This has been one of those tried and true problems throughout the state for the past ten years. We've never really gotten handles on what impact these costs have had on small businesses. And this Amendment is asking both Departments to cooperate in some sort of a survey and study to determine what the costs have been and the impact and come back to the General Assembly with some specific recommendation for legislative and/or administrative action to address the problem. I would move for the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #2. Representative Mautino, on the Amendment."

Mautino: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. The Amendment is laudable, but I do stand in opposition. Fred, the reason I stand in opposition is that it addresses another question, the workers' compensation subject matter that was not agreed to when we sent the two Bills out. For the record, Mr. Speaker, we sent out House Bill 2481 and House Bill 239 to be used as vehicles for the recommendations of the Conference on Small Business, which will be held the 15th and 16th. That was the agreement that we had with Mr. Vinson on his questions yesterday on the Bill. I would stand in opposition to the Amendment. I believe it's out of... it's not germane to the original concept of the Bill, and I would like to have a ruling on that, with the understanding that those Bills will be used for the recommendations of the Conference on Small Business as opposed to any other Amendment provisions."

control public aid costs embraced two things. Number one, it enacted certain restrictions on certain classes of public aid recipients for how much could be paid for hospital stays for those recipients, a total lid of five hundred dollars. And, number two, that Conference Committee Report denied to nursing homes of the State of Illinois rate increases, which had previously been enacted into law, which were part of existing statute at that time. Rate increases which would have taken effect in the current fiscal year. We felt that it was necessary, no matter how unfortunate the situation might be, that we adopt those rigid controls on both hospitals and nursing homes for the purpose of making it possible for the state to live within its means and so that the state would not have to get any deeper into the taxpayers' pockets. Now, the underlying Bill here that we're dealing with will correct that situation as regards those classes of recipients who are getting hospital reimbursement so that that five hundred dollar cap on hospital reimbursement will be removed. My intention is very simple. It is just simply to say that if we are now in a position where we can remove that lid as regards hospitals, we can undo the damage we did to the other class of providers in that Conference Committee Report, nursing homes. And I'm simply asking for equity, so that we're dealing with all providers in the same fashion. And I would move the adoption of Amendment #2, because there is some improvement in the state fiscal situation and because if we're going to deal with hospitals in this fashion, we ought to deal equitably with nursing homes. Many patients reside in nursing homes, and unless we can provide adequate reimbursement for those patients, then they are not going to get the kind of care they might otherwise get. And I think that if we're going to do what

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #2 to House Bill 2350. And on that question, is there any discussion? Representative Currie."

Currie: "Thank you, Madam Speaker, Members of the House. A question of the Sponsor please?"

I would point out first of all that Amendment #2 does not create parity in House Bill 2350 between general assistance recipients and hospital caps and nursing home reimbursement issues. Representative Vinson was quite brave last year when he sponsored a measure that did a disservice to nursing home residents and to general assistance recipients. But, I think it's surprising to find that he's reneging this year on a commitment he made for the present

We'll undo that, and we'll add new dollars next year for things we already agreed we couldn't afford to fund in the present year. His Amendment does not seek to add parity. It does unfortunately seek to break the budget. And I am surprised that someone we've all looked to as a model of fiscal conservatism, somebody who has shown great respect for the taxpayers of the State of Illinois, would try to take a proposal like House Bill 2350, one in line with the Governor's statements, with the Governor's priorities, with the Department of Public Aid's priorities, with the priorities of the administration, this administration, that cares about the poor and the needy and would try to add dollars that the people of the state just plain cannot afford to spend. I'm sorry to have to oppose Amendment #2 to House Bill 2350. As I say, I admire the Sponsor's intentions. But I think that as a...as a fiscal conservative myself, I just plain can't support this budget breaking proposal."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Bowman."

Bowman: "Yes, Madam Speaker, first I would question the germaneness of this Amendment to the Bill, and if you rule it is germane, then I would like to speak to the Amendment. First, I think we have to establish whether this is germane. I think the lady has some very good points that lead me to conclude it is not germane."

So for that reason I would oppose the Amendment at this time."

We could provide much better care for people in nursing homes, but a first prerequisite is that State of Illinois pay its fair share on that subject. I supported the Nursing Home Reform Act in 1979, and I stand prepared to support further reforms in that area, as I think most of you do. There is nothing, nothing more despicable than a situation where a patient in a nursing home gets substandard care. But one of the primary causes of that substandard care is underreimbursement. Now, what we are dealing with here is a underlying Bill that seeks to raise the rate of reimbursement for hospitals. Well by golly, we ought to at the same time we do that raise the rate of reimbursement for nursing home patients, because a lot more people are in nursing homes than are in hospitals, and already we're paying way above the national average for hospital patients and way below the national average for nursing home patients. Remember that Indiana, and Kentucky and Missouri all pay more for nursing home patients than Illinois does, substantially more. And we're suppose to be a rich state that has a social conscience. This came about because of a bank down in my area that they have a number of satellites and are not permitted to have trust officer there. Piel: "A question of the Clerk, Madam Speaker. Has that Amendment been printed and distributed?"

Speaker Breslin: "Yes, it has been printed and distributed."

Piel: "That was the one, I think, Representative Cullerton was asking about before, wasn't it?"

Speaker Breslin: "I don't know, but it has been printed and distributed. Rep... Is there any further discussion on Amendment #2. There being no further discussion, the question is, 'Shall Amendment #2 to House Bill 2670 be adopted?' All those in favor say 'aye', all those opposed say 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it. Does the Gentleman request a Roll Call? The Gentleman from Will requests a Roll Call. All those in favor vote 'aye', all those opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 30 voting 'aye', 22 voting 'no', and 18 voting 'present', and the Motion is... the Amendment is adopted. Representative Johnson, for what reason do you rise?"

Johnson: "Yeah, it's a little late, Mr. Speaker... Madam Speaker. I guess you knew that when you recognized me."

Speaker Breslin: "Are there any further Amendments?"

Clerk Leone: "Floor Amendment #3, Greiman, amends House Bill 2670 on page 1 and so forth."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Greiman."

Greiman: "Thank you, Madam Speaker. Amendment 3 to House Bill 2670 changes the Code of Civil Procedure. Presently, the Code of Civil Procedure makes every trust in Illinois a spendthrift trust which means that creditors cannot seek and cannot reach a trust that is put in... that is established by somebody for the benefit of another person. As a matter of public policy, we believe that child support ought to be reachable. Presently, a case recently was..."

came down from the Appellate Court that provided that the beneficiary of a trust could sit... receive the trust income, live off of it, but need not pay child support. It meant that a child support... a child was not supported by an adult beneficiary of a trust although there was very significant and ample funds to provide that child with child support. It seems to me it should be against the public policy of Illinois for someone to be able to evade his or her obligations to pay child support and place that burden upon the public because... while they are sitting and enjoying the fruits of a trust. Therefore, I moved for the adoption of Amendment 3."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #3 to House Bill 2670, and on that question, the Gentleman from Champaign, Representative Johnson."

Johnson: "Before I address the Bill, address this to Madam Speaker and the Parliamentarian. I would question the germaneness of Floor Amendment #3 in that the subject matter is dramatically different than the Bill in chief and that the Bill in chief purports to amend an Act... the Marriage and Dissolution of Marriage Act and Amendment #3 amends the Code of Civil Procedure. I don't think it's germane."

Speaker Breslin: "In order to determine germaneness, Representative Johnson, we also have to study Amendment #2. With your permission, we will go on with debate while we are studying that question. Is that acceptable?"

Johnson: "Well, my voice is not very strong today. I want to talk about the Bill, but I also want to save my voice. So, I'd rather... if it's going to be ruled nongermane..."

Speaker Breslin: "There are others seeking recognition. If we could go to them and come back..."

Johnson: "Could we come... can you come back to me then?"

Speaker Breslin: "Surely."

Johnson: "Okay, that's fine."

Speaker Breslin: "On the question, Representative McCracken."

McCracken: "Thank you, Madam Speaker. Will the Gentleman yield?"

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman will yield to a question."

McCracken: "Representative, you indicated these are treated as spendthrift trusts in Illinois. What is the policy, if you know, behind that original decision?"

Greiman: "Well, under the old Chancery Act, Section 49 of the Chancery Act provided as this Section of the Code of Civil Procedure provides. Originally the notion was that a settlor or a grantor of a trust could establish a trust and could make it a spendthrift trust, in other words, could put it beyond the reach of the beneficiary's creditor, probably, in most cases, because the beneficiary might indeed get a lot of debts and incur bills. And so one wanted to put the... one wanted to protect that beneficiary from a lot of creditors who might, you know, talk them into some fancy deals. Our statute makes every trust a spendthrift trust. Most states say that you have to specifically state that it's spendthrift, but our statute makes every trust a spendthrift trust. This Amendment merely says that as to child support, one ought not to either directly or by statute relieve the... the beneficiary from that obligation."

McCracken: "I understand... I understand that. Might the policy also have been to honor contracts of third parties which would be abrogated, at least in effect, by allowing creditors to reach the trust proceeds?"

Greiman: "No, I don't believe so, because in this case it's the statute that protected the beneficiaries in most cases rather than a specific spendthrift provision. So, clearly, as to those beneficiaries that are the beneficiaries of

trusts where there is no specific spendthrift provision but rather rely on this statute, it is this statute and not a contract which precludes a child from being supported by the beneficiary of a trust."

McCracken: "So you are saying that expressly made spendthrift trusts are not affected by this statute?"

Greiman: "At this point, no, I think they would all be affected by this statute, yes. However... however, if there was..."

McCracken: "Okay, so if we were to adopt... excuse me. If we were to adopt this, then we would be, by statute, violating express intent of those trusts which are expressly made spendthrift trusts."

Greiman: "I think we would be making a public policy for this state that child support is a premier obligation and that no one ought to be able to hide behind a trust."

McCracken: "I understand, but you would agree that the effect would be to abrogate that... that provision of expressly made spendthrift trusts? Correct?"

Greiman: "I think that's correct."

McCracken: "Okay. Now would this apply to trusts already in existence as of the effective date of this Bill?"

Greiman: "Only to the extent that it would be constitutional."

McCracken: "Well, what is the legislative intent? Do you seek to reach trusts already in existence?"

Greiman: "If it's constitutional, I would."

McCracken: "Now this is in the Code of Civil Procedure. Are you contending that this is not a substantive change in the law?"

Greiman: "Oh, absolutely it's a substantive change in the law. It's a change... we are changing what was previously in this Chancery Act before the revision of the Code of Civil Procedure. It's clearly a substantive change, absolutely."

McCracken: "Would you agree that to the extent it were applied

retroactively it would be unconstitutional?"

Greiman: "I'm not sure of that. I'm not sure of that."

McCracken: "Alright, thank you very much."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Johnson. Representative
Brummer."

Brummer: "Yes, will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman will yield to a question."

Brummer: "Representative Greiman, as I understand the existing
law, if the judgment debtor sets up the trust himself or
herself, that is currently not a spendthrift provision that

Greiman: "If the parent who is liable for child support were to
set up the trust, they could not avoid... the child support
or a creditor or any other creditor."

Brummer: "Under the existing law."

Greiman: "That's correct."

Brummer: "So this... this proposed Amendment will not address any
issue when... when the parent who is obligated for child
support sets up the trust because they can't avoid that
under the existing law."

Greiman: "Clearly where the parent himself or herself establishes
the trust, they cannot set up a spendthrift trust. So this
only goes to trusts that have been set up by a third
party."

Brummer: "Ey... By a grandparent, or an uncle, or aunt or
something of this nature."

Greiman: "Or a parent in contemplation of... of the fact that
they know that their child is required to pay child
support, and they don't want... they want to make sure
that it's out of the reach of... of their former
daughter-in-law maybe or their former son-in-law. I mean,
you know, your suggestion is, Mr. Brummer, that these are
made some place without knowledge of what the beneficiaries

real life style is."

Brummer: "No. I... I think it is good public policy that... that an individual cannot avoid child support by putting his assets in a trust in a spendthrift provision and saying, well, now the court can't reach that, but that's the existing law now. What you're proposing to do by this Amendment is to say a grandparent or someone else can't set up a trust for the benefit of someone else and say that's spendthrift and... and is outside of the... the spendthrift provisions, in effect, would be void under this."

Greiman: "That's correct. That's right."

Brummer: "Briefly to the Amendment. I... I guess I would be in opposition to this Amendment for several reasons. Number one, the individual who has a support obligation under the existing law cannot set up that trust and avoid the trust... avoid the support obligations under the existing law. So with regard to that situation this does nothing. What it would do is prohibit someone else from setting up a trust for the benefit of a parent who may have some child support obligation, and what we really would be saying is, you can't set up a trust this way for the benefit of your niece, or nephew, or grandchild or something of this nature. And I guess I question whether that is good public policy. I would also suggest that the... the proceeds of that trust, once they are paid out, are not beyond the reach of the court currently. Obviously a court can fine someone who has a support obligation to be in contempt of court and can jail them with regard to that contempt proceedings and things of this nature if the trustee is paying out to that individual 1,000 dollars a month, and they have a support obligations, and there's a contempt proceeding initiated and they are found to be in contempt of court. In effect, the court can order them to pay those

proceeds out of that, the violation of which would be contempt, and they are subject to imprisonment. So I think we're really interfering with some contractual obligations, particularly when we talk about this having some retroactive effect with regard to trusts that were established some time ago. I think that's clearly violative of the Constitutional provision prohibiting interference with contracts. And for those reasons, I think this is a bad Amendment."

Speaker Breslin: "On the question of germaneness, we have indicated that the Amendment is germane because all... the Bill and all of the Amendments deal with maintenance and child support. Representative Johnson."

Johnson: "By having made that ruling, Madam Speaker, I would make the further point of order that Amendment #2 and Amendment #3 taken together... Amendment #2's adoption would make Amendment #3 out of order. Amendment #3 purports that the amendatory language inserts after line 14 on page four the following and then recites the different material that Representative Greiman has proffered to us. Page four and by Amendment #2 line fourteen and following in my judgment is a non sequitur, and I don't think it's in order."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Davis, for what reason do you rise?"

Davis: "Well, while the Parliamentarian is looking, and Mr. Johnson's daughter, Annette, and her fifth grade class are up in the gallery. Annette is here, but her fifth grade class from Yankee Ridge Grade School in Urbana is here with Mrs. 'Blanford' and Mrs. McDuffy and Mrs. 'Splitztozer'. May we welcome them to Springfield?"

Speaker Breslin: "Welcome to the fifth grade. Representative Johnson, could... in spite of your bad voice, can you repeat your point of order?"

Johnson: "Yes, I'm looking at Amendment #2 that was adopted, and specifically at page four line fourteen which is right in the middle of a subparagraph... subparagraph 7(e). Amendment #3 then purports to amend the Bill by providing that on page 14 line 14 the following. Those two taken together make absolutely no sense. The Bill would read, if you adopted Amendment #3, 'that proceedings are commenced and continues only during the,' blank, blank, blank, Section 2 and then et al."

Speaker Breslin: "Thank you, Mr. Johnson. The Chair rules that the Amendment is in order because Amendment #3 refers to an Amendment of the Bill not the Amendment of Amendment #2. The Amendment is therefore in order."

Johnson: "Then to the... to the Amendment which dramatically alters the purpose of the Bill. Nobody questions... I don't question, and Representative McCracken and Brummer, I don't think, question the child support as a... as a other obligation, in fact more so as an important obligation. But this Amendment is so broad and the consequences of this Amendment so deep that it would really eliminate in many cases the purpose... the purposes of a set... of a trust, because this Amendment would not only be prospective in nature but retroactive in nature and could, for example, affect a testamentary trust where an individual died and left property to his or her divorced son or daughter never having any intention that the corpus could be invaded for anything and have that purpose totally abrogated by the adopt... by the adoption of this Amendment. We're not talking here about a judgment creditor being a nonpaying mother or father. We're talking about the rights and the ability of a testator or the settlor of a trust to create a trust and be able to have some reliance that the purpose of the trust will be carried out. And to be able to invade

that trust, not just the income of the trust, which can be done now, but the whole corpus and principle of the trust really works absolutely against everything that anybody in here, including Representative Greiman, had ever been led to believe or thought was the purpose of... of trust law. If you want to put an Amendment on it, although I don't think it's necessary, to allow income to be paid over or attached as it's paid out of a trust that's okay. But that's not what this does. And I think that there's a number of cases, and this so dramatically changes the law that our staff really hasn't had a chance to research those cases that would clearly say that the application of this Amendment to existing trusts to testamentary or inter vivos trusts in a number of circumstances would be unconstitutional. I think it's a good statement of principle, but when you're applying it in this fact situation it absolutely makes it nonworkable."

Speaker Breslin: "There being no further discussion, the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Greiman, to close."

Greiman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker... Madam Speaker. Contrary to what you have heard, the majority view and that part of the restatement of trusts provides to the contrary of Illinois law, so that in most states a beneficiary who owes a duty of child support to his children cannot evade that by hiding behind a trust. I suggest to you that the claim of support of children transcends contractual obligations. These are not obligations that we owe because the beneficiary has got into some crazy deal. These are obligations to support ones children. Representative Brummer suggests that there is another remedy, that the remedy would be that the beneficiary could... excuse me, that the beneficiary could be... could be picked up for contempt if he did not pay the child support for which he

was liable. But to the contrary, in the recent case of 'Matt' versus 'Matt' in Illinois that was the genesis of this Amendment, the defendant in that case, the beneficiary of that trust was in hiding, and the court found him in hiding so that he could not be held for contempt. But yet the trustee continued to send checks to that beneficiary. So we have the... situation of a person who is receiving the benefits of a trust and not paying his child support. I think that's against the public policy of this state. The public policy of this state should be that people should pay their child support, that they ought not hide behind any kind of trust situation. That is the majority view. It is the view in the restatement of trusts, and I suggest that it should be the public policy of Illinois."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman moves to adopt Amendment #3 to House Bill 2670. That is the question. All those in favor vote 'aye', all those opposed vote 'no'. Representative DeJaegher. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question, there are 37 voting 'aye', 51 voting 'no' and 15 voting 'present', and this Amendment fails. Are there any further Amendments?"

In 1983 when our Bill was in effect for only half a year, the number of deaths was reduced significantly down to only 12. After that Bill passed, the Illinois Retail Merchants Association informed us that the sale of car seats increased three-fold. Now in the course

of the research on that particular Bill, I discovered that there was an insurance company in Michigan called 'League' General, and 'League' General Insurance Company had a policy of giving out free car seats to their policy holders. 'League' General purchased the car seats for cost. They were mailed directly to their policy holders if the policy holders indicated that they had a child in the appropriate age group. As a result of that program, the use of the car seats went from... approximately 16% up to 85% and, of course, the claims were reduced significantly for the insurance company. Now in an effort for... in an effort to allow this to happen in Illinois, we discovered that our Insurance Code precludes allowing rebates... giving out rebates, and this would be deemed to be a rebate. So what the Bill does is to allow for this car seat program to operate in Illinois. It doesn't require that an insurance company do it. It just allows them to do it. I would hope that an insurance company, take for example, Allstate Insurance Company, which is owned by Sears, could market and use this concept... this Bill to market their own insurance. Perhaps at a Sears store at a counter where they sell Allstate Insurance right next store to that counter they could have a big sign saying free car seats, and then when the people inquire as to how they get free car seats, the insurance company can inform them that if they were to purchase their insurance from Allstate they would get a free car seat. I think that this would be very significant piece of legislation in that it would provide car seats to people who just for some reason or another are not going out and buying them. I've talked to the Governor about this particular Bill. He's very much in support of it. I think that the... the main thing that this Bill will do is to save lives, and I'd appreciate your support."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2952, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Election Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman from Lee, Mr. Olson."

Olson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 2952 is cosponsored by Representative Yourell and myself. It has to do with the subject of exit polling which has gained wide notoriety since the 1980 presidential election when it was quite properly alleged that exiting polling was the cause of the loss of two or three Democratic seats in the State of California. In the State of Illinois then, we have in our respective counties received inquiries, suggestions from clerks that we might put our State Board of Election Laws with regard to exit polling in context with the matter of soliciting votes. So as a consequence, what we do with 2952 is to prohibit any person from questioning or approaching for the purpose of questioning any individual within 100 feet of any polling

I think most of you'll agree that 105 feet or 110 feet away from the polling place, as defined, would be a reasonable source of ability to make the polls. As a consequence, we would ask for your support."

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman from Lee moves for the passage of House Bill 2952, and on that, is there any discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Cullerton."

Cullerton: "Yes, if you could just yield for a question."

Speaker Greiman: "Indicates that he'll yield for a question."

Cullerton: "It seems to me, and I'll read the current law to you, 'No judge of election, poll watcher or any other person shall in any primary or general election do any electioneering or soliciting of votes or engage in any political discussion within any polling place or within 100 feet of any polling place.' So that's the current law. Isn't it already prohibited?"

Olson: "We are not sure of the constitutionality of it. It is the opinion of those that made this recommendation to us that it is not prohibited as far as exit polling is concerned. There may be a constitutional test as to what determines where the polling place is. Is it the building or the room in the building? So we feel that it is not expressly prohibited."

Cullerton: "Someone has told you that exit polling is not engaging in a political discussion?"

Olson: "Not prohibited... People have told us that exit polling is not included in the statutes of the State of Illinois as regard to poli... politicking or electioneering."

Cullerton: "But... And it's certainly not politicking or

Olson: "By the people who suggests to us, the County Clerks' Association, other interested people that people have been harassed going to and coming from the polls, are exhibiting a concern about even going to vote, and so they thought this should be clarified by statute and perhaps there'll be a constitutional test."

Cullerton: "Do you think there might be some constitutional problems with this Bill right now?"

Olson: "There may be a constitutional question which has been expressed with regard to the definition of a polling place. Is it the actual site of the poll or is it the building? That will still have to be determined."

Cullerton: "Would you think there'd be any First Amendment questions as to the right of free... restricted right of free speech?"

Olson: "We have received some support from this from the newspaper media, and some of the television people are not too keen with this proposal."

Cullerton: "Do you think there's any constitutional problems... First Amendment problems?"

Olson: "I would like to suggest there isn't, but maybe they should be tested in the court when it becomes law."

Cullerton: "Alright. Thank you."

Speaker Greiman: "Further discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Bowman."

Bowman: "Well, it sure looks like there's a constitutional problem to me. It seems to me the right of free speech is extended to the right to ask a person a question, and... and that's what's at issue here. I think it is patently

Olson: "John, someone was speaking to me from the..."

Dunn, J.: "If a... If a voter comes out of a booth and gets more than a hundred feet away from the voting... from the polling place, can a... can they be approached for the purposes of an exit poll?"

Olson: "Absolutely. No problem with that."

Dunn, J.: "Your... Your Bill then only is geographical. It just says you have to stay a 100 feet from the polling place, and outside that range you can do whatever you want."

Olson: "That's absolutely correct."

Dunn, J.: "Thank you."

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleran from DuPage, Mr. McCracken."

McCracken: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I agree that there appear to be First Amendment problems here. I really don't think the prohibition on polling is rationally related to free elections, free and unbiased elections, fair elections, and if it is not so related, I think it clearly is protected by the First Amendment. I don't think the 100 feet protects it, and I think the reason you find this split in the media is because television benefits by the polling and the newspapers do not. So to the extent the media's split, I would submit they are no authority on the subject, and I... I have grave reservations about it. I just don't think it's related to any legitimate state interest, and it infringes on the First Amendment."

Speaker Greiman: "Further discussion? There being none, Mr. Olson to close."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 3199, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Marriage and Dissolution of Marriage Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Kirkland."

Kirkland: "Thank you again, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This Bill amends the Marriage and Dissolution of Marriage Act. It provides that in computing the period during which the spouses have lived separate and apart, under Paragraph a(2) of Section 401, which is the new irreconcilable differences paragraph, for purposes of dissolution, periods during which the spouses were living separate and apart prior to July 1, 1984, which is when the Bill goes into effect, be included. The purpose, basically, is to avoid conflicting judicial interpretations, and specifically, possibly a ruling down the road that might, by a court, might say that people separated for some continuous period up to the date of July 1, 1984, that that period would not be counted in the six months or two year period for separation. And again, I

Olson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This Bill has to do with recovery procedures instituted by the Department of Public Aid and is designed to aid in the collection of money owed to the State of Illinois. Its estimated fiscal impact in the positive way is roughly \$8,000,000. The brief provisions of House Bill 3209 are as follows: It authorizes the Comptroller to reduce the payment to an individual by the amount the person owes the state. It reduces the parental liability

from 21 to 18 years old for all categorical programs when a client resides apart from the parents. An original provision of the Bill provided for a reporting to the Department of Public Aid from the insurance community of people who are enrolled in health programs. That was amended out in Amendment #2. Amendment #1 was a technical Amendment. The basic reason for the changes... the change in parental liability from 21 to 18 would make the Department of Public Aid rules consistent with the limits of other agencies, as parents can now become liable for a portion of assistance for 18 to 20 year old children, even though the age of majority is 18 in most legal matters. I'd be very pleased to answer any questions."

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman from Lee moves for passage of House Bill 3209, and on that, is there any discussion? The Gentleman from Bureau, Mr. Mautino."

Mautino: "Will the... Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Gentleman yield?"

Speaker Greiman: "He indicates that he will."

Mautino: "Representative Olson, what is the rationale for the provisions on social security that is embodied in this legislation?"

Olson: "The rationale for the... "

Probation Challenge is an alternative to the sentencing problem. It has been recognized throughout various agencies in this state and in the United States as one of the ongoing things that will decrease the prison population. Who is that back there? Many of you are wondering about the state paying for this..."

Speaker Greiman: "Give the Lady your attention, please."

Alexander: "Many of you are wondering about the state paying for this cost of this Program. This pilot Program has been maintained by Chicago, but because of its rising costs and because of this utilization that could be used statewide, you are wondering about the state paying for it. Well, you are paying for every prison now that's in the Department of Corrections, whether you come from a rural area, a farm district, or where you are coming from, and you are paying \$22,000 per person. This program, as we realize it, will only cost roughly about a little better than a thousand dollars per person that would be put into this Program. It will indeed save this state some money once it is totally

The economy of scale, Representative Ropp, favor this proposition. The concept, I submit to you, is novel. The approach is worthy, and I would urge an 'aye' vote for House Bill 2369."

Speaker Greiman: "The lady from Kane, Ms. Zwick."

Zwick: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I notice on my desk when I'm considering this Bill the literature that's been passed out on it, and I was personally very impressed with the Program when I read about it and thought, gee, this looks like a wonderful Program. I'd like to look at perhaps voting for

And particularly for those of you who are on the other side of the aisle, who are as concerned as we are about the burgeoning prison population and about what it is that we can do in this state to rationally respond to these problems, I would encourage the additional 5 votes, 6 votes go up there so that this Bill can pass."

Bowman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. It appears that there is some concern about the limitation of this Bill to Cook County, but indeed I think Cook County, being the largest county in the state, has contributed mightily to the prison population, and what we're trying to do here is to save money. If we had a program like this in place in Cook County, it would save taxpayers all over the State of Illinois money because we would not have to continue this maddening upward spiral of increased prison construction. It seems to me that regardless of whether your individual county is... whether this program is operating in your individual county, nonetheless, it is of benefit to you, and you should

Brummer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. 2615 provides that construction costs of new electric generating plants and a significant addition to electric generating plants shall not be included in a rate base of any utility unless such costs are found to be reasonable, and that prior to including the costs of these plants and additions

in the rate base, the Commission shall conduct an audit to determine that the costs are reasonable that were associated with the facility. It was kind of amazing that... to discover that we have these new plants go into rate base with no audit, no comprehensive audit regarding the reasonableness of the costs associated with that. Cost is defined in the Bill. Reasonable is defined in the Bill also to include the utilities decisions, construction and supervision of the construction underlying the cost of the new electric utility generating plant. And in determining the reasonableness, the Commission shall consider the knowledge and circumstances prevailing at the time of each relevant utility decision or action. We have, as most Members of the floor know here, some major nuclear plants undergoing construction currently. Some of these plants cost in excess of two and a half or three billion dollars, I think one is estimated to cost, by the time it's concluded. I think it is important that the consumer have some confidence that those large costs attributed to those plants, some three billion dollars, are reasonable. This not only authorizes but directs the Illinois Commerce Commission to conduct that audit, and if the Commission cannot conduct the audit, the Commission shall arrange for an audit to be conducted by persons independent of the utility and selected by the Commission. The cost of that audit is borne initially by the utility company but is recovered by the utility company as an expense through the normal rate-making procedures. This Bill, I suppose, had its genesis somewhat in the Legislative Audit Commission as a result of a request by the Audit Commission to the Auditor General to examine the entire management audit... management auditing area. This Bill only deals with the construction of plants and not overall management audit.

Then the Sunset Review Committee examined this issue, had several hearings both here in Springfield and in Chicago, and there is similar legislation, I think, being considered in the Senate. Huff: "Mr. Brummer, why is it that the utilities are not asked to consider raising revenues through the bond issue rather than always looking to the consumer to make up these costs?"

Brummer: "Well, I think they do raise considerable revenue through issuance of bonds, but somehow they have to pay off those bonds and they pay off those bonds, by generating revenues from consumers."

Huff: "Okay. Very good."

Speaker Greiman: "Further discussion? The Gentleman from Bond, Mr. Slape."

Slape: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Would the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Greiman: "Indicates that he will yield for a question."

Slape: "Is there a provision in this legislation where a utility would have to initially prove that there is a demand for the plant in the first place?"

Brummer: "I could not hear the question."

Brummer: "The... That is not specifically addressed here. This deals with the reasonableness of the cost of the plant itself and the reasonableness of the management of the construction program related to the cost of the plant. So this Bill does not specifically deal with that issue."

Slape: "Okay. How do you define 'reasonable'?"

Brummer: "'Reasonable' as used in this Bill means a utility's decisions, construction and supervision of construction underlying the cost of new electric utility generating plants and significant additions to electric utility generating plants resulted in efficient, economical and timely construction. In determining the reasonableness of plant cost, the Commission shall consider the knowledge and circumstances prevailing at the time of each relevant utility decision or action."

Slape: "Thank you."

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman from DeWitt, Mr. Vinson."

Vinson: "Will the Sponsor yield for a question, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Greiman: "Indicates that he will."

Vinson: "Representative, when an audit concludes that a portion of plant costs are not reasonable, will just that portion of the plant costs be excluded from the rate base, or will the entire plant be excluded from the rate base?"

Brummer: "No... I... We discussed this in Committee. It's a clear intent that that portion attributable to unreasonableness be excluded and not the entire facility."

Vinson: "What happens if an audit is not completed during the 11 month period in which the Commerce Commission has to issue a decision on a rate case?"

Brummer: "Well, the... It is the... It is the hope that that will be done. There has been some concern expressed about that

We, in addition, provide a new personal... \$50 personal needs allowance for residents of public mental hospitals, which are facilities expressly excluded from coverage under current programs. We are doing this because a number of cases have recently come to light where the elderly indigent who are living in nursing homes have not been able to purchase certain essential items. I will let my Cosponsor, Representative Horer, describe the situation in Canton, which was probably the most celebrated case. But if we were to enact this progressive legislation, we would be joining other states like New York, Wisconsin and Oklahoma in providing this kind of supplemental support, and I think it is high time. It came out of the Committee on Aging unanimously, and I recommend a unanimous Roll Call at this time."

Speaker Greiman: "... Bowman, have you concluded your remarks? The Gentleman from Cook moves for passage of House Bill 2707, and on that, is there any discussion? The Lady from Cook, Ms. Topinka."

Topinka: "Yes, if I may ask some questions of the Sponsor, please?"

Speaker Greiman: "Indicates he'll yield for a question."

Topinka: "Representative Bowman, apparently, on the congressional level, there is... there are already movements afoot to increase this program which is currently federally subsidized, and of course, if we went into it at this

Topinka: "5.5 million?"

Bowman: "Yes, Ma'am."

Hastert: "Representative, under this piece of legislation, if the books were not given to the township assessor, or if he had 90 days after April 15th, what would basically... what would that do to the assessment cycle?"

Dunn, J.: "You are the expert in that area. What this will do is it will improve the quality of the assessments, because at the present time, the township assessors, who were the ones out there on the firing line in the townships where I come from, are operating with workbooks which do not comply with the statutes which don't have equalizers in them, which don't have final figures. And, as a result, there are inequities in their assessments. This would allow for them to do their job in a thorough fashion so that when the books are returned they'll be in good order. It does not mean that they will have 90 days after April 15th. If the supervisor of assessments can get the books to the township officials January 1st, the Bill would require that they be returned 90 days from January 15th... January 1st or April

Hastert: "Well, to the Bill, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Greiman: "Proceed, Sir."

Hastert: "You know, I recognize, Representative Dunn, what you're trying to do, and I represent... I understand the frustrations of certain assessors, especially in Macon County with some problems of getting books or as you might use the word 'workbooks'. But one of the problems that we have in the State of Illinois is, there are no real uniform definitions of what books and workbooks are. In some counties workbooks happen to be on what's on a computer tape, on a floppy disk. In other counties, workbooks happen to be something else. And in other counties, workbooks happen to be computer printcuts. What we have to address, really, is the job of assessor is really a year round job, and the assessors are, under law, supposed to work on their books, whatever those books the assessment process throughout the year and not just 90 days after a specific time or from January 1st to April 15th. One of the things we're trying to do in a joint House, nonpartisan House-Senate Body, is to try to address this program... this problem and really the problem of the cycle. I suggest what might happen when we open the cycle up to the discretion of a supervisor assessor or the assessor in the extra 90 days is that tax bills get cut late, school districts get their tax collections late, extra interest then is put on, and tax anticipation warrants are let out and the whole process of local government, especially education, becomes much more expensive. I suggested in Committee, and I suggest again, that instead of doing band-aid approaches to the assessment cycle that we take some time, look at the whole assessment process and the

So I would ask that you would defer on this Bill, and by the end of this session, we should come up with a comprehensive piece of legislation that would totally address this... this piece of... this problem. Slape: "Every four years. So, in other words, all an assessor has to do in the other three years is add the new properties or take properties off that may be destroyed or improvements that have been made."

Dunn, J.: "They have to... That is correct. They have to note the changes. Now this Bill was brought to my attention by the Decatur township supervisor, and the greater part of the population of the City of Decatur lives in Decatur Township. And there are a lot of people, a lot of parcels, and this is a bipartisan Bill, as a matter of fact, because that township assessor happens to be Republican. And he has a good point. He needs to do his work and needs tools to do his work, and all the township assessors that I know of and the township officials of Illinois support this Bill. And I think they have a good point to make. We need to address the overall problem, but at this point in time, we have to deal with what is before us, and this will help those who are right out there in the firing line."

Slape: "It wasn't too long ago that Representative Wolf and myself introduced a Bill to put a stipulation that tax assessors had to have their books back into the supervisor of assessments by April the 15th. And the reason we picked this date was because it was a... we thought it was a median... it was the first change in that law since the Personal Property Tax Law had been repealed by the '70 Constitution, and it was an accurate realization that assessors really only reassess their township every four years. And also, it was really a... realization that assessors are not supposed to get a book from the supervisor of assessment and go out and start assessing and have it done by a deadline. It's supposed to be a long... a year-long progress... process whereby property that has been completed or that portion of it has been completed by January 1 is all that is really supposed to be entered in those books. The reason the legislation came around originally was, school districts were complaining that Boards of Review are not through meeting by the time they have to sit down and set up their budget. They don't really know what their assessed valuations are going to be. They really don't know what... if there's going to be a multiplier or not, and it put them in a bind when they tried to do their budgeting for the next school year. This, you know, all the General Assembly is doing is, we made an effort to try to correct, which was... has... I think Representative Hastert was right, that it was a band-aid effort to correct. Now we're repealing that band-aid effort, and nothing's really being done to see if the cycle will work and to see if property taxes are really the means to finance school education and other government. I think I would suggest that at this time, a 'present' vote, and let's leave the cycle alone and see how it works

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman from Madison, Mr. Wolf."

We think that the Bill that was passed at that time had the effect of straightening out the cycle and the problems that the local assessors were having with local tax districts. Quite frankly, it does address a problem that was brought to our attention, certainly not only unique to Macou County, but in several other areas of the state, in which the supervisors of assessments in concert with the township assessor association did draft this Bill. Both organizations do support this Bill. We found that there were several counties in the state in which the supervisors of assessments was not giving the township assessors adequate time to prepare their workbooks, and for that reason, this Bill was drafted and introduced. And I urge your support for it."

Speaker Greiman: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Keane."

Keane: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in opposition to this Bill. Senator Wolf... Sam Wolf earlier indicated that we changed this law a couple of years ago so that we could have some uniformity. Much of this... Much of the difficulty that's experienced in this area is because there

And I would ask that... I would ask the same thing that Senator (sic - Representative) Wolf has asked, that is to vote 'present' on this Bill. Let the Bill either go down or stay in the House, and once we get a better feel of what the taxing districts want, after this hearing, we can come back and address it or amend it as it has to be. I would urge a 'no' vote or a 'present' vote."

Speaker Greiman: "Thank you. Nice to have Senator (sic-Representative) Wolf with us today. The Lady from Dupage, Representative Nelson."

Nelson: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker, ladies and gentlemen of the House. I join those who are in opposition to this Bill. Representative Slape, Representative Wolf, Representative Hastert and Representative Keane are exactly right. The problem here is a problem for our school districts in particular, because with a 90 day requirement in here that would only extend the cycle. We have, in the State of Illinois, a tax assessment cycle, and then there is actually also a taxing cycle. And anything which extends that cycle means that it is much more likely that school districts will not know what their EAV is that they

Dunn, J.: "And we all know that we've heard for years and years around here that township officials have been criticized because of the... of the professionalism... lack of professionalism in their assessment practices. Now they come before this General Assembly and say, 'We want the tools. We want the tools we need to make proper assessments.' I know for a fact that in Macon County this year the township officials who were required by law to return their books to the supervisor of assessments on April the 15th received those books on April the 6th. They had nine days in which to go through all the parcels in their townships and correct whatever assessments they needed to correct, get that job done and return the books to the supervisor of assessments. I ask you for a concern about the level of taxes at the local governmental level from the standpoint of the property owner, from the standpoint of the school district, from the standpoint even of the mosquito abatement district, are we concerned about what those township assessors are doing? We have chosen not to eliminate them. We think they are needed. We think that they are proper functions... proper officials to function for the taxpayers of this state. And yet we are here to say to them that whether you get your books the day

We've made so many changes in the assessment practice that it's very difficult. The whole thing needs locked at, but right now the township assessors cannot do their jobs. Those of you who are downstaters in particular, who are supported by township officials, ought to rise up and vote for this good piece of legislation. It's a good Bill. It's time may not yet have come, apparently, because of the opposing comments on this floor, but I predict to you that the time for this Bill will come. I hope it is now. I urge a favorable vote."
