Reading. Appears Senate Bill 188. It appears on Second Reading on page 8 in your Calendar. We just moved it to Third Reading. Representative Stuffle is recognized."

Stuffle: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I would like leave to return Senate Bill 188 to Second Reading for the purposes of Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing no objection, leave is granted, be returned to the order of Second Reading."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Stuffle."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor, Mr. Clerk?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Stuffle. Amends Senate Bill 188 in the House on page 4 of a striking line, 35, inserting in lieu thereof, and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Stuffle."

Stuffle: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Members. The Amendment to Senate Bill 188 is quite simple, and I agree...believe... agreed to by both the Savings and Loan and the banking industry Illinois. It provides that state chartered Savings and Loans and state chartered banks would have the same right to provide for a variable interest rate on home mortgages and on contracts for deed, as is being provided for under federal law."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Totten, for what purpose do you arise?"

Totten: "Mr. Speaker, has the Amendment been distributed?"

Speaker Redmond: "Yes."

Totten: "We don't have copies of it."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Conti."

Conti: "This amends the Banking Act, Mr. Speaker, and Mr. Stuffle, I'm sure, would like to all...have us hear what it's all about, and we could barely hear him."

Speaker Redmond: "Please give the Gentleman order. Representative Stuffle."

Stuffle: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Members, once again, is that



better, Representative Conti? Okay. The Amendment is agreed to by the banking and Savings and Loan industry. What Amendment #1 to Senate Bill 188 does, is provide the same authority for state chartered Savings and Loan and state chartered banks, that will be provided as of July 1, '79, to allow consumers the option of a variable interest rate on a mortgage or on a contract for deed, and this Amendment would take effect with the rest of the Bill, which would take effect after July 1, '79, if it becomes a law and would be consistent with the federal law which takes effect July 1, '79. I would answer any questions and move the adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Stuffle, I was in error. This Amendment is not printed, the Clerk advises me. Representative Peters in the chamber?... How about 489. Is Representative McBroom in the chamber? Do you want to go with Senate Bills Third Reading? It's yours, yes. You're parenthesis McBroom parenthesis closed, aren't you? Appropriations of the Department of Insurance and the Department of Financial Institutions...489, Senate Bills, Third Reading, page 2. Let's have a Roll Call for Attendance. Take the record. The Clerk will take the record. Senate Bills, Third Reading appears Senate Bill 489 on page 2, Representative McBroom."

Clerk O'Brien: Senate Bill 489, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act to make an appropriation for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Department of Insurance. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McBroom."

McBroom: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, Senate Bill 489 is a supplemental appropriation for the Department of Financial Institutions. I'd appreciate a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question is 'Shall this Bill pass?'. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk



will take the record. On this question there's all 'aye', no 'nay', and the Bill having received the Constitutional Majority hereby declared passed. Senate Bills Third Reading, Short Debate Calendar, 26: Is Representative Birkinbine in the chamber? Out of the record... Representative Birkinbine, what purpose do you arise?"

Birkinbine: "Mr. Speaker, we're having an Amendment drawn, and it's not ready yet, and I'd like to have it taken out of the record."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay,... We need... the Clerk advises me that page 9, Senate Joint Resolution 33, Senator Graham sponsored a Resolution, there's no House Sponsor... I understand that's Representative Friedland. Who else is it? Stanley... Mugalian... no House Sponsor on Senate Joint Resolution 42 of Senator Nimrod's Resolution. Representative Totten, are you... Representative Pullen... Representative Conti."

Conti: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. We have with us today the second classes from the North Shore Country Day School, first district, represented by Representative Hallstrom, Birkinbine, and Katz. Up here in the gallery... looks like a small class... up here, above the Speaker's stand."

Speaker Redmond: "Former House Member, now Senator Grötberg in the chamber. ... Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "Thank-you Mr. Speaker. I'd like to excuse Representative Giddy Dyer due to illness, Representative Ed Kucharski due to a death in the family."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any objections? Hearing none, will be excused. Representative Lechowicz, are any Democrats whose absence should be excused?"

Lechowicz: "Thank-you Mr. Speaker, would the record indicate that Representative Laurino and Huff are excused because of illness."

Speaker Redmond: "any Objections? Let the record so show. Representative Ryan."



Ryan: "I'd like to add Representative Mary Lou Kent due to sickness in the family."

Speaker Redmond: "Any report on the progress of her husband's illness?"

Ryan: "Doing much better, up and about. They took him home last week, I think it was Friday he went home; and he's doing very well."

Speaker Redmond: "Thank-you. Representative Kent will be excused. Page 3, Senate Bill 90."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 90, a Bill for an Act to make an appropriation of the Illinois Department of Conservation. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Rigney, amends Senate Bill 90 on page 1, line 13, by deleting 'upon ever becoming a law' and inserting 'in lieu thereof July 1, 1979.'"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Rigney."

Rigney: "Mr. Speaker, the Clerk has told you exactly what the Amendment does. It merely changes the effective date to 1979."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment #1. Those in favor say 'aye', 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The motion carries. The Amendments adopted. Any further Amendment?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "No further Reading. Representative Murphy, would you please come to the podium? Representative Schoeberlein, please come up here. Turn the podium over to Representative Kempiners..."

Kempiners: "Thank-you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I have the honor today of introducing to you 'Miss Duretha Young', who on April the 7th, was selected as Miss Black Joliet 1979. She resides in the 39th district, which is represented by Representative Murphy,



Representative Schoeberlein, and myself, and by Senator Mitchler. We're very pleased that she would be able to stop by and greet us today. Miss Young, it's a pleasure to have you."

Miss Young: "I would just like to say that it is a pleasure for me to be here today and to find out so many different things about the Capital, and I would like everyone that has the potential and ability to use it to the best of their advantage. Thank-you."

Kempiners: "Miss Young's sister, Iris, has accompanied her to Springfield today. Nice having you with us. Thank-you."

Speaker Redmond: "She confided that she desires to run for the House of Representatives. She didn't say which ticket. Representative Wolf, Representative Sam Wolf, you ready on 142 and 145? The Amendments are printed. Representatives Christensen and Brummer, will you please sit down, Bradley. Senate Bill 142."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 142, a Bill for an Act to amend the Tri-City Regional Port District Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendment 1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendment from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, Matijevich. Amends Senate Bill 142 on page 1 line 1, by inserting after Act, the following."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this allows the Waukegan port district to be included in the provisions of the Act, and I'd appreciate your support in the adoption of the Amendment and so move."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? Question's on the Gentlemen's motion for the adoption of Amendment 2. Those in favor say 'aye', 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The motion's carried. The Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendment?"



Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading, 145, Representative Walsh is in the chamber."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 145, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act to authorize, for the period of time public, corporations to issue bonds, other evidence of indebtedness and tax testation warrants at interest rates or rates not to exceed 7% per annum. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, Matijeovich, amends Senate Bill 145 on page 1 line 18 by inserting after amended, the following."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijeovich."

Matijeovich: "Mr. Speaker, this also does the same thing and it includes the Waukegan port district as an agency that can come under the provisions of this Act, and I would appreciate your support for the Amendment and so move for the adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Question's on the Gentleman's motion. All those in favor say 'aye', 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The motion carries. Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendment?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Senate Bills Second Reading, First Legislative Day, appearing on page 7. Representative Winchester is recognized."

Winchester: "Thank-you Mr. Speaker. I would move to suspend the appropriate rule to move Senate Bill 945 from Second Reading, First Legislative Day, to Second Reading, Second Legislative Day. This is an emergency supplemental for the Department of Corrections, and the reason is to expedite the Bill to meet the department's payroll for this fiscal year."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Getty."

Getty: "Has the Gentleman spoken to the leadership on this?"



Winchester: "...No, could we hold on the motion?"

Getty: "Why don't you just take it out of the record?"

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the record..."

Getty: "Yeah..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative VonBoeckman, for what purpose do you rise?"

VonBoeckman: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I have conferred with leaders on both sides, and I'd like to have leave to hear Senate Bill 12 in the Motor Vehicles Committee Thursday."

Speaker Redmond: "You've discussed it with the leadership?"

VonBoeckman: "I discussed it. I may have their approval."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing no objections, the Attendance Roll Call will be used and grants leave to hear Senate Bill, it's 12 I believe, isn't it?"

VonBoeckman: "Senate Bill 12..."

Speaker Redmond: "Not 812, Mr. Clerk."

VonBoeckman: "Thank-you Mr. Speaker and Members of the House."

Speaker Redmond: "Senate Bill 12. ...On page 10, in the order of motions. Motion with respect to House Bill 23. Representative Kelly in the chamber? Out of the record. House Bill 101, Representative Deuster."

Deuster: "Mr. Speaker, my motion on House Bill 101 and 102, which are the same subject matter, is to take them from the table and place them in Interim Study. These two Bills were on the order of motions prior to the time we had the deadlines and the expiration of everything alive in the House. I would like to place those in Interim Study, and they came out of the Elementary and Secondary Education Committee. Both of the Bills deal with the Physical Education Mandate. I'd be happy to describe the Bills, but...if anyone wishes, but my motion is to put them in Interim Study so that they can be studied. ...While we're waiting for something to happen, House Bill 101 simply says that a local school



board may excuse a student from physical education for good cause..."

Speaker Redmond: "My friend, when you're from DuPage County, and the head bull elephant talks to you, you pay attention."

Deuster: "I'd be glad to have the House recess for as long as the Senator desires."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman who has joined me is..Senator 'Pate' Phillips. He was formerly a very distinguished Member of the 40th District House Delegation. He is the bull elephant of DuPage County, cleared customs or immigration to come into the county, you see Senator Phillips. He has judgment, except everything life and death for every one of the inhabitants of DuPage County. And he raised \$110,000 in his campaign...for the county. Okay, the question...did you ask leave to hear 101 and 102 together?"

Deuster: "Yes."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? The question is on...the Gentleman's motion to take House Bill 101 and 102 from the table and place them in Interim Study. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. It requires 107 votes. Representative Getty."

Getty: "Well, I was seeking recognition, Mr. Speaker, to ask the Gentleman if this ever had a Committee hearing. Has he ever tried to move it, and just what the urgency is that he'd want to preserve this. I didn't hear that."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Deuster."

Deuster: "I never had anyone ask the question of what the urgency is, putting something in Interim Study, but there was a hearing. Now, this is one of those Bills, Representative Getty, that I suppose philosophically may never get out of the Elementary Committee. It would propose a slight relaxation in what's called the Physical Education Mandate. I did have a hearing, I didn't get enough votes. I had moved to discharge the Committee."



but that motion came up on a bad night, and now I'm just asking to put the Bills in Interim Study. You know, sometimes that's... that's death, sometimes that's study. I believe they're very important, as a matter of fact, Representative Getty, the urgency is that 40% of our Illinois schools presently are on waiver and can't meet this Physical Education Mandate, so it does deserve serious study in my opinion."

Getty: "Well, I was just wondering, because I recall Representative Conti, on an occasion, being unable to move one of his Bills into Interim Study, and that was made before the deadline. Here we have a situation long after the deadline, and you're moving to place it there after it's already been tabled."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schneider, for what purpose do you rise?"

Schneider: "Thank-you Mr. Speaker. Representative Deuster has been very diligent on the topic. The problem however is, is that this Bill and maybe 2 or 3 others much like it have not only been defeated in the elementary and secondary education with a very thorough hearing, they've also lost in higher education. I don't know why we're going to spin our wheels on the issue at this time when we have already dealt with it in the manner that I believe most people would find very diligent and thoughtful and reflective on the topic. I don't see any reason why we ought to approve a motion to bring this proposal before the full House. I would oppose it."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Deuster."

Dueter: "Well, I really don't care if this gets 107 votes or not. It's a very important subject to me, and I think to a lot of schools around the state, ...the Bill happens to be endorsed by the Illinois Association of School Boards, the Illinois Association of School Administrators, and if it doesn't get to Interim Study,



I'll just introduce another Bill. You know, it's no problem. I couldn't care less. It's a nice way to keep the subject alive, but if people don't want to put the votes up there, I'll introduce it again. I'm going to keep working on the subject diligently, as Representative Schneider has said so kindly."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schneider."

Schneider: "Thank-you Mr. Speaker. I misunderstood the motion. I have no problems with it going to Interim. I thought it was coming out to the floor, and I would change my vote to green."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there is 113 'aye' and 8 'no', and the motion is carried. ...Motion carried, and House Bills 101 and 102 will be taken from the table and placed on Interim Study. 103, Representative Deuster."

Deuster: "House Bill 103 is another one that I wanted to put in Interim Study. This is a Bill, again, that I worked long and hard on, didn't go anywhere in Judiciary II. It very simply provides that the victims of juvenile crime shall have the right to know the identity of the juvenile offender that caused them the personal injury or property damage. An effort was made...this was considered once on the House floor. It didn't make it out of Committee. It tied in Subcommittee twice. It's a serious subject. It happens to be endorsed by the Illinois Municipal League, and I would like to put the Bill back in Interim Study of the Judiciary II Committee, and that is the nature of my motion. Back to Interim Study, or to Interim Study."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? Representative Borchers...Borchers."

Borchers: "Mr. Speaker and fellow Members of the House, truly there is some real merit to this particular request. We have...there's never a year goes by that we don't have some vandalism, and under the rules, we



can't make any attempt to find out who, what child, what person, that was a minor, did this. I think it's only fair that the people that have property should be able to try, if possible, to recover from the parents, or the child, or the individual that does the damage. A lot of damage is being done in this state all the time. Some years ago I put in a similar Bill, and it never got out of Committee, but that's not the point. This is a good Bill, this is something that should happen. This is something we should support, because it will help recover, to innocent, you might say innocent bystanders, property owners, some of the losses that they have to stand every year in this state. So I urge you to support Representative Deuster in his endeavor."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? The question's on the Gentleman's motion to take House Bill 103 from the table and place it in Interim Study. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Representative Winchester, for what purpose do you rise?"

Winchester: "Thank-you Mr. Speaker. I've had a discussion with Representative Getty, he's now withdrawn his opposition to..."

Speaker Redmond: "Wait till we get through with 103, will you? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 111 'aye' and 1 'no', and the motion carries. House Bill 103 will be taken from the table and placed in Interim Study. Representative Conti."

Conti: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, we have the Northwest School of LaSalle, the 'Gene Feaney' School group, represented by Representative Anderson, Ackerman here in the front, and Representative VonBoeckman up here in the back row. 'Gene Feaney' School group."

Speaker Redmond: "House Bill 123, Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Purpose of announcement, Mr. Speaker, also in



the gallery is the students from Lincoln School from Cicero, Illinois, represented by Representatives Pechous, Klosak, and Matula. Let's welcome them as well.

Speaker Redmond: "One twenty-three, Representative Deuster:"

Deuster: "Mr. Speaker, this is a similar request to place House Bill 123 in the Interim Study Committee or Calendar of the House Committee on transportation, so that Representatives Skinner, Barnes and other sensitive persons might know, House Bill 123 is an RTA Bill that would provide that the chairman of RTA would be appointed by the Governor. RTA is certainly a lively subject and a great concern to many Members, and I think the Bill should be studied, and that's the reason for my sincere request that it be returned to Interim Study."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Discussion? The question's on the Gentleman's motion that House Bill 123 be taken from the table and placed in Interim Study. Representative Garmisa... Representative Garmisa."

Garmisa: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this Bill did get fair and complete hearings in Transportation Committee, and it was not put in Interim Study, and I don't know why we should burden the Transportation Committee once more again with this Bill. I would object to it being placed in Interim Study."

Speaker Redmond: "Questions on the Gentleman's motion, Representative Deuster."

Deuster: "Well, my friend Representative Garmisa, may... remembering some other RTA Bill, there's so many of them that sometimes our memory gets blurred, but unfortunately I was never able to arrive at the Transportation Committee, so there never was a hearing. That's another reason why I'm asking that it be returned to Interim Study so all the thoughtful Gentlemen on that Committee could have a chance to consider the subject."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Garmisa."



Garmisa: "Mr. Speaker, I do object to this type of action where in order for a Member, if he's that interested in a Bill, he should certainly appear in Committee and have his Bill heard. If any time, as far as I'm concerned, you have a Sponsor of a Bill, and he doesn't evince that much interest in the Bill where he will appear in Committee in support of his Bill, then I don't believe we should consider, later on, taking the time of this House to hear whatever motion he may have on that Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Mr. Speaker, with all due respect to the chairman of the transportation Committee, everyone in this House knows that the Committee is stacked with Chicago Democrats who will defeat every RTA reform Bill that is brought to the Committee. Why should a Member waste his and the Committee's time by appearing?"

Speaker Redmond: "Questions on Representative Deuster's motion to take House Bill 123 from the table to place in Interim Study. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 83 'aye' and 2⁹ 'no', and the motion failed. 134, is Representative Kelly here? Out of the record. 173, Representative Mahar."

Mahar: "Yes, thank-you Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I, likewise ask leave to take House Bill 173 from the table and place in Interim Study. House Bill 173 is one of those Bills that got caught in the crunch in the final day, and I don't really think it had the opportunity to have a full discussion, and it's a subject matter which is, I think, of considerable merit to a great many of us, and I'd like to see the Bill placed in Interim Study."



Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question's on the Gentleman's motion that House Bill 173 be taken from the table and placed in Interim Study. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 113 'aye' and 11 'no', and the motion carries and House Bill 173 be taken from the table and placed in Interim Study. 586, Representative Rigney."

Rigney: "Well, Mr. Speaker, House Bill 586 is one of those Savings and Loan Bills. One that happened to get caught on Third Reading, was placed on Consideration Postponed. We never got back to it. I'd like to place it on the Spring Calendar on the same order of business."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question's on the Gentleman's motion that House Bill 586 be taken from the table and placed on the Spring Calendar, Consideration postponed. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Representative Conti."

Conti: "Mr. Speaker, I was the one that argued against this Bill, and I'd like to see 107 votes there, because I did, since then I did get a legal opinion from the Attorney General's office, and it's still rather vague in my mind, but I feel that if this goes on Interim Study,...or the Fall Calendar,...is that the Spring Calendar that you're asking for? We can give this serious consideration."

Speaker Redmond: "The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 120 'aye' and 1 'no', and the Bill... motion carried. House Bill 586 will be taken from the table and placed on the Spring Calendar, Consideration Postponed. 679, Representative Boucek."

Boucek: "Thank-you Mr. Speaker. House Bill 679 is another one of the Savings and Loans Bills that was, again, caught in that tide, and I move to suspend the appropriate rule to place the same on the Spring Calendar, and



this follows Representative Rigney's. I think

Representative Conti's remarks will probably be the same as was on the previous Bill. Thank-you."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question's on the Gentleman's motion that House Bill 679 be taken from the table and placed on Spring Calendar, Consideration Postponed. Representative Getty."

Getty: "I just wanted to be sure that the motion was Spring Calendar, is that correct?...Not Interim Calendar?"

Speaker Redmond: "...Spring Calendar, Consideration Postponed. Question's on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Representative Conti."

Conti: "I notice we don't have 107 votes on. As I said, this is a group of about 8 Bills, and I blocked 2...2 of the 8. The other 6 did pass, and this is just another governmental agency of being allowed to invest in the Savings and Loans where those officials might be considered having a conflict of interest as they became shareholders. So if you give us the 107 votes on this, after that legal opinion I got from the Attorney General, I think that it has been clarified."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 113 'aye' and 1 'no', and the motion carried. House Bill 679 is taken from the table and placed on the Spring Calendar, Consideration Postponed. Spring Calendar. 1037,...Representative Braun. I can't see back there. Is Representative Braun in the chamber? Out of the record. 1267, Representative Bowman. ...Representative Bowman."

Bowman: "Thank-you Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. 1267 is a Bill that's already in Interim Study. The motion calls for it to be reassigned from Executive to Judiciary. It deals with the judicial matter. It provides...it's a Bill that provides for filling judicial vacancies, and I believe it was inadvertently



sent to the Executive Committee because the Executive Committee has handled Amendments to the Constitution, and there have been some Constitutional Amendments that relate to the same subject matter, but this is a Bill. There is no reason why it should go to the Executive Committee because of the form of legislation. In terms of the subject matter of legislation, it seems to me it's much more appropriately studied in the Interim by the House Judiciary I Committee. So, I ask consideration of the House that it be placed on that Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Johnson."

Johnson: "I suppose really the addressing of the subject should come from the spokesman and chairman of the Executive Committee, but as a Member of the Judiciary I Committee, we don't want this legislation. It shouldn't be in Judiciary Committee. All the related Constitutional Amendments and other matters are before the Executive Committee, and in my opinion, if Representatives Bradley, and Friedland, and Madigan had the judgment to send this to the Executive Committee to begin with, that's where it ought to stay, and I urge a 'no' vote on this motion."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Capparelli."

Capparelli: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen, I would ask everyone to vote 'no' on this recommendation because we did put this...he ask for a Study Committee and that's where we placed it, and we will give it a full hearing this fall, and probably this summer, and I would ask you to vote 'no' on his motion. Thank-you."

Speaker Redmond: "The question's on the...Representative Bowman...Bowman."

Bowman: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I believe I'm entitled to close. I don't know if anyone else wants to speak on this, but I don't know where Mr. Johnson gets off representing the Minority on the Judiciary I Committee. Representative Daniels was Minority Spokesman on that Committee, and



I think he ought to be speaking for the Minority. The... this Bill deals with a merit system for filling judicial vacancies only. It does not deal with the election of judges in the first instance. We would still continue to elect judges. I just want to make it absolutely clear what everyone is voting on here. This is a appointment system for filling judiciary vacancies only, and that's all. It seems to me this is a proper subject matter of the Judiciary Committee. It is not the proper subject matter for a general Committee such as the Executive which, this may be a controversial piece of legislation maybe a highly political piece of legislation, but it should go to the proper Committee for hearing, and that's what I'm asking to be done. This will remain on Interim Study, but will be in the proper Committee..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Daniels."

Daniels: "I would be happy to talk to the Gentleman if he'd come across the aisle to the good side of the aisle, and we could discuss this matter. I don't know what position he would take on it. I would have to check with the Republican Members of the Judiciary Committee to see what their posture would be."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "Mr. Speaker, how many votes does this motion require?"

Speaker Redmond: "89."

Leinenweber: "Thank-you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Bowman...Bowman."

Bowman: "Yeah, in view of the offer of the Minority Spokesman of this Committee, could we take this out of the record for the time being, while I have a chance to talk with him?"

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the record. 1838...1838, Representative O'Brien. O'Brien...1838. Motion...out of the record. 1942, Representative White."



White: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I'd like to have leave to place House Bills 1942 and 1943 on Interim Study Calendar."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave to have these two items considered together? Hearing no objection, leave is granted. Representative White has...any further discussion? Has moved that House Bill 1942 and 1943 be taken from the table and placed in Interim Study. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 11 'aye' and 2 'no'. The motion carries, and House Bills 1942 and '43 are taken from the table and placed in Interim Study. 2063,...2063...is it about time to go to lunch?...about time to go to lunch? We're on 2063... Has this Bill and motion been printed and circulated? Okay, Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, House Bill 2063 amends the Act concerning birth control, rendering of birth control services to certain minors, and an Act concerning surgical procedures, medical and surgical procedures on minors. The Bill met with some objection during its course, and we thought that probably the best thing to do would be to place it in the Interim on the Interim Study Calendar, and I would move that it be taken from the table and placed in Interim Study."

Speaker Redmond: "Question's on the Gentleman's motion that House Bill 2063 be taken from the table and placed in Interim Study. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "After this will you take the Roll Call, Mr. Speaker, if you'd recognize me?"

Speaker: "Have all voted who wish? Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "I...I supposed I'd better explain my vote while Representative Bradley is seeking out what this does. Mr. Speaker, it is something that really ought to be



studied further, because both of the Acts that this Bill seeks to amend were Acts that preceded the Supreme Court's decision on abortion in 1973, and to my knowledge, these Acts have not been amended since. Now, that decision, of course, was very important with respect to what the...this legislation, or what this law did, and I submit to you that it is something that we really ought to...ought to be considering, and I would hope that we could get the necessary 107 votes to place this on Interim Study."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Representative Totten."

Totten: "Well thank-you Mr. Speaker. I don't know whether all the Members are listening to what Representative Walsh is trying to do, but he does have a Bill that has some merit but needs some further study, and all he's trying to do is to get it into Interim Study so it can have that review, and I think the Gentleman ought to have that opportunity. It's not very often that we get to put one of Walsh's Bills in Interim Study, and this is a great chance to kind of submerge it for a while."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Representative Bradley to explain his vote. Have all voted who wish? Representative Greiman...have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 109 'aye', 12 'no', the motion carries. House Bill 2063 will be taken from the table and put on Interim Study. 266, out of the record. Representative Matijevich...Representative Bradley, for what purpose do you rise?"

Bradley: "I guess I rise in a point of personal privilege, Mr. Speaker. Occasionally during the Spring Session, during the height of the college basketball season, we sit here...suggested that they only play basketball at Marquette and Notre Dame University, I'd like to point



out to those graduates of those institutions that mention those 2 universities all the time, that the blonde bomber that lead the Seattle Supersonics to the NBA championship is a Saint Anne High School graduate and also a graduate of Illinois Wesleyan University, and in the small schools is where they really play the best basketball."

Speaker Redmond: "Where did you play, Representative Bradley?"

Bradley: "At the same institution, but a little earlier than he did."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative John Matijevec. Representative Matijevec."

Matijevec: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I'd like to ask leave and use the Attendance Roll Call for that purpose to suspend the posting notice on House Bill 546. It's a Board of Elections Appropriation Bill which I announced at last weeks meeting that it would be postponed until this week, and when we posted, we had no way of knowing what Bills would be postponed. I've been looking for Jake Wolf to let him know we're going to do this, but I know he'll go along because we did postpone it at that meeting. So I'd ask leave that we suspend the posting notice so we can hear that this afternoon in Appropriations I Committee which will be at 2 o'clock in room 114."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? Does he have a unanimous consent to delay the posting rule? Hearing no objection on the unanimous consent, the Attendance Roll Call may be used. Representative Leon, will you come to the podium? ...And Representative Garmisa."

Garmisa: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I would ask that House Bill 2662 be put on the Interim Study Calendar."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Garmisa, will you repeat that, I didn't hear it."

Garmisa: "I'd like to have House Bill 2662 put on Interim



Study."

Speaker Redmond: "Where is it now?"

Garmisa: "It's been tabled. It hit the deadline on the 25th."

Speaker Redmond: "Requires unanimous consent without a written motion. Does he have unanimous consent? Hearing no objection, use the Attendance Roll Call to grant unanimous consent to Representative Garmisa to have House Bill 2662 put in Interim Study. Representative Leon."

Leon: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I just want to announce that the Committee on Financial Institution will meet promptly at 1:30. We do have a number of Bills, and I would appreciate prompt attendance by the Members. Thank-you."

Speaker Redmond: "Any other announcements? Any other announcements? Representative Winchester."

Winchester: "If this is the proper time, Mr. Speaker, could we go with my motion on Senate Bill 945?"

Speaker Redmond: "Will you read 945, Mr. Clerk? It's 945. It's on page 7 appearing under Senate Bills, Second Reading, First Legislative Day. As I understand, it's your motion to suspend the rule."

Winchester: "It's to suspend the rule for Second Reading, Second Legislative Day to move it to Second Reading, Second Legislative Day, and I have cleared it now with Representative Getty, and the Democratic leadership, and the Republican leadership."

Speaker Redmond: "Did you clear it with Representative Telcser..."

Winchester: "But I cleared it with Representative Peters, and they're one in the same."

Speaker Redmond: "He wasn't here earlier."

Winchester: "That's why I said it. Neither one of them..."

Speaker Redmond: "Does he have a unanimous consent? Hearing no objection, read the Bill."



Clerk Leone: "House Bill 945, a Bill for an Act...Senate
Bill 945, a Bill for an Act to provide for the or-
dinary and contingent expense of the Department of
Corrections. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment
#1 adopted in Committee."



Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendment 1?"

Clerk Leone: "No motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendment from the floor?"

Clerk Leone: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Senate Bills, Second Reading, Consent Calendar which appears on page 8. No, I don't know that, but it's...Representative Stuffle."

Stuffle: "Yes, Mr. Speaker. I would ask leave at this time to return Senate Bill 188 from the Order of Consent Calendar, Third Reading to Second Reading for the purposes of an Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing no objection, 188 will be returned to the Order of Second Reading. Senate Bill 188. Will you read the Bill, Mr. Clerk?"

Clerk Leone: "Senate Bill 188. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act in relation to the rate of interest and other charges in connection with sales on credit and lending of money. Second Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Stuffle."

Stuffle: "Yes, this is the Amendment we started to pursue earlier, which was not printed and is now. The Amendment is agreed to by the savings and loan community and the banking community. It gives to state-chartered savings and loans and state-chartered banks the same authority to allow for a variable mortgage interest rate. When a mortgage contractor contracts for deed, it will be allowed pursuant to federal law on July 1 of this year, and I would move adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment 1. Those in favor say 'aye'. 'Aye'. Opposed, 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The motion carried. Amendment 1 is adopted. Any further Amend...Representative Stuffle."

Stuffle: "Yes, I would ask leave that this remain on the



Order of Short Debate."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave to have Senate Bill 188 remain on the Order of Short Debate? Didn't you read the Amendment? Oh, read the Amendment. I thought you were done."

Clerk Leone: "Amend...Amendment #1, Stuffle, amends Senate Bill 188 in the House on page 4 by striking lines 35 and inserting in lieu thereof."

Speaker Redmond: "The question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment 1. Those in favor say 'aye'. 'Aye'. Opposed, 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. Motion carried. Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk Leone: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading and unanimous consent was granted to leave it on the Order of Short Debate, is that correct? Any further announcements? We moved 188 to Third Reading, didn't we, Mr. Clerk? Well, ...Representative Getty, are you now going to move that the House adjourn till 11 o'clock tomorrow? Representative Getty."

Getty: "Mr. Speaker, I would move that the House now adjourn till the hour of 11 a. m. Is there any time needed for the..."

Speaker Redmond: "How much time for perfunctory? Representative Capparelli before we put the motion."

Capparelli: "There'll be final practice today for anyone who can make it between...at 4 o'clock, diamond 8, Lincoln Park. The game is tomorrow at six. If you got to buy tickets, we have two girls out here in the rotunda selling tickets for the ball game tomorrow. Practice tonight, 4 o'clock, diamond 8. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? Question's on Representative Getty's motion that the House now adjourn till 11 o'clock tomorrow. Those in favor say 'aye'. 'Aye'. Opposed, 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. Motion carried. The House now stands adjourned. Eleven o'clock tomorrow."
