

Doorkeeper: "Attention Members of the House of Representatives, the House will convene in five minutes. All persons not entitled to the House floor, please retire to the gallery."

Speaker Redmond: "The House will come to order, Members please be in their seats. Will be led in prayer by Reverend Krueger the House chaplain."

Reverend Krueger: "In the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost. Amen. O Lord, bless this House to Thy service this day. Amen. John Burroughs said: 'The lure of the distant and difficult is deceptive. The great opportunity is where you are'. Let us pray. O Lord God Almighty, we pause this day before our deliberations and debate on the many and complex issues confronting the Legislature of this state. We ask Thy wisdom, O Lord, to serve us well that we may separate that which is cogent to our needs from that which is extraneous and of our whims; that being so guided, that which we consider and enact into law may bring succour to those in need, relief to those who are distressed and lawful opportunity to those who render service to the good of this state and its peoples. This we ask in the name of Jesus Christ. Amen."

Speaker Redmond: "Roll Call for attendance. Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, would you ask that all unauthorized personnel be removed from the floor?"

Speaker Redmond: "All unauthorized persons leave the floor. Any absences....absenteeism should be excused on the Democratic side?"

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, would the records show that the following people are excused? Representative Domico, Nardulli, Capparelli, O'Brien and Getty."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any objection? Hearing none, the record will so show. Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Would you please excuse Rep-



representative Vinson, Representative Campbell, Representative Bianco and Representative Edgar?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan."

Ryan: "And Representative Epton."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any objection to the absenteeism as Representative Ryan told us about? Any objection that those being shown as excused? Hearing none the record will so show. Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, would the record also show that Representatives Kozubowski and Leon are excused?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Leon's wife died today. Is there any objection? Hearing none the record will so show. House Bill, Second Reading. House Bill Second Reading appears House Bill 95. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 95, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 186."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 186, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense of the Commission on Delinquency Prevention and the Department of Children and Family Services. Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, Peters....186...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Darrow are you seeking recognition? I guess maybe we better since there is a Floor Amendment...maybe we better take this one out of the record. House Bill 242. Has a fiscal note been furnished yet? I understand there is another Floor Amendment, is that correct? Take that one out of the record. House Bills, Third Reading. House Bill 9. House



Bill 9."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill #9, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the School Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Huskey. Postponed Consideration. Out of the record. House Bill 33. Representative Huskey, do you want...we've called House Bill 9...Third Reading. Huskey. 9, Huskey is here, I didn't see him out there. He's so quiet."

Huskey: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This is a very simple Bill, it only clarifies the law of a distance that a child would either have to walk to school or be bussed to school. It doesn't change the existing law in anyway whatsoever, except to clarify it. And the Office of Education has supported this Bill, it is a much needed Bill. And I would move for its approval, Mr. Speaker. I don't know if we've got enough here to vote...for 89 votes or not but if we....."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any questions? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye'....Representative Webber Borchers."

Borchers: "I was rather curious as...in relation to the distance involved. I don't have that information, is it still a mile and a half?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Huskey."

Huskey: "If I've got the question right, the distance involved is a mile and a half. But some of the School Boards throughout the state have circumvented the mile and a half distance by building ridges and paths through fields instead of using normally traveled roads and streets. The Bill calls that the you use normally traveled roads or streets to...for the youngsters to walk to school."

Borchers: "And that has nothing to do in relation to say, a small town like Niantic or Blue Mound and it happens with a snow like this that the....streets are only partially usable but the sidewalks are still completely



covered. It has nothing to do in relation to that?"

Huskey: "No, that....it....the only thing it would have to do, Representative Borchers, is to make sure that the children are walking a normal travel road or street in case there was trouble or something happened to them that they would be where they could get help."

Borchers: "Well, in case the weather would be like it is now and has been, and the streets....the sidewalks are impassable and the streets are only possibly passable, and they have to walk along streets that are used by traffic. Does not in anyway allow the School Board to take action to permit the pickup of children to protect their lives in relation to having to walk a very heavily traveled and heavily snowed street...is anything to do with that?"

Huskey: "Representative Borchers, that would be a fine piece of legislation and I would vote for it but this would have nothing to do to clarify that situation."

Borchers: "Yeah, okay. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor....Representative Brady."

Brady: "Yes, thank you, Mr. Speaker. I had a question of the Sponsor, is that possible?"

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Brady: "Can I ask you how many children that you determine that this will involve in the state and what the cost and the transportation you think will be?"

Huskey: "Well really I don't...I don't....the Office of Transportation supports this Bill wholeheartedly and they don't feel it's any additional cost of transportation. I think what it is to present is probably in some cases where they are using some subterfuge of cutting down the mile and a half that is the existing law and building fences I don't think it's going to be a matter of any... any exceedingly high cost. It's a matter of....I will say this, that there was an awful lot of interest in



Committee and I find out it is a fairly widespread problem throughout the state and the Office of Education was very happy to get a Bill to clarify the situation."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Griesheimer, pardon me. Representative Brady."

Brady: "Well...Representative Huskey that certainly doesn't give me any answer as to how many pupils this effects or what the cost is in the state and we don't fully fund the transportation right now...the existing students. If this adds more to it or adds less to it, I would certainly like to know because we're in to a proration effect as it is right now with the transportation of students."

Huskey: "Well....there doesn't seem to be any concern on the cost. I don't think there is any....I don't think there's any additional cost to speak of....if any. It would add....let me say this, I don't have the figures your asking me for....."

Brady: "Thank you, Representative. In light of that, unless you would like to take the Bill out and we can find out some determination, I for one would have to stand up in opposition to this Bill at this time. We're proceeding here in an area of student transportation when we don't fully fund the transportation item right now in our budget. We're adding to it, I've no idea what the cost of the pupil count is and for that reason at this point I would oppose the Bill until we find out what that is."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Griesheimer."

Griesheimer: "Mr. Speaker, I'm going to withhold my questions. I feel that Representative Brady has raised some issues that I would like to have answered, too. I think we should be restricting our school transportation program and not enlarging it, especially when don't fund it on the local schools. So, I would hope that maybe Representative Huskey would take it out of the record until we have these answers as well."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Huskey."

Huskey: "Mr. Speaker, will you take this out of the record."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the record. House Bill 33.  
Has it been read, Mr. Clerk?"

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 33, a Bill for an Act to amend  
Sections of the School Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Deuster. Out of the record.  
On the Order of Motions appears a motion with respect  
to House Bill 260, Representative Younge. Do you desire  
to put that...take that one out of the record. Approval  
of the Journal."

Clerk O'Brien: "Journal for the tenth Legislative Day. The  
House met pursuant to adjournment. The Speaker in the  
Chair, prayer by Father William Krueger, Chaplain...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, I move that we dispense with the reading  
of the Journal, Journal #9 of February 14 and Journal  
#10 of February 15, be approved as read."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question is  
on the Gentleman's motion that the reading of the Journal  
be dispensed with and the Journal be approved as if it  
had been read. Those in favor indicate by saying 'aye',  
opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the motion carried,  
the Journal is approved. Representative Wolf. J.J."

Wolf, J.J.: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I would  
just like to reintroduce an old new Member who I'm  
glad to see back with us. The Gentleman from Kankakee,  
Ed McBroom for those that don't know him, he's back with  
us today."

Speaker Redmond: "When was that election, January 18th? Rep-  
resentative McBroom."

McBroom: "Thank you, Jake, that was very nice of you."

Speaker Redmond: "Introduction, First Reading."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 503...."

Speaker Redmond: "Tom, Representative Hanahan, the Clerk has a



question for you. Mr. Clerk, Mr. Hanahan is in front of you. Introduction, First Reading."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 503, Hallock-Leinenweber. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act to revise the law in relation to frauds and perjury. First Reading of the Bill. Speaker Redmond: "House Bills, Third Reading. On House Bill, Third Reading appears House Bill 33, Representative Deuster is recognized. Please come to order. Representative Deuster."

Clerk Hall: "House Bill 33, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of School Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Deuster."

Deuster: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, one of our obligations as Legislators it seems to me, is to be alert to those many provisions in our Illinois





statutes which might have been passed years and years ago and has now become obsolete or unworkable. House Bill 33 which is before you, both repeals some obsolete and useless language from the statute in the Illinois School Code and also corrects and makes workable a provision relating to the duty of the regional superintendent of schools. As it happens the Illinois School Code requires your regional superintendent of schools to report some financial information to the County Board in September when the regional superintendent never receives that information until October, November or December. Now the way that our old regional superintendent up in Lake County handled this obsolete and unworkable law, that's old Doctor Bill Petty, as he simply ignored it. And he never sent a report to the County Board. Now recently we elected a new superintendent and he was conscientious and he submitted his report after he got the information, which I believe was in November. And he was criticized by a political opponent for not filing it in September. So at the suggestion of the regional superintendent of schools, House Bill 33 changes that reporting date to January from September. This is something, I'm told, that the regional superintendents of school can live with and I think we should make that change in the law. Secondly, in House Bill 33 you will see that we strike about five lines of the statute that require the regional superintendent to report some information about the teachers institute fund, I believe it is, and this is information that is already covered by the County Audit Act which....the County Auditing Act which requires that there be an audit of it. So.... this report is obsolete, not needed and the reporting dates for the county super...or regional superintendent should be changed. I would be happy to answer any of your questions but I would urge your favorable support



for House Bill 33. As I remember, it was voted out of the Education Committee unanimously."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brady."

Brady: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I wonder if the Sponsor would yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Brady: "Representative Deuster are you aware that the Bill says, 'county superintendent', not regional superintendent? Line 9."

Deuster: "Representative Brady, that's the existing law, I suppose that the reference bureau should have done what they usually do and that is...change that to regional superintendent."

Brady: "Well if you have an existing law that is wrong, I think if you're going to modify or change it you ought to go all the way and change it. Number one, that makes it technically incorrect. The other provision that you have in here, Representative, on or before January 1st doesn't tie into any county fiscal year and I think that would be difficult to try and tie in a provision that doesn't tie in with the county fiscal year. And the third part that gives me great concern is in eliminating the list of text. Are we then eliminating the fact that the county regional superintendent now is charged with the textbook and materials program, will no longer have to, by law, keep a list of those?"

Deuster: "Representative Brady...."

Brady: "You want to answer that, I'll yield while you answer."

Deuster: "Yes, going backwards, this Bill has nothing to do with textbooks; that's another Bill. That's the answer to the third question. As to your second question, if you have another date that you'd prefer, that's fine with me. I would be happy to....amend the Bill...."

Brady: "Representative, I stand corrected, it's eliminating his giving his books for audit to the county?"



Deuster: "Well...."

Brady: "Well at any rate, Representative, I wonder whether you could work on the provisions in here that I think pose a technical problem for you and we'll get back to this Bill later."

Deuster: "If you have a technical problem with it I'll take it out of the record and...."

Brady: "A minimum of two."

Deuster: "And take it back to Second Reading."

Brady: "Thank you....thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the record. The Rules Committee will meet at 4:00 o'clock in room 114. Representative Ryan. Rules in 114 at 4:00 o'clock. Any announcements? Agreed Resolutions."

Clerk Hall: "House Resolution 61, 62, 63, 64 and 65. Senate Joint Resolution 14."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, House Resolution 61 by Slape, recognizes Harvey Kuhn's twenty-five years of service. 62 by McCourt, notes a boy scout award. 63 by Yourell does the same thing. 64 by Yourell does the same thing and 65 by Yourell honors George Howe of Oak Lawn and Senate Joint Resolution #14 is Hanahan's Resolution honoring Arthur Tyrrell retiring from the McHenry Sheriff's office. I move for the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions. Those in favor of the motion indicate by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the motion carried. The Agreed Resolutions are adopted. Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, would the records show that Representative Ewell is excused?"

Speaker Redmond: "Any objection? Hearing no objection the record will so show. Representative Laurino."



Laurino: "Well, Mr. Speaker...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Laurino."

Laurino: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, the Elections Committee will meet promptly at 2:00 o'clock right after adjournment in room D-1 today. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Conti, are you seeking recognition?"

Conti: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I don't have the number on it but there's another Resolution that was introduced that was omitted. What's the Resolution number on that Zeke? Congratulatory Resolution."

Speaker Redmond: "Can we do it tomorrow?"

Conti: "I would like to get it through today to bring it back."

Speaker Redmond: "Have you shown it to the Democratic spokesman?"

Conti: "Yes. It's an Agreed Resolution."

Speaker Redmond: "It's Resolution 67, Representative Conti is recognized."

Conti: "The House welcomes the opportunity to recognize the Northeast...Northwestern Steel and Wire Company of Sterling. It was founded in February 28 of 1879. It's a hundred year old company in that particular county and they are just congratulating them on one hundred years of business."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of House Resolution 66. Those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the motion carried, the Resolution is adopted. Representative Mahar are you seeking recognition? Representative Mahar votes 'no'. Any other announcements? Any Committee Chairmen. Representative Pierce."

Pierce: "House Revenue Committee will not promptly today at 2 P.M. in our usual room and then Subcommittees at 2:30. At 7:30 tonight we will reconvene in Madison County in Hamel, Illinois for public hearing, to hear what the downstate voters want in the way of real estate tax



assessment reform and all Members are welcome to attend that public hearing this evening in Madison County."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madison...Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, what is the appointed time for the Revenue Committee to meet?"

Speaker Redmond: "Mr. Pierce."

Pierce: "2:00 o'clock and the Subcommittee at 2:30."

Madigan: "The Full Committee will meet at 2:00 o'clock, is that correct?"

Pierce: "Yeah, for a short time only then we'll break into Subcommittees and that will be it for today."

Madigan: "We've had many requests in my office from all over the state as to what time you would convene."

Pierce: "Well they know the most important Committee when they hear it."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Katz."

Katz: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, an announcement that House Rules Committee will be meeting in room 114 today at 4 P.M. There will be no meeting of the House Judiciary II Committee this week."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ewing are you seeking recognition? Representative Ewing...your light is on. Are you seeking recognition? Representative Ewing's light is off. Any further announcements? Representative Kelly."

Kelly: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, the Counties and Township Committee have a scheduled meeting which we will hold at 3:30 this afternoon in room D-1 in the Stratton Building."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan on the adjournment, they need about a half an hour perfunct I understand. Perfunct until 2 and then adjourn til tomorrow at 3."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, allowing one half hour for a Perfunctory Session I now move that we adjourn until 3 P.M. tomorrow afternoon."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the Gentleman's motion that the House stand in Perfunctory



Session until 2 o'clock then adjourn until 3 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. Those in favor of the motion indicate by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the motion carried and the House now stands adjourned."

Clerk Hall: "House Bill 538, Tuerk. A Bill for an Act to amend the Election Code. First Reading of the Bill. Constitutional Amendment, First Reading. House Joint Resolution Constitutional Amendment 23, Rigney. Resolved by the House of Representatives of the 81st General Assembly of the State of Illinois, the Senate concurring herein, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the state for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least six months after the adoption of this Resolution, a proposition to amend Section 9 of Article IV to the Constitution to read as follows: Article IV. Section 9. Veto Procedure. Every Bill passed by the General Assembly shall be presented to the Governor within 30 calendar days after its passage. The foregoing requirement shall be judicially enforced. If the Governor approves the Bill, he shall sign it and it shall become law. (b) If the Governor does not approve the Bill, he shall veto it by returning it with his objections to the House in which it originated. Any Bill not so returned by the Governor within 60 calendar days after it is presented to him shall become law. If recess or adjournment of the General Assembly prevents the return of a Bill, the Bill and the Governor's objections shall be filed with the Secretary of State within such 60 calendar days. The Secretary of State shall return the Bill and objections to the originating House promptly upon the next meeting of the same General Assembly at which the Bill was considered. The House to which a Bill was returned shall immediately enter the Governor's objections upon its Journal. If within 15 calendar days after such entry that House by a record vote of three-fifths of the Members elected passes the Bill, it shall be delivered immediately to the second House. If within 15 Calendar days after such delivery the second House by a record vote of three-fifths of the



Members elected passes the Bill, it shall become law. The Governor may reduce or veto any item of appropriations in a Bill presented to him. Portions of a Bill not reduced or vetoed shall become law. An item vetoed or reduced shall be returned to the House in which it originated and may become law in the same manner as a vetoed Bill. If a reduced item is not so restored, it shall become law in the reduced amount. The Governor may return a Bill together with specific recommendations for change to the House in which it originated. The Bill shall be considered in the same manner as a vetoed Bill but the specific recommendations may be accepted by a record vote of a majority of the Members elected to each House. Such Bill shall be presented again to the Governor and if he certifies that such acceptance conforms to his specific recommendations, the Bill shall become law. If he does not so certify, he shall return it as a vetoed Bill to the House in which it originated. Schedule. This Amendment to the Constitution takes effect upon its approval by the electors.
