Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 622. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Criminal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1. Getty."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Getty, 622."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amends Senate Bill 622 on page 1, by deleting line 27 and inserting in lieu thereof, the following."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Getty."

Getty: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, in Committee Representative Preston raised a point which this Amendment would seek to cure. He pointed out that under certain circumstances a defendant may also wish to petition the court to have a weapon preserved as possible evidence in the defendant's favor. In addition to that, he might to...wish to



interpose an objection that the possession which he had was a rightful possession and therefore overcome the presumption of the mandate rather than it should be, the weapon should be destroyed. Therefore, in accordance with representations that were made we now offer Amendment #1, which would permit the court to make a finding under both of those circumstances and I would move for the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the Gentleman's motion to adopt Amendment 1. Those in favor say 'aye'; 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the motion carries and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 642."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 642. A Bill for an Act in relation of the acquisition and disposition of telecommunications, duplicating and electronic data processing equipment by state agencies. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 675."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 675. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act relating to alcoholic liquors. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 695."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 695. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Revenue Act. Second Reading of the Bill." No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"



Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 696."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 696. A Bill for an Act requiring reimbursement to units of local governments and school districts. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendment 1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motion filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No floor Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 701."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 701. A Bill for an Act in relation to safety of persons required to enter underground sewers in connection with their employment. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 719."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 719. A Bill for an Act authorizing the Board of Regents to require and operate Lewis University College of Law. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 971."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 971. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Workmen's Compensation Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendments #1 2 and 3 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motions with respect to Amendments 1, 2 and 3?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No floor Amendments."



Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1040."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1040. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Minimum Wage Law. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1331."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1..."

Speaker Redmond: "There are Amendments on 1331? Out of the record. Whose Amendments are they? Senate Bills, Third Reading, Short Debate Calendar. On priority appears H...Senate Bill 26. Out of the record. Birkinbine, out of the record. It's Third Reading. Senate Bill 8. Out of the record at the request of the Sponsor. 67. Representative Hallock. 67."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 67. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Park District Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hallock."

Hallock: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this Bill would amend the Public Buildings Commission Act by allowing any Public Building Commission which exists now to terminate itself prior to the date when the bonds are sold. What we would...what we have done here is we have a case in Winnebago County wherein a Public Building Commission has the funds to pay off the bonds but yet they have seen through the statutes they cannot dissolve themselves. This Bill would allow them permissibly to dissolve, not mandatory. I would ask your favorable support. It passed the Committee, by the way, with unanimous support in the Committee 15 to 0. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there anyone in opposition? The question



is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 118 'aye' and no 'nay' and the Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. 188. Representative Stuffle."

Clerk Leone: "Senate Bill 188. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act in relation to the rate of interest and other charges in connection with sales on credit and lending of money. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Stuffle."

Stuffle: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Members, Senate Bill 188 is essentially in the first part exactly the same Bill that passed out of this House in the form of House Bill 605. It passed Committee unanimously. Yesterday we added an Amendment, which is agreed to by the Savings and Loan and Banking industry in Illinois that would allow the savings and loans and banks that are state chartered to have the same ability to provide for a variable mortgage interest rate or contract for deed variable rate, as will the federal charters have as of July 1 of this year. I would ask for a favorable Roll Call on Senate Bill 188."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there anyone in opposition? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye'... Representative Wolf."

Wolf: "Merely a point of order, Mr. Speaker. The Digest indicated this Bill was on the Consent Calendar. Is it in error?"

Speaker Redmond: "Well, it's on page 2 of your Calendar. The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The



Clerk will take the record. On this question there's
 124 'aye' and no 'nay' and the Bill, having
 received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby
 declared passed. 277."

Clerk Leone: "Senate Bill 277. A Bill for an Act to amend
 Sections of the Unified Code of Corrections.
 Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hoxsey."

Hoxsey: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the
 House, Senate Bill 277 is a Bill proposed by the
 Department of Corrections. The effect of the Bill
 is to address a situation where the individual
 being placed in halfway houses must wait upon
 a 15 day prior written notice from the Department
 of Corrections to the State's Attorney and
 Sheriff in the county in which the halfway
 house is located. The problem has arisen where
 those individuals who were released on parole
 and are currently in the community who are not
 currently residing in the halfway house. On
 occasion these individuals have had the need
 for halfway house placement and had to wait the
 15 day notification period before they could be
 placed in the house. In many instances this
 just is not possible. So in order for the
 department not to circumvent the law as written
 we ask your favorable support on this legislation."

Speaker Redmond: "Is anyone in opposition? The question
 is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote
 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who
 wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will
 take the record. On this question there's 126
 'aye' and 1 'no'. The Bill, having received
 the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared
 passed. 345."



Clerk Leone: "Senate Bill 345. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Juvenile Court Act. Third Reading of the Bill..."

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the record at the request of the Sponsor. 353."

Clerk Leone: "Senate Bill 353. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Section of the Illinois Insurance Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Epton."

Epton: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This is a Bill which simply clears up a previous provision. As you presently know, today insurance companies pay 6 percent interest on all death pol...benefits when they become due and payable. The provision has not been inserted in all of the policies and the cost of doing so would add immeasurably to the cost and would not be necessary. So this Bill simply says that although the company will continue to pay the 6 percent interest on the date of death, it is not necessary, however, to reprint all of the policies. They simply have to notify the beneficiary at the time of the date of the death. And I would ask for you approval of this Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there anyone in opposition? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 124 'aye' and no 'nay'. The Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. 354. Representative Epton."
354. Read the Bill."

Clerk Leone: "Senate Bill 354. A Bill for an Act to add Sections to the Illinois Insurance Code. Third Reading of the Bill."



Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Epton, will you please sit down? Representative Epton, 354."

Epton: "Thank you, Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This Bill simply amends the Insurance Code and authorizes the Director of Insurance to order automobile and fire insurance companies to disclose loss data and nonrenewals by zip code. Presently they are already doing that on a voluntary basis but this gives them the legal authority to order the company to do so and I would appreciate your favorable vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Anyone in opposition? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 136 'aye' and 1 'no'. The Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. 365. Representative Friedrich."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 365. A Bill for an Act to amend the Municipal Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Friedrich. Out of the record? 415."

Clerk Leone: "Senate Bill 415. A Bill for an Act to amend conflict of interest provisions of the municipal code and corrupt practices Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Vinson."

Vinson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. Some years back the Legislature chose to alter the conflict provision...of interest provision in the Municipal Code and to permit people with certain limited conflicts to participate in local government on board councils and so forth."



One of the things that was done at that time was to say that if you had a share in a public utility that was less than 7½% then you could in fact be on the...the municipal board, serve in municipal office. Nobody thought at that point that anybody...there would be a situation where you dealt with anybody who had a share in excess of 7½% because everybody thought about the Commonwealth Edison Illinois Power situation or a situation where nobody has an excess of 7½% of the utility that size. The situation that was overlooked was that there are some 65 independent telephone companies in this state which serve, on the average, about 1,000 customers. These are very small, one village type utilities. And what we've effectively done, they...they tend to be owned by one individual or one family, what we've effectively done is to prohibit that individual from participating in local politics. And this is to correct that. What it does is... that it permits the...the individual, if the rates are regulated by the Illinois Commerce Commission, to go ahead and serve on the Village Board. I would urge a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there anyone in opposition? Representative Getty."

Getty: "Well I don't rise, specifically, in opposition, but I do have a sincere question."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed...proceed."

Getty: "How many people would actually be affected by this, Representative Vinson?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Vinson."

Vinson: "I can't give you the exact number. I do know there are 65 independent telephone companies in this state. So I suppose if you divided 65 by...by



8...or multiplied it, rather, by 8 you'd have the right number."

Getty: "All right, and..."

Vinson: "The Bill was in response to one specific instance."

Getty: "As it's drawn it would only affect those 65 utilities, is that correct?"

Vinson: "Yes, Sir."

Getty: "Are any of those utilities in the Chicago Metropolitan area?"

Vinson: "I don't believe so. I can't say definitively that they are not but I don't believe so, because they tend to be a utility that serves...a telephone utility that serves a very small town. So the one that caught my attention, that caused me to work on the Bill, was in Gridley, Illinois. That's the typical pattern."

Getty: "And it's a 1 town telephone company?"

Vinson: "Yes, Sir."

Getty: "And you're saying anyone who owns stock in that company would be effectively disenfranchised..."

Vinson: "Without this...without this legislation."

Getty: "All right."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Now you're talking to Representative Epton, Mr. Collins. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 125 'aye' and 4 'no'. The Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed." 434. Representative Ronan."



Clerk Leone: "Senate Bill 434. A Bill for an Act to amend a Section of an Act to create sanitary districts and to remove obstructions in the Des Plaines and Illinois Rivers. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman from Cook, Representative Ronan."

Ronan: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. This is a very noncontroversial Bill. The reason we've got it in is because of the obvious inflation that we've had dealing with real estate rentals, and I move for passage of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Anyone in opposition? Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Well, if this is noncontroversial, then protecting taxpayers is noncontroversial. What this Bill does is allow the Metropolitan Sanitary District, every 10 years, to increase a lease by 30 percent. Now how much inflation has occurred in the last 10 years? I know that since 1972 the rate of inflation has gone up over 50 percent. Probably 55 percent, so why should we limit it to 30 percent? It sounds to me like a way to allow the cozy little deals that the Metropolitan Sanitary District has with its lessees to be continued infinitely. For that reason, I would urge people to vote against the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Question is 'Shall this Bill pass?' Those in favor vote 'aye'. Opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. On this question... 88 'aye' and 37 'no'. Representative Jones."

Jones: "Yes, Mr. Speaker. I have a Page standing here for the last ten minutes with a fruit plate and a chocolate sundae. If anyone ordered it, we wish they would come and get it from him."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ronan."

Ronan: "We wish a poll of the absentees."

Speaker Redmond: "Poll of the absentees, Mr. Clerk. Represent-



tative Jones. Representative Jones votes 'aye'. Withdraw your request for the poll of the absentees? On this question...how many, Mr. Clerk? Yeah. This question's 89 'aye' and 37 'no', and the Bill having received the Constitutional Majority, hereby declared passed. 435."

Clerk Leone: "Senate Bill 435. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act to create sanitary districts and to remove obstructions in the Des Plaines and Illinois Rivers. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ronan."

Ronan: "This is another very noncontroversial Bill. All it does, it amends the Chicago Sanitary District Act, authorizes impositions of a lien on real estate for delinquencies in the payment of charges imposed by the Sanitary District. It's obvious what the Bill does." No further..."

Speaker Redmond: "Anyone in opposition? Question is 'Shall this Bill pass?' Those in favor vote 'aye'. Opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 108 'aye' and 15 'no'. The Bill having received the Constitutional Majority, hereby declared passed. Senate Bills, Third Reading, page 2, category, Appropriations. Senate Bill 90. Representative Rigney."



Clerk Leone: "Senate Bill 90... A Bill for an Act making an appropriation to the Illinois Department of Conservation... Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Rigney."

Rigney: "Mr. Speaker, Senate Bill 90 appropriates 200 thousand dollars from the State Boating Act Fund for the Department of Conservation to reimburse the Department for emergency repairs that were made at the site of the Oregon Dam."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there anyone in opposition? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye'... Representative Greiman."

Greiman: "Yes... I...I just want to ask some questions about this Bill. This is a...a special appropriation. Is that right? ... For the Rock River Dam?"

Rigney: "That's correct."

Greiman: "How is...we're paying how much of the repair?"

Rigney: "We are paying 200 thousand."

Greiman: "And how much were the repairs in total?"

Rigney: "I beg your pardon, I didn't catch your question?"

Greiman: "How much were the repairs?"

Rigney: "About 425 thousand."

Greiman: "And the other repairs are being taken by Commonwealth Edison, is that right?"

Rigney: "That's correct."

Greiman: "Well, now there's a Bill in someplace around this General Assembly to give Commonwealth Edison this dam for 1 dollar. Is...that...do you know...do you know this Bill?"

Rigney: "I really don't know the status of that Bill. I understand that it's kind of a holding position."

Greiman: "Well it's holding only because I asked that they get an appraisal of the dam. I don't know how you appraise dams but I guess they have a way to do



it...before we convey, in accordance with House Rules. I...I...I'm not sure... I understand the Department has spent the money and they want to be reimbursed, but maybe we should have this Bill and the other one in a holding pattern until we find out what we're going to do with the other... with the other Bill. I'd like to see Commonwealth Edison pay the 200 thousand bucks if they're going to in fact get the dam. I mean if they're... it's going to be their dam I think they ought to pay the money."

Rigney: "Well, I understand, Mr. Greiman, that there's an Amendment that's being prepared. It's going to transfer to another agency of State Government other than the Department of Conservation."

Greiman: "Well, I'm going to...I'm going to vote 'present' on this. I understand that...just because I think we ought to kind of hold back and see whether Commonwealth is going to get a dollar...pay a dollar to the state for a dam and get a windfall of 200 thousand dollars on a dam that they very much need and want, although they're kind of blase' about saying, 'Well, we don't really want the dam.' I'm going to vote 'present' but, you know, not too worried about it."

Speaker Redmond: "Further discussion? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye'... Representative Piel, pardon me."

Piel: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, could he take this out of the record momentarily, because I agree with Representative Greiman...this was...a Bill similar to this was heard in Committee. And you know, since Representative Greiman has started talking I've had some questions raised in my mind because they were originally going to sell this and I would like



these...these questions answered before I vote
on the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Rigney, what's your
pleasure?"

Rigney: "Mr. Speaker, I don't believe...really believe it
is necessary to remove it from the record. Let
me give you a few more of the details on this.
First of all, this was emergency repairs that were
made back in the months of January and February
when there was truly a hazard created by the
condition of that dam. In other words, people
downstream from this could have been affected
by the spring flooding. The Department of
Conservation owns the dam. They had no choice
other than to go ahead and make the emergency
repairs, so I don't think it's really controversial
in that sense of the nature...in that nature.
Now, keep in mind also that because of this there
were some other projects that had to be put
on the back burners that affect other legislative
districts. Such things as...work, for instance,
on the Mississippi shell harbor dredging, the
49th District, that had to be delayed. Substantial
delay was made in the Illinois Beach Marina study.
They drew 105 thousand dollars to...to be able
to complete the Oregon project, they took it
from there. There are a number of other projects
that are going to be affected by this delay.
You really are not going to be able to effect the Oregon
project, it is completed and it is paid for.
So there are many other...there are many other
Reps here in the House that are having their
projects affected by this delay."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Piel."

Piel: "Yes, my objections have been answered while he was



talking so thank you very much."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "I just want to explain why I'm going to vote 'yes' and I was going to do that in explanation of votes."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay."

Skinner: "I have lots of dams in my district that need fixing and I think the state certainly ought to help pay for them and this sets precedence that I think would help me get such Bills passed."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 101 'aye' and 6 'no'. The Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. 161. Representative Friedrich."

Clerk Leone: "Senate Bill 161. A Bill for an Act making appropriations to the Auditor General. Third Reading of the Bill."

Friedrich: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this is the annual appropriation for the Auditor General and one of the nice things about it, it's one of the few appropriation requests that's smaller than last years. It's gone through both Committees out of the House Committee unanimously and I suppose there's no...I'd appreciate your support."

Speaker Redmond: "Anyone in opposition? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 134 'aye' and 1 'no' and the Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. 340. Representative Bradley. Bradley in the chamber?"



Representative Bradley in the chamber? Take 340 out of the record. 549."

Clerk Leone: "Senate Bill 549. A Bill for an Act making an appropriation to the Metropolitan Fair and Exposition Authority. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Senate Bill 549 appropriates 4.8 million to the Metropolitan Fair and Exposition Authority. And the Senate Amendment #1 specifies that the 4.8 million dollars be used for the reconstruction and rehabilitation of the Rueben Donnelly Building. The 4.8 million dollars that is in this Bill, Senate Bill 349, is included in the Governor's FY 80 Budget and the amended Bill is virtually identical to the annual appropriation made to the authority last year and I move for the passage of House Bill 54... of Senate Bill 549 and urge your support."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is, shall... Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "I was with the Chairman of the Appropriations Committee until he said annual. This is not to be an annual appropriation. It is to be an appropriation that exists only as long as it takes to pay for the reconstruction of the Exposition Center, exclamation point, end of speech."

Speaker Redmond: "Any other exclamation points? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 95 'aye', 37 'no'. The Bill, having received the



Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed.
841."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 841. A Bill for an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense of the State Comptroller. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this is the ordinary and contingency expenses for the Fiscal Y 80 for the Office of the Comptroller. The Bill, as introduced, was 22 million, 224 thousand 839. There was a reduction in the Senate of 231 thousand 600. Further reduction in the House Committee and now the...the appropriation is in the amount of 21 million, 945 thousand, 139, which is about less than 500 thousand dollars over last years appropriation. I would move for the passage of Senate Bill 841 and urge your support."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 144 'aye' and 2 'no'. And the Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. 945. Representative Winchester."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 945. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense of various state agencies. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Winchester."

Winchester: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This is a transfer Bill for the Department of Corrections and it also has a supplemental...an emergency supplemental appropriation in it



of 328 thousand dollars. It originally was
 683 thousand. The Senate reduced it by 230.
 The House Committee reduced it by 125 thousand
 and I would ask for a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is, shall
 this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye',
 opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish?
 Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the
 record. On this question there's 141 'aye',
 2 'no'. And the Bill, having received the
 Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed.
 Senate Bills, Third Reading. On page 2, 365.
 Representative Friedrich. Third Reading, Short
 Debate. Third Reading, Short Debate. We'll get
 to you next. Representative Frederick."

Frederick: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House,
 365 is a Bill which amends a Municipal Code by
 limiting the starting age of fire and police
 department members and placing a time limit on
 their claiming military credit and by requiring
 a final physical examination. I urge..."

Speaker Redmond: "Anyone in opposition. The question is,
 shall Senate..."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 365. A Bill for an Act to
 amend Sections of the Municipal Code. Third
 Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Anyone in opposition? The question is,
 shall this Bill pass? Those in favor... Wait a
 minute... Representative Getty."

Getty: "Well, Mr. Speaker, just to ask a sincere question,
 is this a limitation on home rule units?"

Frederick: "No...no it is not."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is, shall this Bill pass?
 Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'.
 Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the



record. On this question there's 132 'aye' and 3 'no'. The Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. 74."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 74: A Bill for an Act to provide prisoners from the Department of Corrections to the Department of Transportation for purposes such as, prisoners cleaning up trash and garbage along highways of this state. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House.

Senate Bill 74 is one of the better Bills to come along during my tenure in the General Assembly. It's a...it's a sincere attempt to make government work in an economical and beneficial manner to the betterment of our environment and our constituent's. The Bill simply provides that the Department of Corrections is to provide to the Department of Transportation a sufficient number of inmates in order to clean up the mess and slop, cans, bottles, crud that we find littered on our highway. The Bill has received a thorough hearing in both the Senate Judiciary Committee and the House Judiciary Committee. It was voted out with only minimal opposition and I certainly urge the support of every Member of the House, including those who have areas in their districts which are littered with bottles and cans and so forth. It is a way to clean up our highways that will not cost the state anywhere near what it would cost if we don't use this particular manner. I wholeheartedly and sincerely urge everyone to vote 'aye' on this great Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Anyone in opposition? Representative Waddell."



Waddell: "Mr. Speaker, a question. What does the D.O.T. think about this?"

Leinenweber: "The D.O.T. is wholeheartedly for it. The Department of Corrections is wholeheartedly for it and just about everybody is."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Representative Pierce."

Pierce: "Mr. Speaker, I'm supporting this Bill but, believe me, if we had House Bill 5 passed, the bottle Bill that would provide an economic incentive by way in deposit to picking up beverage cans and bottles we wouldn't have to send these prisoners out into nice neighborhoods to threaten the women and children as they pick up the litter caused in the neighborhood, we'd have it returned for the deposit." But this is an attempt, the Gentleman is sincere and I'm going to vote for his Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Jaffe."

Jaffe: "Yeah, Mr. Speaker. I'm sorry, I wonder if the Gentleman would respond to a question. I note here that prisoners convicted of murder or a Class X felony or utter violence or aggravated kidnapping or indecent liberties with a child or forcible detention or aggravated incest or arson or incest or a prisoner is just a habitual criminal, shall not do these things, Harry. Why are you exempting those people?"

Leinenweber: "It's a good question. You'll have to ask the Senate."

Jaffe: "Well, you know, I think that really deserves an answer. In other words, you're saying that...that people..."

Leinenweber: "Well the idea was...the idea was... The Senators"



were sincere in excluding these people because they felt that...to a certain extent, that these people are dangerous to society and the Department of Corrections probably isn't good enough at evaluating people..."

Jaffe: "Well, who do you have left, Harry? You know, it sounds like a great Bill but who do you have left? I mean everybody who's committed a violent crime is not...is not going to participate in that program."

Leinenweber: "There's...there's quite a few left in there."

Jaffe: "Well, but who is left? I don't know what you're talking about. White collar criminals, is that what you're talking about?"

Leinenweber: "Arsonists, tax evaders, all kinds of near to well..."

Jaffe: "Well, tax evaders aren't state prisoners, Harry, they're in our federal prisons."

Leinenweber: "One or two Legislators, somebody told me."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question 133 'aye' and 16 'no'. The Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. 142. Representative...Representative Sam Wolf, do you desire to have this returned to the Order of Second Reading. Is that correct? Does he have leave? Hearing no objection, leave is granted. 142..."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3. Richmond. Amends Senate Bill 142 on page 1, line 3, by inserting before the period, the following. And to amend Sections 8 and 9 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Richmond."

Richmond: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen"



of the House. This Amendment does exactly the same thing that we've voted on yesterday for the Waukegan Port Authority. And I'm asking that it be extended to include the Jackson - Union Counties Regional Port District."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question is on... Representative Totten."

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, would the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Totten: "What is it we're extending to the Jackson Port District?"

Richmond: "The Bill...the Bill provides that the Port District would be able, in the event they wanted to issue bonds, that they would be able to issue them at a rate no higher than 8%, as opposed to the 6 that was originally in the Act."

Totten: "They have the authority to issue the bonds now?"

Richmond: "Yes, they have the authority."

Totten: "Okay, then this would apply to the additional Port District in your district?"

Richmond: "Yes, that's true."

Totten: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment 3. Those in favor say 'aye'; 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the motion carries, Amendment 3 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 145... Representative Sam Wolf."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 145. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections concerning public corporations interest rates. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Wolf."



Wolf: "Mr. Speaker, I would respectfully request leave of the House to bring House Bill 145 back to the Order of Second Reading for the purposes of an Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing no objection, leave is granted. Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2. Richmond. Amends Senate Bill 145 on page 1, line 18, by inserting after 'amended' the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Richmond."

Richmond: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This Amendment is virtually the same thing as the one we just passed except it applies to Senate Bill 145. It includes the Jackson - Union Counties Regional Port District under the terms of the Act and it has to do with the inner straits."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment 2. Those in favor say 'aye'; 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the motion carries and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 162. Representative Cissy Stiehl. 162. Senator Sarunas, will you please sit down?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 162. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Southwest Regional Port District Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative C.M. Stiehl."

Stiehl: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Senate Bill 162 simply provides that the Southwest Regional Port District may appoint a General Manager for a period of five years. Presently, it states at the will...that they will



serve at the will of the board and the board has asked for this because they feel that they could then hire a more effecient, better qualified manager. I would ask for your approval."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 100... Lechowicz 'aye'... 138 'aye' and no 'nay'. The Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed." 292.

Is Representative Kent on the floor? Anyone handle that for Representative Kent? Representative Polk."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 292. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Park District Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Polk."

Polk: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen, this House Bill 292 actually only affects one particular airport and it's in ... it's in Mary Lou's District in... I understand there's no opposition to it. It's in Adam's County. Right."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schneider."

Schneider: "Ask the Sponsor, Mr. Speaker, to speak up a little bit? That sounds like one of Babe McAvoy's tricks."

Speaker Redmond: "It sounds more like..."

Polk: "It certainly wasn't C.L. McCormick, you can tell that."

Speaker Redmond: "It sounds more like the late Bill Scott."

Polk: "This is...this is in relation to airports, Glen and it only affects Adams County. It doesn't really



... affect your district. It really just does the same thing and I'd really appreciate an 'aye' vote."

Schneider: "I like it."

Polk: "Do you want some crackers?"

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? Representative Piel."

Piel: "Will the Representative yield to a question, please?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Piel: "Is it true that this gives them the authority of a backdoor referendum?"

Polk: "I think that was the question that you had in relation to your Bill. It allows a backdoor referendum, yes."

Piel: "It does allow a backdoor referendum?"

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? I think in fairness to the Sponsor we better take this one out of the record. She's not here today and I think she should be given full opportunity to explain it, so we'll take this one out of the record. 394."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 394. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Industrial Building Revenue Bond Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Sam Wolf. Out of the record. 430."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 430. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act to create Sanitary Districts and remove obstructions in Des Plaines and Illinois Rivers. Third Reading of the Bill."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Getty."

Getty: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. Senate Bill 430 is a Bill which is identical to one that was passed out by the House in the form of a House Bill just a few weeks ago. This would clarify to authorize payment of purchase orders or contracts of five thousand dollars or less. This would permit a more business-like handling of the sanitary districts' procedures. It is where there has been approval of the contract by the Sanitary District, but this would be the payment that could be made pursuant to that where it is five thousand dollars or less. It passed out by a very substantial margin. Please do not pay any attention to the synopsis, which in error says five million dollars'. I would ask for a favorable roll call."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Question is 'Shall this Bill pass?' Representative Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "My recollection was that this Bill received quite a bit of adverse criticism when it went through the House, and it just squeaked through. Is that correct, Mr. Sponsor?"

Getty: "No. I...it's not my recollection at all. I don't believe it squeaked through. There was a very substantial misunderstanding that it was five million. It's not."

Leinenweber: "What is the figure now?"

Getty: "Five thousand."

Leinenweber: "And the reason behind the Bill is that the Sanitary District trustees don't meet often enough, so that they need this authority so that they don't have to have special meetings. Wasn't that the argument?"

Getty: "They meet once a month to consider appropriations



such as this. What it permits is that the Director of Finance would pay those amounts under five thousand dollars where it has been authorized in the past and it...has been audited and vouchered. Just as a business would do in the normal course of business without having to wait another...whatever period of time until..."

Leinenweber: "What...?"

Getty: "...the Department, or rather, until the Board of Commissioners would meet."

Leinenweber: "What do the Bo...what do the Commissioners earn a year?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Getty?"

Getty: "I...I...I don't know. That is not contained in the... in the Bill, and I..."

Leinenweber: "All right. Well, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. I...I do recall this Bill, and I've been po...it's been pointed out to me that it got through with 101 'aye' votes and 49 'no' votes, and it was the feeling of many Members of the House that the Sanitary District trustees, who are paid a very good wage, really ought to meet and pass on these matters of appropriation, even though five thousand dollars is considerably less than the five million indicated in the synopsis. Nevertheless, they are responsible. They are elected officials. They are responsible to the voters of the district on these matters, and there's no reason why the nonelected people ought to be appropriating and authorizing expenditures of funds, so I urge, as many Members urged when the House Bill went through, that we vote 'no' in this Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Getty."

Getty: "In closing, I'd like to clarify, apparently Representative Leinenweber didn't quite understand that, and I now have the figures. Twenty thousand, Representative Leinenweber, that they're paid, I'm advised. To avoid what I think may be a misunderstanding, the contract would al-



ready have been approved by the Sanitary District. This merely permits the ministerial payment of these sums after they have been audited and vouchered, and it would permit the Sanitary District to take advantage of prompt payment allowances, saving taxpayers money, and I think that's important. I'd ask for your favorable support."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schraeder."

Schraeder: "Well, Mr. Speaker...I...I may have missed some of the debate, and I just want to ask one question, and if Mike wants to, he can answer it in explaining his vote. The Digest says five million dollars or less. Okay. Thank you. Good Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Que...question is 'Shall this...Representative Robbins.'"

Robbins: "Mr. Speaker. The Bill says five million dollars or less if it's the one I have on my desk. Is there an Amendment to the Bill?"

Getty: "The synopsis is not the Bill."

Robbins: "I'm talking about the Bill that's in the Bill book."

Getty: "That's the synopsis, Sir. It's in error. It's five thousand."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner, will you help out there?"

Skinner: "I don't know whether I can help 'em...help out Representative Robbins. He might be beyond help. One never can tell. Excuse me, Representative Robbins. I would like to point out that we have previously passed a Bill that will raise the salary of the members of the Metropolitan Sanitary District to 25 thousand dollars unless they happen to be an officer, in which case for Vice President they will earn 27 (thousand) five (hundred), and if they are Chairman, 32 (thousand) five (hundred) it appears. Something like that. Anyway, they earn what we do, and they meet twice a month. It seems to me maybe they could meet three times a month, and we wouldn't need



this Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is 'Shall this Bill pass?' Those in favor vote 'aye'. Opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Representative Williams."

Williams: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Actually, when this Bill came up, you know, in the season's Bills, I think there was a lot of confusion about it. What this does, is these Bills have already been actually approved. Now any businessman here knows that you can get a discount if you pay by the tenth of one percent, two percent, or...or whatever that discount, you know, actually may be. When we questioned, let's see, Andy Farenga that was there, we said, 'About how much could this save the taxpayers?', and it could save the taxpayers about 43 thousand dollars a year. I don't understand the opposition to it. It's a good Bill. It's a good Bill for all the taxpayers, and I'd like to see some more green votes up there on the Board."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Conti."

Conti: "I'm sorry to interrupt right in the middle of this Bill, but the group is leaving. We had the National Honor Society from the Mulberry Grove High School from Bond County represented by Representatives Slape, Fred... Friedrich, and Watson. Just leaving."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Representative Getty to explain his vote."

Getty: "I...I'd just like to explain my vote. Apparently there's been a misunderstanding. It's not five million. I have said that on several occasions. Other provisions of the Purchasing Act limit this to five thousand dollars. The contracts have already been approved by the Department. This merely permits the payments after proper auditing and vouchering of these amounts. It amounts to a ministerial act. It is a 'de minimus' sort of thing. I



can't understand why anybody would oppose saving the taxpayers of the Metropolitan Sanitary District substantial amounts of money by permitting them to, in a very efficient, business-like way, pay small Bills that have already been approved, and now the Roll Call looks a little bit better, and that will conclude my explanation."

Speaker Redmond: "Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 100 'aye' and 3...52 'no'. Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Representative Griesheimer."

Griesheimer: "Mr. Speaker, would you kindly check to see if my speak light is working up there?"

Speaker Redmond: "Well, there's...there's a light on now."

Griesheimer: "Well, it...it was...it was on before you closed it. I just want to make sure it's working, that's all."

Speaker Redmond: "Now push the button, Representative Griesheimer. Yeah, it works fine. 481."



Clerk Leone: "Senate Bill 481..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pullen, do you seek recognition?"

Pullen: "Same request, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay, you push your button and we'll see if yours works. Yeah, it works well. Representative Pullen."

Pullen: "I just thought it was rather strange that you said it works well when I hadn't quite pressed it yet."

Speaker Redmond: "Well it shows...would you like to come up here and see..."

Pullen: "I'm glad that it works. I hope it will next time I want to speak. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, I can assure you that it will. Representative Reilly." 481. Did you read the Bill, Mr. Clerk?"

Clerk Leone: "No... Senate Bill 481. A Bill for an Act to amend the Criminal Identification and Investigation Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Reilly: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Senate Bill 481 is...simply corrects a problem that existed in the...the law. The Department of Law Enforcement came before the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules to promulgate a set of rules dealing with how an individual who has a criminal record gets to see that record and some other...other technicalities of that sort. They were required by Federal Law to make such rules but it was not clear in State Law whether they had the authority to do so or not. All we're doing with this Bill is making clear that they do have that authority. The Department of Law Enforcement supports the Bill and I would ask a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Jaffe."



Jaffe: "Would the Gentleman yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Jaffe: "Jim, it seems to me you're really blowing
 ...confiden...confidentiality wide open in this
 thing. According to this thing, at the present
 time, under your Bill...under your Bill, you're
 going to be able to give other state agencies
 information regarding the criminal record of an
 individual and it doesn't even have to be...that
 individual doesn't have to be convicted.
 All he has to do is be suspected or accused of
 a crime. Isn't that correct?"

Reilly: "No...only..."

Jaffe: "Well..."

Reilly: "Well, let me respond to the question, please.
 Only where the Legislature has already said they
 have to do it. All we're doing in that Section...
 you're...you're reading too much into it. All
 we're doing in that Section is..."

Jaffe: "Only in Section 7."

Reilly: "Is making the law consistent with each other.
 If...if we've given too much authority to another
 agency then we ought to cut that back."

Jaffe: "Well I...I would have to differ with you because
 I think the law, as it presently reads, says
 'No information of any character relating to
 its record shall be given or furnished said
 department to any person, bureau or institution...'
 You know, and now you're saying..."

Reilly: "What you're leaving out is that another statute
 directly contradicts that. You can look in another
 place in our statute books and it says they
 must give the information. That's the problem
 and that's all the problem is. That's all we're
 dealing with."



Jaffe: "Well I think maybe the other statute ought to be changed and not this one because I think you're really blowing it wide open. Let me just go on to the next paragraph. At the present time all an individual has to do in order to get his record is show that he's the person asking for the record. Isn't that correct? And now you're saying, over here, that now the person doesn't... in addition to that, the Department shall establish rules for such procedures so even if the person shows that he's that individual he can't necessarily get those records."

Reilly: "Representative Jaffe, the Federal Law, as I explained, requires that the Department, in complying with the Federal Act, issue such rules. All we're doing... is in fact, they have done so..."

Jaffe: "But..."

Reilly: "All we're doing... Aaron, you're just not listening to the answer. I made a perfectly good answer to your questions. The Federal Law says they must to that, in fact they've done that, they've issued rules. All we're doing is clarifying their right to do so. They have no choice but to do it and they'll be in violation of the Federal Law if they don't."

Jaffe: "Mr. Speaker, if I may address the Bill. You know, I think that the Gentleman's answer is really not sufficient because as I read this Bill, as far as an individual goes, at the present time the Department... all they have to do is determine whether or not that person who's making the request is in fact that person and he can get those records. But here's what the Bill adds. It says the Department shall establish rules to set



forth procedures to allow an individual to review any criminal record, information, the Department may hold concerning the individual upon verification of the identity of the individual. I think what we're really doing is we're going much beyond the present statute and saying that an individual doesn't have a right to his records merely upon showing that he is that individual. What we're saying is now that the Department shall establish rules and so on and so forth and set up all sorts of road blocks to that individual getting that information. I've heard the Gentleman's explanation. I'm not satisfied by it and at this time I'm going to have to vote 'no'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kosinski."

Kosinski: "Mr. Speaker, I'm not the House Sponsor of this Bill, Mr. Reilly is, but I'm certainly in support of the measure and I think there may be some misunderstanding. Mr. Reilly has repeatedly shaking his head in the negative to what Mr. Jaffe was saying. If I may throw this in, as Vice-Chairman of Judiciary II Committee, I think Mr. Jaffe well knows the climate in that Committee and the sensitivity of the right of privacy, the sensitivity in many areas of criminal justice. And any Bill which can pass my Committee on a unanimous 'yes' vote, after scurrilous interpretation and inspection, is okay for this General Assembly."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? Representative Reilly, to close."

Reilly: "Well, again, I just reiterate that all we're doing is what we're required to do in part by Federal Law and in part by our own State Law. We're just clarifying the Department's authority to do what it



already has done. I ask for a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is, shall this Bill pass?"

Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'.

Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take

the record. On this question there's 126 'aye',

10 'no'. And the Bill, having received the

Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed.

Representative DiPrima at the podium."

DiPrima: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen

of the House, today is a happy day in the eyes

of the veterans. First of all, it's the 25th

Anniversary...30th...30th year since the Normandy

Invasion...35 years. And I was there and I

don't even know. And I saw that picture last

night of Audi Murphy, 'To Hell and Back', what

a terrific picture. I had seen it before and we're

happy that the United States Supreme Court rendered

a decision, 7 to 2 in favor of retaining veteran's

preference and declared it as being Constitutional.

And we're honored today with the present...presence

of our State Commander of the American Legion

to say...give a few remarks, Norman Beeble,

State Commander of the American Legion."

Norman Beeble: "Thank you. It's an honor to be given

this personal privilege of addressing this astute

Body. On behalf of the 167 thousand members of

the American Legion 60 some thousand members of

the American Legion Auxiliary, I want to thank

you Members for the wonderful record that you

have on veteran's legislation. Illinois is proud

of what the Legislature has done for its veterans

and what it is doing in behalf of the Vietnam

era veterans, who we seem to have forgotten. I



want to again thank you for this privilege of personally thanking you for all you have done.

Thank you."

DiPrima: "Thank you, Commander Beeble. Now we have Frank Rice, Senior Vice Commander for the Department of Illinois, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, who'll be Commander in the ensuing year. Frank Rice."

Frank Rice: "In behalf of the Veterans of Foreign Wars we wish to thank each and every one of you that have supported us and your record is... I have to make a report come June the 24th and that report will be that we are very satisfied with the way that you people in the Legislature have been kind to us and we deeply appreciate it and it will be made part of our record. And this present term of the Legislature, we thank you very much."

DiPrima: "Thank you Command...Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "635."

Clerk Leone: "Senate Bill 635. A Bill for and Act to amend the Illinois Banking Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McBroom. McBroom. Out of the record. 653."

Clerk Leone: "Senate Bill 653. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Friedland."

Friedland: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Senate Bill 653 would provide that elementary school districts pay their proportionate share for the respective township treasurers serving these districts. It passed the Committee 19 to 0. I urge your favorable support."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is, shall this



Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question 138 'aye' and 1 'no'. The Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. 658. Representative Abramson."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 658. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act to license and regulate the keeping and letting of safe deposit boxes. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Abramson. Out of the record. 681."

Clerk Leone: "Senate Bill 681. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Savings and Loan Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Friedland."

Friedland: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Senate Bill 681 would provide that ... amend the Savings and Loan Act to permit a 5% late fee on mortgage payments. It brings it into conformity with the Banking Act and Resale Installment Sales Act and I'd urge your favorable consideration."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question is, shall this... Representative Getty."

Getty: "Would the Gentleman yield? I... Do I understand that the...that this is 60% per year, late charges? That's 5% for a month. That would amount to 60% per year."

Friedland: "5% per month, as is existing law for other types of institutions."

Getty: "Well I...I just think that..."

Friedland: "Only on late payments. If you're...you know..."

Getty: "Still at the rate of 60% per annum. I don't know of anything where we...we have a rate of 60% per annum"



authorized elsewhere in the usury statutes."

Friedland: "Yes it is, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen, this is authorized in the Banking Act, the Resale Installment Sales Act and would permit only on late payments, a 5% penalty payment."

Getty: "Well it would appear to me that maybe we ought to amend all of those Acts. I, for one, I don't think I'm going to support a 60% per annum interest rate on anything."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Representative Beatty."

Beatty: "Well, I don't think I have to explain my vote. Apparently the Members have heard. This Bill hurts poor people, people who can't get their money together to pay their mortgage. A 5% penalty a month is just too much. I think it should be defeated, as apparently it is being."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Representative Friedland."

Friedland: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. You know if you're late at the airport you miss the plane, you miss the train and if you're late with your installments you should be penalized because it provides for additional work for the institutions. This is already existing law affecting banks and other financial institutions and this only affects the mutually owned...or excuse me, the stock owned savings and loan associations. It brings it into conformity and I would urge your favorable consideration."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question...Representen-



tative Friedland: "On this question there's 49 'aye' and 75 'no'. Representative Friedland."
 Friedland: "Postponed Consideration. Could I poll the absentees, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman requests a poll of the absentees. He adds 37 to... Representative Conti."

Conti: "Mr. Speaker, is it too late to give...to speak on the Bill now?"

Speaker Redmond: "I don't know. Go ahead."

Conti: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, when you hit it with 60 percent per annum I can understand why all those red votes are up there. Now the same people that are screaming about the red lighting districts in the City of Chicago and these areas that are depressed areas, all this does is add from 24% to 60% on late payments only. So these savings and loans can keep up with their liquidity. I can't see what everybody is getting excited about this Bill for. This is only on late payments, only. It's not a 60% per annum increase. There are now paying 24% per annum if you're late every month. You have to be late every month for that 60%. I can't see what everybody is getting excited about this Bill for. They want the savings and loans to remain liquid, they have to retain I think it's 7% liquidity. They have to be concerned about whether they can make mortgages in these depressed areas and then we will not give them the right to at least absorb the costs of these late payments in some of these areas that have to go with the delinquent mortgages."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan. Representative Daniels. Daniels."



Daniels: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, first of all, I think that unfortunately, the Bill didn't have enough debate to begin with. If you look at your analysis you'll find that presently, under current law, 2% late charge is acceptable except in cases where it's predicated upon a membership vote or a membership share in which case it's then 5%. What this Bill does is, it makes it uniform. Now keep in mind one thing, that what we're dealing with is your own money. This is money that 's deposited in the S and L's and I think we ought to give the Sponsor enough votes to at minimum put it on Postponed Consideration although I do favor the Bill and think we ought to pass it. But let's put it at least on Postponed so we can go further with it."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mautino. I think we better dump this Roll Call. The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk...Representative Waddell, for what purpose do you rise?"

Waddell: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, to explain my vote, this is already in law. All you're doing is putting one more category in the same way."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Representative Collins."

Collins: "Mr. Speaker, I...I can't understand the reluctance to vote an 'aye' on this Bill. As Representative Waddell and Representative Daniels pointed out, this is already the law if the loan is predicated on a membership vote. If the law reads that it may not exceed 5%. The other...the other portion



of the law currently restricts the charge to 2% and now they're striking the language that I referred to earlier and making it a uniform 5% late charge. I can't see anything wrong, as a matter of fact, I think this is good legislation and I would urge the Membership to put enough votes up there to pass this Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Sam Wolf."

Wolf: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. To add to what Representative Conti has already said, I think you'll find that the Veteran's Administration is already charging 4% on late payments. So I don't see anything unaligned about this Bill at all."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 82 'aye' and 57 'no'. Representative Friedland."

Friedland: "Poll the absentees."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has requested a poll of the absentees."

Clerk Leone: "E.M. Barnes. Boucek. Bower. Capparelli. Davis. Dyer. Ewell."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Davis, for what purpose do you rise? Record the Gentleman as 'aye'."

Clerk Leone: "Farley. Garmisa. Hanahan. Keane. Kent. Klosak. Kornowicz. Kozubowski. Kucharski. Laurino. McAuliffe."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kornowicz, for what purpose do you rise? Record the Gentleman as 'aye'."

Clerk Leone: "McGrew. Oblinger. Preston. Schisler."

Speaker Redmond: "Preston, 'no'. Proceed."

Clerk Leone: "Stearney. Terzich and Younge."

Speaker Redmond: "What is the count? Representative Meyer."

Meyer: "Please record me as 'aye', Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Record Representative Meyer as 'aye'.

Representative Flinn as 'aye'. What's the count, Mr. Clerk? Flinn was the last one. On this question



there's 86 'aye'. Representative Hallock, 'aye'.

Representative Jaffe. Jaffe.

Jaffe: "Mr. Speaker, if this gets 89 I would request a verification."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further? On this question, what is it, Mr. Clerk? On this question there's 87 'aye', 55 'no'. Representative Johnson."

Johnson: "Change my 'present' vote to 'yes'."

is hereby declared passed. Turn the podium over
to Representative Dunn."

Dunn: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House,
I have a distinct privilege today. It is
my privilege to present to you one of our
constituents from the 51st Legislative District,
represented by Senator Jim Ropp, Representative
Tim Donovan and Representative Weber Borchers.
We really wanted to make this presentation
today because we know that none of you really
have any reason to believe, and I know you don't
believe that there are any handsome, good looking,
attractive people in our district and we want you to



meet three of them today. I'd like you to meet Miss Illinois National Teenager, Christie Simpson from Taylorville. Give her a hand, please. And she has with her today her mother and her father, Betty and Bob Simpson of Taylorville. Miss Illinois National Teenager."

Christie Simpson: "Thank you. Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I would like to say that I feel proud and privileged to represent Illinois in the Miss National Teenager Padgeant in August in Atlanta, Georgia. I would like to read to you the Miss National Teenager Creed. Being a Miss National Teenager finalist offers a contestant the opportunity to put her dreams to work. Dreams of new friendships that will make her life richer, dreams of learning and understanding that will brighten her horizons, dreams of playing a greater part in her community and dreams of making her life more valuable to herself, her family and friends. I think that Illinois is a great state and we have been represented by some great leaders. I would like to tell you that when I go to Atlanta, Georgia I will try my very best to bring home the national title. And whether I win the title or not they're going to know Illinois was there because I'm going to give it all I've got."

Dunn: "Thank you very much, Miss Illinois National Teenager."

Speaker Redmond: "733."

Clerk Leone: "Senate Bill 733. A Bill for an Act to amend the Savings and Loan Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Friedland."

Friedland: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Senate Bill 733 is an Amendment to the



Savings and Loan which provides the same liability for shareholders of stock associations that has long been provided for owners of bank stock. It's an updating Amendment and I'd urge your favorable consideration."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 121 'aye' and 1 'no'. And the Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. 340. Representative Bradley. 340."

Clerk Leone: "Senate Bill 340. A Bill for an Act to amend a Section of an Act to provide for the expenses of the Secretary of State. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, what Senate Bill 340 does is the Secretary of State and the Illinois Library System is eligible for an additional 3 million dollars of Federal Funds, that's one part of it. And there is also a supplemental appropriation of 475 thousand from the Road Fund and 10 thousand dollars from the General Revenue Fund to be used to return refunds to Illinois residents who for one reason or another overpaid on their automobile license plates. Part of it was due...the confusion, was due to the new system that we're now using in the Illinois in our license plates. Some people applied...or they didn't get a plate in October or November and they applied for another one. We'd like to refund the dollars they have coming back to them. That's just what Senate Bill 340 does."



Speaker Redmond: "The question is, shall this Bill pass?"

Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'.

Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish?

The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 146 'aye' and 4 'no'. The Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. Announcements. Representative Campbell."

Campbell: "Mr. Speaker, we have a young Page here who has soup for somebody and he doesn't know who it belongs to."

Speaker Redmond: "Senator Knuppel wants it."

Campbell: "Who wanted this side order of soup?"

Speaker Redmond: "Some of the press go down there and get the soup? Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, for the purpose of an announcement. Up in the left gallery here are the pupils of St. Pauls Lutheran School of Rockford. Represented by Representative Simms, Hallock and Giorgi. Up here in the left..."

Speaker Redmond: "Who was that last name?"

Giorgi: "Simms, Hallock and Giorgi."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay. In order... Okay, Agreed Resolutions."

Clerk Leone: "House Resolution 337, Wikoff. 338, Polk.

339, Hallstrom - McCourt. 340, Madigan - Beatty - Kucharski. 341, Jaffe - Telcser - Cullerton - Marovitz. And Senate Joint Resolution 54, Pouncey - Harris."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, House Resolution 337 by Wikoff honors Professor VonFelder. 338 by Polk, Lieutenant John Weiss of Rock Island. 339 by Hallstrom, Lynn... Mary Lynn Garrett. 340 by Madigan, Edward H. Moosecross of Notre Dame. 341 by Jaffe honors Harry S. Seigel. 342 by Kempiners honors a colleague



of ours. And House Joint Resolution Senate Joint Resolution 54 asks for a Marine Corp Day and I move for the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions. Those in favor say 'aye'; 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the motion carries, the Agreed Resolutions are adopted. Representative Griesheimer."

Griesheimer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would request the House to suspend the Posting Rule for House... Senate Bill 1117. It was assigned to the wrong Committee and posted for that Committee. We've checked with the Leadership on both sides. It's been reassigned to Environment and Natural Resources. It's a departmental Bill and we'd like to have it heard and we therefore request a suspension of the Posting Rules."

Speaker Redmond: "You have discussed it with the Leadership on both sides, is that correct?"

Griesheimer: "The Chairman, Mr. McClain has done this and I've checked it with our side."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay. Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing no objection, unanimous consent it accorded. Representative Ewing."

Ewing: "Mr...Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I'd also move for leave to suspend the Posting Rule on Senate Bill 1294. This Bill was originally assigned to Counties and Townships. It has been reassigned to Revenue. It's part of a package of Bills that will be heard today. I've checked with the Leadership."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any objection?.. What Committee is it, Mr. Ewing?"

Ewing: "Revenue."



Speaker Redmond: "Revenue Committee. Representative Pierce nods consent. He has unanimous consent, the Posting Rule is suspended. Any further announcements Representative Yourell."

Yourell: "Mr. Speaker, I would ask leave to waive the appropriate rules...Posting Rule, so that Senate Bill 1025 and 402 can be heard in Counties and Townships today. It's my understanding that the Sponsors have contacted the Majority and the Minority Leaders and there was no opposition."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any objection? Hearing no objection, leave is granted. Representative Greiman, there will be a Rules Committee meeting for 5 minutes immediately after adjournment. Rules Committee, Speaker's Office. It will take about 5 minutes, immediately after adjournment. That rule is suspended pursuant to Representative Yourell's request. Representative Farley."

Farley: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I'd ask that the Posting Rule be suspended for Senate Bill 123 so that we can hear it in our Labor and Commerce Committee tomorrow. It was posted today for Judiciary but it was reassigned so I would ask for the suspension of the appropriate rule."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Farley, I was distracted, what was your motion?"

Farley: "I would ask that the Posting Rules be suspended so that I could post Senate Bill 123 in Labor and Commerce."

Speaker Redmond: "Does he have unanimous consent? Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Would the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Schlickman: "This Bill has not been posted for hearing previously, is that correct?"



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Farley."

Farley: "This Bill was posted for Judiciary I today but it was reassigned. It's on page 11 of the Calendar. It was reassigned."

Schlickman: "Thank you very much."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kane."

Kane: "The Committee on State Government Organization that was scheduled to meet in C-1 tomorrow is moved to Room 122-A."

Speaker Redmond: "Does Representative Farley have unanimous consent? Representative Daniels."

Daniels: "Well, Mr. Speaker, this Bill has been scheduled for a hearing in Judiciary I today. The Sponsor of the Bill came over to talk to me about this and I expressed some concern for the Bill. I don't think he's cleared this with the Minority Leader on this side of the aisle, nor has he had the courtesy to explain to us that he's asked for reassignment and I don't think we should support such a motion. This is the first time we've found out that because he's having a little trouble in Judiciary he's reassigning the Bill. Has he cleared it with the Chairman of the Committee?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Farley."

Farley: "Well I don't exactly understand what Representative Daniels is referring to but the Bill has been reassigned and I'm asking for leave to post this Bill so we can hear it tomorrow."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schuneman."

Schuneman: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, the Minority Spokesman on Labor and Commerce is not on the floor at the present time. I'm wondering if Representative Farley has cleared this with the Minority Spokesman."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Farley."

Farley: "I haven't talked to the Minority Spokesman. I can



hold for a few minutes and talk to him...however."
Speaker Redmond: "I think it's a good idea. Representative Capparelli."

Capparelli: "Where's George Ryan? Our annual game is going to be tonight against the Senate. It's 20 blocks...we're going to play at Chamberlain Park, which is 20 blocks east on Capitol Driveway. We hope that you all get out there and give your team a little support and we have a...a presentation that we make every year to our Speaker. We have a shirt for him and our two Majority...Majority Leader, Mike Madigan. Is he here? And George Ryan. Can...will someone come up for George and receive his shirt? For the Speaker we have a beautiful shirt with his...Mr. Speaker on the back of it. And for George Ryan...you make the presentation here. This is for our Leader, Michael J. Madigan, who will play all positions, as he usually does. Here's the back-up man for all the positions, our Minority Leader, George Ryan. Joe Lucco came out of retirement and he's going to help us coach our team tonight. Where's Joe? Well anyway he's going to be our coach and I hope you all come out there tonight and give us some support. Thank you."

Unknown: "Make sure you place your bet with the Senators."

Capparelli: "Does anybody believe these guys could play ball together?"

Speaker Redmond: "I think they bought this for Chalkie. He's been designated as a designated hitter for tonight, Chalkie. Representative Farley."

Farley: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I have talked to the Minority Spokesman on Labor and Commerce. He has no objection so I would renew my motion to ask leave that Senate Bill 123..."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Daniels."

Daniels: "Has the Gentleman talked to the Minority Leader?"

Speaker Redmond: "Yeah. I guess he didn't. You better talk to Mr. Ryan."

Farley: "Okay."

Speaker Redmond: "What's the number of the Bill?"

Faley: "Senate Bill 123."

Speaker Redmond: "123. Senate Bill 123. It's evidently been posted in Judiciary and he wants to hear it in Labor and Commerce. Representative O'Brien, for what purpose do you rise?"

O'Brien: "Mr. Speaker, I wonder if it would be possible to have leave for the Posting Rule so that Senate Bill 244 could be heard in Revenue today. I've spoken with the Chairman of the Revenue Committee and he has no objection. There was a minunderstanding with our Secretary."

Speaker Redmond: "Did you speak to the Minority Leader?"

O'Brien: "The Minority Leader?"

Speaker Redmond: "Yeah, Representative Ryan. You better talk to Representative Ryan. What's the number Dan?"

O'Brien: "244."

Speaker Redmond: "244. Generic Drugs. Representative Farley."

Farley: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I withdraw my motion."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Farley's motion is withdrawn. Yeah, I did. Representative Ewing, for what purpose do you rise? Representative O'Brien and Representative, did you make a compact? Representative O'Brien has requested that Senate Bill 244..."

O'Brien: "Yes, that's correct, Senate Bill 244 be heard in Revenue Committee."



Speaker Redmond: "Does he have unanimous consent? Hearing no objection, unanimous consent... Representative... Attendance Roll Call, yeah. Representative Getty. Adjournment."

Getty: "Mr. Speaker, I move that we now stand adjourned till the hour of 10:00 A.M. with 5 minutes Perfunctory for the Clerk to read into the record. 12:00... 5 minutes."

Speaker Redmond: "10:00 O'Clock. Representative Totten."

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Our schedule for tomorrow shows us coming in from 5:00 to 8:30, has that been changed?"

Speaker Redmond: "That's right...yeah."

Totten: "So it's adjourned till 5:00."

Speaker Redmond: "5... Any... Representative VanDuyne."

VanDuyne: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Appropriations II has been posted to meet tomorrow morning at 8:00 for all the Members of Appropriations II. That's been changed till tomorrow at Noon 12:00 tomorrow for Appropriations II."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on... Representative Vinson."

Vinson: "Would you explain when we're coming back here?"

Speaker Redmond: "5:00 tomorrow. The question is on Representative Getty's motion to adjourn the House till 5:00 tomorrow. Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to have Representatives Dyer, Kucharski and Kent excused today."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any objections? Hearing none, the record will so show. The question is on Representative Getty's motion. Those in favor say 'aye'... Representative Chapman."

Chapman: "Yes, Sir, I wanted to announce that...well, the Human Resources Committee is scheduled for 8:00 A.M. tomorrow. We will be meeting at 9:00 A.M."



tomorrow as well, of course, at 2:00 P.M. today."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay. The question is on the motion to, after 10 minutes Perfunctory, to adjourn till tomorrow at 5:00. Those in favor say 'aye'; 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the motion carries, the House now stands adjourned till 5:00 tomorrow. Rules Committee, Speaker's Office, 5 minutes."

Clerk Leone: "House Joint Resolution Constitutional Amendment 42. Johnson -Breslin. Resolved by the House of Representatives of the 81st General Assembly of the State of Illinois, the Senate concurring herein, that there shall be submitted to the Electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least 6 months after the adoption of this Resolution, a proposition to amend Section 12 of Article VI of the Constitution to read as follows: The Judiciary. Section 12. Election and Retention. Supreme, Appellate and Circuit Judges shall be nominated at primary elections or by petition. Judges shall be elected at the general or judicial elections as the General Assembly shall provide by law. A person eligible for the office of Judge may cause his name to appear on the ballot as a candidate for Judge at the primary or at the general or judicial election by submitting petitions. The General Assembly shall prescribe by law the requirements for petitions. The office of Judge shall be vacant upon his death, resignation, retirement, removal or upon the conclusion of his term without retention in office. Whenever an additional Appellate or Circuit Judge is authorized by law the office shall be filled in a



manner provided for filing of vacancies in that office. A vacancy occurring in the Office of Supreme, Appellate or Circuit Judge shall be filed...filled as the General Assembly may provide by law. In the absence of law vacancies may be filled by appointment of the Supreme Court. A person appointed to fill a vacancy 60 or more days prior to the next primary election to nominate Judges shall serve until the vacancy is filled for the term at the next general or judicial election. A person appointed to fill a vacancy less than 60 days prior to the next primary election to nominate judges shall serve until the vacancy is filled at the second general or judicial election following such appointments. Not less than 6 months before the general election preceeding the expiration of his term of office, the Supreme, Appellate or Circuit Judge who has been elected to that office may file in the Office of the Secretary of State a declaration of candidacy to succeed himself. The Secretary of State, not less than 63 days before the election, shall certify the Judges candidacy to the proper election officials. The names of the Judges seeking that retention shall be submitted to the electors separately and without party designation on the sole question whether each Judge shall be retained in office for another term. The retention election shall be conducted at general elections in the appropriate judicial districts for Supreme and Appellate Judges and in the county of residence for the Circuit Judge. The affirmative vote of three-fifths of the electors voting on the question shall elect the Judge to the office for the term commencing on the first Monday in December



following his election. A law reducing the number of Appellate or Circuit Judges shall be without prejudice to the right of Judges affected to seek retention in office. The reduction shall become effective when a vacancy occurs in the affected unit. Schedule. This Amendment to Section 12 of Article VI takes effect upon its approval by the electors of this state. First Reading of this Constitutional Amendment. A Message from the Senate by Mr. Wright, Secretary.
