

And that is ten acres is a very small amount of land and I think the Bill is aimed properly at conservation and giving some kind of relief in that area. What I think would be helpful is at least ... there'll be some remaining problems, but at least if you change from ten to twenty the number of acres it would do a number of things. One is it would prevent those with smaller amounts of land from benefiting from a substantial real estate bonanza. Two, it would give those who have considerable amount of acreage some kind of a break. I think twenty is a fairer starting point than ten. It does not address the other problems with the



Bill but I think it's a start."

Speaker Madigan: "Is there any discussion? There being no discussion, the question is shall amendment number two ... Mr. Mugalian."

Mugalian: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponser of the Bill respond to a question or two?"

Speaker Madigan: "The Sponsor indicates that he will yield.

Mugalian: "Representative Harris, I understand that this Bill provides for state payments to owners of land that has trees or wood lots on them. Can you tell me the formula by which state reimbursement is made?"

Harris: "That's a real good question. If you had twenty acres and it was under this plan and your taxes were X number of dollars. For example, \$600 each year. And you had been under the plan for a time where you were to be reimbursed. You would pay your taxes to the county that you resided in at the present time. There's a companion Bill with this Bill, 389, receive money on that Bill is \$175,000. The Department of Conservation would reimburse you for the money you had paid as long as you agreed to keep the land within there jurisdiction."

Mugalian: "Are you saying that the entire tax Bill allocable to the wooded portion would be refunded to the tax pay-er?"

Harris: "The tax Bill would be refunded back 100 percent from the State of Illinois for the Department of Conservation.

The Department of Conservation would have the leverage of how many acres they would accept under this piece of legislation."

Mugalian: "Well, wouldn't the tax Bill include the value of the land as well as the land ... value of the forests on the land?"

Harris: "Yes it would."

Mugalian: "Why would you want to give them a reimbursement for



the land itself? That's just pure gravy is it not?

Harris: "Not in my judgment. This is the same Bill that we had last year that came out of the House and came out of the committee and was bogged in the Senate."

Mugalian: "Well would you be willing to consider an amendment that would give a partial reimbursement for the additional value represented by the trees rather than give it on the entire parcel, including the land?"

Harris: "I'd be more than happy to if you have something that would strengthen the Bill and make it more amenable to the people. I feel like that we probably should hold the Bill in Second Reading for that purpose."

Mugalian: "Alright. I'll ask the Reference Bureau to prepare something and I'll consult with you about it."

Harris: "Thank you very much."

Katz: "Mr. Speaker, as I think the Speaker has indicated to the Members of the House, next Wednesday we will be considering amendments to the House Rules. However;

it is necessary that we deal with the immediate problems



so that Bills can be introduced next week. House Resolution 152 that was just unanimously reported out of the Rules Committee would extend to April 6, the filing day for Bills. In addition to that, If any member had earlier requested from the Reference Bureau by March 15, a request for a Bill that could be filed after April 6. The rest of the resolution sets forth the deadlines for House Bills in Committee Senate Bills, it is sitting on the desk of every member and it was the intention of the Speaker to send a communication to each of the members that will let them know all of the subsequence deadline dates. The only one that becomes important to us here today, is to extend to April 6 the date for the filing of Bills so that members who would otherwise not be able to file Bills under the present Rule will be able to file Bills next week. I would move, Mr. Speaker, for the adoption of House Resolution 152, which is an amendment to the Temporary Rules under which we are now operating."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? Representative

Conti? Question's on the gentleman's motion those in
favor indicate by saying 'aye'. Voting aye. Those oppose
vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take
the record. On this question there's 130 aye, 34 aye,
and 8 no. The motion carried and the Resolution is
adopted. Page 8, the order of Speaker's table appears
House Joint Resolution 16. Representative Meyer is
recognized. Representative Meyer."

Meyer: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. There is Committee Amendment number one which hasn't been adopted on this resolution. If the Clerk would read the amendment. Mr. Speaker, in the Interim I'll explain the amendment. The Resolution creates a Subcommittee of the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules to look into and report to the General Assembly and the Governor a review of the Clean Water Act and the Clean Air Act. This is incor-



porated in the amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "You've got it Mr. Clerk? Is there any discussion on the gentleman's motion for the adoption of amendment one? Question that is on the gentleman's motion those in favor indicate by saying 'aye' aye.

Oppose 'no'. The ayes have it. The motion carried.

The amendment is adopted. Any further amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Meyer's."

Meyers: "Would it be appropriate to move for the adoption of the Resolution at this time?"

Speaker Redmond: "Are there any objections. I don't see any reason why we can't proceed. Representative Meyer's."

Meyer: "Mr. Speaker. This Resolution, as I mentioned before creates a Standing Subcommittee of the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules to look into the section 208

Water Plan and the Clean Air Act plans as they would be submitted to the Governor and the General Assembly.

I urge its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Questions on the gentleman's motion. Those in favor for the adoption of House Joint Resolution 16 indicate by saying 'aye', aye. Oppose 'no'. The ayes have it. The motion carried. The Resolution's adopted. House Joint Resolution 17."

Meyer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This Resolution will moralize this Congress to extent the deadline to the Clean
Air Act, the states portion of it and I might add, only the states portion of submitting the plan. It does not effect the industries compliancewith the plan for one year. This Bill presently is in Congress and I urge the adoption of this amend...of this Resolution."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion. Questions on the gentleman's motion for the adoption of House Joint Resolution 17. Those in favor say 'aye', aye, oppose 'no'.

Motion carried, Resolution's adopted. Representative

John Matijevich, the gentleman from Lake."



Matijevich: "Mr. Chairman, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I'm rising on a personal privilege. I've been very quiet since the inception of the Regional Transportation Authority. I haven't said anything about it because it's been a necessity. But when I woke up this morning and read the newspaper to find out what the Transportation Study Commission is doing to me, Mr. Speaker, and all the people in the Sixth County area, I've got rise up on this point of personal privilege. Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I think that we in the Sixth County area deserve, Mr. Speaker, two things right away. One is that we in the Sixth County area who have not been asked to sit down with the Transportation Study Commission, ought to, first of all, get that report before we go home. And look it over because you who live in the Sixth County area, let me tell you what there going to do to you. You're going to have a one cent sales tax in your area. Do you know that? Perk up your ears. And in addition to that, you're going to get a two cent gas tax that's going be state wide. Do you know that? Now, Mr. Speaker, we need that report right away. Secondly, Mr. Speaker, I've seen since I've been here this session, a task force on just about everything. We've got a task force on on tax relief, we've got one on unemployment compensation and workmen's compensation and what not. And, Mr. Speaker, I feel as...and you are in that Sixth County area like I am. I feel that when somebody does something to me. I have 'nt been this furious since they had that Clandestine meeting on the income tax, that back room deal. And some of you who were'nt there, it was going to be a four cent income tax. Four percent on corporations and individuals. And some of us raised so much hell, and I left the floor of the House that time and my second term was up in the gallery with the tax payers. And we forced that differencial ... forced it.



Now we've got to force some other things now. So,

Mr. Speaker, I'm going to ask you in your high office
and I demand that we in the Sixth County area, we
legislators, sit down with the Transportation Study
Commission. I want to face those people like Bob Blair
and Jerry Shay. And if we have to get in a back alley,
I want to face them and we're going to raise so much
hell at that meeting that there's going to be some
changes made, baby. So, Mr. Speaker, I want you to use
your high office to get that meeting with the Transportation Study Commission and we legislators in the Sixth
County area, because there's going to be smoke in that
room."

Mr. Speaker: "Representative Van Duyne."

Van Duyne: "Thank you. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

I can't do anything more than echo the views of Representative Matijevich. You know I ... it really is a surprise to me. The unmidigated gall of that Commission coming out with this report and asking us, after what we feel the way we were being ripped off in the past, for \$200,000,000 and now they say they're going to give us a break. We've been pleading for some relief for the past four years, and now there answer to us in the form of some type of relief is to just double the take. Now my God, there's no compassion at all. I kind of feel that it overflows on every member of this General Assembly for this Commission and the Transportation Study Group to come up with these things, because the guys down south seem to think that this does nt affect them. They have no compassion for the people in our area. So all I want to do is add my voice to it very vehemently, if I could put it that way Mr. Speaker, to Representative Matijevich."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Totten."

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I to want to echo the words of Representative Matijevichs. But let me point out,



it's the creation of this porforation of commissions and tasks force and study groups that is causing the problem that is costing us \$70. And for those of you who are interested, I introduced a Bill today to abolish all commissions and restructure the General Assembly so we can have a handle on this rate. And any of you who want to join in with me, the Bill number, I believe, is House Bill 1327."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. With all due respect to the first ... the last three speakers, I think the only smoke that's been raised has been by those three comments. The Transportation Study Commission has had a hearing state wide for the last two years. Our last hearing was in the city of Chicago. Last Friday was a public hearing, well publicized. All members recieved notices of that public hearing. The week before that we had a hearing on a Friday also here in Springfield, Illinois the day after session ended. So membership had plenty of time to state their comments. I think they'll be surprised that once they go home they're constituency would be much happier with what the Transportation Study Commission recommended for the Sixth County area, rather than pan a gas tax, a sales tax, and I think the state of Illinois appealed better receiving because when then shut off any state contribution to the RTA and I think for LeRoy's sake, I think it's about time that maybe he stops boxing with Bob Blair. He beat him once. Just let the man now serve government."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Murphy, the gentleman from Kane's."

Murphy: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. When you start going back to the aggressive sales tax in the Sixth Counties, now we're sure we're going to get the old people that have no chance of making up anything with there fixed income, there



a good job at it. You can be sure the three Representatives from the 39th District is going to get in some of the back rooms and try to cut a deal too. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentlemen from Kane, Representative Waddell. Representative Waddell. Gentleman from Kane.

Waddell: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House.

For Representative McClain's benefit and others, we don't need people like Bob Blair in government."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman from McHenry, Representative Skinner."

Waddell."

Skinner: "Mr. Speaker, I'm surprised all these downstate
legislators that think they got such a deal going for
them. Didn't they remember what Governor Olgivie promised them in 1969. Don't they remember all those
freeways. Where are the freeways? The money ran out,
did'nt it? The roads did'nt get built. And then there
was 1974. Remember all those promises of roads and bridges and
jobs that you got to vote for RTA? Are the roads built?
Why not? Well the money was'nt there. Well if you guys
are dumb enough to vote for this thing on the promise
of fcur-lane highways downstate, I would suggest you get the
promises cast in concrete so you'll at least have a
momento of your vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman from Cook, Representative Madi-gan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, would you please set a special order of business for next week sometime to allow all representatives from the collar counties to enter their comments in the record?"

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman from Lake, Representative Pierce."

Pierce: "Mr. Speaker, I can solve this whole thing, my col-

league Representative Matijevich, my colleague from

Lake County, we have an objective impartial RTA Advisory

Committee and Representative Garmisa, the Chairman, tells

me that he can hold a hearing to settle the whole matter



if you refer this to the RTA Advisory Committee,
chaired by Representative Garmisa, which will conduct
this objective hearing on the need for abolishing
or maintaining the keeping the RTA and Representative
Skinner is a member of that Committee. Am I right?
So I suggest we refer all these matters to the RTA
Advisory Committee. I serve on it as well. And we
always meet at the Sangamo Club for dinner. Thank you."
Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman from Kane, Representative Schoe-

berlein."

Schoeberlein: "Mr. Speaker, thank you. I voted against RTA and I worked hard against it, but of course we had . Bob Blair to contend with. Now Bob Blair is on a payroll and no one knows how much he getting out of the Road Fund. I know it's over \$32,000 plus expenses. I want to, as Representative Matijevich said, we should have something to take back with us and not read in the paper what they want to give the paper. We should have the papers to read. Next Tuesday is an election in Aurora, and I'll be around Aurora quite a bit and I'll have to answer a lot of questions. I want something concrete to take back with me showing exactly what that Commission has recommended, and I'd like the names of the commission and also Mr. Blair's name on it; that I can show this to people that they know who they can write to. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman from DuPage, Representative

Daniels."

Daniels: "Well, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the
House. I frankly for one want to thank the Transportation
Study Commission. I want to thank you members of the
Commssion and I want to thank the public members of
that Commission for bringing this to our attention,
because we're going to watch it, we're going to be
careful and it's the best thing you could have done
for us in the collar counties. We'll remember what



trying to do to us. We'll remember what you did to us with the RTA and we'll remember where that gas tax money is going and the areas that are'nt being served. We'll be there. We'll organize better than ever before. We'll deal with you. We'll work with you and we'll make sure that we're better represented and we get something out of this. Because when it's all said and done, remember you downstaters what's happened to you before. Remember Mike McClain from your area what you're promised and what you haven't gotten. And look at the 'Edens' expressway, what we're dealing with right now a 100 percent increase in costs. So you from downstate and the collar counties, if you want to stay together and join with us on both sides of the aisle to make sure that we're taken together, we're going to thank the Transportation Study Commission for bring this together, and we'll come out of this better than they think."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman from Henderson, Representative
Neff."

Neff: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I'm surprised at some of the remarks that have been made here. I just can't believe that the people who've read the report that's been put out by the Transportation Study Commission, because I don't think they'd make their remarks. And it's been brought out here before. We have had public hearings for the last two years on the road problem. We've had two hearings just recently, and to I don'trecall any of the legislative members that have been talking here this morning have ever appeared and given us any comments or suggestions how we should finance. We all know that we do have a road, a serious situation in our roads, and a financial situation. And we've tried to come up here and far as we know the public has had a chance to testify and I think we've came up



here with something that the mojority of the people in the state of Illinois sanction. So, therefore; I don't understand the opposition. I do hope that everyone will read these reports instead of just taking a couple of notes out of the paper and remarking on them. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Lady from Cook, Representative Catania."

Catania: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I have a parliamentry inquiry. What order of business are we on? Because we keep hearing about what a terrible work load we have, I would suggest we get on with it."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, if you will pervail upon your members not to seek recognition, why I have no idea. Representative Skinner is rising on a point of personal privilege."

Skinner: "Mr. Speaker, the Representative Neff suggested thatnone who have spoken testify before his Commission.

I'm not sure that he was in Rockford when I testified, but I did go to Rockford to testify and I take exception to his mistake."

Speaker Redmond: "House Bill, Second Reading. Well wait a minute now. Pardon me. The Chairman of the Transportation Study Commission, the Honorable Representative Garmisa from Cook County. Garmisa."

Garmisa: Thank you Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. The Transportation Study Commission addressed itself to a real rough problem. I recall that in the last session of the General Assembly, the Transportation Study Commission came up with a report that showed that the Highway Fund here in Illinois, our Road Fund would be bankrupt during this period if there was no infusion of any new dollars put into the Road Fund at that time. We came up with a recommendation for an increase in the gas tax. The members of the Commission had voted unanimously for that rise in our gas tax.

Quite a few of the members of that Commission came back



to me the following week and they told me their phones had been jingling off the hook. They had heard from people they had'nt heard from before in all their political lives. They were in real trouble back home if they had to vote for a gas tax increase, and they told me they could not vote for a gas tax increase at that time on the floor of the House. And with the rumbles we had gotten from the members of our own Commission, we thought that this was not the proper time to persue a gas tax increase at that time. Subsequently, during the last two years, our predictions have turned out to be true. At the present time, our Road Fund is bankrupt. We don't have any money to get in there and do the job on potholes that we should be doing. We do not have the funding to maintain our highways at a minimumly acceptable standard. We do not have the funds to build any new highways nor do we have any funds to really run our Mass-Transit systems in the way they should be operated on in this state. What the Transportation Study Commission did was to address itself to this enormous problem that is not unique only in Illinois, it's a problem that we have throughout the country. We set up a twenty-two member blue ribbon Technical Advisory Committee that had worked for the last six months on trying to find out what the shortfalls were, what were needed to keep our highways at a minimumly acceptable standard. What to do to move people to get that added funding to move people in public transportation. This Technical Advisory Committee met dozens of times. We had a half a dozen public hearingsthroughout the state of Illinois. We had public hearings of the Transportation Study Commission, the full Commission, with the findings of that Technical Study Commission, and we addressed ourselves to a real naughty problem. Now the findings that this Commission came up with, that we had approved



yesterday by a vote of thirteen to nothing, would adjust itself to this problem, would take care of the collar counties that had been yelling and screaming and hollaring about the five percent increase that they had gotten in their gasoline tax. This would eliminate that five percent increase in their gasoline tax. We have shifted the collar counties who are doing their screaming on the floor of this House today, but if they were to look at the figures they would find out that under this report, and I'm a member of a Chicago delegation, eight percent of the financial burden of this financing we're talking about has been shifted to the city of Chicago. It's the Chicago people that should really be screaming about this. But we are addressing ourselves to a problem that is throughout the state of Illinois. We're not talking about the small picture, we're talking about the large picture. We've got problems in this state. We've got to have that infusion of new dollars in order to take care of these very serious problems. We have come up with a plan that we've worked on hard, we've put in long hours on it. It's here for everybody to look at, and we want everybody in this General Assembly to take a look at it; and if it is not the solution you want. If you prefer the solution that the Governors offered that the administration has come up with, that's you're choice to make. have not come up with any Bill nor introduces any in this House at this state. This is going to be decided upon by the reaction we get from the membership of this body. It is in your hands, and in your hands only. And the screaming you've heard on the floor of the House this morning, is coming from people that are absolutely misinformed, that are being paniced by some few panic peddlers that are in this House that are trying to do away with RTA that are trying to do away with our highway



system and I want each and every Member of this House to look at that report, look at it through a microscope and you'll find that we have a report that all of us can live with. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "House Bill, Second Reading. House Bill Second Reading clears House Bill 13. Fiscal note has been filed I take it."

Clerk O'Brien: "Fiscal note is filed."

Speaker Redmond: "There are no amendments from the floor?" Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 13. A Bill for an Act providing for the submission to the electors of this state for certain questions of public policy. Second Reading of the Bill. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Breslin: "Ladies and Gentlemen. Representative Laurino's
Bill requires manditory insurance. The penalty for
not having this insurance if you have had any accident
is that you would be guilty of a Class A misdemeanor.
The problem with his Bill is that it is effectively
unenforceable. Because, in order for the States
Attorney to prove that you didn't insurance, he would
have to go around to all of the insurance companies



throughout the state, and verify that they did not have an insurance policy on the car involved in that accident. As a consequence, we have drafted an amendment that would create a rebuttable presumption that a person does not have insurance if they do no longer have insurance with the company that they stated they had insurance with when they got there license plates. The Bill requires that you list on the form when you go to get your license plates from the Secretary State that you list the insurance company that you're insured with. If you don't have insurance with that company at the time that you have your accident, that States Attorney Attorney can merely prove that and then there is a rebuttable presumption that you didn't have insurance at the time of the accident, then it will be... the burden will be on the defendant to prove that he did have insurance at that time. And I think that that's an easy burden for the defendant to carry. And as a consequence, we would ask that you adopt amendment number four to House Bill 206."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schuneman on the amendment."
Schuneman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Question of the sponsor,

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Mr. Speaker."

Schuneman: "Representative Breslin, I think I am in concurrence with what you're trying to do here, but, I'm curious to know how the prosecution would be handled.

Speaker Redmond: "OK. House Bill, Third Reading. On the order of priority call 33."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 33. A Bill for an Act to amend sections of the School Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Deuster."

Deuster: "Mr. Speaker, House Bill 33 is a simple little Bill,

and all it does now is to change the date upon which
the Regional Superintendent of Schools submits his
financial report to the County Board. The present
law requires that the Regional Superintendent submit
this information at the September meeting. The truth
is the Regional Superintendents don't get this information until October, November and sometimes December.
So the Bill changes the time at which they receive, they
are to give the report to January 1. The background is



in Lake County years ago we had a wise old superintendent, Dr. Bill Petty, who knew this law was ridiculous and so he never complied with it, he just ignored it. Then we had a new superintendent who came in and filed his report when he got the information, and he was attacked in a politacal campaign for not complying with the law because he filed it late. This brought the matter to my attention and I have introduced the Bill at the request of the Regional Superintendent of Schools. The other thing the Bill does is to take... is to correct a discription of the office holder from County Superintendent to Regional Superintendent in conformity with the law in all other places. I would ask your favorable vote for House Bill 33."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Question is shall this

Bill pass. Those in favor vote 'aye', oppose vote 'no'.

Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record

on this question. 145 aye and three no. The Bill

having received the Constitutional Majority hereby

declared passed. House Bill 211. Representative

Sharp."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 211. A Bill for an Act to amend sections of the School Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Sharp, 211."

Sharp: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. House Bill 211 is legislation that was successfully passed out of the House Education Committee last year. Passed the House. When it got to the Senate, the Senate decided that it was not an emergency and it did'nt need to be considered. This legislation deals with the problems of school transportation reimbursement. The problems that districts that conduct their own transportation system compared to those that contract with a private carrier. In that districts that do their own transportation and are not reimbursed for many of the expenses,



that someone that might contract with the private carrier is reimbursed for. So what this legislation does, it innumerates those costs associated with transportation that are reimbursable, and in addition, it allows districts that do their own transporting to be reimbursed for what they call an indirected administrative cost factor. And what it will do, it will provide for more equitable methods of reimbursing all school districts whether they transport themselves or contract with a private carrier for transportation to be reimbursed on a fair basis. So the fiscal impact of this is about \$3,000,000, 2,500,000 to 3,000,000, about \$3,000,000. And there would be no impact for the coming fiscal year since districts are reimbursed on a prior year basis. I believe this is only fair. Presently the School Problems Commission is making recommendations to change the in power formula. We don't know what the results of those recommendations will be. I believe that we need this legislation in the event that we do not come up with an equitable formula, a new formula, to that this unfair distribution is not allowed to continue for another year. And so with that I'd ask for favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "Would the gentleman yield?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Leinenweber: "Representative Sharp, I think it was yesterday or the day before we discussed a Bill relating to School Transportation and it was pointed out that in the current fiscal year claims are being honored I believe at the level of 89 percent. Now the General Assembly allocates an amount of money for transportation reimbursement which is less than the actual claims, then what would the affect of your Bill be? Would it be that those districts who currently contract

their bus services, would receive less money than they

Supplied States



would without your Bill and those who have their own fleets
would receive more money. Would that be correct?"

Sharp: "Well, I would rather say that those that contract would get their fair share of the 89 percent funding liable and those that do there own busing would get there fair share rather than less than a fair share of the funds."

Leinenweber: "Then the affect of the Bill would be to make it easier or, let's say districts would be more inclined perhaps to have their own fleet rather than contract. Would that be a fair...

Sharp: "Well, I don't know if that would be a result or not.

I think the way it is now those that contract, get reembursed for the entire cost of the contract which is ... includes a profit to the private carrier. So I think the way it is now, we're incouraging just the opposite of what you're saying. I think we're trying to put it on an even basis so that everyone has equal access to the funds that are available."

Leinenweber: "Alright, Mr. Speaker, I have just briefly addressed the Bill to point that in all probability, since we have not funded a 100 percent level, the transportation claims, we probably won't coming here either. So it would be this reallocation of funds from districts who don't have their own bus lines and who contract with private carriers, to those who do have their own bus lines. I'm not sure wether we ought to make it easier for schools to have their own bus lines or not. It appears to me that the... probably better left in the hands of a private carriers. I would just point those out."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Stuffle."

Stuffle: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Members. The clear point
is that those people who have their own bus systems
are not going to magically jump over and contract or
vice versa. There already tied into a situation where



they pretty much madeoutlays and pretty much have systems developed one way or the other. The second crucial point that Representative Sharp made is important. The Office of Education, the law, the regulations allow the people who contract for services to do all of these things now and get paid for them. Regardless of what the formula provides, 89 percent or a 100 percent, these people have a better shake than those several hundred school systems that have their own bus fleetsand are locked to them and can't do anything about it. All the Bill does is provide basic equity between the two types of services and now for the people who have their own systems the same type of situation that those who contract have. It should be supported by anyone and everyone who has the situations in their district if they want to be fair. I suspect virtually everyone downstate, most of the collar county people and so forth in the north have both types of systems. It would only be fair to vote for the Bill if you have that situation. It would only be fair to vote for the Bill to provide equity between the two types of systems."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schneider."

Schneider:

Representative Sharp has for a number of years tried to address himself to that problem of contracters being allowed to include indirect costs in allowable costs. It has not been true of owned and operated carriers. So it addresses a very serious problem the one that I think the membership is going to here more about as the session progresses. The only way, unfortunately, that any restraints have been exercised agianst the budget submitted by contracters is our proration. We have had some phenomenal increases already being submitted from contracters throughout the state. They are

ranging from 30 percent to 70 percent in increases and there is no access at this time for us as the State

"Mr. Speaker, thank you very much. On 211,



Legislature or as the Illinois Office of Education to analyze how valid those kind of jumps are. But that point again, will be addressed in subsequent issues and Bills. But, right now this proposal if nothing else happens in Transportation this year is at least a start to give the school district a fair shot at including what it takes to reimburse for the cost of education. It's a good beginning point and I think it's a good Bill. It does not at this point seem incompatible with what the School problems Commission is trying to do in reforming the transportation formula. So I think it's a good vote for everybody. How the forms will be eventually allocated, whether this is \$3,000,000 more than the Governor wants or \$3,000,000 more than IOU wants to redistribute, will remain mute until we get this stuff on the floor of the House. So I solicite and I vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Anderson."

Anderson: "Yes, Mr. Speaker. I also solicite and I have voted. Came out of our Education Committee 18 to one to nothing. It is a fair Bill and I also solicite your sye vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Sharp to close."

Sharp: "Yeah, I'd just like to close by saying that I have both types of situations in my district. Districts that do their own busing, districts that contract with private carriers. I've seen the discrepancies, and I think that we ought to address this issue whether we call proration or what But all should be allowed equal access to the funds that are made available by the General Assembly. And I ask for a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "Question is shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', oppose vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record on this question. There's 140 aye and 14 no. Bill having received the Constitutional Majority, hereby declared



passed. The order of Resolutions. House Resolution 159. Mr. Clerk, do you have House Resolution 159? Read the Resolution."

Clerk Leone: "House Resolution 159. Whereas, Andrew Reaves Evans was born in Auburn, Illinois on September 28, 1908. Whereas, Reaves supplemented his education at Dawson High School and Springfield High School with an AA from Blackburn College, a BS and MS at the University of Illinois and additional courses completed at various times throughout his life. Whereas, Reaves began his working life as a farmer, cultivationghis own farm in Riverton from 1929 to 1938. Whereas, during his remarkable career, Reaves has served his country as a Lieutenant in the U.S. Navy and withheld every imaginable educational position known to man including teacher, truant officer, principal, Assistant County Superintendent of Schools, Unit School District Superintendent, School District Director of Attendance and Reports, School District Director of Finance, School District Director of Personnel, Assistant State Superintendent of Schools, Staff Assistant House Committee on Education. Whereas, his Assistant State Superintendent from 1964 to 1970, Reaves applied his expertise on behalf of the Honorable Ray Page towards such endeavors as: the administration of the common school fund, which at that time equaled the mind boggling sum of 797,000,000; and the general supervision of the State Superintendents data processing stata with a staff of 40 employees and a budget of \$632,000. Whereas, Reaves Evans became the first to join the staff of former Speaker W. Robert Blair in February 1971. Whereas, the staff that carefully was built around Reaves, marked the historical beginning of comprehensive committee staffing in the House. Whereas, the staff was built around Reaves. now who numbers 11 strong and 12 women. Whereas, the staff that was built around Reaves for eight years, has



served as a model for the House Democrat Staff to follow. Whereas, in his legislative staff capacity Reaves volunteered his considerable talents to the School Problems Commission and was principally responsible for drafting of the School Aid formula. Whereas, the School Aid Formula was widely held for its purity and its logic until the General Assembly found out about it. Whereas, to this day Reaves is renouned to be the only person in the State of Illinois to understand the School Aid Formula as amended, as amended, as amended Whereas, Reaves spent thousands and thousands of hours of overtime without a complaint when he really wanted to go fishing. Whereas, Reaves still is known to hold his hands with his loving and lovable bride, Nellie. Whereas, Reaves and Nellie proudly boast of their three grown children, John, who is Associate Dean of Education at Southern Illinois University who babysits for five of Reaves grandchildren, Mike, John, Mark, Lois, MaryBell, Elaine, who is a housewife and who is raising three of Reaves grandchildren, Angela, Cinthia, and Michelle, and Leanette, who is a nurse and mother of the youngest grandchild, Christopher. Whereas, Reaves and Nellie have a rare joy of watching and participating in the growth of great grandchildren, Mechelin, age six weeks, daughter of Michelle. Whereas, on October 15 of this year, Reaves and Nellie will celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary. Therefore, be it resolve by the Illinois House of Representatives, that Reaves will be sorely misses and be it resolved that the General Assembly is deeply grateful for the many years of dedication and excellence. And be it resolved that the General Assembly extends its best wishes for a long and enjoyable retirement. And be it resolved that the General Assembly allow Nellie to spend some time with Reaves for a change. And be it resolved that a suitable and engrossed copy of



this Resolution be presented to Reaves."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would ask leave to have all Members of the House added as co-sponsors of the Resolution."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the gentleman have leave?"

Ryan: "I would like to say that Reave Evans has been with the staff for several years. He's made a great contribution of the State of Illinois in the educational system. He's going to be missed by the staff and we want to wish him well. He's over here with Don Anderson. Reaves, stand up and take a bow. Reave Evans. We want to wish you the best for the future, Reaves. I would now move for the adoption, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman's move for the adoption of amendment House Resolution 159. Those in favor indicate by saying 'aye' aye, oppose 'no'. The ayes have it.

The motion's carried. The Resolution is adopted.

House Bills, Third Reading. 286."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 286. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Revenue Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Flinn. 286. Out of the record. 287. Representative Flinn. Out of the record. 14. Representative Daniels. We're going on the priority of call. Out of the record, request of the sponsor. 325. Representative Mugalian. 325, Representative Mugalian. 325, Representative Mugalian. Read the Bill Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 325. A Bill for an Act to amend sections of the School Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Mugalian: "Mr. Speaker. There's one objection to this Bill by the County Clerk of Cook County which was registered at our Revenue Committee meeting when the Bill was heard. Despite that objection, it passed Revenue Committee, but I've talked to the Clerk and I'm expecting him to get back to me and I'd like to hold this one more time. If I don't here from them by them, I'd



like to go with the Bill. Take it out of the record."

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the record. 163. VonBoeckman.

Representative Von Boeckman on 163. Out of the record. 257. Representative Klosak.

Clerk O'Brien: "157."

Speaker Redmond: "257."

Clerk O'Brien: "257. A Bill for an Act in relation to immunity from civil damages in connection with snow and ice removal. Third Reading of the Bill.

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Klosak."

Klosak: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. This is a Bill that grants immunity to persons who remove snow and ice from sidewalks abut residential property. For those of you who are following the Bill in your Bill book, the entire Bill is now incompass in amendment number four. Though there are actually very few situations where a person would openly be found liable, the publicity given this possibility of liability makes it rather desirable for us to encourage residential owners and dweller to remove ice and snow from the sidewalks abutting there property and of course, to grant them immunity for so doing. I ask you favorable consideration."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? Question is shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', oppose vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. In this question there's 148 aye and three no. The Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. The next one on order of call is 442. Out of the record at the request of the sponsor. 533. Representative Yourell. Out of the record. 21."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 21. A Bill for an Act to amend sections of an Act relating to alcoholis liquors.

Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Dunn."



Dunn: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Since one of our three co-sponsors isn't here, Representative Buzz Yourell, we'd like to have it taken out of the record and hold it till next week."

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the record. Request of the sponsor.

455. Representative Jaffe."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 455. A Bill for an Act to amend sections of an Act concerning vocational rehabilitation.

And an Act concerning Department of Children and Family Services. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Jaffe."

Jaffe: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. This transfers certain institutions from DCFS over to DVR. Basically, the institutions that are being transfered are the two schools in Jacksonville, the Illinois Visually Handicapped Institute and also, Community Services Program. This program was really started by the Human Resources Committee sometime last session. We introduced it, we passed it to the House and it's out in the Senate. Since that time, the Governor has now come to the conclusion that this is the proper way to go. He has advocated it and as a matter of fact, he has issued a governmental transfer and that has gone through our two Committees and been unanimous, well not unanimous but adopted by a vote of six to one. I know of nobody that's in opposition to this transfer, and I would move the passage of House Bill 455."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Friedland. Gentleman from Kane."

Kane: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Point of inquiry. Did this measure receive the required number of votes in Committee

to pass?"

Jaffe: "Yes it did. It went to the State Organization

Committee and it received six affirmative votes and one negative vote."

Kane: "Thank you."

peaker Redmond: "Any further. Representative Borchers."



Borchers: "Point of inquiry. Is it going to cost any more money in it or not."

Jaffe: "No, as a matter of fact there's a Fiscal Note that's been filed, Weber, and the Fiscal Note that's been filed says that there will be no more money expended.

Basically, what you're doing is that you're just transferring it from one department to the other department. What we're trying to do is we're really to highlight services for the blind. What's happened is that DCFS really has to much work to do. And the services to the blind has never there long suit.

And it's sort of fallen between the cracks and now with the new federal program in which and with DVP getting more federal money for services to the blind, it's been our concept that these services ought to go to DVR and everybody is really in agreement on that now."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Barnes."

Barnes: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. Just to echo what Representative Jaffe has indicated this is a means of trying to show up the responsibilities and transferring those from the Department of Children and Family Services that can be better carried out on another agency so that the Department can address itself full time toward the mission that that Department would establish for some years ago. I support this Bill whole heartedly and have been assured by the administration that those dollars for these for these responsibilities will follow in terms of the funding of these services."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Peters."

Peters: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, not to belabor the point, there appears to be a consensus on this Bill. But I do join with my colleagues, Representative Jaffe and Pullen and Representative Gene Barnes in support of this legislation. It is I think a step forward in terms of more proper organiza-



tion of government and a better utilization of the resources that we have. And it also goes a long way in think in terms of more clearly defining the mandate in the role of the Department of Children and Family Services and the Department of Vocational Rehabilitation. I would urge the full support of the Members of the House. It is a good move. It's a simple transfer of institions. It is not a increase in the budget of either Department one way or the other. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Jaffe. Representative Bradley, pardon me."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker. I was wondering if he might yield for a question."

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Bradley: "I'm wondering if the home over in Jacksonville for the deaf, is that one of the institutions you would be transferring from DCFS to DVR or was that a DCFS institution?"

Jaffe: "There are two institutions. One, is the institution for the blind and the other one is the institution for the deaf. We're taking them both out of DCFS and putting with DVR."

Bradley: "Those are the only two that are going from DCFS to DVR, correct?"

Jaffe: "Also the Illinois Visually Handicapped Institute in Chicago and the Community Services Program which also operates out of Chicago."

Bradley: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further. Question is shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', oppose vote 'no'.

Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish?

Clerk will take the record. In this question there's 141 aye and three no and the Bill having received the Constitutional Majority hereby declared passed. 674.

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 674. A Bill for an Act to amend

sections of the Park District Code. Third Reading of the



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Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Willer."

Willer: "Yes, thank you Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 674 provides for the Park District, seeking to become coterminous with one or more cities or villages, may not annex without a referendum territory which has been in a particular municipality for more than one year, unless such territory so annexed in 120 acres or less. The genesis of this Bill is that last Fall, the village I live in, the village of Hillside, approximately half the village, the residents, and I live in that half, woke up one morning and found we were annexed to Memorial Park District. There had never been a notice or a hearing, much less a referendum. I tracked down the Bill that allowed this legilation was passed in 1955 and the intent of that Bill certainly was not to have happened to us what happened. The intent was that if a small section of land was developed by a developer in an unincorporated area, and then annexed by the municipality, the Park District could in turn annex it without referendum. So my Bill, I received the help of the Illinois Park District Association, the Bill came out of Committee without a descending vote. and I would ask your support and I'd be happy to answer any questions."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? Representative Daniels."

Daniels: "Will the lady yield?"

Speaker Redmond: "She will."

Daniels: "Representative Willer, why.. first of all, it's

my understanding this Bill does not apply to property

120 acres of less, is that correct?"

Willer: "That is correct."

Daniels: "Why did you pick the figure 120 acres?"

Willer: "Well, in working with the Park District Association,



they felt that was a fair amount. Now, I really don't know. At first it was 60 then we went to 120. They felt it would not work any hardship on anyone if we made it 120 acres or less. Now I will tell you I do not know why they picked that figure but I was going to settle for it. It is not a large piece of land.

Daniels: "No, except for how many pieces of property do
you know in your area that would qualify as being less
than 120 acres?"

Certainly nothing like half of a village."

Willer: "None."

Daniels: "How about in...

Willer: "I would also point out, I'm sorry I didn't mention this before, they may take in any size land if they do it within a year after annexation by the village of unincorporated territory. So they, you know, get their act together, they can do it within a years time no matter what the size."

Daniels: "Did you have any questions from forest preserve districts, counties?"

Willer: "No, I did not."

Daniels: "Did you consider this legislation as far as it would apply to a forest preserve district or...

Willer: "I don't believe it applies to a forest preserve district at all."

Daniels: "I know, but..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brummer."

Brummer: "Will the sponsor yield?"

Speaker Redmond: "She will."

Brummer: "Representative, in the event of the failure of the

Park District to annex within a one year period of time,

a track of land more than 120 acres, how does annexation

occur then?"

Willer: "Then they must go to referendum."

Brummer: "OK, thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further. Representative Ebbesen."



Ebbesen: "Yes, will sponsor yield?"

Speaker Redmond: "She will."

Ebbesen: "What are the prerequisites and who would be the voters in such a referendum. Where do they come from.

What are the prerequisites to vote."

Willer: "Oh, I presume it would be like any other referendum for annexation to a Park District. It's held in the area that is about to be annexed by the Park District."

Ebbesen: "Just the Park District?"

Willer: "It would not affect any other, any other unit of government. It would held by the Park District.

The election would be held within that area to be annexed. It would be held by the Park District."

Ebbesen: "Alright, thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kempiners."

Kempiners: "Yes, will the lady yield?"

Willer: "Yeah."

Kempiners: "Ann, several sessions ago, I passed a Bill that would outline a procedure for home owners to deannex themselves from a park district and annex to another park district that is more representative of their community. And it provided a procedure where a group of them could join together to do this. Would this Bill in anyway affect that procedure?"

Willer: "No, it will not."

Kempiners: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further. Representative Waddell."

Waddell: "Would the sponsor yield?"

Speaker Redmond: "She will."

Waddell: "How would this be affected if the park district,

for example, and the, in this case the county wanted to put a park district within a mile and a half limit of a city. Who then would vote on this?"

Willer: "The county would want to put a park district within...

Waddell: "Correct. rou would have a mile and a half limita-



tion on the authority of a city or village, and therefore; you would have a conflict if the county wanted to come into that area and have a park district or a park of 120 acres less or more. Who, then, is going to vote on this?"

Willer: "I honestly can say I can't answer your question completely, but it would seem to me that we are amending the statutes as pertaining to park districts, not any other unit of government. So, I don't see how it would affect any other statute. Perhaps somebody can answer that."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mahar."

Mahar: "Thatnk you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I think that what the previous speaker was talking about was talking about an area when...in corporated land. This Bill, as I understand it, deals with the areas within the municipality. That's the criteria. That's the important thing. We're talking about areas not in municipalities is something else. This is within the municipality. I might say that this Bill passed other cities and villages with a 12-0 and had a good hearing, and I support it. I think it should be adopted."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? Representative Willer to close."

Willer: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I would like my Cosponsor, my colleague from
the Sixth District, to close."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Wlash."

Walsh: "She is talking about Representative Boucek, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, it doesn't show on here..."

Walsh: "Oh, I guess amybe I am... am..."

Speaker Redmond: "...A hyphenated Cosponsor."

Walsh: "Yes, this is the first recognition I've had from my hyphenated Cosponsor. Well, I am pleased to support this Bill, Mr. Speaker.

There is a need for it. Is a compromise between what is needed in the village of Hillside and the abuse that they've taken from a park district by annexing from an...

old ordinance that was not intended to do as they did and the legimate needs of a park district that is wholely inclosed within a municipality and when that municipality annexes additional land then the park ought to be able to annex also. And I support the Bill enthusiasticly and solicite your support, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Is this the park district that you were a member of?

Walsh: "This is it. That's the one that did it.

Speaker Redmond: "The question is shall this Bill pass?

Those in favor vote 'aye', oppose vote 'no'. Is that

where you got your political baptism?"

Walsh: "That's where I got my start."

Speaker Redmond: "And your training."

Walsh: "Yeah."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. On this question, 143 aye 0 nay. The Bill having received the constitutional majority is hereby declared passed. 161. Representative VonBoeckman.

Out of the record. 199. Representative Pullen. Read the Bill Mr. Clerk. 199."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 199. A Bill for an Act in relation to installation of telecommunication devices for use throughout the state. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pullen."

Pullen: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House.

House Bill 199 is a replay of House Bill 3058 of last session, which passed overwhelminly in this House but unfortunately got caught in a Senate Committee when the Senate was not being well disposed toward House Bills. It requires that a telecommunications device for the deaf be installed in the Sheriff's Office in each county and in at least one public safety agency in each municipality of over 10,000 inhabitants. These telecommunications devices are so that deaf people will be



able to contact emergency services just as hearing and speaking people can. The current situation is that if you or I have an emergency, we can easily pick up the telephone and call the Fire Department, the Police Department, an Ambulance or whatever. But, if a deaf person has such an emergency and is not fortunate enough to have a hearing person living with them and present in the home at the time, this deaf person would have to go to a neighbor and pound on doors many times in the middle of the night until they could find someone that could call a public safety agency on their behalf. The telecommunications device permits the deaf person to communicate with the outside world and an increasing number of deaf people have these devices on their telephones. But, they cannot communicate with someone unless there is a TTY, as they are called at the other end of the line. So this would provide a telecommunications device at the other end of the line in public safety agencies so that deaf people would be able to have the same access to emergency services as hearing people can. It passed the Public Utilities Committee by a vote of 11 to 0. I would appreciate you favorable consideration."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ewing."

Ewing: "Mr. Speaker, I wondered if the sponsor would yield for a question."

Speaker Redmond: "She will."

Ewing: "Now are we mandating that local agencies buy these devices?"

Pullen: "We are mandating certain local agencies provide
these devices which cost between \$250 and \$700 each.

And each agency would have only one and it would be
only municipalities of over 10,000 inhabitants and County
Sheriff's Offices."

Ewing: "I assume though with your stand in mandated programs that we are providing the funds for that."

Pullen: "Sir, you ought to reconsider my stand on mandating



programs but I will inform you that there is an appropriation which was passed by this House and the Senate and the Governor last year of \$90,000 for the Department of Public Health to provide these to every County Sheriff's Office in the state and to as many municipalities as they can with the rest of the \$90,000. If it is the will of the General Assembly that the state provide all the funding for that, I'm sure that that can be added to the Department of Public Health appropriation by someone other than me."

Ewing: "I get a little confused because answer is so long,

Representative Pullen. But there is funds being provided but only up to \$90,000 is that right?"

Pullen: "\$90,000 was the amount that this General Assembly
in its wisdom passed last year."

Ewing: "But we're not limiting those who apply for those funds if you don't get those if they're not availabe to your agency and your district, then you have to pay for it yourself, is that right?"

Pullen: "Then you would scrape up the \$250 to buy one."

Ewing: "Thank you. Mr. Speaker, can I speak to ...

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Ewing: "We are consistently talking about small, little programs. But it just takes one brick put upon another to make a whole building and that's what we're doing here in mandating programs. We talk about it, we go back to our districts and we say how we're against it and we come down here and do it. Just a few days ago we did one in education. No, the cost is very small, it won't matter and now we're going to do it here again. And I would support this Bill if there was a limit in it that no agencies who did'nt get funding for the state did'nt have to provide it. And when we start providing the funds for these this might be a very good measure. Otherwise. I think we should defeat it until we pay for it. Little dollars add up to a lot of money to our units of



government back home."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "Would the sponsor yield."

Speaker Redmond: "She will."

Leinenweber: "Does the Bill still require municipality of over

10,000 inhabitants to have on of these?"

Pullen: "Yes."

Leinenweber: "So all counties in municipalities of over

10,000, is that the jest of the Bill?"

Pullen: "Yes."

Leinenweber: "How many sets of municipalities are there?"

Pullen: "Approximately 170."

Leinenweber: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Marovitz."

Marovitz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I would call the attention of the sponsor of this Bill to the fact that this is a people oriented program which there's no funding for in the legislation. And I intend to vote for this legislation because it's needed and I would hope that the sponsor would remember that the 29th of March, when good people oriented legislation comes up that there are not funds allocated for but that are very important to the people of the state. I hope your stands would be consistent and that you will remember the 29th of March, because I will refer you to this date when other legislation that's good for the people comes up where the money isn't allocated."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Bowman. Representative $\label{eq:Vinson.} \textbf{Vinson."}$

Vinson: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. Normally I follow very carefully my colleague, Representative

Ewing, when he warns us about the evils of big government and big spending. He's normally right on that issue.

Today, however; I feel that I have to split with him and urge adoption of this Bill because this is a Bill that's aimed at helping a group of people that really



cannot help themselves unless government does. We're not talking about buying these devices, for the deaf people themselves in their home. We're talking about buying them for the Sheriffs' of this state so that they can respond to the deaf people. And it really is a situation where only government can help these people. They can't help themselves unless we do. I urge adoption of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brummer."

Brummer: "Yes, will the sponsor yield?"

Speaker Redmond: "She will."

Brummer: "Is there any indication of the rate of frequency that this device would be used in some of the very small counties? Do you have any estimate or any study which would indicate that this would be used to any extent?"

Pullen: "No, I don't, but I think that one emergency in the
lifetime of the machine might very well be worth the \$250 to \$700
that it costs that county or municipality to buy the machine.

I don't think that that ought to be the issue when we
are dealing with people who ought to have the same access

to emergency services that you and I have."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hallstrom."

Hallstrom: "Thank you. Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I rise in support of this Bill. First of all, I think the sponsor of the Bill has certainly shown everyone in this House that she is very concerned about tax payers money. I think that she's also explained it very well and other people in support of the Bill have that these are people that cannot help themselves. And if we save the life of one person it certainly worth whatever this Bill costs. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative John Dunn. Gentleman from Macon."

Dunn: "Will the sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "She will."



Dunn: "If these devices are installed in County Sheriff's

Offices around the state does this mean that every deaf

person in the state of Illinois will have access automatically to emergency services?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pullen."

Pullen: "They would have access if they have a machine themselves. And a growing number of them do own these machines but there does'nt seem to be much point to them
having them if ther's no one at the other end."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Dunn."

Dunn: "Then you're saying that any deaf person who does not have a machine on the other end in their own home cannot take advantage of the instrument that you seek to put the Sheriff's Offices. Is that correct?"

Pullen: "That's true, but now a...

Dunn: "How much do these devices cost?"

Pullen: "\$250 to \$700."

Dunn: "No matter whether you put them in the Sheriff's Office or in an individuals home?"

Pullen: "That's correct."

Dunn; "So they cost \$250 at each end of the line. Is that correct?"

Pullen: "Yes, and there are groups for deaf people who provide them to needy deaf people."

Dunn: "What is your position about subsidising the cost of these and individuals homes where there are deaf people who can't afford \$250 to buy one of these? Will you support legislation to do that?"

Pullen: "I think there are already many private associations which do this for deaf people."

Dunn: "That really wasn't the question."

Pullen: "And sir...

Dunn: "Mr. Speaker, may I address myself to the Bill?"

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed Mr. Dunn."

Dunn: "I think the concept is very note worthy, Mr. Speaker,

but as is just come out in the questioning, you can only



take advantage of this if you have a device on the other end of the line in your own home. And they cost \$250. And there're going to be lots and lots of deaf people in the state of Illinois who can't afford \$250 to hook up to this system. And they'll be coming to local government, state government, and state of Illinois for support and funding to provide these instruments. And I think before we go ahead with legislation like this, we ought to have some indication as to whether the state of Illinois is willing to undertake that burden which will be much much more costly than the initial representation of costs that we have for this system. Because the system is in its infancy if it is established as projected right now it really means nothing to a deaf person who does'nt have the similar device in his or her own home. How are they going th get them, who's going to pay for them, how many do we need, how many deaf people do we have in the state of Illinois, and furthermore; what if they're not at home and need to make a call?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner."

Skinner: " Mr. Speaker, I move to previous question."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved to previous question.

The question is shall the main question be put? Those in favor say 'aye' aye, oppose 'no'. The ayes have it the motion carried. Representative Bowman to close."

Bowman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. What we're talking about here is the lives of 200,000 of Illinois'citizens. There lives are constantly in jeopardy, moreso than anybody because if they had a fire, if they had a break in, if they had some need for emergency services, they would be totally unable to communicate that need to the necessary agency. There's an additional problem with being deaf. Most deaf persons cannot speak. Consequently, if they had an emergency,

they could'nt even go next door and call their neighbors



attention to the emergency and have them place the callfor them. Right now we have 200,000 people in this state who are cut off from the most basic services offered by local governments. This is'nt a mandated program, this is giving people the access to basic public safety services. The Police Department, and the Fire Departments everywhere have the responsibility to provide those serivces for all citizens. Unless the citizens who are affected can communicate that to the proper agencies, nothing will be done. There is a substantial number of people, we are talking about 200,000 people scattered throughout the state every county has them, every city over 10,000 people have then, and now is the time to do something about it. These devices that we're talking about are fairly inexpensive now. At one time they were quite expensive. But modern electronics has brought the cost down to very reasonable ranges. And so suddenly the demand for these machines is growing rapidly, more and more people have them, a very large number of people have them in fact, so that it is a timely issue. And I stress once again that this is not a mandated program at all. It is simply letting citizens have access to public safety services to which they are entitled because they are tax payers just like you and me. Thank you very much."

Speaker Redmond: "Question is shall this Bill pass? All those is favor vot 'aye', oppose vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. Representative Johnson. Representative Johnson aye. Representative Catania aye. What is the count now, Mr. Clerk? This question is 89 aye and 30 no. Representative Kelly requests the verification of the affirmative Roll Call. Representative Pullen moves the poll to the absenties. Representative Kelly, for what purpose so you rise? Bad boy Kelly."



Kelly: "Mr. Speaker, rather than, you know, verify this
Roll Call, could we have the opportunity to maybe open
the voting mechanism and let some of those voting
present vote aye?"

Speaker Redmond: "We've got two on there now that requested
Representativ Johnson and Representative Catania. So
there is 89. Have you withdrawn your request for verification? Representative Kelly. Representative Schoeberlein desires to be recorded as aye. This question is
90 aye and 30 no. The Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. 229. Representative Skinner."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 229. A Bill for an Act relating to tax objections. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the General Assembly. House Bill 229 perhaps could be called the downstate Illinois tax protest equalization Bill. What we're trying to do is make all the animals in the... on the Illinois farm equal. That is we want tax payers downstate to have the same rights as Cook County has. At the present time tax payers in downstate Illinois have to pay \$10 to the Circuit Clerk for every tax bill which they want to pay under protest. That is not the case in Cook County. This \$10 fee was put into effect in a salary as a compensating factor to induce us for the Circuit Clerk of the state to induce us to vote for their salary increases last time around. They thought this would raise the money to pay for it. Unfortunately, they did'nt do it for the entire state and so what we have is people in Cook County that don't have to pay the fee and people downstate Illinois counties do have to pay the fee. "I argued that as unfair and this Bill will end that disparity. The second thing the Bill will do is allow



people in downstate Illinois to pay taxes under protest in installments. Right now the law says that they must

pay them in one lump sum, which means that they must pay them the second installment ahead of time. That seems unfair to me, especially considering many people paying tax under protest can barely afford to pay the taxes let alone pay them in advance. That's what the Bill does it's fairly simple. And I would ask for your support."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Conti." Conti: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I'm not going to discuss the merits of this Bill. I don't... I know what the intent is of the sponsor but the thing that concerns me the most is the frivolous claims that might be brought about because of the taking away of this fee. And I want to remind the sponsor of this Bill the additional cost it might be to the tax payers because when the tax Bill is paid under protest that a certain percentage of those taxes will be held back from these communities forcing most of these communities to go into tax anticipation warrants until the lidigation or the hearing on the tax claim is resolved. The merits of the Bill I could see what he's trying to do, but I'm afraid in trying to help the people again we're trying to shove it to the people."

Speaker Redmond: "Question is shall this Bill... Representative Bowman. Are you seeking recognition? Question is shall this Bill pass? Those is favor vote 'aye', oppose vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. This question, 121 aye and 8 no and the Bill having received the Constitutional Majority, hereby declared passed. 290. Out of the record. Representative Brady is'nt here is he?

Oh. Was'nt in his chair. I guess we amended that today Representative Brady so we can't take it for passage now. Now you can run back. 311. Out of the record. Request of the sponsor. 318, Representative Brummer. 318."



Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 318."

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the record. Request from the sponsor. That's been returned, I hear. 329. Representative Kornowicz. Out of the record. 340, Representative Steele."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 340. A Bill for an Act in relation to fishing and hunting license for persons of age 65 or over. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Steele."

Steele: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 340 is a permissive Bill relating to senior citizens humting and fishing licenses and privileges. It provides that for a nominal cost of 50c to cover handling and mailing that any senior citizen can apply to the Department of Conservation and get a golden age fishing and hunting license. As we all know now, senior citizens do have the privilege of hunting or fishing after 65 but they don't have any evidence of this. And this has caused problems the fact that they don't have evidence to show they do have that right. So House Bill 340 merely provides that for a nominal charge to handle the mailing and the handling that they can be provided for life, the rest of their life, the golden age hunting, fishing license. It's permissive if they want it they can get it, if they don't want it they don't have to have it. Passed unanimously in the Com-

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 387. A Bill for an Act to amend sections of the National Guard Scholarship Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mahar."

Mahar: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 387 amends the National Guard Scholarship Act to allow Junior Officers to come under the program. The program is four years old and it's been quite successful, but has caused this problem. A large number of non-commission officers who are eligible to go to OCS and be promoted to officers are not volunteering simply because they loose their scholarship. Now there are many vacancies in the Junior Officers rank to the National Guard and they're quite concerned about it. The logical people to become Junior Officers are those the staff Sergeants and top Sergeants who are qualified. It's the feeling of the National Guard and the National Guard Association that this will help to solve that problem. And the cost, potential cost is about \$25,000. The Illinois State Scholarship Commission does not oppose it. They project that if the Bill passes it'll be... it'll allow about a hundred people to participate. I'll be happy to try to answer any questions. I urge the adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Question is shall this

Clerk Hall: "House Bill 541. An Act to amend sections of the Illinois Pension Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Beatty."

Beatty: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House.

This Bill is a Bill that's designed to help chronic alcolics that are employed by the Chicago Sanitary District and put them in a position where they will. I don't think it's funny. But some people seem to think so. Suppose to try to help get these people back to work, back on their feet, away from the bottle. It provides that they will be eligible for ordinary disability benefits provided that they do go into a program that will rehabilitate them. And that's the sum substance of the Bill. I ask for your support."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Question is shall this

Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', oppose vote 'no'.

Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take record. In

this question there's 113 aye and 18 no. Bill having

received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared

passed. 546. Representative Ropp."

Clerk Hall: "House Bill 546. A Bill for an Act to amend sections of the Civil Administration Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ropp."

Ropp: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. About eight years ago there was a program inaugurated in the Department of Agriculture which provided recognition for those family farms who had been in the same family and owned and operated for 100 years. This program was called the Centennial Farm Program and a number of signs were presented throughout the state of Illinois giving recognition to those family operations for their long



years of service in building this state. This kind of ... about two years ago then, this became a law which permitted the Department to continue this on a cost provided by the recipients to pay for those particular signs. Now this Bill provides that opportunity for business in the state who have been owned and operated by a family for 100 years. This program will be called the Centennial Business Program. It will cost the state nothing and will give recognition to those businesses who have been the state, family owned businesses for 100 years, recognition from the Department of Business and Econimic Development. I think it's a good program, and I urge your favorable support."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giorgi. You seeking recognition?"

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, is this the sponsors first Bill?"

Speaker Redmond: "I don't know. Is it?"

Ropp: "Yes sir."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? Question is shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye", oppose vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. Dump the Roll Call. Have all voted who wish? Yeah, take it again. Favor vote 'aye', oppose vote 'no'. This question is 154 aye and 0 nay. The Bill having received the Constitutional Majority hereby declared passed. 553. Representative DiPrima. Out of the record. Oh that's been returned to Second I see. 581. Representative Davis."

Clerk Leone: "A Bill for an Act to provide for the exercise of the right of eminent domain. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Davis."

Davis: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 581, if you'll read the synopsis does exactly what it says. And for those of you who don't have it in front of you, I'll read it for you. An Act to



provide for the exercise of right foreminent domain and grants county the right to obtain title and possession to land upon a motion to the Circuit Court. Imposes an additional alligation to that motion if the affidavit to show that 80% of the right away sought to be aquired has been purchased through the regular eminent domain procedure covered in section 10A of the Act. The Bill passed Counties and Townships unanimously. They seemed to think it was a pretty good idea. I think it's a pretty good idea, and if you think about it a little bit I think you'll think it's a pretty good idea."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Would the gentleman yield?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

McClain: "Mr. Davis, is this home rule counties or all counties?"

Davis: "This is all counties, sir."

McClain: "Why would we want to grant counties that are not home rule counties this kind of power?"

Davis: "Well, the Bill that was... the idea came to me simply because of a road project in my district that has been dragging on for four years in the regular eminent domain procedure simply because a few parcels were not aquired, or were not timely aquired. And the cost of that road has practically trebbled in these inflationary times. And it just occured to me that if counties had the right of quick take I might as well call it what it is, that maybe that problem can be eleviated and keep everybody on the right track. But only with the provision that if 80% of the right away, and I picked 80% as an arbitrary figure it could be 90 or 95, that you'd have a safeguard provision and that nobody going to use the right of quick take indiscriminately. Probably would'nt be a bad idea in the states provision as well."

McClain: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the
House. I usually do not, at least I have not found myself



in opposition to Mr. Davis very often, but I do in this case. Quick take powers are powers that I think the legislature ought to seldom give away for condemnation proceedings to any unit of government and ought to very cautiously take a look at quick take powers. What you're doing here is giving a county government, a county government that is not necessarily a home rule unit, in fact all counties throughout the state of Illinois, the right to quick take property for purchasing right away. Generally, if you've ever had a freeway or a road built by the state of Illinois through any of your counties, you'll realize that farmers and business community are very shy of quick take powers. It puts the land owners a great disadvantage and it almost subjects them to a continued harrassment and employing attorneys, and I'm an attorney, but I don't think that we ought to always put the land owner at a disadvantage. Quick take powers are powers that ought to be given away, I think for health and safety, and for those kinds of things like for utitilty companies that need the right away very fast, or for the state of Illinois when they need something to be used for ... in quick measures. And I think in these kind of cases, the state of Illinois ought to not give it away freely and for that I'd ask you to very cautiously look at this piece of legislation."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McMaster. McMaster."

McMaster: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House.

Let me point out to you that in many cases where a county highway is being built, they are making use of other funds such as federal or state funds. And I think this is directly the cue, Mike, as to why they need it. They cannot proceed with this construction and therefore, become ineligible to receive the money if they do not have this quick take power. I do not consider the quick take would interfere with the property owner getting the proper amount of money for the property that is being



taken by quick take. But, I do feel that if we're going to make use of te federal funds that are available to counties and other units of government, there are many cases where this quick take power is just about a necessity. I would urge a yes vote on this legislation."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Van Duyne."

Van Duyne: "Thank you, thank you, Mr. Speaker. I think the the kicker in this Bill is the fact that 80% of all the right away has got to be aquired. So, you know, in difference to the people that you're trying to protect as far as the quick take is concerned, I think you also should look at what has already been done in trying to get a road built. So I rise in support of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Question of the sponsor. Mr. Davis, does this Bill provide quick take power to the Regional Transportation Authority?"

Davis: "No sir, it does not."

Madigan: "It does 'nt."

Davis: "No. Did you notice, Representative Madigan, I didn't say a word about RTA today."

Madigan: "Yes."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Sumner."

Sumner: "Will the sponsor yield to a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Summer: "Would you explain to me how quick take works in this Bill."

Davis: "Well, the quick take provision is outlined in the same provision that the state and other agencies now have for simply you make a motion to the Circuit Court for quick take, and but in this particular case you have to also file an affidavit with the motion that indicates that 80% of the right away has already been aquired through

the regular negotiation eminent domain process."

Sumner: "How does that work though to that 20% that's left?



Does that mean that the county or any unit can just take it and settle later?"

Davis: "Well, essentially that's what quick take is. Now, it's permissive. We're not saying that they have to do it, we're saying that you can do it. And I'm not... the figure 80% is not etched in stone. And nobody questioned it while it was on Second Reading, they're questioning it now and perfectly ameanable to amending up to 90% or wherever you want to go. It's simply to avoid the hold out, the one or two or three parcels held out, or the one or two or three recalcitrant owners held out, or perhaps even a county road commissioner who doesn't choose to proceed with the project in a timely fashion in the regular eminent domain negotiation proceedings. Counties can take land now, but they have to negotiate in the case of the road I spoke of earlier some four years has taken place."

Sumner: "But then as it stands today, that does give the private land owner an option as your Bill would state it merely, I mean it would just come in and take it and not consider the land owner. They would settle with him later."

Davis: "Oh sure, and you must remember at the 80% provision in the regular eminent domain process that the price has already been established or reasonably established so the price can be argued at a later date."

Summer: "That's kind of rough on those poor souls that are left with maybe there lifetime savings and piece of property and the county can come along or anyone and say you know, 'OK we'll settle later'. I...

Davis: "Well, Representative Sumner, they can... Representative Sumner they can do that now. You see, the county can to that now."

Sumner: "But not, evidently not quite as severely or we would'nt need the Bill. If it can't be done with quick take."

Davis: "Well, they don't ahve quick take powers now. They do have eminent domain but not quick take."

Summer: "That's what I don't like about it because that's...

Davis: "Well, I tried to build in a safeguard provision to just address the recalcitrant land owner who refuses to cooperate with the counties."

Sumner: "Well, I still kind of have my doubts on it with that

20% because they are individual land owners and they've

worked hard for what they have and in this case, we're

going to ignore them. And I don't believe that's right.

Davis: "I appreciate that, Mam."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Getty."

Getty: Would the sponsor yield:"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Indicates will."

Thank you for your answers."

Getty: "Representative Davis, I'd just like to clear off
that the purpose of this, and that the legislative
intent, is that this authority is for highway purposes
only. Is that correct?"

Davis: "Yes, it is, Representative Getty."

Getty: "Thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from Rome, Mr. Davis, to close."

Davis: "Well, thank you, Mr. Speaker. In closing I'd like

to address the arguement raised by Representative Mc-Clain. Representative McClain and Members of the House, I'm as jealous of guarding the rights of land owners as anybody else and I'm aware of the Farm Bureau particularlies opposition to all quick take provisions in the law. And normally I would support that particular aspect of it, but I think we've built in a safeguard provision here that even the Farm Bureau is midigating their stance against this particular idea with the 80% level. And it addresses the sign of the times. We don't know where inflation is going or how far it's going or whatever.

Hopefully it'11 be zero and there'11 be no need for this sort of thing because road projects would'nt escalate in



that, and I think Representative McMaster's pointed out some very lucid reasons why this Bill should pass. So I simply say to you regardless of your objections to quick take, the safeguards are in the Bill. It's not a bad Bill. The only thing that I've had to hold back on was the Illinois Municipal League wants in on it very badly and I refuse to take their amendment at this point and time. I think they ought to get their own quick take Bill. Thank you Ladies and Gentlemen."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Question is shall House Bill 581 pass?

All in favor vote 'aye', all oppose vote 'nay'. The
lady from Sangamon, Mrs. Oblinger, the explain of vote."

Oblinger: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House.

This is fine for the protection of the 80% he's talking

about, but what about the other 20%. We've been talking here about a case where 80 acres were taken for an interstate highway. And what happened, they used about 25 or 30 acres and then sold the rest to public auctions. Not for the benefit of the land owner, but the quick taker. I think we who live in the country know what this can do and I'm surprised at this Bill with a quick

Speaker Lechowicz: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Katz, to explain his vote. Timer is on."

take provision."

Katz: "In view of the eliquent remarks from the gentle woman from Sangamon, I had taken my light off. I really don't think that the 80% is anything more than a smoke screen. If I'm one of the 20%, what difference soes it make to me that 80% of the people have agreed to do something? It's my property, all 100% of it belongs to me. Introducing this element of the 80%, I think, has an element of phoniness really that has no relevance to the procedure and either you ought to be able to quick take it or not quick take it and it shouldn't be messed up with these considerations. The Constitution does grant the



right of eminent domain' and is a very basic right under our constitution. And that's why I'm voting no."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. On this question are 23 ayes, 76 nays, and 16 record as present. This Bill having failed to meet the Constitutional Majority, hereby declared lost. Gentlemen from Cook, Mr. Mahar.

Chapman: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. Some of you may recall a similar Bill two years ago which Representative Macdonald and I sponsored. We are trying to solve the problem of double taxation which exists in our Schaumberg township in our district. Where... citizens are paying double library taxes. They reside both within

berg township in our district. Where... citizens are paying double library taxes. They reside both within a township which offers library services and within a municipality which offers library services. Our Bill two years ago, got to the Governor's desk and an amendatory veto really damaged the Bill. The House overrode the amendatory veto, but the Senate failed to do this. We've come back and have solved the problem in our area in a way which only will affect Schaumber township. Because the Bill now is restricted only to Cook County and



Schaumberg township happens to be the only twonship in Cook County which operates a township library and taxes for it. So we believe there should be absolutely no opposition to our Bill. We've solved the problem by requiring the township to abate those taxes collected within the affected area for library taxes, and then for the municipality to split 50/50 with the township. The taxes they collect for this purpose only, of course, within the affected area. I ask for your support on this matter of fairness to Illinois citizens in our legislative district."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from Kankakee, Mr. McBroom."

McBroom: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. House Bill
706 amends the Agricultural Fair Act. Increases state
reimbursement for 4-H, Vocational Agriculture sections,
County Fair rehabilitation grants, different things of
that nature. I'd be glad to respond to any questions
that I'm able to answer. In lieu of that, I'd appreciate

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? The gentleman from Winnebago, Mr. Giorgi."

Giorgi: "I wonder if the sponsor would tell us how much the gamble and skim this amounts to. How much gambling dol-



lars involved in this Mr. McBroom?"

McBroom: "Well, it...

Giorgi: "This is...

McBroom: "All of the money comes from Fair Mutual Betting.

Giorgi: "Yeah, but I think we'd like to know the total be-

cause the people from your district generally don't vote for Bingo Bills or Lottery Bills or Bills of chance. So we'd like to know how much money you're skimming from the gambling take to take care of these poor farmers."

McBroom: "Well, what... as much as we can, Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "That's right. Very well said. What's the total?

What's the total skim you're, you know, you're fleecing the city slickers for how much? You know the guys that go to the track to the Chicagoland area and to Kahokia you know you take the first 16¢ out of every two dollars then you give them to the farmers wife. You give her the ribbons from gambling dollars for the best pies.

And you give the girls, the 4-H girls, for the best aprons gambling dollar price and I want to know how much you're going to spend on these poor bible belt people.

McBroom: "The Director of the Department of Agriculture here, Representative Ropp, tells me... tells me 4.6 million.

Giorgi: "4.6 million."

McBroom: "1.6 million we're going to contaminate the whole area."

Giorgi: "Well, that's so much contamination.

McBroom: "An increase of 1.6."

Giorgi: "As long as you agree that you're taking race track gambling skim to help the bible belt people, I'll go with you."

McBroom: "Thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from Stephenson, Mr. Rigney."

Rigney: "Will sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Indicates he will."

Rigney: "Can you explain how you're changing the base formula under the terms of this legislation?"



McBroom: "Representative Rigney, you directed that question
to my compodrae in the Agriculture Committee. I didn't
profess to understand it then and with all due respect to you

I'm not sure you did then either."

Rigney: "Mr. Speaker, if I can just speak briefly on the Bill.

In spite of the fact that the sponsor seems unable to answer my quesiton, we did hearthis Bill in Agriculture Committee. I think it is an excellent piece of legislation. I think basically what the sponsors providing for is alittle updating as far as funding of our Agricultural Fairs is concerned and this is something that has not been adjusted since in the late sixties and we know what has happened in the inflationary spiral in the last ten years. And I think it's going to be necessary to update it in this fashion. So I hope that in spite of the sponsor that everybody will get on board

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Barnes."

Barnes: "Thank you very much. Will Mr. speaker and Members of the House, would the sponsor yield to a question or two?":

and vote ofr House Bill 706."

McBroom: "Yes."

Barnes: "Well, I'm reading the language in the Digest and this is, although we are being very humorous about it, it seemed to me that this is a serious matter here because you're changing the base, you're changing the increases that will go on continually. Part of the language you have in there deals with the consumer price index. And it ties rate increases relative to that. Could you explain that to me? Well, is this a one time rate adjustment as relates to the consumer price index or are we talking about something that will carry over and will be increased annually based on the consumer price index in the way it moves up or down?"

McBroom: "It would be increased annually, Representative Barnes."



Barnes: "How much, Representative, do you expect though,
what was estimated from the department would be involved
in these various increases? Because of a serious thing,
and I think everyone should take a close look at this,
you're not just talking about changing their base and
making the adjustment for this year, you're talking about
building in increases for future years. So how much,
in fact, would that be if this legislation would become

McBroom: "Well, Representative Barnes, the best answer that
I can give you is that it varies every year. I would guess
five, six percent. That's the best answer I can give
you."

law?"

Barnes: "Well, Representative, one of the problems I have here in addition to this and is a serious matter, is these rates adjusted from the top is there any adjustment made in the collection of the fund prior to this rate adjustment. Are you taking this off the top?"

McBroom: "No, but the fund has increased historically over the years since the enactment of this legislation in 1927."

Barnes: "Well, all due respect, one additional question.

Could you tell me or estimate to me how many dollars

if any, relative to the increase would be coming to the

area of Cook County under this legislation?"

McBroom: "Well, Representative Barnes, I'm advised that two
million goes to McCormick Place and is broken
down by fairs, Representative Barnes. I don't know
how many county fairs you have in Cook County, if any,
I'm really not aware of that."

Barnes: "Mr. Speaker, could I speak to the Bill for just
a moment? This is a... I have no particular problem
with trying to make some adjustments to the base rates
relative to what is received by the county fairs, but
I think we should take a real close look at this, because we're not talking about one adjustment this year.



We're talking about built in adjustments in years to The quesitons I asked relative to Cook County is not just questions of nature to be... add anything or detract anything from the intention of the sponsor. But primarily, in area racing, as I'm sure that all of you know, would consider the perponderance of the money that's raised for racing is raised in Cook County, because that's where the larger tracks are. That's the reason I addressed that question to whether or not any adjustments was ande relative to reimbursement to that particular county. Apparently, there is not. I would look at this in a very serious way. As I said initially, I'm not necessarily, necessarily opposed to an adjustment based on con-inflation involved since the rates have not been adjusted for some time. But I think a serious question, a serious question, and some consideration should be given toward this Billwhen you're talking about building in, billing in, if you will, a formula that allows itself with the consumer price index, but we do not do that, do that, when we do not do that for many needy, needy projects within the state relative to senior citizens, relative to other people that I think this kind of built in rate increase would be far better addressed to."

McBroom: "Mr. Speaker, I'm advised that there are many, many
... there's over six thousands 4-H members in Cook County
which would receive an increase under this measure Representative Barnes. Representative Barnes. To answer
your question partially, there are over six thousand
4-H members in Cook County who would receive an increase
under this legislation."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The gentleman from Wayne, Mr. Robbins."

Robbins: "Speaker, I have had seven children that have gone through this program and it has helped make them better citizens. You will find that throughout your counties, and Cook included, that you will have less juvenile problems



with the 4-H member because they absolutely don't have as much time to get into trouble and they work harder for the community. Now when you start talking about the amount of money that's paid out for premiums whenever they get five to ten dollars maybe for a project, and when you go to consider that the amount of time that they've worked on this project, and the cost of trying to take care of a juvenile, it's dirt cheap to help them have just a little more to... insentive to go ahead with these projects. If some of you... if you are not aquainted they do, you should check in in Cook County and see how much the 4-H programs there saves you. Thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from McClain, Mr. Bradley."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House.

I rise to support the Bill, but I've said on this floor when we passed legislation that allowed the very same funds to go for construction of McCormick Place in the county of Cook and the city of Chicago. We've used the same fund for some buildings over the University of Illinois for food for Century Three. The additional funds that aren't spent, go back into the General Revenue Fund and the Governor and we count on those funds. seems fair to me that we could give additional amount of dollars to the very organization that this fund was initially created for and that's for county fairs and that's what the gentleman intends for it to go. And we have used the funds in various other areas when needed to help Cook County or whatever county it might be. And I think it's a good Bill and we ought to go ahead and vote aye on the Bill. Thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Lady from Champaign, Mrs. Satterthwaite."
Satterthwaite: "Will the sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Indicated he will, Mam."

Satterthwaite: "Representative, is it not true that part of your Bill requires that in order for county fairs to re-



ceive some of this reimbursement they also have to provide some matching local money?"

McBroom: "Yes."

Satterthwaite: "Would that no then be an indication that no fair is going to frivolously use this as an additional windfall, so to speak since it will require an initial outlay on their own part in matching funds?"

Observation is quite correct."

Satterthwaite: "Thank you very much."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The lady from Peoria, Mrs. Sumner."

Sumner: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise to support this Bill.

I think it's a great way to help youth of today far better to put it into an incentive such as this, than into
crime prevention and drug prevention. We use enough
already in those areas and I think this is an excellent
way to support youth. Thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from Bureau, Mr. Mautino."

Mautino: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Would gentleman yield for a question?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Indicated he will."

Mautino: "Ed, I noticed that on page one of 706, we now include roleos as a portion of the State Fair overall complex. Maybe I'm not familiar, but I don't know of any rodeos that the State Fair has. Bo they have one? Or county fairs. They have rodeos as well?"

McBroom: "Well, this is a new aspect of it and some fairs do have rodeos."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Molloy. Mr. Molloy please. I guess your mic isn't working, Miss, you want to move over?"

Molloy: "Mr. Speaker, I move the previous question."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman has moved to previous question.

All in favor signify by saying 'aye' aye, all oppose.

Previous question has been moved. The gentleman from
Kankakee, Mr. McBroom to close."

McBroom: "Well, I'd appreciate a favorable Roll Call very much



Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Question is shall House Bill 706 pass?

All in favor vote 'aye', all oppose vote 'nay'. The
gentleman from Sanga, Mr. Kand. To explain his vote."

Kane: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House.

I think that county fairs probably do need some additional money, but I think that if we... I don't think that if we do not... that's a couple of double negatives in there. But, I don't think that we should build in a cost of living index for county fairs when we aren't doing that for education and corrections and all of those other kinds of things. When some programs need some more money let's vote the money at that time. But, let's not give them a continual check on the State Treasury that'll automatically increase every year."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Genleman from Madison, Mr. McPike to explain his vote. Timer's on."

McPike: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in opposition tothis Bill. Just to reinterate what Doug Kane just said, this is the only program that I've seen since I've been here that we've tied to the Consumer Price Index. We refuse to do that when it comes to education or public aid or any other social services that we provide up here. This Bill goes to the Agriculture Committee and comes out 11 to 0. I think if the increase was 50% or 100% it still would have come out 11 to 0. I think it's ridiculous to give this type of an increase. I didn't have a chance to ask what the percent was but is 1.7 million dollars as compared to what ever it was last year. It could be 50% as well as I know. I think it's ridiculous to give this type of increase to agricultural fairs when we're not even matching the Consumer Price Index when it comes to educational welfare or any other kind of social service. I think it's a disgraceful Bill. I ask for more red lights up there."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from Effingham, Mr. Brummer to



explain his vote. Timer's on."

Brummer: "Yes, I think this is an excellent Bill to provide additional funds for the youth who are engaged in 4-H activities. I intend to vote yes on this. I think possibility if we pass this Bill we won't need House Bill 21 because this help solve the teenage drinking problem."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Matijevich to explain his vote. Timer's on.

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, the sponsor knows I support this

Bill and the funding mechanism which was House Bill 708

passed overwhelmingly in Appropriations Committee. However, I only rise in hope that sponsors in the future

when they have companion Bills will wait until both

of those Bills are together. I think the sponsors themselves would be the best to do this, because we just

can't keep track of all the Bills ourselves and surely from

the podium the aren't always aware there is a companion

Bill and that's the only reason I rise at this time."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Bullock to ex-

Bullock: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. I'll be very brief. I'm glad to see that the other side of the aisle is at least presenting to the citizens of the State of Illinois their proposal on tax spending limitation. And I don't want to belabor the point, but I think we are getting some indication as to the direction that that side of the aisle will go, particularly in its concern for consumer whether it's leisure tax or otherwise. So I'm glad to vote yes and I'll hope they'll continue their progressive stand."

plain his vote."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from Macon, Mr. Dunn to explain his vote. Timer's on."

Dunn: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. I had several questions which will remain unanswered, but it does appear to me as I read the Bill and I will indicate, of course, that I may



not be right, butit looks to me like the county fair can make a claim for some from this fund and if the claim is not enough then they can receive a grant and if the total of the claim and the grant are not adequate then they can participate in the growth incentive program and if that isn't enough they can rely on the increase in the Consumer Price Index. I come from the farm community but we're respectful people, we're respectable and responsible. This is not responsible. We shouldn't pass this Bill. Speaker Lechowicz: "Want to take that out of the record,

Stuffle: "What we're doing is providing that the rates would



be the same for state chartered banks as nationally chartered banks. Nationally chartered banks because they come under directly 1285, the U.S. Code, the Banking Act, already have the authority that we're trying to seek for the state banks. I guess you could construe it that way, but I think to be fair and to provide parity, it's necessary to do this sort of thing particularly in the small communities where the banks do not have the capitalization or the assets or the ability to make what this basically covers which is the signature alone where you come in, say you're a farmer and you need a loan outsides the other types of limitations that are in the Act that would be on an auto loan or that would be on mortgage interest loan that are already covered elsewhere. Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from Stephenson, Mr. Rigney."
Rigney: "Mr. Speaker the intent of House Bil 502 is to
merely say that those second division vehicles that
the time they are carrying a snowplow during those
winter months and so forth, the time they're actually
carrying the snowplow they would be exempt from any
safety laying tests. Its been a greathardship and a great
inconvenience to have to take those plows off the test
during those winter months and this is something that
there's been requested by a number of township road
commissioners in my area and strongly endorsed by the

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from Effingham, Mr. Brummer."
Brummer: "Yield?"

Illinois Township Officials Association."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Indicates he will."

Brummer: "Yes, I wonder, would there be anything in here that would enable the trucks not to be tested at least once a year? I mean, is there any requirement that they be tested at least once a year? I can, I suppose foresee a situation where they have snowplows on in November and still them on in May during the six month period of time or the two testing times, or would never have to be tested during the year. Is that possible?"

Rigney: "If they were, and this happens maybe in a few rare instances where they have a specialized vehicle where they do leave the plow on year around, yes they would be exempt. However, I think you also realize that under the Vehicle Code, if they were to license this



machine as a special, as special equipment, they would be accorded the same privilege. The only problem is there, of course, the license is much more expensive."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Madigan."

Madigan: "Question of the sponsor."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Indicates he yield."

Madigan: "Mr. Rigney, is it true that you introduced this

Bill because there's one township in your legislative

district which has one tow truck and in order to have

the truck inspected they have to take the plow off?"

Rigney: "That was originally the problem that was brought to my attention. Then after we once got into it we found out that there were number of other townships that had a very similar problem."

Madigan: "Are these trucks with the snowplows less dangerous than other vehicles that are inspected?"

Rigney: "Are you saying 'are they less dangerous' as far as the hazard on the road?"

Madigan: "Well, the intent of the Bill is to exempt certain vehicles from inspection and it seems to me that a natural arguement on behalf of that point would be that these vehicles are less dangerous than others and therefore, they ought to be exempt. So my question is, 'Are they in fact less dangerous than other vehicles which are subject to inspection?'"

Rigney: "Yes, I think they certainly are in that they are operating really only at the time the truck is actually plowing the snow and there are not other vehicles out that are competint with them. I think that, you know, there's really no problem with that type of a vehicle, and furthermore; keep in mind that if any time that they do take that plow off then they're immediately subject to the test."

Lechowicz: "Gentleman from Kankakee, Mr. McBroom."

McBroom: "Would the sponsor yield to a question?"

Lechowicz: "Indicates he will."



Rigney: "I'd be delighted to."

McBroom: "Does this legislation apply to Cook County as well

as the rest of the counties in the state."

Rigneyy: "Applies to all muncipalities."

McBroom: "All... I see. And how many vehicles are involved

in this, statewide?"

Rigney: "I really don't know the answer to that, Representa-

tive McBroom, but; there would be a substantial number

at the time that they are actually carrying the plow."

McBroom: "Very illusidating. Thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from Livingston, Mr Ewing."

Ewing: "Yes, I wonder if the sponsor would yield for a question."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Indicates he will."

Ewing: "Mr. sponsor, does... is there anything in the Bill

that requires them, keeps them from leaving the snowplow on all year long?'

Rigney: "In certain instances, perhaps they do have some

specialized equipment that they would leave the plow on year round. There are a few townships that do this."

Ewing: "In that case, they would never have to be tested, is

that right? Under your Bill?"

Rigney: "If they have that plow on year around, they would not have to test, that is correct."

Ewing: "Then there's no requirement that there be any snow on the ground."

Rigney: "Well, if there was no snow on the ground, the snowplow wouldn't be out working, would it?"

Ewing: "Is this a special interest Bill?"

Rigney: "Absolutely not."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Schoeberlein."

Schoeberlein: "Mr. Speaker, I move to previous question."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman has moved the previous question.

All in favor signify by saying 'aye'aye, all oppose no.

Gentleman from Champaign, Mr. Johnson."

Johnson: "Mr. Rigney, does this Bill. We have situations in



area where people, because they live on private lanes, or because they want to do it, have privately owned snowplows that clean their lanes and their driveways and so forth. Would this also be exempted from the operation of the Act?"

Rigney: "Applies to governmental vehicles only."

Johnson: "Can you tell me why, if the purpose of the Bill is to facilicate the function of cleaning snow and so forth, why that doesn't apply to privately owned snowplows as well. In fact in our area, in the township that I live in there more common than the publicly owned one and without some sort of promotion to those we'd have snow all over every road in the township, in Urbana Township."

Rigney: "Well perhaps if you want to introduce legislation of that kind, that might be alright, but my intent was to deal with those governmental units, particularly the smaller ones that you must keep in mind in most cases, don't even have a shed in which to keep this equipment. The township road commissioner as most of my downstate friends will know, some of those part time individuals who are basically just doing this as I say on a part-time basis, it's no major exemption. They still must meet all the requirements of the law as far as safety is concerned. We are really not abandoning the ship as far as safety is concerned. They'll have to live up to all the requirements for a safe vehicle that any other vehicle in the state would have to meet."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from Rock Island, Mr. Polk."

Polk: "Will the sponsor yield to a question?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Indicates he will."

Polk: "Mr. Rigney, you said now this just would affect state vehicles or governmental vehicles, is that correct?"

I happen to have legislative plates on my 1950 Chevy pick-up. If I put a blade on the front of that, can I



keep from getting it inspected in once a year?"

Rigney: "Well, I didn't specifically deal with that question.

However, if you feel it's necessary to amend it, I assure you I will oppose it."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from St. Claire, Mr. Flinn.

Mr. Flinn."

Flinn: "Mr. Speaker would the gentleman yield?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "He has."

Flinn: "Representative Rigney, did Mayor elect Burn have you put this Bill in?"

Rigney: "I didn't here the question."

Flinn: "Did Mayor elect Burn of Chicago have you put this
Bill in?"

Rigney: "I think she would probably be wholeheartedly in favor of it because I know that there's a lot of those vehicles in there that were very busy plowing snow this winter and I'm sure she'd be interested in doing a good job and not have to, you know, be interrupting the service to the community by pulling these snowplows off to test them."

Speaker Lechowicz: "I'm sure it was Mr. Garity to form a
Director of Snow Command. The gentleman from Knox,
Mr. McMaster."

McMaster: "Well, I guess one thing at a time. Somebody
mentioned Chicago and if this would protect them.

I suppose up in Chicago during the past winter if
they hadn't had the snowplows on they couldn't have
gotten to the test station anyhow. But really, I think
we're dragging this thing out too long. You will find
that most townships in the State of Illinois have only
one truck with which they plow snow. And probably the
same would be true of many of our smaller villages. I'm
sure that some of the bigger ones might have more than
one. But I think it's rather foolish to say that we
should take these plows off to go to a test station

when in all possibilities as I said, you may not even be



able to get there without the plow on. But I think that we should leave them the right to leave that plow on and not try to go through a test lane with the snowplow on because it would be impossible and certainly when they do take the snowplow off and most of them are going to take it off sooner or later, then they become liable for inspection. And I don't think anyone is trying go get away with an unsafe vehicle on the highway. I can't think of any place in the state that has a truck valuable enough to plow snow is going to let that sit for eight or nine months a year with that snowplow on and not use it. So I think it's rather foolish. Let's vote aye on this Bill and get it out of here. Get our work done."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any further discussion? The question is shall House Bill 502 pass? All in favor vote 'aye', all oppose vote 'nay'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 89 ayes, 50 nays, 9 recorded as present. This Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Gentleman from Will, Mr. Leinenweber, what purpose seek recognition?"

Leinenweber: "I just wanted to point out that was Representative Rigney's first Bill."

Speaker Lechowicz: "House Bill 675."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 675. A Bill for an Act regulating public accounting to require participation of public

accountants. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Brady."

Brady: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and fellow Members. This Bill does exactly what the synopsis says. It requires registered public accountants which are certified public accountants then licensed by the State of Illinois to participate in continuing education. We have done this in other professional categories. The CPA society is in favor of



this, and I think it will benefit the people who are served by these professionals, and I urge your favorable support."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The lady from Peoria, Mrs. Sumner."

Sumner: "Thank you. Will the Sponsor take a question?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Indicates he will."

Sumner: "I have a concern as to how much continuing education

will be required and who will mandate this. It is a mandate, correct?"

Brady: "Yes, that is correct Representative, like our other continuing educationg programs we've put through in the past few years for doctors, optomotrists, and others. This is a mandated program. This fiscal note from the Department of Registration said it could cost up to \$29,000. The total revenue that the presently get in renewals is at \$163,000 and the CPA's have been one of the most cost efficient professions to regulate. That's why the fiscal note of the Department of Registration Education so it is mandated but certainly their fees cover in renewal substantially far beyond any cost of running the continuing education program. As it's set up in the other professions, there is a Board set up and members of that group themselves decide how many hours are required to compete and continuing education each given year."

Sumner: "Do they now have a brush-up period or a program within their own organization that has them take refresher courses?"

Brady: "Yes, Representative, as a matter of fact, I think somewhere here I had some figures but there's about 73,000 hours of continuing education offered by CPA societies throughout Illinois for membership consumption. I think most good professionals try to avail themselves of continuing education where they can but the society is concerned with the vast changes in their field that those that don't should be included in the societies wish



to mandate continuing education for all."

Sumner: "Then this is taking it from their ability to govern-

ment and putting it to the RNE for a mandate, correct?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Pardon me Mam. For what purpose does

gentleman from Cook, Mr. Collins seek recognition?"

Collins: "Mr. Speaker, I was questioned in priority of call

out of, for this Bill."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mr. Collins, the priority call was established by the Clerks Office by the dates that these Bills appear on the Calendar. Unfortunately, in all fairness to Mr. Brady, 675 does not appear on the priority call, the Calendar I received from the Clerks Office. Your question is valid and I tried to get an answer from the Clerks Office before they just told me it was an error that didn't appear. I don't know which day it's scheduled but until we, until I get an answer from them, I'll take the Bill out of the record at the present time.

Take the Bill out of the record, please. OK. Let's get back to House Bill 506."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 506. A Bill for an Act to amend sections of an Act in relation to compensation and Members of the General Assembly. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mr. Deuster do you want to go on that

Bill? It's 506, sir. Mr. Vinson, what purpose seek

Speaker Lechowicz: "Welcome back. Mr Deuster. Pardon me.

Deuster: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. As

the... we have an authorization to operate a district office and we are able to pay for supplies and commodities, paper, and one thing and another, but when it comes to what can be classified as equipment, we have to rent the equipment, whereas we can purchase supplies, we have to rent equipment. The comptroller has taken the position that if you have district office and you secure in an Illinois flag or an American flag to display in your district office, that this has to be rented. House Bill 506 is very simple. It would add specifically to the equipment that we could purchase or rather to the items that we could purchase, an Illinois flag or an American flag. I think that most of us feel that when citizens or constituents come in to the district office it would be contribute to their feeling of patriotism to see an American flag or an Illinois flag there and so I have present to you House Bill 506 which would authorize that. I'm told that some Members have slipped, have purchased flags and slipped through the voucher, but in my case it came back with a long letter so I think this is common practice and it clarifies what the law ought to be

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from Will, Mr. Leinenweber."

in my opinion. So I urge your support of House Bill 506.

Leinenweber: "Yeah, question from the sponsor."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Indicates he yield."

Leinenweber: "What happens if we're uncerimoniously bounced from office. What happens to the flag, does that go with us or do we give that back?"

Deuster: "Oh, I suppose that you would follow the dictates of your conscience in that case, like anything else that you bought. Perhaps you would donate it to the Local American Legion Post for a library or do something marrotorious with the flag."

Lenienweber: "Mr. Speaker, the sponsor of this Bill is an excellent legislator, but I don't think this is his best Bill. And for the small price of a flag, I think if we



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can't afford to pay it out of our own packet or dig
into our campaign funds or whatever to buy one, I think
perhaps we can talk somebody else into giving us one.
But, I really don't think that this belongs in the
revised statutes of the State of Illinois and I respectfully urge a no."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from St. Claire, Mr. Flinn."

Flinn: "Well, Mr. Speaker. I agree with the previous Speaker.

I don't want to be one of those classed as being against the flag by any means but, I know it's not wise politically, but; I do think it's a dangerous pressman to set to get beyond the area of supplies and services as far as our home office is concerned. What next if we start dealing in other property, where do we go from here?

It creates a terrible inventory problem for state property and I don't think we ought to do this thing in spite of the fact I'm sure the sponsor is sincere in what his efforts are and the cost involved is not that

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from Coles, Mr. Stuffle."

Stuffle: "Yes, will the sponsor yield to a couple of questions."

much to be concerned about. I'm going to vote no."
