110th Legislative Day

April 30, 1986

Speaker McPike: "The House will come to order. Members will be in their seats. The Chaplain for today will be the Reverend Sammy Hooks, Pastor of St. John's African Methodist Episcopal Church of Springfield. Reverend Hooks is a guest of Representative Mike Curran. Will the guests in the balcony please rise and join us in the invocation?"

Reverend Hooks: "This is the day which the Lord hath made. We will rejoice and be glad in it. Ye are of God, little children, and have overcome them because greater is He that is in You than He that is in the world. Our Father, who art in Heaven, we draw nigh unto Thee, conscious of Thy greatness, goodness and power. Therefore, we glorify Thee for all that Thou has done for us. We acknowledge that in many ways we have fallen short of Thy expectations. We have been weak when we should have been strong. We've been fearful when we should have been courageous. We've been foolish when we ought to have been wise. So, we come together today to say thank You for the blessings of life. We thank You for this great country in which we live and have our movement and being. We thank You for all the Members of this Body, even though we've been of different administrations, yet, we are one. We thank You for allowing us to work together as a Body, complete and not fragmented. We are grateful for You allowing us to come together to reason one with another that this state might prosper. Now we ask that You might bring a renewal of health to those who are sick, give strength to those who are tempted, bring comfort to those hearts that are heavy with discouragement or sorrow. These things we ask in the Spirit of Him who prayed not My will, but Thy will be done. Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be accepted when I site, 'Oh Lord, my strength and my

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Redeemer". Amen."

Speaker McPike: "Be led in the Pledge of Allegiance by Representative Ropp."

Ropp - et al: "Pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

Speaker McPike: "Roll Call for Attendance. Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, let the record reflect the excused absence of Representative Nelson Rice. Nelson Rice, our colleague, had a slight attack and is in St. John's Hospital doing fine. He has our prayers and wishes for a speedy and full recovery."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Piel."

Piel: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, would the record please show that Representative Harris and Representative Barnes are excused today?"

Speaker McPike: "Yes, thank you. Someone punch Representative Klemm? I'm sure that he's here. Representative Ropp, maybe you could do it. Representative Masara, could you punch in? Thank you. 114 Members answering the Roll Call, a quorum is present. Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Speaker, I move that we dispense with the reading of the Journal and the following Journals be approved: Journal #88 of January 8th; 89, February 10th; 90 of March 4th; 91 of March 5th; 92 of March 20th; 93 of March 25; 94 of April 1st; 95 of April 2nd; 96 of April 3rd; 97 of April 8th; 98 of April 9th; 99 of April 10th; 100 of April 11th; 101 of April 15th and 102 of April 16th."

Speaker McPike: "You've heard the Gentleman's Motion for approval of the Journals. Is there any opposition? Any discussion? Representative McCracken."

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McCracken: "My children pressed my button. I apologize."

Speaker McPike: "You've heard the Gentleman's Motion. All...

You've heard the Gentleman's Motion. All those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, and the Motion carries. If the Chair could have the attention of the Members, please. Could the Chair have some order for an introduction of a special guest? Could the Chair have some order? Representative Ewing. Today we'd like to introduce Mr. William Penn Mott, Jr., Director of the National Park Service. Mr. William Penn Mott, Jr. was selected as the twelfth Director of the National Park Service in May of 1985. A career professional, Director Mott first joined the National Park Service in 1933 as a landscape architect. Prior to his tenure as Director of the National Park Service, Mr. Mott served as Director of the California Department of Parks and Recreation from 1967 until 1975. As Director of the California Park System, Mr. Mott was responsible for many innovative changes, including opening of park ranger ranks to women. During 1931, Mr. Mott received the Department of Interior's Public Service Award, the highest honor given to private citizens. I'd like to present Mr. William Penn Mott, Jr."

Mr. Mott: "I'm honored to have this opportunity to appear before this distinguished audience. I would like to congratulate you on your support last year in funding the Open Land Acquisition and Development Act through the Build Illinois Program. The matching grants you made available will supplement the Federal Land and Water Conservation Fund. It is steps such as this that will enable Illinois to continue to be a leader in parks and recreation. This morning I heard the Governor speak about parks and recreation and how important these areas are to Illinois and how important they will be in the future. And I would

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like to add my words of support to you for carrying on this program and helping in developing the state park system here in Illinois. It will mean a great deal to you in the future. And I can tell you that statistics indicate that parks and recreation are becoming more and more important to the people of the United States. We anticipate this year, because of the increase in terrorism around the world, the decrease in gasoline prices, the ability of people to move around the United States safely, that we will have an increase in the attendance at the national parks of over 20 percent. We're already feeling that increase in Grand Canyon. This last month had an increase of 30 percent in its attendance over last year. So, I think you're going to find more and more people traveling to Illinois and throughout the United States and this will increase substantially the amount of spending that tourists will bring to Illinois as well as other states in the Union. I'm glad to report to you that the Secretary has recently apportioned the 18.5 million dollars of historic preservation grants and Illinois will receive approximately 300,000 dollars from that particular funding program. Also, the Land and Water Conservation Program, which has been so successful in developing parks throughout the United States, the Governor... the Secretary will be allocating that money, approximately 35.9 million dollars, of which Illinois will receive approximately 1,400,000 dollars to help in the development and acquisition of parks in Illinois. I should also like to give you a few statistics with regards to the interest in parks and recreation in this coming year. There have been a number of surveys that have been made recently. The Gallop Poll figures, for example, indicate that the top recreational pursuits were swimming, fishing, bicycling, pool, weight

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training, jogging, softball, camping, bowling and basketball and baseball. Again, Gallop Poll indicated that people will be spending this year, in their leisure spending program, and this is confirmed by the figures of the U.S. Department of Commerce, 21 billion dollars for toys and sport supplies, 11 billion dollars for hotels and motels and six billion for boating and more than 800 million for pleasure aircraft. I might say to you that in California we developed a number of tours of the state. We called them air tours, as part of our recreation program, and these became very, very popular. And when you... notice that 800 million dollars was spent on pleasure aircraft, I would suspect that here in Illinois you could develop similar air tours of the state that would be very popular to those who use their light airplanes for recreation travel. Travel spending in the United States in 1985, according to the U.S. Travel Data Center, totaled 259.4 billion dollars. The American Outdoor Commission, which was appointed by the President and will be making their report at the end of this year, made an independent survey that was financed by the National Geographic and that survey indicated that the people were interested in support of parks and recreation, had no objection to increasing fees to go to various park facilities and, also, they were... the report indicated that people were particularly interested in quality. And I'm glad to see that here in Illinois money is being spent to rehabilitate some of the old structures that were built during the CC days, and I can assure you that this is the sort of thing that the public appreciates and that you'll find a great deal of support for that kind of operation. The National Park Service has not increased its fees since 1972. We will be in... We have a Bill before Congress that will

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increase fees to the national parks and will increase the fee schedules for the annual pass as well as the pass for senior citizens. I was quite surprised in the House hearing relative to these increased fees that the House felt that our recommendation of increasing the senior citizen pass for which we give out 350,000 annually - and that's good for the lifetime of the individual - that they thought that the increase... charging ten dollars for that particular pass should be increased to 25 dollars. And in my travels around the United States, I find that senior citizens are perfectly willing to make that kind of a charge and I think you'll see that increase take place as legislature goes through the Congress and is approved by the President of the United States. Again, I want to congratulate you on the very creative and expansive program you have here in Illinois relative to parks and recreation. And I can assure you that all the statistics and information that we have in Washington indicates that that's a good investment and that you will... it will return for every dollar expended ten dollars in revenue from tourism into the State of California. Thank you very much for this opportunity to speak to you and to be with you."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Breslin in the Chair."

Speaker Breslin: "Committee Reports."

Speaker Breslin: "Ladies and Gentlemen, Representative Saltsman, in the Chair."

Saltsman: "Thank you, Madam Speaker. It's my pleasure at this time to introduce to the General Assembly the State Championship Girls' Class AA Basketball Champions from Peoria Manuel High School. Our Lady Rams were very victorious this year. I've been sitting here for three terms clapping for all these Representatives who have been bringing the championship teams down here for introductions and this is my first time that I've had the pleasure to have a Class AA championship team from my district. And, beings this is my alma mater, I'm also very proud of it. At this time, I'd like to introduce to you Coach Dennis Brown, who did a fine job with our young athletes, and he'll introduce the players to you. Coach Brown."

Coach Brown: "It's a privilege to be before you today representing Manuel High School. I would like to introduce to you the team members. I will start with the two freshman. If maybe they'd just wave their hand. Alison Green, Veronica Brown. Sophomores - 'Coshica' Augusta, Joyce Jackson, Annette Moore, Jennifer King. One of the starters who was a sophomore, six one and a half, 'Rissa Taylor'. Juniors - Monica King, a starter. 'Mika' Bingamon, a starter, second team all tournament, by the

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way. Four seniors - Sharon Neal, Dawn Matts. The last two off the starters were both seniors. The first player recently signed a letter of intent to attend Murray State University. She was first team all tournament, honorable mention all state, honorable mention high school all American, four times all conference, Holly Baker. Last of the starters, six three senior, all state, Parade Magazine third team all American, USA Today honorable mention all American, four times all conference, first team all tournament, 'Carla McGee'."

Saltsman: "Thank you. And the geographic area that we represent, Representative Tuerk is also here and some of the students also live in his district, so it kind of straddles our borderline. So, indeed, we are proud here in Illinois that our students performed so well, especially from the Peoria and Central Illinois area. The only team they lost to all year was a... was Peoria Central and they were number one throughout most of the year and stayed in the basketball rankings. And with Bradley University being beaten by Louisville, we kind of think that our district is the state basketball district here in Illinois. So, at this time, I would ask the Clerk to read the resolved portion of Resolution 1201."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Resolution 1201, offered by Representative Saltsman and Tuerk. Resolved by the House of Representatives of the 84th General Assembly of the State of Illinois, that we heartily congratulate the Peoria Manuel High School Girls' Basketball Team, the Lady Rams, on winning the 1986 State Class AA Basketball Championship, that we commend their coaches and staff for their dedication and leadership and that we wish all of the team members happiness and success in their future endeavors. And be it further resolved that a suitable copy of this

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Preamble and Resolution be presented to Coach Dennis Brown as a token of our esteem."

Saltsman: "Yes. Also, Representative Carl Hawkinson has part of the Peoria area and some of these students could possibly live in his district. So, at this time, we thank you for your attention. It also takes great supporters. Our First District Councilman for the Manuel High School District, Councilman James Polk, elected to the Peoria City Council, and our County Board Member from the same district who are very loyal fans of the Manue Rams, Dana Davis, our County Board member. Jim is a campaign... downstate campaign manager for Representative Carol Braun. Thank you very much for your attention."

Speaker Breslin: "Ladies and Gentlemen, the House is prepared to go to the Order of House Bills Second Reading, appropriation Bills only. Begins on... It begins on page five. These are the ones that both sides have agreed to call at this time and to move on Second to Third Reading. House Bill 2688. Representative Capparelli. Representative Leverenz. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2688, a Bill for an Act making an appropriation from the Metropolitan Fair and Exhibition Authority Reconstruction Fund to the Metropolitan Fair and Exhibition Authority. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. House Bill... On page six appears House Bill 2974, Representative Barnes. Representative Hastert. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2974, a Bill for an Act making an appropriation to the Military and Naval Department. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

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Speaker Breslin: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. House Bill 2979, Representative Hastert. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2979, a Bill for an Act making an appropriation for the ordinary and contingent expense of the Liquor Control Commission. Second Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Breslin: "Out of the record. House Bill 2980, Representative Hastert. We want to go to House Bill 2980. Representative Leverenz, for what reason do you rise?"

Leverenz: "Inquiry of the Chair. And perhaps I guess Representative Hastert. 2979 I understand is okay."

Speaker Breslin: "I thought you indicated you wanted it taken out of the record."

Leverenz: "That was 2978 out."

Speaker Breslin: "I did not call 2978. Maybe the board put it..."

Leverenz: "But it was on the wall."

Speaker Breslin: "I see. Okay. We wanted 2978 out of the record. We want 2979, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2979, a Bill for an Act making an appropriation to the ordinary and contingent expense of the Liquor Control Commission. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. House Bill 2980. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2980, a Bill for an Act making appropriations for the ordinary and contingent expense of the Illinois Educational Labor Relations Board. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment 01 was adopted in

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Committee."

Speaker Breslin: "Are there any Floor Amendments? Are there any Motions?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions relating to Amendment #1."

Speaker Breslin: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, offered by Representative Leverenz."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Leverenz."

Leverenz: "Thank you, Madam Speaker. Amendment #2 would restore the Amendment #1 that we cut some from in commodities, printing the auto and telecommunications. It would restore 69,900 in this Amendment, bringing the total for the appropriation request to a million 414 thousand point seven. I would move for the adoption of Amendment #2."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #2 to House Bill 2980. And on that question, is there any discussion? The Gentleman from Kendall, Representative Hastert."

Hastert: "Thank you, Madam Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. As per this Amendment, is as per agreement in Committee. So, we concur with the Amendment."

Speaker Breslin: "The question is, 'Shall Amendment #2 be adopted?' All those in favor say 'aye', all those opposed say 'nay'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it, and the Amendment is adopted. Are there any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. House Bill 2981. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2981, a bill for an Act making appropriations for the ordinary and contingent expense of the Local Labor Relations Board. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

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Speaker Breslin: "Are there any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker Breslin: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, offered by Representative Leverenz."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Leverenz."

Leverenz: "Thank you, Madam Speaker. Amendment #2 would restore two line items. It would restore 5,500 in printing. And in the telecommunications line we would restore 20,000 dollars. And that is a little less than they requested. But, that helps get the computers up and running on telephone lines. I would move for the adoption of this Amendment to House Bill 2931."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #2 to House Bill 2931. And on that question, the Gentleman from Adams, Representative Mays. Representative Mays."

Mays: "Thank you very much, Madam Speaker. Would the Gentleman yield for a question?"

Speaker Breslin: "He will."

Mays: "Are we adding back the entire amount of cuts that we made in the previous Amendment on this Bill?"

Leverenz: "No. We cut them in Committee and now we are restoring some but not all that was cut. In printing, again, we're... it's restored to 5.5, 5,500 which is .3 less than was requested and .5 less than their estimated expenditures. And in the telecommunications line it's restored to 20,000 dollars, which is .8 percent less than requested. So, they're still a little under."

Mays: "Thank you very much. I think this Amendment is reasonable and we support it."

Speaker Leverenz: "Representative Hastert."

Hastert: "Yes, just to add, Madam Chairman, that we do agree with

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this Amendment as made in the Committee."

Speaker Breslin: "The question is, 'Shall Amendment 42 to House Bill 2981 be adopted?' All those in favor say 'aye', all those opposed say 'nay'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it, and the Amendment is adopted. Are there any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. House Bill 2982. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2932, a bill for an Act making appropriations for the ordinary and contingent expense of the State Labor Relations Board. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendments #1 and 2 were withdrawn in Committee. Floor Amendment #3, offered by Representative Leverenz."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Leverenz."

Leverenz: "Thank you. This Amendment, Amendment #3, would add something that we did not discuss in Committee but came up on another agency, and that was the Industrial Commission. Seems that the Department of Central Management Services has desk audits being performed in a number of the agencies, boards and commissions. This would put 9... I'm sorry 10,274 in for personal services due to the desk audits showing that the people are not doing... they're doing a job for which they are not being paid for. This straightens out that wrong. Also, an additional 10,000 dollars is in contractual for attorneys' expenses and mainly reimbursements caused by the Attorney General's Office for something that was unsuspected in coming up. So, I would move to add 20,274 dollars to this budget by Amendment #3."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of

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Amendment #3 to House Bill 2962. And on that question,
Representative Hastert."

Hastert: "Thank you, Madam Chairman. This is as per request by
CMS and we agree."

Speaker Breslin: "The question is, 'Shall the House adopt
Amendment #3 to House Bill 2982. All those in favor say
'aye', all those opposed say 'nay'. In the opinion of the
Chair, the 'ayes' have it, and the Amendment is adopted.
Are there any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. House Bill 2992. 2992. House
Bill 2992. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2992, a Bill for an Act making
appropriations for the ordinary and contingent expense of
the Civil Service Commission. Second Reading of the Bill.
Amendments #1 and 2 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Breslin: "Are there any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. House bill 2994. Clerk, read
the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2994, a Bill for an Act making
appropriations for the ordinary and contingent expense of
the Department of Registration and Education. Second
Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in
Committee."

Speaker Breslin: "Are there any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker Breslin: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Hays, for what reason do you
rise?"

Hays: "I would like to ask the Sponsor to hold this Bill for a
moment or a day or so so that we can solidify some of the

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discussions we have at the Department of Registration and Education on licensure enforcement. I think it might be a budget issue that we would like to address. And so I'd like the Sponsor to hold the Bill for a day."

Speaker Breslin: "I note that the Sponsor is Representative Barnes. But I'll ask for Representative Leverenz to address the question."

Leverenz: "Well, I might yield to Representative Hastert, but I would encourage the Bill going forward. We can always bring it back."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Hastert."

Hastert: "I'll agree to do that."

Speaker Breslin: "Okay. We'll let the Bill go forward. The Bill moves to Third Reading. House Bill 3005. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 3005, a Bill for an Act making appropriations for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Illinois Racing Board. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Breslin: "Are there any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker Breslin: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. House Bill 3035. Representative McCracken. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 3035, a Bill for an Act making appropriations to the Secretary of State. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendments #1 and 2 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Breslin: "Are there any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker Breslin: "Are there Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #3, offered by Representative

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McCracken."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative McCracken."

McCracken: "Thank you, Madam Speaker. Floor Amendment #3 would delete approximately 600,000 dollars from the currently allocated money payable from the Motor Fuel Tax Fund and from the State Lottery Fund. That same amount would be added to the amount payable from General Revenue Fund for contractual services. Essentially, it's a bookkeeping change, and I would ask its adoption."

Speaker Breslin: "Mr. Clerk, please note that this is Amendment #3, not Amendment #2. The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #3 to House Bill 3035. And on that question, Representative Leverenz."

Leverenz: "It's agreed."

Speaker Breslin: "The question is, 'Shall the House adopt Amendment #3 to House Bill 3035?' All those in favor say 'aye', all those opposed say 'nay'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it, and the Amendment is adopted. Are there any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. On page eight appears House Bill 3093, Representative Matijevich. Clerk, read the Bill. No? Out of the record. House Bill 3165, Representative Bowman. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 3165, a Bill for an Act making appropriations to various agencies. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendments #1 and 2 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Breslin: "Are there any Floor... Are there any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #3, offered by Representative Leverenz."

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Speaker Breslin: "Representative Leverenz."

Leverenz: "Thank you, Madam Speaker. Floor Amendment #3 would appropriate another million dollars to the State Board of Education for the Enterprise High School Act, and I would move for the adoption of Amendment #3."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #3 to House Bill 3165. And on that question, is there any discussion? Hearing none, the question is, 'Shall Amendment #3 be adopted?' All those in favor say 'aye', all those opposed say 'nay'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it, and Amendment is adopted. Are there any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #4, offered by Representative Leverenz."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Leverenz."

Leverenz: "Thank you. Amendment #4, as we made the commitment in Committee, in Committee we had 10,000 dollars for the Pekin trip, and this would bring it up to the 20,000 dollars that we agreed to in Committee out of Tourism Promotions funds. I would move for the adoption of Amendment #4."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #4 to House Bill 3165. And on that question, is there any discussion? Hearing none, the question is, 'Shall Amendment #4 be adopted?' All those in favor say 'aye', all those opposed say 'nay'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it, and the Amendment is adopted. Are there any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #5, offered by Representative Leverenz."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Leverenz."

Leverenz: "Amendment #5 would provide for a transfer of funds for the Education Labor Relations Board and it would take 34 thousand point seven into contractual and delete 2.4

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thousand from travel, 2.3 from printing and 24 thousand three from telecommunications and 3,000 dollars from auto, which makes the 34,700 dollars available for contractual. I would move for the adoption of Amendment #5."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #5 to House Bill 3165. And on that question, is there any discussion? Hearing none, the question is, 'Shall Amendment #5 be adopted?' All those in favor say 'aye', all those opposed say 'nay'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it, and the Amendment is adopted. Are there any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. House Bill 3166, Representative Matijevich. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 3166, a Bill for an Act to appropriate money to the Department of Energy and Natural Resources for the Des Plaines River Wetlands Demonstration Project. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. House Bill 3093, we will go back to. Representative Matijevich. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 3093, a Bill for an Act making an appropriation to the Department of Central Management Services. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. Representative Bowman is recognized for an announcement. Representative Bowman."

Bowman: "Hon't be necessary."

Speaker Breslin: "Very good. Representative McGann."

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Representative McGann. Representative McGann, we are prepared to go to the Speaker's Table on the Order of Motions. You have a House Resolution to be called. So, Ladies and Gentlemen, on page 12 on your Calendar, under the Order of Speaker's Table, appears House Resolution 1139. Representative McGann."

McGann: "Thank you, Madam Speaker and Members of the Assembly. If I could have your attention for just a few moments. This is a very important Resolution. It's a Resolution to try and help and take care of some of our forgotten ones in this state. This House Resolution 1139 creates a special 13 Member House Committee on Developmental Care to evaluate the quality of care being provided through various state facilities for the developmentally disabled, to review specific violations of health and safety standards that have been cited by the Illinois Department of Public Health and the Health Care Financing Administration of the United States Department of Health and Human Services. The special Committee must report by the end of the year. The Speaker and the Minority Leader of the House appoint six Members. In addition, the Speaker will appoint the Chairman. The Committee will conduct public hearings and consult with various federal, state and local and private agencies regarding the quality of state services for the developmentally disabled. First, I would like to emphasize that this should not be a partisan issue. In fact, I would encourage any and all Members to join as Cosponsors. I believe that it's the time the General Assembly to conduct an intensive review of state services for the developmentally disabled. We need to ensure the highest quality of care possible for such needy children and adults. Second, I believe that this study will ultimately prove beneficial for the Department of Mental Health and

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Developmental Disabilities. General Assembly oversight in this case is intended to ensure that appropriate programs and resources are developed to improve care. By anyone's determination, this will not detract from current state efforts and should assure the highest possible priority for the DMHDD program. Finally, this study is important to the state budget. Now, please listen to this, please, my fellow colleagues. Medicaid reimbursement for the Department of Mental Health and Development Disabilities total more than 90 million dollars. A substantial portion is attributed to the care for the developmentally disabled. These funds have been put in repeated jeopardy. Most recently, the Health Care Financing Administration has cited several, several Illinois developmental centers with violations of Medicaid standards. This has occurred despite repeated, repeated plunges and budgetary initiatives of the DMHDD to improve services and achieve full Medicaid certification of all its developmental centers. The Federal Health Care Financing Administration recommended that Medicaid certification for the Howe Development Center be terminated in August of 1985. The Department of Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities voluntarily withdrew their facility from participation on October... on August the 23rd of 1985 and has been losing 28,000 dollars a day in federal Medicaid funds ever since. Six other developmental centers have been cited, including Waukegan, Shapiro, Kankakee, Lincoln, Jacksonville and Anna. The Elizabeth 'Ludemann' Developmental Center in Park Forest was scheduled for termination on April the 12th, 1986, but is pending based upon implementation of plans of correction that have recently been submitted by the Department. I believe that these matters and the fact that these are recurring problems warrants immediate and

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special investigation by the General Assembly, especially considering the substantial sums of money that we have been asked to appropriate in the past, and for this year, to correct such problems. I believe we must be more fully informed about the quality of existing programs and the success or failure to correct deficiencies. On this point, I would like to further comment that the new Citizens' Council on Mental Health and Development Disabilities is in the process of being organized to conduct some oversight of state programs relating to the mentally ill. It's agenda and priorities for this year have not been established. So, I am not confident that the purpose of the study proposed by this House Resolution could be immediately carried out by that group. I must also say that the Sponsors of House Resolution 1139 are keenly interested in this subject. They expect to be active Members of this special plan... that special panel. I believe that their work would be complimentary to the activities of the new Citizens' Council. I should add that the goals of this study are supported by key community service associations, the Illinois Association for Retarded Citizens, the Illinois Association of Rehabilitation Facilities and 'Ada S. McKinnely' and other advocates for the developmentally disabled who have also expressed concern that loss of Medicaid certification and ill-advised reforms of developmental... training in Fiscal Year '86 are symptomatic of more serious problems to state programs. They have expressed strong, strong concern about the loss of federal funds in plans to divert and the plans that are there to divert these state funds to Medicaid compliance projects. This will reduce critical resources for efforts to maintain and improve these most essential community services. And as I have stated, let's think about the

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forgotten ones today and I ask you to pass this Resolution, jointly, from both sides of this House. Thank you."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of House Resolution 1139. And on that question, the Gentleman from Morgan, Representative Ryder."

Ryder: "Thank you, Madam Chairman. Would the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Breslin: "He will."

Ryder: "Representative, I'm assuming that you're aware of the Citizens' Assembly on Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities?"

McGann: "That is correct, Representative Ryder. I mentioned it in my comments."

Ryder: "And since you're aware of that Citizens' Assembly, are you not duplicating the functions of that Citizens' Assembly by creating this special organization?"

McGann: "Absolutely not. First of all, your Council has... I believe was approved in July 1, 1985, and to this date, is not in its activity. Further, that it's just becoming organized. I don't think there will be any dup... here. I think what we're going to do is do like we're supposed to be doing as Representatives of our people in the state, is to go out and get the facts and then hopefully be able to rectify the different problems that exist."

Ryder: "I think that you're somewhat mistaken into the abilities of the organization, since they were especially set up for exactly the kinds of problems that you discussed. I would think that you may want to reconsider your current position on this Bill."

McGann: "I don't believe that I can reconsider my position on this Resolution, especially when we're losing 24,000 dollars a day, federal monies, Title 19 monies that we should have coming in to help our programs. And I was told also by the Department of Mental Health that they may

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have done that by design. In other words, by design to lose 28,000 dollars a day. Then they stated, back away from it if I would, and they'll try and work out the problems. Then further they stated, blame it on the previous Director. He's the guy that caused it all. We got a new Director now. I think this General Assembly should take this task at hand and do its job. A few years ago, when I first came to this Assembly, that problem was in regards to our little infants, our high risk infants, and we created a special Committee such as this, travelled throughout the state, cost the State of Illinois very little dollars, and we came up with a legislative package that's now in the Act that is taking care of those high risk infants. Something we can be proud of. And this is the same attitude and design we should have here."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Ryder, on the issue."

Ryder: "I stand in opposition to the Resolution for many reasons. The first and foremost is the fact that it duplicates the Citizens' Assembly on Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities. It duplicates an organization that combines not only the very best from this legislative Body and from the Senate, but the very best that can be provided from the private sector. As a consequence, we are in the... we are beginning again the process of duplication of effort, the very process of commissions that onerous word that describes past problems within this legislative body. We are beginning again that kind of a problem. As a consequence, we should not be in support of this Bill. The Representative indicated that there were problems in various state facilities. Indeed, there were. One of them occurred in Jacksonville. But we found that by bringing the matter to the attention of the Director of the Department of Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities,

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that we received the quickest and utmost cooperation. And, today, I can proudly tell you that the problems in Jacksonville have been solved. Cooperation, Citizens' Assembly are the way to address his issues, not by creating another legislative boondog."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman from Lee, Representative Olson."

Olson: "Thank you, Madam Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I address this Resolution as Cochairman of the Citizens' Assembly on Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities. Senator Kelly and I were appointed by respective leaderships in both Houses to do specifically what we're being sought in this Resolution. The Speaker of the House, Mike Madigan, has appointed one of his outstanding members, Steve Stalcup, to be our Executive Director. We have a budget. We have a program. We are the agency that should address this issue and we will. As a consequence, I would suggest that we do not support House Resolution 1139 but, rather, leave it to the group which, by consensus, this General Assembly has put in place."

Speaker Breslin: "The Lady from Cook, Representative Didrickson."

Didrickson: "Yes, thank you, Madam Speaker. Will the Gentleman yield for a question?"

Speaker Breslin: "He indicates he will."

Didrickson: "Representative McGann, you know I talked to you last week about this issue. I happen to have Howe Developmental Disabled Center within my own district. Since I spoke with you, I also met with the Director there and with the parents' group. So, my question to you is did this Resolution come from the parents of the client community?"

McGann: "This Resolution came about when we start looking into the complaints that I had received from many people in my district and other Legislators had received in their districts about the total care and the programs and the

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fact that we were losing 28,000 dollars a day in federal dollars. And we felt as though that we should move on the creation of this special Committee in order to get the facts and hopefully, as I stated before, to rectify it in this very, very short term investigation."

Didrickson: "Well then, I would just like to share with you and the Members of this Body with regards to the feedback that I received last Friday when I was there - rather, excuse me, Monday, with the parent group, the president of the parent groups and the Director of the facility at Howe, which has been decertified. Progress is being made there. The parent community, from the feedback that I received, did not question what we are doing down here in the General Assembly with regards to specifics with this Resolution. And I asked them to respond to that. The feedback that I received from them was that they felt very comfortable and, in fact, sent many okays to the current Director there with regard to the progress that they're making and where they're moving to. Their main concern deals really with the client technician ratio and that's their effort and what they're working towards. I would just like to share that with you."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman from DeWitt, Representative Vinson."

Vinson: "Thank you, Madam Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Assembly. I speak on this issue not in any party capacity. I speak as the representative of one of the larger developmentally disabled institutions in our state system. Lincoln Developmental Center has been in my district since I became a Legislator. It is a fine institution and it is an institution to which I've devoted a great deal of legislative attention. I think that dealing with the problems of the disabled in state institutions and ensuring

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that state institutions are properly run is most important. I think proper funding is necessary and I think that it's critical that agencies are responsible, and that does not include just the Department of Mental Health, but also Public Health, address these problems appropriately. I've worked at length in a bipartisan fashion with Members on both sides of the aisle on this matter. Representative Mautino and I, for years, have periodically sponsored jointly sponsored Amendments to raise the funding levels for various mental health institutions in order to make sure that there was adequate resources there to do the job. I rise against this particular Resolution, therefore, not because I don't think there should be very thorough legislative oversight of the problem, but because I think that the right place to do it is not some special Committee, but in the Appropriations Committee. Pardon me. Representative Bowman, Representative Mastert are strongly committed to the problems of the mentally ill and the developmentally disabled. There's no Committee that will be more diligent in dealing with that issue than a Committee chaired by those two Gentlemen. I believe that they'll work at it very thoroughly. And I know that I've personally made input several times in the past year on this particular problem with Mr. Mastert. I don't see any reason why there should be any sense of partisanship on this matter. And for that reason and because I think we can do it very appropriately through the Appropriations Committee and through the various other oversight groups that this Legislature created, I oppose this Resolution. I say to you, Mr. McGann, that that does not, in any way, mean that I oppose the need for very thorough oversight of this problem. No concern should be more important to us as a General Assembly than the proper care for people who

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cannot care for themselves and to make sure that we've got the resources necessary to do that job and agencies that aren't just tripping themselves up. I would like to join you in making sure that the Appropriations Committee thoroughly addresses that problem and that this Assembly does everything necessary to put the resources and the sense of organization into solving that problem. I don't think this Resolution is necessary to do that. I think it would be duplicative of that, and I think the Appropriations Committee should be the appropriate vehicle for that... for that study and for ensuring that there's compliance. And I would simply say to you one thing of critical concern. When you have the kind of study Committee that you're suggesting, that there's always the question in the bureaucrats' mind whether it has any clout. When you're dealing with the Appropriations Committee, when you're dealing with the people who can make sure that you don't even have toilet paper in the executive washroom, then you know you can get cooperation. And that's why I think the Appropriations Committee is the right place to deal with it. I oppose the Resolution."

Speaker Breslin: "The Lady from Cook, Representative Currie."

Currie: "Thank you, Madam Speaker and Members of the House. I rise in support of the Gentleman's Resolution. It seems to me that although we do indeed have the appropriations process to deal with ongoing issues of funding state agencies, we do have a Citizens' Assembly, newly created, to help us take long term looks at problems facing women, children, the developmentally disabled and the mentally ill in the State of Illinois. This Resolution was introduced in response to a clear cut crisis, a crisis in which we are losing money day after day because our facilities are not in compliance with federal Medicaid requirements. In

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addition, the loss may well be expanded, because other facilities are under investigation by the Federal Health Care Financing Administration. This crisis is one that it is appropriate for our Assembly to respond to by creating a bipartisan 12 Member Committee of the Members of this House so that we can address the issue with focus, a focus that is not available through the ongoing appropriations process, nor through the ongoing Citizens' Assembly process. As Co-chair of that new organization, I still support this Resolution, for I think that it offers us the focus to target our attention to a crisis financial for the taxpayers of the State of Illinois and a crisis of care for the developmentally disabled of our state. I urge your support for House Resolution 1139."

Speaker Breslin: "There being no further discussion, Representative McGann, to close."

McGann: "Excuse me. Thank you, Madam Speaker and Members of the Assembly. While we've heard it pretty well about the great job that's being done in the state for our forgotten ones. But I can't understand, I know the appropriation process and I know that it works very, very well and many compliments should be given to the Chairman and the Members of both those Committees because of the work that they... the time that they spend. But someplace along the line this issue slipped through the cracks. And all we're trying to do is to try to rectify and move on and take care of our forgotten ones in this state so that we have the best services for our mentally handicapped and our developmental disability people. Now, as far as the Council is concerned, yes, there is Co-chairmen, appointed and so forth and so on. But, God almighty, help us realize that after all these months, no activity has taken place. Now, all of a sudden we have a great cry that says

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everything is fine in our centers. This Resolution has been laying around here for the last three weeks. They were trying out there to do their best they can to get everything straightened away before we get out there to look at it. And wouldn't you, each of you, as an individual, who are in charge of an agency, you had no problems, wouldn't you welcome this type of... that look into the problem? I certainly would? I wouldn't be saying, forget about it. All the good things I did to you ... for you in the past and now you're going to turn on me. I'm not turning on that Department. I love that Department. But I want to find out why we're losing 28,000 dollars a day. I ask for support of this Resolution. It'll be handled the same way that our little infants were taken care of and will come back and make us all proud. Thank you."

Speaker Breslin: "The question is, 'Shall House Resolution 1139 be adopted?' All those in favor vote 'aye', all those opposed vote 'no'. Voting is open. 60 votes are required for the adoption of this Resolution. Representative McCracken, one minute to explain your vote."

McCracken: "A request for a verification, if it appears to reach the requisite number"

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Wyvetter Younge wishes to vote 'aye'. Representative Phelps. Representative Phelps. Representative Younge would like to vote 'aye'. There has been a request for a verification. Please vote your own switch. Representative Friedrich, one minute to explain your vote."

Friedrich: "Madam Speaker, with all respect to the Sponsor of this Resolution, I've been involved in this area for a long time, and we have 'Murray' Children's Center at Centralia. We have a very active parents... 'Murray' parents' group

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there, and they are in constant contact, not only with me, but with Legislators all over this state because their children are involved. I think that's the kind of involvement we need, and we don't... the way we solve a problem around here sometimes appoint a Committee. We're all a Committee of one to see that these children are taken care of. And to form another Committee, I think, is excusing ourselves from something we need to be doing anyway. And I can tell you many people on this floor are already involved in the problem and just as concerned as the Sponsor."

Speaker Breslin: "Have all voted who wish? 60 votes are required for the adoption of this Resolution. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 62 voting 'aye', 43 voting 'no' and 2 voting 'present'. There has been a request for a verification of the Roll Call by Representative McCracken. Representative Shaw wishes to have leave to be verified, Representative McCracken. Representative Shaw has leave to be verified. Would you poll the absentees?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Poll of the Absentees. Darger. Giglio."

Speaker Breslin: "Excuse me. Representative McCracken, Representative Curran would ask leave to be verified. Would you write these names down? Curran, Nash, DeLeo, Flowers, Wolf, Currie, Panayotovich. Proceed, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "Continuing with the Poll of the Absentees. Hoffman. Huff. Krska. Pullen. Ronan. Eullock. Barnes. Harris, and Rice."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative O'Connell asks leave to be verified, Representative McCracken, and that is granted. Would you poll the Affirmative, Mr. Clerk?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Poll of the Affirmative. Alexander. Carrios. Black. Bowman. Braun. Breslin. Brookins. Brunsvold.

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Capparelli. Christensen. Cullerton. Curran. Currie.
Daley. DeJaegher. DeLeo. Dunn. Farley. Flinn.
Flowers. Giorgi. Greiman. Hannig. Hartke. Hawkinson."

Speaker Breslin: "Excuse me. Representative Brookins asks leave
to be verified. Proceed, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "Hicks. Homer. Keane. Laurino. LeFlore.
Leverenz. Levin. Martinez. Matijevich. Mautino.
McGann. McNamara. McPike. Mulcahey. Nash. O'Connell.
Panayotovich. Pangle. Phelps. Preston. Rea. Richmond.
Saltsman. Satterthwaite. Shaw. Steczo. Stern. Sutker.
Terzich. Turner. Van Dyne. Washington. White. Wolf.
Anthony Young. Myvetter Younge. And Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Breslin: "Do you have any questions of the Affirmative
Roll? Representative McCracken."

McCracken: "Representative Preston."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Preston. Representative
Preston. Is the Gentleman in the chamber? He is not.
Remove him."

McCracken: "Representative Stern."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Stern. Is the Lady in the
chamber? Representative Stern. She is not. Remove her."

McCracken: "Representative Hartke."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Hartke. Representative Hartke.
The Gentleman is in the chamber."

McCracken: "Representative Terzich."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Terzich. Representative
Terzich. He's not in the cham... He is in the chamber.
Keep him on the Roll Call."

McCracken: "Representative Turner."

Speaker Breslin: "Excuse me. Is Representative Terzich in the
chamber? I'm sorry. I thought that was Representative
Terzich coming in. That was incorrect. Representative
Terzich is not in the chamber. Remove him from the Roll

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Call. Add Representative Stern to the Roll Call."

McCracken: "Representative Rea."

Speaker Breslin: "Jim Rea is in his chair."

McCracken: "Representative Ronan."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Ronan. Representative Ronan.

He is not recorded as voting."

McCracken: "Representative Van Dwyne."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Van Dwyne is in his chair."

McCracken: "Representative Christensen."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman is in his chair."

McCracken: "Representative Hicks."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Hicks. Representative Hicks.

Is the Gentleman in the chamber? He is not. Remove him.

Add Representative Terzich to the Roll Call.

Representative Matijevich asks leave to be verified,

Representative McCracken. That is granted."

McCracken: "Representative Bowman."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Bowman."

McCracken: "Okay. I see him. I'm sorry."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Bowman is in the chamber."

McCracken: "Representative Hyvetter Younge."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Younge is in the chamber."

McCracken: "Representative Shaw."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Shaw had leave to be verified."

McCracken: "I'm sorry."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Preston has returned to the chamber. Add him to the Roll Call."

McCracken: "Representative Mautino."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Mautino. The Gentleman is in the chamber. And add Representative Hicks, as he has returned to the chamber."

McCracken: "Black. Representative Black."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Black. Representative Black.

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Is the Gentleman in the chamber? He is not. Remove him."

McCracken: "Representative Brunsvold."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Brunsvold is in his chair."

McCracken: "Representative DeLeo."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman was verified."

McCracken: "He had leave. I'm sorry. Representative Flinn."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Flinn is in his chair. Do you have any further..."

McCracken: "Representative Saltsman."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Saltsman is in his chair. Any further questions, Sir?"

McCracken: "Nothing further."

Speaker Breslin: "What's the count, Mr. Clerk? 61 voting 'aye', 43 voting 'no', 2 voting 'present', and the House Resolution is adopted. Ladies and Gentlemen this House is preparing to adjourn. We have a couple of announcements. One is that the statement of economic interest is to be filed with the Secretary of State's Office today. If you have not done that, please do that today.
