93rd Legislative Day

March 6, 1984

Speaker Madigan: "The House shall come to order. The Members shall be in their chairs. Ladies and Gentlemen, could we be at our chairs, and we shall be led in prayer today by the Reverend Phillip Schneider, pastor of the United Methodist Church in Kansas, Illinois. Reverend Schneider is a guest of Representative Harry 'Babe' Woodyard. Will the guests in the gallery please rise and join us in the invocation?"

Reverend Schneider: "Let us pray. We thank you, oh God, for the chance to serve. May we, in this evening's deliberations, overlook no opportunity to reach out a helping hand, to speak a kind word, to show sympathy, and above all, help us appreciate every service rendered by those who work with us or for us. May we, oh Lord, in all we do this night, do our level best, may we thing the highest and best thoughts, may we strive to use our best efforts, and may all of our decisions be made from the intelligence we possess and the wisdom that is given. Help us to strive in this Session to remember all the classes and conditions under which the people of this state live, and in our search, oh Lord, grant that we may find the way to alleviate the suffering of the poor and hungry of our land and to fulfill the needs of the elderly, as well as provide a means for the young to feel and to know that they are both needed and wanted. Finally, Lord, awaken each of us to the responsibilities of our office in the State of Illinois. We ask to be heard in the name of Jesus Christ. Amen."

Speaker Madigan: "We shall be led in the pledge of allegiance by Representative Ropp."

Ropp et al: "I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for

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all."

Speaker Madigan: "Roll Call for attendance. Mr. Greiman, are there any excused absences?"

Greiman: "Yes, Mr. Speaker. On the Democrat side, Representative Huff, Representative Preston, Representative Rhem and Representative Yourell are excused absences."

Speaker Madigan: "Let the record show that the Members recited by Mr. Greiman are excused. Mr. Vinson?"

Vinson: "Representative Zwick, Representative Johnson, Representative Barger, Mr. Speaker, are excused absences."

Speaker Madigan: "Let the record show that those Representatives are excused. Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this question, there are 106 Members responding as 'present'. There is a quorum present. Resolution."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Joint Resolution #120. Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Illinois, the Senate concurring herein, that the two Houses shall convene in Joint Session on Wednesday, March 7, 1984, at the hour of 12:00 noon, for the purpose of hearing His Excellency, Governor James R. Thompson, present to the General Assembly his budget message for Fiscal Year 1985, as required by Chapter 127, Section 28 of the Revised Statutes."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Greiman, concerning House Joint Resolution 120, the Clerk has read the Resolution, and we need a Motion."

Greiman: "I move for its adoption... for the adoption of House Resolution 120, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Madigan: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of the Resolution. Those in favor, say 'aye'. Those opposed, say 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Resolution is adopted. Committee Reports."

Clerk O'Brien: "Corrected Committee Report. Representative Richmond, Chairman of the Committee on Agriculture, to

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which the following Bill was referred, action taken 5-3-83, reported the same back with the following recommendations: Interim Study Calendar, House Bill 1622. Representative Braun, Chairman of the Committee on Human Services, to which the following Resolution was referred, action taken March 6, 1984, reported the same back with the following recommendations: 'be adopted as amended' House Resolution 597."

Speaker Madigan: "On page two of the Calendar, there appears House Bills, Second Reading, House Bill 2304, Mr. Van Dwyne. Is Mr. Van Dwyne in the chamber? Do you wish to call your Bill? Mr. Clerk, House Bill 2304, on the Order of Second Reading."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2304, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Unified Code of Corrections. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendments #1 and 2 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Madigan: "Are there any Motions relative to Amendments #1 and 2?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker Madigan: "Are there any other Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #3, Johnson, amends House Bill 2304 as amended by deleting the title and inserting in lieu thereof, the following, and so forth."

Speaker Madigan: "For what purpose does Mr. Piel seek recognition?"

Piel: "A question of the Clerk, Mr. Speaker. Has that Amendment been printed and distributed?"

Speaker Madigan: "Yes."

Piel: "Because none of us on this side of the aisle have the Amendment on our desks."

Speaker Madigan: "Didn't you keep it when it was given to you last fall?"

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Piel: "I thought I did, but somebody removed it from my desk, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Madigan: "Maybe a mouse."

Piel: "Mr. Clerk... "

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Van Dyne, the Amendments have not been distributed for current consideration, so Mr. Clerk, take this Bill from the record. On the Order of House Bills, Third Reading, there appears House Bill 569, Representative Braun... indicates that she does not wish to call her Bill. House Bill 2327, Mr. Leverenz. Mr. Leverenz, do you wish to call your Bill? The Gentleman indicates he does not wish to call his Bill. The Chair recognizes Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, various Bills were just introduced, and the Clerk had erroneously posted these Bills for a Rules Committee meeting tomorrow. They will not be heard in Rules Committee tomorrow because they have not yet been introduced. Speaker Madigan: "The Chair recognizes Mr. Friedrich for the purpose of a Motion."

Friedrich: "Mr. Speaker, I move that the appropriate rule be suspended to allow 24... House Bill 2478 to be heard in Rules Committee tomorrow. This is a substitute for 2408, which apparently was misdrafted, and the other Bill will be

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tabled."

Speaker Madigan: "The Gentleman has moved to suspend the appropriate rule to permit House Bill 2478 to be heard in the Rules Committee on March 7, 1983. Is there any objection? For what purpose does Mr. Matijevich seek recognition?"

Matijevich: "I have no problem except that we've just moved these Bills to the next Rules Committee meeting, and I don't know why this can't be in this category unless he's cleared it with you, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Friedrich, did you know that the Bill has not yet been printed?"

Friedrich: "Yes, Sir, I... I have no problem with what Representative Matijevich says."

Speaker Madigan: "Thank you. So that the Gentleman's Motion shall be withdrawn. Ladies and Gentlemen, the plan is that we will adjourn and return in the morning. We shall convene the Session at 11:45 in the morning, so if you could arrive a few moments before 11:45, the Governor will arrive at 12:00 to deliver his budget message, and then we will have a few items to consider. Is there anything further to come before the Body? The Chair recognizes Mr. McPike for the Adjournment Motion to 11:45 a.m."

McPike: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I move the House stands adjourned until tomorrow at the hour of 11:45 a.m."

Resolved, by the House of Representatives of the 83rd General Assembly of the State of Illinois, the Senate concurring herein, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least six months after the adoption of this Resolution a proposition to amend Section 8 of Article IV of the

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Constitution to read as follows: ARTICLE IV. SECTION 8.
PASSAGE OF BILLS. (a) The enacting clause of the laws of
this state shall be: 'Be it enacted by the People of the
State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly.'
(b) The General Assembly shall enact laws only by Bill.
Bills may originate in either house, or may be amended or
rejected by the other. (c) No Bill shall become a law
without the concurrence of a Majority of Members elected to
each House and no Bill for a law to increase the rate of
any tax imposed by this State shall become a law without
the concurrence of three-fifths of the Members elected to
each house. Final passage of a Bill shall be by record
vote. In the Senate at the request of two Members, and in
the House at the request of five Members, a record vote may
be taken on any other occasion. A record vote is a vote by
yeas and nays entered on the Journal. (d) A Bill shall
be read by title on three different days in each House. A
Bill and each Amendment thereto shall be reproduced and
placed on the desk of each Member before final passage.
Bills, except Bills for appropriations and for the
codification, revision or rearrangement of laws, shall be
confined to one subject. Appropriation Bills shall be
limited to the subject of appropriations. A Bill expressly
amending a law shall set forth completely the Sections
amended. The Speaker of the House of Representatives and
the President of the Senate shall sign each Bill that
passes both Houses to certify that the procedural
requirements for passage have been met. SCHEDULE. This
Constitutional Amendment shall take effect upon adoption by
the electors of this State. First Reading of the

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General Assembly of the State of Illinois, the Senate concurring herein, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least six months after the adoption of this Resolution, a proposition to amend Section 9 of Article VII of the Constitution to read as follows: ARTICLE VII. SECTION 9. SALARIES AND FEES. (a) Compensation of officers and employees and the office expenses of units of local government shall not be paid from fees collected. Fees may be collected as provided by law and by ordinance. (b) An increase or decrease in the salary of an elected officer of any unit of local government shall not take effect during the term for which that officer is elected. SCHEDULE.
