Hoffman: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen, Amendment...Amendment #3 to Senate Bill 793 relates to the dismissal notices that are given to teachers and there's a percentage formula that's built into the Bill...5...not to exceed 5 or 150% of the average number of teachers receiving...receiving dismissals the preceding three years. What this Amendment does is provide...relates the percentages to the numbers of notices sent rather than to the number of teachers dismissed. Many schools, of course, who have to make these notices 60 days prior to the end of the school year, they have to tell people where they are 60 days prior to the end of the school year if they're going to be dismissed. They do not know what their state aid is going to be. There's another... a lot of other unknown factors, and if we're going to put a percentage figure in, it seemed to me that it made more sense and fairer to those who have to manage the school as well as to the teachers who are involved that the percentage be established on the basis of the number of notices sent the preceding three years rather than the



number of...of actual dismissals, and I move for the adoption of Amendment #3."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schnieder."

Schneider: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Members, I'm in opposition to the Amendment. Mostly because, or at least in part, because this legislation has gone through many revisions over the last two or three or four years. I think it's a good idea, and I...we're very close to hopefully putting the Bill on the Governor's desk. I would always work close with the Sponsor next term to try to deal with any problems. I think he has some good ideas, but basically what I find is that we're very close to resolving a...a complex issue that...between teachers, and boards and districts, and I would ask that we defeat the Amendment so that we can place this Bill on the Governor's desk unamended and does not go back to the Senate. So, I ask for a 'no' vote on this proposition."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hoffman to close."

Hoffman: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I find the opposition of the Sponsor, to say the least, to be an interesting approach to...to this problem. It seems to me that what's important is that when we put the legislation on the Governor's desk, that it is put in the position where it's fair to everyone. Fair to the school boards, fair to those people who have to manage the schools, as well as fair to the teachers to whom this is addressed, and, therefore, I would ask for your support of Amendment #3."

Speaker Redmond: "The question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment 3. Those in favor vote 'aye'. Opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Amendment right quick here. It is involved with the
reciprocity, and it reads: 'However if the applicant has
been actively engaged in the practice of plumbing for a



period of five years or more in another state or municipality which does not require registration or licensing of plumbers, the applicant is also entitled to be licensed without examination. The Board may require that such applicant provide satisfactory proof of his or her practice of plumbing."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Piel."

Piel: "Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Piel: "Does the...does this Amendment have anything to do with plumbers hunting coyotes?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Macdonald."

Macdonald: "Thank you...thankyou, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I've talked to the Senate Sponsor of this Bill, and I have no objections to the Amendment, so I would recommend that we accept this Amendment to Senate Bill 1196."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment 1 to Senate Bill...Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Mr. Speaker, I've been trying to listen to the Amendment. Is there a fee increase on this Amendment?"

Watson: "I'm sorry. What was that?"

Lechowicz: "A fee increase."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there a fee increase?"

Watson: "There's no fee increase."

Lechowicz: "Could he just brief...briefly explain the Amendment again? I'm sorry."

Watson: "The Amendment will allow an individual to come from another state outside of Illinois and have worked five years in that state and become eligible for a license for plumbing in Illinois." Presently there are several states who do not require licensing. Illinois requires that you must come from a state which has either the state licensing or a municipal licensing. In other words, there's many



people to Illinois unable to get their plumbing's license and maybe have worked 20...25 years in another state, but has never been licensed. This would allow them to have a plumbing license in Illinois working in a state...in a former state which does not require licensing. It's a reciprocity problem that we've had."

Lechowicz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? Representative Slape."

Slape: "Would the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Slape: "Does the Amendment provide for examination before they receive their license?"

Watson: "No. No."

Slape: "Okay. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McPike."

McPike: "...Sponsor yield?"

Watson: "Yes."

McPike: "I'm reading here that...that this not only covers another state but another municipality. Are you talking about a municipality within Illinois?"

Watson: "No, outside of Illinois."

McPike: "You're not talking about a home-rule municipality?"

Watson: "No. Only coming from a state which does not presently require their plumbers to be licensed."

McPike: "Coming from another state that does not require?"

Watson: "Right. There are a few states who do not require licensed plumbers. In many of the states the counties will license them. In many states the municip...municipalities will license them, but oftentimes no one licenses them, so, therefore, they do not get the opportunity to work as a plumber in the State of Illinois just because of that particular restriction. They can work five years as an apprentice in Illinois and then take...take the examination. But, they could have worked for years in another state and then come to Illinois and still have to go under the



requirements that we presently have."

McPike: "But if...if they came from a...a state like Georgia and then practiced as a plumber there for five years and no apprenticeship program or no...no real requirements like ours, then automatically we would reciprocate. Is that what this means?"

Watson: "If that states does not require licensing. Yes, that's possible. But, there's New York. Well, from what I'm aware of, New York, Oklahoma, and Iowa are the only three states that are involved here. Now, I'm not positive about that. I've got the Department of Health...Public Health checking on that for me, but they do not require licensing of plumbers."

McPike: "Okay, thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? The question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment 1. Those in favor indicate by saying 'aye'. 'Aye'. Opposed... Those in favor vote 'aye'. Opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 46 'aye' and 68 'no'. The motion fails. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1229. Pullen. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Professional Service Corporation Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1274."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1274. Kent. A Bill for an Act to amend the Fish Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1320."



Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1320. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Court Clerk Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1335. Secretary of War, Representative Griesheimer."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill...Senate Bill 1335. Griesheimer. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Court of Claims Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Griesheimer, amends Senate Bill 1335 on page 1 by deleting line 1 through 3 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Griesheimer."

Griesheimer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Amendment #1 on this Bill merely adds to it provisions to provide for a realignment of the circuits in Lake County, McHenry County, Winnebago County, and Boone County. Somewhere the Bill is up in the House. I'd move its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Yeah, could you give us a clue where McHenry County ...what McHenry County will be joined with?"

Griesheimer: "Boone."

Skinner: "That's all?"

Griesheimer: "That's it."

Skinner: "That's a superb Amendment, and I think we ought to adopt it."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? The question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment 1. Those in favor indicate by saying 'aye'. 'Aye'. Opposed, 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The motion carried. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1341."



Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1341. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1350."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1350. Currie. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Industrial Pollution Control Financing Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "Who's the Sponsor of the Floor Amendment?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Representative Pierce."

Speaker Redmond: "This would...Amendment has not yet been printed and distributed, Representative Currie. Out of the record. 1357."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1357. Kelly."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan. Madigan."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1357. A Bill for an Act in relation to certain taxes on motor fuel use in connection with transporting students to and from school. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendment 1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, Skinner, amends Senate Bill 1357 as amended in Section 1 by deleting all of Section 4.03 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan, for what purpose do you rise?"

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, I question the germaneness of this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Yes, I would appreciate the courtesy of allowing me



to point out..."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay, proceed."

Skinner: "...that the first line of the Bill states that it amends the Regional Transportation Authority Act. I am also attempting to amend the Regional Transportation Authority Act, and I think that it's a fairly good argument for germaneness. The Speaker has always ruled before that if one is amending the same chapter, that the Amendment is germane, and I would hope that you would continue to rule as consistently as you have in the past regardless of the policy implications."

Speaker Redmond: "The parliamentarian advises me that the title of the Bill is very restrictive. It's an anti-in...an Act in relation to certain taxes on motor fuel used in connection with transporting students to and from school."

Skinner: "But, Mr. Speaker, when you read..."

Speaker Redmond: "And the...amendment...the Amendment goes far beyond the title of the Bill, and so he advises me that it is not germane. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #3, Skinner, amends Senate Bill 1357 on page 1, line 2 by inserting before the period the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, I question the germaneness Represent..."

Speaker Redmond: "Yeah, Represent...Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Yes, since I'm the Sponsor of the Amendment..."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay."

Skinner: "...couldn't you let me speak first and then let him interrupt me?"

Speaker Redmond: "I recog...I recognize...I recognize you."

Skinner: "Thank you. Amendment #1 exempts automobiles from the Regional Transportation Authority Tax. This is entirely consistent with the intent of the Bill which exempts school buses from the Regional Transportation Authority Tax. It just makes it a little broader."



Speaker Redmond: "That's the trouble with it."

Skinner: "Well, Mr. Speaker, you know that on Wednesday that you're going to put...you're going to abolish the Regional Transportation Authority Tax in Committee. Why not let Representative Kelly, who doesn't seem to be on the floor, does he? Is he? Why are we considering these Amendments if the Sponsor's not on the floor? He might accept them."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan. Do you want to address yourself to Amendment 2, Representative Skinner?"

Madigan: "I...I wish to question the...the Chair, Mr. Speaker, as to the order of business. Are we now on Amendment #3?"

Speaker Redmond: "Amendment #2, I believe. We didn't..."

Madigan: "You...you ruled..."

Speaker Redmond: "I ruled that the last...what was the last one? Two. That's right. There was a Committee Amendment. We ruled that 2 was not germane. We're on 3."

Madigan: "We're on 3, and I question the germaneness of that Amendment, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "The parliamentarian advises me there's the same defect that goes beyond. Representative Conti."

Conti: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this has to do with the RTA. It has to do with the sales tax. And the sales tax...the people in the RTA area are definitely being affected by the sales tax, and I can't understand a ruling of the Chair that this is not germane."

Speaker Redmond: "The problem is..."

Conti: "I'm...I'm...I'm a little surprised..."

Speaker Redmond: "The problem is..."

Conti: "...I'm a little surprised and shocked at some of these rulings that the parliamentarian has been giving you the last couple of days."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Conti, the problem is that it...the title of the Act is an Act in relation to certain taxes on motor fuel use in connection with transporting



students to and from schools. That's the...the Spons... the Sponsor of the Bill in the Senate, Senator Davidson, elected to have this the title, and that's the title of the Bill that we have here. These Amendments go far beyond the title, as Representative Skinner indicated."

Conti: "Who's the House Sponsor, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kelly."

Conti: "Where's Rep...where's Representative Kelly?"

Speaker Redmond: "Well, he's not here, but Representative Madigan is handling it in his place instead."

Conti: "Well, I...I...I just take...I just take offense to the fact that the Majority Leader complimented our staff on here on handling some of our speeches last Friday, and I didn't think that was too bad. That's what we have staff members for, but now when he starts handling Bills of other Sponsors on the floor, we've got a one-man organization on the other side of the aisle."

Speaker Redmond: "And you have Representative Telcser. Representative Totten."

Totten: "Mr. Speaker, on the question of germaneness, I appeal for the parliamentarian. The Bill deals with the transportation of vehic...of students to school. Passenger cars transport students to school, and there is no reason to indicate this germane. I know that my wife transports kids to school and many wives. In fact, many Members here probably do, and they are probably moreso a vehicle for transporting kids to school than maybe the Bill addresses it to, and I think it ought to be ruled germane."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further Amendments? Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "I appeal the ruling of the Chair."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has appealed the ruling of the Chair. Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "Mr. Speaker, since there's so much controversy on this Bill and the Sponsor's not here, wouldn't it be a lot



easier just to take it out of the record and move on?"

Speaker Redmond: "Well, Representative Madigan has agreed to handle the Bill. I don't have any feeling one way or the other way."

Ryan: "Is Representative Madigan a Cosponsor of the Bill even or does he have his name on the Bill anyplace?"

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, as a courtesy to Representative Kelly, he...he told me that if this Bill were called on Second Reading while he were not present, that...that I would be permitted to handle the Bill in his place in order to facilitate the consideration by the House of all these Bills."

Ryan: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I think that it would only be fair that since Representative Kelly's not here that his Bill come out of the record, and you proceed with the Members that are here that are waiting to have their Bills called. It certainly would seem to be the fair way to do it."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, we've only got three more on here, so..."

Ryan: "Well, it...it could hold, Mr. Speaker, and I...I really think that's what you ought to do...is to take it out of the record till the Sponsor's here."

Speaker Redmond: "I don't...Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Speak...Mr. Speaker, we've been calling Republican Bills all morning, and the Members haven't been here, and we've moved them to Third. My gosh, it's only fair...it's...sportsmanlike to allow this to occur."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "Well, we certainly appreciate the courtesy, Representative Giorgi. However, those were all noncontroversial Bills, and this certainly has got the interest of most people here, and I think in all fairness it ought to be taken out of the record."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further Amendments? We're going to proceed. We're going to proceed with 1357. Now, are there any further Amendments?"



Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #4, Skinner, amends Senate Bill 1357 on page 1, line 1 by inserting after, 'fuel', the following."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, wait a minute. Wait a minute. Representative Skinner did file a motion or did move to... Representative Skinner did move to overrule the ruling of the Chair, and I should put that motion. Yes, Sir. Represent..."

Skinner: "It's obvious, Mr. Speaker, that you can win this vote. Perhaps, I should ask for a quorum call first, since there's so few people here. Now, there may not even be 89 people here. I see no reason why you shouldn't take the vote. This is an issue you cannot avoid for the rest of your life. You have voted for a bad tax, the RTA gasoline tax in 1975, and it is going to be abolished, and you and I both know it's going to be abolished. I'm merely trying to give a suburban Democrat the ability to be the Sponsor of that abolition of the Bill. This, if you will...if you will pull your Bill out, Senate Bill 1357, you will see on line 5, Section 1, Section 4.03, the Regional Transportation Authority Act. Now, this is obviously amending the Regional Transportation Authority Act, also. As Representative Totten has pointed out, cars do take students to schools. It's entirely consistent with the Bill. In fact, if Representative Kelly were here, he'd probably would even accept the Amendment. Oh, Representative Kelly is here. Representative Kelly, perhaps you could accept the Amendment, and then we wouldn't have to ruled over...rule the Chair, because he wouldn't allow us to accept it. Mr. Speaker, would you allow Representative Kelly to comment on the...on the Amendment? He's probably for it."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Getty, for what purpose do you rise?"

Getty: "Mr. Speaker, I...I'd just like to raise a point of



order. I think that if a question has been raised as to the germaneness of an Amendment, it is in totally... irrelevant as to whether or not the Sponsor accepts it or doesn't accept it."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, the ruling has been made. It is not germane. Representative Skinner has moved to overrule the ruling of the Chair, and he asked permission to address the...that question on whether or not the Chair should be overruled. I will have to admit that, like his Amendment, he's gone a little bit beyond the title and the subject matter of the motion, but we give Representative Skinner certain latitude. Now, will you please confine your remarks to the motion to overrule the ruling of the Chair? Represent.?"

Skinner: "I would ask that all people who believe that the Speaker's attempt to stonewall this issue on Bill after Bill after Bill vote to overrule him. If one wishes to get rid of the RTA gas tax, there are precious few vehicles that make the floor. This is one. It made the floor, because it didn't go through the House Transportation Committee. It made the floor because it went through the House Revenue Committee. It clearly amends the Regional Transportation Authority Act, and there is no amount of obfuscation on the part of the parliamentarian whispering into the Speaker's ear that will eliminate that fact. I'll be happy to take a Roll Call. It will, of course, be...are...are...are you going to take an Attendance Roll Call before you take a Roll Call of record, so we can know how many ghost voters there will be?"

Speaker Redmond: "Okay. Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, in light of the remarks of the previous speaker, I think it only fair to enter into the record for all of the Members a statement made to me by Senator Davidson of the Senate, who told me that at no point in time did he ever intend that this Bill be used as an



Amendment to the Regional Transportation Act. That his only desire is to provide some relief for the bus carriers who carry children to and from school, and that, in his view, if this Bill became a vehicle for an Amendment to the Regional Transportation Authority Act, that he would not move the Bill in the Senate."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kelly on the motion to overrule the ruling of the Chair."

Kelly: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I have total sympathy with Representative Skinner on both of these Amendments. I do feel that they are germane. I think that's the ruling that the Chair should have made. I am one that's been very strongly opposed to the RTA gasoline tax, and this is...this...both of these Amendments would have been ideal for eliminating that. I...I'm...I'm sorry, Cal, but I...I'm not going to vote to overrule Mr. Redmond."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion to overrule the Chair. The question is, 'Shall the Chair be overruled?' Those in favor vote 'aye'. Opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 65 'aye' and 72 'no'. The motion failed. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #4, Skinner, amends Senate Bill 1357 on page 1, line 1 by inserting after, 'fuel', the following."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Mr. Speaker, it seems to me that we ought to try to stretch fuel as far as we can. One way to stretch fuel is to allow people and businesses to make alcohol and add it to gasoline for their own use. For some reason, the House Transportation Committee has refused to consider this issue. I believe this is an appropriate vehicle to attempt to allow people to operate stills on their farms, to make bathtub gin as they did during the thirties, to



be creative in their fight against the gasoline price increases being forced upon us by the Arabs. This is the most...this is the only way I can think of that the ordinary individual can possibly cut the price...cut the increase in rise in prices of gasoline. There has not been a fair hearing on the subject on the House floor. I think there should be. If our...if our society, during the twenties, could produce gin that was drinkable in the bathtub and could produce alcohol in stills throughout the country, including on the farm neighboring my grandparents farm in Maryland, I see no reason they can't do it today. If anything, the equipment could be mass produced and distributed if it were given the approval of government, and I'm suggesting that the Illinois General Assembly should move in that direction. This Amendment asks that the Motor Fuel Tax be not subject...not applied to alcohol manufactured and used by an individual for his or her own use as a motor fuel. There are, of course, federal regulations which would have to be met. They are too complicated at the present time in my opinion, but if a state as large as Illinois passes a Bill like this to give that incentive to individuals, I think the federal government can be in...would be strongly encouraged to revise the Treasury Department's standards. As some of you may know, one may make drinkable alcoble...drinkal...drink...sounds like I've had too much Tab. I'm sorry. What...may make drinkable alcohol undrinkable merely by adding one drop of gasoline to it, and I would ask your approval of this Amendment. If you really are willing to allow people to fight rising gas prices, of course, you're...if you're in favor of rising gas prices, you ought to stand up and ask that the Amendment be considered nongermane."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan. Representative Getty."

Getty: "Mr. Speaker, I question the germaneness of the Amend-



ment, and I...I do not favor rising gas prices. I think that the question is one of the propriety of the Amendment and nothing else."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Vinson."

Vinson: "Mr. Speaker, I would urge that Representative Getty reconsider his ill-conceived action in this respect in questioning the germaneness of the Amendment. This is a ...an Amendment that will cut the price of gasoline and raise the price of corn, and he ought to be for that."

Speaker Redmond: "The parliamentarian advises me that this is a better Amendment, but less germane than the others. So, we'll have to rule that it is less germane. Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Well, we've got a Roll Call now on who wants to get rid of the RTA gas tax and who doesn't. Let's have a Roll Call on who wants to allow individuals to fight OPEC by making their own alcohol and using it in their own car. I move to overrule the Chair."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Borchers."

Borchers: "Mr. Speaker and fellow Members of the House, 35 years ago when we landed in France and we went up...off the beaches and back into France, I saw everywhere that the French populus was running their automobiles by their own alcohol. Now I know this is perfectly feasible. The Germans kept all the gas for their tanks. The French had no...no gas, so they make their own alcohol. The fact is I suspect you could take calvados and have a flight from here to Paris on...on the...the alcohol from the calvados which is made out of crab apples. It's a hot...it's the worst stuff that I have ever drank in my life. It takes you right off the ground...raise your hair, but this is feasible, and I think we should take every opportunity to do something to solve the gas problem, and I know if the French can do it, we can, too. Let alone bathtub gin and all that sort of thing, but the entire automobile...."



practically the entire automobile...automobiles.and...and buses of France were run by alcohol 35 years ago, and we sure equal to them."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative John Dunn."

Dunn: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This entire question will be considered during the recess this summer with the gathering of input from all interested parties in hearings before the House Transportation Subcommittee on gasohol. This is not the time and place to rush into enactment or consideration of enactment of gasohol type legislation, and we have a ruling that the Amendment is not germane, and if the Gentleman wishes to persist in his motion to overrule the Chair, we should proceed to that and get on with other business of the House."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Getty."

Getty: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, I object to the mischaracterization of any Roll Call on this issue. It would not be in the question of whether we favor a reduction in the gas tax. It would not be a question on gasohol. It's a question on appealing the ruling of the Chair, and that's all."

Speaker Redmond: "That's right. Representative Johnson."

Johnson: "That's irrelevant now. Mr. Getty has spoken twice, but when he speaks the third time, you can let him finish and then call on me on a point of order. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner to close or Representative Brummer. Representative Skinner to close."

Skinner: "Mr. Speaker, the price of gasoline has gone up 25% since we've been in Session, and Representative Getty stands over there and says this isn't a vote on whether we're going to allow people to hold down the increase in the price of gasoline. This is the only vehicle on the House floor. Either we're going to vote for it, or we're not going to vote for it, and if you don't vote for it,



don't go home and say that you're not in favor of allowing the Arabs to rape your...your...your pocketbook by increasing gas prices."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brummer."

Skinner: "If you're in favor of raising gas prices, ..."

Brummer: "Yes, point of order, Mr. Speaker. I'm in favor of gasohol and doing all I can to help the development of it. I think we're here on a motion to overrule the Chair. I never did understand the ruling of the Chair or the rationale for the Chair's ruling that the motion or that the Amendment was not germane nor have I heard any arguments by the person who's moving to overrule the Chair concerning the germaneness. I would like to have some reason to vote on the germaneness or lack of germaneness of this and hear arguments either for or against it and not on the issue of gasohol."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is, 'Shall the ruling of the Chair be overruled?' Those in favor vote 'aye' and opposed vote 'no'. Representative Skinner for the fifth time."

Skinner: "I am surprised at the Gentleman from Effingham. I am certain that his district had more stills per...per section of agriculture land than any other district in the entire state. I'm sure that his..."

Speaker Redmond: "It was Western Lake in McHenry County."

Skinner: "I'm...I am certain that his district..."

Speaker Redmond: "Out in the lake area."

Skinner: "I am certain that his district will benefit more from this Bill than any other district in the entire state. You have experienced moonshiners in your district, and there is every reason in the world to believe that they can continue to make moonshine when it is in favor of the social policy..."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish?"

Skinner: "...as they did when it was against it."



Speaker Redmond: "The Clerk will take the record. I've heard enough of Mr. Skinner. The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 67 'aye' and 65 'no', and the motion fails. Representative Skinner requests a poll of the absentees. Poll the absentees, Mr. Clerk. If you ask me if we're liable to work Sunday, the answer looks more and more like yes. Representative Dyer, how come we have the flowers for you? Welcome back? Have you been away?"

Clerk O'Brien: "The absentees. Alexander. E. M. Barnes. Jane Barnes. Beatty. Bradley. Campbell. Capuzi. Davis. Deuster. Donovan. Ebbesen. Epton. Ewell. Farley. Gaines. Hanahan. Henry. Hoxsey. Hudson. Huff. Emil Jones. Keane. Kelly. Kozubowski. Kelly, 'no'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kelly, 'no'." Representative ...who's that back there? Taylor? For what purpose do you rise? Representative Alexander. No. Representative Henry."

Henry: "Mr. Speaker, pass me 'no'."

Speaker Redmond: "No. Representative Huff, 'no'. Proceed. Representative E. M. Barnes, 'no'. Proceed."

Clerk O'Brien: "Kozubowski. Kucharski. McAuliffe. McGrew. Meyer. Molloy. Mugalian. Oblinger. O'Brien. Piel. Preston. Sandquist. Schlickman. Stanley. Stearney. Tuerk. Van Dwyne. Willer. J. J. Wolf and Younge."

Speaker Redmond: "Now what is the count? Sixty-seven 'aye' and seventy 'no', and the motion failed. Representative Madigan, Any further Amendments."

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Did you say Third Reading, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading."

Madigan: "Did Mr. Skinner hear you say that?"

Speaker Redmond: "Give Representative Skinner a copy of the



Roll Call of Third Reading. 1404. Mulcahey. Yeah."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1404. Mulcahey. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Environmental Protection Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1424."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1424. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act to revise the law in relation to counties. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Representative...Hello.

Well, okay. I'll...I'll get you. I'll...I'll go back to some of the noncontroversial, then I'll...I'll get to you, though. Roll Call for attendance. The Roll Call that really counts is the one in my pocket, though. That's the one that's got Mahar on it. Representative Walsh, be sure you answer the Roll Call for attendance. Representative Madigan. Madi..."

Madigan: "Mr...Mr. Speaker, would the records show that Representative Vitek is excused because of illness?"

Speaker Redmond: "Any objection? Hearing none, the record will so show. Representative Ryan? Republicans are all healthy. Senate Bills, Second Reading on page 7. Representative Totten, do you...88. Somebody's yelling, but I can't see. Who is it? Totten? Oh, Representative Totten."

Totten: "Mr. Speaker, somebody is voting 'no', and there's not a red light on the...on the Attendance Roll Call, and I don't know whose switch may be wrong."

Speaker Redmond: "The electrician is trying to ferret that out. Now there's two, and there's a green one, too, and I..."



Totten: "Well, somebody..."

Speaker Redmond: "J. J. Wolf is one of them."

Totten: "Well, yeah, if everybody would hold their switches..."

Speaker Redmond: "The electrician tells me that if there's anything other than the 'present', that no perdiem is possible."

Totten: "Well, they're all present, but there's one red number up there. At least one, and somebody's switch isn't working."

Speaker Redmond: "Take the record. Christensen was flicking back and forth. Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "I even have a better one for Totten to figure out. The...the numbers add up to 178."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Vinson."

Vinson: "Is...is it true you only use that extra red vote when Skinner's got an Amendment?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Totten."

Totten: "It is verified. We have a hundred and seven..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative...We've discovered it. Representative Woodyard is both 'no' and 'present'. No, we don't know how that happens, but that's the way it is. How many votes does he get? Can he vote 'yes' twice? Okay. Representative Totten."

Totten: "Well, if it gets to 178, I want a verification, but if...but if it is 178, then I think we ought to have a new Roll Call on the Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "That would make it even. Unless you voted for yourself. 88."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 88. A Bill for an Act to limit the activities of state appellate defenders and class... and state appellate prosecutors to Class X crimes and other felonies. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, McClain, amends..."



Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative McClain on the floor?"

Do you got an Amendment on Senate Bill 88?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amends Senate Bill 88 on page 2 by deleting line 2 through 5 and inserting in lieu thereof the following: Section 2 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This is an agreed Amendment in order to get the Bill out of Judiciary Committee. Mr. Stearney and Mr. Katz asked for our word to take out these three lines which provided for a State's Attorney Appellate Service Commission...the right to employ investigators. Mr. Katz and Mr. Stearney said that they saw no relevance to the Bill which did not deal with investigators, so I agreed with them, and it does not harm the Bill in anyway. It's an extraneous Amendment anyway put on by the Senate, and so following my word with Mr. Stearney and Mr. Katz, I'd move for the adoption of Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Kempiners."

Kempiners: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I have a discussion going on over here, and I couldn't under...hear the explanation that he gave of the Amendment. Would he give a brief...?"

Speaker Redmond: "Do you want me to chasten and chastise the Minority Leader?"

Kempiners: "I think that might not be such a bad idea."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay. Representative...Representative Ryan, you interfered with Representative Kempiners. Will you repeat the explanation, Mr. McClain?"

McClain: "Yes, Mr. Speaker. Bill, what the Bill does is it provides that...oh, you know what the Bill does. What the Amendment does...is the Amendment was put on by the Senate by the State's Attorney Appellate Service Commission, which provided that they also may employ investigators. The House Judiciary Committee, both Mr. Stearney and Mr. Katz, saw no relevance and no need for the Commission to



employ investigators, and so Mr. Knuppel, who is the Senate Sponsor, and I gave our word that we would take off that extraneous Amendment put on in the Senate, and that's what the Amendment does."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? The question's on Amend... the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment 1. Those in favor say 'aye'. 'Aye'. Opposed, 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The motion carried. Amendment 1 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 95."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 95. A Bill for an Act making appropriations to the Illinois Economic and Fiscal Commission. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 216."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 216. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act to revise the law in relation to counties. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 257."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 257. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Game Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, Yourell, amends Senate..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain. Representative McClain. I think the rules say something about staying in your seat. I think they do. Amendment #1 to Senate Bill 257. Representative Yourell's Amendment. What is your pleasure, Sir?"



McClain: "I'd...what? Move...withdraw it to...?"

Speaker Redmond: "Well, the thing is that the Sponsor of the Amendment isn't here. If you persist in wanting to move it to Third, that's always been the policy of the Chair."

McClain: "Let's move it, please."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 302. Move it to Third, yeah."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 302. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act concerning counties. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 309."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 309. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Nursing Home Administrators Licensing Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 459."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 459. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 484."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 484. A Bill for an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense of the Department of Agriculture. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendments #2, 3, 4, and 5 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendments 2, 3, 4, and 5?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #6, Ewing, amends Senate Bill .."

Speaker Redmond: "Who's the Sponsor of the Amendment?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Representative Ewing."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Robbins, are you aware of the Amendment #6? Representative Ewing to explain the Amendment."



Ewing: "I'd like to move to withdraw Amendment #6."

Speaker Redmond: "Amendment 6 is withdrawn. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #7, Ropp, amends Senate Bill 484..."

Speaker Redmond: "Who's the Sponsor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Representative Ropp."

Speaker Redmond: "Robbins?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Ropp."

Speaker Redmond: "Ropp. Representative Ropp. Amendment 7 to Senate Bill 484."

Ropp: "Senate...Amendment #7 is one that actually is a seed Bill. If there's ever a need for setting up offices out of the country, the normal process for doing that is to find out whether or not there are additional needs or even the opportunity for setting up trade offices. This was done in the Brussels office which the State of Illinois has. It was also done in establishing the Hong Kong office that developed international trade for Illinois products, and what this does it provides 20,000 dollars for an individual to go down and to determine whether or not there is a justifiable need for developing an office in Latin America. I urge your favorable support."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? The question's on the motion for the adoption of Amendment 7. Those in... Representative Barnes."

Barnes, E.: "Thank you, very much. Just a question, and I'm not questioning the Amendment, but I was reading in the Digest that Amendment #3 did the same thing. What happened?"

Ropp: "Okay, it's a brief history. I took this to Appropriations Committee."

Barnes: "I understand it was taken off in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment 7. Representative Matijeich."



Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, as Chairman of the Appropriations I Committee, I'm not going to get all excited about 20,000 dollars, but I do want to tell the Membership that the Committee did remove the 20,000 dollars, because we felt that we now have under the Department of Business and Economic Development an office in San Paulo at 80,000 dollars a year, and we didn't think that another 20,000 additional to study how we can increase trade with Latin America was necessary, but I'll let Gordon, as former Director of the Department of Agriculture, have his 20,000 dollars, but I did want to alert the Membership that this was removed at one time."

Speaker Redmond: "The question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment 7. Those in favor say 'aye'. 'Aye'. Opposed, 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The motion carried. Amendment 7 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #8, Ewing, amends Senate Bill 484 as amended on page 10, line 16 by deleting 488,700 and inserting in lieu thereof 988,700."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ewing."

Ewing: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment 8 is an Amendment which adds 50...500,000 dollars to the agriculture budget and to the line item which deals with the soil and water conservation districts acrossed this state. The amount that is presently included in the budget is less than we have had in prior years for this item, and yet a year ago or two years ago, we passed House Bill 818 which provides for the implementation of a soil and water conservation program acrossed this state. It's a very ambitious program. It's a very necessary program if we're going to save one our most...one of our most valuable natural resources. There is absolutely no way that the local soil and water conservation districts can even begin to approach this problem unless we put some



more money in the budget so that they can pay their help. We're just providing money for salaries, for secretaries, and the line people who will be needed to implement this program. We have talked to the Governor about this expenditure and though we do not have any promise from his office, I believe that it would be perfectly all right to have this added. If he finds that it's not available at that time, he can always reduce it, and I would ask for your favorable consideration."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Darrow."

Darrow: "Well, thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this budget was heard in Appropriations Committee, given a full hearing, the Director of Agriculture made no mention of this item. It's an addition to the budget. It is not approved by the Governor. I would point out to the other Members of the House that this is for clerical and nontechnical field personal...personnel. It is not for your technical staff. It's for those positions which are easiest filled by patronage workers. What the Sponsor of this Amendment is asking is 500,000 dollars to hire additional patronage workers. It is not needed. It is not necessary. The Director of Agriculture does not care if he has it or not. We can get along quite well without this expenditure. I would ask that we all vote 'no'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Robbins."

Robbins: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, the soil conservation does not hire patronage workers. They hire people to work in the office and in the district, and they are hired by the local...these people will be hired by the local districts. This is not a patronage thing. This is...one of the things that I have met as I have toured over the state, they said if you are going to insist that we handle the House Bill 818 and implement the Clean Water Bill 208, we have to have additional



personnel. When you get into the...into the Bill and try to handle this money...now this money will be spent at the local level, and it will be spent by the local boards and not by the Department of Agriculture."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McMasters."

McMasters: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I rise in support of this Amendment. I had a number of phone calls over the weekend and...and have had a number of letters in regard to this situation. As Representative Robbins said, we are putting additional work on the soil and water conservation district people, and I think it's only fair that if we expect them to do this work, that they should have the finances necessary to hire the people to do it. If we're going to control soil erosion in this state, I think we have got to start thinking about doing something about the funding for it, and I urge your support of this Amendment to House Bill 4...or Senate Bill 484."

Speaker Redmond: "Ready for the question. Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I don't mind giving Gordon Ropp the 20,000 dollars of unbudgeted funds in the Department of Agriculture for his Latin American trade study, but when we're talking about this amount of money, I want to tell the Members of the House that the...the House Committee...Appropriations Committee added 55,000 dollars to the soil and water conservation districts, which was taken away from the Senate. We did this, and the Director of the Department of Agriculture didn't even ask us to do this, but we felt that that amount of funds was needed to assist the local communities in planning for eight water shed projects, but for us to add this additional amount that Representative Ewing is talking about in unbudgeted funds, I think is going overboard. I'd like to reiterate what my Vice-Chairman, Clarence Darrow, has said that this budget was



scrutinized in the Committee. It's a good budget as it stands now, and for us to addition...add additional funds would be irresponsible, and I would urge the Members to beat down this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment #8 to Senate Bill 484. Those in favor vote 'aye'. Opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 58 'aye' and 45 'no', and the motion carries. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Former Representative from the 40th District, now Senator Pate Philips, has entered the chamber with his protege, Representative Daniels. 486."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate..."

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the record. 488."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 488. A Bill for an Act making appropriations for the expense of the Department of Financial Institutions. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adcpeted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendment 1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 490."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 490. A Bill for an Act making appropriations for the expense of the Illinois Arts Council. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 and 2 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendments 1 and 2?"

Clerk O'Brien: "A motion to table Amendment #2."

Speaker Redmond: "Wait a minute. Out of the record. Out of



...out of the record. 506. Any motion with respect to 5...506? What'd you say?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 506. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment..."

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the record. 530."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 530. A Bill for an Act making appropriations to the State Comptroller. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 537."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 537. A Bill for an Act making appropriations to the Legislative Information System. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 546."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 546. A Bill for an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense of the State Board of Elections. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendments #1 and 2 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendment 1 or 2?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 559."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 559. A Bill for an Act to revise the law in relation to credit unions and amending and repealing certain Acts in connection therewith. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendments #1, 2, and 3 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendments 1, 2, and 3?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."



Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #4, Dawson, amends Senate Bill 559 on page 2 by inserting after line 25 the following."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Molloy."

Molloy: "...ask that the Bill be taken out of the record at the present time."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the record. 566."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 56...Senate Bill 566. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 624."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 624. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, Hoffman, amends Senate Bill 624 on page 3 by deleting line 29 through 35 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hoffman."

Hoffman: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Senate Bill 624 is an attempt to deal with a...a court decision where a tenure teacher sought to compel a school board to assign her to teach the same courses she had taught prior to her dismissal which was found to be contrary and to assign her to the same classroom that she had previously occupied. She was returned to the class. She suffered no reduction in salary or loss of other benefits as a result of this assignment. What this Bill attempts to do as...in its present form attempts to require that a board assign a teacher back to a similar assignment that she had the year before. What my Amendment does...provides that the dismissed tenure teacher who is reinstated shall have no fewer rights than any



other tenured teacher. Because as the law stands now, a tenure teacher has no right to position; has only a right to job within the definition of his or her certification as the case may be. If this Bill, Senate Bill 624, becomes law in its present form, what it will amount to is that a dismissed teacher who has been reinstated will have more job rights than a teacher who has not been dismissed, and for that reason I have proposed this Amendment which would say a dismissed teacher who is reinstated shall have no fewer rights than any other tenure teacher. In other words, everybody will be treated the same, and with that explanation, Mr. Speaker, I would move for the adoption of Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Jaffe. Jaffe."

Jaffe: "Yeah. Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, I rise in opposition to this Amendment. This is my Bill, and I believe that this is not a good Amendment. Basically what the Amendment does is that it makes the Bill meaningless. What the Bill does, initially, is requires a reinstated teacher to be assigned to a school by the school board to a position substantially similar to the one held prior to suspension or dismissal. What the Amendment does is absolutely nothing. It just says that the teacher shall have no fewer rights than a tenure teacher. It doesn't deal with the reinstatement. It doesn't specify where in line the teacher would be. You could take that teacher and put that teacher really anyplace as long as it was in a tenure spot. You could have someone teaching history for 20 years and all of a sudden that teacher could be in a...in a study hall because of the fact that she had this dispute. So, this...this Amendment really doesn't give the Bill anything. It makes the Bill meaningless and worthwhile, and I would urge a 'no' vote, and I do oppose this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Anderson."



Anderson: "Yes, Mr. Speaker. I think this is a good, even-handed way of handling the dismissal subject where all teachers will be treated alike, and I urge the adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schneider."

Schneider: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. As I look at the language, it is nebulous in the extreme. I think when you talk about 'shall have no fewer rights', I'm very confused about that. Gene and I are in a classroom everyday for the most part on other occasions, and I don't know if that means that I don't have to move from room to room or I get my own special office or I get a telephone and he doesn't. I think that's very nebulous and nowhere that I can recall in the code that we talk about someone having lesser or greater rights than others; so it's clear that what we need to have is the Bill in its present form rather than again become fuzzy on whether or not we can define in the statutes this question of fewer rights. If you want to have that kind of thing in the code, then I think you ought to delineate what we're talking about, so it...it seems to me to be the kind of Amendment which is aimed toward disabling the legislation rather than enhancing it as, I think, Representative...Representative Hoffman honestly tried to do in 793. This is a rather poorly done Amendment. Not to the credit of the Sponsor. A 'no' vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? Representative Hoffman to close."

Hoffman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This Amendment does one very simply thing and that is that it says everyone who is a tenured teacher has the same rights as any other tenured teacher. If this Amendment is not adopted, you're going to have a Bill which gives a reinstated...a teacher who had been...gone through a dismissal who has been reinstated having greater rights



than teachers who had never been through a dismissal procedure. It's that simple. If you think they ought to have more rights, then you shouldn't support the Bill. If you think people ought to be treated equally and fairly, then you should support my Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "The question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment #1. Those in favor vote 'aye'. Opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Representative Stuffle."

Stuffle: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Members, while on its face this Amendment may look good to some of you as argued by Representative Hoffman. In reality what this Amendment does and can well do is gives license to a subterfuge. In the sense that a teacher dismissed and then reinstated was, in a fact, not really dismissed and was given, in effect, if you will, a verdict of not guilty. To take away that person's position by a subterfuge, as may well be the case, or in the finding that they are not guilty of some action, would be to deny them due process of law and that's what this Amendment does. It really isn't connected to the other rights of tenured teachers, and it ought to be rejected for the reasons cited very well by Representatives Schneider and Jaffe."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 59 'aye' and 73 'no'. The motion fails. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 669. 506."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 506. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendment 1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."



Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 669."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 669. A Bill for an Act to make an appropriation for the ordinary and contingent expense of the Illinois Public Employees Pension Laws Commission. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendment 1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 670."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, Culler..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Emil Jones. We're on 1348.
Who's the Sponsor of Amendment 1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment 1, Cullerton, amends Senate Bill 1348 on page 1, line 3 by deleting the period and inserting in lieu thereof the following."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Cullerton."

Cullerton: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This Amendment prohibits companies from basing rates for fire and extended coverage insurance in different geographical areas for political subdivisions within that portion of any standard metropolitan statistical area which is wholly or partially contained in Illinois, but with this prohibition, shall not apply to the use of the proximity of a risk to a fire protection district as a factor in making rates. I would ask for a favorable approval of this Amendment."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Jones, do you have any comment on Amendment 1? The question is...Representative Bradley. Bradley."

Bradley: "Yes, he...he read that Amendment pretty fast. Would ...would you explain the Amendment..."

Cullerton: "This Amendment adds such a practice to the definition of unfair methods of competition and unfair deceptive acts or practices. It prohibits companies from basing rates for fire and extended coverage insurance on differing geographical areas."

Bradley: "Is this a so-called red-lightning Amendment?"

Cullerton: "I believe it is. Yes."

Bradley: "If I could call the attention to the...the Members that what the...what the Amendment is then. Did...did you say it...it only affects what particular area? Was it affecting only one particular area?"

Cullerton: "Any standard metropolitan statistical area."

Bradley: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schuneman. Schuneman."

Schuneman: "A question of the Sponsor, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Schuneman: "Representative Cullerton, does this Bill...what companies does this Bill affect? What kind of insurance companies?"

Cullerton: "It only affects homeowners' insurance."

Schuneman: "Well, the Bill applies to township and...and county mutual insurance companies. Are you saying that the Amendment only affects homeowners? Mr. Speaker, I wonder if it might be possible to ask that this Bill be taken out of the record for a minute until we have a chance to look at this?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Cullerton agrees to take it out of the record. Senate Bills, Second Reading, Short Debate Calendar, page 5. 761. Representative Bradley."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 761. A Bill for an Act to amend



Sections of the Retailers' Occupation Tax Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, Skinner, amends Senate Bill 761 on page 1 by deleting the title and inserting in lieu thereof the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Mr. Speaker, I'm wondering if you would take a look at the Bill and see...I...I question the germaneness of..."

Speaker Redmond: "Where's the parliamentarian? Representative Skinner on the Amendment."

Skinner: "Mr. Speaker, I question the germaneness of calling the parliamentarian. I'm sure you can rule without him. I would point out that this amends the Retailer Occupation Tax and so does my Amendment." All I'm doing is adding another tax, the Service Occupation Tax, to that. It's generally a sales tax Amendment. If this...if this state were logical and had a sales tax instead of occupation and service taxes, there'd be no question whatsoever."

Clerk O'Brien: "Representative Lechowicz in the Chair."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mr. Skinner. Mr...Representative Bradley's point. The Amendment is germane from...on page 1 through page 13."

Skinner: "That's good for starters."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Up through line 20, but then Section 2, from 13 through the end of the Amendment, is not germane, so in order..."

Skinner: "Oh, in that case, I ask leave to strike after the nongermane part on the face."

Speaker Lechowicz: "There is objection, so the Amendment is out of order."

Skinner: "Shucks."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."



Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading...761...Senate Bill 956. 956, Jack."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 956. A Bill for an Act to amend the Retailers' Occupation Tax Act, Use Tax Act, Service Occupation Tax, and Service Use Tax Act. Second Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1, Skinner, amends Senate Bill 956 on page 1, line 1 by inserting immediately after 'Act'; the following and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Before we get to that Amendment, the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Bowman. You want to waive... waive a posting rule, Mr. Bowman."

Bowman: "Yes."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Have you discussed this with the Minority Leader?"

Bowman: "Well, with Minority...no."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Well, as a..."

Bowman: "I just spoke with the Committee Chairman. Actually, you see, the Bills should've been posted. They were requested to be posted. It was an oversight that they were not posted, and..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Well, to save us a little time, why don't you walk over to Mr. Ryan and check with him, please? Amendment #1, Jack, is that where we're at?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1 by Representative Skinner."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Skinner. The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Bullock, for what purpose do you seek recognition?"

Bullock: "Mr. Speaker, I question germaneness of this Amendment to Senate Bill 956. Could you make a ruling on that?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "One moment, please. Mr. Skinner."

Skinner: "This is getting monotonous. I did not change the title this time."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Well, we'll have the parliamentary take



a look at it."

Skinner: "Do I have to time to go to the bathroom?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "I don't think so."

Skinner: "Oh."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Unless you want to withdraw the Amendment?"

Now, wait a minute. According to the parliamentarian the Amendment is not germane."

Skinner: "What? Mr. Speaker, could we have some indication as to why since this Amendment...since this Bill amends the Retailers' Occupation Tax Act, the Use Tax Act, the Service...?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "The title says an Act to exempt from certain occupation and use taxes transactions involving the sale or transfer of certain tangible personal property to an interstate carrier for hire, and your Amendment does not address that...that issue."

Skinner: "Your rulings are getting narrower and narrower. Your parliamentarian says that's right."

Speaker Lechowicz: "No, I'm afraid he's disagreeing with you, Sir. The Amendment is not in order. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. Mr. Bowman, are you ready for your request? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Bowman."

Bowman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd like to request to waiving the posting rule for Senate Bills 799 and...and 800 to be heard in Executive Committee this Wednesday. I have discussed it with the Chairman of the Committee and the Minority Leader of the House, and there was no objection."

Speaker Lechowicz: "On that question, the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Madigan."

Madigan: "Well, did you discuss this with the Minority Leader?"

Bowman: "Yes."

Madigan: "You didn't discuss it with me, and..."

Bowman: "No, I'm sorry. Yeah, I did discuss it with Ryan."

Madigan: "All right. Fine."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Does the Gentleman have unanimous consent to use the Attendance Roll Call? Hearing no objection, the Attendance Roll Call will be used. The Gentleman's request is granted. Agreed Resolutions."

House Bill (sic) 345 is the death Resolution of Miss Rose Ann Bjorkman. House Resolution 30...346, Wikoff-Johnson, recognizes E. L. Jurgens of the Arther Association of Commerce. House Resolution 347, Cullerton, acknowledges the hard work of Gerhard, Swedenburg, Letzing House Resolution 348, the...commends Ken Mahoney and Doug Biederstedt for making the finals in the Indianapolis 500.
