Tony Leone, our friend and Assistant House Clerk, who has had no formal training in lifesaving techniques, very calmly, forcefully and instinctively applied the Heimlich maneuver to save Ms. Malinski, and his action led to dislodging of the food so that she could breathe normally again; and whereas every one at the scene was aware that Tony Leone did, in fact, Ms. Malinski's life, and that had been chaotic and stressful minutes turned into a happy ending because of Tony's heroism; and whereas Tony's calm in responding to an emergency situation turned to nervousness afterwards when he suddenly realized what could have been. it resolved by the House of Representatives of the 84th General Assembly of the State of Illinois, that we commend Tony Leone, Assistant House Clerk, for his act of heroism on March 6, 1985, when his quick, alert and calm action saved the life of Ms. Adeline Malinski. We hail his quickness of mind in instinctively applying a lifesaving technique to save Ms. Malinski from choking, and we thereby honor our good friend and associate, for it was his good deed that saved a precious life, and be it further resolved that a suitable copy of this Preamble and Resolution be presented to Tony Leone."

Piel: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Needless to say, I was very surprised when my two legislative aides came up to the office and I heard of what happened yesterday. Many times, you know, we are not prepared when an emergency arises, and this lady had started changing color and her eyes started going into the back of her head when Tony rushed over. I'd heard from the people that were down there that he was really the only cool head that prevailed. Everybody was in
