Speaker Redmond: "According to the Calendar it amends the Illinois Public Aid Code, and you read Environmental Protection. What's the...1979."

Clerk O'Brien: "An Act to amend Sections of the Environmental Protection Act."

Speaker Redmond: "Evidently the Calendar is in error. Is that right?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Evidently."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there a Committee Amendment on 1979?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Committee Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendment from the floor? We show an Amendment on the..."

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, Currie-Johnson, amends Senate Bill 1979 on page three line 13 and 19..."

Speaker Redmond: "Who is the Sponsor of this Bill? Representative Meyer, are you the Sponsor?"

Meyer: "Out of the record. Could you...could you take this Bill out of the record please?"

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the record. Who is the Sponsor of it? It shows Representative Friedrich. Is that in error?"

Meyer: "Hyphenated...hyphenated Cosponsors."

Speaker Redmond: "I didn't know we had such things in the Senate Bills."

Meyer: "Hyphenated Sponsors."

Speaker Redmond: "I still didn't know we had such things in the House on Senate Bills. We'll take it out of the record anyway. 1991. I suggest we correct the title



in the Calendar when it shows up again. 1991."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1991, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Insurance Code, Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendment #1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendment from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1992."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1992, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Insurance Code, Second Reading of the Bill. Amendments #2, 3, and 4 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendments #2, 3, and 4?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #5, Preston, amends Senate Bill 1992 as amended with reference to debate..."

Speaker Redmond: "Is Representative Telscer on the floor? Out of the record. 19...2000."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 2000, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act in relation to state finance, Second Reading of the Bill. Amendments #1 and 2 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendments 1 and 2?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendment from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2002."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 2002, a Bill for an Act relating to public utilities and electric supplier taxes, Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendment from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."



Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2004."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 2004,..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Deuster, will you sit down so I can see Representative Walsh? Proceed. Read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "...A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Income Tax..."

Speaker Redmond: "The 'Wrong Walsh' stand up."

Clerk O'Brien: "Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2013."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 2013, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the School Code, Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2014."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 2014, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act in relation to state finance, Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendment #1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendment from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 2020. Bill Holland come up here please. 2020."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 2020, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Local Mass Transit District Act, Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendment from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1 lost in Committee. Amendment #2 and 3 were withdrawn in Committee. Amendment...okay, Amendment #4 was withdrawn. Floor Amendment #5, Watson,



amends Senate Bill 2020 on page two line 30, 31, 32..."

Speaker Redmond: "Are there any motions with respect to any of the Committee Amendments that were not withdrawn?"

Clerk O'Brien: "There were no Committee Amendments adopted. They all lost or withdrawn."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Flinn, is this an Agreed Amendment, Representative Watson? Representative Flinn on the floor? Take it out of the record. 2022.

On this one? By whom. Representative Reilly, there's an Amendment been filed here. Representative Reilly."

Reilly: "I have an agreement with Representative Currie that I'll bring this back, so I would appreciate it... having it moved to Third."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay...Any motion...have you read 2022?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 2022, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Human Rights Act, Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendment #1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendment from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, Representative Currie, amends Senate Bill 2022 as amended in the title and introductory clause in Section 1 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Reilly, are you ready to adopt Amendment #2? Okay..."

Reilly: "No..."

Speaker Redmond: "You're understanding is you move it to Third and bring it back. Is that correct?"

Reilly: "I also believe Representative Currie is not ready to go with it."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Currie, I can't hear you without the microphone."

Currie: "Is the Amendment printed? I don't believe it is printed yet, is it?"

Speaker Redmond: "No, it's not. It is not. What's the best."



leave it where it is or move it up to Third? What's your preference?"

Reilly: "My pleasure would be...or my request would be to move it to Third."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay. Roll Call for attendance. Yeah, he moved it to Third. You know the lights aren't working. Be very careful how you press your switch because the lights aren't working and the electrician is up there working on it, so...if you don't do it exactly right, why... Representative Walsh, you're not voting correctly. Take the record. Senate Bills Third Reading page two. Gene Hoffman here? 1378. Representative Pullen, 1378, out of the record. 1506, Representative Mahar, out of the record. 1614, Representative Vinson here? Anybody can handle this one for Representative Vinson? Out of the record. 1618, Is Schuneman here? Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1618, a Bill for an Act making appropriations for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Department of Personnel, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schuneman."

Schuneman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This is the ordinary and contingent expenses for the Department of Personnel. I think the only controversial part about this Bill was the Amendment that we passed the other day which added an additional \$2,000,000 for the group insurance premium, and I would urge adoption of the motion to pass the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is 'Shall this Bill pass?'. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Representative Skinner, what did you do to your switch? Well, look at the Board. It had to be you. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 118...119 'aye', and three 'no'. The Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared



passed. 1628."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1628, a Bill for an Act making appropriations to the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Attorney General, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Darrow."

Darrow: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this is the annual appropriation for the Attorney General's office. As the Bill was introduced in the Senate it was \$15,781,785. It came back to the House of Representatives at \$15 thousand...or \$15,455,495. We reduced it by \$34,816. It is currently at \$15,410,279."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "I wonder if the Sponsor has gotten rid of all those part-time attorneys that he ranted and raved about in previous years."

Darrow: "Yes, there are some part-time attorneys, and there are some on contract. However, we've reduced some of these. The rest of them seem...the ones that are on contract, there are some question about their...in the newspapers, I believe, about why they're needed and things like this, but it was a feeling that is was a special expertise they had in such areas as environment, utilities, and things like that that they were needed."

Skinner: "I'm glad your education is evolving in the office. We look forward to seeing your holding it."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? The question is 'Shall this Bill pass?'. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 130 'aye', and two 'no'. The Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. 1633."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1633, a Bill for an Act making appropriations for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Commissioner of banks and trust companies, Third Reading of the Bill."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative McBroom."

McBroom: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. This is the annual appropriation just as the title shows on the Calendar. I appreciate a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? You want the...you move the passage of 1633?"

McBroom: "Yes. Yes."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is 'Shall this Bill pass?'. Those in favor vote 'aye', and opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 122 'aye', and six 'no', and the Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed." 1651, Representative Ryan, you want to go with that one? Read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1651, a Bill for an Act making appropriations for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the office of the Governor, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House...or Senate Bill 1651 is a supplemental appropriation for \$633...\$633,454 to be used for some remodeling and some rehabilitation at the mansion, and I would ask for a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Borchers."

Borchers: "I would like to ask a question if you don't mind."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Borchers: "What is this I hear about the...the...what is this I hear about the beams that were just put in a few years ago, some of them being rotten and eaten out by termites. I...is that so? I'm not going to oppose the Bill, I'm just curious about who...if that is so, who did it, and who is responsible for that kind of lumber?"

Ryan: "I haven't heard that, Webber, that...but I do know that they have some outside construction that they have to do."



Borchers: "Some what?"

Ryan: "I haven't heard that about the beams. I...if that is true, I don't know it to be."

Borchers: "Well, I was told by someone who inspected the mansion that some of the beams that were lately put in... a few years ago were actually wood that was rotted, and it was very poor lumber. Even so, they would still have to be replaced if that is part of the trouble. That was all I wanted to know."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pullen. Please give the Lady order."

Pullen: "I would like to ask the Sponsor a couple of questions please."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Pullen: "Does this Bill also include over \$17,000 for another trip of the Governor to Japan?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "The one that he took. This is the one that he already took."

Pullen: "I can't hear."

Speaker Redmond: "Please give the Lady order."

Ryan: "This is the trip that he has already taken, Representative, as your analysis says like mine does."

Pullen: "The trip the Governor took to Japan to try to get some auto plants here? The trip the Governor took to Japan to try to get some auto plants here?"

Ryan: "I'm sure that and some other industries that I think you were interested in trying to put into your district. And I don't know how that has worked out."

Pullen: "No, I don't want any industry in my district. Would it not be the case..."

Speaker Redmond: "At large they call that."

Pullen: "Would it not be true that it would cost us a lot less money to get the auto manufactures and other industries in Illinois by reforming workmen's compensation and unemployment insurance?"



Ryan: "Well, I don't know if that is true with the Japanese firms or not, Representative. That may be...that may be true. I'm not sure."

Pullen: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? Representative Mulcahey."

Mulcahey: "Yes, would the Sponsor yield? Representative Ryan, I notice that there were...there's three attorneys...in house attorneys that were hired during January and February..."

Ryan: "Start over, Representative. I can't hear you. I didn't hear what you said."

Mulcahey: "I understand there were three in house attorneys that were hired for January and February. I was wondering if you could explain what the need for that..."

Ryan: "Well, this is a contractual services, that's right, that were hired to...for the Chicago School Board negotiations."

Mulcahey: "I see, and there's one more. I see there's a chair...\$500 for a chair for the Governor."

Ryan: "Yes, I understand that's..."

Mulcahey: "Five hundred dollars for a new chair for the Governor."

Ryan: "That was an Amendment that was added in the Senate. Right."

Mulcahey: "I've...I've got one he can have."

Ryan: "Why don't you take it over to him?"

Mulcahey: "Maybe we would probably..."

Ryan: "Are you telling that you're going to give up your seat, Representative?"

Mulcahey: "No, it's not...it's not here. It is across the street. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mulcahey. Anything further? The question is 'Shall this Bill pass?'. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Representative Borchers."



Borchers: "In explaining my vote 'yes', I am going to vote 'yes' because I feel it so justifiable to do so. However, I want to point out that a Decatur man that I know personally came to me and he made one of the estimates of repair of the mansion, and he said that a number of the beams that had just been put in during the last administration, that's Walker's administration, have been put into the mansion were complete...rotten, and were very poor wood and should never have been placed there in the first place. Since this is not a Republican cause, but the last administration. I just want to point that out."

Speaker Redmond: "They bought those in Macon County. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 127 'aye', and eight 'no', and the Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. 18...1684." Representative Griesheimer, for what purpose do you rise?"

Griesheimer: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I just wanted to point out to Representative Borchers, I know he is so concerned about this. The same Gentleman put in the beams that did the painting four years ago up here in the porticoes along side the House. He is well noted for the quality of his work."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1684, a Bill for an Act making an appropriation to the Comptroller, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative J. David Jones."

Jones: "Mr. Speaker, Gentlemen of the House...Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, we have a real small appropriation here for the Russell Stewart Oil Company of Champaign of \$3,334 and the Schmidt Towing Service of 13 million... \$13,119, and these are accounts of long standing of about five years and have been tied up in the red tape of the Governor process. The Senate has seen the wisdom that they should be paid and our Appropriation



Committee in the House voted 19 to nothing as they should be paid. I move the passage of 18...1681. If anybody has any questions I can give them all the gory details."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Brummer."

Brummer: "Yes, normally we appropriate funds to the Court of Claims specifically to pay for those awards that the Court of Claims has determined or due in owing to individuals from the State of Illinois. Has the Russell Stewart Oil Company claim been submitted to the Court of Claims?"

J. David Jones: "The Military and Naval Department was where this obligation of where the state is unable to pay the Stewart Oil Company due to the fact the Bill was not received after all available funds has lapsed. A claim was filed in the Court of Claims for the amount due to the Stewart Oil Company, but the case was dismissed on the basis the contracts entered into by a state agency in excess of appropriations are nil and void. Although the products were accepted and used for the purpose for what they are purchased, the Stewart Oil Company has not received any payment for these products."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Taylor, for what purpose do you rise?"

Taylor: "Mr. Speaker, will the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Taylor: "Representative Jones, I heard you say that these were old claims, and I was wondering if the 'Metley' Movers was included in this one?"

Jones: "I don't believe they were. We didn't hear from you, Mr. Taylor."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? Representative Brummer."

Brummer: "Yes, I don't...are there funds in here for payments due other than Stewart Oil Company?"

Jones: "Yes, to Schmidt Towing Company of Springfield, \$13,119."



Brummer: "For how much?"

Jones: "\$13,119.39. This had to do with the State Police hiring the towing service to take the cars out of the chop shop that...north of town that...where the owner has gone to prison and that they were hauled away and he had to hire a forklift...and store them, and in the process of what was happening, they...it was not paid..."

Brummer: "Once again, was that submitted to the Court of Claims for hearing?"

Jones: "Yes it was."

Brummer: "Was it granted or denied by the Court of Claims?"

Jones: "In 1977 Mr. Schmidt filed a complaint in the Court of Claims seeking recovery of their accrued storage charges to date. In order to stop the further accrual of storage charges..."

Brummer: "Mr. Speaker, I can't hear the explanation."

Speaker Redmond: "Please give the Gentleman order."

Jones: "In 1977 Mr. Schmidt filed a complaint with the Court of Claims seeking a recovery of the accrued storage charges to date. In order to stop the further accrual of storage charges, Mr. Schmidt instituted proceedings in Sangamon County to have the court decide which, if any, items from what he has sold to reduce the claim for storage charges. The sale of these items yield a gross proceed of \$9,150. In October, 1979 the Court of Claims denied Mr. Schmidt claim stating the claimant had totally failed to prove to the court that the alleged contract was made by one authorized or enter into contract with the State of Illinois and on a sole issue the claim would be denied. The position of Mr. Schmidt is that he has dealt with the Illinois State Police and a particular trooper, William 'Pennel', head of the stolen car unit in previous cases...had submitted his billings had been paid and that Trooper 'Pennel' had apparently the authority to contract for the State of Illinois."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brummer."

Brummer: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, if I might briefly address the Bill. It seems to me that we have the Court of Claims to hear and adjudicate the claims against the State of Illinois. In each of these instances the claims were filed with the Court of Claims. In each instance the Court of Claims denied the claim of the claimant indicating that the claimant was not entitled to recover the claim against the State of Illinois. I think it is totally inappropriate then that we bypass the Court of Claims, ignore their opinion and decision which we have paid them to render, and nevertheless appropriate funds for the payment of these. I would suggest a 'no' vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Epton."

Epton: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen. It is certainly true that the claims of this nature should go to the Court of Claims, but I think it is in error to assume that the Court of Claims is always correct. They have in the past, on several occasions to my personal knowledge over the past 12 years, disallowed claims where value was given to the state for various technical or political reasons they refuse to make payments. And the Legislature, either the House or the Senate has seen fit to honor an obligation which it rightfully should. In some cases, the Court of Claims should be ashamed at the manner in which they proceed, and certainly this is one instance where we should support this legitimate claim for services rendered for value received and should not be dragged down any technicality, and I would urge the passage of this Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Jones to close."

Jones: "These are obligations that are long overdue, and they have went through with all of the procedures that they should go through, and have not yet received their compensation for services rendered, and I move that we



now appropriate the money to accommodate that effort."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is 'Shall this Bill pass?'.

Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Representative Griesheimer."

Griesheimer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would just like to add my comments to Representative Epton's. The Court of Claims is reviewing these various claims according to strict statutory language. When we review these and we find that these are actual services provided to the State of Illinois that were given in good faith by private businesses. I think we would be hard pressed not to pay them their just compensation. We're just very lucky in today's economy that they're not charging us interest or we would probably owe them hundreds of thousand dollars more. I think this is a moral obligation. This is one of the reasons we serve down here is to intervene on behalf of the people when because of the strict statutory construction, they are not receiving their fair and adequate compensation. I feel this is a moral obligation we must vote for."

Speaker Redmond: "There are a lot of votes on here of Members who are not on the floor, so we'll dump this Roll Call, and please don't vote anyone that isn't here." The question is 'Shall this Bill pass?'. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Representative Borchers."

Borchers: "...Six votes. Now I have been told that this is a moral obligation. If I give my word that I will pay something, by God, I ought to pay it. We have given our word as representatives in a sense, to the State. We should pay the obligation, a moral obligation owed these people by the state. They provide the services, then let's provide the money. Their innocent victims. Their innocent of the...of being, in a sense, taken advantage of by the State of Illinois. We should do something about it."



Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Representative Robbins."

Robbins: "Some people wonder why it costs so much to run a state government and this is one of the reasons. Whenever you start out and bid on a project, you never know whether you are going to get your money or not. So this...this is one of the things that should be done, and I think we should pay these Bills."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Representative Wolf."

Wolf: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. I would just like to shed a little light in this. The Gentleman in question here, in May of '74, he was contacted by William 'Pennel' which...whom he dealt before from the State Police, and was requested to take certain items back to 'Nelvo's' Auto Parts and store the remaining items. Now he didn't have any warehouse facilities of his own that were appropriate, so he went out and rented a building on Dirksen Parkway in Springfield and stored these items. Now the Court of Claims said Mr. Schmidt didn't obtain a written contract for providing this service, but in fact, he never had a written contract with the state for the services he had previously rendered both in the 'Nevo' case and other unrelated matters with the State Police, and he was, in fact, paid. The position of Mr. Schmidt is that he dealt with the Illinois State Police and a particular trooper, William 'Pennel' who is the head of the stolen car unit, and in previous cases he submitted his billing and had been paid and so he felt that the Trooper 'Pennel' had apparent authority to contract for the...for the services. It would seem to me a matter of good faith, if you were in business and someone had authorized you to do some work and you were in fact paid after submitting the bill, you would have reason to believe that you would be paid further. I think it is only a matter



of justice and equity that we vote for this and reimburse the Gentleman for his expenses, and I would urge a 'yes' vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Representative Sam Wolf."

Wolf: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. I don't know whether Representative Jones brought this out, but I think in the case of one of the claimants here, Mr. Schmidt, I think that the amount contained in this Bill is about one-third of the total bill that the individual submitted at the time, and I believe that the \$13,000 is a compromise figure. I think it is a just one, and I think it should be considered and paid by this Assembly."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 96 'aye', and 12 'no', and the Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. 1705."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1705, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Cannabis Control Act, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ebbesen."

Ebbesen: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Senate Bill 1705 merely addresses itself to legislation that was passed several Sessions ago in which we amended the Cannabis Control Act to allow under the Research Section for the use of marijuana to treat the side effects of cancer patients who were taking chemotherapy and also the uncontrolled cases of glaucoma. Now this merely adds...we thought at that time under the legislation we allowed for anything additional to be automatically included, however, it was not interpreted that way, and what Senate Bill 1705 does is allow continued research into the effect of cannabis on radiation for people who are undergoing that



who are cancer victims, and I would appreciate a fair vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Any...any discussion? Representative Getty."

Getty: "Will the Gentleman yield?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Getty: "Representative Ebbesen, under present law, there is a provision that such...in such other procedures certified to be medically necessary, that the appropriate cannabinoids may be used. By this amendatory Act, do you mean in any way to reduce the language or the applicability of that phrase such other certified to be medically necessary, such other procedures certified to be medically necessary?"

Ebbesen: "No, I do not intend to reduce it, and if in fact, I am aware of the language you just read because the... Representative Getty, it was through your efforts and foresight here that this Bill originally came into existence and as I indicated in my previous remarks that we thought that we covered all of this, and... but I do not in any way intend to restrict this and eliminate that language. It doesn't eliminate the language, but restrict it by just including the three aspects. And if that, in fact, is what it does, I would be happy to take it back to Second, and if we have to further amend it to make sure that we're not doing that."

Getty: "I want to be sure that the legislative intent is clear here that by adding this additional item, you in no way intend to detract from the pre-existing language that such procedure found or certified to be medically necessary would also be covered under the ambit of the existing statutes."

Ebbesen: "That is the legislative intent as you have just expressed it."

Getty: "Thank you very much."



Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Ebbesen."

Ebbesen: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I would...if there is no further questions, I would just move for a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is 'Shall this Bill pass?'. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Okay... Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 144 'aye', and three 'no'. This Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. 1707."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1707, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Unified Code of Corrections, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Grossi, out of the record. 1793, Representative Neff, 1793. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1793, a Bill for an Act making appropriations to the Comptroller, Third Reading of the Bill."

Neff: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Senate Bill 1793 sponsored by Senator McMillan in the Senate, appropriates...appropriates...26...58 dollars and 48 cents to 'Hershel Neal'. Now this is money that he paid in. It was a misunderstanding. He had been a school teacher for six and one half years and was drafted into the Army in 1942. When he got out of the services, he taught school for awhile, and he checked with the teachers' retirement system, and at that time the law was that if you would receive military service credit on the same basis as a teacher. He reinlisted in 1964 after sending a check in for this amount to the teachers' retirement system. The teachers' retirement system verified that the check was received on March 25, 1964. He...as he reinlisted for military service under the assumption that the additional military



service would be allowed on his teachers' retirement system, but in 1967 that law was changed, and...and they could not use credit...receive this credit. After checking with the Pension Board, they told him that the law had been changed, and he would not receive this credit, and that they would return the money that he had paid in to receive the credit. He received a check but did not cash it. This is a fault of his, but he was told if he cashed the check that they thought it was a mistake on the Pension Board,...they thought it was a mistake, and if he cashed it he would probably never get it. So he did not cash the check. I suggested a year ago that he go through the Court of Claims, but after trying to go through the Court of Claims, it was over three years old, and so he could not get it. So all we're asking here is that we return the money of a check that he received. It is not costing the state any money. This is money that he paid into the pension fund, and I would appreciate a favorable vote."

Speaker Redmond: "That's 1793. Is that correct? I think in your comment you said 1703. It is 1793. Is that... Any discussion? The question is 'Shall this Bill pass?' Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 125 'aye', and one 'no'. The Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed."

Clerk O'Brien: "Representative Bradley in the Chair."

Speaker Bradley: "Brown 'aye'...Braun, 'aye'. Bradley, 'aye' on that last re...call. On the Calendar appears Senate Bill 1841."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1841, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act making an appropriation..."

Speaker Bradley: "Mr. Williamson, what purpose do you rise?"

Williamson: "I don't believe that you announced the Roll Call on that last Bill, 1793."



Speaker Bradley: "On that question there are 127 'ayes'...129 'ayes', tow 'nays'. The Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed."

Williamson: "Thank you."

Speaker Bradley: "Read the Bill a Third time, or did you, Mr. Clerk?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1841, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act making appropriations for the Illinois State Scholarship Commission, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Bradley: "The Lady from Cook, Mrs. Braun."

Braun: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Senate Bill 1841 is a supplemental appropriation for the Illinois State Scholarship Commission. It will provide money for services that have already been rendered by the colleges that have already been received by the young people who are beneficiaries of this scholarship program. I encourage your affirmative vote."

Speaker Bradley: "Discussion? Discussion? Hearing none, the question is 'Shall this Bill pass?'. All in favor signify by voting 'aye', opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wi...Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Pierce, to explain his vote. Mr. Jaffe, would you let Mr. Pierce use your mic please? Turn on Mr. Pierce..."

Pierce: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, we know why the Minority Party, the Party the Governor is not voting for this appropriation. They're not voting for this appropriation because it fulfills the obligation of the State of Illinois towards the education of handicapped children Amendment was put on this Bill...an Amendment was put on this Bill which reimburses school districts for money they have expended pursuant to our mandate to educate all handicapped children in the state. Because that Amendment was put on,



the soreheads in the Governor's office who claim to be for full funding for special education, but are not telling the truth when they say that, have instructed the Republican Leadership not to vote for this. Now they are voting for it, and I think it will pass."

Speaker Bradley: "Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Lady from Cook, Mrs. Hallstrom, to explain her vote."

Hallstrom: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. First of all, may I please ask for your support on this Bill. The Scholarship Commission Bill is a very important one. These are young people who have already received services through the Scholarship Commission, and this is a Bill that the state owes. In regard to my Amendment, we did spend some time on that the other day. This is not in any way a blank check to special education. School districts had spent this money because in the statute it says that the school districts shall receive \$6,250 per professional for every professional person they have in special education. Local school districts are getting it from all sides. They have spent this money. These children need to be educated. I appreciated your support on the floor last week. I would ask you please to vote 'yes' on this Bill. Thank you."

Speaker Bradley: "Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Conti."

Conti: "Mr. Speaker, I want...just can hold up for a minute. Can I ask the Sponsor a question?"

Speaker Bradley: "Well, we're a little past that point in time unless she says that she will respond, and will somebody vote Mr. Vinson's switch 'aye' please? Mr. Conti. The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 116 'ayes', and 28 'nays'. Do you wish to... do you persist in the verification, Mr. Ryan...requests verification. The Clerk will take the record on 116 'ayes',



28 'nays'...28 'nays'. Mrs. Braun, do you wish to Poll the Absentees? We'll Poll the Absentees."

Clerk O'Brien: "Poll of the Absentees. Bullock, Campbell, Casey, Donovan, Ralph Dunn, Ewell, Dwight Friedrich, Gaines, Garmisa, Hanahan, Hoffman, Huff, Kent, Klosak, Kucharski, Laurino, Lechowicz, Leon, Leverenz, Preston, Schlickman, Stearney, C.M. Stiehl, Telscer, Watson, White, Willer, and Woodyard."

Speaker Bradley: "Poll of the Affirmative Roll. Donovan wishes to be recorded as voting 'aye'. Alright...Darrow, you're recorded 'no' now...from 'no' to 'aye'. Record Mr... Darrow as voting 'aye'. Right. Leverenz, 'aye'...'no'... Leverenz, 'aye'...Leverenz, 'aye'. Ebbesen...from 'aye' to 'no'. Call the Affirmative Roll."

Clerk O'Brien: "Poll of the affirmative vote. Ackerman, Alexander, Balanoff, Beatty, Bell, Bianco, Birchler, Birkinbine, Bluthardt, Borchers, Boucek, Bowman, Bradley, Braun, Breslin, Burnidge, Capparelli, Catania, Chapman, Christensen, Conti,..."

Speaker Bradley: "Mr. Conti, what purpose do you rise?"

Conti: "I was checking the Bill out, and I heard you say all voted who wish. I pushed the wrong button. I would like to be voted 'no' on this."

Speaker Bradley: "Record the Gentleman as voting 'no'."

Clerk O'Brien: "Continuing the Poll of the Affirmative. Cullerton, Currie, Darrow, Dawson, Deuster, DiPrima, Domico, Donovan, Doyle, John Dunn, Dyer, Epton, Farley, Flinn, Virginia Frederick, Getty, Giorgi, Goodwin, Greiman, Griesheimer, Grossi, Hallstrom, Hannig, Harris, Henry, Hudson, Huskey, Jaffe, Dave Jones, Emil Jones, Kane, Katz, Keane, Kelly, Kornowicz, Kosinski, Krska, Kulas, Leverenz, Macdonald..."

Speaker Bradley: "Preston, 'aye'."

Clerk O'Brien: "Continuing the Poll of the Affirmative. Madigan, Margulas, Marovitz, Matijevich, Matula, Mautino, McClain, McCourt, McGrew, McMaster, McPike,



Molloy, Mugalian,..."

Speaker Bradley: "Mr. Ryan, Mr. Flinn wishes to be verified.
Is that alright? Proceed."

Clerk O'Brien: "Mulcahey, Murphy, Neff, Oblinger, O'Brien,
Patrick, Piel, Pierce, Pouncey, Preston, Pullen,
Rea, Reed,..."

Speaker Bradley: "Mr. Henry wishes to be verified, Mr. Ryan.
Mr. Henry...alright. Proceed."

Clerk O'Brien: "Reilly, Richmond, Rigney, Robbins, Ronan,
Ropp, Sandquist, Satterthwaite, Schisler, Schneider,
Schoeberlein, Schraeder, Sharp, Slape, Steczo, E.G.
Steele, Stuffle, Swanstrom, Taylor, Terzich, Tuerk,
Van Duynes, Vinson, Vitek, VonBoeckman, Williams,
Williamson, Winchester, Sam Wolf, Younge, Yourell,

Speaker Bradley: "We have 118 'ayes'. Questions of the
Affirmative Roll Call. Winchester, you want to be
recorded as voting 'no'? From 'aye' to 'no'. 117
'ayes'. Questions, Mr. Ryan."

Ryan: "Representative Alexander."

Speaker Bradley: "Alexander, is she there? Not in her
seat. Is she in the chambers? How is she recorded?"

Clerk O'Brien: "The Lady is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Speaker Bradley: "Take her off the Roll."

Ryan: "Balanoff."

Speaker Bradley: "Balanoff is in her seat. Balanoff is in her
own chair."

Ryan: "Bianco."

Speaker Bradley: "Bianco? He's in his chair."

Ryan: "Birkinbine."

Speaker Bradley: "Birkinbine is not in his chair. Is he
in the chamber? How is he recorded?"

Clerk O'Brien: "The Gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Speaker Bradley: "Take him off the Roll and put Mrs.
Alexander back on. She's..."

Ryan: "Capparelli."



Speaker Bradley: "Capparelli is in his seat."

Ryan: "I want to withdraw my request, Mr. Speaker."

Ryan: "Okay, what's the count now? 100...On this question there are 116 'ayes', and 26...28 'nos'. This Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Mr...Ryan, Mr. Ryan, the only one you took off was Mr. Birkinbine. We'd like to put him back on. He was here. You withdrew your request. Is that alright with you, Sir? Well, we're just wondering. He's on your side of the aisle, and he is the only one you took off. If there is no objection, we'll put Mr. Birkinbine back on. House...or Senate Bill 1844, Mr. Capparelli. Read the Bill a third time."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1844, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Motor Vehicle Retail Installment Sales Act, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Capparelli."

Capparelli: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen, Senate Bill 1844 is an important Bill which we will hope stimulates the auto sales in Illinois. Senate Bill 1844 increases the rate cap on motor vehicle installment loans to reflect the current interest rate. It will enable banks and finance companies handling installment loans to make more money available to new and used car buyers who need transportation. Under current rate structure, loan money is being diverted to other sources. Under this Bill, the propos...the proposed increase cap will be \$12 per \$100 on new cars and \$13 on one or two year old cars. I ask for a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Bradley: "Discussion? Discussion? Hearing none, the question is 'Shall this Bill pass?'. All in favor signify by voting 'aye', opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question we have 124 'ayes', 12 'nays', eight voting 'present'. This Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby



passed. Senate Bill 1993. Is Mr. Telscer in the chambers? Mr. Marovitz, this Bill is hyphenated Cosponsor with Mr. Telscer. Mr. Telscer is not on the floor. Do you want to proceed with the Bill?" 1993...Take it out of the record? Senate Bill 2001, Mr. McBroom. Read the Bill a Third time."

Clerk Leone: "Senate Bill 2001, a Bill for an Act to amend the Civil Administrative Code of Illinois, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Kankakee, Mr. McBroom."

McBroom: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, this Bill would provide that the state would indemnify all of its employees for any action that is not willful which may occur during the course of their employment. I would appreciate a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Bradley: "Discussion? Hearing none, the question is 'Shall this Bill pass?'. All in favor signify by voting 'aye', opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 144 'ayes', one voting 'no'. This Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. The...Representative Hoffman on the floor? Mrs. Pullen...alright...do you want 1378 called? Out of the record? 1506, Mr. Mahar, did you want...out of the record. And...Mr. Vinson on 1614... out of the record. 1707, Mr. Grossi, did you take that out of the record? Senate Bill 1998 on Short Debate, Mr. Steele."

Clerk Leone: "Senate Bill 1998, a Bill for an Act relating to the investigation and prevention of fire, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Madison, Mr. Steele."

Steele: "Yes, Senate Bill 1998 is a measure which changes the reporting date for fire chief to the State Fire Marshal office. At the present time they must report a fire within seven days. This changes so that those reports can be made



monthly. It is supported by the Fire Chiefs of Illinois, the Fire Protection District, and the fire services in general. It...is a good Bill which we urge your support for."

Speaker Bradley: "Discussion? Hearing none, the question is 'Shall this Bill pass?'. All in favor signify by voting 'aye', opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 142 'ayes', no 'nays'. This Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Representative Peters on the floor. Yes, the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Peters."

Peters: "Mr. Speaker, I would ask permission of the House to move Senate Bill 1639 back to the order of Second Reading for the purposes of an Agreed Amendment."

Speaker Bradley: "Any objections? The Bill returned to Second Reading."

Peters: "Mr. Speaker, if you would recognize Representative Harris for the Amendment."

Speaker Bradley: "Let's...see...if the...has the Amendment been distributed? Okay. Alright. The Gentleman from Williamson, Mr. Harris."

Clerk Leone: "Floor Amendment #5, Kelly-Leinenweber, amends Senate Bill 1639 as amended and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "Now wait a minute. Whose Amendment was that? Kelly-Leinenweber? Kelly..."

Peters: "Mr. Speaker, neither of the Sponsors of this Amendment indicated to me that they had this motion pending, and that being the case, I would now withdraw my motion to move this Bill to Second Reading and put it back on Third."

Speaker Bradley: "I don't think we can do that, Mr. Peters. And we have another Amendment also. Whose the other... that is the one we want. We have two other Amendments besides Mr. Harris' Amendment, Mr. Peters."

Peters: "Well, Mr. Speaker, let's go with it. I mean, we'll



be in Conference Committee with 50 of these Bills. What's the hell the difference? One more."

Speaker Bradley: "Mr. Ryan, what purpose do you rise?"

Ryan: "Mr. Speaker, was this Amendment #5 to this Bill?"

Speaker Bradley: "There are Amendments #5, 6, and 7 have been filed..."

Ryan: "Have they been distributed?"

Speaker Bradley: "They asked for the question I ask and they indicated..."

Ryan: "I don't have it, Mr. Speaker. I don't have #5, 6, or 7."

Speaker Bradley: "Five and six have been distributed. Seven has not been distributed. By Mr. Kelly...on Amendment #5."

Kelly: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. Amendment #5 to Senate Bill 1639 would provide \$50,000 to the Department of Public Health for the printing and distribution of materials as mandated under the Illinois Abortion Law of 1975. When we passed the Senate Bill 47 in 1975, we did not provide the funding...there was a separate Bill that never went through that would, under the informed consent provisions where the physician would inform the mother seeking the abortion, certain printed material. This is the funding that would provide it, and I move to adopt Amendment #5."

Speaker Bradley: "Discussion? Discussion? The Gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #5 to Senate Bill 1639. All in favor of the Gentleman's motion signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it. Mr. Peters."

Peters: "Mr. Speaker, Roll Call."

Speaker Bradley: "On this question, all in favor signify by voting 'aye', opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Peters."

Peters: "Mr. Speaker, just in terms of explaining my vote, this Amendment is going to end up going on, and I consider



myself to be a pro-life voter and take that issue seriously, but I think it does a disservice to the entire question of pro-life and pro-choice to attempt to tag these Amendments on every kind of piece of legislation that comes about. The constituencies we serve know where we are at on the issue, and I think it does nothing but cause more problems to continue with this kind of activity."

Speaker Bradley: "Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 83 'ayes', and 45 'nays', and the Gentleman's motion is adopted. Further Amendments?"

Clerk Leone: "Floor Amendment #6, Pierce, amends Senate Bill 1639 as amended and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "Mr. Pierce, is your mic working now?"

Pierce: "Mr. Speaker, this Bill provides additional funds for services for municipalities to serve the deaf. This has been funded, but not fully funded. There are many municipalities that are waiting for their service...for their equipment to come from the state so they can provide the emergency services for the deaf, and I...I ask the adoption of Amendment #6."

Speaker Bradley: "Discussion? The Gentleman from Wayne, Mr. Robbins."

Robbins: "Has this Amendment been distributed?"

Speaker Bradley: "Yes it has."

Robbins: "When?"

Speaker Bradley: "When? We don't put the time on it. It has been distributed. That's all that has to be done."

Robbins: "I just wondered. I didn't have it, and I do try to keep the Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "You don't have one on your side?"

Robbins: "No. I didn't have it, and we didn't have a copy of the one...of the one we voted on prior."

Speaker Bradley: "Would one of the Democratic pages take over an Amendment? The Lady from Cook, Mrs. Pullen."



Pullen: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I think since I was the Sponsor of the legislation that required these...devices for the deaf to be installed in public safety agencies, that I should indicate to the House that the state had never made a promise to all municipalities that they would be funded on this, that the devices are somewhere between \$250 and \$700 each. The Municipal League was fully aware of the fact that there was only a partial appropriation at the time that the Bill was passed, and did not vigorously oppose the Bill in spite of that fact, and really the Sponsor of the Amendment indicates that the municipalities are waiting to install the equipment until they get the machines from the state, but they were required to have them in as of January 1, and there was never a promise from the state that there would be machines from the state. So, you know, you all vote the way you want to on funding this, but I just thought that I should inform you as Sponsor of the original legislation that there was no promise made originally that the Gentleman is now asking us to fulfill."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Pierce, to close."

Pierce: "Mr. Speaker, the Lady is essentially correct. I don't argue with her. She sponsored a very good concept. Certain communities were higher on the list because maybe they were bigger. Maybe her community got funding because she sponsored the Bill. But the idea of the Bill, and her idea is to help the deaf and to provide tele-communication devices for those who are hearing impaired. Now, there are certain villages in the state around Lake area in my county, and others that may not be as big, as politically powerful as some others, and they didn't get the funding. What we're doing as... here is saying, Representative Pullen had a very good idea. We're not saying the Municipal League was



promised this or that. We're not saying the villages were promised this or that. I never said that. All I'm saying is we want to fully implement her good idea by providing the balance of the funds, the Department of Public Health told me, would provide the services... tele-communication services for the hearing impaired, and those communities who fell below the line and were not funded this last year. It is that simple. It is a relatively modest amount. It may save many lives which is why the Lady sponsored the Bill in the first place, and I urge the adoption of Amendment #6."

Speaker Bradley: "The question is 'Shall this motion be adopted?'

All in favor of the Gentleman's motion signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', opposed 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's...Mr. Ryan wants a Roll Call. All in favor of the Gentleman's motion signify by voting 'aye', opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 65 'ayes', and 51 'nays', and the Gentleman's motion prevails.

Further Amendments?"

Clerk Leone: "Floor Amendment #7, Harris, amends Senate Bill 1639 as amended."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Williamson, Mr. Harris."

Harris: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This Amendment is a very important Amendment in my judgement. It the 'record to page and line number' of House Amendment #1 on page 14 line by deleting \$135,000 and inserting therefore, \$215,000 adding \$80,000 to the budget for the purpose of. In the south part of the state, several counties have quarentine for all dogs due to a rabies epidemic. Just recently several counties have a state...county-wide quarentine. In Williamson County...In Williamson County, there was a rabid skunk discovered just yesterday. There are over 100 children who have been subjected to rabid animals



within the last three and one half weeks. More...many children are taking the innoculation to prevent rabies. There is a new rabies serum that has just been approved in the past few days whereby you take five innoculations rather than 21. We all know that rabies is a fatal disease. This \$80,000 allocates money that is much needed to the state for this epidemic. It is a very, very important Amendment, and I ask for a favorable vote."

Speaker Bradley: "Discussion? All in favor of the adoption of the Amendment signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it. The Amendment is adopted. Further Amendments?"

Clerk Leone: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Third Reading. Alright. Mr. Peters on Senate Bill 1589 with response to Rule 61 returning that Bill to Appropriations II Committee. 1589."

Peters: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I have discussed this with the Sponsor of the legislation as well as the Chairman of the Appropriations Committee, and because of some unanswered and pending questions, we would move for the approval of the House to have Senate Bill 1589 recommitted to the Appropriations Committee for further hearing."

Speaker Bradley: "Mr. Ryan, yes, Sir. ...Mr. Ryan, they're alright...if there is no objection, we'll use the Attendance Roll Call on the motion to return Senate Bill 1589 to Appropriations II Committee. We have some requests for change of votes. Why don't we... Alright, the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, was Representative Willer excused on the Attendance Roll Call?"

Speaker Bradley: "No, she was not."

Madigan: "Would the records show that Representative Willer is excused because of an illness in the family."

Speaker Bradley: "It will so show."

Madigan: "And, Mr. Speaker, would the records show that



Representative Laurino was excused because of illness?"

Speaker Bradley: "The records will so show. Mr...Mr. Ryan, any excused absences, Mr. Ryan? Alright, any announcements? Mr. Matijevich."

Matijevich: "The Members of Appropriations I, I am aware that some of you have a conflict with the task force, but I would appreciate if the Members would come down, I guess, immediately after adjournment now, in Room 114 for our Appropriations I Committee, and those who have task force meeting with...if you would be there so we can get you on the quorum call, I don't think we will have as much problems with the meeting. Thank you."

Speaker Bradley: "Alright...alright. Mr. Peters for an announcement."

Peters: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. If the Members of the... Republican Members...Minority Members of the Appropriations II Committee would meet immediately after adjournment in the office of the Minority Leader, Room 300. Immediately after adjournment in Representative Ryan's office. Thank you."

Speaker Bradley: "Further announcements? The Lady from Cook, Mrs. Chapman."

Chapman: "Mr. Speaker, Appropriations II will meet at 2 p.m. in Room 118. Democrats will meet immediately upon... oh, it's five after two. Deomocrats will meet immediately upon adjournment in 122."

Speaker Bradley: "Any further...any other announcements? If not, the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Madigan, moves that the House stands adjourned...Oh, Mr. Farley, the Gentleman from Cook, for an announcement."

Farley: "Yes, I would like to remind the Members of Labor and Commerce that there will be a meeting in C-1 at four o'clock."

Speaker Bradley: "Alright, anything else? Mr. Madigan moves that the House stands adjourned until 12 o'clock noon



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tomorrow. Everybody in favor of his motion signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The House stands adjourned until 12 o'clock noon tomorrow."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Lady from Adams, Mrs. Kent. "Timer's on. " Kent; "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Volume is what we need in the gasohol program. If more people use it, the price will come down. And that is what this will do is encourage them to use it and therefore the volume of gasohol will help our energy situation. I'm glad that you're voting green." "

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from Wayne, Mr. Robbins. The timer's on."

Robbins: "I would like to point out one thing that hasn't been brought up. Illinois is the largest producer of alcohol for fuel of any place in the United States. We should continue to support the industries of Illinois."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 114 'ayes', 35 'nos', four recorded as 'present'. This Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. Senate Bill 1524."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1524, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Criminal Code of 1961. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Daniels."

Daniels: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like leave of the House to bring " this back to Second Reading for purposes of an Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any objections? Hearing none, bring the Bill back to Second Reading."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2..."

Daniels: "I don't think that's been distributed yet, so if



we could just hold it, come back to it as soon as it's..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Amendment has not been distributed. The Bill will remain on Second Reading."

Daniels: "Thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "1541. Take the Bill out of the record.

1543, Mr. Taylor? Out of the record. 1622, Mr. Reilly."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1622, a Bill for an Act making appropriations for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Department of Human Rights and Human Rights Commission. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from Morgan, Mr. Reilly."

Reilly: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Senate Bill 1622 appropriates three million, nine hundred and ten thousand dollars for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Department of Human Rights. This is down some 90 thousand dollars by an agreed Amendment between the two sides of the aisle in Committee. I would be glad to answer any questions. Otherwise, I would ask for a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? The Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Skinner."

Skinner: "Would the Sponsor please tell us how many cases the FEPC and its successor agency, the Department for which this budget is designated, have initiated on the basis of sex discrimination in pay since Representative Corneal Davis sponsored the Bill in 1974, if there have been any?"

Reilly: "I will be glad to get that information for you. I don't know. The successor agency doesn't come into business until July 1, but I don't know historically how many have been."

Skinner: "Well, we've just been through a tortuous debate on the Equal Rights Amendment and most of the proponents primary concern is that women are not being paid as much



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
