50th Legislative Day

June 4, 1985

Speaker McPike: "The House will come to order. The Members will be in their seats. The Chaplain for today will be Father Eugene Costa, Vice Rector of the Diocesan Seminary of the Immaculate Conception at Lake Springfield. Father Costa is a guest of Representative Mike Curran. Will the guests in the balcony please rise and join us in the invocation?"

Father Costa: "Let us pray. Almighty and Eternal God, You know the deepest desires of our hearts, and You lead and guide us. In Your goodness, watch over this Assembly of our leaders, fill them with the spirit of Your wisdom so that the people of our state may prosper and be secure. We pray through Christ, our Lord. Amen."

Speaker McPike: "Led in the Pledge of Allegiance by Representative Ropp."

Ropp: "I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

Speaker McPike: "Roll Call for Attendance. Take the record. 116 Members answering the Roll Call, a quorum is present. Excused absences? Representative Bowman."

Bowman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. For purposes of an announcement, I would like to inform the House or ask leave of the House, rather, to suspend the posting requirement so the House Appropriations II Committee can meet tomorrow for purposes of considering subject matter only, the subject matter being the grant levels for the public aid recipients. We will be meeting in this chamber at 2:00 p.m. I have cleared this with my Republican Spokesman on the Committee and now ask leave of the House for this meeting."

Speaker McPike: "You've heard the Gentleman's Motion. He's asked leave to waive the posting requirements so the

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Appropriations II Committee can meet tomorrow to discuss subject matter - grant levels for public aid recipients. Are there any objections? Hearing none, leave is granted. Attendance Roll Call will be used. Posting requirements are waived. Representative Johnson, someone has... Representative Johnson, someone has requested that you be removed from the floor. That's better. Page five, Consent Calendar Second Reading, Second Day. Mr. Clerk."

This Bill was reassigned too late. I've discussed it with Representative Woodyard, the Minority Spokesman, and he has no problems. And, therefore, I ask for leave to post that Bill, Senate Bill 743."

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Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave to waive the appropriate rules so that Senate Bill 743 can be heard tomorrow. Are there any objections? Hearing none, leave is granted. Attendance Roll Call will be used. Page two of the Calendar, Senate Bills Second Reading, Short Debate, appears Senate Bill 492, Representative Wolf. Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 492, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. Senate Bill 505, Representative Peterson. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 505, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Municipal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker McPike: "Any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk Leone: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. Senate Bill 517, Representative Countryman. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 517, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Consumer Fraud and Deceptive Business Practice Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. Senate Bill 956, Representative White. Representative White in the chamber? Representative Deuchler? Out of the record. Senate Bills Second Reading appears Senate Bill 148, Representative

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Hicks. Representative Mautino? Representative Hicks. Out of the record. Senate Bill 297, Representative O'Connell. Out of the record. Senate Bill 303, Representative Ronan. Out of the record. Senate Bill 431, Representative Giorgi. 431. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 431, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Municipal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Out of the record? Take the Bill out of the record, Mr. Clerk. Senate Bill 495, Ronan. Out of the record. Senate Bill 605, Representative Breslin. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 605, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. Senate Bill 1193, Representative Turner. Out of the record. Representative Ronan, we just took two Bills out of the record. Senate Bill 303, do you wish to have that Bill called? Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 303, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Motor Fuel Tax Law. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. And Senate Bill 495, Representative Ronan. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 495, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

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Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. Page seven of the Calendar, under Concurrence, appears HJR 1, Representative Matijevich."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Joint Resolution #1 concerns the Criminal Justice Information Authority, together with Senate Amendment #1."

Speaker McPike: "Gentleman from Lake, Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, House Joint Resolution #1, as it left the House, indicated our opposition to the Criminal Justice Information Authority studying... or making an evaluation of the intents of probation study program. The Senate Amendment #1 to House Joint Resolution resolves that the University of Illinois at Chicago Circle, the center for research and law and justice, be directed to commence the evaluation of the intensive probation study program and that a copy of this Resolution be sent to the Criminal Justice Information Authority and the University of Illinois Circle Campus. I agree totally with the Amendment and move to concur with Senate Amendment #1 to House Joint Resolution #1."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman moves to concur in Senate Amendment #1. Is there any discussion? Being none, the question is, 'Shall the House concur in Senate Amendment #1 to House Joint Resolution #1?' All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Take the record, Mr. Clerk. On this Motion there are 111 'ayes', no 'nays', 2 voting 'present'. And this Motion, having received a Constitutional Majority, prevails and the House does concur and adopt House Joint Resolution #1. Page six of the Calendar, Constitutional Amendments Second Reading, appears HJRCA 6."

Clerk O'Brien: "Constitutional Amendment #6. Resolved by the House of Representatives of the 84th General Assembly of

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the State of Illinois, the Senate concurring herein, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the state, for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least six months after the adoption of this Resolution, a proposition to amend Section 1 of Article X of the Constitution to read as follows: Article X, Education. Section 1 - Obligation. Preschools. A fundamental obligation of the people of the state is the educational development of all persons to the limits of their capacities. The state shall provide for an efficient system of high quality public educational institutions and services. Education in public schools to the secondary level shall be free. There may be such other free education as the General Assembly provides by law. The state has a primary responsibility and obligation for financing the system of public education. Therefore, the General Assembly shall annually appropriate and the state shall expend more than one half of the total sum of all funds expended annually by the state, local governments and the Federal Government for the financing of public education through the secondary level of this state. For the purposes of this Section, funds expended by local governments for the financing of public education through the secondary level in this state shall include revenues derived through or by municipalities, units of local government and school districts by whatever sources, including corporate personal property replacement taxes which are expended for public education through the secondary level. For the purpose of this Section, funds expended by the Federal Government for the financing of public education through the secondary level in this state shall include revenues of any type derived or received from Federal Government. The state shall, as needed, raise the

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rate of taxation of one or more taxes currently imposed by the state and levy and collect funds derived therefrom or institute new sources of taxation and levy and collect funds derived therefrom to meet the public education funding obligation imposed by this Section. Schedule. This Amendment shall take effect upon its adoption by the electors. Second Reading of the Constitutional Amendment. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. Representative Cullerton, on a Motion. Cullerton."

Cullerton: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I move that the Bills listed on the Calendar Order of Senate Bills First Reading be allowed to be read a first time today. This is in light of the fact that Messages concerning these Bills were received and read into the record prior to May 31, 1985. I'll be happy to answer any questions."

Speaker McPike: "You've heard the Gentleman's Motion. All those in favor... any objections? Hearing none, the Attendance Roll Call will be used. The Motion carries and the Senate Bills First Reading will be read today. Agreed Resolutions."

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Speaker McPike: "Representative Matijeich."

Matijeich: "Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, House Joint Resolution 63, Hoffman, commends the Illinois Export Council. House Joint Resolution 64, Panayotovitch, congratulates inductees to the Academy of the Humanitarians. House Resolution 462, Rice, honors the Jackie Robinson Little League.
