DeJaegher: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. As Sponsor of House Bill 3219, and its Chief Sponsor, I ask leave of the House to table 3219."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman is Chief Sponsor of House Bill 3219 and he has moved to table the Bill. Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, the Attendance Roll Call will be used. The Bill is tabled. Page four of the Calendar, Conference Committee Reports, appears Senate Bill 1412."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1412, First Conference Committee

Report."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Pangle."

Pangle: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Conference Committee Report is one that was highly discussed last week dealing with some conveyance of some property to a non-profit group in Manteno. Illinois to provide parcels, and I stipulate parcels of property to be conveyed to industry to come into that area to provide jobs for the people in our community. I would want to add that Kankakee is still suffering with

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an unemployment rate of 13.7. And if we're in a position and able today to pass this piece of legislation to convey part of 317 acres to the diversified tech campus people, we'd be able to provide 300 jobs for the people in the Kankakee area that's very much needed. I would move for the consideration and the approval of Conference Committee Report on Senate Bill 1412."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of the Conference Committee Report to Senate Bill 1412. Is there any discussion? There being no discussion, the question is, "Shall the House adopt Conference Committee Report #1 to Senate Bill 14..." I'm sorry, the Gentleman from Livingston, Representative Ewing."

Ewing: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, we discussed this land transfer considerably. I think most everybody has made up their mind on the issue. Certainly. don*t want to stand in the way of industrial development. I feel certain that the Director ٥f Central Management Services will do everything possible to see that this land is put to good use for the citizens in the State of Illinois if this Conference Committee Report i s approved. My personal position on this, I think, is well known to the Members of this Body. I still deeply that we, as Republicans on this side of the aisle. had every right to be brought into the negotiations discussions of this issue when the Majority Party drew the Conference Committee Report. That was not the case. For that reason. I will not support it, because I feel the process here is important. And it's important that sides of this aisle have input into important public policy decisions. The decision to give away or to use 300 acres of Illinois land, which has a value of at least 2000 dollars an acre, according to the last appraisal of nearby

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property, is of a magnitude that requires that we have bipartisan consideration. Now, I would just leave as a parting word to the other side of the aisle, if they expect this to work, if they expect the cooperation of the Republican administration in this state, then they ought to cooperate with our Party here in the House. And I can assure you that working together, we could do a than by your trying to strong-arm it through. And that is my major objection. And I have talked with your press back home and they know it. and they know that the Republicans are for industrial development and putting people to work, not for blocking it. But we have rights which we don't like to have trampled. Thank you."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman from DuPage, Representative

McCracken."

McCracken: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker McPike: "He indicates he will."

McCracken: "Representative Pangle, this Bill also amends the

Income Tax Act, is that correct? It also... It amends the

Income Tax Act, is that right?"

Speaker McPike: "Representative Pangle."

Pangle: "Yes, it does."

McCracken: "What is the substance of that Amendment?"

Pangle: "It applies to enterprise zones."

McCracken: "It applies to enterprise zones?"

Pangle: "Correct."

McCracken: "Does it expand the definition of the potential pool of employees for purposes of a tax credit?"

Pangle: "No, I don't believe that it does, Mr... Representative."

Speaker McPike: "Representative McCracken."

McCracken: "I'm waiting for the answer."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman answered the question, Sir."

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McCracken: "Oh. I didn't hear it."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Pangle, would you repeat your answer?"

Pangle: "No, I don't believe it does, Mr. Speaker."

McCracken: "Well, what does it do? What does the Amendment of the Income Tax Act do?"

Pangle: "It deals with job tax credit. It has nothing to do with income tax, Representative. And it deals with job tax credits in enterprise zones."

McCracken: "Okay, thank you."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman from Grundy, Representative

Christensen."

Christensen: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I would just like to add to the people on the other side of the aisle who might be opposed to this legislation that when Manteno Mental Health closed, we were left with some of the highest unemployment in the state. We are trying to make the best of a bad situation and create some 1500 jobs. I would ask that you help us build Illinois. And remember, there's also a reverter clause in here so if it's not used, it will go back to the state. Let's pass this legislation out of here."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Pangle, to close."

Pangle: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would just... would like to ask for the concurrence on this Conference Committee Report. And I sincerely would appreciate the support of the other side of the aisle, because I think it's very imperative this week that we get this legislation passed so that we can put people to work in Kankakee County."

Speaker McPike: "Question is, 'Shall the House adopt Conference
Committee Report #1 to Senate Bill 1412?' This is final
action. All those in favor signify by voting 'aye',
opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted? Have all voted who

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wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this Motion Representative Klemm 'ave'. 97... Ðη this Motion there are... Representative Turner 'aye'. Turner. Representative Wait 'aye'. On this Motion there are 100 'ayes', 7 'nos', 2 voting 'present', and the House does adopt Conference Committee Report #1 to Senate Bill And the Bill, having received the required Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Joint Resolution 169. Read the Resolution, Mr. Clerk."

- Clerk O'Brien: "House Joint Resolution 169. Resolved by the House of Representatives of the 84th General Assembly of the State of Illinois, the Senate concurring herein, that when both Houses adjourn on Friday, April 11, 1986, they stand adjourned until Tuesday, April 15, 1986 at 12:00 noon."
- Speaker McPike: "Representative Greiman moves for the adoption of House Joint Resolution 169. All those in favor signify saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Resolution's adopted. Page five of the... five of page the Calendar, Speaker's Table, appears House Resolution 595. Representative Braun. Out of the record. House Resolution 940, Representative Matijevich. Out record. House Resolution 1064, Speaker Madigan. record. House Resolution 1095. Representative Cullerton. Mr. Clerk."
- Clerk O'Brien: "House Resolution 1095, adds the Special Horse
 Racing Investigation Select Committee to the House Rules.

 The Rules Committee recommends 'be adopted'."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Cullerton."

Cullerton: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Resolution 910, which we passed on January 8th of this year, set up the Special Horse Racing Investigative Committee and called upon that Committee to

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issue a report to the House on or before May 1st of 1986. report is being drafted and it has come to the attention of many Members on that Committee that i t be very beneficial if the horse racing or racing Bills that would be introduced this year would go to this special Committee. So, the purpose of this Resolution is t o Special Horse Racing Investigative Select Committee to the list of Committees that are standing Committees so that this Committee would be in existence for the remainder αf this Session. I don't anticipate it being a permanent thing; but, for this year, since we will have a number dealing with racing, we thought it would bе beneficial to have a Committee that has been looking at all the issues. Representative Kubik is the Minority Spokesman on the Committee, and I believe that he concurs with Resolution. So, I would move for the adoption of the House Resolution 1095."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman moves for the adoption of House
Resolution 1095. And on that, the Gentleman from McLean,
Representative Ropp."

Ropp: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Would the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker McPike: "He indicates he will."

Ropp: "Yeah, Representative, who... who has selected this

Committee, or who even said we needed a Special Horse

Racing Investigative Committee?"

Cullerton: "You did when you voted for House Resolution 910 along with the rest of the Members of the General Assembly and then you wanted to know nam... The Members were appointed by the Minority Leader and by the Speaker. Members on your side of the aisle are Representative Vinson. McCracken and Kubik is the Minority Spokesman."

Ropp: "Has this Committee been meeting already?"

Cullerton: "Yes, we've had four meetings and we are going to be

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having a report which we expect to issue to the General Assembly next week."

- Ropp: "Is... okay. And this only operates until after this
 Report is completed, then the Committee is terminated
- Cullerton: "No, that's the purpose of this Resolution, is to set Committee up as a standing Committee that would consider... have Bills assigned to it that deal with racing and have this Committee vote on and consider those Bills. There will be, undoubtedly, some legislative recommendations that come out of the Special Investigating which would be assigned to the Committee, then, for approval."
- Ropp: "Will the Bills that have come forth from this Committee be assigned to the Judiciary Committee or will it come to the Ag Committee?"
- Cullerton: "Well, I'm not on the Committee on Assignment. If
 we're going to be creating a new Committee for the length
 of time of this Session, there's going to be a special
 Horse Racing Committee. And the Committee on Assignment
 will decide where to assign Bills. I would think that if a
 Bill is introduced that amends the Horse Racing Act, that
 they would probably assign it to our Bill (sic), but you
 never know."

Ropp: "Okay, thank you."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman from McHenry, Representative Klemm."

Klemm: "Will the Sponsor yield for questions?"

Speaker McPike: "He indicates he will."

Klemm: "Representative, I'm just curious for clarification, I
think, on the word 'Investigative'. Is... that seems to
connotate something of wrongdoing, that we're searching out
and looking...."

Cullerton: "I'm sorry. I cannot hear you. There's too much

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noise, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker McPike: "The Body give the Gentlemen their attention, please."

Klemm: "The term of the Committee called 'Investigative', the name of the Committee using the term 'Investigative' gives the connotation that there is something wrong or some wrongdoing in the racing industry, and I was curious if this is, in fact, what you're looking for this Committee to do, to investigate wrongdoing or something or if this is implied somehow that we're not aware of."

Cullerton: "No, no. See, that's what the name of the Committee
was that was set up to investigate some allegations with
regard to some improprieties. We've already conducted that
investigation. We've had four full hearings conducted in
Chicago..."

Klemm: "So..."

Cullerton: "And this is only designed to be a standing Committee

that would... that would vote on and consider Bills that

are introduced that are assigned to it."

Klemm: "So, though we call it the Special Horse Racing Investigative Select Committee, that will be the name it's not necessarily meaning we're investigating wrongdoing?"

Cullerton: "That's right. I don't anticipate anymore ..."

Klemm: "Alright. It just seemed like an inappropriate use of words to describe a Committee just looking at legislation affecting the racing industry when we added 'Investigative' in it. That's all."

Cullerton: "Well, maybe a better name would have been Racing

Committee, but..."

Klemm: "Alright, but it doesn't mean that then."

Cullerton: "Right."

Klemm: "Fine, thank you very much."

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Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Kubik." Kubik: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd just like to reassure the Members on the Republican side of the aisle that the of this Committee is that as we investigated the horse racing industry, we also know that there that will deal with the subject of horse racing and off track betting and a whole conglomerate of issues; thought it would be appropriate to continue the work of this Committee because those Bills would be of interest the Committee. So, there is ... once the report that we will issue in about a week is completed, the purpose of the Committee will be to consider legislation with respect to the horse racing industry and some of the related problems or issues to it. So, I just want to reassure that is the purpose of this Committee. Leadership is in accord with Representative Cullerton's Motion."

- Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption... The

- Vinson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Assembly. I join the Gentleman in his Motion. I believe it's a good Motion. The Members of this Committee has developed substantial expertise on this industry. The problems particularly attendant to this industry deserve careful scrutiny, and I would join the Gentleman in moving for the adoption of House Resolution 1095."
- Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of House Resolution 1095. Since this establishes a permanent it requires 60 votes. All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted? Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the On this Motion there are 95 'ayes', record. 13 *nos*. 2

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voting 'present'... 94 'ayes', 13 'nos', 2 voting *present*, and the Motion carries.
