111th Legislative Day

May 1, 1986

Speaker McPike: "The House will come to order. The Members will be in their seats. The chaplain for today will be the Reverend Peter Thompson, Pastor of Saint John's Lutheran Church of Springfield. Reverend Thompson is a guest of Representative Mike Curran. Will the guests in the balcony please rise and join us in the invocation?"

Reverend Peter Thompson: "In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, Amen. Heavenly Father, we stand humbly before You seeking Your blessing on this Assembly and all who are a part of it. We acknowledge that You are ruler of all things and all people, and that from You and You alone flow power and authority and all good and just government. We humbly acknowledge as well that all we who are on positions of exercising these gifts are also responsible before You and shall be judged by You, who alone knows the depth and content of our hearts and minds. May each person here be acutely aware both of the gift and the responsibility, and let no perfunctory lip service blur the clear vision of those who must make decisions for the good order of society and the welfare of Your people. And may the harsh realities of the kingdom of this world be illuminated by the light of Your heavenly kingdom, as we have seen in the life and person of the Lord Jesus Christ by whose name we boldly offer these, our prayers. Amen."

Speaker McPike: "Be led in the Pledge of Allegiance by Representative Ropp."

Ropp - et al: "I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

Speaker McPike: "Roll Call for attendance. Representative Slack, for what reason do you rise?"

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Black: "Yes. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. A point of personal privilege, if I might."

Speaker McPike: "Let me finish the Roll Call first, alright? Representative Piel, excused absences?"

Piel: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, would the record show Representative Johnson, Representative Harris and Representative Barnes are excused today."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, let the record reflect the excused absence of Representative Nelson Rice."

Speaker McPike: "Take the record, Mr. Clerk. 112 Members answering a Roll Call, a quorum is present. Now, Representative Black on a point of personal privilege."

Black: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I realize this is in violation of House rules. I hope you'll bear with a freshman Legislator. I am honored to have in the gallery today the principal, Mr. David 'Carol', the teachers and the outstanding young citizens of Lincoln Elementary School Fifth Grade in Danville. I'm sure you'll indulge me in welcoming them, if you will."

Speaker McPike: "Supplemental Calendar announcement."

Clerk O'Brien: "Supplemental Calendar #1 is now being distributed."

Speaker McPike: "Representative McGann."

McGann: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the Assembly. I rise on a point of personal privilege."

Speaker McPike: "Proceed, Representative McGann."

McGann: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In the gallery, to my left, we have the fine students of 'Ashburn Lutheran Church' at 83rd Street in the City of Chicago, the 29th District, State of Illinois. Mr. Speaker, we're privileged to have in the chamber Sister Rosemary from 'Isræcordia' in Chicago."

Speaker McPike: "Committee Reports."

Speaker McPike: "If the Chair could have your attention for just a moment, we have passed out Supplemental Calendar #1. Well, it is being passed out. We will allow the Members until 2:25 to file additional Motions to discharge, at which time we will print a Supplemental #2 and that will be it. So, you have, if you have not filed a Motion to discharge a Bill and you wish to do so, you have about 10... 10 or 15 minutes to do it, and then we will prepare a Supplemental Calendar #2. Committee Reports. Continue, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "Continuing Report from Environment, Energy and Natural Resources; 'do pass as amended' House Bills 3473 and 3583; 'be adopted' House Resolution 1164; 'Interim Study Calendar' House Bills 3242 and 3243. Representative Terzich, Chairmain of the Committee on Executive, to which the following Bills were referred, action taken April 30,

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Speaker McPike: "The Adjournment Resolution."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Joint Resolution 148. Resolved, by the Senate of the 48th General Assembly... of the 84th General Assembly of the State of Illinois, the House of Representatives concurring herein, that when the Senate adjourns on Friday, May 2, 1966, it stands adjourned until Tuesday, May 6, 1966, at 1:00 p.m., and when the House of Representatives adjourn on Friday, May 2, 1966, it stands adjourned until Tuesday, May 6, 1966 at 12:00 noon."

Speaker McPike: "The Adjournment Resolution speaks to the fact that the House will adjourn tomorrow. You should be aware that tomorrow will be a Perfunctory Session. Representative Matijevich moves for the adoption of the Adjournment Resolution. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Adjournment Resolution is adopted. Page 16 of the Calendar, under Motions, House Bill 193, Representative Younger, move to discharge Executive Committee and advance to Second Reading. This Motion requires 71 votes. The Lady from St. Clair, Representative Younger."

Younger: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. I move to discharge House Bill 192, (sic - House bill 193) I believe it is, from the Executive Committee. I've discussed this with the Chairman. He is in agreement with that. There wasn't time to take up all the Bills, and I move that we adopt the Motion."

Speaker McPike: "The Lady moves to suspend Rule 27(c) and to discharge Executive Committee, and both require 71 votes. And on the Lady's Motion, the Gentleman from McHenry, Representative Klemm."

Klemm: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Well, I certainly have no problems with the Lady's Bill itself, but as Minority Spokesperson we did have time to hear all the Bills that

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the Sponsors were there to hear. It would seem that in fairness to others, who perhaps didn't make it, that we should not start opening up the procedure of having Bills again being discussed that had an opportunity at the Committee. So, I would stand in opposition to this Motion."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from DeHitt, Representative Vinson."

Vinson: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I appreciate your ruling that the suspension of 27(c) requires 71 votes, and I think you're absolutely correct, and I would urge Members not to vote for this Motion. We are in a Legislative Session where it is appropriate for us to deal with the state budget and emergency matters. There is not a centile of an emergency in this Bill. And all we can do is spend money, waste money and genuflect to problems that don't even exist, when we vote for things like this. I would urge a 'no' vote on the Motion in regard to House Bill 193."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Terzich."

Terzich: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, at the Executive Committee, Representative Youngue was waiting quite a long time. However, we had some O'Hare Bills that took up a considerable length of time, and she got caught in the time crunch. And so, therefore, her request for a discharge Committee is certainly a legitimate reason."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Cullerton, on the Motion."

Cullerton: "Yes, I'm rising in support of the Lady's Motion. As I understand it, it is supported by the Chairman of the Committee. I know we're not supposed to talk about the merits of the Bill, but I think anyone who could look at the analysis, it would indicate to them that it certainly merits debate. And I would support the Lady's Motion to

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discharge the Committee."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Younge, to close."

Younge: "Thank you. The subject matter of this Bill is extremely important to the people of the State of Illinois. I did have... did not have an opportunity to be heard because of large in number... other kinds of Bills were being offered in that Committee. And so, I ask for your support to get this very urgent matter, in reference to the availability of lowering the utility bills as a result of solar collectors being made available on people's homes."

Speaker McPike: "The Lady has moved to discharge House Bill 193 from Executive and suspend Rule 27(c). Requires 71 votes. All those in favor of the Motion, signify by voting 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this Motion, there are 60 voting 'aye', 43 voting 'no', 1 voting 'present', and the Motion fails. House Bill 1230, Representative Younge. Same Motion?"

Younge: "I withdraw that Motion."

Speaker McPike: "The Lady withdraws the Motion. The... Next on the Calendar, there's a mistake. It says, 'House Bill 1235' and this is a misprint, and it's in the wrong place on the Calendar. It's House Resolution 1235. So, that's out of the record. Next is House Bill 2593, Representative Younge."

Younge: "Thank you, Mr. Chairman (sic - Mr. Speaker). This is a situation in which it is an agreed Bill that was not heard in the Executive Committee. It is a Bill that would permit minority contractors to assign their contracts, and therefore, have operating expense. The Department of Central Services is in agreement with this Bill, and I didn't have an opportunity to hear... get it heard in Committee. And I ask that I be permitted to discharge the

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Committee and hear it on Second Reading."

Speaker McPike: "You've heard the Lady's Motion. On that, the Gentleman from DeWitt, Representative Vinson."

Vinson: "Again, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I would urge a 'no' vote on this Bill. There is no emergency whatsoever in this matter. There's no need to clutter up a Spring Session that's designed to be devoted to true emergencies with something in this nature. I believe there should be a 'no' vote, and in the event that it appears to get enough votes, I would request a verification."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Cullerton."

Cullerton: "Well, once again... Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Once again, I would rise to support the Lady's Motion, which we understand does require 71 votes. The Bill was on Interim Study Calendar..."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Cullerton. Representative Cullerton, that is not correct. This Bill was not on Interim Study, and the Motion requires 60 votes."

Cullerton: "Okay. Excellent. The... I believe she indicated for the record that it did not receive a hearing. If the Bill did not receive a hearing in the Committee, what is more fair than to discharge the Committee and have it debated on the House floor? It's a much different story, if the Bill had a hearing and was defeated, but in this case she never received a hearing. So, I think it should be very clear that everyone who is interested in being fair to the Lady on this issue, while not ultimately voting on the subject matter, should support the Motion to discharge."

Speaker McPike: "The Lady from St. Clair, Representative Younge, to close."

Younge: "Thank you very much. This is a very important Bill to minority contractors who do not have the operating expense

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or monies to complete contracts. Our goal is to help build business in the State of Illinois, and I didn't have an opportunity to get this Bill heard in Committee because of the large numbers of other Bills that were being heard. The Department agrees with the Bill, and I ask your support to go ahead and hear this matter by the... as a result of the Committee being discharged. The Chairman is in favor of our discharging the Committee, and he has so spoken."

Speaker McPike: "The Lady has moved to discharge Executive Committee and advance to Second Reading House Bill 2593. All those in favor of the Motion, signify by voting 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. The Lady from St. Clair, Representative Younger, to explain your vote."

Younger: "The high levels of unemployment in the urban ghettos require that we do something immediately to do job creation. Job creation is done when contractors are able to increase and do and complete their contracts. So, I urge your support in reference to this Bill, which would simply allow a contractor to assign his contract to a bank, and therefore, as a result of that, use the contract as collateral for operating expenses. This is... The levels of unemployment among youth in urban areas and among adults in urban areas, are at emergency levels. And for those reasons, I ask that you put two more votes on the board, so that this matter can go forward."

Speaker McPike: "Have all voted? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this Motion, there are 60 'ayes', 49 'nos'. The Gentleman from DeWitt, Representative Vinson, has asked for a verification. The Chair wants to announce that a second Supplemental Calendar is being printed. We are not accepting any more Motions to discharge at this time. Representative Van Dwyne would like to be verified... leave to be verified. He's right

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here. Representative Younge, asks for a Poll of the Absentees. Representative Nash, would like to be verified, Mr. Vinson. Representative Nash. Mr. Clerk, Poll the Absentees."

Clerk O'Brien: "Poll of the Absentees. Berrios. Breslin. Kraska. And Zwick. Also, Bullock. Panayotovich. Barnes. Harris. And Rice."

Speaker McPike: "Proceed with the verification."

Clerk O'Brien: "Alexander. Bowman. Braun. Brookins. Brunsvold. Capparelli. Christensen. Cullerton. Curran. Currie. Daley. DeJaegher. DeLeo. Dunn. Farley. Flinn. Flowers. Giglio. Giorgi. Greiman. Hannig. Hicks. Homer. Huff. Keane. Kulas. Laurino. Leflore. Leverenz. Levin. Martinez. Matijevich. Mautino. McGann. McNamara. McPike. Mulcahey. Nash. O'Connell. Pangle. Phelps. Preston. Rea. Richmond. Ronan. Saltsman. Satterthwaite. Shaw. Steczo. Stern. Sutker. Terzich. Turner. VanDuyne. Washington. White. Wolf. Anthony Young. Hyvetter Younge. And Mr. Speaker."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Vinson, questions of the Affirmative Roll."

Vinson: "Mr. Bowman."

Speaker McPike: "Would you repeat that?"

Vinson: "Mr. Bowman. B-O-W-M-A-N."

Speaker McPike: "Mr. Bowman. Representative Bowman. Is the Gentleman in the chamber? The Gentleman is right here. Representative McNamara, for what reason do you rise? Leave to be verified. Representative McNamara, you have leave. Proceed."

Vinson: "Mr. Brookins."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Brookins is in his chair."

Vinson: "Mr. Brunsvold."

Speaker McPike: "Mr. Brunsvold is in his chair."

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Vinson: "Mr. Christensen."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Christensen. Is the Gentleman in the chamber? Representative Christensen. Remove him from the Roll Call."

Vinson: "Mr. Giglio."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Giglio. Representative Frank Giglio. Remove him from the Roll Call."

Vinson: "Mr. Huff."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Huff. Representative Huff in the chamber? Mr. Clerk, remove him from the Roll Call."

Vinson: "Mr. Keane."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Keane is in his chair."

Vinson: "Mr. O'Connell."

Speaker McPike: "Representative O'Connell. Representative O'Connell. He's in the front of the chamber."

Vinson: "Mr. Shaw."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Shaw. Representative Shaw. The Gentleman is in the front of the chamber."

Vinson: "Mr. Steczo."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Steczo is in his chair."

Vinson: "Mr. Dunn."

Speaker McPike: "Mr. Dunn is in his chair."

Vinson: "Mr. Turner."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Turner is down front."

Vinson: "Mr. Panayotovich."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Panayotovich."

Vinson: "I'm sorry. He's not recorded as voting, that's my fault."

Speaker McPike: "Any further questions?"

Vinson: "Yes. Mr. White."

Speaker McPike: "Representative White. Jesse White. The Gentleman is not in the chamber. Remove him from the Roll Call."

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Vinson: "Mr. Ronan."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Ronan. Representative Al Ronan. The Gentleman is not in the chamber. Remove him from the roll."

Vinson: "That's good enough."

Speaker McPike: "Representative... Mr. Clerk, what's the Roll Call? On this Motion, there are 55 'ayes', 49 'nos', and the Motion fails. House Bill 3337, Representative Wojcik. Representative, you have filed this Motion improperly. It's not... It's not necessary to discharge Rules, but simply proper to table the Bill. So, if you'll make that Motion."

Wojcik: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I move to table House Bill 3337 from the Committee... as the Principal Sponsor."

Speaker McPike: "The Lady moves to table House Bill 3337. Does the Lady have leave? Hearing no objections, leave is granted, and 3337 is tabled. House Bill 3484, Representative O'Connell. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative O'Connell, on the Motion."

O'Connell: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 3484, due to the rush of Bills, was not able to be heard in the Executive Committee, and I'd ask at this time for a Motion to discharge the Executive Committee and place it on Second Reading."

Speaker McPike: "You've heard the Gentleman's Motion. On that, the Gentleman from Adams, Representative Mays."

Mays: "Will the Gentleman yield for a question?"

Speaker McPike: "Indicates he will."

Mays: "Did you even appear before Executive Committee yesterday at all?"

O'Connell: "Representative, I was in Judiciary Committee all day, and I was in contact with Representative Capparelli by

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phone, who can attest to you that because of the length of the O'Hare Bills that they would not get to my Bill."

Mays: "Thank you."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Representative Klemm."

Klemm: "Well, I just want to say the Gentleman did try to get to the Committee. I was the Minority Spokesman. I knew he was tied up. So, I have no opposition to it."

Speaker McPike: "Representative O'Connell, to close."

O'Connell: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd just ask for a favorable vote."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman moves to discharge Executive Committee, advance to Second Reading House Bill 3484. And on the Motion, all those in favor vote 'aye', all opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. Representative Mulcahey, 'aye'. Mulcahey, 'aye'. On this Motion, there are 104 'ayes', 1 'no', none voting 'present', and the Motion carries. Supplemental Calendar 61, appears House Bill 934, Representative Bowman."

Bowman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker..."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Bowman, the Chair would like to state that this Motion requires 71 votes."

Bowman: "Yes. Mr. Speaker, why does this Motion require 71 votes?"

Speaker McPike: "This Bill was on Interim Study, it failed to get out of Committee, under 27(c) it requires 71 votes."

Bowman: "It's no longer in Interim Study."

Speaker McPike: "It requires 71 votes, Sir."

Bowman: "Well, I guess that means everyone can just vote any way they like, right? This Bill is the Social Work Licensure Act. The Bill cleared Committee last year. It was voted out by the same Committee to which it was now assigned. It

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came up on the floor and failed by a few votes and was recommitted to Committee on the Interim Study Calendar, and then, as I understand it, it came off of Interim Study by virtue of having a hearing. The Bill was properly posted. The Committee had a very long call yesterday, and I was in and out all morning, and when the Chair announced that the Committee would recess to the call of the Chair, I was standing out in the corridor on the other side of the glass doors. We could see one another, but the next thing I knew the... everyone had walked out of the Committee room. So, we did not get a chance to call our Bill in Committee yesterday and since this same Committee did vote the Bill out last year, I believe it is appropriate. It has had an adequate hearing already, and I think we can proceed to consider it on the House floor. And so therefore, I ask consideration from the Membership to support my Motion to discharge the Committee and advance to Second Reading."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Nash."

Nash: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Since the Chair was... of this... Committee on Registration and Regulation was mentioned in debate, I'm compelled to oppose this Motion. The Gentleman was in Committee when the Chairman asked if any more Sponsors wished to have their Bill called, and he did not respond. He didn't have the votes in Committee to get the Bill out yesterday, and now he's trying to do it with this Motion. For those reasons, I ask for a 'no' vote on this Motion."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from DeWitt, Representative Vinson, on the Motion."

Vinson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I rise in opposition to the Gentleman's Motion. I would request a verification should he appear to get enough votes. And I would remind the Membership that what this

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is, is special legislation for preceptors - something we need not deal with."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Representative Hensel."

Hensel: "Thank you, Mr. Chairman (sic - Mr. Speaker). As Minority Spokesman on the Registration and Regulation Committee, I believe Representative Bowman was in the chamber... in the room when it was called. He didn't respond. So, I ask for a 'no' vote."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Bowman, to close."

Bowman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. The... As I indicated, I had been in the Committee room and was in and out during the course of the morning, I was in and out several times. The Chair says he made the announcement. I... If he made any announcement, I surely did not hear it. I was... we were in full sight of one another through the glass doors at the time he recessed the Committee, at no time did he address his remarks to me. That morning in the corridors, he asked me point blank if I intended to call my Bill that day, and I said, 'Yes, I did intend to call that Bill that day.' The last conversation I had with him, I was quite explicit and quite clear that I planned to call my Bill. And so, I think that it was improper for him to recess the Committee without making sure that the Bill got called. So, I think it is appropriate that we bring this to the floor, and... So, I am asking for your consideration. This will, I think, be the only time we'll be able to consider social work licensure this year, and so, this is a very important vote for persons interested in the social work profession, and I ask for your support."

Speaker McPike: "The Motion is to suspend Rule 27(c) and discharge House Bill 934 from R and R. All those in favor

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of the Gentleman's Motion, signify by voting 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this Motion, there are 39 'ayes', 52 'nos', none voting 'present', and the Motion fails. House Bill 1435, Representative Levin. Representative Levin, this Motion also requires 71 votes. Out of the record? Out of the record. House Bill 3336, Representative Didrickson. Is the Lady... Out of the record. House Bill 3393, Representative Matijevich. Motion requires 60 votes."

Matijevich: "Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, pursuant to Rule 77, I move to discharge Judiciary II Committee and advance to the Order of Second Reading House Bill 3393. Yesterday, knowing I had some responsibilities, I added John Cullerton, Chairman of the Judiciary II Committee, as Co-chief Sponsor of 3393, and he informed that he would move the Bill out of Committee this morning because I knew I would be busy with responsibilities in the Appropriations Committee. I reminded the staff person that I needed this Bill out of Committee, and I was reassured that it would be handled. Just to make sure, I went over to see John Cullerton and the Committee had adjourned, and they had forgot about me. I... The Bill was given to me by the County Board Chairman Jim 'LaBelle'. It increases the Circuit Court fees from 25 dollars to 40 dollars because of the added drunken driving volume. There is another vehicle. Chairman Cullerton has a Bill similar to it, but that's not why he forgot me. I would ask the Members to support this Motion."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Cullerton."

Cullerton: "Yes, the Gentleman is absolutely correct. I didn't handle the Bill when I should have. He asked me to handle

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it for him. I forgot about it. It's probably the best way to... It's really the best way to kill a Bill, but he caught me. So, now I got to support his Motion to discharge."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Representative McCracken."

McCracken: "I support it, too. It was never called, and if anything, it doesn't go far enough. So, I hope the Sponsor is agreeable to some suggestions for other changes."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman moves to discharge House Bill 3393 from Judiciary II and advance to Second Reading. All those in favor of the Motion signify by voting 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this Motion, there are 107 'ayes', no 'nays', none voting 'present', and the Motion carries. Supplemental Calendar announcement, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "Supplemental Calendar #2 is being distributed."

Speaker McPike: "Committee Reports."

Clerk O'Brien: "Representative Cullerton, Chairman of the Committee on Judiciary II, to which the following Bills were referred, action taken May 1, 1986, reported the same back with the following recommendations: 'do pass' House Bills 2882 and 3159; 'do pass as amended' House Bills 3187, 3262, 3340 and 3349; 'Interim Study Calendar' House Bill 3130. Representative Mulcahey, Chairman of the Committee on Elementary and Secondary Education, to which the following Bills were referred, action taken April 30, 1986, reported the same back with the following recommendations: 'do pass' House Bills 768, 2044, 2279, 2587, 2700, 2720, 3018, 3080, 3081, 3089, 3141, 3145, 3182, 3200, 3214, 3227, 3228, 3351, 3422 and 3482; 'do pass as amended' House Bills 45, 1236, 2734, 2771, 2866, 3048, 3144 and 3550; 'do pass Short Debate Calendar' House Bills 2741 and 3062; 'do pass

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as amended Short Debate Calendar' House Bill 986; 'tabled in Committee' House Bill 3070; 'Interim Study Calendar' House Bill 3054. A corrected Committee Report. House Bill 2915 was reported out of Judiciary II in error, the Bill is still in Committee."

Speaker McPike: "Agreed Resolutions."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Resolutions 1244, Daley; 1245, Capparelli and Laurino; 1246, Capparelli and Madigan; 1247, Nash - et al; 1249, Kulas; and 1250, Phelps; 1251, Phelps; and House Joint Resolution 190, Giorgi and Mallock."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, I move for the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions."

Clerk O'Brien "Additionally, House Resolution 1252, offered by Representative Tuerk - et al."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, this Resolution is hand delivered by the outstanding leader, Minority Spokesman of the House Labor Committee, Fred Tuerk, let's go for this one, too."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. Agreed Resolutions are adopted. General Resolutions."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Joint Resolution 199, Pangle... that's 191, Pangle and House Resolution 1248, Brookins - et al."

Speaker McPike: "Committee on Assignment. Death Resolution."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Resolution 1243, offered by Representative Daley, with respect to the memory of Agnes Barrett."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Giorgi moves for the adoption of the Death Resolution. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Resolution is adopted. Supplemental Calendar #2, appears House Bill 523, Representative Mautino. Now, Sir, this Motion

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requires 71 votes."

Mautino: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I had no original intent of calling 523... 24 in Committee, but what has happened is we passed the Bill out that needs a corrective measure. It was the Bill of Representative John Cullerton. It has the clearance of both the Chairman and the Minority Member to have it presented on the floor, so we could make the corrective measure to, I think it was, House Bill 1741, if I'm not mistaken. And because this is the only other vehicle available, I'd like to have it out on the floor and ask for your support in that regard."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman moves to discharge House Bill 523. And on that, the Gentleman from DuPage, Representative Hensel."

Hensel: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. Representative Mautino, is it your intention that this Bill will not be anything that it says now, but will be strictly to... be an Amendment like to the Bill that we had passed out, to make a change?"

Mautino: "Yes, it will address the situation passed, as it pertains to Navy Pier that needs correction."

Hensel: "So, this Bill... the substance is not going to be in the Bill."

Mautino: "No, it won't be an Amendment to that Bill."

Hensel: "Okay. I support the Motion, then."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Nash."

Nash: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I support the Gentleman's Motion that intends just to correct something that has to be corrected, as Mr. Mautino just indicated. And I urge an 'aye' vote on this Motion."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Vinson."

Vinson: "Yes, I wondered if the Sponsor might yield for an inquiry?"

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Speaker McPike: "Indicates he will."

Vinson: "Representative, I had read the Bill and had intended to support your discharge Motion on the Bill, but I thought I heard in the course of debate that the Bill is not going to be used for the purpose of... Well, what is the Bill going to be used for?"

Mautino: "Representative Cullerton passed legislation that authorized alcoholic beverages to be sold at Navy Pier."

Vinson: "He did that just last week, didn't he?"

Mautino: "That's right. We need a corrective Amendment on there because..."

Vinson: "Oh, his Bill was flawed."

Mautino: "Yes, it was flawed."

Vinson: "Defective."

Mautino: "Yes."

Vinson: "Improper."

Mautino: "No. No, it was a small problem occurred with establishing a time line that wiped out the opportunity to sell other products at Navy Pier. We want to correct that."

Vinson: "Because he wanted to move that so fast, he made mistakes in it, is that what you're telling me?"

Mautino: "No, I think we want a backup position, is what we want, in case that doesn't get done in the Senate, and we'd like to correct that problem."

Vinson: "It does demonstrate the weakness of trying to run lickety-split in this process, and not giving a careful oversight to the problems that may be generated by rapid drafting, right?"

Mautino: "I'm sure with that analysis, we'll thank you for your support for this good Motion to correct..."

Vinson: "From now on, I'll start watching Representative Cullerton's Bills a little more carefully to make sure that

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there aren't these defects in them."

Speaker McPike: "The second... The second error today, Representative Cullerton. Second. The Gentleman from Bureau, Representative Mautino, moves to discharge House Bill 523 from Registration and Regulation and suspend Rule 27(c). All those in favor of the Motion signify by voting 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this Motion there are 103 'ayes', 1 'no', none voting 'present', and the Motion carries. House Bill 524. Out of the record. House Bill 938, Representative Ropp. Representative, this will also require 71 votes."

Ropp: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. House Bill 938 is a Bill that I had yesterday afternoon while we were in Session, talked to the Chairman of the Higher Educational Committee, explaining the intent and stating that I certainly would be in the Committee. I also had a Bill that was in Transportation Committee and went to that Committee first, assuming that it would get out. If any of you attended the Transportation Committee yesterday, there was 150 people in a space that should have only held 100, and by the time I got out, the Higher Education Committee had adjourned, and I was unable to present the Committee that Bill."

Speaker McPike: "The Lady from Champaign, Representative Satterthwaite."

Satterthwaite: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I rise in support of the Gentleman's Motion. He did indeed indicate that he planned to call the Bill yesterday. We arrived at the end of our business, before he was able to come to the Committee Hearing, and we were unable to locate him at that time. So, his Bill did not get heard in Committee, and I support his Motion."

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Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman moves to suspend Rule 27(c) and discharge House Bill 938. I'm sorry, Representative Ropp. Do you want to close?"

Ropp: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I welcome your support and appreciate the comments by the Chairman of the Committee, and would hope that I receive favorable support."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman has moved to suspend Rule 27(c) and discharge House Bill 938 from the Committee on Higher Education. All those in favor of the Gentleman's Motion signify by voting 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this Motion, there are 104 'ayes', 2 'nos', none voting 'present', and the Motion carries. The remaining Motions on the Calendar require 60 votes. House Bill 2915, Representative Bowman."

Bowman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Last night, I thought that House Bill 2915 was reported out from the Judiciary Committee. The Chair announced that I had received 8 votes on this Bill, and 8 votes were required, and so, I left the room thinking the Bill was reported out. It turns out that the numbers weren't added up correctly by the Committee Clerk, and that received one vote shy of the necessary vote to get out of Committee. So, now I am throwing myself on the mercy of the House to try and get this Bill to the floor. All I can do is to assure you this will not be used as a vehicle for the Social Work Practice Act. So, you're safe in that regard, if you vote for this Motion. Thank you."

Speaker McPike: "I think Representative Cullerton has found another way to kill a Bill."

Bowman: "Yes, that's correct."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Cullerton."

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Cullerton: "Actually, just to reiterate, there's two ways in which you can kill these Bills. Number one is to tell the Sponsor that you'll handle it for him, and then just not call it, and hope that they don't catch you. The second way is to tell the Sponsor that his Bill passed, and then after he leaves, discover that you're one vote short. So... He caught me, too. So, here's what happened: We had the Roll Call, there was some people who had voted 'present', who then changed their vote in order to get the Bill out of Committee, after realizing what the vote was, and they changed their vote to 'aye', and the clerk tabulated the votes, and he was in error. So, the Bill was one vote short. So, under those circumstances, I would support the Gentleman's Motion to discharge. I would also indicate that I also supported the Bill, but... and others did not, but I just thought I'd give the background behind the Motion."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Representative McCracken."

McCracken: "I rise in opposition to the Motion. The fact of the matter is, it got fewer than the required number of votes, regardless of what he was told at the time. There is just no reason. It's a bad Bill that had a vote that lost."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from Knox, Representative Hawkinson."

Hawkinson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I did not, and do not, support the Bill. However, it was reported, as the Chairman indicates, that it had passed with 8 votes. I do not recall any vote switching, but it was announced that it was passed. However, I'm going to oppose the Motion, because I think it's a bad Bill."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Bowman, to close."

Bowman: "Well, I just want to thank all the good sports over

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there for... for their help. But in any event, all I can do is to assure Representative McCracken that if he doesn't like the Bill, I'd be happy to work with him to improve it. In the meantime, I think this Motion certainly deserves an 'aye' vote, in the interest of fairness to Sponsors. Thank you."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman has moved to discharge House Bill 2915 from Judiciary, advance to Second Reading. All those in favor of the Gentleman's Motion, signify by voting 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted? Have all voted who wish? The Gentleman from Lake, Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Speaker, in explanation of my vote, I think this ought to be a vote of fairness to the Sponsor. Think of any of you, if you left the Committee thinking that you had passed the Bill. Any one of you would leave that Committee comfortable that you had passed your Bill out of the Committee. There's nothing more you have to do. If you are a vote short, you'd stick around and try to get that vote. I don't think this vote ought to be a vote on the Bill itself. You have every opportunity, when the Bill is on Third Reading, to vote on the Bill itself. But in fairness to the Sponsor, I think we ought to give him the vote and let him proceed with his Bill, because he surely thought he had Committee approval when he left that room."

Speaker McPike: "The Lady from Lake, Representative Stern."

Stern: "Mr. Speaker, as the Member of the Committee who changed her vote from 'present' to 'aye' on the basis of thinking that we were then promoting the Bill to the floor, I would ask you to reconsider your vote on this."

Speaker McPike: "Have all voted? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this Motion, there are 58 'ayes', 48 'nos', 1 voting 'present'. The Motion fails."

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House Bill 3487, Representative Williamson, the Lady from Cook, on the Motion."

Williamson: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I move to take House Bill 8487 (sic - House Bill 3487), a Motion to discharge, out of Committee for Cities and Villages. I feel that, although, this did have a very long hearing, that this is a very important issue to the people of the State of Illinois, and I would like to bring it to the entire Body for a full vote."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from Cook. You heard the Lady's Motion. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Steczo."

Steczko: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in opposition to the Lady's Motion to discharge the Cities and Villages Committee. Probably, Mr. Speaker, if this Motion would be in order, by any of the other Sponsors who had Bills before the Committee that day. The Cities and Villages Committee met last Tuesday with an agenda of 23 Bills, with two hours to hear those Bills, an hour and a half of which was devoted to this Bill and one other related to the same subject matter. There was complete hearing, far more complete than the other Sponsors achieved, and unfortunately, the Lady did not get the requisite number of votes to send the Bill out on the House floor. But yet, the hearing that was held was fair beyond all means... all means, and I would encourage the House to reject this Motion."

Speaker McPike: "No further discussion. The Lady from Cook to close, Representative Williamson."

Williamson: "I hope those bombs are not being dropped from planes that are flying in and out of O'Hare. This is identical to House Amendment 34 from House Bill 1906, which we did pass last year in this Body. All I'm asking for is that we do again have time to hear this Bill properly on the floor."

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Thank you."

Speaker McPike: "The Lady moves to discharge House Bill 3437 from Cities and Villages and advance to Second Reading. All those in favor of the Lady's Motion, signify by voting 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this Motion, there are 54 'ayes', 52 'nos', 2 voting 'present'. The Motion fails. House Bill 3488, the Lady from Cook, Representative Williamson."

Williamson: "Mr. Speaker and Members of this House, I again ask to discharge... Motion to discharge House Bill 3438 from Cities and Villages Committee."

Speaker McPike: "You've heard the Lady's Motion. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Steczo."

Steczko: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Again, I rise in opposition to this Motion, and I'll restate that in a two hour period allotted amount of time to hear 23 Bills in the Cities and Villages Committee this past Tuesday, House Bill 3488 in particular consumed one hour and fifteen minutes. Unfortunately, the Lady did not get the requisite number of votes, but did have a fair hearing. And I would urge the House to reject this Motion."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Williamson, to close."

Williamson: "This Bill deals with the banning of further construction of new runways at O'Hare Airport, and I would ask for a favorable vote."

Speaker McPike: "The Lady has moved to discharge House Bill 3488 from Cities and Villages and advance to Second Reading. All those in favor of the Lady's Motion, signify by voting 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. I'm sorry, the Gentleman from Champaign to explain his vote, Representative Johnson."

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Johnson: "No, I don't want to explain my vote."

Speaker McPike: "Okay. Take the record, Mr. Clerk. On this Motion, there are 54 'ayes', 53 'nos', 2 voting 'present'. The Motion fails. House Bill 3491, Representative Williamson."

Williamson: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, I move to make a Motion to discharge House Bill 3491 from the Executive Committee. I feel that this is a very important issue, and I would like to have a full hearing in the House."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Terzich."

Terzich: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this particular Bill certainly did receive a full and comprehensive hearing. I think that the Bills took in excess of one hour. We heard testimony from everybody and anybody. It certainly had a fair hearing. The Bill did not receive the required number of votes, and I would move that we do not approve the discharge of Committee."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Williamson, to close."

Williamson: "Mr. Speaker, this Bill deals with creating a Metropolitan Airport Authority Act, and again, I stress that this is a very important issue to the people of the State of Illinois, and that it should get a fair hearing, and I ask for a favorable vote."

Speaker McPike: "The Lady has moved to discharge House Bill 3491 from Executive and advance to Second Reading. All those in favor of the Lady's Motion, signify by voting 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this Motion, there are 54 'ayes', 51 'nos', 4 voting 'present', and the Motion fails. House Bill 3492, Representative Williamson."

Williamson: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, I move to discharge House Bill 3492 from Energy and Environment and

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Natural Resources Committee."

Speaker McPike: "You've heard the Lady's Motion. Is there any discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Kulas."

Kulas: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I rise to oppose the Lady's Motion. House bill 3492 had a full and fair hearing in the Energy and Environment Committee yesterday afternoon. And let me tell you something, that the Sponsor of this bill, after being bombarded, didn't even show up. She sent a sacrificial lamb in Representative Pedersen, who took the brunt of this. So, I would oppose the Lady's Motion, and ask for 'no' votes."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Williamson, to close."

Williamson: "Representative Kulas, Representative McPike and I were running from room to room into several other Committees at the same time that the Bill was being heard. So, now that you have heard the entire story, I'm asking for a sympathy vote, and asking for a favorable vote."

Speaker McPike: "You've heard the Lady's Motion. The Chair denies nothing. The Lady has moved to discharge House Bill 3492 from Energy, Environment, advance to Second Reading. All those in favor of the Lady's Motion, signify by voting 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Representative Vinson, on the Motion."

Vinson: "Just as a matter of personal privilege, I would point out that given the way the Chair is voting, we now know what his attitude is on the day after."

Speaker McPike: "Was that comment addressed to the Chair, or Representative Williamson? Representative Vinson."

Vinson: "To the galleries."

Speaker McPike: "Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this Motion, there are 54 'ayes', 54 'nos', 2 voting 'present'. The

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Motion fails. House Bill 3494, Representative Williamson."

Williamson: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, I move to Motion to discharge House Bill 3494 from Transportation and Motor Vehicles Committee. At the time that this Bill was heard in Committee, it was understood that Department of Transportation had the opposite position of what they have at this time. We now have a letter from the Department of Transportation stating that they are neutral on House Bill 3494, and that they do not stand in opposition."

Speaker McPike: "You've heard the Lady's Motion, and on that, the Gentleman from Macon, Representative Dunn."

Dunn: "Well, this Bill, like all the others, did receive a fair hearing in Committee, and I would urge the Membership to reject the Motion to discharge, especially those of you around downstate, who are hard pressed for highway funds, because this does talk about an expressway, and we never know what will happen if expressway vehicles get down on the floor of the House. So, whether they're opposed or proponents we don't know, and we just want to keep this Bill where it is now so downstate roads will be protected for the future. I urge a 'no' vote."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from Adams, Representative Mays."

Mays: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support of the Lady's Motion. Indeed, at the time that this happened, the liaison for the Department was running around trying to get the letter which would say that the Department had changed a position on a given Bill from what was represented in the Committee to the neutral stance. In addition, I believe that the previous Gentleman's remarks may be somewhat misleading for any downstater, because there was nothing involving any kind of highway dollars, or road dollars in terms of construction that might be siphoned off from downstate. So, for both those reasons, I

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would urge an 'aye' vote on the Lady's Motion, and, am hopeful she can prevail."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Greiman."

Greiman: "Yes, thank you, Mr. Speaker. I was at the Committee, at the long Committee Meeting, that this Bill was afforded. And actually, I'm holding two fascinating documents. One is issued on the 28th of April, and the Department of Transportation says that we could lose 37 million dollars if we pass this Bill. And the next day... the Department of Transportation... opposed to it... The next day, they sort of filed a new thing, and they just don't mention the 37 million dollars that we could lose. And they say, 'What? We're neutral now.' I wonder if they fired the guy who wrote the first one. But clearly, if you want to lose 37 million dollars, we should, you know, give this Bill a real... we should pass it right to the Governor. But I think it's had a fair hearing, and we ought not to deal with it any longer. We should give it the same kind of Roll Call we've given all of her other fine pieces of legislation today."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from DeWitt, Representative Vinson."

Vinson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Assembly. I suppose that I've been more interested in getting highway dollars to build highways downstate than about anybody else in this General Assembly, and I've watched the process for a long time. The Governor is for this Bill, and any time a Governor is for a Bill, you've got an opportunity to build highways downstate, and that's about the only time you ever do. So, if you care about highways downstate, I'd urge you to vote for this Bill."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Williamson, to close."

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Williamson: "I, again, would like to stress that I have a letter from the Illinois Department of Transportation, mine is dated the 29th of April, and on this position they are very neutral, and they have not taken a position on this bill. I am asking for a favorable vote on House Bill 3494."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Matijevich, did you have a point?"

Matijevich: "Speaker, I'm going to cast a neutral 'present' vote."

Speaker McPike: "You've heard the Lady's Motion. She moves to discharge House Bill 3494 from Transportation Committee, advance to Second Reading. All those in favor of the Lady's Motion, signify by voting 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this Motion, there are 53 'ayes', 44 'nos', 12 voting 'present'. The Motion fails. The Gentleman from Cook, Speaker Madigan, for an announcement."

Madigan: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. We have been in the process of notifying all interested groups and associations and interested Legislators of the process that will be used to try and resolve this most pressing problem. On Tuesday, there will be a series of five meetings of coordinating Committees, which will be scheduled throughout the afternoon. These meetings will then lead into the summit, again, on Wednesday at 3:00 p.m., in Room 114. We plan to conduct this in a very orderly and deliberative fashion. We do not plan to encourage anyone to storm any offices, or to engage in any unneeded rhetoric. And so, everyone is invited, and we hope to see you at those meetings. Thank
