior college met a biology professor from another junior college at a convention and they decided to get married. Where would they live?"

Walsh: "You mean in the future sometime..... assuming this... you know, the situation now is that the boards can make residency requirements, but you're arguing the Bill and not the Amendment."

Skinner: "No, I think your Amendment says that in the future boards may set residency requirements and I have given you an example that will be in the future."

Walsh: "Not in the future, the board is going to set residency as a condition now to employment. What the Bill proposes to do is to prevent them from making residency requirements. They may do that now."

Skinner: "I thought the Amendment said, was going to allow them, authorize them to do it in the future. To set..."

Walsh: "No, they may do it now, what the Bill would... the Bill would prevent boards from making residency a requirement within the district. The Amendment attenuates that a bit and says, that the boards may make residency a condition of beginning employment."

Skinner: "Then what you're saying is that if the situation that I outlined should occur, either the man or the wife would have to quit his or her job, right?"

Walsh: "Well, yeah."



Skinner: "If they wanted to live in the same house."

Walsh: "Yes."

Skinner: "I think that points out some of the problems with this Amendment which of course, appear with all the previous Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Pierce."

Pierce: "Mr. Speaker, to clarify this Amendment I think we should have a Roll Call vote on it. I'm going to oppose it, what the Bill seeks to do is to prevent school districts from imposing residency requirements on teachers and other personnel for hiring, promoting or discharge and I believe strongly that the American's have a right to live where he chooses especially professional personnel, unless it affects his job, I can understand a policeman or a fireman. Now, what Walsh's Amendment does, Amendment #3, is he agrees with me that the school board shouldn't impose a residency requirement on those that are working for the board at the time the board adopts the residency requirement but, can impose it in future... for future employees of the condition of employment. That's what his Amendment does and I don't agree with it because I think it should never be a condition of employment that a person lives in a school district. Skinner, gave a good reason one is when a husband and wife work in different districts but, I don't oppose the Amendment but the vote is just this simple when we take a Roll Call vote. If you agree with me that a residency requirement should not be imposed on a teacher to be hired, promoted or terminated as a condition, then vote against the Amendment. If you agree with Walsh, that a residency requirement be imposed on those teachers already working when the board first imposes it but, may be imposed on those hired in the future, then vote for Amendment #3, and that is pretty much the issue, I hate to say both sides of a issue and to close, I'm opposing the Amendment because I feel a residency requirement is not reasonable for a school



board to impose. This doesn't affect city government, it doesn't affect county government... only school boards. I would agree that policemen or firemen or sanitation workers it may be good reasons for them to live nearby where they work in the community but not for a professional person such as a teacher and therefore, I oppose Amendment #3 and I think we can get to a Roll Call vote on that issue."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Dan Houlihan."

Houlihan: "I rise to speak in support of the Amendment, I think it is a reasonable one and I would ask for the support of the Membership in behalf of the Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Walsh to close."

Walsh: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. To begin with, no school district that I know of but except for one and that's the Kankakee School District has made residency a condition of employment. None of the eleven hundred some odd school districts... other school districts have done this so, what Representative Pierce is attempting to do with the Bill is something that really hasn't occurred to very many school boards. When we restrict the activities of an elected body, we do something very serious and this simply medicates what Representative Pierce's is attempting to do and I think it is fair to both school board members and to employees of school boards and I urge your support."

Speaker Lechowicz: "A Roll Call is requested. All those in favor of Amendment #3, vote 'aye', those who oppose the vote 'nay'. The Clerk will take... Representative Ewell, to explain his vote. Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 60 'ayes' 48 'nays' 2 recorded as 'present'. Amendment #3, is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. Representative Ralph Dunn, for



what reason do you rise?"

Dunn: "Mr. Speaker, I am the Sponsor... Chief Sponsor of House Bill 2191, it is on Second Reading. I would like leave of the House to table the Bill if I could."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Is that 2191?"

Dunn: "2191, House Bill 2191."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any objection? House Bill 2191, is tabled. House Bill 100, Representative Daniels."

Daniels: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I would like to have House Bill 100 called and I think with the permission of the Chair all the Amendments up to Amendment #13, including Amendment #2, would be tabled. Amendment #13, would be the Amendment we're going with and then 14, would be tabled and then Amendment #15, is Representative Hart's Amendment. I have talked to Representative Griesheimer, who was on the floor until a minute ago and he agreed to table all of his Amendments. I am going to table Amendment #12 and then proceed with Amendment #13."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 100, a Bill for an Act to regulate the business of automobile repairs. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was tabled in Committee. Amendment #2, was adopted in Committee."

Daniels: "I would move that Amendment #2, be tabled, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion of Amendment #2? Representative Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Amendment #2, was a Committee Amendment is that correct, Representative Daniels?"

Daniels: "Yes, Sir it was."

Houlihan: "And, I was under the impression that that was an agreed Amendment in Committee."

Daniels: "Yes, it was an agreed Amendment in Committee and as I advised the Committee when we presented this to them that we would continue to work on the Bill with the various associations. The Chicago Trade Association has now endorsed the Bill as contained in Amendment #13, the



independent garage owners of Springfield and ten other independent garages or organizations have endorsed this legislation as contained in Amendment #3 and we think it is a stronger and better Amendment for the industry and the Consumer Fraud Act."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any further discussion? Representative Daniels moves the... to table Amendment #2, all those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all opposed. Amendment #2, is tabled. Amendment #3."

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11 and 12... is that right?"

Daniels: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I believe all the way up to #11, are Representative Griesheimer's Amendments and I have talked to him, he was on the floor up until a minute ago. He had agreed to table those Amendments.... Representative Griesheimer... is in the back of the chamber arguing with Representative Geo-Karis about who is going to run for the Senate. Representative Griesheimer, are you going to table those Amendments, 3 through 11, on House Bill 100?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Griesheimer."

Griesheimer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would like to move at this time to table the Amendments to House Bill 100. Representative Daniels has cured all of the suggested changes on all eight Amendments sufficiently that I don't believe they have any applicability at the present time so, I will move to table them."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Are you the principal Sponsor of Amendments 3 through 11?"

Griesheimer: "Last time I checked, I was."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Gries.... Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, it was just good to see Adeline and Ron, talking to each other even if they are arguing."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Griesheimer, on the Amendment."

Griesheimer: "Well, I would just like to respond to that, I guess it's just sort of debate and we just want everyone to know that everyone in the 31st District is a big happy family and the king of our district now is a fellow by the name of Bill Morris, so come up and visit us."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Griesheimer moves to table Amendments 3 through 11. Any discussion? All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', those opposed. The Amendments are tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #12, Daniels."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Daniels."

Daniels: "Mr. Speaker, I move to table Amendment #12."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all opposed. Amendment #12, is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #13, Daniels. Amends House Bill 100, on page 1, line 1, by deleting 'automotive' and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Daniels."

Daniels: "Mr. Speaker, Amendment #13 will now become the Bill and I would move for its adoption. Amendment #13, is a result of a considerable amount of discussion with various organizations and consideration of their view point including the Illinois State Tire Dealers and Retreaders Association, Chicago Trade Association, Illinois New Cars Association, Renfo Association, Illinois Independent Garage Owners Association, Independent Garage Owners of Springfield as the result of many Subcommittee hearings. We feel that the language in Amendment #13, that has been revised in accordance with those hearings and discussions is a very workable Bill and I would move for the adoption of Amendment #13."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative Dan Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Well other than telling us all of these fine people that support us, perhaps he could explain the Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Daniels, would you kindly



explain the Amendment."

Daniels: "I would be happy to, Representative Houlihan. Amendment #13, commencing with the page 4, basically commences the Substance of the legislation and requires that estimates be given for any repair work that will exceed seventy-five dollars. It also requires that there be given a precise statement of the work to be performed and a brief statement of the complaint of consumer that are necessitating the repairs. If the repair work is to exceed the specified amount of the estimate and excess of seventy-five dollars and the estimate is say, for example a hundred dollars and it will exceed that, then the repair dealer must receive the specific consent or authorization of the consumer to proceed further over the estimated price. This can be done either orally or written authorization. That was put into the Amendment #13, because of the fact that it was recognized that there would be situations when the car would be up on a rack and you would find out that there was additional repair work needed so, somebody would call up and say... can I proceed over the amount of the estimate and the repair dealer would receive that oral authorization instead of having to hold it up on the rack until the person could get back in and give the written authorization. That's the major change in Amendment #13, there are a few other changes that take place in that Amendment and primarily by the deletion, Representative Houlihan and the reason for that... in deleting some of those items as we felt in reviewing the Bill in great detail, it really didn't strengthen the legislation but we really had many of the things covered through the estimates and that was heart of the Bill."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any further discussion?"

Houlihan: "I understand that..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Houlihan."



Houlihan: "Representative Daniels, anything over seventy-five dollars as far as an estimate, must be specifically discussed with the consumer, is that correct?"

Daniels: "That's correct. The consumer has the right to know how he's spending his money and the problem that we have come across in dealing with the question of automobile fraud is that the people that have the major complaints says that they weren't told what the repair work would be or how much it would cost. This really is pretty much the heart of the legislation and we're saying to the repair dealer, just tell the consumer how much it costs and you will be entering into a contract with that consumer and then that primarily cures the problems that we're dealing with."

Houlihan: "What are the sanctions for violation by the Automobile Repair Dealers?"

Daniels: "The sanctions are all contained under the Consumer Fraud Act and all subject to court interpretation of ruling on an independent case but in the extremes it could mean the loss of corporate charter or a fine up to fifty thousand dollars or injunctive release."

Houlihan: "Up to fifty thousand dollars."

Daniels: "Yes, if it was proved by a court, that's all contained in Consumer Fraud Act."

Houlihan: "You're not changing the Consumer Fraud Act."

Daniels: "No, not at all. It is all under the Consumer Fraud Act, none of that is being changed or amended."

Houlihan: "All right and you're putting enforcement in the Attorney General."

Daniels: "The enforcement of this would be through the Attorney General's office, we've talked with various organizations who have volunteered to set up a fraud panel and this is one of the things that we're very encouraged about in working with the Independent Garage Owners because they are going to set up a fraud panel to assist the Attorney



General in the enforcement of this and furnish him expert advice in cases that fraud exist."

Houlihan: "I have no further questions."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any further discussion? Representative Conti."

Conti: "The most complaints I had on the Bill was the portion where the subcontracts before they could supply any of the parts would have to have a written consent from the person having the job done, has that been deleted from the Bill?"

Daniels: "All that we're asking... on cases where work is subcontracted is that, that subcontractor be identified on the invoice."

Conti: "But, it doesn't have to have an affidavit."

Daniels: "No, that has been deleted. Per your request and your association request."

Conti: "Thank you."

Speaker Lecowicz: Any further discussion? Representative Daniels moves the adoption of Amendment #13... Oh, Representative Bartulis."

Bartulis: "I have a question of the Sponsor if he would yield."

Speaker Lecowicz: "The Sponsor indicates that he will yield."

Bartulis: "All right, Representative on... who's going to pay for the so called difference in making an estimate. You know there is a cost of... to the person that is making the estimate is this going to be put on to the consumer?"

Daniels: "If the repair dealer where to receive the job, he could not and would not be able to charge for the estimate. The estimate as we have discovered in our investigation is being preformed by a lot of what we would classify as a reputable dealer already, they are telling their people percisely what it is going to cost and those are the dealers that we don't have too much trouble with now, it is evidence through our investigation of files on automobile complaint but the estimate that would be required would be



paid for by the consumer if there was a charge levied. if the dealer did not get the repair job."

Bartulis: "Well, if you are in any kind of business and you have to make an estimate for anybody, you've got.... it comes out of your pocket and somebody has to pay for this and this is just another means Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, we're dipping into the pockets of the consumer. This is supposed to be consumer fraud, I wonder who the fraud is on... really we're going into the pockets of the consumer to add on an estimate for him just for a few that the Attorney General should be taking care of in the first place. He's got a consumer fraud panel over there to take care of these things for the people of the State of Illinois. So, why are we going on and dipping into the hands of the consumer for again."

Daniels: "If I might answer that...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Proceed."

Daniels: "Mr. Speaker. Number one the power is not contained presently under the Consumer Fraud Act and he does not have the authority as it would specify in this Bill. Number two, the heart of the Bill is the estimate requirement and I would submit to all Members of this Body and to the people of the State of Illinois that the automobile is the second largest major expenditure that any of us are subjected to. There is hardly a Member in this House that hasn't had an experience where he's taken in his car and found out that the price of the repairs are far exceeded his wildest dream or imagination. We're trying to avoid that and in the same time that's why we've met so regularly with the dealers and the independant garage owners and the various representative of those groups to see if we can assist them in making sure this Bill does not hurt their industry."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. House



Bill 100, as amended is in direct response to a report containing findings and recommendations of the Illinois Investigating Commission concerning auto repairs in the State of Illinois. Now, Amendment #13, greatly revises the Bill as it was originally introduced... greatly revises Amendment #2 but, in so doing maintains the spirit and thrust of the Bill on one hand and on the other is responsive sympathetically to constructive criticism that was voiced by auto repair shops. For example, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, House Bill 100, as amended by Amendment #2, would have required every repair shop to provide an estimate..."

Lechowicz: "Excuse me, Gene. We're on Amendment #13."

Man: "I know, Mr. Speaker, I'm simply comparing #2 to #13. Would have required every auto repair shop to provide an estimate to a customer without the requirements that the customer provides the work of that particular auto repair shop. This would have resulted in shopping by consumers without having to pay for the estimate because there was another provision that the auto repair shop was prohibited from making... from requiring a charge for the estimate. Under Amendment #13, the estimate is to be provided only after... there is a contractual arrangement entered into by the consumer and by the auto repair shop... if there is not that contractual arrangement the auto repair shop can charge for the estimate. Another sufficient provision of Amendment #3, which is sympathetically responsive to constructive criticism allows the consumer to make an oral approval for an addition rather than the impractical arrangement of a written approval. I think, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, the Sponsor of this Bill, the Sponsor of Amendment #13, is to be commended for the manner in which he has approached this matter, he has shown responsibility to the consumers as well as showing responsibility to the repair shops and I would

urge that you join with him in support of this Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, I wonder if the speaker who is a member of Bar Association and the Sponsor of the Bill who is also a member of the Bar Association has a suggested price list for the attorney fees that are going to be involved when some of these things end up in our little courts and then I wonder how many more courtrooms we'll need, public defenders and states attorney's and judges and.... unless they've got a suggested price list for attorney or maybe a fiscal note as to what this is going to cost. Mr. Schlickman or Mr. Daniels. Yeah, we should have maybe a judicial note as Representative Hart suggests."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any further discussion? Representative Daniels, moves the adoption of Amendment #13. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all opposed. Amendment #13, is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #14, amends House Bill 100, as amended by deleting paragraph (g) of 2 (1), and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Huff."

Huff: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I discussed Amendment #14, with the Sponsor and at this time I think I'm going to table Amendment #14. I ask leave to table."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Huff, asks leave to table Amendment #14. Those in favor signify by saying 'aye', those opposed. Amendment #14, is adopted. Any further Amendments... tabled."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #15, Hart. Amends House Bill 100, as amended by inserting after Section 2 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Hart."

Hart: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this Amendment would limit the application of House Bill 100, to counties that have population of over one hundred thousand. The Bill... the Automobile



Repair Act, I believe eventually is the kind of legislation that will come back to haunt us if we pass it..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Excuse me Dick, has this Amendment been distributed?"

Hart: "Yes, it has."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Please proceed."

Hart: "If we can have a little order... I would appreciate it."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Thank you."

Hart: "The real answer to the problem of automobile repair and the consumer complains about it is, to pick out a person that is responsible and who's reliable and take your car there to get it fixed. And I think we have responsible and reliable automobile repair men in the counties of under a hundred thousand, in my district and other districts throughout the state and we don't need House Bill 100. And so, we're asking this Legislature to exempt counties of under a hundred thousand from this Bill through Amendment #15. I move for its adoption."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative Dan Houlihan."

Houlihan: "I rise to speak in opposition to the Amendment. The same.....regulation exists throughout the state and that's just in counties in excess of one hundred thousand. It's no need for the Legislation if you're going to exempt out those counties which in the large part would be what most of the geographical area of this state and I would ask for a 'no' vote on the Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Daniels."

Daniels: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I want to reiterate for your benefit the fact of the... many organizations throughout the State of Illinois that have endorsed this legislation. I want to point out to you that the lobbyist, Mr. Gus 'Patori', of one of the chief downstate companies is up in the gallery now and has endorsed this legislation. The Chicago Trade Association has endorsed it the Automotive Trade Association of Illinois,



The Independent Garage Owners of Springfield, The Car Association of Chicago, The DuCook Association, The Illinois Tire Dealers, The Automotive Wholesalers of Illinois, Motor Vehicle Safety Council, The Independent Garage Owners of Belleville, Illinois and many other organizations that we've met with and discussed. I agree, I frankly agree that regulation of industry is something that we should be very very careful about before we go into it. But I want to point out to you the many frauds and rip-offs that have occurred in the State of Illinois, not just in the City of Chicago but all over this state. I want to point out to you that there have been far too many examples of people bringing their automobile in, like the one now in the Springfield office of the Attorney General where a young couple brought their Volkswagen van in, they were told that it was going to cost seven hundred and fifty dollars, when they went to pick it up a week later, the bill was seventeen hundred and fifty dollars. All we're trying to do in a case like this is, protect the public. And no one else and that's why we're asking for this authority to be given to the Attorney General, the lawyer for the people in an effort to cure some of these problems. Ladies and Gentlemen I solicit your help, I think that this Amendment although given in good interest and good spirit is a bad Amendment and I think would be very harmful to the purpose and the meaning of this legislation and I suggest and urge you to oppose it."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Hart, to close."

Hart: "Well, basically I agree with Representative Dan Houlihan, we really don't need this legislation at all. And... but I just looked at the Sponsorship of the Bill and with the exception of one or two they are all from Cook County. Now, I'm not by this Amendment diminishing in any respect the efforts of those of you who are from Cook County who think you need this legislation. But, I'm trying to protect



the people of my district too and my people don't need this legislation and as I say, the answer to getting your car repaired at a reasonable cost and well done is to check out the person to whom you take it and don't take it to anybody who has got a bad reputation. So, I would urge that you exempt our counties and the counties under one hundred thousand from this legislation. You can have it if you want it but, let us out of it because we don't want it."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Hart, moves the adoption of Amendment #15. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed. A Roll Call is requested. Those in favor of Amendment #15, will vote 'aye', all those opposed will vote 'nay'. Have all voted who wished? Representative Friedrich, to explain his vote."

Friedrich: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, if you people want all this regulation up in the dense areas, you can have it but, let us alone down there, we don't need this kind of regulations and Representative Hart, has certainly made the case pretty plain. If you've got a bunch of crooks up there we'll help... happy to help you take care of them. We can run our own business without this regulation."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 45 'ayes', 80 'nay', 3 recorded as 'present'. The Amendment is not adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #16, Bartulis. Amends House Bill 100 as amended by adding after Section 3, the following; Section 4 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Bartulis."

Bartulis: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Amendment #16, to House Bill 100, amends the Bill by adding after Section 3, the following; Section 4, the Regulatory Act shall be applicable only to municipalities with the population of five hundred



thousand or more. I forgot... I wanted to ask if there was a home rule Amendment on this Bill? To the Sponsor, that was my question from last time..... Representative Daniels."

Speaker Lechowicz: "I don't believe a home rule Amendment is on this Bill, is that correct?"

Daniels: "That's correct."

Speaker Lechowicz: "There is none."

Bartulis: "Well, this would take care of it then and on behalf of the people of Southern Illinois, Central Illinois and anywhere south, this is a good Amendment for all the people because I think we're just going back into the pockets of the people. And, outside of a few who neglect their duties and... that's what we have the Attorney General for and I don't think we should pass this Bill and I think this is a good Amendment and I ask for a do pass."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Dan Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in opposition to Amendment #16. This is not a home rule Amendment except to the effect it would make the Bill applicable only to the City of Chicago, no where else in the state. For all the reasons that Representative Hart's Amendment #15, was defeated this even more so should be defeated and I would urge a negative vote on the Amendment."

Speaekr Lechowicz: "Representative Cunningham."

Cunningham: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I was going to speak in behalf of Representative Hart. The proposition is basically the same, those of us who live in rural communities have grown weary of the tyranny of the big city. We don't need this regulation, we don't want it. We ask you to get your paws off of us, let us be free. If you need it in Chicago, fine we'll vote for it... for there but let's support this Amendment and give this regulation to those who need it and let the rest of us go our way in peace and harmony. I urge you all to vote 'aye', it was a disgrace the

prior Amendment wasn't adopted. You have another chance to correct an error that you made just three minute ago."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Friedrich."

Friedrich: "Would the Sponsor yield to a question?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "He indicates that he will."

Friedrich: "I want to know if there is a fiscal note been filed on this?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Fiscal note request has just been filed with the Clerk. Any further discussion on Amendment #16? Representative Neff."

Neff: "Thank you, Mr. Chairman and Members of the House, this is an Amendment that is a good Amendment, the problem that we're faced here isn't downstate but it is in the City of Chicago and I think any of you can check out in the smaller communities and you don't find this problem. Therefore, let's put it where it belongs and where the people need it and therefore, I think it is a good Amendment and I would hope we don't support this Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Williams."

Williams: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I hear that they say there is no problems, in all of the testimony that we heard and I'm one of the principal Sponsors with Representative Daniels, it's my will on this Bill and certainly the problems are the same downstate as they are in Chicago or any other place and I would urge everyone to defeat this Amendment. You can't go on a population basis, to protect the consumer and I urge defeat of this Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Daniels."

Daniels: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I want to point out that this Amendment which of course is worse than the previous Amendment but applies strictly to the City of Chicago. I want to point out furthermore to you that what some of the people that oppose this legislation are saying, is just simply not



true. There are many many examples of fraud in the automobile industry throughout this state. Unfortunately that happens to be a fact and it happens to be true. I would suggest to you that in recognition to that and the very wide spread support we have from this... for this legislation from the various associations that are concerned with reparable dealings in automobile repair that you must resoundly defeat this Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Bartulis, to close."

Bartulis: "Yes, in closing I would like to say that the organizations that he had just mentioned are for this Amendment and the downstate Dealers Association is for this Amendment. The Retailers are for this Amendment, therefore, I ask for this Amendment do pass."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Bartulis, moves for the adoption of Amendment #16. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed. Amendment #16, is defeated. Any... Roll Call. All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', all those opposed by voting 'nay'. Have all voted who wished? Have all vote who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 52 'ayes' 84 'nays', 1 recorded as 'present' and the Amendment is defeated. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "A fiscal note has been requested so the Bill will remain on Second Reading until the request is fulfilled. House.... Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, in as much as the Bill will remain on Second Reading, I wonder if he will accept an Amendment creating a new system of arbitration rather than using the courts on the judication of these cases. Would you accept an Amendment to start a system of arbitration, Mr. Daniels? Start a new court system, you know take it out of the court."

Speaker Lechowicz: "House Bill 192, Representative Kornowicz..."

Representative Terzich, are you handling the Bill? Take it out of the record. House Bill 213, Representative Totten."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 213, a Bill for an Act to amend the Election Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Totten, amends House Bill 213, on page 11, by inserting between line 29 and 30, the following and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Totten."

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, in Committee there was some discussion regarding of the putting on of an Amendment and we agreed to it. The Bill passed out of Committee 15 to nothing, the Amendment requires the candidates to certify the signatures that he has struck from his petition and the purpose of the requirement is to protect the candidate from having signatures struck by someone else without his knowledge. And, it is an added protection in the Bill and I would move for the adoption of Amendment #1."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative Totten, moves the adoption of Amendment #1, all those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed. Amendment #1 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 231, Representative Sevcik."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 231, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Horse Racing Act. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Sevcik. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. Fiscal note has been requested it has been withdrawn according to the Sponsor. Third Reading."



Representative Houlihan."

Houlihan: "On House Bill 231, was Amendment #1, adopted in Committee?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Yes, it was."

Clerk O'Brien: "231, Amendment #1, was adopted in Revenue Committee."

Houlihan: "And there are no other Amendments on the Bill?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No. Request for a fiscal note."

Speaker Lechowicz: "And according to the Sponsor the fiscal note request was withdrawn and he ask that we move the Bill and we did. House Bill 308, Representative Holewinski. No, 238 at the request of the Sponsor has got some further Amendments coming up and they are not ready. House Bill 308, Representative Holewinski, do you want to call that Bill?"

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 308, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act in relation to performance of medical, dental or surgical procedures. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1 and 2, were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Dan Houlihan."

Houlihan: "I have filed Amendment #3, to House Bill 308 and I ask at this time to table Amendment #3."

Speaker Lechowicz: "House Bill... Amendment #1 and 2, were adopted in Committee on House Bill 308. Any motions?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Okay, Amendment #3, Representative Houlihan."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3, D. Houlihan. Amends House Bill 308, on page 1."

Houlihan: "I move to table my Amendment #3."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? All in favor signify by saying 'aye', those opposed. Amendment #3, is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #4, Holewinski. Amends House Bill 308, on page 1 and inserting after line 6, the following: Section 1 and so forth."



Speaker Lechowicz: "Amendment #4, Representative Holeywinski.
Representative Holeywinski." "

Holeywinski: "Mr. Speaker, I don't have Amendment #4, in my files."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Would you read the Amendment. It has been printed and distributed."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #4, on page 1, by inserting after line 6, the following: Section 1, 2 and 4, the Act in relation to performance of medical, dental or surgical procedures."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Holeywinski."

Holeywinski: "Mr. Speaker, I found it now. What this was, was a technical Amendment supplied by the Reference Bureau the correct spelling in a mistake and a missing coma."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Move the adoption of Amendment #4. Any discussion? All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed. Amendment #4, is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 346, Representative Giglio."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 346...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Excuse me, I don't know... is he in the chamber. House Bill 346, Representative Giglio. Please proceed, House Bill 346."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 346, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Election Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Giglio, amends House Bill 346, on page 1, by deleting lines 13 and 14 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Giglio. Has the Amendment printed and distributed?"

Giglio: "It's printed... I don't know about distribution."

Speaker Lechowicz: "I'm sorry, Frank, it has not been distributed"



we'll have to take the Bill out of the records."

Giglio: "We'll come back to it then as soon as we get it."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Yes, Sir."

Giglio: "Thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative DiPrima, on House Bill 352."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 352, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Food Drug and Cosmetic Act. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1 and 2, were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motion filed."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3, Edgar. Amends House Bill 352, as amended in Section 2.22 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Edgar."

Edgar: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Amendment #3, was something that was agreed to in Committee to take care of a problem that the dairy farmers had on returnable bottles. Due to the fact that the only area they have to put any printing on is about the size of a half dollar and they are already required to put federal requirements of content of the bottle and felt that there was not enough space on their bottle to comply with this Act. This Amendment will exclude them."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any further discussion on Amendment #3? All those in favor of the adoption of Amendment #3, signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed. Amendment #3, is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. Representative Griesheimer, on House Bill 368."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 368, a Bill for an Act to create the Mobile Home Landlord and Tenant Act. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"



that any license increase change has taken place in the State of Illinois since 1957..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Excuse me, we're on Amendment #3. 1 and 2, are adopted."

Griesheimer: "Oh, excuse me. I'm sorry. Amendment #3...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "528, Jack."

Griesheimer: "Is an oversight... in Amendment #2, in Committee they were dealing with hunting license, the Bill was drawn up and omitted the general hunting license. All it pertains to was the specifics of all the permits such as the deer permit and the like and what we done in Amendment #3, is to change the cost of the basic hunting license from, I believe it is three to ten dollars in the State of Illinois. This is, incidentally, this is the same set of facts that is in the same situation that I just described on Amendment #1, this particular license has not been changed in the State of Illinois since 1957 and this Bill has the support of the Department of Conservation, Illinois Wildlife Federation, The Deer Hunters Association of the State of Illinois and many of the outdoor organizations. All of this money goes into the fish and game fund and will be used solely for the benefit of the hunters and fishermen in our state."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Hart."

Hart: "First, I have two requests. I want to be journalized as voting 'no' on Amendment #1 and 2."

Speaker Lechoicz: "So recorded."

Hart: "And, then I want to advise the Members of the General Assembly about this Amendment. This Amendment... the Bill originally came into to Committee... didn't have anything to do with hunting licenses at all, it was amended by Amendment #2, I believe to include hunting licenses. It was commented on in Committee that the associations mentioned by Representative Griesheimer, were in support of this Bill. I want the Members of the General Assembly



to know that the people that belong to these associations do not support this Bill. The Department of Conservation had some kind of a hearing at Marion, Illinois where nobody was invited but people that supported this kind of thing and nobody knew that it was going to happen until it was over and so I would urge that Amendment #3, be defeated."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Yourell. Excuse me, Buz. Could we have a little order, please. Could we have some order, please. Thank you, please proceed."

Yourell: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Would the Gentleman yield for a question? Representative Griesheimer, we're on Amendment #3?"

Griesheimer: "That's correct."

Yourell: "Does that have the increase in the fees for fishing and hunting fees. Does that money go into to the.... I understand you said, the fish and game fund. Does that include the stocking program for the new fish hatchery?"

Griesheimer: "I'm sorry, I didn't catch the first...."

Yourell: "Does that revenue included, does that activity include stocking for the new fish hatchery, that we're talking about?"

Griesheimer: "You mean, building the fish hatchery?"

Yourell: "Yes."

Griesheimer: "Well, as I understand it the money in the fish and game fund can be used for the purpose of that very thing. Now, it's not earmarked only for that, because it would be unfair to the hunters if it all went to the fish hatchery but part of this money can be used to take care of the cost in paying off the necessary bonds to build the new fish hatchery."

Yourell: "No... no, thank you. I rise in support of Amendment #3, to House Bill 528. I don't know what happened downstate as far as the organization are concerned that either support or do not support this Amendment or the legislation

but I do know that three organizations that I belong to are supporting it, they have been advised of the contents of the Bill and certainly not the Amendments, but the Bill and they have all agreed by Resolution to support this Bill and I urge the adoption of Amendment #3, to House Bill 528."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Wolf."

Wolf: "Would the Sponsor yield to a question?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "He indicates he'll yield."

Wolf: "Mr. Griesheimer, I can't find Amendment #3, in my book but... Amendment #3, as I understood, it's #2; would increase the fishing license. Now, that I can understand because that money will go into a restocking program and possibly the new fish hatchery in Peoria and so forth. But, now when we get down to an increase in the hunting licenses or the deer permit, now we're into something else. Are they going to raise.... are they going to give us more deer to shoot, I don't understand what this money is going to be used for."

Griesheimer: "Well, if I can explain somewhat. The funds in the fish and game fund must be used only for bettering hunting conditions and fishing conditions for hunters and fishermen in our state. In the area of hunting and I want to refer to this Amendment #3, the various hunting groups and the Department of Conservation and the Illinois Wildlife Federation came to me and said, look... we know you have an increase in the fishing license, numerous hunters in our group are complaining about the bad facilities that we have in the State of Illinois and how they are handled. So, we don't have the funds to do anything to improve these. Would you consider adding increase for the hunting licenses because all this money is going to be going into the same fund and should be used equally thus there should be some proportion increase in the hunting license. The Amendment #2, was then prepared... in Amend-



47.

ment #2, there was proportional increases in all of the hunting licenses, the divisions or sub-divisions there of but somehow by error they failed to put in an increase in the general hunting license and all Amendment #3, does is bring Amendment #2, into uniformity so that we have all of the hunting license proportionally increased in the same manner that we have the fishing licenses increased. If we don't do this, Jake, what will happen is that the fish and game fund will be increased in size but it won't be getting equal amounts of money or even proportional amounts of money from the fisherman and the hunters and thus the hunters would be in affect getting an unfair advantage because they are not having to pay more while the fishermen are. If the Bill is funded at all, it would really have to go to both hunting and fishing licenses."

Wolf: "All right, one other fast question. Can you tell me what you mean by improving hunting facilities. Like I said before, I talked to some people of organizations that I belong to, they support the idea of the increased money for the fishing license and so forth because they can see where it is going. But, there is no way that they are going to give you two deer to shoot every year instead of one or anything else and if that is in Amendment #2, then I would like to be recorded as voting 'no' on Amendment #2, also, Mr. Speaker."

Griesheimer: "With regards to this particular question. All I can tell you is, that there are stocking programs in the area of hunting. Obviously they don't stock deer in the State of Illinois but they do stock many of the game birds, they stock pheasants, they stock prairie chickens, they stock all of these and develop them so that there is a money output there. Also, this money can be used for refuges it can be used for... for instance, taking care of the deer population over severe winters. We have a very good deer population now, I understand the best since about

1820, but with this number of deer comes more problems too. If we have a severe winter money has to be used from some source to keep these deer alive you're not going to have even one deer for a hunter to shoot. So, this is the type of thing this money can be used for and I think this is the reason that the hunters seem to feel that this is a legitimate Amendment."

Wolf: "Does this increase just the general hunting license or the deer permit?"

Griesheimer: "The deer permit was increased in Amendment #2..."

Wolf: "Okay, that is the one I want..."

Griesheimer: "That's right and this is... Amendment #3, deals only with the subject of the general hunting license."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Byers. Excuse me, could we have a little order in the chambers please. Could we have some order in the chamber please. Representative Byers."

Byers: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Yes, he indicates that he will."

Byers: "Representative Griesheimer, does the Governor support these increases?"

Griesheimer: "It is my understanding that the Governor adopts the concept of increasing user fees where we can show a direct benefit to the people who are using the facilities by paying higher fees."

Byers: "Then that would include the deer license fee and all the other hunting and fishing fees, the camp site fees and all those things."

Griesheimer: "All I can suggest to you is that I heard the State of the State speech as you did also and in that speech, he said unequivocally that he supported the concept of increasing user fees and I haven't personally talked to him on this but I would anticipate that there would probably be some degree of approval on this type of Bill. These Bills did not come from the administration



as such, these Bills were prepared prior to the Governor's State of the State speech. As you know, I introduced the fishing license Bill last term and I personally feel that we need these increases and pull Illinois out of the back woods ages of conservation to get better fishing and hunting in this state."

Byers: "Representative, now some of this money goes to our new fish and game.... new fish hatchery?"

Griesheimer: "We hope that it will. Here is the situation, the State of Illinois has not had a new fish hatchery in many many years there were plans started three years ago for a hatchery and they discovered that the Bill, the compensatory warm and cold water hatchery, it would cost about fifteen million dollars. If the bonds are issued for this we would have to pay them off, it seems logical to do this out of user fees rather than out of General Revenue Fund and thus it does appear that some of this money could be used to dispose of the bonds for the building of a new fish hatchery."

Byers: "It would seem to me that the State of Illinois with the financial crunch that it is at this time of the year, tightening of your belt, that it would be very out of line to build a fish hatchery. What kind of fish are they going raise there?"

Griesheimer: "Well, this fish hatchery, first of all would not be built by the General Revenue Fund so that it wouldn't cost the state any money along those lines. If it was done with bonds that would be paid off with these fees that we're talking about right now, the users of the benefits of the fishing hatchery would actually be paying for the new hatchery. So, there would be no monetary impact to the state. Understand clearly that they are not mandated to use these funds for fish hatchery in these Bills as it now stands. Now, what type of fish would be raised in this hatchery, would be the first hatchery in the State of



Illinois that would develop not only warm water fish but cold water fish, so that we would have everything from bass to bluegill, northern pike, walleyes through the cold water fish in the great lakes such as the salmon, trout and that sort of thing. This will in effect actually save the State of Illinois some money because at the present time, the two fish hatcheries cannot produce enough fish to maintain the demand of the fishermen in this state and we've been buying fish from out of state and paying rather exorbitant prices for them when they are available and on many cases, many cases they are not even available."

Byers: "Okay, thank you. I would like to address the Amendment. I do think that this Amendment at this time with the limited facilities that we have in certain areas for opportunity to fishing that this is certainly too high and I think that the people down my way, I haven't talked to anyone from any sportmans group or anything else that favors this so, I don't know where some of these groups are that have said that they are in favor of this. I would urge a 'no' vote on this Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Mulcahey."

Mulcahey: "Would the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "He indicates that he will."

Mulcahey: "Ron, how much money is going to be... how much additional revenue is going to be generated as results of this increase."

Griesheimer: "First of all we're talking only about the increase in Amendment #3."

Mulcahey: "Yes, Sir."

Griesheimer: "All right, that particular one hasn't been broken out separately. It is anticipated the total increase of revenue from the fishing license program alone will be somewhere around two million dollars. And then the hunting, I can't even give you any figures on that, I had

heard estimates of anywhere from two to three million dollars."

Mulcahey: "Did you indicate that there is nothing in this Amendment that will mandate the money to be spent... to be put back into the up grading of fishing and hunting. Is there any type of mandate in this Amendment that the money has to be spent there."

Griesheimer: "No, no, that's not what I said at all. The money must be put back into hunting and fishing...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Excuse me. Could we have a little order in the chamber, please. Will all unauthorized personnel remove themselves from the chamber. Doorkeeper, could we have a little order, please. Please proceed, thank you."

Mulcahey: "Ron, so if we do adopt this Amendment, we have a guarantee that all of this money generated is going to go back for the up grading of fishing and hunting conditions throughout the state. There will be none going for the Department of Conservation for acquisition of additional lands for the state parks or so on. It will all be for up grading... we have a guarantee that it will be for up grading of fishing and hunting conditions throughout the state."

Griesheimer: "Absolutely, this money goes only into the fish and game fund, it may only be used for that purpose and the legislature created the fish and game fund many years ago in order to guarantee this result."

Mulcahey: "Thank you, Sir."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Mudd."

Mudd: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this is probably one of the most important Amendments that we're going to get an opportunity to vote on. I have to agree with the comments made earlier by Representative Hart, I think that there may be a few organizations that supports this, who understand it but the majority of the people who utilize our conservation facilities oppose this. In

talking to members in the different sportsmen clubs around my area, they're opposed to any increases in fishing licenses or hunting licenses at this time so, I think that it is important.... this Amendment is very important and we should be very careful what we propose here. These rates are going... doubling and I think they are way out of line at this time."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Stuffle."

Stuffle: "Mr. Speaker and Members, as I rise to support the position just taken by the previous speaker on this Amendment to House Bill 528. In fact and indeed I have received nearly a hundred pieces of mail in opposition to this specific Amendment and proposal and indeed, yesterday received a petition with over a hundred and ten names on it. Strictly from rural area of my district that were collected in one day. The people in the district are opposed to this, they are opposed to it not only because it is an increase but because as I understand it, this more than triples the particular fee by this Amendment. I would hope that all the Members, particularly the down-state who have received the same sort of recognition of this bad Amendment and bad Bill would join me and oppose this Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Griesheimer, to close."

Griesheimer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "I'm sorry, Representative Waddell."

Waddell: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, to begin with I believe that you have to take a look at our state, you have to say to yourself, are we going to move ahead or are we going to push people up into Wisconsin, Minnesota; every place else that they can get the kind of things that they want. That very same individual many times resents paying any increase in the licensee..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Excuse me. Could we have a little order, please. Please proceed."



Waddell: "I can't name a one of us you would enjoy paying more in fees. I don't think there is a person around that just says, look take five bucks more of mine because I think that you deserve in this state for what you have to offer. But, I live in the part of the state where most people go up to Wisconsin and there is no need for it. I live in the part of the state that has pheasants and they cost money to replace after a severe winter such as we had last time. And, yet we sit here harping about a couple of bucks that these people are going to pay for a yearly licenses. A yearly licenses, at the same time that very same individual hitches his trailer to the back of the car, goes to Wisconsin, pays three times more to go up there... enjoys that sport up there and says, we don't have a darn thing in Illinois, what's wrong with the state. Well, I'll tell you there is nothing wrong with the state, what's wrong is that we here don't have the foresight to provide the funds so that we in the State of Illinois can be something. When they said they didn't know anybody that was for it, I submit to you that they haven't been reading their periodicals. Both the Isaac Walton League and the National Federation of Sportsmens are behind legislation such as this because they know that's where the future lies and I support the concept and suggest a favorable vote."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Kosinski."

Kosinski: "Mr. Speaker, we have several hundred Bills on Second Reading, if we devoted the equivalent amount of time to each Bill we'll be here until dooms day. I move the previous question."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Kosinski, moves the previous question. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed. The previous question has been moved. Representative Griesheimer, to close."

Griesheimer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. First of all let me clarify



one thing, by your vote on this Amendment you are not voting on the general Bill, this Amendment only clarifies Amendment #2, which generally increase the prices of our hunting licenses but omitted the most basic hunting license, thus it merely brings it into parallel conformance so you're not voting on the basic Bill here. But to those people who have spoken against this concept of increasing the hunting license. Let me point out to you that there is not a hunting constituent of yours that have contacted you that hasn't paid a minimum of seventy-five to a hundred dollars for their gun that they go out hunting with, a box of shells costs four to five dollars and he's buying several boxes of these through the hunting season. It seem ludicrous to say that a hunting license which has been three and not changed since 1957, in this state should not be increased somehow so we can perpetuate the hunting in this state. Now, Representative Waddell, touched the point of subject that is ever so important and should be more important to all of us. The State of Illinois has lived with its head in the sand for years with regards to one of the best industries around. That industry of tourism now tourism can be coming into this state to go to Marriott to go to Chicago, to go to one of the parks in Southern Illinois to go to Lincoln Shirne in this very city but, it also can mean coming into the State of Illinois to hunt, coming into the State of Illinois to fish and quite frankly people don't come here because the facilities are the dark ages at best. Now, every year when it comes to the end of the Session and we run out of money, we cut back the money in the Department of Conservation thus our facilities has been getting worse and worse. Every term I've been in this Legislation we always have people saying, don't increase that fishing license, that's unfair to the people. And thus we don't have any increases and the facilities keep getting worse, we lose the tourism and



those people that want to fish and hunt in this state have poorer and poorer facilities. Where do they go, like Representative Waddell suggested, they go to Wisconsin, they go to Michigan they go to Canada. Let's keep the people in this state let's bring people in from outside and develop more business and if someone can't afford seven dollars more for a hunting license then I suggest they sell their gun and buy food for their kids. Please vote for Amendment #3."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The question is, shall Amendment #3, be adopted. All those in favor say 'aye', all of the opposed. Roll Call has been requested. All those in favor will vote 'aye', all those opposed will vote 'nay'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wished? Representative Davis, to explain his vote. The timer is on."

Davis: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support of Amendment #3, to explain my 'aye' vote. I am a little bit shocked and dismayed at my colleague and friend and fellow sportsman, Representative Mudd, for opposing this Amendment because I don't think there is a sportsman in the State of Illinois who would not after twenty years support an increase in the hunting license fee to ten dollars for the purpose of restocking and refurbishing and replenishing our game supply. When sadly deteriorating moral problem exist in DOC today, we've got problems with all the fish and wildlife programs and there is not one sportsman, let me reiterate it, who will not substantiate and be delighted with this Amendment and I urge your 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 88 'ayes', 37 'nays' 6 recorded as 'present', the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 100, was called earlier, it was held for the purpose of a fiscal note. Fiscal



note has been filed... you want to call House Bill 100?"

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 100, the Bill has been read a second time previously."

Speaker Lechowicz: "A fiscal note has been filed, any questions? Third Reading. House Bill 192, Representative Terzich. House Bill 380, Representative Bradley. Bradley."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 380, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Election Code. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motion? Representative Bradley."

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions are filed."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, what Amendment #1, did in Committee was to provide that two members of the four member board be appointed by the Governor and two members from a... two members be appointed from a political party other than the Governor. It was to be appointed by the first state executive officer designated in the following list. What it meant was, that under this Bill, under the Amendment, two appointments would be made by the Secretary of State, Alan Dixon and I move to table the Amendment so that all four members shall be appointed by the Governor."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Bradley, moves to table Amendment #1. Any discussion? Representative Byers... on the Amendment, no. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed. Amendment #1, is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, Byers, amends House Bill 380, in the title in Section 1, by deleting 1A-3 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Byers. One moment, Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, there are three Bills presently before us addressing themselves to recreating the State Board of Elections. Mr.



Kempiners has a Bill on Second Reading..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Excuse me, Representative Bradley, Representative Byers, Amendment #2, he hasn't moved the adoption yet so let's....."

Bradley: "I want to make a motion on the Amendment, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Do you want to read the Amendment, Mr. Clerk, Amendment #2? Okay, proceed, Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "I make a motion to table all the rest of the Amendments that are on House Bill 380, Mr. Speaker. And the reason for making that motion is, we have three Bills as I was saying on the floor of the House relating to creating the Board of Elections or recreating the Board. Mr. Kempiners has a Bill that is in the shape that he wants it to be in. Mr. Robinson has had the privilege of having a Bill brought out of the Committee, put on the floor House and he amended it yesterday and that Bill is on the way that he would like to have it. And the Bill now with tabling Amendment #1, is in the shape that I would like to have it amended. I would make this suggestion and I would make this offer to the other two Members of the Body that have the two Bills. If they would agree, I certainly would and I make this suggestion, we put the Bills in the shape that their two Bills are in and the shape that 380 is in... the first time that we have the opportunity to go to Third Reading which would be tomorrow, that those Bills would be called at the same time in numerical order and let the House decide whether.... which Board they wish to go with. I don't think there is any fairer way to do that. I'm willing to take my chances on my board the way that I have recreated it in House Bill 380, without making any changes... substantive changes that would be placing my Bill some of the things they think are necessary. So, Mr. Speaker, I now renew my motion to table all the Amendments... further Amendments pertaining to House Bill 380."



Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Lucco."

Lucco: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House,
I rise to make an introduction."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Please proceed."

Lucco: "There is a fine group of students...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Point of order... point of order. Representative
Lucco."

Lucco: "There is a fine group of students here from Hubbard
High School, from Hubbard High School in Chicago which
come from the district represented by Representative
Madigan, Representative Beatty and Representative KucharSKI.
They are seated up here to my left I believe, in the gallery.
Glad to have you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Bradley asks leave of the House
to table Amendments #2 through 14, is there objections?
Objections being heard so let's take them one at a time.
Now, on Amendment #2... oh, I'm sorry, Representative
Bradley."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker, I made the motion and we can vote the
motion up or down and they will have their opportunity
at that time to express their objection but I think we
are entitled to a vote on the motion."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The question, Representative Bradley, is
you've got to have leave in order to move all of them
together."

Bradley: "Well..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The leave was not granted so...."

Bradley: "If somebody objected to taking them all at one time,
I didn't hear that objection. They objected... and we
can divide the question and there is no question about that...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "That is correct."

Bradley: "If that is what they are objecting to fine, I didn't
know that they objected to the motion. I was attempting
to save some time of the House."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Telcser. Oh, Representative



McBroom."

McBroom: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I see my old friend Dick Lockhart sitting in the gallery. Would you rise and be acknowledged, please?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Byers, on a point of order."

Byers: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I would like the Parliamentarian's ruling. I think that a person who has an Amendment should at least have the right to offer it. I have only been here three years but it is the first time I've heard of anything like this where you couldn't even discuss the Amendment. Where does the rule provide for that?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "We're exactly at that position presently, so proceed with Amendment #2."

Byers: "Okay."

Speaker Lechowicz: "And, Representative Bradley moved to table Amendment #2 and he asks leave to table 2 through 11. Leave was not granted so we're back on Amendment #2. Please proceed. Representative Byers, Amendment #2."

Byers: "Well, thank you, Mr. Speaker. Amendment #2, amends House Bill 380 and adds one member to the board. It has five members. They are confirmed by the Senate and it is similar to another Bill that we have on, Representative Kempiners is sponsoring. But it is set up for two members from the two leading political parties in the state and one additional member appointed also, And I would move for the adoption of Amendment #2, to House Bill 380."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Byers moves the adoption of House Bill 380..... Amendment #2, to House Bill 380. Representative Bradley, moves to table. On the question, Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker, before we move that position could I ask a question of the Sponsor of the Amendment?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "He indicates he will yield."

Bradley: "Harold, I couldn't hear your explanation of #2, of the Amendment #2, would you please explain what you're

attempting to do again and I will be more attentive."

Byers: "Okay. House Amendment #2, with the advice and consent of the Senate of the three-fifths members concurring, appoint a five member Board by which the Governor makes the appointments. The people that succeed the initial appointee...their term of office is five years. The members are from each of the two leading political parties, two Democrats and two Republicans in this case and one staff member that is appointed that would be.... that would be also confirmed by the Senate. This would be appointed by the Governor also and that is basically what this Amendment does."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, what Mr. Byers is attempting to do, if I understand it correctly; and he didn't explain who the fifth member was, he just said it was a fifth member. I don't know where the fifth member comes from. I hope in his Amendment that the two members of the Republican Party, two members of the Democrat Party are at least considered for a part of that Board. Now, I have no idea where he's coming up with the fifth member but I.... if he would respond, is it an Independent fifth member, sir, or who is it?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Like a fifth wheel. Please proceed, Representative Byers."

Byers: "Representative Bradley, the fifth member is a person that is unaffiliated with either of the two major political parties."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Bradley moves to table Amendment #2.... Oh, Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker, I now move to advance House Bill 380; to the Order of Third Reading. And I think that takes a simple majority, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Lechowicz: "That is correct. Representative Bradley moves to advance House Bill 380 to the Order of Third

Reading. On the question... Representative Byers, since you were on the...."

Byers: "Yes."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Byers."

Byers: "I move that the motion lie on the table."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Byers has moved... a motion by Representative Bradley, to advance this Bill to Third Reading lie on the table. Representative Houlihan, for what reason do you rise? Lie on the table... Representative Houlihan, for what reason do you rise?"

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker, a point of parliamentary inquiry. Is it provided within our rules that a Member move a Bill to Third Reading by a motion when there are Amendments still pending, when that Bill is the imperfect shape, when that Bill hasn't gone through the Second Reading process? I think that procedure, Representative Bradley, speaks ill of your legislative career."

Speaker Lechowicz: "I rule that the motion is out of order. Your motion is out of order. The Amendments are there, they have been filed, distributed and have to be dealt with. Representative Kosinski... we're on Amendment #2; Do you want to move to table, Jerry? Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker, I would like appeal that ruling. I don't want to appeal the ruling, I... under what rule you were referring to that my motion was not in order.... to move the Bill to Third Reading without reference... I mean to move it to Third Reading?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker, I withdraw my motion. Let's vote the Amendments up or down."

Speaker Lechowicz: "He would have to move to suspend Rule 34, to get what you wanted accomplished but I believe...."

Bradley: "Might I speak against the Amendment, Amendment #2 for I feel it provides for an Independent. And I don't know how you define an Independent, Mr. Speaker, and I urge the



Members to defeat the Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Terzich."

Terzich: "Mr. Speaker, I move the previous question."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The previous question has been moved. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed. The previous question prevails. Representative Bradley moves... Representative Byers moves the adoption of Amendment #2. Would you kindly close, Representative Byers."

Byers: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Now, I don't know where Jerry got the word independent, I didn't use it in my explanation of this. It says that he shall not have held party office or been a candidate in the primary of the nominee of elective office of any political party during the five years proceeding his appointment. He could be a former State Representative. He could be a former State Senator, a former Governor or anyone else that has not been active in a political appointee office primary for five years. And, I did not use the word independent. Representative Bradley is trying to use code words to defeat this Amendment. I would urge the adoption of this five member Board."

Speaker Lechowicz: "All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'nos' have it. Roll Call. Roll Call has been requested. All those in favor vote 'aye', all those opposed vote 'nay'. The board is open. Representative Collins to explain his vote. You've got one minute."

Collins: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of this Amendment... Really, I rise in support of the Bluthardt Amendment which is similar to this but will be better. But, I think it should be pointed out as Representative Byers attempted, This term independent has been bandying about very cleverly by the opponents of the five member board in an effort to scuttle the composition of a board in a truly workable



fashion. There is no measurable word independent, it is only that the fifth person will be unaffiliated with either major party. That is the only definition that is required on this Amendment or in the Bluthardt Amendment. I do think it is clever usage of the word but unfair. And I think opponents of this Bill should avoid twisting these words in an effort to kill meaningful legislation."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Kosinski."

Kosinski: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I'm voting 'no' not against the Amendment per se. I am voting to go against the principle. I understand there is several Bills that will be on this House floor and we'll have an opportunity to vote for a five member Board on another Bill. I think it is the prerogative of the Sponsor of the Bill to put his Bill in the condition that he wishes. If he wishes a four member Board, vote it up or down on Third Reading and vote for a five member Board. But, to make every Bill the same Bill doesn't make sense and it pleases me to vote 'no'."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Kempiners."

Kempiners: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I stand in support of the Amendment for obvious reasons. But I want to respond to some of the complaints that have been made. I received a letter from the city clerk of Decatur who pointed out that there are many many people in this state who are unaffiliated with a political party who know a lot about election laws and they happen to be city and village clerks who run elections. And I think that if there is any response to the problems that have been raised or the questions that have been raised about people not being affiliated with a party, not knowing anything about election laws, that letter wipes out that complaint. I feel that these people ought to be represented on this Board just as the partisan representatives are represented



on this Board through the partisan appointments. So, I urge a 'yes' vote for this Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Emil Jones."

Jones: "Yes, thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm voting 'no' on this measure because I haven't heard the true Independent stand up. And in my brief tenure in the House there has only been two true Independents, that's Taylor Pouncey and Pouncey Taylor. They are the only Independents that I know of that has served in this Body. Other individuals who call themselves Independent but one serves under the banner of the good Democratic organization but yet you couldn't pay him ten million dollar to run as a true Independent. So, if Taylor Pouncey votes for it, I'll vote for it."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Friedrich."

Friedrich: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I've been around quite awhile in this political thing and I don't know what an Independent is. He is certainly no help in making this country work because he doesn't enter into the political process in making the two party system work. And I think any... if you get an Independent on a five man Board, he's going to run the Board and you're not going to like it when you get it."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Kane."

Kane: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, to explain my vote. I don't have any problems with a five member Board or an Independent or socialist labor on there. I do object, however, to the fact with this Amendment that the fifth member would automatically be chairman. I think that that shouldn't be the case, that the person... the tie breaker should serve with the other members and take his turn as chairman with the others and should not automatically be the Chairman. And I urge a 'no' vote on this Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I rise



to oppose this Amendment also and I think Representative Friedrich put his finger right on the problem. What we do with a five member Board, one of whom is an Independent, is we deny the two party system. We may as well have a one member Board if we have a five member Board with the qualifications set forth in this Bill. Now, I suggest to you, Mr. Speaker, that to reward a person for not voting because indeed that's the only way you can determine an Independent...he may not have.... he or she may not have voted, that is an Independent, and to reward that person with the chairmanship of the Board of Elections is absolutely ridiculous. There is no way, Mr. Speaker, that we can have a Board consisting of five members, one of whom is an Independent. I urge your 'no' vote."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative James Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker, let me point out to Representative Jones that there are other members here which were defined and ran as Independents in the Legislature, some of our most respected Members. Representative Jones, that happens to be Representative Lechowicz. So you ought... so also you ought to remember Representative DiPrima. Now to speak to the merits of this Amendment...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Kindly see how we're recorded."

Houlihan: "Representative Walsh, I think you misunderstand the issue at hand. The issue is not the gobbledygook about the protection of the two party system. If you haven't looked at the voting statistics, there are a number of people who consider themselves Independent and vote that way in elections. Otherwise, you could not witness a general election where there may be a difference up to eight hundred thousand or a million votes between candidates of both parties. There are a number of people who want to participate in the election process, who do participate, who vote in general elections, who may not be active in party politics. The issue here is not the protection of the



two party system but rather a Board that can make decisions. If we opt for a four member board what we're really saying is, we're giving one party veto power over any decision, one geographic area veto power. What we're saying is we opt for a Board that will be deadlocked. A board which in effect will do nothing and which will violate the intent of the Constitution. Mr. Chair.... Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Independent Members, Democratic Members and Republican Members, I urge you to put a green light on this Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Bluthardt."

Bluthardt: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. The idea that an unaffiliated member cannot operate I think is preposterous. I think that it is just the opposite. There is no way in the world that a four member Board, consisting of two from each political party, is going to be able to operate the State Board of Elections. The State Board of Elections is for the people... all the voters of Illinois just... not just for the Democratic Party but the Republican Party. Let me remind you that there are more so-called unaffiliated or Independent voters than there are combined Democrats and Republicans in this state. Now, if this man is absolutely necessary they are going to have a workable State Board of Elections. And we're not talking about Independents anyhow, we're talking about a person who has not been affiliated with either political party in that he has not held political office....."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Bluthardt, would you bring your.... Representative Bluthardt..."

Bluthardt: "...Or candidate for office for the last five years. He can vote, he's allowed to vote, vote whatever party he wants but he just cannot have been a candidate or hold a political office for five years prior to the appointment as a fifth member of that Board. We ought to

recognize the wisdom of having a fifth member and forget the politics of this and remember that we're operating... we're trying to establish a Board for the entire State of Illinois, not just for the two political parties."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Matijevec."

Matijevec: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I guess I've been a part of politics for about twenty years and I still don't know what an Independent is and I really don't think that we ought to, in the law, put down that we're going to have an Independent on Board of Elections. As far as I'm concerned, the only reasons for having an Independent is for somebody running for office. If they choose not to run Democratic or if they choose not to run Republican, they'd be running as Independent or if they choose not to run under any other political party labels. But for us to think that those people that don't vote in a primary election are Independents, is a farce. That's a farce..... now, as far as I'm concerned, an Independent is someone that can't make up their mind. They can't make up their mind if they're Democrats, they can't make up their mind if they're Republicans and very often they want the best of two worlds. I recall a few years ago a young fellow wanted to run for the State Senate and this isn't Bill Morris, by the way, it was before that... and he ran and put on his literature, Independent Democrat. And I said to him, 'Who in the hell are you kidding? You want all of the Democrats to vote for you and you want some Republicans to vote for you too. If you're ashamed of being a Democrat, don't put it on your literature. If you're ashamed of being a Republican, don't put it on your literature, but don't try to fool anybody.' Now, we're trying to say that someone that can't make up their mind ought to be a Chairman and run it. Well, let's not be ridiculous."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative O'Brien."



O'Brien: "Mr. Chairman and Members of the House, I heard several Representatives indicate that they had an Independent posture here in the House of Representatives and that they were in favor of Independents like DiPrima like Taylor Pouncey..But I would like to point out to the Senior Member from the 13th District, Representative Houlihan, that he was saying something different when he ran for Ward Committeeman in the Democratic Party of Cook County in the City of Chicago."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Bradley. A point of personal privilege by Representative Jim Houlihan."

Houlihan: "A point of personal privilege, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Lechowicz: "State your point."

Houlihan: "Representative O'Brien, I have to respond. I did not say anything different when I ran for Ward Committeeman. I think everytime I have run for office I have ran straight forwardly as a Democrat who wants to be a Democrat, who happens to be independent of the organization at the time. Now, my interest in running for Ward Committeeman was opening up that organization and becoming a part of the Democratic process in the 43rd Ward. Unfortunately the voters saw it differently and I congratulate you on a successfully...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "State your point, please."

Houlihan:"..Campaign, I think you did a good job. I think now it is incumbent upon you to listen to the voters and I can tell you, Dan, many of them want this Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Emil Jones on a point of personal privilege."

Jones: "Yes, thank you, Mr. Speaker. Since my name was mentioned in debate and I reiterate what I said earlier, there has been only one pure Independent that was elected to office and that was Taylor Pouncey. All the rest ran in a Democratic primary, but Taylor Pouncey did not run in a Democratic primary he ran without party label. So, perhaps he can



tell us what a true Independent really is."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Catania, to explain her vote."

Catania: "Well, since the other two candidates.... Committeemen in that race has spoken, I thought I would point out what the third candidate said. She was Elizabeth Bracket and she said that she wasn't just one of the boys."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Careful, Suzie. Representative Skinner, to explain his vote."

Skinner: "I'm waiting for someone to stand up and suggest that the only good Independent is a dead Independent. That's about the tone of the discussion in the Session this morning. Couldn't we just take the record and verify it and get it over with?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Bradley. Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker, if this Amendment is adopted I will ask for verification."

Speaker Lechowicz: "All those wishing to vote.... The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 89 'ayes', 76 'nos' none recorded as 'present'. Representative Bradley request a verification. Representative Waddell, for what purpose do you rise?"

Waddell: "Mr. Speaker, for the purpose of an introduction. Virgil and Grace, Bill and Mary Wikoff represented by Representative Bennett Tipsword and Dunn. The other one, Wayne Buxton and Patty Buxton, represented by Representative Johnson, Wikoff and Satterthwaite."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Byers requests a poll of the absentees. The Clerk will call the absentees."

Clerk O'Brien: "Antonovych, Ralph Dunn, Dyer, Ewell, Hoffman, Katz, Kelly, Kornowicz, Kucharski, Marovitz, Peggy Smith Martin, Satterthwaite... that's all."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Houlihan, for what reason do you rise?"



Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker, to assist Representative Bradley in getting his verification. In moving the House quickly, I would urge that every Member be in their seat. It is clear that this Amendment is won and we might as well move quickly with the verification."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Would everybody kindly be in your own seat? Will all unauthorized personnel remove themselves from the chamber? The Clerk will proceed with the verification."

Clerk O'Brien: "Abramson, Adams, Anderson, Jane Barnes, Bartulis..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Ladies and Gentlemen, would you kindly sit down... in the process of verification? A point of order has been raised. Thank you, please proceed."

Clerk O'Brien: "Bennett, Bluthardt, Bowman, Byers, Campbell, Catania, Chapman, Collins, Conti..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Bradley, for what purpose do you rise?"

Bradley: "I can't see. There are people standing in the Republican aisle, I can't see the people behind them. I can't tell if they are here or not."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Will all unauthorized persons remove themselves from the chambers? Would the Members kindly be in their seats? Please proceed."

Bradley: "Who was before Conti?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Cunningham, Daniels, Jack Davis, Deavers, Deuster, John Dunn, Ebbesen, Edgar, Epton, Ewing, Friedland, Gaines, Geo-Karis, Getty, Griesheimer, Holewinski, Jim Houlihan, Hoxsey, Hudson, Huskey, Jaffe, Johnson, Dave Jones, Keats, Kempiners, Kent, Klosak, Lauer, Leinenweber, Levin, Macdonald, Madison, Mahar, Mann, Lynn Martin, McAuliffe, McAvoy, McBroom, McCourt, Meyer, Miller, Molloy, Mugalian..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Excuse me. Representative Molloy was the last one... would you go a little slower? Proceed."

Clerk O'Brien: "Molloy, Mugalian, Neff, Peters, Polk, Porter, Pullen, Reed, Reilly, Rigney, Robinson, Ryan, Sandquist, Schneider, Schoeberlein, Sevcik, Sharp, Simms, Skinner,



Stanley, Stearney, Steczo, E.G. Steele, C.M. Stiehl,
Sumner, Telcser, Totten, Tuerk, Waddell, Wall, Wikoff,
Willer, Winchester and Wolf."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any question of the Affirmative Roll Call?
Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Winchester."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Is Representative.... how is Representative
Winchester recorded?"

Clerk O'Brien: "The Gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Is Representative Winchester, in the chamber?
Take him off the record."

Bradley: "Sumner."

Speaker Lechowicz: "How is he recorded? How is Representative
Sumner, recorded?"

Clerk O'Brien: "The Gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Is Representative Sumner, in the chamber?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Lady."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Oh, I'm sorry, she is there. Representative
Bradley."

Bradley: "Simms."

Speaker Lechowicz: "How is he recorded?"

Clerk O'Brien: "The Gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Is Representative Simms, in the chamber?"

Take him off the record."

Bradley: "Sharp."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Sharp, how is he recorded?"

Clerk O'Brien: "The Gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Is the Gentleman in the chamber? Take him
off the record."

Bradley: "McAuliffe."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Geo-Karis... just one moment.

For what reason do you seek recognition? Representative
Geo-Karis asks leave to be recorded... to be verified."

Bradley: "Certainly. McAuliffe."

Speaker Lechowicz: "And return Representative Sharp to the Roll



Call. Representative McAuliffe, how is he recorded?"

Clerk O'Brien: "The Gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Is the Gentleman in the chamber? Take him off the record."

Bradley: "Mann."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Mann, how is he recorded?"

Bradley: "He's on the other side, I see him now."

Speaker Lechowicz: "He's here."

Bradley: "Klosak."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Klosak, how is he recorded?
He's seated in his chair."

Bradley: "Edgar."

Speaker Lechowicz: "He's here."

Bradley: "Ebbesen."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Ebbesen, how is he recorded?"

Bradley: "I see him now, Sir."

Speaker Lechowicz: "He's in his chair."

Bradley: "Daniels."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Daniels, how is he recorded?"

Clerk O'Brien: "The Gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Is the Gentleman in the chamber? Take him off the record."

Bradley: "J. Davis."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Davis, he's in his chair."

Bradley: "Was Bennett, here?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "I'm sorry, who?"

Bradley: "Bennett's here. Anderson."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Anderson, how is he recorded?"

Bradley: "I see him."

Speaker Lechowicz: "He's here."

Bradley: "That's all, Sir."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Matijevec, for what purpose do you rise?"

Matijevec: "Mr. Speaker, I thought, you know, we're going to have so many of these verifications. I thought maybe a



different policy... we always have the Clerk go through a whole reading of the green lights for example. Why doesn't the Clerk give the Roll Call sheet to the person verifying leave that person go down that list and to verify as he calls the names and we could save a little more time if he did it that way? Think about that.... the person reading.... asking for the verification, we go through it a couple of times the way that we do it. But, think about that, Ted, and I think we'll save a lot of time."

Speaker Lechowicz: "We don't have duplicates, you know, but it is a good idea. Representative Daniels is back, kindly put him back on the Roll Call. Representative Winchester has returned... put him back on the Roll Call. I don't believe.... Representative Hoffman... Representative Hoffman wants to be recorded as 'aye'. Hoffman, Gene Hoffman. Representative Simms is back, put him back on the Roll Call. Representative Schneider, for what purpose do you seek recognition?"

Schneider: "Have you made the announcement yet?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "No, we're waiting for the results from the Clerk. On this question there are 89 'ayes', 76 'nays', none recorded as 'present'. The Amendment is adopted. Representative Schneider."

Schneider: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, having voted on the prevailing side by which Amendment #2, to House Bill 380 was adopted I move that we reconsider the vote."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Jaffe."

Jaffe: "I move that the motion lie on the table, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Schneider, moves to reconsider the vote, seconded by Representative Jaffe, move to lie on the table. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', those opposed. The motion to reconsider is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3, Kempiners...."



Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Cunningham, for what purpose do you seek recognition?"

Cunningham: "Mr. Speaker, I want to make a parliamentary inquiry. I thought that the distinguished leader from McLean, got short shrift on his motion to advance to Third Reading, I've carefully read Rule 34, there is no basis whatever overruling the motion, it's an innovative approach, it would save a great deal time if the Sponsor of the Bills were permitted to do so, just say that we move it on to Third even though the Amendments have been distributed. The group would have a chance to vote, if you're looking for a time saver as the sage from Lake County noted a moment ago, it would seem that this is a good place to begin. Would the Speaker reexamine his thinking in the matter, perhaps an error was made in prior ruling."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Speaker at the time indicated that he could have moved to suspend Rule 34. He asked leave and the leave was not granted. He did not make the motion to suspend Rule 34. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3, Kempiners, Byers. Amends House Bill 380, in the title and in Section 1 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Kempiners, on Amendment #3. Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Well, the Gentleman from Lawrence brings up an excellent point, Mr. Speaker and Amendment #2 has been adopted. I now move to suspend Rule 34, so that we may move that 380, to Third Reading, so I move to suspend Rule 34."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Bradley, moves to suspend Rule 34, so that this Bill can be advanced to Third Reading without consideration of any further Amendments. Is there... objections have been raised. The question is on the Gentleman's motion, it takes 89 votes. All those in favor will vote 'aye', all those opposed will vote 'no'. Representative Jim Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I urge every



Member to vote 'no' on this particular motion. This motion is a first step encroaching on every individual Member's right to have a subject matter brought up on Second Reading. It is a violation of every Member's integrity in representing his constituents. I think it's grossly irresponsible and I think it ought to be soundly defeated."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Peters."

Peters: "Mr. Speaker, in an effort to save time, I think what's happening here and what is going to end up happening should that motion pass, is we're going to end up seeing the same kind of motions being made and... and verifications and wasting two days on what is supposed to be a time saving thing, it's nonsense."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Kempiners. Representative Ewell."

Ewell: "Mr. Speaker, I have a point of order to make. It is my understanding that we have a daily order of business in our rules and could you inform me as to when the order of motions are in order. It is my understanding that it is number 18, which would come sometime after Conference Committee Reports and sometime before the Consent Calendar. Would not motions of this type be out of order? I mean, wouldn't we also have to suspend the daily order of business?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "According to the Parliamentarian, not if it is incidental to the Bill or to the proceeding before the House on a different order. Representative Bradley... have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Representative Collins, do you want to explain your vote? Representative Simms."

Simms: "Well, personally I think every Member of House ought to be voting 'no' on this issue because of the precedents that it is setting and I couldn't agree with Representative Houlihan more. We have approximately two and a half weeks



left to do the business of the House and if we start establishing precedents like this, we're going to have some very serious consequences."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Bradley. Bradley."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I was only doing it at the suggestion of the Gentleman from Lawrenceville in an attempt to speed up the operation. We obviously lost the motion, let's go back to Amendment #3."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 53 'ayes', 83 'nos', none recorded 'present'. The Gentleman's motion fails. Now, Amendment #3.... Representative Cunningham, for what purpose do you arise?"

Cunningham: "Mr. Speaker, with permission of my distinguished leader, it is my honor to introduce one of the most outstanding delegations who will ever be before this House, from Unit 10, in Lawrence County in the rear balcony, please stand... ably represented by Brummer, O'Daniel and the other fellow. Stand up from Unit 10, please. Welcome them appropriately."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Peters, for what purpose do you arise?"

Peters: "Mr. Speaker, I have no real objections to anyone being introduced but I would hope that the Members as well as the Chair would be careful that in making those introductions we make them after the business of the House on a particular Bill has been ended. It is very disconcerting for people to get involved in the debate and then have someone get up and make an introduction and destroy whatever point you might have wanted to make. I think that's unfair."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Your point is well taken. Amendment #3."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3, Kempiners, Byers. Amends House Bill 380, in the title and in Section 1 and so forth."



Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Kempiners."

Kempiners: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment #3 simply adds to the Bill that the member to the board, compensation is to be two hundred dollars a day for each day a member attends a board meeting up to twenty-two thousand dollars a year. It basically provides for a ceiling on how much a board member can earn and the reason for this is that we've seen some abuse of the current system whereby a board member of two would be spending a lot more time up in the day to day operation of the board than is really necessary and this provides a ceiling of twenty-two thousand with two hundred dollars a day, up to that point. And, I would urge its adoption, I really don't see where this is all that controversial Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker, I urge that we adopt the Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any further discussion? Question? Representative Kempiners, moves the adoption of Amendment #3. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', those opposed. Amendment #3, is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #4, Kempiners, Byers. Amends House Bill 380, in the title and inserting immediately after Act, the following."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Kempiners."

Kempiners: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Amendment #4, allows the board to appoint a director as a chief executive officer with the salary of twenty-five to thirty-five thousand dollars and I would ask for the adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, the salary seems a little high to me but if that's what Mr. Kempiners wants... I'll support the Amendment and then I know he will support the Bill when we call it on Third Reading."



Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative Kempiners, moves the adoption of Amendment #4. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all opposed. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed. The Chair is... we'll open up the vote. All those in favor vote 'aye', all those opposed vote 'nay'. Have all voted that wished? Have all vote that wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 71 'ayes', 23 'nays', 4 voting 'present', the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #5, Kempiners, Byers. Amends House Bill 380, in the title and inserting immediately after Act the following and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Kempiners."

Kempiners: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this provides that the Executive Director could issue subpoenas at the insistence of the board. That means that the board would have to be the one to order him to issue those subpoenas and I would urge an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "We'll support Representative Kempiners motion... again reminding him, you know, we'll put the Bill in this shape and when it comes up to Third Reading we know that we will have his support."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any other discussion? Representative Kempiners moves the adoption of Amendment #5. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed. Amendment #5, is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #6, Kempiners, Byers. Amends House Bill 380, in the title and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Kempiners, Amendment #6."

Kempiners: "Amendment #6, I would move to table, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman moves to table Amendment #6.

Is there leave, leave being granted, Amendment #6, is tabled.



Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #7, Kempiners, Byers. Amends House Bill 380 in the title and Section 1 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Kempiners, Amendment #7."

Kempiners: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. We have found that there have been abuses with regard to the hiring of consultants and this would put a restriction on the boards use. They must be hired by a vote under contract not exceeding sixty days with one thirty day extension and the same consultant cannot be employed more than once per year and I would move for the adoption of Amendment #7."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, we support Amendment #7."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Dan Houlihan. Any further discussion? Representative Kempiners, moves the adoption of Amendment #7. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed. Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #8, Kempiners, Byers. Amends House Bill 380, in the title and in Section 2, and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Kempiners."

Kempiners: "Amendment #8, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, repeals current language in the State Board of Election Act, creating the position of Chief Clerk and the reason that I am deleting that is because we adopted Amendment #4, which provides for the appointment a Director as Chief Officer and I would move adoption of Amendment #8."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Again, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, we'll support wholeheartedly Amendment #8."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any further discussion? Representative Kempiners moves the adoption of Amendment #8. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed. Amend-



ment #8, is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #9, Kempiners, Byers. Amends House Bill 380 in the first sentence of Section 1A-3 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Terzich, for what reason do you seek recognition?"

Terzich: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, is this Kempiners', Byers' Bill or is this Representative Bradley's Bill?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "I believe that Representative Bradley is the Sponsor of this Bill. Representative Kempiners on Amendment #9."

Kempiners: "This is my last Amendment, Mr. Speaker and I will move that it be tabled."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Kempiners moves that Amendment #9, be tabled. Is there leave? Amendment #9 is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #10, Bluthardt. Amends House Bill 380, in the title and Section 1 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Bluthardt, on Amendment #10."

Bluthardt: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, those who opposed Amendment #2, they'll find that Amendment #10 is much more palatable. What it does is provide that the fifth member must be confirmed by both the Senate and the House instead of only by the Senate and I think this is a little more assurance that the man appointed as a so-called unaffiliated member will be more acceptable to the General Assembly and I would move for the adoption of Amendment #10."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker, in light of the fact that we did adopt Amendment #2, I would ask that the Parliamentarian check Amendment #2 with Amendment #10 and see if it is in the proper order."

Speaker Lechowicz: "He is in the process of doing that right now. Any further discussion? There has been a question



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raised of whether Amendment #10, is germane... in order on the House Bill 380, with the adoption of Amendment #2. We're waiting to have an opportunity to read both. Representative Bluthardt."

Bluthardt: "Mr. Speaker, my understanding is that #2 would be tabled if #10 is adopted. Further, it is not unusual that we have two sections that amend a Bill. In other words we would have two Sections 14-2, I believe. But at any rate, my understanding is that the Sponsor of Amendment #2 will move to table his Amendment, provided that Amendment #10, is adopted and I think those of you who are opposed at 2, certainly should be voting for #10 because it is going to reduce the effect of that member, that fifth member, that so-called Independent. I wanted to point out too, that Amendment #10 only gives that Independent a vote in case of a tie. That way the four partisan members will do everything in their power to reach an agreement so that the Independent will not be casting the deciding vote."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The problem, Representative Bluthardt, is Amendment #2 was locked in by Representative Schneider and Jaffe and Amendment #10 is in conflict with.... what we can do is amend the Amendment on its face. Amend the Bill as amended and file the Amendment.... Why do we get back to you, Ed? Get over here and talk to Epstein. Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker, if that is the Parliamentarian's reply to my request, if it's a conflict and it seems in his opinion it is definitely a conflict... there is a conflict. Ed, we've tried to move this thing along and accepted all these Amendments. Why don't you table your Amendment and we'll go on with the next Amendment? I'm not trying to be an obstructionist or anything, I think we can move it along.... let's go ahead and get the job done."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Houlihan."



Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker, in order to save the time of the House, I think that maybe Representative Bradley, has a good suggestion. Maybe we would hold this Bill on Second Reading and we could get the Amendment in order then we could just move on and adopt the Amendment when it is made in order with Amendment #2, which was adopted."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Well, actually all you have to do is give us three minutes, we'll have the Amendment prepared. If with leave of the House, if it doesn't have to be distributed we can move on it that way. Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I appreciate Representative Houlihan's suggestion. However, House Bill 380 was on Second Reading for about six weeks and they have had every opportunity to prepare those Amendments in the proper form and I would like to move that Bill to Third Reading and go ahead with the Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Bluthardt."

Bluthardt: "Mr. Speaker, I understand that if he'll hold this for two minutes, take it out of the record, we'll have an Amendment ready in about ten, fifteen minutes. If he will do that."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Bradley... Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "If he's asking me to do that and I certainly respect Mr. Bluthardt, let's move the Bill to Third Reading right now and when he gets the Amendment prepared, I'll bring it back to Second Reading if he will agree to do that."

Speaker Lechowicz: "That's fine. Representative Bluthardt."

Bluthardt: "No objection to that, I take Jerry's word and he's a man of honor. It is all right with me."

Speaker Lechowicz: "There is no objection to that..."

Bradley: "Fine, let's go ahead. Fine."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Are there any further Amendments? Representative Bluthardt moves to table Amendment #10. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed. Amendment #10, is tabled. Any further Amendments?"



Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #11, Robinson. Amends House Bill 380, by deleting title and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Robinson."

Robinson: "I move to table Amendment #11."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Robinson, moves to table Amendment #11. Is there leave? Amendment #11, is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #12, Bluthardt. Amends House Bill 380, in the title and inserting 1A-7 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Bluthardt asks leave to table Amendment #12. Leave granted. Amendment #12 is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. May I point out to the Sponsor of House Bill 380, a request for a fiscal note has just been filed by Representative Skinner. I will have to bring it back to Second Reading and hold it on.... it was filed with the Clerk, he just brought it to my attention. Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "I'm asking a question of the Chair, is that fiscal note applicable to this Bill?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker, there is an appropriation Bill for the State Board and I think that is where the fiscal note should be applied and not to the substantive Bill creating the board."

Speaker Lechowicz: "I agree with you and I don't believe a fiscal note is applicable at this time."

Bradley: "Thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 192, Representative Terzich... no, on Second Reading. No, 380 is on Third Reading. House Bill 192, Representative Terzich will handle the Bill for Representative Kornowicz. Representative Skinner, on a point of order."

Skinner: "Well, my light was on while you were discoursing with



Representative Bradley about how this couldn't possibly be a Bill that would cost the state any money, so of course there would be no fiscal implication. I would suggest if that is inconsistent with past rulings that the Chair has made. This Bill will create a new agency and the agency certainly cannot cost nothing."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Skinner, I believe Representative Bradley pointed out quite vividly that there is an appropriation request for the State Board of Elections and that money is contained in that Bill for this purpose."

Skinner: "One should certainly point out quite vividly the budget of the Board of Elections also, which is multi-million and entirely....."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Matijevich on a point of order."

Matijevich: "A point of order, only thing that he can do is appeal the ruling. But he's quiet now, thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "House Bill 192; Representative Terzich for Representative Kornowicz."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 192, a Bill for an Act in relation to conducting of raffles and chances by certain non-profit organizations. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, 2, 3 and 4, were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any additional Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #5, Ralph Dunn. Amends House Bill 192, on page 4, by inserting between line 2 and 3, the following and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Is Representative Dunn, here? Ralph Dunn. Anyone wishing to handle the Amendment for Representative Dunn? Representative Peters."

Peters: "Mr. Speaker, I believe Representative Dunn is on his way to the hospital. I'm not sure whether this is a Committee Amendment or not."



Speaker Lechowicz: "No, it is not, it is a floor Amendment. We'll take it out of the record temporarily. Representative Terzich... wait, how many more Amendments are on this Bill? We'll put it at Third.... we'll move the Bill to Third and bring it back to Second when Representative Dunn, comes back. House Bill 192, is moved to Third Reading. House Bill 364, Representative Totten. Has the Amendments been distributed, 364? Amendments have been distributed. Representative Totten, House Bill 364."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 364, a Bill for an Act in relation to the number of judges of elections. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendment from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Oh.... wait a minute. Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee. This Bill is in the Third Reading previously and there has been an Amendment, #1, adopted. It is now back on Second Reading. Amendment #1, was adopted previously."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any further Amendments? Representative Totten."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment by Representative Giglio, that is incorrectly numbered, Amendment #1, should be Amendment #2, now. Amends House Bill 346, on page 1, by deleting line..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Hold it, we're on 364. Representative Totten, has filed Amendment #2. Do you want to explain the Amendment, Representative Totten."

Totten: "Yes. Amendment #2, was suggested in the Committee to exempt county wide elections from the applicability of the three judges by the Democratic staff and I agree to that and the Amendment #2, does that and I would move its adoption."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative Totten, moves the adoption of Amendment #2. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed. Amendment #2, is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."



Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 368, Representative Griesheimer. Is he in the chamber? House Bill 346, Representative Giglio. Have the Amendments been distributed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Yes, they have."

Speaker Lechowicz: "House Bill 346."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 346, a Bill for an Act to amend the Election Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Are there any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Giglio. Amends House Bill 346, and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Giglio, on Amendment #1."

Giglio: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment #1, is a clean up Amendment to House Bill 346. What this Bill does, according to election law, anybody that went to the hospital, got sick within the five day period after the application for absentee ballot has no right to vote. So, what this Bill does is that if taken to the hospital after that five day period, you have a right to vote and when it was written up the County Clerk had to deliver the ballot and pick it up, this and that and it was too much of a burden and financial responsibility for the County Clerk, so what we're doing with this Amendment the elector has to get a slip signed by the doctor, he designates anyone to go down with a written proposal or form. Go to the County Clerks office, pick up the ballot, go back to the hospital, have the person vote and have that person deliver the ballot back to the County Clerk within the proper time. So, nobody would be denied the right to vote if they so desire. If there are any questions I would be happy to answer, if not I would ask for a favorable vote."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative Giglio, moves the adoption of Amendment #1. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed. Amendment #1, is adopted."



Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. May I make an announcement, it is the intent of the Chair to recess for one hour, from the hour of 12:30 to 1:30, for lunch and hopefully that the Membership will please be prompt in returning at the hour of 1:30. But it is the intent of the Chair to recess at 12:30 for an hour. It has been pointed out by the Clerk that a fiscal note has been requested on 192, the fiscal note was not filed, it was improperly advanced to Third Reading and for that reason I'm bringing House Bill 192, back to Second Reading till the fiscal note Act is complied with. Representative Schneider, on House Bill 526... Representative Capparelli on 535... Representative Younge, on House Bill 560... Mrs. Younge. Representative Giglio... Mrs. Younge, has the floor."

Younge: "I don't believe...."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 560, a Bill for an Act to establish the Illinois Community Development Finance Corporation. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions? Oh wait, has the fiscal note been complied with?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No, the fiscal note has not been filed."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Take it out of the record. Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "How was this any different than the fiscal note that I requested on the Board of Elections Bill. The expenditures would be governed by an appropriation. I mean, a fiscal note has to mean something or it doesn't mean anything."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Well, I don't know where the Appropriation Bill is at."

Skinner: "Well, certainly there would be no money spent if there were no appropriation Bill. I'm just asking for equal treatment for everyone, that's all."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Well we're trying to give it to you Cal, but I...."

Skinner: "I know you tried to give it to me and you succeed usually."

Speaker Lechowicz: "And we'll continue to do so."

Skinner: "I'm sure you will."

Speaker Lechowicz: "House Bill 562, Representative Chapman. Would you care to call that Bill at this time? 562."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 562, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Local Library Act. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any additional Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2, was withdrawn in Committee and floor Amendment #3, Chapman, amends House Bill 562, on page 2, line 1 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Chapman."

Chapman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Amendment #3, was suggested in Committee and as a result of that I had this Amendment drafted. The Bill and the Amendment responds to a double taxation problem that occurred in the northwest suburbs and other parts of the state where people are double taxed for library services and I move to adopt Amendment #3."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative Chapman, moves the adoption of Amendment #3. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed. Amendment #3, is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. On House Bill 563, a fiscal note has been filed. Have the Amendments been distributed? House Bill 563, Representative Chapman."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 563, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Public Aid Code. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."



Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions."

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any additional Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2 and 3, failed in Committee. Floor Amendment #4, Keats, amends House Bill 563, on page 1, by inserting the following immediately before Section 2."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Has Amendment #4, been distributed? I'm sorry Amendment #4, has not been distributed we will have to take the Bill out of the records at this time. House Bill 607.... Representative Mugalian, for what purpose do you rise?"

Mugalian: "A point of information, Mr. Speaker. I wonder if the Speaker, can disclose what plans he has, if any for this evening. That is whether or not we'll break for dinner or if not, what time we may recess."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Let me just point out to you that we'll be breaking from 12:30 to 1:30, for lunch. I'm sure that the Speaker will give us some indication approximately 3:00 or 3:30, what his intentions are for the rest of the afternoon as well. Representative Schneider, do you want to go.... House Bill 526, have the Amendments been distributed? House Bill 526, Representative Schneider."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 526, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Governmental Ethics Act. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions have been filed."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any additional Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, Schneider. Amends House Bill 526, on page 1, line 31 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Schneider."

Schneider: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, there is a conflict with that Amendment, I move that it be tabled."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Schneider, moves to table

Amendment #2, Does he have leave? Leave being granted, Amendment #2, is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #3, Schneider. Amends House Bill 526, on page 1, line 31, by changing twenty thousand dollar to thirty thousand dollars and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Schneider."

Schneider: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Amendment #3, changes the present dollar figure for which individuals must report. Those individuals being policemen, firemen, teachers and employees on boards being remunerated for less than a thousand dollars. I move for its adoption."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Is there any discussion on Amendment #3? Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Excuse me, but are you saying... would you repeat the contents of the Amendment again."

Schneider: "It changes from twenty to thirty thousand dollars the amount by which, you know the threshold at which point you must report if you are a teacher, a fireman or a policeman or a board member who may receive less than one thousand dollars in remuneration."

Skinner: "You mean like a zoning board member?"

Schneider: "That is correct, I believe that is in the first Amendment which was adopted in Committee."

Skinner: "And a teacher, fireman or a policeman can actually be earning over thirty thousand dollars."

Schneider: "Up to thirty, that is correct."

Skinner: "How much do you earn?"

Schneider: "Twenty thousand dollars as a Legislator, you can check records on the side... not thirty thousand dollars though."

Skinner: "Over twenty and under thirty."

Schneider: "As a teacher less than twenty."

Skinner: "This Bill is getting worse and worse."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Friedrich."

Friedrich: "That thousand dollar part was in one of my Bills



and I just wanted to support it now."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Hoffman."

Hoffman: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I rise in support of the Amendment. This is going to save county clerks and school people and other people who are in this condition a great deal of time, a great deal of effort and a great deal of money just for paper. As a school teacher, I earn an excess of twenty thousand dollars and I'm not even paid half of what I'm worth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mrs Martin. Representative Martin."

Martin: "Mr. Speaker, the Subcommittee that brought the Amendment in this Bill out to the full Committee, recommended twenty thousand dollars with the feeling that perhaps not in Chicago or the wealthy suburbs around the state but that is a considerable sum of money. And that anyone that makes more than that amount of money should rightly be under the Act. It.... thirty thousand dollars is a lot of money and I think we file a twenty thousand. I think this Amendment should be defeated and we should keep the twenty thousand dollars as the top..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any further discussion? Representative Schneider, to close."

Schneider: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members. The Clerk...and of course he supported this proposal and discussed with the Secretary of State the problems of collecting the forms that involve public employees was not only a frivolous effort but dealt not at all with the question of conflict. So, number one, we're dealing with a request from the clerk who realize that paper work does nothing but just fill up their shelves and does not really attack the the problem of conflict. I think I foresee us as in conflict or potentially. in conflict with Legislators and I have no problem with reporting, but when you're asking a fireman or a policeman who is making possibly over twenty thousand dollars to file and go through that process at the



ludicrous request so, I suggest that we adopt this Amendment and then proceed with the Bill out of the House on Third Reading."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Schneider, moves the adoption of Amendment #3. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed. All those in favor will vote 'aye', all those opposed will vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 35 'ayes', 13 'nays', 1 recorded as 'present'. The Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #4, Schneider."

Schneider: "One more time. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I move that Amendment #4, be tabled it is in conflict with #3."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Schneider, moves to table Amendment #4, leave granted. Amendment #4, is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. Representative Steele, on House Bill 621. Have the Amendments been distributed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 621, a Bill for an Act concerning Public Utilities. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was tabled in Committee. Amendment #2, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions?"

Steele: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I would like to table Amendment #2 and offer Amendment #3, in its place."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? The Gentleman moves to table Committee Amendment #2, is there any discussion? Representative Dan Houlihan. All right, there being no discussion, the Gentleman asks leave to table Amendment Committee Amendment #2. Leave being granted Committee Amendment #2, is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #3, Steele. Amends House Bill 621, by striking line 8 and so forth."

Steele: "Yes, I would like to move for the adoption of Amendment #3, which is concurred in by Chairman Caldwell of the Committee. It makes several technical changes and it more accurately reflects the intent of the Committee and I urge approval of Amendment #3."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion on Amendment #3? Representative Steele, moves the adoption of Amendment #3, to House Bill 621. On the question Representative Dan Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Parliamentary inquiry as to the form of the Amendment. There are no Section numbers in the Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Steele."

Steele: "I'm advised that this just adds to the existing Sections so it just falls within that one Section of the Bill. It is the same as Amendment #2, just makes a couple of technical changes and better reflect the Committee..."

Houlihan: "But I think Amendment #2, also is technically incorrect. If he could just take this.... would you mind taking this one out of the record and we'll try to resolve it, right here."

Steele: "All right."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Steele, I believe that the Amendment is not in proper order, I advise you to take it out of the record."

Steele: "All right and we'll come back."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Thank you. Request has been made that the Channel 5, requested to have some filmage of the chambers, request is granted. They took House Bill 621, was taken out of the record. House Bill 644, Representative Mudd. Has the Amendments been distributed, Mr. Clerk? Representative Mudd, on House Bill 644."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 644, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the School Construction Bond Act. Second reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted previously and the Bill was held on Second Reading. Amendment #2, Mudd. Amends House bill 644, on page 2, line 5 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Mudd."

Mudd: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Amendment #2, I held this on Second Reading for purpose of discussing this Bill with the Members of the House and agreed to Amendment #2, which I think is better language for the Bill. It doesn't change any of the amounts or anything and I would just ask for a favorable vote on Amendment #2."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative Mudd, moves that Amendment #2, be adopted. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed. Amendment #2, is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendmetns."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. Representative Totten, for what purpose do you rise?"

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. When we had House Bill 364 on Second Reading I inadvertantly forgot to table Amendment #1 and I would like to ask leave to bring House Bill 364, from Third to Second for the purposes of tabling Amendment #1, which was mine and putting Amendment...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Leave granted? House Bill 364, will be taken from Third to Second. House Bill 364, on Second Reading, Representative Totten moves to table Amendment #1. Is there leave? Amendment #1, being tabled...the Bill is returned to order of Third Reading."

Totten: "Thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Ladies and Gentlemen the hour being at 12:30... Representative Dan Houlihan... or Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "I move that we recess, Mr. Speaker, until 1:30."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Madigan, moves that the House recess till 1:30. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed. The House is recessed until the hour of 1:30. Thank you."

Doorkeeper: "Attention Members of the House of Representatives



the House will reconvene in five minutes. All persons not entitled to the House floor, please retire to the gallery."

Speaker Redmond: "The House will come to order, Members please be in their seats. What was the last Bill, we took? House Bill 644, was that taken?"

Clerk O'Brien: "That's moved to Third Reading."

Speaker Redmond: "House Bill 681."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 681, a Bill for an Act to amend the Election Code. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motions with respect to that Amendment?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motion has been filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2, Jack Davis. Amends House Bill 681, as amended on page 3 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative Davis, on the floor? Apparently not, take that one out of the record. Maybe we better go back to 658. Representative Friedrich."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 658, a Bill for an Act in relation to educational opportunity discrimination. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motions?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions have been filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 72... Representative Friedrich for what purpose do you rise?"

Friedrich: "Something to do, I'm sure they're not controversial."

Speaker Redmond: "Which one is that?"

Friedrich: "There is 1153.... 1115, excuse me...."

Speaker Redmond: "1115."

Friedrich: "Wait a minute let me get my ducks lined up here.

1154."

Speaker Redmond: "House Bill 1154."

Friedrich: "1155."

Speaker Redmond: "1155, seems to be right. House Bill 1155."

Friedrich: "1157, also."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 11...."

Speaker Redmond: "1155."

Clerk O'Brien: "1155, a Bill for an Act to restore access rights in Madison County. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motions?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions have been filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1157."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1157, a Bill for an Act to vacate an easement in Fayette County. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Amendments."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1169, a Bill for an Act to restore access rights in Madison County. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motions or floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions have been filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1174."

Friedrich: "1754, is also in that series, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "What is that."

Friedrich: "1754."

Speaker Redmond: "1754."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1754, a Bill for an Act to vacate highway easement in Bond County. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion or...."

Clerk O'Brien: "No motion or Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "No floor Amendment. Third Reading. Representative Birchler, for what purpose do you rise?"

Birchler: "Mr. Speaker, I have House Bill 1415, that had no dissenting votes. There is no Amendment filed to my knowledge."



Speaker Redmond: "House Bill 1415."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1415, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Public Community College Act. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Yes, I've got 1055 which has...."

Speaker Redmond: "1055."

Matijevich: "...an Amendment the Committee asked me to put on and we didn't get a chance..."

Speaker Redmond: "1055."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1055, a Bill for an Act to prohibit use of public funds to urge electors to vote for or against any candidate or proposition. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, the floor Amendment was actually asked for by the Committee. There was clarification to make sure that funds could not be used for political or campaign purposes and also, where there were propositions to Amendment to the Constitution that they could be used for dissemination of information. Speaker Redmond: "Representative Macdonald."

Macdonald: "Yes, Mr. Speaker..."

Clerk O'Brien: "Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Macdonald, amends House Bill 1241 on page 4, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Macdonald."

Macdonald: "Yes, this just adds language that they had left out on... below line 35, they left out a whole Section and this is in regard to annexation in Hoffman Estates into the sanitary district and it has to have the language will become a part of the Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago if such of a petition signed by not less than, they left out that whole Section and it makes no sense without this language so I would like to have that included, please."

Speaker Redmond: "The Lady moves the adoption of Amendment #1. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Representative Bluthardt, for what purpose do you arise?"

Bluthardt: "Mr. Speaker, would you be kind enough to call House Bill 1216 and 17 on Second."

Speaker Redmond: "1216."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1216, a Bill for an Act to amend the



Election Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1217."

Clerk O'Brien: "Hosue Bill 1217, a Bill for an Act to amend the Election Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Yes, Mr. Speaker did you call 1279, I just wanted..."

Speaker Redmond: "1279. I would prefer those that have Amendments that are not..."

Geo-Karis: "There aren't any."

Speaker Redmond: "...controversial..."

Geo-Karis: "That I know of."

Speaker Redmond: "Those that have Amendments that aren't controversial are preferred. 1279, are there any Amendments, Mr. Clerk?"

Clerk O'Brien: "1279 doesn't appear on my Calendar."

Speaker Redmond: "1279 is on page 16."

Clerk O'Brien: "Oh, 1279, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Coal Development Bond Act. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Representative Ebbesen, before he has trouble."

Ebbesen: "Yes, Mr. Speaker. Would you call House Bill 1073, please."

Speaker Redmond: "1073."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1073, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."



Ebbesen: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, the Amendment just changes the effective date of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any motion with respect to the Amendment."

Clerk O'Brien: "No motion filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Representative Matijevich."

Representative D.L. Houlihan."

Houlihan: "I think there is a technical problem in Amendment #1 as far as how the Amendment...."

Speaker Redmond: "On what Bill?"

Houlihan: "1279... or 1073."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay, move it back to Second Reading. Representative Ebbesen, will you talk to Mr. Houlihan and see what he is talking about. He says there is a technical problem with that Amendment."

Houlihan: "Well, Mr. Speaker, will you leave it right there..."

Speaker Redmond: "Just hold it on Second, yes."

Houlihan: "All right."

Speaker Redmond: "Talk to him and see what the problem is. Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "I had 1212 if you want to go with something that's clean as a whistle; there is no Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matejek..."

Matijevich: "1212."

Speaker Redmond: "1073, is that..."

Matejek: "Mr. Speaker, would you call 1507, please it is on Second Reading."

Speaker Redmond: "Will you repeat it."

Matejek: "House Bill 1507."

Speaker Redmond: "1507. 1507."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1507, a Bill for an Act to add Sections to Act to establish joint legislative reference bureau. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."



Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Just a moment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matejek, are there any floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No floor Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2325, I understand that this is an emergency. Representative Hart."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2325,..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hart."

Clerk O'Brien: "A Bill for an Act making appropriations of the Illinois Community College Board. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2319, Representative Breslin."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2319, a Bill for an Act making additional appropriation to the Department of Transportation. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any motions or floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions are filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1037, Representative Ebbesen, have you straighten out your problem with Representative Houlihan?"

Ebbesen: "Yes, Mr. Speaker...."

Speaker Redmond: "1273 then."

Ebbesen: "1073 and the only error there... the Amendment itself has a Section or the phrase that is underlined which it should not be and I would like leave to just amend it on its face where it is underlined that it really shouldn't be underlined."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing no objections, leave is granted to amend it on its face. The Clerk is looking for you, Mr. Ebbesen."

Ebbesen: "All right. Is that Third Reading, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Representative Yourell."



Yourell: "I have two Bills, 519 and 1074 that don't have Amendments if you want to move them."

Speaker Redmond: "My preference would be Bills that have Amendments that are not controversial. Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "782."

Speaker Redmond: "782... 782."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 782, a Bill for an Act relating to compensation of crime victims. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, 2 and 3, were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion or floor Amendment?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motion has been filed. Floor Amendment #4, Schlickman. Amends House Bill 782, on page 3, line 20 and 21 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, Amendment #4, substitutes the word 'homemaker' for 'housewife' and adds full-time college students. I would move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Are there any discussion? The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment #4. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. Representative D.L. Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Can I ask the Sponsor of the Amendment a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Houlihan: "Under Amendment #4, you're changing the word 'housewife' to 'homemaker' but you are also adding 'a full-time college student'."

Schlickman: "That's right. That is what I stated."

Houlihan: "All right. What does that relate to as far as loss of earnings. You're going to a basis of five hundred dollars a month for a full-time college student?"

Schlickman: "For those two classifications which at that point in time had no basis for determining compensation. Conclusion has been drawn by the Attorney General as well as those who are interested in the victims of... compensation to victims of crime acts such as... came out in Loyola University

Law Journal article that one of the deficiency in the Act and a deficiency that is preventing compensation to victims of crime is the absolute requirement that there be earning and what we're doing here is presuming for two classes, homemaker and full-time college students for purposes of determining damage and future earnings, it will be assumed that at the time of their injury if they are in either one of these two classes that they were earning five hundred dollars."

Houlihan: "All right, I follow that but as far as full-time college students, where did the figure of five hundred dollars come from?"

Schlickman: "That is the figure... that's the maximum figure now contained in the Act, number one. Number two, it's the figure that the Attorney General had selected for homemakers and number three, it's approximately equivalent to the minimum wage."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? Any discussion? The question is on the Gentleman's motion for adoption of Amendment #4. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #5, Jaffe. Amends House Bill 782 on page 3, line 12."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this is an Agreed Amendment. What the Amendment does is substitute the word 'psychiatric' with the word 'psychological' and mental health needs. It was the feeling on the part Representative Jaffe and we agreed that the rape victims and the kind of counseling that they would get as a result of the injury they sustained as a result of the commission of a crime that psychiatric is too limited. I would move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Tipsword. Any discussion on this Amendments?"



Tipsword: "No, I just wanted to point out two Bills to you that have Amendments that are not controversial."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay, we've got them."

Tipsword: "No, there are some others. Those are with no Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay. The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment #5. Those in favor indicate by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the motion carries and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "1343. Third Reading."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill...."

Speaker Redmond: "1343."

Clerk O'Brien: "1343...."

Speaker Redmond: "Again I'm trying to take Bills on which there are floor Amendments because some of these others we can move without any problems. So if you just call my attention to the ones that have floor Amendment that we don't anticipate any real problems as we can pass the other ones to Third Reading in perfunct or something and you may be home Mother's Day, if you will let me go along with this thing. Representative Gene Hoffman."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1343, a Bill for an Act to amend the Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Hoffman. Amends House Bill 1343 on page 2, line 11 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Mr. Hoffman."

Hoffman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment #1, was suggested in Committee that we could now... the definition of 'owners family' to 'owners immediate family' and so all this Amendment does is put the word 'immediate' in ahead of the word 'family' so it will read the 'persons immediate family' and I move for



the adoption of Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2119. Representative Hoffman 2119."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2119, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Hoffman. Amends...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hoffman."

Hoffman: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, in House Bill 2119, we've eliminated all the references to school district other than those under Article 34 and in its place rather than referring to Article 34, we say that this Section does not apply to cities having population in an excess of five hundred thousand. This is requested by Representatives of the Chicago Board of Education and we have no objections to it so, I move for the adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the motion carries and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Representative Geo-Karis, for what purpose do you arise... and if you have a Bill without an Amendment on it...."

Geo-Karis: "A floor Amendment, I have 896..."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay, which one... 896?"

Geo-Karis: "Joint Co-sponsor with Representative Huskey. It is a simple Amendment that provides for the...."



Speaker Redmond: "Will you read the Bill, 896."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 896, a Bill for an Act to amend the Election Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Geo-Karis. Amends House Bill 896 on page 1..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "The Amendment simply says, the State Board of Elections or its successor. That's what the Amendment provides for and I move the passage of this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the Ladies motion for the adoption of Amendment #1. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "I have House Bill 1454."

Speaker Redmond: "1454."

Geo-Karis: "I don't think there is any Amendments on it."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1454, a Bill for an Act creating the Illinois Energy Resources Commission. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading."

Geo-Karis: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "1509."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1509, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill..."

Speaker Redmond: "1509, Representative Walsh."

Clerk O'Brien: "Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment #1, which was adopted in Committee provided that the... an



employee may opt out a part-time employee... may opt out of the Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund. I move to table Amendment #1, because Amendment #2, is preferred by the Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund so, I move to table Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion that he... does he have leave to table Amendment #1? Hearing no objection, Amendment #1, is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2, was evidently misnumbered as Amendment #3. Amends House Bill 1509 on page 1, line 1, by deleting Section 7-111 and inserting in lieu thereof, Section and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Well, if we need leave to renumber... I would say that I would ask that first of all."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman asks leave to renumber on its face. Leave is granted, no objections heard."

Walsh: "I think I explained Amendment #2 in explaining why I was tabling Amendment #1. Amendment #2, at the request of the IMRF, is that an employee actively join the fund and I move the adoption of Amendment #2."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion of the adoption of Amendment #1. Those in favor say 'aye'... #2, rather. Will you change the record, Mr. Clerk: Adoption of Amendment #2. Speaker Redmond: "Take that one out of the record. 737, Representative McCourt."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 737, a Bill for an Act to license and



regulate tree experts."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments. Amendment from the floor, Amendment #1, McCourt. Amends House Bill 737 on page 2, by deleting line 10 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McCourt."

McCourt: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this is a housekeeping Amendment that was suggested by the Department of Registration and Education. It merely clarifies who shall be required to have a tree expert license. It gives the Department finer responsibility for the examining applicant and it provides reciprocity with other states that have similar requirements to Illinois. I... there is no opposition to my knowledge of this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for adoption of Amendment #1. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the motion carries and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 621..."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 621, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act concerning Public Utilities. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was tabled in Committee and Amendment #2, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: Representative Steele."

Steele: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill..."

Speaker Redmond: "We're on Amendment #3, is that correct?"

Steele: "Yes, it was taken out of the record due to the objection of D.L. Houlihan, that objection has now been resolved. I would like to table Amendment #3 and replace it with Amendment #4. I would move to table #3."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave to table Amendment #3? Hearing no objections, Amendment #3, is tabled. Any further Amendments?"



Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #4, Steele. Amends House Bill 621 by striking line and everything there after and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Steele."

Steele: "Yes, Amendment #4 corrects a typographical error and resolves the objections that were raised by Representative Houlihan and I would move for the adoption of Amendment #4."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for adoption of Amendment #4. All those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1524... 1524, that's the one we took out of the record, isn't it Representative Walsh? 1102."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1102, a Bill for an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense of the Local Governmental Law Enforcement Officers Training Board. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McAuliffe."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any floor Amendments? Any motions?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed, no floor Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1041."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1041, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Municipal Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Hart. Amends House Bill 1041 on page 2 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hart."

Hart: "Thank you. This is just a clean up Amendment, it removes application to the zoning planning and leaves it just to the zoning and not the planning. I move for the adoption

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of Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Any discussion? All those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1101... 2101, pardon me. 2101, is there a floor Amendment on that?"

Hart: "I believe so."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2101..."

Speaker Redmond: "2101, I don't show any Amendments."

Clerk O'Brien: "A Bill for an Act to amend uniform...."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. I got fooled on that one. 2249."

Hart: "I thought there was one, I'm sorry."

Speaker Redmond: "2249."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2249, a Bill for an Act to provide for the election of trustees in certain conservancy district."

Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hart."

Hart: "Three floor Amendments on this."

Clerk O'Brien: "No Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1,

Hart. Amends House Bill 2249 on page 2, line....."

Hart: "This Amendment makes it only applicable for the at-large trustees. I move the adoption of Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, Hart. Amends House....."

Hart: "This is a technical Amendment just cleans up some language in the Bill. I move for the adoption of Amendment #2."



Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #2. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3, Hart. Amends House Bill..."

Hart: "This Amendment changes the election from the general election to the high school election date and I move for the adoption of Amendment #3."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1521."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1521, a Bill for an Act creating the Illinois Energy Resources Commission. Second Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments. Amendment #1, Lucco. Amends House Bill 1521 on page 2, line 9 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lucco."

Lucco: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Amendment #1, simple changes 'determine' to 'study' and eliminates 'and determine' which makes it a much more permissive Bill and I move that Amendment #1 be adopted."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Any discussion or questions on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Representative Lucco."

Lucco: "I have another clean up Amendment on House Bill...."

Speaker Redmond: "Mr. Clerk, are there any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Lucco: "Thank you. On...."

Speaker Redmond: "You say there are further Amendments?"

Lucco: "No."



Speaker Redmond: "There further."

Lucco: "2203, I have a simple Amendment on it."

Speaker Redmond: "Oh, okay. Third Reading on 1521, is that correct?"

Lucco: "Right."

Clerk O'Brien: "Right."

Speaker Redmond: "Now, what's the other one Representative Lucco."

Lucco: "2203."

Speaker Redmond: "2203."

Lucco: "I have a floor Amendment."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2203, a Bill for an Act to amend the Public Community College Act. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, Lucco. Amends House Bill 2203 on page 1 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lucco."

Lucco: "Thank you, this Amendment is one that I promised to put on in Committee and it changes the wording 'employee' to 'teacher'. I move that it be adopted."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Lucco: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Representative Dyer, welcome home. 384. You take better care of yourself."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 384, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Municipal Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1452. Representative Richmond, do you seek recognition? 384."



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Richmond: "Mr. Speaker, I'm sorry when I gave you that list that was before you announced that you wanted Bills with floor Amendments. Out of the four that I turned in there is only one in that category. That's 1177."

Speaker Redmond: "1177."

Richmond: "Yes."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1177, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1, Richmond. Amends House Bill 1177 on page 1, line 9 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Richmond."

Richmond: "This Amendment was agreed upon in Committee and I promised to put it on in the House on Second Reading. It changes from four days to ten days, the time that is allowed for the various districts to send the money in that has been taken from the teachers salaries for their pensions. I move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2, Richmond. Amends House Bill 1177 on page 2, line 11 by deleting 'of' and inserting in lieu thereof, 'was'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Richmond."

Richmond: "Purely housekeeping. I move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1183... no Amendment on that one?"

Richmond: "No, Sir."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay, take that one out. 2327."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2327, a Bill for an Act to amend



the Illinois Insurance Code. Second Reading of the Bill,
no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Kempiners. Amends House Bill 2327
on page 2, by deleting line 18 and 19."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kempiners."

Kempiners: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This is an Amendment offered
by the Department of Insurance to release the high school
diploma or its equivalent from the provisions of this
Act and I would move its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion
for the adoption of Amendment #1. Those in favor say
'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment
is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Representative McBroom, for
what purpose do you arise?"

McBroom: "In regard to House Bill 1371, Mr. Speaker. It has one
Committee Amendment and I move for the adoption of it.
It is non controversial, I'll be happy to explain it if
you want me to."

Speaker Redmond: "1371, there is no motion in respect to that,
Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1371, a Bill for an Act codifying
the powers and duties of the Department of Mental Health
and Developmental Disabilities. Second Reading of the
Bill..."

Speaker Redmond: "No motions filed."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee. No
motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2327. May I again repeat that
it is the desire of the Chair to only call those that
have floor Amendments. 2327."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2327...."

Speaker Redmond: "2327, has that.... We moved that one, Representa-



five Kempiners."

Kempiners: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, we moved that one to Third Reading..."

Speaker Redmond: "That's what I thought."

Kempiners: "... I have two more."

Speaker Redmond: "2333."

Kempiners: "Okay."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2333, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Insurance Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, Kempiners. Amends House Bill 2333 on page 6, by deleting line 2 and 3, so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kempiners."

Kempiners: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This is an Amendment to the Bill that was agreed upon by the Department of Insurance and the Illinois Life Underwriters Association and I would move its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment #1. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it... Representative D.L. Houlihan. Pardon me."

Houlihan: "Back up. I have a question of the Sponsor, would he..."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Houlihan: "... explain what the effect of the Amendment does as far as notice of termination to employees."

Kempiners: "The effect of the Amendment is to provide that an insurer shall state the reasons for termination only if it is caused by a reason listed in Section 502 and Section 502 is grounds for either refusing or revoking a license... an agents license. So, if they refuse to issue or they revoke then they have to state the reasons for it."

Houlihan: "But the language that you are deleting requires that the notice of termination... in the notice of termination it shows the cause and the circumstances. Now, what's the



reason for deleting that from this Bill?"

Kempiners: "My Amendment I believe is just for the Section 502, where they have to give the reason. We're deleting lines 2 and 3, Dan and I think the... I'm replacing the prescribed by the Director in line 3 and then the termination is for any cause listed in Section 502."

Houlihan: "What if the termination is not for any cause listed in Section 502? Is there a necessity of say, you know, because of circumstances for the termination."

Kempiners: "Would you repeat that, I didn't hear you, Dan."

Houlihan: "If it is not for causes described in Section 502, does the notice of termination... is it required to state the cause of circumstances of the termination?"

Kempiners: "No."

Houlihan: "I don't understand why you're doing this. I think you had a much tighter Bill without this Amendment."

Kempiners: "Well, it was my understanding that the Illinois Life Underwriters Association had problems with it, they didn't appear before the Committee and then they worked out their problems in this Amendment with the Department. Now... that's why I made the comment that it came from that discussion between that association and the Department of Insurance."

Houlihan: "Well, my apprehension is that with this... with the Amendment to your Bill I think that you have weakened the Bill and as far as protection...."

Kempiners: "Would you like for me to hold it on Second Reading..."

Houlihan: "Would you, then we can return it."

Kempiners: "All right. Okay."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the record. How about 233... Representative Breslin, for what purpose do you rise?"

Breslin: "I would like to call 1361."

Speaker Redmond: "What was that? What number?"

Breslin: "1361."

Speaker Redmond: "I'll be right back to you. 2334, Representative

Kempiners, is that one ready?"

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2334, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Insurance Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, Kempiners. Amends House Bill 2334 on page 4 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kempiners:"

Kempiners: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Without the Amendment it requires.... the Bill would require that the name of any agent or broker who solicits the coverage would have to have his name on the policy and designate its capacity. This Amendment would require just the name of the agent or broker involved in the solicitation or negotiation or affecting of the policy which would mean that there would only have to be one name rather than everybody's name who was involved in it and again this is an Amendment that comes from the Department of Insurance and I would move its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion in the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 829. Representative Waddell."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Waddell, on the floor? Representative Friedland, can you handle that... 829? It is a floor Amendment. Waddell... out of the record. 1063... that's Waddell also. 2175."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2175, a Bill for an Act to amend the Environmental Protection Act. Second Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "No Amendments from the floor, I don't know who gave me that one. 2322. Take that one out. Any floor."



Amendment on that one?"

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2322, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Terzich. Amends House Bill 2322 on page 1, line 15, 17 and 20 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Terzich. Representative Harris, what's your pleasure? Amendments are streaming in here almost as fast as we're trying to dispose of things and it is going to be the position of the Chair, that an Amendment is not timely unless it was filed sufficiently far in advance to permit it to be printed and it is on the desks. I don't think it is fair to the Members to be able to file Amendments at anytime.. we'll keep this thing up for ever. Representative Harris, what's your pleasure with respect to this."

Harris: "Mr. Speaker, would like to adopt the Amendment please."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of the Amendment. Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "May we have an explanation of the Amendment?"

Speaker Redmond: "What's the Amendment, Mr. Harris?"

Harris: "Mr. Speaker, it is just a small change in language, it changes line 24, line 12, it doesn't do anything to the Bill."

Schlickman: "I move that it be tabled."

Harris: "Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Harris."

Harris: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like to call on Mr. Hart, to explain the rest of the Bill, if I may please. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hart."

Hart: "The Amendment is requested by Representative Terzich and the Committee, we promised to put it on. What it does is allows the filing of these claims for twelve months rather



than six months and strikes out a provision where it would have been estimated workmen's compensation paid to the claimant. This as I say, was requested by the Committee and all the Bill does with the Amendment is just give a twelve month period for filing instead of a six month period. With that Amendment it has the approval of the Pension Laws Commission and that Committee from which it came. I move for the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Well, I'm sorry, Mr. Speaker. I didn't hear full explanation, particularly the second half that dealt with workmen's comp."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hart."

Hart: "It strikes all those provisions that were in the Bill whereby the person that have had an estimated amount of money paid to him while the claim was pending."

Speaker Redmond: "It's a Pension Code matter, isn't it?"

Hart: "That's right."

Speaker Redmond: "Not Workmen's Comp."

Hart: "Well, they interchange here. It does have to do with Workmen's Compensation where a pensioner is injured, he files a Workmen's Compensation case, if he doesn't simultaneously file under the Pension Code, there is a time when he could be cut off."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay."

Hart: "And the Bill provided that it would be paid to him an estimated amount that he might recover under the Comp. Act and that was unacceptable so we struck all that out of the Bill."

Schlickman: "Will this Amendment have a fiscal impact?"

Hart: "No, it will not. All it will do with him, the Bill would have had a fiscal impact without the Amendment but with the Amendment it will have no fiscal impact."

Schlickman: "Thank you, very much."

Hart: "You're welcome."



Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion: Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Representative Waddell is now returned. Are you duly penitent? What's the number of your Bill?"

Waddell: "829."

Speaker Redmond: "829. Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, now that we've got a full house why don't we go down the line with those that have Amendments either Committee or floor. I concede the floor when we had to skip all over, but now we don't know where the hell we're at. So, I think we're better off..."

Speaker Redmond: "Let me complete this list and then I'll go back."

Matijevich: "All right."

Speaker Redmond: "I think that the floor isn't quite as full from here as it is from there."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 829, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Emergency Services and Disaster Agency Act. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Waddell. Amends House Bill 829 on page 2 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Respresentative Waddell."

Waddell: "This Amendment has within itself clarifying language along with the fact that the department has changed from under its supervision to under its advisement which therefore deleted any cause for additional funds and it puts the Bill in shape, Sir."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion of the adoption of Amendment #1. Those in favor say 'aye', Representative Dan Houlihan."

Houlihan: "I have a parliamentary inquiry about the form of the



Amendment, is it technically correct. It adds a new Section but doesn't amend the title of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Waddell."

Waddell: "Would you run that over again please."

Houlihan: "Let me put it also to Mr. Epstein. If he will check the form of this Amendment as to whether or not it is technically proper, the question has been raised here that you're adding a new Section and yet you failed to amend the title of the Bill to so indicate. I'm saying Bruce, is that I think... you're putting in Section 14, and you should amend in your title, an Act to amend Sections numbering and you should add Section 14, in there also."

Waddell: "I would be glad to do that anytime."

Houlihan: "Do you want to take it out and have it redone?"

Speaker Redmond: "While we're at it the Parliamentarian suggests that it would be better perhaps if you took this out and follow the suggestion of Representative Houlihan."

Waddell: "I have 1063, Sir."

Speaker Redmond: "1063."

Waddell: "1063, merely deletes one line, line 24, making the Bill Constitutional in as much as it now applies to Illinois and not to other states where we have no control."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the Gentleman's motion. All those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1063, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of Business Corporation Act. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee. Floor Amendment #2, Waddell."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Waddell. Any further Amendments? The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment #1, on House Bill 1063. Those in favor say 'aye'... I've been corrected. The Gentleman's motion is to adopt Amendment #2, those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes'

have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1062, Representative Waddell, that's yours, you gave me that... never mind. Never mind that has no floor Amendment. 2175."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2175, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Environmental Protection Act. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2227, is there a floor Amendment on that one? 2227."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2227, a Bill for an Act relating to the increase in fees and certain sheriff services. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Darrow. Amends House Bill 2227, on page 1 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Darrow."

Darrow: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Amendment #1, increases the fees the sheriff charges for service of process. It was my intent to have this placed in the Bill when it was drafted, however, due to the last minute rush the Reference Bureau failed to do so and I would ask for its adoption now."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the motion carries and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1468."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1468...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Yourell."

Clerk O'Brien: "A Bill for an Act to amend local governmental

and governmental employees Tort Immunity Act. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Yourell. Amends House Bill 1468 on page 5 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Yourell."

Yourell: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Amendment #1, to House Bill 1468 places an effective date in the Act, I move for the adoption of Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The motion carries and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 806."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 806, a Bill for an Act to protect the interest of potential real estate renters. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1 and 2, were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #3, Holewinski. Amends House Bill 806, on page 11 by deleting line 28 through 35 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Holewinski."

Holewinski: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker..."

Speaker Redmond: "Holewinski."

Holewinski: "Mr. Speaker, Amendment #3 was agreed to by myself in the Committee, the Committee passed the Bill out with the agreement that this Amendment would be put on, on the House floor. What Amendment #3, does is... it deletes Section 25, on page 11 of the Bill which was a Section that delineated the relationship of this Act to home rule municipality and I would move for the adoption of the Amendment."



Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion.
Representative D.L. Houlihan."

Houlihan: "I have a question of the Sponsor if he will yield?"

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Houlihan: "What's the net effect under the Amendment as far as
home rule municipalities are concerned?"

Holewinski: "From my conversations with Mr. Schwartz, he tells
me that the affect would be to leave it up to the home
rule municipalities as to whether they want to regulate in
this area."

Houlihan: "Would you just give us a minute here."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Would the Sponsor yield? Isn't it true that...
No, I withdraw the question, thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "A question for Mr. Holewinski."

Speaker Redmond: "Question."

Leinenweber: "The effect of this Amendment then means that
this Act and licensing power will not be exercised in
Cook County... could not be..."

Holewinski: "No, it does not. The Section of the Act that we're
deleting stated that the state and the municipality had
consurrent jurisdiction. It's believed that by eliminating
this Section what it does allow, it allows the municipalities
to license if they wish but if not, then there is a state
Act... state licensing Act under the provision of real
estate in the Department of Registration and Education..."

Leinenweber: "Cook County chose not to license, they would
have a state standard, then the state would license."

Holewinski: "That's my understanding."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Then do I follow you correctly, Representative
Holewinski, this Bill is not a limit and the powers of
any home rule unit and that they could enact this type
of control or regulation on their own."



Holewinski: "For the Legislative record, yes."

Houlihan: "Thank you."

Holewinski: "That's correct. Mr. Speaker, I move the adoption of Amendment...."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #4, Holewinski. Amends House Bill 806, on page 1, line 25 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Holewinski."

Holewinski: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This Amendment was also agreed to by the Committee, what it does is take the... after the discriminatory sections that is anti-discriminatory sections in the Real Estate Brokers Act and makes them applicable to this Act. I would move the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative D. L. Houlihan. The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1105."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1105, a Bill for an Act requiring employees to notify the appropriate license issuing authority. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Holewinski."

Holewinski: "Amendment #2, I believe."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2, Holewinski. Amends House Bill 1105 as amended by adding after Section 3, the following, Section 4 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Holewinski."

Holewinski: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This is a Bill that addresses a problem that we had



with reporting of disciplining medically license people licensed to practice medicine in... various instances. What the Amendment does is simple absolve people of liability in cases where they are complying with the Act in good faith, that is where they have reported the suspension of privileges to practice medicine to the Department and the department has had a hearing with the idea behind the Amendment is to prevent those people from being sued for complying with the intent of the law and I move the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mike McClain."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Would the Gentleman yield? Mike, could you tell me, does this go further than the Good Samaritan Act, this expand in the Good Samaritan Act."

Holewinski: "No, it doesn't. It has nothing to do with the Good Samaritan Act. The Act requires that the hospitals to report if they have suspended a doctors privileges. That is what the Bill does. Okay, in order to protect that hospital from a suit when they have acted in good faith and specifically stated, the Amendment was added saying that no employer hospital etc., shall be liable for civil damages in result of good faith compliance with the Act. That's referring only to reporting."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2195."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2195, a Bill for an Act relating to assessments resulting from home improvements. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tipsword."

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, Tipsword. Amends House Bill 2195 as amended and so forth."



Tipsword: "Mr. Speaker, this Amendment is one that was requested by the Committee. It just merely takes Cook County out of the application of this Bill relating to damages or relating to assessments for improvements to property and I would move the adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2196."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2196, a Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act. Second Reading of the Bill..."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion in respect to Amendment #1, or any floor Amendment?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2196, a Bill for an Act relating to assessments resulting from home improvements. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion or Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2197."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2197, a Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Tipsword. Amends House Bill 2197 on page 1 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tipsword."

Tipsword: "Mr. Speaker, there are two Amendments to this Bill that are from the floor. Both Amendments are necessary to accomplish the one purpose that was requested by the Committee. This is a Bill that basically provides that when



a person goes in to have his hearing before the tax review board that he may if it is feasible and reasonable, have all of his various tracts of property heard at the same time. This Bill... these Amendments for this Bill merely provides that it be done when it is reasonable and books are available from each of the townships and I would move for the adoption of this Amendment and also the one that follows."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment #1. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the motion carries, Amendment adopted. Amendment #2, is there any discussion on that? Representative Tipsword, had you included in your discussion the Amendment #2?"

Tipsword: "May I ask, Mr. Speaker, I think wasn't there a Committee Amendment that preceded this?"

Speaker Redmond: "Yes...."

Clerk O'Brien: "No, there was no Committee Amendment on the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "No."

Tipsword: "Oh, I was thinking that there was. Yes, I have included... it's a part of the same necessity it amends a different part of the same Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion with respect to Amendment #2. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1209."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1209, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act concerning fees and salaries. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1, McMaster. Amends House Bill 1209, on page 2, line 1 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Dyer. Representative McMaster's,



pardon me. I can't see Representative McMaster, there is an interloper there and... somebody from..."

McMaster: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, House Bill 1209 was presented to us in Committee by Representative Dyer's, raised the cost of a marriage license issued by the county clerk from ten dollars to twenty dollars. We suggested to her in Committee that we would be more favorable to this Bill if we changed that to raise the license from ten dollars to fifteen dollars and that is the reading of this Amendment. It would require raising the marriage license from ten dollars to fifteen rather than ten to twenty. I would urge the adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Wolf."

Wolf: "I just wanted... I would just like to ask the Sponsor when the effective date of this Bill is?"

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of... Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Yes, would the Gentleman yield to a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Matijevich: "Yes, Representative McMaster, I have no objection at all to reducing the fee from ten to twenty... from twenty to fifteen rather. But, my question is does it even take fifteen dollars to actually administer the fee or the work that you have to have as far as filing. As far as I'm concerned fifteen dollars sounds like it is a lot of money. Just to file a marriage license and you know under the new Constitution fees are illegal and any fees must go into the Treasurer and I look at this as a tax increase. This is an increase imposed on young people going into marriage and I realize that we've said many times, we ought to make it tougher for people to get married. But, I don't think the way to do it is by increasing the marriage license fee. I would like to see the Bill be defeated on Third Reading but I do actually



support your Amendment but I wonder if you could answer that question, does it really take fifteen dollars to administer the marriage license?"

Speaker Redmond: "Do you care to reply, Representative McMasters."

McMaster: "Well, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, John, you talked a long ways around the bush to get to your question. I would suggest that really since the Bill is originally Representative Dyer's that I would let her answer that question if she so desires. The Bill is originally hers, all we were decreasing was the amount that she was asking for, John. Would you be agreeable to her answering the question?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Yes, I wish she would hold it, I would like to reduce it all the way back to the original amount. I think it is just terrible to use the vehicle of marriage license fees to increase taxes on people. But, could she answer that question."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Dyer."

Dyer: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I think this Bill has very... two very definite benefits. One, it would help reduce, I think the number of teenage marriages, the sudden elopement the night of the Senior Prom, I think just a slight increase gives a second thought. Secondly, to answer your question specifically. Yes, I have discussed this with the county clerk in DuPage County and other counties. With inflation and arising costs of running offices particularly with Mr. McMaster's Amendment, a five dollar increase in marriage license... yes, can definitely be justified with higher cost of administration today."

Matijevich: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I'm going to speak in favor of the Amendment but I found out from the Sponsor what the real intent of the Bill was and I'll speak to that on Third Reading. But, I do support the Amendment."



Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? Representative Collins."

Collins: "Well, just one thought on the Amendment, Mr. Speaker I would suggest to the Sponsor... rather than raise the cost of marriage licenses we suggest they take the money and get their head examined."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the motion carries. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1097."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1097, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act to revise the law in relation to townships. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, McMaster. Amends House Bill 1097 on page 1, line 16 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McMaster."

McMaster: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this may take perhaps a little bit of explaining. The Bill that we put in House Bill 1097, changes the method of auditing township books. Under current laws the township trustees or auditors have been auditing their own books when the amount of total appropriations of the township was under one hundred thousand dollars. It is our belief that if not illegal certainly improper that township trustees should audit their own books. For that reason the Bill provides for an auditing Committee to be appointed by the Board of Trustees of the township and it does provide that they would be paid expenses not in the excess of fifty dollars a day, it could be much lower in some of our smaller townships. Let me continue, that in other legislation that I believe we have already passed this year, we change the one hundred thousand dollar amount to



one hundred and fifty thousand dollars before CPA would be required. When we put the Bill in we had not recognized this so this Amendment also changes the one hundred thousand for total appropriation to one hundred and fifty thousand. I would urge the adoption of this Amendment and would so move, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the motion carries and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2024."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2024, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Animal Control Act. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1, Rigney Amends House Bill 2024 on page 1, by deleting line 17 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Rigney."

Rigney: "House Bill 2024, give additional powers to the Animal Control Warden, but one of the powers that we do not want him to have is the right to carry a concealed weapon and that is what it has done under the terms of Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the Gentleman's.... Representative Deuster."

Deuster: "I presume, Representative Rigney, that a concealed weapon does not include some of the tranquilizer guns that they use to protect themselves from vicious animals, is that correct?"

Rigney: "Well, I think they would have any right to have any type of a weapon but they cannot use it as a concealed weapon. They could even carry a shotgun if they felt it was necessary. But, what we're trying to do is get away from the concealed weapon."

Deuster: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion."



Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the motion carries and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1361."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1361, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Code of Criminal Procedure. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment from the floor that was erroneously numbered, number one should be two. Breslin, amends House Bill 1361 on page 2, by deleting line 7, inserting in lieu thereof, the following, and so forth."

Breslin: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this Amendment was suggested in Committee. It requires that the reimbursement of the cost for a public defender will now be to the extent that such services were unjustly or falsely procured."

Speaker Redmond: "The Lady has moved the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor indicate by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the motion carried and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1363."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1363, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act relating to Criminal Law. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1, Breslin. Amends House Bill 1363 on page 1, line 32 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Breslin."

Breslin: "Section IV, of this Bill has been changed to read from a class 4, felony to class misdemeanor. This was also suggested in Committee and it makes Section IV, consistent with Sections I, II and III which follows previously."

Speaker Redmond: "The Lady has moved for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor say 'yes', opposed 'no'. The



motion carries and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1615."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1615, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act relating to criminal law. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Breslin."

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, Breslin. Amends House Bill 1615 on page 1, by deleting line 13 through 15 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Breslin."

Breslin: "This Amendment takes out the language 'conflict of interest' and instead inserts the language that is presently in the prior statutes which allows the public defender or other counsels to be appointed. It now reads the same as the other statutes which says, the public defender or the state appellate defender shall be appointed as counsel unless with the consent of the defendant and for good cause shown the court may appoint counsel other than the public defender."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Lady's motion for the adoption of Amendment #2. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the motion carries and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2294."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2294, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Franchise Disclosure Act. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Steczo. Amends House Bill 2294 on page 2, line 7 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Steczo."

Steczko: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Amendment #1, makes a technical change that was brought to my attention in Judiciary I



Committee on page 2, line 7, of the Bill. It changes the word 'to' to the word 'or' and I move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment #1. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the motion carries and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1096."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1096, a Bill for an Act to provide for regulation of mortgage bankers. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1 and 2, were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #3, Holewinski. Amends House Bill 1096, on page 1, line 24 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Holewinski."

Holewinski: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, actually Amendments #3 and 4, do quite similar things that they do, its tighten up the definition of mortgage banker that is included in the Act. It was brought to our attention that the definition was overly brought in the Committee and I agreed to put this Amendment on the floor. It removes the words 'or collaterally' and the effect is to take out the commercial agencies that are otherwise all ready licensed. I would move the adoption of Amendment #3."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it the motion carries and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #4, Holewinski. Amends House Bill 1096 on page 1, line 20 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Holewinski."

Holewinski: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Amendment #4, does something very similar in that we do exempt Savings and Loan Associations from the Act because they are already covered



under the Savings and Loan Act. We just add the words 'or their service corporations' because they are already regulated by another Act and it is not necessary to cover them here. I would move the adoption of Amendment #4."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the motion carries. The Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1820."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1820, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections in the title of Lobbyist Registration Act. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, failed in Committee. Amendment #2, is adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Holewinski."

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment...."

Speaker Redmond: "Any floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #3, Terzich. Amends House Bill 1820 as amended by deleting all of sub Section C and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Holewinski."

Holewinski: "It is Representative Terzich's Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Terzich."

Terzich: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment #3, I believe is a very worthwhile Amendment and what it does, at the present time we have a maximum contribution of fifty dollars and as we know we will have inflation coming up every year...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Are the Amendments printed and distributed?"

Speaker Redmond: "When was it filed? I don't know if you were on the floor, Representative Terzich, it is the opinion of the Chair that it is unfair to a Sponsor of a Bill to hold a Bill when the Amendment was not filed in sufficient time to have it printed and distributed. Now, they tell me that this Amendment is not printed and distributed, is that



correct Mr. Page?"

Terzich: "Well, it's not my fault, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Houlihan."

Houlihan: "I was under the impression that that ruling of the Chair would be when we were going through the Bills which would be in numerical sequence...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Holewinski. It is a general proposition, it seems to me that we've had plenty of time to get Amendments ready and I don't think that it is fair to a Sponsor of a Bill to hold the passage of the Bill pending an Amendment that has not been filed and not been printed now, that's just the way that I feel about it. Representative Holewinski."

Holewinski: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I would agree with your position I would say though that if we could come back to the Bill today, I would be happy to take it out of the records so that Representative Terzich's Amendment can be circulated even though I am going to oppose them..."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, the only thing that I say is that when they come out of the record, I don't guarantee what's going to happen to them, I'll get them out... we'll reach them just as well as I can but that's the problem if things are taken out of the record and are not reached, I think that.... Representative Holewinski."

Holewinski: "Mr. Speaker, then maybe we can move it to Third and...."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay."

Holewinski: "At this time."

Speaker Redmond: "With that understanding then we'll move it to Third and arrange something and bring it back... that's all right with the Chair but I just don't think in fairness to all the Members the Amendments have been streaming up here like they are going out of style. 1820... we've just got Amendments right this minute... eleven. And there is no way we're like we're in quicksand here and there is



just no way we can complete this job. Third Reading on 1820. Representative Terzich."

Terzich: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I... you know, I would like to say I'm not going to object with your ruling but I did ask that these Amendments be prepared immediately after this Bill came out of Committee and the fact that there are ten or eleven Amendments simply state the fact that everyone went and processed these Amendments as quickly as possible. And, I would certainly think it's not in good faith to pass this Bill on to Third Reading with eleven Amendments been requested...."

Speaker Redmond: "We will return it to the order of Second Reading when the Amendments are ready. 1313."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1313, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner, Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendments from the floor, Amendment #1, Skinner. Amends House Bill 1313 on page 1, line 18, to add the following after Sam and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner. Is he on the floor? Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Thank you, Sir. Isn't this... is this.... I ask for the adoption of Amendment #1, which I believe exempts highway maintenance vehicles from the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giglio, 1313 on the Amendment. Do you have any comment? Okay. The question is on the... Representative Skinner's motion to adopt Amendment #1. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2, Giglio. Amends House Bill 1313 on page 1, by deleting line 10 through 12 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giglio."

Giglio: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House,



Amendment #2, what it does it takes out the special legislation from DOT and the farm trucks and it includes all vehicles is what it does. I would ask for your favorable support."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "First of all, Mr. Speaker, has this been printed and distributed?"

Speaker Redmond: "They tell me that it has."

Skinner: "Well, that's unfortunate because this is a measurable Amendment. In the past five years there has been quite a change in the Motor Vehicle Committee, it has indeed turned into a consumer protection agency and this Bill, the fact that this Bill got out of Committee with such a good plurality is an indication of that. The basic Bill would require that gravel trucks and other trucks that break your windshields and spew stuff all over the highway have to be covered if they are loaded above the top of the body of the truck. Now, there are certain interest in the State of Illinois such as the Agriculture interest who will actively oppose such a Bill if they are not excluded from it. That is what the Representative is trying to do is to basically make the Bill tougher to pass than it is all ready and for that reason I would ask that his Amendment be defeated."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giglio, to close."

Giglio: "I don't know if this... if we're going to include all the trucks I think we ought to include DOT and the farmers too, so I would just ask you to take that into consideration and vote for the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor of the motion say 'aye', opposed 'no'. Those in favor vote 'aye' and the oppose vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Well, I obvious can't explain my vote since I have already spoken on the issue. I certain...."

Speaker Redmond: "Sometimes it's hard to."

Skinner: "A call of the absentees if this motion... if this Amendment passes."

Speaker Redmond: "We'll take this out of the record if it is going to get that controversial. Do you persist in your request? Okay. Out of the record. 909."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 909, a Bill for an Act... is that 08 or 09?"

Speaker Redmond: "I have 909, is that correct?"

Clerk O'Brien: "A Bill for an Act to amend the Probate Act. Second.... A Bill for an Act to amend the Probate Act. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, 2 and 3, were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #4, Porter. Amends House Bill 909 on page 3, line 15 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hart."

Hart: "Yes, this is just a technical Amendment, I'm handling for Representative Porter. Just some clean up language in the Bill. Move for the adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Representative Bluthardt, are you seeking recognition? With respect to House Bill 380."

Bluthardt: "Yes, Mr. Speaker. Do you recall in House Bill 380, it when on to Third Reading with the agreement between Jerry Bradley and myself that it come back to Second for purposes of an Amendment, Amendment #13.. Amendment #13, amends House Bill 380 as amended by providing that the Chairman



of the Board, we're talking about the Board of Election, shall be affirmed by a three-fifths majority of both the Senate and the House. The Bill as it now stands does not require any confirmation by the House but under this Amendment it would require confirmation by the House. I think it would give us more protection, more insurance that the man that is selected as the Chairman and fifth member would be acceptable to the majority of the General Assembly. It also provides that that Chairman shall only vote in case of a tie and that it shall take three votes to pass any issue before that board. I move its adoption.

Speaker Redmond: "I understand that Representative Bradley, the principal Sponsor of this Bill is requesting that it be returned from the order of Third Reading to the order Second for the purpose of accommodating Representative Bluthardt's Amendment, is that correct? Now does he have leave to return it. Now on Second Reading. They tell me that Representative Bluthardt, is going to be coronated tonight and Schiller Park, is that correct? The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of.... Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, have a question on the Amendment. Ed, is it three-fifth confirmation by both Houses in your Amendment or just the Senate."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Bluthardt."

Bluthardt: "It requires three-fifths confirmation of both Houses."

Bradley: "Thank you, Sir. I support the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment..... Amendment is adopted. Any other Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No other Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Representative Deuster."

Deuster: "Mr. Speaker, I would make a suggestion, I think it is



helpful for the Members, we've been here quite a while, if you go in chronological order or go back to regular call. Then we can all look at the Calendar, we see what's coming along and we can be prepared for it, the Sponsors who have Amendments can be on the floor... I respect the decision of the Chair."

Speaker Redmond: "I have about ten more here that..."

Duester: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "The thing is, that the Members who were here promptly and came up, I think are entitled to have theirs called. Now, to follow your suggestion we'll be going back to the people who came quite late and I think that we started that way. There is only about ten more then we'll follow your suggestion. 1556."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1556, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act in regard to judgments and decrees. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2, Steczo. Amends House Bill 1556 as amended in paragraph A, of 18-F and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Steczo."

Steczko: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Amendment #2, to House Bill 1556, fulfills a commitment that was made in the House Judiciary I Committee. It deletes reference to the Illinois Residential Mortgage Foreclosure Act, House Bill 870 which is currently in Interim Study Calendar and I move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the motion carries and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1557."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 15... 1557?"



Speaker Redmond: "1557."

Clerk O'Brien: "Its not on the Calendar."

Speaker Redmond: "Sure it is, it's out of order if somebody...
you've got 1557 and then 1556."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1557, a Bill for an Act to amend
the Public Community College Act. Second Reading of the
Bill, Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2, Lauer. Amends House Bill 1557
as amended on page 2 and line 3 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lauer."

Lauer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Amendment #2, is a simple
Amendment and I think it is supported by the Sponsor of
the Bill. It makes the Federal funds that are to be handled
by the Junior College subject to appropriation by the
General Assembly. I move adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the
Gentleman's motion to the adoption of the Amendment. Those
in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the
Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1524."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1524, a Bill for an Act to amend
the Public Community College Act. Second Reading of the
Bill, no Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1, Reilly.
Amends House Bill 1524, by deleting line 29 through 35, on
page 4 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Reilly."

Reilly: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House,
the issue involved in this Amendment is a familiar one
to those of you who were on the floor yesterday. House
Bill 1524, mandates that all section of the state be in-
cluded in a public junior college district and it deletes
from the present law the back door referendum provision.
If House Bill 1524, passes in its present form those areas

of the state which are not presently included in a public junior college district will be annexed whether they chose to agree to that are not, will be subjected to the tax rate of the annexing junior college district all without any voice in the matter themselves. Present state law indeed state from the very first statute on this subject that cover this particular subject has provided that each area of the state should be included in a junior college district but it's allowed the district to exempt itself out by a back door referendum provision. The areas of the state that are not included have all held referendums and they have rejected inclusions by margins of ten to one, eleven to one, twelve to one and in one case fourteen to one. The Amendment does not change the Bill in any way except that it puts the back door referendum provision back into the Bill. The issue here is simple should the people in these district have a choice before this tax is imposed on them, I want to stress that the issue here is not the merits of junior colleges. I personally do not yield to anyone in the House on that subject and in my support of public junior colleges, I intend to support another Bill which is before you which would help the junior colleges with their tax situation. I was involved in Morgan County which was one of the counties that I represent in trying to get a public junior college formed... district formed at one time. The people rejected those efforts and I think the people ought to continue to have that choice, we regularly vote down proposals to give school boards the right to raise taxes without referendum. We were quite concerned about that yesterday, the principle here is exactly the same. We regularly vote down proposals to give cities the right to annex territory without a referendum. The issue here is the same, the cities claim as the junior colleges claim that people outside of their boundaries receive benefits and therefore, ought to be included but in



case in Illinois law whether we're talking about tax or whether we're talking about annexation, in every case of any sufficient size at all we either have a front door referendum or back door referendum. This Bill attempts to do without either, I'm authorized to say that the Farm Bureau and the Livestock Association are for this Amendment. To spite dire predictions of the Sponsors of the original Act that if you did not have compulsion, areas of the state would not join junior college districts, the fact is that in the last year or so, eleven districts of the remaining districts have petitioned to join and presumably will do so. The voluntary system which is the present statement of state policy is working. I ask that it be upheld, I ask a favorable vote on this Amendment to uphold the right of back door referendum in this law. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Walsh. This is your Bill what's your reaction?"

Walsh: "My reaction is unfavorable, Mr. Speaker. I rise to oppose the Gentleman's Amendment and suggest that what he's doing is restoring the Act to exactly what it would be without this Bill. It has the effect of striking the enacting clause. Now, the Gentleman brings up some points that are inaccurate in my opinion. For example, he says that there are many of us who uphold the enactment of a tax without a referendum but the Sponsor of this Amendment as well as some of those people.... all of those people probably who favor this legislation will favor a Bill that will be before us soon that will require that high schools in non junior college districts levy a tax for purpose of sending our students to other junior colleges. And this, Mr. Speaker will be without referendum. Now, some years ago, thirty or forty, not all of the state included or not all high school districts were included within all of the state and we had this dispute then over high school districts and it was necessary then, Mr. Speaker for the



state to mandate that every part of the state be within a high school district and there were parts of the state that opposed it very vigorously. Now, I suggest to you, Mr. Speaker that the time for this has long since pasted. It is long over due that we have every part of the state included within a junior college district. Currently 95% of the people in this state are paying taxes for junior college services, they're paying a property tax for higher education. If 95% of the state can do it, Mr. Speaker, then all of the state can do it and I urge the defeat of this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion... Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I rise to support the Gentleman's motion for numerous reasons. Number one, I would like to point out and we fought this battle many times but I would like to point out to the Gentleman who spoke last, I think things have changed greatly in the last ten or twelve or fifteen years since we adopted junior college concept. Mainly that we have fewer and fewer more children coming into our school system. The need is simply not there for our junior college system as it was some ten or twelve years ago. If we are predicting in K through 12, by 1984, a reduction of 25% in our school population. Now, if that holds true and we have every indication that it will, we simply are not going to need the kind of higher education facilities that we presently have. There are not as many students in our four year universities partly because of the junior college system. I would also point out to the Members of the floor that those people in those districts that are in a junior college district got there by voting on the issue and deciding to join or create a junior college district. That was the plan when the junior college program was conceived. That you would have the option of voting yourself



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in to a junior college and paying the taxes or if you in your area did not need one, then you could not... you would vote not to join one or not to create one. Now, what we're saying is, we're taking that concept away and we're saying you shall be in one whether you need one... whether you want one or not. You're really mandating to the people that they force upon themselves something that they don't need and let me give you an example, in my area where we have opt out time after time, we have two universities one private, one a public. We have a private junior college thirty mile south of the Bloomington-Normal area, we have a junior college district fifty miles east, forty miles west and we had one not too long ago a private junior college thirty miles north. It's simply Ladies and Gentlemen we don't need the junior college in our area and I doubt that it would be used in any great extent and so why force upon our... something that you had the opportunity to vote up or down some years ago and you agreed to join a district and you voted to join one, create one and pay taxes to create that junior college district. Give our people the same opportunity to opt out if they so desire that's all we're asking with this Amendment and I would appreciate support of the Membership. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McGrew."

McGrew: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. I suppose perhaps to balance the discussion on both sides of the aisle, let me point out that I am in complete and absolute agreement with Representative Walsh. This Bill simply puts those forty-eight high school districts that are not now in junior college districts into either existing district or creating new district. Now, let me continue by pointing out that there can be such procedures as John Woods and Quincy College did where by these district as alluded by the Representative from Champaign-Urbana, I'm sorry from Bloomington-Normal area, those areas can be used to contract



the services with the many services that are currently being offered. Ladies and Gentlemen I submit to you this is equibility, it puts every district in the State of Illinois on the same tax paying basis. Those of you that are already in a junior college district I submit that you have a lot to lose with the adoption of this Amendment. If you look at the charge back procedure that we have for high school districts you will discover that indeed those districts are not paying, I repeat, are not paying their fair share or the total per student cost of the various students in that junior college district. That simply reflects the difference in, in district and out of state... out of district tuition and does not reflect the amount of money that has to be raised through local property taxes. This is a bad Amendment and I urge your 'no' vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Willer."

Willer: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I simply would like to address my remarks briefly to the Gentleman from McLean, I think he's got... he sort of obscured his statistics. It's true that the population... the college population is dropping, however, more and more students in my area are availing themselves with the junior colleges... I mean junior colleges because they simply can't afford to go to say, ISU or Champaign. So, I think our need for our junior colleges will be growing not decreasing even though the college population may be going down and of course he does not need junior college in his area, they can practically walk to ISU, so I don't think that's typical. More and more people of the sixth district are availing themselves to junior colleges in the area because they simply can't afford to go to a university. So, it may pain me to say so but I happen to think that Representative Walsh is absolutely right."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Gene Hoffman."

Hoffman: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I rise in opposition to this Amendment and in support of the one



that was originally introduced. If there is fairness in equity that fairness in equity is an equity that is provided by treating all taxpayers and all young people the same across the state. 95% of the state is covered now by junior college districts, it's reasonable, it makes sense and the charge back policy for high school district and those areas in some cases are excessive. The travel time is excessive for some of the people who live in those districts. Obviously junior college districts are going to give their own residents as I think they must, a preference in programs and for these reasons I rise in opposition to this Amendment because it will do exactly as Representative Walsh says, it will for all practical purposes strike the enacting clause from this Bill and make it a nullity. I urge your defeat of this Amendment and then we can on Third Reading debate the issue maybe a little further on its merits but absolutely this Amendment should be defeated."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Mr. Speaker, I move the previous question."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentlemen has moved the previous question."

The question is, shall the main question be put. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. Representative Reilly, to close."

Reilly: "Thank you, Mr..... thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I will be very brief in closing. The statement has been made that the sections of the state that are not included in a junior college district are not paying their fair share. If that is true the fault lies in the charge back procedure itself, not in the subject matter of this Bill by statutes the charge back procedure is supposed to be a formula that will cover the cost, if it does not then let's work on that, let's deal with the problem directly. Let's not force those areas of the state which have voted to stay out of the junior college district which do pay whatever the charge back is for the students



that go, let's not force them into a junior college district. The issue here, I repeat is simple, there is no evidence that we need this compulsory approach. Eleven high school districts have joined voluntarily in the last year or have petitioned to join, it is no reason to think the present voluntary approach which has been the public policy of this state, will fail. I think the issue here is simple this issue of whether the people in the territory affected should have a large tax and a governing body imposed on them without a referendum. If this were any other issue, half of the people at least who spoke against my Amendment would be on the other side. We had ten Bills before us yesterday and at least half of the people who are opposing my Amendment stood up then to talk about how important it was that we have a referendum either front door or back door on each of these provisions. I would ask a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor will vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Representative Greiman."

Greiman: "Mr. Speaker, merely to explain my vote very quickly. I would tell the Sponsor of this legislation that in my Community we have not received the money from... for tuition from the schools that are not in a district, that my community college last week had a judgment in it for some four hundred thousand dollars, I'm advised against I think New Trier Township for funds that were not paid. We in fact, this Amendment encourages the continuation of hangers-on and moochers in the community college area."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished? Representative Keats."

Keats: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I appreciate this moment to speak and I would like to ask some of the blue votes up there, some of the people who are voting 'present' or not voting... not voting to please put yourself in the 'yes'."



column. There are numerous reasons for supporting this Amendment it is one of the most important Amendments that has come out today. It's particular important, number one because we have to allow some basic form of local... local decision to come in, now from my district... from my district within fifteen minutes drive from my house I have seventeen colleges excluding community colleges. We need a community college like we need... well, I was going to say something risque but I'll skip it. Perhaps like a broken leg, there is one thing that my district has voted against at least three referendums recently, it has been to vote against being annexed into community college because we have seven-teen of them so close in that you can spit to them. And so what I ask is please support this Amendment to allow some kind of local conditions to develop. We've got empty school buildings all over our district and the Gentleman that spoke before me and accused my district of being moochers has got an empty...."

Speaker Redmond: "You have two minutes to explain your vote and your two minutes are coming to a close."

Keats: "With that I say, allow local controls; give my district a break and give free choice a break. Vote 'yes' on this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. Representative Porter, two minutes."

Porter: "I'll take my two minutes, thank you. Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, the... one of the previous speakers counts this Bill in terms of putting in to junior college districts those high school districts that were not yet in. That's not accurate, what the Bill does is take away the referendum right that every other one of your high school districts have had and the purpose of the Amendment is to put that right back in. When we have voted, when you have voted to put yourselves in a high school district and we have not, now you have decided



that since we haven't decided the same way that you have, you can put us in without giving us that right of referendum. It seems to me that that's unconstitutional, it seems to me that everyone in the state must have the same right. The same right to vote 'yes' or to vote 'no', it's wrong, it's unfair to take away this referendum right the Amendment would put it back in and I would urge an 'aye' vote, I would urge you to give us the same consideration that you have had in adopting your junior college district. I urge an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Redmond: "The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 58 'no' and 51 'aye' and the Gentlemen's motion fails and the Amendment is not adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, Porter. Amends House Bill 1524 on page 1 and line 1, and in line 5 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz, for what purpose do you rise?"

Lechowicz: "Well, on the board it says Amendment #2, we just defeated one now what's the Amendment number, Mr. Clerk?"

Clerk O'Brien: "We're now on Amendment #2, Amendment #1, just lost."

Lechowicz: "Okay."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Porter."

Porter: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, the purpose of Amendment #2, is simply that if this Bill is adopted there will be lost the right of high school districts to continue to levy a rate to pay the charge back and the purpose of the Amendment is simply to take away the obligation to pay the charge back. It seems to me that if you're going to take away those high school districts' right to levy a tax to pay the tuition to attend junior colleges then you also have to take away the obligation to pay. If you don't take away the obligation to pay then you're going to have some high school districts.



who may not for reasons of litigation or otherwise be in the junior college district, you'll have them paying high.... paying college tuition, junior college tuition from their levy that is levied for high school educational purposes and so this is merely to provide equity to provide fairness to take away the fund, you should also take away the obligation to pay and I would urge the adoption of Amendment #2."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this Amendment is indeed mischievous. This says that the 95% who are within junior college districts shall support at no cost junior college education for the people who are not, for the 5% who are not within junior college districts. It's a terrible Amendment, Mr. Speaker, there is no equity in it at all. It addresses itself also to a problem that really this Bill doesn't deal with, there shall be Bills coming up that will give us an opportunity to enact the charge back for another year which I hope we do not do. But, there will be these Bills and this is mischievous it's capricious and I urge you to defeat it."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ewing."

Ewing: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. My light has been on since the last Amendment so I wanted to speak, which is part of a terrible terrible Bill. Now we are taking over in this Bill and we're rapping Central Illinois for the benefit of a few people who are building their junior college kingdom. They want our farm land, we get no services for it and we're going to pay the tax. Now the last Amendment was a good one, it failed and I couldn't speak on it. This is a good Amendment, it's a taxpayers Amendment and I would suggest an 'aye' vote. If there is anything bad here, it's the Bill itself and not the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hoffman."



Hoffman: "Mr. Speaker, would the Sponsor yield to a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Hoffman: "Representative Porter, who... question. Who pays... who would pay under your Amendment, who would pay tuition charge then?"

Porter: "No one."

Hoffman: "Pardon me."

Porter: "No one."

Hoffman: "Somebody has got to pay it."

Porter: "The student would pay it if they have to. There wouldn't be any students either obvious."

Hoffman: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, it was mentioned earlier by Representative Greiman, it's hard enough to collect from some of these people and apparently what this Amendment does is guarantee that they wouldn't have the responsibility. So, that the 95% taxpayers who are in a junior college district would have to pay for children who came in from outside the district. Now if that's incorrect... if what we're saying is that the children who live in that 5% area not covered wouldn't even be eligible to go, but would have to pay the full freight themselves, absolutely disfranchises those people from opportunity to participate and if this Amendment does nothing else it confuses the major intent of this Bill and that's what we ought to be voting on when we get to Third Reading and for that reason as well as the first reason I mentioned, I oppose the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ebbesen."

Ebbesen: "Mr. Speaker, I move the previous question."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is, shall the main question be put. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the motion carries. Representative Porter, to close."

Porter: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, the question here is whether the high school district that

has no responsibility for junior college education should have to continue to pay from it funds that it raises for its own purposes the tuition of students to attend junior college when they've lost the charge back levy. It seems to me that if you don't have a fund from which to pay a charge back you shouldn't have to pay that charge back any longer and since the legislation that Representative Walsh has proposed, has proposed to take away that levy then we should also take away the obligation to pay the tuition. It seems to me that that is only fair, high schools in this state are in the business of educating high school students not junior college students and it seems to me that we can't put upon our high schools the obligation to pay something from they have no fund to at all and so I would urge an 'aye' vote on Amendment #2."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment #2. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Representative Keats."

Keats: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. To make this very brief... all this Amendment does is say, put your money where your mouth is. If you want to do something you have to pay for it, don't expect the citizens from elsewhere to pay for what you want to do. This is a put your money where your mouth is Amendment and that's all it is."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished? Have all voted? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 35 'ayes', 71 'no' and the Gentleman's motion fails, the Amendment is not adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendemnts."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Representative Walsh, will you give me another non controversial one."

Walsh: "See if I can think of one, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "1549."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1549, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Local Governmental and Governmental Employees



Tort Immunity Act: Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, Jaffe. Amends House Bill 1549 on page 1, line 20 and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Jaffe."

Jaffe: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this is an Amendment put on at the request of the Department of Labor to conform with the Federal Law, it's a non controversial Amendment all it does is make sure that it includes contributions or reimbursements, I would move its adoption."

Speaker Bradley: "Discussion? Hearing none, all in favor of the Gentleman's motion say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2, Hoffman. Amends House Bill 1549 on page 1, line 21 and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Hoffman."

Hoffman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Amendment #2, to House Bill 1549, provides that taxes that are levied by school districts to pay workmen's comp... unemployment compensation cost shall appear separately on tax bills which are sent to taxpayers and shall designated there on as a tax for such purpose. So, that when taxpayer receives his bill the itemized breakout of the bill will indicate the specific charge which is being levied for these purposes. The Sponsor of the Bill and myself have agreed to this Amendment."

Speaker Bradley: "Discussion? The Gentleman from Macon, Mr. J. Dunn."

Dunn: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would like to address myself to this Amendment. This looks to me like a cheap shot to take... at those who try to up-grade workmen's compensation laws in the State of Illinois, to separate this out on the tax bill so that you can tell people that they are being taxed for workmen's compensation. Those measures were up-



graded and there is some controversy about this and there is no need to take this issue to the people tax bills. I urge a 'no' vote on this Amendment."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from DuPage, to close."

Man: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I think the last speaker explained as well as anyone might the reason why this would be separated. If he wants the high cost for the taxpayers so be it, I happen to be one who says let's put it out in front and let them know where this money is going and for that reason, I urge your support of this Amendment."

Speaker Bradley: "The Lady from Cook, Mrs. Pullen."

Woman: "This Amendment is very simple, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. It is called truth in packaging and I urge an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Bradley: "All in favor of the Gentleman's Amendment will say 'aye', opposed 'no'. All those in favor of the Gentleman's motion will vote 'aye', opposed will vote 'no'. Geo, would you turn around and vote me 'aye' on that issue please. The Clerk will take the record. On this question 96 'aye', 39 'nay', the Gentleman's motion is adopted... the Amendment is adopted. Further Amendments?"

O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Third Reading. 1767."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1767, a Bill for an Act relating to the regulation of home health agencies. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Bradley: "Are there any motions relevant to Amendment #1?"

O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Bradley: "Further Amendments?"

O'Brien: "Amendment #2, Jaffe. Amends House Bill 1767 amended by deleting Section 2.04 and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Jaffe."

"Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this is an Amendment

that was put on because the Department of Public Health wishes it to be so. Actually what it does is, it revises the definition of home health agency and home health services, it deletes the requirement that all licenses expire on September 30th, of each year and it provides a couple of other things that the Department of Public Health wanted to have as clean-up measures. I would move its adoption."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #2, to House Bill 1767. All in favor of the Gentleman's motion say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3, Stuffle. Amends House Bill 1767 as amended by inserting after the last line in Section 12 and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Coles, Mr. Stuffle."

Stuffle: "Mr. Speaker and Members. Amendment #3, is the Christian Science Amendment to this particular Bill. Representative Jaffe and I discussed it, he has no opposition to it and I would move its adoption."

Speaker Bradley: "Discussion? The Gentleman offers Amendment #3, to 1767. All in favor of the Gentleman's motion say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the motion and Amendment is adoption. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Third Reading. 1727."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1727, a Bill for an Act to provide for registration of marriages, divorces and annulments. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee. There is a motion filed to table Amendment #1, by Representative Sumner."

Speaker Bradley: "Representative Sumner, on the motion relevant to Amendment #1, to House Bill 1727."

Sumner: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I offered this Amendment in Committee and had some problems so I drafted another Amendment to substitute. I

have discussed the matter with the Committee Chairman and the Minority Spokesman and they are both in agreement with the motion. I ask your favorable support."

Speaker Braldehy: "The Lady...."

Sumner: "I move to table the first Amendment."

Speaker Bradley: "The Lady moves to table Amendment #1, to House Bill 1727. All in favor of the Lady's motion will say 'aye'...."

Sumner: "Now, I make a motion... excuse me."

Speaker Bradley: "Opposed say 'nay', in the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it and Amendment #1, is tabled."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2, Sumner. Amends House Bill 1727 by deleting line 11 to 32 and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "The Lady from Peoria, Mrs. Sumner."

Sumner: "With the agreement of the Committee Chairman and the Minority Spokesman, I offer this Amendment. It is the same that passed in Committee... I'm informed that I have to table this one... because it has a technical error in it and I have Amendment #3."

Speaker Bradley: "The Lady moves to table her Amendment #2. Any objections? Hearing no objection the Amendment is tabled. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3, Sumner. Amends House Bill 1727 on page 1."

Sumner: "Thank you, now I'll get around to explaining it. With the agreement of the Chairman and the Minority Spokesman what this Amendment does is it changes the fee from two dollars to three dollars. In Committee it was two dollars to five dollars and there was some disagreement, I've taken it back to the three dollar so now, I ask a favorable motion in raising it from two dollars to three dollars. Thank you."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. D. Houlihan."

Houlihan: "It would appear that the Amendment that the Sponsor is speaking to is Amendment #2, I think what she intended to do is table Amendment #1, to adopt Amendment #2 because



Amendment #3, simply refers to the title of the Bill."

Speaker Bradley: "She tabled Amendment #1 and she tabled Amendment #2."

Houlihan: "I don't think she intended actually to table Amendment #2, is that correct."

Sumner: "Thank you, you're correct. That's what I started to do and thought I was wrong. Thank you. We're tabling the Amendment in Committee, #2 is correct the fee so that it is two dollars to three dollars and...."

Houlihan: "Pass Amendment #2 and if we will go to Amendment #2."

Speaker Bradley: "Let's go back to #2 and if Ms. Sumner would, would you please move to take Amendment #2, from the table."

Sumner: "I so move."

Speaker Bradley: "All in favor of the Ladies motion say 'aye', opposed 'nay'. All right we have Amendment #2 and will you move to adopt."

Sumner: "I move to adopt."

Speaker Bradley: "Amendment #2, to House Bill 1727. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'nay'. The 'ayes' have it. Further Amendments?"

Sumner: "Thank you. The #3 Amendment now, is one that was a technical error and this was found in House Enrolling and Engrossing Department. I move to adopt."

Speaker Bradley: "All those in favor of the Ladies motion to adopt Amendment #3, to House Bill 1727, will say 'aye', opposed 'nay'. The 'ayes' have it. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Third Reading. House Bill...."

Sumner: "Thank you."

Speaker Bradley: "House Bill 2204."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2204, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of Public Community College Act. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, Lucco, Stuffle. Amends



House Bill 2204 on page 3, by deleting line 13 and 14 and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Madison, Mr. Lucco."

Lucco: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I will... would like to ask to table Amendment #1 and I will ask put on two other Amendments after that..."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman moves to table Amendment #1, to House Bill 2204. All those in favor will say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is tabled. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2, Lucco. Amends House Bill 2204 on page 3...."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. D. Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Amendment #2, been printed and distributed?"

Lucco: "Yes, also #3... about two days ago. Amendment #2, strictly changes some wording... including but not which amount is, in other words it limits the amount which the person could collect under hearing process. This was a proposed Amendment in Committee which I agreed to accept and put on, on the floor. I move that Amendment #2, be accepted."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Houlihan."

Houlihan: "I believe the line that he intends to amend by Amendment #2, is page 3, line 13, but the Amendment as drafted calls for page 3 and line 16 and if I am correct I think he would want to amend the Amendment on its fact, Representative Lucco."

Lucco: "Thank you, that is correct. It should be line 13, however, it does call for line 16, with your indulgence if you would allow me to change that to line 13, I would appreciate it."

Speaker Bradley: "Are there any objections to amending it on its face? Hearing no objections it will be so done. Now, on the Amendment."

Lucco: "That is the Amendment."

Speaker Bradley: "Did you move the adoption of the Amendment?"



Lucco: "Yes, I moved the adoption of Amendment #2."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #2, to House Bill 2204. All those in favor will say 'aye', opposed 'nay'. The 'ayes' have it. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3, Lucco. Amends House Bill 2204 on page 1, line 28 and so forth."

Lucco: "Amendment #3, changes the terminology of from State Board of Education to the Board of Higher Education in several instances because the Bill was not intended to put the provision on to State Board of Education, it should be under the Board of Higher Education. I move Amendment #3, be adopted."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman moves the Amendment #3, on House Bill 2204. All in favor will signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'nay'. The 'ayes' have it. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Third Reading. House Bill 1767."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1767...."

Speaker Bradley: "That's Mr. Jaffe's Bill, did we already work...."

Clerk O'Brien: "That Bill was already moved to Third Reading."

Speaker Bradley: "House Bill 1248."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1248, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections to the Civil Administrative Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, J.J. Wolf. Amends House Bill 1248 on page 2, by deleting line 16 through 30 and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "Is Mr. Wolf on the floor? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Wolf."

Wolf: "Mr. Speaker, I'm sorry that I was off the floor. This Amendment is an Amendment which was introduced as a recommendation to the Department of Mental Health. It tightens up the language and they are in support of the Bill with

this Amendment."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #1, to House Bill 1248. All those in favor of the Gentleman's motion say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendemtns."

Speaker Bradley: "Third Reading. House Bill 1503."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1503, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Insurance Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, J.J. Wolf. Amends House Bill 1503 on page 1 and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Wolf."

Wolf: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this Amendment was introduced was drafted by the Department of Insurance to tighten the language and so the policies would include homeowner policy as well as fire policy. I would move its adoption."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #1, to House Bill 1503. All in favor of the Gentleman's motion say 'aye', opposed 'nay'. The 'ayes' have it. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Third Reading. House Bill 1504."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1504, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Insurance Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, J.J. Wolf. Amends House Bill 1504 on page 1, line 1 and 8 and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Wolf."

Wolf: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this also was one drafted with the advice of the Department of Insurance because this is what the Committee Members... we had agreed



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to in Committee to pass the Bill out. Again it is a language tightening and it says that no company authorized to transact in this state described in classes 2 and 3, can refuse to provide policies, I move its adoption."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #1, to House Bill 1504. All those in favor will say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The Amendment is adopted. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Third Reading. House Bill 761."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 761, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Child Care Act. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, failed in Committee and Amendment #2, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Bradley: "Are there any motions relevant to Amendment #2."

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Bradley: "Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3, Jane Barnes. Amends House Bill 761 as amended and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Houlihan, indicates he does not have the Amendment."

Houlihan: "Has it been printed?"

Speaker Bradley: "Should we take that out of the record for... the Amendment has not been printed, we'll take that out of the record. House Bill 1809."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1809, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Amendment from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Terzich. Amends House Bill 1809 on page 1, line 1 and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "Representative Terzich... is he on the floor? Take that out of the record. 1946."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1946, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the County Department of Corrections Act."



Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Leverenz. Amends House Bill 1946 on page 1, line 12 and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Leverenz."

Leverenz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Amendment #1, is simply a language correction. It puts in a word 'the' prior to the word 'boards' on line 12 and changes the word 'unexpired' to 'expired' to make it technically correct and the error came through the Reference Bureau. I move the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #1, to House Bill 1946. All in favor of the Gentleman's motion say 'aye', opposed 'nay'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Third Reading. 2219."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2219, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1, Leverenz. Amends House Bill 2219 by deleting line 19 and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Leverenz."

Leverenz: "Thank you. This Amendment was agreed to in Committee and that I would put it on on the House floor and it would make it so the employee would pay his own contribution and the organization that he would allowed to have a leave to work with would pay the employers contribution to the pension fund. I move the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #1, to House Bill 2219. All in favor of the Gentleman's motion say 'aye', opposed 'nay'. In the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it. The Amendment is adopted. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."



Speaker Bradley: "Third Reading. House Bill 935."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 935, a Bill for an Act to amend the Insurance Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Daniels. Amends House Bill 935 on page 1, line 22 and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Daniels."

Daniels: "Yes, Mr. Speaker this is merely a clean up Amendment in accordance with the hearing before the Insurance Committee where JUA would be accepted medical malpractice from the present time until October 1, 1979. This is a recommendation of the Insurance Committee. I move for the adoption."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. D. Houlihan."

Houlihan: "I have a question of the Sponsor if he will yield?"

Speaker Bradley: "He indicates that he will."

Houlihan: "The Bill as originally drafted calls for a seven year period?"

Daniels: "It called for a five year extension, this presently this Amendment would make it until October 1, 1979, supported by the Insurance Committee and by the Director of Insurance."

Speaker Bradley: "Further discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption... the Lady from Lake, Mrs. Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Will the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Bradley: "He says, no, but I think he means yes. He's nodding no but said yes, I think that's the way it was."

Geo-Karis: "Smarty. Anyway, in this Bill Representative, does this defer to private liability?"

Daniels: "No."

Geo-Karis: "Okay, thank you."

Speaker Bradley: "Further discussion? Hearing none, the Gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #1, to House Bill 935. All in favor will signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'nay'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Further Amendments?"



Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2, Daniels. Amends House Bill 935 on page 1, line 1 and 6 and so forth,"

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Daniels."

Daniels: "Amendment #2, is a technical Amendment. It was recommended by Mr. John Smith, who is a very outstanding practitioner in the field of insurance to allow alien companies to be treated the same as foreign companies in the cases of the JUA. This had the support of the previous Director of Insurance, Mr. Wilcox and was omitted from the JUA treatment and it is a technical Amendment. I don't think there is any objection to it."

Speaker Bradley: "Discussion? The Gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #2. All in favor of the Gentleman's motion say 'aye', opposed 'nay'. The 'ayes' have it. Amendment is adopted. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Third Reading. 1772."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1772, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act regarding judgments and decrees. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, Daniels. Amends House Bill 1772 on page 2, by adding after line 6, the following and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Daniels."

Daniels: "Amendment #1, on 1772 is a definition of abandoned property. This is in accordance with the hearing before the Judiciary I Committee and an agreement that I made with them and that's further into that agreement."

Speaker Bradley: "Discussion? Hearing none... the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. D. Houlihan."

Houlihan: "I have a question of the Sponsor."

Speaker Bradley: "He indicates that he will yield."

Houlihan: "Directing your attention to the Amendment, you called for an abandon word there has been a discontinuation of



maintenance of mortgage property. How do you define that discontinuation of maintenance of property."

Daniels: "You want me to define discontinued maintenance where one stops maintaining the property and when he goes into court asks for a court order as to whether or not the property has been abandoned and the court receives evidence after notice is given to all persons involved through the foreclosure procedure that the mortgage holder is going to go and ask for a definition that the property has been abandoned, this one be one of the tests he has... discontinued the maintenance for preservation of the mortgage property and that he cease to be present there."

Houlihan: "So, it has to be a court finding."

Daniels: "Oh, absolutely... absolutely."

Speaker Bradley: "Further discussion? The Gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #1, to House Bill 1772. All in favor of the Gentleman's motion say 'aye', opposed 'nay'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "House Bill 829.... Third Reading, or Third Reading. 829."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 829, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Emergency Services and Disaster Agency Act. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Waddell. Amends House Bill 829 on page 2, by inserting immediately after line 21, the following: and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Waddell."

Waddell: "Mr. Speaker, I move to table Amendment #1."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman moves to table Amendment #1. All in favor of the Gentleman's motion say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The Amendment is tabled. Further Amendments?"



Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2, Waddell. Amends House Bill 829 on page 2, line 1 and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Waddell."

Waddell: "Mr. Speaker, I believe that the Bill now contains the proper delineation as pointed out on the other side of the aisle. It determines the Executive Officer and also alleviates from the department that responsibility to supervise everyone of the exercises in the Bill and therefore, merely approves.... I move for its approval."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #2, to House Bill 829. All in favor of the Gentleman's motion say 'aye', opposed 'nay'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Third Reading. 1061."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1061, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Horse Racing Act. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Bradley: "Any motion relevant to Amendment #1."

Clerk O'Brien: "No motion filed."

Speaker Bradley: "Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Waddell."

Waddell: "Mr. Speaker, I move to table Amendment #1."

Speaker Bradley: "The Amendment that was adopted in the Committee you're moving to table Amendment #1?"

Waddell: "Correct."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman moves to table Amendment #1, to House Bill 1061. All in favor of the Gentleman's motion say 'aye', opposed 'nay'. The Gentleman's motion carries and Amendment... the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. D. Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Wasn't this Representative Mudd's Amendment which is now being tabled?"

Waddell: "No."

Houlihan: "The copy... the Amendment that we have has Mudd's



name on it."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Waddell, to explain."

Waddell: "What this does now, it puts the Bill in its original fashion and it does one thing and one thing only. Probably the smallest Amendment in this Session it just changes from 'American Veterinarian' to 'Illinois Veterinarian' and that would be the posture of the Bill right now."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Peoria, Mr. Mudd."

Mudd: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I offered that Amendment in Committee and all it does is is corrective legislation. Mr. Waddell is perfectly correct and to my knowledge the Amendment is not controversial at all."

Speaker Bradley: "Back to the Gentleman's motion to table... we are in that position...."

Waddell: "Table Amendment..."

Speaker Bradley: "Table Amendment #1, to House Bill 1061. All in favor of the Gentleman's motion say 'aye', opposed 'nay'. The 'ayes' have it and Amendment #1, to 1061 is tabled. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Third Reading. 1062."

Waddell: "Mr. Speaker..."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1062, a Bill for an Act vacating a public roadway in Kane County. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Bradley: "Are there any motions relevant to Amendment #1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Bradley: "Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2, Waddell. Amends House Bill 1062 as amended by deleting all of Section 1, and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Waddell."

Waddell: "Yes, this is an easement Bill and what Amendment #2, does... it delineates actually the amount to be vacated



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in this particular area and what this does, it puts the Bill in that kind of shape whereby the people had given this territory to the State of Illinois originally for one dollar, now gives the state fifty feet access off of that and the remainder returns to the original owners. That's the posture of the Bill."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #2, to House Bill 1062. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'nay'. The 'ayes' have it and the motion is adopted... the Amendment is adopted. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3, Waddell. Amends House Bill 1062 as amended by deleting all of Section 1 and inserting in lieu thereof, the following and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Waddell."

Waddell: "The same."

Speaker Bradley: "Move the adoption of Amendment #3, to House Bill 1062. All in favor of the Gentleman's motion say 'aye', opposed 'nay'. The 'ayes' have it, Amendment is adopted. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Third Reading. House Bill 1039. Mrs. Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Houe Bill 1039, there was an Amendment adopted in Committee. I don't know if there are any further Amendment."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1039, a Bill for an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Department of Aging. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Bradley: "Any motions relevant to Amendment #1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Bradley: "Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Third Reading."



Geo-Karis: "Thank you."

Speaker Bradley: "1824, Mr. J.D. Jones."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1824, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Probate Act. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee. Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Bradley: "Are there any motions relevant to Amendment #1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Bradley: "Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Third Reading. Ladies and Gentlemen for your information, so that you will know what the schedule might be for the rest of the evening. The plans of the Chair are to work again tonight until 5:30, break until 7:00 and come back and we're going to work late... 11...ish, try to get some of this work done so, that's the intention of the Chair. Now, we'll go back to the order of call. Mr. J.D. Jones."

Jones: "1824, is on the board do you want to adopt the Amendment? There is a Committee Amendment to be adopted. I move its adoption."

Speaker Bradley: "That's already taken care of and we moved it to Third Reading, Mr. Jones. Representative Giglio, to help clear up the Calendar on 1936."

Giglio: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I would like leave to table House Bill 1936."

Speaker Bradley: "Does the Gentlemen have leave? Hearing no objections, House Bill 1936, is tabled. Mr. Meyer, the Gentleman from Cook, what purpose do you rise, Sir?"

Meyer: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to have leave to table House Bill 1049, I am the Chief Sponsor."

Speaker Bradley: "Does the Gentleman have leave to table House Bill 1049? Hearing no objections, the Bill is tabled."

Meyer: "And, re-refer to Appropriations Committee 1046 and 1047,"



they're Appropriation Bills."

Speaker Bradley: "Where are those Bills right now, Mr. Meyer?"

Meyer: "Second Reading, they never got re-referred to Appropriations they went from Executive out to the floor of the House, they should be re-referred to Appropriations."

Speaker Bradley: "Are they Appropriation Bills, Mr. Meyer?"

Meyer: "Yes, Sir."

Speaker Bradley: "You're moving to re-refer those from Executive II...."

Meyer: "No, they are on Second Reading."

Speaker Bradley: "Oh, re-commit then."

Meyer: "Re-commit."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman has moved to re-commit House Bills 1046 and 1047 to the Appropriations Committee..."

Meyer: "Representative Barnes is Appropriation, what is that II?"

Speaker Bradley: "I was going to ask, are those your Bills, Mr. Meyer?"

Meyer: "Yes, Sir."

Speaker Bradley: "Does the Gentleman have leave to... we're having some problem with 1046, is not an Appropriation Bill."

Meyer: "Well, don't the Companion Bills have to be re-referred? Well, then fine just 1047, the Appropriation."

Speaker Bradley: "All right, let's re-refer 1047, the Appropriations Committee. Hearing no objections, it will be re-committed. The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Yes, could I have leave of the House. We've got some Commission Bills, we've got the Appropriations I Committee as a Subcommittee on Commissions and we would like to have leave to suspend the posting notice so that these Bills can be heard Monday, in the Subcommittee on Commission of Appropriations I. They are House Bills 645, 715, 1124, 1534, 1538, 1574, 1634, 2001, 2351, 2365 and 2370. Could we have that leave?"

Speaker Bradley: "Mr. Matijevich, would you please bring that



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list up to the Clerk's desk and does the Gentleman have leave to suspend the posting rule so that those Bills may be heard in a Subcommittee, Monday..."

Matijevich: "Those will be heard at one o'clock, Monday afternoon. We had twelve o'clock but because the Chairman can't be there it will be a one o'clock Monday afternoon in the Subcommittee on Commission."

Speaker Bradley: "Does the Gentleman have leave?"

Matijevich: "Thank you."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Barnes."

Barnes: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, in the same vein..."

Speaker Bradley: "Let me take care of... we didn't... I thought you were going to speak on the Gentleman's motion. Hearing no objections, I thought you were objecting so, hearing no objections, the Gentleman has leave and those Bills shall be posted to be heard in the rule will be suspended and we will use the attendance Roll Call. Now, Mr. Barnes."

Barnes: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, in the same vein, I would ask leave to suspend the proper rule so that we can have a supplemental posting for the following Bills: House Bill 648, House Bill 688, 1038, 1064, 1065, 1106, 1127, 2378 and 2380, so that we can have those Bills heard on Monday, in Appropriations II."

Speaker Bradley: "Does the Gentleman have leave to suspend the posting rule so that those Bills can be heard and will you please bring the list of those Bills to the Clerk's office... Clerk's desks. Are there any objections? Hearing none, leave is granted and the suspension of the posting rule, at your request is adopted. Now, we're back to the order of call and we'll continue on that and starting at the top of page 6, House Bill 528, Mr. Griesheimer."

Griesheimer: "Mr. Speaker, this Bill has already been moved to Third Reading."

Speaker Bradley: "535, Capparelli."



Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 535, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Bradley: "Any motion relevant to Amendemnt #1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motion filed."

Speaker Bradley: "Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2, Capparelli. Amends House Bill 535 on page 1, line 16 and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Capparelli."

Capparelli: "Mr. Speaker, first I would like to table Amendment #1. Amendment #1, was the Amendment where it eliminate the 3% automatic increase and we're going to decrease that to 2% on Amendment #2 and I ask to table Amendment #1."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman moves to table Amendment #1. Any discussion? All in favor of the Gentleman's motion say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is tabled. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2, Capparelli."

Capparelli: "All right, Amendment #2, now deletes 3% down to 2% and it makes the employees contribution 1/2 instead of 3/8 and I would ask to adopt Amendment #2 and keep this Bill on Second Reading for impact statement."

Speaker Bradley: "Discussion on the Gentleman's motion? All in favor of his motion will say 'aye', opposed 'nay'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. We'll leave the Bill on Second Reading."

Capparelli: "Thank you."

Speaker Bradley: "Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "All right. Hold it on Second. 560."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 560, a Bill for an Act to establish the Illinois Community Development Finance Corporation..."

Speaker Bradley: "We'll take this out of the record, there is a request for a fiscal note and it has not been filed. House Bill 562."



Clerk O'Brien: "That Bill is moved to Third Reading already."

Speaker Bradley: "563."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 563, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Public Aid Code. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Bradley: "Any motions relevant to Amendment #1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Bradley: "Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2 and 3, failed in Committee, floor Amendment #4, Keats. Amends House Bill 563 on page 1, by inserting the following and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "Is Mr. Keats on the floor? Mr. Keats. Take that out of the record. 575. Is Mr. Mann on the floor? Miss Chapman, for what purpose do you rise?"

Chapman: "Mr. Bradley, I really regret having my Bill held back because an unfriendly Amendment is being offered to it and the Sponsor of that Amendment does not have enough interest to be on the floor to offer it."

Speaker Bradley: "What Bill are you referring to Miss Chapman?"

Chapman: "House Bill 563, the one you just called."

Speaker Bradley: "And what is your objection?"

Chapman: "I don't support the Amendment but I really would like to have my Bill moved along and not be held back simply because the mover of an unfriendly Amendment is not present on the floor."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Hoffman."

Hoffman: "Mr. Speaker, for the edification of the Sponsor of this Bill, the Sponsor of that unfriendly Amendment has gone down to the Reference Bureau to create another unfriendly Amendment for somebody else's Bill and it... oh, he's back. I see he has returned to participate in further mischief."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Matijevich."

Matijevich: "I make a point of order that these so called Amendments are not printed, not on our desk, she has every



right to have her Bill moved to Third Reading."

Speaker Bradley: "I think it is the posture of the Chair generally that as a Gentleman or Lady is not here to offer an Amendment to a Sponsor's Bill, I think it is their responsibility to be here to offer that Amendment, they are delaying the action of the floor of the House and I Mrs. Chapman is correct and Mr.... the Sponsor is here now and we go... with no objections from Mrs. Chapman, we'll go to that Gentleman's Amendment and then we will... and if it isn't printed we will not be able to go with... Is the Amendment printed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No, the Amendment is not printed yet."

Speaker Bradley: "The Lady from Cook, Mrs. Chapman."

Chapman: "This Bill has been on the Calendar for weeks and weeks, Mr. Bradley. I can't understand that the Amendment hasn't been printed. I would offer Sponsor the courtesy of bringing it back to Second, even though it is such an unfriendly Amendment, if this would help things along."

Speaker Bradley: "Mr. Keats..."

Chapman: "I'll bring it back to Second."

Speaker Bradley: "The Lady is inclined to have this Bill moved to Third Reading which she has every right to do to request that and she will bring it back to Second Reading for your Amendment when the Amendment is printed. Is that agreeable? Mr. Keats."

Keats: "Mr. Speaker, I handed in this Amendment within a day or two of the time the Bill came out of Committee, I don't know where it is but I handed it in weeks ago, weeks and I know perfectly well it is printed. Now, I think what happened, Mr. Speaker, I think what happened is this Bill has been sitting on Second Reading for such a prolong period of time, the Amendment was passed out two and a half weeks ago and if everyone did what I do, with two and a half week old Amendments, it's in the wastebasket but the Amendment was printed, unless I'm wrong it was passed out awhile



ago."

Speaker Bradley: "We have two sources to check, Mr. Keats and both of them indicate that they have never received the Amendment. Now, in order to go ahead, I think that in view that Mrs. Chapman has agreed to bring this Bill back when the Amendment arrives and I think it is up to you to see where that Amendment is and why it isn't on the floor."

Keats: "Mr. Speaker, as long as it can be brought back that is perfectly fair, it is not her fault that the Amendment is missing, I know that it is not mine. Let me check on it, but as long as she will come back, that is not unreasonable I'm perfectly willing to go along with that."

Chapman: "Okay."

Speaker Bradley: "All right, now lets move back to 563, are there further Amendments on 563? Let's take care quickly. Now were there any Committee Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "There was Committee Amendment #1, was adopted, Committee Amendemnt #2 and 3, failed."

Speaker Bradley: "Well, any motions relevant to Committee Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Bradley: "Further Amendemnts, other than Mr. Keats?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Third Reading. The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Barnes."

Barnes: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House and I appreciate your indulgence. I would move, Mr. Speaker to waive the appropriate rule... have leave of the House to waive the appropriate rule so that Senate Bill 486, can be heard Monday. The posting rule for that purpose this is the Department of Public Aid deficiency appropriation."

Speaker Bradley: "Does the Gentleman have leave to suspend the posting rule so that Senate Bill..."

Barnes: "486."



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Speaker Bradley: "486 and would you bring that down to the Clerk's desk so we can... hearing no objections, the posting rule has been suspended and the Bill can be heard. We will use the attendance Roll Call. Second Reading appears 575."



Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 575, a Bill for an Act in relation to discrimination on basis of sexual orientation. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Amendments from the floor."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Deuster. Amends House Bill 575 on page 1 and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Deuster."

Deuster: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, House Bill 575, came before the Judiciary I Committee upon which I serve, as I remember and... I think that was a Committee and our staff analysts indicated what is obvious to anyone looking at the Bill. It did prohibit discrimination on the grounds of sexual orientation. Sexual orientation needs to be defined, it's not found in the statutes anywhere else. I had the Illinois Legislative Counsel look into this to see what it meant and if there is any well known definitions. Since there aren't any I've offered Amendment #1, which defines it. My feeling is, if we are going to prohibit public universities and community colleges from discriminating against the job applicant against the basis of sexual orientation, we ought to be specific and indicate what that is. Amendment #1, defines sexual orientation and it says for the purpose of this Act it means male or female, homosexuality, heterosexuality, or bisexuality by preference or practice and the lawful choice for disposition to choose a sexual or affectional partner or partners by gender or any lawful manifestation of such choice or disposition. I think this does tighten the Bill, narrows it. I believe it is acceptable to the Sponsors and I move the adoption of Amendment #1."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Mann."

Mann: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this Amendment elaborates by definition almost every other sexual orientation or life style. It was not our choice as the word or the collection of words with which we would bar discrimination,



however, we feel that the Amendment is offered in good faith. We feel that in good faith we are going to accept it. In so accepting, I want to make one statement that I would hope that you would keep in mind throughout this debate. These Bills do not confer one single light upon anybody, they merely add as a category a group of people to certain rights which are available and which are a part of Illinois law to the rest of us. So, we're not adding anything we're merely putting a class of people in a category similar to what all ready exists. And, in that spirit, Mr. Speaker, I would accept and urge that Amendment #1 be adopted."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #1. All in favor will say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The Amendment is adopted. Further Amendments?"

Clerk Hall: "Amendment #2, Hudson. Amends House Bill 575, on page 1, line 14 and following."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Hudson."

Hudson: "Yes, thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Amendment #2, to House Bill 575 is offered in the sincere belief that a persons right to join nor not join an employees union is fundamental to a free society and certainly in the public sector with which House Bill 575 deals. This is especially true, no teacher or public employee, it seems to me should be placed in a position where a membership in any organization or non-membership will be a condition of employment or of retention or of advancement in position or salary. No teacher should be put in a position where he may be called upon to strike against government which hires him and strike against taxpayers who pay his salary. To do so is by definition, in my opinion at least, a form of insurrection. And this Bill purports to extend civil rights to a group of people previously mentioned by prohibiting discrimination in one area. And the Amendment I offer, simply would extend the concept of per-



mission to another group of people in another area and

I would urge my colleagues to support this Amendment."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, in a lot simpler language, Representative Hudson is trying to offer a right-to-scab Bill. Let's call it what it is, let's not try and flower it up and make fancy phrases about what it is. It's a right-to-scab and those members... I think even without any doubt in my mind even those conservative Members of the General Assembly recognize that the right-to-scab in Illinois is not something that the lofty ideal, its not something that any Governor ever runs on in a campaign promise. It is not something that most Legislators run on in their district that when they talk to the working people back in their district about how they feel about trade unionism in the State of Illinois. And' this Amendment pure and simple deserves a very fast death because what this Amendment pretends to be as a lofty ideal is truly, the most union busting, the most rotten type of principle type of Amendment that could be offered to hurt. And you talk about throwing down and putting down the business interest of this state, just adopt the right-to-work law and see what happens in this state to the business community and the upheaval and labor in the community of work and workers, see what would happen then. But we can't take that gamble, so I ask the Members of the General Assembly to overwhelmingly and for once and for all put to death this kind of right-to-scab Amendment."

Speaker Bradley: "Further discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Greiman."

Greiman: "Thank you.... for a question, would the Gentleman yield for a question?"

Speaker Bradley: "He indicates that he will."

Greiman: "Does this mean that the Chamber of Commerce is going to support the Gay Bills and the the Gay Rights Bills, if

this Amendment goes on? Can you speak for them as their Representative?"

Hudson: "No, I have not consulted the Chamber of Commerce relevant to the so called Gay Bills, you called them that I didn't call them that."

Greiman: "Well, we have mixed up working and right to work sex and there is not a confusion in anybody's mind that one will be work and one would be something else."

Hudson: "No, I think this Amendment has merit and is fully entitled to be considered on its own merits and should rise or fall on its own merits."

Greiman: "I see." Well, I suppose on the Bill.... the Amendment if I might, I think that's right, things should rise and fall on their own merits and what we have done by this Amendment is to take things which are unrelated, totally unrelated and I think whether you have strong feeling about one you ought not to be compelled to lock in balance them against the other. They're fully unrelated, wholly unrelated. If people want a right-to-work law and if that's the kind of law they can get through this General Assembly, that's fine I have no objection to that... going along in the Legislative process but not by putting together two wholly unrelated areas of interest. I think we should defeat this."

Speaker Bradley: "The Lady from Cook, Mrs. Pullen."

Pullen: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I am deeply grieved to hear a Member of this Body refer to people who want to be able to hold jobs as scab. This Amendment has nothing to do with scabbing, this Amendment has to do with basic human rights and I urge you to vote 'aye'."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Hudson, to close."

Hudson: "Well, thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I might say, first of all, I'm utterly amazed that Representative Hanahan would rise and take the position



that he's taken relevant to this Amendment. It is totally unexpected on my part but nevertheless he has done it. Now, I want to say.... I want to say this and make it perfectly clear that I in no way consider myself or this Amendment a scab Amendment. It is an Amendment that would extend the philosophy of freedom that Representative Mann purports to represent...the philosophy by freedom. It is an extension, in my opinion, of the area of civil liberty. And if people can be employed and hired and it is unlawful to discriminate in anyway or to consider their sexual orientation which could mean... well, I won't even get in to that, But if that area can't be discriminated against or questioned in anyway, it seems inconceivable to me that a man or a woman should be barred from the teaching profession because he or she simply does not happen to belong or does belong to a labor organization. I'm not arguing in my Amendment here the case for or against labor organizations or unions or belong.... or a member of them but, I am arguing that an individual, particularly a teacher should have the right of choice and it is as simple as that. I think it is a further extension of the freedom philosophy that Representative Mann seems to be concerned about here. And I believe that an idea, who's to use the old cliché, who's time has come. I close my case and urge your green vote on this good Amendment."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #2, to House Bill 575. All those in favor will say 'aye', opposed 'no'. All those in favor vote 'aye', opposed will vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 31 'ayes', 92 'nays' and the Gentleman's motion having failed to receive a majority is hereby declared lost. Further Amendments?"



Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3, Schoeberlein, amends House Bill 575, on page 1, line 14 and 27, page 2, line 10, by changing orientation to deviation."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Schoeberlein on Amendment #3."

Schoeberlein: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, there is no use fooling around with a word like orientation that doesn't mean a thing when you're talking about sex. You might as well call a spade a spade.... when you're in bed with a female, you are not orientating and when you are in bed with a male, it is deviation. And the Bible talks about deviation when you are in bed with a male and it tells a penalty for it and you want to know.... and perhaps our Reverend can tell you where to find it, if not I have it here. So, all I say is, let all of us know where it is, what it is, what they are teaching in...."

Speaker Bradley: "Let's give the Gentleman some order please."

Schoeberlein: "I'm very happy that this Bill was not heard while the young people were in the gallery, the ones that were there are old enough to know what we're talking about, besides that is what we're down here for. In Dade...."

Speaker Bradley: "I'm not sure about that."

Schoeberlein: "That's after adjournment. In Dade County in Florida, Miami is the largest city. They have passed a Bill allowing homosexuals doing this and doing that and being in government and everything else and on June the 9th there will be a referendum there, I'll tell you why. They are recruiting the young boys of Dade County to join them. Now, when two men get together, and I have taken this out of the newspaper of the Washington Star, what are the two of them doing? And listen to this and you Ladies close your ears if you want to.... I want everybody to hear this because you know that is what it is. They are eating the sperm of another male and that is exactly what it is."



There is no reproduction, have any of you ever seen an offspring of homosexuals? It just isn't there and even the hookers are complaining. So, Mr. Chairman and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, all I ask is that the true word be shown here instead of orientation that would be what I have shown, that is deviation and I ask its adoption."

Speaker Bradley: "Further discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Sandquist."

Sandquist: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This is really not a comical matter. This is a serious matter and I believe that... I wish that each and every Member of the House was in the Committee when we heard the witnesses on these Bills. But that is really not germane because I don't believe Representative Schoeberlein, has read what the Amendment... what we just adopted here which completely defines sexual orientation and is now part of the Bill. And this kind of... what he calls deviation may be deviation to him but it is not deviation to someone else. And I think that we have adopted a definition in Amendment #1, that is in the Bills now and this is a serious matter. Let's not make jokes of it but let us quickly defeat this Amendment and get on with the business."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Mann, on the Amendment."

Mann: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I don't even think the Amendment is appropriate in view of the Amendment #1, which we adopted which was, Mr. Deavers'. So, I think the Amendment is out of order."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Schoeberlein to close."

Schoeberlein: "Mr. Speaker, about four years ago I opposed the rest stop on Route 47...."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Mann."



Mann: "May I have a ruling on that, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Bradley: "You didn't ask for a ruling, you said you thought it was out of order."

Mann: "Sorry, may I have a ruling on it, Sir?"

Speaker Bradley: "Certainly. You're basing... you're objection is on adoption of Amendment #1? The Parliamentarian suggested that it is in proper form and it is not out of order. It might be incompatible but we'll... not a procedural matter it's a substantive so we have to rule that the Amendment is in order. Mr. Schoeberlein, to close."

Schoeberlein: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I don't take the floor very often but when things like this come up on the floor here, where we're encouraging homosexuals, four years ago I opposed the rest stop on Route 47, outside of Yorkville, I could see no need for it because there aren't enough trucks and enough people who want to rest. I visited some people in the 38th District the other day in Plano and they said, 'What's going on in that truck stop... or that rest stop? And I said, 'Why'. And they told me what they had seen. I called the Sheriff and the Sheriff said, 'We have been watching that, we have license numbers, we have found six cars...'"

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Mann."

Mann: "Mr. Speaker, the question here is, whether or not the category he objects to is a deviation or as defined by Mr. Deuster, includes everyone on the sexual rainbow so that everything can be defined. Now, if these things and everybody else is a deviate he ought to say so and conclude his remarks. He's talking about matters that have nothing to do with it."

Speaker Bradley: "Mr. Mann.... Mr. Mann, I believe that you are debating right now, if you're objecting to it, his remarks.... explain your vote but, the Gentleman... it is his Amendment and he is entitled to close the debate. Mr.



Schoeberlein, continue."

Schoeberlein: "May I continue please without interruption. They have taken the license numbers of these cars to find where they live. They are not going through on traveling or anything else but they leave their cars there. They pick up young people and take them places and I talked to the Highway Department about that yesterday, that proper signs be posted. Now, they are picking up these young people and making deviates of them, right from a rest stop. And I think you will find certain signs will be placed at rest stops. What is this world coming to when these things are going on? And then we're going to have people in the university teaching our children, they are running around with their arm around them or they're flopping their arms and walking around with them and dating them up for that night. Now, I personally cannot see it. As the Washington Star said. It makes you sick to your stomach! Thomas Jefferson recommended castration for these people a hundred and some years ago and he is from the other side of the aisle. So I ask you, Ladies and Gentlemen, let's call a spade a spade and show what homosexuals are. I can see them a block away the way they are acting towards one another when you're walking down the street. Thank you."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #3, to House Bill 575. All in favor will say.... all in favor will vote 'aye', opposed will vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr Houlihan, to explain his vote. Jim."

Houlihan: "Well, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I think Representative Sandquist made a few comments here which were very important to all of us. This is a serious matter, a number of peoples lives are being affected by this. It is something that we can take in a funny manner



but, to publicly proceed in this fashion is irresponsible. I would suggest a few more red lights, this is not something that we can joke about when we are talking about the statutes in Illinois."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Will, Mr. Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I voted against this Bill in Committee and as I told the Sponsor, I'm definitely going to vote against this Bill on Third Reading because I don't agree with it. However, in the unlikely event the Bill did pass and this Amendment was put on it, it would make the Bill so infinitely worse than what some of us may think it is right now because the term sexual deviation is awfully broad and encompasses an awful lot of different Acts other than what was limited by the term and Mr. Deuster's Amendment. So, I think really, if you disagree with the Bill move to strike the enacting clause but I really don't think you should put this horrible Amendment on, what I consider to be a bad Bill. So, I'm voting 'no' and would encourage others to do likewise."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Huff."

Huff: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Actually I heard this Bill come up in Committee also and I was troubled with what basically is a symmetrical term. And I told this to the Sponsor of the Bill and the people who were opponents for the Bill that I didn't think the word orientation lends itself to what they were trying to do. And I looked it up in the dictionary and orientation Bills with biological structure of munipulus structure doesn't say anything about the genetic structure. It talks about the relationship of the magnetic pole in relationship to the directions, but it is when you look at the dictionary definition on preference that you get more to the heart of the matter and this is exactly what these people are doing. They are coming to the Committee pleading preference in which they actually want to deny preference to others in this case. The



employer and I think when we call it by its right name, sexual preference instead of sexual orientation, I think then our delineation in terms of which way to go then falls into place. Preference simply stated in the dictionary is defined as the superior like of one or the other and I think this is what we're talking about here. And since it is, in my opinion preference that these people are ask... pleading for, I don't see how we can deny the same in the part of the employee who may not have the preference to want to hire these people for obvious reasons. So, I'm voting for this Amendment although, I think it is a little as Skinner says, a little draconian. Perhaps we can soften it somewhat by taking that word deviate out and put in preference."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Telcser to explain his vote."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, in explaining my vote I think a couple of speakers hit the nail on the head for having a long hard day today as we've had every week and we're inclined to get humorous, have a good time but we're dealing with people in this state... we're dealing with their lives as someone else said, and I really and truly think that the choice of words in the Amendment is absolutely wrong. The prior speaker perhaps had a better choice that should be adopted with another Amendment. But, the word which is used in this Amendment just simply cannot be defined. I think that if any Member of this House would seriously think about the word deviation and what it means and how to define it, you would have to come to the conclusion that it cannot be defined. It simply cannot be set down and guidelines set down as to what deviation is or is not. It is a wrong word, it is obviously designed to totally destroy this piece of legislation. I don't think the Amendment should be adopted, I think it is quite clear to any thoughtful person thinking about

that it should not be in the Bill and I certainly hope that a number of Members would change their mind and vote 'no' on this Amendment. And perhaps the last speaker before the Bill is put to the order of Third Reading could find a better word to attempt to do what he wants to do and which perhaps the Sponsor of this Amendment wishes. So, I ask the Members of the House to please reconsider your vote if you're voting 'yes', if you're not voting to please change your vote to 'no'."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Stearney to explain his vote."

Stearney: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I respectfully disagree with my Leadership there and let me tell you the reasons why. The word deviate means that it is not in.... strike that and start... one moment. You see, we start from this premise, what is the norm? Is heterosexuality the norm in our society? If we agree that it is, that boys like girls and girls like boys then the opposite of that is deviation from the norm. So, I say that the word here is the appropriate terminology to use because if no one agrees with that, if you're saying heterosexuality is not the norm and that homosexuality is on the same level with heterosexuality then I would agree with the opponents there that say that deviation is not appropriate term. But, if we're going to use the Kings English and if we're going to accept the first premise syllogism that heterosexuality is a norm in our society then deviation is the appropriate term to use. Now, some may disagree with it but let's abide by the Kings English and accept this Amendment as it should be. Thank you."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Marion, Mr. Friedrich to explain his vote."

Friedrich: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House if you would listen to some of these learned lawyers you would think



Representative Schoeberlein had coined a new phrase of a new term. I've heard the word... the term sexual deviate for the last forty years and I know what it means and if you don't know then I don't know where you came from because it has been in common usage for all of my life that I know of and I know what it means, you know what it means and I don't see anything wrong with putting it in the Bill."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Deuster to explain his vote."

Deuster: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, in explaining my 'no' vote, I would like to point out to many Members what some of you may have overlooked that we... I offered Amendment #1, which was adopted and it is now part of this Bill. And my Amendment, among other things, defines sexual orientation but it also defines it in this way: It says you can't be discriminated against when you apply for a job if you happen to be a homosexual. That is if I'm a boy and I like boys but I also have the word heterosexual because I don't want to be discriminated against. If I like girls and I'm included in this Amendment and I think just about everybody in the House, that I know of is included, you're a heterosexual. And now this Amendment, although I respect the sincerity of Representative Schoeberlein, I think if you would ask everybody what do you think of this behavior, I think that most would say, you know, kinda deviation as Representative Stearney said. But the Bill now says that we prohibit discrimination on the basis of your sexual orientation whatever it is, whether it is homosexuality or heterosexuality or bisexuality where you like both. And so, it would be comical and peculiar to add this Amendment because if you support this Amendment you're saying what you are is deviatious and you can't do that so I would urge some more 'no' votes. And if you don't like this Bill and



if you don't intend to vote for it, as Representative Leinenweber and I don't on final Third Reading, wait until final Third Reading then strike your blow, but don't make this innocuous and strange and... Bill that makes no sense."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Epton."

Epton: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House..."

Speaker Bradley: "Just a minute, Mr. Epton. Could we give the Gentleman some order please?"

Epton: "I certainly have no desire to make light of this very important situation but after hearing the various explanations of what the word means, I think I'd better be safe and suggest if I have any conflict of interest, I'm still going to vote my conscience."

Speaker Bradley: The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Mann, to explain his vote."

Mann: "Mr. Speaker, first of all very quickly this Amendment accomplishes just the opposite of what the Gentleman wants because by saying deviation is abnormal he brings within it every Act that may be deviate Mr. Deuster's Amendment which we accepted sets out the definition and I ask that you vote 'no'."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Knox, Mr. McGrew, to explain his vote."

McGrew: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. I'm a little bit concerned the question has been raised back here, what happens if you are too old for either but I'm going to vote 'aye'."

Speaker Bradley: "The Lady from Cook, Mrs. Willer, to explain her vote."

Willer: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, first the Sponsor of the Amendment says that anyone that sleeps with a woman is devious and man is devious and then another person gets up... another man gets up and says, every Member of this House likes



women. Well, you know there is eighteen Members here that I think should take objection to those two remarks."

Speaker Bradley: "Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 58 'ayes', 69 'nays' and the Gentleman's motion is lost and the Amdnemnt fails. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Third Reading. House Bill 577."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 577, a Bill for an Act in relation to discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Yes, there are."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Could I have leave to change my 'no' vote, there was 69 'nays' and I don't think that sounds too good."

Speaker Bradley: "Amendments from the floor."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Deuster, amends House Bill 577, on page 1 and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Deuster."

Deuster: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This is the same Amendment that we adopted to the prior Bill on this subject which defines sexual orientation and everyone understands that you can read the Amendment. But one thing that it does do that I pointed out in my explanation of vote is that it includes what most of us would regard as normal behavior. If you're a heterosexual and we seem to think that is a normal situation for most of us, you, too, cannot be discriminated against in applying for a job. And, I think that is important. the Bill does... the Amendment does specifically define what orientation is and I think it is needed to make a clear Bill and on Third Reading why the Bill can be presented in that form. I would urge the adoption of Amendment #1



Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #1, to House Bill 575, all in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. 577, I'm sorry. The Amendment is adopted. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2, Skinner. Amends House Bill 577 on page 1, by deleting line 1, 2, 3 and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Skinner. For what purpose does the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Dan Houlihan, arise?"

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker, I question the germaneness of Amendment #2, to House Bill 577."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman questions the germaneness. Let's see the... the Gentleman's point is well taken, the Amendment changes it from an orientation or discrimination back to a RTA Act and the Amendment is not germane. Mr. Skinner, the Gentleman from McHenry."

Skinner: "Well, Mr. Speaker, the RTA opponents are probably as desperate to get some legislation out on to the floor as are those people who are homosexuals and being discriminated against then I would respectfully suggest if you look at House Bill 577, you will find that one of the Acts being amended is a Regional Transportation Authority Act and if you will notice my Amendment, I'm exercising every from the Act... from the Bill except that reference to the RTA Act. Now, I would certainly agree I am changing the orientation or perhaps a better word would be deviation of this Bill but I certainly think it is relevant since it amends the same chapter of the statutes and I would respectfully ask you to change your ruling. Even reconsider."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Houlihan and I don't think that it is possible for the Chair to change its ruling on the germaneness on the basis of that argument the Amendment is simply not germane to House Bill 577 and we'll have to rule it out of order. Are there further



Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3, Hudson. Amends House Bill 577 on page 1, line 2 and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Hudson."

Hudson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, the remarks that I made before on the preceding Bill certainly apply to this one with a few additional comments that I might throw in, in support of this Amendment. It seems to me that it is wrong to open the doors of employment and of advancement to those who maybe, I say maybe, through possibly no fault of their own sexual deviation and at the same time, deny that same opportunity of employment or advancement once employed to those simply on the basis of membership or non-membership in a labor organization. I honestly believe that if we're sincere in the concept of extending this area or an area of civil rights and civil liberties that it must include some others and the right to belong or not to belong to a labor union should be one of those rights if we are to continue to call this country a free country. The right to work is a basic right and to deny this right seems to me to support the concept that compulsory membership in a labor organization for all public employees in this case. Members of the RTA wherever they happen to be and other public employee areas all including those who don't want the services of a union none the less have to be members of a union or they must join or they must pay money or lose their job to work for their own government. The government that hires them. It seems to me, Ladies and Gentlemen that this is an untenable position and an untenable argument to pursue. If we're truly interested in the area of human freedom and I would urge your 'aye' vote for this Amendment."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Well, Mr. Speaker once again Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, the right-to-scab is what is being purported



here as a lofty Amendment Bill of gay rights or sexual freedom. The right to sex or the right to work possibly has some intermingling of people are for both, I don't know but I'll tell you this, the average worker... the average worker in this state even if he doesn't belong to a union certainly recognizes the values of what unionism has brought to the work place with the conditions of employment improved over the years through the responsibility of trade unions leading the forefront for safety conditions, better wages, better hours of work certainly disavows that this Amendment is anything but a right-to-scab and a right-to-scathe is in error because what this means is that you could be a freeloader, this means that somebody else goes out and provides all the benefits and all the rights and you don't pay for it. Now, if all the areas that this Amendment is going to pertain to in the area of public employment, you've got to remember that if I voted against a sewer project in a community and though I voted against it the majority of my neighbors voted for it, it doesn't give me any right to use that sewer... to use sewer work and not pay the bill. Just because I, in my conscience says that when I voted that I voted against this project. The same thing is true here in the right-to-scab or the right-to-scathe: it's a freeloading type of individual that takes advantage of those kinds of laws and to expouse this kind of law by an Amendment flaw, is really in error and I ask for a negative vote."

Speaker Bradley: "Further discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Greiman."

Greiman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Merely to suggest to the Body that the Sponsor has again as he did in the last Bill, confuse his... not his, confuse daytime activities with nighttime activities while his aims may be lauable in his view certainly and many who agree with him. This is just not the place for it. Let this Bill stand by itself."



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let it go up or let it go down, let right to work go up or down on its merits but let's not confuse them."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Hudson to close."

Hudson: "Well, thank you, Mr. Chairman and thank you Gentleman on the other side of the aisle there for your zealous support of my Amendment. I appreciate it."

Speaker Bradley: "Did you move the adoption of your Amendment, Sir? Are did you close."

Hudson: "I want to say this, Mr. Chairman."

Speaker Bradley: "Proceed."

Hudson: "It seems to me that to argue counterwise to the right that is suggested here in this Amendment forces the solvent government to negotiate as an equal. Where a private organization in this case a labor union, that's what we're talking about not a right-to-scab but this is what we're doing. I feel that this truly a fundamental right and some day... some day we'll be recognized and we'll achieve its place along with other right to freedoms that we have known in this country. Today may not be the day, Ladies and Gentelemen and obviously isn't but I nonetheless call for your support and urge the passage of this Amendment."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #3, to House Bill 577. All in favor will vote 'aye', opposed will vote 'nay'. Have all voted who wished? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Porter to explain his vote."

Porter: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this section covers a number of things, some of them are matters of choice and some of them are matters that are personal, sex and natural and national orienage of course, there are choices. There are choices such as religion, we make those choices personally. We're attempting to add I see a sexual orientation and that is a matter of choice. This is also a matter of choice whether to be or



not to be a member of a labor organization. It seems to me it's no less of a personal choice than the others that we intend to include in this legislation, it's a basic civil rights and it is a basic human right and I would urge the Members to support this basic right the same as they would support any other. It is an all important and high right and I urge an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Bradley: "Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there 27 'ayes', 93 'nays', 5 voting 'present' and the Gentleman's motion fails. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #4, Deuster. Amends House Bill 577 on page 12, by deleting line 2...."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Deuster. For what purpose does the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Houlihan, arise?"

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker I question the germaness of Amendment #4."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Deuster."

Deuster: "Mr. Speaker, Amendment #4, I do believe is germane and I would like to point this out to the Members and to the Chair. That Amendment #4, also relates to employment practices of the RTA, of course the main Bill deals with the employment to practices with respect to discrimination against a person on the basis of sexual orientation hiring. This Amendment deals with the salary of the Chairman of RTA and it does limit the salary of the Chairman to thirty thousand dollars a year when someone else is actually performing the duties as is the case right now. I believe Leo Cusick, or who ever.... I believe it is Leo, who is acting as Executive Director in performing substantially most of the duties contemplated by the Chief Executive Officer in such a case....."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Lechowicz...."

Deuster: "Which is why we're here...."



Lechowicz: "A point of order, Mr. Speaker, I would like to have a ruling from the Chair."

Speaker Bradley: "On the germaness."

Lechowicz: "Correct."

Speaker Bradley: "Mr. Deuster, I thought you were going to be speaking to the germaness...."

Deuster: "Yes, back to the germaness... this Amendment which relates to the salary of an employee is an employment practice just as hiring is and that of course in the past has been the practice to allow almost everything as an RTA Amendment being germane. I know we are narrowing that a little bit now but I still think even though we're narrowing it that employment whether it be hiring or salaries are germane and the practice of the Chair a little liberal, a little flexible and those who might oppose this could vote it down but I do believe in order to allow the House to work its will on this subject in relative narrow area of employment, I would think that the Chair would want to rule that it is germane."

Speaker Bradley: "Rule of the Chair is going to rule that it is not germane to the subject in the title of the Bill. We could rule possibly that it is germane and you are amending it properly in that Section of the Bill but, if it were an RTA Bill it would be germane but it is not an RTA Bill, it's a sexual discrimination Bill and is limited by the title and therefore, we're going to have to rule that it is not germane to the Bill. Mr. Deuster."

Deuster: "I was simply going to say that while you're considering the announcement of your ruling, I think in considering germaneness we should not look at the title of the Bill but the substance of the Bill. The substance of the Bill is employment practices."

Speaker Bradley: "The substance of the Bill is discrimination."

Deuster: "All right, thank you."

Speaker Bradley: Mr. Houlihan's objection as the germaneness



is held and it is not germane and it will be so ruled.

Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #5, Skinner. Amends House Bill 577 on page 1, by deleting line 1 through 3 and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker, I question the germaneness of Amendment #5, to this Bill."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from.... Mr. Skinner, the

Gentleman from McHenry, explain the Amendment, sir."

Skinner: "Mr. Speaker, if this Bill... if this Amendment is not about discrimination I can't imagine what it is and it is certainly about discrimination without regard to sex. Everyone in the outlying counties, in fact everyone outside of Chicago is being discriminated against by the RTA."

Speaker Bradley: "Is that on the basis of sexual orientation?"

Skinner: "Well, if you happen to be alive and have a sexual orientation...."

Speaker Bradley: "I guess we're going to rule the same ruling that we ruled the last time. It is not germane for the same reasons that is expressed in Mr. Deuster's Amendment. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #6, Skinner. Amends House Bill 577 on page 1, by deleting line 1, 2, 3 and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Skinner on the Amendment. What purpose does the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Houlihan arise?"

Houlihan: "For the same purpose, Mr. Speaker. I question the germaneness of Amendment #6."

Speaker Bradley: "This is a little farther out it's dealing with the fund structure of Illinois and we're going.... I have to rule not germane to the... to the subject matter we'll rule it not germane and are there further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #7, Schoeberlein. Amends House Bill 577 by changing 'orientation' to 'deviation' in each of the following places and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Schoeberlein."

Schoeberlein: "I haven't got my breath. I don't believe they have been distributed."

Speaker Bradley: "Have the Amendments been distributed?"

Schoeberlein: "I cannot find anyone who has received it and I brought it up there two days ago."

Speaker Bradley: "It has been distributed it has been indicated."

The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would like to have a ruling from the Chair, I believe this Amendment was considered before... I believe this Amendment was considered before similar to an Amendment that was defeated."

Speaker Bradley: "I believe that was the other Bill, I think it was the Bill prior to this one, Mr. Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Thank you."

Speaker Bradley: "I have been informed that it has been distributed, Mr. Schoeberlein, would you like to proceed."

Schoeberlein: "I understand they have... but I believe that

I have said everything I wanted to.... you people will think that this hasn't been in printed form, again I want to say all the things and all of the words and all the scriptures that I gave had been printed in the Washington Star, Washington, D.C. and there isn't anything that they are ashamed of because they've got problems there too. deviate is deviate and when you people you are younger than I am, don't remember the days of Leopold and Loeb and Bobby Franks. That was the beginning as I can remember when deviate killed a boy on a Sunday afternoon and stuck his body in a culvert because he was going to tell his father who was a millionaire who had been molesting him. This is all I've got to say and I hope I can get the same Roll Call as before or better. Thank you."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #7. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair the 'nos' have it and the Gentleman's motion

fails. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Third Reading. The hour of 5:30 has arrived and we will come back at 7:00 sharp and we will... there might be some announcements now, the Gentleman from Winnebago, Mr. Mulcahey."

Mulcahey: "Mr. Speaker, I would ask leave of the House to have my vote changed from 'yes' to 'no' on Amendment #3, to House Bill 577. I was sleeping at the switch."

Speaker Redmond: "House please come to order, we're getting into to the nitty gritty."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amends House Bill 608 on page 1, line 12."

Speaker Redmond: "Who's the Sponsor of the Amendment?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Representative Terzich."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Terzich, is he on the floor? Representative Terzich. Representative Martin's desk... Representative Terzich. Please come to order here."

Terzich: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment #3, is a result of a meeting with the

Representative Mudd, amends House Bill 814 on page 1, by deleting line 22 through 33 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shumpert... Representative Mudd."

Mudd: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I don't have the numbers of those Amendment. I filed two Amendments on 814, one of them deals with the prime..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, we don't have those Amendments in our file."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "We don't have Mr. Mudd's Amendments in our files, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "When was the Amendment filed? Representative Mudd."

Mudd: "Mr. Speaker, these Amendments were filed early this morning. I discussed both Amendments with Representative Shumpert before I filed them... they were the Amendments that were agreed to be filed on this Bill in Committee. 814, is the Bill which describe and set out what a blighted area is. It is the same description that is in the...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shumpert, do you seek recognition? Representative Shumpert, do you seek recognition?"

Shumpert: "Mr. Speaker, will you take it out of the record."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 820, there is a fiscal note request filed on 820."

Speaker Redmond: "Fiscal note requested. Leave it on Second. Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "A fiscal note has been filed, Sir."

Speaker Redmond: "Has it been filed; Mr. Clerk?"

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 820, a Bill for an Act to provide for home loans to any Illinois resident for the purpose of the purchase of a first home. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any floor Amendments? Representative Totten."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2, Skinner. Amends House Bill 820 on page 2, line 7 and 8 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has requested that it be moved to Third Reading and under the rules he is entitled to that. Third Reading. Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, at the time that we considered House Bill 814, we did not have the Amendments in our file, we have subsequently been given copies of the Amendments and could we return to House Bill 814. And 815."

Speaker Redmond: "814, we moved 820 to Third Reading. 814, return to the..."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 814, a Bill for an Act to provide loans to persons owning property in blighted or slum areas. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mudd."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Mudd. Amends House Bill 814."

Mudd: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, on House Bill 814. This Bill sets out to describe the blighted or slum area as described in tax increment Bill which set out a full description of any blighted area. It is probably the most detailed description of a blighted area that we have on file in any piece of state legislation. I think it does a good job to describe this particular Bill and I think the Amendment is one that was agreed on by the Minority Spokesman and myself in Committee to bring this Bill out."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shumpert."

Shumpert: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen, it is an agreeable Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion



for the adoption of Amendment #1. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Floor Amendment?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Has the fiscal note been furnished?"

Clerk O'Brien: "The fiscal note is filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 815."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 815, a Bill for an Act to provide loans to private property owners in certain urban areas. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mudd."

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, Mudd. Amends House Bill 815 and so forth."

Mudd: "Floor Amendment #1, to House Bill 815, there was also discussion in Committee as to the rate of interest that would be charged on these bonds and it was agreed upon that it would 1% over prime interest rate also again by the Minority Spokesman and myself in order to put this Bill in shape on Second Reading and I would ask for favorable consideration."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shumpert."

Shumpert: "Move the adoption, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment #2. Those in favor say 'aye' opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the motion carries, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 853, is Representative Daniels on the floor? Out of the record. 865, Representative John Dunn, is he on the floor? 865."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 865..."

Speaker Redmond: "There is a floor Amendment."

Clerk O'Brien: "A Bill for an Act to amend various Act to make



administrative decisions. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, John Dunn. Amends House Bill 865 on page 1, by deleting line 12 through 14 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Dunn."

Dunn: "I ask for a favorable Roll Call on this Amendment, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 881, Representative Totten."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 881, a Bill for an Act amend Sections of the Revenue Act. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2, Ryan. Amends House Bill 881 on page 1, line 12 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Totten.... Representative.... who was the Sponsor of the Amendment?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Representative Ryan."

Speaker Redmond: "Ryan, your Amendment to 881."

Ryan: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment... what's the number... #2 postpones the effective date for two years and I would ask for a favorable Roll Call in the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Would the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Madigan: "Mr. Ryan, as I understand this Bill it will provide for an adjustment in the exemption of the income tax based upon inflation and in light of the strong inflationary spiral affecting all Illinoisans, why do you propose to post-

pone the effective date."

Ryan: "Because at this time as you well know, Mr. Majority Leader, the State of Illinois can't afford it and Mr. Totten knows that too."

Madigan: "What was your comment concerning Mr. Totten?"

Ryan: "He heard it."

Madigan: "He what?"

Ryan: "He heard it. He knows that we can't afford it as you do."

Madigan: "Doesn't he speak for himself anymore?"

Ryan: "Yes, he sure does, he's doing a good job right now. Your dilatory tactics are getting the Speaker upset, we have to move Bills here he told me or we will end up with a user list. Do you have a reasonable question you want to ask me, Mr. Madigan?"

Madigan: "Well, I asked a reasonable question and I received a rather unreasonable answer."

Ryan: "That's the way it is some days."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, I rise to oppose the adoption of this Amendment, I certainly think that Representative Totten has offered a good idea for the General Assembly. What he has said is that the exemption of the income tax ought to be conditioned upon the inflationary factors existing in any particular time and if that is a good idea, I think it is, I don't know why we should postpone it for two years. If it will be good in two years, it would now and ought to be adopted now. I object and oppose the adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to address myself to Amendment that is being offered by Representative Ryan, Amendment #2. I had the opportunity of listening to the testimony on House Bill 881, in the Revenue Committee and in fact I was quite impressed by the presentation and the



graphs that were presented to the Committee in reference to the consumer price index and when the income tax was passed in the State of Illinois in 1969 and the price index at that time and the Bill as it was originally presented to the House Revenue Committee, Chaired by Representative Pierce, pointed out the fact that a consumer price index... there should be an adjustment to that fact as the income tax was passed to the residents of Illinois. This Amendment was not offered in Committee, Mr. Speaker, nor in turn the consideration of the Amendment was being proposed at that time. I totally disagree with the proposal being delayed for two years, I think this Bill as presented to the General Assembly, it's timely in fashion and it should be implemented as soon as possible. I would strongly recommend that Amendment #2, be defeated. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Totten."

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I rise to oppose Amendment #2, to House Bill 881 also. House Bill 881 has been explained by Representative Lechowicz, is something that we should have done in 1969, when we put the income tax into affect. That income tax exemption in 1969, which had a tax advantage of one thousand dollars, is only worth six hundred dollars today and unless we start doing something in the way of tax reform, we're going to continue to tax without representation. Now, I have talked to the Governor's office regarding this Bill, there is a fiscal impact on it but I believe that something ought to be done immediately in regards to tax reform on House Bill 881, does it... the effective date should be next year and I oppose the Amendment which would extend the effective date for two years and I ask for your support to defeat Amendment #2."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Telcser."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I rise to support the Gentleman's Amendment and I wonder if those Gentlemen



on the other side of the aisle would support this Amendment if it had the same effect on the one-twelfth revenue sharing money that goes back to local government from the state income tax. I dare say, my friends on the other side of the aisle, you certainly wouldn't want your local government to have their revenue sources reduced by this very same method and to those Members who are opposing Representative Ryan's Amendment, let me suggest to you that this Assembly is offering programs and spending money not only far in excess of the Governor's budget but by opposing this Amendment, you're going to further reduce the availability of state government to pay for the programs which you and I want. We're going to be making legislative decisions in this Session as we do every Session to set the priorities of this state as what we're going to do for the people of Illinois and how we're going to fund it. Everyone who served in this Assembly knows full well that we always... that we always over appropriate no matter who the Governor is, it is the nature of this beast but to oppose Representative Ryan's Amendment simply creates a problem that is even greater. Now, I know that traditionally in Illinois the party who opposes the Governor likes to see him get into a bind. That may be true but my friends the public isn't going to buy it. I know why you're for this Amendment, I think the Members of the Assembly do because state revenues are going to be reduced while at the same time we in this Assembly collectively are going to be passing Bills to spend more money. So, my friends... I hope and I suggest that you take a responsible position and you support Representative Ryan's Amendment. It is the only thing that you can do to help preserve some dollars so that the programs and Bills that you and I are fighting for can be enacted into law."

Speaker Redmond: "Any thing further. Representative D.L. Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I think the last speaker comments are inappropriate



about the Members on this side of the aisle, I would suggest to him and Representative Ryan, that they better get in touch with their own Membership. There are twenty Sponsors of this Bill and everyone of them is a Republican Representative. We agree with Representative Totten, the Sponsor of the Bill that this Amendment is unnecessary and it should not be adopted and we are joining with him and his Co-sponsor in opposing the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The question.... Representative Ryan, to close."

Ryan: "Well, thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. The cost of this Bill the first year is going to be twenty-one million dollars to the State of Illinois, forty-two million dollars the second year, eighty-four million dollars the third year and I am suprised that Representative Totten's reluctance to accept this Amendment at this time. I think that if you want to be responsible if you're concerned about the operation of state government in delivering the services that have to be delivered, without increasing the taxes to the people of the state, then I say that you should adopt my Amendment and I would ask that you do so."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will.... Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "Mr. Speaker, I know that there were several buttons pushed here that Members aren't present for. The Sponsor of the Bill pushed his seatmates button and I haven't seen him on the floor, he may be here, I'm not sure that that's the way the operation should be done here. This is a very important piece of legislation and certainly an important Amendment. And, I would suggest that maybe we start over with the Roll Call, at any rate whether we do or not, Mr. Speaker, I want to verify the negative Roll."



Speaker Redmond: "I smell a request of the poll of the absentees and a verification and I think the quickest way to do it is to dump this Roll Call and vote again and only vote your switch. Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, as long as he said he's going to verify it in any event, this might as well be the time you use your oral Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "I'm afraid...."

Matijevich: "Verified Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "I'm afraid to tonight, we'll do that tomorrow."

Matijevich: "We're going to go through it anyway."

Speaker Redmond: "Dump the Roll Call. The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed 'no' and there is a criminal statute by voting somebody elses switch. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Representative Ewing."

Ewing: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I know this measure has been talked about considerably tonight but I served on the Revenue Committee and we heard this Bill. I think there is a great deal of fairness in the Bill but I do believe that this Amendment is timely needed. We cannot afford to be cutting state taxes at this crucial period. In explaining my vote I would hope that we would get some more 'aye' votes up there. I think this is a good compromise, one that will bring this needed tax relief to our people at a time that we can afford it and I would ask some more green votes. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 64 'aye' and 84 'no' and the Gentleman's motion fails. Are there any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 901, Representative Stiehl."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 901...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ryan. I declared the results..."

Ryan: "All right."

Speaker Redmond: "I called the next Bill up. 901."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 901, a Bill for an Act in relation to fire protection districts. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, D.L. Houlihan. Amends House Bill 901, page 1 and line 10 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative D.L. Houlihan, the Sponsor of the Amendment." D.L. Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Could you take this out of the record for a moment while we speak to the Sponsor of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the record. 922."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 922, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, McClain. Amends House Bill 922, on page 5, by deleting line 27 through 32 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment #1, to House Bill 922 is deal of my promise I made to Jake Wolf, Junie Bartulis and Jim McCourt when we were in front of personnel and pensions. In discussing House Bill 922, they had one problem with the Bill and that was, in the Bill we had to leave the requirement for establishment of out of state service. They had some problem with that and I promised I would remove that deletion and I have with the wording of Amendment #1, to House Bill 922 and I move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question is on the Gentleman's motion. All those in favor indicate by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the motion carries and the Amendment is adopted. Any further



Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 933."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 933, a Bill for... there is a fiscal note request on this Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative DiPrima. I understand that you haven't received your fiscal note that was filed, Representative DiPrima."

DiPrima: "Yes, I'm waiting for the fiscal note but I won't have any problem with it if we want to go ahead."

Speaker Redmond: "How about the floor Amendment?"

DiPrima: "The what?"

Speaker Redmond: "We'll take this out of the record."

DiPrima: "Oh, I've got it right here."

Speaker Redmond: "The fiscal note? Well, that's a good place for it. Well, you've got to file the fiscal note with the Clerk, Representative DiPrima."

DiPrima: "Well, you aren't worried for a minute about the fiscal note are you? You know there won't be any problem with my Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Frankly..."

DiPrima: "Fear not."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 933, a Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schneider."

Schneider: "I think everyone should abide by the fiscal note..."

Speaker Redmond: "You have to have a fiscal note or this isn't going to move."

Schneider: "Can we just move the Bill on because we will be debating it twice."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, he said he had the fiscal note."

Schneider: "Where is it?"

DiPrima: "Don't you have to adopt the fiscal note first."

Schneider: "Is it filed with the Clerk?"

Speaker Redmond: "Has it been filed with the Clerk?"



DiPrima: "Yes."

Speaker Redmond: "Mr. Clerk, do you have the fiscal note?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No, I don't have it on file yet."

Schneider: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, can you take it out of the record until we get it."

DiPrima: "Well, I gave it to that guy, what's his name... Dale something."

Schneider: "It is not on the Clerk's desk."

Speaker Redmond: "We'll have to take this out of the record.

We'll get back to it when you find the fiscal note."

DiPrima: "Don't worry about it, it will be okay when I tell you what this Bill does, you'll jump to get on it."

Speaker Redmond: "You know, you passed a lot of laws here that bind me and the law that you passed says that we can't move it to Second and Third Reading until you file it, now..."

DiPrima: "Well, let me suspend the rules so..."

Speaker Redmond: "It is not a rule, it's a statute Representative DiPrima and there is only one person that can... that statute and he's from Crystal Lake."

DiPrima: "Who's that, Skinner?"

Speaker Redmond: "That's Skinner."

DiPrima: "Cal, give me an okay."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, I think we just can't proceed now. 948."

DiPrima: "We'll take care of it later."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 948, a Bill for an Act restricting lie detector tests..."

Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative Hanahan on the floor? It's your Bill... 948."

Clerk O'Brien: "Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was tabled in Committee and Amendment #2, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Are there any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #3, Representative Simms. Amends House Bill 948 on line 22 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Simms."



Simms: "Mr. Speaker, Amendment #3, is an Amendment that was suggested in Committee which Representative Hanahan has agreed to, simple states that the Act will not be applicable in such cases where the applicant for employment has waived his right to a lie detector test and I would move for the adoption of Amendment #3."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Yes, I concur with the Gentleman."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor indicate by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 956."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 956, a Bill for an Act in relation to the form and cost of publications required by law. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Dan Houlihan. Amends House Bill 956 on page 1, line 17 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Who's the Sponsor of the Amendment? Representative Houlihan."

Houlihan: "If we may hold this just for a moment."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay, we will hold it. Representative Tipsword."

Tipsword: "Mr. Speaker, would you just pass over House Bill 956, 957, 958, for the time being, please."

Speaker Redmond: "Will you pardon me, will you repeat that, I didn't hear it. Please come to order. It's getting bad when the Chair can't hear."

Tipsword: "Would you please just pass over House Bill 956, 957 and 958, at this time."

Speaker Redmond: "Will do. Take those out of the record. 962."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 962, a Bill for an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense for the office .



of the Governor. Second Reading of the Bill..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ryan."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #...."

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the record. 937."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 937, a Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1 and 3, were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No floor Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "A fiscal note has been furnished, is that correct?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Fiscal note is filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 964, Representative Ryan, do you want 964 called? Out of the record. 992, Representative Stanley. 992."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 992, a Bill for an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Liquor Control Commission. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Stanley. Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment...."

Stanley: "Could I hold the Bill, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Redmond: "What was that."

Stanley: "Can I hold the Bill, please."

Speaker Redmond: "Surely, out of the record."

Stanley: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "1010, is Representative Getty on the floor? 1010."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1010, a Bill for an Act concerning indecent liberties with a child. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Leinenweber. Amends House Bill 1010 page 1, by deleting all of line 9 through 11 and so



forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Amendment 1010, does not change the thrust of House Bill... does not change the thrust of the Bill at all, it does clarify what is an indecent liberty in regarding to photographing or video taping or whatever, a child. The Bill I thought needed some clean up to make it more approvable in the event of a violation so, I would urge the adoption of House... Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Getty."

Getty: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, Representative Leinenweber and I discussed this both in the Committee and subsequently... and this is an agreed Amendment, it does clean up some language and I would urge for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion of the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1011."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1011, a Bill for an Act relating to vacancies in the office of judge. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Telcser. Amends House Bill 1011 on page 1, by deleting line 1, 2, 3 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Telcser."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker, that Amendment is Representative Martin's."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Martin."

Martin: "Yes, this Amendment changes the method of selection as proposed in the Bill, quotes more closely to the way suggested by the American Bar Association, the Illinois Bar Association and the Chicago Bar Association. It is the classic method of judicial selection produced by a



Commission, it provides for the first district, eleven lawyers, ten non lawyers. For the rest of the districts, seven lawyers, six non lawyers. They are equally represented by each political party. This particular Amendment is necessary to this Bill because of the importance of the way that we select our judges. As the executive and legislative branch have lost power, the judicial branch has gained power and I think the people are demanding the kind of judicial selection that is as free from political chicanery as possible. This classic judicial selection Amendment provides for it, those of you who favor merit selection of judges would certainly wish to support this Amendment which would then make the Getty Bill an ideal Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Will the Sponsor of the Amendment yield to a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "She will."

Geo-Karis: "Representative do I understand correctly from you that by your Amendment, you're providing for the merit selection of judges?"

Martin: "This is just for vacancies, Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "And you feel then that your Amendment as contrasted to the Bill, would be more preferable."

Martin: "Well yes, obviously or I wouldn't have proposed the Amendment but the Bill itself proposes for selection by the judges for the judges and I think we can all see that within that... inherently within that system is a system of both favoritism and protection for judicial selection that would not best represent the interest of the people of Illinois. This is the classic judicial selection method."

Geo-Karis: "But that Bill does not provide for merits of all judges."

Martin: "No, this is for vacancies."



Geo-Karis: "Because that I am opposed to."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Getty."

Getty: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I oppose the adoption of Amendment #1. House Bill 1011, as introduced is introduced as means of the legislator for the first time addressing itself to the filling of vacancies. Because there is a void, there is no statute, the Supreme Court makes those appointments. I believe that we must view the law in the context in which it is, the Constitution presently provides for the election of the judiciary not for the merit selection. Now, I have supported merit selection of judges, there is a Constitutional Amendment House Joint Resolution Constitutional Amendment 35, of which the Representative who offers this Amendment is a Co-sponsor of, I believe hyphenated principal sponsor. That is that Constitutional Amendment is adopted ratified by the people will change the law in this State of Illinois. In the meantime, I think that we should work within the context of the law as it is. The Bill without the Amendment I believe politically viable, it will suit all areas of the State of Illinois, it will give local control within the districts of the appellate court within the circuit courts throughout our state and it will build in a first step towards merit selection, through a screening process through election and secret ballot by all of the judges of the court filling the vacancy. That is a political first step so I would urgently ask your support against this Amendment which would in effect destroy the Bill and go to what, Representative Martin very laudably would propose as a Constitutional Amendment. She seeks to impose this through on a Bill which addresses a current problem and I would earnestly solicit your 'no' vote on this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Telcser."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, it has been a



long day, we all have the tendency to not quite pay attention to every single Bill that we are considering so let me ask the Members of this Body to pay very close attention to the Amendment that we are now considering, the Gentleman's Bill. Let me also say that I have the highest personal regard in respect for the very fine devoted dedicated Sponsor of this Bill, who I know is acting in a sincere honorable way in order to provide a method for filling vacancies of judges throughout the state, although I think perhaps the principal concern of this Bill may be up in Cook County. Let me take some of you back to the primary of last year, let me remind you of the primary election for the Supreme Court, seats that were available this year and let me also remind you that Mr. Justice Clark and Mr. Justice Dully won in the primary, they ran against the so called organization and are now sitting on the Supreme Court of this great state. Let me also say, that it is a Supreme Court today that is involved filling these vacancies. There are some who say that the judicial system is a very key important intricately part of the so called machine in Cook County, from where the power emanates throughout this state. Let me also remind you... let me also remind you that while the step by step procedure which the Gentleman is asking for in his Bill may very well be some sort of selection process that appears to be fair and maybe fair, but I want to say to every Member of this House that the filling of those vacancies rests right with the machine in the City of Chicago. That's what is going to happen with this Bill, now I know Members on my side of the aisle may be thinking in terms of their local circuits but let me remind you about the power of the Democratic Party in the State of Illinois and from where it really comes, it comes from Chicago and that Bill if it passes and becomes law is going to bolster up that power, it is going to shore it up because it is weakening, because



they lost the primary for the Supreme Court because there is a change in the executive in Cook County in Chicago there is a new Mayor, I don't know what's going to happen with the new Mayor, they don't know what's going to happen they're losing a few elections and some of you on the Democratic side of the aisle are here today because you beat the machine and you want to keep beating the machine. I say to you that this Bill will help defeat you in the future and other independent Democrats who want to come to this Legislature as free agents, you're not going to be free if you let that machine strangle you and this Bill... this Bill if it becomes law it is going to strangle you. Representative Martin has offered a sincere Amendment an Amendment which provides the same kind of merit selection that we all talked about... only for those vacancies... only for the vacancies. Now, if you want honest judiciary and you want a state that has equal honesty throughout its judicial system, I suggest that you vote for Representative Martin's Amendment and you'll look at the politics of this Bill. As sincere as I know the Sponsor is, the net result will be what I say it is. Strengthening the machine and strengthening the one party control up in my county and in this state perhaps. I urge you to all vote for Representative Martin's Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tipsword."

Tipsword: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen, I know that the Amendment that is proposed to this Bill comes from the heart and soul of the proposer of this Amendment and she is very very intent in presenting it. And I regret that I must stand on this floor and oppose her Amendment but I oppose it because it is a move towards merit selection of judges in the State of Illinois. Now, we just heard a very moving and elegant speech from a leader on the other side of the aisle, let me address myself for just a moment to the lawyers who sit in this Body. Do you think that if you



have this kind of selection process that is in this Amendment that any of you no matter how excellent your qualifications are, are ever going to be selected to fill a vacancy on the bench, you are not you're tainted you've been in the Legislature. The people of this state, I find as I travel around are not in favor of merit selection of judges. Merit selection of judges is a fine theoretical proposal but in practical life it doesn't work any better than other methods of selection, either by the judiciary or by vote and the people of this state consider no matter how many times they may send you letters criticizing what you do, that the Legislature of this state belongs to the people of the state, they elect them. That the executives of this state belong to the people of this state because they elect them but they do not have that confidence in the judiciary. They feel that the judiciary no longer belongs to the people under our Democratic form of government and they think that it should belong to the people and if we would adopt this Amendment, it is another move toward removing farther and farther and farther from the people of this state the selection of their judges who hold the power of life and death and their economic well being in their hands day after day. I therefore, urge you to defeat this Amendment and while the proposal here is not necessarily, the totality of what the people would like to have, it at least does not move us toward total merit selection of judges and it does give us a legislative attempt to voting these vacancies on a level where they can know the quality of the candidates in the area where the vacancy is to be filled and so I urge you to defeat this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ebbesen."

Ebbesen: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I believe the issue is now clear."

I move the previous question."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman moves the previous question."

The question is, shall the main question be put. All in



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favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. Representative Martin, to close."

Martin: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would seek support from three very different groups for this Amendment, the first is the group that is totally or almost totally against merit selection of judges. You may well get stuck in your view of some kind of merit selection, the question then, will it be the most acceptable kind which is what this Amendment provides or Representative Getty's and so, for people like Representative Tipsword, whom I of course respect. I hope that he will think that over carefully and chose to join support for this Amendment. The second group that I ask for support from is downstate, both sides of the aisle. Again although it is easiest for us to think of our own districts, we must... we must think of that first judicial district. It has been pointed out, this is a statewide problem and we should rise above ourselves and vote what it is best for all members of the state. Thirdly, I ask support from Chicago, I recognize that Chicago may feel the other way guarantees the kinds of things that they prefer, but as a freshman I was told to rise above principle and vote politics. I suggest this time you rise above politics and vote principle. I ask your support."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Ladies motion for the adoption of Amendment #1. Representative Ewell, for what purpose do you rise? The question is on the Ladies motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor of the motion vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 68 'aye' and 79 'nay' and Ladies motion fails... Representative Martin."

Martin: "I would like a verification of the Roll. Poll of absentees."

Speaker Redmond: "There has been a request for a poll of the



absentees. Representative Schuneman, has heard Mr. Ryan's voice."

Schuneman: "Mr. Speaker, I would ask leave to have my vote changed from 'no' to 'yes' on that last Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "Change the Gentleman from 'no' to 'yes'. Representative Deuster."

Deuster: "Please record me as voting 'aye'."

Speaker Redmond: "Record Representative Deuster as 'aye'. Poll the absentees."

Clerk O'Brien: "Antonovych, Bluthardt, Brandt, Campbell, Chapman, Ralph Dunn, Edgar..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Edgar."

Edgar: "Please record me as 'aye'."

Speaker Redmond: "Record the Gentleman as 'aye'. Representative Chapman." Record the Lady as 'aye'. Chapman, 'aye'. Representative Steczo."

Steczko: "Mr. Speaker, please change my vote from 'present' to 'aye', please."

Speaker Redmond: "Change the Gentleman from 'present' to 'aye'. Proceed. Proceed with the call of absentees."

Clerk O'Brien: "Gaines, Jim Houlihan...."

Speaker Redmond: "What have you got? Proceed."

Clerk O'Brien: "Jim Houlihan..."

Speaker Redmond: "Who?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Jim Houlihan, Hoxsey, Huskey, Klosak, Kornowicz, Kucharski, Peggy Smith Martin, McAvoy, Molloy, Ridney, Robinson, Sandquist, Satterthwaite, Schlickman, Sevcik, Skinner..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, having finished passing out my Laetrile pits I would like to vote 'aye'."

Speaker Redmond: "Record the Gentleman as 'aye'."

Clerk O'Brien: "E.G. Steele..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Steele, 'aye'. Everett, E.G. Representative Rigney, for what purpose do you rise? Record



the Gentleman as 'aye', Rigney."

Clerk O'Brien: "Stuffle, Tuerk and Wall."

Speaker Redmond: "Now what's the score? Representative
Klosak."

Klosak: "Record me 'aye', please."

Speaker Redmond: "Record the Gentleman as 'aye'. Representative
Tuerk, are you seeking recognition?"

Tuerk: "How am I recorded, Mr. Speaker?"

Getty: "Mr. Speaker, I believe there is another Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2, Peters. Amends House Bill 1011
by striking line 1 and 2 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Who's the Sponsor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Representative Peters."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Peters."

Peters: "Mr. Speaker, I move to table Amendment #2."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Amendment
#2, is tabled. Any further Amendments? Amendment #2, is

had gone to the order of Amendment #2 and a point of order



was raised as to whether or not his motion was timely in requesting vote by which the Amendment was adopted to be re-considered. Well, that Amendment was tabled. The Parliamentarian tells me that the Gentleman is in order. Representative Collins. Proceed. Representative Gene Hoffman."

Getty: "That's all right, Mr. Speaker. I just wanted to make sure that you held it on Second."

Speaker Redmond: "It's on Second Reading."

Getty: "All right, thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "1021."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1021, a Bill for an Act to amend the Election Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Chapman. Amends House Bill 1021 on page 1, line 19 and 20 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Chapman."

Chapman: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, Amendment #1, conforms the Bill to the form it's in in the Senate and does this by deleting the words 'or relative' 'or friend of the voter'. I move for the adoption of Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Lady's motion. Those



in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the motion carries and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1025."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1025, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Capital Development Board Act. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Younge. Amends House Bill 1025 in line 9, by inserting immediately after second parentheses the following..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Younge."

Younge: "Amendment #1, Mr. Speaker merely clears up a technical language of the Bill and I move for the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the Ladies motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1046."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1046, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Housing Development Act. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Meyer. Amends House Bill 1046 on page 1, line 1 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Meyer."

Meyer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This is an Amendment that was given to me by the Auditor, it merely brings the Illinois Housing Development Act in conformity with filing reports with the Comptroller rather than the Auditor General. I move its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion



for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading."

Meyer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "10... Representative McAuliffe, for what purpose do you rise?"

McAuliffe: "Mr. Speaker, I rise to ask unanimous consent of the House to change my vote from 'aye' to 'nay' on House Bill... on Amendment #3, to House Bill 577. I was off the floor and my switch was voted by mistake."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. Representative Wolf."

Wolf: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to be recorded voting 'yes' on that same Amendment, Amendment #3, on 577. I was off the floor and I was not recorded."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. We have an emergency situation here. Temporarily we'll go to the order of Senate Bills, Second Reading First Legislative Day. Senate Bill 485, for which Representative Barnes is recognized. Representative Barnes, on Senate Bill 485."

Barnes: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I would like leave to waive the proper rule, rule 33-A, that this Bill can be amended today and moved to Third Reading. It is currently on Second Reading First Legislative Day. It is the emergency measure to the Department of Labor supplemental appropriation and the emergency that exists, is that they've got to meet a May 10, payroll."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has requested... moved for a suspension of the appropriate rule. Are there any objections in suspending the appropriate rule so that the matter can be moved to the order of Second Reading, is that Second



Legislative Day, is that what your request is? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. Now, Representative Barnes... read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 485, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense for the Department of Labor. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Barnes: "Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Barnes: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee it was an Amendment that was discussed fairly through there, one of the reasons for the Amendment was so that certain information that was not at hand from the department at the time that we heard it in our Committee was forthcoming. That information has arrived we have the information that was requested by the Members of the Appropriations Committee. Also, as I fore stated there is an emergency that is existing here and one of the reasons for us asking the waiving of the rule and extra ordinary situation is to insure that this Bill can get to the Governor's desk so that the department can meet their May 10, payroll. With that in mind at this time and with the concurrence of the Committee because we discussed this and said that we would take this action on the House floor with the concurrence of the department so that it does not have to go back to a concurrent process in the Senate. I would like to at this time move to table that Committee Amendment that was adopted in Committee, Appropriations II."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Polk."

Polk: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen, I appreciate what the Chairman of the Appropriations II Committee is doing. We have agreed... we do have the information from the Department of Labor and I would like this Amendment removed."



Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for tabling the Amendment #1. Those in favor indicate by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the motion is tabled. Anything further, Mr. Barnes?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Now, we'll go back to House Bill, Second Reading. 1079."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1079, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections in the title of an Act to regulate the practice of public accounting. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Geo-Karis...."

Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative Jacobs on the floor? Is Jacobs on the floor? 1079, there is a floor Amendment. Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "I can tell you, Mr. Speaker, he has no objections to the Amendment. This Amendment.... I sure that..."

Speaker Redmond: "I understand that the fiscal note has not been furnished and the Clerk's office says that it is better to do this all at one time so we'll... Representative Jacobs."

Jacobs: "What I would like to know is, how long Mr. Speaker do we have to wait to get a fiscal note after you apply."

Speaker Redmond: "If it was my Bill I would have a fiscal note filed someday, some how."

Jacobs: "Do you want to tell me how... I can't get one I have asked... so far I haven't gotten one. If you just want a figure we can give you that. There is another Bill in pertaining to...."

Speaker Redmond: "I would suggest that if you don't get your fiscal note by tomorrow that you put the question to the Body as to whether or not a fiscal note applies."

Jacobs: "Well, on another Bill..."

Speaker Redmond: "And if it carries...."



Jacobs: "Another Bill similar to this, the Body ruled that it did not apply but I'm still trying to get it from... because a request was made and I'm going to get it someday or other."

Speaker Redmond: "I would suggest that you put that question tomorrow and see what happens. I don't know why we're having so much trouble getting fiscal notes but we are on both sides of the aisle."

Jacobs: "I don't object to this Amendment, there is another Amendment coming so...."

Speaker Redmond: "When we get the fiscal note we can do it all at once."

Jacobs: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "We'll take this out of the record. 1110, Representative Griesheimer."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1110, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Air Carriers Act. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, McClain, Griesheimer. Amends House Bill 1110 on page 4, line 15 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Griesheimer."

Griesheimer: "Mr. Speaker, is Representative McClain here?"

Speaker Redmond: "He's here."

Griesheimer: "I didn't know that Representative McClain's name was on this Amendment. At Committee hearing there was certain inconsistency in the basic Bill suggested by Representative Lechowicz and we agreed to prepare an Amendment to it. The staff, Democratic staff prepared the Amendment it was presented to Representative Lechowicz, he approved it and then I review it and it was not a proper Amendment. In fact it gutted the Bill and I'm sure that's not what Mr. Lechowicz wanted at all and the staffer went ahead and gave the Amendment to the Clerk with my name on it and with the other Representatives name on it. I would like to see it tabled because we have a new Amendment to



which I presented to Representative Lechowicz that does accomplish what he wanted without affecting the basic Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. If the Gentleman would yield for a minute."

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

McClain: "Ron, the Amendment had been given to me, via Ted, and I approved it and he thought it was with your approval. Has Ted agreed to tabling Amendment #1 and accept Amendment #2."

Griesheimer: "I just gave the Amendment to Representative Lechowicz a few minutes ago and I could just... that is Amendment #2, his concern with the Bill was that we not require all airports to carry all forms of fuel. I agreed with him but when the Amendment was prepared they failed to define the word 'wholesaler' which makes the Bill far broader than it was ever intended to be and I pointed this out to your staff worker when he brought this to my attention and he did not see fit to do anything about it. I told him that I didn't like it the way that it was and he went ahead and introduced the Amendment. I didn't know that your name per se, was going to be put on it. I thought that Representative Lechowicz name would be on it."

McClain: "No, I'm Ted's protege. I'll give my time to Ted."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, what Representative Griesheimer pointed out, he brought Amendment #2, to my attention about a half an hour ago. I tried to get over to staff person that was in Committee that we sat on, this is a rather controversial measure. It only affects 80 octane gasoline that is available to the airplane pilots in the State of Illinois. There was a question raised as far as the manufacturing of the 80 octane gasoline in the state, in turn the Amendment that

was drafted was for the protection of the airports in the state in conjunction with users. Now, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, since this Amendment was given to me about a half an hour ago, I have not had an opportunity to review Amendment #2 and I would ask that this Bill be taken out of the record until tomorrow morning and I can get an opportunity to review it."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Griesheimer."

Griesheimer: "Mr. Speaker, if Representative Lechowicz would consider, I hate to allow this Bill to be passed at this time because with the backlog of work we're getting to, it could be weeks before we could get back to this Bill. Would it be agreeable with Representative Lechowicz, to allow this to move to Third and if he has any objections to the Bill whatsoever, I agree to move it back to Second."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "That's fine, Mr. Speaker."

Griesheimer: "Now, we will under those circumstances at some time have to get this other Amendment on it because it definitely still needs amending."

Lechowicz: "I'm sure that you agree with the manufacturers as well. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Move it to the order of Third Reading. 1200.

Is Representative Totten, on the floor? 1200."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1200, a Bill for an Act in relation to the drugs commonly known as Laetril. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Totten. Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2, Skinner. Amends House Bill 1200, on page 1, by deleting line 2 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, following the lead of the Indiana Legislature, I have prepared Amendment #2, to House Bill 1200. It would legalize the manufacture

and use of saccharin in the State of Illinois. Now, all of you know that I'm half junkie and if we don't legalize saccharin in the state... we're going to be in big.... I'm going to be in big trouble and some of your constituents who use saccharin to avoid using sugar, will also be in big trouble. Now, the State of Illinois does have manufacturers of saccharin, one of them was featured in one of the recent Sunday editions of the Springfield paper, I believe there are also probably manufacturers in Lake County, in the drug complex up there and I would respectfully ask for your support of this Amendment even though the Sponsor of the Bill, Representative Hanahan is violently and irrationally against it. Oh, excuse me, Totten, I don't know why I get them mixed up. It must be a Freudian slip."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Totten."

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I rise to oppose Amendment #2, to House Bill 1200. Not necessarily that I'm opposed to maybe, making saccharin more available than the FDA has chosen to do but I've introduced House Bill 1200, on what I think is a very serious subject and although the Indiana Legislation may have saw fit to add saccharin to their Laetrile Bill, I don't see any reason why we should in Illinois. Secondly I also feel that there is just as much tradition and justification for a Sponsor to have his Bill in the fashion that he would like it and I would not like it as attached to it an Amendment such as Representative Skinner has proposed. Third, although many of us may not agree with the FDA findings on the substance saccharin, they have said that it may or could cause cancer or has caused them and might. I think that it is rather irresponsible to attach it to a Bill that deals with a substance that may control or be a cure for cancer so, I would ask all of you who support me on House Bill 1200, to support me in defeating Amendment #2, to House Bill 1200."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Leinenweber." Representative Chapman... I get you mixed up. Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, I hope you don't mix me up with my old seatmate, Miss Chapman, but I would like to make a point of order that this Amendment is out of order. It is not confined to the subject of laetrile and it is therefore, violates Rule 34-D."

Speaker Redmond: "Where is the Parliamentarian."

Matijevich: "34-D, no Amendment is in order unless it is confined to the subject of the Bill, which this is not confined to."

Speaker Redmond: "Somebody get me the Parliamentarian. Representative Chapman, we'll go back to Representative Matijevich argument in a moment. What was your point? Are you seeking.... Representative Chapman."

Chapman: "Mr. Speaker, I didn't recognize that my mike was on. I'm still recovering from my former seatmate calling me his old seatmate. I would like to congratulate Mr. Skinner on going a point further in his Amendment than Mr. Totten did. At least in taking control of a substance away from the FDA..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Leinenweber, for what purpose do you rise?"

Leinenweber: "I thought I had been recognized to address the Amendment. The Lady seems to be addressing the Amendment in place of me."

Speaker Redmond: "Well... we'll decide the point of order before we go any further. Where is the Amendment? Give you an idea of what the plan is tonight, we still have about fifty-two Bills upon which floor Amendments have been filed and the plan is to go on these contested Amendments as long as we can. I would guess probably another hour at which time we will then go back to the Bills on which there has been no Amendments of any kind filed and we'll try and go through and complete that. Then the Speaker will be here and go back to those upon which there have been Committee



Amendments and no motions filed. Now, if anybody has a Bill and it is on Second Reading that has no Amendment of any kind and does not want that called, please tell me about it and I won't call it. And if anybody has a Bill that has Committee Amendments on which there has been no motion filed let me know so we won't call that because I have a feeling that I may not have the fine company of a hundred and seventy-six of my fellow Members once we get away from the contested matters. Now, that's the plan, we had seven hundred and fifty Bills on the order of Second Reading when we started this morning, we have moved approximately a third of them and if there is any way in the world that we're going to avoid a full Session on Saturday, I don't know any way other than the one that I suggested. Representative McClain."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. An inquiry, please. Do you plan on starting tomorrow like at noon or nine?"

Speaker Redmond: "Nine o'clock."

McClain: "That's great. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker, some of us have Bills on Third Reading we have to take them back to Second, could we do it tomorrow morning?"

Speaker Redmond: "Well, we'll do that in due order. I'm going to try and get... the plan was not to go to Third Reading until Monday, now..."

Geo-Karis: "That's all right."

Speaker Redmond: "It depends on how well we do. Representative Bradley, how many have we moved from Second to Third?"

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, the count on the Calendar of the Clerk shows that we've moved two hundred and sixty Bills today from Second to Third Reading."

Speaker Redmond: "So, that still leaves five hundred. Aren't you glad you put all those Bills in. Aren't the Committee's so happy that they moved them 'do pass'. Don't tell me that,



you're the Parliamentarian. Is it or is it not germane, Mr. Parliamentarian? The Parliamentarian advises me that he is outside the title and the Amendment is not germane. 1205, wait a minute now, does that.... are there any other Amendments? Mr. Clerk, are there any other Amendments? Mr. Kempiners, let the Clerk do his job here. Are there any other Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Amendment #2, is not germane. 1205.

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1205, a Bill for an Act...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain, for what purpose do you rise?"

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I don't believe the Amendments to House Bill 1205, have been distributed."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker, it is Representative Mautino's Bill and I believe.... stand to be corrected. I think we want that Bill left on Second Reading, there will be Amendments filed."

Speaker Redmond: "We'll leave it on the order of Second Reading. 1206. Representative McClain."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker would you leave this... let's move to Third, I'll bring it back."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1206, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Luft. Amends House Bill 1206 on page 1, line 1 and 5."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker has that Amendment been distributed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No, it is not."

McClain: "Could we move the Bill back to Third and after it has



distributed I'll bring it back to Second and we can adopt the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Are there any other Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "What was your pleasure now?"

McClain: "My pleasure is move it to Third and when the Amendments are distributed I'll bring it back to Second for...."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay, go to Third Reading. 1222."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1222, a Bill for an Act providing for additional judges to the circuit of Cook County....
Out of the record."

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the record. 1227."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1227, a Bill for an Act to create sanitary district. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1, Abramson. Amends House Bill 1227...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Houlihan. Out of the record. We called 1112, is that correct Representative... 1112, there was evidently a floor Amendment that was not marked on the Calendar, am I right?"

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1112, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act to revise the law in relation to injunction. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1 and 2, were adopted in Committee. Floor Amendment #3, Greiman, Hart. Amends House Bill 1112 on page 1, line 8 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative.... there are no motions filed with respect to 1 and 2?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Greiman, with respect to Amendment #3."

Greiman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Amendment #3, response to the... one of the problems that was raised by Representative Hart in Committee. It was passed out with the understanding that we would amend the Bill in accords with his wishes and Representative Hart has joined me as a Co-sponsor of

Amendment #3, it provides for a verified complaint that is to bring it to...or to commence proceeding with a verified complaint and limit the extent that the court can affect the marital home, the occupancy of the marital home. I ask for a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the Gentleman's motion of the adoption of Amendment #3. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the motion carries and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1110, what did we do with that one, Mr. Clerk?"

Clerk O'Brien: "1110, moved to Third Reading with no Amendments adopted."

Speaker Redmond: "Oh, I see. 1234, Representative Laurino."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1234, a Bill for an Act to amend the Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1, was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2, E.M. Barnes. Amends House Bill 1234 on page 1, by deleting line 1 and 2 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative E.M. Barnes."

Barnes: "Thank you, very much. Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, Amendment #1... Amendment #2, rather to House Bill 1234, this Bill was heard in Motor Vehicles Committee and we had rather extensive discussion concerning this issue that Amendment #2, is trying to address. I know perhaps the Sponsor of the Bill and maybe a bit surprised but in the sense that I'm not necessary opposed to the concept of what his Bills is attempting to do. I've talked extensively with people in the industry, centrex meeting, I've had some conversations with some people today but, what the purport of this Amendment... what this Amendment proposes to do is to insure that if we go to mandatory



insurance and I'm not sure that it is not an issue which time has come but if we are going to mandatory insurance I think that we should insure that everyone... everyone on equal basis have equal access to all insurance that is offered in the State of Illinois. That's what this Amendment addresses, the only thing embodied in this Amendment is to insure that all people who would qualify with motor vehicles who would come under the purview of the intent of House Bill 1234, would have equal access to all automobile liability insurance offered in the State of Illinois. That's all this Amendment does and I would move for the adoption of Amendment #2, to House Bill 1234."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Laurino."

Laurino: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I oppose this Amendment on the basis... that is the intent of Mr. Barnes, I suggest that he do that in another Bill, not into this Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? The question is on the Gentleman's motion... Representative Jones."

Jones: "Yes, thank you, Mr. Speaker would the Gentleman yield?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Jones: "Bill, under your Bill would this require that all automobile license drivers have to have mandatory insurance? Is your Bill a mandatory insurance Bill?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Laurino."

Laurino: "Yes."

Jones: "It is mandatory insurance Bill then why is it that you are oppose to the people having access to all insurance throughout the State of Illinois. Or especially in counties of excess. of a million people."

Laurino: "If I understood Gene correctly, he's eliminating or he's setting up a situation for the State Department of Insurance to regulate these insurance companies, is that right?"

Jones: "No, it is not attempt to regulate insurance or the



way that I interpret it and perhaps Gene can answer himself but the way I interpret it, the rates in counties of excess of one million that you could not have a difference in any rate for automobile insurance."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Barnes."

Barnes: "Thank you, very much. No, Mr. Speaker the answer to Representatives question concerning this Amendment. This Amendment does not get the state into setting rates, we do not have a rating law in the State of Illinois. The only thing that this Amendment does... the only thing that it does, it says that in municipalities of one million or more that all insurance... all insurance that sold in this state would be offered... would have all people that would come under the purview of being mandated to have insurance prior to the issuance of the license. Would have equal access to all insurance written in that area, that's all it says. It does not mandate any rate, it does not address itself to any rate nor does it say that any insurance company would have to sell to any individuals. It merely says that, equal access that all insurance must be offered in that general area. That's all it says. The company still has within its purview... within its decision making powers who would receive insurance upon their application. This Amendment simply address itself at equal access, nothing more nothing less."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion... Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I have a copy of the Amendment in my hand and it certainly looks to me as though it deals with rates. It looks to me as though the Amendment provides that there may be no classification of rates within a county of one million persons are more. So, that everyone within Cook County would have to pay exactly the same insurance rate for their automobile insurance. Now that, Mr. Speaker is simply



notequitable within Cook County, we have probably seven or eight different classification of rates... some much better than others. Now, I live in an area where the rate is not the best but it is certainly not the worst. This discriminates terribly against people in areas where there relative few accidents. I see no reason on earth why we should discriminate against suburban people because suburban people don't have as many accidents as people within the close in suburbs or within the City of Chicago. And I urge the defeat of this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Barnes."

Barnes: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. While I would hate to quarrel with my learned colleague from the other side of the aisle but according to the insurance industry and the spokesman that I spoke with this afternoon, in terms of where an accident occurs has nothing to do with the rate in terms of the rate making structure because that accident is charged against where the automobile is housed where it is garaged, has absolutely nothing to do with where the accident occurs. So, this would not be discriminatory in terms of where those automobiles are housed. If an automobile had an accident at eighty-seventh and the Dan Ryan and it housed in Oak Park where the charge is is where the automobile is housed not at eighty-seventh and the Dan Ryan. That is not taken into consideration of the rate structure now enforced in this state. The only thing that we're talking about here is equal access. I see no reason... no reason whatsoever, if we're going to mandate... mandate people to have certain prerequisites to receive their license in this state and then not give them equal access to the insurance available, it seems to me that we are being totally discriminative in what we're trying to do. All we're trying to accomplish here is equal access, we're not mandating anyone to sell anything we're simply saying, if you sell the product make it equally

accessible to everyone."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Laurino."

Laurino: "Mr. Chairman and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this Amendment does not does not do what Mr. Barnes wants it to do because his one interpretation is equal accessibility to insurance on equal rating and it does not.... not affected in the way that the structure of his Amendment pursues this Bill. He's trying to change the rating system, no matter how he explains it and he is using a situation of accidents happening all over the state and the housing of the automobile some place else. And that is not corollary to the situation at hand. All I'm trying to do with this Bill is have responsibility placed on the financially responsible people. And I'm not trying to make this into a racial issue."

Speaker Remdond: "Representative McBroom."

McBroom: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I move the previous question."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the previous question. The question is, shall the main question be put. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, motion carries. Representative Barnes, to close."

Barnes: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. I know it is very late but I want to make one thing clear and then simply ask for your support on this Amendment. This Amendment is trying to address a very serious issue that will center around mandatory insurance in this state. There is absolutely nothing that I can see that's wrong with mandating insurance in trying to solve a very serious question. Since we do not have... since we do not have no fault insurance in this state, to mandate... to mandate mandatory insurance without equal protection for each individual to allowing him or afford him an opportunity to get that insurance. We must have some stipulations built in to insure equal access. That's all that I'm talking



about and I would solicit your support."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment #2. Those in favor vote 'aye' opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 27 'ayes' and 69 'nos', the Gentleman's motion lost. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1248, is Representative Wolf on the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "We've already moved 1248."

Speaker Redmond: "1249."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1249, a Bill for an Act to provide for the exercise of the right to eminent domain. Second Reading of Bill..."

Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative Kelly on the floor? Out of the record. 1265... Representative Collins has asked leave to be recorded as voting 'aye' on the last Roll Call. Does he have leave? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. 1265."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1265, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act in relation to State Revenue sharing with local governmental entities. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Farley. Amends House Bill 1265 on page 1, line 28 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Houlihan. D.L. Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Yes, thank you, Mr. Speaker. This is Representative Farley's Amendment who has asked me to handle the Amendment for him. The effect of the Amendment is to simply to limit the share into this is the Chicago Park District of 25%. I ask for a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the

Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment #1. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1275."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1275, a Bill for an Act to create sanitary districts in Des Plaines and Illinois rivers. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Terzich."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Abramson. Amends House Bill 1275 on page 1, by striking line 13 through 16 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Terzich.... Abramson's Amendment. Representative Abramson."

Abramson: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Is this Amendment printed and distributed?"

Speaker Redmond: "Mr. Clerk, tell me it has."

Clerk O'Brien: "It is distributed."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Abramson, go ahead."

Abramson: "House Bill 1275 attempts to remove Assistant Purchasing Agent Fund, Civil Service on exam requirements and from civil service. Amendment #1, returns the Assistant Purchasing Agent Chicago.... Civil service and also returns all the other positions that are exempted under this Section. The only justification, I believe for removing people from civil service coverage if they are in top policy making positions. These positions are ministerial captains, should be covered by civil service. I urge your favorable adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Terzich."

Terzich: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I oppose this Amendment. What this Amendment desires to do is strike out all positions that are with very strong power within the sanitary district, now this particular Bill, the assistant purchasing agent was omitted from a Bill that we passed out of the House

last Session and the Bill came out of Committee fifteen to nothing and to strike out some of the positions such as the chief engineer and the assistant chief engineer is absolutely ridiculous. The Bill does provide that if an employee with the approval of the Commissioners, is on the job for two years, he's automatically certified under the civil service code and it doesn't omit him from becoming a civil service employee and therefore, I would oppose adoption of Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor indicate by voting 'aye', opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 40 'aye' and 62 'no' and the Gentleman's motion fails. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1284."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1284, a Bill for an Act to create sanitary district in Des Plaines and Illinois rivers. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1, Abramson. Amends House Bill 1284 on page 1 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative O'Brien."

O'Brien: "I wish to table this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave to table the Amendment? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. Any further Amendments? Oh, oh, pardon me. Representative Abramson's Amendment. Have you explained the Amendment?"

Abramson: "1284, I asked to table the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Would you repeat that please."

Abramson: "I asked to table the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "That's what I thought. The Gentleman asks leave to table the Amendment. Any objections. Hearing none, leave is granted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1285. The Clerk misled me there."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1285, a Bill for an Act to create sanitary districts in Des Plaines and Illinois rivers. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendment from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Abramson. Amends House Bill 1285 on page 1 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Abramson."

Abramson: "This Amendment seeks to return the amount subject to competitive bidding to twenty-five hundred dollars. Bill 1285, increase it to five thousand dollars. Say, twenty-five hundred dollars is a reasonable amount for competitive bidding... just the other day on another Bill we held the amount at twenty-five hundred dollars and I urge the House to adopt this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative O'Brien:"

O'Brien: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, House Bill 1285 and 1323, are companion Bill and if we're going to discuss 1285, perhaps we can have 1323 included in the discussion. They merely allow the purchasing agents of the sanitary district to purchase at five thousand dollars level rather than twenty-five hundred level. The twenty-five hundred dollar level was set back in 1951, due to inflation costs and so forth, they can't continue to buy without having board approval and they are losing credits on pre payments and early payments because of the limited purchasing power right now for a lot of the technical things that they have to purchase for the sanitary district."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the.... Representative Abramson Bill. Do you desire to close on the motion to adopt the Amendment?"

Abramson: "I move in favor of adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for

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adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Representative Simms."

Simms: "Well, Mr. Speaker to explain my vote, this Amendment deserves a green light in order that we have uniformity in the State of Illinois and I think Representative Abramson's Amendment to reduce back to twenty-five hundred dollars is a level that I think this Legislature established in other taxing bodies. To do other than that is to set different standards and really destroy the nature of competitive bidding for the citizens for the State of Illinois and this type of Amendment is what should be placed in this Bill so that the citizens that do have competitive bidding and the tax dollars protected and I would urge a green vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 63 'aye' and 75 'no' and the Gentleman's motion fails. Any other Amendments? Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1286. Representative O'Brien."

O'Brien: "Mr. Speaker, 1323 is a companion Bill to 1285. I believe that I asked that the Roll Call apply to both Bills before we took the Roll Call, is that confirmed?"

Speaker Redmond: "I didn't hear you if you did and objections have been raised... so..."

O'Brien: "Well, I certainly stated and you can play the tape back, it's in the record. They are companion Bills."

Speaker Redmond: "1286."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1286, a Bill for an Act to create sanitary district in Des Plaines and Illinois rivers. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1, Abramson. Amends House Bill 1286 by striking line 19 through 31 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Abramson."



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Abramson: "Amendment #1, seeks to hold as a constant level of seventeen million five hundred thousand, the amount of corporate indebtedness maybe incurred without bonding. The Bill seeks to increase it to a floating level of 80% of assessment. This Amendment keeps Legislative control over the amount that the sanitary district will have in its working cash fund. I urge a favorable adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative O'Brien."

O'Brien: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, House Bill 1286 increases the corporate working cash fund for the Metropolitan Sanitary District, at present the Metropolitan Sanitary District has to float notes at the interest rate of 6 to 7% in order to pay their... in order to fund their payroll and their salary. What this allows them to do is to have approximately seventeen point five million dollars or 40% of their budget in a cash flow situation so, they don't have to fund... float bonds to pay for the ordinary and contingent salary expenses of the Metropolitan Sanitary District. I might add that in the Committee there was no opposition from any taxpayer group as a matter of fact, the civic federation favored the Bill because it would save the Metropolitan Sanitary District money in the long run."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment #1. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair.... those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 67 'aye' and 77 'no' the Gentleman's motion fails. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1299, Representative Porter."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1299, a Bill for an Act in relation to reforestation and preservation of timber lands." Second



Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Porter. Amends House Bill 1299 on page 1, line 14, by deleting one acre and inserting in lieu thereof, three acres."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Porter."

Porter: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, that really explains the Amendment. The Bill would be applicable less widely with this Amendment and I would move its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor indicate by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1313."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1303..."

Speaker Redmond: "1313."

Clerk O'Brien: "1313, 'a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Skinner. Amends House Bill 1313 on page 1, line 18 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Mr. Speaker, that was already adopted. You're on Amendment #2."

Clerk O'Brien: "That was taken out of the record."

Skinner: "No, it was taken out of the record during the Roll Call of Amendment #2. Representative Giglio and I remember that vividly."

Clerk O'Brien: "Not in the minutes so, you better adopt..."

Speaker Redmond: "Better follow the Clerk's advice."

Skinner: "Oh, I follow the Clerk's advice and move that we adopt this good Amendment."



Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor indicate by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The motion carries and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2, Giglio. Amends House Bill 1313 on page 1, by deleting line 10 through 12 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giglio."

Giglio: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, what Amendment #2 does, it includes all vehicles used by the farmers and the vehicles used by Department of Transportation and all the vehicles that use the roads, have to be covered with a tarp."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of.... Representative Byers."

Byers: "Would the Sponsor yield for a question."

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Byers: "Representative Giglio, does this mean that the farmers hauling a load of grain to the market, that's going over the state highways for short distance... he's going to have to put a tarpaulin over his load wheat or oats or corn, whatever it might be."

Giglio: "That's correct."

Byers: "Well, Mr. Speaker, if I might address the...."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Byers: "...Amendment, I think is going to work a hardship upon the farmers in the rural areas in the State of Illinois for many of these take grain a short distance to market and they would request that if this was adopted be technically in violation of the law. I do not believe that for... at least for grain that it is necessary that this be adopted and I think it would be to the detriment of the farmers of the State of Illinois and I would urge a 'no' vote on this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this Amendment



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I oppose also. I've never had any complaints from any constituents up in 33rd District that some corn or some grain is blown off of a truck hauling that kind of commodity. But I have certainly had a lot of complaints from the constituency up there where the Crown Family continue to haul all that gravel all over the states highways and spill it all over the place. And I just suggest that to amend the Bill that is perfectly introduced to stop the abuse of some of these most rich companies of this state that not only abuse our highway systems but then go and get immunity to testify against Legislators. I think we should not amend the Bill... to kill it. The members in our area should not be restricted on how they haul their grain, if a few kernels of corn fall on the highway, so be it but it certainly.... and it doesn't affect your automobiles or trucks. But when you're driving over these highway and get these rocks into your windshield and wonder why your insurance is up so high, I think that's what we're trying to do with this Bill and I ask for a negative vote on this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brummet, do you still seek recognition? Representative Keats."

Keats: "I think the presentation has been excellent and I move the previous question."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the previous question. The question is, shall the main question be put. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. Representative Skinner, to close."

Skinner: "It's a rotten Amendment but it's not mine."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giglio, to close, pardon me."

Giglio: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I don't think it is a rotten Amendment, what we're trying to do with this Amendment is make it equal for everybody. We're not picking on the farmers, we're not picking on DOT, what we're trying to... and I'm not trying to kill the Bill. If it is good for all



the trucks and DOT should set the example and show, and so should the farmers that they go on the roads and the stuff is put on the truck high enough that they should all be covered... all trucks not just a certain few and that is exactly what the Bill does, I ask for your support."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion of the adoption Amendment. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 19 'aye' and 99 'no' and the Gentleman's motion fails. Is there any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1320. 1320."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1320, a Bill for an Act to amend the Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, O'Brien. Amends House Bill 1320 on page 3 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative O'Brien."

O'Brien: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this is a Bill that came out of the pension study or the Pension Commission... the Bill that came out of the Pension Commission, Amendment was pushed by the Pension Commission, it is an agreed Amendment. It allows Con:Con delegates to get service for two years served in a Constitutional Convention."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? Representative J.J. Wolf."

Wolf: "I didn't hear that, is that the Bill that... pension served credits for Members of General Assembly who served in Con Con?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative O'Brien."

O'Brien: "No, the Amendment provides that they pay the full cost and there is no duplication of service should the Bill pass. The Amendment provides, Representative Houlihan, I'm



passing this for your State Senator since she was a member of the Constitutional Convention. The Amendment requires that they pay the complete amount into the Pension Laws Commission, the state doesn't pay for anything."

Wolf: "Could we amend this to include service in the boy scouts or girl scouts too."

O'Brien: "Right."

Wolf: "Well, Mr. Speaker could I address myself to this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Wolf: "I rise in opposition to it, I think it's a bad idea, I think it is a bad Amendment and I think we ought to vote it down."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? Representative O'Brien, to close."

O'Brien: "The only thing is that the Amendment was recommended by the Pension Laws Commission..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Terzich."

O'Brien: "If you don't have the Amendment on the Bill it is probably going to be a worse Bill and it probably wouldn't pass out of the General Assembly. The Amendment does basically two things, it requires that those individuals who are eligible for service, those who served in Con Con pay the employer and the employee cost and it prohibits them from any duplication being paid into the Pension Fund. It is a good Amendment and a bad Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Terzich."

Terzich: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I think they should speak on the Amendment itself and the Amendment is proper in the fact that it does provide that the Member would have to pay both the employer and the employee cost if he so desires to take up this credit. There is no payment by either the state or any other fund on this, they would have to pick up the entire cost and therefore, I would move for the adoption of Amendment #1."



Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment #1, to House Bill 1320. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 69 'aye' and 27 'no', the Gentleman's motion prevails and the motion is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1321. Read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1321, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, O'Brien. Amends House Bill 1321 on page 3."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative O'Brien."

O'Brien: "Same Amendment as on 1320, I would ask a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1322."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1322, a Bill for an Act to amend the Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative O'Brien."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, O'Brien. Amends House Bill 1322"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative O'Brien."

O'Brien: "That's also the same Amendment for state employees that served in Con Con."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion to adopt the Amendment. Those in favor indicate by saying

'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1323."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1323, a Bill for an Act creating sanitary districts in the Illinois and Des Plaines rivers. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, Abramson. Amends House Bill 1323 on page 1, by deleting all of line 19 and 20 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Abramson."

Abramson: "House Bill 1323, prevents the board which is elected by the people from having control over expenditures under five thousand dollars and delegates that responsibility to the Department of Finance. I believe this opens the board up to charges of abuses and relinquish their control over their budget and I believe that it should be controlled by the members that were elected by the people and my Amendment, Amendment #1, returns that to the responsibility of the Board of Commissioners. I urge your favorable adoption on this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative O'Brien."

O'Brien: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, House Bill 1323, is a companion Bill to House Bill 1286, which we just voted on. I oppose this Amendment, this would allow the sanitary district to pay those bills without the stamp from the Commissioners and let the Department of Finance get their records out and pay so there is no penalty for the late payment on it. It is just a companion Bill to 1286, I would urge the defeat of the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Telcser."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, as I understand the Bill the Bill would take from the members of the board the power to..."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz, for what purpose do you arise?"

Lechowicz: "On a point of order, Mr. Speaker, I believe Representative O'Brien and the other Gentleman just closed."

Telcser: "Representative Abramson, didn't close."

Speaker Redmond: "Not yet. Not yet, Representative Lechowicz. Proceed, Representative Telcser."

Lechowicz: "I withdraw the question then."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, House Bill 1323 provides that the Finance Committee, I believe of the sanitary district had authorized payments up to five thousand dollars without the authorization of the elected members of the sanitary district. Now, I think this would take away from the elected members of the district the right to make these decisions. The people of Cook County who are serviced by the sanitary district, elect those trustees, they are elected by the people and I think they ought to be accountable to the people. To rise up to the level of five thousand dollars the amount of purchase which the Finance Committee could make without the approval of the elected board, I think it is too high. Abuses could take place, I don't think the members of the board want to be put in that position and I think the taxpayers of the district are entitled to have accountability and be able to ask someone whom they have elected, why and how their money is being spent. I think Representative Abramson's Amendment is a fine one, I think it's a protection for the people of Cook County or any area which is served by the district and I think every Member who is concerned about the public's interest and public protection and accountability on the part of public officials ought to support the Gentleman's Amendment. I don't think any Member of this House would want to give up their rights both on appropriation Bills or how money is spent in fact, in fact, Mr. Speaker I have joined with many



Members of this House on both sides of the aisle, in a court suit which addresses itself to a very similar problem. The question of federal funds and the ability of the Legislature to appropriate those funds. This is really the same issue, the people of Cook County ought to have accountability. This is what Representative Abramson is asking for and I think everyone of us ought to support him."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Abramson, to close."

Abramson: "I believe House Bill 1323, would unnecessarily deligate these responsibilities of the elected officials to an appointed Committee. I urge your favorable adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. All those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Representative O'Brien, to explain his vote."

O'Brien: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, in explaining my vote, this Bill is a technical Bill and it's a companion Bill to House Bill 1286, which gives the purchasing power to the Metropolitan Sanitary District for five thousand dollars. This Bill allows the Department of Finance to pay that without the approval. It's a technical Bill, it will allow them to expedite their disbursement rapidly and to get their discounts and it will save the sanitary district money in the long run. This is a good Bill, we have many watchdog agencies and I would ask everybody to defeat this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 69 'aye' and 77 'no' and the Gentleman's motion lost. 1323, Third Reading."

Collins: "Mr. Speaker, I'm just curious, is my light broken



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on your desk. Every time I've turned it on tonight you have not recognized me."

Speaker Redmond: "Not intentional, usually you yell so loud I can hear you."

Collins: "Well, I was trying...."

Speaker Redmond: "And you didn't yell this time so...."

Collins: "I will remember, I'll yell from now on. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1328."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1328..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative.... out of the record. As I advised you eariler that the hour of eleven o'clock has come so, we will discontinue the calling of the contested matters and we will now go to calling those Bills that have no floor Amendments and those Bills that have Committee Amendments and no motions have been filed with the respect to the Committee Amendments. Now, if any Sponsor desires to advise me of some Bill that he does not want called, just advise me and I won't call it. Representative D.L. Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Will it be a procedure, Mr. Speaker to remove a Bill from this order of business upon objection by a Member that is non controversial or it is not controversial."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, I would hope that we didn't run into that but I guess that we would have to meet it at the time it comes up. Representative Luft."

Luft: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I would appreciate not having House Bill 492, called today please."

Speaker Redmond: "4 what?"

Luft: "492."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay."

Luft: "I would like to leave it on Second Reading."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "A point of order, by what you're.... Mr. Speaker, by what you're saying are you saying that we can go home if we don't have any...."

Speaker Redmond: "I didn't say any such thing."

Matijevich: "Oh, I'll take my coat off then."

Speaker Redmond: "There isn't going to be any Roll Call and there won't be any votes so you decide it for yourself. Those things that look to me to be controversial why, I will jump over them and if I make too many mistakes tomorrow just let me know. Back to House Bills, Second Reading... House Bill 3. I'm afraid that might be controversial and I would have trouble tomorrow so, I don't want anymore trouble I can get. House Bill 3. Nine o'clock tomorrow."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 3, a Bill for an Act concerning the violation of certain penal laws. Second Reading of the Bill, Amendment #1 and 2, have been adopted previously. #3 was withdrawn."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion filed or any floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 36."

Clerk O'Brien: "The request for a fiscal note was withdrawn. House Bill 41, a Bill for an Act authorizing creation of businesses to operate policy numbers games. Second Reading of the Bill..."

Speaker Redmond: "What was that?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendments on that."

Speaker Redmond: "On which one?"

Clerk O'Brien: "41."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any motion filed with respect to Amendment... any of the Amendments have any floor Amendments? There is a floor Amendment? Well, we'll take that out of the record. 89."
