

Speaker Redmond: "House will come to order. Members please be in their seats. Be led in prayer by Reverend Krueger, the House Chaplain."

Reverend Krueger: "In the Name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost. Amen. Oh, Lord, bless this House to Thy service this day. Amen. C.C. Colton said, 'That which we acquire with most difficulty, we retain the longest; as those who have run into fortune are commonly more careful of it than those by whom it may have been inherited'. Let us pray; Almighty God, source of all power and good, the ultimate Creator of all that we have, and all that we are, we praise Thy holy name this day and express from grateful hearts our thankfulness for Thy concern and care for us.

Particularly are we most grateful for the heritage of our democracy and the freedom under which we live and are governed. As Members of this House of Representatives, may we be steadfast in our preservation and perfection of the cherished ideals upon which this great republic was founded. And may we ever be constant in our concern for the welfare, for the good, for the rights and for the privileges and responsibilities of those whom we do serve, the peoples of this great State of Illinois. All of which we ask in Thy holy name, amen."

Speaker Redmond: "Pledge of allegiance."

Members: "I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and to the Republic for which it stands, one nation, under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

Speaker Redmond: "The cognizant authority has already been

advised that it's cold in the chambers. Roll Call for attendance. House will be in order. Mr. Clerk, got anything? Introduction and First Reading."

Clerk O'Brien: "Introduction and First Reading of the Bills: House Bill 3637, Huff-Henry, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Regional Transportation Authority Act. First Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Former Member is visiting the floor, former Member Edgar is on the floor. Where is former Member Edgar? There he is. Former Member. Former Member Ben Harpstrite. Where is Ben Harpstrite? There he is. Former Member. Almost looks like a Senator. Oh, former Member Bill O'Daniels. Bill O'Daniels. Former Member Frank Giglio. Representative Collins, did you have a comment on that district?"

Collins: "Correction, Mr. Speaker. Former Member Giglio is Member elect Giglio."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay."

Collins: "And, Mr. Speaker, may I make an introduction?"

Speaker Redmond: "Go right ahead."

Collins: "In the gallery to my left is the seventh grade class from the Raymond Lincolnwood School from the district represented by Representatives Oblinger, Jones and Kane."

Speaker Redmond: "Sam Vinson is back with his pipe. In case you read the paper, Sam had given up smoking. Representative Polk."

Polk: "Mr. Speaker, would the record also show that Representative Dyer and Representative Molloy are

requesting to be absent due to illness?"

Speaker Redmond: "Any objection? Hearing none, the record will so show. Representative Collins."

Collins: "Mr. Speaker, would you add Representative Schoeberlein to that list?"

Speaker Redmond: "Any objection? Representative Schoeberlein's name will be added. Representative Katz out there? Will he come up here? House will come to order. On the Order of House Bills, Second Reading, appearing on page two of the Calendar, 3621."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 3621, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Office of Auditor General. ~~Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments.~~"

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 3622."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 3622, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Secretary of State. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 3623."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 3623, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act to establish a system of merit employment in certain counties. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 3624."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 3624, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Municipal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. On the Supplemental Calendar #1 under the Order of Motions appears a motion with respect to House Bill 3630. Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, House Bill 3630 was heard in the Rules Committee yesterday and what.. it has to do with the Act just signed into law by the Governor that has to do with not-for-profit raffles and chances. And this doesn't make any substantive changes in the law. All it does is clarify some of the language that the legal departments throughout the state have been calling about and I've talked to the Leadership on both sides of the aisle. And I'd like to move this Bill to Second Reading, Second Legislative Day, if I have permission of the House."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pullen."

Pullen: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this Bill has a number of changes in it dealing with the recently signed law concerning raffles. And I think that this ought to go to Committee for consideration. There are at least four changes in this law which are substantive and I would oppose this motion and urge the other Members of the House to do likewise."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hoffman."

Hoffman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I have an inquiry of the

Chair. Mr. Speaker, how many..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hoffman?"

Hoffman: "Excuse me, Mr. Speaker. I don't mean to interrupt a heavy conversation, but how many votes does this take to carry this motion that the Representative from Rockford is proposing?"

Speaker Redmond: "107."

Hoffman: "107. Fine. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker, and I'm sorry for interrupting."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, I've talked to the Leadership on the Republican side of the aisle. What happened, this is one of the first Bills that we have that we've just enacted that has a sunset feature in it. This Bill self-destructs January 1st, 1983. But some of the legal departments around the state have asked about some of the language and we've cleared up the language. There are no substantive changes. I don't mind going to Committee with it, but I'd like to expedite this because, as I said, this has a sunset feature in it. This Bill will expire January 1st, 1983 and we want to give it a fair shot. So I promise any Member of the House that I'll hold this Bill on Second Reading till they're satisfied that what I'm telling you is the truth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Friedrich."

Friedrich: "Well, Mr. Speaker, it was my understanding from the Sponsor that he was willing to let it go to Committee and agreed for it to go. And, I would have to oppose this even though, despite his explanation.."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giorgi, out of the record?  
How about 3636?"

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like to.. I want to go with 3636.  
This is the Bill that has to do with what occurred in  
some of the counties this last Session. Winnebago and  
some of the larger counties ended up with a single tax  
Bill with a single payment day because of the problem  
with overlapping districts, taxing districts, and this  
is to clear that up so that the county clerk can send  
out estimated tax bills but not rectify the change  
till the following year. I've talked, again, to the  
Leadership on both sides of the aisle. And there  
doesn't seem to be any objection to this 3636."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Simms."

Simms: "Well, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the  
House, I would join Representative Giorgi in urging  
that the House accept Representative Giorgi's motion  
and bypass Committee in order that the same situation  
will not happen again in two or three of the larger  
counties in the state. It's extremely essential. It  
was a devastating factor in our county to the  
taxpayers having a one time payment bill that they had  
to face and this will help to alleviate that problem.  
And I would join my colleague on the other side of the  
aisle in urging that this bypass Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brummer."

Brummer: "Yes, Mr. Speaker. As one of the new Members here  
I don't understand how we're supposed to know what  
these Bills do or where we're supposed to be able to  
look at to determine the content of them."

Speaker Redmond: "Weren't the Bills distributed?"

Representative Brummer."

Brummer: "Have these Bills been distributed?"

Speaker Redmond: "Have they been distributed? No."

Brummer: "Well, I don't know how we're supposed to make an intelligent vote with regard to what I guess is a motion to bypass Committee when we don't even have the Bills, analysis, Synopsis, or anything in front of us and with all due respect to Representative Giorgi, sometimes his explanations leave a little bit to be desired. Could the Sponsor indicate what the Bill does?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giorgi, will you..."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, this will allow the county clerks that have problems with the overlapping taxing districts in the various counties, to allow the county clerk to send out estimated tax bills based on that last year's assessment and what it does, it will allow the county clerk to rectify the change the following year rather than the same year. And that's because some of the counties had.. experienced a one tax cycle.. one tax bill cycle with one payment by the taxpayer, causing a lot of frustration and bitterness. This Bill has been approved by the County Clerks Association, Urban Counties Association. And I'll hold the Bill on Second Reading till Representative Brummer is satisfied that the Bill meets with his approval."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brummer."

Brummer: "Yes. Representative, the counties currently have authority to estimate."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "But that same law forces the county clerk to make

the adjustment the same tax year. We're allowing the county clerk to make the adjustment the following tax year because of a savings involved."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brummer. Brummer?"

Brummer: "Yes. There's obviously going to be a loss of revenue at that point to the various taxing districts. You know, I think this is a serious item. I don't understand completely the legislation. Apparently the Representative is indicating that the second installment would be an estimate also in which case obviously the various taxing districts would not receive the revenue that they had levied for. They now receive it one year late. They would, in effect, be receiving the full payment two years late. I think this is a type of concept that quite possibly ought to be examined in Committee to allow the various taxing districts, where... to present testimony with regard to that. It's not a problem that's unique to the large counties at all. It applies in every county in each of the 13 counties. And many of them are very small in my district. And I simply think it ought to be examined in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is... Any other discussion? The question is on the Gentleman's motion that House Bill 3636 be advanced to the Order of Second Reading without reference to Committee. Those in favor vote 'aye'; opposed vote 'no'. Requires 107 votes. Have all voted who wish? Representative Birkinbine."

Birkinbine: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I don't think we've received any of the Bills that are on Supplemental Calendar #1. I think the House Bills that have been



distributed go as high as 3624."

Speaker Redmond: "Parliamentarian advises me that the only requirement is that it be on the Calendar, that you don't have to have them printed to put this motion so, as far as it being in order, he advises me that it is. Representative Dunn. Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 115 'aye' and 21 'no'. And the motion carried and House Bill 3636 will be placed on the Order of Second Reading. 3628, Representative Chapman on the floor? 3634, Representative Taylor? Representative James Taylor."

Taylor: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House.

House Bill 3634 is an awards Bill for the Court of Claims for \$600,000. These awards have already been adjudicated by the Court of Claims and we normally approve those. And for that reason, Mr. Speaker, I move to advance to Second Reading House Bill 3634 without reference to Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? Representative Hoffman, will you please sit down? Campbell, will you please sit down? Senator Sarunas will you sit down? Representative Wolf. Representative Wolf."

Wolf, J: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I just wanted to say that this Bill appears to be in good order and that we would have no objections on this side of the aisle to its advancement."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor indicate by voting 'aye'; opposed by voting 'no'. Representative Bower, please be in order. Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the

record. On this question there's 129 'aye' and 7 'no'. And the motion carried. House Bill 3634 is on the Order of Second Reading. 3635? Terzich?"

Terzich: "Yes, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 3635 pertains to House Bill 2012 which allows pension contributions to be tax deductible for federal income tax purposes. This Bill was passed approximately a year ago with the effective date of January 1, 1981 after a Governor's amendatory veto. This was subject to approval of an IRS ruling which we have not received. I wrote to the Governor and to the Leadership and we've heard this in the Pension Laws Commission and what the Bill does is simply change the effective date from January 1, 1981 to January 1, 1982 so the IRS approval could be forthcoming. And I would urge support of this motion."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question's on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor vote 'aye'; opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 140 'aye' and 5 'no'. And the motion carried. House Bill 3635 will be placed on the Order of Second Reading. Introduction and First Reading."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 3638, Yourell-Friedrich, et. al., a Bill for an Act in relation to state mandates amending certain Acts herein named. First Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "I forgot to announce earlier that lame duck, Representative Walsh, is in the chamber. On page three, on the Order of Total Veto Motions, appears House Bill 426. Representative Oblinger? Out

of the record. 986, Representative Rea? Out of the record. 1221? Ralph Dunn? Representative Ralph Dunn? Out of the record. 2845, Representative Henry? Out of the record. 2847, Representative Kosinski? Out of the record. 2892? Representative Sumner? Representative Sumner? Out of the record. 3153, Representative Stuffle? Out of the record. 3166, Representative Campbell? Out of the record. 3167? Out of the record. 3505, Representative Ropp? Out of the record. 3542. We'll take this one out of the record. On page five, Reduction Item Veto Motions, House Bill 3027, Representative Wyvetter Younge. Representative Schraeder? Out of the record. Amendatory Veto Motions on page five. House Bill 1009. Representative Schraeder. Out of the record. 1673? Bowman? Representative Bowman."

Bowman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. The amendatory veto is a very simple one striking the last phrase of the last sentence. The Governor's staff felt that this would represent an impairment of contract. I'm not an attorney. I can't speak to that particular point. I do know that that was their feeling. From my perspective, I think it helps the people I was intending to help in the first place. If the Governor wants it that way, I'm perfectly happy to accept it."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion?..."

Bowman: "I move we accept."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is, 'Shall the House concur ... Shall the House accept the Governor's specific recommendation for change with respect to House Bill

1673 by adoption of the Amendment?' All in favor vote 'aye'; opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 132 'aye' and 12 'no'. Representative Borchers, 'aye'. And the motion carried and the House does accept the recommendations for change. 2227? Out of the record. 2351? Representative Yourell? Representative Borchers, please don't bother Representative Yourell. 2351. Out of the record. Okay, now you can bother him. 2876, Representative Holloy? Out of the record. 2997? Brummer?"

Brummer: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. I filed a motion to accept the Governor's amendatory veto on 2997. 2997 as originally introduced dealt with a particular problem dealing with mental health agencies. It passed out of the House with a very large majority, I think 150 some votes. In the Senate they added a provision that required the local sheriff to transport mental health patients to mental health facilities and to be reimbursed by the state for that service. That was not part of the original Bill. Subsequently the House concurred in that Senate Amendment. The Governor's amendatory veto deletes the provisions of that Section requiring the local county sheriff to transport the mental health patients at the state expense. And I would move to accept the Governor's amendatory veto."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is, 'Shall the House accept the Governor's specific recommendations for change with respect to House Bill 2997 by adoption of the Amendment?' All in favor vote

'aye'; opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 138 'aye' and 7 'no'. The motion carries. And the House does accept the Governor's specific recommendations for change regarding House Bill 2997 by adoption of the Amendment. On page six, 3007. Out of the record. 3070, Representative Anderson. Out of the record. 319...3179, Representative Brummer. Representative Getty, will you please sit down?"

Brummer: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, 3179 is a similar situation to the last one in that the original Bill introduced by Representative Bower and myself ~~authorized municipalities to issue revenue bonds for~~ the purpose of medical clinics. That passed through the House by a very large majority. In the Senate, the Senate placed on the Bill as an Amendment another House Bill that had passed out of the House, but it failed to pass out of the Senate Rules Committee, and that was a Bill which authorized the establishment of ambulance districts. As you know, the concept of authorizing the establishment of additional taxing districts has been a sometimes controversial issue. In any event, with the Amendment on it, it passed through the House and the Senate, went to the Governor's desk. The Governor's amendatory veto deletes all the provisions dealing with the ambulance district law and leaves intact the provisions dealing with the Medical Revenue Facilities Bond Act. I would move to accept the Governor's amendatory veto."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is, 'Shall

the House accept the Governor's specific recommendations for change with respect to House Bill 3179 by adoption of the Amendment?' All in favor vote 'aye'; opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Clerk will accept the record. On this question there's 146 'aye' and 1 'no'. And the motion carries and the House accepts the Governor's specific recommendations for change regarding House Bill 3179. 3204? Out of the record. 3401? Representative Stiehl, Secretary of State."

Stiehl: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I move to accept the Governor's veto. This, 3401, was sponsored jointly by myself and Representative Ryan. It provides a strong incentive for business to locate and to expand in Illinois by providing a job training program. The Governor made some technical changes. He allowed greater flexibility for the department in dealing with industrial firms and he also eliminated the job training fund because there was no need for this inasmuch as the funds had already been appropriated to the department. I would ask for a favorable vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question is, 'Shall the House accept the Governor's specific recommendations for change with respect to House Bill 3401 by adoption of the Amendment?' Those in favor vote 'aye'; opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 146 'aye' and no 'nay'. And the motion carried and the House accepts the Governor's specific recommendations for change regarding House Bill 3401 by adoption of the

Amendment. 3614. Christensen? Out of the record. Representative Satterthwaite. Will you talk to Representative Conti? Representative Conti? Talk to Representative Satterthwaite there. On page seven on the Order of Motions, Senate Joint Resolution 96. Representative DiPrima is recognized."

DiPrima: "Yes, Sir, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Senate Joint Resolution 96 was passed at the end of the Session, but it was noted that there had been the wrong Amendment applied in the Senate and it's been recalled. And having voted on the prevailing side, I move pursuant to Rule 62, I move to reconsider the vote by which that Resolution was adopted on June 29th, 1980. And I have the proper Amendment that's to be adopted."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question's on the Gentleman's motion that the vote by which Senate Joint Resolution 96 was adopted be reconsidered. Those in favor vote 'aye'; opposed vote 'no'. Representative Wyvetter Younge. 'Aye', Representative Younge. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 136 'aye' and no 'nay'. And the motion carries and the House reconsiders the vote by which Senate Joint Resolution 96 was adopted. Representative DiPrima?"

DiPrima: "What do you want me to do?"

Speaker Redmond: "You want to adopt the Resolution?"

DiPrima: "Why, absolutely. This pertains to agent orange and I move for the adoption of the Senate Joint Resolution 96."

Speaker Redmond: "Now what we want to adopt is the correct

version. The Senate made a mistake when they sent the previous message over. Is that correct, Representative DiPrima?"

DiPrima: "Yes. This pertains to that 'agent orange'. You know the present administration in Washington hasn't made any moves in that regards and our incoming President is going to have some look see on this 'agent orange' and this pertains to that defoliant that was used out in Vietnam and many veterans are complaining... that fought in the Vietnam War, are complaining that many of their ailments were responsible to that defoliant that was used out there. And I would move for the passage of Senate Joint Resolution 96."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pullen."

Pullen: "I wonder whether the Sponsor could tell us exactly what it is the Resolution does in the unamended version?"

DiPrima: "That's rather lengthy. If you want me to read it, I'll read it for you."

Pullen: "Could you possibly read the 'Be it Resolved' clauses?"

DiPrima: "Well, 'where there's created the Agent Orange Victims Committee consisting of two Senators, one each appointed by the President and the Minority Leader of the Senate, two Members of the House of Representatives, one each appointed by the Speaker and the House Minority Leader, and three public Members, no more than two of the same political party to be appointed by the Governor. The three public Members shall be Vietnam era veterans. The Director of the



Illinois Department of Veterans Affairs shall serve as an ex officio Member of the Committee. The Committee shall select two Members, one from the Senate and one from the House who are not from the same political party, to serve as Co-Chairmen and may employ any clerical support it considers necessary'."

Pullen: "What is it that the Committee is charged to do?"

DiPrima: "Well, make a study of this agent orange."

Pullen: "Just to study the problem?"

DiPrima: "Yes."

Pullen: "Okay. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hoffman."

Hoffman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. My understanding of this Resolution is that this is a directive to the Illinois General Assembly to set up a Committee to look at a problem which affects not only veterans in Illinois, but veterans all over the country. I think it's obvious to most of the people who are sitting here that this is a national issue with a national implication. It would make much more sense in my judgement to memorialize Congress to do whatever they need to do to deal with this issue because, ultimately it's a national matter. It is not a state function. It may be a function to give somebody additional information or additional work here in Illinois, but certainly this is not a state function. Vietnam was not a war declared by Illinois. It was a police action in which the national government was involved and I think this is their responsibility and we should memorialize them to deal with it."

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Speaker Redmond: "Representative DiPrima?"

DiPrima: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, my concern is with the veterans in the State of Illinois and there's in excess of one million, seven hundred thousand..seven hundred thousand and that's my main concern. To make sure that our people are properly given the support they're entitled to for the efforts they put into Vietnam War."

Speaker Redmond: "Ready for the question. Any ... Representative Bowman."

Bowman: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I would like to rise in support of Representative DiPrima's motion. He is, first of all, quite right about the present status of Vietnam era veterans, not only Illinois residents, but others.

They have been truly neglected on this issue. However, I would like to in response to the Representative from DuPage, say that this is a matter of very much local concern. The substances that were contained in agent orange, the dioxans which created the problem are being used, are continuing to be used in chemicals that are being spread along our highways and being used in other ways in the State of Illinois. I think it is a matter of concern to each and every one of us here, in this state, because those chemicals are continuing to be used in the state and I think the more we know about them, the better off we're all going to be and the better off our children will be. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? You ready for the question? The question is on the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 96. Those in favor vote 'aye';

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opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Representative Capuzi, 'aye'. Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 143 'aye' and 4 'no'. And the motion carries and Senate Joint Resolution 96 is adopted. Representative Satterthwaite? You have a motion?"

Satterthwaite: "Yes, Mr. Speaker. I would move that we immediately consider House Resolution 1005. I believe there's no objections."

Speaker Redmond: "It's been cleared with both sides?"

Satterthwaite: "Yes, Sir."

Speaker Redmond: "The question's on the motion for the adoption (sic) of House Resolution 1005. Those in favor vote 'aye'; opposed vote 'no'. Representative Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "Yeah, what is it? I didn't ... I.."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Satterthwaite."

Satterthwaite: "The Resolution simply allows six House Members, three Republicans and three Democrats, to get together to review the method by which rate increases for group house insurance policies are approved or disapproved. They would report back before the end of this Session."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Borchers."

Borchers: "This is on the Calendar? I can't find it."

Speaker Redmond: "Motion was filed. It was a Resolution that was introduced today and a motion was filed for immediate consideration for adoption of the Resolution. Representative Schuneman."

Schuneman: "Question of the Sponsor, Mr. Speaker. Representative, I didn't hear your entire explanation."

I'm sorry. Would you mind repeating it?"

Satterthwaite: "The Resolution will allow six House Members, three Republicans and three Democrats, one being a Member of the Insurance Committee and one being a Member of the Personnel and Pension Committee to get together to look at the method by which group health insurance policy rates are determined for the state. You may be aware that..."

Schuneman: "For the state group insurance?.."

Satterthwaite: "For state..group insurance either by individuals or small groups which go through the Department of Insurance or by the state employees group which go through the Department of Personnel."

Schuneman: "Well, I would simply say that I think that work is presently being done by the State Employees Group Insurance Commission which is also an organization of House..... and the Senate and I wonder what expertise this group will bring that cannot be brought by the already created Commission."

Satterthwaite: "As far as I'm aware, there is no existing report that really delineates the difference in the rate setting mechanisms. All I'm asking is that we put together a report to document how those rates are determined and what the differences were in regards to the hearings that were held leading up to the new rates that were set last summer."

Schuneman: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I'd simply like to point out to the Members of the House, I'm not a Member of that Commission, but I was several years ago and I know that the work of that Commission is public work and they do issue a report and I question the need for any

additional bodies to be studying this."

Satterthwaite: "Well, Mr. Speaker, it appears though even though I thought there was approval on both sides of the aisle for this, that there really are not, so let's take it out of the record until next week."

Speaker Redmond: "Take it out of the record. Looks like we've gone through all of the motions with respect to vetos. Now is there any Member that has a motion with respect to a veto that wants it called? That's out of the record. Anything else for the good of the order? Agreed Resolutions."

Clerk O'Brien: "Agreed Resolutions; Senate Joint Resolution 128, Lechowicz. House Joint Resolution 109, Matijevich, et. al. House Resolutions 988, Kornowicz, 989, Kornowicz, 990, Johnson, 991, Johnson, 992, Johnson, 998, Redmond, 1001, Doyle, 1003, Matijevich, 1006, Keane, 1007, Kulas, 1008, Johnson, 1012, Katz-Redmond-Ryan and 1013, Capparelli."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, I don't have that first Senate Joint of Lechowicz's... Representative Lechowicz's. But I do have House Joint Resolution 109 by Matijevich which notes the efforts of the Port District, 988 by Kornowicz announces a Hall of Fame dinner, 989 by Kornowicz tells of a retirement, 990 by Johnson notes a Pasteur award, 991 by Johnson heralds the practice of a pediatrician, 992 by Johnson retires a fellow, 998 by Redmond heralds an 'Everything has a Price Week', 990..1001 by Doyle gives an Eagle award, 1002 by Matijevich honors Victor Debrovin, 1002 by... 1003 by Matijevich further honors David Doring, 1006 by

Keane notes a wedding, 1007 by Katz records the efforts...er, Kulas records the efforts of the Croatian Committee, 1008 by Johnson, he went to a reception, 1012 by Katz lauds a Safer Foundation, 1013 by Capparelli talks about a ball team victory. And Senate Joint Resolution 128 by Lechowicz, it's a Death Resolution. Mr. Speaker, I move for the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions. Lechowicz's Resolution, that Senate Joint, was a Death Resolution. I don't think you wanted that in there."

Speaker Redmond: "I didn't understand your explanations."

Giorgi: "Senate Joint 128 is a Death Resolution. I don't think you wanted it in that pile."

Speaker Redmond: "Oh, okay. Take 128 out. Then the

question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the remaining Death...Agreed Resolutions. Those in favor say 'aye'; 'aye'. Opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The motion carried. And the Agreed Resolutions are adopted. Representative Madigan on the floor? Oh, there he is. Would you buzz me? Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Mr. Speaker, on the Calendar on page seven is Senate Joint Resolution 128. I'd like to have that matter read and adopted. It's a Death Resolution which was taken out of the Agreed Resolution because it was a Death Resolution. It was not..."

Speaker Redmond: "Oh, you want that.. You want that one read now?"

Lechowicz: "Yes, I would, Sir."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay. Death Resolutions."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Joint Resolution #128, Representative

Lechowicz. Whereas, the Members of the General Assembly were deeply saddened to learn of the death of Robert W. Johnson, and whereas, Mr. Johnson was born in Wittman, Iowa, into a strong union family and whereas, he became active in the United Automobile Workers of America when he worked in the foundry of John Deere's Spreader Works in East Moline, Illinois, and whereas, he was appointed an international Representative for the UAW in 1948 and whereas, in 1956 he was elected Director of UAW, Region IV, the largest Membership region of the union, and served for many years in that position, and whereas, he temporarily accepted the post of Director of the Illinois Department of Labor in 1961 and directed major reforms in that department during his tenure of that office and whereas, throughout his career Mr. Johnson was active in civil right causes and political campaigns, therefore, Be it Resolved by the Senate of the Eighty-First General Assembly, of the State of Illinois, the House of Representatives concurring herein, that we express our profound sorrow and deep sense of loss upon the death of Robert W. Johnson, an honorable, enthusiastic companion of the rights of the working man, that we extend our heartfelt sympathy to his widow, Carol Johnson, and his bereaved family and that a suitable copy of this Preamble and Resolution be presented to Mrs. Johnson as a token of our sympathy."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Senate Joint Resolution 128 is for a tribute to

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a wonderful individual who worked with many Members on both sides of this aisle and on both sides of the rotunda in trying to promote the better interests of the working people in this state. Bob Johnson was not only a leader in his own respective union, he was a leader in many civic endeavors. He was a leader in his community and he'll be sorely missed, not only by the Membership of this Body, but by the Membership of his union and by the people of Illinois. It's with deep regret that I move the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 128."

Speaker Redmond: "The question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 128. Those in favor say 'aye', 'aye'. Opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The motion carried. The Resolution is adopted. Further Resolutions?"

Clerk O'Brien: "House Resolution 999, Giorgi, et. al. with respect to the memory of Robert W. Johnson. House Resolution 1000, Redmond-Madigan, et. al., with respect to the memory of Jane White. House Resolution 1002, Matijevich, et. al., with respect to the memory of David During. House Resolution 1009, Younge, with respect to the memory of Mrs. Lowell Bell Stephenson Lyles. House Resolution 1010, Capuzi-Peters, McAuliffe, with respect to the memory of Judge Harold N. Nudleman. House Resolution 1011, Capuzi-Peters, McAuliffe, with respect to the memory of Robert E. Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, I move the adoption of the Death Resolutions."



Speaker Redmond: "The question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Resolutions. Those in favor say 'aye'; 'aye'. Opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The motion carried. The Resolution is adopted. General Resolutions."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Resolution 1004, McClain and House Resolution 1005, Satterthwaite, et. al."

Speaker Redmond: "Committee on assignment. Before some of you slip away, there will be a Joint Session between the House and the Senate on the 19th. The Governor will be.. He's requested that we have a Joint Session so he can address us at one o'clock. So...Request for change of vote."

Clerk O'Brien: "Representative Ewing requests to vote 'no' on the motion to advance to Second Reading on House Bill 3636."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any objection? Who was that? Mr. Laetrile? Change will be journalized. Yes, Mr. Clerk? Anybody else have a motion? We're getting ready now. Representative Madigan, adjournment? Do we have any authorized excused absences on the Democratic side? The Republicans took care of the rs. Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Would the record show that Representative Vitek is excused because of illness?"

Speaker Redmond: "Any objections? Hearing none, ..."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, would you strike that from the record?"

Speaker Redmond: "Strike that."

Madigan: "Would you strike that from the record, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Redmond: "It will be stricken. Withdrawn, countermanded."

Madigan: "Is there anything further?"

Speaker Redmond: "No, adjournment."

Madigan: "I now move that we adjourn till Wednesday at twelve noon."

Speaker Redmond: "The question's on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor say 'aye', 'aye'. Opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The motion carried and the House now stands adjourned till Wednesday, November 29th...19th at twelve noon. There will be a Joint Session at 1:00 o'clock."

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
